CITY OF LANSING

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

Call To Order:

The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor McNeill at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call:

Mayor McNeill called the roll and indicated which Councilmembers were in attendance.

Councilmembers Present:

Ward 1: Gene Kirby and Dave TrinkleWard 2: Don Studnicka and Marcus MajureWard 3: Kerry Brungardt and Jesse GarveyWard 4: Dan Clemons

Councilmembers Absent: Gregg Buehler

Councilmember Brungardt entered the meeting at 7:01 PM.

OLD BUSINESS:

Approval of Minutes of the Regular Meeting of September 15, 2022, as presented.

Councilmember Kirby made a motion to approve Regular Meeting Minutes of September 15, 2022, as presented. Councilmember Studnicka seconded the motion. No discussion took place. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: Councilmember Garvey; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved.

Audience Participation: Mayor McNeill called for audience participation. Richard Nick at 719 Mt. Calvary Rd. spoke regarding internet service to his and neighbors' area. The neighborhood is located south of Sycamore Ridge that has been serviced by Spectrum. However, they have not moved any further south on that road to connect the neighbors outside the subdivision. The neighbors contacted Spectrum who agreed to provide service, but once they came out to see the location stated that they could not service that area. The neighbors understood that Spectrum was going to cover everybody in the city of Lansing. The neighbors are now trying to determine if Clearwave will be servicing their area but have not seen any progress indicating that. Mr. Nick stated that with school age children, internet is going to be an intricate part of his families' life. His family has been using Wi-Fi hotspots on their phones periodically, but there is no easy way to have it constant. Mr. Nick has checked into Starlink. February 2021, Mr. Nick put in for Starlink to provide internet. They stated that since he was in the city, they will not service his area as they provide to rural first. He received an email stating that they may be able to get to his area 2023 mid-year. Conversation continued with the mayor, director of CED, and councilmembers regarding the scope of the initial install by Clearwave and AT&T and budgetary restrictions of each business. Mr. Nick stated that he had attempted alternative options and was having difficulty as his property is considered in a residential area even though his location is rural. The mayor stated he would be willing to sign a letter for the neighbors affected that clarifies that they are outside of city infrastructure despite being in city limits. Mr. Nick explained that when he asked about connecting to the internet option in the adjoining subdivision it was going to be cost prohibitive even though he could see the cable box from his front door. The mayor reiterated that he would contact Clearwave to see what could be done. The Council thanked Mr. Nick for coming in to discuss the issue.

Audit services contract extension

MEETING MINUTES October 6, 2022

Staff feels it is the best interest of the city to remain with Adams Brown due to their performance for the past 3 years and their knowledge of current and upcoming capital projects. They also performed a single audit for the CARES funds received in 2020 and currently provide guidance on use of ARPA funds. Finance Director Beth Sanford was available for questions.

Councilmember Brungardt made a motion to approve the engagement of Adams Brown to perform the audits for the years ending December 31, 2022 through December 31, 2024. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion. Councilmember Trinkle asked for clarification on if this was the same company that always been used. The mayor agreed. The finance director stated that they had been providing the service the last three years. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Garvey, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved.

Mill & Overlay Quantity Adjustment

In mid-summer 2022, a significant overrun in milling quantities was identified from the April 21, 2021, approved mill & overlay bids. To offset costs, the north portion asphalt on 147th Street/DeSoto Rd was removed and will be added to an upcoming program. Public Works Director Mike Spickelmier was available for questions.

Councilmember Kirby made a motion to accept the revised quantities for the 2022 Mill & Overlay Program for a project total of \$816,402.95. Councilmember Majure seconded the motion. Mayor McNeill clarified, with the Public Works Director Spickelmier that this was the project discussed during the work session. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Garvey, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved.

MSE Wall Repair (Lansing Project 2022-3) Committee Recommendation

Proposals were opened and evaluated by the special committee. \$50k was submitted by PW for the 2023 Capital Budget. Due to the nature of the project, and recent failure Public Works is asking this project be accelerated into the 2022 Budget year. Also, due to the unforeseen nature of the project, as well as some additional needs, Public Works is requesting a project contingency of 10%. Public Works Director Mike Spickelmier was available for questions.

