RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution reaffirming Resolution 2021-044 and making findings pursuant to Government Code Section 54953, as amended by Assembly Bill 361, and authorizing the continued use of virtual meetings due to health and safety concerns for the public.

BACKGROUND:

On March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20, which allowed for relaxed provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Brown Act) that allowed legislative bodies to conduct meetings through teleconferencing without having to meet the strict compliance of the Brown Act. All provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 concerning the conduct of public meetings expired on September 30, 2021.

DISCUSSION:

AB 361 was signed into law by the Governor on September 16, 2021, and went into effect immediately upon signing. It amends the Brown Act to allow local legislative bodies to continue using teleconferencing and virtual meeting technology after the September 30, 2021, expiration of the current Brown Act exemptions as long as there is a "proclaimed state of emergency" by the Governor. This allowance also depends on State or local officials imposing or recommending measures that promote social distancing or a legislative body finding that meeting in person would present an imminent safety risk to attendees.

AB 361 requires Public agencies to make findings by majority vote within 30 days of the first teleconferenced meeting under AB 361 and every 30 days thereafter that a state of emergency

still exists and continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person, or that officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California declared a state of emergency to make additional resources available, formalize emergency actions already underway across multiple state agencies and departments, and help the state prepare for broader spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, the Town Manager of Los Gatos acting in the capacity of Town of Director of Emergency Services, issued a Proclamation of Local Emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-29-20, which suspended and modified the teleconferencing requirements under the Brown Act (California Government Code Section 54950 et seq.) so that local legislative bodies can hold public meetings via teleconference (with audio or video communications, without a physical meeting location), as long as the meeting agenda identifies the teleconferencing procedures to be used; and

WHEREAS, on March 17, 2020, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos ratified the Proclamation of Local Emergency as set forth in Resolution 2020-008 and remains in full force and effect to date; and

WHEREAS, on June 4, 2021, the Governor clarified that the "reopening" of California on June 15, 2021 did not include any change to the proclaimed state of emergency or the powers exercised thereunder; and

WHEREAS, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which extended the provision of N-29-20 concerning the conduct of public meetings through September 30, 2021, and the Governor subsequently signed legislation revising Brown Act requirements for teleconferenced public meetings (Assembly Bill 361, referred to hereinafter as "AB 361"); and

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021 Governor Newsom signed AB 361, which added subsection (e) to Government Code section 54953 of the Brown Act, and makes provision for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos approved Resolution No. 2021-044 on October 5, 2021 declaring the need for the Town Council, Boards, Commissions, and Committees to continue to meet remotely in order to ensure the health and safety of the public; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Los Gatos remains in a state of emergency due to the continuing spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends physical distancing of at least six (6) feet whenever possible, avoiding crowds, and avoiding spaces that do not offer fresh air from the outdoors, particularly for people who are not fully vaccinated, or are at a higher risk of severe illness due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, that the Santa Clara County Public Health Department continues to recommend that public bodies meet remotely to the extent possible; and

WHEREAS, the Town's public meeting facility is indoor and not designed to ensure circulation of fresh/outdoor air, and not designed to ensure that attendees can remain six (6) feet apart; and

WHEREAS, holding in-person meetings would encourage community members to come to Town facilities to participate in local government, and some of them would be at high risk of severe illness due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, technology exists that allows full participation from members of the public without requiring in-person attendance at a Town Council, Board, Commission, or Committee meeting.

WHEREAS, the Town Council has considered all information related to this matter, including the associated staff report and other information relating to COVID-19 provided at prior public meetings of the Town Council; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council now desires to adopt a Resolution finding that the requisite conditions continue to exist for the legislative bodies of the Town of Los Gatos, as defined in the Brown Act, to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS DOES HEREBY RESOLVE:

- 1. The Town Council hereby finds that the fact set forth in the above recitals and as contained in Resolution 2021-044 are true and correct, and establish the factual basis for the adoption of this Resolution;
- 2. There is an ongoing proclaimed state of emergency relating to the novel coronavirus causing the disease known as COVID-19 and as a result of that emergency,

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meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees of inperson meetings of this legislative body and all Town advisory bodies within the meaning of California Government Code section 54953(e)(1).

- 3. Under the present circumstances, including the risks mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the Town Council determines that authorizing teleconferenced public meetings consistent with Assembly Bill 361 is necessary and appropriate.
- 4. Staff are directed to take all actions necessary to implement this Resolution for all Town meetings in accordance with the foregoing provisions and the requirements of Government Code section 54953, as amended by Assembly Bill 361, including but not limited to returning for ratification of this Resolution every 30 days after teleconferencing for the first time pursuant to Assembly Bill 361 for so long as either of the following circumstances exists: (a) the state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of this legislative body to meet in person; and/or (b) state or local officials, including but not limited to the County Health Officer, continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

BACKGROUND (continued):

On November 16, 2021, the Town Council adopted Town Council Policy 04-06: Purchasing Policy. Among other items, the Policy increased the Department Director purchase authority up to the amount of \$50,000 and the Town Manager's authority up to \$100,000. The Purchasing Policy is available on the Town website:

Resolution 2019-033 does not align with the Town's current Purchasing Policy and staff is recommending its recission. A draft replacement Resolution (Attachment 2) is consistent with the Purchasing Policy and authorizes the Town Manager to execute the following duties during periods of official Town Council legislative recess in consultation with the Mayor and for purchase amounts over \$100,000:

- 1. Approval of plans and specifications for capital projects and authorization to advertise for bids.
- 2. Award of construction contracts and construction contract change orders in excess of the amount included in the contingency.
- 3. Execution of agreements and amendments to agreements in excess of \$100,000 that ordinarily require Town Council approval.

The Town Council took an official legislative recess from June 22, 2022 to August 1, 2022. During this recess, and pursuant to authority granted by the Town Council consistent with the Town's Purchasing Policy, the Town Manager executed one action in consultation with the Mayor:

 Agreement with Foothill Mechanical Inc. for HVAC System at the Adult Recreation Center Services/Purchase (Parks and Public Works Department Memorandum, Attachment 3)

The Town Manager determined that immediate action on the above item was necessary due to lengthy lead times for equipment and delivery and in order to maintain critical services to the occupants and patrons of the facility. The above item has already been approved by the Town Manager and Mayor, and Council members may request additional information or provide additional direction regarding these items.

It is recommended that the Town Manager execute an agreement with Foothill Mechanical Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$195,000 inclusive of all unforeseen costs.

BACKGROUND:

The Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) System at the Adult Recreation Center has reached the end of its serviceable life. This HVAC system was installed in 1978 when the building was first constructed. PPW Facilities have been making substantial repairs to the system for several years. These costly repairs have been done through both contracted and inhouse labor. The majority of the stand-alone HVAC units have failed (14 out of 18). All of the units are in need of replacement.

DISCUSSION:

Staff received quotes from 2 of the 3 contractors solicited. Foothill Mechanical Inc. provided the most cost-effective proposal for this work. Due to long lead times for delivery of equipment and providing comfort to the occupants and patrons of this facility, it would be beneficial to execute this agreement.

BACKGROUND:

On April 20, 2021, the Town Council discussed the status of parklets in the downtown and approved an increase in parklet subsidy per business to \$40,000 or 75% of the total cost for semi-permanent parklets.

On March 15, 2021, the Town entered an agreement with AP&I Design, Inc. in the amount of \$49,000 for design of semi-permanent parklets under previous Council direction. This agreement provides base semi-permanent parklet design documents to help streamline permitting review and reduce costs to businesses for up to ten parklets. With the increased subsidy, the demand for parklets has increased from the original anticipated number to an upper potential of 26 parklets, the Town Council approved a first amendment to the agreement on June 15, 2022 with AP&I Design, Inc. to increase the agreement amount to a not to exceed (NTE) amount of \$91,192.

SUBJECT: Contract Amendment with AP&I Design

DATE: August 2, 2022

DISCUSSION:

As the semi-permanent parklet project continues to progress, more resources than originally anticipated have been required to provide design updates and engineering support for the parklet designs, mostly related to achieving accessibility in line with the Americans with Disability Act (ADA). While there is a standard design being implemented for the parklets, each parklet has required specific tailoring to meet the existing conditions of the street and adjacent sidewalk. This has resulted in AP&I design, Inc. using more of its staff resources to address these needed design modifications.

The team was originally selected based on their experience in designing previous parklets for businesses and the ability for that team to quickly adjust the template and move the process forward. Staff recommends continuing and expanding this agreement to accommodate the additional scope.

CONCLUSION:

The addition to the design contract will facilitate the increased scope of design work necessary to continue the installation of semi-permanent parklets in the downtown.

COORDINATION:

This project is coordinated with the Community Development and Parks and Public Works Departments.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding for this project has been previously identified from the Capital Improvement Project titled Downtown Streetscape/Economic Recovery Efforts and using American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding.

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on March 15, 2021 by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and AP+I Design, Inc., ("Consultant"), whose address is 117 Easy Street, Mountain View, CA 94043. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 The Town desires to engage Consultant to provide professional architectural design services for the Town of Los Gatos Parklet Program.
- 1.2 The Consultant represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Consultant warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement.

 Consultant acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Consultant.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Consultant shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on March 2, 2021, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. This contract will remain in effect from March 25, 2021 through Dec 31, 2022. Consultant shall perform the services described in Exhibit A.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Consultant represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession. Consultant shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Consultant shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Information/Report Handling</u>. All documents furnished to Consultant by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Consultant under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of Consultant's services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Consultant in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and

the Consultant shall not make any of the these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Consultant or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Consultant in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Consultant expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Consultant which is and has been confirmed in writing by Consultant to be a trade secret of Consultant.

- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation for Consultant's professional services **shall not exceed \$49,000**, inclusive of all costs. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.
- 2.7 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.8 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Consultant shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Consultant shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Consultant's offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Consultant. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.10 Independent Contractor. It is understood that the Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Consultant may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Consultant agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under

this Agreement. Consultant shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Consultant or is based on allegations of Consultant's negligent performance or wrongdoing.

- 2.11 Conflict of Interest. Consultant understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Consultant has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Consultant has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Consultant warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Consultant shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person, Consultant discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 Equal Employment Opportunity. Consultant warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Consultant nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Consultant agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Consultant shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Consultant agrees that all

- certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.
- iv. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, professional liability insurance in amounts not less than \$1,000,000 which is sufficient to insure Consultant for professional errors or omissions in the performance of the particular scope of work under this agreement.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant, premises owned or used by the Consultant. This requirement does not apply to the professional liability insurance required for professional errors and omissions.
- ii. The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Consultant shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Consultant shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Consultant provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.

3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Consultant shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Consultant, or any of the Consultant's officers, employees, or agents or any subconsultant.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Consultant shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Consultant shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Consultant. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Consultant an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Consultant.
- 4.5 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.6 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

- 4.7 <u>Order of Precedence</u>. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.8 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Consultant. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

AP+I Design is pleased to present the following proposal for professional architectural design services for The Town of Los Gatos Parklet Program. We have prepared the following proposal based on our understanding of the work to be done described during our meeting on February 4th, 2021. We are very excited about your project and hope to work in partnership with you in the development of pre-approved parklets for the Town of Los Gatos.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The project consists of developing standardized designs and pre-approved drawing packages for outdoor parklets based on previously approved design documents. These standardize designs will include limited modification options for individual sites including color variation and railing type. The Town of Los Gatos will make these pre-approved model plans available for limited use by business owners. AP+I will provide limited license to the Town of Los Gatos such that each individual parklet to be built from the plans will incur a use and modification fee. For each built parklet the business owner or the Town will contract with AP+I Design and RCL Engineers for the additional fee indicated in order to make minor modifications to the plans.

Parklet construction is limited to (10) ten total parklets under this contract. Additionally for each parklet constructed AP+I and RCL will be notified by the town or business owner and use fee paid.

Disabled accessibility (Title 24/ADA) issues will be addressed for the parklets only.

Civil engineering services are not included and each parklet builder will be responsible for suverying their site and/or working with a contractor to finalize finish elevations.

Construction Administration is included on a limited basis as a hourly not-to-exceed fee.

SCOPE OF WORK – Model Plans:

Under this scope of work AP+I and RCL Structural Engineers will provide model parklet options to be reviewed and approved by the Town and held on file for future use.

STANDARDS DEVELOPMENT

- Field verify existing parklet construction with sample parklets in the field
- Provide standardized parklet layouts for the following parklet types:
 - o 2 Parking Stalls Long Flat Site (up to .9% grade)
 - o 3 Parking Stalls Long Flat Site (up to .9% grade)
 - o 4 Parking Stalls Long Flat Site (up to .9% grade)
 - 2 Parking Stalls Long Sloped Site (up to 4.9% grade)

Under this scope of work individual business owners or the Town of Los Gatos will contract with AP+I and RCL Structural Engineers to provide minor modifications to adapt the model plan to an individual site and for a contractor to build (1) such modified parklet up to 10 parklets total. Note a portion of the fee for the scope below will be covered by the town of Los Gatos.

B. Compensation

This agreement provides base semi-permanent parklet design documents to help streamline permitting review and reduce costs to businesses for up to ten parklets.

SUBJECT: Contract Amendment with AP&I Design

BACKGROUND (continued):

With the increased subsidy, the demand for parklets has increased from the original anticipated number to an upper potential of 26 parklets.

DISCUSSION:

The increased interest in parklets will require additional work from the project architects, AP&I Design. The team was originally selected based on their experience in designing previous parklets for businesses and the ability for that team to quickly adjust the template and move the process forward. Staff recommends continuing and expanding this agreement to accommodate the additional scope.

In addition, staff recommends extending the deadline for businesses to submit their applications from the current date of June 30 to July 29, 2021. This extension will allow businesses to fully commit to the expense of the semi-permanent parklets. The required timeline for final construction will remain December 31, 2022.

CONCLUSION:

The addition to the design contract and the extension to the application deadline will facilitate the increased demand and installation of semi-permanent parklets in the downtown.

COORDINATION:

This project is coordinated with the Economic Vitality Manager and the Community Development Department.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding for this project has been previously identified from the Capital Improvement Project titled Downtown Streetscape/Economic Recovery Efforts.

BACKGROUND:

The FY 2021/22 Curb, Gutter, and Sidewalk Maintenance Project focused on replacing or retrofitting curb ramps in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other accessibility requirements. Title II of the ADA obligates jurisdictions to upgrade non-conforming curb ramps when streets are resurfaced from one intersection to another. The United States Department of Justice has determined that roadway resurfacing work such as asphalt overlay and rubber cape seal prompts curb ramps on associated streets to be installed or upgraded per the latest ADA requirements and standards.

At the February 15, 2022 Town Council meeting, Council approved the plans and specifications for the Annual (FY 2021/22) Curb, Gutter, and Sidewalk Maintenance Project, approved advertising for bid, and authorized the Town Manager to award a construction contract in an amount not to exceed \$588,500, including contingencies.

BACKGROUND (continued):

On March 10, 2022, the Town received twelve bids ranging from \$367,145 to \$723,600. The Town entered into an agreement with Spencon Construction for the work for the lowest responsible bid of \$367,145. Bidding the projects early in the year helped the Town receive favorable bids.

DISCUSSION:

With the timely execution of the contract, the construction project started in April 2022. Spencon Construction has since satisfactorily completed all contracted work items, including Town requested change order work, for a final construction cost of \$387,225. Per the original scope, a total of 57 curb ramps were made ADA compliant, and 250 square feet of sidewalk and 65 linear feet of curb and gutter which were uplifted and damaged were replaced. The Town requested change order work that resulted in an additional 90 square feet of sidewalk and 84 linear feet of curb and gutter being replaced as needed prior to the street resurfacing scheduled this year. Staff recommends accepting the project.

Five percent of the faithful performance bonds will remain in effect for a period of two years as a guarantee for any needed repair or replacement caused by defective materials and/or workmanship for the project. The execution and recordation of the Certificate of Acceptance is required to finalize the Town's acceptance and to release the retention funds withheld from the contractor.

CONCLUSION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a Certificate of Acceptance and Notice of Completion for the FY 2021/22 Curb, Gutter, and Sidewalk Maintenance Project (CIP No. 813-9921), completed by Spencon Construction, and authorize the Town Clerk to file the certificate with the County Clerk-Recorder's Office for recordation.

COORDINATION:

This project has been coordinated with the Finance Department.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Parks and Public Works staff costs are tracked for all projects. Tracking of staff costs allows for accountability in the costs of the project, recovery of costs for grant funded projects, and identification of future staffing needs. This project utilized both full-time and part-time

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a four-year agreement for services (Attachment 1) with Universal Site Services for enhanced downtown garbage, recycling, and pizza box receptacle collection and cleaning services in an amount of \$45,961.06 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23, with a succeeding annual base amount of \$56,336.28, for a total agreement base amount valued at \$214,969.90 prior to any future increase adjustments made for Consumer Price Index (CPI).

BACKGROUND:

The Town of Los Gatos has utilized contractual services to provide enhanced downtown garbage collection and recycling on the weekends since August 2015 and the current agreement for services with Universal Site Services will expire on August 31, 2022.

This agreement supports the effort to augment trash collection in the downtown area on the weekends and to provide recycling services to the downtown. The Town's franchise hauler for trash and recycling is unable to meet all the service needs of seven-day trash service and downtown recycling service. In 2021, the Town of Los Gatos added seven pizza box receptacles

BACKGROUND (continued):

in response to the overflow in trash receptacles due to an increase in takeout containers with COVID-19.

Implementation of the current service model of contracted recycling, pizza box receptacles, and enhanced trash hauling on weekends in the downtown, combined with an increase in recycling receptacles, has significantly decreased the incidents of overflowing trash cans with a corresponding decrease to the amount of waste going to the landfill. Staff continues to increase the number of recycling receptacles to meet the needs of the downtown with the ultimate goal of completing one-to-one receptacle pairings. Currently, the service includes 61 trash receptacles paired with 50 recycling receptacles.

In addition to collection, Universal Site Services provides cleaning services of the receptacles. The receptacle design leads to soiled surfaces, which have historically been a nuisance downtown.

DISCUSSION:

Recently, staff prepared a Request for Proposals (RFP) for the following service categories:

- Downtown weekend garbage and pizza receptacle collection
- Downtown recycling collection on weekends and midweek
- Receptacle cleaning services

Firms were asked to provide their capability and experience with collection and recycling service and to provide pricing for each category. One proposal was received on May 27, 2022 from Universal Site Services. While only one proposal was received, staff was comfortable moving forward in the process based on peer review, industry knowledge, and experience.

Staff determined that Universal Site Services is the best qualified and the most cost competitive firm to provide the requested services. Universal provides similar services to multiple corporations, municipalities, and public agencies around the Bay Area and have been in business since 1958. The Town's experience with Universal providing enhanced garbage and recycling services as well as other related cleaning services for the Town has been very successful, with high quality service, great communication, and positive responses to issues.

The Agreement includes base amount line item costs for special as-needed services and the addition of receptacles to the inventory prior to any increase adjustments made for the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Staff anticipates an increase in recycling receptacles downtown to bring the garbage to recycling receptacle ratio equal.

DISCUSSION (continued):

The four-year agreement term allows for continuity of service and maximizes savings by engaging the firm for multiple years. The contract language provides for cancellation should the need arise during the contract term.

CONCLUSION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a four-year agreement for services (Attachment 1) with Universal Site Services in an amount of \$45,961.06 for fiscal year 2022/23, with a succeeding annual base amount of \$56,336.28, for a total agreement base amount valued at \$214,969.90 prior to any future increase adjustments made for CPI.

Funds for the services for FY 2022/23 have been appropriated in the FY 2022/23 Parks and Public Works Operating Budget.

AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 1st of September 2022, and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and Universal Site Services ("Service Provider"), whose address is 760 E. Capitol Avenue, Milpitas, CA 95035. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town sought quotations for the services described in this Agreement through a Request for Proposals (RFP) and Town desires to engage Service Provider as the sole responder for the services described in this Agreement and the Service Provider and was found to be a responsible supplier for these services.
- 1.2 Service Provider represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Town desires to engage Service Provider to provide garbage, pizza box, and recycling receptacle collection and cleaning services.
- 1.4 Service Provider warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Service Provider acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Service Provider.

II. AGREEMENT

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Service Provider shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on May 27, 2022, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. The effective date of this Agreement shall begin September 1, 2022, and will continue through June 30, 2026, subject to appropriation of funds, notwithstanding any other provision in this agreement.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Service Provider shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Service Provider represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Service Provider to practice its profession. Service Provider shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Service Provider shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.

