A. Monthly ADA Coordinator Report – January 2025

Chair Thorsrud introduced the item and deferred to ADA Coordinator Krause.

Ms. Krause provided a verbal report on the following:

- The amended meeting schedule for 2025 was published and included in the Meeting packet
- A memorandum approved by the board members in regards to soliciting information about accessible options/solutions for the Homer Harbor Float system was included in the Meeting packet.
- Budget development for FY26/27 is starting and will be added to the next meeting's agenda
- A reminder that it is encouraged to have several projects of various dollar amounts- funding opportunities are not always available for higher dollar projects.
- Tolley System may not be doable due to the extreme slope of the harbor. The design is only suitable for a less than 30-degree slope.

Chair Thorsrud opened the floor for questions/comments.

Commissioner Parsons asked about the update from Public Works regarding the transition plan. Ms. Krause stated Public Works had not gotten back to her yet, due to time conflicts with other more pressing projects.

Commissioner Geisler commented that she appreciated the clarification on the kayak loading project provided in the report.

Commissioner O'Brien asked if the Commission need to make a decision on the kayak loading project as an extra project. Ms. Krause responded that it can be presented as a new project and be added to a later meeting.

B. Final Rules from the DOJ about ADA Online, Web, and Mobile Applications.

Chair Thorsrud introduced the item and deferred to Commissioner Parsons.

Commissioner Parsons stated that some contacts at the Northwest ADA National Resource Center forwarded some guidelines and guidebooks on how to make the City of Homer's website ADA compliant under the new rules put forth by the DOJ. He stated the City website has some pretty substantial changed that need to be made for compliance before April of 2027.

Ms. Krause said she is familiar with the upcoming rules and has plans to address the website's changes in a timely manner.

PUBLIC HEARING(S)

PENDING BUSINESS

A. Staff Report ADA-25-002 Requesting Council Approval to Seek Design Recommendations

Ms. Krause stated the Memorandum would be included in the Council packet for their next meeting. Commissioner Lepley shared his findings about two companies interested in working on an accessible kayak launch project. He mentioned that Marine Innovations, based out of Minnesota, and a local Homer company, BayWeld Boats, were both interested and could potentially handle the project. He stated Marine Innovations was interested in designing the project but would not be able to supply the engineers to build it. Marine Innovations and BayWeld Boats would need to work together with between designs and manufacturing to complete this project successfully.

B. Staff Report ADA 25-003 Strategic Plan and Goals Review and Update

Chair Thorsrud introduced the topic and deferred to Ms. Krause.

Ms. Krause recommended reviewing the Plan and Goals for any desired changes and updates. Commissioner Geisler pointed out 1A Goal that included annual review and updates to previously adopted transition plans. She suggested scheduling the reviews on a staggered basis throughout the year so the Commission isn't tackling the whole plan in one drawn out meeting. Ms. Krause suggested adding the goals to the meeting agenda every other month.

C. Staff Report ADA 25-005 Trails Transition Plan Draft

Chair Thorsrud introduced the topic and deferred to Ms. Krause.

All commissioners agreed the Trails Transition Plan Draft looked good and they were comfortable moving forward with it.

NEW BUSINESS

A. Staff Report ADA 25-004 Adopted Transition Plan Review and Update

Chair Thorsrud introduced the item by reading of the title.

The Commission discussed the transition plan for parks, campgrounds, and facilities, including the harbormaster's updates and the need for accessible signage at the Fishing Hole Campground. They also addressed the use of wood chips and an accessible material, coming to the conclusion that the material can be sued under playground equipment but not on pathways or trails.

Council Actions:

Council has approved a number of Ordinances to appropriate funding for replacement equipment for the new Fish Grinding Building, amending the Homer Port & Harbor Tariff #1, which is a document that mimics Homer City Code, agreeing to purchase more land above Karen Hornaday Park for hiking and providing wildlife corridors. This land is too steep to build on and there were several attempts by former property owners to construct a road to access this area. The City currently owns a 10-acre parcel above which is similar in topography.

Ordinance 25-01 and Memorandum CC-25-028 will have a final discussion and Council will either adopt the ordinance amending the zoning for a parcel of land related to the proposed Doyon Lighthouse Village project. I would recommend supporting this action since it would provide an accessible path and viewing areas to the public as well as guests at the hotel to view the area of Mariner Slough and Kachemak Bay. There are really limited, truly accessible areas to people with mobility challenges in this town and to think that Homer would have one more fully accessible hotel, with amenities that would also be accessible, is an incredible attraction to those travelers wanting to visit Homer and Alaska. It would fulfill the desire for "All Ages and Abilities" compliance and would not cost the city to maintain which in and of itself would be a plus.

I am going to be working on updating the transitions plans with the status updates from the departments over the next couple of months and hopefully have that completed for the May meeting.

I will be sitting for my ACTCP exam in March as I am wrapping up my two final classes for the credits required. Then I will receive my accreditation and just have to keep up with the Continuing Education to keep my accreditation. This has been a long three-year process but I believe well worth it.

There has been impacts to crab fishing, set netters, but it appears that there is special treatment for one faction.

Port Director Hawkins provided input for Council that there is a need for the harbor to operate. As long as we have had a harbor, the seiners have not had to pay for a skiff, it has been status quo for approximately 40 years, back in the day they recorded moorage on library index cards and 25 years ago they purchased the first software and a work skiff was registered and entered in to the system, then they must remove the skiffs in order not to include them into the bills which requires a lot of staff time.

Further comment on needing long term solutions but expressed support the extension of the exemption for one more year was made by the majority of Council.

Discussion ensued on the proposed zoning change regarding the descriptive word of "derelict" used in the application, what the differences were from the initial plan submitted and providing those changes for Council.

City Planner Foster provided input on the lot, property on Bay Avenue was currently zoned Rural Residential and this project still has to go through multiple steps before they can be issued a zoning permit.

VOTE, NON-OBJECTION, UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

a. Memorandum CC-25-010 from ADA Coordinator re: Request for Authorization to Allow the ADA Advisory Board to seek Recommendations on Possible Accessibility Options and Solutions for the Homer Harbor Floats.

Mayor Lord introduced Memorandum CC-25-010 and deferred to Councilmember Parsons.

Councilmember Parsons explained the purpose of the memorandum providing a little background on the work being done by the ADA Board and this is to make it formal authorization allowing the ADA Advisory Board to seek design input noting there was no monetary request.

