#### **VISITORS**

a. Lobbyist Update - Christine Hess and Reggie Joule (15 minutes)

Christine Hess and Reggie Joule reviewed their report included in the packet that addressed the political landscape for 2021, the State Budget and the declining savings balance, and current House and Senate make up. They also touched on the Federal scene and the need to be shovel ready in anticipation of receiving federal funds in upcoming years.

b. Unified Command Report (20 minutes)

Mark Kirko, Fire Chief, Leslie Felts and Lorne Carroll, Public Health Nurses, Derotha Ferraro South Peninsula Hospital PIO, and Jenny Carroll City of Homer PIO, reported about planning efforts for the upcoming COVID Vaccination Point of Dispensing (POD) event to distribute approximately 700 vaccinations to citizens 65 and older on January 16<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>.

There was no worksession scheduled.

b. Committee of the Whole Report

Councilmember Lord reported Council discussed the Land Allocation Plan, Main Street Sidewalk 35% design, and ordinances regarding the Beluga Lift Station and the 2021 truncated budget.

# c. Mayor's Report

Mayor Castner acknowledged former Councilmember Sylvia Cassidy, who recently passed away. He recalled her involvement in the controversial issue of whether to cap the existing dump at that time to make ball fields, which is what ended up happening.

He reported the Kenai Peninsula Mayors had a discussion with Governor Dunleavy about a number of things including the future in what we're looking at for economic possibilities and COVID. During their discussion he had mentioned being interested in making sure the economy we have today is one that continues, and Governor Dunleavy requested a meeting with him that was canceled and will happen later. He'll report after they meet.

# d. Borough Report

Kenai Pensinsula Borough Assembly member Lane Chesley reported the assembly had their first in person meeting since the pandemic began, it went well, was lightly attended by the public, and there's follow on work occurring to the audio and video levels to make the remote platform more effective. At their meeting they had a presentation from Dr. Kristen Mitchell from Central Peninsula Hospital regarding vaccination distribution in the State. They also heard a lot of public testimony regarding an ordinance updating the KPB schedule of rates, charges, and fees for agricultural and grazing leases.

# e. Library Advisory Board

Kate Finn, Library Advisory Board member, commented there have been a lot of inquiries about when the library will re-open, and shared that services are still available at the library through curbside pickup. She noted the Endowment Fund matching challenge raised \$18,100, other donations for book purchases, and story time is ongoing on KBBI.

# f. Planning Commission

Roberta Highland, Planning Commissioner, reported they had a special meeting regarding an appeal on City Planning staff issuance of Zoning Permit 1020-782 at 541 Bonanza Avenue and the Commission took action to continue the hearing. At their regular meeting they had a presentation on the Main Street Sidewalk 35% design and discussed the project, and passed a CUP on Lakeshore Drive. The Commissions also discussed a letter regarding coal burning and they're interested in what the Council views and interest in pursuing the subject.

Robert Archibald, Parks Art Recreation and Culture Advisory Commission, reported they will have a presentation on the Main Street Sidewalk project at their upcoming meeting along with starting discussion on the Beach Policy.

i. Port and Harbor Advisory Commission

Steve Zimmerman, Port and Harbor Advisory Commission Chair, commented at their last meeting they didn't get a chance to address Ordinance 20-93 and they weren't aware of the truncated budget and shift to a July 1 to June 30 fiscal year. He expressed concern about the amount of money that will disappear from the Port and Harbor enterprise fund from this change, suggested forgiving the \$311,000 admin fee in the 2021 budget, and questioned whether this could be put off until they have time to discuss it.

j. Americans with Disabilities Act Compliance Committee

Councilmember Aderhold reported the Committee will be meeting January 14th at 4:00 p.m.

k. Economic Relief Grant Report

Special Projects and Communications Coordinator Carroll reviewed her final report that was included in the packet. Since her report the Mortgage and Rent Relief Grant (MARRG) closed with a total of 91 households approved, \$521,058 dispersed, and a balance of \$242,142 will be returned to the City. There are still 101 people in the que and AHFC representatives have been reaching out to all applicants to verify information and while there are no longer city funds available, AHFC will be working with those 101 applicants who returned calls or emails, using alternative funding sources.

b. Ordinance 20-93, An Ordinance of the City Council of Homer, Alaska Amending the 2021 Operating Budget to Provide for Necessary Mid-Biennium and 2021 Truncated Budget Adjustments. City Manager. Introduction December 14, 2020 Public Hearing and Second Reading January 11, 2021

Memorandum 20-206 and 21-013 from Finance Director as backup

Mayor Castner opened the public hearing.

Daniel Donich, Port and Harbor Advisory Commissioner, commented that the Commission hasn't had an opportunity to discuss. He understands there are benefits to truncating the budget, but they need to look at pros and cons of the process. He sees more cons with rolling 20% of our savings to finance the first six months of the year. The Harbor enterprise doesn't get a majority of its funds until October. He feels this has been rushed through and would like the opportunity to discuss it with the other commissioners.

Steve Zimmerman, Port and Harbor Advisory Commission Chair, added to his earlier comments that this change may also affect the bond rating of the Harbor Enterprise fund. They'd like the time to plan for it and he questioned what the benefits are and how much it will cost the City as a whole, in taxpayer money, to make this transition. He requested postponement until people have had time to analyze this and comment correctly.

There were no further comments and the hearing was closed.

LORD/ADERHOLD MOVED TO ADOPT ORDINANCE 20-93 BY READING OF TITLE ONLY FOR SECOND AND FINAL READING.

Councilmember Lord commented it's taken a couple of weeks for her to wrap her head around the financial implications of a truncated budget from an accounting perspective. This ends up reducing our general fund balances by \$3.5 million. She thinks there are legitimate reasons for changing the fiscal year, but doesn't think they're urgent and she regrets the path were on. Regarding the enterprise, she agrees with the Commissioners that spoke in that there wasn't time for them to review. Municipalities do this sort of thing, but typically you'd plan for it and understand what the implications are and look ahead at how to address them. She agrees it's

responsible of Council to take unassigned fund balance from the general fund and make sure they cover the enterprise hole that this truncated budget creates. She sees a way to get halfway there at this point, and by the end of the truncated fiscal year she'd like to make sure they get to the other half.

LORD/ADERHOLD MOVE TO AMEND THE FY21 PROPOSED TRUNCATED BUDGET BY REMOVING THE GENERAL FUND ADMIN FEES ON ACCOUNT NUMBER 5241 IN THE AMOUNT OF \$311,223.

Councilmember Smith expressed his support for the amendment and acknowledged Commissioners Donich and Zimmerman make good points in the sense that it shouldn't be the enterprise's burden to bear. He feels they fully understood there would be some financial implications with the change and it's only right to do our part to ensure the enterprise is fully compensated. This is the first step in making that happen.

Councilmembers Aderhold and Venuti concurred that the enterprise fund should be compensated.

There was brief discussion clarifying the result of this is a reduction in revenue to the general fund.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Motion carried.

Councilmember Aderhold shared that it also took her some time to understand the implications of the truncated budget. She shared the frustration that it would have been nice for them to have had the time to spend with the possibility of changing the budget and assess what the fiscal implications would be, time for feedback from the Commissions, and this was a busy time for the public. She hopes as Council moves forward they'll evaluate all the reserve funds and develop our policies to rebuild the reserves in a systematic way, based on future needs for equipment replacement, road rebuilds, and so forth.

Councilmember Lord appreciates the work of staff in developing this truncated budget. The unassigned fund balance can cover the cash to make this happen, but she would prefer to use the money for something else. As we look at making big financial decisions or other complex or complicated decisions to remember there are very few things where there's a fire under them to have to move this quickly. COVID and CARES Act Funding was something that had to happen immediately, but they didn't have to move this fast with this change.

Councilmember Smith doesn't see this as a loss of revenue or that it creates a hole, it spends revenue we've collected to pay to operate the cost of doing business. We can argue the merits of having \$9.5 million in the general fund and the utility of what it serves versus what we're

doing now, which is paying for running the government. He expects we can still achieve projects that we feel are priorities, we're still going to be in a good position in doing this. He knows the timing isn't perfect, but questions if there would ever be perfect timing or that we'd be in the financial situation to make this change. These things have aligned and he's in favor of it.

At the request of the Mayor, City Manager Dumouchel read the recommendation from Memorandum 21-013, "City Administration strongly recommends Council provide support to the Enterprise Fund to balance out the impacts of the fiscal year change."

Councilmember Lord appreciates Councilmember Smith's thoughts on this. A question from Memorandum 20-206 about what we're going to do about capital projects. City Manager Dumouchel responded he plans to bring forward an action item or report at the next meeting focused on capital projects and addressing a path forward.

Councilmember Aderhold appreciates the comments from the Port and Harbor Commissioners. If this passes this evening they won't have the opportunity to have weighed in on this, but thinks it will be great to get feedback from them on methods to use at the end of the year to make sure they address this change. She thanked staff for their work on the budget, for the upcoming work of getting through this truncated year, and ready for our upcoming new fiscal year.

Mayor Castner opened the public hearing. There were no comments and the hearing was closed.

Councilmember Aderhold supports the ordinance and questioned if this might qualify for FEMA reimbursement sometime in the future.

City Manager Dumouchel responded that it may qualify and staff continues to track COVID issues. We continue to track data and see what comes out of the new administration at a federal level to see what might be the best route to consider.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

Mayor Castner called for a break at 8:03 p.m. and resumed the meeting at 8:13 p.m.

