a. Unified Command Report (20 minutes)

Derotha Ferraro, South Peninsula Hospital (SPH) Public Information Officer, reported COVID-19 testing has moved to 4201 Bartlett Street, seven days a week from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Call 235-0235 in advance to register. Currently there aren't enough supplies to test ever person for every reason so call or check www.sphosp.org to ensure you qualify before you come. A person who's been exposed to a known positive should quarantine and wait approximately seven days post exposure to test. SPH has provided 10,196 tests, 9,789 are negative, 124 positive, and the rest are pending. Ms. Ferraro reviewed State's data dashboard information compared to the information provided by SPH and why the information sometimes differs between the two sites. She shared hospital visitation updates and commented regarding the upcoming Rotary Heath Fair, low cost blood draws, and upcoming flu shot opportunities.

Ms. Ferraro answered questions regarding the types of COVID-19 tests used at the hospital and tracking results.

Jenny Carroll, City of Homer Public Information Officer, reported since March the State has seen various time lags and efficiencies in their testing facilities. It comes down to the amount of transmission going on in the state, and right now they're seeing some of the highest numbers of positive cases. Public Health Nurses are an important tool to help mitigate the spread and

the nurses are stretched very thin. It important for the city businesses, schools, and others have mitigation plans in place to help mitigate the spread. She acknowledged the school district and their work in implementing their mitigation plans as the numbers are rising.

Special Projects & Communications Coordinator Carroll reviewed the written report from Sara Perman that was provided in the supplemental packet. She highlighted the NERG, CBERG, and SoSERG programs have closed, the NERG had 35 applications received and approved for a total of just under \$323,000 awarded, CBERG had four applications received and approved for a total of \$75,000 awarded, and SoSERG had nine applications received and approved for a total of just under \$150,000 awarded. The Rasmussen Foundation approved the Municipal Match Program for arts and culture organizations that will be allocated to the arts and culture mission oriented groups that applied. The HERG program opened two weeks ago, it closes October 16th at 5:00 p.m. So far there have been 95 application received, 76 have been approved, one denied, and the remaining are being reviewed for eligibility. He shared concern that the assessment payment that come in should pay the debt service and past councils have bonded 100% of the cost and not made a cash contribution, so we're collecting less in debt payment than what we're paying in debt, so we need to correct and ensure we're making the cash contribution. The water/sewer fund has two sources of income, money coming in from debt assessment and the percentage of sales tax. We have to subsidize the debt assessment and so it reduces the amount available for either of those other uses.

AMENDED AND RESTATED OPERATING AGREEMENT OF COSMIC SEAWEED, LLC

This Amended and Restated Operating Agreement ("Operating Agreement") of Cosmic SeaWeed, LLC (the "Company"), an Alaska limited liability company, is entered into by and among the Company and the individuals executing this Agreement as the Members

RECITALS

Christina Logan, Christopher Corey, and Chris Long executed an Operating Agreement for Cosmic SeaWeed, LLC, dated October 25, 2018 ("2018 Operating Agreement").

The 2018 Operating Agreement, under provision XLII, allows for its Members to amend the 2018 Operating Agreement and the Members desire to amend and restate the Company's Operating Agreement.

The Members agree to this Operating Agreement's provisions and have executed a resolution adopting the Operating Agreement.

In consideration of the promises and covenants contained herein, the Members agree as follows.

AGREEMENT

1. ADOPTION OF STATUTORY RULES

Except to the extent provided by this Operating Agreement or the Articles of Organization, the Company is governed by the rules, procedures, and provisions set forth in the Alaska Revised Limited Liability Company Act (the "Act"), AS 10.50, and any successor statute, as amended from time to time.

2. INITIAL MEMBERS

The Company's initial Members and each Member's Membership Interest are set forth below:

Member or Members when used in the Operating Agreement means Christina A. Logan, Christopher B. Corey, and Chris C. Long and any other person who executes this Operating Agreement in the future pursuant to the Operating Agreement's provisions.

3. ORGANIZATION AND PURPOSE

A. Company's Name

The Company's name is Cosmic SeaWeed, LLC.

B. Purpose

Cosmic SeaWeed, LLC Operating Agreement Page 1 of 2

The Company is organized to own and operate marijuana-related businesses and to engage in any other lawful purpose.

C. Term.

The term of the Company will begin upon the acceptance of the Articles of Organization by the Alaska Department of Commerce and will continue until terminated pursuant to Section 9 of this Operating Agreement or the Act's mandatory provisions.

D. Registered Agent

The Company's initial registered agent is Christina A. Logan, whose mailing address is 272 Charles Way, Homer, AK 99603 and physical address is 262 Charles Way, Homer, AK 99603.

4. MEMBERS' RIGHTS AND DUTIES

A. Management Right

The Members will manage the Company. Each Member has the right to participate in the control and conduct of the Company's business, and subject to the limitations imposed by the Act, this Operating Agreement, or Members' action, each Member is an agent of the Company and has authority to bind the Company in the ordinary course of its business. The Members have the power, on the Company's behalf, to do all things necessary, appropriate, or convenient to carry out the Company's business and affairs.

B. Members' Liability

No Member will be liable for any debt or obligation for which the Company is liable or which is secured by Company property. The Company's failure to observe any formalities or requirements relating to the exercise of the Company's powers or management of its business or affairs under this Operating Agreement or the Act will not be grounds for imposing personal liability on any Member.

C. Indemnity

The Company will indemnify each Member against losses, judgments, claims, expenses, and liabilities, including amounts paid in settlement, in connection with the Member's acts, errors, omissions, or services relating to the Company, to the fullest extent permitted by law.

D. Dealing with the Company

The Members may deal with the Company, provide or receive assets or services to or from the Company, and receive compensation or other income from the transactions and dealings.

5. COMPANY MANAGEMENT

A. Company Management

The Members have the exclusive right to manage the Company's business. Accordingly, except as otherwise specifically limited in this Operating Agreement or under applicable law, the Members will: (i) manage the Company's affairs and business; (ii) exercise the authority and powers granted to the Company; and (iii) otherwise act in all other matters on the Company's behalf.

B. Company Expenses

All expenses incurred with respect to the Company's organization, operation, and management will be paid or reimbursed by the Company. Before the Company can incur debt exceeding \$20,000 or spend greater than \$20,000 in one transaction a majority of the Company's ownership interest must approve of the debt or spending.

C. Meetings

Any Member may call a Member meeting. The meeting must be held at the Company's principal place of business or as designated in the meeting's notice or notice waiver. Notice of a Member meeting must be provided to each Member at least three days and no more than thirty days before the meeting's date, unless the procedures in Section 5.I., are followed. Notices must be in writing and specify the purpose for which the meeting is called.

D. Quorum

A quorum for transacting business at any Member meeting requires a majority of the Company's Membership Interest present in person or represented by proxy.

E. Telephonic Meetings

Members may participate in, attend, and act at any Member meeting through telephonic or other communication means, as long as all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other. A Member's participation in a Member meeting constitutes attendance and in-person presence at the meeting.

F. Proxies

Each Member entitled to vote at a Member meeting, or to express consent or dissent to an action in writing without a meeting, may authorize another person to act for the Member by proxy. The written and signed proxy notice must be provided to the Company's principal office at least forty-eight (48) hours before a meeting is held or action is taken. A proxy will terminate eleven (11) months after its execution date, unless otherwise specified in the proxy.

G. Voting of Interests

Each Member is entitled to a vote equal to the Member's Membership Interest in the Company on each matter submitted to a vote. For example, a Member holding a 33% Membership Interest holds a vote equal to 33; a Member holding a 25% Membership Interest holds a vote equal to 25.

H. Action by Members

Except as otherwise provided in this Operating Agreement, all decisions relating to the business or affairs of the Company will be decided at a Member meeting by the affirmative vote or consent of a majority of the Company's Membership Interest present in person or represented by proxy. The following actions, however, require the affirmative vote or consent of all Members:

- (i) transferring any portion or all of at Member's Ownership Interest:
- (ii) dissolving or winding-up the Company's business;
- (iii) selling the Company;
- (iv) merging the Company with any other entity;
- (v) amending the Operating Agreement;

- (vi) commencing a voluntary bankruptcy case for the Company;
- (vii) conveying any interest the Company may have in any Alaska Marijuana Control Board license or permit.

I. Action Without a Meeting

Any action required or permitted to be taken at any Member meeting may be taken without a meeting, without prior notice, and without a vote, if all Members entitled to vote on the action sign a written consent, setting forth the action taken. The written consent must bear the signature and signature date of each Member. The record date for determining Members entitled to sign the written consent will be the date of the first signature by a Member.

