I LOVE MY LIBRARIAN AWARD **DRAFT LIBRARY COMMISSION NOMINATION OF ROSE BAIZA**

Rose Baiza has been the Los Altos Community Librarian since 2019 and, before that, was our Children’s Librarian commencing in 2014. Rose excels at working with the Library Commission and the other non-profits that support the Library to implement new technologies and new services. One example of Rose’s willingness to innovate and work with partners is the success of Open Access, a technology that allows pre-enrolled library patrons access to the Woodland branch library during off hours. Rose worked with the Commission to research this technology and then managed the acquisition and installation of Open Access. Rose launched the first pilot program in the county of Open Access. Library patrons are now able to enjoy exclusive, self-service access to browse books, check out library materials, relax and read, or use the Wi-Fi or our computers, printers, and copy machines during the library’s off hours.

If you choose to collaborate with others to nominate a librarian, we strongly recommend working together on a single nomination rather than having several people submit individually.

National Library Card Sign-Up Month

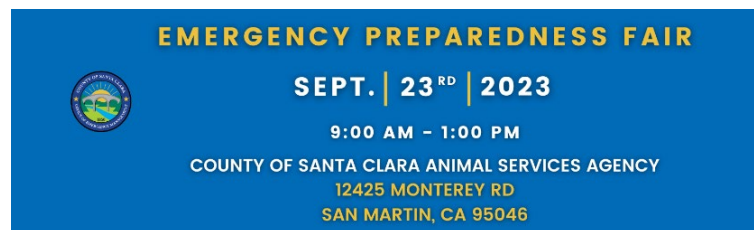

International Literacy Day

UNESCO, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, created [International Literacy Day](#) in 1967 to stress the importance of the ability to read and write as a human right.

Here at SCCLD, we prioritize literacy, starting with reading to babies and then helping them advance in their reading adventure step by step with initiatives like [1,000 books before 6](#). We also offer [booklists](#) for babies, toddlers, preschoolers, and recommended reading lists by grade. SCCLD libraries feature sections to continue to inspire and challenge young readers, as well as collection areas for teens and adults. The importance of reading is also true for adults. The [Reading Program](#) pairs a tutor with an adult learner who wants to improve their reading, writing, speaking and listening skills for 1:1 tutoring sessions.



Park Passes Flying Off the Shelves

Our patrons love the free California State Library Parks Pass program and have made SCCLD one of the top ten systems in the state in Park Pass circulation during the second quarter of 2023, fourth when considering checkouts per pass available. Including backpacks and exploration kits (available for checkout only at Morgan Hill and Gilroy libraries), passes were circulated 35,914 times during the three-month reporting period.

Passes grant one passenger vehicle per day access to over 200 California State Parks and are available on [our website](#). This month, you can also visit some parks virtually starting out with a California Adventure Pass noontime Facebook event on [Friday, September 1](#) about Samuel P. Taylor State Park in Marin County. The State Library Government Publications Section continues the series of virtual tours along with the California Department of Parks with events on Calaveras Big Trees State Park on [September 26](#), Colonel Allensworth State Historic Park on [October 12](#), and Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve on [October 26](#).

Mental illness is more prevalent than most people realize. One in five adults in the US lives with a mental illness; in Santa Clara county, that's about 340,000 adults – or enough people to fill Levi's Stadium five times. Mental health parity requires that commercial insurance plans provide the same level of coverage for mental health services as they do for physical health services, but many people don't know their rights to care and coverage.

Recognizing there is a great need for mental health services — and hearing the difficulty many are facing in accessing services — Health System, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Santa Clara, and Bay Area Legal Aid (Bay Legal) developed a presentation to educate our community about their right to access medically necessary mental health care. The 30-minute presentation explains how common mental health conditions are and how to recognize signs and symptoms. The program provides information on rights to mental health care, steps and resources to access care, and what to do if you encounter problems. Handouts with tips and resources will be provided.

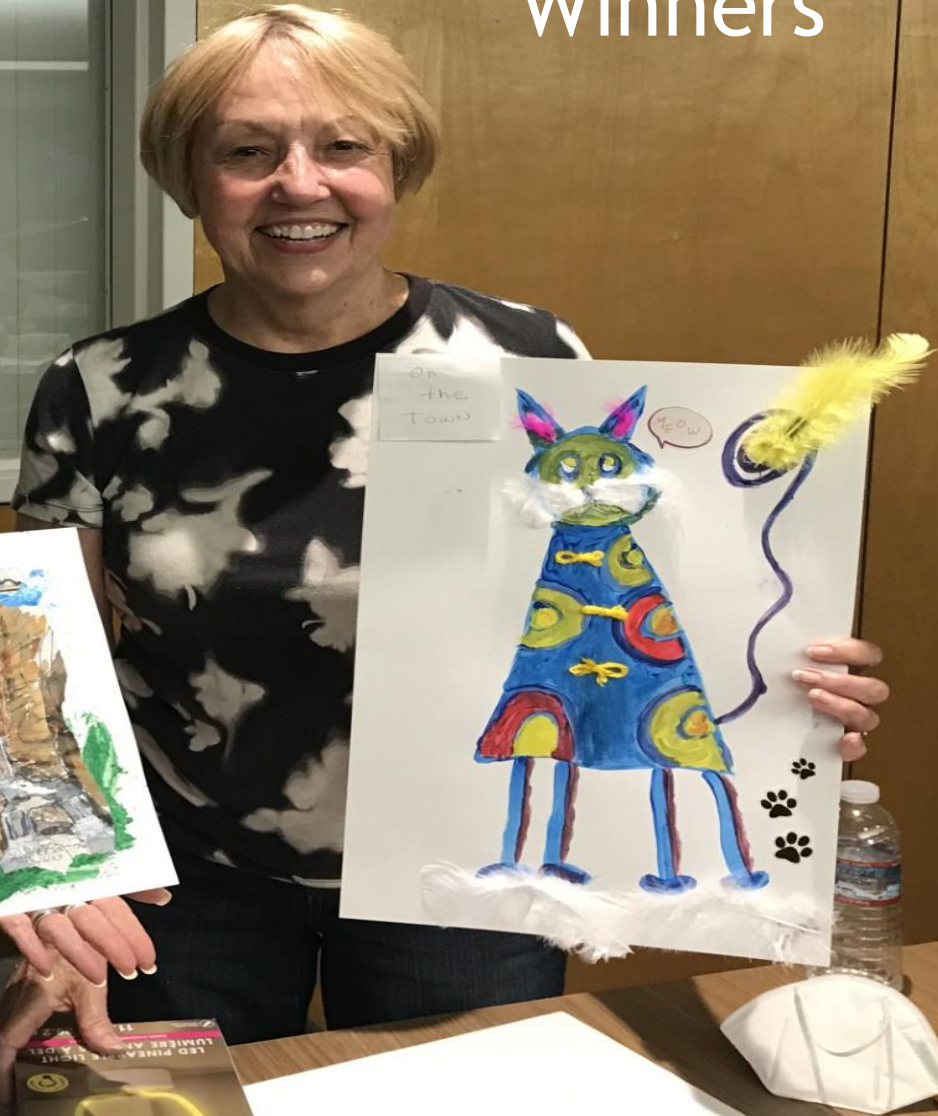