- 2.5 Information/Report Handling. All documents furnished to Service Provider by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Service Provider under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Service Provider in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Service Provider shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Service Provider or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Service Provider pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Service Provider in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Service Provider expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Service Provider which is and has been confirmed in writing by Service Provider to be a trade secret of Service Provider.
- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>: shall be as follows per the bid pricing sheet as described in Exhibit A.

Compensation for year one (FY 2022/23) shall not exceed \$45,961.06. Compensation for future years shall include the projected base amount and be adjusted upward annually for the remaining term of this agreement by the change, if any, in the San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose Metropolitan Area Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, all items

(CPI). The adjustment shall be based upon the CPI published on December 31 of the preceding year. If the CPI indicates a downward adjustment, compensation will remain at the base amount. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.

2.7 Failure to Perform:

It is mutually agreed by SERVICE PROVIDER and TOWN that in the event that performance of the work by SERVICE PROVIDER under this Agreement is not completed as scheduled, TOWN will suffer damages and will incur other costs and expenses of a nature and amount which is difficult or impractical to determine. The Parties agree that by way of ascertaining and fixing the amount of damages, costs and expenses, and not by way of penalty, SERVICE PROVIDER shall pay to TOWN the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per location per scheduled service in liquidated damages for every missed service in addition to reducing the monthly payment by the cost of that service. In the event that the liquidated damages are not paid, SERVICE PROVIDER agrees that TOWN may deduct the amount of unpaid damages from any money due or that may become due to SERVICE PROVIDER under this Agreement.

2.8 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.9 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Service Provider shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Service Provider shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Service Provider offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.10 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Service Provider. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.11 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. It is understood that the Service Provider, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she

shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Service Provider may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Service Provider agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Service Provider shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Service Provider or is based on allegations of Service Provider's negligent performance or wrongdoing.

- 2.12 Conflict of Interest. Service Provider understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Service Provider has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Service Provider has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Service Provider warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Service Provider shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person Service Provider discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement Service Provider shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.13 Equal Employment Opportunity. Service Provider warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Service Provider nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

i. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.

- ii. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Service Provider shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Service Provider agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Service Provider; products and completed operations of Service Provider, premises owned or used by the Service Provider.
- ii. The Service Provider's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Service Provider's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Service Provider's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Service Provider shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Service Provider shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Service Provider provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.

3.4 Indemnification. The Service Provider shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Service Provider, or any of the Service Provider's officers, employees, or agents or any subcontractor.

IV. **GENERAL TERMS**

- 4.1 Waiver. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 Governing Law. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 Termination of Agreement. The Town and the Service Provider shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Service Provider shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Service Provider. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Service Provider an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 Prevailing Wages. This project is subject to the requirements of Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code requiring the payment of prevailing wages, the training of apprentices and compliance with other applicable requirements. Contractors and all subcontractors who perform work on the project are required to comply with these requirements. Prevailing wages apply to all projects over \$1,000 which are defined as a "public work" by the State of California. This includes: construction, demolition, repair, alteration, maintenance and the installation of photovoltaic systems under a Power Purchase Agreement when certain conditions are met under Labor Code Section 1720.6. This include service and warranty work on public buildings and structures.
 - 4.4.1 The applicable California prevailing wage rate can be found at www.dir.ca.gov and are on file with the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department, which shall be available to any interested party upon request. The contractor is also required to have a copy of the applicable wage determination posted and/or available at each jobsite.

- 4.4.2 Specifically, contractors are reminded of the need for compliance with Labor Code Section 1774-1775 (the payment of prevailing wages and documentation of such), Section 1776 (the keeping and submission of accurate certified payrolls) and 1777.5 in the employment of apprentices on public works projects. Further, overtime, weekend and holiday pay, and shift pay must be paid pursuant to applicable Labor Code section.
- 4.4.3 The public entity for which work is being performed or the California Department of Industrial Relations may impose penalties upon contractors and subcontractors for failure to comply with prevailing wage requirements. These penalties are up to \$200 per day per worker for each wage violations identified; \$100 per day per worker for failure to provide the required paperwork and documentation requested within a 10-day window; and \$25 per day per worker for any overtime violation.
- 4.4.4 As a condition to receiving progress payments, final payment and payment of retention on any and all projects on which the payment of prevailing wages is required, the contractor agrees to present to the TOWN, along with its request for payment, all applicable and necessary certified payrolls (for itself and all applicable subcontractors) for the time period covering such payment request. The term "certified payroll" shall include all required documentation to comply with the mandates set forth in Labor Code Section 1720 et seq, as well as any additional documentation requested by the Agency or its designee including, but not limited to: certified payroll, fringe benefit statements and backup documentation such as monthly benefit statements, employee timecards, copies of wage statements and cancelled checks, proof of training contributions (CAC2 if applicable), and apprenticeship forms such as DAS-140 and DAS-142.
- 4.4.5 In addition to submitting the certified payrolls and related documentation to the TOWN, the contractor and all subcontractors shall be required to submit certified payroll and related documents electronically to the California Department of Industrial Relations. Failure to submit payrolls to the DIR when mandated by the project parameters shall also result in the withholding of progress, retention and final payment.
- 4.4.6 No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5 [with limited exceptions from this requirement for bid purposes only under Labor Code section 1771.1(a)].
- 4.4.7 No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project, unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. Contractors MUST be a registered "public works contractor" with the DIR AT THE TIME OF BID. Where the prime contract is less than \$15,000 for maintenance work or less than \$25,000 for construction alternation, demolition or repair work, registration is not required.
- 4.4.8 Should any contractor or subcontractors not be a registered public works contractor and perform work on the project, Contractor agrees to fully

- indemnify the TOWN for any fines assessed by the California Department of Industrial Relations against the TOWN for such violation, including all staff costs and attorney's fee relating to such fine.
- 4.4.9 The TOWN shall withhold any portion of a payment; including the entire payment amount, until certified payroll forms and related documentation are properly submitted, reviewed and found to be in full compliance. In the event that certified payroll forms do not comply with the requirements of Labor Code Section 1720 et seq., the TOWN may continue to hold sufficient funds to cover estimated wages and penalties under the contract.
- 4.5 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Service Provider.
- 4.6 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.7 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

or personally delivered to Service Provider to such address or such other address as Service Provider designates in writing to Town.

- 4.8 <u>Order of Precedence</u>. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Service Provider. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute an Agreement for Services with S & H Construction Inc. for the Corporation Yard Building Replacement Project (CIP No. 821-2302) at 41 Miles Avenue for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$999,180 including 30% for unanticipated services.

BACKGROUND:

This project includes the construction of a replacement building at 41 Miles Avenue which will be utilized entirely for storage for Parks and Public Works (PPW) equipment and Police evidence.

DISCUSSION:

Originally this project was scoped to include the demolition of the existing building and was advertised in January 2022. Only 1 bid was received at that time and the cost proposal was over the allotted budget amount. On March 3, 2022, as recommended by staff, the Town Council rejected the single bid and approved an additional \$600,000 for the project. In order to facilitate a more competitive bidding process, the existing building was demolished on July 5, 2022 to help reduce the costs for the overall project. The Town advertised and received two bids for the revised project on July 12, 2022. S & H Construction Inc. had the most cost-effective proposal for the building construction within our revised budget.

AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 18th day of July 2022, and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and S & H Construction Inc. (Vendor), whose address is 5560 Boscell Common, Fremont, CA 94538 (Address). This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town sought quotations for the services described in this Agreement, and Service Provider was found to be the lowest responsible supplier for this purchase.
- 1.2 Service Provider represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Town desires to engage Service Provider to provide General Contracting Construction Services.
- 1.4 Service Provider warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Service Provider acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Service Provider.

II. AGREEMENT

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Service Provider shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on July 12, 2022, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. The effective date of this Agreement shall begin upon execution and will continue through December 31, 2023, subject to appropriation of funds, notwithstanding any other provision in this agreement.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Service Provider shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Service Provider represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Service Provider to practice its profession. Service Provider shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Service Provider shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.

- 2.5 Information/Report Handling. All documents furnished to Service Provider by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Service Provider under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Service Provider in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Service Provider shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Service Provider or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Service Provider pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Service Provider in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Service Provider expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Service Provider which is and has been confirmed in writing by Service Provider to be a trade secret of Service Provider.
- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation for services shall not exceed \$999,180 inclusive of all costs including 30% for unforeseen services. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.
- 2.7 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.8 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Service Provider shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Service Provider shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Service Provider offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Service Provider. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.

- 2.10 Independent Contractor. It is understood that the Service Provider, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Service Provider may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Service Provider agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Service Provider shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Service Provider or is based on allegations of Service Provider's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.11 Conflict of Interest. Service Provider understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Service Provider has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Service Provider has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Service Provider warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Service Provider shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person Service Provider discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement Service Provider shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 Equal Employment Opportunity. Service Provider warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Service Provider nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

i. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined

- single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Service Provider shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Service Provider agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Service Provider; products and completed operations of Service Provider, premises owned or used by the Service Provider.
- ii. The Service Provider's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Service Provider's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Service Provider's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Service Provider shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement.

- Further, Service Provider shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Service Provider provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Service Provider shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Service Provider, or any of the Service Provider's officers, employees, or agents or any subcontractor.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Service Provider shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Service Provider shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Service Provider. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Service Provider an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Prevailing Wages</u>. This project is subject to the requirements of Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code requiring the payment of prevailing wages, the training of apprentices and compliance with other applicable requirements. Contractors and all subcontractors who perform work on the project are required to comply with these requirements. Prevailing wages apply to all projects over \$1,000 which are defined as a "public work" by the State of California. This includes: construction, demolition, repair, alteration, maintenance and the installation of photovoltaic systems under a Power Purchase Agreement when certain conditions are met under Labor Code Section 1720.6. This include service and warranty work on public buildings and structures.
 - 4.4.1 The applicable California prevailing wage rate can be found at www.dir.ca.gov and are on file with the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department,

- which shall be available to any interested party upon request. The contractor is also required to have a copy of the applicable wage determination posted and/or available at each jobsite.
- 4.4.2 Specifically, contractors are reminded of the need for compliance with Labor Code Section 1774-1775 (the payment of prevailing wages and documentation of such), Section 1776 (the keeping and submission of accurate certified payrolls) and 1777.5 in the employment of apprentices on public works projects. Further, overtime, weekend and holiday pay, and shift pay must be paid pursuant to applicable Labor Code section.
- 4.4.3 The public entity for which work is being performed or the California Department of Industrial Relations may impose penalties upon contractors and subcontractors for failure to comply with prevailing wage requirements. These penalties are up to \$200 per day per worker for each wage violations identified; \$100 per day per worker for failure to provide the required paperwork and documentation requested within a 10-day window; and \$25 per day per worker for any overtime violation.
- 4.4.4 As a condition to receiving progress payments, final payment and payment of retention on any and all projects on which the payment of prevailing wages is required, the contractor agrees to present to the TOWN, along with its request for payment, all applicable and necessary certified payrolls (for itself and all applicable subcontractors) for the time period covering such payment request. The term "certified payroll" shall include all required documentation to comply with the mandates set forth in Labor Code Section 1720 et seq, as well as any additional documentation requested by the Agency or its designee including, but not limited to: certified payroll, fringe benefit statements and backup documentation such as monthly benefit statements, employee timecards, copies of wage statements and cancelled checks, proof of training contributions (CAC2 if applicable), and apprenticeship forms such as DAS-140 and DAS-142.
- 4.4.5 In addition to submitting the certified payrolls and related documentation to the TOWN, the contractor and all subcontractors shall be required to submit certified payroll and related documents electronically to the California Department of Industrial Relations. Failure to submit payrolls to the DIR when mandated by the project parameters shall also result in the withholding of progress, retention and final payment.
- 4.4.6 No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5 [with limited exceptions from this requirement for bid purposes only under Labor Code section 1771.1(a)].
- 4.4.7 No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project, unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. Contractors MUST be a registered "public works contractor" with the DIR AT THE TIME OF BID. Where the prime contract is less than \$15,000 for maintenance work or less than

- \$25,000 for construction alternation, demolition or repair work, registration is not required.
- 4.4.8 Should any contractor or subcontractors not be a registered public works contractor and perform work on the project, Contractor agrees to fully indemnify the TOWN for any fines assessed by the California Department of Industrial Relations against the TOWN for such violation, including all staff costs and attorney's fee relating to such fine.
- 4.4.9 The TOWN shall withhold any portion of a payment; including the entire payment amount, until certified payroll forms and related documentation are properly submitted, reviewed and found to be in full compliance. In the event that certified payroll forms do not comply with the requirements of Labor Code Section 1720 et seq., the TOWN may continue to hold sufficient funds to cover estimated wages and penalties under the contract.
- 4.5 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Service Provider.
- 4.6 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.7 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

or personally delivered to Service Provider to such address or such other address as Service Provider designates in writing to Town.

- 4.8 <u>Order of Precedence</u>. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Service Provider. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

Adopt a resolution summarily vacating public utility easement (PUE) at 112 Wilder Avenue and 115 North Santa Cruz Avenue.

BACKGROUND:

A seven-foot wide PUE within the property located at 112 Wilder Avenue, Accessor's Parcel Number (APN) 510-17-103, was dedicated to the Town of Los Gatos for the purpose of providing electric service through the property from a Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) joint pole on Victory Lane Alley to a PG&E streetlight on Wilder Avenue. The Grant of Easement for the dedication was recorded at the Santa Clara County Clerk-Recorder's Office on December 1, 1981, as Document Number 7224823.

Through a Certificate of Lot Line Adjustment recorded on September 24, 2008, as Document Number 19997560, the property line between 112 Wilder Avenue and 115 North Santa Cruz Avenue (APN 510-17-102) was adjusted along Victory Lane Alley, which resulted in this PUE existing within both parcels.

The property owners of 112 Wilder Avenue have requested that certain portions of the PUE over their building structure be vacated as PG&E reroutes the electric service away from their building space.

SUBJECT: Adopt a Resolution Summarily Vacating Public Utility Easement at 112 Wilder

Avenue and 115 North Santa Cruz Avenue

DATE: July 19, 2022

DISCUSSION:

Staff has reviewed the documents provided with the Request for Abandonment of Easement application and has verified that the portion of PG&E streetlight electrical service through 112 Wilder Avenue and 115 North Santa Cruz Avenue within the area of the abandonment request has been relocated. Utility companies with services within the area were notified of the request for the vacation. The Town has received responses from PG&E, San Jose Water Company, Comcast, Verizon, and West Valley Sanitation District with no objections. Staff has determined that this PUE is no longer necessary for future public purpose.

In accordance with the California Streets and Highways Code Section 8333, the legislative body of a local agency or any public officer or employee authorized by the legislative body may summarily vacate a public service or utility easement, if the easement has been superseded by relocation, or determined to be excess by the easement holder, and there are no other public facilities located within the easement.

CONCLUSION:

Adopt a resolution (Attachment 1) to vacate a specified portion of PUE at 112 Wilder Avenue and 115 North Santa Cruz Avenue as described in Exhibit "A" and depicted on the plat map on Exhibit "B" of this resolution. Once adopted, the Town Clerk would be authorized to file the resolution with the Santa Clara County Clerk-Recorder's Office for recordation.

WHEREAS, PG&E relocated a portion of the street light electrical service within the area of the abandonment of easement request from the property owners of 112 Wilder Avenue to clear their building structure; and

WHEREAS, no utilities or public improvements now exist in public utility easement particularly described herein in Exhibit "A" attached to this resolution and depicted on the plat map attached as Exhibit "B" to this resolution, and the public convenience and necessity do not require reservation of this portion of the easement.

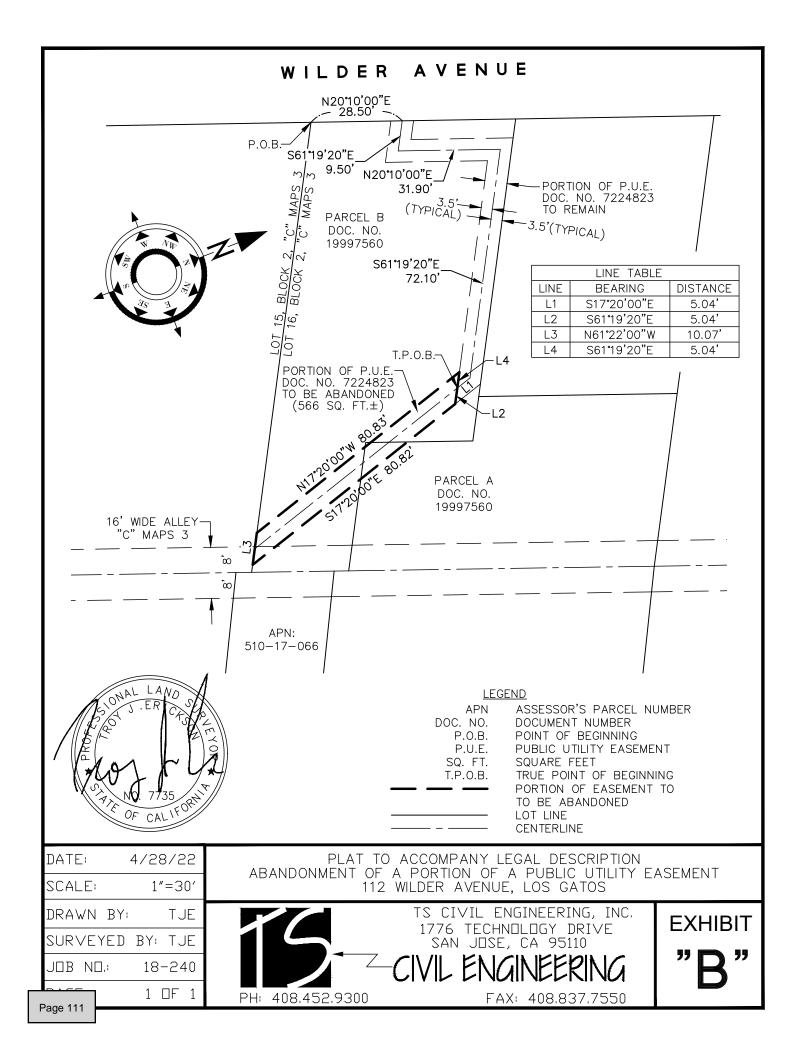

RECOMMENDATION:

Consider objections to the 2022 Weed Abatement Program Assessment Report (Attachment 1) and adopt a resolution (Attachment 2) confirming the report and authorizing collection of the assessment charges.

BACKGROUND:

The Weed Abatement Program is a different, but complimentary program to the Brush Abatement Program, that works to protect the Town by preventing fire hazards created by vegetative growth and the accumulation of combustible debris with the goal of voluntary compliance.

The Town of Los Gatos Municipal Code Chapter 11, Article II et seq requires property owners to prevent potential fire hazards based on the California Health & Safety Code to provide protection for the property and any nearby structures by clearing hazards according to Minimum Fire Safety Standards. It also authorizes the County to remove the weeds if the property owner fails to do so and to recover costs through an assessment on the property tax bill for each parcel.

Typically, a property is placed in the program after a County inspector identifies a potential fire hazard on the premises. Fire Departments, Code Enforcement, Public Works, and other public agencies can also submit complaints to the County. Once a parcel is placed in the program, it will remain until it displays compliance for three consecutive years, at which point it will be removed.

BACKGROUND (continued):

The Program is administered by the County on behalf of the Town and is funded from fees assessed on the properties included on the assessment list. Every year while in the program, each of the property owners are charged an annual compliance inspection fee and some incur costs for additional inspections, administrative, and abatement fees.

On December 7, 2021, the Town Council passed Resolution 2021-057 (Attachment 3) declaring hazardous vegetation (weeds) a public nuisance, providing for their abatement, and setting January 18, 2022 as a public hearing date for the annual program. The County mailed property owners a notice of the January 18, 2022 Public Hearing for the Los Gatos jurisdiction along with guidelines on the Los Gatos Weed Abatement Program.

DISCUSSION:

The 2022 Weed Abatement Assessment Report list includes assessment charges for the annual compliance inspection fee of \$91, and any additional inspection, administrative, and abatement fees as described in Attachment 4. The attached resolution affirms these costs and acknowledges the costs will be assessed by the County Tax Collector against the respective properties.