Councilmembers expressed concerns and commented the following:

- on costs increasing maintenance and impacts to existing infrastructure that may require more ADA accesses
 - $\circ\quad$ such as are they going to require installing an elevator on both sides of the Harbor
- liability to the City and the operations
- the harbor provides accessible stalls and one ramp is not as steep but there are some ideas that should be explored
- there are items listed in the Transition Plan that need to be addressed
 - o Difficult getting into City Hall
 - o Previous proposed projects such as the fishing hole platform
- This was not a budget request
- Not knowing what the solution could be or if there is any solution
- Having a larger conversation with staff and that the message is getting to the Advisory Bodies for the opportunity for more structure

City Manager Jacobsen recommended that City Council direct the ADA Advisory Board to draft the language on what, such as a request for proposals or information, they would like the entity(s) to provide regarding Accessibility Options for the Homer Harbor floats and provide a list of potential vendors and other harbors and have it reviewed by Staff.

ADERHOLD/VENUTI MOVED THAT CITY COUNCIL REQUEST THE ADA ADVISORY BOARD DRAFT A REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FOR RECOMMENDATIONS ON POSSIBLE ACCESSIBILITY OPTIONS AND SOLUTIONS FOR THE HOMER HARBOR FLOATS, A LIST OF POTENTIAL VENDORS AND OTHER HARBORS FOR THE CITY TO FORMALIZE

Councilmember Erickson requested that they include the ADA regulations and liabilities, costs to infrastructure, staffing a more complete picture.

City Attorney Gatti stated that a simple motion to recommend the ADA Board to continue with its quest to develop information about ADA accessibility for harbor activities, noting that may be too broad and restated it to reflect the Homer Harbor Floats. He then noted that he has worked with

staff on harbor ADA compliance issues, and concerns with the tides. He pointed out that it may be jumping ahead since the research may show it is not possible to do anything more.

Further discussion on Commissions or Board sending out anything on letterhead prior to direction of the Council, individuals doing research even member of Council do that, sending out to engineering schools a formal design will be required.

VOTE. NON-OBJECTION. UNANIMOUS CONSENT.

Motion carried.

b. Memorandum CC-25-011 from Recreation Champions Working Group re: Proposed Community Recreation Center Site Selection Recommendation.

Mayor Lord introduced Memorandum CC-25-011 and deferred to Councilmembers Aderhold and Erickson

Councilmember Aderhold reviewed the memorandum providing a summary of the findings. She noted that the Town Center location was further reviewed and recommend the city get input from the neighboring property owners, believing it was valuable to hear from the broader community before making decision.

Councilmember Erickson commented on the process reviewing the different parcels, stating it was important that they will be able to expand in the future and this property checks a number of boxes by developing town center, infrastructure connections, may be a bit more upfront costs but in the end costs would be less. She further stated that the property offers so many opportunities.

Councilmember Davis commented that he liked the idea in principle and would be curious to see the previously submitted design for town center project.

Mayor Lord noted that Council expressed a consensus to review the previous town center project documents.

Council approved the recommendations as stated in the memorandum by Consensus.

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INTRODUCTION

- 3 The City of Homer Transition Plan and Responsibilities
- 4 In accordance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA, this document shall serve as the City of Homer's
- 5 Transition Plan.
- 6 This is an overview of the plan that includes the self-evaluation that identifies barriers to program
- 7 accessibility and municipal owned properties throughout the City and includes project checklists to track
- 8 improvements. The plan consists of an Inventory Assessment, implemented requirements and annual
- 9 reassessment of goals and improvements.
- 10 The City of Homer ADA Coordinator will manage all aspects of ADA Compliance. This plan is available on the
- 11 City of Homer website for review by the general public. Individuals are encouraged to submit comments or
 - issues on accessibility of City programs and facilities by contacting the City ADA Coordinator.

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BACKGROUND

- 15 Resolution 16-019 established the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Compliance Committee and
- appointed then Deputy City Clerk Melissa Jacobsen as ADA Coordinator.
- 17 Resolution 16-057 established the ADA grievance procedure which sets out a system for resolving complaints
- of disability discrimination in a prompt and fair manner.
- 19 Resolution 17-75(A) Committed the City to continual work towards becoming a universally accessible city.
- 20 Resolution 19-024 established the Transition Plan for City facilities.
- 21 Resolution 19-055 confirmed the ADA Compliance Committee as a Standing Committee of the City Council.
- 22 This resolution further outlined the need for the Committee and stated the ongoing responsibility to review
- 23 any new programs, activities and services within the City of Homer; perform and develop transition plans
- for other areas of the City including but not limited to the city parks, trails, campgrounds and programs to
- 25 comply with ADA requirements.
- 26 Resolution 20-114 Appointed Renee Krause, Deputy City Clerk to assume the duties of ADA Coordinator for
- the City.
- 28 Ordinance 22-53(A) Created the Americans with Disability Act Advisory Board to codify the body to reflect
- 29 the City of Homer's commitment to Title II of the ADA Regulations and efforts to accessibility to all.

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PURPOSE

- 32 The federal legislation known as the American with Disabilities Act (ADA), enacted on July 26, 1990, provides
- 33 comprehensive civil rights protections to persons with disabilities in the areas of employment, state and
- 34 local government services, and access to public accommodations, transportation, and telecommunications.
- 35 Title II of the ADA specifically applies to state and local governments, referred to as "public entities," and
- 36 their programs and services. Title II, Article 8, requires public entities to take several steps designed to
- 37 achieve compliance.
- For the Transition Plan, the outlined scope of work included:

- o Preparing a self-evaluation of the City's policies and practices and analyze whether these policies and practices adversely affect the full participation of individuals with disabilities in its programs, activities, and services
 - Performing a self-evaluation of City facilities for compliance with ADA requirements for accessibility by individuals with disabilities
 - Developing a Transition Plan based on the self-evaluations that lists the physical barriers of the City's facilities that limit the accessibility of its programs, activities, or services to individuals with disabilities; the methods to be used to remove the barriers and make the facilities accessible; and the schedule for taking necessary steps to achieve compliance.

SELF-EVALUATION PROCESS

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City of Homer Staff and ADA Advisory Board (formerly known as ADA Compliance Committee) members received training on performing self-evaluations and Transition Plans from the Northwest ADA Center. The Northwest ADA Center is funded by the National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research (NIDILRR), and is part of the ADA National Network Centers which are a national platform comprised of ADA professionals and experts charged with assisting businesses, state and local governments, and people.

