Chair Lee called the Systemic Racism Review Committee to order at 12:03p.m.

Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AE) An Ordinance Appropriating \$300,000 to the Manager for the Downtown Subport Planning Capital Improvement Project; Funding Provided by Port Development Fees.

Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AF) An Ordinance Transferring \$30,000 from Information Technology to Community Development for a GIS Technician.

Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AG) An Ordinance Appropriating \$93,336 to the Manager for a Grant to Travel Juneau; Funding Provided by Hotel-Bed Tax Funds.

Mr. Barr read the ordinances into the record and gave a brief synopsis of each ordinance. Mr. Froehlich flagged Ordinance 2022-48(b) pulled for further discussion.

**MOTION**: by Chair Lee to approve the consent agenda as amended, *hearing no objection, motion passed*.

#### H. LEGISLATION PULLED FROM CONSENT FOR DISCUSSION

Mr. Froehlich requested Ordinance 2022-48(b) pulled for further discussion.

Mr. Barr noted that Docks and Harbors used to be required to have its own land management plan and this is part of the effort to clean up code and housekeeping and require Docks and Harbors to think about their land disposal method in the same way that CBJ does land disposal. Chair Lee asked if this ordinance is to clean up and align with the broader CBJ plan. Mr. Nance commented that this is an important area of transfer of land and part of the discussion the SRRC began last month. It's appropriate that the SRRC be concerned to make sure CBJ is being as transparent as possible. Mr. Froehlich agreed with Mr. Nance and acknowledged that if CBJ is going to dispose of land it should figure out how to get that land back to the indigenous tribes in our community noting that the SRRC has flagged every land transfer for further discussion that has come before the committee. Chair Lee recommended that these comments could be part of the work session still to be scheduled. Chair Lee, walked the committee through the checklist for Ordinance 2022-48(b) for further discussion.

Mr. Nance recommended the Assembly work to publicize and specifically notify the native organizations of CBJ real estate transactions. Mr. Gottschalk summarized that any signaling out of a group, organization or tribe could violate codified legislation currently outlined within the State Constitution. Mr. Froehlich questioned if tribes as tribal governments would be exempt and therefore allowed the first right of refusal. Mr. Gottschalk will research this further and bring back his findings to the committee.

Ms. Patterson suggested the SRRC could recommend to the Assembly that it recognizes the Lands Committee doesn't' currently have anything in place to return land to indigenous people and that continues to perpetuate systemic racism without the opportunity for the original land owner to receive it back; and the SRRC sees this as a potential problem. Mr. Gottschalk will research this further and bring back his findings to the committee.

<u>MOTION</u>: by Ms. Patterson to recommend to the Assembly that as the SRRC reviewed Ordinance 2022-48(b), it noted a reoccurring issue around CBJ land disposal; by not considering first right of refusal by the indigenous people of our community the SRRC sees this as a perpetual systemic racism issue. *Hearing no objection, motion passed.* 

**MOTION:** by Chair Lee moved to forward Ordinance 2022- to the full Assembly with the recommendation from Ms. Patterson and asked for unanimous consent. *Hearing no objections, motion passed.*