The Town of Los Gatos mailed property owners a notice of the August 2, 2022 Public Hearing for the Los Gatos jurisdiction, including detailed information on the assessment charges and contact information for potential questions pertaining to the assessments (Attachment 5). This public hearing is an opportunity to allow property owners who are on the assessment report to object to the assessment.

CONCLUSION:

Staff recommends that the Council conduct a public hearing to consider objections to the 2022 Weed Abatement Program Assessment Report and adopt a resolution confirming the report and authorizing collection of the assessment charges.

COORDINATION:

This program has been coordinated with the County's Consumer and Environmental Protection Agency (CEPA) - Weed Abatement Program.

FISCAL IMPACT:

HEARING DATE OF JANUARY 18, 2022 TO CONSIDER OBJECTIONS FOR PROPOSED
ABATEMENT

WHEREAS, Section 39501 and Section 39502 of the Government Code of the State of California authorize the Town of Los Gatos to prescribe a procedure for compelling the owner, lessees or occupant of buildings, grounds, or lots to remove hazardous vegetation (weeds) from such buildings or grounds and adjacent sidewalks, and, upon his failure to do so, to remove such hazardous vegetation (weeds) at owner's expense, making the cost thereof a lien upon such property; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Los Gatos, by ordinance, has adopted such a procedure, codified in Chapter 11, Article II, Sections 11.20.010 through 11.20.045 of the Los Gatos Town Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: that the Town Council hereby finds that hazardous vegetation "weeds," as that term is defined in Section 11.20.010, are growing upon and adjacent to private property within the Town of Los Gatos, and declares that all hazardous vegetation (weeds) growing upon any private property or properties, and in any sidewalk street, or alley within the Town of Los Gatos are a public nuisance and should be abated.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that unless such nuisance be abated by the destruction or removal of such hazardous vegetation (weeds) within thirty (30) days after the adoption of this resolution, or within the time specified in a written agreement with the Town of Los Gatos Director of Parks and Public Works, or his representative, whichever time shall be later, as provided in Chapter 11, Article II, of the Los Gatos Town Code, the Town of Los Gatos shall cause such nuisance to be abated, and the expense thereof assessed upon the lots and lands from which, or in the front and rear of which, such hazardous vegetation (weeds) shall have been destroyed or removed, such expense constituting a lien upon such lots or lands until paid, and to be collected upon the next tax roll upon which general municipal taxes are collected.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Director shall execute a "Notice to Destroy Hazardous Vegetation (Weeds)" in the form set forth in Section 11.20.020(b) and shall cause same to be published and posted in the manner prescribed by Section 11.20.020(c).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on the 18th day of January 2022 at a meeting of the Town Council beginning at 7:00 p.m. via Teleconference, a public hearing will be held during which all property owners in the Town of Los Gatos having any objections to the proposed destruction or removal of such hazardous vegetation (weeds) will be heard and given due consideration.

To protect your property and the surrounding area from possible fire, your jurisdiction (city or County if in unincorporated areas) contracts with the County of Santa Clara to operate a Weed Abatement Program. You are receiving this notice and information because our staff has determined that your parcel is part of this Program. Please read the information carefully and contact us for clarification or additional information.

Your jurisdiction has or will adopt a resolution declaring your property as one that may contain fire hazards from weeds or other debris. Following this action, your jurisdiction will conduct a public hearing to consider an abatement order which would require you to remove any hazardous vegetation or combustible debris prior to the deadline in the attached abatement schedule. The public hearing will be held on the date and at the place stated in the attached notice and provides an opportunity for you to raise any objections or concerns with this requirement.

If you believe your parcel includes an environmentally sensitive habitat, please check the box and provide additional information on the reply form to assist us in determining the best approach to abating your property.

If, after the public hearing, the Weed Abatement Program is approved for your property, the County is authorized by your city and the California Health and Safety Code sections 14875-14922 to inspect your property to confirm that the property has been cleared of hazards according to Minimum Fire Safety Standards (see enclosed brochure). Inspections will begin after the abatement deadline for your jurisdiction. This notice does not relieve you of your responsibility to complete the necessary work prior to the deadline for your jurisdiction. You will be responsible for an annual fee of \$91 to cover the cost of this compliance inspection.

If you fail to complete the abatement work prior to our inspection of your property, you will be responsible for an inspection fee of \$505 per parcel, and your property will be scheduled for abatement by the County contractor. You will be assessed a County administrative fee of \$858 per parcel plus the County's cost of abatement if the County completes this work. If you complete the abatement work before the County contractor, you will not incur further charges.

The County will use the least costly method of abatement considering the physical characteristics of your property and any other environmental or related concerns. Fees are detailed in the attached price list. The total amount will be included as a special assessment on your property tax bill following confirmation of the charges by your city or the County if parcel is not in a city at a public hearing?. This hearing would be scheduled in late spring/summer 2021 with the exact date determined by your jurisdiction. Jurisdictions

post hearing information at a physical location (typically at a city hall building or other government center and most jurisdictions also publish this information on their websites) at least three days prior to the meeting.

You can avoid all costs, other than the annual compliance fee, by completing the abatement work yourself according to Minimum Fire Safety Standards (see enclosed brochure) prior to the abatement deadline for your jurisdiction <u>and</u> maintaining the Minimum Fire Safety Standards for the duration of fire season, which typically runs March Through October. Parcels will be removed from the program after three consecutive years of voluntary compliance (work completed by property owner prior to the deadline and confirmed by our inspection).

In preparation for this program, <u>please complete and return the enclosed Reply Form</u> by January 15, 2021so we are notified of your plans for abating your property.

If you designate in your reply that you intend to abate the weeds yourself, you need to complete the abatement <u>before</u> the deadline listed on the attached abatement schedule and <u>maintain fire safe conditions for the duration of the fire season</u>. Responding that you intend to provide maintenance yourself does not release you from this responsibility to have the maintenance *completed* before your deadline and *repeated* as necessary to maintain Minimum Fire Safe Standards. The County will abate hazardous vegetation as required after the deadline for your jurisdiction at your cost.

If you sell your property after the date of this letter, it is your responsibility to notify the new owner and to include the obligation to pay any abatement costs in your agreement of sale. Without taking this action, you will be responsible for all hazard abatement charges assessed to the property.

All property owners having any objections to the proposed destruction or removal of such weeds are hereby notified to attend a meeting of the Town Council of such Town to be held in the Council Chambers of said Town at 110 East Main Street, Los Gatos, California, on Tuesday, January 18, 2022 at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter can be heard, when their objections will be heard and given due consideration. The language and format for this notice is required by California Health and Safety Code Sections 14891 Et. Seq.

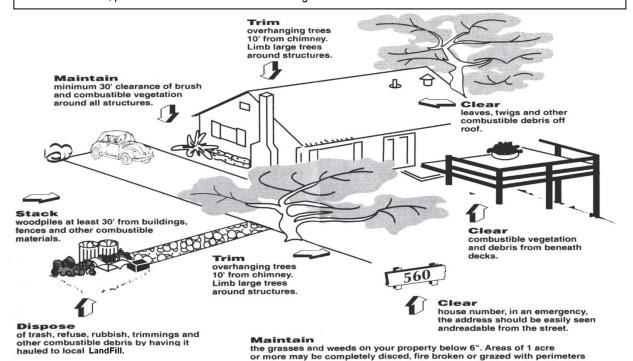

MINIMUM FIRE SAFETY STANDARDS (MFSS)

- 1. Vegetation must not exceed 6 inches in height any time after the compliance deadline.
- 2. Maintain grasses and weeds below 6 inches for 10 feet horizontally on both sides of all roadways, including driveways and access routes. Roads and driveways must maintain a clearance of 10' W by 13'6" H for all vegetation.
- 3. Clear flammable vegetation a minimum of 30 feet around any structure, occupied or not. Ornamental vegetation should be kept clear of dead material. Some conditions, such as slopes, may require up to a 100 foot clearance.
- 4. Parcels one acre or less shall be completely abated. Parcels over one acre up to five acres require 30 foot clearance around structures and perimeter property lines. Additional 30 foot cross fuel breaks may also be required.
- 5. Parcels larger than five acres require 30 foot clearance around structures and perimeter property lines in addition to 30-foot cross fuel breaks as needed to separate the remaining vegetation into sections no larger than five acres.
- 6. Keep property clear of accumulation of combustible debris, such as trash, wood, and dead vegetation. Stacked firewood and neatly piled yard waste is not considered to be combustible debris.
- 7. Keep vegetation cleared from under the eaves of houses.
- 8. Trim tree branches to at least 10 feet away from chimneys. Trim tree branches up from the ground to provide at least 6 feet of vertical clearance.
- 9. Clear leaves, pine needles and debris from roof and gutters.

The Santa Clara County Weed Abatement Program

The Santa Clara County Consumer and Environmental Protection Agency and your city are working together to protect your community from fire. We need your help. Please read and follow the directions provided in this brochure regarding fire prevention on your property. The purpose of the Weed Abatement Program is to prevent fire hazards posed by vegetative growth and the accumulation of combustible materials.

The Weed Abatement program is entirely funded from fees charged to residents. Fees will be assessed for any property in the program. This is to cover the cost of the compliance inspection for the property. Properties that fail the compliance inspection will be charged a failed inspection fee, even if the resident completes the weed abatement. If the property requires abatement by the County contractor, the property owner will be responsible for the actual cost of abatement plus an administrative fee. Properties that meet and maintain the minimum fire safety standards will not be charged other than the annual fee.

Program staff annually inspect parcels at the beginning of the fire season, which is typically in March or April depending on your jurisdiction. If the parcel is not in compliance at the time of inspection, the property owner will be charged a failed inspection fee, and the owner will be sent a courtesy notice as a reminder to abate the weeds. If the weeds are not abated by the property owner, the work will be completed by the County contractor. The property owner will pay the contractor's fees plus a County administrative fee. All fees will be included in your property tax bill.

Our Goal Is Voluntary Compliance

Property Owner's Responsibilities

- Do not allow a fire hazard to exist on your property. The Minimum Fire Safety Standards (MFSS) in this brochure give you guidelines to follow in order to maintain your property and protect against a fire hazard. Please contact our office if you need guidance or have any questions regarding the requirements!
- Make arrangements to have your property maintained throughout the year. Contractors can be found in the yellow pages. You may choose to have the County contractor maintain your property. A current price list is included in your packet.
- Please complete and return the Reply Form provided in your mailing packet by the date on the form. Indicate your preference regarding performance of weed abatement services.

Program Staff Responsibilities

 Weed Abatement Inspectors will perform periodic inspections on all parcels included in the Santa Clara County Weed Abatement Program. Properties that fail the compliance inspection will be charged a failed inspection fee, even if the resident completes the weed abatement.

- Inspectors will order the County contractor to perform all necessary abatement work on any parcel where the MFSS are not met. An attempt will be made to give the owner a courtesy notice prior to releasing the work order.
- The County contractor uses several methods of abatement including discing and handwork. The property owner is free to select whatever method they choose, provided the MFSS of all federal, state and local laws are met.
- The Weed Abatement Program will place inspection costs and the charges for County contractor services plus a County administrative fee on the property owner's tax bill during the next fiscal year.

Burrowing Owls

These small owls nest in abandoned ground squirrel burrows. Discing collapses the burrows and kills the young. These owls are listed as a state Species of Special Concern and are protected by the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act. If you suspect burrowing owls on your property you <u>must</u> use another form of weed abatement such as mowing or weedeating. If you request the County perform abatement services, please notify program staff or your City if burrowing owls are known to exist on your property.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Why have I received an Abatement Notice?

A. Typically, a property is placed on the program if a Weed Abatement Inspector identified a potential fire hazard on the property. Fire Departments and other agencies also submit complaints to the Weed Abatement Program.

Q. What is required of me now that I am in the Program?

A. All property owners are required to maintain their property free of fire hazards throughout the year.

Q. The grasses planted on my property are fire resistant. Are they exempt from the Weed Abatement program?

A. No. Even grasses that possess some fire resistant qualities are not fire proof, and they can add fuel to any site that is subject to a fire. Additionally, fire resistant grasses are rarely found in a pure, homogenous stand but rather are usually found to occur mixed with other common introduced annual grasses that are highly flammable and hazardous in a fire event. Finally, many grasses occur in Santa Clara County and species identification is difficult in the field, especially after the spring when the reproductive portions required for identification have dried and dispersed. Weed Abatement Inspectors can only focus on the presence of grasses and weeds on your property and the Minimum Fire Safety Standards, and not on grass species identification. Therefore, all grasses are required to be below 6 inches in height.

Q. What is the SC County Weed Abatement Program?

A. This is a monitoring program and our primary objective is voluntary compliance. See the first two paragraphs of this brochure for further specifics.

More FAO:

Q. How long will I be on the Program?

A. Your property will remain on the Program for three years. If no hazards are found during that time, your property may be removed from the program.

Q. How much will this cost me?

A. There will be an annual fee to cover the cost of the compliance inspection. If the parcel does not meet the MFSS when it is first inspected in the spring, or if work is required by the County contractor, you will be charged additional fees. Our goal is to ensure that the MFSS are met at the lowest possible cost to the property owner.

Q. How will I be billed?

A. Any charges for the inspection and any abatement work performed will appear as a special assessment on your next property tax bill.

Q. Why have you performed work on my property while the vegetation is still green?

A. Grass, weeds or piles of combustible debris have been declared a public nuisance by your jurisdiction. Abating fire hazards in the spring minimizes the volume of combustible material before the hazards increase and dries out completely during the peak fire season.

Q. Will you notify me prior to beginning abatement work?

A. Property owners are responsible for preventing fire hazards on their property. If the MFSS have been met, but further work is necessary, you will receive notice prior to the County contractor performing the work. If the MFSS have **not** been met, an attempt will be made to give the owner a courtesy notice prior to initial abatement.

Q. Where can I find someone to provide abatement services?

A. Weed Abatement contractors can be found in the Yellow Pages under "Weed Control Services" or "Discing Services". You may have the County contractor perform the necessary work; see your mailing packet for a current price list as administrative costs are charged.

Q. How can I get additional information or assistance regarding the specific requirements for my property?

A. Weed Abatement Inspectors are available to assist you and answer your questions. Please call our Customer Service line at (408) 282-3145 to schedule a consultation with program staff or to obtain additional information.

Q. I have Grazing Animals do I need to perform abatement?

A. Grazing animals do not absolve you of your responsibilities to provide a fire safe condition on your property. You will need to check with our office to determine if grazing is adequate or if additional work is required.

To protect your property and the surrounding area from possible fire, your jurisdiction (city or County if in unincorporated areas) contracts with the County of Santa Clara to operate a Weed Abatement Program. You are receiving this notice and information because our staff has determined that your parcel is part of this Program. Please read the information carefully and contact us for clarification or additional information.

Your jurisdiction has or will adopt a resolution declaring your property as one that may contain fire hazards from weeds or other debris. Following this action, your jurisdiction will conduct a public hearing to consider an abatement order which would require you to remove any hazardous vegetation or combustible debris prior to the deadline in the attached abatement schedule. The public hearing will be held on the date and at the place stated in the attached notice and provides an opportunity for you to raise any objections or concerns with this requirement.

If you believe your parcel includes an environmentally sensitive habitat, please check the box and provide additional information on the reply form to assist us in determining the best approach to abating your property.

If, after the public hearing, the Weed Abatement Program is approved for your property, the County is authorized by your city and the California Health and Safety Code sections 14875-14922 to inspect your property to confirm that the property has been cleared of hazards according to Minimum Fire Safety Standards (see enclosed brochure). Inspections will begin after the abatement deadline for your jurisdiction. This notice does not relieve you of your responsibility to complete the necessary work prior to the deadline for your jurisdiction. You will be responsible for an annual fee of \$91 to cover the cost of this compliance inspection.

If you fail to complete the abatement work prior to our inspection of your property, you will be responsible for an inspection fee of \$505 per parcel, and your property will be scheduled for abatement by the County contractor. You will be assessed a County administrative fee of \$858 per parcel plus the County's cost of abatement if the County completes this work. If you complete the abatement work before the County contractor, you will not incur further charges.

The County will use the least costly method of abatement considering the physical characteristics of your property and any other environmental or related concerns. Fees are detailed in the attached price list. The total amount will be included as a special assessment on your property tax bill following confirmation of the charges by your city or the County if parcel is not in a city at a public hearing?. This hearing would be scheduled in late spring/summer 2021 with the exact date determined by your jurisdiction. Jurisdictions

post hearing information at a physical location (typically at a city hall building or other government center and most jurisdictions also publish this information on their websites) at least three days prior to the meeting.

You can avoid all costs, other than the annual compliance fee, by completing the abatement work yourself according to Minimum Fire Safety Standards (see enclosed brochure) prior to the abatement deadline for your jurisdiction <u>and</u> maintaining the Minimum Fire Safety Standards for the duration of fire season, which typically runs March Through October. Parcels will be removed from the program after three consecutive years of voluntary compliance (work completed by property owner prior to the deadline and confirmed by our inspection).

In preparation for this program, <u>please complete and return the enclosed Reply Form</u> by January 15, 2021so we are notified of your plans for abating your property.

If you designate in your reply that you intend to abate the weeds yourself, you need to complete the abatement <u>before</u> the deadline listed on the attached abatement schedule and <u>maintain fire safe conditions for the duration of the fire season</u>. Responding that you intend to provide maintenance yourself does not release you from this responsibility to have the maintenance *completed* before your deadline and *repeated* as necessary to maintain Minimum Fire Safe Standards. The County will abate hazardous vegetation as required after the deadline for your jurisdiction at your cost.

Please be aware that any abatement performed by the County must comply with all applicable regulations. If your property falls within an area designated as possible habitat for burrowing owls or any other protected species of bird or animal, the methods used to remove vegetation may be regulated by specific laws or local ordinances.

If you are no longer the owner of the property identified by this mailing, please notify us immediately at (408) 282-3145. If you sell your property after the date of this letter, it is your responsibility to notify the new owner and to include the obligation to pay any abatement costs in your agreement of sale. Without taking this action, you will be responsible for all hazard abatement charges assessed to the property.

Notice to Destroy Weeds

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that on December 7, 2021, pursuant to the provisions of Section 11.20.020 of the Town Code of the Town of Los Gatos, the Town Council of said Town adopted a Resolution declaring that all weeds growing upon any private property or in any street, sidewalk or alley, as defined in Section 11.20.020 of such code, constitute a public nuisance, which nuisance must be abated by the destruction or removal thereof.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN that property owners shall within thirty days after the adoption of such resolution, or within the time specified in a written agreement with the Director of Parks and Public Works of the Town of Los Gatos, or the Director of Parks and Pubic Works' representative, whichever time shall be later, remove all such weeds from their property, the abutting sidewalks, and the abutting half of the street in front, and alleys, if any, behind such property, and between the lot lines thereof as extended, or such weeds will be destroyed or removed and such nuisance abated by the Town of Los Gatos, in which case the cost of such destruction or removal will be assessed upon the lots and lands from which, or from the front or rear of which, such weeds shall have been destroyed or removed; and such cost will constitute a lien upon such lots or lands until paid, and will be collected upon the next tax roll upon which general municipal taxes are collected. All property owners having any objections to the proposed destruction or removal of such weeds are hereby notified to attend a meeting of the Town Council of such Town to be held in the Council Chambers of said Town at 110 East Main Street, Los Gatos, California, on Tuesday, January 18, 2022 at 7:00 p.m., or as soon thereafter as the matter can be heard, when their objections will be heard and given due consideration. The language and format for this notice is required by California Health and Safety Code Sections 14891 Et. Seq.

