MEDIUM: Painted Steel

LOCATION: West Edith Avenue & University Avenue, Los Altos, CA 94022



CONDITION REPORT:

- The sculpture is structurally stable.
- There is possible corrosion under the paint, supported by the presence of blistering paint and some visible corrosion along bottom edge and along undersides of horizontal elements.
- There are several bent and misaligned elements: both legs are bent on the bottom figure; the proper left figure has a warped front leg; there is slight warping in the legs of the bagpipe and trumpet figures; the bagpipes are bent, the trumpet and bagpipes are intertwined.
- The paint is chalked and blanched.
- There is paint loss on vertical bars exposing a tan primer and a possible intermediate maroon colored primer.
- There are bird droppings, biogrowth, organic debris across the surface.
- There are mineral deposits across the front of the base.

TREATMENT PROPOSAL:

- Photographic and written documentation will be completed before, during and after treatment.
- Paint samples will be taken and color matched to identify an appropriate paint system for repainting.
- The site will be prepared and include a scaffold for access and a fence to prevent public access to wet paint surfaces.

- The deteriorated red paint will be sanded back to provide a key for repainting, both by hand and with palm sanders.
- Corrosion will be converted and reduced.
- The bent and misaligned elements will be realigned as far as possible.
- A painting tent will be installed to cover the artwork during the painting process.
- The chosen industrial paint system will be spray applied including primer, two coats of paint, and a clear top coat.

ESTIMATE:

For treatment as described:, including labor, materials, rental equipment, travel and documentation and photography: Labor, documentation and travel costs over eight days=\$21,790 Rental Equipment=\$7,000 Industrial Paint and Materials \$2,400 Total Cost = \$31,190

CONDITION REPORT:

- The sculpture is structurally stable.
- There are gouges, dents and abrasions in lower pipes and attachment points to the concrete pads
- There is a crack in the weld on the unpainted aluminum loop.
- There is a slight downward bend in the longest red painted horizontal element at the top of the sculpture
- Two layers of red paint are visible. The top layer is chalking and blanching with losses exposing a lower paint layer. The lower layer is more saturated in color but cracked in all exposed areas;
- There are chips, nicks and losses in both layers of red paint
- The clear coat on the unpainted aluminum elements is failing with aluminum oxide forming in areas of coating loss.
- There are tags on the painted surface.
- There is trash and debris within the tubes.
- There is overall surface dirt and grime, organic debris, and biogrowth,

TREATMENT PROPOSAL:

- Photographic and written documentation will be completed before, during and after treatment.
- Red paint samples will be taken and color matched to identify an appropriate paint system for repainting.
- The sculpture will be surrounded by a security fence during the treatment.
- The deteriorated red paint and clear coat will be reduced to a stable surface by sanding, both by hand and with palm sanders.

- The unpainted aluminum elements will be polished by hand and with orbital buffers.
- The crack in the loop will be filled and reinforced.
- An attempt will be made to rebend the dented elements to align them.
- The chosen paint system will be applied to the painted area including primer, and two coats of paint.

ESTIMATE:

For treatment as described:, including labor, materials, rental equipment, travel and documentation and photography: Labor, documentation and travel costs over eight days=\$20,030 Rental Equipment=\$7,000 Industrial Paint and Materials \$2,000 Total Cost = \$29,030

LOCATION: Main Street & Second Street, Los Altos



CONDITION REPORT:

- The sculpture is structurally stable.
- There are several losses along the central join.
- There are two vertical firing cracks at bottom, one is about a foot long and the other is about an inch in length.
- There is flaking glaze between the legs accompanied by minor losses.
- There are minor abrasions in the glaze
- There is soiling, bird droppings and organic debris across the surface.

TREATMENT PROPOSAL:

- Photographic and written documentation will be completed before, during and after treatment.
- The sculpture will be washed with a solution of dilute anionic detergent (Orvus) in potable water. Soiling, bird droppings and organic debris will be removed.

- The flaking glaze will be consolidated and losses will be toned to visually integrate them with the surrounding surface. Minor abrasions will be toned in the same way.
- Losses will be filled and toned with an appropriate inpainting material.

