<u>Purpose of Legislation:</u> Approve funding in the amount of \$170,628.86 under the Bridge and Road Safety and Accountability Program (BaRSSA).

<u>Statutory Authority/Reference:</u> Local Government Road Construction and Maintenance Match Program (MCA 15-70-130) and Allocation of State Funds for Public Transportation (MCA 7-14-102)

<u>Background:</u> House Bill 473 increased the gas tax paid by distributors effective July 1, 2017. The additional tax is required to be distributed in the same manner as existing gas tax funds. The State Legislature requires a 5% match of these funds from the receiving government. The City of Livingston will use this funding to help fund the Downtown Capital Improvement Plan with matching funds being generated from the Street Maintenance, Water, Sewer, and Light Maintenance Funds.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> The City staff recommends approving the acceptance of additional BaRSSA funds.

**Fiscal Impact:** This revenue was included in the FY 21 budget adopted by the commission. It can be found in the Gas Tax Fund under account 335041.

WHEREAS, it is the City's intent to improve the sound quality and equipment in the Civic Center, by minimizing unwanted noises to make for a more useful and enjoyable environment. By doing so it allows the City to increase the functionality, utilize the space for larger socially-distanced type community meetings, offer more flexible rental options while preserving the multipurpose recreational space; and

WHEREAS, the City contacted Poindexter's of Bozeman to perform a RT60 acoustical testing to determine the reverberation time of frequencies within the building and calculate the materials needed to achieve the desired results. One recommendation is to spray the ceiling with approx. 2" of a specialized acoustic sound absorption insulation; to trap the noise bouncing around the gymnasium and prevent it from creating echoes and reverberations that make speech difficult to hear and understand. Follow-up testing will be performed after the ceiling is sprayed, to determine what additional attenuation measures need to be taken. The RT60 testing results are attached hereto and incorporated within as "Exhibit A"; and

WHERAS, the City was referred to Helena Insulation, Inc. who specializes in the installation of insulation and requested a quote on solutions to remedy the acoustics, Helena Insulation provided an estimate that does not including the balcony area or roof purlins would be \$43,312.00, plus the cost of bond. The City requests spending up to \$55,000.00 on this portion of the project to cover additional unforeseen costs. The quote is attached hereto and incorporated within as "Exhibit B"; and

**WHEREAS,** now the parties desire to define their respective rights, establish roles, duties and obligations and define other terms and conditions as recited within the General Services Agreement, which document is attached hereto and incorporated herein as "Exhibit C"; and

**WHERAS**, the Civic Center is scheduled to have the gymnasium floors resurfaced on August 24, 2020, and Helena Insulation has the equipment, skillset, knowledge, willingness and ability to complete the project prior to that deadline; and

#### Good Morning Faith and Mike,

May this find you both doing well on this beautiful day.

Attached please find the results from the acoustical tests. The screen shot with the multiple pink lines indicates the number of tests factored in for the final result.

The PDF with the green area at the base of the graph is the window we're aiming for, the area where the sound within the room will be easily understandable. We're getting pretty close with the suggested spray material on the ceiling. The bass is still lingering within the room and can be addressed in other ways. This prediction is with a sprayed thickness of 1.25" of material on the ceiling, the contractor is suggesting 2" so we should have better results.

The low frequency energy within the room is indicated on the left side of the graph. This we may need to address by hanging wall panels. Bass tends to build up in the corners of the rooms. We may wish to place some wall panels across the back wall to help address the "flutter echo" effect we'll get by having two parallel concrete walls across from each other.

In summery this test and the prediction show us very good promise with the suggestion of spraying the ceiling with the UreK-Fire Resistant material.

Any questions please let me know? I'm happy to reach back to Bill Abney at Helena Insulation to request a quote and time line? It would be ideal to beat the Aug. floor re-do.

