1. Call to Order by Vice Chair Ford at 12:06 pm

Motion to excuse Prime and Sugg by Shermeyer, seconded by Lovins. All in favor.

2. Approval of Agenda



Ensuring staff is staying informed and learning about best practices, trends, and implementation strategies is important to economic development organizations. While there are numerous professional development trainings available in the planning & economic development fields, there are three (3) International Development Economic Council (IEDC) training courses that I would like to attend:

- Real Estate Development & Reuse
- Entrepreneurial & Small Business Development Strategies
- Economic Development Credit Analysis

The description of these courses are included in the attached course guide. Offered online, these are 2 – 3 day trainings which are part of the IEDC's Certified Economic Developer (CEcD) program. Each of these courses covers topics that are of critical importance to both understanding the business landscape and addressing the needs of Lathrup Village entrepreneurs and businesses. Individually these courses do not exceed the \$1,000 discretionary spending limit outlined in the DDA Bylaws. Additionally, the course schedule is such that the expenses would be split between fiscal years. There is, however, a discount available when registering for 3 or more training courses. I am not currently a member of IEDC, though the rate would be \$455 annually. The cost would be as follows:



RE: 2025 MDOT Safety Improvement Program

Hubbell, Roth & Clark (HRC) are the traffic engineers designing the HAWK signal at Margate Avenue/Southfield Road. At our initial meeting with HRC, I had indicated that the DDA is interested in installing several traffic signals/pedestrian crossings along the corridor but that we would need to securing grant funding to do so. HRC indicated at that time that HAWK signal installations are great projects for MDOT's Safety Program and that they would keep an eye out for the call for projects. HRC shared information this week related to the 2025 MDOT Safety Program.

There is a maximum award of \$750,000 per project which would allow the DDA to install 3 additional pairs of HAWK signals. Construction funding would be 80/20 with the DDA's match being approximately \$150,000. Project & construction engineering costs would be borne by the DDA. Applications are due Monday, May 1st, 2023, and HRC can put together that application for a cost of \$5,000.

Suggested Motion: To authorize the DDA Director to contract with Hubbell, Roth & Clark in the amount of \$5,000 to complete an application for MDOT's 2025 Safety Improvement Program for the purpose of installing additional HAWK signals along the Southfield Road corridor.