Councilmember Brungardt made a motion to accept the recommendation of the special review committee and award the project to Linaweaver Construction per their submitted proposal in the amount of \$78,662.00, to direct staff to amend the 2022 Capital Budget, and execute the project with a 10% contingency in an amount not to exceed \$86,000. Councilmember Majure seconded the motion. No discussion took place. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Garvey, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved.

Southfork Pipe Liner Installation

This project has been in the CIP for a number of years. \$100,000 was identified in the 2022 Capital Budget for Drainage Projects in Capital Fund Line Item. Public Works is requesting a 5% contingency on this project. Public Works Director Mike Spickelmier was available for questions.

Councilmember Clemons made a motion to accept the low bid of \$55,500 from Linaweaver and direct staff to proceed with the project with a 5% contingency. Councilmember Majure

seconded the motion. No discussion took place. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Garvey, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved. Salt Prices for 2023

Leavenworth County has again solicited pricing for bult purchase of rock salt. The quantity includes material for LVCO, City of Leavenworth, City of Basehor, City of Tonganoxie, and the City of Lansing. Public Works Director Mike Spickelmier was available for questions.

Councilmember Brungardt made a motion to accept the bid of \$57.61 per ton from Independent Salt Company in cooperation with Leavenworth County. Councilmember Majure seconded the motion. Councilmember Trinkle asked for clarification from Mr. Spickelmier whether the city had any issues with the company. Director Spickelmier stated they are a needs-based provider. Councilmember Majure commented on the price dropping. Director Spickelmier stated that the amount was less than the city paid in 2021. Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Brungardt, Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Buehler, and Clemons; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Garvey. The motion was approved.

Ordinance No. 1091: An Ordinance amending the Unified Development Ordinance of the City of Lansing, Kansas - Section 7.04 Parking Lot Design, A. General Standards, Item 6

At the work session on August 25, 2022, the Council came up with requirements for where gravel surfacing should be allowed in the City. The Planning Commission, at their September 21, 2022, meeting approved recommending changes to the UDO to adopt the parking lot design general standards. Economic Development Director Matt Schmitz was available for questions.

Councilmember Garvey made a motion to remand Ordinance No. 1091, to the Planning Commission to reduce the distance from 75 feet to 50 feet as discussed in the August 25, 2022 work session. Councilmember Majure seconded the motion. Councilmember Trinkle asked if it was increasing the height. CED Director Schmitz stated the ordinance decreases the height from 12 inches to 10 inches for residential and 8 inches for commercial with caveats for agricultural zone areas that are more rural. Discussion continued regarding issues that might arise for code enforcement. CED Director Schmitz stated that this will start the code violation notification process earlier. The City Administrator stated that as discussed in the work session, especially in commercial zones, this will allow for sending notifications to businesses 5-6 days earlier Roll Call Vote: Aye: Councilmembers Studnicka, Trinkle, Kirby, Majure, Garvey, Clemons, and Brungardt; Nay: none; Abstain: none; Absent: Councilmember Buehler. The motion was approved.

Councilmember Studnicka: Thanked the city clerk and librarian for their work on the volunteer dinner and thanked the volunteers for everything they do for the city.

Councilmember Kirby: Agreed with Councilmember Studnicka regarding the volunteer dinner and appreciates all the volunteers. He also asked the public works director regarding the Take 5 oil change locations impact on the intersection and traffic flow. Director Spickelmier stated that the company was required to provide a traffic impact study. The study was reviewed by the city and KDOT, and impacts identified are somewhat less than is existing. The traffic flow will be different than what exists now. Discussion continued. Councilmember Kirby recommended learning the detour route for the traffic change scheduled for Friday, October 14.

Councilmember Majure: Nothing to discuss.