# ORDINANCE(S)

#### **CITY MANAGER'S REPORT**

a. City Manager's Report

City Manager Dumouchel addressed the letters in the packet from the City of Seldovia, they're interested in ways we might be able to work together with them to communicate with the State Ferry. Councilmember Aderhold expressed her willingness to participate and champion legislation.

He highlighted items in the City Manager's written report in the packet including new welcoming the new finance staff member, the Homer Police Station award from the Alaska Chapter of the American Institute of Architects for creative use of materials, and organizationally the City remains in Code Red status related to COVID with ongoing consideration of the situation. He also addressed work being done in sketching out a budget process for FY22/23 to bring Council and others in the conversation earlier.

There was brief discussion regarding personal watercraft and how Council would like to proceed given the City's limited window of jurisdiction. Comments from Council included a desire for Council to have a worksession that includes what current code is and possible directions we could go. There has been some past discussion that the City has no near shore rescue capabilities. It would be valuable to discuss what it looks like with these watercraft coming in, along with other users like kayakers, surfers, kite boarders, paddle boarders, and other near shore users. It was noted that PARCAC will be taking up the Beach Policy and they should be sure to look at how to take this into account.

In response to questions City Manager Dumouchel provided an update on the Council Chambers remodel, noting the completion date is still pending, and the pot hole near Bishops Beach is being addressed by Public Works and should be repaired soon.

Councilmember Aderhold commented she's had discussion with different people including the City Manager and Deputy City Planner Engebretsen. One thing that has come up is at the closing of the sale of the property, these assessments are dealt with at that time and she wonders if they have the latitude to work with the title company at closing to address this.

City Manager Dumouchel responded in passing a resolution to do this, an ordinance will need to come forward to allocate funds so staff will work with the parties involved to help ensure a smooth closing.

VOTE (substitution): NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

Councilmember Smith is in favor of this because the merits prove out, but going forward we need to have a larger discussion about long term planning on how we do this. There's been 9 properties that have gone through this same process and about \$400,000 of SAD money that was obligated to the land owners to pay as part of the agreement through the formation of the SAD. The City has transferred the obligation from the land owners to the tax payers. When talking about this percentage of a project, it then goes back into the tax payer obligation, he has a problem with that. They'll have to have a larger conversation to look at what point has the City done its part when it comes to moose habitat and land conservation. It's important, but we're a relatively small city and how much can we dedicate.

Councilmember Aderhold appreciates the points raised by Councilmember Smith and offered to work with Councilmember Smith on updated code language to address this. Regarding the property being discussed she added that the area is very high value wetlands and when filling wetlands other problems are created. She expressed that these conservation properties have value to the taxpayers, even though they aren't tax bearing properties.

VOTE: NON OBJECTION: UNANIMOUS CONSENT

# **COMMENTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL**

Councilmember Venuti wished everyone Happy New Year. This past week has been really difficult, what happened at America's capital by extremists have left many friends and neighbors with a feeling of sadness and disappointment. She thinks it's important that we try to stay positive for our own good mental health, and shared a quote from Emerson, "The purpose of life is not to be happy, but it is to be useful, to be honorable, to be compassionate, and to have it make some difference that you have lived and lived well."

Councilmember Smith shared at his house they have a sign that reads "Happiness is Homemade". If we relegate other people to make us happy, we'll probably be disappointed more often than not. Finding our place in the world and being a light that shows we can be happy regardless of circumstances is something that's important. He recommended reading the book by Leo Tolstoy "The Kingdom of God is within Us" that was recommended to him by a pilot who served in Viet Nam and that flew here during the Exxon Valdez Oil Spill. When thinking about even the title, it talks about what is within us makes all the difference and how we interact with the external forces around us.

Councilmember Lord welcomed everyone to the New Year. She's had a lot of thoughts and reflection on what we're doing within our local, state, and federal government. She believes strongly in local government and that we're all neighbors and a group of people sitting at this table, doing the best we can with all of our own challenges. She shared how her family works through challenging situations with patience, kindness, and empathy. She thanked teachers and administrators for their work in getting some of the kids back in school today. She's incredibly proud of the work City staff and Council on CARES Act, it was a huge undertaking and they moved a lot of money into the community.

Councilmember Aderhold commented that January 6<sup>th</sup> was a very horrible day in American history. She's personally devastated by the storming of the US Capital and the attempt to disrupt the peaceful transfer of Presidential power. It's been difficult for her as we learn more about what happened and she processes what occurred last week. The images of people who call themselves patriots attacking the foundation of our democracy are devastating. As those responsible for the destruction of our US Capital are held accountable we must also find a way

forward as a nation, as a community, and as individuals. Her hope is that we examine our responsibilities as citizens. We love our Constitution and often invoke the Bill of Rights, but less frequently reflect on responsibilities we have to each other and our communities. We have the privilege of disagreeing with each other through debate and discussion. Council makes decisions at this table based on public comment and debate, amend legislation to compromise and improve. We can do that in our personal lives by listening to other people's perspectives and be curious about them. She encouraged people to watch to the video by Arnold Swarzenegger's following the attack on the US Capital.

Councilmember Hansen-Cavasos shared her appreciation for the hard work of the medical staff in our community in their efforts for planning for the vaccinations. She wished the kids good luck in heading back to school.

The public notice was posted on the Planning Department's bulletin board at the KPB Administration Building. The petition was published as part of the agenda in the Homer News on January 7, 2021.

#### **Utility Company Comments Received:**

Alaska Communications Systems: No objection.

ENSTAR Natural Gas: No objection.

GCI: A response was not received. The surveyor provided proof that an attempt was made to receive comment.

Homer Electric Association: No objection.

#### Staff comments:

This petition is to vacate six different drainage easements all located within the City of Homer. This is in conjunction with project to vacate Cheryl Lane right of way and combine and/or reconfigure 28 parcels. If approved the drainage easement vacations will be finalized by the Lillian Walli Estate 2020 Replat, KPB File 2020-119.

The vacation of Cheryl Lane was heard and approved by the Kenai Peninsula Borough Planning Commission at their October 26, 2020 regularly scheduled meeting. That decision was upheld by the Homer City Council on November 9, 2020. The preliminary plat was heard and approved by the Kenai Peninsula Borough Plat Committee on November 9, 2020.

On May 20, 2020 the Homer Planning Commission unanimously approved to adopt staff report 20-31 and recommended the retention of drainage easements C, D, E, and the vacation of drainage easements A, B, and F. Per the city memorandum dated May 19, 2020 from the Deputy City Planner, it was recommended to retain easements C, D, and E "as they feed into the designed drainage system for Eric Lane. The other easements do not appear to serve a purpose or have any water associated with them."

Staff would like to note that if approved the drainage easement vacations should only be drawn to the property line as granted by the parent plat and not the centerline of the former right of way.

When looking at the plat submitted the approximate centerline of drainage is not always within the designated drainage easements. This was also noted within the City of Homer staff report. Per their code HCC 21.50.020(b)(2) requires structures be a minimum of 15 feet of the top of the bank of a defined channel.

A comment was previously received by a land owner, Fran Durner. The comments were submitted prior to the other meetings that were scheduled for the plat and right of way vacation. Ms. Durner is supportive of the vacation and plat but has concerns regarding the drainage easement vacations. She owns lots 48 and 49 south of Eric Lane and is concerned about future development and lot clearings and how that will impact and create the potential for flooding and water damage because of the steep slopes in the area. Ms. Durner requested that all of the drainage easements be retained.

# Findings:

- ACS, ENSTAR and Homer Electric Association provided written non-objection to the proposed vacation, GCI did not respond.

- 5. Staff used KPB 20.90 "Easement" definition when determining what process to follow for the drainage easement vacation application.
- 6. May 20, 2020 City of Homer Planning Commission meeting was opened to allow a public comment period and confirming with the Clerk that there were no members of the public present to provide testimony the chairman closed the public comment period.
- 7. Homer Public Works Department recommends retaining the easements marked C, D and E on the "Water Resources Map", as they feed into the designed drainage system for Eric Lane. The other easements to not appear to serve a purpose or have any water associated with them.
- 8. The 20-foot drainage easements were granted by Plat HM 88-16.
- 9. The easements are reserved for drainage purposes only.
- Any use of the drainage easement, by the public, would require approval from the City of Homer Public Works Department.
- 11. An objection comment from a neighboring land owner (Durner) was received. The land owner requested that all existing drainage easements be retained.
- 12. The approximate drainage is not wholly within the drainage easements.
- City of Homer Code requires structures be a minimum of 15 feet from the top of the bank of a

defined channel.

- 14. The proposed plat has a plat note that addresses the city code and the setback requirements.
- 15. There is not a drainage easement that connects drainage C and drainage E to drainage D.
- A drainage easement to provide a connection from drainage C and E to drainage D can be granted on the Lillian Walli Estate 2020 Replat.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Based on the means of evaluating public necessity established by KPB 20.70, the merits of the proposed vacations, and findings 1, 2, 3, 7, 10, 13, 16, **Staff recommends** approval of the drainage easements labeled A, B and F on the Water Resources Map KPB, and the denial of the drainage easements labeled C, D and E on the Water Resources Map KPB, subject to:

- The granting of a 15 foot drainage easement to provide a connection from drainages C and E to drainage D with the location of the easement being defined on the Lillian Walli Estate 2020 Replat.
- 2. Finalize the approved vacations by submitting a final plat within a timeframe such that the plat can be recorded within one year of vacation consent (KPB 20.70.130).
- Any drainage easements that are retained may require additional drainage easement dedications
  within the vacated portion of Cheryl Lane that are approved by the City of Homer Public Works
  Department.

