for New Ordinances.

RECOMMENDATION:

Affirm and/or refine existing Strategic Priorities and determine the priorities for new ordinances.

BACKGROUND:

Every year, the Town Council considers its Strategic Priorities for the next two years. In past years, Strategic Priorities consisted of specific policy efforts that could be completed within a relatively short time frame of a few months. More recently, Strategic Priorities have evolved to address more complex issues facing the Town that may involve multifaceted approaches, such as addressing transportation and traffic (see Attachment 1).

The Council's identification of Strategic Priorities is a critical step in the budget process for the next fiscal year by determining the policy priority areas. The next step is for the Town Council to provide specific budget direction for the preparation of the Proposed Fiscal Year (FY) 2023/24 Operating and Capital Budgets (scheduled for February 21, 2023).

The goal of the session is to affirm and/or refine existing Priorities. Given the work that is underway with existing Priorities, the Town organization has no staff capacity to add new items on top of the existing ones; however, there is capacity for refinements of existing Priorities as discussed in this report. In addition, the Town has limited financial capacity to add significant new items as Town revenues continue to be impacted by the pandemic and insufficient relative to expenditures.

This report discusses the Town's staff capacity, existing Strategic Priorities, accomplishments to date, work in progress, opportunities for refinements, and a list of recommended ordinances.

DISCUSSION:

Staff Capacity

The Town of Los Gatos provides the key local government services of Public Works, Parks, Library, Police, and Community Development with the necessary support services of Information Technology, Finance, Clerk, and Human Resources. The Town Manager's Office leads and guides these administrative duties and closely collaborates with the Town Attorney's Office to support the work of the Town Council. From the Council's priority setting, the work of the Town Departments and Commissions is aligned to meet these Priorities.

As a service organization, each Department devotes approximately 90% of its staff time and other budget resources providing core services to the community. These core services contribute to the quality of life in Los Gatos and were recently affirmed through a community survey. The community is accustomed to high quality municipal services provided by talented, skilled, and caring employees. Some of these services had to evolve given the COVID-19 pandemic and in response to the changing needs of the community. In addition, Town Departments have had to absorb new work required by State mandates without adding new employees. Based on the Council's leadership, staff is also implementing community vitality and economic recovery actions to assist businesses, residents, and non-profits during these challenging times.

The remaining 10% or so of Department resources are allocated to special projects, such as Strategic Priorities. All of these services and projects are supported by the Town's Operating and Capital Improvement Budgets.

As we learned last week, the same staff who work on these initiatives are also an integral part of the Town's response in an emergency. For all of these reasons, the Town organization has no idle capacity for big, new Priorities.

Existing Strategic Priorities

Attachment 1 depicts the Ongoing 2022-2024 Priorities, organized under the major topics of Safety, Prudent Financial Management, Quality of Life, and Traffic/Transportation. Per Council direction, the depiction of the Priorities show the interconnectedness of the major topics.

<u>Accomplishments</u>. Several items were accomplished during 2022, including the reinvigoration of community policing; sale of the Venue to Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High School District; entry into the lease for the Los Gatos Theatre; the construction of the Dittos Lane Affordable Housing Development; adoption of Objective Standards for multi-family development projects; voter approved measure to modernize the Business License Tax; funding for wildfire mitigation

vegetation management; and implementation of a pilot downtown business employee parking permit program.

<u>Work in Progress</u>. There are important efforts underway in each category. For **Traffic/Transportation**, these efforts include wayfinding for downtown parking; a nexus study for an update to the Town's Traffic Impact Fee and a potential Vehicle Miles Traveled Fee; and several active transportation improvements that are in the design and/or bidding phase.

Under **Prudent Financial Management**, the Town continues to put funding aside for future pension and Other Post-Employment Benefits obligations; the Finance Commission is discussing new revenue opportunities and other ways to address the Town's fiscal challenges; and the Town is working on the potential transfer of New York Avenue and other streets to the High School District.

With respect to **Safety**, the Police Department has made great strides in many aspects of public safety as discussed at the January 17, 2023, Council meeting. In addition, the Town is continuing to manage roadway vegetation to reduce the Town's risk of wildfire and seek funding for a siren system as identified in the Ad Hoc Wildfire Mitigation Plan. Emergency preparedness activities, including Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) recruitment and training, are ongoing. The Holiday Parade and the recent storms provided an excellent opportunity for Town staff to work with CERT and our Disaster Assistance Response Team (DART) to augment our lean resources.

A variety of efforts are underway in the **Quality of Life** category. The Town Manager's Office is taking the lead in preparing a Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan as directed by Town Council, which should be finished in Summer 2023. The Senior Road Map is nearing completion by the Senior Services Committee. Economic and community vitality efforts are well underway, including the semi-permanent parklet program, the extraordinary rebounding of community events, and technical assistance to businesses seeking to locate or expand in Los Gatos. Town staff continue to enhance the variety of communication methods with the community to foster engagement in Town efforts, including but not limited to Farmers Market booths, expanded social media presence, website redesign, and pushing out information regarding community workshops, Council meetings, and other participation opportunities.

The Housing Element is scheduled for Council consideration next week with follow up work to refine the document in response to the California Department of Housing and Community Development comment letter. The Housing Element is the Town's affordable housing plan. Once the Housing Element is certified, the Town must begin to work on key implementation

programs as required by State law (e.g., rezoning the properties identified in the Sites Inventory). While the 2040 General Plan was adopted in 2022, a referendum on the Land Use and Community Design Elements necessitates further Council direction after the certification of the Housing Element. The adopted 2040 General Plan also contains a large number of Implementation Programs to be completed during 2020-2025, annually, or on an ongoing basis (Attachment 2). There are a lot of important items, including actions in the updated Environment and Sustainability Element; however, staff is not asking the Council to prioritize any of those items and add them to Strategic Priorities until the Housing Element work, including site rezonings, is complete.

The Council adopted an Ordinance to provide local rules for the implementation of Senate Bill 9 and directed additional work which is scheduled for Council consideration in February.

<u>Opportunities for Refinements</u>. The Council is welcome to refine the existing Priorities, clarify its objectives, and/or provide additional direction. For example, the Town Council may want to provide initial direction on two Town properties (224 W. Main and Pine/Calfhill Court) as part of the "sell or lease certain Town properties" under Prudent Financial Management.

List of Ordinances

A growing aspect of municipal governance is the proliferation of state mandated laws which require local ordinance development. In addition, decisions by the courts are mandating local ordinances to implement their rulings.

In coordination with all Town Departments, the Town Attorney has provided a list of potential ordinances to amend the Town Code in Attachment 3. This list is in priority order based on work already in progress, State laws, service delivery, and emerging conditions. The Council is welcome to adjust the priorities for this work.

Public Comments

Attachment 4 contains public comments received prior to 11:00 a.m. on Friday, January 20, 2023. The comments include a mix of policy, service, and budget requests.

CONCLUSION AND NEXT STEPS:

The completion of the Strategic Priorities aligns the work of the Town Departments, Boards, Commissions, and Committees. The Council's affirmation of existing Priorities and any refinements inform the Council's budget direction discussion scheduled for February 21 and the preparation of the Proposed Fiscal Year 2023/24 Operating and Capital Budgets for Council consideration in May.

Specifically, on February 21, the Town Council is scheduled to discuss the Five-Year Financial Forecast and the sensitivity of the Forecast to changes in key revenue and expenditure assumptions (i.e., alternative scenarios). As part of this discussion, the Council may direct forecast revisions. The Five-Year Forecast provides important context to the Town Council's budget direction for the preparation of the Proposed Budget.

The Finance Commission is scheduled to discuss these same financial items at its February 13th meeting, providing any comments and recommendations for Council consideration.

COORDINATION:

The preparation of this report was coordinated with all Town Departments.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The work of this session together with the Council's budget direction in February informs the preparation of the upcoming Fiscal Year 2023/24 Operating and Capital Budgets. The Priority setting session itself has no fiscal impact.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

The Council's work associated with Strategic Priorities is not a project defined under CEQA, and no further action is required.

Subject: Ordinance Priorities

The Town Attorney's Office is continually evaluating the Town Code for needed updates and provides this memorandum to assist the Town Council in its Priority Setting Session. The list is in order of recommended priority. As you know, issues may arise during the year that can alter these priorities.

1. Amendment to Town's Concealed Carry Weapons Ordinance and Adoption of "Sensitive Places" Ordinance

The Town Code includes an ordinance authorizing applications for "concealed carry weapons" permits. This ordinance needs to be updated in order to comply with a recent Supreme Court decision (New York State Rifle & Pistol Association, Inc. v. Bruen) holding that requiring "good cause" for the issuance of concealed carry weapons permits is unconstitutional. In addition, staff recommends that the Town Council consider adoption of an ordinance prohibiting the carrying of concealed weapons in "sensitive places" such as public buildings and schools.

2. Various Zoning Code Amendments to Comply with Updated Housing Element.

State law requires that General Plans and Zoning Codes be internally consistent. The Town will need to update its Zoning Code to comport with the Town's Updated Housing Element.

3. Accessory Dwelling Unit Ordinance

The Town should update its accessory dwelling unit ("ADU") ordinance to comply with recent changes to State law, which include the following:

- a. Allowance of separate conveyance of ADU under specified conditions;
- b. Reduced application review time; and
- c. Exemptions and limitations on impact fees.

4. Density Bonus Ordinance

The Town should update its density bonus ordinance to comply with recent changes to State law, which include the following:

- a. Reduced parking requirements; and
- b. Limits on impact fees charged to affordable units.

5. Lot Merger/Adjustment Ordinance

Lot Mergers occur when two or more parcels are combined into a single legal parcel. The Town's existing process to merge parcels does not comply with the State Subdivision Map Act, which preempts local ordinances, and must revised. The Planning Commission has reviewed and recommended the proposed ordinance and the proposed ordinance is scheduled for introduction at the Town Council's February 7th meeting.

