Requirements

- Establish a standing Bee City USA committee to advocate for pollinators. Can be existing board
- Create and enhance pollinator habitat on public and private land by increasing the abundance of native plants and providing nest sites. Native Plant List and Plant Supplier List. Both lists are on Bee City page on City's website. Cannot be worded as a promotion.

 Tree Board currently involved but work could have greater impact with more efforts. ESB could have an initiative tied to increased habitat on private land. *next page
- Reduce the use of pesticides. Tree Board handles.
- Incorporate pollinator-conscious practices into city policies and plans. Tree Board working on.
- Host pollinator awareness events. Can be Hendo Earth Fest and Garden Jubilee.
- Publicly acknowledge Bee City USA affiliation with signs and an online presence. Caitlyn takes care of.
- Pay an initial application fee and annual renewal fee. Caitlyn takes care of.
- Annually apply for renewal and report on the previous year's activities. Caitlyn takes care of.

Pollinator Gardens on Private Property Initiative



Benefits:

- Solves issue of who maintains the owner would maintain and would likely have better success since pollinator habitat would be on their own personal property
- Quantifiable impact and a way for ESB to interact with City residents and businesses in an easy way while contributing to Bee City program.

How this would work:

- 1. ESB designates one or two pollinator garden application deadline(s).
- 2. ESB & Caitlyn put together online form residents/business owners fill out showing why they would benefit from a pollinator garden, commitment to maintain garden, maximum planting area, etc
- 3. ESB votes on award recipients
- 4. ESB consults with winner on what plants would be viable for garden location & put together purchasing list (with plants coming from Bee City Native Plant List). We could have a template email that is sent out for the owner to fill out.
- 5. ESB meeting with owner to help plant mini garden and provides a brochure on who ESB is and tips for maintaining their garden
- 6. If desired, ESB could keep a list of award recipients and ESB can reach out 1/year on how the progress is going but this wouldn't be a requirement.



Mayors' Monarch Pledge Hendersonville's Update & Action Items for 2023

COMMUNICATIONS AND CONVENING

✓ Issue a Proclamation.

The city proclamation was made by Mayor Volk in April.

In process. Engage with gardening leaders and partners.

The city is currently helping to revitalize 7th Ave. Community Garden with Caregivers of Mother Earth, The Community Foundation, Bee City USA and Tree City.

SYSTEMS CHANGE

In process. Integrate monarch butterfly conservation into the city's Sustainability Plan.

PROGRAM AND DEMONSTRATION GARDENS

✓ Plant a monarch and pollinator-friendly demonstration garden at a location.
 A monarch and pollinator-friendly garden was planted on Four Seasons
 Hwy. (at Aldi access lane) by Tree City board members.

In process. Facilitate or support milkweed seed collection and propagation effort.

The city is currently working with Blue Ridge Community College on a "plant partnership" to raise milkweed plants, with a portion to be for the city's use.



2023 REMAINING ACTION ITEM

Display educational signage at monarch gardens and pollinator habitat –
 7th Ave. Community Garden

2024 ACTION ITEM(S) FOR CONSIDERATION

- Launch an invasive species removal program –
 7th Ave. Community Garden
- Remove milkweed from the list of noxious plants in city weed / landscaping ordinances
- Change weed or mowing ordinances to allow for native prairie and plant habitats and
 - increase the percentage of native plants, shrubs and trees that must be used in city landscaping ordinances and encourage use of milkweed, where appropriate.
- Direct city property managers to consider the use of native milkweed and nectar plants at city properties where possible.

Subpod Proposal

Install unit in raised bed at City Operations Center near main public entrance Goal: to raise awareness of composting methods and increase use by city employees and the public

Why Subpod? This unit is more appealing than an open structure or other bin which may require more maintenance.

Composting can't get any easier with the Subpod, this one of a kind in-ground compost bin! Ditch the bulky bins, large piles, and pesky tumblers for good. The Subpod makes it easy and convenient to break down your organic waste and food scraps and turn them into nutrient-rich composting soil that helps plants thrive.

Worms and microbes work together inside the bin to compost your food waste lightening fast and 100% odorless!

Smell-free and pest-proof

- Composts up to 34lbs of food waste a week
- Suitable for households of 1-6 people
- Dual compost chambers
- Low maintenance (about 5 minutes a week)
- Food-grade stainless steel aerator included
- 2 worm blankets included

The holes around the Subpod's base allow for compost worms to travel into the surrounding garden soil, spreading nutrients and promoting plant growth.

One Subpod can compost the food waste from a family of 4 every week!

Typical compost bins and piles are bulky, difficult to use, smelly, and tough to keep pests out of. Make the switch to a Subpod for fast and easy compost!

*worms are not included in this bundle.

Please note: Your aerator will ship separately in August. An Aerator is not required for the first month while worms settle in and your waste is low. In the meantime, a small garden hand spade, trowel, or gloves will be able to effectively turn the compost. Here is a handy video to assist you in the meantime: https://youtu.be/KDYH41YOeck

The Essentials Bundle includes: 1 Subpod & 1 Aerator



The included aerator keeps your system perfectly maintained by adding air to the soil. Air is needed in soil and compost to keep good bacteria alive.

Size: Length 29.5in x Width 17.7in x Height 16.9in

How Subpod works:

Subpod works like a small factory. Your compost worms (not included with purchase) and neighboring microbes take food scraps and carbon items (like paper, leaves and other browns) and turn it into nutrient-rich composting soil that can be used to naturally fertilize your garden, houseplants, or yard!

The Subpod is an underground system, which makes it completely unique compared to others! By being underground, it creates a natural environment for the composting worms and other insects and microbes. Having access to the soil around them means they can feed and breed as rapidly as they'd like. Soil is an insulator, and in hot weather, compost worms will instinctively escape into soil to cool down. During winter, the pod will keep your worms warm and active (as long as the soil doesn't freeze). Every time your worms leave the Subpod, their movement naturally aerates your garden soil and increases its nutrient content.

Fifteen people representing city departments, county parks and recreation and community members attended along with three Design Workshop employees who are leading the plan development.

The city is leaning toward plans for passive use vs. organized sports which will be provided by the county. Goals related to ESB interests include protecting the tree canopy and environmental stewardship of the park space. I mentioned native plantings and inventory as well as invasive species management. Concern from staff continues related to ongoing care of any pollinator gardens.

The next meeting of the group will be in September. Design Workshop intends to gather community input via survey and public input sessions at various events, Council Conversations, etc. The full process to develop the will take approximately one year.

Next Steps

As you consider next steps for the ESB, we recommend confirming with the group which commitments you will collectively work towards, and then begin forming action plans for those commitments.

Though it may sound complicated, action plans are just a way to say who is responsible for what, by when. The ESB should discuss what specific factors should be included in its action plan. At a minimum, we suggest including individuals responsible, action steps, and an overall timeline. For reference, Fountainworks frequently uses "game plans" which lay out additional key factors to consider such as:

- What are our overall goals?
- Who is involved?
- What resources are needed?
- What are our near- mid- and long-term steps?
- Are there any challenges we should anticipate?

The ESB may also consider establishing/formalizing some of its meeting norms. Though the group is largely cohesive, setting clear expectations for communication among the group can help make meetings as efficient and effective as possible.
