The Regular Meeting minutes of January 16, 2025, were provided for review.

Councilmember Brungardt made a motion to approve the Regular Meeting Minutes of January 16, 2025, as presented. Councilmember Kowalewski seconded the motion.

Charles "Chase" Spears and Peter Im have agreed to fill the vacant seats on the Board of Zoning Appeals. Both terms will be from February 6, 2025, to February 5, 2028.

Councilmember Brungardt made a motion to appoint Charles Spears and Peter IM to fill the vacant seats on the Board of Zoning Appeals with terms ending February 5, 2028. Councilmember Kowalewski seconded the motion. Discussion occurred regarding the vacant seats.

Port Authority Appointment

Each City in Leavenworth County is allowed an appointee to the Leavenworth County Port Authority. For the previous three years, Councilman Clemons has served as Lansing's appointee to the board. The current term expires on March 25, 2025. Mr. Clemons has volunteered to serve another term on the LCPA Board.

Councilmember Robinson made a motion to approve Councilman Dan Clemons to the Leavenworth County Port Authority Board. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion. No discussion took place.

Resolution B-2-2025 Riverbend Heights RHID

Ad Astra Development LLC applied for a Reinvestment Housing Incentive District (RHID) to develop a 412-lot Single Family Home subdivision, Riverbend Heights. The request is for the City to approve a 20-year RHID that would result in \$25 million of infrastructure investment to support a residential subdivision. There are currently six other parcels in Lansing within the Reinvestment Housing Incentive District. The RHID Program exists to spur growth and development as well as making housing more attainable.

Councilmember Kirby made a motion to approve Resolution B-2-2025 to create the RHID for the Riverbend Heights subdivision. Councilmember Clemons seconded the motion. Joe Oaks with Polsinelli Law Firm on behalf of Astra presented. Chris Coulson (owner/principal), Ross Volgal and Ben Gasper (SMH Consultants - engineers for the project) were available for questions. Council and Mr. Oaks discussed what was being requested for approval, the initial resolution which allows the proposal to be sent to the Department of Commerce, the steps the city and developers would need to take to move forward, and additional green space added to the proposal.

Patrick Melvin (13438 McIntyre Rd), Katie Burton (13068 McIntyre), and Mike Kenaga (owns property to the south of proposal) voiced concerns regarding the amount of green space allocated, change in lifestyle, questioned the setbacks in reference to the property lines, and accommodations for geographical features. Ben Gasper from SMH Consultants addressed the setbacks and geographical features.

SUBJECT: Waste Management Contract Extension

Waste Management notified the City three months ago of a potential rate increase at the conclusion of our current contract, which is set to expire February 28, 2025. Waste Management provided options to allow the City to offset some costs by establishing recycling every other week. The City put out a survey to residents to gauge their interest in every other week recycling, and over 57% of our residents preferred to keep recycling weekly, in spite of the \$3.38/month increase. According to Waste Management, the lion's share of the increase is the result of increasing wages to their drivers. Increasing wages to their drivers has resulted in increased costs, but has also made trash and recycling pick up more reliable, generally.

Financial Consideration: Waste Management's current rate is \$18.27/month, when including administrative costs, totals an even \$19/month for our residents. Due to rising costs, Waste Management is proposing a rate of \$21.65 for the same service to our residents (potentially more with administrative costs).

Below is a summary of what other nearly jurisdictions pay for trash service:

AMENDMENT TO MUNICIPAL RECYCLING AND SOLID WASTE AGREEMENT CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS

THIS AMENDMENT TO **MUNICIPAL RECYCLING AND SOLID WASTE AGREEMENT** ("<u>Amendment</u>"), by and between the CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS (the "<u>City</u>") and WASTE MANAGEMENT OF KANSAS, INC., a Kansas corporation ("<u>WM</u>") is made and entered into this <u>1</u> day of January 2019 (the "<u>Effective Date</u>").

A. The City and WM entered into that certain Municipal Recycling and Solid Waste Agreement dated _____, which expires on February 28, 2021.

B. WM costs of recycling have increased significantly in 2018 due to changes in standards for contamination rates. Specifically, China lowered its contamination standard to one-half percent (0.5%).

C. Because the cost of recycling has increased, commencing on February 1, 2019, WM has requested that the City pay an additional charge equal to Eighty-Seven Cents (\$.87) per month for each Residential Unit ("Recycling Surcharge"). The City and WM desire to enter into this Amendment to provide for payment of the Recycling Surcharge by the City.

In consideration of the covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. Extension of Term. The parties agree to extend the Agreement to expire on February 28, 2022 and there shall be no price increase in accordance with the Consumer Price Index for Water/Sewer/Trash described in section V. b of the Agreement during the period from March 1, 2021 through February 28, 2022.

2. <u>Payment of the Recycling Surcharge</u>. The City shall pay the Recycling Surcharge to WM for each remaining year of the term of the Contract beginning in 2019.

3. <u>Reevaluation of Recycling Surcharge</u>. In the event that allowable standard contamination rate imposed by China or another substantial importer of recyclable materials increases significantly enough to reduce WM's processing costs, the City and WM shall negotiate in good faith to reevaluate the amount of the Recycling Surcharge. The City and WM agree that any disputes related to the Recycling Surcharge shall first be addressed by negotiations between the parties. If direct negotiations fail to resolve the dispute, the City or WM shall have the right to terminate the Agreement upon sixty (60) days' written notice to WM.

4. <u>Affirmation of Contract.</u> All other terms and provisions of the Agreement that are not specifically modified by this Amendment shall remain in full force and effect, unmodified by the terms of this Amendment. All references herein or in the Agreement shall mean and refer to the Agreement as amended by this Amendment.

SECOND AMENDMENT TO MUNICIPAL RECYCLING AND SOLID WASTE AGREEMENT CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS

This Second Amendment to the **MUNICIPAL RECYCLING AND SOLID WASTE AGREEMENT** ("Second <u>Amendment</u>"), by and between the CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS (the "<u>City</u>") and WASTE MANAGEMENT OF KANSAS, INC., a Kansas corporation ("<u>WM</u>") is made and entered into this day of January 2022 (the "<u>Effective Date</u>").

A. The City and WM entered into that certain Municipal Recycling and Solid Waste Agreement dated January 4, 2018 and amended on January 17, 2019, which extended the term through February 28, 2022 (collectively, the "Agreement").

B. The parties desire to extend the Agreement for a three year term on the same terms and conditions as set forth in the Agreement except for those terms stated below.

In consideration of the covenants contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. <u>Extension of Term</u>. Section II of the Agreement shall be amended to extend the term of the Agreement through February 28, 2025, and thereafter shall automatically renew for successive renewal terms of one-year each unless either party gives the other Party written notice of its intention to terminate the Agreement at least ninety days prior to the end of the then -current term. All notices shall be served by certified mail, return receipt requested, or by a nationally recognized courier service.

2. <u>Fees and Payments</u>. The monthly service fee per Residential Unit set forth in Section V. a. of the Agreement shall be Sixteen Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$16.50) commencing March 1, 2022 ("Commencement Date"). The Recycling Surcharge described in the Amendment dated January 17, 2019 is included in this rate.

3. <u>Annual Increase</u>. Thereafter, annually on the anniversary of the Commencement Date, the monthly service fee shall increase in accordance with the percentage increase of the Consumer Price Index for Water/Sewer/Trash.

4. <u>Affirmation of Agreement.</u> All other terms and provisions of the Agreement that are not specifically modified by this Amendment shall remain in full force and effect, unmodified by the terms of this Amendment. All references herein or in the Agreement shall mean and refer to the Agreement as amended by this Amendment.
