RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution reaffirming Resolution 2021-044 and making findings pursuant to Government Code Section 54953, as amended by Assembly Bill 361, and authorizing the continued use of virtual meetings due to health and safety concerns for the public.

BACKGROUND:

On March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20, which allowed for relaxed provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act) that allowed legislative bodies to conduct meetings through teleconferencing without having to meet the strict compliance of the Brown Act. All provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 concerning the conduct of public meetings expired on September 30, 2021.

DISCUSSION:

AB 361 was signed into law by the Governor on September 16, 2021, and went into effect immediately upon signing. It amends the Brown Act to allow local legislative bodies to continue using teleconferencing and virtual meeting technology after the September 30, 2021, expiration of the current Brown Act exemptions as long as there is a "proclaimed state of emergency" by the Governor. This allowance also depends on State or local officials imposing or recommending measures that promote social distancing or a legislative body finding that meeting in person would present an imminent safety risk to attendees.

DISCUSSION (Cont):

AB 361 requires Public agencies to make findings by majority vote within 30 days of the first teleconferenced meeting under AB 361 and every 30 days thereafter that a state of emergency

still exists and continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, or that officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, the Town Manager of Los Gatos acting in the capacity of Town of Director of Emergency Services, issued a Proclamation of Local Emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20, which suspended and modified the teleconferencing requirements under the Brown Act (California Government Code Section 54950 et seq.) so that local legislative bodies can hold public meetings via teleconference (with audio or video communications, without a physical meeting location), as long as the meeting agenda identifies the teleconferencing procedures to be used; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos ratified the Proclamation of Local Emergency as set forth in Resolution 2020-008 and remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2021, the Governor clarified that the "reopening" of California on June 15, 2021 did not include any change to the proclaimed state of emergency or the powers exercised thereunder; and

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which extended the provision of N-29-20 concerning the conduct of public meetings through September 30, 2021, and the Governor subsequently signed legislation revising Brown Act requirements for teleconferenced public meetings (Assembly Bill 361, referred to hereinafter as "AB 361"); and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021 Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which added subsection (e) to Government Code section 54953 of the Brown Act, and makes provision for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos approved Resolution No. 2021-044 on October 5, 2021 declaring the need for the Town Council, Boards, Commissions, and Committees to continue to meet remotely in order to ensure the health and safety of the public; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Los Gatos remains in a state of emergency due to the continuing spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated, or are at a higher risk of severe illness due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, that the Santa Clara County Public Health Department continues to recommend that public bodies meet remotely to the extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the Town's public meeting facility is indoor and not designed to ensure circulation of fresh/outdoor air, and not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; and

WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to Town facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, technology exists that allows full participation from members of the public without requiring in-person attendance at a Town Council, Board, Commission, or Committee meeting.

WHEREAS, the Town Council has considered all information related to this matter, including the associated staff report and other information relating to COVID-19 provided at prior public meetings of the Town Council; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council now desires to adopt a Resolution finding that the requisite conditions continue to exist for the legislative bodies of the Town of Los Gatos, as defined in the Brown Act, to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS DOES HEREBY RESOLVE:

- 1. The Town Council hereby finds that the fact set forth in the above recitals and as contained in Resolution 2021-044 are true and correct, and establish the factual basis for the adoption of this Resolution;
- 2. There is an ongoing proclaimed state of emergency relating to the novel coronavirus causing the disease known as COVID-19 and as a result of that emergency,

meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees of inperson meetings of this legislative body and all Town advisory bodies within the meaning of California Government Code section 54953(e)(1).

- 3. Under the present circumstances, including the risks mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the Town Council determines that authorizing teleconferenced public meetings consistent with Assembly Bill 361 is necessary and appropriate.
- 4. Staff are directed to take all actions necessary to implement this Resolution for all Town meetings in accordance with the foregoing provisions and the requirements of Government Code section 54953, as amended by Assembly Bill 361, including but not limited to returning for ratification of this Resolution every 30 days after teleconferencing for the first time pursuant to Assembly Bill 361 for so long as either of the following circumstances exists: (a) the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of this legislative body to meet in person; and/or (b) state or local officials, including but not limited to the County Health Officer, continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

Receive the Fourth Quarter Investment Report (April through June 2022) for Fiscal Year 2021/22.

DISCUSSION:

The Finance Commission received this report on August 8, 2022 and had no comments.

As of June 30, 2022, the Town's weighted portfolio yield was 1.37% which trended approximately 51 basis points above the Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) yield of 0.86%. This favorable yield differential to LAIF was primarily due to the LAIF portfolio's lower weighted average maturity (WAM) of 311 days versus the Town's longer WAM of 453 days. The Town's weighted average rate of return of 1.37% for the close of the fourth quarter is 21 basis points better than the 1.16% return at the close of the third quarter.

During the fourth quarter, LAIF yields climbed from to 37 basis points to 86 basis points through the end of June 2022. Staff in coordination with the Town's investment advisor continued primarily replacing maturing investments in shorter to medium term maturities in the two- to three-year maturity range. These investments capture current yields that exceed the rates expected to be earned in the State Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) pool during that same time period. The State LAIF pool typically lags the market when current market yields are either increasing or decreasing.

Interest rates rose across the yield curve in the quarter, especially in the short-term maturity range of six months to two years. The rise in short term rates was influenced by a 75-basis

point interest rate hike instead of a 50-basis point hike at the June 15 Federal Open Market Committee meeting.

It was the largest interest rate move by the Federal Reserve since 1994, taking the federal funds rate to a range of 1.5-1.75%. The Federal Open Market Committee statement offered "the Committee decided to raise the target range for the federal funds rate to 1-1/2 to 1-3/4 percent and anticipates that ongoing increases in the target range will be appropriate."

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the Finance Commission receive the Fourth Quarter Investment Report (April through June 2022) for Fiscal Year 2021/22.

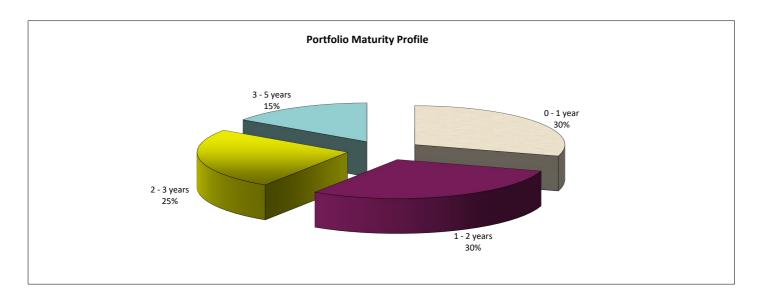

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this day of July 2018 and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and Mintier Harnish, LP, ("Consultant"), whose address is 1415 20th Street, Sacramento, CA 95811. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town desires to engage Consultant to provide Consultant Services for preparation of the General Plan update and Environmental Impact Report.
- 1.2 Consultant represents and affirms that they are qualified and willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement
- 1.3 Consultant warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Consultant acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Consultant.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Consultant shall provide the services as described in the Scope of Services attached as Exhibit A-1 and the schedule attached as Exhibit A-2.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. This contract will remain in effect from the date of execution through July 31, 2020.
- 2.3 Compliance with Laws. Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state, and local laws. Consultant represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications, and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession. Consultant shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Consultant shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Information/Report Handling</u>. All documents furnished to Consultant by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Consultant under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of Consultant's services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Consultant in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Consultant shall not make any of the these documents or information available to any

individual or organization not employed by, or under contract with, the Consultant or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Consultant in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Consultant expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Consultant which is and has been confirmed in writing by Consultant to be a trade secret of Consultant.

- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation for Consultant's professional services shall not exceed the \$1,174,975 inclusive of all costs. Payment shall be made against tasks at costs as set forth in Exhibit B Fee Schedule. Consultant shall be compensated for services in addition to those described in Exhibit A-1 only if Consultant and Town execute a written amendment to this Agreement describing the additional services to be performed and the compensation to be paid for such services. Fees for additional services will be allocated from the ten percent contingency identified on Exhibit B Fee Schedule.
- 2.7 <u>Flexibility</u>. As noted in Exhibit B Fee Schedule, the distribution of hours between firms, staff categories, and tasks are an estimate. While the total costs shall not exceed amount in Section 2.6 above, the distribution of hours/costs may vary depending on actual execution.
- 2.8 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed, by whom, at what rate, and on what date.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.9 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Consultant shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Consultant shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Consultant's offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.10 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Consultant. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.

- 2.11 Independent Contractor. It is understood that the Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Consultant may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Consultant agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Consultant or is based on allegations of Consultant's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.12 Conflict of Interest. Consultant understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Consultant has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Consultant has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Consultant warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Consultant shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person, Consultant discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.13 Equal Employment Opportunity. Consultant warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Consultant nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance.

i. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage.

- ii. Consultant agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy insuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Consultant shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Consultant agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.
- iv. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, professional liability insurance in amounts not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) which is sufficient to insure Consultant for professional errors or omissions in the performance of the particular scope of work under this agreement.

General Liability

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant; and premises owned or used by the Consultant. This requirement does not apply to the professional liability insurance required for professional errors and omissions.
- ii. The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has

- been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. Consultant shall maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town. Consultant shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Consultant provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Consultant shall save, keep, hold harmless, and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees, and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Consultant, or any of the Consultant's officers, employees, or agents or any subconsultant.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Consultant shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Consultant shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Consultant. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Consultant an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Consultant.
- 4.5 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.

4.6 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

Scope of Work

The following section provides our work program for the preparation of the Town of Los Gatos General Plan Update. This program is designed to respond to the scope items included in the Town's Request of Proposal (RFP) and provides for the formulation of a thoughtful and user-friendly General Plan and comprehensive program-level Environmental Impact Report (EIR) that can be used to streamline subsequent project-level proposals. The work program includes appropriate technical studies and community engagement opportunities that explore issues, opportunities, and solutions to guide the community to the year 2040.

In this work program, the term "Consultants" refers to members of the Consultant Team assembled for the project.

Details on community engagement activities are described under Task H, with placeholders shown under each task to show their relationship to the overall work program.

Task A Project Initiation

During this task, the Consultants will work with Town staff to lay the foundation for the General Plan Update, including developing tools to be used throughout the Update, meeting with the General Plan Advisory Committee (GPAC), the Planning Commission, and Town Council, and initiating the community engagement program.

Task A.1 Project Scoping Meeting, Kick-off Meeting, and Town Tour The Consultants will meet with Town staff to discuss expectations for the schedule, process, and work products and to refine the scope of work to address Town comments.

Following execution of the contract, the Consultants and Town staff will hold a project kick-off meeting. This meeting will confirm roles and responsibilities, establish communication protocols, refine and detail the project schedule based on actual start date, and discuss the initial ideas and strategies for community engagement (which will be refined and documented under Task H.1). Immediately following the kick off, the Consultants will tour the community with Town staff to examine key issues and opportunities that will be addressed in the General Plan Update.

Task A.2 Assemble GIS Data and Prepare Base Maps

The Consultants will work with Town staff to confirm the Planning Area and gather and format information for a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) database covering the Planning Area. The Consultants will prepare base maps suitable for reports and display presentation, including establishing a uniform legend and title block.

During the project kick-off meeting (Task A.1), the Consultants will work with Town staff to identify and obtain existing GIS resources from the Town and other identified agencies with GIS data covering the Planning Area. We will develop new GIS data and maps consistent with Town protocols and data formats to ensure easy integration into the Town's information system. At the end of the project, the Consultants will provide the Town the native files of all original data as well as project-specific GIS layers modified or created by the Consultants for the General Plan Update.

Exhibit A-1

As described in Task H.3, the Consultants will also present selected geographic data online using ESRI ArcGIS Online and/or ESRI Story Map.

Task A.3 Existing Data Collection and Compilation

Knowledge of existing conditions within the Town of Los Gatos will give the Consultants, and the community, a more thorough understanding of how the Town can move forward and what has changed since the last General Plan was prepared. At the beginning of the Update process, and prior to initiation of public engagement, the Consultants will compile (including native format files whenever possible) the following:

Applicable plans, studies, and analysis documents that currently exist within the various departments in the Town of Los Gatos that pertain to the General Plan. Documents may include, but are not limited to:

- General Plan
- Specific Plans
- Hazard mitigation plan
- Parks, open space, trails and recreation plans
- Municipal Code
- Any other pertinent information, documents, plans, and other items identified by Town Staff
- Applicable plans, studies, and analysis documents concerning Infrastructure and utilities
- Geographic information system (GIS) data
- Transportation plans

Pertinent information that is contained in these documents will be reviewed and used by the Consultants to develop the Existing Conditions Background Report (see Task B) that will be provided with the General Plan Update.

The Consultants will use and rely upon these existing resources to develop the General Plan and EIR information. The scope of work and budget are based on the availability and use of secondary data and the development of planning level qualitative assessments that are typical for a general plan update. This information will be supplemented with data collected by our team as described in Task B, Existing Conditions Background Report

GPAC Meeting #1 will be held during this task to facilitate data identification and collection (see Task H.5).

Engagement Activities During Task A:

Task B Prepare Existing Conditions Background Report

During this task, the Consultants will compile information on existing conditions within the town and Planning Area organized by the topics to be covered in the General Plan Update. The Existing Conditions Background Report (Background Report) will focus on identifying and evaluating existing conditions and future trends that will influence the development of the General Plan Update, the EIR, and the future of the community.

Administrative Draft Background Report

The Consultants will prepare an Administrative Draft Background Report and submit it to Town staff for review and comment. The Report will highlight current conditions and trends, and identify future opportunities and constraints, which will lay the groundwork for subsequent policy development. The report will address, at a minimum, the topics described in the request for proposals (RFP), although some reorganization and combinations are proposed.

- Land Use
- Population, Employment, and Housing
- Circulation and Transportation
- **Biological Resources**
- **Cultural Resources**
- **Economics**
- Infrastructure
- **Public Services**
- Noise
- Air Quality
- Safety and Hazards
- Geology
- Hydrology and Water Quality

During this task, the Consultants will compile information on existing conditions within the Planning Area organized by the topics identified above. This assessment will not only support the development of goals, policies, and programs, but will also serve as the setting information sections in the EIR.

Compiling existing conditions information will involve reviewing existing and draft documents (e.g., existing General Plan elements, zoning, other plans, special studies, EIRs) and contacting appropriate agencies and organizations serving the community. The Existing Conditions Report will include maps, charts, graphs, and photographs to illustrate conditions and trends in an easy-to-read format. Each topic area of the report will address the following:

- Introduction to the topic;
- Key terms (as appropriate to topic);
- Regulatory setting outlining key Federal, State, and local regulations and policies that are pertinent to the topic;
- A summary of existing conditions and setting;
- A brief description of key constraints and opportunities; and
- References (i.e., document citations, websites, and personal communications).

Land Use. The Consultants will analyze the existing General Plan land uses and adopted plans that affect development in Los Gatos. The Consultant will map and analyze existing land uses based on available GIS and/or Assessor's data and identify opportunities and constraints for future development and reuse. The Consultants will also describe regional planning efforts affecting the town.

This section will also summarize the community character of Los Gatos neighborhoods and districts and the design characteristics of each. This will include describing architectural patterns, community gateways, and major geographic features that define the character of Los Gatos.

Population, Employment, Housing, and Fiscal Stability. The Consultants will examine the demographic, employment, and market demand data for different land uses, including retail, industrial, and office development. For the demographic information, the Consultants will use a combination of primary data from the U.S. Census of Population, the American Community Survey, the Local Employment Dynamics database, Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG), and the California Department of Finance. This data, supplemented by information provided by Town staff, will include measures and trends such as population, housing characteristics, income distribution, educational attainment, ethnicity, commute patterns, and tenure.

We will prepare an overview of economic characteristics and analyze the recent employment trends to verify the leading sectors in the Los Gatos economic base. This analysis will address the types of office and light industrial uses that may be attracted to Los Gatos. For the local demand component, the Consultants will analyze the retail market in Los Gatos, including household demand, business-to-business transactions, and visitor spending. Using sales data provided by the Town sales tax audit firm, we will prepare the retail leakage analysis and provide recommendations on potential commercial development opportunities. We will also prepare a projection of future market growth for Los Gatos based on anticipated household growth and trends in the regional market area. Based on this analysis, the Consultants will develop recommendations for strategic actions and policies to help support the town's retail sector and address potential market threats related to changing market conditions.

The Consultants will also look at the current job-housing balance and use the labor force data and commute patterns to assess housing needs. We will look at how the existing labor force patterns compare with the employment base. The distribution of occupational employment and labor force by occupation can serve as an indicator for the types of housing that the labor force and job base will demand. The Consultants will also identify the existing service levels for various institutions in Los Gatos, such as education and health care facilities, and compare them with other communities. This will help assess future needs, based on population and/or employment growth.

Based on the market analysis above and factoring in the potential supply of land for different uses (employment-generating and residential), we will produce a market projection that addresses future demand for different land uses, as well as forecasts that will identify a range of potential needs for different types of spaces.

The Consultants will also prepare an analysis of the Town budget and how land uses affect Town revenues and costs. This will provide a foundation for later fiscal analysis of land use alternatives or changes in development capacity through the General Plan process.

Circulation and Transportation (Mobility). The Consultants will compile data and information on the existing transportation system, including roadways, transit services, and bicycle and pedestrian facilities. The Consultants will prepare a detailed description accompanied with maps and graphics illustrating the roadway system, bicycle and pedestrian facilities, peak hour traffic counts, pedestrian/bicycle counts, and transit routes/stops. We will use available Census and travel survey data to describe the travel behavior of Los Gatos residents and employees. Federal, State, regional, and local regulations pertaining to multimodal circulation in Los Gatos.