Councilmember Garvey: Agreed with previous councilmembers regarding the volunteer dinner and appreciated the outstanding job by both the volunteers and employees. Thanked the citizens that came to address the internet issue and express their opinion.

Councilmember Clemons: Agreed with previous comments regarding the volunteer dinner. He also addressed the director of public works regarding Carraway drainage issue and the estimate on the cost associated with it. Director Spickelmier stated repairs had been made to the street in front of the house. It is identified as an unfunded project. He could put together an estimate, but it would come down to whether it was funded. Discussion continued regarding the Capital Improvement Program and if the Carraway property was on the list for the next CIP as per the discussion at the work session. Director Spickelmier agreed to provide a ballpark estimate regarding drainage issues that are on the CIP.

Councilmember Brungardt: Thanked Mr. Nick for coming and apologized for being late to the meeting.

ADJOURNMENT:

SUBJECT: Gas Monitoring System Replacement Request

When the new facility was constructed in 2005, a hazardous gas monitoring system was installed in the Headworks Building on both the upper and lower levels. The purpose of the system is to monitor for hazardous environments inside the building, and alert staff of the conditions prior to entry.

Over the last 17 years, the sensors and controls for the system have become obsolete and are no longer available. Staff solicited quotes from two vendors to update the system to current technology. Part of the upgrade includes reusing existing conduit and weatherproof cabinets to save money on installation costs.

RE Pedrotti, the system integrator for the SCADA system, and TG Tech, the gas monitoring calibration and service contractor have provided pricing to replace the system. This would include the removal of the old sensors and controls, installing new sensors, calibration, programming, and start up.

A copy of the quotation is attached for your review.

In the fall of 2021, one of the three aeration basins at the treatment plant needed to be taken offline due to a gearbox malfunction. Staff and a contractor pumped the contents of the aeration basin (designated D1) into aeration basin D2. Upon completion of the pumping operation, approximately one foot of solids and inorganic material remained at the bottom of the tank and associated chambers. Staff hired Environmental Works to remove the materials and prep the tank for a mechanical contractor to remove the damaged gearbox and motor.

The motor and gearbox were removed and taken to a local shop for diagnosis, cleaning, and a repair estimate. While inconclusive, it appears that when the motor to gearbox coupling failed (after 17 years of continuous use) the remnants of the coupling caused damage to both the motor output shaft and the gearbox input shaft. Small parts of the coupling and it's housing fell into the gearbox. The motor's shaft and lower bearing were damaged, which seems to be the cause of the coupling failure.

The mechanical contractor has recommended the replacement of the motor with a current model, while the gearbox can be repaired and put back into service. A cost breakdown is shown on the attached repair estimate.

Staff recommends replacing the motor at a total cost of \$25,722.22. Due to the large capital cost of a new gearbox, staff recommends damaged and normal wear components be replaced, for a total cost of \$78,847.73. The lead time for parts to complete the repairs are 16 to 18 weeks.


Legal Description – Permanent Water Easement:

A Water Easement being part of a property as described in a General Warranty Deed filed in Book 1005 Page 1774 at the Register of Deeds office of Leavenworth County, and also being located in the Southeast Quarter of Section 27, Township 9 South, Range 22 East of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Leavenworth County, Kansas, a description written by D. Steven West, PS No. 1614, on September 22, 2022, and being more particularly described as follows:

Commencing at the East Quarter Corner of said Section 27; thence S 1°12′49″ E along the East line of said Southeast Quarter of said Section 27, a distance of 1311.58 feet; thence S 88°47′11″ W a distance of 36.80 feet to a point on the West right-of-way line of Gilman Road as now established, said point also being the Point of Beginning of the centerline of a 20 feet wide easement lying 10 feet on each side of the following described centerline, and with the sides of easement to be extended or trimmed to existing right-of-way line; thence S 88°49′05″ W, a distance of 5.92 feet; thence S 83°09′02″ W, a distance of 531.93 feet; thence S 15°35′31″ W, a distance of 101.39 feet to the point of termination of said centerline of easement.