- A. Denial of a vacation petition is a final act for which no further consideration shall be given by the Kenai Peninsula Borough.
- B. Upon denial by the planning commission, no reapplication or petition concerning the same vacation may be filed within one calendar year of the date of the final denial action except in the case where new evidence or circumstances exist that were not available or present when the original petition was filed.

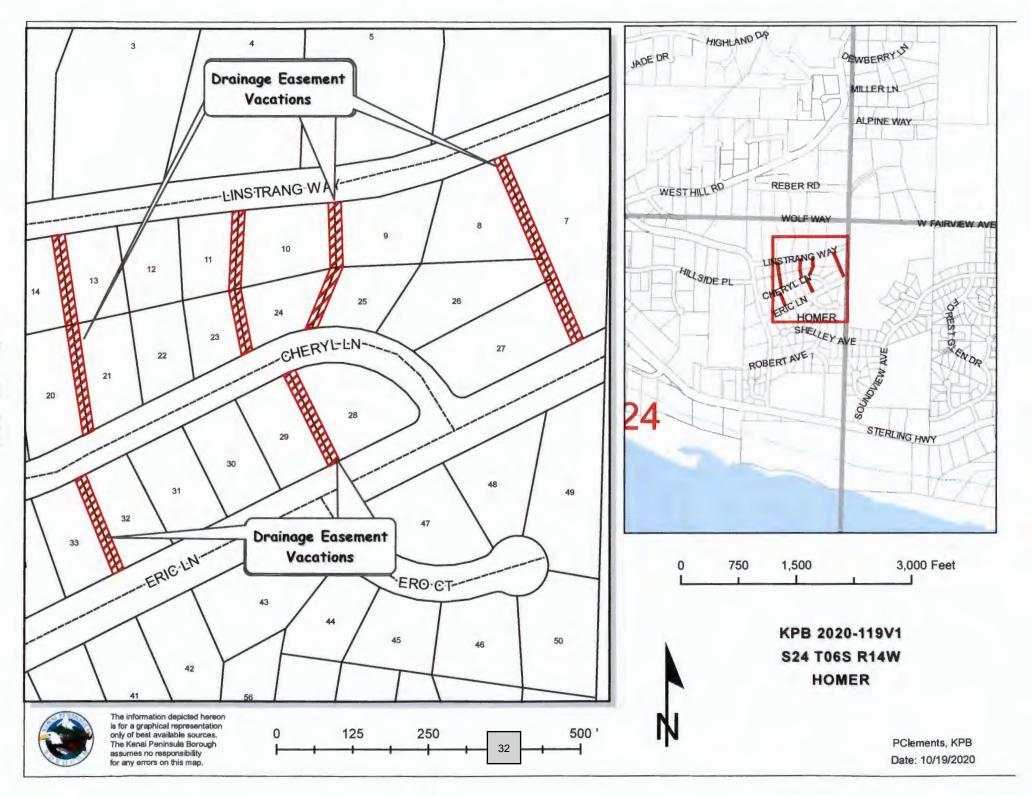

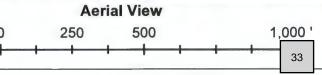

To the Kenai Peninsula Borough Planning Commission,

At your Monday, January 11, 2021 Planning Commission meeting, you will be considering KPB 2020-119V1, a proposal to vacate drainage easements in the replat of the Walli Subdivision in Homer.

I am the owner of lots 48 and 49 in the Walli Subdivision, on the south side of Eric Lane, directly downhill of the proposed re-plat and vacation.

While I think the replat makes sense overall and am generally supportive of it, I am concerned about the proposed vacation of the six existing drainage easements on the replatted property.

The Walli Subdivision is at the bottom of West Hill, on a particularly steep slope. There are known drainage and flooding problems in the subdivisions adjacent, below and to the east of the Walli Subdivision.

One of the owners of the largest lots at the top of this proposed replat, has stated his intent to remove all the trees.

With so many trees removed above Eric Lane, and with the already existing flooding problems, I am concerned with the potential for increased flooding and water damage to homes and roads in our subdivision and adjacent subdivisions. This area is part of a moderate wetlands and drainage area which can be viewed on the Homer Wetlands map.

On May 20, 2020, the City of Homer Planning Commission Special Meeting unanimously approved a recommendation to retain drainage easements C, D, and E on the proposed replat. These drainages and the wetlands areas are marked plainly on the Water Resources Map that was sent to me in the recent meeting notice packet.

The recent notice that was sent to me does not mention the full recommendations of the Homer Planning Commission, and only states that the City of Homer recommends vacating the drainage easements in favor of a note stating that creeks and drainages are subject to a 10 foot building setback. The statement without the full recommendation is misleading.

It is also misleading to suggest that drainages can be subject to a 10 foot setback, for without the drainage easements

marked on the plat, who is to say where drainages are located for 10-foot setbacks?

I respectfully ask the KPB Planning Commission to revisit the question of the drainage easements on the proposed replat and give careful consideration to not just the City of Homer's recommended retention of easements C, D, and E, but vote to retain all six of the easements, A, B, C, D, E, and F.

At your Monday, October 26, 2020 Planning Commission meeting, you will be considering KPB 2020-119V, a proposed replat and vacation of a portion of the Walli Subdivision in Homer.

I am the owner of lots 48 and 49 in the Walli Subdivision, on the south side of Eric Lane, directly downhill of the proposed re-plat and vacation.

While I think the replat makes sense and am generally supportive of it, I am concerned about the proposed vacation of the six existing drainage easements on the replatted property.

The Walli Subdivision is at the bottom of West Hill in a particularly steep slope. There are known drainage and flooding problems in the subdivisions adjacent and to the east of the Walli Subdivision.

One of the owners of the largest lots at the top of this proposed replat, has stated verbally, and in writing, that he is planning to remove all the trees on his lot, and has pressured all the owners of the other lots along Eric Lane to do the same.

With all these trees removed, I am concerned with the potential for buildup of considerable flooding and water damage to homes and roads in our subdivision and adjacent subdivisions. This area is part of a moderate wetlands and drainage area. Please see the attached Homer Wetlands map.

On May 20, 2020, the City of Homer Planning Commission Special Meeting approved a recommendation to retain drainage easements C, D, and E on the proposed replat. Please see the attached map from the City of Homer Planning Commission packet.

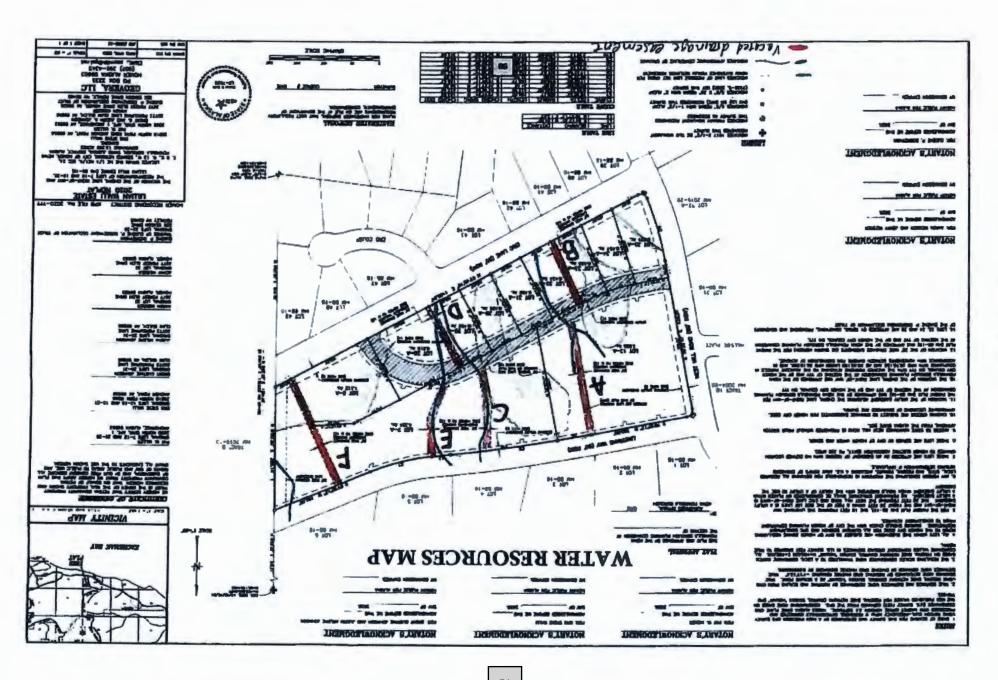

SUBJECT: Airport and Library Security Camera Upgrade

In 2007, security camera systems were installed at the Homer Public Library and the Homer Airport. These systems are well past the end of their designed lifespan, and many of the cameras are no longer functional.

In 2018 and 2019, the City Council approved funds to replace these systems and upgrade them to meet modern standards. The project has been significantly delayed and redesigned due to requirements imposed by the federal government. The National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA), passed in 2019, dictates that security equipment installed at airports must contain no Chinese-made components. This has limited the choice of available suppliers and driven up costs, as well as slowed delivery through supply chains. COVID-19 has further delayed the project, both by tying up suppliers of the equipment and by forcing City personnel to concentrate on other tasks.

In late 2020, the City advertised for bids to supply and install the equipment at both locations. The winning bid, from Sherman Technologies, was selected in January 2021. Sherman Technologies has offered to complete the full project at a total cost of \$76,100. The City will also need to pay \$3,600 for additional software licenses to support the new cameras, bringing the total cost to \$79,700. This is an increase of \$19,700 over the existing \$60,000 appropriation.