The Consultants will review collision data available through the California Highway Patrol's SWITRS reports to identify specific "hot spots" that have experienced high rates of automobile, pedestrian, and/or bicyclist collisions.

The Consultants will determine existing intersection levels of service using the collected traffic volume data, intersection geometric configurations, and signal phasing (to be provided by the Town). The Consultants will conduct weekday AM and PM peak period traffic counts (vehicles, bikes, and pedestrians) for 10 key study intersections and 24-hour counts on 20 roadway segments (for informational purposes). We will develop the exact list of locations in cooperation with Town staff. To represent typical conditions, we will collect all data during a typical non-holiday weekday and while local schools are in session.

Using transit ridership data from VTA and input from Town staff, we will map key transit trip origins and destinations and used to assess connectivity of transit service. Transit operations will include the peak load factors for bus routes serving Los Gatos.

We will map key pedestrian and bicycle origins and destinations to assess the pedestrian and bicycle network completeness. We will identify gaps in the pedestrian and bicycle networks.

Biological Resources. The Consultant will summarize sensitive habitats, principal vegetation cover types, and special-status and endangered species. This will include primary source material from the Santa Clara Valley Habitat Plan, supplemented with limited windshield surveys and review of existing biology studies completed for the town.

Cultural Resources. The Consultant will summarize historic structures and locations and conduct archeological sensitivity analyses for both prehistoric and historic sites using records maintained at the regional information center and in published research papers. The Consultant will ensure that appropriate individuals are contacted with the surrounding Native American Tribes to ensure sensitive cultural resources are documented appropriately. This section will include areas for the protection of cultural resources consistent with recent State mandates (SB 18).

Economics. See Economics, Population, Employment, and Housing description, above.

Public Facilities, Services, and Infrastructure. The Consultant will summarize infrastructure, resources, services, and facilities related to: water supply and delivery, wastewater collection and disposal, stormwater drainage, solid waste and recycling, energy and telecommunications, law enforcement, fire protection, health care, schools and education, and government services. For each of the topical areas described, the Consultant will identify planned facility improvements and estimate future demands based on projected development compared to available capacity and planned improvements, identifying potential facility and/or service shortfalls. The Consultant will also assess if the General Plan must include information related to recent State mandates that require cities to identify service needs for unincorporated disadvantaged communities (SB 244).

Noise. The Consultant will review existing noise data, including recent EIRs and studies, and summarize the existing noise environment in Los Gatos resulting from major roadways and highways, and stationary noise sources and activities. The Consultant will also document existing noise-sensitive areas and sites. The Consultant will also summarize current information on ground vibration. The Consultant will also update existing noise contours based on the data collected during the noise monitoring survey and traffic data developed/collected.

Air Quality. The Consultant will summarize existing air quality conditions within Los Gatos and the nearby vicinity. This will specifically include the location of existing sensitive receptors and emission sources, existing mass emissions, ambient air quality concentration data from the most applicable monitoring station(s), attainment designations, and natural factors that relate to the transport and dispersion of air pollutants. This summary will include applicable Federal, State, and local regulations, as well as thresholds of significance recommended by Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD) and rules for which compliance will be required.

Safety and Hazards (including Geology). The Consultant will summarize existing natural and manmade hazards. As part of this evaluation, the Consultant will summarize the geological environment and associated hazards. This section will address Seismic Hazard Zones (i.e., Seismic Hazards Mapping Act of 1990 and the Alquist-Priolo Earthquake Fault Zoning Act of 1972) and soil strength properties. The Consultant will describe major creeks, streams, and drainages, and will summarize the latest FEMA floodplain mapping to illustrate potential safety and development constraints. The Consultant will summarize urban and wildland fire risks, fire hazard risk areas, and fire protection resources. The Consultant will also summarize major users and producers of hazardous materials within or adjacent to the Town.

Hydrology and Water Quality. The Consultant will summarize sources of groundwater and surface water, water consumption rates, measures used to conserve water, and renewable water facilities and resources. This section will document potential pollution sources, areas susceptible to water quality degradation, and source issues and capacity constraints.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions and Climate Change Adaptation. The Consultants will prepare a climate change background report and existing GHG inventory that includes a discussion of climate change and how the General Plan Update should address this issue, including both the reduction of GHG emissions and climate change vulnerability and adaptation. The report will briefly summarize relevant background information regarding these topics and lay out a framework for the General Plan Update to address climate change, including how the General Plan can implement the existing Sustainability Plan (2012) to serve as a "plan for the reduction of GHG emission" to achieve streamlining benefits per Section 15183.5 of the State CEQA Guidelines.

- GHG Emissions. The Consultants will summarize relevant legislation and guidance regarding preparation of a GHG reduction strategy or climate action plan, including the five-step process of preparing an inventory (updates since the 2012 inventory was conducted) and forecasts (including through 2030 and the General Plan horizon year), setting new GHG targets, and developing updated and/or new GHG reduction measures.
 - The Consultants will also prepare an inventory of recent annual GHG emissions for communitywide activities within Los Gatos, building off of the data contained in the 2012 Sustainability Plan, using information provided by the Town, energy utilities, the traffic consultant, and other sources such as Plan Bay Area or other regional planning documents. The Consultants will prepare the inventory in accordance with established GHG inventory protocols that are appropriate for local municipalities (e.g., Local Government Operations Protocol [LGOP] and ICLEI Communitywide Protocol). The inventory will be focused primarily on emissions that are within the Town's jurisdictional control or influence. The inventory will not attempt to quantify emissions that are outside the scope of the effort, such as lifecycle/carbon footprint analysis or changes in carbon sequestration or storage in natural or working lands. The inventory will serve as the reference point from which emissions forecasts and reduction targets can be prepared during later phases of the project.
- Climate Change Adaptation. The Consultants will prepare a communitywide, planning-level climate change vulnerability assessment, using tools and methods established by the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR), the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA), and the California Energy Commission (CEC), including the Cal-Adapt web-based tool, the Adaptation Planning Guide, the 2017 General Plan Guidelines, and other resources. The assessment will examine the adverse effects of climate change relevant to Los Gatos, building on townwide work already completed as part of the Sustainability Plan and existing policies/programs contained in the existing Environment and Sustainability Element. Key issues that will be addressed include extreme heat, changes in precipitation and drought, increased risk of flooding and wildfire, and other impacts. The assessment will help inform SB 379 adaptation measures to be included in the General Plan Policy Document.

Healthy Communities. The Healthy Communities chapter will examine public health challenges facing Los Gatos and identify opportunities for improving health and well-being of residents though a variety of land use, transportation, and other built environment strategies. Our analyses will shed light on key public health issues impacted by the built environment including: obesity, chronic diseases, lack of physical activity and unhealthy eating, injuries, asthma, and health disparities. The Consultant will look at the impact of these issues on special populations such as children, youth, and seniors. The Consultant will also identify a set of healthy community indicators that will be used to describe community factors in Los Gatos that support or act as barriers to active and healthy lifestyles. The Consultant will use GIS maps and graphics to present these findings and illustrate the local "place-health" connections.

Environmental Justice. Community health, environmental justice, and social equity are emerging as important issues that communities are addressing in general plans. SB 1000 requires jurisdictions that have disadvantaged communities to adopt an environmental justice (EJ) element or incorporate EJ policies into their general plans. Based on a review of CalEnviroscreen 3.0, which is considered the default tool used to identify disadvantaged communities, there are not currently any areas identified that would require special treatment as part of the General Plan Update, but this fact will be documented as part of the Background Report.

Task B.2 Public Draft Background Report

Following review by Town staff, the Consultants will revise the Background Report and provide a Public Draft document for review with the GPAC, the Planning Commission, Town Council, and community (see Tasks H.9and H.11).

Task B.3 General Plan Audit Report

An initial step in the update of the General Plan will be an assessment (audit) of the current General Plan. This assessment will look at the current plan and revisions and additions needed to address changes in State law, the new 2017 OPR General Plan Guidelines, and contemporary planning practice and content.

In addition to meeting current requirements and planning practice, we will also work with Town staff to evaluate the existing General Plan to determine what works, what does not work, and where the plan is not providing adequate or current guidance. This will be done using our proprietary General Plan Evaluation Tool. This Tool provides insights on the existing General Plan clarity; linkages to other plans; progress in achieving desired outcomes; and whether goals, policies, and actions should be carried forward, modified, or removed. The results of this review will be documented in a General Plan Audit Report.

Task C.2 Public Draft Issues, Opportunities, and Constraints Summary Following review by Town staff, the Consultants will revise the Administrative Draft and prepare a Public Draft Issues, Opportunities, and Constraints Summary for review with the GPAC, the Planning Commission, Town Council, and community (Tasks H.12, H.13, and H.14).

Task C.3 Final Issues, Opportunities, and Constraints Summary Following review by the Town Council and Planning Commission, the Consultants will revise the document and prepare a final Issues, Opportunities, and Constraints Summary.

Development of a General Plan Vision Task D

A General Plan vision statement and guiding principles are intended to reflect what community members value most about their community and the shared aspirations of what they envision their community being in the future. The vision statement should be inspirational and set the key values and aspirations for the General Plan's guiding principles, goals, policies, and implementation measures. The guiding principles should provide more specific guidance that provides the fundamental rules or doctrine that the Town will use to guide General Plan goals, policies, and implementation measures.

During this task, the Los Gatos Vision Statement and Guiding Principles will be developed to guide the preparation of the General Plan Update.

Administrative Draft Vision and Guiding Principles Task D.1

The Consultants will prepare the Administrative Draft Vision Statement that represents the ideal future for the community and a set of Guiding Principles that support the Vision and represent the Town's core values. We will base the Vision and Guiding Principles on public input gathered at the stakeholder interviews, community workshops, GPAC meetings, and Town Council/Planning Commission study sessions, as well as input from Town staff.

Task D.2 Public Draft Vision and Guiding Principles

Following review by Town staff, the Consultants will revise the Administrative Draft and prepare a Public Draft Vision and Guiding Principles for review with the GPAC, the Planning Commission, Town Council, and community (Tasks H.15, H.16, and H.17).

Task D.3 Final Vision and Guiding Principles

Following review by the Town Council and Planning Commission, the Consultants will revise the document and prepare the final Vision and Guiding Principles that the Town will use to guide development of the General Plan Update.

Task E Development of Alternatives

During this task, the Consultants will work with Town staff and the community to prepare, evaluate, and ultimately define a preferred policy and land use alternative that will be the basis of the General Plan Update. This task involves developing alternative scenarios for special planning areas and other key locations in the community and evaluating the implications of each alternative. We will also evaluate each alternative based on responsiveness to the key issues, opportunities, and constraints (from Task C) and the Vision and Guiding Principles developed in Task D.

Task E.1 Administrative Draft Alternatives Report

Based on inputs received from the community as well as ideas from the Consultant team, the Consultants will prepare an Administrative Draft Alternatives Report for review by Town staff and the GPAC. This Report will contain a mix of land use and circulation alternatives as well as key policy alternatives. Based on the RFP, the land use and circulation alternatives may potentially address: land use mix, development options for key sites, approaches to commercial corridors, circulation options, and interactions between land use and transportation systems.

The Alternatives Report will include maps and descriptions for land use, circulation, and policy alternatives that cover each of the areas and topics identified earlier. We will group location-specific alternatives into alternative packages that achieve the Vision and Guiding Principles. The assessment conducted will include an evaluation of alternatives in terms of implications for land use and community character, economic development, fiscal health, mobility and connectivity, public facilities and services, and the natural environment. For each policy alternative, the Consultants will identify the issues for which there is clear policy choice and direction, as well as issues where choice and direction is not as clear. We will complete a

qualitative comparative assessment of the policy implications of each alternative based on clarity and congruence with key issues.

The Consultants will prepare an Alternatives Report that clearly communicates the potential implications of each alternative, supporting a more informed choice. We will base the assessment of each alternative choice primarily on a qualitative look at factors that can be used to differentiate the alternatives and their potential impacts on the community relative to achieving the Vision and Guiding Principles. There are two areas where we will provide more quantifiable information: fiscal impacts and the transportation system.

The work done at this stage is designed to help the community evaluate the alternatives presented and is not intended to be a full CEQA alternatives analysis (which will be performed as part of a later task).

Subtask E.1a Fiscal Impact Analysis

The Consultants will prepare an analysis of the fiscal and economic impact of proposed land use changes being considered as part of the General Plan Update. This may be in the form of an alternatives analysis or an analysis of the preferred land use plan, as needed in the overall process. The fiscal analysis will project Town tax revenues and other revenues normally affected by growth in population, jobs, and development. The Consultants will estimate the increases in service capacity needed to support the proposed growth levels or from changes in the land use mix. The fiscal model allows us to evaluate land uses separately to assist in identifying an optimal land use mix from the standpoint of generating sufficient tax base to support Town services.

Subtask E.1b Transportation System Alternatives

The Consultants will develop trip generation and VMT estimates using our MainStreet tool for each of the land use alternatives. These trip generation and VMT estimates will be used in the selection of the preferred alternative. The Consultants will also provide qualitative assessments of each alternative using criteria developed in concert with Town staff to reflect Los Gatos community values. They may include items such as the availability of transportation services, the potential to increase traffic congestion, and the potential to reduce average VMT.

Task E.2 Public Draft Alternatives Report

Following review by Town staff, the Consultants will revise the Administrative Draft and prepare a Public Draft Alternatives Report for review with the GPAC, Planning Commission, Town Council, and community (Tasks H.19, H.20, H.21, and H.22).

Task F General Plan Goals and Policy Development

Based on the extensive work resulting from the Background Report, technical studies, visioning, and alternatives planning in previous tasks, the Consultants will prepare the draft General Plan. The Consultants will prepare a General Plan document that is attractive, contemporary, and user-friendly, using extensive photos, illustrations, and maps. We are also proposing to include the development of a web-based General Plan at the end of the project.

Task F.1 Administrative Draft General Plan

For the Update, the Consultants will address all the requirements of State law, such as complete streets, flood risk reduction, and environmental justice, using the 2017 OPR General Plan Guidelines as a guide. The Plan will reflect best practices for addressing contemporary planning issues, such as retail trends, transportation technology, and community health. It is expected that the cross-cutting topics of climate change, sustainability, resiliency, and healthy communities would be themes addressed throughout the Plan, rather than separate, standalone elements; however, we will discuss options with Town staff.

The General Plan will include an Introduction and Table of Contents, and at a minimum, will update the content of the elements that make up the current Los Gatos General Plan:

- Land Use Element;
- Community Design;
- Transportation Element (Circulation);
- Vasona Light Rail Element;
- Open Space, Parks, and Recreation Element (Open Space);
- Environment and Sustainability Element (Conservation);
- Noise Element;
- Safety Element; and
- Human Services Element.

Prior to the start of this task, and considering the results of the General Plan Audit conducted earlier, the Consultants will work with Town staff to determine the outline (framework) for the General Plan Update. To support this, the Consultants will review with Town staff a selection of plan formats that could be used. This could include the combination of existing elements or the addition of new elements to meet current and projected needs.

As part of this task, the Consultants will develop policies and programs to reduce GHG emissions as part of an integrated GHG reduction strategy.

The current Housing Element will be integrated into the General Plan Update when the final documents are prepared at the end of the project. The Town's current Housing Element will not be updated as part of this project.

Implementation Strategy

The Consultants will prepare a comprehensive implementation strategy that includes discrete, tangible actions the Town will undertake to implement the goals and policies. The Consultants will also review current implementation ordinances/regulations (e.g., zoning, subdivision, historic preservation, public arts, and other

implementing ordinances) and include recommendations as a part of the implementation programs for ordinance revisions needed to maintain consistency with the General Plan.

As part of the Update, the Consultants will review and develop new objective standards that provide clear direction on application and intent.

Task F.2 Administrative Draft Land Use and Circulation Diagrams

The Consultants will prepare an updated General Plan (Land Use) Diagram and Circulation Diagram as part of the Administrative Draft General Plan. We will update the Land Use Diagram with any changes made to the designations and locations they apply based on the preferred alternative. For the Circulation Diagram, we could use VMT to develop roadway standards instead of or in addition to LOS standards (as desired).

Task F.3 Preliminary Draft General Plan

Based on direction from Town staff, the Consultants will revise the Administrative Draft General Plan and prepare a Preliminary Draft General Plan for review and confirmation by the GPAC, Planning Commission, and Town Council. We recommend this review to confirm direction on changes to the General Plan before preparation of the EIR (see Task H.23 and H.24). This approach helps reduce the potential for major changes to the Plan during or after the environmental review process.

Task F.4 Public Draft General Plan

Based on direction from the Town Council, the Consultants will prepare the Public Draft General Plan for publication and environmental review.

Task F.5 General Plan Consultation and Referrals

State law requires consultation with a variety of Federal, State, regional, and local agencies whenever a jurisdiction updates or amends its general plan. These statutes are located throughout the Government Code and have varying requirements for when draft and final documents must be submitted and how long agencies have to review and provide comments. We maintain a checklist of agency consultation requirements that we will use to ensure the Town provides the Public Draft General Plan to the appropriate agencies.

Task G Environmental Impact Report

Based on review of the RFP and our experience preparing General Plan EIRs, we recommend the preparation of a Program EIR pursuant to State CEQA Guidelines Section 15168. Although the legally-required contents of a Program EIR are technically the same as those of a Project EIR, Program EIRs are by necessity more general and may contain a broader discussion of impacts, alternatives, and mitigation measures than a Project EIR.

Use of a Program EIR provides the Town with the opportunity to consider broad policy alternatives and program-wide mitigation measures and greater flexibility to address environmental issues and/or cumulative impacts on a comprehensive basis. Once a Program EIR has been certified, subsequent activities within the program may be evaluated to determine what, if any, additional CEQA documentation needs to be prepared. If the Program EIR addresses the program's effects as specifically and comprehensively as possible, many subsequent activities could be found to be consistent with the Program EIR mitigation parameters and additional environmental documentation may not be required (CEQA Guidelines Section 15168(c)). In this case, the Program EIR serves a valuable purpose as the first-tier environmental analysis that will assist in streamlining and possibly exempting future projects from CEQA with the idea that the General Plan Program EIR can be used for such exemptions when projects are consistent with the General Plan Update.