6. Sign Ordinance

The Town's Sign Ordinance was adopted in 1976 and was last updated and amended in 1992. Based upon the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in Reed v. Town of Gilbert, the Town's current Sign Ordinance should be revised to remove content-based regulations. In addition, the Sign Ordinance should be updated to clarify where temporary signage (such as campaign signage) may be located.

7. Subdivision Ordinance

The Town's subdivision ordinance needs to be clarified in a number of technical respects in coordination with an update to the Town's standard specifications regarding road width and drainage.

8. E-Bike Ordinance

E-Bikes have proliferated in the Town and staff recommend adopting an ordinance addressing their use, including requiring the use of helmets, imposing speed restrictions, and restricting E-Bikes in specified areas such as trails. The Youth Commission is currently developing proposed ordinance provisions with the Police Department.

9. Wireless Facilities Ordinance

The Town's current Wireless Facilities Ordinance was adopted in 2003 to conform to the 1996 Telecommunications Act. It should be updated to comply with the ongoing changes to State and Federal legislation. AT&T is proposing installations in the public right of way. Such installations could be on existing Town-owned structures, such as streetlight poles, or could involve the companies putting in their own new poles. The amendments should include siting

and design standards to preserve the aesthetics of the Town but to also facilitate providing competitive, varied, and high-quality wireless communications service infrastructure.

10. Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance

The Town needs to amend its water efficient landscape ordinance to comply with updates to State law.

11. Parking Space Requirements Ordinance

The Town's parking space requirement should be updated. For example, staff recommended reducing the number of requested parking spots in hillside developments to reduce the need for grading.

12. Noise Ordinance

The Town's Noise Ordinance was adopted in 1991. With the changes to the Town's Entertainment Policy, the Town needs to analyze and determine whether the noise levels set forth in the Noise Ordinance adequately protect the residents of Los Gatos from unnecessary, excessive, and disturbing noise and vibration.

13. Tobacco Retailer Ordinance

The Town has partnered with the County of Santa Clara to establish a tobacco retailing program that regulates the sale of tobacco products and prohibits the sale of specified tobacco products to minors. The County has recently updated the countywide ordinance and the Town needs to update its ordinance to match County requirements in order for the County to continue enforcement in the Town.

14. Public Nuisance /Blight/Administrative Abatement Hearing Ordinance

It would be helpful to develop a comprehensive public nuisance ordinance to clearly define public nuisances and clearly set forth the Town's enforcement mechanisms. Also, the Town's Administrative Abatement of Violations section should be updated.

Honorable Mayor and Esteemed Town Council,

The Chamber of Commerce continues our efforts to keep an open dialogue with Town Council and Staff regarding certain initiatives we have identified as critical to our membership and the business community at large. We have previously discussed some of these same priorities with individual council members in November of 2021. As we head into this new post-election year, we would like to revisit that list and provide an update on our 2023 priorities. At the same time, we will reflect on some of the strides and progress we have made in the last two years. We look forward to working with the new Council and Staff in 2023, and as always offer our help and resources. We have learned we are much stronger and more efficient when we work together.

Priority #1 -2040 General Plan Land Use and Community Design Elements & HCD Housing Elements

As you are aware, a referendum was filed by the Los Gatos Community Alliance to repeal these two elements for the time being. Understandably, in order to move things along, Council voted to revert back to the 2020 GP as it related to these two elements, but that is not a solution. These elements are critical in that they provide the framework in which any new or proposed project can move forward. We need to bring new businesses to Town and we need new residents who will support our existing businesses and our workforce.

The Chamber of Commerce expects the Town Council will prioritize revision of these two elements of the General Plan as its highest priority to ensure they are in line with the vision of the citizens and business community. Revisions will also need the support of all advocacy groups including the LGCA and the Chamber of Commerce. We urge the Council to give clear direction to staff to call as many meetings, study sessions, special roundtables or whatever methods are necessary to engage with the aforementioned groups and the public to revise these elements and certify them along with the rest of the already certified General Plan.

To that end, we expect the withdrawal of the referendum by the LGCA once the public is satisfied with the revisions. Under no circumstances does the Chamber of Commerce or the business community believe it is reasonable for the referendum to remain in place and be put to a vote of the citizens in November 2024. We believe such a delay will continue to cause unnecessary wait times for potential projects which will greatly enhance and benefit our Town in multiple ways. This outcome would be an egregious demonstration of negligence by the Town, especially in light of all of the previous excessive delays the 2040 General Plan has experienced.

Acceptance of Housing Elements Plan By HCD

It goes without saying that the Council must prioritize the passage of our Housing Element – whatever it takes. Amendments to our current plan will need to be made and accepted before the end of March as we do not want to be exposed to any liability for non-compliance. Development standards will need to be determined to address concerns raised by the LGCA and others. It has come to our attention that

revisions may need to include more density in certain areas. Swift decision making, leadership and communication are crucial here.

Priority #2 - Budget

The structural budget deficit is of great concern to the Chamber of Commerce, the Business Community and to all residents. Cutting services as suggested will greatly impact the quality of life here in our Town as we know it and frankly, we cannot stand by and watch our vibrancy threatened. It is one of the goals of the Chamber to identify if funding will in fact be lost. Have we worked hard enough and collaborated enough to figure out other ways that we might save dollars or raise more? We have seen that with focus and collaboration progress happens. Over the past three years, Los Gatos has become more vibrant and is thriving. We cannot afford to lose the momentum we have built together. We need to take the necessary steps to not only maintain this momentum but look for new creative ways to find new revenue sources and truly be an innovative leader in Silicon Valley.

Priority #3 – Permit and Processing Streamlining

The Community Development and Economic Development departments made great strides in permit streamlining with policy changes made in 2018. Council Member Rennie alluded to this success in his comments at the December 13 Town Council meeting. This was a major milestone and we have seen the results with new businesses opening all over Town that have taken advantage of those updated policies. We still have a long way to go to create a healthy process and unfortunately, we feel we have lost some ground since the 13 policy changes went into effect.

At the moment, the biggest issue facing any business owner, developer, or home builder is the amount of time it takes to issue building permits for new projects. While we understand there are other agencies involved, such as SCCDEH and SCCFD, who are not necessarily under the Town's control, we still should be doing better. We need to work harder to improve the permit processing timelines. People will not pursue opening businesses to do business here if we do not remedy this situation soon. There has been some discussion previously, but we have yet to make any progress. Businesses opening translates to increased revenue, we should get them open as fast as possible!

The Chamber of Commerce requests that the Town Council prioritize conversations between Town Staff, the Chamber, business owners, and industry professionals to collaborate on new ways to get through the permitting process more quickly and efficiently. Taking 1-2 years to get a business open is unacceptable. We need to target a goal of 3-6 months.

Additionally, residents have started to engage the Chamber with their frustrations regarding their personal residential projects. This frustration affects local businesses such as architects, engineers, and contractors who are valued members of the Chamber of Commerce. We are compiling a list of some real examples of unnecessarily delayed projects that have been brought to our attention. At a macro level, it appears that the commercial and residential projects combined are overwhelming our Town staff. Town staff and the deciding bodies need to collaborate more closely and rely more on the recommendations of the licensed design professionals. There are no licensed design professionals on the deciding bodies which is causing unnecessary delays on non-critical issues. We hope we can collaborate and come up with effective ways to significantly shorten these permitting timelines. We believe we can leverage technology and create processes that will help and that we can then share those with neighboring cities. We are in the heart of Silicon Valley after all, so the resources to achieve this are certainly within reach.

Priority #4 - Destination Marketing

The Visitor and Information Center staff has worked hard to build the Visit Los Gatos brand, the destination marketing arm for Los Gatos. The social media and the destination website, in addition to the brick-and-mortar visitor and information center, are Visit Los Gatos. The money from our annual \$55k Contract for Services plus the \$55k ARPA 'one-time emergency destination marketing funds' that we received in 2021 helped us build this foundation over the past 18 months.

After successfully building the Brand with that increased funding, we have seen a direct positive impact on visitor spending ie: sales tax and TOT revenue. The Council needs to determine whether or not we want to be competitive to increase our share of the domestic travel market and potentially become a first-tier tourist destination.

If we truly want to be a shopping, dining, and tourism destination we need to come up with a strategy to achieve that together. Events programming, economic development, and destination marketing are key factors to achieving this goal. The Chamber of Commerce supports this effort and recommends that this should be one of Town Council's strategic priorities going forward. We urge Council to convene a work study session with stakeholders, Town staff, Chamber, Visit Los Gatos CA, Finance Commission, and hotel representatives to consider the direction going forward. Councilmember Hudes has suggested this type of roundtable discussion numerous times.

We are hopeful the Town Council recognizes the importance of this priority and quickly allocates time and resources. This is another area that can directly improve revenues realized by the Town.

Priority #5 – Parking Program

The Chamber of Commerce congratulates the Town Council and Staff on its initial efforts to implement the recommendations found in the Dixon Study. Although slow to start, it appears that the employee parking permit program is working well and we have received positive feedback thus far. We would like to ensure that the next steps in the program are moving forward. We assume that in the first half of 2023, you will continue to direct staff to follow the Dixon Report Roadmap. For example, we would like to see the installation of the Wayfinding Signage prior to any implementation of Pay to Stay programs. There is good evidence from other jurisdictions that it is prudent and cost effective to follow the Roadmap as it is laid out. As the aforementioned initiatives progress, we will see more shoppers, diners, and visitors come to Town. Being proactive with parking is critical to make sure they have an enjoyable experience and return.

Thank you for your consideration of the five issues that the Chamber believes are most important to the business community at this juncture. We look forward to our first Mayor-Town Manager-Chamber Meeting at which time we would like to also address a few of our secondary concerns. These include: the growing homeless crisis in Town; the fractured communication gap between the Chamber staff and the Town staff; special event collaboration for Promenades, Sounds of Summer, carriage rides, holiday parade and the reintroduction of a PBID, BID, or TID.