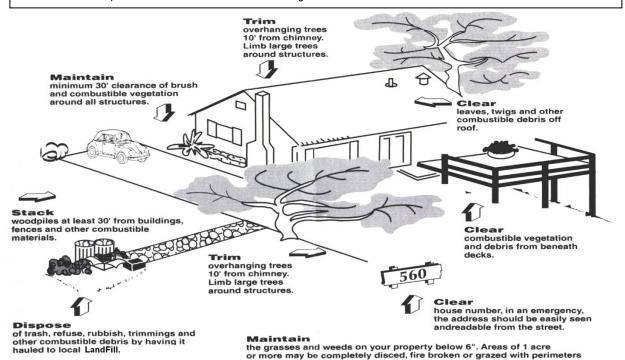

MINIMUM FIRE SAFETY STANDARDS (MFSS)

- 1. Vegetation must not exceed 6 inches in height any time after the compliance deadline.
- 2. Maintain grasses and weeds below 6 inches for 10 feet horizontally on both sides of all roadways, including driveways and access routes. Roads and driveways must maintain a clearance of 10' W by 13'6" H for all vegetation.
- 3. Clear flammable vegetation a minimum of 30 feet around any structure, occupied or not. Ornamental vegetation should be kept clear of dead material. Some conditions, such as slopes, may require up to a 100 foot clearance.
- 4. Parcels one acre or less shall be completely abated. Parcels over one acre up to five acres require 30 foot clearance around structures and perimeter property lines. Additional 30 foot cross fuel breaks may also be required.
- 5. Parcels larger than five acres require 30 foot clearance around structures and perimeter property lines in addition to 30-foot cross fuel breaks as needed to separate the remaining vegetation into sections no larger than five acres.
- 6. Keep property clear of accumulation of combustible debris, such as trash, wood, and dead vegetation. Stacked firewood and neatly piled yard waste is not considered to be combustible debris.
- 7. Keep vegetation cleared from under the eaves of houses.
- 8. Trim tree branches to at least 10 feet away from chimneys. Trim tree branches up from the ground to provide at least 6 feet of vertical clearance.
- 9. Clear leaves, pine needles and debris from roof and gutters.

The Santa Clara County Weed Abatement Program

The Santa Clara County Consumer and Environmental Protection Agency and your city are working together to protect your community from fire. We need your help. Please read and follow the directions provided in this brochure regarding fire prevention on your property. The purpose of the Weed Abatement Program is to prevent fire hazards posed by vegetative growth and the accumulation of combustible materials.

The Weed Abatement program is entirely funded from fees charged to residents. Fees will be assessed for any property in the program. This is to cover the cost of the compliance inspection for the property. Properties that fail the compliance inspection will be charged a failed inspection fee, even if the resident completes the weed abatement. If the property requires abatement by the County contractor, the property owner will be responsible for the actual cost of abatement plus an administrative fee. Properties that meet and maintain the minimum fire safety standards will not be charged other than the annual fee.

Program staff annually inspect parcels at the beginning of the fire season, which is typically in March or April depending on your jurisdiction. If the parcel is not in compliance at the time of inspection, the property owner will be charged a failed inspection fee, and the owner will be sent a courtesy notice as a reminder to abate the weeds. If the weeds are not abated by the property owner, the work will be completed by the County contractor. The property owner will pay the contractor's fees plus a County administrative fee. All fees will be included in your property tax bill.

Our Goal Is Voluntary Compliance

Property Owner's Responsibilities

- Do not allow a fire hazard to exist on your property. The Minimum Fire Safety Standards (MFSS) in this brochure give you guidelines to follow in order to maintain your property and protect against a fire hazard. Please contact our office if you need guidance or have any questions regarding the requirements!
- Make arrangements to have your property maintained throughout the year. Contractors can be found in the yellow pages. You may choose to have the County contractor maintain your property. A current price list is included in your packet.
- Please complete and return the Reply Form provided in your mailing packet by the date on the form. Indicate your preference regarding performance of weed abatement services.

Program Staff Responsibilities

 Weed Abatement Inspectors will perform periodic inspections on all parcels included in the Santa Clara County Weed Abatement Program. Properties that fail the compliance inspection will be charged a failed inspection fee, even if the resident completes the weed abatement.

- Inspectors will order the County contractor to perform all necessary abatement work on any parcel where the MFSS are not met. An attempt will be made to give the owner a courtesy notice prior to releasing the work order.
- The County contractor uses several methods of abatement including discing and handwork. The property owner is free to select whatever method they choose, provided the MFSS of all federal, state and local laws are met.
- The Weed Abatement Program will place inspection costs and the charges for County contractor services plus a County administrative fee on the property owner's tax bill during the next fiscal year.

Burrowing Owls

These small owls nest in abandoned ground squirrel burrows. Discing collapses the burrows and kills the young. These owls are listed as a state Species of Special Concern and are protected by the federal Migratory Bird Treaty Act. If you suspect burrowing owls on your property you <u>must</u> use another form of weed abatement such as mowing or weedeating. If you request the County perform abatement services, please notify program staff or your City if burrowing owls are known to exist on your property.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. Why have I received an Abatement Notice?

A. Typically, a property is placed on the program if a Weed Abatement Inspector identified a potential fire hazard on the property. Fire Departments and other agencies also submit complaints to the Weed Abatement Program.

Q. What is required of me now that I am in the Program?

A. All property owners are required to maintain their property free of fire hazards throughout the year.

Q. The grasses planted on my property are fire resistant. Are they exempt from the Weed Abatement program?

A. No. Even grasses that possess some fire resistant qualities are not fire proof, and they can add fuel to any site that is subject to a fire. Additionally, fire resistant grasses are rarely found in a pure, homogenous stand but rather are usually found to occur mixed with other common introduced annual grasses that are highly flammable and hazardous in a fire event. Finally, many grasses occur in Santa Clara County and species identification is difficult in the field, especially after the spring when the reproductive portions required for identification have dried and dispersed. Weed Abatement Inspectors can only focus on the presence of grasses and weeds on your property and the Minimum Fire Safety Standards, and not on grass species identification. Therefore, all grasses are required to be below 6 inches in height.

Q. What is the SC County Weed Abatement Program?

A. This is a monitoring program and our primary objective is voluntary compliance. See the first two paragraphs of this brochure for further specifics.

More FAQ:

Q. How long will I be on the Program?

A. Your property will remain on the Program for three years. If no hazards are found during that time, your property may be removed from the program.

Q. How much will this cost me?

A. There will be an annual fee to cover the cost of the compliance inspection. If the parcel does not meet the MFSS when it is first inspected in the spring, or if work is required by the County contractor, you will be charged additional fees. Our goal is to ensure that the MFSS are met at the lowest possible cost to the property owner.

Q. How will I be billed?

A. Any charges for the inspection and any abatement work performed will appear as a special assessment on your next property tax bill.

Q. Why have you performed work on my property while the vegetation is still green?

A. Grass, weeds or piles of combustible debris have been declared a public nuisance by your jurisdiction. Abating fire hazards in the spring minimizes the volume of combustible material before the hazards increase and dries out completely during the peak fire season.

Q. Will you notify me prior to beginning abatement work?

A. Property owners are responsible for preventing fire hazards on their property. If the MFSS have been met, but further work is necessary, you will receive notice prior to the County contractor performing the work. If the MFSS have **not** been met, an attempt will be made to give the owner a courtesy notice prior to initial abatement.

Q. Where can I find someone to provide abatement services?

A. Weed Abatement contractors can be found in the Yellow Pages under "Weed Control Services" or "Discing Services". You may have the County contractor perform the necessary work; see your mailing packet for a current price list as administrative costs are charged.

Q. How can I get additional information or assistance regarding the specific requirements for my property?

A. Weed Abatement Inspectors are available to assist you and answer your questions. Please call our Customer Service line at (408) 282-3145 to schedule a consultation with program staff or to obtain additional information.

Q. I have Grazing Animals do I need to perform abatement?

A. Grazing animals do not absolve you of your responsibilities to provide a fire safe condition on your property. You will need to check with our office to determine if grazing is adequate or if additional work is required.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve revisions as recommended by the Policy Committee to Town Council Policy 2-11: Commission Appointments, Residency and Attendance Requirements, and Establishing a Quorum.

BACKGROUND:

On June 7, 2022, the Town Council conducted interviews for several Commission vacancies and at its regular session that same day, Council appointed new Commissioners. From this experience, the Chair of the Policy Committee suggested that the Commission Appointment Policy return to the Policy Committee for discussion and consideration of potential recommendations to the Town Council for revisions.

Specifically, Chair Badame requested that the Commission Appointment Policy be modified to ensure each Council member can ask a question of each applicant (see Attachment 1). In this way, each Council Member has an opportunity to engage with each applicant. It is likely that the length of each interview will be longer, requiring more of the Council's time to complete all interviews.

DISCUSSION:

At its June 28, 2022 meeting, the Policy Committee considered the proposed revision. There was no public testimony.

DISCUSSION (continued):

After discussion, the Committee voted to forward a recommendation to allow enough time for each Council Member to ask at least one question of each applicant (Attachment 1, original redline). The intent of this change was important to the Committee.

Recognizing that "enough time" might vary by Mayor, the Committee requested that the following potential options be forwarded for Council consideration:

- Specify in the Policy that each interview will be approximately five minutes (Attachment 2, Option 2 redline);
- Remain silent on the length of each interview (Attachment 3, Option 3 redline);
- Specify a set time of 4 p.m. for the start of interviews (Attachment 4, Option 4 redline);
- Specify that each interview will be a minimum of five minutes and ask the Council if it would like to specify a maximum in the Policy (Attachment 5, Option 5 redline).

In its discussion, the Policy Committee acknowledged that some Council Members may be conscientious of time and choose to pass on their opportunity to ask a question; therefore, there may not be a need to include time limits. The discussion also recognized that general guidance could be provided by the Clerk to Council Members and applicants to be succinct in their questions and responses respectively, due to overall time constraints for the interviews.

CONCLUSION:

Given staff's experience with scheduling and managing the interviews, upon further reflection, staff prefers Option 4 contained in Attachment 4 that specifies a set time of 4 p.m. for the start of interviews. If this Option is selected for the Policy revision, staff would work with applicants on scheduling their interviews to accommodate those who may not be able to attend during business hours, and if the Council completes the interviews early, then it would have a longer break prior to its regular session.

COORDINATION:

The preparation of this report was coordinated with the Town Clerk and Town Attorney.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The agenda item has no fiscal impact.

PURPOSE

To establish a policy to encourage participation by the Town's residents on Town Boards, Commissions and Committees (hereinafter referred to as "Commissions"). The Town of Los Gatos is committed to inclusivity. We value all our community members, regardless of religion, immigration status, ethnicity, race, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The Town will encourage residents to participate on Commissions by advertising vacancies on Commissions for at least 30 days, preparing easily understood applications, maintaining clear descriptions of the role of each Board, Commission, and Committee and its respective members, providing current meeting schedules, and conducting public interviews of all Commission applicants, except as provided by this Policy.

SCOPE

This Policy applies to all applicants to Town Boards, Commissions and Committees.

POLICY

The Town Council encourages public participation in all decision-making and to be successful residents must be assured both that the participation is meaningful and that their input will be valued. The widest representation from the community can only be achieved if vacancies are well advertised so that anyone interested will have the opportunity to apply. Interviews of the applicants conducted in public by the Town Council demonstrates that it values these appointments and that all have an equal opportunity to be appointed. Applicants may apply to more than one Commission, and shall rank their choices in their preferred order, during each recruitment cycle.

To ensure the greatest possible participation by the public, it is the Town's policy that no person shall be appointed to more than one Commission except in those cases where they are ex-officio members of other Boards, Commissions and Committees. This Policy does not apply to Commission members serving as representatives of their Commission who have been appointed by the Town Council.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS

Residency within the incorporated municipal limits of the Town of Los Gatos, California is required for appointment and continued membership on all Town of Los Gatos Boards, Commissions, and Committees, with the exception of the Youth Commission.

Youth Commission:

The members shall be students who are entering grades 8 through 12 in the fall. Membership for the students requires either residency in the incorporated limits of the Town of Los Gatos or residency in the unincorporated areas of the County of Santa Clara, which have a Los Gatos mailing address.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All members of all appointive Town Advisory Bodies should attend all regular and special meetings of said Advisory Bodies.
- 2. Any member not in attendance at a regular meeting of said Advisory Body for at least 70% of the meeting shall be considered absent.
- 3. Any member of an appointive Town Advisory Body who is absent from the number of regular meetings listed below appropriate to his or her Advisory Body shall, as a result, surrender his or her office on the Advisory Body and the office shall be considered vacant.
 - a. For an Advisory Body which holds six (6) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: three (3) regular meetings.
 - b. For an Advisory Body which holds five (5) or fewer regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: two (2) regular meetings.
 - c. For an Advisory Body which holds sixteen (16) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: eight (8) regular meetings.
- 4. The vacant position shall be filled by appointment by a majority vote of the Town Council, for a term equal to the unexpired portion of the office vacated. Any member removed from office due to non-attendance may re-apply to serve on a Town Advisory Body but will not be treated as an incumbent in any subsequent application to the same Advisory Body.
- 5. If a Youth Commissioner liaison misses three meetings of a liaison Commission during a *consecutive twelve (12) month period, the Youth Commission shall appoint a different Youth Commissioner as liaison.

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^{*}Consecutive twelve (12) month period is defined as any consecutive twelve-month period beginning with the first absence. A regular meeting shall not be cancelled and replaced with a special meeting in order to alleviate an absence by an advisory body member.

QUORUM REQUIREMENTS

The number of members needed to constitute a quorum on any Town Advisory Body shall be a majority of the total number of filled seats.

PROCEDURES

The following procedures will be followed by the applicant, the Town Clerk, and the Town Council for the appointment of applicants to Town Commissions:

Responsibility and Actions: Town Clerk

A. Annual Recruitments

Adult Commission members' terms begin on January 1st and end December 31st, Youth Commissioners' terms follow the academic year and begin on August 1st and end on June 30th. The Town Clerk shall perform the following duties in conducting an annual recruitment for Commission members:

- 1. Notify Town Council of vacancies on Commissions by indicating the names of the Commissions, the number of terms expiring or being vacated, names of individual(s) with expiring terms or vacating seats, advertising periods (at least 30 days) and the date of interview.
- 2. Advertise the vacancies, including the application deadline and the interview date. Interviews and appointments for Adult Commissioners shall occur after annual Mayor and Vice Mayor selection, and in the case of election years, after new Council Members have been seated. Interviews and appointments for Youth Commissioners shall occur by the fourth Wednesday in May, no earlier than 4:00 p.m.
- 3. Prepare and maintain easily understood applications for appointment to Commissions. Applications shall include the following policy information:

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Balloting Process

Unless determined otherwise, the Council shall conduct a ballot vote for the appointment of individuals to fill the vacancies for each Commission. To avoid actual bias or the appearance of possible improprieties, the public official is prohibited from participating in the decision.

However, the Town strongly encourages that in the event that a decision concerns a nonprofit corporation for which an advisory board member is a board member, director, officer, or employed with that nonprofit corporation, the person should recuse him or herself and at a minimum shall disclose the potential conflict of interest before any discussion and decision.

EFFECTIVE DATE: 2/28/1990

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PURPOSE

To establish a policy to encourage participation by the Town's residents on Town Boards, Commissions and Committees (hereinafter referred to as "Commissions"). The Town of Los Gatos is committed to inclusivity. We value all our community members, regardless of religion, immigration status, ethnicity, race, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The Town will encourage residents to participate on Commissions by advertising vacancies on Commissions for at least 30 days, preparing easily understood applications, maintaining clear descriptions of the role of each Board, Commission, and Committee and its respective members, providing current meeting schedules, and conducting public interviews of all Commission applicants, except as provided by this Policy.

SCOPE

This Policy applies to all applicants to Town Boards, Commissions and Committees.

POLICY

The Town Council encourages public participation in all decision-making and to be successful residents must be assured both that the participation is meaningful and that their input will be valued. The widest representation from the community can only be achieved if vacancies are well advertised so that anyone interested will have the opportunity to apply. Interviews of the applicants conducted in public by the Town Council demonstrates that it values these appointments and that all have an equal opportunity to be appointed. Applicants may apply to more than one Commission, and shall rank their choices in their preferred order, during each recruitment cycle.

 - a. For an Advisory Body which holds six (6) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: three (3) regular meetings.
 - b. For an Advisory Body which holds five (5) or fewer regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: two (2) regular meetings.
 - c. For an Advisory Body which holds sixteen (16) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: eight (8) regular meetings.
- 4. The vacant position shall be filled by appointment by a majority vote of the Town Council, for a term equal to the unexpired portion of the office vacated. Any member removed from office due to non-attendance may re-apply to serve on a Town Advisory Body but will not be treated as an incumbent in any subsequent application to the same Advisory Body.
- 5. If a Youth Commissioner liaison misses three meetings of a liaison Commission during a *consecutive twelve (12) month period, the Youth Commission shall appoint a different Youth Commissioner as liaison.

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^{*}Consecutive twelve (12) month period is defined as any consecutive twelve-month period beginning with the first absence. A regular meeting shall not be cancelled and replaced with a special meeting in order to alleviate an absence by an advisory body member.

QUORUM REQUIREMENTS

The number of members needed to constitute a quorum on any Town Advisory Body shall be a majority of the total number of filled seats.

PROCEDURES

The following procedures will be followed by the applicant, the Town Clerk, and the Town Council for the appointment of applicants to Town Commissions:

Responsibility and Actions: Town Clerk

A. Annual Recruitments

The members shall be students who are entering grades 8 through 12 in the fall. Membership for the students requires either residency in the incorporated limits of the Town of Los Gatos or residency in the unincorporated areas of the County of Santa Clara, which have a Los Gatos mailing address.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All members of all appointive Town Advisory Bodies should attend all regular and special meetings of said Advisory Bodies.
- 2. Any member not in attendance at a regular meeting of said Advisory Body for at least 70% of the meeting shall be considered absent.
- Any member of an appointive Town Advisory Body who is absent from the number of regular meetings listed below appropriate to his or her Advisory Body shall, as a result, surrender his or her office on the Advisory Body and the office shall be considered vacant.
 - a. For an Advisory Body which holds six (6) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: three (3) regular meetings.
 - b. For an Advisory Body which holds five (5) or fewer regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: two (2) regular meetings.
 - c. For an Advisory Body which holds sixteen (16) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: eight (8) regular meetings.
- 4. The vacant position shall be filled by appointment by a majority vote of the Town Council, for a term equal to the unexpired portion of the office vacated. Any member removed from office due to non-attendance may re-apply to serve on a Town Advisory Body but will not be treated as an incumbent in any subsequent application to the same Advisory Body.
- 5. If a Youth Commissioner liaison misses three meetings of a liaison Commission during a *consecutive twelve (12) month period, the Youth Commission shall appoint a different Youth Commissioner as liaison.

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^{*}Consecutive twelve (12) month period is defined as any consecutive twelve-month period beginning with the first absence. A regular meeting shall not be cancelled and replaced with a special meeting in order to alleviate an absence by an advisory body member.

QUORUM REQUIREMENTS

The number of members needed to constitute a quorum on any Town Advisory Body shall be a majority of the total number of filled seats.

PROCEDURES

The following procedures will be followed by the applicant, the Town Clerk, and the Town Council for the appointment of applicants to Town Commissions:

Responsibility and Actions: Town Clerk

A. Annual Recruitments

Adult Commission members' terms begin on January 1st and end December 31st, Youth Commissioners' terms follow the academic year and begin on August 1st and end on June 30th. The Town Clerk shall perform the following duties in conducting an annual recruitment for Commission members:

- 1. Notify Town Council of vacancies on Commissions by indicating the names of the Commissions, the number of terms expiring or being vacated, names of individual(s) with expiring terms or vacating seats, advertising periods (at least 30 days) and the date of interview.
- 2. Advertise the vacancies, including the application deadline and the interview date. Interviews and appointments for Adult Commissioners shall occur after annual Mayor and Vice Mayor selection, and in the case of election years, after new Council Members have been seated. Interviews and appointments for Youth Commissioners shall occur by the fourth Wednesday in May, no earlier than 4:00 p.m.
- 3. Prepare and maintain easily understood applications for appointment to Commissions. Applications shall include the following policy information:
 - a. Prior to initial appointment to any Commission, non-incumbent applicants must be interviewed by the Town Council. The applications of those not appearing will be held for the next recruitment.
 - b. If an incumbent Commissioner is requesting reappointment to the same Commission, the incumbent may submit a request to be interviewed by telephone, with their application, instead of attending the interview or must submit a letter prior to the interviews, describing the reason why the applicant cannot be present telephonically or in person for the interview, and why the applicant should be reappointed to the Commission.
 - c. Submissions deadlines are mandatory; no exceptions are permitted.

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4. Applications:

- a. For adult applicants Accept applications, verify eligibility, and distribute copies of the applications of eligible applicants to the Town Council prior to the interviews for appointment.
- b. For student applicants Accept applications, verify eligibility, and distribute copies of the applications of eligible applicants to the Town Council Selection Committee, consisting of the Mayor, Vice Mayor, Police Chief, and Youth Commission Chair (if not reapplying), prior to the interviews for appointment.
- 5. Notify the applicant by letter or email as to the date and time of the interview and provide the option for an in person or teleconference interview.
- 6. Facilitate the Council voting process set forth below by informing Council as to how many votes are possible on each Commission, calling out applicants' names, and identifying the applicants receiving sufficient votes for appointment. This process does not apply to student applicants.

