

RATES PROPOSAL - SCOPE

- City has requested Ardurra and team to evaluate existing rates for sustainability and potential rate adjustments to cover system operating costs.
- City of Leon Valley Water & Sewer Capital Improvement Plan (in process), has potential to require an additional ~\$500,000 per year to water and sewer budgets once enacted. (\$1,000,000 total)

 - \$0.62 / 1,000 gallons usage
 - TCEQ Fee
 - 0.5% of total bill


- Usage is calculated based on the average cost per 1,000 gallons for 9,500 gallons of usage / month
 - (301,245,000 gallons/yr)/(2,643 total meters)
 - ~9,500 gallons/month
 - \$5.14 / 1,000 gal in current rates
- Actual revenue from 2022-2023 is given to show how our projections are conservative

SUMMARY - FIRST PROPOSAL

- For sake of cost security and sustainability, all expenses the system defines as necessary to keep system running will be considered "fixed costs"
- GOAL: Ensure system will have all fixed costs, upcoming CIP costs included, covered even in low usage years by raising base rate revenue
 - Residential water meter fee proposed:
 - Existing: \$11.76
 - Proposed: \$44.91
 - Sewer base rate proposed:
 - Existing: \$15.08
 - Proposed: \$75.79
 - Usage fee adjusted to \$0.50 / 1,000 gallons for all tiers




EFFECT OF USAGE TIERS ADJUSTMENT IN CONJUNCTION WITH % INCREASE PROPOSED







Leon Valley Park Commission Meeting Minutes

The Park Commission of the City of Leon Valley, Texas met on the 9th day of January 2025, at 6:30 p.m., at Conference Center, 6427 Evers Road, Leon Valley, Texas, 78238 for the purpose of the following business, to-wit:

1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance, and Determine if Quorum is Present.

Chairman Christensen called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m., with the following members in attendance: Vice-Chairwoman Danielle Bolton and Commissioners Diana Frazier, Elaine Valdez. Absent were Commissioners Ann Sawyer and Joyce Trent.

Also present were Staff Liaison David Dimaline, Public Works Assistant Director and Kathy Hill, President of the Leon Valley Historical Society (LVHS).

2. Review and Consider Approval of the December 12, 2024, Park Commission Meeting Minutes.

Vice-chair Bolton made a motion to approve the minutes as amended, which was seconded by Commissioner Frazier. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Citizens to be Heard.

Ms. Hill spoke, thanking the Park Commission for their work on the Park Master Plan and noted that the LVHS was very concerned with the erosion occurring along the banks of Huebner Creek directly behind the Huebner-Onion Homestead, the Triangle Park, and within the Huebner-Onion Natural Area Park (HONAP). She explained that the continuing erosion was alarming, as after each rain event, the banks eroded more, and the LVHS would like to preserve as much of the park as possible. She stated that she wanted to make sure the concern was addressed in the Park Master Plan. She then stated that their other concerns included the SAWS water line that crosses the creek near the Huebner-Onion Homestead and the erosion occurring closer to the Bandera Rd. bridge.

Chairman Christensen thanked Ms. Hill for her input. He stated that the Plan adoption had already occurred, and that the last remaining piece of the Plan was to adopt a Foreword, but that he looked forward to working with the LVHS on addressing plans for the drainage within the HONAP.

Mr. Dimaline provided handouts from the Park Master Plan that highlighted community recommendations to address Huebner Creek. He explained that items in the Plan included repairing erosion along Huebner Creek, adopting an annual

maintenance plan, and addressing drainage issues. He also provided copies of the current plan for the Huebner Creek Drainage Project and noted that the project called for concrete riprap on the south side of the creek and an earthen channel that would vary in width. He explained that approximately 404 trees would need to be removed, however, there could be an opportunity to replant native trees with the Bexar Branches Alliance.

4. Old Business

a. Discussion and Recommendation - Final Draft Park Master Plan

Mr. Dimaline reported that a draft Foreword had been written by Public Works Director Melinda Moritz and was included in everyone's packets. Commissioner Elaine Valdez stated that she had also written a Foreword and that it had been copied and handed out. The Park Commission was directed to review both and decide if they preferred one over the other, or a combination of the two.