Mayor, Vice Mayor and Council members, this is the follow up email promised after my Public Comment at the 1/17 LG Council meeting. Our group, the St Vincent de Paul conference out of St Mary's Los Gatos would like to partner with the Council and any other group interested in designating an Overnight Warming Center (OWC) within Los Gatos during weather emergencies. In December, we identified just a few OWC's available to the homeless: Seven Trees Community Center (at capacity during the weather emergency) and Camden Community Center (almost at capacity). There were OWC's at Roosevelt Community Center and West Valley Branch Library on a referral basis. The VTA offered free rides to these OWC's.

We received calls and visits (usually after a weekday mass) from our homeless neighbors in December reporting washed out camps, destroyed tents and water soaked clothing, sleeping bags and blankets. We provided laundry vouchers via Los Gatos Laundry and as much material support as we could. In some cases we offered overnight lodging. We partner closely with St Lukes and Los Gatos United Methodist in their services to the homeless.

It was not easy or possible during the most recent severe weather days/nights for our local homeless to get to the closest OWL, Camden Community Center. When our members visited that site during the weather crisis the site was near capacity. They gave the site high marks for their efforts and services. We must have an additional space within Los Gatos that our neighbors can get to and stay overnight during a severe weather crisis that we know are becoming more frequent.

Our conference is very interested in any next steps you can propose. We are willing to partner with all interested groups and County agencies.

We are writing today to encourage you to treat NUMU | New Museum Los Gatos as an integral part of the Town of Los Gatos' strategic priorities by removing rent payments from NUMU's lease with the Town. Now more than ever, NUMU provides critical services to the Town that makes Los Gatos an incredible place to live, work, play, and learn, in addition to attracting visitors from the greater Bay Area. We are asking the Town to reduce rent for 106 E. Main Street to \$1 per year to support NUMU's ongoing responsibility to maintain and steward the Town of Los Gatos' history collection and provide arts, history, and cultural educational services to the Los Gatos community. This arrangement is in line with other museum/city partnerships in our region. By retaining the funds that NUMU obtains through donations and grants, it will allow us to recirculate them into more services and programs that ultimately serve the Town of Los Gatos with art, history, and culture.

We want to express our ongoing gratitude for forgiving our rent this past three years, which has helped us not only navigate the pandemic, but deepen our ability to serve our community. Rent forgiveness has enabled NUMU to achieve several key mission-aligned goals that directly support the Town's priorities for local history, community vitality, and inclusivity. NUMU is also a key feature of the Town Culture initiatives in the 2040 Town Plan. The 2040 General Plan for Los Gatos commits to "Enrich the Town by making visual arts, the performing arts, literary arts, and other cultural Tx amenities more accessible to the Town's residents." We have been working tirelessly on critical areas that support these goals such as the Los Gatos History Project; delivering the high-visibility *ArtNow* high school exhibition and program; and collaborating with local community partners and beyond, like the Los Gatos Library, CASSY, and LGS Recreation. The Town's rent forgiveness has been a true lifeline for all of these efforts, and is a testament for what we can achieve together.

We can continue to achieve all this and more with your increased support:

- The Los Gatos History Project makes our permanent art and history collection accessible in-person and through an online database. We display, steward, protect, and in the future, will loan our collection of art and history objects that represent Los Gatos. The staff has decades of cumulative experience in collections care and display. The collection includes unique objects and archives from Los Gatos history, including the world's most comprehensive collection representing the lives of prolific artists and life partners Frank Ingerson and George Dennison, and their home, Cathedral Oaks, a mountain destination for creatives in mid 20th century Los Gatos.
- We are hosting the exhibition, Reclamation, a partnership between the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and San Jose
 State University, featuring Los Gatos and Bay Area places of significance to the Tribe. It amplifies the Muwekma
 Ohlone Tribal Council's efforts to gain visibility and federal recognition.
- The ArtNow high school exhibition program creates visibility for Los Gatos with high schools county-wide, and attracts a large audience to the Museum and the Town. The program features teen artists from Los Gatos and across the county, and provides scholarships for award winners.

- We completed a Packard Foundation-funded, year-long diversity, equity, accessibility, and inclusion (DEAI) strategic planning process that will help us shape our exhibitions and programs, educate our audience about the untold histories of Los Gatos, and help us build alignment with Town DEAI initiatives.
- NUMU collaborates with local community partners like the Los Gatos Library, LGS Recreation, the Chamber of Commerce, Los Gatos Art Association, CASSY, and Mosaic America to implement programs and exhibitions that provide a platform for underrepresented artists and communities. We run the Footbridge summer camp program in partnership with LGS Recreation to enhance the Town and involve students in local history.

As we are all learning, NUMU, like other arts and culture organizations, will not fully recover by July 2023; in fact, full recovery will take years. Starting rent payments in July 2023 will paralyze our ability to become a truly world-class destination for art and culture in the Bay Area. There is no better time to re-imagine the Town's relationship with its community museum. NUMU is in the Town's 2040 Plan both as a steward of the collection and a center for arts and culture. These proposed lease amendments not only ensure that the museum will exist in 2040, but will be able to thrive for decades to come. Nominal rent would be in line with virtually every museum in our area (see appendix), and signal to the region that Los Gatos values inclusivity, community, and culture. Please vote to reduce rent for 106 E. Main Street to \$1 per year to support NUMU's critical role in maintaining-and expanding-the Town's cultural footprint, moving toward a deep and permanent partnership.

NUMU's relationship with the Town of Los Gatos is vital to us and our ongoing ability to serve our community. Thank you from all of us for your continued support.

Hello Laurel,

In preparation for the Town Council's priority setting meeting on January 24th, I'm reaching out on behalf of the LGS Recreation (the "Agency") and our Board of Directors to reaffirm the permanent lease abatement proposal of April 2022 (attached). As the 2022 proposal outlined, the Agency is seeking a partnership in which the Town provides permanent lease abatement, and the Agency provides the staffing, financial management, programs and services. The arrangement is one in which Town leadership has a stake in the Agency and position of authority and governance.

As background, in 2009 the Agency entered into an agreement to lease the ARC facility. The agreement obligates the Agency to provide certain 55+ programs and services. It costs the Agency \$750K per year to pay the leases on Town-owned ARC and YRC facilities (\$250K) and support the 55+ programs (\$500K).

In the past, The Agency used the profits from other program areas such as childcare and youth sports to offset lease and 55+ expenses; this is no longer feasible and will not be supported by our Board. Additionally, School District partners have made concessions to their facilities fee structure that serves as an Agency subsidy. District partners are focused on youth and are unwilling to have their concessions used to pay for leases and the senior programming.

The 2023 Agency budget forecasts \$7.8M in revenue and will break-even; it does not include resuming lease payments to the Town. After the temporary lease abatement ends June 2023, any future payments will be treated as a variance and prompt difficult decisions. Without permanent lease abatement, the Agency will be forced to evaluate use of the Town facilities and the associated staffing and financial obligation to provide core 55+ services.

We share the vision of creating a community where older adults are engaged, have a sense of belonging and have inclusive opportunities to thrive. Benchmarking by the Town's Senior Services Committee has demonstrated all State-wide 55+ programs are a combination of free, low cost and subsidized programs as a cost-recovery effort of up to 30-40%.

The 55+ programs associated with the lease are specifically aligned with Town Council 2022 – 2024 community vitality strategic priorities:

- · Diversity, equity and inclusion efforts
- Creating community where older adults thrive
- Special events
- Community engagement

The Agency also serves as the Town's de facto recreation department, serving 31.6K customers in 2022 with programming for all ages. No other recreation departments in the State pay a lease for the use of space to serve their community. Philosophically it does not make sense for the Town to charge rent to the Agency. By retaining our revenue, we are in a stronger position to create new programs that provide even greater value to the community. Town government is not able to efficiently use these funds to offer something of greater value. Diverting our revenue to lease payments makes an immaterial difference to the Town's budget and compromises the Agency ability to reinvest revenue.

Recreation is an anchor institution and a social driver of enrichment and connection; we add to the Town's unique identity, community vitality and sense of belonging. Our only mission is to curate specialty programs and services that are unduplicated in the surrounding area.

We recognize this is a defining moment for the Town and budget tradeoffs must be made. Decisions made now will affect the community for generations to come. Partnership between the Town and LGS Recreation is essential to supporting strategic priorities and over 31K customers.

Hello Laurel,

On behalf of the LGS Recreation Board of Directors and the Agency, I want to thank the Town of Los Gatos for the lease concessions provided to the Agency during the more restrictive COVID shelter-in-place. The concessions enabled the Agency to conserve cash and continue to fund operations. It is our understanding the full lease expense is expected to resume effective July 2022. This proposal will demonstrate that the Agency's fundamental business model has changed and we're seeking support to continue operating in the community. I'm writing to request the Town become a stakeholder with the Agency and consider a permanent lease abatement for the use of the Adult Recreation Center (ARC) and Youth Recreation Center (YRC) buildings. Background has been provided to support the request along with a scenario for consideration.

Background

In 1956 the Agency was formed as a Joint Powers Authority by the three Los Gatos and Saratoga School Districts to serve an unmet need in the community. The Agency has been serving as Los Gatos' de facto Recreation Department and Adult and Senior Services resource center for 66 years. The Agency leases the ARC and YRC buildings from the Town and is required to provide certain Senior Services as governed by the ARC lease. The cost to the Agency to provide those services is approximately \$500K / year. The Agency is the only Recreation Department in the State of California that must pay for use of space to conduct programs, including buildings and parks. The Agency is also the only Recreation Department that does not receive subsidy for the cost of Senior Services. As a basis of comparison, all other California Recreation Departments are tucked under a Town or City with a 60-70% cost recovery model and free use of building and park space. (Note: The focus of this proposal is lease abatement, not subsidy. Benchmarking and gap-analysis of Senior Services is expected to be complete by summer 2022).

