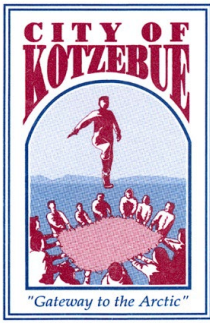

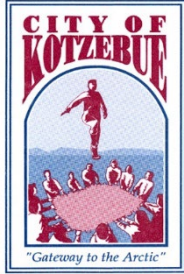

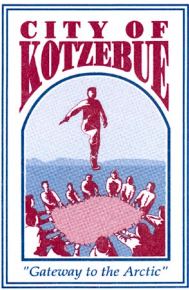

Audit Overview & Strategy



Overview

Our audit strategy follows a risk-based approach, so that our audit work, including the nature, timing and extent of audit procedures planned, is focused on the areas of the financial statements where the risk of material misstatement is assessed to be significant as well as other areas of the financial statements where we have identified risks of material misstatement.

In preparation for our audit, we have discussed with the City Council, management and internal audit significant matters including, but not limited to, market conditions, activities, and changes to the City's business, systems, accounting principles and controls, and obtained management's view of potential audit risk in order to update our understanding of the City. This is important to our identification and assessment of risks of material misstatement to the financial statements and related disclosures.

Key components of our audit objectives and strategy are highlighted within this report.

We will continue to update the resulting assessment throughout the audit. We will communicate to you any significant changes to the planned audit strategy or the significant risks initially identified and communicated herein, and the reason for such changes, as applicable, when we present the results of our audit upon completion.



Terms of the Audit and Independence

AUDITOR'S RESPONSIBILITY

BDO USA, P.C., as your auditor, is responsible for forming and expressing an opinion about whether the financial statements that have been prepared by management, with your oversight, are prepared, in all material respects, in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework. We are also responsible for expressing an in relation to opinion on the schedule of expenditures of federal awards (SEFA) that has been prepared by management, with your oversight, is prepared in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*. Our audit will be conducted in accordance with standards for financial audits contained in the *Government Auditing Standards* (GAS or Yellow Book) issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our audit will also be performed in accordance with Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements of Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance) for forming and expressing an opinion on compliance.

The audits do not relieve you of your responsibilities and do not relieve management of their responsibilities.

INDEPENDENCE

- ▶ Our engagement letter to you dated May 13, 2025 describes our responsibilities in accordance with professional standards and certain regulatory authorities and *Government Auditing Standards* regarding independence and the performance of our services. This letter also stipulates the responsibilities of the City with respect to independence as agreed to by the City. Please refer to that letter for further information.

TERMS OF THE AUDIT

Our establishment and understanding of the terms of the audit engagement have been documented in our annual engagement letter, which was provided to you on Mat 13, 2025, and includes the objectives of the audit along with the responsibilities of both the auditor and of management for your reference.

- ▶ We will plan and perform the audit of the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2024 in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*.
- ▶ We will plan and perform the audit of the SEFA for the year ended December 31, 2024 in accordance with GAS and will issue an in relation to opinion.
- ▶ We will perform tests of compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions is not an objective of our audit.
- ▶ We will consider the City's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with GAS and the Uniform Guidance.

Determining Our Planned Audit Strategy

We focus on areas with higher risk of material misstatement to the financial statements, whether due to error or fraud.

In addition, *Government Auditing Standards* require that we also plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the City has complied with applicable laws, regulations and the terms and conditions of the federal awards that may have a direct and material effect on each of the City's major federal programs.

Our audit strategy includes consideration of the following:

- ▶ Prior year audit results including discussions with management and those charged with governance regarding the City's operations and risks.
- ▶ Inherent risk within the City (i.e., the susceptibility of the financial statements to material error or fraud) without regard to the effect of controls.
- ▶ A continual assessment of materiality thresholds based upon qualitative and quantitative factors affecting the City.
- ▶ Recent developments within the industry, regulatory environment, and general economic conditions.
- ▶ Recently issued and effective accounting and financial reporting guidance.
- ▶ The City's significant and critical accounting policies and procedures, including those requiring significant management judgments and estimates and those related to significant unusual transactions.
- ▶ The control environment, risk management and monitoring activities, and the possibility that internal controls may fail to prevent or detect a material misstatement due to error or fraud. In connection with our audit, we will obtain a sufficient understanding of the City's internal control to plan the audit of the financial statements. However, such understanding is required for the purposes of determining our audit procedures and not to provide any assurance concerning such internal control.
- ▶ The use of information systems and service organizations in the financial reporting process and overall IT environment.
- ▶ Extent to which we plan to use others, outside the core engagement team, to perform certain planned audit procedures or evaluate audit results related to significant risks that may require specialized skills or knowledge.
- ▶ We will consider the City's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing audit procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the City's effectiveness of internal control.
- ▶ Internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance.

Detail of Significant Risks & Additional Audit Considerations



Areas of Significant Risk

Our areas of significant risk, which are risks with both a higher likelihood of occurrence and a higher magnitude of effect that require special audit considerations, are as follows.

Based upon our initial assessment, our planned scope for the audit is described below:

- ▶ The areas indicated below relate to significant risks identified during our risk assessment procedures:
 - Fraud Risk and Management Override of Internal Controls
 - Risks relating to management exercising undue influence to override internal control policies and procedures designed to deter, prevent, and detect misstatements due to fraud.
 - Substantive procedures will be performed addressing manual journal entries prepared by management, management's use of significant accounting estimates (if any), and significant unusual transactions occurring during the fiscal year.
- ▶ Risks related to revenue recognition and the existence of revenue
 - Substantive procedures will be performed to ensure documentation is complete, accurate, and appropriately supports revenue recognition and the existence of revenue for the City's grant revenue stream.

Other Topics



BDO's System of Quality Management

An audit firm's effective system of quality management ("SoQM") is crucial for supporting the consistent performance of high-quality audits and reviews of financial statements, or other assurance or related services engagements under professional standards, and applicable legal and regulatory requirements.

Accordingly, BDO has implemented a SoQM designed to provide reasonable assurance that its professionals fulfill their responsibilities and conduct engagements in accordance with those standards and requirements. The firm's SoQM supports the consistent performance of quality audits through many ongoing activities including, at least annually, certification by leaders with responsibility for key controls and related processes. Our Assurance Quality Management team performs regular reviews and testing of key controls and processes throughout the SoQM and identifies and communicates areas for improvement. In addition, our Audit Quality Advisory Council supports our SoQM by providing guidance and input on audit quality initiatives.

As required by International Standard on Quality Management 1 (ISQM 1) under the International Auditing and Assurance Standards Board (IAASB), BDO has conducted an evaluation of the effectiveness of its system of quality management and concluded, as of July 31, 2024, that, except for certain deficiencies related to the execution of its issuer audits, that system provides the reasonable assurance that our professionals will perform audits and reviews of financial statements or related assurance services engagements in accordance with professional standards, and applicable legal and regulatory requirements. BDO has either implemented or is designing remedial actions to address those deficiencies prior to our next evaluation.

Implementation of New GASB Standards



GASB Statement No. 100, Accounting Changes and Error Corrections
an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62

Section XI, Item c)

Effective Dates	Date per Pronouncement
	Fiscal Years Beginning After 6/15/2023

- ▶ This Statement defines accounting changes as changes in accounting principles, changes in accounting estimates, and changes to or within the financial reporting entity and describes the transactions or other events that constitute those changes.
- ▶ As part of those descriptions, for (1) certain changes in accounting principles and (2) certain changes in accounting estimates that result from a change in measurement methodology, a new principle or methodology should be justified on the basis that it is preferable to the principle or methodology used before the change. That preferability should be based on the qualitative characteristics of financial reporting—understandability, reliability, relevance, timeliness, consistency, and comparability.
- ▶ This Statement also addresses corrections of errors in previously issued financial statements.
- ▶ This Statement requires that:
 - changes in accounting principles and error corrections be reported retroactively by restating prior periods,
 - changes to or within the financial reporting entity be reported by adjusting beginning balances of the current period, and
 - changes in accounting estimates be reported prospectively by recognizing the change in the current period.
- ▶ The requirements of this Statement for changes in accounting principles apply to the implementation of a new pronouncement in absence of specific transition provisions in the new pronouncement.
- ▶ Statement No. 100 requires that the aggregate amount of adjustments to and restatements of beginning net position, fund balance, or fund net position, as applicable, be displayed by reporting unit in the financial statements.
- ▶ This Statement requires disclosure in notes to financial statements of descriptive information about accounting changes and error corrections, such as their nature. In addition, information about the quantitative effects on beginning balances of each accounting change and error correction should be disclosed by reporting unit in a tabular format to reconcile beginning balances as previously reported to beginning balances as restated.
- ▶ Statement No. 100 also addresses how information that is affected by a change in accounting principle or error correction should be presented in required supplementary information (RSI) and supplementary information (SI). For periods that are earlier than those included in the basic financial statements, information presented in RSI or SI should be restated for error corrections, if practicable, but not for changes in accounting principles.