ESTIMATE:

For treatment as described, including labor, materials, rental equipment, travel and documentation and photography, the cost will be \$3,450

CONDITION REPORT:

- The sculpture is structurally stable.
- There is some corrosion under the paint.
- The paint is thickly applied with drips and bubbles.
- There are visible paint losses that have been painted over creating recessed areas in the paint.
- There are broken blisters in the paint.

TREATMENT PROPOSAL:

- Photographic and written documentation will be completed before, during and after treatment.
- Paint samples will be taken and color matched to identify an appropriate paint system for repainting.
- The deteriorated paint will be reduced by sanding, both by hand and with palm sanders.
- Corrosion will be reduced, and converted.
- Areas of corrosion will be spot primed with the primer from the chosen paint system.
- The chosen paint system will be applied including two coats of top paint.

ESTIMATE:

For treatment as described, including labor, materials, rental equipment, travel and documentation and photography, the cost will be \$6,600

CONDITION REPORT:

- The sculpture is structurally stable.
- Both sculptures are detached from their base and are at risk of loss.. When lifted there is a plastic footprint visible beneath each foot with several rusted screws pointing up from below. It appears that the bottom of each foot has become detached.
- There is cracking in the fiberglass and paint layers.
- There are cracks and losses to the fiberglass and paint, revealing the underlying wood especially on the necks. .
- A significant portion of the sculptures has been overpainted. The overpaint is blanching and delaminating from the underlying original paint.
- There is blanching, flaking and paint losses in both the original and secondary paint layers.

TREATMENT PROPOSAL:

- Photographic and written documentation will be completed before, during and after treatment.
- Recommend that since the sculpture can be deinstalled, transfer them to PA studio.
- The areas of flaking paint will be gently sanded by hand to remove the loose and deteriorated paint.
- Areas of fiberglass loss and cracking will be filled and toned to match the surrounding surface.
- The sculptures will be repainted with matching colors.
- The sculptures will be reattached to the original feet bottoms using appropriate adhesive and hardware.

ESTIMATE:

For treatment as described:, including labor, materials, rental equipment, travel and documentation and photography: $Total\ Cost = \$17,420$



Gilroy Library Patio's New Look








Welcome Heidi von Mayrhauser!

10-6--2022 Report of the Infrastructure Subcommittee Scheduled September 29, 2022

1. Orchard Room Foldable Partition

The subcommittee has completed its study of the feasibility of adding foldable partitions to the Orchard Room to divide the room to allow 2 smaller classes/events to be held simultaneously and is submitting its final report.

ACTION ITEMS: None.

2. Expanded Outdoor Patio Area at Woodland.

The Public Arts Commission recommended that rather than install a mural at the Woodland Branch Library, increasing the patio area to allow for more outside seating and study areas would satisfy a greater need.

The subcommittee is in the first stages of exploring the feasibility of clearing the vacant part of the lot where we want to expand by building a 4400 sq ft building extension. The idea is to clear part of the area and provide ground cover (sand/gravel) and picnic tables for students to congregate outside and for tutoring activities.

We contacted the City Manager, Gabe Engeland, regarding any possible liability issues for the city. He checked with the city's insurance carrier and advised the subcommittee that there were no issues. Mr. Engeland also advised that he thought the expanded patio is "a great idea." He advised that the maintenance crew would be happy to help clear the area to allow a sand or pea gravel land cover. And he also advised that the city would be happy to put money towards this project if it had commission and community support.

We contacted Jennifer Weeks, the County Librarian, and she had a favorable impression of the project.

We have also contacted our Council Liaison, Vice Mayor Sally Meadows, regarding Council approval of such a project and she advised that this may not need a formal vote by Council.