The ARC lease (in effect until 2029) is expected to resume at \$18,249 / month. The YRC lease (month-to-month) is expected to resume at \$2539 / month. In total, the Town will receive \$250K in lease payments, \$20K in park use fees and approximately \$500K in services per year. The \$770K in annual payments and services is no longer sustainable and will result in a more rapid depletion of cash reserves, accelerating the timeline to close the Agency. Most importantly, the current arrangement of lease and service obligations does not align with a more traditional philosophy of Recreation and Senior Services as a community asset that is worth supporting. In effect, the value of recreation programming to the Los Gatos community is greater than the incremental revenue from the building leases.

Economic Model

The Agency was the only Recreation Department in Northern California to continue operating in a virtual manner throughout the pandemic. In 2021 we served 25,070 Los Gatos community members (counting Los Gatos participants not households; excluding Aquatics, Vasona Boating and Clubhouse Childcare). However, several developments compromise our long-term economic model and jeopardize our financial sustainability:

- The Agency's 2022 Budget and 3-year Pro Forma Forecast (attached) reflects nearly \$1M in losses each year (2022 \$655K loss offset by the current \$328.5K ARPA grant for Senior Services).
- Operations have been funded by cash reserves since March 2020. The Agency Available Cash
 Balance Forecast (attached) demonstrates cash reserves will be depleted by 2023 year-end
 (PERS unfunded pension liabilities and some contracts require setting aside the remaining fund
 balance).
- The pandemic posed an impediment to in-person programming. Although we're experiencing growth in some program areas, building utilizing is 43% of normal and total revenue is down by 30%.
- The Agency's more profitable Clubhouse revenue used to offset less profitable program areas; this is no longer the case. Parents have found ways to work remotely and no longer need traditional aftercare tuition plans.
- Leases for 5 out of 9 Clubhouse site have reverted to SUSD and Union School Districts to conduct childcare; Only 4 Clubhouse childcare sites remain under the Agency.

The Agency has pivoted over the last two years to adjust to the hardships. The following illustrates the sacrifices made to continue the business:

- Rolled back Leadership Team salaries 20%.
- o Full or partial furlough of Staff.
- Operating with 30% fewer Staff in 2022 than pre-pandemic levels; All remaining Staff have taken on additional duties.
- Increased all program prices effective January 2022; testing limits of customer price elasticity.

Regrettably, these steps are insufficient to forestall either greatly reducing our presence in the Los Gatos community or closing our doors entirely.

In addition, JPA District partners are willing to aid the effort as stakeholders of community recreation and are developing a Facilities Master Plan with concessions to the facilities cost of conducting programs on their campuses. As an interim solution, each District has made a commitment to extend a one-time \$95K facilities credit to shore up Agency cash reserves, a total of \$285K. This credit is likely to be used within the next 12-18 months. However, the Districts have made it clear they will not subsidize what they view should be Town support for community recreation.

Proposal

The Agency proposes an arrangement whereby the Town of the Los Gatos becomes a partner of the JPA to re-imagine recreation in the community and come together with the JPA District stakeholders and City of Saratoga as a coordinated effort. Under this scenario, the Town of Los Gatos would become a JPA member with a leadership role in the governance and direction of the Agency, our programs, and use of facilities. The goal is to create a single solution to provide robust 'cradle to grave' community programs under the Recreation Department. The proposal is what is required to remain in business and continue to serve over 25K+ participants annually in Los Gatos. The JPA Agreement (attached) outlines the current arrangement.

Scenario

The Agency Scenarios (attached) reflects the programs and services that will cease without lease concessions. The model reflects significant Staff layoffs which will cease programming in Los Gatos. What remains is Aquatics, Vasona Boating and the 4 Clubhouse sites. Minimal remaining Staff would be consolidated to support the 5-year agreement to provide recreation services for the City of Saratoga. It would result in 2022 projected revenue going from \$6.5M to \$3.1M and prevent us from serving the Los Gatos community.

Under this scenario, the Agency Board has discussed the option of ceasing the use of the ARC and reexamining the month-to-month lease terms at the YRC in an effort to have some presence in Los Gatos. However, all ARC Staff would be displaced under this scenario and it would prompt a layoff of all Staff assigned to 55+ and Senior Services.

Timing

The Agency Board requires the Leadership Team to re-plan the 2022 budget from July to December once there is more clarity about facilities use agreements with the Districts and Town. The anticipated timing for this effort is in early July for review at either a July Special Board Meeting or no later than the August 25th Regular Board meeting.

Lease Conditions

A discussion about the ARC agreement leads to an opportunity to change the list of services governed by the lease. Please see the Senior Services Scope of Work (attached) for a current list of programs. We recommend modifying the current agreement to reflect the following list of direct services in order to remain flexible to community need and still observe the spirit of the agreement.

Direct Services:

Game Day (weekly)

Exercise Class or Group (weekly)

Social Discussion Group (weekly)

Newsletter (monthly)

Themed Event or Entertainment (quarterly)

Thanksgiving Lunch (annual)

Summer Picnic (annual)

Management and recruitment of indirect service providers or guest speakers (ongoing)

Management and recruitment of program facilitators and volunteers (ongoing)

Dedicated office hours and phone line for program information + referrals to other resources (ongoing)

This proposal to the Town comes at a defining time for the Agency; we are challenged with financial hardship and risk of closure. Although a departure from past practice, financially supporting the Recreation Department that serves the community is an expectation and priority of other Towns / Cities in California. The Leadership Team and I have been and will continue to be strongly committed to the Agency's success and would embrace the opportunity to serve alongside the Town of Los Gatos. We are available to meet with Town Leadership and the Town Council for further discussion. Please let us know if you have questions or feedback on the proposal.

Los Gatos-Saratoga Recreation, and specifically the 55 Plus Program, greatly appreciate the ARPA grant opportunity and support of the Town of Los Gatos Council, the Community Health and Senior Services Commission (CHSSC), and the Senior Services Committee (SSC). The commitment of resources in 2022 aided our efforts in restoring pre-pandemic services and further demonstrated what can be achieved through partnership. We share the vision, guided by the CHSSC and SSC analysis and recommendations, of creating a vibrant community where older adults are engaged, have a sense of belonging, and have inclusive opportunities to thrive.

We offer a proposal in support of a Town/LGS Recreation partnership, in which the demonstrated success of the 55 Plus and ARPA funded programs over the last 15 months will continue. In good faith, staff and programming levels were increased to support the ARPA grant effort and it is our goal to avoid difficult facility, staffing, and program decisions based on the currently fiscally unsustainable model.

The full burden of the cost to operate the 55 Plus Program at current service levels is now on the Agency. We are committed to operate at the current staffing and programming level until it becomes clear if Town Council prioritizes the 55 Plus effort and identifies sources of partnership and support. The Agency is unable to absorb the forecasted loss of ~\$457k in 2023, which considers minimal 2023 revenue via membership fees and additional grants. The fully burdened cost to operate at the current level is \$501k. By mid-year 2023 in the new Council budget cycle, decisions must be made by the Agency about the sustainability of the effort including use of facilities, staffing and program levels.

The attached proposal has been carefully crafted to consider staffing levels, the SSC survey results, and their proposed 1, 3, and 10-year roadmap. This proposal does not easily lend itself to mixing items or services as staff FTEs are tied to the overall program levels, not individual activities. We are in a unique position to support and implement many of the projects outlined as priorities in the SSC roadmap.

Most Towns and Cities recognize it's the expectation of the community to have recreation, enrichment and 55+ programs. Benchmarking by the Town's Senior Committee has demonstrated all State-wide 55+ programs are a combination of free, low-cost and subsidized programs as a cost-recovery effort of up to 30-40%. No other recreation departments in the State pay a lease for the use of

space to serve the community; the Town lease and associated programs are an unnatural arrangement that can no longer be supported.

We recognize that the SSC draft document has not been provided to Council yet and the governance elements may have a material impact on our proposal, but it is essential to provide our recommendations to Council in a timely manner for consideration in their priority setting meeting on January 24th.

LGS Recreation 2023 Proposal for 55 Plus Programming and Services

LGS Recreation is seeking a partnership with the Town of Los Gatos to continue the momentum, program level and success of the 55 Plus Program. In the partnership the Town provides funding, and the Agency provides the staffing, financial management, programs, and services. It is not a vendor relationship but one in which Town leadership has a stake in the Agency and the seniors in the community. The 55 Plus program is aligned with Town Council 2022 – 2024 strategic priorities in the areas of: building community where older adults thrive, special events, and community engagement. We share the vision of creating a community where older adults are engaged, have a sense of belonging, and have inclusive opportunities to thrive. We encourage Council to support the sustainability of core senior services of social, enrichment, educational, and wellness activities provided by LGS Recreation and the 55 Plus Program.

In 2022, LGS Recreation received ARPA grant funding from the Town of Los Gatos intended to aid the 55 Plus Program to restore services to pre-pandemic levels. During 2022 the program has evolved beyond expectation as we have seen exciting growth in membership, engagement, programs offered, and a greater sense of community. The 55 Plus program attracted hundreds of new members! In the past 5 years we have had under 400 members, but in 2022 we had 730 members! As of January 18th, there are already over 320 members registered for 2023. In 2022, 55 Plus offered 1267 programs and had 9172 encounters. The ARPA grant has highlighted what is possible for older adults in this community with Town support of the 55 Plus Program.

LGS Recreation 55 Plus Program

The 55 Plus Program is dedicated to ensuring free or low-cost access to recreation, education, socialization, and wellness opportunities for older adults throughout Los Gatos. Our goal is to create a sense of belonging by providing opportunities to make connections in the community and participate in meaningful recreation programs that address social, psychological, physical, and cognitive needs of older adults. In Los Gatos, the largest demographic living in poverty are females over 75, followed by females aged 55-64 and then males aged 65-74. By offering free and low-cost recreation programs and allocating building space to local services we are eliminating financial barriers and increasing participation and access to services. Older adults who participate in recreation and leisure activities preserve cognitive function, physical function, and mental health, therefore contributing to successful aging. In a review Rivera-Torres et al. found that the "older old" or older adults aged 80-89 are at the highest risk for social isolation and loneliness and lower engagement in physical leisure and recreation activities. 80% of our members are over the age of 70 and 42% of members are considered "older old" (80+). We are in a unique position to address seniors at the highest risk of social isolation and meet the recreation needs of this demographic to improve behavioral health and connectedness.

