Executive Summary:

This is an owner-requested annexation of approximately 71.23 acres located off Shipp Springs Road. The proposed zoning for the annexation site is the R-3, Low Density Apartment District. The purpose of the annexation is to accommodate development of 581 proposed residential units on the site (281 single family units and 300 apartment units). It should be noted that the Planning Commission considered this annexation during the same February 2023 meeting that they also considered the preliminary development plans for the development that will occur inside this annexation area. No opposition was received to annexation of the site itself. Lots of opposing comments were received by the Planning Commission about the proposed development plans for the site. During their February 2023 regular meeting, the Kingsport Regional Planning Commission voted to send a favorable recommendation for the annexation, zoning, and plan of services to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen by a vote of 5-0. The notice of public hearing was published on February 20, 2023.

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

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A PLAN OF SERVICES FOR THE SHIPP SPRINGS ANNEXATION OF THE CITY OF KINGSPORT, TENNESSEE

WHEREAS, before any territories may be annexed under Tennessee Code Annotated §6-51-102, the governing body shall have previously adopted a plan of services setting forth the identification and timing of municipal services; and

WHEREAS, before any such plan of services shall have been adopted, it must have been submitted to the local planning commission for study and a written report; and

WHEREAS, a plan of services for the proposed Shipp Springs annexation was submitted to the Kingsport Regional Planning Commission on February 16, 2023, for its consideration and a written report; and

WHEREAS, prior to the adoption of a plan of services, the City shall hold a public hearing; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held March 7, 2023; and

WHEREAS, notice of the time and place of the public hearing shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the municipality a minimum of fifteen (15) days prior to the hearing; and

WHEREAS, notice of the time and place of the public hearing was published in the Kingsport Times-News on February 20, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the City of Kingsport, pursuant to the provisions of Tennessee Code Annotated, §6-51-102 has endeavored to annex a portion of the 11th Civil District of Sullivan County, Tennessee, commonly known as the Shipp Springs Annexation, said area being bounded and further described as follows:

AND WHEREAS, the City of Kingsport deems it advisable to adopt a Plan of Services for the proposed annexation area. Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF KINGSPORT, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I. That a Plan of Services for the Shipp Springs Annexation as bounded and described above is hereby adopted, subject to an enactment of an annexation resolution for the annexation area, the said Plan of Services to be as follows:

Shipp Springs Plan of Services

1. Police Protection

- A. On the date of annexation the Kingsport Police Department will respond to all calls for service for police protection, including criminal calls, traffic accidents and traffic related occurrences, and other prevention and interdiction calls for service.
- B. Effective with annexation, all resources currently available within the Kingsport Police Department will become available to the citizens of the area. The Kingsport Police Department has an authorized accredited force of 119 police officers and approximately 43 civilian personnel to provide services 24-hours per day, 365 days a year.
- C. The Kingsport Police Department is accredited with the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies and has met 363 mandatory and 54 other-than mandatory standards in order to attain this status. Kingsport Police Department was only the third accredited department in the State of Tennessee and the first in northeast Tennessee.
- D. Upon annexation, existing police department personnel will be utilized to provide services by expanding the contiguous patrol sections to include the newly incorporated area. Existing police personnel and equipment will be shifted to provide needed coverage of the area. Each section will be patrolled by units of the Kingsport Police Department and will be augmented by other departments and units such as investigators, specialized assigned details etc.
- E. When needed, the Kingsport Police Department will hire additional police officers to provide more response to annexed areas. The officers will undergo 500 hours of

basic recruit training before being certified as a police officer. Upon completion of the classroom training, the officers will undergo 696 hours of field officer training where they will work and be trained by designated training officers.

- F. The Kingsport Police Department will provide upon request crime prevention programs, traffic safety education programs, drug education/awareness programs to the citizens of the area. Additional programs include department personnel to address groups on law enforcement topics or concerns, home and business security checks and establishing and maintaining neighborhood watch programs.
- G. The Kingsport Police Department currently maintains an approximate 3 minute and 7 second average response time to emergency and urgent calls within the corporate limits.