7. Applicants:

- a. For adult applicants After the interviews and Council vote are completed, notify all applicants of the Council's action, and explain Town policy of keeping application active for one year with notification of subsequent openings on that Commission to the interested applicants.
- b. For student applicants After the interviews are completed, notify all applicants of the Council Committee's action, and prepare a staff report for the Town Council to ratify the Committee's appointment at the first Town Council meeting in June.

Interview Process

To ensure the interview process is consistent, fair, and equitable, each applicant shall be asked the same standard questions, as provided below. Notwithstanding, no Council Member shall be prevented from asking appropriate questions of applicants.

- 1. If appointed, what ideas would you like to see the Commission explore?
- 2. Please expand beyond the written response on your application: your experience, interest, and/or expertise that you feel would be most useful to the Commission.
- 3. Please elaborate on any written response provided in the application to assist the Council learn more about you.
- 4. If you did not answer any of the questions on the application, please explain why.

Given that most interviews are only three to five minutes due to the size of the applicant pool, the standard questions are limited in number to allow an applicant sufficient time to respond. While the intent is for each Council Member to be able to ask one question of each applicant, the Council may decide or may not to ask all of the provided questions, change, in the same the order of the questions, or rotate which by the same Council member asks a specific question. Interview questions will be reviewed annually by the Town Council in advance of the interview process for any potential modifications.

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Balloting Process

Unless determined otherwise, the Council shall conduct a ballot vote for the appointment of individuals to fill the vacancies for each Commission. Such ballot vote may be conducted at either a regular, adjourned, or special meeting of the Town Council. The ballot vote process shall be conducted as follows:

- 1. The Town Clerk shall provide a ballot to each Town Council member listing the names of all applicants and "None of the above" for each respective Commission. Prior to the vote, the Town Clerk shall publicly announce the position vacancy and all applicant names that are listed on the ballot.
- 2. Each Council member may vote for the same number of applicants as there are current vacancies on the respective Commission. In no case, can a Council Member cast more votes than there are vacancies; or vote for the same candidate more than once on each ballot (i.e. cumulative voting -- e.g. where there are three vacancies, a Council member may not give all three votes to the same candidate). A Council Member is not required to vote for any of the candidates or for the total number of vacancies available.
- 3. The Town Clerk shall collect all ballots and shall publicly announce the name of each Town Council member and how that Council member cast his or her vote. In the case of a tie vote, the Town Clerk will announce that there is a tie and that a run-off vote shall be conducted but will not announce the names of the applicants in the run-off. Once all voting is concluded and a decision made, the votes will be made public. The run-off ballot will also include a "None of the above" option.
- 4. Applicants receiving a majority number of votes shall be deemed appointed to the Commission. In the event of a tie, a run-off vote shall be conducted among the applicants receiving the highest number of votes from the previous round. This shall continue until a majority consensus on an applicant(s) is reached for the number of vacancies to be filled. In the event of an unbreakable tie, the Council may determine an alternative method for selecting the appointee(s) or direct the Town Clerk to re-advertise the vacancy.
- 5. If an applicant(s) is appointed to an Advisory Body which has vacancies for both full and partial, unexpired terms, the length of the appointee's term will be determined by the Mayor.

B. Mid-Term Recruitments

During the year, Commissions may experience vacancies that drop the number of filled seats to a number of members that is not sufficient to conduct Commission business. The Commission may request the Council to conduct a mid-term recruitment to fill seats. To the extent possible, the Town Clerk will consolidate mid-term recruitments to minimize the number of recruitments occurring throughout the year. In the event of a vacancy on the Planning Commission, the Town will automatically conduct a mid-term recruitment. Mid-term recruitments will not be conducted for Youth Commissioners. The Town Clerk shall advertise mid-term vacancies on Commissions for at least 15 days.

- 3. For student applicants: Attend the Council Selection Committee interview session. The applicant is required to notify the Town Clerk no later than 4:00 p.m. the Friday before the scheduled interview date whether they will attend in person or via teleconference.
- 4. If an incumbent Commission member is requesting reappointment to the same Commission and is not available on the date of the interview, the incumbent must submit a letter by 4:00 p.m. the Friday prior to the interviews, describing the reason why the applicant cannot be present telephonically or in person for the interview, and why the applicant should be reappointed to the Commission.
- 5. If appointed, prior to starting the Commission term, appointees are required to attend a Commissioner Orientation and take the "Oath of Office."
- 6. Attend Advisory Body meetings once term begins.
- 7. Read the Commissioners' Handbook. Hard copies of the Handbook are to be returned to the Town Clerk when the term is complete.

Responsibility and Action: Town Council

- 1. Review applications.
- 2. For adult applicants Interview applicants individually by Commission at a public meeting with all applicants present.
 - For student applicants Town Council Selection Committee interviews applicants.
- 3. Determine if the incumbents not in attendance and having submitted a letter pursuant to this Policy should be considered for reappointment.
- 4. If there are limited applications for any vacancy to a Commission, the Mayor, on behalf of the Council, may request that the Town Clerk re-advertise the vacancy, reschedule the interviews, and notify all applicants of the new interview date.

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COMPLIANCE - GROUNDS FOR DISMISSAL

A member may be removed from the Advisory Body prior to the end of his or her term by a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the Town Council and may not be reappointed for the following reasons:

- 1. Failure to attend Advisory Body meetings.
- 2. Failure to file the following documents required by the Fair Political Practices Commission (Adult Commissioners):
 - a. Form 700 Assuming Office, Annual, and Leaving Office when term is complete.
 - b. Planning Commissioners are also required to complete AB 1234 Ethics Training and file the original certificate with the Town Clerk every two years.
- 3. Failure to comply with all Town Policies, Guidelines, and Handbooks.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Under the Fair Political Practice Act, an advisory board member has a disqualifying conflict of interest in a governmental decision if it is foreseeable that the decision will have a financial impact on his or her personal finances or other financial interests. In such cases, there is a risk of biased decision-making that could sacrifice the public's interest in favor of the official's private financial interests. To avoid actual bias or the appearance of possible improprieties, the public official is prohibited from participating in the decision.

The Fair Political Practice Act does not prohibit an advisory board member from participating in a decision simply by virtue of holding a position as a board member, director, officer, or employment with a nonprofit corporation. However, the Town strongly encourages that in the event that a decision concerns a nonprofit corporation for which an advisory board member is a board member, director, officer, or employed with that nonprofit corporation, the person should recuse him or herself and at a minimum shall disclose the potential conflict of interest before any discussion and decision.

PURPOSE

To establish a policy to encourage participation by the Town's residents on Town Boards, Commissions and Committees (hereinafter referred to as "Commissions"). The Town of Los Gatos is committed to inclusivity. We value all our community members, regardless of religion, immigration status, ethnicity, race, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The Town will encourage residents to participate on Commissions by advertising vacancies on Commissions for at least 30 days, preparing easily understood applications, maintaining clear descriptions of the role of each Board, Commission, and Committee and its respective members, providing current meeting schedules, and conducting public interviews of all Commission applicants, except as provided by this Policy.

SCOPE

This Policy applies to all applicants to Town Boards, Commissions and Committees.

POLICY

The Town Council encourages public participation in all decision-making and to be successful residents must be assured both that the participation is meaningful and that their input will be valued. The widest representation from the community can only be achieved if vacancies are well advertised so that anyone interested will have the opportunity to apply. Interviews of the applicants conducted in public by the Town Council demonstrates that it values these appointments and that all have an equal opportunity to be appointed. Applicants may apply to more than one Commission, and shall rank their choices in their preferred order, during each recruitment cycle.

However, the Town strongly encourages that in the event that a decision concerns a nonprofit corporation for which an advisory board member is a board member, director, officer, or employed with that nonprofit corporation, the person should recuse him or herself and at a minimum shall disclose the potential conflict of interest before any discussion and decision.

PURPOSE

To establish a policy to encourage participation by the Town's residents on Town Boards, Commissions and Committees (hereinafter referred to as "Commissions"). The Town of Los Gatos is committed to inclusivity. We value all our community members, regardless of religion, immigration status, ethnicity, race, disability, gender, sexual orientation, or gender identity. The Town will encourage residents to participate on Commissions by advertising vacancies on Commissions for at least 30 days, preparing easily understood applications, maintaining clear descriptions of the role of each Board, Commission, and Committee and its respective members, providing current meeting schedules, and conducting public interviews of all Commission applicants, except as provided by this Policy.

SCOPE

This Policy applies to all applicants to Town Boards, Commissions and Committees.

POLICY

The Town Council encourages public participation in all decision-making and to be successful residents must be assured both that the participation is meaningful and that their input will be valued. The widest representation from the community can only be achieved if vacancies are well advertised so that anyone interested will have the opportunity to apply. Interviews of the applicants conducted in public by the Town Council demonstrates that it values these appointments and that all have an equal opportunity to be appointed. Applicants may apply to more than one Commission, and shall rank their choices in their preferred order, during each recruitment cycle.

ATTACHMENT 5

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To ensure the greatest possible participation by the public, it is the Town's policy that no person shall be appointed to more than one Commission except in those cases where they are ex-officio members of other Boards, Commissions and Committees. This Policy does not apply to Commission members serving as representatives of their Commission who have been appointed by the Town Council.

RESIDENCY REQUIREMENTS

Residency within the incorporated municipal limits of the Town of Los Gatos, California is required for appointment and continued membership on all Town of Los Gatos Boards, Commissions, and Committees, with the exception of the Youth Commission.

Youth Commission:

The members shall be students who are entering grades 8 through 12 in the fall. Membership for the students requires either residency in the incorporated limits of the Town of Los Gatos or residency in the unincorporated areas of the County of Santa Clara, which have a Los Gatos mailing address.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All members of all appointive Town Advisory Bodies should attend all regular and special meetings of said Advisory Bodies.
- 2. Any member not in attendance at a regular meeting of said Advisory Body for at least 70% of the meeting shall be considered absent.
- Any member of an appointive Town Advisory Body who is absent from the number of regular meetings listed below appropriate to his or her Advisory Body shall, as a result, surrender his or her office on the Advisory Body and the office shall be considered vacant.
 - a. For an Advisory Body which holds six (6) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: three (3) regular meetings.
 - b. For an Advisory Body which holds five (5) or fewer regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: two (2) regular meetings.
 - c. For an Advisory Body which holds sixteen (16) or more regular meetings per a consecutive twelve (12) month period: eight (8) regular meetings.
- 4. The vacant position shall be filled by appointment by a majority vote of the Town Council, for a term equal to the unexpired portion of the office vacated. Any member removed from office due to non-attendance may re-apply to serve on a Town Advisory Body but will not be treated as an incumbent in any subsequent application to the same Advisory Body.
- 5. If a Youth Commissioner liaison misses three meetings of a liaison Commission during a *consecutive twelve (12) month period, the Youth Commission shall appoint a different Youth Commissioner as liaison.

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^{*}Consecutive twelve (12) month period is defined as any consecutive twelve-month period beginning with the first absence. A regular meeting shall not be cancelled and replaced with a special meeting in order to alleviate an absence by an advisory body member.

QUORUM REQUIREMENTS

The number of members needed to constitute a quorum on any Town Advisory Body shall be a majority of the total number of filled seats.

PROCEDURES

The following procedures will be followed by the applicant, the Town Clerk, and the Town Council for the appointment of applicants to Town Commissions:

Responsibility and Actions: Town Clerk

A. Annual Recruitments

Adult Commission members' terms begin on January 1st and end December 31st, Youth Commissioners' terms follow the academic year and begin on August 1st and end on June 30th. The Town Clerk shall perform the following duties in conducting an annual recruitment for Commission members:

- 1. Notify Town Council of vacancies on Commissions by indicating the names of the Commissions, the number of terms expiring or being vacated, names of individual(s) with expiring terms or vacating seats, advertising periods (at least 30 days) and the date of interview.
- 2. Advertise the vacancies, including the application deadline and the interview date. Interviews and appointments for Adult Commissioners shall occur after annual Mayor and Vice Mayor selection, and in the case of election years, after new Council Members have been seated. Interviews and appointments for Youth Commissioners shall occur by the fourth Wednesday in May, no earlier than 4:00 p.m.
- 3. Prepare and maintain easily understood applications for appointment to Commissions. Applications shall include the following policy information:
 - a. Prior to initial appointment to any Commission, non-incumbent applicants must be interviewed by the Town Council. The applications of those not appearing will be held for the next recruitment.
 - b. If an incumbent Commissioner is requesting reappointment to the same Commission, the incumbent may submit a request to be interviewed by telephone, with their application, instead of attending the interview or must submit a letter prior to the interviews, describing the reason why the applicant cannot be present telephonically or in person for the interview, and why the applicant should be reappointed to the Commission.
 - c. Submissions deadlines are mandatory; no exceptions are permitted.

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4. Applications:

- a. For adult applicants Accept applications, verify eligibility, and distribute copies of the applications of eligible applicants to the Town Council prior to the interviews for appointment.
- b. For student applicants Accept applications, verify eligibility, and distribute copies of the applications of eligible applicants to the Town Council Selection Committee, consisting of the Mayor, Vice Mayor, Police Chief, and Youth Commission Chair (if not reapplying), prior to the interviews for appointment.
- 5. Notify the applicant by letter or email as to the date and time of the interview and provide the option for an in person or teleconference interview.
- 6. Facilitate the Council voting process set forth below by informing Council as to how many votes are possible on each Commission, calling out applicants' names, and identifying the applicants receiving sufficient votes for appointment. This process does not apply to student applicants.

7. Applicants:

- a. For adult applicants After the interviews and Council vote are completed, notify all applicants of the Council's action, and explain Town policy of keeping application active for one year with notification of subsequent openings on that Commission to the interested applicants.
- b. For student applicants After the interviews are completed, notify all applicants of the Council Committee's action, and prepare a staff report for the Town Council to ratify the Committee's appointment at the first Town Council meeting in June.

Interview Process

To ensure the interview process is consistent, fair, and equitable, each applicant shall be asked the same standard questions, as provided below. Notwithstanding, no Council Member shall be prevented from asking appropriate questions of applicants.

- 1. If appointed, what ideas would you like to see the Commission explore?
- 2. Please expand beyond the written response on your application: your experience, interest, and/or expertise that you feel would be most useful to the Commission.
- 3. Please elaborate on any written response provided in the application to assist the Council learn more about you.
- 4. If you did not answer any of the questions on the application, please explain why.

Given that most interviews are only three to The interviews are scheduled for a minimum of five minutes per applicant. dDue to the size of the applicant pool, the standard questions are limited in number to allow an applicant sufficient time to respond. While the intent is for each Council Member to be able to ask one question of each applicant, tThe Council may decide or may not to ask all of the provided questions, change, in the same the order of the questions, or rotate which by the same Council member asks a specific question. Interview questions will be

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reviewed annually by the Town Council in advance of the interview process for any potential modifications.

Balloting Process

Unless determined otherwise, the Council shall conduct a ballot vote for the appointment of individuals to fill the vacancies for each Commission. Such ballot vote may be conducted at either a regular, adjourned, or special meeting of the Town Council. The ballot vote process shall be conducted as follows:

- 1. The Town Clerk shall provide a ballot to each Town Council member listing the names of all applicants and "None of the above" for each respective Commission. Prior to the vote, the Town Clerk shall publicly announce the position vacancy and all applicant names that are listed on the ballot.
- 2. Each Council member may vote for the same number of applicants as there are current vacancies on the respective Commission. In no case, can a Council Member cast more votes than there are vacancies; or vote for the same candidate more than once on each ballot (i.e. cumulative voting -- e.g. where there are three vacancies, a Council member may not give all three votes to the same candidate). A Council Member is not required to vote for any of the candidates or for the total number of vacancies available.
- 3. The Town Clerk shall collect all ballots and shall publicly announce the name of each Town Council member and how that Council member cast his or her vote. In the case of a tie vote, the Town Clerk will announce that there is a tie and that a run-off vote shall be conducted but will not announce the names of the applicants in the run-off. Once all voting is concluded and a decision made, the votes will be made public. The run-off ballot will also include a "None of the above" option.
- 4. Applicants receiving a majority number of votes shall be deemed appointed to the Commission. In the event of a tie, a run-off vote shall be conducted among the applicants receiving the highest number of votes from the previous round. This shall continue until a majority consensus on an applicant(s) is reached for the number of vacancies to be filled. In the event of an unbreakable tie, the Council may determine an alternative method for selecting the appointee(s) or direct the Town Clerk to re-advertise the vacancy.
- 5. If an applicant(s) is appointed to an Advisory Body which has vacancies for both full and partial, unexpired terms, the length of the appointee's term will be determined by the Mayor.

B. Mid-Term Recruitments

During the year, Commissions may experience vacancies that drop the number of filled seats to a number of members that is not sufficient to conduct Commission business. The Commission may request the Council to conduct a mid-term recruitment to fill seats. To the extent possible, the Town Clerk will consolidate mid-term recruitments to minimize the number of recruitments occurring throughout the year. In the event of a vacancy on the Planning Commission, the Town will automatically conduct a mid-term recruitment. Mid-

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term recruitments will not be conducted for Youth Commissioners. The Town Clerk shall advertise mid-term vacancies on Commissions for at least 15 days.

Responsibility and Action: Applicant

- 1. Read the Commission Appointments, Residency and Attendance Requirements, and Establishing a Quorum Policy, complete and submit to the Town Clerk the application for appointment to a Town Commission by the advertised deadline date and time.
- 2. For adult applicants: Attend the Council meeting to be interviewed for Commission appointment. The applicant is required to notify the Town Clerk no later than 4:00 p.m. the Friday before the scheduled interview date whether they will attend in person or via teleconference.
- 3. For student applicants: Attend the Council Selection Committee interview session. The applicant is required to notify the Town Clerk no later than 4:00 p.m. the Friday before the scheduled interview date whether they will attend in person or via teleconference.
- 4. If an incumbent Commission member is requesting reappointment to the same Commission and is not available on the date of the interview, the incumbent must submit a letter by 4:00 p.m. the Friday prior to the interviews, describing the reason why the applicant cannot be present telephonically or in person for the interview, and why the applicant should be reappointed to the Commission.
- 5. If appointed, prior to starting the Commission term, appointees are required to attend a Commissioner Orientation and take the "Oath of Office."
- 6. Attend Advisory Body meetings once term begins.
- 7. Read the Commissioners' Handbook. Hard copies of the Handbook are to be returned to the Town Clerk when the term is complete.

Responsibility and Action: Town Council

- 1. Review applications.
- 2. For adult applicants Interview applicants individually by Commission at a public meeting with all applicants present.
 - For student applicants Town Council Selection Committee interviews applicants.
- 3. Determine if the incumbents not in attendance and having submitted a letter pursuant to this Policy should be considered for reappointment.
- 4. If there are limited applications for any vacancy to a Commission, the Mayor, on behalf of the Council, may request that the Town Clerk re-advertise the vacancy, reschedule the interviews, and notify all applicants of the new interview date.

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COMPLIANCE - GROUNDS FOR DISMISSAL

A member may be removed from the Advisory Body prior to the end of his or her term by a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the Town Council and may not be reappointed for the following reasons:

- 1. Failure to attend Advisory Body meetings.
- 2. Failure to file the following documents required by the Fair Political Practices Commission (Adult Commissioners):
 - a. Form 700 Assuming Office, Annual, and Leaving Office when term is complete.
 - b. Planning Commissioners are also required to complete AB 1234 Ethics Training and file the original certificate with the Town Clerk every two years.
- 3. Failure to comply with all Town Policies, Guidelines, and Handbooks.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST

Under the Fair Political Practice Act, an advisory board member has a disqualifying conflict of interest in a governmental decision if it is foreseeable that the decision will have a financial impact on his or her personal finances or other financial interests. In such cases, there is a risk of biased decision-making that could sacrifice the public's interest in favor of the official's private financial interests. To avoid actual bias or the appearance of possible improprieties, the public official is prohibited from participating in the decision.

The Fair Political Practice Act does not prohibit an advisory board member from participating in a decision simply by virtue of holding a position as a board member, director, officer, or employment with a nonprofit corporation. However, the Town strongly encourages that in the event that a decision concerns a nonprofit corporation for which an advisory board member is a board member, director, officer, or employed with that nonprofit corporation, the person should recuse him or herself and at a minimum shall disclose the potential conflict of interest before any discussion and decision.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt a Resolution of the Council of the Town of Los Gatos for Model 3, calling a municipal election for November 8, 2022, requesting that the County consolidate the municipal election with the general election on November 8, 2022, and submitting to the qualified electors of the Town at the November 8, 2022 consolidated general election a measure to amend Chapter 14 – Licenses and Miscellaneous Business Regulations (Chapter 14) of the Los Gatos Town Code relating to business license taxes.