Requested Item: ¹/₂ ton or 1500 4X4 Pick-up Truck

Item being replaced: 2007 Ford E-350 15 Passenger Van (ID #VEHIC-011VAN1)

Justification for replacement: The current vehicle that is in use for maintenance support is a 2007 Ford E-350 15 passenger van that was passed down from Police Department fleet in 2016. The van is a very large and awkward vehicle for many of the department uses. It is very inefficient and difficult for some employees to drive. The van does not support the needs of a maintenance vehicle and limits the ability to haul materials or very large items. Due to the city information sign being changed to a new LED sign, we no longer have the need for a covered vehicle to carry all the letters and other signage equipment. A pick-up would be more conducive for hauling items that you wouldn't want to put inside a vehicle, and provide the ability to act as a multi-use support vehicle. The van has always had electrical system problems that come and go, causing starting issues that have required it to be towed. This year a 4th battery was replaced along with an alternator. Currently, the van would not be recommended for out-of-town travel due to reliability coupled with the handling quirks with steering and suspension. There is not currently a need for a 15-passenger style vehicle in the city's fleet

Replacement Cost: Not to exceed \$45,000.00

Department: Parks & Recreation and Public Works/Streets

Requested Item: Medium Sized Tractor

Item being replaced: Kubota 3710 Tractor

Justification for replacement: The Kubota has not been fully operational for over two years. There have been multiple attempts to repair the equipment from the factory dealerships, but the attempts were unsuccessful. The P&R and PW departments jointly operate this equipment. P&R performs a significant portion of the seasonal spring and fall turf maintenance with this machine including seeding, aeration and top-dressing operations. During the summer, Streets use this machine to augment their ditch mowing (along with John Deere). The machine also gets used for rototilling when necessary for both departments.

Replacement Cost: \$65,000 and we will surplus the old Kubota

City Administrator's Report

October 20, 2022

Agenda Items:

Proclamations for Kansas Reads to Preschoolers Month and Military Retiree Appreciation Day are on the agenda.

Wastewater Director Zell will provide an update to the City Council on current wastewater projects.

A bid from RE Pedrotti Company to replace the gas monitoring system at the wastewater treatment plant for \$17,110 is on the agenda. The previous system was 17 years old and many of the controls for the system are no longer available. Funds are available for this replacement in the Wastewater Utility Fund. Director Zell will be present to answer any questions from the governing body.

The motor and gearbox for an aeration basin was taken to a shop for diagnosis, cleaning, and a repair estimate. The mechanical contractor has recommended the replacement of the motor with a current model, while the gearbox could be repaired and put back into service. Replacing the motor comes at a total cost of \$25,722.22. Staff is also recommending the replacing of damaged and worn gearbox components for a total cost of \$78,847.73. The lead time of the parts to complete the repairs is 16-18 weeks. Funds for the repairs and replacement are available in the Wastewater Utility Fund.

Lan-Del extended a water line to Bernard Park to service the new baseball and softball fields. A permanent easement for the water line needs to be granted to Lan Del to allow for future maintenance and repair of their water line. We discussed this several months ago at the outset of the Bernard Park improvements. A motion to approve the water line easement for the Mayor's signature is requested.

Department heads submitted two pieces of equipment for replacement in 2023. The first item to be replaced is a 2007 Ford E350 15 passenger van, proposed to be replaced with a ½ ton 4x4 pickup. This vehicle is currently used for the Administration Department. The second item to be replaced is a nonoperational Kubota tractor. Parks & Recreation and Public Works/Streets are proposing to replace this item with a functional medium sized tractor not to exceed \$65,000. Authorizing these two items allows staff to begin the process of getting formal bids; as both items are over \$15,000, they will need to be brought back to the City Council in early 2023 for final purchase approval.

Public Works:

The closure at K7/Eisenhower began the morning of October 14th and is slated to take one week. The closure allows the contractor to move more quickly and provides a safer work zone for the crews. All businesses have accessibility throughout the closure and detour, as the Eisenhower entrances were operational. Lansing Police Department has paid special attention to the area during the closure. All improvements north of the intersection are scheduled to be complete by the end of October.