Chairman Christensen recommended that Commissioner Valdez work with Public Works and the consultant to finalize the Foreword, and to bring the final version back to the next Park Commission meeting for approval.

b. Reports - Tree and Swimming Pool Subcommittee

Mr. Dimaline said there was nothing to report at this time.

5. New Business

PURPOSE & BACKGROUND

The Leon Valley Smoking Regulations, adopted in 2008 and contained in Chapter 6 Health and Sanitation, Article 6.05, provides for smoke-free air in public places. The ordinance addresses smoke only from combustible smoking devices (i.e. cigarettes and cigars). In 2014, electronic smoking devices (ESDs), such as e-cigarettes or vapes, entered the market, therefore, ESDs were not included in the original Ordinance.

This amendment would include ESDs and would prohibit the use of ESDs in the same places where smoking is currently prohibited.

The amendment will contain three changes related to ESDs and one change due to the preemption of state law.

- Add the definition of Electronic Smoking Devices (ESDs) to the Section. 6.05.003 -Definitions.
- Add Section. 6.05.009 Posting of Signs.: Establishments will be required to include the
 electronic smoking device icon on signs, along with the traditional cigarette icon. Both
 icons would be enclosed in the standard red circle with a red bar across them. This
 signage will be required for every public place and place of employment where smoking
 is currently prohibited.
- 3. Section 6.05.008 Distribution, display, and sale of tobacco products; and cigarette machines. Our ordinance had set the age of sale to 21 years. This was preempted by the State's law passed in 2019 (still at 21 yrs), so current code language is not needed.
- 4. Requires restaurants to provide areas for nonsmoking patrons.

The amendment to the Leon Valley Smoking Regulations Ordinance benefits the community by prohibiting exposure to both secondhand smoke and the vapor from electronic smoking devices in public places. This protects employees and patrons from exposure to dangerous substances. Many tobacco and vaping products contain harmful chemicals, which can damage lungs and

affect brain development and can be especially troubling for young people.

The Texas State Law applies to purchasing vapes, by dictating age restrictions and still applies fines for purchase, use and possession of vapes by persons under a certain age.

The amendment restricts vaping in the same places where smoking is restricted. Restrictions and penalties for vaping are the same as for smoking. The amendment does not change those current rules.

In 2019, the 86th Legislature passed Senate Bill 21, which increases the legal age for the purchase of cigarettes, e-cigarettes or tobacco products, from 18 to 21, including:

- sale
- distribution
- possession
- purchase
- consumption
- receipt

WHEREAS, In 2014, electronic smoking devices (ESDs), such as e-cigarettes or vapes, entered the market, therefore, ESDs were not included in the 2008 version of Chapter 6 Health and Sanitation, Article 6.05 Smoking Regulations; and

WHEREAS, many tobacco and vaping products contain harmful chemicals, which can damage lungs and affect brain development, which can be especially troubling for young people; and

WHEREAS, In 2019, the 86th Texas Legislature passed Senate Bill 21, which increases the legal age for the purchase of cigarettes, e-cigarettes or tobacco products, from 18 to 21, including sale, distribution, possession, purchase, consumption, and receipt; and

WHEREAS, the City of Leon Valley wishes to not only adhere to State Law, but also protect the general public from noxious fumes from ESD's; and

WHEREAS, an amendment to the Leon Valley Smoking Regulations Ordinance benefits the community by prohibiting exposure to both secondhand smoke and the vapor from electronic smoking devices in public places;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEON VALLEY, TEXAS, THAT:

SECTION 1. That the Leon Valley Code of Ordinances, Chapter 6 Health and Safety, Article 6.05 Smoking Regulations is hereby repealed and replaced as stated in Exhibit A attached hereto.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall become effective on and after its passage, approval and the meeting of all publication requirements as provided by law.

SECTION 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict. All provisions, sections and sub-sections set forth in the Leon Valley Code of Ordinances, Chapter 6 Health and Sanitation not revised or amended herein shall remain in effect.

Exhibit A

Chapter 6 Health and Sanitation Amendments

ARTICLE 6.05 SMOKING REGULATIONS

Sec. 6.05.001 Penalties

Each violation of this article if a first offense shall be punished by a penalty of a fine of not less than \$25.00 nor more than \$200.00; a second conviction shall be punished by a penalty of a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$500.00 for a second conviction; and shall be fined an amount no less than \$100.00 for third or more convictions nor more than \$2,000.00.