Our Senior Center also acts as a hub of information to connect older adults or caregivers with services and resources. Resources for seniors are available on the HUB webpage or through our 55 Plus office, email,

and phone line. The HUB resource page for Seniors has had over 1,000 visits since it was launched, averaging 270 visits per month. From May – December 2022, the 55 Plus Office received 1,222 inbound calls. This is an average of 175 calls/month. This does not include seniors who contact the main office line or the Recreation Coordinator directly. Therefore, this is likely an under representation. Additionally, we also receive emails to 55plus@lgsrecreation.org and directly to the Recreation Coordinator. We average 5 senior walk-ins (either Seniors or Family Members) daily that come to the front desk or 55 Plus office to inquire about services. We promote and refer people to other local senior services like Live Oak Nutrition (menu available and on display at reception each month), Live Oak Day Program, Saratoga Day Program, and RYDE. 55 Plus staff schedules appointments and allocates space for external services for seniors that are open to the public.

- External Programs/Referral Services hosted at the ARC available to public
 - o AARP Tax Aid
 - o AARP Drivers Safety Training
 - HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program)

Program Fiscal Sustainability

The 55 Plus program generates minimal revenue (forecast \$44K revenue in 2023). Historically, LGS Recreation subsidized the 55 Plus program from the profits of fee-based programming from other departments within our Agency. This approach is no longer financially sustainable.

- In 2023 the Agency is taking the following actions to offset a portion of the costs of the 55 Plus Program:
 - o Membership fee increases from \$25 to \$30 (Campbell, Saratoga, Cupertino range from \$25-30)
 - Seek out additional grant opportunities (ex. El Camino Health)
 - Increase donation opportunities from members of the community. Donation button available on our website. Donation campaigns will roll out throughout 2023.
- Adult Recreation Center Lease
 - Temporary lease abatement ceases at the end of June 2023. Permanent abatement is required to sustain programming.
 - O Benchmarking by the Town's Senior Committee has demonstrated all State-wide 55+ programs are a combination of free, low-cost, and subsidized programs as a cost-recovery effort of up to 30-40%. No other recreation departments in the State pay a lease for the use of space to serve the community; the Town lease and associated programs are an unnatural arrangement that can no longer be supported.

An ongoing commitment of resources from the Town of Los Gatos is needed to support the 55 Plus program in our efforts to meet the physical, social, and emotional health needs of older adults in our community.

Proposed Financial Plan

Below is a 3-tiered proposal of Town / Agency partnership. The mid-plan is a continuation of the ARPA funded level of programing over the last 15 months. The mid-plan will also include a Social Worker/ Case Manager who will aid in providing mental health services and resource guidance.

Senior Services Committee Roadmap Goals and Draft Projects

Our organization values the insight of the Town of Los Gatos Community Health and Seniors Services Commission and the Senior Services Committee. We attend monthly meetings, listen to what is important, and act. For example, at the beginning of the year communication about senior services was highlighted as being lacking. We expanded the number of pages dedicated to 55 Plus in our Brochure (giving seniors more attention on the front and back cover), emailed out to our database of >7000 people over the age of 55 to announce the 55 plus program, expanded the PRINT content and delivered to key places around town as well as flyers for upcoming events, and worked on outreach at community events or gatherings. The creation and development of the HUB is a demonstration of our willingness to work with the CHSSC or SSC to reimagine senior services and meet gaps in service for older adults in Los Gatos. LGS Recreation, and specifically the 55 Plus program, is in a unique position to be the central point for seniors in the community as well as support and implement many of the projects outlined as priorities in the roadmap developed by the Senior Services Committee. Below we have provided a brief outline of how LGS Recreation and specifically the 55 Plus program can act on the proposed roadmap detailed by the Senior Services Committee. The Adult Recreation Center is centrally located in Los Gatos and close to Town buildings. It is already viewed and utilized as a central point for seniors in Los Gatos.

Below is a brief outline indicating how LGS Recreation can work in partnership with the Town of Los Gatos Senior Services Committee to meet projected Roadmap Goals.

We recognize that the Senior Services Committee roadmap document has not yet been provided to Council. Based on the information publicly available on January 10th in the Senior Services Committee Agenda on the draft roadmap document, excluding section 8 Governance, LGS Recreation has developed this below outline. Governance elements may have a material impact on our proposal and further edits may be needed, but it is essential to provide our recommendations to Council in a timely manner for consideration in the priority setting meeting on January 24th.

In our Senior Community we are noticing that more support is needed for Caregivers (respite, finances, support group). Specifically, people over 55 who are caring for another senior with little support. Members have also recommended having a Cancer Support Group on site. We believe this is another benefit of having a case manager on site at the Adult Recreation Center and embedded in the 55 Plus Program.

Additional Considerations:

LGS Recreation Adult Programs

In addition LGS Recreation is the longstanding Recreation provider in Los Gatos for people of all ages. For adults aged 18 and older, LGS Recreation offers a wide variety of <u>fee-based</u> fitness, sport, and enrichment activities in addition to the 55 Plus program. Many of these activities are geared towards or attended by adults over the age of 55.

- LGS served 1717 Individuals and 7261 registrations over the age of 55 in 2022.
 - These adult programs take place at several locations in Los Gatos and in Saratoga (Joan Pisani Community Center, Adult Recreation Center, Youth Recreation Center, Friendship Hall Saratoga, Vasona, La Rinconada Park, Oak Meadow Park, Redwood Middle School, Los Gatos High School, etc,)
 - For example, our fee-based "Great Getaway" adult day trips offer an opportunity for both social interaction and remove the barrier of transportation. In January, the average age of attendees was 72, the youngest person being 61 and the oldest being 88.
 - Pickleball Membership in 2022 reflects 36% over 55
- Adult fee-based program and participation levels have increased throughout 2022 when compared to pre-pandemic levels.
 - 69% increase to the number of fee-based classes in which those 55 and older participated.
 - 25% increase to the number of fee-based classes in which those 55 and older could participate.
 - 27% increase to the number of unduplicated individuals 55 and older who attended a program.
 - 119% increase to the number of registration records for those 55 and older.
- Data reflected for adult fee-based programming, in addition to the expansion of 55 Plus program, support the gentrification of Los Gatos and that up to a third of the citizen of Los Gatos will be over the age of 55 within the next 10 years.
- Adult fee-based programming
 - Forecasted 2023 review is \$440k, with a yielded gross margin of 40%
 - Of that 40% operating costs must be covered staffing, facilities costs, utilities, program supplies, marketing, software systems, etc.

*Note that if a birthday is not entered in the system the age defaults to 0 and as a result this number is likely an under-representation. An individual is not duplicated, whereas a registration may be duplicated, for example, Sally takes golf lessons, painting classes and yoga. Sally is counted as one individual and three participants.

The purpose of this document is to provide a final update regarding 55 Plus Program activity following the ARPA Grant received in September 2021 through December 2022.

Fiscal Update

Los Gatos Saratoga Recreation, and specifically the 55 Plus Program, greatly appreciate the ARPA grant opportunity and the continued support of the Town of Los Gatos Council, the Community Health and Senior Services Commission, and the Senior Services Committee. This commitment of resources has aided our efforts in restoring pre-pandemic services.

Expenses funded by the ARPA grant (vendor invoices, compensation, benefits) are recorded to our financial system (Intacct) with the project ID "ARPA2122". An Intacct report built to filter and present, based on a user entered date range, those expenses recorded to that Project ID is reviewed to ensure accuracy and completeness. Compensation and benefits are allocated as described in the grant application. Invoices are then provided to the Town of Los Gatos.

As of December 31st, 2022, the full grant amount of \$328,500 has been assigned to the following

LGS Recreation 55 Plus Program provides comprehensive free or low-cost programs for people ages 55 and over. For a full listing of programs visit The PRINT archive www.lgsrecreation.org/55-plus/the-print/. Office hours are Monday through Friday from 9am-5pm for drop-in and calls to 55 Plus Office.

55 Plus Phone Line

Note: In May we switched to a new phone system that allows us to track monthly incoming calls. From May 2022 – December 21, 2022, the 55 Plus Office received 1,222 inbound calls. This is on average 175 calls/month. This does not include seniors who contact the main office line or the Recreation Coordinator directly. Therefore, this is likely an under representation. Additionally, we also receive emails to 55plus@lgsrecreation.org and directly to the Recreation Coordinator. It should also be mentioned that we average 5 senior walk-ins (either Seniors or Family Members) each day that come into the front desk or 55 Plus office for assistance, either members or public.

- The HUB resource page for Seniors has had over 1,000 visits since it was launched, averaging 270 visits per month.
- External Programs/Referral Services hosted at the ARC available to public
 - AARP Tax Aid free service open to public, 55 Plus office schedules all appointments and provides free use of space 1x/week from February through April.
 - AARP Drivers Safety Training free service open to the public, 55 Plus office schedules all appointments and provides free use of space. Bimonthly.
 - HICAP (Health Insurance Counseling & Advocacy Program) free service open to public, 55 Plus office schedules all appointments and provides free use of space

2023 Budgeting and Program Sustainability

- The 55 Plus program is nearly non-revenue generating. Historically, our Agency subsidized the 55 Plus program from the profits of fee-based programming from other departments within our Agency and this approach is no longer financially sustainable.
- This past year LGS Recreation continued to commit funding to staffing and marketing efforts, in addition to ARPA funds.
- The Agency is taking the following actions:
 - Membership fee increases
 - Seek out additional grant opportunities
 - Increase donation opportunities from members of the community
- The ARPA grant has highlighted what is possible with Town support of the 55 Plus Program
- Adult Recreation Center Lease
 - Temporary lease abatement ceases at the end of June 2023. Permanent abatement is required to sustain programming.
 - Benchmarking by the Town's Senior Committee has demonstrated all State-wide 55+
 programs are a combination of free, low-cost and subsidized programs as a cost-recovery
 effort of up to 30-40%. No other recreation departments in the State pay a lease for the

use of space to serve the community; the Town lease and associated programs are an unnatural arrangement that can no longer be supported.