In the estimation of the City IT Manager, the bid includes a reasonable cost increase, given the two years that have elapsed since the original appropriation and the aforementioned complications in the equipment supply.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Appropriate an additional \$19,700 to cover cost increases and complete the project and follow up with a Resolution awarding the contract to Sherman Technologies to supply and install security cameras and supporting equipment at the Homer Public Library and Homer Airport.

SUBJECT: Payment of water and sewer assessments for Lot 4, Hodnik Subdivision

A 21 acre parcel located between Lampert Lake and Kachemak Drive is currently for sale. This property is particularly popular with birdwatchers and ice skaters. Kachemak Moose Habitat, Inc (KMHI) is intending to purchase the land and retain it for conservation purposes. KMHI has a history of land acquisition in the Beluga Lake/Kachemak Drive area to preserve moose habitat (see attachment 1). KMHI also has a practice of allowing public access to their properties. KMHI would like to partner with the City to "waive" the existing water and sewer assessments (~\$78,500). As the assessments are debts owed to the HAWSP fund, it is inappropriate to waive the assessments. Instead, staff recommends the Council consider paying off the assessments with available funds from the Land Acquisition Fund.

#### **Subject Parcel Information**

The subject parcel is identified as Township 6 South, Range 13 West, Section 22, Lot 4 Hodnick Subdivision Seward Meridian, Lot 4 Kenai Peninsula Borough parcel number 17936032. It is located between Kachemak Drive and the Homer Airport.



The parcel is 21 acres in size and contains a large portion of Lampert Lake. The parcel is zoned "General Commercial 2," but the opportunities for development are limited due to the lake and wetlands. Lampert Lake and its adjacent wetlands provide both ecosystem services and recreational opportunities to the City's residents and visitors. The parcel attracts migratory birds as well as moose. The parcel also attracts birdwatchers, amateur ecologists, environmental educators, and, when conditions are right, ice skaters.

### **Assessment History**

At this time, the subject parcel is associated with approximately \$78,500 in water and sewer assessments. The assessments, when paid, would refund the HAWSP Fund's participation in the extension of water and sewer to this part of the City.

The subject parcel is part of two districts:

- 1. Kachemak Drive Phase I Sewer Special Assessment District (Resolution 04-11, approved by Council January 12, 2004)
- 2. Kachemak Drive Phase 1 Water Special Assessment District (Resolution 05-80, approved by Council July 25, 2005)

In 2005, the City Council adopted Resolution 05-50(A) to exempt certain lands from water and sewer assessments when the lands would be conserved for a public purpose or habitat protection. Over the years, the city has exempted at least six lots along Kachemak Drive for this purpose. Because of the impact "exemptions" or "waivers" have on the HAWSP Fund, staff does not recommend following the past practice of waiving any fees associated with the parcel.

Prior resolutions which had provided "waivers" to assessments, included language that stated if a property benefiting from a waiver were later developed, the full assessment would come due. While the post-development concept is very valid, it is very difficult to administer. If Council wants to develop a program of this nature, Administration, Finance, and the City Attorney will need to collaborate on a program which can adequately address situations such as this.

### Request from Kachemak Moose Habitat, Inc.

This fall, KMHI contacted the mayor to request an exemption ("wavier") for the subject parcel (see attachment 2). The property is under private ownership, and is in the process of being purchased with the intent that KMHI will be the owner. Initially it was believed that there were approximately \$30,000 in assessments on the subject property, however further research determined that the amount is actually \$78,500. At the time the assessments were approved, the land included two parcels; lot lines have since changed and it is now one large property with the two original two assessments.

In exchange for the City paying the assessments, KMHI has proposed the following language as a deed restriction:

"The above described real property is protected, in perpetuity, primarily for the purpose as a wetland and habitat conservation area. The property shall be protected and managed in its natural condition for the preservation of its surface resources, vegetative cover, habitat for fish and wildlife, wetland hydrology and other water quality values of the property. The property shall remain available for public recreational activities provided those activities do not conflict with this primary purpose."

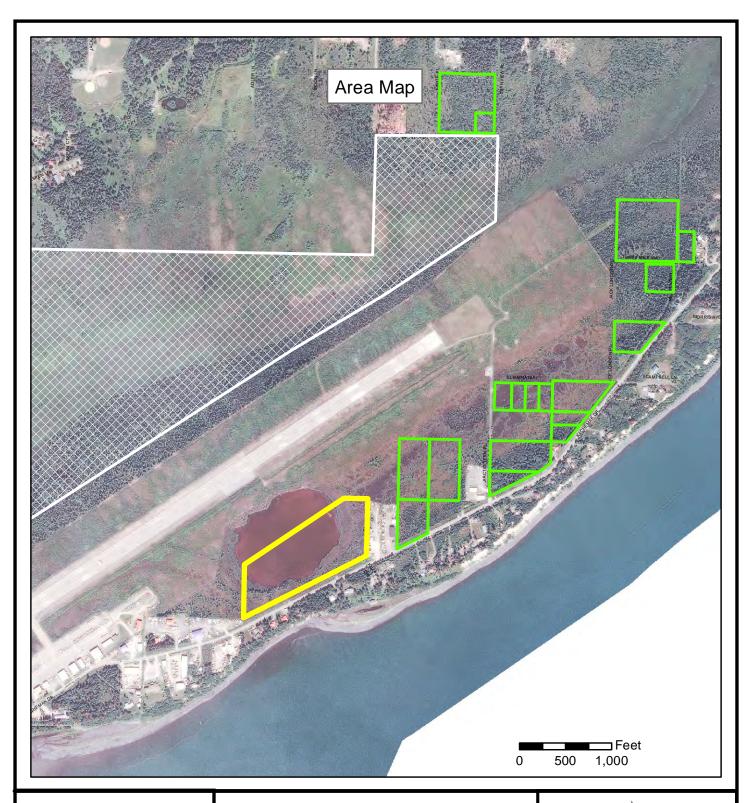
### **Potential Funding Source**

Staff has identified the Land Acquisition Fund as a potential funding source. The fund currently has a balance of about \$170,000. If the fund is used for these assessments, the remaining balance would be approximately \$91,000.

**Recommendation**: Adopt the Resolution. When the property transaction is complete with the recorded deed restriction, staff will bring forward an ordinance to pay the water and sewer assessments.

Dear Mayor Kastner:

Kachemak Moose Habitat Inc. ("KMH") is currently negotiating the acquisition of 21 acres of prime moose habitat land, which includes a large portion of Lampert Lake. I know there has been previous attempts by the City to acquire this popular lake to no avail. The KMH acquisition will help move the ownership out of private hands, make this popular skating lake more accessible to the public, protect high value wetlands and provide moose habitat in a popular viewing area. Additionally Beth Trowbridge, Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies, has expressed a desire to utilize the property for field education classes. We have always allowed public access to our properties as long as moose habitat is not damaged. We believe the public will enjoy this environment for a long time to come.

The Lampert Lake property is currently subject to about \$30,000 in unpaid utility assessment, levied by the City of Homer. In the past, the City has waived such fees so long as the impacted property remained in habit conservation status. For example, attached is a City of Homer Resolution, passed in 2017, in which the City agreed to waive utility assessment fees related to a different property we placed into habitat conservation status. This is what we propose for the Lampert Lake acquisition

It has always been the intent of our organization to protect in perpetuity the wildlife habitat we acquire and we have such language in many of our property deeds. Our previous agreements with the City specify that any changes to our properties' protection status, such as development of any kind, would cause the waiver to be set aside and any assessment district fees to be immediately reinstated.

