Mr. Barr read the legislation into the record and gave a brief explanation of each piece of legislation. Chair Froehlich asked committee members if there were any ordinances committee members wished to pull for further discussion.

Ms. Pemberton, curious about what our options are for with spending more time with Title 49 and when it makes sense for us to weigh in. Mr. Barr noted that Ordinance 2025-15 will go to the Planning Commission to have 60 days to review.

Mr. Froehlich asked if the Planning Commission held discussion on this. Mr. Barr outlined the 60-day process noting that the SRRC will have additional time to review this process.

<u>MOTION</u>: by Ms. Pemberton to pull Ordinance 2025-15 for further discussion and approve the consent agenda as amended and asked for unanimous consent. *Hearing no objection, motion passed*.

J. COMMITTEE MEMBER / LIAISON COMMENTS AND QUESTIONS

Mr. Nance asked if with the changes at the federal level, there are any fallout effects to CBJ. Mr. Barr said there are lots of potential impacts that staff don't fully understand yet and are continuing to work through; the only specific thing that CBJ has hit pause on is the Safe Streets Grant until we hear if it's really moving forward.

Ms. Adkison noted that she will attend the SRRC Worksession and updated the committee on additional discussions held at Monday night's Assembly Human Resources Committee meeting. The HRC discussed options related to the Historic Resources Committee and heard from the Community Development Department regarding staff's ability to support HRAC. The HRC directed Law to bring forward legislation that would redefine the charge of HRAC to an as needed basis. Law will bring the HRAC resolution, and an updated ordinance related to dissolving the various appeal boards and moving to a Hearing Officer when needed for appeals to the March HRC meeting.