Task G.1 Staff Work Session on Program EIR Preparation

The consultants will facilitate a work session with Town staff on preparing the Program EIR and completing the adoption process. The session, often referred to as a CEQA kickoff meeting, will cover the following topics:

Evaluating Environmental Impacts

- Strategies for CEQA compliance
- Coordination of environmental document with general plan preparation
- Developing a reasonable range of alternatives
- Using new or revised policies as mitigation measures
- GHG gap analysis

Completing the Process

- Agency consultation
- Public notice
- Hearings
- Adoption
- Final documents

Task G.2 Notice of Preparation

The Consultants will work with Town staff to develop a project description and will prepare a draft Notice of Preparation (NOP) for Town staff to review. The NOP is intended to alert other public agencies about the undertaking, and to solicit their input on the scope of the study. The Consultants will submit a final PDF copy of the NOP to Town staff for posting on its website and for distribution to public agencies. It is assumed that the Town will distribute the NOP using the Town's NOP distribution list. The Consultants will review and make suggestions regarding the list. The Consultants will be responsible for filing the NOP with the State Clearinghouse/OPR.

Task G.3 Scoping Meeting

The Consultants will facilitate a public and agency scoping meeting associated with the release of the NOP. The Scoping Meeting will be held during the 30-day NOP period to introduce the community to the EIR process and obtain input on the Program EIR scope of work. It will include a brief presentation, followed by public comment and input from meeting attendees. The Consultants will prepare a summary of all input gathered, which will be included in the Draft Program EIR along with any written public comments received during the NOP comment period.

Task G.4 Administrative Draft Program EIR

The Consultants will prepare an Administrative Draft Program EIR (ADPEIR) in compliance with CEQA requirements using information gathered as part of the General Plan update effort and comments on the NOP, as well as information from other relevant CEQA documents completed by the Town in recent years. The Consultants will be responsible for development of a legally-adequate and appropriate Program EIR for the General Plan.

The Consultants will prepare the ADPEIR based on the project description approved by the Town Council. The description of the environmental and regulatory setting for the General Plan EIR will be based on the Background Reports prepared for the project (see Task B), and information from other relevant CEQA documents completed by the Town in recent years, as well as any information received during the General Plan Update process. Materials will be presented in a user-friendly format.

We will introduce each topical section in the environmental analysis with a brief statement of its context in the ADPEIR and the development of the General Plan. This effort may include interpretive information for the reader to better understand how the General Plan affects the environment, as well as the sources of data used in the analysis.

The setting for each topical section will describe existing conditions relevant to the topic and provide the groundwork for impact analysis. The number of impacts to be analyzed and the depth of analysis will be determined based on areas of concern identified by the Consultants and Town staff, as well as responses to the NOP. Thresholds used to determine the significance of project impacts will be clearly stated and will include thresholds in the CEQA Guidelines, Appendix G, as well as existing regulatory standards, if applicable. Impacts will be identified, and mitigation measures will be prepared, to reduce significant impacts to a less-than-significant level, when feasible. For each potentially significant impact identified in the ADPEIR, the Consultants will identify mitigation measures or policy statements proposed by the Town as part of the General Plan Update to avoid or reduce identified impacts. Mitigation measures will be constructed as policy statements or implementation measures to facilitate incorporation into the General Plan Update.

In order to prepare an ADPEIR that meets the needs of the Town and regulatory requirements of the State, the ADPEIR will comprise the following sections:

Executive Summary. This section will provide a summary of the entire ADPEIR and include the following:

- a discussion of the project objectives;
- a brief description of the proposed project;
- a summary of the environmental setting for the Planning Area;
- a summary of impacts;

- a summary of mitigation measures (mitigating policies or programs);
- a discussion of alternatives considered; and
- areas of controversy, and issues remaining to be resolved.

Introduction. The ADPEIR will contain an introductory chapter that provides an overview of the project and context, summarizes CEQA requirements and the environmental review process, describes the legal purpose of the ADPEIR, outlines the environmental issues being addressed, and presents the organization of the report.

Project Description and Environmental Setting. This section will contain the Town's objectives for the General Plan and a summary of the General Plan components. It will also outline the Planning Area boundaries and summarize existing conditions and new land uses proposed as a part of the project. We will describe the information in a mix of text, tabular, and graphic form (i.e., maps and diagrams).

Analysis, Impacts, and Mitigation Measures. The environmental analysis section will include four main components:

- Setting description of current conditions with respect to the issue in question, including the
 existing regulatory environment
- Impact analysis statement of significance thresholds and discussion of potentially significant
 effects of the proposed project
- Programmatic mitigation measures methods by which significant effects can be reduced or eliminated, often presented as General Plan policies to be introduced back into the plan
- Level of significance after mitigation discussion of whether proposed mitigation measures reduce impacts to below the adopted significance threshold

We will consider adverse impacts that meet or exceed significance thresholds significant. Additionally, all impacts will be characterized in terms of short- or long-term effects and presented in a logical discussion that the public can understand. We will discuss any inconsistencies with local or regional plans.

We will discuss approaches to the impact analysis for the Program EIR with Town staff and will be consistent with the assumptions and methodologies used in recent Town-certified EIRs to the extent possible. In general, the impact analysis will focus on the issues present in the Planning Area and likely to be affected or impacted by the General Plan Update. Some issues, such as agriculture and mineral resources may not require a detailed analysis relative to other issues because they do not occur in Los Gatos or would be unaffected by the project.

Issues to be analyzed in a programmatic framework will include:

- Aesthetics
- Agriculture
- Air Quality
- Biological Resources
- Cultural Resources
- Geology and Soils
- Greenhouse Gas Emissions
- Hazards and Hazardous Materials

- Hydrology and Water Quality
- Land Use and Planning
- Mineral Resources
- Noise
- Population and Housing
- Public Services
- Recreation
- Transportation and Traffic
- Tribal Resources
- Utilities and Service Systems
- All the mandatory CEQA sections including energy and growth inducement

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Analysis

The Consultants will conduct necessary analysis to address CEQA Guidelines Section 15064.4. The Consultants will prepare the GHG section of the ADPEIR addressing the contribution of GHG emissions generated by buildout of the General Plan and their contribution to cumulative impacts related to climate change. Potential impacts and mitigation measures will be coordinated with the recommended targets and GHG emission reduction potential of the updated General Plan's policies and program.

Prepare GHG Forecasts and Reduction Targets

Based on the GHG emission inventory (conducted in Task 2.2), the Consultants will prepare GHG emissions forecasts (e.g., "business-as-usual") for communitywide sources for two future-year scenarios: 1) without applicable legislative actions; and 2) with reductions associated with implementation of adopted Federal and State legislation (e.g., renewable energy portfolio standards, California Green Building Code standards, vehicle emissions controls, fuel efficiency standards). The Consultants will forecast GHG emissions for 2020 (consistent with AB 32), 2030 (consistent with SB 32), and 2050 (consistent with Executive Order B- S-3-05), along with the GPU buildout year (i.e., 2040).

The Consultants will also calculate GHG reduction targets required to meet the Town's local fair share of the State's 2020 and 2030 GHG reduction goals in AB 32 and SB 32, per guidance from CARB in the 2017 Scoping Plan Update and the 2017 General Plan Guidelines.

Quantify GHG Reduction Measures and Perform Gap Analysis

The Consultants will quantify the GHG reduction potential of proposed General Plan policies and programs and conduct a "GHG reduction gap analysis" to determine whether the proposed policies and programs in the Draft General Plan can achieve the Town's GHG reduction targets and goals.

As part of the GHG quantification process, the Consultants will evaluate and prioritize policies and actions using the following or similar criteria:

- Quantified VMT or trip reduction potential;
- Quantified energy conservation or fuel savings potential;
- Quantified renewable energy generation potential;
- Quantified water efficiency and conservation potential;

- Quantified solid waste reduction and recycling potential;
- Administrative/political responsibility and feasibility, implementation costs, possible funding sources, and public and private sector implementation partners.

We will add all information, assumptions, and target indicators used to quantify GHG emissions reductions required to meet the targets into the ADPEIR as a technical appendix, creating a single, master data-set for the GHG reduction analysis. If it is determined during preparation of the ADPEIR that the identified draft policies and program are not enough to achieve the Town's reduction targets and goals, the Consultants will increase participation rates of GHG reduction actions or identify new potential GHG reduction policies and actions to fill the gap. If needed, revised or new policies and implementation programs will be added to the General Plan and/ or recommended as mitigation measures.

Transportation Analysis

The operations of study intersections and freeway segments on SR 17 and SR 85 will be evaluated with LOS calculations during the AM and PM peak hours for the following traffic study scenarios:

- Existing Conditions
- Cumulative 2040 without Project
- Cumulative 2040 with Updated General Plan Land Use and Circulation Element

The Consultants will use transportation forecasts from the VTA's travel demand model to determine the growth in traffic, including regional traffic growth on SR 17 and SR 85 for a plan year (2040). We will add traffic estimates from Task 3 for the preferred land use to develop traffic forecasts for Scenario 3.

We will prepare a LOS table showing operating conditions of all study intersections for each of the study scenarios, along with "Project plus mitigated conditions" (if mitigations required and/or are feasible). We will use the Town of Los Gatos and VTA criteria to identify significant impacts to intersections and freeway segments.

Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Transit Analysis

The Circulation Element will include improvements to pedestrian, bicycle, and transit facilities and services. If bus rapid transit (BRT) is included in the Circulation Element, we will evaluate its impact at a planning level by comparing person carrying capacities and levels of service at a few selected intersections with and without its implementation.

VMT Travel Forecast Model Runs to Support Air Quality and Noise Analyses

The Consultants will use the VTA's model to provide input for the air quality and noise analyses.

For Air Quality and Greenhouse Gas Emissions Analysis:

- 1. Average Daily Vehicle Trips associated with existing land uses (2018) in Los Gatos
- 2. VMT associated with existing land uses in the Los Gatos
- Average Daily Vehicle Trips associated with 2040 without Project and with Project land uses in Los Gatos (at the planning horizon)

- 4. VMT associated with the 2040 without Project and with Project land uses in Los Gatos GP Plan Year
- 5. VMT by I-X, X-I, I-I (excluding X-X trips), if available

For Noise Analysis:

- 1. Daily Segment Traffic Volumes for Existing for all segments analyzed
- Daily Segment Traffic Volumes for 2040 without Project and 2040 GP Plan Year for all segments analyzed
- 3. Speed limits on the segments for existing and future time frames, if available

Alternatives Analysis. We will consider a range of alternatives in the ADPEIR. State CEQA Guidelines require consideration of the "No Project" Alternative. For purposes of this Program EIR, the No Project Alternative would be a continuation of the existing General Plan without any updates or additions. In addition to the "No-Project" Alternative, the Consultants will consider other alternatives (such as alternative land use scenarios) that were developed during the General Plan Update. Evaluation of alternatives will be in less detail than that for the proposed project, though the analysis will provide decision-makers and the public adequate information to decide between alternatives. This section will also identify the "environmentally superior alternative." If the "No Project" Alternative is determined to be environmentally superior, the ADPEIR will identify the environmentally superior alternative among the remaining scenarios.

For transportation impacts, the Consultants will analyze up to two project alternatives in a qualitative manner, with a discussion of trip generation and general discussion of potential impact differences compared to the preferred land use plan.

Cumulative Impacts. We will evaluate cumulative impacts based on planning documents for the Planning Area. We will also estimate and discuss the contribution of the proposed project to the overall cumulative impacts.

Other CEQA Sections. The ADPEIR will provide, in addition to the sections discussed above, all other required CEQA sections, including areas of known controversy, growth inducement effects, energy, and significant unavoidable impacts.

Task G.5 Staff Review/Screen Check Draft Program EIR

The Consultants will incorporate Town staff input into the ADPEIR and provide Town staff with digital versions of the ADPEIR in both Word and PDF formats. Town staff will conduct one review of the ADPEIR and provide consolidated comments and edits. The Consultants will incorporate appropriate revisions and prepare a Screen Check Draft Program EIR. We will provide the Screen Check version in a digital format.

Task G.6 Draft Program EIR

Once the Town staff approves the Screen Check Draft Program EIR, the Consultants will prepare the Draft EIR for public circulation. The Consultants will prepare and distribute the required copies of the Draft Program EIR to the State Clearinghouse, including all required accompanying forms, such as the Notice of Completion (NOC). The Consultants will also file the Notice of Availability (NOA) of the Draft Project EIR with the Santa Clara County Clerk's office. We assume that Town staff will distribute the NOA of the Draft Program EIR to responsible agencies, and interested agencies, organizations, and persons. We also assume that the Town will be responsible for required newspaper ads and other public noticing of the document's availability, such

as radius label mailing or onsite posting. As required by State law, the Draft Program EIR will require at least a 45-day public review period.

Task A Engagement

The following activities will occur in conjunction with the work under Task A.

Task H.1 Community Engagement Strategy

Based on input from the kick-off meeting (Task A.1), the Consultants will work with Town staff to prepare a comprehensive Community Engagement Strategy that will document the outreach methods to be used throughout the project. The Strategy will describe outreach responsibilities, publicity protocols, and how the engagement will be structured to ensure comprehensive community engagement. The Strategy will be structured to be inclusive of all those who make up the "community," including residents; workers; visitors; businesses; property owners; educational institutions; civic, community, and non-profit organizations; religious, social, cultural and ethnic communities; and public agencies. In addition to being inclusive, our goal is to create meaningful opportunities for involvement throughout the development of the Update.

Task H.2 Branding and Project Logo

The Consultants will develop a branding package for the General Plan Update. The branding package will include a project logo and style templates that we will use for all work products, the website, and publicity materials to build enthusiasm about the project and ensure that this effort is distinct in the minds of the community. We will provide the Town with up to three options from which to choose.

Task H.3 Set Up Online Engagement

During this task, we will design and develop a project-specific website for the Los Gatos General Plan Update. In our work on dozens of general plan projects, we have found that having a stand alone project website, with links to and from the Town's website, provides a responsive platform for community engagement while not adding additional work for Town staff.

The Consultants will build the website on a modern, user-friendly platform that allows quick and easy updates to the website. In addition to being an important public outreach and information tool, the website will serve as an administrative record of the project. It will include all meeting announcements/materials, draft and final documents, and meeting summaries. The website will also be used to link to online

engagement opportunities, including Engagement HQ, developed during the project. This scope of work includes all needed maintenance and updates to the website for the duration of the project.

As part of the online outreach, we propose to use the Engagement HQ software tool and online mapping using ESRI ArcGIS Online and ESRI Story Map. For more information, see "Enhanced Community Engagement Tools" inset on page 41.

Task H.4 Newsletter #1, General Plan Update Overview

The Consultants will prepare a newsletter that describes what a general plan is, how and why it is being updated, the project schedule, and how the public can be involved in the update. The newsletter will be used to promote engagement opportunities.

Task H.5 Form the General Plan Advisory Committee (GPAC), GPAC Meeting #1

The Consultants will facilitate the first meeting of the GPAC. We will first present and get consensus on the overall GPAC meeting format, rules, and operating procedures. We will summarize the community engagement strategy and get GPAC input on strategy refinements. We will also ask the GPAC members to identify key issues they feel should be addressed during the General Plan Update.

Task H.6 Other GPAC Meetings

Six GPAC meetings, associated with specific deliverables are detailed in the Scope of Work. Budget to cover an additional 18 GPAC meetings is included and will be placed as needed.

Task H.7 Community Workshop #1, Project Initiation

At the beginning of the process, the Consultants will conduct the first community workshop. At the Town Hall, the Consultants will provide an overview of the key steps in the General Plan Update process, the opportunities the community will have for engagement, and changes in State law/regulations and other important issues that will affect the General Plan Update. During this Town Hall, the Consultants will also conduct an exercise to start the identification of issues and opportunities that should be addressed as part of the General Plan Update.

Task H.8 Joint Study Session #1, Introduction to the General Plan Update

At the beginning of the process, the Consultants will facilitate a Joint Study Session with the Town Council and Planning Commission. Given the significance of the General Plan Update, it will be important for the Council and Commission to meet the Consultants early in the program and to have a clear understanding of what to expect during the process. This meeting will provide a common understanding of the need for and purpose of the General Plan, the key steps in the preparation process, the strategy for community engagement, changes in State law and regulations since the last update, and other important issues affecting the General Plan preparation process. The workshop will also help establish stronger working relationships between the Consultants and Town leaders.

The Consultants will facilitate Town staff and GPAC review of the GPAC Draft General Plan

Task H.24 Joint Study Sessions #5, #6, and #7

The Consultants will conduct up to three joint study sessions with the Town Council and Planning Commission to review and confirm the changes to the General Plan. The Planning Commission will recommend any final revisions or adjustments to the Town Council. The Town Council will then provide direction on any final revisions or adjustments to the General Plan prior to the preparation of the EIR. During one of these study sessions, a presentation on VMT will be included.

Task H.25 Newsletter #4, Public Draft General Plan

The Consultants will prepare a newsletter summarizing the Public Draft General Plan that provides highlights of the key features and changes in the new General Plan.

Task H.26 Community Workshop #5, Draft General Plan

Upon release of the Public Draft General Plan, the Consultants will facilitate an open house to present the Plan to the community. The open house could be set up in the format where residents can visit stations or "booths" focused on each element of the Plan. Town staff and Consultants will be stationed at each booth to discuss the elements, answer questions, and gather feedback. The Consultants will promote the public review process and hearings for the General Plan.