6. CAPITAL ACCOUNTS, CONTRIBUTIONS, AND ALLOCATIONS

A. Capital Accounts

In addition to whatever other accounts are necessary for the Company's business operation, the Company will maintain a capital account for each Member.

B. Initial Contributions

Upon executing the Operating Agreement, each Member will contribute to the Company the cash and other assets described on attached Schedule A, which will be credited to the Member's capital account.

C. Subsequent Contributions

Each Member may, at his or her option, from time to time make additional contributions to the capital account as is determined to be necessary or desirable by that Member.

D. Loans

Each Member may, at his or her option, from time to time make loans to the Company on such terms as the Members agree.

E. Allocations

Except as may be required by law, profits, losses, and all other items of income, gain, loss, deduction, and credit will be allocated among the Members in proportion to each Member's Membership Interest in the Company. Distribution of the Company's cash and other assets (other than in Company dissolution) will be made at the times determined by a majority of the Members.

F. Reimbursement

As soon as the Company has sufficient funds to do so and before distributing any other profits or losses, it will reimburse each Member for his and her initial capital contribution as detailed in Schedule A.

7. TRANSFER AND CONVERSION OF MEMBERSHIP INTERESTS AND MEMBER ADDITION, SUBSTITUTION, AND WITHDRAWAL

A. Company Interests Transfers

The term "transfer" and "transfers" when used in the Operating Agreement with respect to a Membership Interest, includes any sale, assignment, gift, pledge,

Cosmic SeaWeed, LLC Operating Agreement Page 4 of 10 hypothecation, mortgage, exchange, or other disposition, except the term will not include any pledge, mortgage, hypothecation, or granting of a security interest in a Membership Interest in connection with any financing obtained on the Company's behalf.

B. Void Transfers

No Membership Interest can be transferred, in whole or in part, except in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in Section 7. Any transfer or purported transfer of any Membership Interest not made in accordance with the Operating Agreement will be void ab initio.

C. Transfers

A Member may transfer all or a portion of that Member's Membership Interest to any other person or entity, provided all of the following conditions are met, as well as all other applicable conditions in Section 7:

- i. The Member has first offered the Membership Interest, in accordance with Section 7.D., to the non-transferring Members;
- ii. All non-transferring Members, in the exercise of their sole and absolute discretion, provide written consent to the transfer;
- iii. The transferee agrees to be bound by all the terms and conditions of the Company's Articles of Organization and Operating Agreement;
- iv. The transferee assumes the Member's obligations, if any, to the Company; and
- v. All necessary regulatory approvals are received.

Unless and until a transferee is admitted as a substituted Member, the transferee will have no right to exercise any of the powers, rights, or privileges of a Member. A Member who has transferred its Membership Interest in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in Section 7 will cease to be a Member upon transfer of his or her entire Membership Interest and thereafter will have no further powers, rights, or privileges as a Member.

D. Member Buy Out

If a Member desires to transfer its Membership Interest in whole or part, or must transfer its Membership Interest due to a felony conviction or any other action that would jeopardize the Company's licenses, it must first offer its Membership Interest to the non-transferring Members at a price stated per Membership Interest percentage (i.e. \$10 per 1% Membership Interest). The transferring Member must be willing to sell its Membership Interest at the stated price or purchase the other Members' Membership Interests at the stated price. Within 30 days of receiving the buy/sell offer the non-transferring Members must either accept the offer or sell their Membership Interest to the transferring Member at his/her stated price per Membership Interest percentage.

Alternatively, if the non-transferring Members determine not to accept the offer; there is a third-party who will purchase the transferring Member's Membership Interest at the stated price; the non-transferring Members provide written consent to the transfer; and all other conditions in Section 7.C. are met, the transferring Member may sell its Membership Interest to the third party.

E. Dealing with Members.

The Company, each Member, and any other person having business with the Company will only deal with Members who are admitted as the Company's Members or as substituted Members, and will not be required to deal with any other person by reason of transfer by a Member, except as otherwise provided in this Operating Agreement.

F. No Right to Withdraw

No Member has the right to resign or otherwise withdraw from the Company without the express written consent of all the other Members.

G. Member Death

When a Member dies, that Member's Membership Interest automatically transfers equally to all surviving Members. All profits and losses up to the Member's date of death allocated to the deceased Member will be distributed to the Member's beneficiary designated on Schedule A.

8. NON-COMPETE AND CONFIDENTIAL BUSINESS INFORMATION

A. Non-Compete Term

While a Member of the Company and for a 1-year period thereafter ("Non-compete Term"), Members and past Members are prohibited from directly or indirectly participating in other business interests and investments that constitute a Competing Business of the Company, except if provided written consent from all Members to engage in the Competing Business. Any business or investment related to marijuana within Alaska is considered a Competing Business pursuant to this non-compete provision.

B. Covenant Not to Compete

The Members covenant and agree that during the Non-compete Term neither a Member, nor his or her successors and assigns, will directly or indirectly, whether as a principal, agent, employee, employer, investor, shareholder, member, partner, manager, consultant, or otherwise, alone or in association with any other person, provide any services to a Competing Business or solicit or contact any Company customers for a Competing Business.

C. Remedies

Each Member acknowledges (i) the unique nature of the protections and provisions of this non-compete, (ii) the Company will suffer irreparable harm if any Member or past Member breaches or violates this non-compete, and (iii) monetary damages alone would be inadequate to compensate the Company for a breach or violation of this non-compete. Therefore if at any time a Member or past Member violates this non-compete the Company will be entitled to injunctive relief in addition to any other remedies at law or equity.

D. Confidentiality

The Members recognizes the Company is engaged in sensitive and proprietary business with many trade secrets. As such, the Members will keep all sensitive and proprietary information and Company trade secrets confidential and only share such information with the Company's professional advisors, or as required by law. This confidentiality restriction does not apply to any information that is in the public domain.

E. Liquidated Damages.

Each Member agrees that unauthorized release of confidential information will damage the Company and the damage incurred is impracticable or extremely difficult to ascertain. As a result, in connection with any unauthorized release of confidential information by any Member, in addition to any other rights or remedies available to the Company in law or equity, each Member agrees to pay to the Company, as liquidated damages, \$5,000 per disclosure. The parties agree the liquidated damages amount is a reasonable estimate of damages incurred in the event a Member fails to adhere to the confidentiality requirements and the payment is intended to be liquidated damages and not a penalty.

9. DISSOLUTION, LIQUIDATION, AND TERMINATION

A. Events Causing Dissolution

The Company will be dissolved and commence winding up its affairs if any of the following events occur:

- i. Written consent, signed by all Members, to dissolve and wind up the Company's affairs;
- ii. The Company selling or disposing of all or substantially all of the Company's assets and collecting all amounts derived from the sale or other disposition, including all amounts payable to the Company under any promissory notes or other evidences of indebtedness taken by the Company and the satisfaction of the Company's contingent liabilities in connection with another disposition (unless the Members elect to distribute such indebtedness to the Members in liquidation);
- iii. The Company's term expires as detailed in its Operating Agreement or the Articles of Organization;
- iv. Any default under the Act that would cause the Company's dissolution or that would make it unlawful for the Company's business to continue.

B. Winding Up

Upon the Company's dissolution, the Members will wind up the Company's affairs and satisfy the Company's liabilities. The Members will liquidate all of the Company property and assets as quickly as possible consistent with obtaining the property's and assets' full, fair market value. During this period, the Members will continue to operate the Company, its property, and its assets, and all of the Operating Agreement's provisions will remain in effect. The Members will notify all known creditors and claimants of the Company's dissolution in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

C. Final Distribution

The proceeds from the Company's liquidation will be distributed as follows:

 First, to creditors, including any Member who is a creditor, until all of the Company's debts and liabilities are paid and discharged, including Member's capital contributions (or provision is made for payment thereof); and

ii. The balance, if any, to the Members, in proportion to their Membership Interests as of the distribution date, after giving effect to all contributions, distributions, and allocations for all periods.

D. Distributions in Kind

In connection with the Company's termination and liquidation, the Members will attempt to sell all of the Company property and assets. To the extent that property or assets are not sold, each Member will receive its Membership Interest of any distribution in kind. Any property or assets distributed in kind upon the Company's liquidation will be valued on the basis of an independent appraisal and treated as though the property or assets were sold and the cash proceeds distributed.

E. Deficit Capital Accounts

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Operating Agreement, and notwithstanding any custom or law to the contrary, the deficit, if any, in a Member's Capital Account upon the Company dissolving will not be a Company asset and the Member will not be obligated to contribute the amount to the Company to bring the balance of the Member's Capital Account to zero.

F. Articles of Dissolution

Once the Company's property and assets are completely distributed, the Company is terminated and the Members (or such other person as the Act requires or permits) will file articles of dissolution with the appropriate state agency, cancel any other filings made pursuant to the Act, and take all actions necessary to terminate the Company.