GASB Statement No. 101, *Compensated Absences*

Effective Dates	Date per Pronouncement
	Fiscal Years Beginning After 12/15/2023

- ▶ This Statement requires that liabilities for compensated absences be recognized for leave that as not been used and leave that has been used but not yet paid in cash or settled through noncash means.
- ▶ Requires recognition of a liability for leave that has not been used if:
 - the leave is attributable to services already rendered,
 - the leave accumulates, and
 - the leave is more likely than not to be used for time off or otherwise paid in cash or settled through noncash means.
- ▶ Leave that is more likely than not to be settled through conversion to defined benefit postemployment benefits should not be included in a liability for compensated absences.
- ▶ Statement No. 101 requires that a liability for certain types of compensated absences, including parental leave, military leave, and jury duty leave, not be recognized until the leave commences.
- ▶ In addition, this Statement requires that for specific types of compensated absences, a liability not be recognized until the leave is used.
- ▶ This Statement also establishes guidance for measuring a liability for leave that has not been used, generally using an employee’s pay rate as of the date of the financial statements. A liability for leave that has been used but not yet paid or settled should be measured at the amount of the cash payment or noncash settlement to be made. Certain salary-related payments that are directly and incrementally associated with payments for leave also should be included in the measurement of the liabilities.
- ▶ With respect to financial statements prepared using the current financial resources measurement focus, Statement No. 101 requires that expenditures be recognized for the amount that normally would be liquidated with expendable available financial resources.
- ▶ Statement No. 101 amends the existing requirement to disclose the gross increases and decreases in a liability for compensated absences to allow governments to disclose only the net change in the liability (as long as they identify it as a net change). In addition, governments are no longer required to disclose which governmental funds typically have been used to liquidate the liability for compensated absences.

GASB Statement No. 102, *Certain Risk Disclosures*

Effective Dates	Date per Pronouncement
	Fiscal Years Beginning After 6/15/2024

- ▶ The objective of this Statement is to provide users of government financial statements with essential information about risks related to a government’s vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations or constraints.
- ▶ Statement No. 102 defines a *concentration* as a lack of diversity related to an aspect of a significant inflow of resources or outflow of resources.
- ▶ Statement No. 102 defines a *constraint* as a limitation imposed on a government by an external party or by formal action of the government’s highest level of decision-making authority.
- ▶ Requires a government to assess:
 - whether a concentration or constraint is known to the government prior to the issuance of the financial statements,
 - whether a concentration or constraint makes the primary government reporting unit or other reporting units that report a liability for revenue debt vulnerable to the risk of a substantial impact and
 - whether event or events associated with a concentration or constraint that could cause the substantial impact have occurred, have begun to occur, or are more likely than not to begin to occur within 12 months of the date the financial statements are issued.
- ▶ For items meeting the above criteria, required disclosures include descriptions of:
 - the concentration or constraint,
 - each event associated with the concentration or constraint that could cause a substantial impact if the event had occurred or had begun to occur prior to the issuance of the financial statements, and
 - Actions taken by the government prior to the issuance of the financial statements to mitigate the risk.

We have audited the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of City of Kotzebue, Alaska, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise City of Kotzebue, Alaska's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, except for the effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified and Unmodified Opinions section of our report, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Business-Type Activities and the Package Store Enterprise Fund of City of Kotzebue, Alaska, as of December 31, 2023, and the changes in financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Unmodified Opinions on Governmental Activities, General Fund, Water and Sewer Enterprise Fund, Refuse Enterprise Fund, Bar and Grill Enterprise Fund, and Aggregate Remaining Fund Information

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the Governmental Activities, General Fund, Water and Sewer Enterprise Fund, Refuse Enterprise Fund, Bar and Grill Enterprise Fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of City of Kotzebue, Alaska, as of December 31, 2023, and the respective changes in financial position and, where applicable, cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Qualified and Unmodified Opinions

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the City and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified and unmodified audit opinions.

Matter Giving Rise to Qualified Opinions on Business-Type Activities and Package Store Enterprise Fund

We did not observe the taking of physical inventory as of December 31, 2023 (stated at \$649,637). We were unable to satisfy ourselves about inventory quantities by means of other auditing procedures. Consequently, we were unable to determine whether any adjustments to this amount or to the amount of cost of sales (stated at \$1,214,970 for the year ended December 31, 2023) were necessary.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about City of Kotzebue, Alaska's ability to continue as a going for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinions. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of City of Kotzebue, Alaska's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about City of Kotzebue, Alaska's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that budgetary comparison information on page 49, and the Schedules of Net Pension and Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB) Liability (Assets) and Pension and OPEB Contributions on pages 50-51, be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Management has omitted management's discussion and analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinions on the basic financial statements are not affected by this missing information.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the City's basic financial statements. The combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules year ended December 31, 2023 and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by *Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2023, and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the *combining and individual fund financial statements and schedules, and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards* are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole for the year ended December 31, 2023.

We also previously audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the basic financial statements of City of Kotzebue as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022, and have issued our report thereon dated September 29, 2023, which contained unmodified opinions on the respective financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information. The individual fund financial statements and schedules for the year ended December 31, 2022, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the 2022 financial statements. The individual fund financial statements have been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the 2022 basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare those basic financial statements or to those basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the individual fund financial statements and schedules are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole for the year ended December 31, 2022.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 30, 2024 on our consideration of City of Kotzebue, Alaska's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. Notes to Basic Financial Statements
Year Ended December 31, 2023

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Reporting City

City of Kotzebue, Alaska (the City) was incorporated on October 14, 1958. The City operates under a Council-Manager form of government and provides a full range of services including public safety, streets, sanitation, water and sewer, health and social services, culture and recreation, public improvements, planning and zoning, and general administrative services.

The financial statements included in this report are for City of Kotzebue, Alaska only. There are no other component units for which City of Kotzebue, Alaska is financially accountable, nor do any special financial relationships exist between the City and any other City.

The accounting policies of the City conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies:

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the statement of net position and the statement of activities) report information on all of the activities of the City. In general, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements to minimize the double-counting of internal activities. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from *business-type activities*, which rely primarily on fees and charges to external parties.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segments are offset by program revenues. *Direct expenses* are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. *Program revenues* include 1) fees, fines and charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use, or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as *general revenues*.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and proprietary funds. Major individual governmental funds and major individual enterprise funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting, and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the *accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of the related cash flows. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the current financial resources measurement focus and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be *available* when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the City considers all revenues except reimbursement grants to be available if they are collected within 60 days after year end. Reimbursement grants are considered available if they are collected within one year of the end of the current fiscal period. Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to accrued leave are recorded only to the extent they have matured.

Sales taxes, charges for services, and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. Most other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when received by the government.

The City reports the following major funds:

Major Governmental Funds

The *General Fund* is the City's primary operating fund. It accounts for all financial resources of the general government, except those required to be reported in another fund.

Major Proprietary Funds

The *Water and Sewer Utility Enterprise Fund* is used to account for the operations of the City's water system and the wastewater utility.

The *Refuse Enterprise Fund* is used to account for the operations of the City's solid waste and landfill activities.

The *Package Store Enterprise Fund* is used to account for the operations of the City's liquor store activities.

As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been eliminated from the government-wide financial statements. Exceptions to this general rule are allocated administration fees and charges between the enterprise funds and the various other funds and departments. Elimination of these charges would distort the direct costs and program revenues reported for the various functions concerned.

Amounts reported as *program revenues* include 1) charges to customers or applicants for goods, services, or privileges provided, 2) operating grants and contributions, and 3) capital grants and contributions. Internally dedicated resources are reported as *general revenues* rather than as program revenues. In addition, general revenues include all taxes, investment income, and State of Alaska entitlement revenues.

Proprietary funds distinguish *operating* revenues and expenses from *nonoperating* items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the Enterprise Funds are charges to customers for sales and services. Operating expenses for the Enterprise Funds include the costs of sales and services, administrative expenses and depreciation on capital assets. All revenues and expenses not meeting this definition are reported as nonoperating revenues and expenses.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the proprietary funds consider all cash accounts to be cash and cash equivalents. The central treasury, which holds cash and investments, is used essentially as a cash management pool by each fund.

Inventory

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost or market in the proprietary funds. Cost is determined by the first-in, first-out method. The cost is recorded as an expense at the time individual inventory items are consumed.

Receivables and Payables

Activity between funds that are representative of lending/borrowing arrangements outstanding at the end of the year are referred to as either “due to/from other funds” (i.e., the current portion of interfund loans) or “advances to/from other funds” (i.e., the noncurrent portion of interfund loans). All other outstanding balances between funds are reported as “due to/from other funds.” Any residual balances outstanding between the governmental activities and business-type activities are reported in the government-wide financial statements as “internal balances.”

Grants and Other Intergovernmental Revenues

In applying the measurable and available concepts to grants and intergovernmental revenues, the legal and contractual requirements of the numerous individual programs are used as guidance. There are, however, essentially two types of these revenues. In one, monies must be expended on the specific purpose or project before any amounts are considered “earned”; therefore, revenues are recognized based on expenditures recorded. In the other, monies are virtually unrestricted as to purpose of expenditure and are usually revocable only for failure to comply with prescribed compliance requirements. These resources are reflected as revenues at the time of receipt or earlier if the measurable and available criteria are met.

Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the City has numerous transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services, construct assets, and service debt. The accompanying financial statements generally reflect such transactions as transfers. Operating subsidies are also recorded as transfers.

Accrued Leave

All full-time employees are eligible for paid personal leave. Accrued leave is recorded as an expense in the government-wide and proprietary fund financial statements. A liability for these amounts is reported in the governmental fund financial statements only if they have matured (e.g. the employee has terminated employment).

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Capital Assets

Capital assets, which include property, plant, and equipment, are reported in the applicable governmental or business-type activities columns in the government-wide financial statements. As a phase 3 government for GASB Statement 34 purposes, the City has recorded additions to infrastructure capital assets (e.g. roads, sidewalks, etc.) prospectively from the GASB Statement 34 implementation date, which was June 30, 2003. Capital assets are defined by the City as assets with an initial, individual cost of more than \$5,000 and an estimated useful life in excess of one year. Such assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if purchased or constructed. Donated capital assets are recorded at acquisition value. Acquisition value is the price that would be paid to acquire an asset with equivalent service potential in an orderly market transaction at the acquisition date.