BACKGROUND:

On September 13, 2021, the Town Finance Commission reviewed the Town's Business License Tax Program and recommended that the Town Council authorize the Town Manager to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP) for consultant services to evaluate and recommend modernization options for the Town's Business License Tax Program. The Business License Tax supports all municipal services that are enjoyed by the businesses, including but not limited to streets, other infrastructure, and public safety.

On October 19, 2021, the Town Council received the Finance Commission recommendation and directed staff to engage a consultant to review the Town's 1991 Business Tax Ordinance and recommend options for modernizing the Ordinance.

BACKGROUND (continued):

On December 17, 2021, the Town issued an RFP for Business License Tax consulting services. Hinderliter, deLlamas & Associates (HdL) Companies was selected given their significant experience in business license review and analysis, including having performed dozens of tax study and modernization programs in California.

HdL submitted their Business License Analysis and Ordinance Review (Report) to the Town on June 8, 2022.

On June 13, 2022, the Finance Commission discussed the HdL Report and voted unanimously to move forward to continue research and public outreach on business license tax modernization.

On June 21, 2022, the Town Council unanimously directed staff to continue conducting research and public outreach and prepare options for proposed ballot measure language for Council consideration on August 2, 2022.

DISCUSSION:

Per Council direction, staff has been coordinating extensive business outreach and working with HdL to refine potential business license modernization models. Following are summaries of both efforts:

Business Outreach

The Town set up a dedicated webpage at www.LosGatosCA.gov/BLModernization with information regarding the current business license tax program, background on modernizing the tax, discussions to date, the options being considered, and the timeline for a ballot measure. The Town also set up a unique email address of BLModernization@losgatosca.gov for public comment and received several communications on this topic from a variety of businesses (see Attachment 1).

The Town hosted a community workshop on July 25, 2022 at 7:00 p.m. via teleconference. The Town publicized the potential business license modernization ballot measure and the July 25 informational workshop via the Town website homepage, weekly Newsletter, multiple posts on the Town's official social media accounts (Nextdoor, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and LinkedIn), and a postcard mailing. The postcard went out to every business the Town has on file and was mailed to a total of 5,167 valid business addresses with receipt occurring between July 15 and 21.

The community meeting provided an opportunity for Town residents and businesses to learn more about the potential business license modernization, discuss each of the proposed options

under consideration, ask questions, and provide feedback. The materials from the webinar are available at www.LosGatosCA.gov/BLModernization. Though lightly attended, the community answered a series of Zoom poll questions following the initial staff presentation:

- 75% felt the Town should update the business license tax.
- 100% felt the Town business license program should be equitable.
- 100% preferred the proposed Model 3.

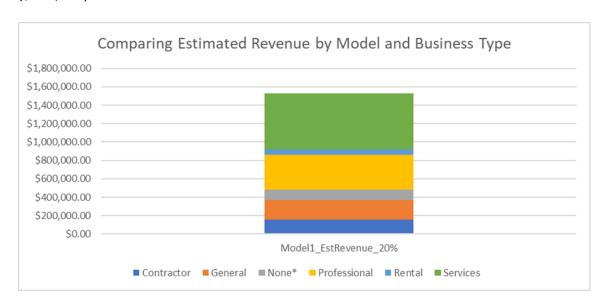
After further discussion and a question and answer session, the poll was launched again with an additional participant and the following results:

- 60% felt the Town should update the business license tax.
- 100% felt the Town business license program should be equitable.
- 20% preferred the proposed Model 1 and 80% preferred the proposed Model 3.

In addition to the community meeting and other outreach efforts, staff sent emails directly to the five largest businesses discussed within Model 3 and also had separate discussions with community stakeholders including the Los Gatos Chamber of Commerce and Netflix.

Analysis of Potential Models

Model 1 – Would retain the existing structure while modifying the tax amounts for each category by 20%. The drawback of Model 1 is that the tax remains regressive. In fact, because it would increase the flat fees, it becomes more regressive. In addition, since 1991, inflation has risen approximately 117% or five times as much as the recommended increase. The advantage of this model is that the increases for each business type are minimal. This Model would increase revenues approximately \$255,000 annually primarily from the Services category (\$101,000).



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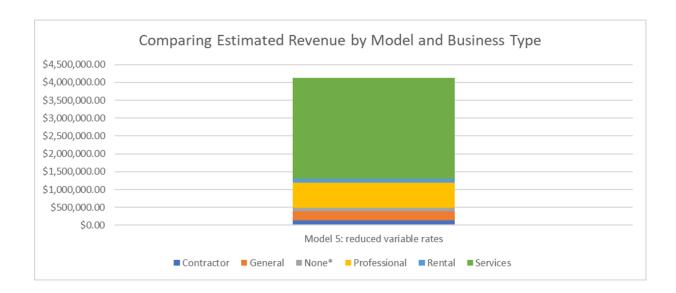

<u>Model 2</u> – Introduces the concept of converting the Town tax to a gross-receipts model for all businesses. This means that every business would pay based on their gross receipts, utilizing different single rates for five different business classifications. This Model also lowered the annual base rate to a uniform \$25 flat rate for the first \$25,000 to provide some additional tax relief for smaller businesses. This model affords the most flexibility for increasing revenues while accommodating certain business categories with differing rates. This Model would increase revenues approximately \$2,861,000 annually primarily from the Services category (\$2,321,000).

<u>Model 3</u> - Maintains the existing gross-receipts structure for Manufacturing, Wholesaling, and Jobbing except for updating the rate of \$75.00 for each \$550,000 more than \$12,000,000 to \$300 for each \$550,000 more than \$12,000,000. For purposes of this schedule, Manufacturing refers to any manufacturing or processing of goods, wares, merchandise, articles, or commodities. Wholesaling refers to the sale of goods, wares, or merchandise for the purpose of resale. Jobbing is the business of selling goods, wares, or merchandise to wholesale

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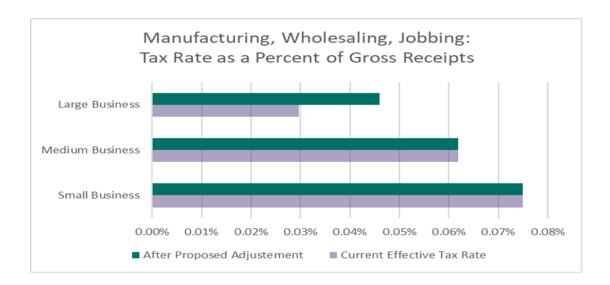

merchants for resale at wholesale. This model also includes the E-commerce category which includes commercial transactions conducted electronically on the internet.

This model would have the least change to the existing structure, only impacting businesses with gross receipts above \$12,000,000, while helping to offset some of the inequities associated with the lower effective tax rates of larger businesses presented earlier. This Model would increase revenues approximately \$1,100,000 annually.



Finance Commission Alternative Model

On July 28, 2022, the Finance Commission held a Special Meeting to discuss the results of community outreach and business feedback and the three models under consideration. At the conclusion of their discussion, the three resident Commission members present voted to provide the Town Council with an alternative Model. The proposed Model is an enhanced version of Model 1. The Commission Model would increase all flat fees and the gross receipts tax schedules for E-Commerce, Manufacturing, Wholesaling, and Jobbing and Retailing 100% to account for inflation. In addition, the Commission expanded the Retailing gross receipts table to include two additional payment levels above the current \$2,000,000 (and above) threshold. The following table illustrates the additional payment levels.

Like Model 1, the drawback of this Model is that the tax remains regressive. This model would make up most of the inflation since 1991. This Model would increase revenues approximately \$1,600,000.

Ballot Initiative Process

A ballot measure to modernize the Business License Tax requires a 4/5 vote of the Town Council to place it on the ballot. A General Tax can be expended on any program, service, or capital need at the discretion of the local government's governing body. A simple majority vote (50 percent of voters plus one additional voter) is required for approval of a general tax.

A resolution with corresponding ballot language and its draft ordinance have been prepared for each of the three models. For Model 1, see Attachment 2; for Model 2, see Attachment 3; and for Model 3, see Attachment 4. If the Council decides to move forward with one of the models, then the Council should adopt the resolution it would like, which would submit the Council's ballot measure to voters at the November 8, 2022 regular municipal election. Provided below is the ballot language for the three models.

Should the Town Council choose to pursue a ballot measure, final approval including the ballot measure language will need to be submitted to the Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters by August 12, 2022. Provided below are ballot measure milestone dates:

- August 12, 2022: Last day for Resolutions calling a measure
- August 12, 2022: Deadline for submitting primary arguments in favor of or against a measure
- August 17, 2022: Last day to amend or withdraw a measure
- August 19, 2022: Town Attorney submits impartial analysis to the Town Clerk
- August 19, 2022: Deadline for submitting rebuttal arguments to primary arguments in favor of and against a measure.

The proposed resolutions authorize the Mayor, or his designee(s), to prepare a written argument in favor of the proposed measure on behalf of the Town Council. At the Mayor's discretion, the Argument may also be signed by bona fide associations or by individual voters eligible to vote in Los Gatos.

This staff report was coordinated with the Town Manager, Town Attorney, and Finance Director.

FISCAL IMPACT:

If approved by voters in November, the estimated additional revenue generated by the three models is between approximately \$255,000 and \$2,800,000 annually. These funds would be locally generated and therefore be safe from seizure by the State. In addition, they would enable the Town to invest in services and infrastructure that the community values. The cost of the ballot measure is approximately \$59,000 and incorporated in the FY 2022/23 adopted budget.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

In accordance with CEQA Guidelines Section 15378(b)(4), placement of a ballot measure on the ballot to amend the Town's business license tax is not a project subject to CEQA, because it is a government fiscal activity.

Dear Town Council:

I have three comments regarding your proposed Models for the Business License Modernization program.

- 1) If you charge smaller businesses what they perceive to be too much or considerably more than they have been paying, some may decide not to get a business license. Especially small Mom and Pop and home based businesses. You will chase them undercover and then lose that revenue. New businesses may decide to go elsewhere. You must make Los Gatos business friendly and welcoming.
- 2) Locate and require at home businesses to have a business license. Many people now work from home, yet have no license.
- 3) Basing a license fee on gross receipts is unfair because the fee is based on overall sales receipts, not the profit made.

Example: A Ferrari dealer sells expensive cars and a used car dealer sells inexpensive cars. The Ferrari dealer could sell a few cars and have a large gross receipts record. The used car dealer could sell a lot of cars, have a higher overall profit, but a much lower gross receipts total, thus pay less for a business license than the Ferrari dealer. If you base the license fee on gross receipts, you could potentially be penalizing the person that sells more expensive products than someone who sells less expensive products.

I am a small business owner so the potential changes to fix the regressive tax structure is welcome. My concern as a citizen of Los Gatos is that ramping up the tax on large businesses, like Netflix, should be considered very carefully and not be too aggressive. The whole dollar amount contributed by Netflix and other large organizations, regardless of the tax rate in terms of percentage, I would imagine makes up a material portion of the cash coming into the Town of Los Gatos to support the many programs, services, and infrastructure.

Said more simply, don't scare away or anger the big tax contributors with a material increase in tax rates. As evidenced by many large companies in the Bay Area over the past few years, they will take action and move to TX or FL, or some other tax-friendly jurisdiction.

If my gross receipts are \$25,000,000 annually according to the charts I'm seeing, that results in a license fee of \$37,500...I believe that is outrageous. You know that in the automobile business, we don't have the same margins that another retailer might have. To base the fee solely on gross receipts is highly unfair. There should be some sort of setoff regarding the sales tax that a business generates for the town. I would embrace a slightly higher annual fee, but nothing like what I'm seeing. There should be a cap on the fee, certainly no more than \$2000/year.

Calling a Municipal Election for November 8, 2022,
Requesting that the County Consolidate the Municipal Election
with the General Election on November 8, 2022 and
Submitting to the Qualified Electors of the Town at the
November 8, 2022 Consolidated General Election a Measure
to Amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, the Town's business license tax ordinance was adopted in 1968 and the amount of the tax has not increased since 1991.
- B. WHEREAS, the Town Council desires to adjust the business license tax to increase revenue to fund critical Town needs
- C. WHEREAS, a proposed ordinance attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Attachment "A" ("the Ordinance") would amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code to revise the license tax on businesses operating in the Town of Los Gatos.
- D. WHEREAS, a statewide general election is scheduled for November 8, 2022. The Town Council wishes to call a municipal election for the Town to be held on November 8, 2022 and to request the County of Santa Clara to consolidate the municipal election with the statewide general election.

The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos now resolves as follows:

<u>Section 1. Findings.</u> The Town Council finds and determines that each of the findings set forth above are true and correct.

Section 2. Calling the Election. The Council calls for a municipal election to be held on November 8, 2022 ("the Election").

<u>Section 3. Measure.</u> Pursuant to Government Code Section 53724 and Elections Code Section 9222, the Town Council hereby submits the Ordinance attached hereto as Attachment A to the voters at the Election and orders the following question to be submitted to the voters at the Election:

Shall the measure to fund critical Town needs such as public safety by imposing a 20% increase to all flat fees and the gross receipts tax schedules for E-Commerce,	YES	
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Manufacturing, Wholesaling, and Jobbing and Retailing raising about \$255,000 yearly for general fund purposes until ended by voters, and which have not been increased since 1991, be adopted?	NO	
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This question requires the approval of a majority of those casting votes.

<u>Section 4. Notice of Election.</u> Notice of the time and place of holding the election is hereby given, and the Town Clerk is authorized, instructed, and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form, and manner as required by law.

Section 5. Impartial Analysis. Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9280, the Town Council hereby directs the Town Clerk to transmit a copy of the measure to the Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the measure, not to exceed 500 words in length, showing the effect of the measure on the existing law and the operation of the measure, and transmit such impartial analysis to the Town Clerk on or before 4:00 p.m. on August 19, 2022.

In the event the entire text of the Measure is not printed on the ballot, nor in the voter information portion of the sample ballot, there shall be printed immediately below the impartial analysis, in no less than 10-font bold type, the following: "The above statement is an impartial analysis of Ordinance or Measure __. If you desire a copy of the ordinance or measure, please call the Town Clerk at 408-354-6888 and a copy will be emailed at no cost to you."

Section 6. Ballot Arguments. Pursuant to Elections Code Section 9286 et. seq., August 12, 2022, at 4:00 p.m. shall be the deadline for submission of arguments in favor of, and arguments against, this measure. Arguments in favor or against the measure shall not exceed 300 words in length. The Mayor, or his designee(s), is hereby authorized to prepare a written argument in favor of the proposed measure on behalf of the Town Council. At the Mayor's discretion, the Argument may also be signed by bona fide associations or by individual voters who are eligible to vote in the Town of Los Gatos. Each argument shall be signed, filed with the Town Clerk, and include the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting the argument. If more than one argument for or against is received, the priorities established by Elections Code Section 9287 shall control.

Section 7. Rebuttal Arguments. Subdivision (a) of section 9285 of the Elections Code shall apply to the Election and shall control the submission of any rebuttal arguments for this measure. If an argument in favor and an argument against the measure have been selected to be printed in the voter information guide, the Clerk shall send a copy of the argument in favor of the measure to the authors of the argument against the measure and a copy of an argument against the measure to the authors of the argument in favor of the measure. The rebuttal authors or persons designated by them may prepare and submit rebuttal arguments not to exceed 250 words in length. Rebuttal arguments must be submitted not later than August 19, 2022, by 4:00 p.m.

Section 8. Consolidation Request. The Council of the Town of Los Gatos requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County consolidate the municipal election and the election on this measure with the November 8, 2022 statewide general election. The Council further requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County include on the ballots and sample ballots, all qualified measures submitted by the Town Council to be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Los Gatos. The Council acknowledges that the election will be held and conducted according to procedures in the Elections Code, including Section 10418.

Section 9. Request for County Services. Pursuant to Section 10002 of the California Elections Code, the Council of the Town of Los Gatos hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County to permit the Registrar of Voters to render services to the Town of Los Gatos relating to the conduct of the Town's Municipal and Special Elections which are called to be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. The services shall be of the type normally performed by the Registrar of Voters in assisting the clerks of municipalities in the conduct of elections including, but not limited to, checking registrations, mailing ballots, hiring election officers, and arranging for polling places, receiving absentee voter ballot applications, mailing and receiving absent voter ballots, and opening and counting ballots, providing and distributing election supplies, and furnishing voting machines.

<u>Section 10. Transmittal of Resolution.</u> The Town Clerk is hereby directed to submit forthwith an original copy of this resolution including the measure attached hereto as Attachment "A" to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors and a certified copy to the Registrar of Voters.

Section 11. Placement on the Ballot. The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to place the measure on the ballot and the full text of the Measure shall not be printed in the voter pamphlet. A statement shall be printed in the ballot pursuant to Section 9280 of the Elections Code advising voters that they may obtain a copy of this resolution and the Measure, at no cost, upon request made to the Town Clerk, as well as a link to the ballot measure materials on the Town's website.

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Ordinance of the Town of Los Gatos Amending Chapter 14 of the Town Code

The People of the Town of Los Gatos ordain as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code is hereby amended by adding, deleting, and modifying provisions as set forth in this section below. Additions are indicated by underscoring and deletions are indicated by strike through type. Portions of the Chapter not included in this Ordinance or not shown in underscoring or strike-through type are not changed.

Chapter 14 LICENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS REGULATIONS

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 14.10.010. Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

Business means professions, trades and occupations and every kind of calling carried on for profit or livelihood, including the business of renting or leasing apartments.

E-commerce means commercial transactions conducted electronically on the Internet.

Fixed place of business means the premises occupied for the particular purpose of conducting the business thereat, and regularly kept open for that purpose, with a competent person in attendance for the purpose of attending to such business. Included in such term is the premises rented or leased by persons owning apartments located in the Town.

Gross receipts means the total amount of the sale price of all sales and the total amount charged or received for the performance of any act, service or employment of whatever nature it may be, for which a charge is made or credit allowed, whether or not such service, act or employment is done as a part of or in connection with the sale of materials, goods, wares or merchandise. Included in such term shall be all receipts, cash, credits and property of any kind or nature, and any amount for which credit is allowed by the seller to the purchaser without any deduction therefrom on account of the cost of the property sold, the cost of the materials used, labor, or service costs, interest paid or payable or losses or other expenses whatsoever.

Excluded from such term shall be cash discounts allowed and taken on sales, any tax required by law to be included in, or added to, the purchase price and collected from the consumer or purchaser, and such part of the sale price of property returned by purchasers upon rescission of the contract of sale as is refunded either in cash or by credit.

Home occupation has the same meanings as it does in the zoning ordinance.

Jobbing business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in job lots to wholesale merchants for resale at wholesale to the trade by such wholesale merchants.

Quarter means a period of three (3) calendar months. The quarters begin on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year. The quarter shall include fractions thereof.

Real estate broker means the managing broker and/or partner of any real estate office.

Retail business means any business conducted for the purpose of selling, or offering to sell, any goods, wares or merchandise, other than as a part of a wholesale business and jobbing business.

Tax and license collector is the Finance Director or designee.

Vehicle means any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public street or highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

Wholesale business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in wholesale lots to retail merchants for resale at retail to the trade by such retail merchants.

Sec. 14.10.040. Statements required—Upon application for original business license.