10. MEDIATION REQUIRED

In the event any dispute arises between the Company and its Members or between the Members, the parties will pursue — in good faith — mediation to resolve the dispute and will not, at any time, pursue litigation in the court system. The Members understand and agree that they are waiving their right to bring a claim in the court system against the Company and against the other Members and voluntarily agree to this provision.

11. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

A. Title to Assets

Title to all Company assets must be in the Company's name and not in the Members' name.

B. Successors and Assigns

All of the terms and provisions of this Operating Agreement inure to the benefit of and are binding on each of the Company's Members and their respective, permitted transferees, if any.

C. Entire Agreement

This Operating Agreement contains the final, entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject of this Operating Agreement and supersedes any previous Operating Agreement. Any representation, warranty, covenant, or condition not set forth in writing signed by the Members is void and of no effect. The Operating Agreement may only be amended by a writing signed by all Members and the Company.

D. Rights of Creditors and Third Parties under Operating Agreement

This Operating Agreement is entered into among the Company and the Members for the exclusive benefit of the Company, its Members, and their permitted successors and assignees. The Operating Agreement is expressly not intended for the benefit of any creditor of the Company or any other person. Except and only to the extent provided by applicable statute, no creditor or third party has any rights under this Operating Agreement or any agreement between the Company and any Member with respect to any capital contribution or otherwise.

E. Governing Law

This Operating Agreement has been entered into and is governed by the laws of Alaska. The Members agree to only pursue mediation if a dispute arises out of this Operating Agreement and understand each is waiving its right to use the court system to resolve disputes.

Dear Governor Dunleavy,

As local elected officials, we are receiving significant concerns from our community members surrounding the increase in community spread of Covid-19 and the resulting closure of our schools on the Southern Kenai Peninsula. Entering what your administration calls 'Phase III: Maximizing Healthcare capacity and response', the Homer City Council looks forward to working with DHSS and your staff to actively respond and support our community through this winter.

Concerns that have been directly expressed from our community include:

- The need for **faster testing turnaround times.** It is taking up to five days, if not more, for our residents to receive test results from the State lab.
- **Sufficient contact tracing** to ensure timely and comprehensive outreach to known close contacts of positive individuals
- **Regionalized epidemiological information** to help understand what's happening in our community. How are people contracting Covid-19 in our area? What are our hot spots, and are there targeted ways the community/region can respond?
- **Continued/increased economic support** specifically for those facing a 14-day quarantine (or isolation due to sickness) for themselves and/or dependent(s), and specifically in regards to lost wages heading into winter and beyond the timeline for the City's CARES Act funds.
- Continued/increased mental health support

With numbers increasing daily here, our schools are closed for in-person learning through the end of October. Parents are again in a terrible position of trying to work, run businesses, and support their children - often without any additional childcare assistance.

As we look towards a winter of high case counts, the City of Homer stands ready to work in partnership with your administration, Federal agencies, and community leaders to get our schools open, to support our working families, our children, and our businesses. Together we can get through this difficult time, maximizing every opportunity we have to respond in a timely way to mitigate social and economic harm.

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Homer City Council as a reaction to recent developments in the rapid spread of the novel Coronavirus in the Kenai Peninsula Borough.

We applaud the efforts taken by the District in providing guidelines of controls that afford the best chances of maintaining normal school operations with high classroom attendance. The guidelines provide a solid base of local preventions to minimize community spread. In fact, over the end of August, through September, the Homer community enjoyed a six-week period of hospital testing that were free of positive COVID 19 infection.

The same cannot be said of the measures taken for interscholastic activities. While the District might impose requirements for the students involved, attendant participants become regional travelers that increase the chances of becoming a new vector of viral spread.

We urge you to place the return to the classroom as a priority that must be maintained.

Issue: We were directed to explore an engineering solution to relocate the surface water discharge at the confluence of the Sterling Highway and Mount Augustine Drive into a naturally occurring ravine, gully, watercourse or runnel. This memorandum presents the results of our exploration.

Background:

Mt. Augustine Drive is located in the Baycrest Subdivision, located near the City's western limits. This subdivision was certified in 1967, not long after the City was first incorporated in 1964. While the road is not built to City standards, it is part of the City's Road Maintenance Map and the City provides rural road maintenance – grading, dust control, brushing, snow plowing and drainage ditching. Mt. Augustine Drive connects the subdivision to the Sterling Highway, with its point of ingress/egress on the south side of the highway.

In 1996, the Alaska Department of Public Transportation and Public Facilities ("ADOT/PF") converted the Sterling Highway from a 2-lane to a lane 4-lane highway. That project included the installation of roadside drainage ditches on both sides of the highway. Cross-culverts were installed to convey water from the north side of the highway to the south. One such cross-culvert comes out at Mt. Augustine Drive. Further, the ADOT/PF installed a "beehive" to capture surface water from the south side of the highway. The combined flows are carried under Mt. Augustine Drive through an aluminum culvert. Over the years, the property owner and other residents of the subdivision have complained this drainage was causing, or had the potential to cause, damage and sought help from the City.

In 2018, the City Council adopted Resolution 18-008 requesting the Alaska Department of Public Transportation and Public Facilities ("ADOT/PF"), "work to fix drainage issues that are adversely affecting the Baycrest Subdivision including, but not limited to redirecting the outflow from the Sterling Highway Beehive." The ADOT/PF denied any responsibility and took no action.

We have explored options for an engineering solution, which involves capturing the water, where it crosses Mt. Augustine Road, in a new storm drain line that would empty into a nearby ravine. Once there, the water would flow to Kachemak Bay. The estimated cost of our engineered solution is


\$97,000. We propose to fund this solution through the HART-Roads Fund, which is authorized to address drainage problems.


Funds are available:

I. Funding is available. The City Council, on April 24, 2017, passed Resolution 17-038, which adopted the Homer Accelerated Roads and Trails Program ("HART") Manual. The HART Manual identified a set of criteria for projects that may be considered for HART funding. The criteria that would be addressed by the Mt. Augustine Drive Storm Drain Improvement Project include addressing drainage issues.

Our estimated cost of the recommended solution is \$97,000. If this project is funded from the HART-Roads Fund, the remaining balance in that Fund would be \$4,836,314.62. (See chart below.)



SUBJECT: NORTHERN ENTERPRISES BOAT YARD INC LEASE TERM EXTENTION REQUEST

Northern Enterprises Boat Yard Inc. ("Northern Enterprises") of Homer was granted a long-term lease for a portion (60 sq. ft.) of City tidelands in Mud Bay directly across from their private property on May 1 2019. Northern Enterprises Boat Yard, Inc., as a Homer based company specializing in vessel haul out, repair, and storage, are working on constructing a new dock capable of supporting a Marine Travel Lift Station to haul out larger, heavier vessels.

As progress has moved forward on this project Northern Enterprises has been advised by their financial lenders that, per <u>Alaska Admin Code 3 AAC 99.230 Terms of real property loans</u>, they are required to have a lease term that is at least 10 years more than the length of the loans for the project. They have submitted a request for an amendment to their current lease to extend the term to a timeline that would fulfill this requirement. They are asking for their current 20 year lease with option for 2 consecutive 5 year extensions to be amended to become a 40 year lease with 2 consecutive 5 year extensions. This gives the term for this property lease a total length of possibly up to 50 years, instead of the standard 30 years used most regularly in the City Lease contract.

The location of this property, as described above, consists of tidelands directly adjacent to an existing dock, and it's not anticipated at this time that there would be another competitive interest in this property. Please see location circled in yellow.



The Port and Harbor advisory commission met on October 20 2020 to review this request and made a unanimously approved motion of support. Below is the meeting minute excerpt of that Motion:

Port Director Hawkins provided background on the lease amendment, referencing the letter from Northern Enterprises Boat Yard. The lease is for 60 square feet of mud flats out into the bay and the bank required the longer lease term for them to move forward with funding.

ULMER/STOCKBURGER MOVED MOVE TO RECOMMEND THAT CITY COUNCIL APPROVE AN AMENDMENT OF THE NORTHERN ENTERPRISE'S BOAT YARD INC. LEASE TO EXTEND THE TERM TO 40 YEARS WITH OPTIONS FOR 2 CONSECUTIVE 5 YEAR RENEWALS.

Commissioner Ulmer commented that it's the right thing to do.

Commissioner Carroll inquired on the financials for the lease. Chair Zimmerman clarified that the amount is only \$3.74 annually, specified in the draft resolution.



With our progress in moving forward with our dock expansion project we have been made aware by our financial lenders Alaska Industrial Development and Export Authority (AIDEA) and First National Bank of Alaska that we need to have a set timeframe lease that covers 10 years beyond the timeframe of the loans. When we requested something in writing we were forwarded the Alaska Admin Code 3 AAC 99.230, (http://www.legis.state.ak.us/basis/aac.asp#3.99.230) specifically, section "h" of "Terms of real property loans".