Sec. 6.05.002 Purpose

The Surgeon General of the United States has declared that smoking is the number one public health issue. The United States Environmental Protection Agency has concluded that passive smoking poses a public risk larger than the hazardous air pollutants from all industrial emissions combined. The city recognizes the evidence that smoke creates a danger to the health of some citizens and is a cause of annoyance and discomfort to those who are in confined spaces where the same is present. The city also recognizes that it is the right of citizens to choose whether or not to smoke actively or passively and it is the policy of the city to encourage food service establishments that have enclosed dining areas to provide adequate seating for patrons and employers and employees of such establishments who prefer a smoke-free environment. In order to protect the health, safety and welfare of the general public as well as protect the rights of smokers and non-smokers, this article has been created to restrict smoking in public places, except in areas designated as smoking areas.

Sec. 6.05.003 Definitions

Administrative areas. The area of an establishment not generally accessible to the public, including but not limited to individual offices, stockrooms, employee lounges, or meeting rooms.

Electronic Smoking Device (ESD) means any product containing or delivering nicotine or any other substance intended for human consumption that can be used by a person in any manner for the purpose of inhaling vapor or aerosol from the product. The term includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an e-cigarette, e-cigar, e-pipe, e-hookah, dab rig or vape pen, or under any other product name or descriptor.

Employee. Any person employed by any employer for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit or is in a position that would lead one to believe that such person is employed.

Employer. Any person, partnership, corporation, association, or other entity that employs one or more persons.

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Enclosed. Closed in by a roof and walls with appropriate openings for ingress and egress, but does not include areas commonly described as public lobbies.

Food establishment. Any operation defined as such in section 6.02.003 of this Code.

Hospital. Any institution that provides medical, surgical, and overnight facilities for patients.

Movie theater. Any establishment engaged in the business of exhibiting motion pictures to the public.

Public-owned facilities. All buildings or structures whatsoever owned or operated by the city, including the entirety thereof, where the public has access or not.

Public place. Any enclosed indoor area that may be used by the general public, and includes, but is not limited to: stores, offices, and other commercial establishments; restaurants; public and private institutions of higher education; and health care facilities.

Retail and service establishments. Any establishment which offers goods or services for sale to the general public.

Service line. Any indoor service line at which one or more persons are waiting for or receiving service of any kind, whether or not such service involves the exchange of money.

Smoking means inhaling, exhaling, burning, or carrying any lighted or heated cigar, cigarette, pipe, hookah, or any other lighted or heated tobacco or plant product intended for inhalation, whether natural or synthetic, including marijuana/cannabis, in any manner or in any form. Smoking includes the use of an electronic smoking device which creates an aerosol or vapor, in any manner or in any form, or the use of any oral smoking device for the purpose of circumventing the prohibition of smoking in this Chapter.

Workplace. Any enclosed area of a structure, or portion thereof, intended for occupancy by employees who provide primarily clerical, professional or business services of a business entity, or who provide primarily clerical, professional, or business services to other business entities, or to the public, at that location. The enclosed indoor area under the control of the employer shall include those areas to which employees have access during the course of employment, including but not limited to work areas, employee lounges, employee restrooms, employee conference rooms, and employee cafeterias. A private residence is not considered a place of employment.

Sec. 6.05.004 Smoking prohibited in certain public areas

- (a) A person commits an offense if he smokes or possesses a burning tobacco, weed or other plant product or any lighted burning pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind, or smoking equipment or device, in any of the following indoor or enclosed areas:
 - (1) An elevator used or that may be used by the public;
 - (2) A hospital or nursing home corridor providing direct access to patients;
 - (3) Any publicly owned facility or operated by the city as defined in section 6.05.003 above;

