Building on an existing provision for downtown housing, this ordinance proposes to expand tax abatement for qualifying new housing developments borough-wide. Only housing developments on a single lot that remain under common ownership would qualify. This incentive is intended to help address Juneau's shortage of adequate and affordable housing, which the Assembly identified as a high priority in its 2022 Goals. This tax abatement would sunset on October 1, 2032; which will induce a future review to determine if the program is accomplishing its aims as designed. Connection to existing legislation: This ordinance amends Section 69.10.023 of CBJ's Code.
