Chair Froehlich called the Systemic Racism Review Committee to order via Zoom at 12:01p.m.

Deputy Manager Barr provided a staff report on each of the above legislative matters and the meetings at which they have considered.

MOTION: by Ms. Pemberton to approve the consent agenda as presented and ask for unanimous consent. **Hearing no objections; motion passed**.

I. AGENDA TOPICS

3. Legislative Capital Priorities

SRRC members to review legislative priorities list and bring recommendations to the committee for final discussion and vote on which priorities to move forward.

Chair Froehlich said that SRRC discussed the Legislative Capital Priorities at its last meeting and the three priorities that the committee had identified they were interested in putting forward were the Lemon Creek Multimodal Path, the Jackie Renninger Skate Park, and Bartlett Aurora Behavioral Health Center.

Chair Froehlich opened the floor up to committee comments and questions.

Ms. Pemberton noted that the Bartlett Aurora Behavioral Health Center was withdrawn from the list and she asked if they could hear more from E/PW Director Koch about the new projects listed specifically the Capital City Community Center in Lemon Creek. E/PW Director Koch gave an overview of the new projects added to the list and also explained the process and timelines by which this priorities list is developed.

Chair Froehlich noted the Capital City Community Center fits the most with SRRC priorities and addresses the lack of community infrastructure within this area of time. He suggested they strike the Behavioral Health Center from their final letter and possibly pursuing this project as long as the process includes dialogue with the community and that portion of the community in particular. Additional discussion took place as to their ranking, or not ranking, of the SRRC's top three priorities.

<u>MOTION</u>: by Ms. Pemberton to remove the Behavioral Health Center as the third priority and replace it with the new Capital City Community Center as submitted by the Parks & Recreation Advisory Committee and asked for unanimous consent.

Hearing no objection, the motion passed by unanimous consent.

Chair Froehlich said he will work on updating the letter and try to send that out for review by the end of the week and then he will send it to E/PW Director Koch once it is final. Director Koch encouraged them to send the letter to her as soon as possible as the next stop in the process is that the priority list will be going to the PWFC on December 18 for review.

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J. STAFF REPORTS

Mr. Barr shared some process tips to ensure compliance with the Open Meetings Act (OMA) and suggested that members should not be emailing one another about the draft letter but rather to use staff as the hub for any edits to the letter which would ensure there are no OMA violations.

K. COMMITTEE MEMBER / LIAISON COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS

Ms. Hughes-Skandijs introduced herself and was grateful to be the Assemblymember Liaison to the SRRC and due to travel and other time conflicts, this was the first meeting she has been able to attend as the liaison and she is happy to provide any feedback to the Assembly that they may wish to forward on.

Ms. Pemberton said that at the Assembly meeting the night before, she noticed that there were a number of committee appointments made and she asked what the status was on the SRRC vacant seat.

Deputy Clerk Cathcart shared that there were two applications received for the SRRC and the appointment to committee will be taken up at the January 8, 2024 Assembly Human Resources Committee meeting. She explained they are still accepting applications so anyone who may be interested in applying can still submit an application.