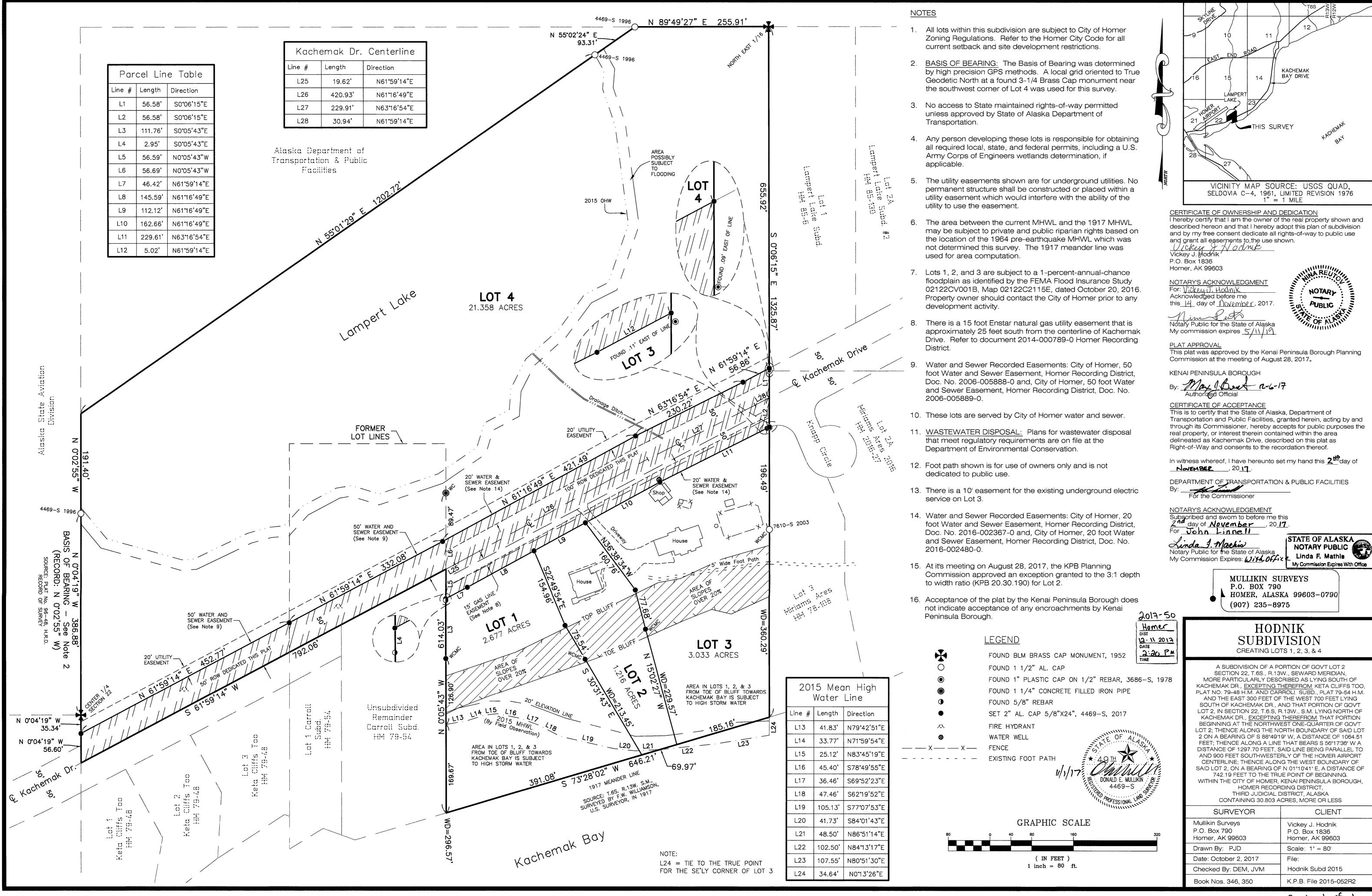
We asked the owners of the Lampert Lake property to get the property appraised. As a result, they reduced their asking price to a number we could agree on. We have found funds to purchase the property, but the funder does not want to pay \$30,000 in utility fees assessments.

Jan Keiser, City of Homer Public Work Director, is familiar with our organization and Julie Engebretsen, Assistant Planner, is familiar with KMH's relationship with the City regarding previous Kachemak Drive property acquisitions. Jan recommended I reach out to you and ask for help in resolving this. I would like to schedule a brief meeting with you to discuss our proposal.

SUBJECT: KBNERR MOU

The Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (KBNERR) is in the process of updating their partnerships. In 1998, the City of Homer signed a Memorandum of Understanding with ADF&G to "assist the governmental agencies in cooperatively managing the areas within the boundaries of KBNERR." At that time, ADF&G was assigned by the State as the agency responsible for managing the Reserve.

In November 2019, the UAA Alaska Center for Conservation Science's Director Matt Carlson contacted the City with a request to update the MOU since it is now the University of Alaska, Anchorage that is responsible for managing KBNERR. The MOU is tied to KBNERR's Management Plan, which has also been updated. Port and Harbor and Administration received the final draft of the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve's (KBNERR) on July 6<sup>th</sup> from KBNERR Reserve Manager Coowe Walker and reviewed the proposed MOU and made comments. City attorneys, JDO Law, have also reviewed the document and made suggested edits. Presented today is the final document encompassing all input from KBNERR and City interests for final council review and approval.

### Background:

- Homer City Council has passed legislation over the years supporting the efforts of KBNERR, namely Resolutions 18-027, 14-030, 98-14, and 96-106.
- KBNERR has historically provided beneficial services to the City, including baseline data on coastal bluff erosion currently being used to inform capital improvements to the Seawall; assess nearshore fish prior to harbor expansion; provide trainings on green infrastructure; work on the City's climate action plan; and most recently applying groundwater models for the Bridge Creek reservoir, and exploring options for financing coastal peatlands.

Page 2 of 2 Memo Re: KBNERR MOU

 The Homer Harbor and area slated for expansion are not part of KBNERR's domain. In 2014, the harbor and surrounding areas were excluded from the Kachemak Bay Critical Habitat Area managed by ADF&G after findings that this area should not be precluded from development on account of environmental needs/sensitivity. This important City project will not be hindered as a result of this partnership.

### Going Forward:

- The updated MOU provides the opportunity for the City to partner with the UAA system and receive benefits like a free exchange of management, research, and assessment data while making sure KBNERR is in compliance with City regulations.
- Points of interest in the updated Management Plan and possible ways the Port can benefit:
  - long-term datasets that facilitate understanding of regional ecological shifts (such as fish and sea life) over time and serve as a magnet for emerging research and technological approaches. Understanding such shifts is critical in managing coastal and marine ecosystems in ways that promote their resilience and sustainability."
  - Invitation for attendance to the Coastal Training Program (CTP). "The CTP provides up-to-date scientific information and skill-building opportunities to coastal decision-makers on relevant coastal management issues. Target audiences may vary for each reserve, but generally include local elected or appointed officials, managers of both public and private lands, natural resource managers, coastal and community planners, and coastal business owners and operators." The City was identified as a priority audience for this program.
  - o Partner on research and monitoring projects and enhance place-based research.
  - "…identify lands and waters with high priority for retention." "Consistent communication and coordination between these entities and KBNERR will facilitate cooperative efforts on land acquisition, management, and potential restoration projects, as well as collaboration on critical resource issues, research needs, and outreach efforts on affected lands."
  - Provide access to resources held by other partnering agencies including NOAA regional, Alaska Sea Grant, and Alaska Ocean Observing System, Chugach Regional Resource Commission, and Prince William Sound Science Center.
- The Management Plan also offers other benefits that, although they don't directly tie to the port, could benefit the City as a whole such as public education programs and general information exchange and consultation services.

Homer is a regional commerce center and transportation hub for many different industries. Protection and sustainable use of natural resources while balancing the needs of the industries supported by them is paramount. Signing on to partner with UAA in regards to KBNERR will provide helpful information and guidance on topics like land development and coastal erosion. As stated in the MOU, "the Reserve will serve to increase public awareness and understanding of the complex nature of estuarine systems, their values and benefits to humans and the natural world, and the problems the confront them." The City is not under any

## MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING between the

### UNIVERSITY OF ALASKA ANCHORAGE Alaska Center for Conservation Science

and the

#### CITY OF HOMER

# concerning portions of the KACHEMAK BAY NATIONAL ESTUARINE RESEARCH RESERVE

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is designed to assist the governmental agencies in cooperatively managing the areas within the boundaries of the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve (KBNERR). The agreement pertains to the responsibilities of:

1) University of Alaska Anchorage (UAA), College of Arts and Sciences, Alaska Center for Conservation Science, whose address is 3211 Providence Drive, Anchorage, Alaska 99508, and 2) the City of Homer ("City"), whose address is 491 E. Pioneer Ave., Homer, Alaska 99603. In no way does this MOU alter existing authorities and responsibilities either between or within the agencies.

WHEREAS, the State of Alaska has determined that the designation of the KBNERR under the National Estuarine Research Reserve System (NERRS) would provide for beneficial longterm research and improve public understanding of our coastal resources; and

WHEREAS, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), Office of Ocean and Coastal Resource Management, designated the KBNERR, which includes areas along the Homer spit and portions of Beluga Slough; and

WHEREAS, UAA is designated by the State of Alaska and in the KBNERR Management Plan, as the agency responsible for managing the Reserve; and

WHEREAS, the City of Homer has passed resolutions (e.g., Res. 98-14, 96-106) supporting the establishment of KBNERR; and

WHEREAS, the City of Homer has title to lands which form important components of the Reserve, including several acres of tidelands and salt marshes alongside the Homer Spit, and marshland and park parcels in the Beluga Slough area; and

WHEREAS, including these areas in the reserve may better facilitate estuarine research and education programs in the Homer area;

### NOW THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the City and UAA as follows:

- 1. The purpose of the KBNERR is to provide a natural field laboratory and living classroom which, in addition to current uses, will be used to gather data and educate people of the state and nation on the natural and human processes occurring within coastal watersheds and estuaries. As stated in the NERRS goals, the Reserve will serve to increase public awareness and understanding of the complex nature of estuarine systems, their values and benefits to humans and the natural world, and the problems the confront them.
- 2. A management plan for the KBNERR was finalized by UAA after public review with critical input from the City of Homer. The management plan provides a framework for conducting research and educational programs in the Reserve. Activities within the City lands will be conducted in a manner which is consistent with the management plans for City lands and the KBNERR, designated as a NERR in 1999. Under terms of this agreement, the City of Homer will continue to manage and administer its lands and programs in these areas.
- 3. The City shall be fully and regularly consulted by UAA regarding research and education needs, opportunities, and information pertaining to Reserve areas.
- 4. The Signatories will coordinate and cooperate to ensure that research and educational activities do not adversely affect the lands, waters, fish, wildlife, natural and scenic values in these areas, or each other's management plans.
- 5. The Signatories acknowledge that the City intends to significantly expand port and harbor facilities on the spit. Nothing in the agreement is to be construed as opposing the City's projects or impairing the City's ability to expand port and harbor facilities for purposes which may include, but are not limited to, marine industrial, commercial, and recreational uses.
- 6. Nothing in this agreement shall obligate any party in the expenditure of funds, or for future payments of money, in excess of appropriations authorized by law.
- 7. Each party agrees that it will be responsible for its own acts and omissions including those of its officers, agents, and employees, and each party shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the other, to the maximum extent allowed by law, from any claim of, or liability for error, omission ornegligent act of whatever kind, including attorney fees, for damages to property or injury to persons occasioned by each party's own acts or omissions in connection with the terms of this agreement.
- 8. Nothing herein is intended to conflict with federal, state, or local laws or regulations. If there are conflicts, this agreement will be amended at the first opportunity to bring it into conformance with conflicting laws or regulations.
- 9. A free exchange of management, research, and assessment data among agencies is encouraged and is necessary to insure the success of these cooperative efforts.