Major outlays for capital assets and improvements are capitalized as projects are constructed. Interest incurred during the construction phase of capital assets of business-type activities is included as part of the capitalized value of the assets constructed. The costs of normal maintenance and repairs that do not add to the value of the asset or materially extend the useful life of the asset are not capitalized. Property, plant, and equipment of the City is depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings and improvements	25 - 40 years
Improvements other than buildings	10 - 25 years
Machinery and equipment	5 - 25 years

Long-term Debt

In the government-wide and the proprietary fund financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities, business-type activities, or proprietary fund type statement of net position.

Fund Balances

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report aggregate amounts for five classifications of fund balances based on the constraints imposed on the use of these resources. The nonspendable fund balance classification includes amounts that cannot be spent because they are either (a) not in spendable form - prepaid items or inventories; or (b) legally or contractually required to be maintained intact.

The spendable portion of fund balances comprises the remaining four classifications: restricted, committed, assigned, and unassigned.

Restricted Fund Balance - This classification reflects the constraints imposed on resources either (a) externally by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments; or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Committed Fund Balance - These amounts can only be used for specific purposes pursuant to constraints imposed by formal ordinances of the City Council - the government's highest level of decision-making authority. These committed amounts cannot be used for any other purpose unless the City Council removes the specified use by taking the same type of action imposing the commitment. This classification also includes contractual obligations to the extent that existing resources in the fund have been specifically committed for use in satisfying those contractual requirements.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Assigned Fund Balance - This classification reflects the amounts constrained by the City's "intent" to be used for specific purposes, but are neither restricted nor committed. The City Council and City Manager have the authority to assign amounts to be used for specific purposes. Assigned fund balances include all remaining amounts (except negative balances) that are reported in governmental funds, other than the General Fund, that are not classified as nonspendable and are neither restricted nor committed.

Unassigned Fund Balance - This fund balance is the residual classification for the General Fund. It is also used to report negative fund balances in other governmental funds.

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the City's policy to use externally restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources - committed, assigned, and unassigned - in order as needed.

Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts and other commitments for expenditures are recorded in order to reserve that portion of the applicable appropriation, is employed as an extension of formal budgetary integration in the General Fund and Special Revenue Funds. Any encumbrances outstanding at year end are reported as appropriate constraints of fund balances if they meet the definitions and criteria as outlined above.

Unearned Revenue

Amounts received from grantor agencies, which are restricted as to use and have not been expended for the intended use are shown as unearned revenue.

Pensions and Other Postemployment Benefits (OPEB)

All full-time permanent employees of the City participate in the Public Employees' Retirement System ("PERS") administered by the State of Alaska.

For purposes of measuring the net pension and net OPEB liability, deferred outflows of resources and deferred inflows of resources related to pensions and OPEB, and pension and OPEB expense, information about the fiduciary net position of the Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) and additions to/from PERS's fiduciary net position have been determined on the same basis as they are reported by PERS. For this purpose, benefit payments (including refunds of employee contributions) are recognized when due and payable in accordance with the benefit terms. Investments are reported at fair value.

Budgets and Budgetary Compliance

Kotzebue City Code requires that the City Manager prepare and submit a budget to the Council by November 1st of each year. The Council will hold public hearings on the budget and must adopt the budget and make the appropriation ordinance not later than December 15th. If the Council does not adopt a budget, the original budget submission shall become the budget. The City Council may amend the budget at any time, following the public hearing process. All appropriations lapse at year end, unless they have been expended or lawfully encumbered.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

2. Cash and Investments

The City of Kotzebue utilizes a central treasury that is available for use by all funds. Each fund's portion of the central treasury is displayed on the balance sheet as "Cash and investments", or in the case of "negative" cash, is included in "Due to other funds."

Investments***Investment Policy***

The City is authorized to invest in the following instruments. All securities purchased by the City and all other City investments must mature not later than the time indicated below, measured from the date of the City's investment transaction.

1. Obligations of, or obligations insured or guaranteed by the United States or an agency or instrumentality of the United States - up to ten (10) years.
2. Certificates of deposit and other deposits at banks and savings and loans associations - up to ten (10) years.
3. Federally insured deposits at banks and savings and loan associations - up to ten (10) years.
4. Bonds and notes which are issued by a State or political subdivision thereof, or pursuant to the Tribal Tax Statutes Act 26 U.S.C. Sec. 7871 and which are rated AA or higher by a nationally recognized rating service - up to ten (10) years.
5. Commercial paper issued by corporations and having the highest rating given by a nationally recognized rating service - two hundred seventy (270) days.
6. Bankers acceptances drawn on and accepted (a) at banks, all of whose debt issues are rated at least AA or its equivalent by a nationally recognized rating service or (b) if the bank is a subsidiary of one bank holding company, all of whose commercially held paper has the highest rating given by a nationally recognized rating service or whose debt issues meet the requirements in (a) above - one hundred eighty (180) days.

7. Money market mutual funds whose portfolio consists entirely of instruments - maturity date not applicable, which are U.S. government, or U.S. government guaranteed obligations, which have a constant net asset value.
8. Repurchase agreements, the securities underlying the agreement being any of the items listed in subsection 1 and 6 of this section which meet a margin requirement of 102%.
9. The Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool, made in accordance with terms of that Pool's "Common Investment Agreement."

Interest Rate Risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that changes in market interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. Generally, the longer the maturity of an investment, the greater the sensitivity of its fair value to changes in market interest rates.

The City of Kotzebue, Alaska's investments at December 31, 2023 consisted of nonnegotiable certificates of deposit and investment in the Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool (AMLIP), which are not subject to interest rate risk.

Fair Value Measurement

The City categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure the fair value of the asset. Level 1 inputs are quoted prices in active markets for identical assets; Level 2 inputs are significant other observable inputs; Level 3 inputs are significant unobservable inputs.

Cash and investments include \$393,275 invested in the Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool). The Pool was rated a principal stability rating of AAAM by Standard & Poor's (S&P). Stand-alone financial statements can be obtained by writing to the Alaska Permanent Capital Management Co., 900 West Fifth Avenue, Suite 601, Anchorage, Alaska 99501 or visiting www.amlip.org.

The City does not have any recurring fair value measurements as of December 31, 2023.

The City has investments in certificates of deposit totaling \$237,989 that are not held at fair value, but instead recorded at amortized cost as of December 31, 2023.

Alaska Statute (AS) 37.23 provides for regulatory oversight of the Pool. The Statute provides requirements regarding authorized investments and reporting. The Pool is incorporated in Alaska as a nonprofit corporation and reports to a board of directors. AS 37.23.050 requires retention of an investment manager. The manager is required to produce monthly disclosure statements for the Pool. An investment advisor monitors the performance of the investment manager to ensure compliance with investment policies. The Pool must maintain a dollar-weighted average maturity of 90 days or less, and only purchase instruments having remaining maturities of 397 days or less. The fair value of the investments in the Pool are reviewed monthly by an independent pricing service. The Pool meets the standards for reporting investments at amortized cost with regard to portfolio requirements including maturity, quality, diversification, liquidity and shadow price. There are no restrictions or limitations on withdrawals from the Pool. As of December 31, 2023, the fair value of the investments in the Pool approximates the amortized cost at which they are reported. The fair value of our investments in the Pool is the same as the value of our Pool units.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Credit Risk

Generally, credit risk is the risk that an issuer of an investment will not fulfill its obligation to the holder of the investment. This is measured by the assignment of a rating by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization.

Custodial Credit Risk

Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that, in the event of the failure of a depository financial institution, a government will not be able to recover deposits or will not be able to recover collateral securities that are in possession of an outside party. Of the bank balance at December 31, 2023, \$250,000 was covered by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC), \$6,869,713 was subject to a collateral agreement with the depository financial institutions and \$2,100,246 was not insured or collateralized.

3. Receivables

The City maintains accounts receivable balances of which a portion is reserved as an allowance for doubtful accounts. 8. Municipal Landfill Closure and Post Closure Liability

State and federal laws and regulations require the City to place a final cover on its landfill site when it stops accepting waste and to perform certain maintenance and monitoring functions at the site for 30 years after closure. Although closure and post closure care costs will be paid only near or after the date the landfill stops accepting waste, generally accepted accounting principles require that the City report a portion of these closure and post closure care costs each period based on landfill capacity used as of each balance sheet date.

Management estimates that one of the two existing cells are 100% full and the other cell is approximately 80% full. Cell one is fully capped. The \$338,614 reported as landfill closure liability at December 31, 2023 represents the estimated closing cost once the cell is at capacity. The remaining life of the cell currently being used is estimated to be approximately 23 years.

9. Pension and Other Postemployment Benefits Plan***(a) Defined Benefit (DB) Pension Plan******General Information About the Plan***

The City participates in the Alaska Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS). PERS is a cost-sharing multiple-employer plan which covers eligible State and local government employees, other than teachers. The Plan was established and is administered by the State of Alaska Department of Administration. Benefit and contribution provisions are established by State law and may be amended only by the State Legislature.

The Plan is included in an annual comprehensive financial report that includes financial statements and other required supplemental information. That report is available via the internet at <https://drb.alaska.gov/docs/reports/#pers>. Actuarial valuation reports, audited financial statements, and other detailed plan information are also available on this website.