- Following the training, the ADA Advisory Board self-performed the work with the support of City of Homer staff, with the option of contracting for aspects of the self-evaluation and initial Transition Plan that exceeded the expertise of the Board and City staff.
- 59 City facilities included in the primary self-evaluation:

Several of the facilities were excluded from this initial self-evaluation due to the following reasons:

- Old Homer Police Station At the time of the self-evaluation Homer City Council was evaluating plans for a new police station building; the old Police Station has known ADA compliance issues. This building is currently being used for storage for the Fire Department and is not open to the public.
- Homer Education and Recreation Complex (HERC) The HERC consists of the old Homer Middle School (HERC-1) and the old Homer High School (HERC-2); at the time of the self-evaluation the status of HERC-1 was in flux and the ADA Advisory Board decided to not evaluate the building knowing that any improvements to the building would address known ADA compliance issues; HERC-2 is used by Public Works Maintenance Staff and is not open to the public.
- City Park Restrooms (e.g. Karen Hornaday Park KHP) The restroom facility at KHP has been demolished and Plans are in the design phase to construct a new restroom facility. In the interim portable toilets are in use.

- Bishop's Beach Restrooms are currently portable toilets. A Water and Sewer Special Assessment District
 Project is in process to construct and install water and sewer to the park and restroom facilities are planned
 for construction in the near term.
- ADA compliance issues pertaining to Public Works and HVFD's public areas are limited to just their entrances; the remainder of the buildings/facilities are employee access only and therefore not subject to this Transition Plan.

Staff from the City Clerk's Office and Public Works, members of the ADA Advisory Board, and interested members of the public visited City facilities and (using standardized evaluation sheets from the Northwest ADA Center) measured/evaluated parking areas, curbs and sidewalks, building entrances, counter spaces, seating, restrooms, and other public spaces for accessibility.

While conducting the facility evaluations, City staff and the ADA Advisory Board developed a list of questions related to ADA compliance requirements. Additionally, many of the harbor facilities, such as the ramps, float system, and fish cleaning stations, required specialized expertise to evaluate. To address these issues, the City established a contract with the Northwest ADA Center and David Barton to assist with answering questions and evaluating the more-specialized areas/facilities; those facilities were included in an assessment report by the Northwest ADA Center which has been incorporated into this Transition Plan.

Following all measurements/evaluations, the Board reviewed the data to determine where facilities were in compliance and where they were not. Items not in compliance were compiled into a spreadsheet as part of this Facilities Transition Plan.

TRANSITION PLAN DEVELOPMENT

The ADA Advisory Board reviewed the spreadsheet with Public Works and Port and Harbor staff to refine the list into a more efficient, applicable plan. During the process, some issues were removed for several reasons:

- Items were corrected at the time of measurement (e.g., the effort required to open a door) and will continue to be ongoing maintenance items per Public Work's policy and/or Building Maintenance job descriptions.
- Items were easily correctable, and were resolved during or shortly after the self-evaluation was conducted (e.g., materials blocking an accessible counter).
- Some items identified at the harbor by the Northwest ADA Center were incorrect and the Port and Harbor Director provided more detailed information regarding facility use that was not readily available at the time of evaluation.

These items are included in an Addendum at the end of the Facilities Transition Plan to acknowledge and document the initial findings.

PRIORITY RANKING: Once an accurate list of non-compliant items was compiled, the ADA Advisory Board ranked each item based on the following priorities for resolution as per ADA standards for accessible design:

Priority 1: Building accessibility including parking, access routes, and main building entrances

Priority 2: Equitable access to goods and services

Priority 3: Restrooms

Priority 4: All other measures to improve accessibility

COST/IMPACT RANKING: Public Works and Port and Harbor Staff were consulted to rank each compliance issue based on the level of impact to the department's budget and staff time required to complete the project. Definitions for Cost/Impact Rankings are:

- 1 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff at low cost and with a low amount of effort.
- 2 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff, the cost would be moderate and/or would require a moderate level of scheduling in association with other staff duties to complete.
- 3 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff; however, the cost for materials would be high and/or the time required to complete would be high. Use of a contractor would allow project completion sooner.
- 4C Project requires specialized tools, skills, and/or level of warranting the use of a contractor.

TIMELINE RANKING: Public Works and Port and Harbor department staff also evaluated the items based on current department workloads and schedules for when in-house and contractor-hired projects could be completed. The timelines for projects completed in-house would be as follows:

- A Project can be completed in between regularly schedule work as time allows, with completion within one year.
- B Project requires additional scheduling and budgeting and may be completed within one or two years.
- C Project requires significant scheduling and budgeting and may be completed within three to five years; could be completed sooner if done by a contractor.

If a contractor is hired to complete a project they may have a more definitive timeline because they must be budgeted in advance. For these items, the Transition Plan lists the estimated year that staff will prepare an Invitation to Bid, include it in their budget requests to City Council, and have the project completed by.

Implementation of the Transition Plan

The ADA Advisory Board will review and update the Transition Plan annually or as needed to identify work that has been completed, add barriers that may arise in the future, and identify interim steps. If the time period for achieving compliance is longer than one year, the plan will identify the interim steps that should be taken during each year of the transition period to achieve compliance with Title II of the ADA.

EVALUATION NOTES

- City Hall, Library, Airport, Public Works, Homer Volunteer Fire Department (HVFD), and City Restrooms were evaluated by ADA Compliance Committee Members, City staff, and supporting members.
- Port and Harbor facilities were inspected by David Barton, Northwest ADA Center, with support from ADA Compliance Committee Members and City staff; his final report was merged into this transition plan.
- Cost/impact rankings, in-house/contractor determinations, and timeline estimates were made by Public Works and Port and Harbor Staff.
- City Park Restrooms (e.g. Karen Hornaday Park) were not included in the plan because they were constructed prior to standard ADA regulations and were completely out of compliance.
- The Old Police Station was not included due to the approval of building a new Police Station.
- The Homer Education and Recreation Complex (HERC) buildings were not included since City Council is still determining the future use or demolition of the buildings per a recent Task Force report.
- Bishop's Beach Restrooms were determined to not have ADA issues, therefore are not included.
- Public Works and HVFD's public areas are limited to just their entrances; the remainder of the buildings/facilities are employee access only.
- Public Works Staff Comments: "If the City does the in-house items, it will take a long time to accomplish, but it could be done. Another approach is to put out a contract to tackle everything."