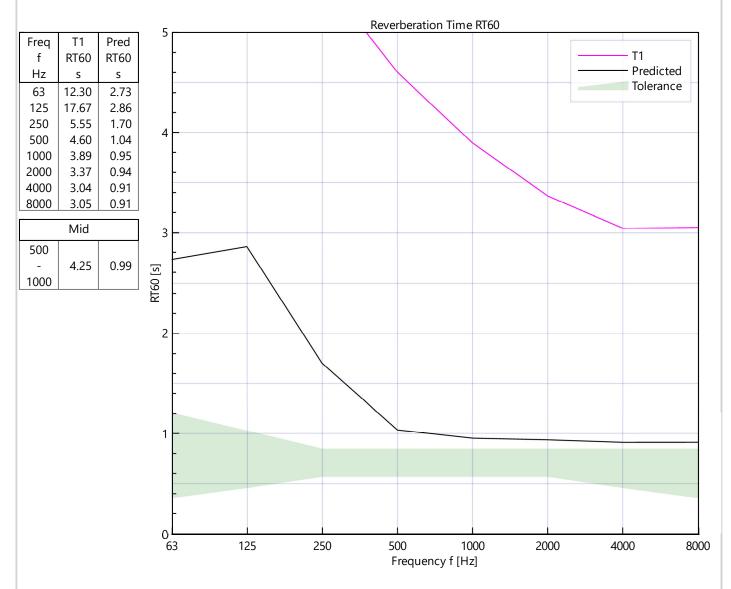

(hereinafter referred to as the "Contractor"; and	together with the City, the "Parties").	

#### **RECITALS:**

- A. The Contractor is engaged in the business of providing construction and building services, independent of the City, and has the manpower, knowledge, expertise, skills, means, tools, licenses, if applicable, and equipment necessary to perform construction services for the City.
- B. The City has not contracted with the Contractor for services in the past.
- C. The Parties desire to define their respective rights, duties and obligations in connection with their relationship and, as a result, the Parties desire to proceed under the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals and the terms and conditions contained herein, the Parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>INCORPORATION OF RECITALS</u>. The above Recitals are true and correct and are fully incorporated into this Agreement as if fully set forth in this Paragraph 1.
- 2. <u>NON-DISCRIMINATION</u>. Pursuant to Mont. Code Ann. § 49-3-207, in the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor agrees that all hiring will be on the basis of merit and qualifications and the Contractor will not be discriminate on the basis of race, color, religion, creed, political ideas, sex, age, marital status, physical or mental disability, or national origin.
- 3. <u>SCOPE OF WORK/SERVICES</u>. Contractor shall complete all work as specified or indicated in the construction plans and specifications herein. The Project for which the work shall be completed may be generally described as the "

4. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS. In addition to this Agreement, the contract documents shall consist of the Project Manual and all attachments and exhibits thereto, the Instructions to Bidder, bid, all issued addenda, drawings the specifications manual, bonds, and insurance certifications as required by the Instructions to Bidder and documents identified therein (the foregoing documents are collectively referred to in this Agreement as the "Contract Documents.") The Contract Documents are collectively attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A.

#### 5. NATURE OF RELATIONSHIP.

- a. The Contractor states that it is engaged in an established business or profession which is in no way affiliated with or connected to the City, except by this Agreement and that it uses independent judgment in the performance of services provided hereby free from control or direction of others. The Contractor shall perform the Project as an independent contractor. The Parties agree that the City is only interested in the end result of said project, not in the method of performance, and as such, the Contractor has been and will continue to be free from the control or direction of the City in the performance of this Agreement. The Contractor shall not be deemed by virtue of this Agreement nor the performance thereof to have entered into any partnership, joint venture, employer/employee or any other legal relationship with the City besides that of an independent contractor.
- b. The Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable laws, rules and regulations adopted or promulgated by any governmental agency or regulatory body, both State and Federal, and furthermore agrees to assume full responsibility for the payment of all contributions of all federal and state income or other payroll tax or assessment, social security, worker's compensation insurance, unemployment insurance, self-employment tax or any other required deduction or contribution for himself or for any employees engaged by the Contractor in performance of this Agreement.
- c. The contractor agrees to follow the Montana Preference law for materials and labor as set forth in 18-1-102 and 18-2-403 MCA. For projects valued in excess of \$25,000.00, the contractor agrees to post the job site with the standard prevailing wage information, to pay his employees the standard prevailing wage as established by the Montana commissioner of Labor and/or the federal government and to maintain records thereof for three years.