2. Fire Protection

- A. On the operative date of annexation, the City of Kingsport will answer all calls for service for fire, disaster, hazardous materials, special rescue and medical first responder. The Kingsport Fire Department goes beyond the basic fire services required of a City Government.
- B. Free fire safety inspections will be available upon request on the effective date of annexation. Water lines will be upgraded within five (5) years after the effective date of annexation to provide needed fire flow to protect the properties.
- C. All structures must be brought into compliance with the City-wide smoke detector ordinance within thirty (30) days of the effective date of annexation. This is strictly to provide residents with the best fire protection service available.
- D. The City of Kingsport Fire Department has a Hazardous Materials Response Team, which has state-of-the-art equipment to handle all calls of an emergency nature dealing with incidents relating to hazardous chemicals. The department also has a Technical Rescue Team that has specialized rescue capabilities and equipment for all types of hazards.
- E. The City of Kingsport Fire Department provides First Responder emergency medical services to all life-threatening medical emergencies resulting from serious illness or injury. We provide advanced life support (paramedics) for victims until ambulance service arrives for transport.

3. Water

- A. City of Kingsport water serves the annexation site. Water will be billed at in City rates rather than out of City rates, which will result in a reduction in water rates for annexed citizens already receiving City water. Those not currently receiving City water will be required to obtain a water-tap in order to obtain City water.
- B. The City of Kingsport Water Department meets or exceeds water quality standards set forth by the State of Tennessee and the United States Environmental Protection Agency. The plant has been the recipient of the EPA Partnership for Safe Drinking Water award for nine consecutive years.
- C. The Water Distribution Division is managed with a professional staff who are members of key professional organizations such as: American Water Works Association, Tennessee Association of Utility Districts, National Society of Professional Engineers, American Society of Civil Engineers. Several key members of the staff also hold certificates and licenses in the operations of a distribution system in the State of Tennessee.

4. Electricity

Electric service in this area is currently under the jurisdiction of American Electric Power and is currently available.

5. Sanitary Sewer

- A. City of Kingsport sanitary sewer serves the annexation site. Sewer will be billed at in City rates rather than out of City rates, which will result in a reduction in sewer rates for annexed citizens already receiving City sewer. Those not currently receiving City sewer will be required to obtain a sewer-tap in order to obtain City sewer.
- B. Sanitary sewer fees are based on usage of water and are direct reflection of the amount of water used by the resident.
- C. The City of Kingsport operates and maintains a 12.4 MGD wastewater treatment plant, 88 sewer lift stations and approximately 525 miles of sanitary sewer collection lines to provide sewer service to our customers.

- D. The City of Kingsport Wastewater Treatment Plant recently experienced over 21 million dollars of improvements to provide a reliable and dependable infrastructure.
- E. The wastewater treatment plant is staffed with State Certified Operators 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Treatment plant operators exceed State of Tennessee training requirements, and the Wastewater Treatment Plant is the recipient of multiple operations excellence awards.
- F. The Sewer Collection Division is managed with a professional staff who are members of key professional organizations such as: Water Environment Federation, Tennessee Association of Utility Districts, National Society of Professional Engineers, American Society of Civil Engineers. Several key members of the staff also hold certificates and licenses in the operations of a collection system in the State of Tennessee.

6. Solid Waste Disposal

Sanitation garbage (routine household refuse), and trash (grass clippings, tree trimmings, bulky items) collection will be provided to the annexed area on the same basis as that received by properties located within the existing City Limits. Collection will begin within thirty (30) days following the effective date of annexation. Members of the collection crews receive ongoing training in their fields. The City of Kingsport also owns and operates a demolition landfill that residents can use for a fee. That landfill is supervised by a SWANA certified Manager of Landfill Operations. This supervisor also holds other certifications from SWANA and TDEC.

