Chair Lee called the Systemic Racism Review Committee to order at 12:08p.m.

3. Moving Forward as a Committee - SRRC Process

With the adoption of Ordinance 2023-20b, expanding the charge of what the SRRC can now review or work on, the SRRC should discuss how they would like to move forward as a committee, possible options include:

- a. Continue to have links to Ordinances for Introduction from the Assembly consent agenda along with checklists pre-filled out by staff for those ordinances, *or*
- b. Continue to include links to Ordinances for Introduction with a blank checklist that SRRC members could fill out if that was the will of the body, *and/or*
- c. Move away from review of Ordinances for Introduction, focusing instead on larger topics/items members would like to take a deeper dive on as a committee, *or*
- d. Some combination of a, b & c

Chair Lee asked the committee what they would like to see the SRRC look like now at the expansion of our charge. Mr. Froehlich said this may be a larger conversation and agree that it is a combination of the above. Chair Lee maybe look at if we pull an ordinance and we could work through the checklist.

MOTION: by Chair Lee to add the CBJ Budget as a Standing Agenda Topic.

Ms. Cheney wondered if there are any places within the budget that we look a little more deeply into and asked for staff recommendations. Mr. Barr recommended looking at where the changes are as noted under the Executive Summary of the FY24 Revised Budget Book.

Mr. Barr read the legislation into the record and gave a brief summary of each ordinance. Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AW) was pulled from the Regular Assembly agenda during its Monday night meeting. Chair Lee asked if there were any ordinances to pull for further discussion. Mr. Froehlich pulled Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AK)(c) for further discussion.

MOTION: by Ms. Patterson to approve the consent agenda as amended with Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AK)(c) for further discussion. *Hearing no objection, motion passed.*

Mr. Froehlich asked how the process works using the Affordable Housing Fund for this project. Mr. Barr walked committee members through the Affordable Housing Fund process.

Mr. Froehlich asked how many applications are typically received. Mr. Barr noted that previous applications are viewable on the <u>Affordable Housing website</u> for 2021 and 2022, the 2023 schedule hasn't been posted yet. In 2022 CBJ received seven applications and awarded four were awarded. In 2021 there were four applications and three were awarded.

<u>MOTION</u>: by Mr. Froehlich to move Ordinance 2022-06(b)(AK)(c) forward to the Assembly for public hearing. *Hearing no objections, motion passed.*