- d. The Contractor hereby states that it is either covered by Worker's Compensation and Unemployment Insurance or has obtained an exemption from the Montana Department of Labor and Industry pursuant to Mont. Code Ann. §§ 39-71-401(3) and 39-51-204(2), as is evidenced by the certificates of insurance or exemption documents attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit A. Any certificates of insurance shall require at least ten (10) days written notice to the City prior to any cancellation, termination, or non-renewal of coverage.
- e. The Contractor, its officers, agents and/or employees shall not have the authority to make representations on behalf of the City, and neither shall the aforementioned persons have the authority to legally bind or otherwise obligate the City to any third person or entity.
- 6. <u>CONTRACTOR'S REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES.</u> The Contractor represents and warrants as follows:
  - a. It and its employees possess all of the necessary qualifications, experience, knowledge, tools and equipment to undertake the performance of the Services as set forth in this Agreement.
  - b. It has inspected the job site and become familiar with and is satisfied as to the general, local and site conditions that may affect cost, progress, performance or furnishing of the work.
  - c. It is familiar with and is satisfied as to all federal, state and local laws and regulations that may affect costs, progress, performance and furnishing the Services.
  - d. It has reviewed this Agreement and all exhibits hereto and has entered into this Agreement based solely upon its own knowledge, inspection and judgment, and not upon any representations or warranties made by the City or its officers, employees or agents.
  - e. It will complete the Services in a workmanlike manner according to industry standards and practices.
  - f. It will not cause or permit any liens to be filed against City-owned property.

#### 7. <u>ADDITIONAL CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBLITIES.</u> The Contractor shall:

- a. Give employment preference to bona fide Montana residents in the performance of the work.
- b. Pay the travel allowance in effect and applicable to the district in which the work is being performed.
- c. Pay the standard prevailing rate of wages, including fringe benefits, in effect and applicable to the district in which the work is being performed as determined by the Montana Department of Labor and Industry. Information about such wages and fringe benefits must be posted at the job site. The prevailing wage and fringe benefits rates for the current year are attached hereto and incorporated herein as Exhibit C.
- d. Retain records regarding its payment of the standard prevailing rate of wages, including fringe benefits, for a period of three (3) years after the Contractor's completion of work on the Project.

#### 8. <u>CITY'S RESPONSIBILITIES.</u> The City shall:

- a. Provide all of the information regarding any requirements under this Agreement in a timely fashion.
- b. Provide access to City property and easements with respect to the performance of this Agreement

#### 9. <u>PAYMENT.</u>

- a. Subject to additions or deductions by change order, the Contractor shall perform his obligations under this agreement for the contract price \$43,312.00. Pay estimates submitted by Contractor must first be approved by the City or its designee prior to payment. All bills shall be submitted fourteen (14) days before the regularly scheduled meeting of the City Commission to Faith Kinnick, Administrative Assistant 414 E. Callender St. Livingston, MT 59047.
- b. In connection with obtaining payment under this Agreement, Contractor agrees to familiarize itself with, and agrees to be bound by, the City's claim procedure, including but not limited to deadlines for submitting claims for approval and payment. The Contractor assumes responsibility for the late filing of a claim.

c. In the event the Contractor seeks payment or compensation for work, materials or services not included in this Agreement and the exhibits hereto, the Contractor must seek prior written authorization from the City before such expenditure is incurred. If the Contractor fails to obtain prior written authorization, the Contractor shall not be entitled to payment for the unauthorized work, materials or services.