- (a) Upon a person making application for the first <u>business</u> license under this chapter, or for a newly established business, in all cases where the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid is based upon gross receipts or is graduated according to some other sliding scale, such person shall furnish to the Tax and License Collector, for guidance in ascertaining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant, a written statement upon a form provided by the Tax and License Collector, signed and certified under penalty of perjury to be true and correct.
- (b) If the amount of the <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant is based upon the amount of gross receipts, the applicant shall estimate the amount of gross receipts for the period to be covered by the <u>business</u> license for the purpose of determining the licensing bracket which will be applicable for the period to be covered by the license to be issued. Such estimate, if accepted by the Tax and License Collector as reasonable, shall be used in determining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant. The tax so determined shall be tentative only and such person shall, by not later than <u>January 31st May fifteenth next</u> following the period for which the license was issued, furnish the Tax and <u>License Collector</u> with a certified or sworn statement upon a form furnished by the <u>Tax</u> Collector, containing the data required to show the licensing bracket properly applicable to such person during the period of such <u>business</u> license, and the <u>business</u> license tax for such period shall be finally ascertained and paid in the manner provided in this chapter, after

- deducting from the payment found to be due the amount paid at the time such first <u>business</u> license was issued. The Tax and License Collector shall not issue to any such person another license for the same or any other business until such person shall have furnished the written statement and paid the <u>business license tax</u> as required in this chapter.
- (c) If the amount of the <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant is graduated according to some sliding scale other than gross receipts, the applicant shall furnish to the Tax and <u>License-Collector</u> for guidance in ascertaining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid, a certified or sworn statement upon a form provided by the Tax and <u>License-Collector</u> setting forth such information as may be therein required and as may be necessary properly to determine the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant and which statement shall show, among other things, the number of vehicles or tonnage thereof or the number of seats, chairs, rooms, tables or other units used or involved in such person's business as of the time of filing such application. Such person shall thereupon pay the required license tax in advance, computed in accordance with the information contained in such statement.

Sec. 14.10.095. Term.

A <u>business</u> license issued under this chapter shall expire at the end of the <u>term year</u> for which the license or renewal is issued unless the license is renewed for an additional period.

Sec. 14.20.110. Gross receipts tax.

Every person doing business in the Town, except a person whose business is taxed under the terms of section 14.20.115, shall pay an annual <u>business</u> license tax based on the gross receipts of the business. The tax is levied according to one (1) or both of the following schedules. When the business activities of one (1) person, taxable under the provisions of this section, involve both retail and <u>e-commerce</u>, manufacturing, wholesaling or jobbing transactions, the total gross income is apportioned between the two (2) schedules, according to its source.

The provisions of this section do not apply to commercial travelers or selling agents selling their goods to dealers, whether selling for present or future deliveries, by sample or otherwise, nor to hawkers on the street, nor peddlers from vehicles, nor to persons selling fruit, vegetables, butter, eggs, or other fruit or ranch products.

 - (1) An assessment pursuant to the parking and business improvement area district ordinance has been levied on the business by the Town for the license year; and

- (2) The business has paid its parking and business improvement area district assessment for the prior year.
- (b) Each person doing any of the kinds of businesses identified as "Contractor," "Hospitals, rest homes, and the like," "Professional and semiprofessional occupations," "Service occupations," and "Trucking" in section 14.20.115 shall receive a credit equal to fifty (50) percent of the annual business license tax.

Sec. 14.20.125. Exemption for contractors to the town.

Any business whose income from business in the Town is not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) during any calendar year and is derived solely from contracts with the Town is exempt from payment of the business license taxes set forth in this article for that calendar year. (Ord. No. 1983, § II, 7-5-94)

<u>Section 2. Severability.</u> Should any provision of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable, or otherwise void, that determination shall have no effect on any other provision of this Ordinance or the application of this Ordinance to any other person or circumstance and, to that end, the provisions hereof are severable. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the electorate that they would have adopted this Ordinance had such unconstitutional, illegal, or invalid provision, sentence, clause section, or part thereof not been included herein.

Section 3. California Environmental Quality Act. This Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code section 21000 et seq., under, including without limitation, Public Resources Code section 21065, and CEQA Guidelines sections 15378(b)(4) and 15061(b)(3), as it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity authorized herein may have a significant effect on the environment.

<u>Section 4. Council Implementation.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos shall adopt any and all laws it deems necessary to implement this Ordinance.

<u>Section 5. Council Amendments.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos is authorized to amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code in any manner that does not increase the rate of any tax or otherwise constitutes a tax increase for which voter approval is required by Article XIII C of the California Constitution, including adopting exemptions, waivers, or reductions of the tax.

<u>Section 6. Administrative Regulations and Delegation.</u> The Town Manager is authorized to adopt rules and regulations consistent with this measure as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code and to develop all related forms and

other materials and to take any other steps as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 and to make such interpretations of this measure and Chapter 14 as the Town Manager may consider necessary to achieve the purposes of this measure and Chapter 14. The Town Manager may delegate any authority within their discretion pursuant to this measure as they deem reasonably necessary.

<u>Section 7. Liberal Construction.</u> This Ordinance shall be liberally construed to effectuate its purposes.

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Resolution of the Council of the Town of Los Gatos Calling a Municipal Election for November 8, 2022, Requesting that the County Consolidate the Municipal Election with the General Election on November 8, 2022 and Submitting to the Qualified Electors of the Town at the November 8, 2022 Consolidated General Election a Measure to Amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, the Town's business license tax ordinance was adopted in 1968 and the amount of the tax has not increased since 1991.
- B. WHEREAS, the current business license tax is regressive in that smaller businesses pay a higher effective tax rate than larger businesses.
- C. WHEREAS, the Town Council desires to adjust the business license tax to both increase revenue and provide a more equitable tax structure.
- D. WHEREAS, a proposed ordinance attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Attachment "A" ("the Ordinance") would amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code to revise the license tax on businesses operating in the Town of Los Gatos.
- E. WHEREAS, a statewide general election is scheduled for November 8, 2022. The Town Council wishes to call a municipal election for the Town to be held on November 8, 2022 and to request the County of Santa Clara to consolidate the municipal election with the statewide general election.

The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos now resolves as follows:

- <u>Section 1. Findings.</u> The Town Council finds and determines that each of the findings set forth above are true and correct.
- <u>Section 2. Calling the Election.</u> The Council calls for a municipal election to be held on November 8, 2022 ("the Election").
- <u>Section 3. Measure.</u> Pursuant to Government Code Section 53724 and Elections Code Section 9222, the Town Council hereby submits the Ordinance attached hereto as Attachment A to the voters at the Election and orders the following question to be submitted to the voters at the Election:

Shall the measure to fund critical Town needs such as public safety by incorporating gross receipts reporting for all businesses at rates between \$0.50 and \$2.00 per \$1000 after a \$25.00 flat fee for the first \$25,000 in gross receipts,	YES	
replacing the existing regressive taxing system of flat fees and gross-receipts, raising \$2.3 million yearly for general fund purposes until ended by voters, and increasing equity among small, medium and larger businesses, be adopted?	NO	

This question requires the approval of a majority of those casting votes.

<u>Section 4. Notice of Election.</u> Notice of the time and place of holding the election is hereby given, and the Town Clerk is authorized, instructed, and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form, and manner as required by law.

Section 5. Impartial Analysis. Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9280, the Town Council hereby directs the Town Clerk to transmit a copy of the measure to the Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the measure, not to exceed 500 words in length, showing the effect of the measure on the existing law and the operation of the measure, and transmit such impartial analysis to the Town Clerk on or before 4:00 p.m. on August 19, 2022.

In the event the entire text of the Measure is not printed on the ballot, nor in the voter information portion of the sample ballot, there shall be printed immediately below the impartial analysis, in no less than 10-font bold type, the following: "The above statement is an impartial analysis of Ordinance or Measure __. If you desire a copy of the ordinance or measure, please call the Town Clerk at 408-354-6888 and a copy will be emailed at no cost to you."

Section 6. Ballot Arguments. Pursuant to Elections Code Section 9286 et. seq., August 12, 2022, at 4:00 p.m. shall be the deadline for submission of arguments in favor of, and arguments against, this measure. Arguments in favor or against the measure shall not exceed 300 words in length. The Mayor, or his designee(s), is hereby authorized to prepare a written argument in favor of the proposed measure on behalf of the Town Council. At the Mayor's discretion, the Argument may also be signed by bona fide associations or by individual voters who are eligible to vote in the Town of Los Gatos. Each argument shall be signed, filed with the Town Clerk, and include the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting the argument. If more than one argument for or against is received, the priorities established by Elections Code Section 9287 shall control.

Section 7. Rebuttal Arguments. Subdivision (a) of section 9285 of the Elections Code shall apply to the Election and shall control the submission of any rebuttal arguments for this measure. If an argument in favor and an argument against the measure have been selected to be printed in the voter information guide, the Clerk shall send a copy of the argument in favor of the measure to the authors of the argument against the measure and a copy of an argument against the measure to the authors of the argument in favor of the measure. The rebuttal authors or

persons designated by them may prepare and submit rebuttal arguments not to exceed 250 words in length. Rebuttal arguments must be submitted not later than August 19, 2022, by 4:00 p.m.

Section 8. Consolidation Request. The Council of the Town of Los Gatos requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County consolidate the municipal election and the election on this measure with the November 8, 2022 statewide general election. The Council further requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County include on the ballots and sample ballots, all qualified measures submitted by the Town Council to be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Los Gatos. The Council acknowledges that the election will be held and conducted according to procedures in the Elections Code, including Section 10418.

Section 9. Request for County Services. Pursuant to Section 10002 of the California Elections Code, the Council of the Town of Los Gatos hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County to permit the Registrar of Voters to render services to the Town of Los Gatos relating to the conduct of the Town's Municipal and Special Elections which are called to be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. The services shall be of the type normally performed by the Registrar of Voters in assisting the clerks of municipalities in the conduct of elections including, but not limited to, checking registrations, mailing ballots, hiring election officers, and arranging for polling places, receiving absentee voter ballot applications, mailing and receiving absent voter ballots, and opening and counting ballots, providing and distributing election supplies, and furnishing voting machines.

<u>Section 10. Transmittal of Resolution.</u> The Town Clerk is hereby directed to submit forthwith an original copy of this resolution including the measure attached hereto as Attachment "A" to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors and a certified copy to the Registrar of Voters.

Section 11. Placement on the Ballot.

The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to place the measure on the ballot and the full text of the Measure shall not be printed in the voter pamphlet. A statement shall be printed in the ballot pursuant to Section 9280 of the Elections Code advising voters that they may obtain a copy of this resolution and the Measure, at no cost, upon request made to the Town Clerk, as well as a link to the ballot measure materials on the Town's website.

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Ordinance of the Town of Los Gatos Amending Chapter 14 of the Town Code

The People of the Town of Los Gatos ordain as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code is hereby amended by adding, deleting, and modifying provisions as set forth in this section below. Additions are indicated by underscoring and deletions are indicated by strike through type. Portions of the Chapter not included in this Ordinance or not shown in underscoring or strike-through type are not changed.

Chapter 14 LICENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS REGULATIONS

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 14.10.010. Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

Business means professions, trades and occupations and every kind of calling carried on for profit or livelihood, including the business of renting or leasing apartments.

Contractor means every person, firm, or corporation conducting, managing, or carrying on the business of contractor, subcontractor, or builder; or engaging in the construction or repair of any structures or infrastructure; or engaged in any engineering.

E-commerce means commercial transaction(s) conducted electronically on the Internet.

Fixed place of business means the premises occupied for the particular purpose of conducting the business thereat, and regularly kept open for that purpose, with a competent person in attendance for the purpose of attending to such business. Included in such term is the premises rented or leased by persons owning apartments located in the Town.

<u>General Commerce/Retail</u> means This category includes retailers, wholesalers, manufacturersing, jobbers, hoteliers, and restaurant businesses.

Gross receipts means the total amount of the sale price of all sales and the total amount charged or received for the performance of any act, service or employment of whatever nature it may be, for which a charge is made or credit allowed, whether or not such service, act or employment is done as a part of or in connection with the sale of materials, goods, wares or merchandise. Included in such term shall be all receipts, cash, credits and property of any kind or nature, and any amount for which credit is allowed by the seller to the purchaser without any

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deduction therefrom on account of the cost of the property sold, the cost of the materials used, labor, or service costs, interest paid or payable or losses or other expenses whatsoever.

Excluded from such term shall be cash discounts allowed and taken on sales, any tax required by law to be included in, or added to, the purchase price and collected from the consumer or purchaser, and such part of the sale price of property returned by purchasers upon rescission of the contract of sale as is refunded either in cash or by credit.

Home occupation has the same meanings as it does in the zoning ordinance.

Manufacturing means manufacturing or processing any goods, wares, merchandise, articles, or commodities.

Jobbing business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in job lots to wholesale merchants for resale at wholesale to the trade by such wholesale merchants.

<u>Jobber</u> means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in job lots to wholesale merchants for resale at wholesale to the trade by such wholesale merchants.

Professional means any professional services, as that term is ordinarily and commonly used and understood, where individuals are engaged in the business of offering to the public professional or semiprofessional services for compensation, and shall include those professions generally requiring governmental certification or a professional degree, including but not limited to, the services rendered by a person engaged in the practice or profession of law, medicine, surgery, dentistry, ophthalmology, optometry, chiropractic medicine, osteopathy, chiropody, dentistry, laboratory technology, physical therapy, mortician services, psychology, psychotherapy, counseling, speech therapy, veterinary services, financial planning, investment advising, real estate sales, management, or development, engineering, surveying, geology, appraising, architecture, accounting, income tax preparation or consulting, bookkeeping.

Quarter means a period of three (3) calendar months. The quarters begin on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year. The quarter shall include fractions thereof.

<u>Rental Commercial & Residential means any business that leases, rents, or provides use of real property to another individual or entity for compensation.</u>

Restaurant means an establishment where meals, prepared foods, and/or beverages are served to customers.

Real estate broker means the managing broker and/or partner of any real estate office.

Retail business-means any business conducted for the purpose of selling, or offering to sell, any goods, wares or merchandise, other than as a part of a wholesale business and jobbing business.

Services means any services in which an individual or individuals are engaged in the business of offering to the public services for compensation, including but not limited to, hair salons, nail salons, gardening services, and any other service not specifically included in another definition including e-commerce.

Tax and license-collector is the Finance Director or designee.

Vehicle means any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public street or highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

Wholesale means the sale of goods, wares, or merchandise for the purpose of resale in the regular course of business.

Wholesale business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in wholesale lots to retail merchants for resale at retail to the trade by such retail merchants.

Sec. 14.10.030. Certain businesses exempt from certain requirements of chapter.

- (a) Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed or construed to apply to any of the following:
 - (1) Any person transacting and carrying on any business exempt by virtue of the constitution or applicable statutes of the United States or of the State.
 - (2) Any institution or organization which is conducted, managed, or carried on wholly for the benefit of charitable purposes or from which profit is not derived either directly or indirectly by any person.
 - (3) The conducting of any entertainment, concert, exhibition, or lecture on scientific, historical, literary, religious or moral subjects within the Town whenever the receipts of any such entertainment, concert, exhibition, or lecture is to be appropriated to any church or school or veteran association, or to any religious or benevolent purpose.
 - (4) The conducting of any entertainment, dance, concert, exhibition, or lecture by any religious, charitable, fraternal, educational, military, State, county, or municipal organization or association whenever the receipts of any such entertainment, dance, concert, exhibition, or lecture are to be appropriated for the purpose and objects for which such organization or association was formed, and from which profit is not derived either directly or indirectly by any person.
 - (5) Charitable nonprofit corporations recognized by the Franchise Tax Board and granted California tax exemptions as such, attributable to business activities conducted in the course of and in conjunction with community-wide events when the event has specific approval of the Town Council, or is permitted under the special event permit process, and when the proceeds of the business activity are entirely devoted to the purposes of the organization.
- (b) Every person commencing, transacting and carrying on in the Town any business in a home, whose annual gross receipts from such business are two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) or less, shall be exempted from the payment of a license tax under this chapter, but shall be required to obtain and display a license and shall pay a license fee of twenty dollars (\$20.00). Where the annual gross receipts from such business exceeds two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500.00) the license tax as imposed in this chapter shall apply.

- (<u>be</u>) No public utility making franchise payments to the Town shall be subject to the provisions of this chapter.
- (cd) Any person claiming an exemption pursuant to this section shall file a verified statement with the Tax and License Collector stating the facts upon which such exemption is claimed, and shall furnish such other information and documentary evidence as the Tax and License Collector may require in connection with such claim for exemption.
- (de) The Tax and License Collector, upon a proper showing contained in the verified statement, and upon receipt of other information and documentary evidence required in connection with such claim for exemption, shall issue a license to such person claiming exemption under this section without payment to the Town of the license tax required by this chapter.
- (ef) The Town Council may revoke any license granted pursuant to the provisions of this section upon information that the licensee is not entitled to the exemption as provided in this section.
- (fg) Nothing in this section shall be deemed to exempt any organization or association from complying with any other provisions of this Code or any other ordinance of the Town requiring a permit from the Town Council or any Commission or officer of the Town to conduct, manage, or carry on any profession, trade, calling or occupation.

Sec. 14.10.040. Statements required—Upon application for original <u>business</u> license.

- (a) Upon a person making application for the first <u>business</u> license under this chapter, or for a newly established business, in all cases where the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid is based upon gross receipts or is graduated according to some other sliding scale, such person shall furnish to the Tax and License Collector, for guidance in ascertaining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant, a written statement upon a form provided by the Tax and License Collector, signed and certified under penalty of perjury to be true and correct.
- (b) If the amount of the license tax to be paid by the applicant is based upon the amount of gross receipts, tThe applicant shall estimate the amount of gross receipts for the period to be covered by the business license for the purpose of determining the licensing bracket which will be applicable for the period to be covered by the license to be issued. Such estimate, if accepted by the Tax and License Collector as reasonable, shall be used in determining the amount of license tax to be paid by the applicant. The tax so determined shall be tentative only and such person shall, by not later than <u>January 31st</u> May fifteenth next-following the period for which the license was issued, furnish the Tax and License Collector with a certified or sworn statement upon a form furnished by the Tax Collector, containing the data required to show the licensing bracket properly applicable to such person during the period of such business license, and the business license tax for such period shall be finally ascertained and paid in the manner provided in this chapter, after deducting from the payment found to be due the amount paid at the time such first business license was issued. The Tax and License Collector shall not issue to any such person another license for the same or any other business until such person shall have furnished the written statement and paid the business license tax as required in this chapter.

(c) If the amount of the license tax to be paid by the applicant is graduated according to some sliding scale other than gross receipts, the applicant shall furnish to the Tax and License Collector for guidance in ascertaining the amount of license tax to be paid, a certified or sworn statement upon a form provided by the Tax and License Collector setting forth such information as may be therein required and as may be necessary properly to determine the amount of license tax to be paid by the applicant and which statement shall show, among other things, the number of vehicles or tonnage thereof or the number of seats, chairs, rooms, tables or other units used or involved in such person's business as of the time of filing such application. Such person shall thereupon pay the required license tax in advance, computed in accordance with the information contained in such statement.

A <u>business</u> license issued under this chapter shall expire at the end of the <u>term year</u> for which the license or renewal is issued unless the license is renewed for an additional period.

All licenses under this chapter shall be kept and posted in the following manner:

- (2) Any licensee transacting and carrying on business, but not operating at a fixed place of business in the Town, shall keep the license in possession at all times while transacting and carrying on such business, or if issued for taxicabs or trucking firms under section 14.20.115, then the license shall be displayed prominently in the vehicle.

ARTICLE II. LICENSES

DIVISION 2. SCHEDULES

Sec. 14.20.110. Gross receipts tax.

Every person doing business in the Town, except a person whose business is taxed under the terms of section 14.20.115, shall pay an annual <u>business</u> license tax based on the gross receipts of the business. The tax is levied <u>based upon gross receipts at the following rates and in the following classifications: according to one (1) or both of the following schedules. When the business activities of one (1) person, taxable under the provisions of this section, involve both retail and manufacturing, wholesaling or jobbing transactions, the total gross income is apportioned between the two (2) schedules, according to its source.</u>

A. CLASSIFICATIONS:

1. Category 1 – General Commerce/Retail (\$0.50 per thousand of gross receipts above \$25,000, plus \$25.00 minimum tax rate)

This category includes retail, wholesale, manufacturing, and restaurant businesses.

- 2. Category 2 Services (\$1.00 per thousand of gross receipts above \$25,000, plus \$25.00 minimum tax rate)
- 3. Category 3 Contractor (\$1.00 per thousand of gross receipts above \$25,000, plus \$25.00 minimum tax rate)
- <u>4. Category 4 Professional (\$2.00 per thousand of gross receipts above \$25,000, plus \$25.00 minimum tax rate)</u>
- 5. Category 5 Rental Commercial/Residential (\$2.00 per thousand of gross receipts above \$25,000, plus \$25.00 minimum tax rate):
- B. In any case where a licensee or an applicant for a license believes that his or her individual business is not assigned to the proper classification under this section because of circumstances peculiar to it, as distinguished from other businesses of the same kind, he or she may apply to the Tax Collector for reclassification. Such application shall contain such information as the Tax Collector may deem necessary and require in order to determine whether the applicant's individual business is properly classified. The Tax Collector shall then conduct an investigation following which he or she shall assign the applicant's individual business to the classification shown to be proper on the basis of such investigation. The proper classification is that classification which, in the opinion of the Tax Collector, most nearly fits the applicant's individual business. The reclassification shall not be retroactive but shall apply at the time of the next regularly ensuing calculation of the applicant's tax. No business shall be classified more than once in one year.
- C. The Tax Collector shall notify the applicant of the action taken on the application for reclassification. Such notice shall be given by serving it personally or by mail to the applicants last known address.