Enhanced Community Engagement Tools

Task H.27 Online Engagement

While workshops and meetings are essential to an effective planning process, these traditional outreach methods of engagement are not enough to obtain the broad mix of inputs needed to make a plan responsive to the entire community. This is especially true for younger generations who are busy with work, family commitments, and other social engagements. Our approach to public outreach is to supplement community workshops with web-based crowd-sourcing and social media tools to attract and engage the broadest possible audience. As part of the Update program, we will offer a range of online engagement tools that allow participation in the process while at home, work, the coffee shop, or wherever inspiration strikes.

Project Website. The website will serve as the hub of project communication and information, including an overview of the project, announcements about upcoming meetings and information on past meetings and events, document library, and contact information.

Engagement HQ. In addition to the Project Website as an information portal, we also propose to use Engagement HQ software tools to develop an exciting platform for online public engagement. Engagement HQ allows us to engage with the community through surveys, opinion polls, discussion forums, photo sharing, mapping exercises, and more. It also offers analysis and reporting tools to understand who is participating and easily summarizes community inputs. During the General Plan Update, we will use this tool to poll the community on a range of topics.

If desired, the Consultants will also train Town staff to administer the site, so it can be maintained beyond the General Plan Update project as an ongoing forum for general civic engagement. We will use Engagement HQ software for active public engagement over a 12-month period during the development of the General Plan, with the site maintained during the public review portions of the project. Online Mapping. To help the community better understand the range of existing and future factors (natural and manmade) that will influence the future of Los Gatos, the Consultants will prepare an online mapping tool (ESRI Story Map). This online Story Map will provide maps of these factors (items such as wildland fire hazards, biological resources, environmental hazards, transportation connectivity) and a short description that will describe the implications of the factor shown on each map. This type of online map atlas will help support the discussion of issues and opportunities and be a component of the alternatives development.

Social Media. As part of the Update process, we will provide content for social media posts that Town staff can publish on the Town of Los Gatos Facebook (https://www.facebook.com/losgatosca/), Twitter (https://twitter.com/townlg?lang=en), Nextdoor (https://nextdoor.com/neighborhood/losgatosmain--losgatos--ca/), and other Town social media feeds at key points in the Update process.

Task H.28 Ongoing Communication

Email Blasts. As part of the Update process, the Consultants will work with the Town to develop project-specific email notifications that the Town will distribute using the Town's existing e-notification system. Additional e-mail addresses for interested individuals that are collected by the Consultants at meetings, events, or the Project website will be provided to the Town to add to their current notification lists.

Press Releases. Prior to every community workshop, we will prepare and distribute news releases to inform media outlets serving the community about upcoming meetings and ensure accurate coverage that sets realistic expectations for what the General Plan does and does not do.

Task H.29 Pop-up Booth for Festivals and Events

Booths at Festivals and Events. The Consultants will provide materials for Town staff to set up a "pop-up" booth at up to four sets of festivals and events in Los Gatos. The booth would feature boards and hand-outs that provide an overview of the General Plan Update, information on opportunities to get involved, and depending on which phase of the project we are in, exercises that are similar to the exercises from the most recent community workshop. It is assumed that Town staff will attend and run the booth with support from the Consultants.

Materials will be provided relative to the following four major components of the Update: 1) project overview, 2) issues and opportunities exercise, 3) alternatives exercise, and 4) draft General Plan.

Town Hall Displays. Like the booths at festivals and events, the Consultants will provide materials for Town staff to display at Town Hall. These displays will provide timely information on the Update process, provide posters on current project developments, and provide some opportunities for interactive displays designed to gain community input.

Task I Certification of the EIR and Adoption of the General Plan Update

Task I.1 Response to Comments

Within three weeks of receipt of all comment letters on the Draft Program EIR, the Consultants will submit a draft Response to Comments to Town staff for review. The Response to Comments document will include a list of commenters, comment letters, responses to comments, and any added or revised text of the Draft Program EIR that may be necessary. All responses will include reasoned analysis and, as necessary, will include additional analysis. The final version of the Response to Comments will be incorporated as an appendix to the Final Program EIR.

The scope and budget assume a level of effort that would include 100 hours of staff time for this task. This assumes receipt of approximately 15 to 25 comment letters. If the number of comment letters and the effort to prepare responses is greater than anticipated, the Consultants will notify Town staff immediately and discuss options to amend our scope of work and budget as necessary. Following receipt of Town staff comments, the Consultants will finalize the Response to Comments.

Task I.2 Mitigation, Monitoring, and Reporting Program

Concurrent with the Response to Comments, the Consultants will prepare a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Plan (MMRP), which will be included in the Final Program EIR. The MMRP will be provided in a format designed for use by planners, environmental monitors, or code enforcement officers. Essentially, this plan will take the form of a detailed table that describes:

- Persons/agencies responsible for monitoring compliance with each condition
- Timing when monitoring must occur
- Frequency of monitoring
- Criteria to be used to determine compliance with conditions

The final version of the MMRP will be incorporated as an appendix to the Final Program EIR.

Task I.3 Final Program EIR

The Consultants will complete the Final Program EIR after the review period has closed and all comments submitted during that period have been received. The Final Program EIR will include corrections to the Draft Program EIR (if warranted), comments received, and responses. The Consultants will prepare a Screen Check Final Program EIR for Town staff review and confirmation followed by a Final Program EIR after incorporating comments from Town staff. The Consultants will produce print and digital copies of the Final Program EIR. Within one day of Final Program EIR certification and project approval, the Consultants will submit the draft Notice of Determination (NOD) to Town staff for delivery to the County Clerk and/or State Clearinghouse.

Task I.4 Planning Commission Hearing

The Consultants will attend a public hearing with the Planning Commission to review the Public Draft General Plan and Final Program EIR. The Planning Commission will consider the comments made during the public hearing and make recommendations to the Town Council.

Task I.5 Town Council Hearings (2)

The Consultants will attend two public hearings with the Town Council to review the Public Draft 2040 General Plan and Final Program EIR. At these hearings, the Town Council will consider the Planning Commission recommendations and the comments made at the Planning Commission public hearing. After the hearings, the Town Council will direct the Consultants to incorporate their recommendations and prepare the Final General Plan and Final Program EIR.

Task I.6 Final General Plan Documents

Following public review of the Draft Public General Plan, the Consultants will prepare the Final General Plan for adoption.

Task I.7 Town Council Adoption Hearing

The Consultants will attend one hearing with the Town Council for certification of the Final Program EIR and adoption of the Final General Plan.

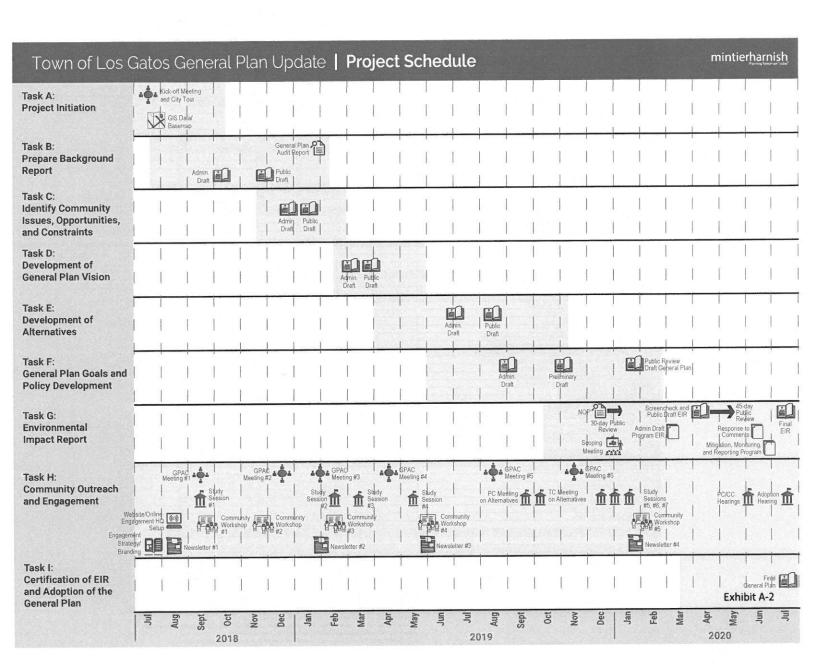
Task I.8 Web-Based General Plan

The Consultants will design the Final General Plan as an interactive web-based General Plan. The web-based plan will not simply be a document that is published online, but will be a dynamic communication tool that provides transparency, accessibility, and efficiency in local government.

The web-based plan will be highly graphical and structured and designed to meet the specific needs of the Town. It will be fully searchable, allowing decision-makers and other users to quickly locate relevant information. The online format will allow cross-referenced links to related policies, programs, maps, or background information.

BACKGROUND:

On February 6, 2018, Town Council discussed the scope and process for the General Plan update. At that meeting, the Town Council indicated that the General Plan is serving the community well, and an update provides the opportunity to refine the General Plan, address emerging trends and recent State laws, and consider new issues.

On February 20, 2018, the Town Council approved the work plan for the General Plan update. The work plan included the creation of a General Plan Update Advisory Committee (GPAC), which would be comprised of the existing members of the General Plan Committee (GPC) and additional at-large members appointed by the Town Council.

On March 12, 2018, the Town issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for consultant services associated with the General Plan update and Environmental Impact Report (EIR). Proposals were due April 13, 2018.

BACKGROUND (Continued):

On April 17, 2018, the Town Council adopted a resolution to establish the GPAC and approve guiding principles to guide the work of the GPAC.

DISCUSSION:

Staff sent the request for proposals to 14 consultants with known qualifications associated with the General Plan update and EIR. Staff received proposals from two firms and conducted interviews and reference checks for each. At the conclusion of the RFP review process, staff concluded that Mintier Harnish Planning Consultants provides the best fit, capacity, and professional expertise for preparation of the General Plan update and EIR within the established time frame.

Mintier Harnish offers extensive experience working with communities with their General Plan and environmental analyses, including Windsor, Gilroy, Folsom, Millbrae, Union City, Sacramento, and Hayward. Mintier Harnish's proposal focuses on addressing the key issues identified by the Town Council. The proposed scope of work includes extensive opportunities for public engagement and outreach. In addition, Mintier Harnish proposes a team approach with five subconsultants for specific project tasks: WRT (urban design), Rincon Consultants, Inc. (EIR and climate change), Fehr & Peers (transportation), Applied Development Economics (economics), and Urban Green (sustainability and community engagement). This team approach allows efficiency in production and effective coordination between the General Plan and EIR documents.

The estimated cost to complete the proposed scope of work described in this proposal is \$1,174,975. A general 10 percent contingency fee of \$117,498 is included to fund any unanticipated services. The base amount plus contingencies totals \$1,292,473. The contingency fee will only be utilized if necessary, and it has been included to allow the Town Manager to authorize limited additional costs in order to complete the project within the proposed schedule.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the Town Council authorize the Town Manager to enter into an agreement (Attachment 1) with Mintier Harnish Planning Consultants for the reasons stated in this report.

ALTERNATIVES:

The Council could direct staff to meet with the recommended consultant to add or delete work scope components. Adding components to the work scope would likely increase the project

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on this 1st day of September 2021, by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and Interwest Consulting Group engaged in providing Supplemental Building Plan Check and Associated Consulting Services, herein called ("Consultant"), whose address is 39355 California Street, Suite 200, Fremont, CA 94538. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town desires to engage a supplemental Building Plan Check consultant to assist in the processing of plan checks and associated services because of Consultant's experience and qualifications to perform the desired work and Town needs to undertake activities to supplement its ability to review building plan checks and enhance customer service, efficiency, and legal requirements.
- 1.2 Consultant represents and affirms that it is qualified and willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Consultant warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Consultant acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Consultant.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services.</u> Consultant shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal to Provide Building Division Plan Check Review Services sent to Town on June 4, 2021, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance.</u> This contract will remain in effect from September 1, 2021 to June 30, 2026. Consultant shall perform the services described in this agreement as follows:
 - a. Provide complete Building Permit Plan Check Services, including but not limited to, Initial Plan Check comments on submitted applications, Resubmittal Plan Check comments on revised plans, and written copies of Initial and Resubmittal Plan Check comments.
 - b. As requested by Town, provide copies of work products of all comments, reports, and studies prepared for Town. Consultant shall provide electronic file copies of these documents.
 - c. As requested by Town, provide an updated listing/status report of all Building Permit Plan Checks reviewed for Town.
 - d. When needed by Town, Plan Check Consultant and Building Official shall attend meetings with Town staff, public officials, community leaders, developers, contractors and the general public. (Maximum of 4 additional meetings per month.)

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- e. Provide On-site Plan Review services for approximately ten (10) hours per week for Plan check of minor residential and commercial projects.
- f. Provide Technical Support at pre-design and pre-construction meetings and at field visits as needed. Provide Technical Support and guidance for field inspection personnel.
- g. Provide services as needed by the Town per Scope of Services Exhibit A.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws.</u> Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Consultant represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession. Consultant shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility.</u> Consultant shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 Information/Report Handling. All documents furnished to Consultant by Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Consultant under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to Town upon the completion of Consultant's services or at Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Consultant in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by Town to the public, and Consultant shall not make any of the these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by Consultant or Town without the written consent of Town before such release. Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by Consultant in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Consultant expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Consultant which is and has been confirmed in writing by Consultant to be a trade secret of Consultant.
- 2.6 <u>Compensation.</u> Compensation for Consultant's professional services shall be based upon Town's pre-approval of each task as noted in the Scope of Services Compensation for each task and shall not exceed the amount per task noted in Consultant's Schedule of Fees attached hereto as part of Exhibit B and incorporated by reference herein. Fees will be reviewed on an annual basis.

2.7 <u>Billing.</u> Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom, at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- Availability of Records. Consultant shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Consultant shall make these records available to authorized personnel of Town at the Consultant's offices during business hours upon written request of Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting.</u> The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to Consultant. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of Town.
- 2.10 <u>Independent Contractor.</u> It is understood that Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, Consultant may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Consultant agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Consultant or is based on allegations of Consultant's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.11 Conflict of Interest. Consultant understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. Consultant has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within Town of Los Gatos. Consultant has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Consultant warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Consultant shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person, Consultant discovers it has employed a person with a direct or

- indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 Equal Employment Opportunity. Consultant warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Consultant nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Consultant agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Consultant shall provide to Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Consultant agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.
- iv. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, professional liability insurance in amounts not less than \$1,000,000 which is sufficient to insure Consultant for professional errors or omissions in the performance of the particular scope of work under this agreement.

General Liability:

i. Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant, premises owned or used by Consultant. This requirement does not apply to the professional liability insurance required for professional errors and omissions.

- ii. Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages.</u> Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation.</u> In addition to these policies, Consultant shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Consultant shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Consultant provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- Indemnification. Consultant shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of Consultant, or any of Consultant's officers, employees, or agents or any subconsultant.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver.</u> No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement.</u> Town and Consultant shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen (15) days written notice of

termination. In the event of termination, Consultant shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by Consultant. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Consultant an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.

- 4.5 <u>Disputes.</u> In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.6 <u>Notices.</u> Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

Plan Review Tracking Method & Billing Process

BACKGROUND:

The Town has contracted with outside consultants to provide building permit application plan checking services for more than 10 years. The Town needs to retain consultant plan check and structural engineering services because the Town does not have a Plan Check Engineer position.

Staff is recommending that our current Plan Check Consultant, O'Brien Code Consulting, Inc. be the primary Plan Check consultant. Additional plan check and associated services may be needed to augment the services of the primary Plan Check consultant due to the volume of activity in the Building Division. For this reason, staff is recommending entering into an agreement with Interwest Consulting Group (ICG) for supplemental plan check services. This firm was selected using the same Request for Qualifications (RFQ) process that identified O'Brien Code Consulting as the most qualified to be the Town's primary Plan Check consultant.

DISCUSSION:

The Plan Check consultant provides Building Division plan check services to the Town, providing both non-structural and structural code review for building permit applications. Staff sent out a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to learn the quality and costs of services available in the

marketplace. Staff sent out RFQs to six plan check consultant firms, and proposals were received from the following firms:

- O'Brien Code Consulting Inc.;
- Interwest Consulting Group;
- 4LEAF, Inc.; and
- Shums Coda Associates.

Staff evaluated the proposals and all the proposals were competitive. ICG was determined to be the most qualified firm based on their staff experience and competitive pricing to provide supplemental plan check and associated services, including:

- Plan Review services of complex projects;
- On-site Plan Review of less complex projects two days per week;
- Technical support;
- Miscellaneous support, expedited services, emergency response;
- Pick-up/delivery of plans and comment letters;
- Building Inspection services; and
- Permit Technician services.

The principal and staff of ICG have the experience and qualifications to provide supplemental plan check services, building inspection services, and permit technician services. ICG has the following qualifications:

- Licensed Civil and Structural Engineers;
- International Code Council Certified Plans Examiner;
- Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design Accredited Professional Certified;
- California Accessibility Specialist Program Certified; and
- International Code Council / Uniform Building Code Building Inspectors.

ICG also provides similar services to a large number of jurisdictions in California.

CONCLUSION:

ICG is able to provide supplemental plan check and associated services in addition to building inspection and permit technician services.

Staff recommends that the Town Council authorize the Town Manager to enter into an agreement (Attachment 1) with ICG for the reasons stated in this report.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve an amendment to the temporary salary schedule for the classification of Project Manager.

BACKGROUND:

Temporary/Hourly employees that work fewer than 20 hours per week are in the unrepresented group and serve in an unbenefited capacity and as at-will employees. The Municipal Code (Section 2.30.925) require that amendments and revisions to the Town's salary schedules are effective upon approval by Town Council. The staff recommended change is presented to the Council for approval.