#### 10. TERMINATION.

- a. If the City fails to substantially perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, the Contractor shall deliver to the City a written notice specifying the nature of the City's failure to substantially perform. The City shall have a period of ten (10) days after receiving the written notice from the Contractor to cure the failure to perform. If the City fails to cure its failure to perform within the 10-day cure period, the Contractor shall provide the City with a written notice to terminate this Agreement. The Contractor may only terminate this Agreement if it is not at fault for the City's failure to perform. Failure of the City to make payment as provided in this Agreement shall be considered nonperformance and cause for termination, unless the Contractor is at fault for the City's nonpayment.
- b. The City may terminate this Agreement upon not less than ten (10) days prior written notice to Contractor. If the City terminates this Agreement for a reason other than fault of the Contractor, the Contractor shall receive compensation for the work/services performed prior to termination, together with reasonable expenses incurred up to the date of termination.
- 11. INDEMNIFICATION AND HOLD HARMLESS. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify the City, its officers, employees, agents and representatives against any and all claims, actions, costs, fees (including but not limited to attorney fees and all defense costs), losses, liabilities or damage of whatever kind or nature arising from or related to Contractor's performance of this Agreement and Contractor's work (or the work of any subcontractor or supplier to Contractor) under this Agreement. In the event a claim should be brought or an action filed against the City with respect of the subject of this Agreement, Contractor agrees that the City may, at its election, employ attorneys of its own selection to appear and defend the claim or action on behalf of the City, at the expense of the Contractor. City, at its option, shall have the sole authority for the direction of the

- defense and shall be the sole judge of the acceptability of any compromise or settlement of any claims or actions against the City.
- 12. <u>INSURANCE AND BONDING.</u> During the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall be responsible for maintaining, at its sole expense, insurance coverage and bonding. The Contractor shall provide the City with certificates of insurance demonstrating such insurance coverage and bonding and the certificates of insurance shall require at least ten (10) days written notice to the City prior to any cancellation, termination, or non-renewal of coverage. The certificates of insurance shall also name the City as an additional insured. The Contractor shall:
  - a. Maintain a comprehensive public liability insurance policy, including automobile coverage, insuring against loss and for damages for personal injury or death and/or property loss, damage or destruction arising out of or in connection with the performance of this Agreement by the Contractor, its officers, agents and employees with the minimum liability limit of \$3,000,000.00 per claim and \$1,000,000.00 for each occurrence, as set forth in sections 5 of the bidding documents.
  - b. Maintain workmen's compensation and unemployment insurance, as well as other insurances as may be required by law for employers, or an exemption from the state of Montana.
  - c. Make, execute, and deliver to the City a good a sufficient bond with a surety company licensed in Montana, as surety, conditioned that Contractor shall (i) faithfully perform all of the provisions of this Agreement, (ii) pay all laborers, mechanics, subcontractors, and material suppliers, and (iii) pay all persons who supply the Contractor or subcontractors with provisions, provender, material, or supplies for performing the work.
- 13. <u>NOTICES</u>. All notices or communications required to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given by personal delivery or upon deposit into the United States Postal Service, postage prepaid, for mailing by certified mail, return receipt required and addressed, to the address set forth in this Agreement. Any change of address shall be made by giving written notice thereof to the other party, providing the new address.

- 14. MODIFICATION AND WAIVER. No amendment, modification or waiver of any condition, provision or term of this Agreement shall be valid or of any effect unless made in writing, signed by the party or parties to be bound and specifying with particularity the nature and extent of such amendment, modification or waiver. Any waiver by any party of any default of the other party shall not effect or impair any right arising from any subsequent default. Nothing herein shall limit the remedies or rights of the parties hereunder and pursuant to this Agreement.
- 15. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>. Each provision of this Agreement is intended to be severable. If any provision of this Agreement is illegal or invalid for any reason whatsoever, such illegality or invalidity of said provision shall not affect the validity of the remainder of this Agreement.
- 16. <u>ENTIRE AGREEMENT</u>. This Agreement contains the entire understanding of the Parties in respect to the Services and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings between the Parties with respect to the Services.
- 17. <u>TIME IS OF THE ESSENCE.</u> Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- 18. <u>CAPTIONS</u>, <u>HEADINGS</u>, <u>AND TITLES</u>. All captions, headings, or titles in the paragraphs or sections of this Agreement are inserted for convenience or reference only and shall not constitute a part of this Agreement or act as a limitation of the scope of the particular paragraph or section to which they apply. As used herein, where appropriate, the singular shall include the plural and vice versa and the masculine, feminine or neuter expressions shall be interchangeable.
- 19. <u>COUNTERPARTS</u>. This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be one and the same Agreement and shall become effective when one or more counterparts have been signed by each of the parties and delivered to the other party.
- 20. <u>PARTIES IN INTEREST AND ASSIGNMENT</u>. This Agreement shall be binding upon, and the benefits and obligations provided for herein shall inure to and bind, the Parties and their respective successors and assigns, provided that this section shall not be deemed to permit any transfer or assignment otherwise prohibited by this Agreement. This Agreement is for the exclusive benefit of the Parties and it does not create a contractual relationship with or exist for the benefit of an third party, including contractors,