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- (4) All retail or service establishments and financial institutions serving the general public, including but not limited to any department store, grocery store, drugstore, clothing store, shoe store, hardware store, bank, savings and loan, laundromat, hair salon or barbershop, and shall include all public areas and waiting rooms of public transportation facilities, including but not limited to common areas of city-owned theaters, concert halls, and cultural facilities; provided that smoking may be allowed in common areas of the shopping malls and designated areas of public facilities;
- (5) An area marked with a no smoking sign in accordance with section 6.05.005 by the owner or person in control of a hospital, nursing home, or retail or service establishment serving the general public; or
- (6) Any facility of a public primary or secondary school; or an enclosed theater, motion picture theater, library, museum, and transportation vehicles, such as buses and taxicabs, except on charter buses for private hire or in taxicabs clearly designated by the operator to permit smoking;
- (7) All rooms in which meetings and/or hearings are open to the public.
- (b) The owner or person in control of an establishment or area designated in this section shall post a sign, conspicuous to ordinary public view, at or near each public entrance to the establishment. The sign shall contain the words "No Smoking Except in Designated Areas, City of Leon Valley Ordinance," the universal symbol for no smoking, or other language that clearly prohibits smoking.
- (c) The owner of a person in control of an establishment or areas described in subsection (a)(4) or (a)(6) may designate an area, including but not limited to lobbies, meeting rooms, waiting rooms, or lounges, as a smoking area; provided that the designated smoking area may not:
 - Include the entire establishment;
 - (2) Include cashier areas, over-the-counter service or sales areas, or service lines;
 - (3) Include the viewing area of any theater or motion picture theater.
- (d) It is the defense to prosecution under this section if the person was smoking:
 - In a location that is not a designated nonsmoking area of a facility or establishment described in subsection (a)(4) or (a)(6) of this section;
 - (2) In a location that is an administrative area or office area of an establishment described in subsection (a)(4) or (a)(6) of this section;
 - (3) In a location that is a retail or service establishment serving the general public with less than 750 square feet of public showroom or service space or having one employee on duty, unless posted as designated in subsection (b) of this section;
 - (4) In a location that is a retail or service establishment that is primarily engaged in the sale of tobacco, tobacco products or smoking implements;

- (5) In a retail or service establishment, which is a food service establishment regulated by section 6.05.005;
- (6) As a participant in an authorized theatrical performance; or
- (7) In a situation in which the person is present at an event in which an entire room or hall is used for a social function, seating arrangements are under the control of the sponsor of the function and not the proprietor or person in charge of the place. However, the sponsor of the social function may designate a nonsmoking area.

Sec. 6.05.005 Regulation of smoking in food establishments

- (a) A food service establishment that has indoor or enclosed dining areas shall provide areas for nonsmoking patrons.
- (b) A nonsmoking area must:
 - (1) Be separated from the smoking areas by a minimum of four feet of contiguous floor space, a partition or a wall;
 - (2) Be ventilated and situated so that air from the smoking area is not drawn into or across the nonsmoking area, or the smoking area shall be separately ventilated;
 - (3) Be clearly designated by appropriate signs visible to patrons within the dining area indicating the area that is designated nonsmoking; and
 - (4) Have ashtrays or other suitable containers for extinguishing smoking materials at the perimeter of the nonsmoking area.
- (c) Each food establishment which has a dining area shall:
 - (1) Have and implement a written policy on smoking which conforms to this article;
 - (2) Make the policy available for inspection by employees; and
 - (3) Have signs, conspicuous to ordinary public view, at each public entrance to the establishment indicating that nonsmoking seating is available.
- (d) Non-dining areas of any food establishment affected by this section to which the public has general access, including, but not limited to, food order areas, food service areas and restrooms, shall be designated as nonsmoking areas.
- (e) It is a defense to the prosecution under this section that the food establishment is:
 - (1) An establishment which has indoor seating arrangements for less than 50 patrons;
 - (2) An establishment which has more than 70 percent of its annual gross sales in alcoholic beverages; or
 - (3) A physically separated bar area of a food service establishment otherwise regulated.
 - (4) The establishments covered in subsections (1) through (3) above shall post a sign, conspicuous to the ordinary public view, at each public entrance to the

establishment which shall contain the words "This Establishment Does Not Provide for a Nonsmoking Section."

Sec. 6.05.006 Regulation of smoking in the workplace

Notwithstanding the provisions of sections 6.05.004 and 6.05.005, any employer may designate a portion of the workplace as a nonsmoking area. Any employer who chooses to designate any portion thereof as a nonsmoking area shall:

- (1) Have and implement a written policy on smoking which conforms to this article;
- (2) Make the policy available for inspection by employees;
- (3) Prominently display reasonably sized signs conspicuous to ordinary public view, indicating that smoking is prohibited in certain areas; and
- (4) Provide facilities in sufficient numbers and at such locations to be readily accessible, for the extinguishment of smoking materials.

