Assembly Request for Consent Agenda Changes

Assembly Action

- I. Ordinances for Introduction
 - 4. Ordinance 2022-07(b)(B) An Ordinance Appropriating \$3,680,701 from the Central Treasury for FY23 School District Operations; Funding Provided by State Revenue and Private Grants.

This ordinance would appropriate \$3,680,701 in grant awards for Juneau School District (JSD) FY23 operations. The Alaska Department of Education and Early Development provided funding for Project AWARE (Advancing Wellness and Resiliency in Education) and the American Rescue Plan Act Evidence-Based Summer Learning and Enrichment Programs. Thread issued grant funding for RALLY as a part of the State's Phase 3 – COVID-19 Child Care Stabilization Grant. In addition to the State grants, JSD received multiple private grants from Sealaska Heritage Institute (SHI) for indigenous education programs and a grant from Juneau Community Foundation providing support for Title 1 Elementary School Social Service Workers and Advocates. Grant funds are allocated as follows:

The Manager recommends the Assembly refer this ordinance to the Assembly Finance Committee for further review and set it for public hearing at the next regular Assembly meeting.

Ordinance 2023-14(b)(K) An Ordinance Appropriating \$600,000 to the Manager for the Gate K
 Culvert Reconstruction Capital Improvement Project; Funding Provided by Airport Funds.

This ordinance would appropriate \$600,000 of Airport Funds for the Gate K Culvert Reconstruction CIP. This funding would provide for the DEC testing requirements related to the Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP). To begin Gate K culvert reconstruction, the Airport must fulfill the requirements recently brought forth by the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) for dewatering, PFAS, and monitoring, testing and filtration. It is anticipated that this CIP will be receiving a CARES Act grant later this year. In order to fulfill this DEC requirement and take advantage of the construction season, the Airport is requesting to use Airport Funds. If the grant funding becomes available and these costs are eligible for the grant, these appropriated funds will be returned to the Airport Fund.

The Airport Board reviewed this request at the August 10, 2023 meeting.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly introduce this ordinance and set it for public hearing at the next regular Assembly meeting.

J. Resolutions

Resolution 3030 A Resolution Amending the Accessory Apartment Grant Incentive Program
Criteria.

The Accessory Dwelling Unit Grant Program was created to encourage homeowners to add an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) to their home, furthering the creation of affordable housing in the community. A pilot program to provide \$6000 grants to homeowners was established in 2015 followed by a five-year extension of the program that ended June 30, 2023.

At the August 7, 2023, meeting of the Assembly Committee of the Whole (COW), the Committee voted to forward Resolution 3030 to the Full Assembly for introduction and approval. This resolution does two things: changes the official name of the program to the Accessory Dwelling Unit Grant Program (ADUG) and increases the amount of grant funding each recipient can receive for the creation of an accessory dwelling unit from \$6,000 to \$13,500.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this resolution.

7. Resolution 3035 A Resolution Approving the Issuance of the Public Finance Authority Revenue Bonds, Series 2023 (Aurora Integrated Oncology Foundation) in a Maximum Aggregate Par Amount Not to Exceed \$250,000,000.

The Aurora Integrated Oncology Foundation and local oncologist Dr. Eugene Huang approached the Assembly seeking support for their endeavor to issue tax-exempt bonds through the federal Public Finance Authority. The Foundation's goal is to consolidate oncology services and facilities in a few Alaska cities and towns in order to provide more cohesive and comprehensive services to the residents in those locations. In order to obtain funding through the Public Finance Authority, the local government must approve a resolution supporting the organization and hold a Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA) hearing. The hearing was held on August 21, 2023 at 2pm in City Hall Conference Room 224 and via Zoom. This resolution does not obligate CBJ financially in any way nor does it impact CBJ property taxes.

The Manager recommends the Assembly approve this resolution if they wish to support the foundation's effort to obtain funding from the Public Finance Authority.

K. Transfers

8. Transfer Request T-1061 A Transfer of \$428,919 from Various Capital Improvement Projects to CIP A50-104 Ramp Improvements and CIP Juneau International Airport Taxiways A, E, & D-1 Capital Improvement Project Capital Improvement Project.

This request would transfer \$428,919 of previously appropriated 1% sales tax funds from multiple completed and one in progress Airport CIP to the Ramp Improvements and Juneau International Airport Taxiways A, E, & D-1 CIPs. These projects are ongoing and are in need of additional local matching funds.

This transfer of project funding is consistent with the intent of the 2017 1% Sales Tax initiative approved by voters in the October 3, 2017 municipal election.

The Airport Board reviewed this request at the August 10, 2023 meeting.

The Manager recommends approval of this transfer.

Staff from Police, Finance, Fire, Public Works (Utilities) and Community Development Departments have reviewed the above licenses and recommended the Assembly waive its right to protest the applications. Copies of the documents associated with these licenses are available in hardcopy upon request to the Clerk's office.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly waive its right to protest the above-listed liquor and marijuana license actions.

M. PUBLIC HEARING

10. Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AZ) An Ordinance Appropriating \$134,526 to the Manager for the Design Phase of the Ramp Improvements Capital Improvement Project; Funding Provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP) Grant.

This ordinance would appropriate \$134,526 in Airport Improvement Program grant funding for the Ramp Improvements CIP. This funding would provide for the design phase of the rehabilitation of large air carrier and air taxi ramps. The local match requirement will be provided by previously appropriated 1% sales tax funds in the Ramp Improvements CIP. This award increases the \$2,017,881 grant appropriated under Ordinance 2022-06(b)(M).

The Airport Board reviewed this request at the July 13, 2023 meeting.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

11. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(H) An Ordinance Appropriating \$1,795,267 to the Manager for the Construction Phase of the Gate 5 Passenger Boarding Bridge Capital Improvement Project; Funding Provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP) Grant.

This ordinance would appropriate \$1,795,266 in Airport Improvement Program grant funding for the Gate 5 Passenger Boarding Bridge CIP. This request would provide for the acquisition, construction, and installation of a new passenger boarding bridge, replacing a 21-year-old, inoperable jet bridge. The final

grant award documentation was received, and the final grant award amount is \$1,795,266, \$1 less than the amount expected during the introduction of this ordinance. The local match requirement will be provided by previously appropriated 1% sales tax funds in the Gate 5 Passenger Boarding Bridge CIP.

The Airport Board reviewed this request at the July 13, 2023 meeting.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

12. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(I) An Ordinance Appropriating up to \$19,000,000 to the Manager for the Construction Phase of the Ramp Improvements Capital Improvement Project; Funding Provided by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Airport Improvement Program (AIP) Grant.

This ordinance would appropriate up to \$19,000,000 in Airport Improvement Program grant funding for the Ramp Improvements CIP. This funding would provide for the construction of a new remain overnight (RON) large aircraft parking ramp, rehabilitate deteriorating pavement for large and commercial aircraft parking ramps, repair failing ramp drainage and catch basins, and upgrade ramp lighting. The local match requirement will be provided by previously appropriated CARES Act funding in the Ramp Improvements CIP.

The Airport Board reviewed this request at the August 10, 2023 meeting.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

13. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(A) An Ordinance Appropriating \$60,000 to the Manager for the Mount Bradley Trail Reroute and Restoration Project; Grant Funding Provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration, Federal Lands Access Program.

Parks and Recreation has been awarded an additional \$60,000 in grant funding from the Federal Lands Access Program to relocate and reconstruct the Mount Jumbo Trail from Savikko Park to the Treadwell Ditch. This award increases the \$265,000 grant appropriated under Ordinance 2021-08(b)(am)(V). A local match requirement of \$8,051 will be provided by previously appropriated funds from the Trail Improvement CIP (P46-112) and in-kind labor. Trail Mix is reconstructing the trail and is expected to complete the project in 2024.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

14. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(B) An Ordinance Appropriating \$2,000,000 to the Manager for Childcare Programs and Grants; Grant Funding Provided by the State of Alaska.

The City and Borough of Juneau has been awarded \$2,000,000 in grant funding for childcare programs and grants, focused on improving the availability and quality of childcare in Juneau. The state funding for these grants derives from the American Rescue Plan Act and Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act. These funds will be used to expand existing CBJ programs for FY24 and FY25 as well as create an apprenticeship program for childcare administrators. No local match is required for this grant.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly take public testimony on this ordinance and refer it to the next regular Assembly meeting for action.

15. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(C) An Ordinance Appropriating \$850,215 to the Manager for the Hank Harmon Rifle Range Improvements Capital Improvement Project; Grant Funding Provided by the Alaska Department of Fish and Game.

This ordinance would appropriate \$850,215 for the Hank Harmon Rifle Range Improvements CIP. This funding would provide for a series of safety, accessibility, and longevity improvements that will address deferred maintenance needs. The improvements will comply with National Rifle Association Standards and will ensure that all Juneau-area hunting and recreational shooters will have continued year-round

access to this free facility. The local match requirement will be met through previously appropriated funds in the CIP.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

16. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(D) An Ordinance Appropriating \$347,340 to the Manager as Funding for Round 2 of the Healthy and Equitable Communities Grant; Grant Funding Provided by the Alaska Department of Health.

CBJ has been awarded an additional \$347,340 in grant funding from the Alaska Department of Health's Healthy and Equitable Communities grant. The Healthy and Equitable Communities unit was established in 2021 in response to widening barriers to health highlighted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This award increases the \$222,953 grant received in FY23. This grant would improve health outcomes for high-risk and underserved Alaskans by providing funding for the following purposes:

Capital City Fire and Rescue (CCFR) Employee Mental Health Training - \$45,000

CCFR Response Van Modifications - \$45,000

Community Health Needs Assessment - \$50,000

Parks & Recreation's Youth Shelter (Shéiyi Xaat Hít) - \$75,000

Warming Shelter - \$132,340

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

17. Ordinance 2023-14(b)(J) An Ordinance Appropriating \$280,000 to the Manager for the Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Capital Improvement Project; Grant Funding Provided by the U.S. Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration.

CBJ has been awarded a \$280,000 Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grant from the Federal Highway Administration. The SS4A grant's goal is to develop a holistic, well-defined strategy to prevent roadway fatalities and serious injuries. Funding would be used to conduct a full road safety analysis, taking inventory of all previous crashes, historical trends, conditions, severity of injuries, community and partner input, and other factors throughout the borough. The safety analysis would produce a list of projects and guide the creation and implementation of the Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. Once the plan is implemented, the CBJ would be eligible for additional road safety grant funding. A local match requirement of \$70,000 will be provided by previously appropriated funds in the FY24 CIP Resolution 3016(b).

The Public Works and Facilities Committee reviewed this request at the June 26, 2023 meeting.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

18. Ordinance 2023-27 An Ordinance Authorizing the Manager to Convey Approximately 3,030 Square Feet of Property Located Adjacent to 11260 North Douglas Highway with the Legal Description of a Fraction of Lot 2, USS 3559 Beachside to Jon and Susanne Reiswig for Fair Market Value.

In May 2022, the City Manager received an application to acquire City property from Jon and Susanne Reiswig, the owners of 11260 North Douglas Highway. The application is for roughly 3,000 square feet of City property adjacent to the applicant's 11.6-acre property and the request is being made in order to secure more road frontage on North Douglas Highway. The City property is a large 92-acre parcel, transected by North Douglas Highway. The requested property is managed by the Lands Division and the 2016 Land Management Plan designated this property as retain/dispose. The Plan also states that this property could be utilized for a future residential subdivision.

The LHED Committee reviewed this request at the May 2, 2022 meeting and forwarded the application to the Assembly with a motion of support for disposal. The Planning Commission reviewed this

application at the September 13, 2022 meeting and recommended approval of this disposal. The Assembly provided a motion in favor of working with Jon and Susanne Reiswig towards the disposal of City property at the June 12, 2023 meeting. An appraisal was complete in March 2023 which valued the property at \$7,600.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

19. Ordinance 2023-34 An Ordinance Authorizing the Eaglecrest Ski Area to Enter into a Franchise Agreement with Evan and Kaitlin Morgan, Doing Business as Pittman's Pub for Beer and Wine Sales.

This ordinance would authorize the Eaglecrest Ski Area to enter into a franchise agreement with Pittman's Pub LLC to provide beer and wine sales at Eaglecrest Ski Area during the winter season consistent with the ski area operating calendar. On June 5, 2017 the Assembly adopted Resolution 2793(b) authorizing the Eaglecrest Board to approve on a case by case basis, the sale, possession, and consumption of beer, wine, alcoholic ciders and other similar malt beverages in connection with a valid permit issued under City and Borough of Juneau Code of Regulations, Title 11 Chapter 7 with a licensed vendor holding a valid liquor license issued by the State of Alaska. The federal Land and Water Conservation Fund prohibits CBJ from issuing leases at Eaglecrest. However, CBJ can grant a franchise agreement as a mechanism to formalize a business relationship. Eaglecrest solicited a Request For Interest (RFI 23-174) and received no responses. After the solicitation closed Eaglecrest continued to look for suitable vendors and was contacted by two interested parties. After pursuing the opportunities further Pittman's Pub LLC was the only remaining interested party. This ordinance would allow Pittman's Pub to operate for five consecutive winter seasons.

The Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

N. NEW BUSINESS

20. BE22-202 Bid Award for JNU Gate 5 Passenger Boarding Bridge Replacement

Bids were opened on this project on July 19, 2023. The bid protest period expired at 4:30 p.m. on July 20, 2023. Results of the bid opening are as follows:

Project description: Work generally consists of the removal and replacement of the existing Passenger Boarding Bridge (PBB) and fixed PBB walkway at Gate 5.

The City Manager recommends award of this project to Dawson Construction, LLC for the total amount bid of \$1,705,705.00.

21. BE23-243 Bid Award for JNU Rehabilitation Part 121/135 Apron and RON Parking Apron

Bids were opened on this project on July 25, 2023. One bid was received. The bid protest period expired at 4:30 p.m. on July 26, 2023. Results of the bid opening are as follows:

Project Description: Heavy civil rehabilitation of the Part 121/135 parking aprons at Juneau International Airport.

The City Manager recommends award of this project to SECON for the total bid amount of \$14,708,640.00.

22. Hardship and Senior Citizen/Disabled Veteran/Non-Profit Late-Filed Real Property Tax Exemption Applications

There are 31 property owners that have requested the Assembly authorize the Assessor to consider a late-filed exemption for their property assessment.

The Assembly should consider each request separately and determine whether the property owner was unable to comply with the April 30 filing requirement. A.S. 29.45.030(f); CBJC 69.10.021(d). The burden of proof is upon the property owner to show the inability to file a timely exemption request. If the Assembly decides to accept one or more late-filed exemption requests, those applications will be referred to the Assessor for review and action.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly act on each of these applications individually.

23. Grant Creek Homes Request for a Land Trade

The Lands Office received an application from Grant Creek Homes, located at 4305 North Douglas Highway, requesting a land trade. This land trade would allow the disposal of approximately 3.22 acres of CBJ land to Grant Creek Homes and the acquisition of approximately 2.42 acres of land by the CBJ from Grant Creek Homes. The application states that this would allow the developer to avoid development in the Grant Creek stream buffer area and potentially create a small lot subdivision to provide housing within the CBJ. The Planning Commission noted that the land acquired by the CBJ would extend the 200-foot designated stream corridor surrounding Grant Creek, in line with the 2013 Comprehensive Plan. The Lands Housing and Economic Development Committee reviewed this proposal at the May 2, 2022, meeting and passed a motion of support. The Planning Commission reviewed this application at the meeting on August 11, 2022, and recommended that the Assembly approve this land trade. This application is moving forward after the applicant re-engaged in July.

The Manager recommends the Assembly pass a motion of support to work with Grant Creek Homes toward the disposal of City property in accordance with City Code 53.09.260.

24. Appeal 2023-AA01 before the Assembly: Karla Hart v. Planning Commission re: USE 2023-0003 Huna Totem Floating Dock

The Clerk's Office received a timely filed appeal from Karla Hart on August 4, 2023 regarding the Planning Commission's decision on USE 2023-0003 related to Huna Totem's application for a floating dock.

In accordance with the Appeals Code, the Assembly must decide whether to accept or reject the appeal. If you determine, after liberally construing the notice of appeal in order to preserve the rights of the appellant, that there has been a failure to comply with the appellate rules, or if the notice of appeal does not state grounds upon which any of the relief requested may be granted, you may reject the appeal.

If the appeal is accepted, you must decide whether the Assembly will hear the appeal itself or if it will assign the appeal to a hearing officer.

If you decide to hear the appeal yourselves, a presiding officer should be appointed. In hearing an appeal itself, the Assembly would sit in its quasi-judicial capacity and must avoid discussing the case outside of the hearing process. (See CBJ 01.50.230, Impartiality.)