subcontractors or their sureties. This Agreement shall not be assigned, or any right or obligation hereunder, in whole or in part, to another without first having prior written consent of the other party. No assignment or transfer of any interest under this Agreement shall be deemed to release the contractor from any liability or obligation under this Agreement, or to cause any such liability or obligation to be reduced to a secondary liability or obligation.

- 21. <u>APPLICABLE LAW AND VENUE</u>. This Agreement and the rights and obligations of the Parties shall be governed by and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Montana. The parties stipulate and agree that the Montana Sixth Judicial District Court, Park County, has proper venue and jurisdiction to resolve all causes of action which may accrue in the performance of this Agreement.
- 22. <u>DISPUTES</u>. It is mutually agreed that the performance or breach of this Agreement and its interpretation shall be governed by the laws of the State of Montana, without regard to its conflicts of law principles.
  - 23. <u>LIAISON</u>. The designated liaison with the City is Faith Kinnick both of whom can be reached at (406) 823-6002. The Contractor's liaison is Bill Abney, who can be reached at (406)439-2455.
  - 24. <u>GOVERNING LAW</u>. It is mutually agreed that the performance or breach of this Agreement and its interpretation shall be governed by the laws of the State of Montana, without regard to its conflicts of law principles.
  - 25. <u>COMPUTING TIME</u>. For the purpose of calculating time under this Agreement, the following computation shall be used: If the period is stated in days or a longer unit of time, exclude the day of the event that triggers the period, count every day, including intermediate Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays, and include the last day of the period, but if the last day is a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, the period continues to run until the end of the next day that is not a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.

DISCUSS/APPROVE/DENY: GUIDANCE TO CITY MANAGER ON RAILROAD CROSSING RESOLUTION.

# **Introduction**

The City of Livingston conducted a series of interactive community rail crossing meetings on June 18, June 25, and July 9, 2020, to gauge public interest and opinions to finalize a proposal for financing an additional railroad crossing.

Talks regarding the need for an additional rail crossing began in 1977, and a most recent decision by the City Commission came in 2018 when they voted to pause a proposed project to garner additional community input and to try to identify funding sources. In August of 2019, the City attempted to secure federal transportation grant funding to help with engineering costs but learned in December another community in Montana had been selected.

The City Commission will have the final say on whether or not a proposal would be included on a November ballot. If the Commission decides to move forward with a ballot initiative for November, ballot language must be specified on a resolution prior to the 10 Aug deadline.

The interactive meetings, attended by over 30 participants in total, used voting devices to capture participant preferences throughout the meeting. More residents watched the meetings on Facebook Live, but were not able to participate in voting. The questions were worded to try and gauge overall interest in an additional crossing and resulted in some interesting findings, including that gorgonzola is less offensive on pizza than alfredo, pineapple, or bacon, and that no Dallas Cowboy fans attended. Demographic breakdown of participants is below, but note that some individuals attended multiple meetings:

This information shows that most of our participants were from the City, owned their homes, and skewed towards higher age groups. Overall, 71% of participants were over the age of 50.