The Plan provides for retirement, death and disability, and postemployment healthcare benefits. There are three tiers of employees, based on entry date. For all tiers within the Defined Benefit (DB) plan, full retirement benefits are generally calculated using a formula comprised of a multiplier times the average monthly salary (AMS) times the number of years of service. The multiplier is increased at longevity milestone markers for most employees. Peace/Fire employees accrue benefits at an accelerated rate. The tiers within the Plan establish differing criteria regarding normal retirement age, early retirement age, and the criteria for calculation of AMS, COLA adjustments, and other postemployment benefits (OPEB). A complete benefit comparison chart is available at the website noted above.

The PERS DB Plan was closed to new entrants effective July 1, 2006. New employees hired after that date participate in the PERS Defined Contribution (DC) Plan described later in these notes.

Historical Context and Special Funding Situation

In April 2008, the Alaska Legislature passed legislation converting the previously existing PERS plan from a DB agent-multiple-employer plan to a DB cost-sharing plan with an effective date of July 1, 2008. In connection with this conversion, the State of Alaska passed additional legislation which statutorily capped the employer contribution rate, established a state funded "on-behalf" contribution (subject to funding availability), and required that employer contributions be calculated against all PERS eligible wages, including wages paid to participants of the PERS Tier IV defined contribution plan described later in these notes. The Alaska Legislature has the power and authority to change the aforementioned statute through the legislative process.

Alaska Statute 39.35.280 requires the State of Alaska to contribute to the Plan an amount such that, when combined with the employer contribution, is sufficient to pay the Plan's past service liability contribution rate as adopted by the Alaska Retirement Management Board (ARM Board). As such, the Plan is considered to be in a special funding situation as defined by GASB, and management has recorded all pension related liabilities, deferred inflows/outflows of resources, and disclosures on this basis.

The City recorded the related on-behalf contributions as revenue and expense or expenditures as prescribed by GAAP, pursuant to the relevant basis of accounting based on fund type.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Employee Contribution Rates

Regular employees are required to contribute 6.75% of their annual covered salary. Peace officers and firefighters are required to contribute 7.50% of their annual covered salary.

Employer and Other Contribution Rates

There are several contribution rates associated with the pension contributions and related liabilities. These amounts are calculated on an annual basis.

Employer Effective Rate: This is the contractual employer pay-in rate. Under current legislation, the amount calculated for the statutory employer effective contribution rate is 22% on eligible wages. This 22% rate is calculated on all PERS participating wages, including those wages attributable to employees in the DC plan. Contributions derived from the DC employee payroll is referred to as the Defined Benefit Unfunded Liability or DBUL contribution.

ARM Board Adopted Rate: This is the rate formally adopted by the Alaska Retirement Management Board. This rate is actuarially determined and used to calculate annual Plan funding requirements, without regard to the statutory rate cap or the GASB accounting rate. Effective July 1, 2015, the Legislature requires the ARM Board to adopt employer contribution rates for past service liabilities using a level percent of pay method over a closed 25-year term which ends in 2039. This change results in lower ARM Board Rates than previously adopted.

State Contribution Rate: This is the rate paid in by the State as an on-behalf payment under the current statute. The statute requires the State to contribute, based on funding availability, an on-behalf amount equal to the difference between the ARM Board Rate and the Employer Effective Rate. In the governmental fund financial statements, on-behalf contribution amounts have been recognized as additional revenues and expenditures. In the proprietary funds and government-wide financial statements, the on-behalf amounts reflect revenue and expense only during the measurement period in which the Plan recognizes the payments, resulting in a significant timing difference between the cash transfers and revenue and expense recognition.

Alaska Statue 39.35.255(a) capped the employer rate at 22% with the State of Alaska making a nonemployer contribution for the difference between actuarially required contribution and the cap. For the period from January 1, 2023 to June 30, 2023 as well as the period July 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023, the employer rate was 22.00% for pension and 0.00% for ARHCT. The contribution requirements and the City are established and may be amended by the ARMB. Additionally, there is a Defined Benefit Unfunded Liability (DBUL) amount levied against the DCR Plan payroll. The DBUL amount is computed as the difference between (a) amount calculated for the statutory employer contribution rate of 22.00% on eligible salary less (b) total of the employer contribution for (1) defined contribution employer matching amount, (2) major medical, (3) occupational death and disability, and (4) health reimbursement arrangement. The difference is deposited based on an actuarial allocation into the defined benefit plan's pension and healthcare funds.

The total pension liability for the June 30, 2023 measurement date was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2022 rolled forward to June 30, 2023 and adjusted to reflect updated assumptions to calculate the net pension liability as of that date. The City's proportion of the net pension liability was based on a projection of the City's long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating entities, including the State, actuarially determined. At the June 30, 2023 measurement date, the City's proportion was 0.44861 percent, which was a(n) decrease (increase) of 0.2849 from its proportion measured as of June 30, 2022.

For the year ended December 31, 2023, the City recognized pension expense of \$1,251,922 and on-behalf revenue of \$149,195 for support provided by the State. The total pension liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of June 30, 2022, rolled forward to the measurement date of June 30, 2023. The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2022 actuarial valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2021, resulting in changes in actuarial assumptions effective for the June 30, 2022 actuarial valuation, which were adopted by the Board to better reflect expected future experience.

Long-Term Expected Rate of Return

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic rates of return, excluding the inflation component of 2.82%, for each major asset class included in the pension plan's target asset allocation as of June 30, 2023 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.25%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employer and State contributions will continue to follow the current funding policy, which meets State statutes. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Sensitivity of the Net Pension Liability to Changes in the Discount Rate

The following presents the City's proportionate share of the net pension liability calculated using the discount rate of 7.25%, as well as what the City's proportionate share of the net pension liability would be if it were calculated using a discount rate that is one percentage-point lower or one percentage-point higher than the current rate:

(b) Defined Contribution (DC) Pension Plan

Employees hired after July 1, 2006 participate in PERS Tier IV, a DC plan. This Plan is administered by the State of Alaska, Department of Administration in conjunction with the DB plan noted above. Benefit and contribution provisions are established by State law and may be amended only by the State Legislature. The Alaska Retirement Management Board may also amend contribution requirements. Included in the Plan are individual pension accounts, a retiree medical insurance plan and a separate Health Reimbursement Arrangement account that will help retired members pay medical premiums and other eligible medical expenses not covered by the medical plan. This Plan is included in the annual comprehensive financial report for PERS, and at the following website, as noted above. <https://drb.alaska.gov/docs/reports/#pers>.

Contributions to the DC plan consist solely of employer and employee contributions with no special funding or other nonemployer contributions. In addition, actual remittances to the PERS system require that the City contribute at 22%. After deducting the DC plan contributions (and related OPEB contributions), the remaining remittance (the DBUL) is deposited into the DB plan as noted earlier.

Benefit Terms

Employees are immediately vested in their own contributions and vest 25% with two years of service, plus an additional 25% per year thereafter for full vesting at five years of service. Nonvested employer contributions are forfeited upon termination of employment from the Plan. Such forfeitures were applied in the year ended December 31, 2022 to cover a portion of the City's employer match contributions. For the year ended December 31, 2022, forfeitures reduced pension expense by \$64,905.

Employee Contribution Rate

Employees are required to contribute 8% of their annual covered salary. This amount goes directly to the individual's account.

Employer Contribution Rate

For the year ended December 31, 2022, the City was required to contribute 5% of covered salary into the Plan.

The City and employee contributions to PERS for pensions for the year ended December 31, 2022 were \$242,677 and \$388,282, respectively. The City contribution amount was recognized as pension expense/expenditures.

(c) Defined Benefit OPEB Plans

As part of its participation in PERS, the City participates in the following cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit OPEB plans: Alaska Retiree Healthcare Trust (ARHCT), Retiree Medical Plan (RMP) and Occupational Death and Disability Plan (ODD).

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

The ARHCT, a healthcare trust fund, provides major medical coverage to retirees of the DB plan. The ARHCT is self-funded and self-insured. The ARHCT was closed to all new members effective July 1, 2006. Benefits vary by Tier level. The RMP provides major medical coverage to retirees of the PERS DC Plan (Tier IV). The RMP is self-insured. Members are not eligible to use the Plan until they have at least 10 years of service and are Medicare age eligible. The ODD provides death benefits for beneficiaries of plan participants and long-term disability benefits to all active members within PERS. The Plans are administered by the State of Alaska, Department of Administration. The OPEB plans are included in the annual comprehensive financial report for PERS, at the following website, <https://drb.alaska.gov/docs/reports/#pers>.

Employer Contribution Rates

Employer contribution rates are actuarially determined and adopted by and may be amended by the Board. Employees do not contribute.

The total OPEB liability for each plan was determined by actuarial valuations as of June 30, 2022, rolled forward to the measurement date of June 30, 2023. The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2022 actuarial valuation were based on the results of an actuarial experience study for the period from July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2021, resulting in changes in actuarial assumptions effective for the June 30, 2022 actuarial valuation, which were adopted by the Board to better reflect the expected future experience. For the ARHCT and RMP plans, the per capita claims costs were updated to reflect recent experience for the June 30, 2022 actuarial valuation.

Long-Term Expected Rate of Return

The long-term expected rate of return on OPEB plan investments for each plan was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of return (expected returns, net of OPEB plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. The best estimates of arithmetic rates of return, excluding the inflation component of 2.82%, for each major asset class included in the OPEB plan's target asset allocation as of June 30, 2023 are summarized in the following table:

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total OPEB liability for each plan as of June 30, 2023 was 7.25%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employer and State contributions will continue to follow the current funding policy which meets State statutes. Based on those assumptions, the fiduciary net position of each plan was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on OPEB plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total OPEB liability for each plan.

