Deputy Clerk Cathcart read the ordinances into the record. Chair Froehlich had a question regarding Ordinance 2023-31 and asked if a new City Hall site had been determined or if this was just general with a site to-be determined. Ms. Layne stated that at this point it's just general; however, there was a lot of work done on this process last year which determined the Whitter St. site as currently best location. Ms. Layne did note that Engineering is still looking at other options as sites become available.

Ms. Patterson asked about Ordinance 2023-29 and if the code is being changed to be able to build closer to land or streams where mammals are inhabiting. Ms. Maclean outlined the ordinance and what it does, noting that this ordinance has been in the making for many years. She said there has been push and pull between protection of habitat and developable land since CBJ doesn't have much developable land and this ordinance is looking to balance both those needs. Ms. Maclean noted that CBJ consistently hears from the development community that it's really hard to develop land when you have a 50' buffer for an anadromous stream. The ordinance is designed to allow for developers to use 10-15' of the 50' buffer to allow for initial construction and once construction is complete developers would need to go back and revegetate that 10-15' area with native plantings which are on a pre-approved list from the State of Alaska. Hopefully this will help protect habitats while giving flexibility to allow for development of the few areas still available.

Chair Froehlich asked if any of the tribes and tribal organizations were consulted on this policy or part of the public outreach. Ms. Maclean noted that she was not aware of specific outreach to native organizations however there have been many public meetings on this process for at least the last decade through various committees and the Planning Commission.