If you decide to send the appeal to a hearing officer, the Assembly may waive its right to reject or modify the hearing officer's decision, rendering the hearing officer's decision final and appealable to Superior Court without Assembly comment. Additionally, in this situation the Assembly is not prohibited

from discussing the case, as you are not sitting in a quasi-judicial capacity, nor are you reviewing the decision of the hearing officer.

At the February 1, 2021 Assembly Committee of the Whole the Manager recommended that in the event of an appeal of this proposed development that the Assembly send the appeal to a hearing officer.

An updated memo is in this packet.

Attorney Wright recommends the Assembly accept the appeal, consider assigning it to a hearing officer, and consider waiving final review under CBJC 01.50.140(c).

A. CALL TO ORDER

Deputy Mayor Maria Gladziszewski called the Special Assembly meeting to order at 6:08p.m. The meeting was held in the Assembly Chambers and broadcasted virtually via Zoom.

B. LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

'Wáahlaal Gíidaak provided the following land acknowledgment: We would like to acknowledge that the City and Borough of Juneau is on Tlingit land, and wish to honor the indigenous people of this land. For more than ten thousand years, Alaska Native people have been and continue to be integral to the well-being of our community. We are grateful to be in this place, a part of this community, and to honor the culture, traditions, and resilience of the Tlingit people. *Gunalchéesh!*

E. AGENDA TOPICS

1. Public Hearing

Ordinance 2023-30 An Ordinance Authorizing the Manager to Advocate for and Provide Public Information Regarding the Need for a New City Hall, Including the Dissemination of Information That May Influence the Outcome of a Future Ballot Initiative.

This ordinance enables the Manager to advocate for a new City Hall project if the Assembly decides to put a ballot question before the voters this fall. \$50,000 for this purpose has been included in the FY24 budget. While CBJ regularly provides the public with nonpartisan information about upcoming ballot provisions, Alaska law requires the Assembly adopt an ordinance specifically authorizing the expenditure of funds if those funds are to be used to influence the outcome of an election. Threading the needle of delivering nonpartisan information versus information that might influence the outcome of an election is particularly challenging in this case; people may reasonably debate about the difference of facts and arguments in favor of a City Hall facility.

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These funds would be used to produce and disseminate materials via direct mail, media, presentations to the community, and online.

The City Manager recommends the Assembly adopt this ordinance.

Public Comment

Frank Bergstrom, a resident in the Fred Meyer area, spoke in opposition of Ordinance 2023-30. He stated that the new city hall is a controversial topic that was recently turned down by voters during the 2022 election. At the May Finance Committee meeting, Assemblymember Woll proposed that the word "New" be removed from the title "New City Hall" giving the reason that the subject is "controversial" and controversial subjects are often referred to a committee or commission for impartial study. Ordinance 2023-30 states "enables the manager to advocate for the new city hall... and influence the outcome of the election." He spoke to the reasons this should be referred to an impartial committee or commission. He spoke to the expenses and numbers given during the 2022 election cycle as well as those of the project with relation to this proposed ordinance. He stated that his personal property tax has increased by 45% in the last eight years and he is emblematic of many people in town and he is exhausted by the rate of property taxes.

Scott Spickler, a resident of North Douglas, spoke in opposition to Ordinance 2023-30. He said that the community said no to this project last year. He said that the \$50,000 is not a wise use of funds. The project should stand on its own merits if the Assembly chooses to put this on the ballot again. He said that he hopes they don't put it on the ballot again. He said that he also does not like when the city bundles ballot items together and would prefer that individual projects stand on their own merit. He said that he understands the Assembly has a tough job and that CBJ has \$1 billion in deferred maintenance that goes back decades but we don't have a good history of taking care of what we do have and if we did, we would not likely be in the current situation.

Roger Callaway, an Auke Lake resident, spoke in opposition to Ordinance 2023-30. Mr. Callaway said that CBJ already has a Public Information Officer (PIO) that they fund and he is surprised that the information they wish to convey isn't already being put out by the PIO.

Don Habeger, a Back Loop resident, said that in addition to speaking on his own behalf, he is representing Juneau's First Things First Foundation, of which he is the Executive Director. He said that their organization in a 501(c)(3) non-profit that gets involved in public discussions. He said that this public discussion involves whether or not we need a new city hall and whether or not CBJ should be in the business to advocate for one. They have heard testimony that this is a controversial issue and it was defeated in the 2022 election that had a 32% turnout, which is average for the past 10 years for voter turnout. He said that turnout said no and it is the will of the people. That should conclude the Assembly to withdraw this ordinance. He said that if the Assembly does choose to pass it, they should have reasonable public debate and they should find an organization that would represent the other side and fund that equally and have a true, honest public debate on the issue.

Mr. Smith asked if First Things First, would be willing to participate in a public debate on the merits of the project. Mr. Habeger said he thinks First Things First is open to that but it would be willing to do that but it would depend on what an RFP would look like. If First Things First didn't consider the RFP fair, they would likely not go after it. If all things are fair and a true public debate was put out, they may be interested in that.

Wayne Coogan, an Auke Bay resident, said that he deeply appreciates the Assembly's commitment and professionalism and it is generally always there. He said that with regards to City Hall, this current City Hall now needs \$14 Million to repair the current space. He said that you can't see the dire need when you walk through the building. He said that he thinks they have crossed into territory and is hearing grave concerns being raised about the Assembly advocating in a political manner and using tax payer money to advocate against the vote that was taken during the 2022 election. He is concerned about the honor of the Assembly.

Assembly Action

MOTION by Mr. Bryson to adopt Ordinance 2023-30 and asked for unanimous consent.

Objection by Mr. Smith for purposes of a question. Mr. Smith asked Manager Watt, if this ordinance does not pass, what information could CBJ provide to the public about this proposed project. He asked what city staff would feel is legal or comfortable in putting out. [Mr. Smith removed his objection with Mr. Watt's reply.]

Mr. Watt said that the information would look similar to what was done last year. He noted that if there was incorrect information out on social media, CBJ staff would not engage in that discourse or provide information that might correct erroneous assumption. CBJ would not participate with community groups if they asked for presentations. They would not provide mailer/flyer/postcards or things like that. He said they would narrowly stay out of the electoral process. He noted in his manager's recommendation what is and isn't a fact and what is or isn't considered advocacy can be subject to interpretation. CBJ would largely be silent. He said that he does not think that the voters would benefit from the reasons this project has been proposed. He said that it is for that reason that he has recommended this ordinance.

Ms. Gladziszewski asked Mr. Watt to explain the relationship of the Public Information Officer (PIO), how this money might relate to the PIO's salary and if this is additional money or if this ordinance is to meet the formal reporting requirements for advocacy as set out by Alaska Public Offices Commission (APOC).

Mr. Watt said that the \$50,000 looks like additional money but it offsets staff costs. He said that all staff work on this project has to be tracked and reported to Alaska Public Offices Commission (APOC). He said that any staff time related to providing public information on this topic, whether it was the PIO doing work on it or if he were to attend a public event such as a Chamber of Commerce luncheon to speak on this topic, they would assign the salary cost of the staff member to this appropriation. Those salary costs would offset existing budget authority and not likely be new expenditure of funds.

Ms. Gladziszewski asked if they could do it as a decrement from the already budgeted funds if they wanted to. She said that the real purpose of this appropriating ordinance is for APOC reporting of staff time allocated to this ballot issue. Mr. Watt said that was correct for the most part, however, if they did send out a postcard or flyer to voters, that would be a new expenditure so it would be fair to call those new costs. For any staff costs, those would be offset costs since they will not be hiring anyone new.

Ms. Hale said that one of the members of the public who testified suggested that CBJ could use the PIO to provide information to the public. She asked Mr. Watt to clarify that unless this ordinance is passed, the PIO would not be allowed to get information out about this project.

Mr. Watt said that was correct. Since that APOC rules are fairly narrow and this issue has been argued and litigated, APOC recommends specific appropriation and specific legislative authority to participate in the electoral process. He said that clearly, we would be advocating for a new city hall as they feel a new city hall is in the best interest of our citizens. He said that in the effort to provide information about the project, we would be trying to influence the election so APOC requires these two separate authorizations.

Hearing no further objection, Ordinance 2023-30 was adopted by unanimous consent.