(d) Defined Contribution OPEB Plans

PERS DC Pension Plan participants (PERS Tier IV) also participate in the Health Reimbursement Arrangement Plan (HRA Plan). The HRA Plan allows for medical care expense to be reimbursed from individual savings accounts established for eligible persons. The HRA Plan became effective July 1, 2006 at which time contributions by employers began.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

Contribution Rate

AS 39.30.370 establishes this contribution amount as “three percent of the average annual employee compensation of *all employees of all employers* in the plan”. As of July 1, 2023, for actual remittance, this amount is calculated as a flat rate for each full-time or part-time employee per pay period and approximates \$2,303 per year for each full-time employee, and \$1.48 per hour for part-time employees.

Annual Postemployment Healthcare Cost

In 2023, the City contributed \$120,919 in DC OPEB costs. These amounts have been recognized as expense/expenditures.

10. Deferred Compensation Plan

The City offers its employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. The Plan, available to all full-time employees, permits them to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death, or unforeseeable emergency. In accordance with the Internal Revenue Code, all assets and income of the Plan are held in trust for the exclusive benefit of participants and their beneficiaries.

11. Risk Management

The City faces a considerable number of risks of loss, including (a) damage to and loss of property and contents, (b) employee torts, (c) professional liability; i.e., errors and omissions, (d) environmental damage, (e) workers' compensation; i.e., employee injuries, and (f) medical insurance costs of employees. Commercial policies, transferring the risk of loss, except for relatively small deductible amounts, are purchased for employee medical costs. The City participates in the Alaska Municipal League Joint Insurance Association (AML/JIA) which provides insurance coverage for property and contents damage, torts, general and automobile liability, and workers' compensation. The City has no coverage for potential losses from environmental pollution damages. The AML/JIA is a public City risk pool organized to share risks among its members. The Association's bylaws provide for the assessment of supplemental contributions from members in the event that losses and expenses for any coverage year exceed the annual contributions and income earned on such contributions for the year. Such supplemental contributions shall be based upon each member's annual deposit contribution in comparison to the aggregate annual deposit contributions of all members. The Association made no supplemental assessments during the year ended December 31, 2023. Coverage limits and the deductibles on the policies have stayed relatively constant for the last several years.

12. Contingencies***Grants***

Amounts received or receivable from granting agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by the granting agency. Any disallowed grant expenditures, including amounts already collected, would become a liability of the City.

Other

The City, in the normal course of its activities, is involved in various claims and litigation. In the opinion of management and the City's legal counsel, the disposition of these matters is not expected to have a material adverse effect on the City's financial statements.

13. Subsequent Events

On November 28, 2023, the City of Kotzebue signed into an agreement to purchase a tract of land and the existing structures and fixtures on the land. The closing on this property occurred on February 7, 2024. The total purchase price of this property was \$595,000. As a part of the purchase, the City also signed a note payable agreement in the amount of \$300,000, to be paid over the course of 24 months at a 9.5% interest rate with the last payment due in December, 2025.

14. New Accounting Pronouncements

The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has issued several new accounting standards with upcoming implementation dates (effective dates are adjusted for the issuance of GASB Statement No. 95, Postponement of the Effective Dates of Certain Authoritative Guidance). The following new accounting standards were considered and/or implemented by the City for 2023 reporting:

GASB Statement No. 91 - Conduit Debt Obligations - Effective for year-end December 31, 2023. This Statement provides a single method of reporting conduit debt obligations by issuers and eliminates diversity in practice associated with commitments extended by issuers, arrangements associated with conduit obligations, and related note disclosures. This Statement clarifies the definition of a conduit debt obligation and establishes standards for related accounting and financial reporting.

GASB Statement No. 94 - Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements - Effective for year-end December 31, 2023. The primary objective of this Statement is to improve financial reporting by addressing issues related to public-private and public-public partnership arrangements (PPPs) and also provides guidance for accounting and financial reporting for availability payment arrangements (APA).

GASB Statement No. 96 - Subscription-Based Information Technology Arrangements - Effective for year-end December 31, 2023. This statement provides guidance on the accounting and financial reporting for subscription-based information technology arrangements (SBITAs) for government end users. This statement, among other things, defines a SBITA, establishes that a SBITA results in a right-to-use subscription asset (an intangible asset) and a corresponding subscription liability, provides capitalization criteria for outlays other than subscription payments, and requires note disclosures regarding a SBITA.

Notes to Basic Financial Statements

The GASB has issued new accounting standards with upcoming implementation dates. Management has not fully evaluated the potential effects of these statements, and actual impacts have not yet been determined. The statements are as follows:

GASB Statement No. 99 - Omnibus 2022 - Provisions of this Statement related to extension of the use of LIBOR, accounting for SNAP distributions, disclosures of nonmonetary transactions, pledges of future revenues by pledging governments, classification of certain provisions in Statement No. 34, as amended, and terminology updates related to Statement No. 53 and Statement No. 63 are effective upon issuance. The effective date for the provisions of this Statement related to leases, PPPs, and SBITAs are to be implemented for year-end December 31, 2023. The effective date for the provisions of this Statement related to financial guarantees and the classification and reporting of derivative instruments within the scope of Statement No. 53, are to be implemented for year-end December 31, 2024.

GASB Statement No. 100 - Accounting Changes and Error Corrections - an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62 - Effective for year-end December 31, 2024. Earlier application is encouraged. The primary objective of this Statement is to enhance accounting and financial reporting requirements for accounting changes and error corrections to provide more understandable, reliable, relevant, consistent, and comparable information for making decisions or assessing accountability.

GASB Statement No. 101 - Compensated Absences - Effective for year-end December 31, 2025. Earlier application is encouraged. The objective of this Statement is to better meet the information needs of financial statement users by updating the recognition and measurement guidance for compensated absences. That objective is achieved by aligning the recognition and measurement guidance under a unified model and by amending certain previously required disclosures.

GASB Statement No. 102 - Certain Risk Disclosures - Effective for year-end June 30, 2025. Earlier application is encouraged. The objective of this Statement is to provide users of the government financial statements with essential information about risks related to a government's vulnerabilities due to certain concentrations or constraints. The disclosures will provide users with timely information regarding certain concentrations or constraints and related events that have occurred or have begun to occur that make a government vulnerable to a substantial impact.

GASB Statement No. 103 - Financial Reporting Model Improvements - Effective for year-end December 31, 2026. Earlier application is encouraged. The objective of this Statement is to improve key components of the financial reporting model to enhance its effectiveness in providing information that is essential for decision making and assessing a government's accountability. This Statement also addresses certain application issues.

The actuarial assumptions used in the June 30, 2021 actuarial valuation are the same as those used in the June 30, 2020 valuation with the following exceptions:

1. Per capita claims costs were updated to reflect recent experience.
2. The amount included in the Normal Cost for administrative expenses was updated to reflect the most recent two years of actual administrative expenses paid for postretirement healthcare plan assets.

In 2022, the discount rate was lowered from 7.38% to 7.25%.

In 2019, an Employer Group Waiver Plan (EGWP) was implemented effective January 1, 2019. This arrangement replaced the Retiree Drug Subsidy (RDS) under Medicare Part D and resulted in largest projected subsidies to offset the cost of prescription drug coverage.

Enterprise Funds

**Notes to the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards
Year Ended December 31, 2023**

1. Basis of Presentation

The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (the "Schedule") includes the federal grant activity of City of Kotzebue, Alaska (the City) under programs of the federal government for the year ended December 31, 2023. The information in this Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the City, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes in net position or cash flows of the City.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained in the Uniform Guidance, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement.

3. Non-Cash Assistance

In FY23, the Alaska Department of Transportation and Public Facilities expended federal grants to enhance City-owned assets. The value of this non-cash assistance was determined in accordance with the provisions of 2 CFR 200, Subpart F, Audit Requirements, Section 502 (g). The funds were expended for improvement of public roads and sidewalks in Kotzebue. The Assistance Listing number of such funds is 20.205 and the total expenditure of the funds is \$9,443,924.

4. Indirect Rate

The City has elected not to use the 10-percent de minimus indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance.

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the governmental activities, the business-type activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of City of Kotzebue, Alaska (the City) as of and for the year ended December 31, 2023, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise City of Kotzebue, Alaska's basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated September 30, 2024.

Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the City of Kotzebue, Alaska's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of City's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the City's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the City's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. We identified certain deficiencies in internal control, described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2023-001 that we consider to be a significant deficiency.

Report on Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether City of Kotzebue, Alaska’s financial statements are free from material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

City’s Response to Findings

Government Auditing Standards requires the auditor to perform limited procedures on the City’s response to the findings identified in our audit and described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. The City’s response was not subjected to the other auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the response.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the City’s internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the City’s internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS); the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. *Code of Federal Regulations* Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (Uniform Guidance). Our responsibilities under those standards and the Uniform Guidance are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section of our report.

We are required to be independent of the City of Kotzebue, Alaska and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion on compliance for each major federal program. Our audit does not provide a legal determination of City's compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above.

Responsibilities of Management for Compliance

Management is responsible for compliance with the requirements referred to above and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of effective internal control over compliance with the requirements of laws, statutes, regulations, rules, and provisions of contracts or grant agreements applicable to the City's federal programs.