RANKING NOTES

1.0 Introduction

The ADA National Network estimates the overall rate of people with disabilities in the US population is around 54 million. In Alaska, the numbers reported having a disability overall were 13.2 percent. The data show that disability increases with age, for people 65 and over it was reported that 32.9 percent of Alaska residents had some form of disability. In Homer, according to the 2021 US Census ACS 5 year Survey out of 5416 residents (including children) there are 2129 adults over the age of 50 and of those residents 1123 are over the age of 65. In short, hundreds of people in our community face disabilities and many of those use Homer's parks, play areas and campgrounds on a regular basis.

Homer's mission is to be a dynamic community where all can live, play, work and invest. To make that mission a reality, it needs to be accessible. The City of Homer owns and manages 17 parks, comprised of over 520 acres of land, along with 5.41 miles of maintained trails. These range from small pocket parks and multi-use trails to forested natural areas, larger established parks with play areas, campgrounds, and sports fields. To ensure our parks, play areas and campgrounds are accessible to all, the City commenced the development of an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Parks, Play areas & Campgrounds Transition Plan in 2021. This document will be incorporated with the ADA Facilities Transition Plan adopted by City Council in 2019.

1.1 ADA Background

The ADA is a civil rights law that requires all state and local governments to provide equal access to programs and services for all community members. It was signed into law by President George H.W. Bush on July 26, 1990 and went into effect in 1992. The ADA is a landmark civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in access to jobs, public accommodations, government services and programs, public transportation, and telecommunications. The ADA treats access as a civil right.

<u>Title I</u> of the ADA prohibits private employers, state and local governments, employment agencies and labor unions from discriminating against qualified individuals with disabilities in job application procedures, hiring, firing, advancement, compensation, job training, and other terms, conditions, and privileges of employment. The City of Homer is an Equal Employment Opportunity Employer and adheres to the requirements of Title I.

Title II of the ADA adopts the general prohibitions against discrimination contained in Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, but applies to all state and local governments, regardless of whether or not they receive federal funding. It prohibits the City from denying persons with disabilities the equal opportunity to participate in its services, programs or activities, either directly or indirectly through contractual arrangements. It is the policy of the City of Homer to make every reasonable effort to provide equal access to all City facilities, services, programs, and activities for citizens with disabilities in accordance with the ADA and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973.

<u>Title III</u> applies to public accommodations, which include businesses open to the public and requires them to make reasonable modifications to accommodate individuals with disabilities.

1.2 Community Involvement

Community involvement is a priority of Homer and an essential part of the ADA requirements. The City is required to involve the public in the evaluation and prioritization process. To ensure the community had various ways to engage the public, meetings were held via electronic means as well as in person. The public was invited to attend and participate in the facilities review and site accessibility audits.

2.0 Regulatory Standards and Guidance

2.1 Audit Standards

Multiple federal guidelines were applied to the parks, play areas and campgrounds accessibility audits. The first is the Americans with Disabilities Act Accessibility Guidelines (ADAAG), also known as the 1991 standards, which addresses entries, doors, service counters, showers, curb cuts on sidewalks, pathways and trails within parks, and other typical building elements when applicable. The second is 2010 Standards for Accessible Design, effective March 15, 2012 that includes requirements for play areas, fishing areas, boating areas, and more.

The Access Board issued accessibility guidelines for newly constructed and altered recreation facilities in 2002, these supplement the ADAAG. All newly designed, constructed, and altered recreation facilities covered by ADA were required to comply.

Certain parks elements do not yet have a final standard, these include trails, picnic areas and campgrounds. On these elements, the Federal Outdoor Developed Areas Guidelines (ODAG) were used. The site accessibility reports cite both the ADAAG 2010 Standards and the Outdoor Developed Areas Guidelines.

This report identifies the barriers and performance-based solutions in the form of project recommendations. Some of these projects will require further design prior to implementation. All improvements will require maintenance to ensure continued compliance with these guidelines.

2.2 Transition Plan Requirements

The Parks, Play Areas & Campgrounds ADA Transition Plan (Parks Transition Plan) development includes the following features:

- A list of physical barriers that limit accessibility of programs or activities to individuals with disabilities, also known as a self-evaluation.
- A description of the methods that will be used to remove the barrier.
- The official responsible for implementation of the plan.
- A timeline for corrections.

The Parks Transition Plan timeline is designed to provide flexibility to the City around specific parks, play areas, and campgrounds, ensuring that continuous access and improvements are being made.

In 2019, the City Council adopted the City of Homer Facilities ADA Transition Plan (Transition Plan), which identified the ADA coordinator, evaluated communications and other city facilities, and developed a dispute process and modifications request.

This information is available on the City of Homer website or at the City Clerk's Office. The Facilities Transition Plan began the audit process with the evaluation of entrances, restrooms, sidewalks, parking areas and curb ramps at all city facilities.

The Parks Transition Plan describes those barriers to and within Homer's parks, play areas, and campgrounds, and provides recommendations to remove barriers found. This document will supplement the earlier Facilities Transition Plan to fulfill the requirements in Title II of the ADA.

The Parks Transition Plan and the previously approved Facilities Transition Plan will be integrated into a single overall Transition Plan after completion.

2.3 Program Access Recommendations

The US Department of Justice test for existing facilities is known as the program access test. A program is an opportunity made available by the individual department, in this case Parks. A program is not just an activity for which a person registers and pays a fee. It can be the program of picnicking, parking or fishing. It is a program if it is an activity made available by the Parks, Harbor or Recreation department.

The program access test does not apply to new construction or alterations and additions. New construction, alterations or additions must be designed and constructed to comply with the 2010 Standards for Accessible Design.

There are multiple ways in which a program can be made accessible. In Title II regulations, Section 35.150(b) describes the methods an entity can use to make programs accessible. They include:

- Redesign or acquisition of equipment;
- Move program to accessible buildings;
- Assignment of aides to program beneficiaries;
- Delivery of services at alternate accessible sites;
- Alteration of existing facilities and construction of new facilities;
- Use of accessible rolling stock or other conveyances; and
- Any other methods that result in making its services, programs and activities readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities.

The program access recommendations are based on a minimum of *one out of three assets should be accessible.* All unique assets should be accessible.

Some barriers, identified in the site accessibility reports will not need to be changed until a renovation or rebuild based on the technical infeasibility, historical preservation, construction tolerance or that no current guidance is available.