Layne 4 5 RESOLUTION OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF JUNEAU, ALASKA 6 7 Serial No. 3030 8 9 A Resolution Amending the Accessory Apartment Grant Incentive 10 Program Criteria. 11 12 WHEREAS, consistent with the City and Borough of Juneau ("CBJ") Housing Action 13 Plan, to ensure a healthy housing market, the CBJ needs to spend its own resources to 14 create more housing for young families, workers, and seniors; and 15 16 WHEREAS, in 2015, the Assembly established an accessory apartment grant pilot 17 program with \$72,000 in \$6,000 individual grants, which resulted in 12 new accessory 18 apartments; and 19 20 WHEREAS, by early 2017, the \$72,000 pilot program created more than \$1,000,000 in 21 development, which is recognized through property taxes; and 22 23 WHEREAS, because of the success of the pilot program, the Assembly appropriated 24 \$480,000 as funding for the Accessory Apartment Grant Incentive Program for five years via 25 Ordinance 2017-06(AD); and 26 27 WHEREAS, the Accessory Apartment Grant Incentive Program criteria has been 28 amended to clarify that the Assembly's intent is to create accessory apartments for long-29 term rental use, and not for short-term rental use; and 30 31 WHEREAS, the CBJ Lands Housing and Economic Development Committee (LHEDC) 32 made a motion of support of modifications to the Accessory Apartment Grant Incentive 33 Program including structural and funding amount changes, and a name change to the 34 "Accessory Dwelling Unit" Grant Program. 35 36 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF 37 JUNEAU, ALASKA: 38 39 Section 1. Accessory Dwelling Unit Grant Program. The following program 40 criteria governs new Accessory Dwelling Unit Grants: 41 42 **A.** Intent. The Accessory Dwelling Unit Grant Program is intended to provide 43 encouragement for homeowners to add an accessory dwelling unit (ADU) to their 44 home, furthering the creation of affordable housing. Homeowners will be awarded 45 \$13,500 for construction of an ADU through this grant program. 46

B. Availability. Grants are limited based on available funding. The CBJ is free to reduce or eliminate the funding for this program. Applicants do not vest any rights in this program. Funding for this program is provided by the Juneau Affordable Housing Fund.

C. Preliminary Eligibility Requirements to Apply.

- 1. One grant per property:
- 2. Applicant must be a Juneau resident whose principal residence is within the borough of Juneau;
- 3. Applicant must be the property owner(s) and at least 18 years of age;
- 4. No outstanding code enforcement cases can exist on the subject property;
- 5. Only new accessory dwelling units are eligible for this incentive program;
- 6. Building permit and grant application must be compliant with applicable federal, state, and municipal codes, laws, and regulations; and Grant Criteria; and
- 7. Applicant can only apply for the grant program concurrently with a building permit application; applications received after submittal of a building permit will not be accepted.

D. General Eligibility for Award.

- 1. Must pass final inspection within two years of issuance of associated building permit.
- 2. Receive a full Certificate of Occupancy within two years from issuance of the building permit. A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy is insufficient.
- 3. The grant is non-transferable; therefore, if there is a conveyance of property prior to awarding this grant, this application becomes null and void. If a conveyance of property occurs after receipt of the grant award, Section F of this resolution applies.
- 4. Provide photos of the unit interior and exterior upon receipt of Certificate of Occupancy and prior to award. Photos must show the kitchen, bathroom(s), and a view of the unit from the street.
- 5. Property taxes and assessments, including bonds, must be in good standing.

> A Resolution Approving the Issuance of the Public Finance Authority Revenue Bonds, Series 2023 (Aurora Integrated Oncology Foundation) in a Maximum Aggregate Par Amount Not to Exceed \$250,000,000.

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WHEREAS, the Public Finance Authority (the "Issuer"), a commission organized under and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 66.0301, 66.0303 and 66.0304 of the Wisconsin Statutes, as amended, has received a request from Aurora Integrated Oncology Foundation, a Delaware not-for-profit corporation (the "Borrower") and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code") to issue one or more series of the Issuer's qualified 501(c)(3) conduit revenue bonds, as defined in Section 145 of the Code, in a maximum aggregate par amount not to exceed \$250,000,000 (the "Bonds") to (a) either via the acquisition of the membership interests in the entities that own such assets or through the acquisition of such assets directly, finance the acquisition of (i) various existing radiation oncology centers located in the State of Alaska including, without limitation, the real estate and equipment related to such centers, including a radiation oncology facility located within the boundaries of the City and Borough of Juneau (the "Juneau Treatment Facility") and a medical office building and a patient house located in City and Borough of Juneau (the "Juneau MOB and Patient House"), and (ii) a professional physician practice providing physicians to provide services in such existing radiation oncology centers; (b) fund one or more debt service reserve funds; and (c) pay costs incurred in connection with the issuance of the Bonds: and

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WHEREAS, on the date of issuance of the Bonds, the Juneau Treatment Facility will be owned by RBS Evolution of Juneau, LLC, the sole member of which is the Borrower, and will be located at 1701 Salmon Creek Lane, Juneau, Alaska and expected to be acquired for a par amount of not more than \$45,000,000, and the Juneau MOB and Patient House will be owned by the Borrower, and will be located at 1701 Salmon Creek Lane and 10736 Mendenhall Loop Road, Juneau, Alaska, respectively and expected to be acquired for a par amount of not more than \$6,500,000; and

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WHEREAS, the remaining portion of the proceeds of the Bonds will be used to finance the acquisition of existing radiation oncology centers, real estate, equipment, and a professional physician practice as described above in the City of Palmer, Alaska, the City of Soldotna, Alaska, and the Municipality of Anchorage, Alaska, as well as for the other uses described above; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the "Code") authorizes the issuance of revenue bonds for a "qualified 501(c)(3) entity," such as the Borrower; and

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Code requires that qualified 501(c)(3) bonds be approved by the applicable elected representatives of the governmental units having jurisdiction over the areas in which the assets being financed by the Bonds are located, and the Assembly (the "Assembly") of the City and Borough of Juneau, Alaska ("Juneau") is the "applicable elected representative" of the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the portion of the Project consisting of the Juneau Treatment Facility and Juneau Patient House being financed with a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds is located; and

WHEREAS, under no circumstances will the City and Borough of Juneau be in any way, legally or morally, obligated to repay any portion of the Bonds or in any other way incur any liability related thereto; the Bonds will be special limited obligations of the Issuer payable solely from revenues and resources provided or arranged by the Borrower to be pledged to the payment of the Bonds and any credit enhancement arranged for by the Borrower; and the Bonds and interest thereon will not constitute an indebtedness or a pledge of the faith and credit of the City and Borough of Juneau, the State of Alaska or any political subdivision thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Borrower has requested that the Assembly approve the issuance of the Bonds strictly in order to satisfy the requirements of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

RE: Childcare Update

This is a follow-up to our discussion at the <u>April 24, 2023</u> Committee of the Whole meeting. Since then, AEYC has published a request for <u>letters of interest</u> for new and/or expanded childcare startups, we were notified that our \$2M grant application was successful and will be awarded in full. An <u>appropriating ordinance</u> was introduced at the July 10, 2023 Regular Assembly meeting.

As a reminder, total CBJ funding with the grant requires shifting some funds from FY24 to FY25 due to a requirement the grant be fully expended in FY24, and our desire to smooth out and create a longer-term period of predictable funding for providers. Currently anticipated 5-year funding with the new grant (more detail in the 4/24 memo linked above):

This level of funding will allow us to double the size of our per-child stipend program in FY24 and FY25 while also creating a new per-employee stipend program and an apprenticeship program designed to provide training and development opportunities for 4 new childcare administrators.

A final note – while we have received verbal notification of this grant award, we have yet to receive formal grant documents. We expect to receive those just-in-time for AEYC to process July payments – if something changes, we will adjust course and update the Assembly.

Recommendation:

Direct staff to prepare a deappropriation ordinance for \$950K (\$550K from GF, \$400K from 1% Sales Tax) in FY24, and include the same amount as a one-time increment in FY25.