Auditor’s Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether material noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above occurred, whether due to fraud or error, and express an opinion on the City of Kotzebue, Alaska’s compliance based on our audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance will always detect material noncompliance when it exists. The risk of not detecting material noncompliance resulting from fraud is higher than for that resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Noncompliance with the compliance requirements referred to above is considered material, if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, it would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user of the report on compliance about the City’s compliance with the requirements of each major federal program as a whole.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, *Government Auditing Standards*, and the Uniform Guidance, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material noncompliance, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the City of Kotzebue, Alaska’s compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.
- Obtain an understanding of the City of Kotzebue, Alaska’s internal control over compliance relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the Uniform Guidance, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the City’s internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and any significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal control over compliance that we identified during the audit.

Report on Internal Control Over Compliance

A *deficiency in internal control over compliance* exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A *material weakness in internal control over compliance* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency in internal control over compliance* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of Compliance section above and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies in internal control over compliance may exist that were not identified.

Our audit was not designed for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.

The purpose of this report on internal control over compliance is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over compliance and the results of that testing based on the requirements of the Uniform Guidance. Accordingly, this report is not suitable for any other purpose.

<i>Criteria</i>	Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Codification state that capital assets must be reported at historical cost. Capital assets attributable to governmental activities should be reported as assets in the governmental activities column in the government-wide statement of net position.
<i>Condition</i>	\$187,000 in capital outlays for additions to construction in progress were excluded from the fixed asset module in the City's accounting system. As a result of the exclusion, the system-based report containing the inputs for total governmental activities' capital assets was understated. Additionally, the City did not depreciate assets which were put into service during the year resulting in accumulated depreciation being understated by \$262,900.
<i>Cause</i>	The City did not identify all capital outlay accounts for review as potential capital additions to be reported under governmental activities. Additionally, the City did not identify all asset additions which should have been depreciated for several months out of the year. Control activities in place were not designed to catch such errors.
<i>Effect or Potential Effect</i>	Prior to the correction of the City's fixed asset module, the accounting system improperly classified \$187,000 as only a capital outlay, and not as a governmental activities' capital asset addition, which would have resulted in an understatement of capital assets and overstatement of expenditures without the adjustment. Additionally, additions to fixed assets were all placed in service as of the last day of the year, which did not allow for several months of depreciation expense to be booked in the system. Without the adjustment, depreciation expense and accumulated depreciation would be understated.
<i>Recommendation</i>	We recommend management establish robust processes, including thorough review, surrounding year-end general ledger and module reconciliations to ensure that the fixed asset listing is complete in 2024.
<i>Views of Responsible Officials</i>	Management agrees with the finding. Controls are being put in place to review expenditure details monthly to ensure items over the capitalization threshold are added to the capital assets schedule.

Condition The City executed several small purchase transactions without obtaining price or rate quotations from an adequate number of qualified sources.

Current Year Status:

The City of Kotzebue has implemented a policy requiring all department heads to collect at least 2-3 quotes before purchasing items for the city. This process ensures competitive pricing and transparency in procurement. However, if a project or item that needs to be sole sourced is needed, it has to be approved by the city manager.

2022-003 – Procurement, Suspension, and Disbarment – Noncompliance and Significant Deficiency in Internal Controls Over Compliance

Information on Federal Program(s) – U.S. Environmental Protection Agency – Passed through Alaska Native Tribal Health Consortium – Congressionally Mandated Projects –Sanitation Facilities Improvements – AN 18-RO2

Condition Documentation that vendors are not debarred, suspended or otherwise excluded were not retained in the City’s procurement files and thus, auditors were not able to test that the relevant internal controls were operating effectively.

Executive Summary

During this reporting period, significant attention was given to grant administration, financial matters, capital projects, infrastructure, and coordination among City departments and outside agencies.

The City has also continued working with its Planning, Public Works, and Finance departments on several active grants and capital projects. Discussions have included the City's current financial position and whether projects that are not presently under contract should be temporarily placed on hold while the City works to stabilize and rebuild its finances.

Finance

Finance Manager Mike Wetzel recommended obtaining additional assistance from Caselle to help the City catch up on reconciliations and clean up the City's general ledger accounts. After discussing the matter with the City Attorney, who agreed that obtaining the additional assistance was appropriate, I authorized the service to move forward.

City staff have also discussed the possibility of temporarily pausing projects that are not currently under contract. This would provide the City additional time to address its financial position and preserve available resources. No final determination has been made regarding such a pause.

Grants and Grant Administration

City Consultant Tessa with Sailaq Consulting submitted required reports for the following projects:

- Denali Commission – Cape Blossom Phase II
- Denali Commission – Washateria
- SRF – Vortac Lake Dam
- SRF – Water Treatment Plant

I also signed a Denali Commission request for reimbursement.

Tessa provided an update regarding the State of Alaska Cape Blossom Regional Planning Grant. The grant currently has approximately **\$445,543.12 remaining**.

Tessa submitted a VIF application on behalf of Public Works for the purchase of a **crack-sealing machine**, which would provide the department with additional capability to perform road maintenance and repairs.

I also signed a Zender grant request for Tessa associated with the cleanup project currently being undertaken by Public Works.

Public Works and Tessa are working with SRF to determine whether grant funding can be used to purchase a backup generator for the Devils Lake/Vortac facilities

Updated administrative users for the Cape Blossom grant portal. I also responded to State Grants Administrator Lindsay Reese and advised her that no longer employed users should be removed from the State's applicable grant contact list.

Cape Blossom Road Project

The City continues preparations for the **Cape Blossom Road Phase II meeting scheduled for August 21, 2026, at 11:00 a.m.** The meeting was requested by the City Council, and the Northwest Arctic Borough Chambers have been reserved.

The City also continues working with NANA/Cornerstone regarding an amended Temporary Use Permit (TUP) for the fairgrounds, working in collaboration with City Attorney Joe Evans.

Public Works and Infrastructure

I met with DOWL, Public Works staff, and representatives associated with NANA/Drake to discuss current lift station projects.

I also participated in the City's regularly scheduled capital projects meeting with DOWL at City Hall.

On August 10, the Planning Department, Public Works Director, Finance Manager, Joe Evans, and I met to discuss options associated with the upcoming clean-water grant with VSW.

On August 11, Public Works Director Jason Avery took me to the landfill to review work completed in preparation for the upcoming DEC inspection. Considerable work has been completed, although additional work remains before the inspection. (DEC inspection completed and we feel that we did well.)

On August 12, I attended the Water/Sewer Workshop at the Northwest Arctic Borough.

Upcoming Meetings and Events

Clark Cripps with HUB insurance will be in Kotzebue on **August 18** and has requested a meeting.

Also on August 18, breakfast is scheduled at the Nullagvik Hotel regarding housing challenges in Kotzebue and the surrounding area. AHFC directors are expected to participate, and City representation would be beneficial given the ongoing housing challenges affecting the community.

KEA has planned annual maintenance power outage scheduled for **August 27 from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.** The city is aware and will take appropriate steps.

I received information regarding the Summer Legislative Conference in Fairbanks and recommended that the City consider sending a representative.

Derek Haviland Lie, KOTZ General Manager, has asked to schedule a time for City representatives to participate in the radio station's fundraiser occurring during the period of **September 28 through October 9**, with available times from **1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.** This will be a consideration taken care of when Ron takes back over. By the time of the council meeting it should be scheduled.

In Closing

City departments have continued moving forward with grant administration, infrastructure projects, financial reconciliation, and interagency coordination while addressing several significant financial and contractual matters requiring close oversight.

City Attorney's Report for August 20, 2026 RCCM [prepared and submitted on August 14, 2026]

Pending Lawsuit: *Luke Outwater v. Sgt. David Cox and City of Kotzebue*, 2KB-22-00276CI, Superior Court, Second Judicial District, Kotzebue, appeal pending in Alaska Supreme Court, Case No. S19518. This is the fourth time this case has been before the Alaska Supreme Court – three Petitions for Review preceded this ARAP 204 Appeal. Outwater's Opening Brief and Excerpt of Record have been filed and accepted by the Alaska Supreme Court. The City's Brief and Excerpt of Record have been filed. Outwater's Reply Brief has been filed in the Supreme Court. Defense and indemnity coverage is being provided by APRA (successor to the AMLJIA). Proceedings in the trial court have been stayed and the trial date has been vacated. (The appeal in the Alaska Supreme Court by Luke Outwater challenges the trial court's dismissal of Defendant David Cox based on qualified immunity.) Oral argument has been set for September 9, 2026 before the Alaska Supreme Court in Anchorage.

Lawsuit (resulting from Swan Lake Loop Failure in 2024): *Francis Swanson, Kristi Nelson, Audrey Lee, Jason Lee and Sophie Foster v. City of Kotzebue*, 2KB-26-00017CI, Superior Court, Second Judicial District, Kotzebue, FIRST AMENDED COMPLAINT, dated February 2, 2026. The City's liability carrier, APRA – the successor to the AMLJIA – has retained Jim Wilkson, an attorney with Farley & Graves in Anchorage, to defend the City in this matter. APRA has also retained me as *CHI* counsel for the City of Kotzebue. An ANSWER to the FIRST AMENDED COMPLAINT has been filed. A Pre-Trial Scheduling Conference was held on May 7, 2026 and a trial has been set for January 2028. The Court has approved the proposed Pre-Trial Scheduling Order. Extensive Initial Disclosures have been exchanged and are being reviewed by the Parties. Formal discovery – Interrogatories, Requests for Production and Depositions – will commence in the ensuing months. **[Any questions/comments regarding this pending litigation should be discussed in Executive Session.]**

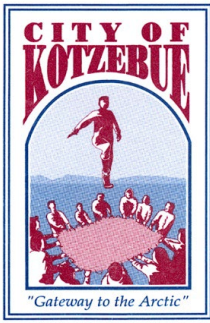

Line Maintenance is now actively utilizing the system through the iPads, which is a significant step forward. As they become comfortable with the process, we can begin looking at transitioning the work order system into another Public Works department.