 - (1) An assessment pursuant to the parking and business improvement area district ordinance has been levied on the business by the Town for the license year; and
 - (2) The business has paid its parking and business improvement area district assessment for the prior year.
- (b) Each person doing any of the kinds of businesses identified as "Contractor," "Hospitals, rest homes, and the like," "Professional and semiprofessional occupations," "Service occupations," and "Trucking" in section 14.20.115 shall receive a credit equal to fifty (50) percent of the annual business license tax.
- (c) Every person doing any other kind of business shall receive a credit equal to thirty three and a third (331/3) percent of the annual business license tax.

Sec. 14.20.125. Exemption for contractors to the town.

Any business whose income from business in the Town is not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) during any calendar year and is derived solely from contracts with the Town is exempt from payment of the business license taxes set forth in this article for that calendar year. (Ord. No. 1983, § II, 7-5-94)

Section 2. Severability. Should any provision of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable, or otherwise void, that determination shall have no effect on any other provision of this Ordinance or the application of this Ordinance to any other person or circumstance and, to that end, the provisions hereof are severable. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the electorate that they would have adopted this Ordinance had such unconstitutional, illegal, or invalid provision, sentence, clause section, or part thereof not been included herein.

Section 3. California Environmental Quality Act. This Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code section 21000 et seq., under, including without limitation, Public Resources Code section 21065, and CEQA Guidelines sections 15378(b)(4) and 15061(b)(3), as it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity authorized herein may have a significant effect on the environment.

<u>Section 4. Council Implementation.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos shall adopt any and all laws it deems necessary to implement this Ordinance.

<u>Section 5. Council Amendments.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos is authorized to amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code in any manner that does not increase the rate of any tax or otherwise constitutes a tax increase for which voter approval is required by Article XIII C of the California Constitution, including adopting exemptions, waivers, or reductions of the tax.

Section 6. Administrative Regulations and Delegation. The Town Manager is authorized to adopt rules and regulations consistent with this measure as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code and to develop all related forms and other materials and to take any other steps as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 and to make such interpretations of this measure and Chapter 14 as the Town Manager may consider necessary to achieve the purposes of this measure and Chapter 14. The Town Manager may delegate any authority within their discretion pursuant to this measure as they deem reasonably necessary.

<u>Section 7. Liberal Construction.</u> This Ordinance shall be liberally construed to effectuate its purposes.

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Resolution of the Council of the Town of Los Gatos Calling a Municipal Election for November 8, 2022, Requesting that the County Consolidate the Municipal Election with the General Election on November 8, 2022 and Submitting to the Qualified Electors of the Town at the November 8, 2022 Consolidated General Election a Measure to Amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code

RECITALS

- A. WHEREAS, the Town's business license tax ordinance was adopted in 1968 and the amount of the tax has not increased since 1991.
- B. WHEREAS, the current business license tax is regressive in that smaller businesses pay a higher effective tax rate than larger businesses.
- C. WHEREAS, the Town Council desires to adjust the business license tax to both increase revenue to fund critical Town needs.
- D. WHEREAS, a proposed ordinance attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Attachment "A" ("the Ordinance") would amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code to revise the license tax on businesses operating in the Town of Los Gatos.
- E. WHEREAS, a statewide general election is scheduled for November 8, 2022. The Town Council wishes to call a municipal election for the Town to be held on November 8, 2022 and to request the County of Santa Clara to consolidate the municipal election with the statewide general election.

The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos now resolves as follows:

- <u>Section 1. Findings.</u> The Town Council finds and determines that each of the findings set forth above are true and correct.
- <u>Section 2. Calling the Election.</u> The Council calls for a municipal election to be held on November 8, 2022 ("the Election").
- Section 3. Measure. Pursuant to Government Code Section 53724 and Elections Code Section 9222, the Town Council hereby submits the Ordinance attached hereto as Attachment A to the voters at the Election and orders the following question to be submitted to the voters at the Election:

Shall the measure to fund critical Town needs such as public safety by amending the gross receipts tax schedule for E-Commerce, Manufacturing, Wholesaling, and Jobbing for businesses with gross receipts above \$12,000,000 from \$75	YES	
per each \$550,000 in excess of \$12.0 million to \$300 per each \$550,000 in excess of \$12.0 million, raising about \$1.0 million yearly for general fund purposes until ended by voters, and increasing equity, be adopted?	NO	

This question requires the approval of a majority of those casting votes.

<u>Section 4. Notice of Election.</u> Notice of the time and place of holding the election is hereby given, and the Town Clerk is authorized, instructed, and directed to give further or additional notice of the election, in time, form, and manner as required by law.

Section 5. Impartial Analysis. Pursuant to California Elections Code Section 9280, the Town Council hereby directs the Town Clerk to transmit a copy of the measure to the Town Attorney. The Town Attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the measure, not to exceed 500 words in length, showing the effect of the measure on the existing law and the operation of the measure, and transmit such impartial analysis to the Town Clerk on or before 4:00 p.m. on August 19, 2022.

In the event the entire text of the Measure is not printed on the ballot, nor in the voter information portion of the sample ballot, there shall be printed immediately below the impartial analysis, in no less than 10-font bold type, the following: "The above statement is an impartial analysis of Ordinance or Measure __. If you desire a copy of the ordinance or measure, please call the Town Clerk at 408-354-6888 and a copy will be emailed at no cost to you."

Section 6. Ballot Arguments. Pursuant to Elections Code Section 9286 et. seq., August 12, 2022, at 4:00 p.m. shall be the deadline for submission of arguments in favor of, and arguments against, this measure. Arguments in favor or against the measure shall not exceed 300 words in length. The Mayor, or his designee(s), is hereby authorized to prepare a written argument in favor of the proposed measure on behalf of the Town Council. At the Mayor's discretion, the Argument may also be signed by bona fide associations or by individual voters who are eligible to vote in the Town of Los Gatos. Each argument shall be signed, filed with the Town Clerk, and include the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting the argument. If more than one argument for or against is received, the priorities established by Elections Code Section 9287 shall control.

Section 7. Rebuttal Arguments. Subdivision (a) of section 9285 of the Elections Code shall apply to the Election and shall control the submission of any rebuttal arguments for this measure. If an argument in favor and an argument against the measure have been selected to be printed in the voter information guide, the Clerk shall send a copy of the argument in favor of the measure to the authors of the argument against the measure and a copy of an argument against the measure to the authors of the argument in favor of the measure. The rebuttal authors or

persons designated by them may prepare and submit rebuttal arguments not to exceed 250 words in length. Rebuttal arguments must be submitted not later than August 19, 2022, by 4:00 p.m.

<u>Section 8. Consolidation Request.</u> The Council of the Town of Los Gatos requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County consolidate the municipal election and the election on this measure with the November 8, 2022 statewide general election. The Council further requests that the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County include on the ballots and sample ballots, all qualified measures submitted by the Town Council to be submitted to the qualified electors of the Town of Los Gatos. The Council acknowledges that the election will be held and conducted according to procedures in the Elections Code, including Section 10418.

Section 9. Request for County Services. Pursuant to Section 10002 of the California Elections Code, the Council of the Town of Los Gatos hereby requests the Board of Supervisors of Santa Clara County to permit the Registrar of Voters to render services to the Town of Los Gatos relating to the conduct of the Town's Municipal and Special Elections which are called to be held on Tuesday, November 8, 2022. The services shall be of the type normally performed by the Registrar of Voters in assisting the clerks of municipalities in the conduct of elections including, but not limited to, checking registrations, mailing ballots, hiring election officers, and arranging for polling places, receiving absentee voter ballot applications, mailing and receiving absent voter ballots, and opening and counting ballots, providing and distributing election supplies, and furnishing voting machines.

<u>Section 10. Transmittal of Resolution.</u> The Town Clerk is hereby directed to submit forthwith an original copy of this resolution including the measure attached hereto as Attachment "A" to the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors and a certified copy to the Registrar of Voters.

Section 11. Placement on the Ballot.

The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to take all steps necessary to place the measure on the ballot and the full text of the Measure shall not be printed in the voter pamphlet. 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Ordinance of the Town of Los Gatos Amending Chapter 14 of the Town Code

The People of the Town of Los Gatos ordain as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code is hereby amended by adding, deleting, and modifying provisions as set forth in this section below. Additions are indicated by underscoring and deletions are indicated by strike through type. Portions of the Chapter not included in this Ordinance or not shown in underscoring or strike-through type are not changed.

Chapter 14 LICENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS REGULATIONS

ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL

Sec. 14.10.010. Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them by this section:

Business means professions, trades and occupations and every kind of calling carried on for profit or livelihood, including the business of renting or leasing apartments.

 $\underline{\textit{E-commerce}}$ means commercial transactions conducted electronically on the internet.

Fixed place of business means the premises occupied for the particular purpose of conducting the business thereat, and regularly kept open for that purpose, with a competent person in attendance for the purpose of attending to such business. Included in such term is the premises rented or leased by persons owning apartments located in the Town.

Gross receipts means the total amount of the sale price of all sales and the total amount charged or received for the performance of any act, service or employment of whatever nature it may be, for which a charge is made or credit allowed, whether or not such service, act or employment is done as a part of or in connection with the sale of materials, goods, wares or merchandise. Included in such term shall be all receipts, cash, credits and property of any kind or nature, and any amount for which credit is allowed by the seller to the purchaser without any deduction therefrom on account of the cost of the property sold, the cost of the materials used, labor, or service costs, interest paid or payable or losses or other expenses whatsoever.

Excluded from such term shall be cash discounts allowed and taken on sales, any tax required by law to be included in, or added to, the purchase price and collected from the consumer or purchaser, and such part of the sale price of property returned by purchasers upon rescission of the contract of sale as is refunded either in cash or by credit.

Home occupation has the same meanings as it does in the zoning ordinance.

Jobbing business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in job lots to wholesale merchants for resale at wholesale to the trade by such wholesale merchants.

Quarter means a period of three (3) calendar months. The quarters begin on the first day of January, April, July and October of each year. The quarter shall include fractions thereof.

Real estate broker means the managing broker and/or partner of any real estate office.

Retail business means any business conducted for the purpose of selling, or offering to sell, any goods, wares or merchandise, other than as a part of a wholesale business and jobbing business.

Tax and license collector is the Finance Director.

Vehicle means any device in, upon or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public street or highway, except devices moved by human power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks.

Wholesale business means any business conducted solely for the purpose of selling goods, wares or merchandise in wholesale lots to retail merchants for resale at retail to the trade by such retail merchants.

Sec. 14.10.040. Statements required—Upon application for original business license.

- (a) Upon a person making application for the first <u>business</u> license under this chapter, or for a newly established business, in all cases where the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid is based upon gross receipts or is graduated according to some other sliding scale, such person shall furnish to the Tax and License Collector, for guidance in ascertaining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant, a written statement upon a form provided by the Tax and License Collector, signed and certified under penalty of perjury to be true and correct.
- (b) If the amount of the <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant is based upon the amount of gross receipts, the applicant shall estimate the amount of gross receipts for the period to be covered by the <u>business</u> license for the purpose of determining the licensing bracket which will be applicable for the period to be covered by the license to be issued. Such estimate, if accepted by the Tax and License Collector as reasonable, shall be used in determining the amount of <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant. The tax so determined shall be tentative only and such person shall, by not later than <u>January 31st May fifteenth next</u> following the period for which the license was issued, furnish the Tax and <u>License Collector</u> with a certified or sworn statement upon a form furnished by the <u>Tax</u> Collector, containing the data required to show the licensing bracket properly applicable to such person during the period of such <u>business</u> license, and the <u>business</u> license tax for such period shall be finally ascertained and paid in the manner provided in this chapter, after

- deducting from the payment found to be due the amount paid at the time such first <u>business</u> license was issued. The Tax and License Collector shall not issue to any such person another license for the same or any other business until such person shall have furnished the written statement and paid the <u>business</u> license tax as required in this chapter.
- (c) If the amount of the <u>business</u> license tax to be paid by the applicant is graduated according to some sliding scale other than gross receipts, the applicant shall furnish to the Tax and License Collector for guidance in ascertaining the amount of <u>business license tax to be paid</u>, a certified or sworn statement upon a form provided by the Tax and License Collector setting forth such information as may be therein required and as may be necessary properly to determine the amount of <u>business license tax to be paid by the applicant and which statement shall show, among other things, the number of vehicles or tonnage thereof or the number of seats, chairs, rooms, tables or other units used or involved in such person's business as of the time of filing such application. Such person shall thereupon pay the required license tax in advance, computed in accordance with the information contained in such statement.</u>

Sec. 14.10.095. Term.

A <u>business</u> license issued under this chapter shall expire at the end of the <u>term year</u> for which the license or renewal is issued unless the license is renewed for an additional period.

DIVISION 2. SCHEDULES

Sec. 14.20.110. Gross receipts tax.

Every person doing business in the Town, except a person whose business is taxed under the terms of section 14.20.115, shall pay an annual <u>business</u> license tax based on the gross receipts of the business. The tax is levied according to one (1) or both of the following schedules. When the business activities of one (1) person, taxable under the provisions of this section, involve both retail and <u>e-commerce</u>, manufacturing, wholesaling or jobbing transactions, the total gross income is apportioned between the two (2) schedules, according to its source.

The provisions of this section do not apply to commercial travelers or selling agents selling their goods to dealers, whether selling for present or future deliveries, by sample or otherwise, nor to hawkers on the street, nor peddlers from vehicles, nor to persons selling fruit, vegetables, butter, eggs, or other fruit or ranch products.

 - (1) An assessment pursuant to the parking and business improvement area district ordinance has been levied on the business by the Town for the license year; and
 - (2) The business has paid its parking and business improvement area district assessment for the prior year.
- (b) Each person doing any of the kinds of businesses identified as "Contractor," "Hospitals, rest homes, and the like," "Professional and semiprofessional occupations," "Service occupations," and "Trucking" in section 14.20.115 shall receive a credit equal to fifty (50) percent of the annual business license tax.

(c) Every person doing any other kind of business shall receive a credit equal to thirty-three and a third (331/3) percent of the annual business license tax.

Sec. 14.20.125. Exemption for contractors to the town.

Any business whose income from business in the Town is not more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) during any calendar year and is derived solely from contracts with the Town is exempt from payment of the business license taxes set forth in this article for that calendar year. (Ord. No. 1983, § II, 7-5-94)

Section 2. Severability. Should any provision of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unlawful, unenforceable, or otherwise void, that determination shall have no effect on any other provision of this Ordinance or the application of this Ordinance to any other person or circumstance and, to that end, the provisions hereof are severable. It is hereby declared to be the intention of the electorate that they would have adopted this Ordinance had such unconstitutional, illegal, or invalid provision, sentence, clause section, or part thereof not been included herein.

Section 3. California Environmental Quality Act. This Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code section 21000 et seq., under, including without limitation, Public Resources Code section 21065, and CEQA Guidelines sections 15378(b)(4) and 15061(b)(3), as it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity authorized herein may have a significant effect on the environment.

<u>Section 4. Council Implementation.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos shall adopt any and all laws it deems necessary to implement this Ordinance.

<u>Section 5. Council Amendments.</u> The Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos is authorized to amend Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code in any manner that does not increase the rate of any tax or otherwise constitutes a tax increase for which voter approval is required by Article XIII C of the California Constitution, including adopting exemptions, waivers, or reductions of the tax.

Section 6. Administrative Regulations and Delegation. The Town Manager is authorized to adopt rules and regulations consistent with this measure as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 of the Los Gatos Town Code and to develop all related forms and other materials and to take any other steps as needed to implement this measure and Chapter 14 and to make such interpretations of this measure and Chapter 14 as the Town Manager may consider necessary to achieve the purposes of this measure and Chapter 14. The Town Manager may delegate any authority within their discretion pursuant to this measure as they deem reasonably necessary.

<u>Section 7. Liberal Construction.</u> This Ordinance shall be liberally construed to effectuate its purposes.

REMARKS:

The following information is provided in response to questions from Council Members, additional business feedback since the posting of the staff report, and other considerations.

Can the ballot measure acknowledge the inflation of the last 30 years?

Yes, the ballot language can acknowledge the 117% inflation that has occurred in the last 30 years. This could read:

Shall the measure to fund critical Town needs such as public safety by imposing, raising about yearly for general fund purposes until	YES
ended by voters, and which have not been increased since 1991 while inflation increased 117%, be adopted?	NO

Do other municipalities have inflation adjustments built in?

Yes, the cities of Belmont, Union City, and Newport Beach have included inflation adjustments. Details of their approaches are provided on the next page.

In addition, in the event Council opts for a Model that captures only a portion of the 117% inflation factor since 1991 (Model 1 20%), or most of the 117% inflation (Model 3 reduced or Finance Commission alternative), staff would recommend an inflation adjustment be included. Staff would recommend using the Bay Area Consumer Price Index. This could be accomplished by adding the following language to any of the proposed ballot statements.

Shall the measure to fund critical Town needs such as public safety by imposing, raising about yearly for general fund purposes until	YES
ended by voters, and which have not been increased since 1991, and adjusted annually for inflation, be adopted?	NO

Belmont

Sec. 12-28. - Annual adjustment.

The above referenced schedule of fees, including but not limited to the per employee fees, minimum tax, and license fees shall be adjusted annually pursuant to the Bay Area Consumer Price Index (BACPI) over the previous calendar year. The first such adjustment shall occur on July 1, 1991, based upon the 1990 calendar year BACPI.

Union City

5.08.100 Annual adjustment.

Annual adjustment shall be based on the Consumer Price Index. The rate of the license payable for the license period beginning January 1, 1984, and each year thereafter, shall be adjusted as follows: The Consumer Price Index published as of June 30, 1967, by the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics for San Francisco, California area shall be used as the base year. The Consumer Price Index used for the computation for the succeeding year shall be the preceding June to June, all urban index, San Francisco/Oakland Index rounded off to the nearest full percentage point. Increase shall be sixty-five percent of the CPI and the increase shall be no less than three percent, nor more than ten percent of the increase in CPI for all categories not currently taxed at gross receipts or gross payroll.

Newport Beach

5.08.022 Business Tax—Commercially Based Businesses.

Every commercially based business as defined by this chapter shall pay an annual business tax as established by resolution of the City Council. The business license tax shall automatically be adjusted each year in July to reflect the percentage change, rounded to the nearest dollar, in the cost of doing business as measured by the consumer price index. The term "consumer price

index" shall mean the United States Department of Labor Bureau of Labor Statistics consumer price index, Los Angeles Anaheim-Riverside.

How would the Town's business license structure and fees compare to other municipalities?

Based on the HdL analysis and report, the Town has the 3rd highest Business License receipts of the comparators used in the report (pg. 8 of the report). The fact that the comparator jurisdictions have different tax structures (flat fee, per employee, gross receipts) is the primary driver of the difference in receipts. Since all the models under consideration raise additional revenues, Los Gatos will continue to be in the top tier of Business License receipts.

Additional Business Feedback

Staff concluded their third conversation with representatives of Netflix on August 1, 2022. During the call with Netflix, representatives shared that they understand the Town's impetus for initiating a review of the Business License program and expressed their thoughts on the three models under consideration. Netflix is neutral on Model 1, opposed to Model 2, and felt Model 3 is overly punitive as is, and if considered by Council, should be closer in line with the 117% inflation factor referenced in the staff report. Staff greatly appreciated Netflix's engagement and will be available to respond to questions on the sequence of calls.

Other Considerations

As the Town Council considers the different models, the Council is free to consider options for any of the three models. Staff is prepared to run real-time calculations if Council would like to see the effects of different tax rates for the flat fees, retailing gross receipt rates, and/or e-commerce, manufacturing, wholesaling/jobbing gross receipt rates. Staff is also preparing a resolution and associated ordinance for the Finance Commission recommendation.

If the Council votes on a measure that is a more complex variation of one or more of the models, a special meeting prior to August 12, 2022 would be needed to provide the public and the Council an opportunity to review the associated resolution and ordinance.