Sec. 6.05.007 Reporting of violations not required

This article does not require the owner, operator, employer, manager or any employee of an establishment to report a violation or to take any action against any individual violating sections 6.05.002 through 6.05.006 of this article.

(Ordinance 08-053 adopted 11-18-08; 2008 Code, sec. 6.05.007)

Sec. 6.05.008 Distribution, display and sale of tobacco products; and cigarette machines

(a) Definition. For purposes of this section only:

Tobacco products. Any product that is made from or derived from tobacco and is intended for human consumption or is likely to be consumed, whether smoked, heated, chewed, absorbed, dissolved, inhaled or ingested by any other means, including, but not limited to, a cigarette, a cigar, pipe tobacco, chewing tobacco, snuff, or an electronic smoking device or liquids used in electronic smoking devices. Tobacco products do not include drugs, devices, or combination products authorized for sale by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, as those terms are defined in the Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act.

- (b) Prohibited. Distribution, display, and sale of smoking tobacco products, or smoking paraphernalia on any public right-of-way, city park or any city-owned building or facility is hereby prohibited.
- (c) The sale of tobacco products to persons under twenty-one (21) years of age is prohibited by Chapter 161 of the Texas Health and Safety Code.
- (d) Each person who sells tobacco products at retail or by vending machine shall post a sign as required by Texas Health and Safety Code Section 161.084.
- (e) Cigarette vending machines.

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- (1) Subject to the defenses provided in subsection (2) below, it shall be unlawful for any business owner, manager and employee in control of cigarette vending machines within the city to intentionally, knowingly, recklessly, or with criminal negligence allow the display or use of any cigarette vending machine upon any property within the city.
- (2) It is a defense to prosecution under the provision of subsection (f)(1) that:
 - (A) The cigarette vending machine is situated in a premises where entry by any person under 21 years of age is prohibited by law; or
 - (B) The cigarette vending machine is located in a workplace with the permission of the employer, provided that the employer has no persons under the age of 21 years employed at the workplace, and further provided that the cigarette vending machine is situated at a location within the workplace to which persons other than those employed at the workplace are not permitted to have access.
- (f) Penalty. A violation of any subsection of this section is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor crime, and upon conviction, shall be punishable as set out below:

A violation of subsections (b) or (e) shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$2,000.00.

Sec. 6.05.009 Posting of signs.

- (a) "No Smoking" signs shall be clearly and conspicuously posted in every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this chapter, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person in
- control of that place. The City Manager shall prescribe the content of the "No Smoking" sign
- required to be posted under this article and have an example sign available on the City's website.
- (b) Every public place and place of employment where smoking is prohibited by this chapter
- shall have posted at every entrance a conspicuous sign clearly stating that smoking is prohibited.
- (c) All ashtrays and other smoking paraphernalia shall be removed from any area where smoking is prohibited by this chapter by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of the area.
- (d) Areas which are exempt from the provisions of sections 6.05.004 and 6.05.005 of this chapter shall post a standard sign at each entrance, to be designated by the city informing potential patrons that the area allows smoking, and warning patrons of the negative health effects associated with secondhand smoke, inhaling vapor and aerosol from electronic smoking devices.

(e) The owners or operators will provide the signs required under subsection 6.05.009 (d) at their own expense following City sign posting guidelines within 90 days of the adoption of the ordinance.

Sec. 6.05.010 Governmental agency cooperation.

The city manager shall annually request other governmental and educational agencies having facilities within the city to establish local operating procedures in cooperation and compliance with this chapter. This includes urging all federal, state, county and school district agencies to update their existing smoking control regulations to be consistent with the current health findings regarding secondhand smoke and vapors and aerosols from electronic smoking devices.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this M & C is to consider approval of an Ordinance amending the Leon Valley Code of Ordinances, Chapter 12 Traffic and Vehicles, Article 12.03 Parking, Stopping and Standing, Section 12.03.006 Parking Restrictions on Specific Streets, to prohibit parking along Thistle Dr.

Businesses located on Bandera Road are using Thistle Dr. to park vehicles; this activity reduces the usable width of the street. People living in The Ridge at Leon Valley Subdivision and emergency vehicles have a difficult time traversing the street due to this condition, which impedes vision and causes unsafe traffic conditions, as residents and first responders drive in and out of their subdivision.