The office has also been busy with some much-needed organization and cleanup. A major focus has been sorting through the large number of blueprints and plans in the office and cataloging them back into an organized system so they can be easily located and referenced in the future.

Equipment Maintenance Shop

Dude and his team continue to do a great job keeping the City's fleet running and operational. As time allows, the Shop is beginning to transition into **winter preparation**, working through preventative maintenance and identifying equipment that needs attention before the winter season.

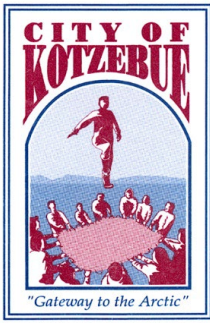
We are proud to say we now have a laptop with the provided program for our equipment to talk back and fourth to help keep our equipment running.

Streets

John and his team have been working hard to keep up with the demands throughout the community. The department has been operating **one position short for most of the month**, which has made balancing daily responsibilities and ongoing projects challenging.

The crew has been hauling cover material for the Landfill while continuing to address potholes and other street deficiencies throughout the community. We still plan to utilize the **asphalt reclaimer** to address some of the larger problem areas as time and resources allow.

The Streets crew has also continued assisting with the **Large Item Pickup Program**. To date, we have collected **a little over 100 vehicles**, which have been staged in the field behind the kids' ball field. We are planning to dedicate additional time during the latter part of the month to completing the large item pickup.

We have had some movement on our “Veterans Park” NCC has delivered some decent material that included some good soil for vegetation to grow. When time permits and we have the resources we will move the Pavilion that is currently located at the old fairgrounds.

Line Maintenance

Charlie and his team continue to do a great job keeping water and sewer service calls to a minimum. The reduction in service calls has allowed the crew to use that additional time to catch up on preventative maintenance and projects that had been set aside during the winter months.

The crew has been actively **flushing sewer mains, addressing out-of-service fire hydrants, repairing leaks that require excavation, assisting homeowners with water shutoffs at curb valves, and camera-inspecting sewer lines.** This additional preventative work is important because it allows us to identify and address issues before they develop into larger service problems.

Building Maintenance

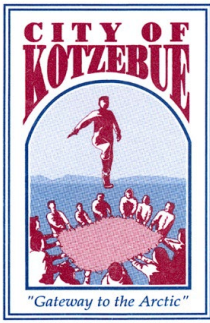
Kevin and his team have been extremely busy with several projects.

The crew has removed one of the old boilers in the Shop in preparation for installing a new boiler that the City has had on hand for the past couple of years. They have also been working on the footing for the associated fuel tank, which had previously been sitting directly on the ground.

The crew also **repaired and replaced the deteriorated back stairs at the Public Works Building,** which had been in poor condition for some time.

We were fortunate to acquire **free materials from the FAA** that were being removed from some of their property. Being able to reuse these materials will help reduce costs on upcoming projects.

Additionally, **907 Mechanical is scheduled to arrive next week** to install the heating loop for the back offices at the Public Works Building. This will address a long-standing heating issue in that area of the facility.

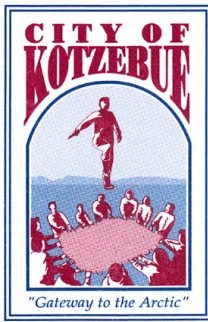

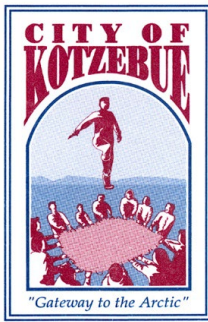

MONTHLY UTILITY O&M REPORT

****WATER****

1. ****Water Treatment Plant Standard Operating Procedures (SOPs):**** Continuing to collaborate with the Water Plant Supervisor on all water system SOPs.
2. ****Water Deliveries: **** Established immediate SOP changes for water deliveries, which include using a dry-erase board to record the date and time of customer requests, as well as the customer's name, address, phone number, and estimated delivery time after the 3:00 PM cut-off. Deliveries will begin at 3:15 PM, Monday through Friday. Additionally, test the chlorine residual in the water delivery truck daily before 12:00 PM to allow 2 hours to incorporate MIOX, if needed. I set the new minimum at 0.20 PPM, up from "any trace amount." If it falls below this level, add 1 liter of MIOX per 1,000 gallons of water in the truck.
3. ****Vortac Dam Inspection: **** Had a very informal discussion about the Periodic Safety Inspection (PSI) of the dam with the inspector on Friday, August 17, following his inspection. The bottom line is that the dam appears repairable with several options. The formal PSI report will be presented to the city during the week of the 17th for official administration review.
4. ****O&M PM Preventive Maintenance**** I continue to format the PM list for daily, weekly, monthly, quarterly, and annual O&M inspections. This includes over 400 highly technical items not previously addressed.
5. **** Nano Filtration Skids**** I troubleshooted the NF1 and NF2 flow control valve problems. Currently, we can operate only one NF train at a time while the detention work is ongoing. We have been waiting for the approval of the DELCO service contract so that I can proceed next week with replacing the NF2 concentrate flow control valve. During this process, Delco will monitor my work remotely through their PLC system.
6. **** DL pump house**** Devils Lake Generator started failing after 30 seconds of run time, and I suspect fuel filters, but requested a work order for the shop to have a diesel mechanic look at it.

7. **** D/L PUMPHOUSE**** Pumphouse ramp shoreline landing failing. Requested a work order on 8-13. Failure could rupture our water line attached to the ramp.
8. ****VORTAC Lake**** We will begin using water from Vortac Lake next week and since we only use about one third of what we can pump out, the rest will return to DEVILS LAKE to help recharge it as it is the lowest level ever recorded.

****Wastewater****

1. ****LS1 & LS7****: I researched the lift station gas monitor systems that were causing red lights at LS1 and LS7. It took about three hours, but I cleaned and recalibrated the LS1 gas monitor. I will address LS7 next Wednesday as part of my weekly wastewater Operations and Maintenance (O&M) duties. The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) requires a separation between water and wastewater duty times, so I perform Water O&M on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday, and Wastewater O&M on Wednesdays.
2. ****LS6**** Power supply circuit breaker (at meter) was replaced in LS6 with the one from Cell 2 sewage lagoon. NW Electric has a replacement on order.
3. ****VEGA Radar Level Sensor System**** - Lift Station 10 has been upgraded from an outdated float level system to a modern non-contact radar level sensor system. This upgrade will save the city between \$3,000 and \$5,000 per year by reducing late-night callouts, decreasing the need for regular float replacements, and preventing wastewater from overflowing at manhole covers located at the corner of Wolverine and Turf, as well as on Caribou Street from the women's shelter to the boat harbor. Additionally, this new system has eliminated the need for Line Maintenance personnel to manually reset the lift station after power outages, a task that is particularly problematic during winter storms. We hope to eventually convert all lift stations to this system, which costs about \$3,000.00 per lift station. They can also be incorporated into our SCADA systems, where they are available, with a very simple hookup that I can do in-house.

Since the Kotzebue Police Department's last activity report, the police department has responded to 1041 calls for service (July 2026), a 4% increase from the month of June. Calls of note for the month of July were 19 Disturbance, 33 Intoxicated Persons, 15 Assault, and 13 Traffic. For a complete list of calls for service see the attached report. Calls for service occurred most frequently on Friday between the hours of 4:00 pm to 5:00 pm.

The Kotzebue Regional Jail processed 56 prisoners during the month of July, a 18% decrease from June (69).

Community Policing:

- KPD officers had 555 public relations, safety, and assistance contacts with the citizens and business owners of Kotzebue during the month of July.
- KPD officers conducted 175 security checks of businesses, or other locations within the city.

Staff Development and Training:

- All officers are participating in Police One Trainings; Hate Crime Training for Law Enforcement, Interacting with Mentally Ill as a First Responder, Recognizing and Responding to Domestic Violence, and The LGBTQ+ Community.
- Ofc. Evetts resigned.
- Training limited due to staffing levels.
- APSIN in the jail has been restored as well as new livescan software has been implemented.

Community Service Officers:

- The Community Service Officers responded to 60 calls for service regarding animal complaints, a 0% increase/decrease from June (60).
- The CSOs impounded 6 dogs.
- 1 animal(s) were adopted or rescued. (15 since beginning of the year).
- 0 animal(s) was euthanized in June. (4 since the beginning of the year).
- Served or attempted to serve 17 court documents.