DISCUSSION:

The temporary salary schedule range for the classification of Project Manager currently does not identify specific step increases. Rather, the salary schedule currently lists a maximum step 6 in the amount of \$115.56 per hour (Attachment 1). The Town's temporary salary schedule is proposed to be amended to include the wording "up to" the maximum salary of \$115.56 per hour to make it consistent with current practice and allow more flexibility in determining the pay rate for future offers for this classification (Attachment 2). If Council approves this modification, it will go into effect immediately.

BACKGROUND:

On August 3, 2021 the Police Department presented an update on overall delivery and comparison analysis of Police services. This Police Services Report presents the following information:

- Department staffing update and succession opportunities
- Calls for service and officer activity
- Mandates and training
- Mental health evaluations and resources
- Community outreach and volunteer programs

DISCUSSION:

DEPARTMENT STAFFING UPDATES

Law enforcement agencies nationwide are experiencing staffing challenges comparable to the Los Gatos-Monte Sereno Police Department (LGMSPD). Current trends of retirements, resignations, in conjunction with fewer applicants have resulted in highly competitive recruitments. While knowledge transfer is an integral part of the training of all Department staff, the loss of institutional and local experience is noticeable and additional mechanisms are being implemented to bring new staff up to speed as quickly and thoroughly as possible.

DISCUSSION (continued):

The Police Department budget allocates for 39 sworn positions. From December 2020 through July 2022, ten sworn staff members have retired or departed for personal reasons. An additional Officer will also be separating soon for personal reasons, bringing the overall number to eleven. The Police Department has hired nine Police Officers in that timeframe; however, recruitment and retention of qualified personnel remains challenging. Two of the nine new officers are in the Field Training Program and not yet operating as independent Police Officers.

The Department has three current vacancies with one Police Officer Recruit in the Police Academy as of August 2022. The 28 available sworn personnel are divided among four patrol shifts, the investigations bureau, and administration. Of the remaining sworn personnel, the table below identifies the current availability of sworn staff, while also considering medical reasons or Family Medical Leave Act (FMLA), light or modified duty, and those currently being trained:

The Police Department is dedicated to recruiting, training, and retaining qualified officers that are a positive representation of the vision and values of the Los Gatos-Monte Sereno Police Department. The process of hiring and training a Police Officer is a lengthy process, further extended for applicants that have not completed a Police Academy. Recruitment, background investigations, and hiring of a recruit is estimated to take about three to four months. Once the recruit is hired, they are then sent to a California Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) accredited Police Academy for about six months. Upon graduation, the recruit must complete a POST-approved 16-week Field Training Program led by certified members of our Police Department. Our current capacity accommodates up to three trainees at a time. The timeline of recruitment to operational capacity as a new Police Officer is approximately one year and approximately six months if they are a considered a lateral with prior experience. It should be noted that the Fiscal Year 2022/23 adopted budget included one-time temporary staff hours to further augment sworn and nonsworn capacity.

Dispatchers are critical components for law enforcement and are undergoing similar staffing issues. The Police Department is budgeted for eight full time Dispatchers and is presently at four with two in training.

The total training program is approximately 20 weeks in length to prepare an individual to work independently, including a Dispatch Academy and one-on-one training in the Town's Dispatch/Communications Center. The configuration of our Communications Center can accommodate two Dispatchers in training at any given time. Nine oral boards for Officers, Dispatch, Records, Parking Control, and Community Service Officers have taken place between January -July 2022. The background process has recently been contracted to an outside vendor who is providing thorough and unbiased assessments in compliance with SB 2 (Certification standards for sworn staff). An additional Records Specialist oral board is scheduled in the next month.

The hiring and recruitment efforts have recently resulted in the following hires:

- Police Academy Recruit started the Academy August 1, 2022
- Dispatcher -beginning training on August 15, 2022
- Parking Control Officer beginning training on August 22, 2022
- Community Service Officer Interns two beginning training on September 1, 2022

The Police Department currently has the following open positions:

- Records Specialist
- Police and Records Manager (expected to be reclassified to a different position)
- 2 Communications Dispatchers
- 3 Sworn Personnel

The Police Department has hired a total of seven per diem Dispatchers to supplement the full-time Dispatch staff in order to allow for better coverage, training, and vacation opportunities with more focused training of new Dispatch staff. Vacations or elective time off frequently requires backfill as well as overtime coverage in addition to the impact of unexpected COVID-related vacancies.

During Fiscal Year (FY) 2021/22, the Police Department used 1,959 hours of Supplemental Paid Sick Leave (SPSL) time off due to COVID impacts. The table below depicts the number of overtime hours collected in pay and compensation time that were necessary to fill shift vacancies in comparison of the first six months of 2021 to that of 2022. The variance of 227 hours more overtime in the Communications division is likely due to per diem staff not being available during the 2021 time period and therefore the full-time staff working increased overtime hours. The variance of 804 more overtime hours in 2022 versus 2021 is likely due to the significant COVID impact at the beginning of 2022 among sworn staff, training of new Officers during that timeframe, and lean staffing availability.

SUCCESSION OPPORTUNITIES

Since January 2022, there have been several succession opportunities for sworn and non-sworn staff. Through several promotional processes, the following assignments were filled by internal staff members:

- Police Captain
- Two Sergeants
- Two Corporals
- Lead Records Specialist
- Senior Records Specialist
- Two Senior Communications Dispatchers

In May of 2022, Department leadership participated in a Team Building Workshop through an opportunity made available by a POST grant and donation by the Police Foundation. The outcome of the Team Building Workshop was the development of a two-year Strategic Plan that outlines five goals and priorities that the Police Department will continuously assess and remain focused on as part of the Departments direction through 2024. These goals are:

- Goal 1 Organizational recruitment, development, and retention of a quality workforce
- Goal 2 Prevent and reduce crime, increase quality of life, and focus on traffic safety
- Goal 3 Active partnerships
- Goal 4 Embrace and integrate technology throughout the agency
- Goal 5 Organizational wellness

CALLS FOR SERVICE AND OFFICER ACTIVITY

Despite the staffing challenges previously outlined, the LGMSPD continues to provide an uncompromising high level of service to the community. The following table depicts a comparison over the last two years between the months of January – July of the

Communications division call volume both inbound and outbound, immediacy to which they are answered, and number of 911 calls.

The industry standard for a Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) agency is a target for 911 calls to be answered within less than ten seconds 95% of the time. Outbound calls can be a result of transferring callers to other points of contact within Town Departments, contacting or following up with community members, or conducting other inter-agency duties.

Officers' response to priority calls for service continue to be comparable to prior years. These metrics can be found in the Fiscal Year 2022/23 Adopted Operating Budget in the performance measures section of the Police Department chapter. Priority 1 refers to an immediate emergency with threat to life or a public safety hazard, Priority2I is an urgent emergency that requires an immediate response, and a Priority 3 incident is a non-emergency. The LGMSPD has set response time goals of 5:00 minutes for Priority 1 calls, 10:00 for Priority 2 calls, and 15:00 for Priority 3 calls. The Police Department has maintained average response times below the priority goals between January and July for both 2021 and 2022.

Additional data regarding traffic stops and preliminary RIPA information will be provided in the presentation to Town Council at the August 16, 2022 meeting.

MANDATES AND TRAINING

LGMSPD is committed to ensuring public safety service levels that are a result of dedicated efforts from the Communications division, Patrol, and other divisions within the Police Department. Recruitment, training, and succession planning continue to remain an ongoing priority while monitoring the fiscal implications from overtime needs and wellness impacts on staff members.

Several unfunded legislative mandates were incorporated into the Police Department's technology, service delivery, personnel assessment, and training. These included Police reform efforts towards transparency including compliance with the Racial and Identity Profiling Act (RIPA) and California Incident Based Reporting System (CIBRS/NIBRS). LGMSPD was one of the

first agencies in the county to become compliant with Department of Justice (DOJ) for CIBRS / NIBRS in 2022.

Additionally, Assembly Bill 481 – Military Equipment Transparency required the Police Department to engage with the community prior to seeking approval by Town Council of an Ordinance in May 2022. The Ordinance codifies annual reports on qualifying Police Department resources under AB 481 guidelines.

Additionally, there are several legislative impacts to the Police Department. Compliance with Senate Bill 2 – Police Decertification which has resulted in a significant increase in staff and resources needed at POST to ensure reporting and compliance with Police misconduct and eligibility for current or future employment. The Police Department has contracted with an experienced and respected personnel background vendor for future sworn background investigations to assure the requirements of Senate Bill 2 are followed. The Police Department's Personnel and Training staff have been engaged in frequent training and updates for awareness and responsiveness to the requirements outlined in Senate Bill 2, as several tenets to the bill are retroactive to the conduct of Officers. Finally, Senate Bill 1000 – Radio Encryption pending legislative action and is being closely monitored by many California law enforcement agencies due to its significant operational and fiscal impact on radio communications.

LGMSPD sworn staff are required by POST to complete 34 hours of training annually and Dispatchers are required to complete 24 hours. The specific training requirements are available for public view on the Police Department's Website on the Transparency webpage: https://www.losgatosca.gov/2713/Transparency-and-Data-page.

This year, as part of this required training, Officers have completed training in Emergency Vehicle Operations (EVOC) in the Explorer patrol vehicles to re-emphasize safe driving disciplines. As part of Advanced Officer Training (AOT) in 2022, sworn staff completed Deescalation and Use of Force training through the first use of the new Virtual Reality (VR) decision and tactics training technology. This same technology will be experienced by the attendees of the upcoming Community Police Academy. This system assists Department trainers in creating a realistic training environment for Officer's decision-making, de-escalation, and use of force. The system allows the VR inhabitants of the scenarios to have their mental status, gender, race, and many other attributes adjusted for maximum reality.

Providing new and existing staff with the necessary training to develop confidence and competency is a priority for the Police Department to navigate in its current lean staffing model. This requires continuous assessment of mandatory or immediate Department training

needs based on POST requirements and operational effectiveness. Additionally, the promotional and collateral positions that have been filled during January – July 2022 are followed with necessary trainings in order to support those individuals in their new roles. These training opportunities frequently require backfill through the use of overtime.

MENTAL HEALTH EVALUATION REPORTS AND RESOURCES

LGMSPD maintains a partnership and collaborates with mental health resources made available through Santa Clara County Behavioral Health Services. In addition, LGMSPD has implemented several additional efforts to compliment a multi-disciplinary approach to providing support to those that may benefit from the options available. Below is an outline of resources utilized based on an assessment of the situational needs:

Therapy Canine Program

Two therapy canines were funded through donations by the Police Foundation and completed training in spring 2022. The canines are assigned to a handler in the Communications division and to a handler assigned as a Corporal on patrol. Both handler and canine attend ongoing training and are available to be a resource to both staff and to the public. The canines have been to multiple community events and were deployed on school campuses the day after the Uvalde incident to increase law enforcement presence and offer support.

Ambulance Contract

 The Police Department maintains a contract with an Ambulance service to provide transport at a pre-contracted rate in the event the transport would create unnecessary financial strain on the patient in need of mental health resources. This resource has not been utilized.

Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT)

- Teams of clinicians with the ability to respond at the request of law enforcement or may conduct follow up with families and only request a law enforcement presence if necessary.
- The efforts of MCRT are focused on connecting family/caregivers to community support, conduct mental health evaluations and assessments, provide post-crisis follow up, and provide crisis intervention and safety planning as needed. MCRT services ages 18 and older, regardless of insurance status.

Mobile Response and Stabilization Services (MRSS)

Provides stabilization and support services for children and young adults from ages 4-20.
 Therapeutic teams provide consultation, assess for safety, and intervene through crisis counseling. Post-crisis stabilization services are provided to ensure referral and coordination to ongoing services.

9-8-8

9-8-8 is a national initiative and a shift of mental health crisis calls away from law enforcement. In Santa Clara County, when someone calls 9-8-8 for services, their needs are evaluated by the Suicide Prevention Hotline to determine what resources may be best suited to meet the caller's needs. The available resources include MCRT, MRSS, TRUST, or others that may be available in the area. This is a new program launched in July 2022 and is being evaluated for enhanced collaboration and quality improvements.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY VOLUNTEERS

LGMSPD launched a Community Policing initiative in May 2022. The Community Policing programs and opportunities include Coffee with a Cop, the Therapy Canine Program, a Community Police Academy, Walk with a Cop, and staff support of Special Olympics activities. These engagements are identified on the lower portion of a LGMSPD Community Policing logo to promote these events throughout the year on the Department website, social media, or other communications. The engagements are integral to building community – police partnerships and a better-informed vision of public safety needs and responses.

LGMSPD hosted a Coffee with a Cop in May and August, has received almost ten Walk with a Cop requests, supported at least four Special Olympic activities, and is excited to begin its first 10-week Community Police Academy at the end of August 2022.

Community outreach and resources also occurs in many other forms, including National Night Out, social media communications, Operation Care, Vacation Checks, On Watch, and the many Emergency Preparedness and Volunteer opportunities offered through the Police Department. Emergency Preparedness and responsiveness throughout the Town of Los Gatos is strengthened through the force multiplying efforts of the Disaster Aid Response Team (DART) and the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). Both teams work collaboratively throughout the year on common drills, including a wildfire evacuation drill in April 2022.

Additionally, other Police Department volunteer opportunities include the Explorer Cadet program, Volunteers in Policing (VIP), Victim Services Unit (VSU), and Neighborhood Watch. The Police Department provided eight Neighborhood Watch meetings from January to July of 2022, with six of those being new Neighborhood Watch groups.

CONCLUSION:

The Police Services Report is intended to provide a transparent overview of available resources, operational efforts, and continued priorities that may be considered valuable to the community

RECOMMENDATION:

Receive information on Town operational efficiencies and provide potential direction.

BACKGROUND:

During the May 17, 2022 Budget public hearing, the Town Council approved a motion that included direction to initiate an employee-led operational efficiency program with the goal of 3% to 5% operational improvements and develop 5-year goals.

DISCUSSION:

Context

Currently, the Town provides most municipal services with the exception of Fire and Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Community Services/Recreation (for all ages). In 1971, the Town annexed into the County Fire District and transitioned the service to that agency.

During the Great Recession, the Town eliminated the Community Services Department and distributed its functions. Senior programming was built into a lease agreement with Los Gatos-Saratoga Recreation (LGS Rec). The Town Manager's Office and the Community Development Department absorbed several functions. The Town Manager's Office took on Town events (e.g., 4th of July), Community and Senior Services Commission (now the Community Health and Senior Services Commission) and Arts and Culture Commission (currently administered by the Library Department). The Community Development Department administers Housing Programs, overseeing the work of vendors providing many of the direct services.

The Great Recession also saw the elimination of many Town positions. Attachment 1 shows the sharp decline in staffing at that time and the fairly steady maintenance of reduced staffing rates over the years.

Process Improvements and Organization Efficiencies

As a lean organization, all Town Departments are continuously reviewing their processes to identify and institute process improvements to ensure that the limited Town staff resources are focused on work that best utilizes their professional, creative, innovative, and technical skills. Out of necessity with increased workloads, new State unfunded mandates, and little to no increases in headcount, staff has had to find ways to do more by becoming more time efficient without reducing the high quality of work product, internal controls, or the high level of customer service the Los Gatos community expects of the Town.

Attachment 2 lists efficiencies identified by staff in three categories: (1) already implemented, (2) in the process of being implemented, and (3) expected to be implemented. The information includes efficiencies that were identified and implemented beginning in January 2020 to the present to account for pre-Pandemic, Pandemic, and current considerations. The Pandemic was an incredible catalyst to push many potential efficiencies from "nice to have" to "must have" (such as on-line permit applications). It should be noted, that while this report focuses on process improvements implemented since 2020, as illustrated in Attachment 1 the staffing reductions since 2001 have required significant process improvements over the decades to maintain service levels.

Efficiencies have been achieved through a variety of mechanisms, including but not limited to:

- The innovative use of technology;
- Regulatory streamlining;
- Use of consultants, retired annuitants, or vendors in a cost effective manner to create staff capacity for other work; and
- Updating processes to improve workflow.

While the motion requested the quantification of the efficiencies gained through the implementation of the items, the Town does not have the bandwidth to attempt these estimations. Instead, qualitative explanations are provided with each item.

The Adopted Operating Budget contains activity and performance measures for all of the Departments. The measures include quantities of work, cycle times, and other metrics. Some of the performance measures include customer satisfaction ratings. Additional customer satisfaction data were collected with the recent Community Survey.

Finally, the Town's ability to provide ongoing efficiencies in part depends on staff retention. Trained and experienced staff have the relationships with community members, institutional knowledge, and problem-solving background of past issues facing the Town. The Town's recruitment efforts carefully screen candidates to determine their technical and soft skills to deliver high quality, timely, and professional services. Once hired, career opportunities can occur within a single Department or by promoting to a new position within another Department.

CONCLUSION:

This report documents efficiencies that have been implemented in Town Departments and Offices beginning in January 2020 (pre-Pandemic), illustrating that staff engagement in continuous process improvements is a fundamental element of the Town's organizational culture. Attachment 2 also contains some of the prospective improvements for the future. A five-year projection of additional improvement would be challenging at this time given the dynamic technological changes that are already underway.

As the Town continues to face future budget challenges, the Council has asked the Finance Commission to look at both revenue and expenditure options to address the forecasted shortfalls. Staff is supporting the Commission's work by providing information regarding potential options. With this agenda item, the Town Council may also provide specific direction to staff.

COORDINATION:

The information contained in this staff report was coordinated with all Town Departments and Offices.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no negative fiscal impact associated with the receipt and discussion of this report.