"(h) The terms and conditions of a land lease or, in the case of a qualified energy development, an easement that secures a real property loan for a project or qualified energy development are subject to approval by the authority. The term of the lease or easement must exceed the effective term of the loan by at least 10 years. However, the authority may approve a land lease or easement for a shorter term if there is an irrevocable option to renew the lease or easement that is acceptable in the sole discretion of the authority."

We are respectfully requesting a modification to our lease to be a 40-year lease with options of renewals at the end of that timeframe.

SUBJECT: Proposed Kiosk Purchases for Campgrounds, Airport and RV Dumpstation

Issue: Currently the City of Homer operates drop-box style pay stations at three campgrounds, the airport and 1 RV dumpstation. Processing cash payments during the COVID-19 pandemic increases the risk of infection to city staff. Also, traditional cash deposit methods can increase the infection risk to those making payment.

Background: Installing automated pay kiosks at the campgrounds, RV dumpstation and the airport will decrease the risk of infection by provided automated cash and/or credit card payments, thereby reducing the need to handle cash payments directly. As The City of Homer has received CARES Act funding to mitigate the adverse effects fo COVID-19, the City has budgeted these funds to purchase and install automated pay kiosks at these pay sites. The City already maintains one automated pay kiosk at the Fishing Hole RV dumpstation and needs to use the same model for other locations.

T2 systems is the system integrator for the City's existing automated pay kiosk and is the only
source available for this technology. T2 systems provides a quote of \$52,274 for 5 similar
units. Shipping and installation costs will be \$, bringing total project cost to
\$ <u>.</u>

Recommendations:

1: A sole source contract with T2 Systems is authorized for the subject purchase.

SUBJECT: Tasmania Court Special Assessment District

Issue: The process to form the Tasmania Court Special Assessment District to provide the neighborhood with City water was started in May 2020. The public hearing part of the process will be held September 14, 2020. Following the public hearing, the City Council will be asked to decide whether or not to proceed with the next steps towards forming the District. If the District is formed, the City will need to provide interim financing.

Background:

If the Tasmania Court Water Assessment District is formed, we will, in all likelihood, seek financing from the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation. The loan is a reimbursable arrangement; that is, we must incur the costs first, and then seek reimbursement for the documented costs. We need a way to provide interim financing, for the project costs. We propose to transfer funds from the City's HAWSP Fund to a project account. As we access loan proceeds, they will be used to repay the General Fund. Separate accounting will be put employed to administer loan repayments and assessment collection.

The total estimated project cost is \$234,105. Of this, \$175,579 would be paid by the property owners and \$58,526 would be paid by the City, probably with funding from the HAWSP Fund. This will be determined when the final assessment roll, payment schedules and other details related to the administration of the assessment district.

Funds are available:

As of 3-31-20, there was a balance of \$2,437,693 I the HAWSP Fund. Since then, no expenditures have been approved from this fund. The projects recently funded for repairs to various water/sewer facilities was authorized from the Water Depreciation Fund or Sewer Depreciation Fund.

Action Recommended:

- a. That the City Council pass the proposed resolution appropriating \$234,105 from the HAWSP Fund for the construction of the Tasmania Court Water Improvements.
- b. That the City Council approve the expenditure of the City's share (25%) of the project costs, from the HAWSP Fund.

SUBJECT: Linking water service permits to connections to City sewers

Issue: Currently, there is no requirement that people requesting connection to the City's water system be connected to the City's sewer system, thereby creating the potential for public health hazards. The purpose of this memorandum is to propose that this be corrected.

Background:

In 2019, the Homer City Council reviewed the City code provisions relating to the City's public utility provisions. The purpose was to "ensure they were up to date, clear and consistent". This resulted in substantial changes to Title 14, Homer Public Water System, and Title 17, Improvement Districts. The purpose of the changes proposed in this Memorandum is to take the 2019 Council's efforts a step further. Specifically, the proposed changes would make a connection between (1) having access to City sewer access and (2) getting access to City water.

Numerous properties in the City are not served by City sewer, but rely on on-site sewage disposal systems. These systems must be permitted by the Alaska Department of Environmental Conservation when they are installed. At one time, this agency conducted regular inspections of such systems. However, due to budget cutbacks, this is no longer the case. On-site septic systems are challenging in Homer because of bad soils, high ground water and copious quantities of surface water from rainfall, open springs and storm water runoff.

Installing a properly operating septic system in such conditions is expensive. Prices for septic tank/leachfield systems in Homer range between \$20-\$30,000. Further, they are expensive to maintain and replace. We know at least one property owner in the Tasmania Court neighborhood replaced their septic leachfield in the past year, at the cost of about \$11,000. The combined assessment for both water and sewer mains in the Tasmania Court neighborhood is currently projected to be \$20,967.

People want City water because it offers higher quality, ever-present reliability and lower cost than hauled water. We get multiple requests for water special improvement districts, to extend water lines to new customers, every year. This comes with a price – it can trigger public health risks. People

connected to City water usually use more water than those who rely on hauled water; typical household water use for municipal water is 150 gallons per person per day, instead of 25 or fewer gallons per day for households using hauled water. It is reasonable to expect that access to City water will exacerbate the challenges related to septic systems in neighborhoods with poor soils and high ground water. It is in the best interests of the public health and welfare to require people who want access to City water to connect to City sewers.

This would mean that people requesting a water special assessment district would also need to be part of a sewer special assessment district. This need not be a substantial financial hardship. First, the City is usually able to offer long term, low-interest financing on such assessment districts. Second, current code gives property owners three years to connect, once city utilities become available in their neighborhood. By that time, homeowners may be more than happy to connect to a problem-free sewer main!

We propose to edit the Homer City Code as follows:

14.08.040 Water connection and extension permit.

- a. All property owners connecting to the water system must obtain a permit prior to starting construction.
- b. The water system connection and extension permit application shall be available at the City Clerk's office, the Public Works Department, and/or on the City's website. The permit fee must be paid at the time the application is submitted. The criteria for the permit shall be included in the application.
- c. The Public Works Director or his or her designee may revoke, modify or impose conditions upon a water system permit if he or she finds, in his or her sole discretion, that revocation, conditions or modifications to the permit are required to prevent or stop damage to the water system or protect public health or sanitation. Except when immediate action is necessary to protect the water system and prevent immediate harm to public health and sanitation, the Public Works Director shall provide notice to the property owner at least 30 days before revoking or modifying a water system permit.
- d. (b) Property owners and developers interested in initiating water special assessment districts should review the provisions of Homer City Code Section 14.08.040, which provides that "[e]xcept as otherwise provided in the Homer City Code, permits for connections to the water system or an extension of a water main to properties that are not served with City sewer service, will not be issued". Thus, Special Assessment Districts for water main extensions will only be formed (1) where city sewer is available or (2) if a Special Assessment District for a sewer main extension is also formed.

Recommendations:

That the City Council adopt the proposed edits to HCC 14.08.040 and 17.02.170.

To the Homer City Council-

I'm writing this in hopes of accessing a City of Homer grant to assist with our continued operations during this pandemic.

For the past forty years South Peninsula Behavioral Health Services has provided services, treatment and support to the community of the Southern Peninsula. Our Mental Health, Substance Misuse, and Developmental Disability services annually reach over 400 individuals and families.

During this pandemic we've seen the need for our services increase even as easy access to our services decreased. Many of our current clients, due to State Mandates, were unable to leave their homes or have us visit them in-person. A service that used to include three hours in the community developing skills, learning new coping strategies, and finding new social connections was reduced to thirty minutes on a video screen or, on occasion, from the front patio through a plate glass window.

Additionally, as SPBHS has navigated this pandemic, we have worked closely with our community partners, the local hospital and police department, to implement telehealth access into the emergency room to assist with timely response as well as helping to keep our staff safe and the communities crisis centers free of extraneous staff. We are still developing the capacity to do the same thing in the jail.

Our switch to telemedical service has been a double edged sword. Over the past six months, we have seen the number of many of our service contacts increase, as expected during such trying times. Conversely, the duration of those contacts has decreased, as longer video and telephone contacts are difficult for families, children, and specific symptomologies. Unfortunately, our services are not reimbursed if the contact is less than thirty minutes. Since we continue to meet with all of our clients, regardless of payment, we have seen a loss across all of our services that has averaged approximately \$23,000 per week.

Since March, we have continued to provide all of our services and we have maintained all of our staffing. We have been able to do that with assorted grants and support as well as dipping into our reserves. We did not anticipate that by the end of September we would still be facing a national crisis.

