Hendersonville's Bee City USA Celebrates Pollinator Month in June

(HENDERSONVILLE, NC, April 1 2023) – June is Pollinator Month - a celebration of bees, birds, butterflies, bats, beetles, and other species that help pollinate more than 1,200 crops and about 90% of all flowering plants that rely on pollinators for the survival of their species. Pollinators also support healthy ecosystems that clean the air, stabilize soils, and support other wildlife. During June, people of all ages can learn more about the interdependence between humans and pollinators. Especially in our agricultural area, this is a subject of interest related to the food we eat and the economically important crops we raise.

Pollinator Month activities range from gardening tips, free seeds, honey-tastings, walks along nature trails, and valuable information about bees and beekeeping. We know responsible growers would not sell most of these varieties. We would prefer that you not sell them this year if possible. We understand that if you grew some of these specifically for Garden Jubilee and we will allow them this year. Please refrain from selling anything on this list next year or risk losing your booth space. This list was complied by the Asheville Botanical Society and agreed upon by the Hendersonville Tree Board.
