Thank you for the opportunity to work with the ESB. We are excited by the work the ESB is doing in and for your community and are sure the region and state will feel the impacts of your work.

This memo includes a brief summary of the June $14^{\rm th}$ follow-up session, including an updated list of commitments and detail on the prioritization exercise the ESB completed. Additionally, we have outlined some potential next steps for ESB to consider.

June 14th Summary

Enclosed is an updated Vision Themes document for the ESB to consider. Though these may not be finalized, we hope that these capture the future you aspire to create for Hendersonville and the impacts you hope to have.

Next Steps

As you consider next steps for the ESB, we recommend confirming with the group which commitments you will collectively work towards, and then begin forming action plans for those commitments.

Though it may sound complicated, action plans are just a way to say who is responsible for what, by when. The ESB should discuss what specific factors should be included in its action plan. At a minimum, we suggest including individuals responsible, action steps, and an overall timeline. For reference, Fountainworks frequently uses "game plans" which lay out additional key factors to consider such as:

- What are our overall goals?
- Who is involved?
- What resources are needed?
- What are our near- mid- and long-term steps?
- Are there any challenges we should anticipate?

The ESB may also consider establishing/formalizing some of its meeting norms. Though the group is largely cohesive, setting clear expectations for communication among the group can help make meetings as efficient and effective as possible.

Subpod Proposal

Project: Install Subpod composting unit in raised bed at City Operations Center near existing bike rack

Goal: to raise awareness of composting methods and encourage sustainable practices by city employees and the public

Project Benefits

- Community and staff education on composting practices
- More sustainable waste management in city building
- Beautification of city building with garden bed
- Use of compost material in garden

Cost: Maximum \$500.

Why Subpod? In addition to its low cost and high usability, the Subpod unit is an attractive alternative to an open structure or other compost bin, further encouraging the community to utilize it. Additionally, the Subpod requires less maintenance than many other compost methods, meaning it can be more easily undertaken by the staff.

Subpod Features

- Smell-free and pest-proof
- Composts up to 34 lbs of food waste a week
- Suitable for households of 1-6 people
- Dual compost chambers
- Low maintenance (about 5 minutes a week)
- Food-grade stainless steel aerator included
- 2 worm blankets included

The holes around the Subpod's base allow for compost worms to travel into the surrounding garden soil, spreading nutrients and promoting plant growth.



The included aerator allows the user to keep the system perfectly maintained by adding air to the soil. Air is needed in soil and compost to keep good bacteria alive.


Dimensions: Length 29.5in x Width 17.7in x Height 16.9in

Cost: The produce is 20 percent off until August 21st - \$212. (reg \$265.)

Location


Proposal to keep the Subpod unit in a raised garden bed outside of the City Operations Center. The compost material can then be used in the garden bed, further educating the community and staff about the benefits of composting.

Additional Material Needed

Garden Soil - ten 2 cubic feet bags - \$100.

Total Proposal Costs (before taxes)

Subpod \$212. Raised Bed \$130. Soil \$100.

Total \$442.

Overview: Buncombe County Employee Composting Program

Process for Implementation (Piloted first in one building):

- Identified a hauler to service the compost cart on a weekly basis to be processed
 - o Hauler processes compost material and sells it
 - County is currently assessing feasibility for in-house processing and permitting
- County worked with janitorial staff (with some contract amendments) to incorporate compost bin servicing within the building into their daily duties
- Educated the county staff
 - Lunch & Learns
 - Signage
 - Handouts
 - o Emails
- Compost bins available at every desk, break room, and bathroom in place of trashcans

Educational Content

Email Language

"The deskside composting program has now been implemented in the 200 College building. By today, all deskside trash cans in individual offices and workspaces will have been converted to compost collection cans, denoting the contents with a "COMPOST" sticker. Please dispose of all organics (acceptable items can be found here) in these deskside bins and dispose of any trash in the communal trash cans which have not been changed or moved. As a reminder, if there is trash in your deskside compost bin, it will not be emptied by janitorial staff moving forward. If you have any questions, please contact recycling@buncombecounty.org. Thanks again for your participation in this program and for working together to reduce our greenhouse gas impact in the Buncombe community."

City Operations Center

1 kitchen breakroom with multiple restrooms and individual trash and recycling bins.





Kitchen breakroom (banana peal, to-go container, kcups, beverage containers, and napkins)



Restroom trash bin – usually chockfull of paper towels. This could easily be addressed by adding hand dryers in all the restrooms in City Ops. and City Hall



Trashbin in City Ops. PW suite – beverage container, facemask, and paper

Other comments from staff:

- ESB can work with promoting composting to businesses such as a hospital or even school. The City wouldn't necessarily benefit if the business isn't paying for the City's trash pick up service
- A few staff members said they don't produce a lot of food waste. Mostly a banana peel, pomegranate seeds but would likely take a while before there was enough food waste to contribute to a composter.
- During City events there can be a lot of food but that is always catered/prepared ahead of time. Afterwards, extra food goes in the breakroom for people to take home.
- If we do an employee compost program, City Hall would likely make more sense since there are more employees in that building but you would likely have the same thing where people aren't producing a lot of food waste.

Neighboring programs to consider:

- Buncombe County employee compost program
- Asheville food waste drop off program
- Likely a survey component should be considered before implementation
