Discussion

The Library Commission's Ad Hoc Subcommittee on Commission Presence proposes the following strategies to enhance recognition of the Commission's work. By increasing visibility, these efforts will raise public awareness of the Commission's impact and encourage more people to consider joining as members.

Greater Commission Visibility in the Library

Other libraries provide pictures of their Library Commission in the Library. For example, the Cupertino Library has the following on their entrance wall:

In addition, Cupertino includes Library Commission Biographies on their website. Displaying photographs of city commission members is important because it fosters transparency, accountability, and a personal connection with the community. Seeing the faces behind decision-making humanizes the commission, making it more approachable and relatable to residents. It reinforces trust by showing that the members are accessible and invested in serving the public.

Additionally, photographs can help residents identify commission members during events or meetings, promoting more meaningful engagement and dialogue. Finally, it serves as a reminder of the important work the Commission does and may encourage residents to consider volunteering when positions become available.

Recognition of the Commission's Work

The Commission brought several ideas to completion and yet this effort is hidden in minutes. Some of the projects that the Commission brought into being include:

- Curb-Side Drop Off
- Tech Lending: Noise Canceling Headphones
- NCLA Funds for County Strategic Initiatives

Currently there is no visible placard acknowledging the work of the Commission with respect to these projects. Including placards to recognize projects created by the Library Commission highlights its contributions and reinforces its role in enhancing library services. Placards serve as a visible acknowledgment of the commission's efforts, increasing public awareness and appreciation of its impact. They provide an opportunity to educate visitors about the projects' origins and significance, fostering transparency and accountability. Recognizing the commission's work also boosts its credibility, strengthens community trust, and inspires support for future initiatives. These markers celebrate accomplishments while ensuring the commission's contributions are remembered and valued.

Yearly Summaries of Commission Achievements

Summarizing its achievements at the end of the year can help the Library Commission demonstrate transparency, build trust, and showcase its impact on the community. Some

examples of the Commission's work this year include:

- Successfully transitioned to a five member Board and the City's guidance on Ad-Hoc Subcommittees for Targeted Outreach;
- Commissioner Morris revisited a 2022 proposal from Commissioners Bedard and Crane that we implement a program to lend noise cancelling Headphones. Commissioner Morris worked with Rose Baiza, Community Librarian, to implement a Sensory Headset Pilot Project to provide noise reducing / canceling headsets to accommodate for those with sensory needs.
- Commissioners Bedard and Crane, as members of the Library Improvements Ad-Hoc Subcommittee, continued to advocate for library improvements resulting in the City of Los Altos accepting the North County Library Authority funds for library improvements and awarding a Contract for Main Library Improvements Project to Anderson Brule Architects on December 10, 2024.
- Commissioners Fawcett and Carter began discussions with Rose Baiza, Community Librarian regarding a "Night at the Library" event tentatively scheduled for 2025.

Reminding ourselves and the public about our accomplishments celebrates successes, boosts morale, and fosters civic pride while providing a foundation for strategic planning and future goal-setting. A year-end summary engages stakeholders, strengthens relationships, and raises the commission's visibility, inspiring public support and participation. Additionally, it serves as a historical record and a tool for reflecting on progress, ensuring accountability and driving continuous improvement.

Participation by Commission Members in Library Events

Library commission members participating in library events fosters stronger connections with the community, increases the visibility of the commission, and demonstrates their commitment to supporting the library's mission. Their presence helps raise awareness about library initiatives, builds relationships with patrons, and provides opportunities for direct feedback from the community. Participation also allows commission members to better understand library operations and the needs of users, enabling them to advocate more effectively for resources and programs. Engaging with events can inspire public trust, encourage collaboration, and enhance the overall impact of the library within the

community. Participation could include children's readings and attendance at public events.

Engaging with Residents to Understand Their Needs

The Library Commission should serve as a conduit to the community, actively engaging with residents to understand their needs and communicate important information back to them. The Commission should invite residents to provide feedback on initiatives they would like to see in the library so that Commissioners may consider proposals.

Feedback Box and Digital Option

Place a physical feedback box in a visible area of the library, equipped with forms and pens to share suggestions. Alternatively, or in addition, create a digital feedback form accessible via a QR code prominently displayed in the library. This QR code can link to an online form, making it easy to submit their ideas.

