Staff let the committee know about the upcoming Legislative Breakfast meeting on January 25 at 7am in the Assembly Chambers.

J. COMMITTEE MEMBER / LIAISON COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS

Assemblymember Hughes-Skandijs gave a recap on what actions took place at the January 8th Assembly meeting which included moving \$1.6 Million into the Affordable Housing Fund, adopting the alternative procurement process for the Eaglecrest Gondola, de-appropriated \$950,00 for Childcare. The ordinance for Docks & Harbors safety rail along the seawalk had been up for possible reconsideration but after a 4Y:5N vote, was not reconsidered. There is an Assembly Finance Committee meeting on January 10th which will include a conversation about the budget process and would be useful to watch. Assemblymember Hughes-Skandijs said she is excited about working with this committee on the upcoming budget work.

Mr. Froehlich said it would be valuable to have Ms. Hughes-Skandijs at the Worksession.

Ms. McEwen said Clerk staff will send out a Doodle Poll for Worksession dates. All but Ms. Morato are now using their CBJ email accounts. Discussion then turned to the need to go through the CBJ cybersecurity training which was good and not too onerous.