We are asking for \$230,000 to help cover the costs over the last quarter of 2020. This grant from The City of Homer will allow us to fully fund our staff, and provide all of our services without interruption, through the end of the calendar year.

Our goal is simple. We will look to continue providing the same quality Mental Health, Substance Misuse, and Developmental Disability services to our community for anyone that needs it, regardless of their ability to pay.

This grant will ensure we can meet that goal.

The PARC Advisory Commission was presented information at the regular meeting on August 20, 2020 regarding the opportunity to purchase an adjacent parcel, 0.13 acre (about 5,662 square foot), to Bishops Beach Park and US Fish and Wildlife land. This seller is interested in selling it to the City. The listed price is \$35,000. The current tax assessed value is \$17,400.

Following is an excerpt of the minutes from that meeting and recommendation made by the Commission:



SUBJECT: CARES Act Close Out Plan Backup

This memo presents a draft CARES Act Close Out Plan as proposed in Resolution 20-104 and provides backup information on projects staff and some Councilmembers have proposed for inclusion in the Plan.

The CARES Act Close Out Plan is intended to reflect Council's prioritized expenditures from the COVID-19 Response fund so that CARES Act funds can be maximized for COVID-19 response and recovery within the remaining eligibility period. The plan directs staff on incurring eligible CARES Act expenses.

Please review the CARES Act Project Close Out Plan, discuss the proposed prioritization and suggest and approve any amendments.

For instance, attached to this memo is an erosion mitigation proposal from Councilmember Evensen for potential CARES Act funding. From Administration's perspective, while some of the beaches and parks have experienced the impacts Councilmember Evensen lists, it may be challenging to make a direct connection between a beach reclamation project and the public health, which is required by US Treasury for capital projects utilizing CARES Act funding. Council may advise otherwise and move to amend the plan to include this project.

Once approved by Council, staff will provide regular reports detailing costs incurred through the CARES Act Close Out Plan so that City Council can adjust the Plan as needed to respond to COVID-19. Amendments to how programs or projects are prioritized, including the addition of new programs or project will be made by resolution.

The Close Out Plan includes a list of prioritized expenditures. The first four priorities are to complete funding for any unfunded applicants of the SBERG, NERG, MARRG, and FERG programs should grant applications overreach appropriations for any of the Economic Relief Grant programs. Below, I provide backup information about the other items in the proposed prioritization.

- 5. Kenai Peninsula College equipment necessary for teaching remote/online classes
- 6. Kenai Peninsula College Homer Resident Student Scholarships

Kenai Peninsula College reached out to the City Manager for CARES Act funding in support of costs associated with changes in operations to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. A letter requesting funding for the two projects listed above is attached to this memo.

7. Port & Harbor repeater, base station and 15 portable radios

8. 6 Port & Harbor 6 mobile radios

Communications is one of the most important tools during an emergency to maximize the number of people who take appropriate and timely action to ensure the safety and protection of life and property; the COVID-19 health emergency is no exception. The Port of Homer is the destination port for medical evacuations from non-road connected communities throughout Lower Cook Inlet. Surface transport of COVID patients is the COOP plan for when weather does not permit VFR flights, or when the air transport companies refuse to transport COVID-19 patients in small aircraft.

With this current COVID-19 pandemic, harbor staff use our communications system to talk with vessels approaching the Port, to assist them with filing state required travel reports, and to arrange vessel quarantine. We have relied on radios heavily in these situations where early contact is imperative, and local phone numbers for arriving individuals are unknown, to ensure that conditions are safely managed and clear direction is given. We have already experienced operational communications issues with the following COVID response activities:

- Managing large vessels under quarantine that need to anchor offshore and tender to the harbor for supplies, medical interventions, etc.
- Port of Homer is the home port the AMHS vessel Tustumena and which was directed to quarantine at the Port of Homer during the June shipboard outbreak of Covid-19. Communications with the inbound vessel were paramount to a successful resolution.

The Port & Harbor plays an important role in the safety and protection of life and property. This project corrects deficiencies in the communications system, improves resiliency and will bring huge benefits to our lower Cook Inlet communities and mariners during this current Covid-19 emergency and the next emergency that comes our way.

Components include: Radios- Handheld and mobile radios are utilized by all operations staff, maintenance staff, and the Harbormaster. These units are seven-year-old hand me downs from the police department which are an upgrade from the 12-year-old units that they replaced. However, these units are no longer able to be serviced by the manufacturer as they no longer support that model. In order that the Port can maintain our classification as a regulated facility by the USCG we are required to stay current with FCC regulations and to maintain interoperable communications with our State, Federal and local agencies partners.

Repeater- When the on-duty officer is making their rounds in the harbor we often don't hear calls from vessels outside the harbor basin and this can include Regulated vessels such tugs and barges, ferry's and small passenger vessels. The placement of a repeater at the Skyline site will correct this weak link in the network, in partnership with the base station. Looking into the future the repeater will allow us to maintain communications between harbor basins when we expand the port and add a large vessel harbor.

Base station- (Moving the base station system to the city's tower located on Skyline Drive) From this vantage point we will be able to vastly extend our base station's range. The radio repeater will connect our

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handhelds directly into the base effectively giving our handhelds the same range as the base station. Increasing our range makes everything in the communications system more effective, and since this is a system we rely heavily on in an emergency for its reliability and flexibility, the farther it reaches the more effective we become as a whole.

9. 1 Lucas CPR device:

This request would outfit two HVFD ambulances with Lucas CPR devices. One Lucas CPR device (of two requested) was funded with CARES Act funds by Ordinance 20-63(A). The Lucas provides "consistent quality" CPR for those in cardiac arrest. What makes it specifically useful during the transportation of COVID-19 cases is that it allows responders to perform quality CPR without exposing EMT's to the risk of COVID-19 airborne/droplet particles that are always generated during CPR events. We need 2 of them so that both of our frontline ambulances are equipped with the equal equipment as we often have simultaneous calls happening. There is no way of knowing what the call type is before it happens so equipping both ambulances is the only way to assure that proper care is provided every time. Additionally, it provides the highest degree of safety for first responders as it eliminates the need to have additional volunteers in the ambulance during transport.

10. 1 Patient power load system & gurney:

To mitigate the spread of COVID-19 among emergency responders, HVFD has reduced staff to two medical providers on calls when possible. Typically the Fire Department would have between 4 to 5 Fire/EMS personnel and possibly a police officer to help with manually loading patients into the ambulance. The reduction in emergency responders on call heightens the department's risk to the national leading cause of injury to EMS personnel which is back injury due to the amount of lifting that is required in this field. The power load patient lift system has greatly reduced the risk of back injury to EMS providers by limiting the heavy lifting of patients. It is very common to have a single lift of patient and equipment exceed 350—400 pounds.

11. 3 Cardiac/Respiratory monitors:

The Zoll Cardiac/respiratory monitors are better suited to treat COVID-19 patients than our current cardiac monitor. The Zoll monitors are Bluetooth capable which will allow us to transmit patient information directly to the hospital as they are currently using Zoll products. The Zoll monitor have both audio and video prompts that will help provide vital information to the EMS responders that will directly assist them in patient care decisions. The telemetry these monitors provide to the hospital gives them real time information to better prepare them to treat the patient remotely, and provide them with more information that will allow them to be better prepared to receive COVID-19 patients at the ER.

12. Park Maintenance COVID-19 Mitigation Actions - Parks Custodian seasonal positions:

Due to COVID-19 concerns, Park Laborers who usually clean City public restrooms in the summer quit and Public Works could not find any new hires. Temporary Parks Maintenance Custodian positions were specifically created to fill this need.

13. HPD & HVFD

US Treasury permits the use of CARES Act dollars to cover first responder payroll during the eligible period March 1, 2020 – December 30, 2020. As of the last pay period, HPD and HVFD payroll expenses not applied to

CARES Act funding thus far totals \$1,962,776. After December 30, staff will have a total amount of first responder payroll and can reimburse this expense with Coronavirus Relief Funds.					



Kenai Peninsula College Kachemak Bay Campus Proposal for Homer CARES Funding

KPC and the rest of the University of Alaska started operating mostly remotely in March when COVID-19 became a pandemic. Campuses were closed, 90% of classes were delivered remotely and stringent guidelines were put into place that greatly impacted how we could serve students. This continued in the current fall semester and it has been decided KPC will operate under these same conditions in the Spring 2021 semester.

As a direct result of the pandemic, KPC's Kachemak Bay Campus (KBC) requests the following economic relief so they can better serve their students and the Southern Peninsula:

Faculty teaching from home

As all of our 30+ faculty are teaching from home this fall and this coming spring we need to continually replace damaged and/or outdated equipment that we use to teach distance.