3.0 Methodology

The methodology of this portion of the transition plan included the following elements:

3.1 Access Audits

Members of the ADA Advisory Board, Public Works Staff, and members of the Parks, Arts, Recreation & Culture Advisory Commission (PARC), and interested community members conducted accessibility audits for six parks, including campgrounds, one separate campground and one memorial park. These audits were conducted July through September 2021 and 2022.

The site visit accessibility audits consisted of an overall site report and individual checklists that covered parking, accessible routes and means of access, play areas, shelters/picnic areas, outdoor recreation amenities such as fire rings or bar-b-que grills and park site.

- The overall site report for each park facility includes the following:
 - a description of the specific barriers at each location
 - o reference to the regulation or guideline citation
 - o digital images of the barrier
 - location within the site
 - methods to meet accessibility requirements or recommendations to address the barrier
 - o priority ranking in accordance with federal guidelines

3.2 Findings

The accessibility audits identified multiple access deficits. This represented a better than average number of access deficits, meaning City of Homer parks, play areas and campgrounds are less accessible than many larger communities, but comparable to similar communities across Alaska. Projects were prioritized using Department of Justice (DOJ) guidance which considers the following priorities.

- 1. Accessible approach and entry (parking, accessible routes)
- 2. Access to programs and services
- 3. Access to Restrooms
- 4. Access to other items (drinking fountains, trash receptacles, grills, benches, etc.)

3.3 Community Priorities

Each location was prioritized based on community usage, survey responses, public comment or participation, access to park amenities such as playground, trails, and campgrounds and was given a higher priority.

4.0 Transition Plan

The accessibility audits identified multiple access deficits across the system. To effectively and efficiently improve accessibility they were prioritized over a ten (10) year timeline to ensure program access. The prioritized list includes barriers to access all features at each location.

This prioritization of the projects within the Parks Transition Plan was accomplished through meetings and site visits open to members of the community, in collaboration with the ADA Advisory

Board members and Public Works Staff. This work sought to identify the most efficient and effective way to make the City's parks, play areas and campgrounds more accessible. The prioritization focused on all of the deficiencies that could be addressed in the recommended timeframe while working on program access.

These priorities concentrated on which parks, play areas, and campgrounds were most used by the community and visitors to improve accessibility, evaluating which deficiencies to correct first for the most benefit. Lastly, that all program types are accessible somewhere within the system.

The transition plan works toward this goal with the expectation that any new construction will be fully compliant and help the departments move over time to a completely accessible parks system within the City of Homer.

See Exhibit A for Accessibility Audits on the following:

- 1. Karen Hornaday Park including playground, campground and ballfields
- 2. Mariner Park including Day Use Area and campground
- 3. Beluga Slough Trail
- 4. Bishop's Beach Park
- 5. Bayview Park
- 6. Jack Gist Park including ballfields and access to the Disc Golf Course
- 7. Seafarer's Memorial

5.0 Cost Estimating and Financing

5.1 Cost Estimating

The timeline for this work outlined in the Parks Transition Plan is ten years which takes advantage of the biennial budgeting process the City follows. Initial work has been focused on cost estimates for the projects undertaken in the biennium budget period and a five-year proposed project list. Maintenance and smaller capital projects would occur in the annual budget established and as needed. Detailed development of budget offers would be written and submitted over the next three biennia. More detailed cost estimates for future projects would be developed for those budget offers. Any new construction undertaken is required to be fully accessible.

Upon completion of the prioritization, the City of Homer Public Works performed cost estimating with park maintenance operations, administration and planning to further understand the project groupings and how we might contract for certain work such as paving parking lots vs. a discrete set of access projects at a single park. Original cost estimates were based on past experience with similar projects and assumptions regarding future economic conditions and related to construction only (no design or project costs).

These numbers were reviewed and revised with a multiplier to bring to 2024 cost estimates. Additional work on costs will occur leading up to development. Potential cost savings may be realized from strategic scaling of contracts. Analysis of the project list identified 6 major types of work that include the following six trades or project types:

- Parking/Paving/Concrete
- Labor
- Plumbing
- Electrical
- Signage
- Potential Capital Improvement Plan Project

Further costing will evaluate opportunities to do multiple projects across the park, play area or campground system, such as all sign upgrades.

5.1.1. Cost/Impact Ranking

Public Works and Port and Harbor Staff were consulted to rank each compliance issue based on the level of impact to the department's budget and staff time required to complete the project. Definitions for Cost/Impact Rankings are:

- 1 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff at low cost and with a low amount of effort.
- 2 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff, the cost would be moderate and/or would require a moderate level of scheduling in association with other staff duties to complete.
- 3 Project can be completed by City of Homer staff; however, the cost for materials would be high and/or the time required to complete would be high. Use of a contractor would allow project completion sooner.
- 4C Project requires specialized tools, skills, and/or level of warranting the use of a contractor.

5.2 Funding

There is no dedicated source of federal funds for accessibility renovations to existing sites. The work will be done through three main funding channels as follows:

- Maintenance and repair
- Small capital projects
- Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) projects.
 - Current CIP projects will be reviewed to see if they may be amended to capture additional access improvements. An example of this might be the Bayview Park. This will increase the available number of accessible play areas.
- Available Grant funding and other sources that could help implement some of this work
 - ADA modifications are common, and grants will be competitive. Some opportunities may be available through the following:
 - Community Development Block Grant Funds: Many agencies receive federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for accessibility renovations at existing sites. CDBG funds often have a scale of priority. It is important to establish accessibility as a priority for CDBG applications.
 - State/Federal Grant Programs such as the Land & Water Conservation Fund, The Great American Outdoors Act; Community Facilities Direct Loan & Grant Program in Alaska, or Recreational Trails Program

- State Appropriations: The City has successfully competed for appropriations for larger projects and if offered by the State, would be an avenue for funding.
- Local organizations such as Rotary, Homer Foundation, Rasmussen, etc.

5.3 Timeline Ranking

Public Works and Port and Harbor department staff also evaluated the items based on current department workloads and schedules for when in-house and contractor-hired projects could be completed. The timelines for projects completed in-house would be as follows:

- A. Project can be completed in between regularly schedule work as time allows, with completion within one year.
- B. Project requires additional scheduling and budgeting and may be completed within one or two years.
- C. Project requires significant scheduling and budgeting and may be completed within three to five years; could be completed sooner if done by a contractor.