Our intention is to continue to offer a thriving 55 Plus Program, but partnership and financial support will be required to make the program fiscally sustainable.

- Everything that I have attended I have had a wonderful experience with. I think the Staff at Los Gatos Senior Center is doing a fantastic job!

LGS Recreation is grateful for the support received from the Town of Los Gatos. Community Health and Senior Services Commission, and the Senior Services Committee. ARPA funds were intended to aid the 55 Plus program to restore services to pre-pandemic levels. As indicated in this report we have successfully restored services and have also seen exciting growth in our community in terms of membership and program expansion. The full burden of the cost to operate the program at current

service levels is now on the Agency. As a policy matter, it makes no sense for the Town to charge rent to the Agency. Diverting our revenue to lease payments makes an immaterial difference to the Town's budget and compromises the Agency ability to reinvest revenue to grow programs.

I recommend the Council create a 10-year strategic priority re-envisioning the community center as a cultural center with a multi-year plan to accomplish the goal. Establishing a plan as part of the GP2040 makes the community more charming and desirable and creates a space to come together.

As a JPA-member School District Partner we have made concessions to our facilities fee structure that serves as an Agency subsidy. For the Los Gatos Union School District, this amounted to \$95,000 this past year. School Districts are focused on youth education. We are unwilling to use our concessions to pay for Town building leases and the 55+ senior program.

The 2023 Agency budget forecasts \$7.8M in revenue and will break-even; it does not include resuming lease payments to the Town. After the temporary lease abatement ends June 2023, any future payments will be treated as a variance and prompt difficult decisions.

Without permanent lease abatement, the Agency will be forced to evaluate use of the Town facilities and the associated staffing and financial obligation to provide core 55+ services. Recreation and senior services are the expectation of a Town. The Agency is the Town's de facto recreation department and a community asset worth preserving.

In my twenty-two years as a public school district superintendent, I have not seen such an arrangement where a town and recreation/senior services are separate. I am accustomed to the town and recreation department working side by side for the benefit of the community. It is ironic that I as an educator am asked to make decisions regarding senior services.

In my meetings with Town Manager Laurel Prevetti, I have repeatedly suggested that the town join the JPA as a full contributing member. This makes more sense, since senior services should not be driven by public school educators. Having the town offer permanent lease abatement is a step in the right direction, but I would argue that having the town join the JPA as a fully contributing partner is the right vision for the future. I know I would greatly appreciate this as Superintendent of the Los Gatos Union School District.

I decided not to speak at the end of the session thinking most people would be gone and you would all be emotionally wiped out with the loss of Arn. Let me say how disappointed that I am losing one of the best employees this town has ever had. He was universally liked and respected, even when we had our differences. I shall miss him. We have now lost just about every top manager in the past couple of years. What is the source of this problem? Is this happening to all cities and towns?

What would be another tragedy would be to lose Ms Rollett (ARC) and/or Ms. Davis (NUMU), two cornerstones to this towns community spirit and inclusiveness. One or both will be out of business without immediate Council support. These two entities are not discretionary, but rather mandatory in any well run town.

This is what I was going to speak about last night:

My purpose in speaking tonight is to encourage the Council to put both the Adult Recreation Center and NUMU high on your priority list on the 24th of this month. They two organizations are two town treasures that provide recreation, education, art, community, inclusiveness, etc. etc. to thousands of our residents and to 1000's of visitors who come to see the Town's growing museum.

My family is now in its third generation of using ARC. You will hear over the course of the next week that the ARC has to change its business model; ie, they are no longer able to be a revenue source for the town by paying rent while at the same time incurring the cost of a seniors program that is growing rapidly. The increased efforts by Ms Rollett and her team are paying off with more seniors participating in the programs. They are closing in on 100% growth over the past year. However, growth also has its costs that can no longer be paid for with the current financial structure of the ARC.

You have two very talented, intelligent, hard working individuals in Ms. Rollett and Ms. Davis who are wholly dedicated to the Town's citizens that participate from a very young age to what they call an, old, old age. When people say, "I love Los Gatos", in part, it comes from the caring and forethought the Council and staff gives to its citizens. That has been manifested through the efforts of the ARC and NUMU as well as the many talented Commissions and Committees we have.

Just recently I was introduced to the Senior Services Committee and was totally wowed by what this talented group is doing along with the CHSSC and ARC. With the cooperation of the ARC, the senior committee and the services commission, they are now melded into a cohesive unit by combining their knowledge with advice given by two of the town's councilmembers. They are providing the leadership, bench marking, and gap analysis while creating a road map as to how to create a bigger and better community center over the next 10 years.

It's my opinion that the ARC has been steadily building a platform upon which this community center can be launched with an already solid base of leadership, membership and participation. I realize the Town has had some serious financial issues, but the "ask" of the ARC and NUMU is a mere ~1% of the total budget. The five year forecast was

recently reduced from \$20 million over 5 years to \$10 million. We should be able to manage another \$750K.

However, I don't think they will be able to do that without some serious work by the Council, staff, Commissions and Committee's if they are an afterthought as opposed to a becoming a priority. Once a priority, all eyes are focused on how to make that entity stronger and better. They already have great leadership and they have a long record of success with our citizens. No other towns nor cities charge rent to their departments just as town does not charge rent to the library. They provide a service to the community. Please give up the rent and the administrative costs. Let them continue to grow stronger.

Both entities, ARC and NUMU are cornerstones to the success of our Town.

The Los Gatos Community Alliance is in full support of the ARC's and NUMU's. Future success.

The arrangement is one in which Town leadership has a stake in the Agency and position of authority and governance and the Agency provides staffing, financial management, programs and services.

The Agency is an enrichment center with a mission to provide recreation and 55+ programs for the benefit of the community. In 2022 we served 31.6K customers. The Town is better off because of our role and our organization is what makes this Town unique, just like the Library and NUMU.

The ongoing use of the ARC facility to offer the 55+ program is reflected in the Town's 2022 – 2024 strategic priorities under *Community vitality in which older adults thrive*, *Special events and Community Engagement*. The Agency has a past practice of writing grants to support 55+ programs. We have also established a 55+ donation campaign. Permanent lease abatement will demonstrate Town support for it's own strategic priorities.

LGS Recreation is seeking a partnership with the Town of Los Gatos to continue the momentum, program level, and success of the 55 Plus Program experienced in 2022. In this partnership, the Town would provide funding, and the Agency provides the staffing, financial management, programs, and services. In 2022, LGS Recreation received \$328.5K ARPA grant funding from the Town of Los Gatos intended to aid the 55 Plus Program to restore services to pre-pandemic levels. The ARPA grant has highlighted what can be achieved with Town support of the 55 Plus Program. Strategic Priorities Refinements Addendum

Proposed by Rob Moore

Language changes:

- Change "Transportation Demand Management" to:
 - "Traffic Calming"
- Change "Community Where Older Adults Thrive & Senior Road Map" to:
 - "Community Where Older Adults Thrive & Support Implementation of Senior Road Map"
- Change "Affordable Housing" to:
 - "Affordable Housing Partnerships/ Homeless Support"
- Delete "Semi-Permanent Parklets"
- Delete "Dittos Lane Affordable Housing"
- Delete "Objective Standards"

Refinements/ Direction

Below is additional elaboration/ direction on existing strategic priorities and on proposed refinements:

- Traffic Calming
 - The reason for this change is to move the emphasis from traffic demand management closer to the idea of "complete streets." This better aligns our strategic priorities with the 2040 General Plan (ex. Complete Streets and Reduce Vehicle Speeds as outlined in 5.3 MOB-4) and addresses growing community concerns related to traffic safety.
 - Given the recent traffic fatality on Blossom Hill Road and other concerns with speeding throughout all areas of Los Gatos, the Town should be investing in traffic calming efforts. These could include roads diets, slow streets, and/ or greater enforcement.
- Bicycle and Pedestrian Improvements
 - Among other important Bike and Ped improvements, staff should seek out improvements and upgrades to streetlight and sidewalk infrastructure, especially in historically underinvested parts of the town. Neighborhoods in Los Gatos that were annexed relatively recently from Santa Clara County often have no sidewalks and few streetlights, despite having just as much need for these important safety features.
- Sell or Lease Certain Town Properties
 - The Town should be very intentional when it comes to the use of Town-owned properties. The Town owns few properties and a significant portion of land in Los Gatos has been built on.
 - As such, the Town should explore options and partnerships for using the parcel of Town-owned land located at 224 W. Main for affordable housing. The

facilitation and creation of affordable housing is a major goal of our draft Housing Element and our 2040 General Plan as a whole. Space is often the greatest constraint, so Town-owned property should be seriously considered for use as affordable housing.

- Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Efforts:
 - Town staff are currently working hard to complete a town Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Plan which should be finished in Summer 2023, as identified in the staff report. Completion of this report, then implementation of tangible actions, should be a top DEI priority.
 - These actions include those already identified in the 2040 General Plan like the creation of a Social and Racial Justice Commission and in-person diversity, equity, and inclusion trainings for staff and Council.
- Community Where Older Adults Thrive and Support Implementation of Senior Road Map:
 - First, the grammar and verbiage in this bullet is a little confusing. I'd be interested to hear from other Councilmembers who have been intimately involved with senior issues what changes to this language make the most sense.
 - With the Senior Road Map nearing completion, the emphasis on this item should be shifted to support the actions identified in the completed report.
 - Additionally, the Town should continue to explore ways to empower existing senior service providers and ensure the highest level of care and services for our older adults in Los Gatos.
- Affordable Housing Partnerships/ Homeless Support
 - This language change will help clarify Council's intentions when it comes to affordable housing and supporting disadvantaged community members.
 - The creation of affordable housing is an important priority for many groups and community members including the Los Gatos Community Alliance, the Los Gatos Anti-Racism Coalition, and local faith groups. As such, Town staff should proactively reach out to various organizations in the community like nonprofit housing developers, housing advocacy groups, philanthropic housing funders, and the Santa Clara County Office of Supportive Housing to create partnerships in order to facilitate affordable housing development in Los Gatos.
 - The Town should also explore options to provide greater support to our residents who are experiencing homelessness. As of now, there are few options and resources provided by the Town to help these vulnerable community members. The Los Gatos faith community is interested in being a partner to accomplish this, as are local nonprofits who experts at supporting those experiencing homelessness. Town staff should explore housing options (both permanent housing and temporary housing, such as an extreme weather shelter) as well as best practices for providing services under serious resource constraints.