This MOU will become effective on the date of signature. The termination date of this agreement shall be indefinite; however, either party may terminate its participation by providing written notice to the other party ninety days before termination. This agreement may be amended by mutual written consent of the Parties.

SUBJECT: Moratorium on Fee Collection – Park Pavilion Rentals

I am recommending that Council pass a resolution directing staff to enact a moratorium on collecting fees for the rental of park pavilions through May 27, 2021. No amendment to the fee schedule is required as there is no intent to change the fee. Fee collection would resume in time for Memorial Day weekend.

### **Background**

Staff, and Council through the passage of Resolution 20-130, are doing their best to support and encourage outdoor recreation. Starting December 4, 2020 I began meeting regularly with a group of staff to discuss winter recreation issues. This group has been referenced in previous City Manager reports as "winter recreation champions." One actionable idea which has come from this team is the temporary removal of fees to use park facilities. In 2020, pavilion rentals generated approximately \$1000 in revenue. If a fee moratorium is enacted, reservations will still be required, but we would be removing a barrier to usage for some folks who may be having economic issues related to COVID and can't afford other options away from their home to safety gather and recreate.

SUBJECT: Plan to Resume Capital Projects

Administration is recommending that the Council endorse a move to resume the implementation of approved capital projects on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the City Manager.

Council passed Resolution 20-050 in May of 2020 which directed staff to be conservative and delay non-critical capital projects. This was done early on in the pandemic when there was much more uncertainty over the potential impacts of COVID-19 on the City's revenues. While some uncertainty remains, we have been under pandemic conditions for approximately ten months and are actively working on a change to our fiscal year as well as a new two-year budget. In that financial review process, staff is finding that we are in a position where we can begin to resume projects which had been delayed due to COVID.

I have provided a resolution which directs staff to evaluate and resume capital projects with the caveat that they must be first approved by my office before moving forward. I intend to create a small review team to assist me in this process.

Finance Director Walton has prepared a memo with more information regarding the status of our existing capital projects and the budget implications of bringing them back online.

SUBJECT: FY20/21 Capital Budget Update

The purpose of this memo is to provide an update on the FY20/21 capital budget.

### **Background**

Council passed Resolution 20-050 stating that all non-critical capital projects were to be delayed. As such, City Departments took that direction and postponed those non-critical projects. At the City Council meeting on January 11<sup>th</sup>, Administration stated it would bring additional information associated with the capital budget to Council at the next meeting. This memo provides Council with the update on all of the General Fund CARMA (152/156), Water and Sewer CARMA (256), and Port Reserves (452/456) capital projects that were approved for FY20 and FY21.

Per HCC 3.05.035(b), an appropriation for a capital expenditure shall continue in force until the purpose for which it is made has been accomplished or abandoned; the purpose of such appropriation shall be deemed abandoned if three years pass without disbursement or encumbrance of the appropriation. It is important to keep the second piece in mind when determining how to address FY20 capital spending already approved. Three years will lapse during FY22 and that fiscal year covers the period of July 1, 2021 – June 30, 2022.

### **General Fund**

The FY20 capital budget for the General Fund CARMA (156) and Fleet CARMA (152) included approved projects totaling \$1,035,109. Of this approved amount, roughly \$329,952 has been spent to date. This total spend value is low, as the majority of capital projects slated for FY20 were postponed per Resolution 20-050.

Here is a chart summarizing the capital spending approved for FY20 and the status of those requests. The total spend to date value represents the actual amount that has been recorded to our general ledger and does not reflect any committed spending with vendors. For example, HPD has purchased both of their patrol vehicles, but the invoices for them have yet to be processed through accounts payable. Therefore, you will see an open amount suggesting no spending has been done to date. The completed marker has been assigned to

WHEREAS, The Kenai Peninsula Borough is the tax collection agency for the City of Homer and is on a fiscal year calendar and as such is currently in their budget process through which their Administration, under the "Summary Data – Governmental Functions" section of Mayor Pierce's proposed FY 21 Annual Budget, has estimated nearly 21% reduction in tax revenues (sales and property taxes) with an estimated 15% reduction in sales tax returns as a result of Covid-19 restrictions; and

WHEREAS, It is in the best interest of the City to act proactively and plan for long-term fiscal responsibility across funds and within operations throughout this crisis to continue providing City services and maintain the City's workforce through economic uncertainty to the greatest extent possible; and

WHEREAS, The direction provided in this resolution is proactive in nature. Its intent is to protect the fiscal health of the City and the City's ability to continue providing essential services into what is currently an uncertain future. This direction will be followed with staff reevaluating all capital projects and operational expenses under these new parameters.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City Manager will work with Departments to assess approved capital projects and will only proceed with projects that are currently underway, have majority of funds from other sources (i.e. state or federal grants), are necessary for public safety and welfare, or are recommended to still occur while delaying other non-critical capital projects.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Manager will work with Departments to stretch operational dollars and spend budgeted funds conservatively and prudently.

BE IF FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council will reassess guidance on capital and operational spending after the first and second fiscal quarters' revenue is booked;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council requests the following information from Administration for a worksession prior to the first meeting in June:

- Updates on all current fund balances and accounts, including reserve accounts, debt service accounts, the General Fund, Enterprise Fund, and Water Sewer Special Revenue Fund.
- o An update on the 2019 audit and timeline.
- o Modeled projections of City revenues for FY20 and FY21 with sales tax revenues reduced by 15% and 40% and property tax revenues reduced by 10% and 20%.
- Estimates of Fund Balance spending to fill the above projected revenue reductions.

#### **MEMORANDUM OF VETO**

#### Dear Council Members:

Under the authority granted to me under AS 29.20.270 (a), I am striking three line items that were included in the 2021 (truncated, 6 month) budget that you approved on January  $11^{th}$ . They are shown on Page 361 of the agenda packet for that meeting, a copy of which is attached. They are identified as A/C 4984, A/C 4985, and A/C 4987. They are the administrative charges to the HART and HAWSP Funds.

Explanation: The HART and HAWSP Funds are voter approved collections of a sales tax for dedicated purposes. The voters directed the money to be used exclusively for those purposes and expenditures beyond those purposes require voter approval. The City has been charging administrative fees to both for many years, which, in my view to have been an improper appropriation of restricted funds. The Council just adopted a refreshed HAWSP Policy that makes it very clear that administrative fees are <u>not</u> to be charged to the fund.

A similar restraint exists to the HART Fund, whether written or not.

I have included a spreadsheet with back-up materials to illustrate the erosion of fund growth when an administrative fee is in place.

Subject: Planning Commission Report for City Council Meeting

Attending: All Commissioners were present including new Commissioner Brad Conely, City Clerk Melissa Jacobson, and Deputy City Clerk Renee Krause.

We held a virtual **Work Session** evaluating the recommended (by JDO) **procedures for hearing the appeals** to decisions made City Planning Office or HPC. City Clerk Melissa Jacobsen guided us through this evaluation. A final process was reached which will be implemented at the Special Meeting on January 27, 2021 to hear the appeal of Zoning Permit 1020-782. City Planner Abboud was excused for this discussion.

We briefly discussed the **Tall Tower topic**. CP Abboud shared that there was need to gathering more information and also have the FAA's evaluation to be able to give final decision.

#### **Planning Commission Regular Meeting**

All Commissioners we present with City Planner Abboud and Deputy City Clerk Renee Krause.

The **Agenda** motion was presented and due to the withdraw by the Applicant of Variance 21-01, this was removed from the Pubic Hearings portion of the Agenda.

There were neither **Public Comments** nor **Reconsiderations**.

**Consent Agenda** was passed without discussion or objections.

#### **Reports**

City Planner Abboud presented **Staff Report 21-04**. Mr. Abboud emphasized the Main Street Improvement Project reflecting on design options and cost.

Commissioner Charles Barnwell was appointed to the Public Works Task Force and a report from him will be added to the Reports portion of the HPC meetings.

We welcomed Commissioner Brad Conely.

City Planner Abboud also shared briefly on city Land Allocation, 2021 City Budget, and EDC activities.

Various commissioners presented questions to Mr. Abboud about the Public Works Relocation effort regarding possible locations, budget and timing.

Under **Pending Business**, City Planer Abboud presented **Staff Report 21-06**; **Helicopters and Tall Towers Near the Hospital**. This report evaluates if there is any flight hazard to the hospital by the potential 85' tower (a 4G system) to be located at 3838 Bartlett St. CityScape Consultants presented a thorough and helpful written report of the topography and flight patterns to and from the hospital. There were no significant concerns raised. Additional evaluation by the FAA may be needed. Questions about tower lighting and color were introduced.

We spent a few minutes on **Informational Materials** highlighting the Police Station Architectural Award, Personal Water Craft in Kachemak Bay, affirmation of City Employee involvement with the Covid Vaccination effort, the Library Trail Project and the Camping Report.

The Homer Planning Commission will have a Special Meeting on January 27, 2021. The next Regular Meeting will be held virtually by Zoom on February 3, 2021 at 6:30 p.m.

