CITY OF HOMER 1 2 **HOMER, ALASKA** 3 Mayor/City Council **RESOLUTION 20-127** 4 5 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, 6 7 STRONGLY OPPOSING ALTERNATIVE 4 IN THE PUBLIC REVIEW DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT/REGULATORY IMPACT 8 REVIEW FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENT XX TO THE FISHERY 9 MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR THE SALMON FISHERIES IN THE EEZ OFF 10 ALASKA THAT WOULD CLOSE ALL FEDERAL WATERS IN COOK 11 INLET TO COMMERCIAL SALMON FISHING AND FINDING THAT 12 IMPLEMENTATION OF ALTERNATIVE 4 WOULD HAVE A 13 SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT ON THE ECONOMY OF HOMER 14 15 WHEREAS, The North Pacific Fishery Management Council developed the *Fishery* 16 Management Plan for Salmon Fisheries in the EEZ off Alaska, (FMP) that manages salmon 17 fisheries in the United State Exclusive Economic Zone (EEZ; 3 nautical miles to 200 nautical 18 19 miles off shore of Alaska); and 20 WHEREAS, Pursuant to a United States Court of Appeals Ninth Circuit ruling, after 21 successful litigation brought by Cook Inlet commercial fishermen and seafood processors, the 22 23 North Pacific Fishery Management Council must amend the FMP to bring it in line with the Ninth Circuit Court's decision; and 24 25 WHEREAS, Through its Public Review Draft Environmental Assessment/Regulatory 26 Impact Review for Proposed Amendment XX to the Fishery Management Plan for the Salmon 27 Fisheries in the EEZ off Alaska the North Pacific Fishery Management Council is considering 28 four alternative amendments to the FMP: 29 30 31 Alternative 1 is status quo or no action, deferring management to the State of Alaska by excluding the traditional net fishing area in the Cook Inlet EEZ from the FMP (the Ninth 32 Circuit Court ruling makes this alternative "untenable" according to the authors' of the 33 34 Public Review Draft EA/RIR for Proposed Alternative XX to the Fishery Management Plan 35 for the Salmon Fisheries in the EEZ Off Alaska); 36 Alternative 2 would establish federal management of the commercial salmon fishery in 37 38 Cook Inlet with management of the commercial fishery delegated to the State of Alaska

in accordance with the Magnuson Stevens Act and other applicable federal law;

39 40  Alternative 3 would establish Federal management of the commercial salmon fishery in Cook Inlet with the North Pacific Fishery Management Council and national Marine Fisheries Service without delegation of management to the State of Alaska; and

Alternative 4 would establish Federal management of the commercial salmon fishery in the Cook Inlet EEZ with the EEZ closed to commercial fishing; and

WHEREAS, The waters of the Cook Inlet commercial salmon drift gillnet fishery included by the EEZ are the closest fishing grounds to Homer and have been part of traditional fishing grounds since statehood; and

WHEREAS, In 2014 the Homer City Council voiced opposition to restrictions on the Cook Inlet Fishing District 1 (Resolution 14-019(A)), which is roughly equivalent to the area of the EEZ, citing widespread and deleterious effects to local and regional economies; and

WHEREAS, The Homer City Council has consistently advocated for science-based fisheries management decisions that are equitable across fishery users and sustainable for continued human benefit into the future; and

WHEREAS, Alternative 4 was proposed by the State of Alaska Department of Fish and Game Deputy Commissioner at the North Pacific Fishery Management Council's October 12, 2020 meeting after closure of public comment; and

WHEREAS, Alternative 4 is not a science-based alternative to fishery management, does not result in equitable or sustainable distribution of the salmon harvest resource, was introduced after public comment which is counter to the intent of the National Environmental Policy Act, and does not adequately address the Ninth Circuit court ruling; and

WHEREAS, If Alternative 4 were adopted by the North Pacific Fishery Management Council, it would close the area of fishing where most of the Cook Inlet salmon drift gillnet fishery harvest occurs, effectively eliminating the economic viability of the fishery and viability of local seafood processors; and

WHEREAS, The loss of the salmon drift gillnet fishery in Cook Inlet would cause severe job loss, loss of capital investment in the fishery and support businesses, and could impact other fisheries if local processing capacity is lost or reduced; and

WHEREAS, A 2015 report published by the McDowell group titled "The Economic Impact of the Seafood Industry in Southcentral Alaska" reported that the seafood industry in the reporting region directly employs over 10,000 people seasonally and had an economic output of \$1.2 billion; and

WHEREAS, The Homer City Council recognizes that the salmon drift gillnet fleet, like other fisheries users, is a critical component of Homer, positively contributing to the City's local history, culture, and economy; and

WHEREAS, Section 4.55 of the EA/RIR presents information about fishing communities associated with the Upper Cook Inlet salmon drift gillnet fishery and includes some of the following information regarding the City of Homer:

Homer has the highest vessel participation of any community with participants in the fishery with an annual average number 2009-2018 of 104.9, average percent of 24.38 of total participants, and 197 unique vessels (Table 4-13);

Homer-based vessels receive the highest gross revenue from the fishery of communities with participants in the fishery with an annual average revenue 2009-2018 of \$5,505,099 and 28.6 percent of total revenue (Table 4-14);

Homer has the highest permit participation in the fishery of communities participating in the fishery with an annual average number 2009-2018 of 107.1, average percent of 23.55 of total permit holders, and 216 unique permits; and

WHEREAS, The closure of the fishery as proposed under Alternative 4 would have a significant adverse impact on the economy of Homer through the loss of the livelihoods of Homer based fishermen who participate in the Cook Inlet salmon drift gillnet fishery, marine trades and other businesses based in Homer, and the City of Homer primarily through the loss of harbor fees, ice and crane sales, fish landing tax revenues, and sales tax revenues; and

WHEREAS, The timeline allowing for public comment on Alternative 4 has been inadequate generally, but particularly because the proposed closure of the fishery under Alternative 4 would disproportionately affect the economic health of the Homer community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska, hereby opposes the North Pacific Fishery Management Council adopting Alternative 4, proposed to the North Pacific Fishery Management Council that would close all federal waters in Cook Inlet to commercial salmon fishing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of Homer, Alaska, has determined that implementation of Alternative 4 would have a significant adverse impact on the economy of Homer.

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1 **CITY OF HOMER** 2 HOMER, ALASKA 3 Lewis **RESOLUTION 14-019(A)** 4 5 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF HOMER, ALASKA, 6 STRONGLY OPPOSING ALASKA 7 BOARD OF FISHERIES PROPOSALS 138, 139, 140, 142, AND 143 THAT CLOSE OR 8 RESTRICT WATERS OF COOK INLET NEAR HOMER TO 9 10 COMMERCIAL DRIFT FISHING. 11 WHEREAS, The waters of the Cook Inlet Commercial Drift Fishing District Area 1 are the 12 closest drift fishing grounds to Homer encompassing approximately 600 square miles of Cook 13 Inlet from Anchor Point north to Kalgin Island; and 14 15 16 WHEREAS, The waters of Area 1 have been part of the traditional fishing grounds of the Cook Inlet Commercial Drift Fishery since statehood; and 17 18 WHEREAS, Area 1 is integral to the Homer fishing economy; and 19 20 21 WHEREAS, Alaska Board of Fisheries Proposals 138, 139, 140, 142, and 143 close or 22 restrict commercial drift fishing in Area 1; and 23 WHEREAS, Closing Area 1 to commercial drift fishing will result a tripling of travel time 24 for Homer based vessels to reach fishing grounds; and 25 26 WHEREAS, Increased travel costs will force the over 100 vessels that represent the 27 Homer based drift commercial fishing fleet to relocate to communities closer to open fishing 28 29 grounds; and 30 WHEREAS, Businesses in Homer would lose the economic activity associated with 31 provisioning the fleet in Homer including food, fuel, supplies, gear, and professional marine 32 trades services; and 33 34 WHEREAS, Local jobs in seafood processing, marine trades, and trucking will be 35 negatively impacted if fish is delivered to another port; and 36 37

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WHEREAS, The Homer Port and Harbor identified 170 accounts comprised of fishing vessels, tenders, and seafood processors participating in the Upper Cook Inlet drift fishery in 2013; and WHEREAS, Problems with Susitna salmon production have been identified and are the result of freshwater habitat issues; and WHEREAS, Intensive management of saltwater fisheries will never solve the problems found in the freshwater habitats of spawning and rearing salmon; and WHEREAS, The Board of Fisheries should eliminate restrictions on Central District drift gillnetting during the July 9 through July 31 time period because it is now known that these restrictions are not an effective method of improving Susitna sockeye production; and WHEREAS, Although it is impossible to discern the revenue generated from the commercial drift fishery exclusively because many vessels participate in multiple fisheries, the Homer Port and Harbor enterprise fund received combined revenues of \$849,742 in 2013 from these fishing vessels, tenders, and processors; and WHEREAS, Adopting the proposed changes to Area 1 of the Cook Inlet Commercial Drift Fishing District will have a negative economic impact to Homer's Port and Harbor Enterprise in fish processing tax, wharfage, Fish Dock ice sales and crane usage, moorage and uplands leases, and gear storage; and WHEREAS, Proposals to close or restrict commercial drift fishing in Area 1 disproportionally affects the economic health of one community. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Homer City Council strongly opposes Alaska Board of Fisheries Proposals 138, 139, 140, 142, and 143 that restrict or close commercial drift fishing in Area 1.