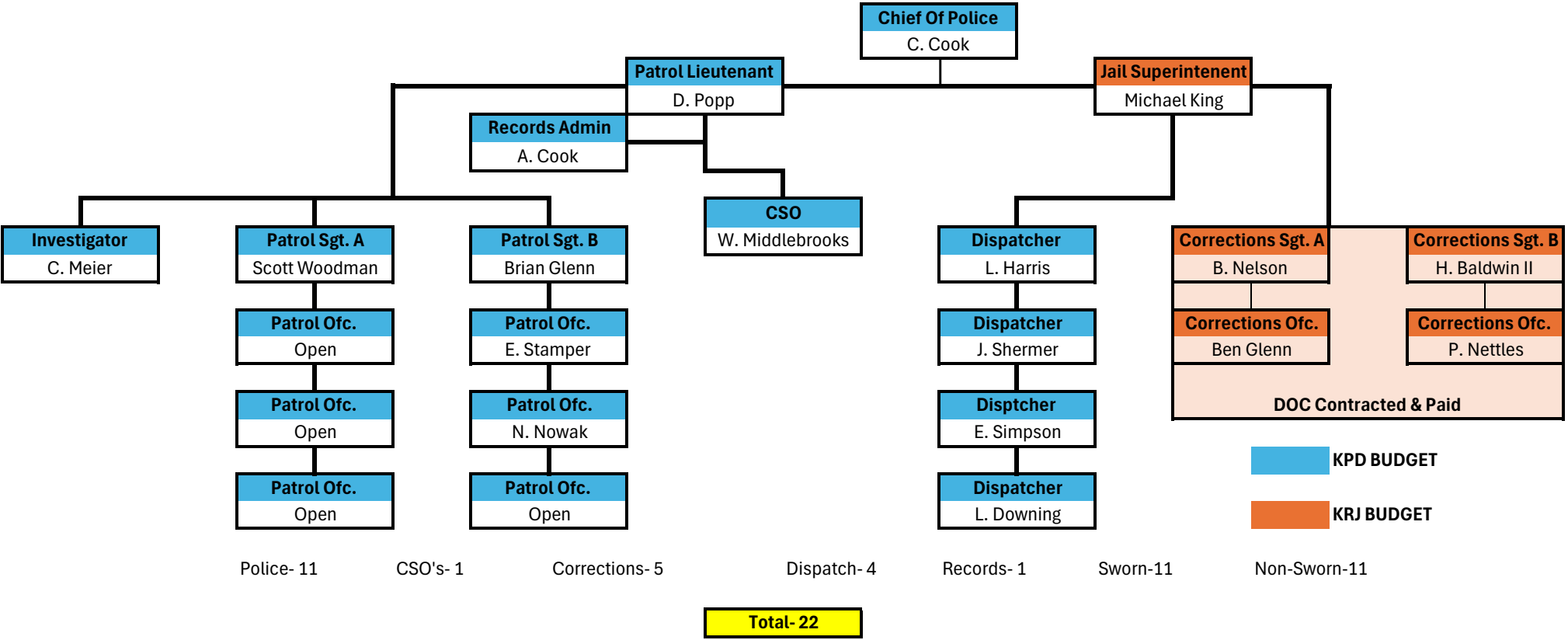

In July of 2026 KFD responded to a total of 126 calls. 119 of which were EMS related, while 7 were fire/public assistance related.

This month we continued with 2 medical presentations on giving IV's in the field and on Acquired Savant Syndrome. 3 of our staff took a training to become a Basic Life Support Instructor. We also conducted another Airboat training with Nick Ferguson.

Our Firefighter I academy is going well. Students are working hard to learn how to recognize fire dynamics, structural collapse, communication on the fire scene, and more. Our Lt's who are teaching this class are putting in a lot of hard work to hold this for us, and we are very grateful.

I continue to meet with Maniilaq billing department to iron out the bugs of our ambulance contract. I'm encouraged to see how our revenue from both Maniilaq and from our 3rd party billing services is on track to be above what is budgeted this year, and I look forward to seeing continued improvement in this area.

We currently have two listed positions open, one to begin immediately and one to begin in October.

As I look ahead to the next few months I'm encouraged to see the department functioning well and staff growing in knowledge and certification levels.

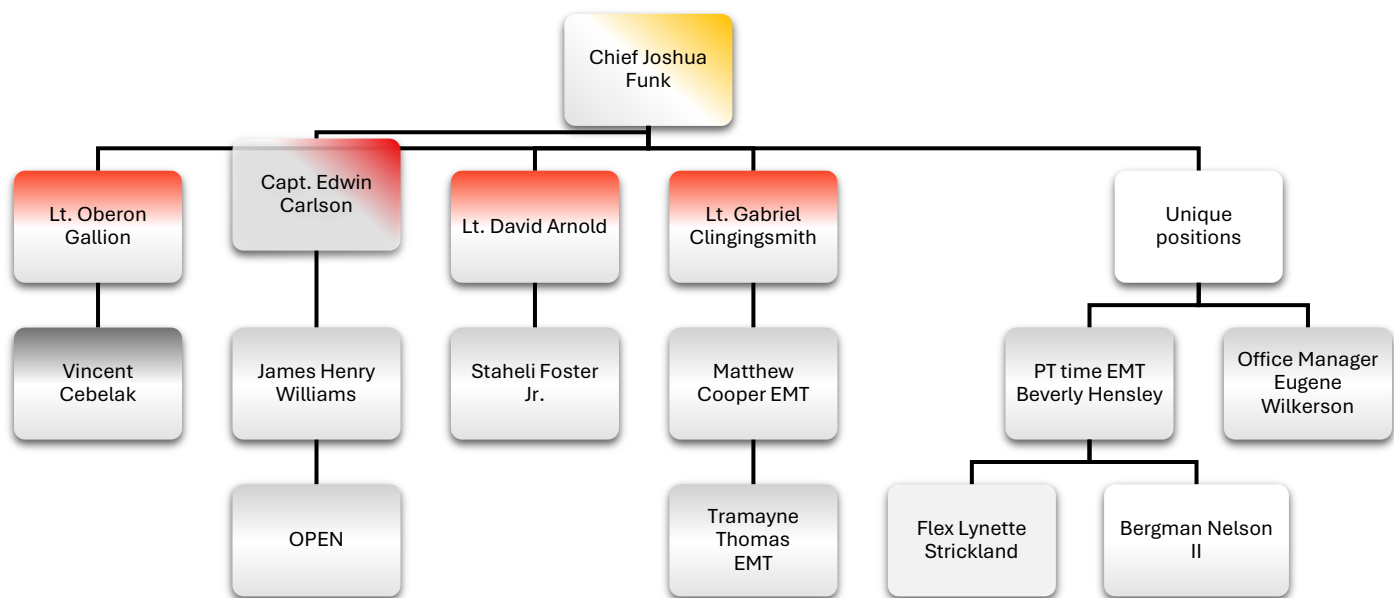

The following is a calendar recap for July 2025 as compared to July 2026.

Total revenue collected in July of 2025 was \$266,849.66, compared to \$304,817.19 in July of 2026. This is an increase of \$37,967.53 or almost 14% more revenue than this time last year. There were 27 sales days in July of 2025 and 27 sales days in July of 2026.

In July of 2025 we had 5,601 customers compared to 5,994 in July of 2026. This is an increase of 393 customers. The average sale in July of 2025 was \$47.64 compared to \$50.85 in July of 2026 or an average of \$3.21 more spent per customer this year compared to last year.

Cigarette sales in July of 2025 were \$9,179.50 as compared to \$10,272.29 in July of 2026. This is a increase of \$1,092.79 or 11% more in tobacco sales compared to this time LY.

The delivery Site 0 logged transactions.

The number of 10-day permits issued was 249.

The number of 30-day permits issued was 13.

The number of 90-day permits issued was 9.

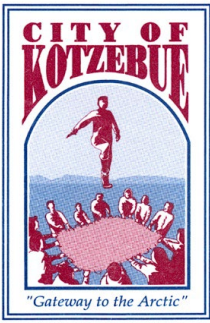
The number of 180-day permits issued was 16.

II. 2024 & 2025 FEMA Disaster Recovery

- a. The federal Department of Homeland Security, conducted their site investigation related to the damaged sites from the October 2025 disaster
- b. The State of Alaska Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management Services continues to meet weekly with the City of Kotzebue working on the projects declared in the disaster. **We recently requested and received materials on how the COK can receive funding advances for the different FEMA projects. We will pursue advanced funding for projects as the City continues to experience financial challenges**

III. Western Alaska Flood Disaster-Alaska Community Foundation

- a. The Public Works Director and City Planner met with representatives of the Western Alaska Flood Disaster Steering Committee. The group is tasked with working with impacted communities and providing funding assistance decisions to ACF. **The City Council has accepted those grant funds in their July COK.. ACF did approve our requested use of \$222k on communications equipment, fire dept truck, the three sewer damaged homes.**

IV. Insurance claims of infrastructure impacted by the flood

- a. The City maintains insurance of city infrastructure under the former AMLJIA, now ARBOR
- b. The City is working to process claims on the three lift stations damaged by the flood, currently about \$100k in claims have been filed for those repairs.

V

Maniilaq Employee and Patient Housing Projects

- a. The Maniilaq projects have variances related that are triggering additional building permits, i.e. Lift Station 9 and Caribou Drive Sewer main improvements. To date the Employee housing project, Lift Station 9, and the Patient Housing project have all been permitted. We expect a permit application will be submitted to expand an area around their emergency room.

VII

Cape Blossom Road Phase 2, Port Infrastructure and Port Authority

- a) cape Blossom Road Phase 2. The City Council requested a public meeting be held regarding Phase 2 of the project. There is concern the existing design is not adequate for the interests of local stakeholders. A meeting is scheduled for August 21, 2026.
- b) The Planning Department continues work with PND Engineers on the Port Infrastructure Development Program. PND is nearing identifying a proposed Port location. The department was delinquent in its' grant reporting. We are now current with the PIDP grant reporting. The next phase of contract work will be the public and stakeholder outreach which is planned to begin September 2026.
- c) Related to Cape Blossom Port Development, the City accepted a State Legislative grant to explore development of a Port and establishment of a Port Authority to support the construction of one.

VIII.

Capital Projects

- a) The Planning department is more actively engaged in the capital projects of the City. The addition of a Planning Director and Projects Coordinator has expanded the capabilities of the department.
- b) Moving forward, the intent is to restore Planning/Capital projects back within the City. In recent years that work has been contracted out. Currently the Planning Director and Public Works Director are actively engaged in the design, administration and flow of the projects.