Real-Time and Ongoing Recognition

In addition to yearly summaries and recognition, implementing real-time and ongoing acknowledgment strategies can further enhance the visibility of the Library Commission's contributions:

- **Immediate Acknowledgment of Contributions:**

Use signage to highlight Commission-supported projects or services as they are implemented. For example: "This Curbside Drop-Off Service is supported by the Library Commission."

Always have a signature branding like "supported by the Library Commission" for every achievement.

- **Social Media Shootouts:**

Share posts on the library's social media platforms immediately following milestones, launches, or events. For example: "Noise-reducing headphones are here! Thanks to the Library Commission for their support in making this happen."

- **Public Event Recognition:**

Verbally acknowledge the Commission's role during library events or in event materials (presentation slides), such as flyers or programs.

- **Creating Dynamic Displays in the Library:**

Create a small, rotating display within the library featuring recent initiatives and projects made possible by the Commission, keeping these accomplishments.

- **Individual Business Cards for Visibility**

Providing business cards for Library Commission members enhances visibility and professionalism by:

- Facilitating connections during events and community meetings,
- Encouraging collaboration with local organizations and partners, and
- Demonstrating accessibility with contact details for feedback.

Purpose

Review Preliminary Woodland Library Patio Drawings

Discussion

In March 2022, the Library Commission Infrastructure Subcommittee presented a report on the Woodland Library Patio Project that had a conceptual framework of proposed programs and amenities for the outdoor space at Woodland Library. The Infrastructure Subcommittee was directed to continue working on the project.

In December 2022, the Library Commission unanimously approved the Woodland Expanded Patio Project as presented.

After that approval, the Infrastructure Subcommittee provided the general proposal for a Woodland Expanded Patio Project to the Los Altos Library Endowment to explore funding opportunities. It was determined that this project would wait until after a Main Library Patio project.

In August 2024, the Los Altos Library Endowment was made aware of a native plant garden project in the proposed area for the Woodland Library Patio so the Los Altos Library Endowment team gathered that group and key library stakeholders to discuss how the two projects could work together moving forward.

At the September 16 meeting, the Library Commission received an update on the project from Chair Fawcett who provided a summary of actions to date. Vice Chair Bedard recommended, with a second from Commissioner Carter, to have this as a potential Ad-Hoc Subcommittee discussion for the October 3 meeting.

At the October 3, 2024 meeting, the Library Commission received another update on the project from City staff. The Library Commission did not create an Ad-Hoc Subcommittee on this topic.



At the January 9, 2025 meeting, the Los Altos Library Endowment is seeking any additional feedback on this project as they continue to develop the plans for the space. Attached to this staff report are the preliminary drawings created by Los Altos Library Endowment for feedback.

Library Commission

The Library Commission shall:

- A. Serve as the principal liaison between the City Council of Los Altos and Los Altos Hills and the Santa Clara County Library District, and the various community entities that help to fund the library branches, including, but not limited to, the North County Library Authority, the Los Altos Library Endowment and the Friends of the Los Altos Library;
- B. Review the Los Altos Library programs, services and facilities, and make recommendations to the Council, the City Manager and/or County and Community Librarians as appropriate, for additions or modifications thereof;
- C. Conduct community outreach regarding the library facilities, programs and services, and report back to the Council and/or the County and Community Librarians as appropriate;



Library Commission

The Library Commission shall:

- D. Perform such other tasks as may be expressly requested of it by the City Council;
- E. Serve as a forum for community input and engagement;
- F. Submit an annual report to the Council; and
- G. Perform other tasks and duties as assigned by the Council.



Election of Chair and Vice Chair

- Commission appoints Chair and Vice Chair annually at the first meeting in October.
- No member of a Commission may serve consecutive terms as the chair so they must change annually



Attendance and Participation

- Majority of members required in person for meeting to take place
- Commissioners must attend 75% of regularly scheduled meetings
- Commissioner must let liaison know at least one week in advance of meeting that they will attend remotely
 - Commissioners may attend no more than 20% of meetings remotely



Reporting

- Commissions provide a workplan for approval to Council in 1st Quarter of each calendar year
- Commissions provide an annual plan to Council at joint meeting

Ad Hoc Subcommittees

- Must be Ad Hoc, cannot be standing
- A Commission may appoint Ad Hoc subcommittees, consisting of less than a majority of the body, to work on specific tasks. Ad Hoc subcommittees should be focused on one specific topic and shall not last more than one year.
- Ad Hoc Subcommittees must comply with all aspects of the Brown Act, but do not require meetings to be posted or staff support.