If a contractor is hired to complete a project they may have a more definitive timeline because they must be budgeted in advance. For these items, the Transition Plan lists the estimated year that staff will prepare an Invitation to Bid, include it in their budget requests to City Council, and have the project completed by.

6.0 Recommendations

In addition to the audit findings, opportunities to improve accessibility via policies and procedures were identified through the self-evaluation. The following recommendations are not an exhaustive policy review, but highlighting best practices based on discussions with staff, ADA Advisory Board members, PARC Commissioners and interested members of the community.

- 1. Implement modifications according to the approach proposed in Section 4.0 and the Parks, Play Areas and Campground Transition Plan to accommodate all users.
- 2. Develop maintenance staff training and checklists to improve accessibility during routine maintenance.
 - Items such as accessible routes, gaps, changes in level, door closing force and common obstructions can be scheduled as part of ongoing routine maintenance work.
- 3. Update website with more details regarding ADA access at each park, play area or campground. This would include parking and restroom accessibility, along with what is accessible so patrons can make informed decisions before traveling to a specific park, play area, or campground.
- 4. Ensure all contracts have language regarding ADA compliance and or modifications that a contractor will make to provide equal access to services, programs and activities.

- 5. Involvement of the ADA Coordinator in review of project design to ensure the contractor is fully aware that ADA regulations and guidelines are to be included within the project at the beginning.
- 6. Improve wayfinding signage so people with disabilities can more easily and conveniently navigate the park system and the city as a whole.
- 7. If portable toilets are provided make sure at least one is accessible.

7.0 Parks Listing

The following details the physical barriers of the City parks, play areas and campgrounds that limit the accessibility of its programs, activities or services to individuals with disabilities and the methods suggested to remove those barriers, make the area accessible and the schedule for achieving compliance.

RAISE Grant Award

The City of Homer has received a \$2 Million grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) for Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE). This highly competitive federal grant program funds transportation infrastructure projects with significant local or regional impacts. As of June 2024, the RAISE program has provided more than \$15 billion across sixteen rounds of funding to local governments, Tribes, transit and port authorities, and states. This milestone achievement is a testament to the hard work of the City of Homer team and our dedicated partners. The grant will fund planning and design for Realizing Equitable and Accessible Connectivity in Homer, a project to develop sidewalks, trails, bikeways, and mobility hubs along key streets identified in Homer's Transportation Plan, and to address challenging, hard to develop routes that stand in the way of a connected, community-wide sidewalk network. Work will include public engagement, system-wide planning, design, environmental and equity analyses to ensure an inclusive approach. This award represents a critical step toward improving access for everyone in Homer. We appreciate the U.S. Department of Transportation for recognizing this project as one that will improve safety and mobility for the traveling public, and we thank the Alaska Congressional Delegation for advocating for this, and other important Alaskan infrastructure projects.

Grant Submitted

Community Development Director Engebretsen and Special Project Coordinator submitted a \$1.5M grant application to NOAA in early January. Via Resolution 24-077 in July 2024, Council supported a partnership between the City, University of Alaska and the Kachemak Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve to submit a grant application to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration for funding to acquire and protect lands within the Bridge Creek Watershed Protection District. The grant also includes funding for a weather station, which can provide data for future landslide hazard research. Staff expects to learn the result of the application in late spring, with a potential grant agreement to Council in the summer.

Transportation Plan

Homer's new Transportation Plan has been adopted by the Kenai Peninsula Borough! This was the final step in the lengthy process to update this portion of the Comprehensive Plan. The community's work and input on this plan will serve Homer well as we embark on implementing the plan, working with the State of Alaska on the awarded HaPP loop project, and on the newly awarded federal RAISE grant. Staff from Administration, Public Works and Community Development will continue to work closely together on these transportation projects over the coming years.

Next week at the Alaska Fire Chiefs Association will be meeting with legislators in Juneau to discuss several topics of interest within the Alaska fire service. Chief Kirko provided a copy of their letter and list of critical infrastructure needs from all over the state. The list was requested last year by Senator Stevens, who was instrumental in getting Kodiak the funding for their new fire station and has shown interest in supporting other Alaska public safety (fire/EMS) agencies as well.

FY24 Audit Update

The City Finance Department continues to focus on 2024 audit work in conjunction with Porter & Allison, the accounting firm that assists us in preparing our documentation, and BDO, the City's independent auditor. A copy of the 2024 Audit Planning Document from BDO is attached to this report.





Audit Overview & Strategy



Overview

Our audit strategy follows a risk-based approach, so that our audit work, including the nature, timing and extent of audit procedures planned, is focused on the areas of the financial statements where the risk of material misstatement is assessed to be significant as well as other areas of the financial statements where we have identified risks of material misstatement.

In preparation for our audit, we have discussed with City Council, management and internal audit significant matters including, but not limited to, market conditions, activities, and changes to the Company's business, systems, accounting principles and controls, and obtained management's view of potential audit risk in order to update our understanding of the Company. This is important to our identification and assessment of risks of material misstatement to the financial statements and related disclosures.

Key components of our audit objectives and strategy are highlighted within the executive summary section and explained in more detail in the following sections. The executive summary section is designed to facilitate discussion with the audit team, while the rest of the package serves as pre-read material for City Council.

We will continue to update the resulting assessment throughout the audit. We will communicate to you any significant changes to the planned audit strategy or the significant risks initially identified and communicated herein, and the reason for such changes, as applicable, when we present the results of our audit upon completion.

- ▶ We will plan and perform the audit of the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2024, in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- ▶ We will perform tests of compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions is not an objective of our audit.

Determining Our Planned Audit Strategy

We focus on areas with higher risk of material misstatement to the financial statements, whether due to error or fraud. Our audit strategy includes consideration of the following:

- ▶ Prior year audit results including discussions with management and those Charged with Governance regarding the City's operations, business activities, and risks.
- ▶ Inherent risk within the City (i.e., the susceptibility of the financial statements to material error or fraud) without regard to the effect of controls.
- ▶ A continual assessment of materiality thresholds based upon qualitative and quantitative factors affecting the City.
- ▶ Recent developments within the industry, regulatory environment, and general economic conditions.
- ▶ Recently issued and effective accounting and financial reporting guidance.
- ► The City's significant and critical accounting policies and procedures, including those requiring significant management judgments and estimates and those related to significant unusual transactions.
- ► The control environment, risk management and monitoring activities, and the possibility that internal controls may fail to prevent or detect a material misstatement due to error or fraud.
- ▶ The use of information systems and service organizations in the financial reporting process and overall IT environment.
- Extent to which we plan to use others, outside the core engagement team, to perform certain planned audit procedures or evaluate audit results related to significant risks that may require specialized skills or knowledge.

