SUBJECT: Los Altos Main Library Timed Parking

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive update from City staff on the installation of time parking in the main library parking lot and discuss with Library staff

BACKGROUND & DISCUSSION

After the April 7 Library Commission meeting, an official request was submitted to the City Manager on looking into the possibility of having timed parking outside the City's main library. This request was made due to the concern about the loss of parking spaces with the installation of the eventual permanent dog park and the increase of parking lot usage with the temporary dog park installed at Hillview Park soccer field. The thought was to be able to turn over a certain number of spaces for library patron usage.

Work between the Police Chief and the Maintenance Services Director began to decide what would be the best way to install and enforce this limited timed parking. Considerations that were made included the following.

- Length of time
- Location of the parking spaces
- Number of timed parking spaces
- Installation of signs
- Ability to enforce

Taking library programming and downtown parking enforcement into account, PD came to the conclusion that 2-hour parking would work best. This would be consistent with the downtown street parking limits. Allowing parking for 2-hours would also provide ample time for certain library programs while still turning over the spaces within a time that would discourage longer events on the campus to park there. The hours of timed parking will be consistent with the downtown signs as well (9am-6pm).

The location and number of spaces that would be timed was based on proximity to the library entrance. Being close to the main entrance was the factor that determined the location. The number of spaces was determined based on the location. There are exactly 14 spaces in the row across from the main entrance that run from the space nearest San Antonio Road to the drive entrance to the small lot. City staff found that to be a good number of spaces and easy to identify for signage and driver recognition.

Staff found that installing the signs along the curb of the spaces would be easy and out of the way of pedestrians. This made the selected location good for sign installation, while it's proximity to downtown and "one area" seemed to make it easier for PD enforcement.

Regarding enforcement: Library and City staff would be expected to park outside of the timed parking spaces, as there will not be permit or employee parking allowed. PD has indicated there will be an education/social media outreach period before any enforcement, but tire marking will commence after that period and citations will eventually be issued.

Work by the Public Works Department on pole installation had begun and signs have been ordered. We do not currently have a timeline on delivery of the signs. City staff will meet with PD to discuss enforcement timelines once the signs come in.





SOUND MITIGATION WALL – WOODLAND BRANCH

PROJECT FINDINGS

Infrastructure Subcommittee



POTENTIAL OPPORTUNITY & PROJECT APPROACH

- The Los Altos Woodland Branch Library consists of one open space area that are conceptually "divided" into two sections, the Adult area and the Children's area
 - There are no internal walls to physically separate the adult section from the children's section.
 - There is no separate quiet area for adults to work/read.
 - School children either studying alone or in groups and school children being tutored make up a large portion of the library patrons during weekday afternoons and all day on the weekends.
- The Infrastructure Subcommittee has been investigating various means for creating a quiet adult area.
- Our approach entailed:
 - Meeting with an architect who suggested constructing one or two walls of soundproof glass with door(s) in order to separate the library
 into two sections thereby providing a quiet adult area.
 - Investigating glass-walled soundproof rooms at other library locations
 - Morgan Hill
 - Cupertino Library
 - Obtaining initial cost estimates and preliminary drawings

KEY FINDINGS:

- Only one glass wall with one or two doors would be required to create a quiet adult space.
- Rough cost estimates are \$700 per running linear foot = approx. \$40,000 to provide one glass wall from the front door to the back wall. This estimate includes materials and installation
- The panels could be held together either by mullions which would go between each panel or by caulking. (See examples in next slide)
- A mechanical engineer would need to be consulted to determine if any adjustments to the HVAC would be necessary.
- Bryant Bao suggested that this project, if implemented, would best be carried out in conjunction with a reassessment to determine the optimal internal layout of the Woodland Branch.








7-27-2022 Report of the Awareness Subcommittee for the August 4, 2022, Library Commission Meeting

1. LALE ads

a. topics for upcoming months

b. update from Bryant on progress with Adobe InDesign Software

ACTION ITEM:

a. There was no mention of the In Person Tutoring Program on the SCCLD website and Bryant was unable to obtain any information about the program in time for the ad copy deadline for the August Town Crier ad. We opted to use the resource selected for September, Headspace, for our August ad. Bryant believes the In Person Tutoring Program will run from September to December so we will feature it for our September ad. We plan to feature O'Reilly Books in October. We will look for suggestions for November and December from Rose who is returning August 10, Bryant and the Library Staff as well as LALE board members and the Library Commissioners.

b. Bryant reports that he has used the Adobe InDesign software to change the colors in the LALE ads from RGB to CYMK however the ads as printed in the newspaper still have color fidelity issues in the recent LALE ad he creates – not the one the Awareness Subcommittee creates. So going forward, Bryant will create the ads from scratch using InDesign. He is also waiting for the new book template from the District's graphic designer. It will be like the book template that the Town Crier produced for us the last two ads. This new template will get rid of the gray background.

2. Bryant provided an update on the Pods for the Main Library

ACTION ITEM: The City of Los Altos required information, specifications, and formal drawings so they can evaluate fire safety and ADA compliance. A District architect will prepare this information and then the City will have to review it and grant approval of the pods before they can be ordered. Ventilation/air circulation equipment is required and will add to the cost of the pods. The Friends are aware of this, and Bryant advises they still are

on board with paying for the pods. The vendor estimates that delivery won't be possible until 18-20 weeks from receipt of the order.