Ad Hoc Subcommittees

- Must have specific topic and timeframe
- Cannot be an area of continuing jurisdiction
- Cannot be established in multiple years
- Must report findings out to full Commission
- Commissioners can only serve on one subcommittee at a time



Ad Hoc Subcommittees

The motion of establishment must include that the Ad Hoc Subcommittee:

1. Is comprised solely of members of the Commission establishing the Ad Hoc Subcommittee,
2. Consists of less than a quorum of the Commission,
3. Includes a defined purpose and the timeframe to accomplish that purpose and is less than one year in duration,
4. Will automatically terminate when a final report is given to the Commission, or when the timeframe established by the Commission is met, unless extended by the Commission at a public meeting,
5. Will not be re-established or renewed in multiple years, and
6. Is advisory in nature and is not established to work on an item where continuing jurisdiction exists

Working Pairs

- Unlike Ad Hoc Subcommittees which require a formal approval and are limited in time duration and scope, the Commission may assign Commissioners into working groups to provide research, information, fact gathering, prioritizing, or other activities related to the Commissions work plan.
- Working groups may consist of 1 or 2 Commissioners who are able to meet to discuss topics of interest to the Commission, prior to reporting back at an open meeting to the full Commission.
- The Commission may take action on the report or simply receive it.



Working Pairs

- Working groups are designed to allow Commissions to work in a more flexible manner, to respond to requests, initiatives, or direction from Council, or to move work plans forward.
- There is no limit to the amount of working pairs a Commissioner can participate in at one time.

- Component of plan or project
- Example: Flyer for New Library Feature



Commissioner Liaisons

- Commissions may assign individual Commissioners to act as a liaison to other boards, commissions, or agencies, without establishing an Ad Hoc Subcommittee.
- The full Commission should be updated in public
- The positions supported by the liaison are to be in alignment with the positions that the Commission or the City Council have taken if they have considered the topic



Commissioner Liaisons

- Can appoint official commission liaisons to any external organizations
- Current liaison assignments:
 - Friends of Los Altos Library – Pierre Bedard
 - Los Altos Library Endowment – Christine Fawcett
 - North County Library Authority – Julie Crane



Council Liaisons

- Council liaison will meet with Commission Chair and staff liaison once per year at a minimum as well as at joint meeting
- Council liaisons shall not direct, guide or unduly influence the policy making work of the City's advisory bodies



Conflict of Interest

- Perceived Conflict of Interest
- Incompatible Activities



Perceived Conflict of Interest

- A perceived conflict of interest for a Commissioner may arise from personal relationships, financial interests, serving on bodies or boards that have shared or overlapping subject matter jurisdiction as those under the jurisdiction of the Commission, or when it appears that the Commissioner's private interests impact the official duties of the Commissioner, or influence his/her decision-making.



Perceived Conflict of Interest

- Commissioners must notify Staff liaison
- Commissioner must disclose perceived conflict of interest before participating in discussion
- Commissioner will seek out advice from City Attorney or FPCC



Conflict of Interest

- Per state law, a public official, including commissioners, may not engage in any activity for compensation that is inconsistent, incompatible, or in conflict with their official duties with the City.



Conflict of Interest

- It is ultimately the responsibility of the Commission member to identify whether they may be engaging in incompatible activities or have a perceived conflict of interest.
- The City Attorney should be consulted as early as possible on any matters regarding incompatible activities or perceived conflicts of interest.



California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)

- CEQA requires government agencies to consider the environmental consequences of their actions before approving plans and policies or committing to a course of action on a project.
- Most actions by advisory bodies will not qualify as a CEQA project requiring additional steps.
- Commission liaisons will check whether projects require CEQA review prior to commission review.

Looking Forward to a Big Year for SCCLD Libraries

Last year was filled with several great [accomplishments](#) at our libraries. 2025 is shaping up to be another big year for SCCLD, with several construction projects finishing and a number of transformative initiatives taking place.

The Campbell community will welcome a fully [renovated library](#) by mid-year. The new jewel of the city's Civic Center will have more room for storytimes and special events, environmentally conscious energy usage and an improved layout, with extensive use of natural light to illuminate interior spaces.