Cost: \$19,600

Cost: \$24,000

10 Dell laptops (\$1,500/each)

8 Dell USB-C Dongles for monitors (\$75/each)

2 Multi-camera instructor following platforms (\$1,000/each)

10 Headsets (\$50/each)

10 Webcams (\$150/each)

Homer Resident Student Scholarship

The majority of KPC students work while attending college. Due to the pandemic many are struggling financially due to the closure or reduced hours of businesses that typically employ college students. The Homer Resident Student Scholarship will be offered to students currently admitted or have pending admissions to a UA degree program and are taking six or more credits. Students must be enrolled and admitted/pending admission before the deadline for the spring 2021 semester. This

estimate is based on the 48 Homer residents currently enrolled at KBC meeting these requirements.

Students will be asked to complete an online scholarship application which will require a statement of need and how the pandemic has impacted them. Each student will receive a scholarship of \$500.

SUBJECT: City Manager's Report for October 26th Council Meeting

Tsunami Warning

On October 19th, there was a large earthquake near Sand Point, AK which resulted in a tsunami warning that had potential to impact the Spit and other coastal areas of the City. City staff with emergency response responsibilities assembled at the EOC to prepare and monitor the situation. The public was encouraged to evacuate from the Spit and other low lying areas for a short period of time. A tsunami wave was generated but it was relatively small and did not make it as far as Homer.

While emergencies like this can be viewed as a hassle, each one does provide an important opportunity for staff to evaluate our processes and find any broken linkages between ourselves and other agencies. Between writing this report and the October 26th Council Meeting, I will have met with staff to discuss the event and potential improvements to our process. Chief Kirko and I will have also met with Kenai Peninsula Borough emergency management officials to discuss opportunities for improvement in regards to their interface with tsunami warning events in Homer. The goal is continuous improvement so that when we do have a large scale disaster we are prepared, efficient, and effective in protecting the City.

Police Station Virtual Tour

Because of COVID restrictions, in-person tours of the new police station were not practical at the time of the ribbon cutting. Instead, the Homer Police Department has provided a video virtual tour of the facility so that the public can see the inside of our newest City building. The video is available on HPD's Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/homerakpolice/videos/698384224430670/) and features an appearance from City Engineer Carey Meyer discussing the green infrastructure outside of the building.

Bears on City Property

I received a letter from an Alaska Department of Fish & Game (ADF&G) biologist related to concerns with bears on city managed property, mainly Karen Hornaday Park. The concerns revolve around food attracting bears to the park and the potential for unsafe situations for both bears and humans. The suggestion is to install bear-proof trashcans and food storage containers for campers. Municipal-grade bear-proof equipment is not inexpensive, but I am working with Parks Maintenance Coordinator Matt Steffy to attempt to identify ways we can reduce the cost of this equipment and seek grant funding to defray the expenses of upgrading our camp facility over time. In the meantime, we will work to improve messaging to campground users which includes education on best practices related to bear safety.

Climate Action Plan (CAP)

Staff have been working on energy use and emissions calculations while also working on a building a pathway to an update to our 2007 CAP (a 2020 Council-Initiated Priority) underway. Related to this item, staff, in conjunction with Councilmember Aderhold, collaborated on a questionnaire which provided data to a climate cohort group with which the City is aligned. The questionnaire will help them figure out ways to support communities like ours who are working on climate change initiatives and climate action plans.

GFOA Budget Award

As I was finishing this report, Finance Director Walton received a congratulatory note from the Government Finance Officers Association notifying the City that we have been awarded the Distinguished Budget Presentation Award. Per their website, "GFOA established the Distinguished Budget Presentation Awards Program (Budget Awards Program) in 1984 to encourage and assist state and local governments to prepare budget documents of the very highest quality that reflect both the guidelines established by the National Advisory Council on State and Local Budgeting and the GFOA's best practices on budgeting and then to recognize individual governments that succeed in achieving that goal. Over 1600 governments, including states, cities, counties, special districts, school districts, and more have been recognized for transparency in budgeting. To earn recognition, budget documents must meet program criteria and excel as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide, and communication tool." GFOA's review also provides instruction on how the City's budget can include additional modifications to completely adhere to the organization's standards. The Finance Department works very hard to keep up with all the demands from COVID response and all of our regular City business, I would like to congratulate them for this accomplishment.

COVID-Related Updates

Council Chambers COVID Remodel

Staff prepared a plan and design for a remodel of the Council Chambers to allow for more distancing and an improved integration with digital means of public participation. I fielded comments and design ideas in writing and in person from Councilmembers which resulted in some modifications, but the general layout remained the same as originally proposed. We are moving forward with a large semi-circle/horseshoe shape because it allows for Councilmembers to see each other when speaking, expands their available space, allows for easier wiring of electronics, and works well with the existing seating area for the public. Personnel from Public Works, IT, and the Clerk's Office are all engaged in getting this project moving forward within the CARES Act timeline.

State of Alaska Community Engagement Team

During the October 22 DHSS/State Unified Command meeting, Deputy Public Information Officer Tussey made note of an opportunity for community leaders and elected officials to reach out to the state through a community engagement team made available to meet with local communities. The team consists of Commissioner Crum, Director Paul Nelson from State Emergency Management, Eliza Muse from DHSS, and Brian Fisher. Please let me know if this opportunity is of interest and what topics the body would request a presentation/discussion on.

Library Services (update provided by Director Berry)

On June 12, the library applied for federal grant money to fund four major upgrades to the library's technology. The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) received more than 1,700 requests for grant funding, and the funding announcement was significantly delayed. Facing delays in implementing urgent

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projects, the Homer City Council has provided funding out of CARES Act monies for these projects. In July, boosting the library's wi-fi signal was given the nod to move forward. On Sept. 14 the Council passed Ordinance 20-63(A) to fund the remaining projects in the original grant application. On Sept. 16 the library withdrew its application to the IMLS and work on the remaining projects began at once.

One of the four projects (upgrading the library's wi-fi network to cover the parking lot) is now complete, and the signal has been up and running since September. The replacement of the library's print management software is in progress: a server has been set up and the company is working on code development for the features we requested. We expect the new print-management system to go live in December, allowing patrons to submit print jobs over the internet from their phones, laptops or home computers. The library currently uses magnetic strips and barcodes for tracking its collection, a technology that is increasingly obsolete. We're in the process of replacing it with radio-frequency ID (RFID) tags. All the RFID equipment has been ordered and is now being configured. Tags should begin arriving in early November, the computer stations, checkout pads and other tools should arrive in mid-November, and the security gates should be set up in mid-December. The new system will allow for self-checkout terminals and low-contact checkout at the front desk, as well as much faster and more accurate processing of materials.

We're also acquiring more laptops for checkout. The charging locker has arrived and is set up at the front desk. IT has solicited quotes for the computers themselves and expects those quotes to be complete within the next couple of days. All equipment should be delivered by December 30.

CARES Act Funds Update

I expect to provide updated stats and graphs as part of a supplemental packet. Checks for ERG programs are typically cut on Fridays and delaying this part of my report allows for a more accurate accounting of CARES Act expenditures at the Council meeting.

SUBJECT: Revisions to Fishermen Economic Relief Grant (FERG) Program

Consideration of the FERG program proposed at the October 12, 2020 City Council meeting signaled that Council was interested in seeing revisions to the program policy such that the program would reach a broader range of fishing dependent Homer-based workers who were financially injured by the COVID19 Pandemic.

Staff worked with Mayor Castner and industry leaders to revise FERG policy to extend relief opportunities through the program to crew members and permit holders in addition to commercial fishing vessel owners.

CITY OF HOMER COVID-19 FISHERMEN ECONOMIC RELIEF GRANT (FERG) PROGRAM POLICY GRANT PROCEDURES AND CRITERIA

Purpose

The Fishermen Economic Relief Grant (FERG) Program is designed to provide financial relief grants to Homer-based commercial fishing vessel owners/commercial fishing permit holders and crew members who certify they have suffered a loss of revenue due and/or increased expenses due to the novel coronavirus (Covid-19) pandemic. The City of Homer, using Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funding, has allocated \$1,300,000 to be distributed through this grant program.