7. Public Road/Street Construction & Repair

- A. Emergency and routine maintenance of streets and street signs, pavement markings and other traffic control devices will begin on the operative date of annexation. Emergency pothole repairs are generally made within 24 hours of notification. Crews are available on a 24 hour basis for major emergency call-outs.
- 3. Cleaning of streets of snow and ice clearing will begin on the operative date of annexation on the same basis as now provided within the present City limits. This includes major thoroughfares, State highways and emergency route to hospitals as first priority, with secondary/collector streets and finally residential streets in that order as priority II. Snow removal crews receive yearly training to help keep them up to date with changes in procedures and techniques. Snow removal crews also respond on a 24 hour emergency call in basis.

- C. Streets affected by utility construction will be repaired as soon as possible after the utility construction is completed.
- D. Routine Right of Way maintenance is also provided on the effective date of annexation. Tasks include Mowing, Tree Maintenance and Weed Control by certified personnel as needed to respond to routine maintenance requests and emergencies.
- E. The Streets and Sanitation Division is managed and supervised by a professional staff who are members in good standing of several Professional Organizations such as the Tennessee Chapter of the American Public Works Association, the national chapter of the American Public Works Association, the Volunteer Chapter of the Solid Waste Association of North America, the national chapter of the Solid Waste Association of North America, the Tennessee Urban Forestry Council, the Tennessee Nursery and Landscape Association, National Arbor Day Association, Tennessee Vegetation Management Association, and the Keep Kingsport Beautiful Council. The staff receives ongoing training through these Professional Organizations. Members of the staff are active in their respective organizations. Members of the staff also serve as trainers and instructors for various training venues.

8. Recreational Facilities

- A. Residents of the annexed area may use existing City recreational facilities, programs, parks, etc. on the effective date of annexation at City rates rather than out of City rates.
- B. Residents of the annexed area may use all existing library facilities and will be exempt from the non-residential fee on the effective date of annexation.
- C. Residents of the annexed area (50 years or older) will be eligible to use the Senior Citizens Center with no non-residential fees and with transportation provided on the effective date of annexation.
- D. The Department of Parks and Recreation has more than 4,800 acres of city-owned land to provide parks and recreation programs to all our citizens. The amenities and programs offered by many of the parks and recreation areas through the Leisure Services Department include playing fields for baseball and softball, basketball courts, play grounds, volley ball, tennis courts, a skate park and concession areas and restrooms to serve these facilities. Other amenities offered include General meeting areas, multi-function areas, Community Centers, senior programs, Theater

and Cultural Arts programs. Many of the parks have walking and hiking trails and Bays Mountain, the City's largest park, includes animal habitats, a farm area, camping sites, and a Planetarium.

9. Street Lighting

Within five years of the operative date of annexation the City will take over responsibility (including payment) for dusk-to-dawn lights presently in place that meet City standards. The City will <u>request</u> that AEP install additional streetlights on collector-class and lower streets in accordance with the policy on roadway lighting within five (5) years of the effective date of annexation.

10. Zoning Services

- A. The area will be zoned R-3 (Low Density Apartment District).
- B. The Kingsport Regional Planning Commission is the comprehensive planning agency and administers zoning and land subdivision regulations for the City of Kingsport as provided in State law. The Kingsport Regional Planning Commission consists of nine (9) commissioners appointed by the Mayor of the City of Kingsport.
- C. The Kingsport Regional Planning Commission will exercise planning and zoning activities for the area being annexed upon the operative date of annexation.
- D. Appeals to the Zoning regulations are heard by the Board of Zoning Appeals and variances are granted if the request meets the criteria established for granting variances under Tennessee Code Annotated.

11. Schools

- A. Upon annexation, children currently attending County schools will be allowed to attend City of Kingsport schools or remain in County schools per the prevailing County policy at the time.
- Tuition paid by non-city residents now attending City schools will cease upon the
 effective date of annexation and those students may continue to attend City schools
 without charge until graduation.

The previous sections are titled and listed in the order prescribed by Tennessee Code Annotated 6-51-102(b) (2). The following sections are provided by the City of Kingsport in addition to the minimum requirements.