Signage would cost approximately \$200, which would be taken from the Public Works existing budget.

WHEREAS, providing the citizens with additional traffic safety measures adds to the overall quality of life; and

WHEREAS, the City of Leon Valley has received numerous complaints and concerns from property owners and residents of the Ridge at Leon Valley subdivision that vehicle owners and operators are parking along the sides of Thistle Dr. and said vehicles are blocking the street and limiting vision for people using and traveling along the roadway into the Ridge at Leon Valley subdivision; and

WHEREAS, the City finds the complaints and concerns are valid and on-street parking along Thistle Dr. not only creates a nuisance but also interferes with safe driving conditions along this street.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEON VALLEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 12 Traffic and Vehicles, Article 12.03 Parking, Stopping and Standing, Section 12.03.006 Parking Restrictions on Specific Streets, be amended as follows:

<u>Thistle Drive.</u> The parking, standing, or stopping of any motor vehicle, whether attended or unattended, at any time, on Thistle Street, between Bandera Road and Watercress Drive, is prohibited."

SECTION 2. REPEALER CLAUSE. The provisions of the Ordinance shall be cumulative of all other ordinances or parts of ordinances governing or regulating the same subject matter as that covered herein, provided, however, that all prior ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed to the extent that such inconsistency is apparent by any other ordinance.

SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY CLAUSE. If any provision, section, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance or application of the same to any person or set of circumstances is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or unenforceable, the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance or its application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting, and the Mayor in approving this Ordinance, that no portion thereof or provisions or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fall by reason of any unconstitutionally or invalidity of any portion, provision, or regulation.

SECTION 4. SAVINGS CLAUSE. The repeal of any ordinance or part of ordinances effectuated by the enactment of this ordinance shall not be construed as abandoning any action now pending under or by virtue of such ordinance or as discontinuing, abating, modifying, or altering any penalty accruing or to accrue, or as affecting any rights of the City under any section or provisions of any ordinances at the time of passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. That this Ordinance shall take effect after its passage and publication as required by law.

SECTION 6. NOTICE OF MEETING CLAUSE. It is hereby officially found and determined that the meeting at which this Ordinance was passed was open to the public and that public notice of the time, place, and purpose of said meeting was given as required by the Open Meetings Act, Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code.

SECTION 7. PENALTY. Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined as provided in Chapter 1. General Provisions, Article 1.01 Code of Ordinances, Section 1.01.009 General penalty for violations of code: continuing violations of the City of Leon Valley Code, and/or applicable state law.






Proposed No Parking Zone



Purpose

This M & C is to consider approval of an Ordinance authorizing a budget adjustment to provide additional funding for the purchase and installation of an Intersection Conflict Warning System at the Intersection of Evers Rd. and Adair Dr.

A traffic safety assessment was conducted to re-evaluate existing traffic conditions at the Evers Rd. and Adair Dr. intersection. This intersection provides a single access point for 27 properties located along Adair Dr. and Countess Adria to Evers Rd. The existing speed limit along Evers Rd. is 30 m.p.h. In the month of December 2024, the traffic counts were approximately 8,500 cars per day, with an average speed limit of 32 m.p.h. The 95th percentile was 39 m.p.h., meaning 5% of vehicles on the road traveled at or below 39 m.p.h. Two other data sets from previous months show the 95th percentile to be 32 m.p.h. and 35 m.p.h.

The traffic engineer analyzed intersection crash frequency, and stopping and intersection sight distance. Crash data from the Leon Valley Police Department showed no accidents were reported between March 2017 and March 2022. Considering the crash frequency observed as well as the low traffic volumes from the 27-lot subdivision, stopping sight distance would not be of significant concern.

As a proposed sight distance mitigation alternative, the traffic engineer recommends a dynamic warning sign, or Intersection Conflicting Warning System (ICWS). The system would detect vehicles on the main road (Evers Rd.) utilizing cameras and indicate their presence to drivers on the minor roadway (Adair Dr.), when signage is flashing.

The Crash Modification Factors Clearinghouse lists a 32% reduction for all crash types when installing a "Vehicles Entering When Flashing" system.