Commercial vessel owners can apply for up to \$8,000 in Cares Act relief funds on behalf of a commercial fishing business/operation based on eligible expenses in the following categories:

- Up to \$2,000 for vessel owners;
- Up to \$1,000 for commercial fishing permit holders;
 (Vessel owners who hold a permit is entitled to up to \$3,000 in relief funds based on eligible expenses.)
- Up to \$1,000 per crew member (for up to 5 individual crew members)

Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Must provide proof of ownership of the named commercial fishing vessel, USCG Documentation, or in the case of a small boat fishermen a current State of Alaska Division of Motor Vehicle registration.
- 2. Applicant must provide State of Alaska Commercial Fishing Entry Commission 2020 Vessel License receipt.
- 3. Must be a commercial fishing vessel that is currently active in catching fish, verified by either a fish ticket that shows that the vessel had a fish delivery in the qualifying year or as in the case of a fishing tender show proof of a contract with a fish buyer/processor for 2020.
- 4. Provide proof that the named vessel has moored in Homer Harbor between January 1, 2020 and September 30, 2020.
- 5. Vessel owner must be an Alaska Resident who maintains a primary residence on the Kenai Peninsula and spends the majority of the year as a resident of the Kenai Peninsula Borough. This will be confirmed with either PFD records or voter registration.

- 6. The vessel owner on behalf of the vessel's crew/permit holder must agree that the vessel was/is negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and disclose, certify and document how the vessel has experienced or continues to experience economic hardship as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020.
- 7. Applicants must provide a budget itemizing uses of FERG grant funds and agree to provide documentation in the event the program/grant recipient is audited.
- 8. A vessel owner may only apply one time for this grant.

Grant funds are eligible for:

- 1. Vessel mortgage or lease agreement in force for the 2020 fishing season (ship mortgage or vessel loan must have been in full force before March 1, 2020).
- 2. Vessel moorage, dunnage, or storage payments.
- 3. Vessel owner/permit holder wages, commissions, income, or net earnings (earnings cannot exceed 2019 tax return Schedule C earnings from self-employment)
- 4. Crew shares of up to \$1,000 for up to five crew members for lost earnings in the 2020 season (earnings cannot exceed 2019 earnings as reported on 1099's)
- 5. Electricity, gas, heating oil, vessel fuel, water, transportation, launch fees, telephone access, or internet access.
- 6. Personal protective equipment required for employees or business operations.
- 7. Equipment necessary for adapting to amended business operations during or after the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Grant funds ineligible for:

- 1. Any expense considered ineligible under the State of Alaska CARES Act grant program or would not be considered an eligible business expense by IRS rules.
- 2. Any expense covered by another CARES Act grant or other economic relief program.
- 3. Political contributions.
- 4. Bonuses to owners or employees.
- 5. Wages/percentages to any member of owner's family who is not a bona fide employee/crew member.
- 6. Charitable contributions.
- 7. Gifts or parties.
- 8. Earnings to owner/crew members/permit holder that exceed earnings for the same period in 2019.
- 9. Pay down or pay off debt by more than required in underlying debt instrument

Process

- 1. The vessel owner must fill out the application available online at the City of Homer website or paper application available from the Clerk's office and provide a W-9 form from the Internal Revenue Service.
- 2. If applying for crew member economic relief, the vessel owner must provide names, Fish and Game Commercial Crewmember License numbers and W-9 forms for up to five crew members.
- 3. Upon completion of application review and verification that the applicant meets the eligibility requirements, a grant payment for eligible expenses up to \$8,000 shall be disbursed. Payments shall be dispersed to eligible applicants and their crew members on a rolling basis in a defined application period.
- 4. All applications received by the deadline will go through a review and verification process to insure applicants meet the eligibility requirements.
- 5. Applicants who submit incomplete applications will be notified by email. Applications may be amended before the deadline.
- Applicants whose requests are denied will be notified via email. A grantee who is denied may appeal in writing to the City Manager no later than 5 PM the 10th calendar day after the applicant receives notice from the City.
- 7. Information provided in the FERG application will be kept confidential to the extent authorized by law.
- 8. Grant funds received must be fully expended by December 30, 2020. If funds have not been expended, they must be returned via check to the City of Homer. Funds must be used in accordance with the guidelines of this program.
- 9. An IRS 1099 Misc. income form will be issued by January 31, 2021.
- 10. It is incumbent upon recipients to determine whether:
 - a. Proceeds from the grant are taxable, or
 - b. The receipt of a grant under this program might preclude eligibility for any other grant or aid programs.

Reporting

Grantees are required to expend grant funds in accordance to the budget they provide as part of the FERG application itemizing how grant funds are to be used to reimburse eligible expenses associated with COVID-19 and incurred or reasonably expected to be incurred from March 1, 2020 to December 30, 2020. Grant funds must be either fully expended or any unused portion returned to the City of Homer by December 30, 2020.

Grants received under this program are subject to audit and may be randomly selected to produce documentation for program evaluation. This may include the completion of a reporting form provided by the City documenting how the funds were used. Grantees are required to maintain records and receipts for grant expenditures for a period of six years and make them available upon request.

SUBJECT: FISHERMEN ECONOMIC RELIEF GRANT PROGRAM (FERG)

The COVID -19 pandemic is a public health emergency with wide spread financial impacts on businesses and individual households alike. In the City's ongoing effort to put federal relief dollars to work where they will do the most good for the community, economic relief programs have been developed for small businesses, nonprofits and households that suffered loss due to the COVID-19 emergency. However commercial fishing did not qualify for relief under any of the City of Homer grant relief programs.

There are a large number of commercial fishing vessel owners who base their operations out of Homer during the course of a year and who are likewise experiencing financial loss related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Port and Harbor admin staff worked with the City Manager's office and the Mayor to develop FERG and qualifying criteria to provide economic relief to this essential segment of Homer's economy: Homer-based commercial fishing vessels.

After reviewing the Borough's Commercial Fish Relief Program standards, and meeting with industry leaders, staff wrote the included baseline standards:

Applicant must provide proof of ownership for a named commercial fishing vessel (US Coast Guard
Documentation OR current Alaska Division of Motor Vehicles registration.
Alaska Division of Fish and Game commercial fishing registration.
Applicant must be a commercial fishing vessel that is currently active in catching fish, by either
submitting a fish ticket that shows that the vessel had a fish delivery in the qualifying year or, as in
the case of a fishing tender vessel, show proof of a contract with a fish buyer/processor for 2020.
Applicant's vessel must show proof of having moored in the Homer Harbor or that the vessel was in
dry storage in one of the Homer area boat yards at some time between January 1, 2020 and
September 30, 2020

Applicant must be an Alaskan resident with a primary residence on the Kenai Peninsula (PFD or voter
registration proof).
Applicant must certify that they have not already received CARES Act relief funding or other
government assistance for the same expenses claimed in the FERG application.
A business may only apply one time for this grant.
One grant per commercial fishing vessel owner.

Commercial fishing vessel owners will be required to meet these benchmarks in order to qualify for funding through this program. FERG is intended for commercial fishing vessel owners who live in our local community on the Kenai Peninsula. Port and Harbor staff looked at the eligibility criteria and estimate that this program could reach as many as 450 active commercial fishing vessels who used the City's harbor system during the 2020 qualifying year,.

I believe that Cares Act dollars injected into the local commercial fishing fleet in order to help them respond to the economic hardship caused by the pandemic will help stabilize a portion of our local economy that Homer depends on year after year. It's been my experience that a commercial vessel owner, on average, will spend approximately 10% of the value of their vessel in maintenance each year on the vessel to keep it competitive and safe. These vessel maintenance dollars are what helps our community get through the winter on the off tourist season. The financial impacts caused by COVID-19 may make a commercial fishing vessel owner defer maintenance and other necessary tasks to the upcoming year, so it's for that reason that I see this FERG program as beneficial to the City of Homer's economic recovery from the COVID-19 public health emergency.

Recommendation

I would like to thank the Mayor and Council for their continued work in getting us through this crisis and for supporting the commercial fishing industry's response to COVID-19 through this important relief program.

Fiscal Note

Unexpended Small Business Economic Relief Grant (SBERG) program funds from the State CARES Act grant to the City at \$1,932,000 are proposed to fund this program. The SBERG2 \$2 million allocation is proposed to come out of Kenai Peninsula Borough CARES Act grant funds (\$1,775,953.96) and the State Cares Act grant (\$224,046.04).

Eligibility Criteria

- 1. Must provide proof of ownership of the named commercial fishing vessel, USCG Documentation, or in the case of a small boat fishermen a current State of Alaska Division of Motor Vehicle registration.
- 2. Current Alaska Division of Fish and Game commercial fishing registration.
- 3. Must be a commercial fishing vessel that is currently active in catching fish, verified by either a fish ticket that shows that the vessel had a fish delivery in the qualifying year or as in the case of a fishing tender show proof of a contract with a fish buyer/processor for 2020.
- 4. Provide proof that the named vessel has moored in Homer Harbor between January 1, 2020 and September 30, 2020.
- 5. Vessel owner must be an Alaska Resident who maintains a primary residence on the Kenai Peninsula and spends the majority of the year as a resident of the Kenai Peninsula Borough. This will be confirmed with either PFD records or voter registration.
- 6. All applicants must certify and provide a brief explanation as to how the business suffered a loss of revenue as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 7. Applicants must provide a budget itemizing uses of FERG grant funds and agree to provide documentation in the event the program/grant recipient is audited.
- 8. A business may only apply one time for this grant.