12. <u>Traffic Control</u>

The City will verify all street name signs and traffic control devices in accordance with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices.

13. Inspection Services

All inspection services now provided by the City on a fee basis (building, electrical, plumbing, gas, housing, sanitation, etc.) will begin in the annexed area on the effective date of annexation. A free safety inspection of plumbing vents will be required at the time sewer connections are made to make sure that proper protection is available to prevent sewer gas from entering houses.

14. Animal Control

Animal control service equivalent to that presently provided within the City will be extended to the annexed area on the effective date of annexation.

15. Storm Sewers

Maintenance of existing storm sewer systems within the public ROW is provided on an as needed basis. Response to emergency storm drainage calls is also provided on a 24 hour call in basis.

16. Leaf Removal

The City will collect loose leaves with the vacuum truck between October 15 and January 15, and it will be provided to the annexation area on the same basis as it is currently provided to other City residents beginning on the effective date of annexation. Bagged leaves are collected year round. Leaves are transported to the City's Demolition Landfill where they are composted and used as an amendment to existing dirt stockpiles. This enhanced dirt is then used on City Projects for backfill and topsoil applications.

17. Litter Control

The City's litter control program will be extended to the area on the effective date of annexation. It is provided on a regular schedule along major routes and on an "as needed" basis throughout the City.

18. Graffiti Control

The City's graffiti control program, which is aimed at eliminating graffiti on public rights-of-way such as bridge abutments, street signs, railroad underpasses, and the like, will be extended to the area on the effective date of annexation. It is provided on an "as needed/on call" basis. Response time for "offensive" graffiti removal is generally within 48 hours.

19. Other Services

All other services not classified under the foregoing headings such as Executive, Judicial, Legal, Personnel, Risk Management, Fleet Maintenance, Finance and Administration and other support services will be available upon the effective date of annexation.

SECTION II. This Resolution shall take effect on May 8, 2023, the public welfare requiring it.

Planning Department Recommendation

RECOMMENDATION: APPROVAL to recommend the Annexation, Zoning, and Plan of Services to the BMA

The Kingsport Planning Division recommends approval for the following reasons:

- The City of Kingsport should utilize annexation as urban development occurs and is necessary for present and future growth in an orderly manner.
- It is reasonably necessary for the welfare of the residents and property owners of the affected territory.
- The City of Kingsport can provide services through its Plan of Services that the County cannot provide to the area.





Executive Summary:

This resolution approves an amendment to the agreement with the Kingsport Housing and Redevelopment Authority to extend the completion date for the development of Riverbend Park from February 28, 2023 to July 31, 2023.

The TIF agreement for the Riverbend Redevelopment District was created in 2015 and included a provision for monies to support improvement of the donated park property along the riverfront. Of the \$2 million TIF incentive, \$666,667 was set aside for future improvement of Riverbend Park. The TIF agreement required a Redevelopment Agreement be entered into between the City and KHRA.

The original agreement was approved by the KHRA board in October 2016. The agreement requires that the city complete construction of the project in accordance with an approved Site Plan.

An amendment was approved in June 2020 (Res. 2020-203) to extend the completion date to November 23, 2022. The second amendment was approved on October 18, 2022 (Res. 2023-091) to extend the completion date to March 31, 2022. <u>Construction should be complete by the beginning of fiscal 24</u>. This project was initially delayed due to COVID as well as permitting requirements due to the proximity of the South Fork of the Holston River.

The third amendment proposes to extend the date of completion to July 31, 2023. This revision will be considered by the KHRA Board at their February 27th meeting.

The contractor has requested an extension to the contract time for the above referenced project. Due to site conditions encountered during construction, the project has required some reevaluation and re-design to address unforeseen conditions including rock and sandy soils. The redesign efforts have required geotechnical input as well as direction from the floating pier manufacturer. Barge has been trying to coordinate with the pier manufacturer since September 2022 to resolve the pier redesign and are still awaiting calculations to finalize the new foundation design. Our understanding is that the manufacturer will have calculations to us this week. This delay in receiving information has impacted the construction schedule and thus is necessitating the request for a contract time extension.