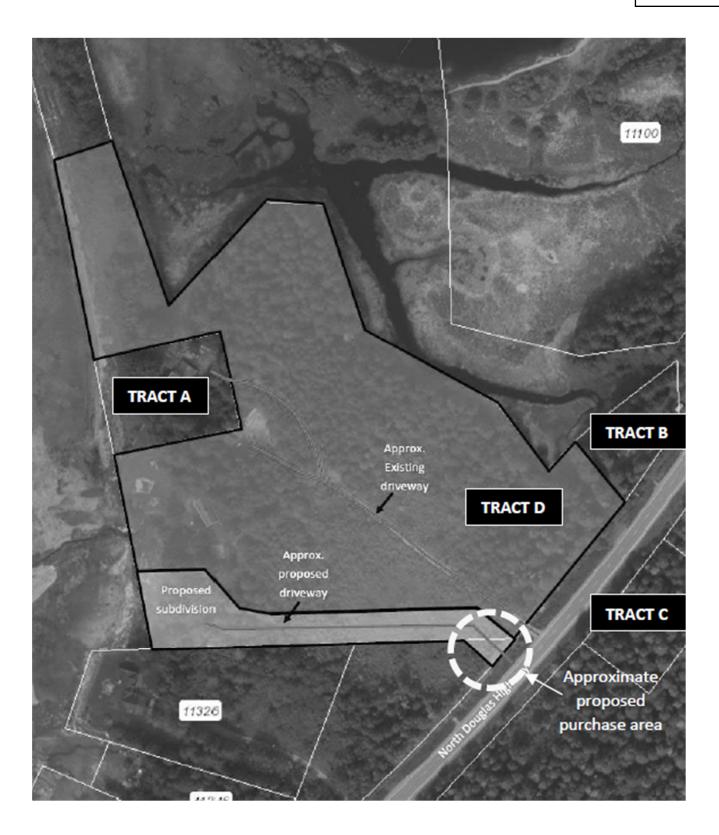

An Ordinance Authorizing the Eaglecrest Ski Area to Enter into a Franchise Agreement with Evan and Kaitlin Morgan, Doing Business as Pittman's Pub for Beer and Wine Sales.

WHEREAS, in 1975 and 1983, federal Land and Water Conservation Funds were used to develop Eaglecrest Ski Area, which imposed permanent restrictions prohibiting conversion of any property interest including a lease to private use, *see* 54 U.S.C.A. § 200305(f)(3); 36 C.F.R. § 59.3; LWCF Financial Assistance Manual at page 103 (3/11/2021); and

WHEREAS, the City and Borough of Juneau Charter allows the Assembly to authorize franchises by ordinance, CBJ Charter 5.2(c); and

WHEREAS, Black's Law Dictionary defines Franchise as, "To grant (to another) the sole right of engaging in a certain business or in a business using a particular trademark in a certain area"; and

WHEREAS, the Eaglecrest Ski Area solicited statements of interest for the Eaglecrest Beer and Wine Sales in (RFI 23-174), and received no responses during the initial solicitation; and

WHEREAS, City and Borough of Juneau ("CBJ") staff contacted other Beer and Wine vendors who did not express an interest in the Beer and Wine Concessionaire opportunity and found Pittman's Pub to be the only interested party; and

WHEREAS, the following franchise authorization is in the best interest of the public.

THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED BY THE ASSEMBLY OF THE CITY AND BOROUGH OF JUNEAU, ALASKA:

- **Section 1. Classification.** This ordinance is a noncode ordinance.
- Section 2. Franchise terms. The franchise is subject to the following essential terms:
- (a) **Application of 11 CBJAC 07 Commercial Use of Eaglecrest Ski Area.** The provisions of 11 CBJAC 07.010-100 apply to this franchise authorization in addition to the following provisions except when in conflict with a provision of this ordinance.
- (b) **Authorized location.** Eaglecrest has two locations which Concessionaire may use to provide concessions ("Concession Premises"). The first location is a designated bar concession

space with a handwashing sink behind a permanently positioned bar located in the Fish Creek Lodge adjacent to the cafeteria. The second is a twenty-five-foot (25') wide by thirty-five-foot (35') deep outdoor commercial tent with overhead propane heat and a permanently mounted bar adjacent to the base of the Hooter Chairlift, which includes a small storage shed. All utilities necessary shall be provided by Eaglecrest or Concessionaire under the terms of this Contract. CBJ reserves the exclusive right to provide all food service at Eaglecrest including during all open bar concession hours.

- (c) **Kitchen and restrooms.** Vendor may use restrooms and water from the kitchen. The vendor may also use the kitchen on "off hours" if agreed to by the Ski Area Manager and vendor. "Off hours" being defined as hours when the kitchen is not being used by Eaglecrest staff for washing any glassware or serving equipment.
- (d) **Communication system.** Vendor may use of the Eaglecrest Secure WIFI network for credit card transactions.
- (e) **Term.** Each franchise term is one winter operating season, generally running December 1st until Aril 15th terminating on the last day of the winter operating season. Vendor may request to renew this franchise authorization annually by sending written notice to the Ski Area Manager by September 15th, which shall be granted so long as the vendor is in good standing and a renewal is in the best interest of Eaglecrest Ski Area as determined by the Board of Directors. This franchise authorization is effective for a maximum of five winter seasons expiring October 1, 2028, with an annual renewal option.
- (f) **Revocation.** This franchise authorization is revocable upon violation of any of terms of this ordinance or upon failure to comply with other applicable permits, laws, and regulations.
- (g) Compliance with other laws and regulations. Vendor shall comply with all applicable City and Borough of Juneau, State of Alaska, and federal permits, laws, and regulations, including CBJ Conditional Use Permit USE2005-00060. Vendor shall ensure compliance and is responsible with this franchise authorization for Vendor's agents, employees, customers, and guests.
- (h) Insurance.

Commercial General Liability Insurance. Concessionaire must maintain Commercial General Liability Insurance in an amount it deems reasonably sufficient to cover any suit that may be brought against Concessionaire. This amount must be at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) per occurrence, and two million dollars (\$2,000,000.00) aggregate. This insurance policy is to contain, or be endorsed to contain, additional insured status for CBJ, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. If additional insured status is provided in the form of an endorsement to Concessionaire's insurance, the endorsement shall be at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10, CG 20 26, CG 20 33, or CG 20 38; and CG 20 37 forms if later revisions used.

Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance, which coverage shall apply to all owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles, with one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) combined single limit coverage. This insurance policy is to contain, or be endorsed to contain, additional insured status for CBJ, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers.

Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance. Concessionaire must maintain

Workers Compensation Insurance. If required by Alaska Statute (see Alaska Statute 23.30), Concessionaire must maintain Workers Compensation Insurance to protect Concessionaire from any claims or damages for any bodily or personal injury or death which may arise from services performed under this Contract. This requirement applies to Concessionaire's firm, Concessionaire's subcontractors and assignees, and anyone directly or indirectly employed to perform work under this Contract. Concessionaire must notify CBJ as well as the State Division of Workers Compensation immediately when changes in Concessionaire's business operation affect Concessionaire's insurance status. Statutory limits apply to Workers Compensation Insurance. The policy must include employer's liability coverage of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per injury and illness, and one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) aggregate. If Concessionaire is exempt from Alaska Statutory Requirements, Concessionaire must provide written confirmation of this status in order for CBJ to waive this requirement.

<u>Liquor Liability</u>. Liquor Liability: Insurance Services Office Form CG 00 33 04 13 covering Liquor Liability on an "occurrence" basis, with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 aggregate. The Liquor Liability will cover the furnishing of alcoholic beverages.

- (i) **Indemnity.** Vendor agrees to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City and Borough of Juneau from any and all claims for injury and damage to persons or property related to or arising out of the Vendor's activities unless such injury or damage is caused by the gross negligence of the City and Borough of Juneau, its agents, employees, officers, or anyone acting on its behalf.
- (j) **Hours of operation.** Vendor must operate the business at a minimum every weekend day and holiday that Eaglecrest is open during the winter. The business will be available from 11:00am until one hour after the chairlifts close. Vendor may operate other hours as approved by the Ski Area Manager.

(k) General permit fees.

a. The Concession Fee payable by Concessionaire to CBJ for this Contract year shall be five *percent* (5%) of Concessionaire's gross sales or six hundred dollars (\$600), whichever is the larger sum, for the months of January, February, and March. For each partial month, (December and April), the Concession Fee shall be 5% of Concessionaire's gross sales or three hundred dollars (\$300) whichever is the larger sum. The Concession Fee shall be calculated monthly and remitted to CBJ within fifteen (15) days after the end of each month this Contract is in effect. Late payments not made by the 20th of the month due shall bear interest at a rate established by ordinance for late payments or at the rate of twelve *percent* (12%) *per annum*, if no rate has been set by ordinance.

b. Concessionaire will pay as follows for utilities: heating fuel (paid directly to propane vendor or to CBJ based on actual billing from propane vendor), internet and electricity at a monthly fee of \$150 paid directly to CBJ.