# **Preliminary Questions**

A series of questions were asked to get the initial opinions of participants before any information was provided. The intent was to see if the presented material affected participant's responses.

First, participants were asked which way the preferred to move forward with the project.

This indicates that most participants prefer to move forward with a solution, even if they do not agree on what that exact solution should be.

Next, participants were asked, hypothetically, how much they would be willing to spend monthly to ensure no more than a 5-minute wait for a train.

These results are interesting as they show a significant divide in what people are willing to spend for a solution. The most common response was that they were willing to spend nothing, while at the same time a larger percentage of respondents are willing to spend \$20 or more per month.

Finally, the last preliminary question asked what location participants preferred for crossing.

The results show that the original location of Star Road is the most popular single location with Northern Lights Road slightly behind combining to account for 55% of the respondents. Western solutions are less popular, but together still account for 37% of the respondents.

## **Post Presentation Questions**

After the preliminary questions were complete, additional questions were asked throughout the presentation after each applicable topic. The initial section focused on traffic problems with crossings at Star Road and Northern Lights and explained the advantages to the traffic network, water loop, and sewer connections with a crossing further West. Once the presentation was complete, participants were again asked for their preferred location for a crossing

After the presentation, respondents' opinions on the desired location shifted significantly to a Westerly solution. Star Road and Northern Lights Road decreased to a combined total of 40% while Hwy10/West End Rd was the most popular solution at 37% and when combined with PFL Way accounted for 54% of the respondents.

Next, information on estimated cost was presented to the audiences which outlined a funding package that included a city-wide mill levy of \$12M and a Special Improvement District (SID) placed on Northside properties for \$3M. This resulted in an average cost city-wide of \$168.75 per year or \$14.06 per month. If a resident also had property within the SID it would result in an additional \$101.81 per year for a total of \$270.56 per year or \$22.55 per month. All numbers are estimates and could change based on engineering results and actual bids from contractors.

After presenting all of the cost information, participants voted on whether or not they were willing to fund a crossing on the West End (PFL Way or West End Rd dependent upon engineering) for the costs presented in the previous paragraph. After the vote the participants were allowed a time for questions on any aspect of the project and then the same vote was taken again.

This result shows strong support for funding a crossing on the Western end of a new Front Street extension. At the same time, there is a lot of trepidation about any solution as it comes at a high cost and is irreversible once built. While this small sampling doesn't mean there is a community consensus, it does indicate that we are starting to move towards at least a common understanding of an acceptable solution.

Finally, participants were asked if attending the meetings was helpful to them.

This indicates that if the Commission decides to move forward with a ballot initiative, there must be a strong educational piece after the ballot language is chosen.

## **Commission Next Steps**

With a deadline for ballot language of 10 August, the Commission must vote during the 4 August meeting on how you would like to move forward. This Action Item is intended to provide the City Manager with the necessary information to prepare a resolution for a Commission vote on 4 August. Below are a series of options the Commission can choose from or modify to provide guidance to the City Manger

#### **Funding Options -**

Option 1:

A Resolution stating the City is no longer pursuing a crossing project.

Option 2:

A Resolution authorizing ballot language for a mill levy to save funds for a future project.

Option 3:

A Resolution authorizing ballot language for a \$1.5M mill levy to fund project engineering.

Option 4:

A Resolution authorizing ballot language for a \$12M mill levy to fund the project in conjunction with a \$3M SID.

Option 5:

A Resolution authorizing ballot language for \$15M mill levy to fund the project.

#### **Location Options -**

Option A: Star Road

Option B: Northern Lights

Option C: Star Road to Northern Lights based on engineering

Option D: PFL Way

Option E: West End Road/Hwy 10

Option F: PFL Way to West End Road based on engineering

#### **City Manager Recommendation:**

The City Manager recommends Options 4F. Taking into account the feedback from the public meetings and the increased practicality for traffic, utilities, and future growth; Option 4F is the most balanced approach that addresses the most challenges facing the community. Additionally, limiting the amount borrowed on the mill levy preserves more of the City's authorized debt capacity.
