REPORTS & BUSINESS

PICKLEBALL COMMITTEE presentation by Emmett Walker and Tim Dewald

- Updates on the committee's search for a permanent location for a pickleball facility.
- Proposed location is at Theater Sports Park, east of the softball fields.
- Facility would include eight regulation size courts and two USA PB Wheelchair SPEC Court ADA Access
- Location contains existing restroom facilities that would be close proximity to the courts.
- Motion made by Carlisle Harrison to accept the Pickleball Committee's proposed location of Theater Sports Park for their facility. Seconded by Nicole Westing. Motion carried unanimously.
- The Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee's recommendation to accept Theater Sports Park as the location for proposed pickleball facility will be presented to City Council before moving forward.

COMMUNITY CENTER ENTRY

• Parks and Rec/Community Center access from Hwy. 395 and 2nd Street is under construction. Parking lot access will be from 3rd Street with two-way Entry/Exit traffic on the north side of the building and one-way exit only on the South side of building. Project is expected to be completed in 90 days.

A Game for Connection and Fitness



WHO?


Open to all.























Funland Tactile Map