We will communicate to you any significant changes to the planned audit strategy, or to the significant risks initially identified, that may occur during the audit due to the results of audit procedures or in response to external factors, such as changes in the economic environment.

Areas of Significant Risk

Our areas of significant risk, which are risks with both a higher likelihood of occurrence and a higher magnitude of effect that require special audit considerations, are as follows. Our planned audit procedures for these risks are detailed starting on page 12.

Grant Revenue Recognition

SUMMARY OF AREA OF SIGNIFICANT RISK

BDO has identified a significant risk related to recognizing grant revenue in accordance with approved agreements and applicable provisions. There is a risk that revenue recognized does not correlate with incurred expenses or according to stipulations in the applicable agreements. After considering all the inherent risk factors, the engagement team assessed the likelihood of a misstatement and magnitude of the potential misstatement and concluded on the level of assessed risk as significant.

SUMMARY OF PLANNED AUDIT PROCEDURES

In order to address this significant risk, we plan to perform the following procedures:

- We will refine our understanding of the grant revenue recognition process through a walkthrough of the revenue business process and evaluate the design of controls in this area.
- Our substantive procedures will include evaluating underlying grants based on inspection,, and inquiries directly with personnel at the City. We will select grants for detailed testwork of the underlying costs, revenue recognition, and cash receipts associated with the project.

Management Override of Controls

SUMMARY OF AREA OF SIGNIFICANT RISK

Management override of controls is presumed to be a significant risk by default for all entities. The presumptive risk is that management could use their position to circumvent controls in order to misstate or misappropriate assets. In addition, management could be in a unique position to perpetrate fraud because of their ability to manipulate accounting records and prepare fraudulent financial statements by overriding controls that otherwise appear to be operating effectively.

After considering all the inherent risk factors, the engagement team assessed the likelihood of a misstatement and magnitude of the potential misstatement and concluded on the level of assessed risk as Significant.

SUMMARY OF PLANNED AUDIT PROCEDURES

In order to address this significant risk, we plan to perform the following procedures:

- We will update our understanding of the FRCP business process, perform a walkthrough of the FRCP business process and evaluate the design of controls in this area.
- Our substantive procedures will include evaluating journal entries to test the reasonableness of entries made, as well as their applicable authorization.
- Inquiries will be made throughout the organization to determine if there is know or potential fraud issues.

Obtaining Information from Those Charged with Governance



We perform inquiries related to fraud and other matters to help inform our audit strategy and execution of our audit procedures. As part of the upcoming meeting with you, we would like to discuss the following topics with you to understand any matters of which you believe we should be aware, including, but not limited to:

- ▶ Your views about the risk of material misstatements due to fraud, including the risk of management override of controls
- ▶ How you exercise oversight over the Company's assessment of fraud risks and the establishment of controls to address these risks
- ▶ Your awareness of any actual, alleged or suspected fraud or illegal acts affecting the Company
- ▶ Your awareness of tips or complaints regarding the Company's financial reporting and your response to such tips and complaints
- ▶ Your awareness of other matters relevant to the audit including, but not limited to, violations or possible violations of laws or regulations
- ▶ Your awareness of noncompliance with laws and regulations to include consideration of noncompliance with provisions of contracts and grant agreements.
- ▶ Your awareness of any investigations or legal proceedings that have been initiated or are in process with respect to the period under audit.
- ▶ Your awareness of any significant communications between the Company and regulators
- ▶ Your understanding of the Company's relationships and transactions with related parties that are significant to the Company
- ▶ Any business relationships between a BDO firm and the Company or its affiliates
- ▶ Whether the Company has entered into any significant unusual transactions
- > Your awareness of any other information that is important to the identification and assessment of risks of material misstatement

Other Topics



BDO's System of Quality Management

An effective quality management system in an audit firm is crucial for supporting the consistent performance of high-quality audits and reviews of financial statements, or other assurance or related services engagements under professional standards, and applicable legal and regulatory requirements.

BDO has either implemented or is designing remedial actions to address those deficiencies prior to our next evaluation.

GASB Statement No. 99, Omnibus 2022

Effective Dates

Effective as Noted Below

- ▶ This Statement address practice issues identified during implementation and application of certain GASB Statements and accounting and financial reporting for financial guarantees.
- ► Effective Upon Statement Issuance April 2022:
 - Extension of the period during which LIBOR is considered an appropriate benchmark interest rate for the qualitative evaluation of the effectiveness of an interest rate swap that hedges the interest rate risk of taxable debt
 - Accounting of benefits distributed as part of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - Disclosures related to nonmonetary transactions
 - Pledges of future revenues when resources are not received by the pledging government
 - o Clarification of provisions of Statement No. 34 related to the focus of the government-wide financial statements
 - Updates to terminology used in Statement No. 53 to refer to resource flow statements and to certain provisions in Statement No. 63
- ▶ Effective for Fiscal Years Beginning After June 15, 2022:
 - Determination of lease term and classification of leases as short-term in accordance with Statement No. 87
 - Clarification related to the determination of Public-Private Partnerships (PPP) term and recognition and measurement of installment payments and the transfer of PPP assets under Statement No. 94
 - Clarification of the provisions of Statement No. 96 related to Subscription Based Information Technology Arrangements (SBITA) term, classification of short-term SBITA, and recognition and measurement of a subscription liability
- ▶ Effective for Fiscal Years Beginning After June 15, 2023:
 - A government extending an exchange or exchange-like financial guarantee should recognize a liability and expense/expenditure related to the guarantee when qualitative factors and historical data indicate that it is more likely than not a government will be required to make a payment related to the guarantee. Statement No. 99 excludes guarantees related to special assessment debt, financial guarantee contracts within the scope of Statement No. 53, or guarantees related to conduit debt obligations.
 - Requirements related to the classification and reporting of derivative instruments within the scope of Statement No. 53 that do not meet the definition of an investment or hedging derivative instrument

GASB Statement No. 100, Accounting Changes and Error Corrections - an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62