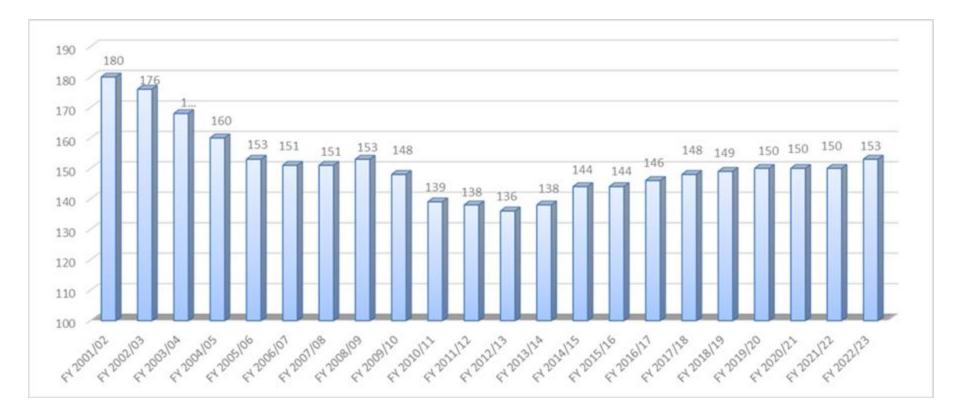

OPERATIONAL EFFICIENCIES BY DEPARTMENT

Town Manager's Office

Already Implemented

- Town Social Media Record Retention (December 2021): Implementation of ArchiveSocial social media retention software transformed a manual process of gathering social media records in response to both public records requests and internal staff requests to an electronic process. Efficiency Outcome: ArchiveSocial has changed a manual process that could take hours depending on the size of the request into an electronic report that can be pulled in minutes. It has also allowed the Town a mechanism to capture deleted and edited comments, improving transparency and access to records, and meeting our legal retention requirements.
- <u>Email Distributions (March 2020)</u>: Communications and documents that had been printed and distributed in hard copy were converted to email distributions. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced production time, saved paper, and reduced copier maintenance.
- <u>Communications and Outreach (ongoing)</u>: Expanded modes of communication to the
 public via improved website content, summaries of Council actions, social media use,
 strategic use of postcards to all residents, and other mechanisms. Efficiency Outcomes:
 Improved access and transparency of Town activities, upcoming engagement
 opportunities, and access to information. Enhanced consistent responses to customer
 inquiries by directing the public to information available on the Town website. Reduced
 research time for public inquiries.
- <u>Updated Procurement Policy (Fall 2021)</u>: The Town Manager's Office led a multi-Departmental effort to update the Town's Procurement Policy that was approved by the Town Council in December 2021. **Efficiency Outcomes:** Reduced processing times for procurement.
- <u>Events Streamlining (July 2022)</u>: Enhanced template for standard conditions and eliminated redundant process steps. **Efficiency Outcome:** Faster processing times for Special Event Permits.
- Economic Vitality Streamlining: See Community Development Department

Clerk Department

Already Implemented

- Town Agreement Processing (April 2020): Implementation of DocuSign software
 transformed a Town-wide paper-based agreement review and signature process to an
 electronic process. Efficiency Outcome: DocuSign has reduced the agreement
 processing time from two to three weeks minimum to five to seven calendar days
 maximum (weekends included).
- <u>JustFOIA Public Records Request System (March 2022)</u>: Public records requests are submitted and handled through the online system. **Efficiency Outcome:** This has reduced staff processing time by 50%.
- Municode Portal (March 2022): Allows staff, Council, and the public to search for an agenda item on any meeting date without having to know

- the specific date. **Efficiency Outcome:** Reduces search time by approximately 50% and greater public transparency.
- <u>Electronic Document Filing (March 2020)</u>: Where possible we have eliminated paper files. **Efficiency Outcome:** Electronic filing reduces the amount of time staff spends filing by 50% and also reduces costs for filing supplies.

Information Technology

- IT Service Desk Ticketing Solution (January 2021): ServiceDesk Plus, a cloud hosted ITSM (IT Service Management) solution, was implemented to manage the complete life cycle of IT incidents and support requests which were previously managed through Outlook email by individual IT Staff. **Efficiency Outcome:** ServiceDesk Plus has reduced the time to resolution significantly as illustrated by Staff's rating of the timeliness of IT's support which rose from 96% in 2020 to 100% in 2022.
- New Hire and Separation Process (June 2022): An improved IT New Hire and Exit form was implemented to better manage the onboarding and offboarding process through automated workflows and notifications. Efficiency Outcome: IT Staff receives new hire and separation notifications in a timely manner with formal HR approval which allows IT Staff to focus their time on the activities related to the onboarding and offboarding process rather than chasing down information.
- IT Orientation for New Hires (February 2022): A formal IT orientation is scheduled for all new hires on their first day of work to get them fully situated on their computers and various applications. Efficiency Outcome: New hires are immediately able to utilize their computers and other systems where technology does not become a hinderance but rather a springboard to get them operating fully in their new job function.
- Sharepoint File Storage (February 2021): Various departmental file shares stored on a local file server were migrated over to Sharepoint as the new online document management system. Efficiency Outcome: The Sharepoint platform allows for concurrent viewing and editing of hosted files which allows Staff to collaborate on files together at the same time without having to wait on others to finish their work and close the files. Sharepoint hosted files also provide the flexibility of accessing files remotely without the need for direct VPN access to the Town's internal network thus eliminating additional hurdles and IT support to access data.
- Microsoft Teams (February 2020): Microsoft Teams was implemented as the Town's communication platform which allows for online meetings as well as file and screensharing for all Town Staff. Efficiency Outcome: Microsoft Teams was an important tool during the Covid shutdown period and continues to be a highly utilized tool for remote/hybrid work to keep people connected. Microsoft Teams allows Staff to quickly communicate and collaborate with one another in a highly dispersed work environment.
- <u>Internet Service Reliability (October 2020):</u> The Town's internet service was migrated from a 50MB connection through Comcast Business over to a 200MB connection with

Frontier Communications. The Library's internet connection was also leveraged with the new Frontier connection to be utilized as a failover connection. **Efficiency Outcome:** The Town experienced frequent outages with Comcast during PG&E power interruptions and was generally unreliable and slow. The new internet connection has considerably increased uptime and reliability which allows Town staff, including public safety, to better serve the community without any unplanned disruptions.

Town Attorney's Office

Already Implemented

- <u>Using ABAG-PLAN (June 2022):</u> Sending town claims to our third-party administrator (ABAG-PLAN) to evaluate claims as they come in. **Efficiency Outcome:** The PLAN handles all the claims rather than the Town Attorney's Office staff
- Outside Council (June 2022): Using outside counsel to advise regarding response to Police Department subpoenas (unless it involves a simple matter such as requesting a hearing continuance in which case the Town Attorney can handle). Efficiency Outcome: Reduces time spent on the long cases.
- <u>Lexis Nexis (June 2022):</u> Implementation of Lexus Nexis lets the Attorney's office have access to a database of case law and legislative history. **Efficiency Outcome:** This makes it easier and efficient for the Attorney's Office to find Legal documents.
- Contract Template (Prior to January 2020): The already created contract template is standard template that departments can input in a created document. **Efficiency Outcome:** Reduces the preparation and review time for agreements.

Finance Department:

- <u>Timesheet via email (March 2020)</u>: Timesheet submittal and approval via email replacing a paper-based submittal and approval. **Efficiency Outcomes**: Decreased processing time and enabled remote work when social distancing was required by Public Health Orders. This also decreased the cost of paper and printing, and protects the environment.
- Paperless Account Payable processing (March 2020): The accounts payable process is now paperless with every invoice approved via email. Efficiency Outcomes: Decreased processing time and enabled remote work when social distancing was required by Public Health Orders. It also provides an easier transition to storing all items electronically thus providing easier access for future research and/or to meet auditor and Department requests. This also decreased the cost of paper and printing, and protects the environment.
- <u>Positive Pay</u> (November 2021): The Town implemented positive pay, an automated cash management service employed by financial institutions to deter check fraud. Positive pay matches the checks issued with those presented for payment. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced possible fraud and staff time interacting with banking partners.

- <u>Digital Accommodation of Business License Processing (March 2020)</u>: Utilized email and digital phone messaging to streamline and provide business license processing during office shut-down due to Public Health Orders. Efficiency Outcomes: Business owners were able to communicate and receive timely answer regarding business license applications. Payments were still submitted via check during the office closure, and the email communication ensured that the correct amount and documentation were submitted.
- <u>Virtual audit engagements (Spring 2020)</u>: Uploaded all documentation to the Independent Auditor web portal. **Efficiency Outcomes:** Streamlined the audit process timeline, making the requested information available immediately to the auditor team. Reduced the time of pulling physical backup and scanning materials.
- <u>Journal Entry Approval via email (Spring 2020)</u>: Journal entry submittal and approval via email replaced a paper-based submittal and approval process. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Faster turnaround of journal entries with the email submission procedures. Backup electronically stored. Documents are easier to access as well as provide to auditors when requested.
- SharePoint utilization for the Operating and Capital Budget (March 2022): Efficiency
 Outcome: Utilizing the simultaneously shared document made the collaboration
 between users and Departments more effective while meeting the compressed timeline
 to produce budget documents.
- Work from Home Schedule (August 2021): Ability to work from home a couple of days
 per week has resulted in better scheduling of certain tasks. Efficiency Outcome: Able to
 log in and complete early bank account review from home and provide activity
 information to other staff who may need to complete related bank activities prior to
 cutoff times.

Human Resources Department:

- HR and Payroll Shared Folder (2021): A single location on the Town's server for confidential new hire payroll paperwork. Efficiency Outcome: Enhanced security for confidential information, reduces processing times, reduces the use of paper, and improves digital filing.
- NeoGov eForms (Fall 2020): Allows for employee forms to be routed for signature digitally and securely. Efficiency Outcomes: Reduces staff time by creating, managing, and routing documents electronically for approval.
- <u>NeoGov Onboard (Fall 2020)</u>: Allows for new hire packet forms to be sent to new employees digitally and securely through a self-service portal. Efficiency Outcomes: Enhances security of confidential documents. Reduced processing time of documents. Streamlined and improved the consistency of the onboarding process, review of Town policies, and trainings. Saves paper and copier maintenance.

- New User IT Form and the User Exit Form (Spring 2022): Documentation for new and exiting employees. Efficiency Outcomes: Improved workflow, enhanced documentation of IT equipment use and returns.
- <u>Virtual Onboarding, Offboarding, and Interview Processes (Spring 2020)</u>: Zoom capability enabled the Town to continue its recruitment-related processes, including testing of candidates. **Efficiency Outcome:** No loss in productivity during the Public Health Order shutdowns.
- Online Open Enrollment Process and Virtual Wellness Challenge (Fall 2020): Completed
 Open Enrollment for benefits on time. Efficiency Outcome: Provided a flexible way for
 staff to learn about changes to benefits, allow for online enrollment, and reduce staff
 time for processing materials.
- On-Demand Virtual Sexual Harassment Prevention Training (Fall 2021): Used the services of Liebert Cassidy Whitmore (LCW) for online training. **Efficiency Outcome:** All employees to meet this State requirement flexibility during the Pandemic.

Implementation Underway

- <u>NeoGov Perform</u>: An automated performance evaluation system. **Efficiency Outcomes:** Increases engagement between employees and supervisors. Reduces time to complete evaluations, saves paper, and reduces copier maintenance.
- Improved Access to Forms: Working with IT to develop the HR section of an internal platform for employees to access information and forms online. Efficiency Outcome: Reduces staff time searching for and completing forms.

Library Department

- <u>Targeted Teen Volunteer Roles (October 2021)</u>: Solicitation for high school volunteers based on specific skill sets needed rather than the past practice of accepting general volunteers. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced labor load for staff equivalent to .1 FTE per week while allowing for staff to focus on higher level tasks.
- <u>Collection Assessment Software for EDI Analysis (July 2022)</u>: Implementation of software to analyze the scope of diversity of the library's collection which replaces a time-intensive manual system of evaluation. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced staff time for collection analysis projects by appropriately 60 hours per year.
- <u>Historical Archives Online Platform (July 2022)</u>: Migration of historical archives to the new digital platform Cataloglt. **Efficiency Outcome:** Improved functionality and searchability has reduced records input and retrieval from twenty minutes per entry to five minutes per entry. Lower cost of software has cost savings of \$3,000 annually.
- Wireless Staff Radios (February 2021): Implementation of wireless radios worn by all staff replaced inbuilding communication by word of mouth and email. Efficiency Outcome: Facilitation of rapid communication among staff saves approximately two hours of staff time per day and enhances safety.

- Program Backup Cross Training (July 2022): Developed training for all full-time staff
 members to be assigned and trained as substitutes for scheduled programs and events
 eliminated need to cancel or reschedule programs. Efficiency Outcome: Increased
 quality of service to the public and reduced service interruptions. Approximately sixty
 minutes of staff time per day are saved through this cross-training.
- <u>Tech Equipment Troubleshooting Cross Training (May 2022)</u>: Cross-training of all full-time staff for troubleshooting issues with public computers, printers/copiers, and self-check machines decreased reliance on availability of specialized staff members.
 <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Increased quality of service to the public and decrease in down time of malfunctioning equipment from 30 minutes to 5 minutes.
- <u>Public Desk Cross Training (October 2021)</u>: Cross-training of all full-time staff and most
 part time staff to field all first level public interactions at three different service points
 (children's desk, reference desk, circulation desk) decreased reliance on availability of
 specialized staff members. **Efficiency Outcome:** Increased quality and speed of service
 to the public. Approximately sixty minutes of staff time per day are saved through this
 cross-training.
- Appointments for Historical Research (January 2022): Implementation of appointment booking via Library website for patrons needing historical research replaced a drop-in system. Efficiency Outcome: Labor-time related to historical research appointments has been reduced by approximately 2 hours per week. Pre-booked appointments allow for more efficient staff scheduling and time management, fewer interruptions, and more focused attention to the patron.
- <u>Time Boxed Active Project Meetings (June 2022)</u>: Adoption of "time-boxing" for simultaneous work on collaborative projects transformed discussion meetings to output meetings which bring projects to completion. **Efficiency Outcome:** Projects are completed 20% more quickly across the board.
- World Languages Collaboration (November 2020): Development of inter-library agency workgroup to share language purchasing, cataloging, and translation expertise in multiple languages other than English replaced reliance on vendors and outsourcing.
 Efficiency Outcome: Eliminating reliance on venders' expertise has resulted in a cost savings equivalent to \$6,000 per year.
- <u>Staff Role and Project Assignments (November 2020)</u>: Reassignment of staff project roles based on immediate changing need for skill sets rather than job descriptions.
 <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Labor-time savings of approximately .5FTE annually across all specializations.
- <u>Virtual Staff Development (May 2020)</u>: Assignment of staff to new virtual training opportunities from the State Library and other agencies increased professional learning opportunities with fewer staffing impacts. **Efficiency Outcome:** Labor-time savings of approximately 100 hours per year.
- <u>Library Director Check-In Meetings (June 2020)</u>: Virtual attendance at monthly meetings
 with Library Directors across the State replaced slow email communication chains and
 fostered problem solving. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced redundancy of work across
 different library jurisdictions has allowed the Library Director to save approximately 120

- hours of time per year, enabling the Director to devote this time to other important priorities.
- Wireless Public Printing Software (June 2021): Implementation of Princh wireless
 printing software for credit card payment and release of public printing jobs replaced
 manual system of making change and manual print releases. Efficiency Outcome: Labortime savings of approximately one hour per day.
- <u>Friends of the Library Payment Systems (April 2021)</u>: Installation of cash donation box and self-serve DipJar credit card payment for the Friends of the Library eliminated staff need for making change, overseeing donations, and monitoring purchases. **Efficiency Outcome:** Labor-time savings of approximately one hour per day.
- <u>Cashless Operations (June 2020)</u>: Elimination of all cash transactions and removal of cash register replaced daily cash handling. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: 30% reduction in waittime for service to the public at library desks. Approximately one hour per day of labortime is also saved.
- Shared Files and Folders via Cloud Platform (April 2020): Implementation of and migration to OneDrive, SharePoint, and Office 365 for all staff files and working documents replaced system of files stored on individual computers. Efficiency Outcome: By eliminating the need for file transfers, multiple file versions, and backups, and by allowing for increased collaboration and simultaneous editing, the shared files have saved approximately ten hours of staff time per week.
- <u>Collaborative Communication Application (March 2020)</u>: Implementation of MS Teams application transformed real-time digital communication among staff. **Efficiency Outcome:** Real-time remote communication has saved approximately three hours of staff time per day.
- Shared Purchasing Tracking and Reconciliation (July 2020): Creation of a shared universal master spreadsheet for tracking all internal account spending replaced individual staff tracking for budget line items. **Efficiency Outcome:** Saves approximately sixty hours of staff time per year, including forty hours of Library Director time, thereby allowing the Director and staff to direct this time towards other public needs.
- <u>Staff Laptops (September 2020)</u>: Purchase of laptop computers and docking stations for full time staff members replaced desktop computer towers, allowing greater flexibility in staff usage of different workspaces. **Efficiency Outcome:** Location flexibility saved approximately 0.5 hours per week per employee.
- Outsourced Book Processing (October 2020): Increase of amount of book processing (catalog records and shelf ready preparation) reduced scope of in-house processing.
 Efficiency Outcome: The outsourcing of book processing saved approximately four hours of staff time per week.
- <u>Direct Purchase of Catalog Records for Languages Other Than English (September 2020)</u>: Purchase of complete records direct from book vendors eliminated need for staff to translate and create records in-house. **Efficiency Outcome:** Purchasing complete records saved approximately thirty hours of staff time annually.
- Hold Items Pulling (July 2020): Creation of collaborative team system to locate and pull items requested by patrons replaced a tedious individual process. **Efficiency Outcome:**