- (l) **Fees charged by vendor.** Pursuant to 11 CBJAC 07.040(b)(3)(A), Vendor must submit to the Ski Area Manager a schedule of fees and charges to customers prior to the beginning of each ski season.
- (m) **Monthly revenue reports.** Vendor must submit to the Ski Area Manager a complete revenue report detailing the gross revenues for each month of operation. Reports are due on or before the last day of the following month. (For example, the February 2024 report will be due on or before March 31, 2024). Reports shall contain a breakdown of the gross receipts by the activity which produced such receipts.
- (n) Audit and inspection of records. The CBJ may once per annual term cause an audit of Vendor's gross revenues to be made by a Certified Public Accountant of the CBJ Finance Director's selection or a CBJ auditor. If the audit reports that less gross revenues were reported by the Vendor in a given year period than were actually received, Vendor shall bear the cost of the audit and remit the amount of the underpayment to the Eaglecrest Ski Area. Otherwise, the Eaglecrest Ski Area shall bear the cost of the audit. The Eaglecrest Ski Area shall have the right at all reasonable times during the term of this franchise authorization, upon ten days written notice, to inspect, review, and copy, records of Vendor that are necessary to verify Vendor's compliance with its fee obligations.
- (o) Ownership, maintenance, and removal of improvements. All improvements installed by Vendor are the property of Vendor. Vendor shall keep Vendor's improvements in neat, clean, sanitary, and safe condition. Vendor must remove improvements on or before the date of permit expiration, or within 30 days after permit termination. At any time during the term of this franchise authorization, upon Vendor's consent, Eaglecrest Ski Area may purchase the improvements or consent to allow improvements to remain on site after expiration or termination.
- (p) **Taxes and impositions.** During the term of this franchise authorization, Vendor shall pay all CBJ taxes which may be imposed or assessed, including tax on sales and services and business personal property. Nothing in the preceding sentence shall affect Vendor's legal rights to appeal any tax imposed or assessed on it by CBJ.
- (q) **Permit transfer.** Pursuant to 11 CBJAC 07.030(e), business may only be conducted under this franchise authorization by Pittman's Pub, LLC, and this franchise authorization may not be sold, assigned, leased, rented, mortgaged, or otherwise transferred unless Vendor's entire business interest in Pittman's Pub, LLC is transferred to another party. The Vendor or the transferee shall submit a written application which shall be approved if application satisfies all of the reasonable requirements applicable to an original application. No credit will be given to the transferee for any permit payments made to CBJ by the Vendor.

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(r) **General operating requirements.** Pursuant to 11 CBJAC 07.080(b), Vendor is responsible to the CBJ for their actions and those of agents, employees, and customers while engaged in franchise authorization activities, and the following operating requirements apply to the permit unless otherwise addressed:

- (i) Vendor will keep the permitted area clean at all times and will employ persons who meet or exceed food and alcohol safety handler standards.
- (ii) Signs may be posted in accordance with CBJC 49.45 *et. seq.* and with the Ski Area Manager's written permission and Board of Director approval, which must not be unreasonably withheld.
- (iii) The Vendor must promptly notify the Ski Area Manager of any accident, injury, or claim relating to the franchise activity.
- (iv) Vendor shall promptly dispose of all litter found on and near the authorized location.
- (v) All vehicles under the control of the Vendor shall be lawfully operated and parked while the Vendor is engaging in franchise activities. The Vendor is responsible for following all parking restrictions and requirements.
- (s) **Casualty.** Should the authorized location be destroyed or so badly damaged by fire or other casualty during the initial term or any renewal term of this franchise authorization making the premises unusable for the intended purposes, the franchise authorization is terminated.
- Vendor's Confidential Information. The parties acknowledge that as a result of Vendor's operations under this franchise authorization, CBJ may acquire information regarding Vendor's business that may be protected as confidential under state or CBJ law. Vendor acknowledges and understands that the CBJ is subject to the Alaska Public Records Act (AS 40.25.120) and that all documents received, owned, or controlled by the CBJ in relation to this franchise authorization must be made available for the public to inspect upon request, unless an exception applies. It is Vendor's sole responsibility to clearly identify any documents Vendor believes are exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act by clearly marking such documents "Confidential." Should the CBJ receive a request for records under the Public Records Act applicable to any document marked "Confidential" by Vendor, the CBJ will notify Vendor as soon as practicable prior to making any disclosure. Vendor acknowledges it has five (5) calendar days after receipt of notice to notify the CBJ of its objection to any disclosure, and to file any action with any competent court Vendor deems necessary in order to protect its interests. Should Vendor fail to notify the CBJ of its objection or to file suit, Vendor shall hold the CBJ harmless of any damages incurred by Vendor as a result of the CBJ disclosing any of Vendor's documents in the CBJ's possession. Additionally, Vendor may not promise confidentiality to any third party on behalf of the CBJ, without first obtaining express written approval by the CBJ.
- (u) **Choice of law, jurisdiction.** The Superior Court for the State of Alaska, First Judicial District at Juneau, Alaska shall be the exclusive jurisdiction for any action of any kind and any nature arising out of or related to a franchise agreement. Venue for trial in any action shall be in Juneau, Alaska. The laws of the State of Alaska shall govern the rights and obligations of the parties. Vendor specifically waives any right or opportunity to request a change of venue for trial pursuant to A.S. 22.10.040.

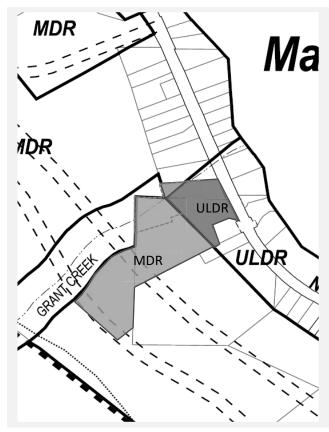

SURROUNDING LAND USES AND ZONING

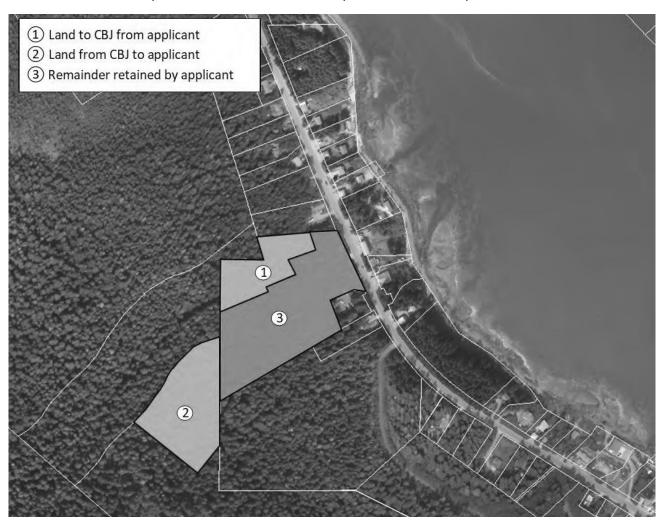

Note that I have no model of what is meant by "concisely describe the legal and factual errors" and am not an attorney, I am an active and involved citizen is approaching this as the same. I don't want to be excluded from raising issues because I thought they were part of the argument and the hearing officer chooses to interpret as legal and factual errors. This detail is attached to my ever-so brief summary of legal and factual errors handwritten on the form.

Unless stated otherwise, page numbers refer to the June 29, 2023 staff report from Irene Gallion to Michael LeVine.

Outreach, including the description of a mixed use development that "includes a floating dock," with a street address of 0 Egan Drive was inadequate for a project of this known level of controversy and community-wide impact, as well as for the timing during the summer when locals are traveling, working seasonal jobs, and otherwise not proactively looking at meeting agendas.

CDD appears to confound the past and present property owner's outreach and consider private events (Rotary, Chamber, Southeast Conference) and bar and basketball venues as public meetings. The Hanger Ballroom, closest to a meaningful public meeting, was on January 30, the same day the Assembly had a public hearing on "Resolution 3011 A Resolution Adopting Cruise Ship Tourism Policy Objectives from the Visitor Industry Task Force Final Report."

The Community Development Director was in error with respect to appropriate public outreach.