Other direction:

- Empowering commissions:
 - Once we get to budget setting, I would like to devote a few thousand dollars to each "project oriented" commission. This will give them a greater ability to work on the projects they have identified as important for the year. We have already allocated \$1,500 per year for this purpose to the Arts and Culture Commission. This should be expanded to include commissions like Complete Streets, Parks, etc.

As a lifelong, 51 year member of the Los Gatos community I am writing to express my concern with regard to traffic safety along Blossom Hill Road and the Belwood-Belgatos Neighborhood.

I have not only live in Belwood for 15 years, I grew up on Francis Oaks Way just up Blossom Hill Road. I have spent my entire life pulling out onto Blossom Hill Road. I have never experienced traffic so bad in terms of how fast people drive and how unsafe it is for bikers, pedestrians, motorists and especially the residents living along this road.

I now have teenage drivers and after the recent fatality near our home, I have told them to not make a left across Blossom Hill Road to exit our neighborhood at Westhill Drive because a large truck is always parked along the houses on BH Road and it makes it impossible to see oncoming traffic to the left. This is also where the road goes from one to two lanes and people speed up and pass each other. There is no U turn sign at the light at Leigh and Blossom Hill intersection so, I now have my children and I doing illegal u-turns just so we do not have to take a dangerous, blind left hand turn out onto Blossom Hill Road and face an accident or death.

Having no parking allowed along Blossom Hill Road from Union Ave to Harwood Road and having a dedicated turn lane along the entire length of roadway would make our entire corridor a much safer place for all who utilize this extremely busy and well utilized road. Also adding a "do not block" section at Westhill Drive before and after the light at Leigh on Blossom Hill Road would allow for safer entering and exiting traffic during commute hours.

As a little back history, I have been working on behalf of our Belgatos/Belwood neighborhood to get safer bike paths, sidewalks and road safety for the past 15 years. I have worked with the Parks and Public Works (Kevin Rohani), town traffic engineers, the mayors at the time (Rob Rennie and Joe Pirzynski), the LGPD and the town council to no avail. I was always told the area doesn't serve enough residents to warrant any changes. My main goal was to get a side walk or path along the hillside of Blossom Hill Road from Heritage Oaks to the Union Avenue light so my children could walk to Union Middle School safely and for us to be able to walk to the Safeway shopping center on Union Ave so we did not have to drive. Over the past few years I have tried to get parking along this roadway prohibited and traffic mitigation addressed, again to no avail.

Since I have been a 51 year resident of this town, I have seen all of the traffic, bike and pedestrian safety measures the town has invested in in every part of town that serves the local LGUSD schools. East Los Gatos has been largely overlooked and forgotten. The 25 million dollar pedestrian overcrossing being built over highway 17 near blossom hill road is another example of items that

precede our needs. We already have Blossom Hill Overpass as a bike and pedestrian crossing as well as the pedestrian crossing into old town from the high school and the Main Street overpass.

The dangerous condition of the traffic pattern along Blossom Hill Road has long contributed to an elevated risk of serious injury or death — not just for residents of the neighborhood, but also for families visiting our beautiful park, playground, hiking trails and school.

Over the years there have been many serious accidents on this stretch of Blossom Hill Road. Sadly, the deadly accident that occurred on January 8th is just the latest.

I am a faculty member at San Jose State University, an anthropologist of Silicon Valley, and a longtime collaborator with New Museum Los Gatos, NUMU. My colleagues, such as the late Pat Dunning, and I have worked with the Forbes Mill History Museum of Los Gatos since the early 2000s. As you know their collections moved to NUMU. In 2017, I worked with them on the exhibit Cement Prairie, capturing the stories of Native American relocated to the Bay Area. I am working with them now on their collaboration with the Muwekma Tribe of the San Francisco Bay Area and Mosaic America. I am writing today to encourage you to treat NUMU | New Museum Los Gatos as an integral part of its strategic priorities by removing rent payments from NUMU's lease with the Town of Los Gatos.

The institution is a vital part of the region's ecosystem of museums. They are a leader in museum studies and they amplify the voices of artists not usually recognized. They take the time to learn about the communities with which they work, such as our region's Native Americans. I have watched them mentor dozens of San Jose State University students over the years, and hope they will be in a strong position to mentor them in the future. I'm aware that NUMU is asking the Town to reduce rent for 106 E. Main Street to \$1 per year to support NUMU's ongoing responsibility to maintain and steward the Town of Los Gatos' history collection and provide art, history, and cultural educational services to the Los Gatos community. What would Los Gatos be without NUMU? I fully support this arrangement and hope that the Town can financially prioritize NUMU for years to come.

I live on Belhaven Dr. and find that drivers frequently do not stop at the stop sign when they go down Harwood Dr. (at the intersection of Harwood Rd. and Belhaven Dr). Even if I am stopped first at the Belhaven stop sign, they don't always stop when driving down Harwood. One day, my neighbor posted her son at the intersection to tally how many people actually made stops at the intersection. Only about 50% of the drives stopped at the sign!

Town Manager Prevetti,

Thank you for reaching out to the town citizens for input on traffic safety.

In addition to the traffic safety issues along Blossom Hill Road that were highlighted previously in the Verbal Comment time of the 1/17 Town Council meeting, I do have five observations for my immediate neighborhood I thought would share for your visibility.

- 1. Excessive speed along Belgatos Rd. This is a 0.3 mile stretch of uninterrupted straight road without stop signs or any speed mitigation. The northbound direction is also a downhill slope (-3%) On weekdays most of the traffic is going to and from Mulberry School by parents dropping their kids off as part of their commute. On weekends we have many visitors to the park (see item 5).
- 2. J-walking. The location of crosswalks (Leigh and Harwood) is simply not convenient for school kids or pedestrians traveling to our park. The existing traffic pattern on BHR lends itself to an increase in J-walking.
- 3. Crosswalks at the corner of Belgatos & Belvue are almost always overlooked by motorists. Relating to item (1) above, cars are also typically traveling above the speed limit. I live here at the corner of this intersection and make this frequent observation.
- 4. The stop sign at Belwood Gateway and Harwood is frequently ignored, especially by motorists on Harwood and particularly by those traveling downhill in the northbound direction.
- 5. Parking at the Belgatos park is limited. My observation is that the park became more popular during the pandemic. As such, parking always spills out onto the surrounding streets on weekends. Parking capacity is maybe only ~35% of peak demand.

The PDF attached contains information on the five items discussed above, as well as the previously-communicated item regarding Blossom Hill Road.









Saw the post on next door for suggestions and I have one.

Many cars speed up on blossom hill in the long wide straightaway between winterbrook and Lu Ray. There are regularly speeds of 45 to 50+ mph on this section by cars going either direction, easily seen with the radar signs already in place.

It looked like there was a device measuring speed (not sure) near Stephenie lane recently, but this was right by the turn where people finally slow down or are just speeding up (depending on direction traveling).

If a crosswalk similar to the one on blossom hill and Hillbrook were built at Linda and blossom hill, it would throttle traffic and slow these speedsters down. In addition, there are quite a few walkers out on streets in this area but the closest crosswalk is all the way down at Hillbrook. This would be a great addition that would be appreciated by the local community.

My name is Jamie Butcher and I am a member of the Los Gatos Community, a mother of 3 school aged children, and the parent coordinator for traffic and safety at Noddin Elementary School in the Union School District. I am writing to express my concern with the regard to traffic safety along Blossom Hill Road and the Belwood-Belgatos Neighborhood.

The dangerous condition of the traffic pattern along this particular section of Blossom Hill Road is sadly not new since the deadly accident a few Sundays ago. The speeding has long presented an elevated risk of serious injury and death and is in need of your immediate attention.

In the past couple of years there have been lengthy conversations of how to keep our students and families in the Belwood-Belgatos neighborhood safe, especially since returning to in-person school back in the 2021-2022 school year. Aside from the concern for the Blossom Hill/Harwood intersection, the amount of speeding and red-light running that occurs on a daily bases from Leigh to Harwood is out of control.

At the beginning of year, I spoke to Police Sergeant Greg Borromeo and discussed some options for traffic safety. We were able to get two crossing guards and a change in our light at Harwood and Blossom Hill to help aid the students walking/biking to school and every once in awhile had LGPD ticketing. However, that does not help with the speeding that occurs and the families that drive, kids that bike, or students that walk to school from other exits of the neighborhood. In addition, the amount of traffic we have coming from Mulberry School, Bright Horizons preschool and our beautiful Belgatos Park and trails adds to the need of additional traffic safety.

I have come to realize that I just will not risk turning left from Belgatos Road onto Blossom Hill. Families have instructed their teenagers to not make that left. How can we change that to make this safer for the drivers, our children, our bikers so we do not have another devastating injury or death in our community?

Unless something is done to improve traffic safety along Blossom Hill Road and the Belwood-Belgatos community, risk to life will continue to be the daily norm. Please help make traffic improvements on Blossom Hill Road a strategic priority.