SUBJECT: HOMER-TESHIO SISTER CITY UPDATE

In November 2020 the Consular Office of Japan in Anchorage reached out to all Alaska municipalities that have sister cities in Japan to be a part of a statewide effort that encourages connections. Given Homer's ties to Teshio, Japan, we were invited to participate in the Consulate's Japan-Alaska Sister City forums.

The purpose of these forums are to exchange information and opinions among municipalities in both Japan and Alaska and share concerns, challenges, good practices, etc., and promote exchange and friendship. Frequency of meetings are currently once a quarter; so far there has been one forum with Alaska-only cities and one joint forum that included all Japan and Alaska communities. Activities of the forums include:

- Plan and implement joint initiatives and events to serve the purposes above.
- Holding online meetings.
- Search for and utilize ways of regular information exchange (For example, email, FB, calls).
- Posting events and disseminating information through the "Newsletter" of the Consular Office.
- Organizing concrete projects; example of this is the "Japan-Alaska Friendship Video Campaign" for
  residents of the Alaska-Japan sister cities (see attached flyers). This campaign could be an opportunity
  to educate our community on what is a sister city and that we have one in Japan, while encouraging
  additional participation from those who have been involved in our sister city relations in the past.

I have been asked by Mayor Castner and the City Manager to represent Homer as the Sister City Coordinator at these forums. Joining me in these meetings and helping with this project is Megumi Beams, who is a Homer resident and works at the Chamber of Commerce.

Homer does not have an "official" sister city exchange program, such as Seward or Ketchikan, and has relied on many amazing volunteers over the years to make these connections happen. I hope that with enough support, we could bolster our efforts into a more formal program. One that includes informational campaigning within our community to businesses and schools, supports annual exchanges (either for students, work, or community interest groups), and does more to showcase our relationship with Teshio. Given my experiences of living in Teshio for nearly a year as an exchange student and visiting again as a delegate, I can attest to how beautiful and giving the Teshio community is. They honor their sister city relationship with Homer at such a high degree; it would be only fair that Homer works to establish a program that matches their energy and love.

SUBJECT: Beluga Sewage Lift Station Rehabilitation

**Issue:** The Beluga Sewage Lift Station is a major piece of the City's sewer system, transporting all sewage from the Spit as well as the Lakeshore Drive/Ocean Drive neighborhoods. For a variety of reasons, the sewage is extra rich in hydrogen sulfide, which is an acid that eats metal and concrete. As a result, the mechanical/electrical components as well as the concrete structure comprising this lift station, are corroding. Rehabilitation is necessary to extend the useful life of this lift station and protect the neighborhoods it serves. We propose to issue a contract for engineering services to explore options, perform preliminary design, and prepare a cost estimate for the rehabilitation.

#### **Background:**

All the sewage from the Spit flows through this lift station. In the winter flows on the Spit are substantially reduced, which means sewage sits in the pipes longer than it does in the summer. This pooling gives the sewage time to generate substantial volumes of hydrogen sulfide, a powerfully corrosive and dangerous gas. When you walk by the lift station and smell rotten eggs, you are smelling low concentrations of hydrogen sulfide. Over time, the acid has caused the concrete structure of the lift station to crack, spall and otherwise deteriorate. This is putting the structure at increasing risk of failure. Likewise, the acid adversely affects the values, pipes, controls and other mechanical/electrical systems, decreasing their useful life.

There are multiple ways to address this problem. We propose to bring in HDL Engineering, a firm that is well-experienced with waste water collection systems, to evaluate the conditions and help us identify a preferred option as well as perform preliminary engineering sufficient for initiating permitting and developing a reliable cost estimate for final design and construction. HDL is one of the firms, with which the City has a Term Contract. The cost for the proposed services is \$19,573.

With this preliminary engineering effort, we will be able to ascertain our best option for moving forward and the extent to which we can perform some of the rehabilitation work with our own staff. We will not initiate any new sewer projects from this fund until such time as a new CARMA policy manual is adopted and we have refined our Asset Management Plan and Capital Improvement Plans for the sewer system.

The City maintains a Sewer CARMA, built from the user fees paid by the City's customers. The value of the Sewer CARMA Account, as of March 31, 2020, was \$2,018,059. Since then, the City Council has appropriated or obligated the following expenses:

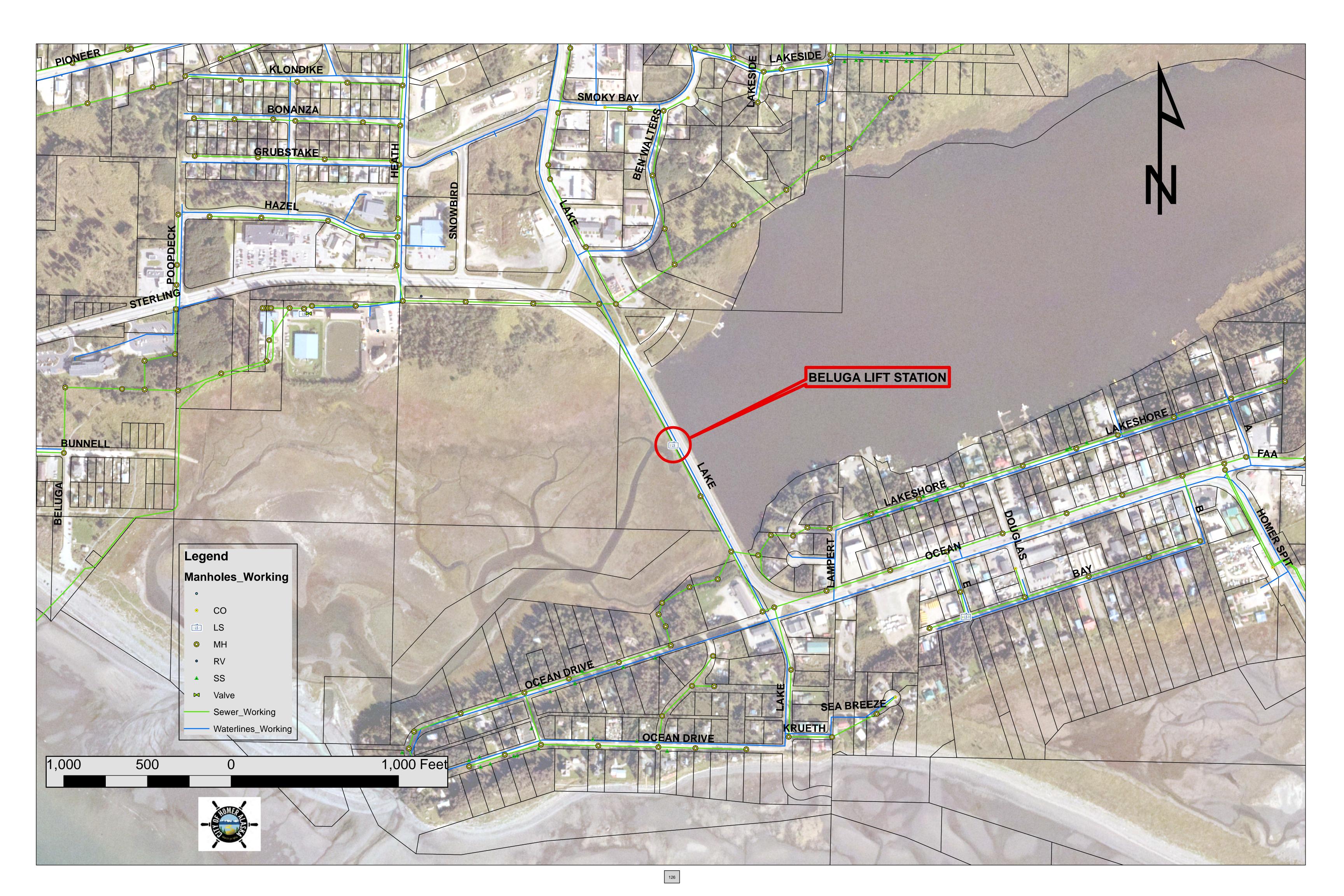

SUBJECT: ORDINANCE 21-02 SUBLEASES

Subleases, and the businesses that utilize them, generate and grow the tax base benefit for the City, Borough, and State. It's in the City's best interest if City Code supports and encourages the growth of business and equally supports all conditions allowed under the City code and land use requirements. Currently, Homer City Code (HCC) 18.08.140 requires property lessees to pay 10% of any additional rent earned from a sublease.

Currently, as the Harbor has gained experience with implementation of this aspect of the City Harbor leasing requirements, it has been found not to have been an effective tool to promote the leasing goals embedded in Title 18. Instead, the deletion of the sublease premium and the delegation of authority to the Administration to approve subleases should promote the purposes of HCC 18.05.005, "that the lease of City-owned property maximizes the value of City assets and that the City awards leases that provide the highest and best use of City owned property". It should also promote the additional code purpose that "the City to lease its property in a fair and nondiscriminatory way".