RE: TECHNICAL MEMORANDUM Follow Up Traffic Safety Assessment of the Evers Road and Adair Drive Leon Valley, Texas

Background:

A traffic safety assessment was conducted to re-evaluate existing traffic conditions at the Evers Road and Adair Drive intersection in Leon Valley, Texas. A previous safety assessment was conducted in April of 2022 and followed-up with this safety assessment. The intersection provides the single-access point for the 27 properties located along Adair Drive and Countess Adria Lane to Evers Road. The posted speed limit along Evers Road is 30 miles per hour. Figure 1 below illustrates the location of the Evers Road and Adair Drive intersection in Leon Valley, Texas.



Figure 1. Evers Road and Adair Drive Intersection



Intersection Crash Frequency:

Previously, the City of Leon Valley had queried the city's police crash logs for crash history at the Evers Road and Adair Drive intersection between March 2017 and March 2022 and found no intersection related crashes during that time period. Additional crash data was queried for the adjacent intersections along Eves Road and it was determined that 18 crashed have occurred during the same timeframe with all crashes related to some level of driver inattention. Crash frequency is not believed to be the safety factor necessitating this assessment.

Stopping and Intersection Sight Distance Assessment:

Also discussed in the previous intersection assessment, Stopping Sight Distance (SSD) is the length of roadway ahead that is visible to the driver approaching an intersection. The available sight distance on a roadway should be sufficiently long to enable a vehicle traveling at or a near the design speed to stop before reaching a stationary object on its path. Given the current posted speed limit along Evers Road (30 miles per hour), drivers approaching the intersection along Evers Road would need approximately 200' of sight distance as established in the American Association of State Highway Transportation Officials (AASHTO) *Policy on Geometric Design of Highways and Streets* to come to a complete stop if an obstruction is observed at the intersection, specifically a vehicle exiting the subdivision from Adair Drive and turning onto Evers Road. Considering the crash frequency observed between March 2017 and 2022 as well as the low traffic volumes from the 25-lot subdivision, stopping sight distance would not be of significant concern.




Figure 2. AASHTO Intersection Sight Distance Triangles

Intersection Sight Distance (ISD) is the length of roadway visible to the driver at a stopped condition, typically at the stop bar of a stop-controlled intersection. Intersection sight distance is measured from a point located approximately 3.5' above ground level (driver's eye height for passenger cars) and approximately 14.5' from the edge of travel lane to a point located approximately 335' (assuming 30 miles per hour) from the intersection and 3.5' above ground level. Figure 2 below illustrates the intersection sight distance triangles for vehicles at a stop-controlled intersection. Intersection sight distance for the Adair Drive approach to Evers Road is observed to be less than the required 335' and may benefit from warning signage. Figure 3 illustrates the existing intersection sight distance, facing west along Evers Road.

Sight distance is also obstructed by an existing privacy fence at the south-west corner of the intersection, further limiting visibility of vehicles approaching along eastbound Evers Road towards Adair Drive, shown in Figure 3.

Existing Pavement Markings:

Currently, the Evers Road approaches to Adair Drive are striped for two-lanes in each direction of travel and no shoulders. Adair Drive does not currently have any pavement markings. It may be beneficial to provide a stop bar at the Adair Drive approach to Evers Road to increase sight distance around the existing privacy fence however; a stop bar located much closer to the Evers Road travel lanes would also conflict with the existing pedestrian ramps. The placing of a stop bar closer to the travel lanes would require adjustments to the existing pedestrian ramps to remain between the Evers Road travel lanes and the Adair Drive approach stop bar.

Existing Warning Signage:

Currently, there is a "Side Road" advanced warning sign (MUTCD W2-2R Designation) located approximately 560' from the intersection along the eastbound Evers Road approach to Adair Drive however the Texas Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD) does allow for closer spacing between the intersection and sign location. Table 2C-4 (Guidelines for Advanced Placement of Warning Signs) of the Texas MUTCD does allow for a minimum of 100' from the intersection to provide for a driver to search for the side street following observation of the advanced warning sign. The current 550' upstream placement of the advanced warning sign may be adjusted to 250' to adequately serve the purpose of a warning sign at a 30 mile per hour operating speed.