PROJECT FINDINGS



ORCHARD ROOM PARTITION OPPORTUNITY & ANALYSIS

- The Los Altos Main Library has the Orchard Room for community events and activities
 - 100 person capacity
 - Only Library Conference Room in Los Altos (including Woodland)
- The Infrastructure Subcommittee, at the request of the Community Librarian, worked to determine if there's a
 practical way to partition the room for greater flexibility and to possibly accommodate two groups simultaneously
- Our approach:
 - Found and interviewed potential vendors of partition walls for initial cost estimates and key considerations. We found three of the top five vendors with local distributors.
 - Interviewed librarians at Bay Area locations with such walls to see how often they use these partitions often and why
 - Morgan Hill
 - Fremont Main Library
 - Reviewed 2019 detailed Orchard Room calendar data as a baseline to assess whether a partition could add meaningful capacity
 - Finally, reviewed findings with library staff to see if a compelling business case can be made

MORGAN HILL PARTITION WALL






- Room is comparable to Orchard Room in capacity (92 vs. 100)
- Designed to accommodate a Modern Fold partition wall
- Uniquely split 2/3: 1/3 to accommodate a smaller group and larger one simultaneously

FREMONT MAIN LIBRARY:

- The Fukaya Room is roughly double the capacity of the Orchard Room, serving as the major community center for the City of Fremont.
- Originally built with the Huffcor partition wall as part of the design. Note how the wall hides within hidden closets when not in use.

BOTH LIBRARIES INTERVIEWED CITED BENEFITS OF A PARTITION WALL FOR THEIR LIBRARY

- Morgan Hill (Heather Geddes, Community Librarian):
 - 'We're happy with the split. We were splitting the room several times per week (pre-COVID)—sometimes to accommodate two programs and sometimes because a program like storytime worked better in a divided room
 - 'For example, our toddler program would happen on the larger side (2/3:1/3 split) and then at the end they could move to the smaller side for playtime.'
 - 'The partition is holding up well, and it's original to the building (2007). It has required some repair and maintenance, however'
- Fremont Main Library (Brian Edwards, Manager):
 - 'Pre-pandemic, we were using the partition daily or even multiple times per day'
 - Very happy with these doors. Can move the wall with just one person. Very high quality compared to other doors I've had experience with at Dublin and the prior system at Fremont Main. Hasn't gotten stuck once, and I've been Division Director since 2016.'

ARRIVING AT A RECOMMENDATION:

Estimated Cost = \$90K

- \$40K for partition wall, including installation
- \$50K Construction modifications—estimated by vendors to be 100% of product cost (so used highest estimate)



AT THIS TIME, DIFFICULT TO RECOMMEND INSTALLING A PARTITION WALL IN THE ORCHARD ROOM

- Calendar data analysis does not show a huge opportunity for a partition to add useful capacity
 - Library programs make up the vast majority of hours booked—therefore, these programs do not appear to be crowded out by rentals or other purposes
 - Furthermore, adding library programs would not constrained by room capacity—rather it would be library staff who could lead such activities
- Library Staff raised concerns about the value of a partition wall relative to other projects, as well as some potential complications
 - 'Would be useful, but can't see it being of a greater value vs. other competing projects for funds—e.g., outdoor/indoor patio addition'
 - "Just now getting back to normal...would hate to disrupt activities in order to modify the room for a partition"
 - "Would require modifying the room just to keep functionality (e.g., HVAC, lighting and AV controls), and the partition only serves to divide room capacity. The outdoor/indoor project would actually add capacity'
 - "If we had it. I'm sure we would use it, but..."




THE ORCHARD ROOM IS A HEAVILY UTILIZED LIBRARY RESOURCE



- Orchard Room bookings for all of 2019 included 563 events and ~1,200 hours
- 2019 Library Calendar encompassed 837 events and 1,580 hours


LIBRARY PROGRAMS MAKE UP THE VAST MAJORITY OF EVENTS AND HOURS IN THE ORCHARD ROOM





- Library Programs represent 83% of all Events booked and 80% of Hours
- Mon-Wed and Saturday bookings are 90%+ Program hours
- Both Saturday and Sunday are used to accommodate longer events
- Rentals take place only Friday-Sunday, mostly on Sunday

APPROXIMATELY HALF OF ORCHARD ROOM EVENTS COULD HAVE BEEN ACCOMMODATED WITH A PARTITIONED ROOM—ALLOWING FOR ADDITIONAL BOOKINGS, IF NEEDED



- Slightly more than a third of Orchard Room bookings had attendance data so used that for analysis
- 92 events with fewer than 50 people accounted for 290 hours...
- ...while those with more than 50 people accounted for 110 events and 160 hours
- In summary, a little less than half of events but about two-thirds of hours could have been accommodated with a partitioned room—allowing for other groups and events