This form had to be submitted with the agencies application which again was due before March 1st, 2023. The Mayor executed the certification form for each of these agencies on February 24th, 2023 and his execution thereof needs to be ratified by the board.

Supplemental Information

The Family Promise of Greater Kingsport of Greater Kingsport

Family Promise of Greater Kingsport is a self-sufficiency program for homeless families with minor children. Social workers assist the families in looking for employment, housing, transportation and all other needs so that the families may become self-sufficient. Family Promise of Greater Kingsport offers shelter, meals and supportive services. The Family Promise of Greater Kingsport shelter can accommodate up to 14 families and is located at 601 Holston Street in Kingsport. Family Promise of Greater Kingsport is the only shelter in Kingsport that can accommodate two-parent families, families with teenaged boys and single fathers with teenage girls. Families staying in the shelter actively seek employment, while working on a plan to regain their independence. Family Promise of Greater Kingsport will use ESG 2023 to continue its shelters operations and support services.

The Greater Kingsport Alliance for Development (GKAD)

GKAD was founded in 1989 to provide housing opportunities and services to low-income individuals and families in the greater Kingsport area. Today, GKAD houses low-income individuals and families in scattered-site units in and around Kingsport. It also owns a 24-unit apartment complex, Green Valley Manor, which provides housing for 24 individuals who receive supportive services through Frontier Health. GKAD also owns and operates two supportive living homes in Kingsport for intellectually challenged adults. The low-income intellectually challenged adults living here receive 24-hour care through Frontier Health. For several years, GKAD has administered Emergency Solutions Grant funding to help those experiencing homelessness and will use ESG 2023 funding for two homeless street outreach coordinators and operate three units at Green Valley for shelter operations and transitional housing.

The Salvation Army of Kingsport

The Salvation Army assists in meeting the needs of individuals and families experiencing homelessness and those at-risk of being homeless. Services provided by the Salvation Army include emergency rental and utility assistance, soup kitchen, food pantry, clothing and household voucher, temporary emergency shelter, white flag, youth character building, community care, and Christmas programs and referrals. Executive Summary:

Community Development staff seeks authorization to apply for the Emergency Solutions Grant through the Tennessee Housing Development Agency. The Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) is funded by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) specifically to address homelessness. Since, the City of Kingsport employs a homeless outreach worker whose role is designed to assist in homeless prevention, street outreach and re-housing; an application for ESG funds will be submitted to support the role of the Homeless Outreach Social Worker. The city has successfully administered ESG funding in the past. The grant request will be for \$50,000 and carries a dollar-for-dollar match requirement. Salaries of existing employees can be used to meet the in-kind match. The goal is to meet the homeless population where they are, develop relationships and provide needed services and/or referrals. Each ESG service element is designed for collective impact with each Continuum of Care (CoC). Each element of the grant request will impact our community and help assist those who are currently experiencing homelessness or at-risk for homelessness.

ESG Description:

The ESG Program in Tennessee is governed by Title 24 Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 91 and 576 (ESG Regulations) and this Program Description. ESG Regulations are incorporated by reference in this Program Description. In cases of conflicting requirements, the more stringent requirement will apply. The objectives of the ESG program are:

- 1. Reduce the length of time program participants experience homelessness;
- 2. Exit program participants to permanent housing;
- 3. Limit returns to homelessness one year after exiting the program; and,
- 4. Based on the activity, all ESG resources must be used to benefit individuals who are defined by HUD as "homeless" in the ESG Regulations.

ELIGIBLE ACTIVITES:

Street Outreach: Essential services to eligible participants provided on the street or in parks, abandoned buildings, bus stations, campgrounds, and in other such settings where unsheltered persons are staying. Staff salaries related to carrying out street outreach are also eligible.

Prevention Activities: Activities related to preventing persons from becoming homeless and to assist participants in regaining stability in their current or other permanent housing.

Rapid Rehousing Activities: Activities related to help a homeless individual or family to move into permanent housing