Proposed Sight Distance Mitigation Alternatives




Figure 5. Traffic Entering When Flashing Warning Sign (MUTCD W2-10)

Another option for an intersection with limited sight distance is a dynamic warning sign, as shown in Figure 5 below. The Intersection Conflicting Warning System (ICWS) can be designed to either detect vehicles on the minor roadway (Adair Drive) and indicate their presence to drivers on the main road (Evers Road), or indicate to the driver on the minor road when there is oncoming traffic on the main roadway. The Crash Modification Factors (CMF) Clearinghouse lists a 32-percent reduction for all crash types when installing a "Vehicles Entering When Flashing" system (advanced post-mounted signs on the major road and detection on the minor roadway at stop-controlled intersections). Appendix A includes an Unsignalized Intersection Improvement Guide for the Install of an Intersection Conflict Warning System.

In addition to the installation of signage and conflicting warning system, it may be recommended that a clear zone be established using the intersection sight distance sight triangles, specifically along the eastbound Evers Road approach to Adair Drive which may require the removal of a wooden picket fence on the south-west corner of the intersection, shown in Figure 6 below.

Conclusions and Recommendations:

Based on the existing 30 mile per hour speed limit along Evers Road and the lack of crash history at the intersection of Evers Road and Adair Drive, there remains insufficient evidence to warrant the implementation of additional roadway improvements at the intersection. However, in addition to the previously relocated "Side Road" advanced warning sign from its previous 560' from Adair Drive to approximately 250' from Adair Drive, consideration may be given to the installation of an Intersection Conflicting Warning System and the clearing of the Adair Drive sight distance triangles.

UIIG Sheet for Installation of Intersection Conflict Warning System







This ICWS employs ground-mounted signing and Warning Beacons to warn major road drivers that one or more vehicles may be entering from the minor road.



This ICWS utilizes overhead signing and Warning Beacons to warn major road drivers that one or more vehicles may be entering from the minor road.

Install an Intersection Conflict Warning System (ICWS)

Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) technology used to warn motorists approaching an intersection of potential conflicts with other approaching vehicles. Such systems include detection of vehicles on the major road, minor road, or both.

Targeted Crash Types

- Right-angle
- Rear-end (major road)

Problems Addressed

- Inadequate visibility of intersection or intersection traffic control devices
- Inadequate intersection sight distance
- Misjudgment of gaps
- Speeding

Conditions Addressed

- Crash history involving vehicles entering or crossing major road.
- Difficulty among drivers in determining appropriate gaps in traffic.
- Awareness of the intersection is lacking.
- High running speeds are typical of major road traffic.

Considerations

- There are applications designed for the major road approaches only, the minor road approaches only, or the approaches of both roads.
- Requires similar equipment to a traffic signal: controller, cabinet, detection devices (loops or video), and possibly LED message signs.
- Message should be simple and easily understood.
- Place at a distance from the intersection that would provide the approaching driver time to react.
- When ICWS design incorporates dynamic messages, some agencies program their devices to display random dots on the message screen when they are not working properly.

UIIG Sheet for the Clearing of Intersection Sight Triangles





Clear the Intersection Sight Triangles

Removal of overgrown foliage or other objects (e.g., signs, vehicular parking, utility poles, fences) obstructing the sight triangle without involving major construction.



Targeted Crash Types

- Right-angle
- Rear-end (major road)

Problems Addressed

- Inadequate intersection sight distance
- Inadequate visibility of intersection or intersection traffic control devices

Conditions Addressed

- Inadequate sight distance at intersection due to obstructions in the sight triangle (in the median or on the roadside).
- Crash history or observed conflicts due to inadequate sight distance.



In both images, sight triangles were improved by creating a buffer area between the approaching through lane and near edge of roadway.



Site distance could be improved at this intersection by trimming the vegetation.

Considerations

- Removal of obstructions on private property will require coordination with property owners.
- Agency policy or local ordinances regarding planting and landscaping features on property corners should be reviewed, revised as necessary, and enforced.
- The position of the minor road stop line may be adjusted to improve visibility from the minor road approach.
- If adequate sight distance cannot be maintained, consider appropriateness of an all-way stop condition.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEON VALLEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The City's Red Light Camera Fund budget is hereby adjusted in the amount of \$27, 847 to increase the Traffic and Safety Department Budget to pay for the installation of an Intersection Conflicting Warning System at the intersection of Evers Rd. and Adair Dr.

SECTION 2. The financial allocations in this Ordinance are subject to approval by the Director of Finance. The Director of Finance may, subject to concurrence by the City Manager or the City Manager's designee, correct allocations to specific accounts as necessary to carry out the purpose of this Ordinance.