Despite a notedly (by the commission, relating to Phase 3, by this appeal, far more) incomplete application, concerns expressed about approving the project in phases, the observation of public involvement lacking, and without any substantive discussion of the dock and related impacts, or the details of the proposed staff conditions relating to the dock, the Commission chose to separate approval of that out from the rest of the project and approve a CUP for the dock **PHASE**.

The project review was sloppy and reads more as an advocacy document by selection of information to include, and to bury or exclude, and by wording than a thorough and objective review expected of planning staff. A lack of page numbers on the 300+ page packet hinders review.

Page 3 in background information states that "the original application was for the uplands. The Applicant added the dock to this application rather than apply for a separate one. Revisions have resulted in some redundancies in the submission." The public notice to abutters, printed June 2, 2023, includes the dock. Yet, throughout the document the dock project is neither integrated full for consideration, nor pulled out as a standalone with complete evaluation.

Examples from Gallion to Levine, June 29,2023

"The proposal moves reception of over 100 thousand passengers out of the congested downtown dock area." (page 1)

"A dock will allow larger ships, increasing Juneau's cruise ship visitor capacity by 25 percent." (page 21)

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"Applicant is limited to one large cruise ship unless they subsequently modify the Conditional Use Permit with Planning Commission approval." (page 1)

Pages 25 and 26 note the limit of five large ships as a CBJ management issue, yet suggest the possibility of approval for a dock for a second large ship in the future.

"Two additional moorages for smaller vessels could be provided under the current vehicle regime..." (page 1) These statement leaves a gaping opportunity by ambiguity.

"The dock will not accommodate lightering from a cruise ship at anchor if that ship is over 750 feet or accommodates more than 950 passengers." (page 22) Page 25 Waterfront Plan info: "No berthing or lightening outside of the area encompassed by the plan." "Summary, CBJ manages current lightening facilities and would deny access to a sixth ship at anchor, or anchored outside of the managed area. A proposed condition prohibits lighting from the proposed facility." NCL, when the property owner, was very clear and vocal that building the dock would physically preclude and cruise ships anchoring out and touted the environmental and safety costs of having ships at anchor.

CBJ Docks and Harbors asked for a **navigation study**. (page 23 of 30) Rather than requiring that before approval, staff/the Commission chose to make that a condition of the CUP, approving the use without knowing how the dock (and associated use) will impact harbor navigation. They also asked for clarity regarding dock fingers in the renderings. "(Attachment A2, page 12)" is referenced. I found no corresponding page. The proponent is big on renderings of their shoreside facilities but extremely vague on the dock details.

The dock is dependent upon CBJ leasing tidelands to Huna Totem. The public has been repeatedly assured that will be a meaningful opportunity for input on whether or not this project goes forward. That the lease is not a done deal. Yet, page 3 "The lease provides the vehicle for the Assembly to attach qualitative policy standards to the project, based on their assessment of community interest and well-being." Bias noted.

"Once the **full details of the proposal are known, should the Assembly lease land** for the development of a cruise ship dock at the Subport?" from Watt, Jan 20, 2021 to Assembly, yet in passing a CUP without the uplands and without evaluating many other aspects, including details on the dock design and complete intended use, the Assembly will not have complete information for a lease or no lease decision.

From Watt, Jan. 20, 2021 memo to the Assembly: "Docks & Harbors is currently working on the "Small Cruise Ship Berthing Plan." That plan has preliminarily identified a preferred development option that is adjacent to and coordinates with the proposed NCL development." I note no mention of any coordination or even how this dock relates to the city dock in the staff packet.

With the exception of the condition regarding the navigation study (which should predate approval, not be an add-on condition), **Docks and Harbors had questions which appear unaddressed** by the applicant, CDD, and the Commissioners.

1. Docks & Harbors requests a navigability study be conducted to ensure the alignment of the proposed HTC dock does not impede access to the AS/CT Docks or to the USCG/NOAA Docks. The CBJ CLERK

study should also evaluate any unreasonable impact to larger vessels (i.e. fuel/material barges) transiting Gastineau Channel under the bridge. The AJT Dock (former Standard Oil Dock) also should be addressed as the proposed HTC appears to block reasonable access to this derelict pier which is legally on patented private tidelands.

- 4. Docks & Harbors recommends the CUP address dock electrification and expected commitment from HTC to achieve shore power (conceptual planning document, by date certain, anticipated financial investment, etc.).
- 5. Docks & Harbors requests the applicant provide clarity to the **finger floats** shown in the renderings. What size of slips are proposed and how will these slips be utilized in the off-season.
- 6. Docks & Harbors requests to know if HTC will be providing navigation safety measures such as real time current monitoring and/or meteorological sensors.
- 7. Given a that very large cruise ships will be moored perpendicular to shore and in close proximity to the bride, request a hydraulic study be conducted to determine whether disruptions to the tidal flushing under the bridge or if siltation issues will be anticipated. Additionally, evaluate safety concerns to very large cruise ships mooring with current abeam in the proposed dock alignment.
- 8. An evaluation to view-shed impacts should be considered/addressed for both the dock (with vessel) as well as the proposed upland building.

Docks and Harbors asked for **view-shed** impacts as well. The applicant provides nothing re view sheds and Juneau residents Page 25, table re Long Range Waterfront Plan, also has "new docks should address impacts to view planes." the summary response is inadequate. Ships now are up to 14 floors tall, well over 1,000 feet long, and 200 feet wide. The few dock-related illustrations provided do not address resident/off-site view sheds at all.

Page 18. "Noise is anticipated to be in character with Mixed Use 2 and Waterfront Commercial activities..., this project does not change or mitigate those concerns." Isn't noise supposed to be below 65 db at the property boundary in daytime? Has this been measured? The ships are coming now. A professional could/should do real noise measurements that include at different elevations as noise carries at heights and across water. "Anticipated to be" is not an analysis or data.

Page 18. Habitat. Completely blows past the fact that tidelands will be impacted and intertidal areas. Zero acknowledgment. Zero analysis.

Page 20. Under **Welfare** is a gratuitous biasing statement relating to estimates of electric rates and Greens Creek Mine and Princess interruptible power that is irrelevant to the application since shore power will not be available for years. Similarly the statements re economic indicators and the visitor survey, without also acknowledging the conflicts, stress, overtourism, discontent, objects that exist.

The condition re shore power "an appropriately sized power line is within 25 feet of the property line" indicates that there is no real analysis or work done to specify what that might be, and the "at their own expense" part only starts within 25 feet of the power line, apparently it is okay with all if the general ratepayers of Juneau cover the expenses of getting the line there.

The section on property value or neighborhood harmony just blows off any analysis with a "it is challenging due to ship size increases and the ability to enforce limitations." Completely unacceptable. No real analysis was even attempted and the impacts go community wide CLERK

Section N, Item 24.

The City Attorney memo is referenced was Attachment D. Challenges of limiting the number of passengers. One undebatable legal option Juneau has for limits is not allowing another dock for large cruise ships.

CBJ revenue bonds for the city cruise docks do not allow the city to do things that might threaten revenues and the ability to pay back the bonds. There is no analysis of how having another dock might impact use or ability to charge prices at the city docks.

Page 25, "New docks should address environmental impacts, including shore power to mitigate air pollution." Summary, "The proposed dock includes cable trays.... However, a line capable of providing power needed is not currently proximate to the project." The document and application do not provide any meaningful environmental analysis. Not air pollution. Not water pollution. The bit about shore power is a red herring as there is no power to offer. Further, DEC has done modeling on the water discharges from cruise ships in the Juneau harbor and the modeling found water quality issues. CBJ should understand the discharge of any scrubber wastewater in Gastineau Channel. There is nothing in the application that addresses sewer discharge to Juneau treatment plants, sewer lines, costs, sewer system capacity and related either.

Page 28. Is the application for the requested Conditional Use Permit complete? "No further analysis needed." I've detailed missing analyses, there are likely others.

Page 28. "Will the proposed development materially endanger public health, safety, or welfare?" "No further analysis needed." NONE was done. The 2022 CBJ application for a grant for shore power, April 12, 2022 submitted by CBJ Carl Uchytil, clearly documents air pollution from cruise ships in Juneau and that there is inadequate electricity to provide shore power for one dock all of the time, much less for the city docks which are also seeking to electrify. A timeline for getting additional power online is years. Therefore, a full analysis of the health impacts of cruise ship emissions moved closer to that part of town and shore is needed. The finding is that "with appropriate conditions." Extensive modeling of winds along with analysis and weighing of health impacts of this pollution burden is needed. There is new evidence emerging in health scientific literature that demonstrates even lower levels of air pollution than once thought has adverse impacts on a wide range of health conditions. None of that is included. Even if on shore power once docked, ships tend to belch especially dirty smoke when maneuvering and this dock will require them to be doing tricky maneuvering, sometimes against winds and currents. That is not analyzed. So even in the best case, air pollution will be in close proximity. And where are the air intakes on the federal building, the SLAM, others?