#### Current administrative experience-includes:

- 1) MONITORING AND ENFORCEMENT ISSUES. Currently, there are no agencies outside the City that track subleasing within City limits other than the KPB tax assessment office. Sublease tracking is a self-reporting program which assumes the lessee of a City lease property chooses to report their sublease activity. City staff are only aware of subleases that are self-reported or noticed through visual inspection of the property, making it difficult to ensure that enforcement of the subleasing conditions are evenly and fairly applied to all lessees.
- 2) ADMINISTRATIVE EXPEDIENCY. Given the seasonality and short term use that often takes place with subleasing, it is not practical to expect that subleases would have to be approved by Council as per the current code. Staff's limited ability to track and enforce the code as written for small subleases, and Council's busy calendar when addressing this shifting field, have made it difficult to keep pace with the code as it currently stands. Instead Administrative approval of sublease activity promotes the purposes of the code and assists lessees by promoting expeditious economic development activity. The City's ability to rapidly respond in a kinetic business environment is important especially as the economy rebounds from the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- 1) Removal of the 10% subleasing premium -.
- 2) Addition of a self-reporting form/ application requesting approval of subleasing by the City manager or their designee. The reporting form would include:
  - a. The applicant information/lessee requesting the sublease;
  - b. The proposed sublease business information;
  - c. A current Alaska business license;
  - d. Proof of insurance:
  - e. The length of term of the proposed sublease; and
  - f. Confirmation that the proposed use in the proposed sublease is an allowed use with the current zoning.
- 3) Amend code language to delegate administrative approval and management of individual subleases to the City Manager or their designee. This would become an administrative task, streamlining the process, reducing staff time spent on subleases, and providing expedient processing of lessee sublease requests.

SUBJECT: Engineering Finance Support to Help Develop Water/Sewer Reserve Policies

**Issue:** The City is in the process of reviewing and adjusting its policies for building and spending reserve funds for the water and sewer utilities. Public Works indicated it needs specialized engineering support to help it identify and develop policies and protocols that best fit Homer's needs. We've asked HDR, one of the firms, with which we have a term contract, to provide a proposal for such services. The purpose of this Memorandum is to request funding for the work, splitting the costs between the Water/Sewer CARMA Funds.

#### **Background:**

Financial management of water and sewer utilities is a highly complex business, involving the administration of user rates, fees, operating budgets, capital expenses and savings. It is typical for municipalities and utilities to seek specialized help when "right sizing" these business matters. In Homer, a citizen task force worked for over 10 months to develop a water/sewer rate model that is still used to compute the rates for water and sewer services. That being said, there are some questions about how to administer some of the details of the rate model, such as how much we should be collecting for reserves and how we can be assured this amount is part of the commodity pricing structure.

We have a term contract with the engineering firm of HDR, which has a division that specializes in helping utilities address financial management issues. They proposed a package of services, the total cost for which is \$57,036. However, this includes a lot of work related to the water and sewer rate model, which we don't need. We do not intend to re-invent the water/sewer rate model, but to ask HDR specific questions regarding how certain elements of the rate model could be more effectively administered – such as the reserve element. We also need help setting up Job Cost Accounting for the W/S utilities so we can better track the expenses related to specific water/sewer projects, whether funded by HAWSP or the CARMA. We believe a budget of \$35,000 is an appropriate target for the scope of work we need at this point.

I'm requesting funding and authorization to issue HDR a Task Order in the amount of \$35,000. I will negotiate with them to fine tune the scope of work. I propose funding be split between the Water and Sewer CARMA Funds.

#### FY22/23 Budget

I am in the process of meeting with each member of the leadership team to discuss the FY22/23 budget. These kick-off meetings are focused on department/division missions, objectives, and goals as well as identifying challenges and opportunities for the future. A budget development schedule document will be brought to Council at the first meeting in February, and I anticipate a discussion on Council's FY 22/23 budget priorities at the second meeting in February.

#### **Climate Action Plan**

A draft whitepaper which examines changes in the City's greenhouse gas emissions in the years since the adoption of the 2007 Climate Action Plan has been completed and is being circulated for review. This paper is largely based on significant contributions by Public Works Engineering Technician Aaron Yeaton and will serve as the jumping off point for further sustainability planning for the City. When the review is complete, I will distribute the final draft via a future report.

#### **Sports Gear Library Update**

In an effort to support additional outdoor recreational opportunities, Community Recreation is pleased to have launched the Sport Gear Lending Program that is now available online at: <a href="https://www.cityofhomer-ak.gov/recreation/sports-gear-lending-program">https://www.cityofhomer-ak.gov/recreation/sports-gear-lending-program</a>. This free program provides an initial limited amount of outdoor recreational gear ranging from sleds, to various sporting balls to a pickleball set up. We hope to expand and provide additional items as the program evolves and we envision to network with other local entities to direct community members to locate gear that we may not be able to provide. Participants submit their requests online and make arrangements for curbside pickup and drop off with Community Recreation staff. The program is also open to donated gear, please contact Mike Illg at <a href="millg@ci.homer.ak.us">millg@ci.homer.ak.us</a> or 907-399-6090 if you have recreational equipment in good condition which you are interested in donating to the program.

#### Personal Watercraft in Kachemak Bay - Update

After a brief discussion with Council at the January 11<sup>th</sup> Council meeting, I have asked staff to get feedback from the Port & Harbor Commission as well as PARCAC on this topic. In the meantime, staff continues to investigate potential impacts and potential actions that could be associated with this issue in the future.

#### PFD and Tax Forms Available at the Library

The Library has forms available for distribution, including both the PFD application and the IRS 1040 tax form. Patrons can pick up forms through curbside pickup or at the plastic tub outside the front door of the building. PFD forms are also available at the Legislative Information Office at 270 W. Pioneer Avenue, and the PFD application can be completed online at my.alaska.gov. The only tax form the library has is the 1040, although we will soon have reproducible tax forms that can be photocopied and taken home.

#### **Quarterly Financial Reports**

Included with the CM Report are financial reports for the 2nd and 3rd quarters of fiscal year 2020. One item that remains outstanding is the utilization of CARES funding to reimburse the General Fund for Public Safety payroll expenses. The Finance Department and CARES team are still crunching those numbers and will come to Council with an update shortly. Keep in mind while reviewing these reports that the values presented are preliminary and are subject to change during the fiscal year-end closeout process. Finance is optimistic to provide Council with a 4th Quarter report by the first meeting in April 2021.

#### **Water and Sewer CARMA Updates**

Updated reports from the Finance Department regarding the Water and Sewer CARMA funds are attached to this report.

#### **Bishops Beach Update**

The sinkhole at the transition from the paved parking lot at Bishops Beach onto the beach itself has been addressed by the Public Works Department. A contractor was brought in to provide fill, shave down ice ridges, and relocated driftwood for parking delineation. The area will be reevaluated by Parks staff when the ground is thawed in the summer.



#### **Police Station**

Staff is preparing to make one final purchase before closing out the Police Station project. See attached for a memo about plans to purchase a shelving system for the evidence room.

#### **Recruitment for Assistant to the City Manager**

In January the City began its recruitment for a new assistant to the City Manager. This position has been open since November and the Administration Department is excited to find a welcome a new member to the team.

In January, we said goodbye to Investigations Sergeant Larry "Beans" Baxter. Sgt. Baxter joined our team in 2009. Originally from Kentucky, he spent four years in the Army which brought him to Alaska. Sgt. Baxter worked for the Unalaska Police Department from 2006 to 2009 before coming to Homer. He was promoted to Sergeant in 2017.

In February, Port Administrative Supervisor Lisa Ellington will be retiring as well. Lisa joined our team in 2006 and served the City for over 14 years.

# **COVID-Related Updates**

#### **COVID Risk Status**

I continue to meet with staff to review our risk level regarding the COVID threat in our community. On November 23<sup>rd</sup> I moved the City to "Red" status and we remain there today. After the schools reopened, I have been receiving increased communications from Library patrons and individuals who use the HERC for recreation asking that those facilities be reopened. While we're not currently seeing much COVID activity within our organization, we are continuing to take a conservative approach to COVID-safety due to stresses on the healthcare system at a statewide level. Local COVID numbers are low right now, but we are closely watching the impact of the return to in-person schooling on the Kenai Peninsula before considering a move back to "Orange" or below. If we maintain current local trends, there is a chance we could see limited reopenings of the HERC and the Library in February.

#### **COVID Vaccine POD**

The City of Homer and South Peninsula Hospital partnered to provide a very successful event at the Christian Community Church, providing the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine to more than 700 people over 65 years of age. Doses were administrated on Friday and Saturday, January 15th and 16th. Teamwork between City departments and the hospital really show that Homer is "The City That Works."



At this time, we are expecting five more vaccination events between the date of this report and the end of March. I am directing staff to continue to participate in the management and implementation of these events. South Peninsula Hospital is picking up many of the expenses, but there is still a cost to the City in staff time and materials for these events. Incident Command Team staff are determining the costs of the original vaccine POD to forecast the expense for the next five. I anticipate that there will be vaccine distribution funding made available from the Federal Government but the timing, amount, and deployment of that mechanism is unknown at this time. For now, departments will track vaccine POD related time and use their existing budgets to fund the program. I expect to bring a different funding program to Council for review once there is more known about any federal programs.

SUBJECT: Evidence Shelving System for Police Station

The Police Department has identified a shelving system for their evidence room which would increase their ability to use that space efficiently and allow a greater amount of storage. The Finance Department has calculated that the new police station construction project has \$42,936 in funds remaining from the original allocations (\$7,548,548). The total cost of the evidence shelving system has been quoted at \$40,530. I am planning to approve a request from the Police Chief to use these remaining funds for a functional upgrade to the evidence room.

I believe this is an appropriate and beneficial use of appropriated funds. This memo is written with the intent of being transparent in the purchasing of this system and giving Council an opportunity to object if they do not agree that it is an appropriate use of funds.

**Staff Recommendation:** Accept the memo and allow Administration and the Police Department to move forward with purchasing an evidence room shelving system.