Date per Pronouncement

Effective Dates

Fiscal Years Beginning After 6/15/2023

- ▶ This Statement defines accounting changes as changes in accounting principles, changes in accounting estimates, and changes to or within the financial reporting entity and describes the transactions or other events that constitute those changes.
- As part of those descriptions, for (1) certain changes in accounting principles and (2) certain changes in accounting estimates that result from a change in measurement methodology, a new principle or methodology should be justified on the basis that it is preferable to the principle or methodology used before the change. That preferability should be based on the qualitative characteristics of financial reporting—understandability, reliability, relevance, timeliness, consistency, and comparability.
- ▶ This Statement also addresses corrections of errors in previously issued financial statements.
- ▶ This Statement requires that:
 - o changes in accounting principles and error corrections be reported retroactively by restating prior periods,
 - o changes to or within the financial reporting entity be reported by adjusting beginning balances of the current period, and
 - o changes in accounting estimates be reported prospectively by recognizing the change in the current period.
- ▶ The requirements of this Statement for changes in accounting principles apply to the implementation of a new pronouncement in absence of specific transition provisions in the new pronouncement.
- ▶ Statement No. 100 requires that the aggregate amount of adjustments to and restatements of beginning net position, fund balance, or fund net position, as applicable, be displayed by reporting unit in the financial statements.
- ▶ This Statement requires disclosure in notes to financial statements of descriptive information about accounting changes and error corrections, such as their nature. In addition, information about the quantitative effects on beginning balances of each accounting change and error correction should be disclosed by reporting unit in a tabular format to reconcile beginning balances as previously reported to beginning balances as restated.
- ▶ Statement No. 100 also addresses how information that is affected by a change in accounting principle or error correction should be presented in required supplementary information (RSI) and supplementary information (SI). For periods that are earlier than those included in the basic financial statements, information presented in RSI or SI should be restated for error corrections, if practicable, but not for changes in accounting principles.

GASB Statement No. 101, Compensated Absences

Effective Dates
Fiscal Years Beginning After 12/15/2023

- ▶ This Statement requires that liabilities for compensated absences be recognized for leave that as not been used and leave that has been used but not yet paid in cash or settled through noncash means.
- ▶ Requires recognition of a liability for leave that has not been used if:
 - the leave is attributable to services already rendered,
 - the leave accumulates, and
 - o the leave is more likely than not to be used for time off or otherwise paid in cash or settled through noncash means.
- ▶ Leave that is more likely than not to be settled through conversion to defined benefit postemployment benefits should not be included in a liability for compensated absences.
- ▶ Statement No. 101 requires that a liability for certain types of compensated absences, including parental leave, military leave, and jury duty leave, not be recognized until the leave commences.
- ▶ In addition, this Statement requires that for specific types of compensated absences, a liability not be recognized until the leave is used.
- ▶ This Statement also establishes guidance for measuring a liability for leave that has not been used, generally using an employee's pay rate as of the date of the financial statements. A liability for leave that has been used but not yet paid or settled should be measured at the amount of the cash payment or noncash settlement to be made. Certain salary-related payments that are directly and incrementally associated with payments for leave also should be included in the measurement of the liabilities.
- ▶ With respect to financial statements prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus, Statement No. 101 requires that expenditures be recognized for the amount that normally would be liquidated with expendable available financial resources.
- ▶ Statement No. 101 amends the existing requirement to disclose the gross increases and decreases in a liability for compensated absences to allow governments to disclose only the net change in the liability (as long as they identify it as a net change). In addition, governments are no longer required to disclose which governmental funds typically have been used to liquidate the liability for compensated absences.

GASB Statement No. 102, Certain Risk Disclosures

Effective Dates
Fiscal Years Beginning After 6/15/2024

- ▶ The objective of this Statement is to provide users of government financial statements with essential information about risks related to a government's vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations or constraints.
- ▶ Statement No. 102 defines a concentration as a lack of diversity related to an aspect of a significant inflow of resources or outflow of resources.
- ▶ Statement No. 102 defines a *constraint* as a limitation imposed on a government by an external party or by formal action of the government's highest level of decision-making authority.
- ▶ Requires a government to assess:
 - whether a concentration or constraint is known to the government prior to the issuance of the financial statements,
 - whether a concentration or constraint makes the primary government reporting unit or other reporting units that report a liability for revenue debt vulnerable to the risk of a substantial impact and
 - whether event or events associated with a concentration or constraint that could cause the substantial impact have occurred, have begun to occur, or are more likely than not to begin to occur within 12 months of the date the financial statements are issued.
- ▶ For items meeting the above criteria, required disclosures include descriptions of:
 - the concentration or constraint,
 - each event associated with the concentration or constraint that could cause a substantial impact if the event had occurred or had begun to occur prior to the issuance of the financial statements, and
 - o Actions taken by the government prior to the issuance of the financial statements to mitigate the risk.



City Property on Main Street

I've received an inquiry about the City's interest in selling the property the City owns at 3713 Main Street. To share a little history, this property was designated as land for sale in the Land Allocation Plan and listed for sale with our contracted realtor in 2016. Due to lack of interest it was taken off the market in 2018, In 2019 a local business owner made an attempt at purchasing the property and Ordinances 19-25 and 19-59 to move forward with the land sale failed. When Council adopted the 2020 Land Allocation Plan, this property was re-designated from land for sale to City Facility and other lands. There has been some conversation about uses for this lot, including a parking area but no definitive use has been determined. Homer City Code 18.12 provides direction for the disposal of real property and if Council has interest in selling this property, a proposal can be initiated by ordinance.



Continued Efforts on Homer Spit protection

City Staff met with AKDOT Deputy Commissioner Keith and had a productive hour of conversation. We are particularly encouraged to learn that PROTECT formula funds are included in the upcoming STIP amendment, and we look forward to working with the State through the planning process to maximize benefits for protecting the Spit Road, vulnerable areas of road right-of-way and the long-term future of the Homer Spit. As a result of this meeting Resolution 25-012 was drafted to formalize the City's support for the State's application for to the PROTECT Grant Program Planning Grant for the Homer Spit Transportation Resiliency Project. In addition to this meeting Special Projects and Communications Coordinator Jenny Carroll has been reaching out for letters of support from our State delegation and other partners for this grant application and for a Congressional Directed Spending (CDS) request for the Homer Spit Revetment General Investigation, a project currently listed in the Alaska District's Work Plan.

Joint Worksession with Kachemak City Council

At our January 13th Homer City Council meeting Council suggested holding a joint worksession with the Kachemak City Council, and I reached out to Mayor Fry and their City Clerk with an invitation. The Kachemak City Clerk let me know they'll confirm after their February 12th Council meeting.


