FOX VALLEY TECHNICAL COLLEGE PUBLIC SAFETY TRAINING CENTER USE AGREEMENT

INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS AGREEMENT

Kaukauna Fire Department (hereafter “Agency” and its officials, employees, agents, invitees and the like, in consideration for being allowed to use facilities at Fox Valley Technical College’s Public Safety Training Center (hereafter “PSTC”) including *training village* on or about *January 1 – December 31, 2024* for the purpose of training, does agree to the extent authorized by Wisconsin law and subject to the limitations of Wis. Stats. §§ 893.82 and 895.46, each party agrees that it shall be responsible for any loss or expenses, including costs and attorney fees, arising from or incidental to the act or omission of its respective officers, officials, agents, or employees in performing the obligations under this agreement arising out of or related to this Agreement.

ASSUMPTION OF RISK

Agency shall be solely responsible for advising its officials, employees, agents, students, invitees and the like of this provision prior to their entry and use of the facility.

DAMAGE TO FACILITY

Agency agrees that if the facility is damaged during its use of the same as a result of actions by Agency during such use, the facility will be repaired at Agency’s expense and at no cost to FVTC. Repairs, if necessary, shall be made by a qualified entity of FVTC’s choosing.

Re: Appleton Radio Contract

As we've discussed in prior meetings, our department has been participating in a regional radio grant through the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) program. The journey began in January of 2022 and received the award in the fall of 2022. The Appleton Fire Department served as the host agency, and the grant award helps Kaukauna along with 17 other departments throughout Outagamie County to make necessary radio replacements. It has been a long process, but we are almost there.

The attached contract formalizes the actual dollar amount that each department will be responsible to reimburse Appleton for the purchase of the radios.

While this grant is extremely helpful for all departments involved, it did fall short of our ask to replace our entire inventory. It was not because the need was not there, but our grant reached the \$2M maximum, so the award was pro-rated.

Nonetheless, through this grant we will receive \$155,994.60 worth of radios for a cost of \$15,599.46.

I am asking for authorization for the Mayor and I to sign this contract with the City of Appleton.

CONTRACT

I. THE PARTIES

- 1.01 Appleton Fire Department, with offices at 700 North Drew Street, Appleton, Wisconsin 54911 ("AFD").
- 1.02 City of Kaukauna Fire Department, maintaining offices at 201 Reaume Avenue, Kaukauna, WI 54130 ("KKFD").

II. THE RECITALS

- 2.01 WHEREAS AFD is the regional host agency for the Fiscal Year 2021 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program ("AFG").
- 2.02 WHEREAS KKFD is a Regional Participating Partner of the AFG.
- 2.03 WHEREAS, pursuant to the AFG, AFD is the purchasing agent for portable radio bundles ("radios") for KKFD in strict compliance with all other documents incorporated herein by reference.
- 2.04 WHEREAS KKFD has agreed to cost share the purchased radios at a minimum of ten percent (10%) in strict compliance with all other documents incorporated herein by reference.

III. AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the fulfillment of the obligations of the parties hereinafter set forth and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AND PROMISED, by and between the above-referenced Parties as follows:

- 3.01 The Recitals are hereby made a part of the Agreement.
- 3.02 AFD shall purchase the radios for KKFD pursuant to the terms of the AFG award and all other documents incorporated herein.
- 3.03 KKFD is responsible for payment to AFD for KKFD's portion of the cost sharing in strict compliance with all documents incorporated herein by reference, for an amount to be not less than **Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-Nine and 46/100 Dollars (\$15,599.46)**.

IV. COMPONENT PARTS OF THIS CONTRACT

- 4.01 This contract consists of the following component parts all of which are as fully a part of this contract as if herein set out verbatim or, if not attached, as if hereto attached.
- 4.01.1 AFG Additional Funding, Agreement Articles, and Obligor Document, with an effective date of 09/15/2023, and consisting of nineteen (19) pages.
- 4.01.2 Memorandum of Understanding, as Amended, between AFD and KKFD for the Fiscal Year 2021 Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program, consisting of approximately forty-one (41) pages including Amendment and signature pages.
- 4.01.3 AFD Purchase Order dated 09/25/23 and accompanying Motorola Solutions Quote-2329686 dated September 13, 2023, consisting of approximately eight (8) pages.

V. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS

- 5.01 In the event that any provision in any of the above component parts of this contract conflicts with any provision in any other of the component parts, the provision in the component part first enumerated above shall govern over any other component part which follows it numerically, except as may be otherwise specifically stated.
- 5.02 In the event that any part of this contract is found to be illegal, it shall be stricken from the contract and the contract interpreted as if that clause did not exist.
- 5.03 Where not otherwise specified, this contract shall be construed in accordance with, and governed by, the laws of the State of Wisconsin, without giving effect to any choice of law doctrine that would cause the law of any other jurisdiction to apply. Venue shall be in Outagamie County, Wisconsin.
- 5.04 Nothing contained within this contract is intended to be a waiver or estoppel of AFD or its insurer to rely upon the limitations, defenses, and immunities contained within Wisconsin law, including those contained within Wis. Stats. §§893.80, 895.52, and 345.05. To the extent that indemnification is available and enforceable, the municipality or its insurer shall not be liable in indemnity or contribution for an amount greater than the limits of liability for municipal claims established by Wisconsin Law.
- 5.05 This contract may be executed in several counterparts, either by original signature or verified electronic signature, each of which shall be deemed an original, but such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same agreement. The headings in

this contract are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall not constitute a part hereof.

- 5.06 Each of the Parties herein represents and warrants that the execution, delivery, and performance of this Contract has been duly authorized and signed by a person who meets statutory or other binding approval to sign on behalf that respective Party.
- 5.07 **AGREEMENT TO INDEMNIFY AND SAVE HARMLESS.** KKFD agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City of Appleton officers, officials, employees and agents from and against any and all liability, loss, damage, expenses, costs, including attorney's fees, arising out of the activities performed as described herein, caused in whole or in part by any negligent act or omission of the KKFD, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone whose acts any of them may be liable, except where caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City of Appleton.

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Article 1 Assurances, Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, Representations and Certifications

I.