At the July 11 Planning Commission meeting, Mr. LeVine stated that members had received a letter from Alexandra Pierce, Tourism Manager, but that they could not accept letters handed to them outside of the packet unless the sender were in person in the Assembly chambers at the time. She was not, she was on Zoom. Her proposed amendments to the proposed conditions for the dock put them in alignment with the VITF. That the CDD staff did not take the content of the CBJ Tourism Manager commenting in her official capacity to clarify conditions to meet a guiding document for Juneau cruise tourism and put them forth themselves resulted in conditions that are not in compliance with adopted city policies.

The July 20, 2023 Planning Commission Notice of Decision states "The Project is to be conducted as described in the project description and project drawings submitted with the application...

THERE are essentially no details in any project description. No information as to a depth of dredging needing (and environmental impacts of that), the details on the dock that Docks and Harbors requested, whether there are sewer connections and how that is done, no harbor traffic study to know what will be needed), no information on size, volume, other of ships (and corresponding passengers, traffic, and other community impacts. How does CBJ enforce this? Or the public monitor?

There is no acknowledgement in the CUP that there is yet the step of the Assembly considering whether or not to lease the land. This permit should be clear that the applicant has the further step of consideration of whether or not to lease the land rather than "... until the tidelands lease is recorded." There is no THE lease. They do not have a lease yet. And no guarantees of a lease.

- 4. "The Applicant will maintain and operate paths, parks, ... for year-round use." Is it the intention of the Commission that this be for year-round PUBLIC use or simply that the property owner uses it?
- 5. re shore power, "large ships" has a meaning in Juneau. So again there is the implication that ships under 950 feet might also be using the dock and not be required to use shore power. Is this what is intended? How does this protect the health of Juneau residents, as a 949 passenger ship is still quite large and emitting significant pollution?
- 6. All of this should have been done before issuing a permit and the results may influence how the project is built and you have not enough project description and project drawings to hold Huna Totem accountable.

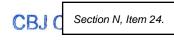

The Planning Commission, at its regular public meeting, adopted the analysis and findings listed in the attached memorandum dated June 29, 2023 as they pertain to the floating dock. The Commission approved a Conditional Use Permit for a floating steel dock up to 70 feet wide and 500 feet long. The project is to be conducted as described in the project description and project drawings submitted with the application, and with the following conditions:

- 1. A Temporary Certificate of Occupancy will not be issued for the dock until the tidelands lease is recorded.
- 2. The minimum width of the Applicant constructed seawalk on the south side of the lot will be 16 feet wide. The minimum width of the Applicant-constructed seawalk on the west side of the lot will be 20 feet.
- 3. Before Temporary Certificate of Occupancy for any phase or element of the project, the Applicant will record an easement for CBJ maintenance and management of the seawalk. The easement will be at least 16 feet wide on the south side of the lit, and 20 feet wide on the west side of the

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lot. The easement will be comparable to such easements in place for other dock owners.

- 4. The Applicant will maintain and operate paths, parks, landscaping, and other amenities (other than the seawalk) for year-round use.
- 5. The dock owner will, at their own expense, provide shore power within 24 months after an appropriately-sized power line is within 25 feet of the property line. When shore power is provided, large ships using the dock will be required to use shore power instead of ship power.
- 6. Prior to issuance of a building permit, the Applicant must provide a navigability study that includes explicit consideration of access impacts to:
 - Alaska Steam Dock.
 - Cruise Ship Terminal.
 - USCG/NOAA docks.
 - Large traffic, such as material or fuel barges, transiting Gastineau Channel under the bridge.
 - The AJT Mining Properties, Inc. dock.
 - Aircraft using the area for landing and taxiing to the float plane docks.
- 7. The dock is limited to one (1) large cruise ship (750 feet or more in length OR 950 or more passengers) each 24 hour period beginning at midnight.
- 8. The dock will not accommodate hot berthing.
- 9. The dock will not accommodate lightering from a cruise ship at anchor if that ship is over 750 feet in length or accommodates more than 950 passengers at full capacity.

The Commission (Commission) did not adopt the analysis and findings that relate to the uplands portion of the application. The Commission found that the uplands portion of the application did not contain sufficiently specific information, particularly about the portion designated Phase 3, to support a conclusion that the project as a whole would comport with Title 49, including the MU2 land use designation.

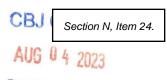

RE: Subport Development – Updated Assembly Consideration Process

In January 2021, at the COW, I provided a memo that detailed a recommended public process approach to consideration of a fifth cruise ship dock at the Subport property. Over the past 2.5 years, CBJ has used this document as guidance in the Assembly and public process around the property purchased by Norwegian Cruise Lines (NCL) and subsequently transferred to Huna Totem Corporation (HTC). This memo is intended to provide an update on the process and outline the Assembly's next steps. The "Issues and Approach" sections below will follow the same format as the 2021 memo and provide an update on each component of the process with a draft approach, all of which still hinges on three sequential questions:

- 1. Should a dock at the Subport be considered?
- 2. Should a dock at the Subport be permitted, and if so, under what conditions?
- 3. Once the full details of the proposal are known, should the Assembly lease land for the development of a cruise ship dock at the Subport?

Issues and Approach:

1. Long Range Waterfront Plan (LRWP)

This process is complete as recommended in 2021. This affirmatively answers the question of "should a dock at the Subport be considered?".

2. Conditional Use Permitting

- a. The Conditional Use Permit (CUP) application was heard by the CBJ Planning Commission on July 11, 2023. The Planning Commission approved the proposed dock, but not the uplands development. This CUP was appealed on August 4. A separate CUP for the uplands development was approved on August 8. As of August 18, CBJ has not received an appeal of the uplands CUP.
- b. The 2021 memo recommends that the Assembly hire an independent hearing officer in the event of an appeal. That decision is before the body tonight, and staff's recommendation stands.

c. The Assembly should refrain from negotiations with HTC before the appeal is resolved. It would not be surprising if HTC requests to start negotiating while the appeal is still in process. The outcome of the appeal and the conditions imposed by the Planning Commission will inform the Assembly's decision on what to include in a tidelands lease. While I appreciate that an appeal delays the project proposal (and is frustrating for project proponents), I strongly believe that the public is best served by letting the appeal process run its course before contemplating next potential steps.

3. CBJ is the owner of the adjacent tidelands.

- a. If the appeal process results in approved CUPs for both the dock and uplands, the Assembly should commence tideland lease discussions with HTC, based on public process.
- b. The Assembly may consider the conditions imposed by the Planning Commission to determine whether they are adequate or if additional items should be included.
- c. While the appeal is in process, staff will work with the Assembly to design a timely public process to ensure that the items included in the tidelands lease and the decision on whether to approve or deny a fifth cruise ship dock are based on public input.

4. Adjacent or Coordinated Development.

There are two CBJ projects that need to be considered in the context of the proposed development.

- a. Docks & Harbors is currently working on obtaining funding for the "Small Cruise Ship Berthing Plan." That plan has preliminarily identified a preferred development option that is adjacent to and coordinates with the proposed HTC development. There is no timely action on these ideas necessary at this time.
- b. Engineering Department staff have been working on developing a waterfront seawalk from the bridge to the rock dump, in conformance with the Long-Range Waterfront Plan. Efforts to extend the seawalk to the AJ Dock has some momentum and are making progress.

5. Negotiations with Federal Government.

a. The HTC proposal originally included a U.S. Coast Guard facility on one side of the proposed cruise ship dock. The Coast Guard has declined to be part of the project. The Coast Guard also owns property along the water side of the lot and the adjoining tidelands.

- b. The D&H planning effort would require negotiation and agreement with NOAA and possibly the USCG.
- c. The Coast Guard has selected the adjoining federal (Coast Guard and NOAA) lots as a homeport for a future icebreaker. This is an important priority for CBJ and any offsite impacts of the development on navigation, security, or facility access should be considered in the tideland lease discussions.

Recommendation:

Assign Appeal 2023-AA01: Karla Hart v. Planning Commission re: USE 2023-0003 Huna Totem Floating Dock to an independent hearing officer.
