Ordinance 2023-32 An Ordinance Clarifying the Process for Electing an Assemblymember Due to a Midterm Vacancy.

<u>Ordinance 2024-07</u> An Ordinance Amending the Recreation Areas Code Relating to Prohibited Uses and Providing for a Penalty.

Mr. Barr read the legislation into the record, giving a summary of each ordinance up for public hearing. Chair Nance opened the floor for ordinances to be pulled for further questions or a motion. Mr. Drips asked about Ordinance 2023-14(b)(Y) funding and wondered if any of this fall within systemic racism area. Mr. Barr gave a high-level overview of the Capital Improvement Plan. We can invite Engineering to a future SRRC to give an overview of CIP's.

MOTION: by Mr. Drips to pull Ord 2023-14(b)(Y) and approve the consent agenda as amended and asked for unanimous consent. *Hearing no objection, motion passed*.