A growing priority for the Library District has been promoting adult literacy through our Reading Program. A new facility dubbed "The Nest" is being constructed next to our administrative building by Los Gatos Creek County Park and will help us expand on these efforts with more dedicated space where tutors can meet one on one with learners, library staff and other tutors. As the name implies, The Nest is tied into the natural environment, with unique architectural features for sustainable practices and safer environments for the local flora and fauna. This building is scheduled to be opened by late 2025.

Los Altos Library is looking at renovations to hold outdoor events through its [courtyard expansion project](#), with construction planned for early this year and [completed by late fall](#). The 4,000 square foot area overlooks the civic center's historic orchard and provides opportunities for the busy library, which has seen double-digit increases in attendance year over year.

The Gilroy Library is considering facility improvements based recent community survey results. The Milpitas Library is refreshing its courtyard to better feature its international materials collection. Stay tuned as well for news from the City of Milpitas on its new StoryWalk® at one of their public parks. The Saratoga Library will open a new passport services office (SCCLD's fifth) in the first quarter of the year. And the Woodland Library has plans to better activate its exterior space.

Technology is getting upgraded at all the libraries as well including public computers in our libraries being upgraded to newer models. The critical automated material handling systems at each library is also being replaced with faster equipment which will help boost our overall efficiency of processing materials, as well as get all materials out more quickly throughout the system.

These are just some of the upcoming highlights for 2025. Stay tuned for more updates.

Grand Opening Elmwood Women's Library

Residents of the Elmwood Correctional Campus in Milpitas now have access to a beautiful new library organized and staffed by SCCLD librarians. This is the third partnership with County justice facilities to bring current library resources to incarcerated persons following the opening in 2023 of libraries at two County Probation run facilities geared toward juveniles and young adults. Elmwood is operated by the County Sheriff's Office Restorative Services Division.

A [news conference](#) celebrating the new space was held on Thursday, December 5, featuring County Librarian Jennifer Weeks, County Sheriff Bob Jonsen, and officials from the Restorative Services Divisions. Several facility residents also attended and spoke to the media about their excitement about having a curated library available to them, with titles that interest them. Spanish language television channel [Telemundo](#) and [KCBS News Radio](#) were among the outlets that covered the event. The County's Office of Communications and Public Affairs also [produced a feature](#) about this partnership.

As mentioned in the [news release](#) about the event, library services in jails play a critical role in reducing recidivism and improving reentry outcomes by providing resources that enable personal transformation. Providing inclusive and compassionate library service throughout the district is a Strategic Plan priority.

New Worlds for Kids to Explore

SCCLD will soon be the first library system in the state to offer immersive early literacy experiences for little learners and their families inside our libraries. **Storybook SCCLD** is built to instill the love of reading. This [conceptual video](#) gives an idea of the spirit of the initiative.



Parts of each community library's Children's areas will be transformed into interactive spaces with educational elements for little hands to practice motor skills, nooks for reading, special spaces for imaginative play, toddler-sized slides for active play, an interactive learning area for babies and pre-walkers, a balance element for all abilities, and seating for all ages. And each library's space and theme are unique!

The Saratoga Library will be the first to undergo a transformation, starting on January 20. The process takes around two months in total. SCCLD will stagger the start dates location by location to prepare, install and launch the play spaces to give families alternatives to visit other libraries during construction at their preferred libraries. Each library will offer smaller children's collections during installations. Find the schedule for each library's exciting transformation on our [Storybook SCCLD webpage](#). The project is being designed and developed with Luci Creative and Group 4 Architecture and is a realization of SCCLD's 5-year Strategic Plan priority to **Inspire** by "building the foundations of literacy within our community." The spaces promote the five practices of [Every Child Ready to Read](#) – talking, singing, reading, writing, and playing. All in one place, ensuring all children build the essential skills they need to become good readers!



Singer Songwriter Mazon Mendoza Concerts

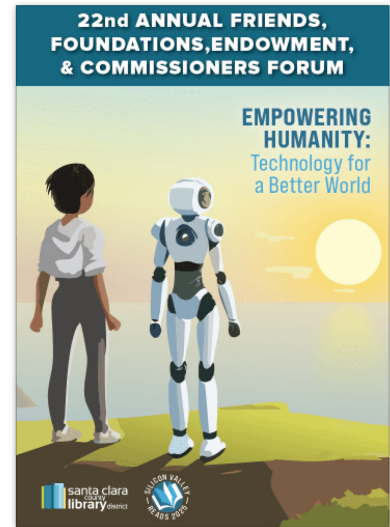