- Increased speed of service to the public. Time spent on pulling reserves reduced from 2 hours per day to 30 min per day.
- Adhesive Receipt Paper (August 2022): Utilization of adhesive receipt paper to attach
 automatedly printed hold and reserve notes to books replaced manual writing, cutting
 and rubber banding paper slips to books. Efficiency Outcome: The switch to adhesive
 receipt paper has saved approximately twenty minutes per day of staff time and has
 increased the speed of service to the public.
- Patron Initiated Replacement of Lost or Damaged Items (September 2020): Adopted procedure of encouraging patrons to replace their lost or damaged items with a new identical copy replacing system of staff-initiated replacement. Efficiency Outcome: Staff time spent replacing lost or damaged items has been completely eliminated.
- <u>Display Books in Children's Room (January 2021)</u>: Utilization of additional surface areas in Children's Room to display recently returned books decreased need to reshelve all items. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Staff time spent on reshelving children's books has been reduced from forty to thirty minutes per cart.
- Paperless Invoices (August 2020): Adoption of workflow process to receive, route, and approve invoices replaced a paper-based system of copies, physical signatures, and interoffice mail routing. Efficiency Outcome: The new workflow process for invoices saves approximately one hour of staff time per week.
- <u>Close Caption Transcription Software (February 2021)</u>: Acquisition of automatic transcription software for historical interviews and programs eliminated need for manual in-house transcription. **Efficiency Outcome**: The usage of automatic transcription software saves approximately 8 hours of staff time per project.
- <u>Design Software (April 2021)</u>: Utilization of simple user interface Canva design software allowed for access to premade templates and designs for print and social media replacing previous cumbersome design software and need for designing files from scratch. **Efficiency Outcome:** Use of Canva has reduced time spent on designing social media posts and flyers from 90 minutes per item to 15 minutes per item.
- <u>E-Magazine Consortium Purchasing (July 2021)</u>: Cooperation with neighboring library jurisdictions to purchase a core collection of e-magazines at a discounted rate reducing financial cost. **Efficiency Outcome:** Cost-savings of \$4,800 annually.
- State Access to Databases (September 2021): Joined State-sponsored programs to access educational and job-searching databases and subscriptions reducing financial cost. Efficiency Outcome: Cost savings equal to \$13,500 annually.
- <u>Check-in Meetings with Partner Organizations (February 2022)</u>: Adoption of regular check in meetings with partners for NUMU, LGS Rec, and LGSUHS District representatives to increase dialog, replacing communication voids. **Efficiency Outcome:** Streamlined communication with partners has eliminated problems resulting from miscommunication among departments, thereby saving approximately 10 hours of staff time per year.
- <u>Single Point of Contact Desk (May 2022)</u>: Reassessment of staffing coverage at Reference and Children's desks, based on daily foot traffic patterns, identified times of

- the day that could instead be serviced by a single front desk. **Efficiency Outcome:** Saved ten hours of staff time per day.
- <u>Public Computer Bulk Updates (August 2021)</u>: Adoption of new workflow for regular updates to public computers can be done from a staff desk, replacing need for staff to monitor computers in the public area while updates complete. **Efficiency Outcome:** Saves approximately six hours of staff time per week.
- Rearrangement of Collections (December 2021): Modification of locations of high use collections such as series chapter books and graphic novels in the Children's area allowed for more space to effectively locate, access, and shelve items. Efficiency Outcome: This improve usage of space has resulted in higher-quality service to the public and reduced reshelving time by approximately five minutes per cart.
- <u>Self-Check Machines (October 2020)</u>: Installation of four new public self-service checkout machines with RFID readers increased ability for public to successfully checkout items without staff assistance. **Efficiency Outcome**: The self-service checkout machines increase speed of service to the public through a 50% decrease in wait-times.
- Phone App Based Self-Checkout Functionality (October 2020): Addition of item checkout
 functionality via the Library's app provides ability for public to check out items in a fully
 contactless manner. Efficiency Outcome: Allowing members of the public to
 immediately check out items eliminates the need for staff to check out materials,
 thereby cutting out wait-times for patrons who use this service. Saves approximately
 thirty minutes of staff time per day.
- <u>Phone Tree Software (May 2020)</u>: Implementation of RingCentral software to serve as a
 phone tree for incoming calls routes public calls to the appropriate staff member or
 desk, replacing the need for staff to field and transfer each call. Efficiency Outcome: The
 software improves speed of service by reducing the length of telephone interactions
 from five to three minutes per call.
- Communication Channels for County Emergency Management (August 2020):
 Establishment of communication channel between County Library Director and local staff sped dissemination of emergency updates, allowing staff to respond faster to changes. Efficiency Outcome: Faster communication of updates allows staff approximately three hours of advance planning time to respond to each upcoming change.
- <u>Shared Repository for Regional Library Document Templates (January 2021)</u>: Creation of repository for Bay Area libraries to share document examples such as vendor agreements, RFPs, and policy examples reduced need for documents to be created from scratch-in house. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Saves approximately four hours of staff time per document.
- <u>Staff Scheduling Software (November 2020)</u>: Implementation of LibCalendar software for staff scheduling, remote schedule communication, and time off requests replaced a more complicated software. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: LibCalendar reduces labor-time devoted to schedule management by 30%.
- Reservation Functionality (August 2021): Implementation of reservation functionality to the Library website provides method for the public to directly reserve study rooms,

- replacing need for reservations to be staff managed. **Efficiency Outcome:** By eliminating the need for staff to manage reservations, this change saves approximately two hours of staff time per week. The new system also increases quality of service to the public.
- Minimal Processing of High Circulation Children's Items (March 2022): Creation of single generic catalog record for hundreds of high-volume use children's beginning reader paperbacks replaced need to create individual records for each of those items.
 Efficiency Outcome: Reduces processing time per item from 3 minutes to thirty seconds.
- <u>Patron Access to Historical Collections (April 2022)</u>: Relocation of non-archival historical resources to the public area freed history workroom space and allows public to access more resources without staff assistance. **Efficiency Outcome:** This intervention has increased workspace and storage capacity for archives by 25%.
- Archive Finding Aids and Reorganization (March 2022): Creation of a comprehensive finding aid for archived materials and physical reorganization of archives replaced system of filing cabinets in a confined work area. Efficiency Outcome: The new finding aid has reduced research time for historical questions from an average of 60 minutes to 20 min. per research inquiry.
- <u>Historical Microfiche Digitization (June 2022)</u>: Outsourcing of digitization of historical newspapers replaced need to digitize in-house. **Efficiency Outcome:** The outsourcing of digitization has saved a total of 250 staff hours.
- <u>Tech Tutoring Appointments and Volunteers (March 2022)</u>: Utilization of volunteers for drop-in periods for patron help with computers and phones replaced scheduled programmed timeslots that required staff. **Efficiency Outcome:** Saves two hours of staff time per week.
- Restricted Hours for Book Donation Drop Off (April 2021): Restriction of time windows
 for receiving donated books only to hours covered by volunteers eliminated need for
 staff to handle book donations. Efficiency Outcome: Reduces staff interruptions; saves
 approximately two hours of staff time per week.
- <u>Immediate Purchasing from Local Vendors (April 2022)</u>: Establishment of relationships with local booksellers facilitated ability to receive copies of popular titles that were delayed due to supply chain issues with our normal vendors. **Efficiency Outcome:** Time for obtaining back-ordered materials has been reduced from six weeks to two hours.
- <u>Reference Question Software (February 2020)</u>: Implementation of Gimlet reference transaction software allowed staff to quickly record questions asked by the public into a searchable database utilized for facilitating statistical gathering and for crossreferencing previously answered questions. **Efficiency Outcome:** Reduces research time from five minutes to two minutes per reference transaction.
- <u>Interns (April 2022)</u>: Reinstatement of library intern program post-pandemic opened opportunities for library school students to work on Library projects temporarily increasing staff capacity. **Efficiency Outcome:** Increased staff capacity by 0.5 FTE for the duration of the internship.

- Speaker Consortium (July 2022): Joined consortium of national library systems to host authors and speakers for library programs at a consortium-negotiated rate. Efficiency Outcome: Cost savings equivalent to \$12,000 annually.
- Art and Craft Class Subscription (July 2022): Implementation of CraftBug subscription for public access reduced need for staff to create similar content in-house. Efficiency
 Outcome: Provides over 500 hours of program content with no additional staff time.
- <u>Collection and Circulation Reports (July 2021)</u>: Generation of reports for item holds, item deaccession, missing items, and item use duplicated in Koha catalog software, replacing need for continued subscription to redundant software. Efficiency Outcome: Elimination of redundant software leads to cost-savings of approximately \$4,500 per year
- <u>Social Media Meetings (April 2022)</u>: Posts to Library social media accounts are made during regularly scheduled meetings devoted to social media outreach, rather than at random times. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Saves approximately 2 hours of staff time per week.
- <u>Staff Area Reorganization (March 2022)</u>: Reorganization of temporary holding areas in staff work areas to facilitate workflow of processing, mending, and problem flagged items. **Efficiency Outcome:** Increases efficiency of workflow in this area by 50%.
- <u>Lasercut Signage and Branded Items (January 2021)</u>: Utilization of grant-funded laser cutting equipment for rapid in-house production of signage and branded items eliminated need for contracting through vendors. **Efficiency Outcome:** Cost savings of approximately \$2,000 per year.
- <u>Program Supply Circulation to Public (November 2020)</u>: Circulation of existing Library program and event supplies and equipment for public checkout freed workroom and storage space while providing additional use of specialized items. **Efficiency Outcome:** Provides an additional service to the public at no extra cost.
- <u>Community Grant Application Process (July 2022)</u>: Utilization of SurveyMonkey platform to receive and process grant applications streamlined document receiving and formatting. **Efficiency Outcome**: Simplifies the application process, saving time for applicants as well as reducing necessary staff time from 6 hours to 1 hour.
- <u>Town Website Permissions (October 2021)</u>: Implementation of internal department permissions for changes to the CivicPlus platform eliminated need to process webpage updates and edits through an interdepartmental communication chain. **Efficiency Outcome:** Cuts time for website changes from 24 hours to 15 minutes.

Police Department

Already Implemented

Community Policing and the impact on service delivery (February 2022): A Community Policing initiative was developed in early 2022, branded and launched in April 2022.
 Efficiency Outcomes: Enhanced community-police partnerships and communication improves the intent of the policing model in several ways. The fear of crime in a community is reduced with a greater awareness of the presence of public safety efforts and a relationship with the public safety resources that provide those services. The

- presence of crime is reduced through education to the community of what information may be helpful to provide to the Police Department and when, thereby developing additional "eyes and ears" for the Police Department to have a swift response to concerns and develops helpful investigative information to solve crimes. Improved trust, transparency, and access helps to mend and bridge perceptions related to individuals in the policing profession and may aid in developing ambassadors for the profession and recruitment for the LGMSPD.
- Flock (January 2022): The Police Department initiated a two-year pilot program for the allocation and implementation of stationary automated license plate readers (ALPR) throughout Town, as a crime suppression and investigative tool. Efficiency Outcome: Images of vehicles reported as stolen, wanted as evidence in major crimes or associated to missing persons are alerted to LGMSPD within seconds. The Flock system helped to solve and prevent many crimes and 13 other law enforcement agencies share their data with LGMSPD. This also allows to have a strategic deployment or response model based on immediate information of where crime may be occurring, and evidence related to a crime.
- Virtual Reality (VR) Training (February 2022): The purchase of virtual reality Decision and Tactics Training Equipment with dedicated VR simulation components assists LGMSPD in creating the most realistic training for officer's decision making, deescalation and use of force. This system is Police Officer Standards and Training (POST) approved and allows the subjects involved in the scenarios to have the mental status, gender, race, and many other attributes of the subjects on the screen to be adjusted. Efficiency Outcome: This equipment allows for onsite training and opportunities to recreate situations they may encounter on duty, but in a controlled setting and to be available on any shift throughout the week. This technology can also be shared with members of the community to allow them to participate in a controlled environment in some of the situations our sworn staff experience.
- RIMS (September 2020): RIMS is a new Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) and Records Management System (RMS) that interfaces with many different platforms utilized currently and by other law enforcement partners in the county. Efficiency Outcome: RIMS assisted the Police Department in being able to comply with existing and upcoming mandates, capture ongoing statistical data, accurately measure performance, better equip first responders with relevant information, and reduce report writing time. RIMS interfaces with many other platforms in use by the Police Department, therefore reducing the need for staff to login and access each database independently. Additionally, the RIMS platform allows the ability to provide a website link where the public can access information of police activity and arrests, which reduces the need for staff to provide this information or the public having to make a request and increases transparency. Residents can also request vacation checks, register their security cameras, or request directed patrol on the site.
- Racial and Identity Profiling Act RIPA (October 2021): Assembly Bill 953 referred to as the Racial and Identity Profiling Act (RIPA) was passed by legislature to focus on eliminating racial and identity profiling and improve diversity and racial and identity sensitivity in law enforcement. The bill requires each state and local agency that

employs peace officers to annually report to the Attorney General specified data elements on all stops. **Efficiency Outcome:** Statistics received based on the RIPA information will be published by Department of Justice in Spring of 2023 and accessible on a database maintained by DOJ with other jurisdictions RIPA information for a uniformed intake and transparency platform. Law enforcement agencies are able to generate RIPA analysis information through the Stop Data Dashboard to review the officer's "perception" of various components of information mandated under the RIPA requirements.

- National Incident Based Reporting System NIBRS / CIBRS (February 2022): Implemented to improve the overall quality of crime data collected by law enforcement and an ability to provide circumstances and context for crimes and provide more useful statistics to promote constructive discussion, measured planning, and informed policing. This is a data collection method required by the FBI and replaces the previous Unified Crime Reporting (UCR). The prior UCR Summary Reporting System (SRS) has been retired and a more expanded information report will be available in 2023. Efficiency Outcome: Significant amount of information related to victims, offenders' relationships property, and crimes that was not previously available for assessment of the totality of each investigation under the UCR process.
- Transparency Webpage (May 2021): A single, user-friendly webpage on the Police Department website provides consistent and transparent information on incidents throughout different areas within LGMSPD's jurisdiction. The website also includes information related to Police Department training requirements, hate crimes, PRAs, Use of Force, and Flock Safety Transparency Portal (updated daily). Efficiency Outcome: A single location for information, improved accessibility of the data to the public, improved customer service, and reduced calls for information.
- Body Worn Cameras and Mobile Audio Video Technology (July 2021): While the Department was an early adopter of body-worn cameras (BWCs), the updated BWC equipment also included Mobile Audio and Video (MAV) system in the patrol vehicles to benefit the Town Department, and the public through enhanced evidence collection, retention, increased officer safety, accountability, and transparency. Efficiency Outcome: The BWCs and MAV system interface with an associated evidence management platform that works in conjunction with the new Computer Aided Dispatch System. This connection through technology limits staff time on categorizing and tagging video evidence. The updated BWCs and MAV system are crucial in limiting liability exposure.
- Axon Automated License Plate Readers ALPR (August 2021 / July 2022): Axon Fleet 2 installed in August 2021 and upgraded to Axon Fleet 3 ALPR in July 2022. Fleet 3 allows better coverage with camera angles and ability to read plates passing through the camera angles. Plate reading technology alerts officers on the car computer on plates of interest or with a want associated to the vehicle. The technology also retains the plate read data through Axon Evidence for later investigations. Efficiency Outcome: Immediate awareness of more than what an Officer can observe, similar to Flock but mobile. This adds to the Officers' situational awareness and has the same 30 days retention period as Flock.

- Fingerprinting contract with Los Gatos-Saratoga Recreation (LGS Rec) (November 2021):
 Fingerprinting services for tow truck drivers, town applicants, and other as needed purposes was being provided by Records staff utilizing outdated equipment.
 Fingerprinting services are now being contracted through the LGS Rec. Efficiency
 Outcome: Limited Records Staff is no longer having to track and provide services for fingerprinting and allowing non-police staff into a secured area for fingerprinting services. This allows for better security in the Police building and ability for staff to focus on Police Records duties.
- <u>Updated Surveillance System (July 2022):</u> The Police Department updated and modernized its antiquated interview recording and Police Operations Bureau overall surveillance camera system. **Efficiency Outcome:** This new system allows access for viewing from all available PD terminals, instead of one, and the recording function is significantly more seamless.
- <u>Evidence.com / Axon</u>: Digital evidence management system for videos, photos, documents. **Efficiency Outcome:** Time saved with efficiency tools offered with redaction, transcription, and sharing evidence with secure link controls with law enforcement partners. Evidence.com is a cloud-based system that integrates with RIMS for auto tagging capabilities thereby reducing time officers had to previously review and mark evidence.
- Per Diems in Dispatch (November 2021): The Police Department has utilized per diem Dispatchers to supplement the full-time Dispatchers as they continue to train new personnel. Per diem staff have provided additional needed shift coverage for full-time dispatchers to have vacation, go to training, and provide increased staffing when needed. Efficiency Outcome: Full time staff overtime hours in Dispatch is less than the same timeframe a year ago, they are allowed time off, each Dispatcher was allowed to attend a training course in the first six months of this year. improved staff retention.
- Social Media (February 2022): The Police Department has expanded the staff that has access and approval for posting on the various Police Department social media sites and are encouraged to share work experiences that the public may be interested in, provide safety messages, and advertise upcoming events that the community may want to attend. Efficiency Outcome: Social media provides immediate information and awareness that is accessible to media and to community members. It allows for swift consistency in messaging and provides a greater level of awareness for the Police Department and its public safety efforts and connection with the community.
- Coplogic Online Reporting (August 2021): Online police reports are convenient and accessible to the public any time of day. Online reporting allows Police Officers to be available for emergencies and other high-priority situations. It also gives officers more time for proactive and discretionary police work. Efficiency Outcome: Resulted in fuel savings and improved response time to incidents. Support staff can process the reports more efficiently. Since January 1, 2022 until August 1, 2022, a total of 163 online police reports have been received through the online system. With each report estimated at taking 1.5 hours for an Officer to document, this provided an estimated time savings of 244.5 hours of sworn staff time this year alone.