Grant funds are eligible for:

- 1. Payment of rents or required monthly loan payments
- 2. Payments of essential wages, taxes, and normal benefits to employees essential to maintain business

- 3. Normal operating expenses that are included in "operating expenses" on businesses' income statement (utilities, insurance, professional services, etc.)
- 4. Normal draw or wages on a weekly or monthly basis to owner

Grant funds ineligible for:

- 1. Any expense that would not be considered an eligible business expense by IRS rules.
- 2. Political contributions.
- 3. Bonuses to owners or employees.
- 4. Wages to any member of owner's family who is not a bona fide employee.
- 5. Charitable contributions.
- 6. Gifts or parties.
- 7. Draw or salary to owner that exceed the amount that they were paid on a weekly or monthly basis for the same period in 2019.
- 8. Pay down or pay off debt by more than required in underlying debt instrument
- Any expense considered ineligible under the State of Alaska CARES Act grant program.

Process

- 1. The business owner must fill out the application available online at the City of Homer website or paper application available from the Clerk's office.
- 2. The complete application must be submitted with a W-9 form from the Internal Revenue Service.
- 3. Upon completion of application review and verification that the applicant meets the eligibility requirements, a grant payment for eligible expenses up to \$4,500 shall be disbursed. Payments shall be dispersed to eligible applicants on a rolling basis in a defined application period.
- 4. A 1099 Misc, income form will be included with the distribution.
- 5. It is incumbent upon the applicant to determine whether:
 - a. Proceeds from the grant are taxable, or
 - b. The receipt of a grant under this program might preclude eligibility for any other grant or aid programs.

Reporting

City administration will provide a report to the Homer City Council with the number of applications received, number of applications processed, and account balances of the program fund.

Per Homer City Code 2.08.080, Mayor's absence: At the first meeting of the Council following certification of the municipal election each year, there shall be appointed a Mayor Pro Tempore, by majority vote of the Council, to act as Mayor during the Mayor's temporary absence or disability.

Pursuant to Council's Operating Manual: A Mayor Pro Tem shall be elected by the majority of the Homer City Council. The term of the Mayor Pro Tem shall be until the call for election by the Homer City Council of a New Mayor Pro Tem. The Mayor Pro Tem shall, in the absence of the Mayor, act as Mayor of the City of Homer as though they themselves had taken the Oath of Office of Mayor with all duties, responsibilities and powers of the office of the Mayor of the City of Homer. The Mayor Pro Tem, when acting in that capacity, does not lose the privilege or duty to vote as a Councilmember.

Typically secret ballots are available for Council to vote if needed. Since meetings are held remotely, a process for that to happen in a Zoom webinar will be determined prior to the meeting.

Pursuant to Council's Operating Manual: Council Seat- Customarily the selection is by seniority. Senior members may choose a different seat prior to the junior members being seated. The Mayor Pro Tempore shall have first seating choice and then the Senior Councilmembers and so on and so forth. (Resolution 04-89)

Once Council returns to the Chambers seat selection can take place.

SUBJECT: Impacts from Fiscal Year Change

The purpose of this memo is to provide additional information regarding the impacts of changing fiscal years.

Historical Information:

Prior to Fiscal Year 1987, the City of Homer operated under a fiscal year that began on July 1 and ended on June 30 of the succeeding year. There was discussion with City Council prior to this conversion that weighed the advantages and disadvantages of the switch. Resolution 86-70 and accompanying Memorandum 86-163 have been attached to this memo for reference purposes.

Advantages:

- There is no longer the conflict with elections and new council members won't have to immediately tackle budget conversations on the first day of his/her term.
- There will be some administrative relief in providing budget estimations for our insurance costs. The bill is issued based on a July June fiscal year and we currently have to split the bill amongst two fiscal years.
- There is a potential for an ease to State and KPB grant reporting, as our fiscal years would align and splitting between fiscal years is no longer necessary.
- Much of our revenue is earned in the second half of the calendar year, starting the fiscal year in July would allow us to have more time to react to a summer with revenues that did not meet forecasted expectations.

Disadvantages:

- One time cost would be incurred for necessary changes to the accounting system as well as the need for an audit at the end of the fiscal years during the transition.
 - We are working to get a quote for the cost that will be charged by our accounting software (Caselle) to facilitate such a transition. We have spoken with Caselle and they have stated it is a "process and it involves a complete restructuring of our

- accounting system". We are also working to get a timeline towards completion time.
- A decision would have to be made on the length of our budget years during this transition, as we will have to amend our audit schedule accordingly. There are two options (6 month or 18 month fiscal year). It has been recommended that we highly consider the 6 month term, as our grant agencies will not want to wait the 18 months plus audit time for finalized statements.
- The biggest stumbling block is the amount of work that has to occur behind the scenes to accomplish such a transition:
 - Administrative work associated with the switch in our accounting software appears to be lengthy and we will need to schedule our transition accordingly. There is bound to be unforeseen impacts by making this switch and those impacts can be burdensome, achieving this change on the proposed timeline may require additional temporary help for the Finance Department.
 - The Finance department will be highly engaged during the first quarter of 2021 to complete CARES reporting and return any unspent funding to the State. There is no solid communication that explicitly lines out what the closeout process will involve, but we are expecting to provide detailed reporting.
 - o There is a huge concern over the mandatory need to time audits with the budget year. If we make the transition this will mean that the City will have to work through two audits simultaneously.
 - Administrative work associated with performing multiple audits within a short time span is another major concern. Having a shortened fiscal year does not decrease the amount of work associated with a financial audit, as the requirements remain the same. As it stands, we barely manage to meet the reporting deadline and the pressure will be intensified to get multiple audits completed prior to deadlines. If we fail to meet the deadlines, our ability to receive grants could be impacted.
- Budget Implications:
 - Public engagement in the budget process could be affected, as a significant portion of our community is engaged in seasonal work.
 - However, the distribution of information and opportunities for public engagement are much different in 2020 and this may not be as much of a barrier at this time.
 - State/KPB funding if the State and the Borough are going through budget conversations at the same time we are there will be trickle down effects if our assumptions don't align.
 - Administrative work associated with "rebuilding" the budget to accommodate the new fiscal year.

Additional Items to Consider:

- When will this fiscal year change occur? If we transition in July 2021, are we having a 6 month fiscal year running January June 2021?
 - There will be a need to set a budget for this transition period. This means conversations will need to begin immediately.

- There would be a subsequent need to set the budget beginning July 2021 and administrative work would need to begin in January.
- There will be a need to amend budget code accordingly to accurately reflect the start/end time of the fiscal year. Other edits will need to be made to ensure terminology is consistent with the fiscal year change.

SUBJECT: Calendar Year Change

As we have discussed with the City Council, it may be desirable to change the City's accounting and budget year (i.e., Fiscal Year) to the calendar year. In this regard, the following advantages and disadvantages should be considered prior to making the final decision to change to the calendar year.

Advantages

- Public Access Under a calendar year format residents engaged in seasonal work i.e. fisheries or construction, would have greater access to various public processes (budget, capital improvements program and/or rate setting).
- 2. Balanced Workload The calendar year format would enable a number of City departments, especially Public Works and Port/Harbor Departments, to spread out the workload more evenly over a given year.
- 3. State Funding State funding levels should be known prior to adopting the budget under a calendar year format.
- 4. Better Capital Improvement Planning/ Capital Budget Interface Under a calendar year format, the capital improvement program would preced the capital budgeting process whereas currently it overlays the capital budget process, thereby minimizing public involvement as well as administrative and council review and analysis.
- 5. All accounting subsystems would be on the same reporting basis Under the current system, payroll is accounted for IRS purposes on the calendar year basis whereas the remaining accounting systems are on the fiscal year basis.

Disadvantages

1. One time only cost would be incurred for necessary changes to the accounting system as well as the need for an audit at the end of the current calendar year.

- 2. Additional costs would be incurred for year-end audits. The increased cost is due to the City being required to pay increased audit fees due to completing the audit during the Federal Tax preparation season.
- 3. The budget process would coincide somewhat with municipal elections.

It is my opinion that the advantages outlined above outweigh the disadvantages and as such the City should adopt as its accounting and budget year the calendar year commencing January 1, 1987. To accomplish the changeover will require a number of major tasks to be accomplished, some of which were identified above. However, to reiterate those tasks as well as the others, I have prepared the attached action plan which outlines the required tasks to be accomplished. Also, attached for submission to the City Council is Resolution 86-70 which provides for adoption of the calendar year as the City's fiscal year.

Recommendation

Submit Resolution 86-70 to the City Council for adoption.
