### **Background information:**

Attached is the most recent version of the City of Kaukauna's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), updated by staff as of September 2025. The CIP serves as both a planning tool for operations and a framework for financing and budgeting, providing a five-year outlook for equipment, parks, streets, utilities, and other capital needs.

Historically, the City has borrowed approximately \$5 million annually to align with manageable debt service. The 2026 CIP identifies approximately \$14.5 million in projects, with about \$4.9 million anticipated through general obligation (GO) borrowing, consistent with prior practice. Major projects in 2026 plan include planning for the replacement of a fire engine, multiple street reconstructions, and substantial sanitary sewer upgrades, including the Industrial Park and Konkopot Interceptor projects. Note these sanitary sewers projects have were bonded for in 2025 under the revenue bond supported by the sanitary sewer user fee. Because of these they have no direct impact on the property tax or general obligation borrowing.

The plan consolidates requests from all departments, ensuring a citywide perspective on priorities. Departments are encouraged to bring forward requests in a timely manner so needs can be evaluated before equipment or facilities become critical. At the same time, the City must balance avoiding premature replacement with extending the useful life of assets where appropriate, to minimize unnecessary capital spending.

The CIP is treated as a living document. Estimates in years 2028–2030 are preliminary and will be updated as project scopes and costs are refined. Decisions made today can influence future borrowing capacity and may affect the ability to respond to new capital needs that are not yet reflected in this plan. Based on what is presented in the CIP today, if anything unplanned capital needs to be identified and pursued simultaneously, the city would likely need to alter its borrowing structure or accept a significant tax rate increase.

### Strategic Plan:

The CIP aligns with the City's Strategic Plan by:

- Supporting sustainable infrastructure investment to maintain quality services.
- **Balancing fiscal responsibility** with the need to address operational requirements across all departments.
- Providing transparency and foresight into how decisions made today shape future flexibility, particularly if additional development opportunities or facility sites materialize.

Developing a more **robust evaluation system** for CIP items is also a strategic priority of the Finance Director, aimed at ensuring that the right capital investments are made at the right time meeting departmental needs without creating undue impact on taxpayers.

### **Budget:**

The 2026 CIP proposes \$14.5 million in total projects, with funding derived from GO borrowing of \$4.9M.

Borrowing at this level maintains consistency with the City's historical practice. Looking forward, maintaining a balance between **timely replacements** and **stretching useful life** will be essential to keep borrowing levels sustainable. Recent state law changes may also provide opportunities to spread certain projects over longer horizons, easing annual debt service payment pressures.

#### Staff Recommended Action:

Staff recommends that Council acknowledge the updated 2026–2030 CIP as a planning document and use it as a guide in evaluating and prioritizing future projects. Specific approvals for 2026 projects will be brought forward in Spring 2026 ahead of bonding and bidding.

### **Background information:**

When discussing operational changes with the refuse dumpsters at the Municipal Disposal Site a full cost analysis of the site was suggested along with gathering information on what percentage of users are utilizing the refuse dumpsters vs the other material services. Currently there are five categories of materials accepted, and each material has its own process and timing for servicing. Residential garbage, recycling, brush, yard waste, and motor oil are the current accepted materials.

Garbage being the biggest concern also carries the highest cost of all materials accepted. Estimated yearly labor cost is \$19,200 and estimated yearly tipping fees based on today's pricing are \$24,200. Total collection cost \$43,400.

Recycling, which has been the second most concerning material accepted, comes at a cost of \$9,000 per year with current collection rates.

Brush and yard waste were combined to produce total costs as both materials are managed at the same time with the same equipment. With the bulk of material coming in during the growing season the costs were based off 7 months of collection. Yearly labor costs were estimated at \$28,000 and contracted grinding costs of \$6000-\$12,000.

Waste oil is currently hauled by GFL and comes with no cost to the city.

Currently there are 2088 site users which net \$52,200 a year. With site fees only covering around 56% of actual costs of operations, changes need to be considered. 15% of site users utilize the refuse dumpsters which is roughly 47% of total operational costs. The continued concern of staff safety, non-compliant dumping, costs of tipping fees, and enforcement of this material need to be considered and determined if this material is worth the continued risk and cost for collection.

Recycling, Which sees misuse of not breaking down large boxes, overfilling of dumpsters, and piling materials on the ground is another material that should be discussed. Outagamie County will not accept this material for free or a discounted cost even though material from the Municipal Disposal Site is from Outagamie residents. The only recycling accepted for free is through the Outagamie County curbside contract and their drop-off site at the landfill. Even though this material does not pose the safety risk the garbage material does, it still comes with cost. Residents do have the option to dispose of excess recycling at the Outagamie County Landfill for free during normal business hours.

If the desire were to remove the garbage and recycling material from the Disposal Site, we would reduce our cost by 56%. This could allow for access fees to stay flat and still cover increases in operational costs.

### Strategic Plan:

To continue providing a high quality of life through services staff looks at ways to provide collection services while keeping staff safe and being financially responsible.

### **Budget:**

Costs from the Municipal Disposal site are budgeted in waste collection operational budget.

### **Recommended action:**

- 1. Direct staff to remove garbage and recycling dumpsters from Disposal Site on determined date and update Waste Material ordinance 11.11.
- 2. Direct staff to remove garbage dumpsters from the Disposal Site on determined date and update Waste Material ordinance 11.11.
- 3. Direct staff to remove garbage dumpsters on weekends and update Waste Material ordinance 11.11.
- 4. Direct staff to bring back a recommended yearly access fee amount to cover operational costs if all materials continue to be accepted.

As the Kaukauna Area School District (KASD) begins the work at Haen School, City and KASD staff had saw an opportunity for beneficial re-use of some playground equipment that was scheduled to be removed. KASD was able to donate three basketball hoops, the baseball backstop, and the two square picnic tables that were located at the lower playground for re-use at City parks. Special thanks go to Street Superintendent VanGompel and Kevin Veldman, KASD Maintenance Engineer for seeing an opportunity to benefit the community and working together to improve our city parks. And thanks to street department staff for collecting and refurbishing some of this material for reinstall.

### Strategic Plan:

The donation will help the City update more parks while being financially responsible and showing collaboration between the city and community partners.

Budget: The re-use of the donated items could save the City approximately \$16,000-\$20,000.