 <u>LexisNexis (June 2022):</u> Automated accident report database that interfaces with the RIMS platform. **Efficiency Outcome:** Provides a secure, electronic data management resource that helps agencies deliver accident reports to requestors directly and alleviates the requesting and issuance process that previously occurred through Police Department Records staff manually. The accessibility to the requestor enhances public service and document accessibility.

Implementation Underway

- <u>Strategic Plan:</u> The Police Department Leadership Team joined together for several days
 for a facilitated Team Building Workshop with the purpose of team building and to
 provide an opportunity to refine and build upon the strategic direction of the
 organization. During the retreat, the team focused on problem solving, developing
 organizational goals and objectives that can be implemented in the Department and
 throughout the community. **Efficiency Outcome**: The Strategic Plan provides focus for
 the Department over the next two years.
- Outside Vendor to Conduct Backgrounds: Instead of using retired staff to complete both sworn and non-sworn background investigations, the Police Department elected to contract with an outside vendor. Efficiency Outcome: Outside backgrounding services create staff capacity and there is no potential for pre-conceived bias of having known an applicant. Each background investigation and report is conducted in a similar manner, depending on the position being sought.
- <u>Investigative Technology Advancements</u>: Enhanced intelligence systems for onsite review instead of awaiting outside vendors or State and Federal law enforcement partners to utilize their technology databases to extract and analyze the information. **Efficiency Outcome:** Reduction in time for return of investigative information.

Expected

- <u>Electronic Citations or E-cites (Spring 2023):</u> Allows Officers to produce printable paper citations in the field without having to hand write the document on a triplicate copy.
 <u>Efficiency Outcome:</u> Through electronic communication, the information on the citation is automatically uploaded in the interfacing RIMS Records Management program and sends the pertinent information to the court system as well, thereby alleviating a lot of time from writing the citation, Records staff having to enter and process the documents, and limits paper storage by going to an automated capability.
- All of PD staff at POB (2023 2024): Develop a phased process with the goal of moving the Police Department staff at Headquarters to the Police Operations building. Efficiency Outcome: By bringing all Police Department staff together there are many benefits and efficiencies including decreasing redundancy, improving communication, enhancing access and camaraderie throughout the Police Department team, cross training opportunities, and allow for all Police Department resources to be available to the public at one location.

Parks and Public Works Department

- <u>Special Use Permit Applications (April 2021)</u>: created a PDF fillable form for a paperless process. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced the cycle time for the approval process.
- Special Use Permit Refund Request (September 2021): created a PDF fillable form for a paperless process. Efficiency Outcome: Reduced the cycle time for the approval process.
- Park Reservation Refund Request (September 2021): created a PDF fillable form for a paperless process. Efficiency Outcome: Reduced the cycle time for the approval process.
- QR Code Signage Parks (September 2021): created a QR code for easy access to Parks website. Efficiency Outcome: Allows residents/customers the ability to access Parks website from their cell phone.
- <u>Tree Removal Permit Application (August 2021)</u>: created a PDF fillable form for a paperless process. <u>Efficiency Outcome</u>: Reduced the cycle time for the approval process.
- Agreement Checklist (November 2021): created a PDF fillable form for a paperless process. Efficiency Outcome: Reduced the cycle time for the processing of an agreement.
- SharePoint (May 2020): For electronic work files, PPW switched over from local network drives to cloud-based Microsoft SharePoint platform during the Covid shutdown as a way to allow employees to continuously share and store documents even remotely. SharePoint continues to be a useful tool for staff to access and work on documents collaboratively. Efficiency Outcome: increased productivity, collaboration, and readily available information to staff members.
- Engineering Document Archiving (June 2020): Scanned/digitized/cataloged hardcopy documents (both typical letter size to large format, such as maps), which were previously stored in large storage bins, to be archived and accessed quickly through local network drive and SharePoint. Efficiency Outcome: Faster and easier access to Engineering documents and freed up workspace for other tasks.
- Online Bidding for Public Works Projects (May 2020): In response to Covid-19, PPW staff implemented online plan room and bidding platforms to allow electronic bid advertising and bid management services. Efficiency Outcome: Minimize the need to reproduce hardcopies of bid documents, consolidate bid management through online platform, and allow contractors to submit bids online without having to physically deliver or mail in bids.
- <u>Postcard Mailings for Community Outreach</u> (August 2020): Outsourced postcard mailings by utilizing multiple online vendors. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduced staff time to manually prepare documents and effectively provides notices to the public in a timely manner.
- Imagery and Light Detection and Ranging (LiDAR) Data Acquisition Cost Sharing Agreement (September 2021): The Town entered into a cost agreement with the

County of Santa Clara for the rights to utilize updated County-wide imagery and LiDAR data. The Geographic Information System (GIS) and aerial map dataset are recent, and the shared costs are nominal compared to costs for similar updated data if the Town was to obtain as an independent agency. **Efficiency Outcome**: Staff is using most updated and current aerial maps and GIS information to update the Town's GIS application and identify and track Town infrastructure assets visible via aerials and LiDAR information.

Implementation Underway

• <u>Accela Upgrade</u>: Implementation of online submittals for all Engineering applications including electronic payments. **Efficiency Outcome**: Reduce the amount of staff time to input information from applications into the database, improve payment process, potentially improve cycle times, and faster conversion to digital filing.

Expected

<u>Public Works Development Review (2022)</u>: An assessment of the existing Public Works
development review process is underway by the new Director. Once the assessment is
concluded, specific implementation steps will be taken. **Expected Outcomes**: Improved
tracking of application status, streamlining the review to improve cycle times, and
improved customer experience.

Community Development Department

- <u>Virtual Inspections (April 2020 August 2022)</u>: Implementation of virtual inspections to perform field inspections during the Covid 19 pandemic. **Efficiency Outcome:** Virtual inspections allows the Building Department to safely continue providing inspection services to the many active construction projects in the Town.
- <u>Digital Plan Submittal and Review (May 2020)</u>: Implementation of online application and plan submittals for Building and Planning permits, and digital review replaced in-person submittals during the Covid 19 pandemic. **Efficiency Outcome:** Online submittals and review allowed the Building and Planning Divisions to continue providing permit processing and resulted in conversion to a permanent paperless filing system.
- <u>Review Time Tracking Report (ongoing)</u>: Development of new reports for use in tracking
 the timeliness of submittals and reviews through the permitting process. This involves a
 reconfiguration of the permitting workflow and task assignments. **Efficiency Outcome:**Tracking review times of both staff and applicants is anticipated to provide a better
 understanding of inefficiencies within the review timeline to identify areas for efficiency
 improvements.
- <u>Cross Train Plan Review (ongoing)</u>: Digital plan review training for permit and inspection staff. **Efficiency Outcome:** Distributing specific plan review responsibilities to multiple

- Building Department Staff is anticipated to reduce review times on projects that do not require a Design Professional review.
- Accela Cloud Hosted Migration (December 2021): Accela, the Town's permitting, code compliance, and land management solution, was migrated to Accela's cloud hosted platform. Efficiency Outcome: Migrating Accela to their cloud hosted solution has eliminated the ongoing support and maintenance of four servers in the Town's datacenter. The Accela system is accessible without the need to be connected to the Town's internal network which allows for more efficient work by Staff out in the field.
- Enhanced Accela Citizen Access (ACA) Portal (January 2021): The ACA portal was migrated to an enhanced version through Accela's cloud hosted platform. This included the development of an online permit decision tool. Efficiency Outcome: The Enhanced ACA portal provides a much more intuitive user interface where the public can easily apply for permits by eliminating the guessing game of what they need to apply for. The newly developed permit decision tool helps to facilitate the application process and minimizes erroneous information that Staff must often correct on the back end.
- <u>Economic Recovery Process Reductions (2020-2021, ongoing. In coordination with</u> Economic Vitality):
 - March 2020 Town Council adopted an Economic Recovery Resolution in response to the COVID-19 Pandemic. As time has passed, staff has brought forward modifications, updates, and extensions to continue to streamline commercial land use processes, foster economic recovery, and provide improved customer service through process time and fee reductions and increased flexibility.
 - These modifications, updates, and extensions were adopted by the Town Council: January 2021, February 2021, April 2021, and November 2021.
 - Streamlining captured by the Economic Recovery Resolution include:
 - Businesses within the C-2 zone are authorized to use existing on-street public parking for use of outdoor dining with an executed agreement;
 - Suspending parking requirements in private commercial lots to allow for some parking spaces to be utilized for outdoor dining;
 - Businesses may relocate, expand, or open additional locations without obtaining a new CUP and memorializing the expansion with an executed Economic Recovery Agreement;
 - Personal service may locate within the C-2 and Office (O) zones with an executed Economic Recovery Agreement;
 - Up to five new bars, markets, and other miscellaneous businesses may locate with the C-2 zone utilizing an executed Economic Recovery Agreement;
 - The cost of a new CUP is reduced by 50%, with the Town paying the balance of the fees;
 - Alcohol consumption is permitted in Town parks, parklets, pop-up patios, and temporary dining areas in alignment with the Town Code; and
 - The expiration date for all building permits and planning entitlements shall be extended by two years.

 Efficiency Outcome: Reduced permitting time and staff time required for projects that would otherwise require a new CUP and associated multidepartment review and public hearing. In addition, the extension of existing building permits and planning entitlements prevented the need for project extension requests or new applications that would have been required after permit expiration.

Implementation Underway

- Expedited Permit Process: Staff is looking into options for expedited Building Permit
 application processing for certain types of Building Permits. Efficiency Outcome:
 Expedited Building Permit processing is anticipated to provide plan check services in less
 time than standard review timelines. Important components of this type of review will
 be: the capacity of other departments and outside agencies to perform expedited
 reviews; and addressing potential inequities related to increased costs for expedited
 review.
- <u>Digitizing Planning Project Files</u>: As a follow-up to the transition to digital plan submittals and review, the Planning Division is taking all current paper files and preparing them for scanning to laserfiche. **Efficiency Outcome**: Digital access to project files is anticipated to reduce staff time needed and increase promptness for responses to inquiries, PRAs, and review of Use and Occupancy applications.

Multiple Departments:

Already Implemented

 Hybrid Conference and Meeting Equipment (January 2022): Installation of OWL hybrid meeting hardware in library conference room, PPW conference room, and Council Chambers created ability for all Town Departments to conduct hybrid meetings and interviews. Efficiency Outcome: Increases the efficiency of scheduling meetings and increases flexibility for attendees.

Implementation Underway

- Tyler Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) System Migration: The Town's current
 CentralSquare ERP system will be migrated to a more modern ERP platform from Tyler
 Technologies. The project started August of 2022 with an anticipated go live date
 sometime in September of 2024. Efficiency Outcomes: Numerous areas of process
 improvements and efficiencies have been identified below.
 - Consolidate information, link processes and functions, and eliminate separate
 Departmental spreadsheets/Excel databases in favor of a single system that
 integrates the Town's financial and non-financial applications through a common
 database;
 - Streamline business processes to take advantage of best practices through automation, integration, and enhanced workflows;

- Provide a user-friendly and intuitive user interface to promote system use and productivity;
- Eliminate the need for redundant data entry (budget, timesheet, etc.);
- Eliminate the need for manual input when preparing the annual budget and financial statements;
- Improve and/or provide necessary reports and reporting capabilities, and access to data through inquiry or drilldown capabilities; and
- Provide interface capabilities with third-party systems;
- Electronic timesheet submittal and approval via integrated workflow system;
- o Electronic invoice submittal and approval via integrated workflow system;
- o Electronic requisition submittal and approval via integrated workflow system;
- Electronic Personnel Action Form submittal and approval via integrated workflow system;
- Electronic Business License Application and Approval with integrated online payment system;
- Streamlined Bank Reconciliation with automated software solutions;
- Automated reports for management decision making;
- Budget Dashboard for public participation.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve up to \$2.9 Million provided to the Capital Program during the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 budget process to specific capital projects and approve a budget adjustment transferring \$2,900,000 of General Fund balance anticipated to be available in FY 22/23 from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) allocated "replacement" revenues recognized in the General Fund in accordance with the Lost Revenue Provisions of the Act to the General Fund Appropriated Reserve (GFAR).

BACKGROUND:

On June 21, 2022, the Town Council approved the FY 2022/23 – 2026/27 Capital Improvement Program based on available funding. During budget deliberations on May 17, 2022, the Town Council allocated \$2,900,000 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to the General Fund Allocated Reserve (GFAR) for capital projects. At the conclusion of the budget process, staff was directed to return to Council in August 2022 with recommendations on the use of this additional funding.

DISCUSSION:

This report is intended to assist the Town Council in its deliberation and decision on how to allocate \$2,900,000 in ARPA funds. Funds may be allocated to projects or held in reserve for future anticipated needs (e.g., grant matching funds) as described below.

Capital Projects in Need of Funding

Attachment 1 provides a list of priority capital projects and identifies those that are unfunded or underfunded. In that attachment, projects are presented in three categories for Council consideration: 1) projects that staff propose for funding in this action; 2) existing projects in progress that are underfunded; and 3) projects identified as a future need and currently have no funding. Projects are prioritized into four categories and their community benefits are identified. The categories and benefits are shown in Table 1.

In considering the allocation of the ARPA funding, staff noted that there are items that routinely need to be completed that have no funding source. Examples of this include replacement of guardrails damaged by vehicles, repair of malfunctioning HVAC systems, sidewalk repairs to correct tripping hazards, repair or replacement of fencing impacted by trees or vehicles, emergency tree removal, etc. Since there is no current funding source for completing this type of work, staff is proposing to allocate a small percentage of the available funding to cover these unanticipated repairs.

Matching Fund Allocation for Grants

At its meeting of June 21, 2022, the Town Council authorized the Town Manager to submit applications to the Valley Transportation Authority (VTA) for four projects for funding under the One Bay Area Grant (OBAG) 3 program. If the grant applications are awarded, the Council will have the opportunity to review the funding agreements, decide whether to accept the grant funds, and identify and commit to local match funds, as well as the funds needed to facilitate

project work that will be reimbursed through the grant program. Table 2 shows the applications submitted, the grant amount requested, and Town matching requirements.

If all four projects were awarded OBAG grant funds, the Town would be required to provide \$15.1 million in matching funds over five years, \$7.7 million of which has not been secured. Award of all applications is an unlikely outcome in this highly competitive grant program; however, it is possible that the Town will secure grant funds for one or two of these projects. Therefore, staff recommends preliminarily identifying potential sources for matching funds.

Recommended Use of ARPA Funds

Table 3 provides the staff recommendation for use of the ARPA funding and Table 4 provides a description of each project.

Project / Description

East Main Street Crosswalk Improvements

The project will enhance pedestrian safety measures for crossings on East Main Street in front of Los Gatos High School. This augments an existing project budget and will facilitate completion of design and construction of the safety measures.

Downtown Public Restroom Feasibility Study/Design

Town Council has asked staff to consider a public restroom facility in Plaza Park or the general downtown area. This project would analyze alternative locations and consider utility needs and potential impacts of the work. The project will result in development of cost estimates for construction and ongoing maintenance.

Project / Description

Rehabilitate Automatic Gates – 41 Miles Avenue

The three automatic gates at the Parks and Public Works Corporation Yard are in disrepair. The repairs would include replacing safety equipment (e.g., sensor bars, receivers, transmitters, photo eyes and new electronic loops in pavement, etc.). This work will make the gates safe for operation and improve reliability.

Termite Abatement at Water Tower – 41 Miles Avenue

Staff has found termite damage in the water tower. This project would provide funding for the appropriate abatement work.

Civic Center Plumbing Repair – 110 E. Main Street

Plumbing at the Civic Center has been leaking from joints and pinholes in several locations. Ceiling tiles are starting to become wet and deteriorating. These failed pipe joints and pinholes are due to the age of the mechanical infrastructure of the building. The piping is wrapped in insulation that contains asbestos. To access the piping for repair will require proper hazardous material abatement.

HVAC Improvements – Police Operations Building (POB)

To make the Heating, Ventilation, Air Conditioning (HVAC) system at the Police Operations Building more efficient and fully functional, new motors are needed for seven existing economizers. Once the motors are installed, we will have the ability to incorporate them into our Building Management System for Town facilities. This will improve management of system and make it more energy efficient.

Engineering Counter Modifications – 41 Miles Avenue

At present Parks and Public Works staffs two counters for public access – one at the engineering building and another at the White House. This project would modify the front counter at the Engineering Building to accommodate a second staff, allowing the White House to be closed for public access. This will enhance service to the community and improve efficiency of service delivery.

CONCLUSION:

The Town has significant capital expenditure needs competing for limited funds. Prioritization of projects and goals, focusing on safety, equity, proactive maintenance, and quality of life, helps to ensure existing infrastructure is maintained in a cost-effective manner while new amenities are added at a balanced and reasonable rate.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Adopted Capital Budget includes \$2.9 M allocated to the Capital Program. This action will establish funding for specific capital projects based Council direction. Any funds reserved for future projects or matching funds would remain in GFAR.

The Adopted General Fund budget did not include the transfer from General Fund to the GFAR. The requested budget adjustment would transfer \$2,900,000 of General Fund balance anticipated to be available in FY 22/23 from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) allocated "replacement" revenues recognized in the General Fund in accordance with the Lost Revenue Provisions of the Act. The adjustment will authorize a \$2,900,000 General Fund transfer-out and a corresponding GFAR budgeted transfer-in for the same amount for use as a funding source for the proposed capital improvements. Any actions above this amount taken by the Town Council may have corresponding fiscal impacts.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

In accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 1538(b)(4), this decision is not a project subject to CEQA because it is a fiscal activity, which does not involve any commitment to a specific project. CEQA and other environmental issues would be considered and addressed at each individual project level.