Clearwave Fiber has been issued 13 permits within Lansing, and an additional four KDOT permits to conduct work in the right-of-way. Clearwave is in the process of planting grass in some areas, with additional seeding likely to take place over the next couple of months. AT&T has been issued six permits, and one KDOT permit to work in the right-of-way. AT&T will likely continue working in Lansing in 2023 and perhaps beyond. AT&T has also stated they will cease installation of the above ground utility boxes in front yards but may still install in rear utility easements. Moving forward, AT&T will utilize at-grade utility boxes, also known as flowerpots. To date, no right-of-way permits for fiber providers have been closed out.

The engineering study to review and analyze changes to the speed limit along East Mary Street came in just over \$14,000. The current speed limit is 20 miles per hour. Details like the number of driveways, site distance, lack of shoulders, previous accidents, current average speeds, and the fact that's it's a school zone would all come in to play on the study.

We had our first resident utilize the sidewalk cost share program, with a resident being reimbursed \$2,300 for replacing a portion of sidewalk on their property.

The City is again working with KDOT to replace the plain green signage along K7 with wayfinding signs directing drivers to City Hall, the Library, Lansing High School, etc.

Community & Economic Development:

Construction continues at Family Eye Care. The building is closed in, and they are working on interior work as well as exterior site work. Work on the parking lot is currently taking place. The Planning Commission granted a modification to the FEC site plan by allowing them to remove the small retaining wall on the property.

The Traffic Impact Study (TIS) for Take 5 Oil Change was approved by KDOT with no exceptions. Lansing's staff has reviewed the TIS and concurs with KDOT that there would be no significant adverse impacts.

Work has begun on the townhomes at Santa Fe and Fairlane. A completion date is tentatively scheduled for next year. We have reached out to the developer of the Fairway Estates Fifth Plat. We hope to receive updated plans for this single-family home subdivision shortly.

Discussions are beginning at LCDC regarding the sites of future industrial parks in Leavenworth County. These discussions could be expedited if the existing parks in the area are filled soon. Completion of the sewer line toward McIntyre could make that site appealing, or even construction to the southern edge of the property to begin, as we discussed in the summer. As the discussions progress, staff will keep the Council abreast of the industrial park search.

Through the September disbursement, the .45% sales tax has generated \$512,136, on pace for \$682,847 throughout the year. The 2022 debt payment for DeSoto Road is \$388,075. Based on current projections, this would leave \$294,772 toward park improvements this year.

*A hotel in Lansing was used in 2021 for isolation during the pandemic. Current Transient Guest Tax figures are slightly less but comparable to periods prior to the pandemic.

Final valuations were completed, and the County recently sent us our finalized mill levy of 36.448. Based on the final mill levy, property taxes on a \$300,000 home would be \$1,257.46, a decrease from \$1,415.57 last year (41.031 mills). One mill in Lansing currently generates \$109,171.72.

Wastewater:

Three of the four easements needed for the Town Center Sewer Replacement project have been negotiated and signed. The final parcel is involved in a probate case and contact with the property owners has been limited. One of the family members is in the process of purchasing the property. 100% plans and specifications are complete and permitting is ongoing. The latest engineer estimate for construction is \$900,000. Construction of this project will follow, as directed by the City Council.

The owner of a gas main in conflict with the sewer alignment for the McIntyre Sewer Interceptor project has been found and contacted; however, there still seems to be confusing about the entity that owns the pipe. Staff reached out to a private law firm for assistance on this issue with preliminary positive results. The next step for the project is to acquire easements or permission from landowners to perform geotech work to refine the project cost estimate. 90% plans are under staff review currently. This project would extend sewers to McIntyre Road and include the installation of nearly 9,500 feet of pipe.

A draft report of the flow study and revision to the Wastewater Master Plan will be delivered in the upcoming months.