Dear Town Council Manager,

As a long term resident of the Belwood neighborhood, I'm deeply concerned about the lack of traffic controls on Blossom hill road between intersections of Leigh Avenue and Harwood Road. Recently, we have seen a rash of serious accidents that have led to loss of life and serious injury. To prevent such incidents from recurring, I have three suggestions for improving road safety on Blossom Hill Road. I've limited my suggestions to those I believe Los Gatos can implement autonomously, and so I've limited them to the Eastbound section of Blossom Hill Road; as I understand, the Westbound half may fall under SJC jurisdiction, and may require additional cooperation between the two cities.

- 1. Paint shoulder lines on the eastbound right hand shoulder. The shoulder line will help aid drivers turning left from the neighborhood onto blossom hill road. The resulting narrower lines will also help reduce the speeds on BHR by preventing the illusion of it being a wide open highway. Please see attached a diagram of this idea (BHR improvement narrow right lane).
- 2. Provide center turn lane to aid drivers turning left into and out of the neighborhood. See attached drawing (BHR -- add turn lane).
- 3. Post speed limit signs WITH radar indicator of "Your Speed". These signs will serve a reminder to the drivers and help reduce speeds on Blossom Hill Road. Please see the drawing (BHR post speed radars) in attachment.

Dear Council Members, I am writing about the Public Safety component of the Strategic Plan to be discussed at the Council's upcoming Special Meeting. My wife and I have lived in the Town for over 40 years and our children went to school here. I am a member of the St. Vincent de Paul Society of St. Mary's Church. The Society's mission is to help the poor and needy. The Society partners with volunteers at St. Mary's, United Methodist (UMC), and St. Luke's churches to help the homeless neighbors in the Town. For example UMC volunteers provide showers and St. Vincent de Paul volunteers provides laundry vouchers and cleanliness supplies for them.

Several of these homeless neighbors are physically or mentally disabled and struggle to survive. In conversation with several of these folks at UMC during the storms, I learned they lost their tents, sleeping bags, clothing and other possessions, or had them soaked, in the storms. The impact was exacerbated by the very cold nights we experienced. When we met these folks were visibly shaken, muddy and shivering. Their health and safety was and is at risk.

Where could they go to get warmth and shelter from the storms and cold? There are no warming centers in the Town. The nearest warming centers at Camden Community Center and Seven Trees Community Center were at or near capacity.

I am asking the Council to arrange a day and/or night warming center for these neighbors during severe weather emergencies. I believe that the churches would partner with the Town to establish a warming center. It should be a strategic priority as a matter of public heath and safety.

Dear Council Members and Town Manager:

I am Chris Tanimoto who resides on Westhill Dr. near Leigh Ave. for the past 17 years. Since 2006, I have seen traffic increase dramatically in recent years. From my perspective, the one lane to two lanes on both sides of Blossom Hill Road driving towards Leigh Ave. encourages speeding way over the designated 35 MPH speed limit. This recent fatality is a wake-up call that is waiting to happen, again!

I have to admit that there is no simple solution along this stretch of road because it involves the City of San Jose, lack of bicycle lanes, a school zone at Harwood & private grade school on Belgatos Road, businesses, and residences. In addition, the Town is projecting a \$10 million plus budget deficit.

Having stated the aforementioned, there are two proposals that I would like to present that could be cost effective, and could have an immediate impact as follows:

Speed Limit Signage: Paint a 35 Mile Speed Limit on the pavement where the one lane becomes two lanes on both sides of Blossom Hill Road and also place a flashing 35 MPH Speed Limit Sign on both sides of Blossom Hill Road(Los Gatos jurisdiction). Please note that currently there is no signage of any type in this location and also there is only one Flashing 35 MPH Speed Limit sign just before Belgatos Road. Further down where the businesses are located, there is a 25 MPH Non-Flashing sign indicating a school zone only when children are present to Harwood Road. After Harwood Road, it becomes the City of San Jose jurisdiction. There needs to be an updated analysis to determine what type of signage will help reduce the speeding and at the very least, on the Los Gatos side of the road. Of course, it would be appreciated if the City of San Jose would do the same.

Page Two:

No Parking Vehicles Over 6 Ft. High: Instead of pursuing "red curb" restrictions to assist those drivers making a left turn out of Belgatos; this ordinance would still allow residents to park vehicles under the height limitation; which is better than restricting all vehicles. Enforcement will not be available so the residents will have to report violations, similar to the Leaf Blower Ordinance. I acknowledge that this proposal may be more than simple; however, it deserves being addressed now rather than later.

Dear Mayor Ristow, Vice Mayor Badame, and Council Members Hudes, Moore, and Rennie,

As you may already know the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe and I, as both a San Jose State University Anthropology Department faculty member (1978-2019) and Tribal Archaeologist, have continuously volunteer our services to work collaboratively with the Los Gatos Museum staff on several archaeological and cultural exhibitions about the Tribe's history and heritage. The first two exhibits that we worked on were at the Forbes Mill Museum first in 1998 titled "Making a Living and Ceremony, Ritual," and Symbol." The second exhibition at Forbes Mill was exhibited from 2009-2010 titled "The Ohlone: Past and Present."

In 2015, we worked again with the NUMU staff, the SJSU Anthropology Department, and the Tribal leadership on two exhibitions titled "Back From Extinction: Prehistory, History and Heritage of the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe of the San Francisco Bay Area," and the "Cement Prairie" about the relocation of Native American families and veterans to the Bay Area as a result of the "Termination" and "Relocation" programs implemented by the U.S. Government to conduct forced acculturation of Native people during the late 1940s through the 1970s. In all of these exhibitions, the Muwekma Ohlone Tribe allowed for the display and interpretation of their ancestral heritage material culture derive from several of their ancestral heritage sites spanning the past 5,000 years.

Presently, as you may also know, the Muwekma Tribal leadership and I are presently continuing that collaboration with the SJSU Anthropology Department, and Museum staff, to tell other aspects of the Tribe's history and heritage, that addresses both the "Politics of Erasure" and the Tribe's "Reclamation" of its sacred places and ancestral heritage sites, as well as its efforts to regain its previous Federally Recognized status.

Over the years the educational benefits to the general public and school groups have been immeasurable, and we have tirelessly committed our time towards that benefit. It has come to our attention that the City of Los Gatos is planning to charge NUMU rent which is essentially unheard of for city-based museums that serve the public in a multitude of capacities including areas of educational art programs, curating historical collections, and cultural-related educational services to the greater Los Gatos community. My own background was with the Departments of Education and Anthropology at the American Museum of Natural History in NYC. I fully support the Mission and Vision of NUMU, and hope that the Town of Los Gatos can financially find ways to support NUMU as a public educational institution.

My name is Shailaja Venkatsubramanyan, and I have lived in Los Gatos for more than 12 years. I have tried adhering to a plant-based lifestyle for nearly 30 years. I am aware that the most common stereotype of someone with my inclinations is that of a scrawny, protein-starved, self-righteous, obsessive, and depressing preacher who cares more about animals than they do about humans. To be honest, I quite enjoy the jokes - the good ones - about people like me. But, more importantly, I am glad that we are at least talking about this lifestyle choice that is on the rise across the globe.

Based on scientific data, I am convinced that plant-based diets are a cost-effective way to solve so many of our climate and health problems. According to the UN's Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO), the livestock sector contributes to 14.5 percent of global human-induced greenhouse emissions. The climate impact of plant-based food is smaller than that of animal products, so switching to more plant-based food could reduce emissions. When it comes to health, numerous studies have shown that consuming animal products can be detrimental to our health. Regular meat consumption is associated with an increased risk of other conditions such as heart disease, pneumonia, diverticular disease, diabetes, and several cancers. During the pandemic, researchers from Harvard Medical School found that a healthy plant-based diet was associated with decreased risk of severe Covid. Diet influences immunity through nutrients that support antibiotic and antiviral defense, as well as through the microbiome.

When humans are confronted with data that go against commonly held beliefs and culture, the natural tendency is to reject it. It takes effort to look at scientific data and make changes. We want good health for ourselves and our loved ones. We want to leave a healthy planet behind for future generations. To this point, I want to ask the town to please fund plant-based education programs. Just to give you a couple of examples of the possibilities - we could get speakers of renown to help educate our residents about the benefits of a plant-based diet and get plant-based chefs to teach us how to cook healthy food. In short, let's make taking proactive steps to address climate and health issues a priority.

- 3. I think it's important to dial down on why there is a difference.
- 4. What are the stats on persons pulled over and where do they live and work?
- 5. Why are people being pulled over?
- 6. In practice, are we treating people equally? If not, change to get there. If yes, let's be in a strong position to explain the stops.

Second Issue:

LG should put a greater emphasis on really going no more than the speed limit. Let's face, many drive over the speed limit.

Honestly, I catch myself going to fast, slow down and then often I got drivers behind me driving up close and pushing for more speed—as if not going over the speed limit is wrong or unreasonable driving.

We can enforce speed limits rigorously and set a tone. The cost will be some disgruntled entitled drivers; the benefit will be be saving lives, avoiding injuries, less stress on the roadways, safer walking and biking for kids and it's good for businesses as well.

I suggest we do a complete diagnostic on the town's roadways, determine the areas of highest risk for injuries and take immediate steps to mitigate the risks. Because we certainly can't eliminate all risk is no excuse to practically minimize risks on the roadways. Let's do what we can.

Los Gatos Town Council, we are residents on Westhill Drive in the Belwood neighborhood of Los Gatos. In our 10 years as residents, we have been extremely concerned about the traffic safety situation on Blossom Hill Road leaving the Belwood neighborhood, in particular when drivers turn left out of the neighborhood onto Blossom Hill Road from either Westhill Dr., Belgatos Rd or Belwood Gateway. Two issues make this left hand turn particularly perilous - (1) when cars are parked along Blossom Hill Road, visibility is extremely poor, and reduces the time one has to react while turning left, and (2) the speed of drivers along Blossom Hill Road makes any error in judgment while turning left potentially deadly (and even makes turning right unusually hazardous). For 10 years, we have feared that this combination would lead to a fatality, and while we do not know the exact details of the deadly accident on January 8, 2023, we were devastated but not surprised that this accident occurred, as such an accident had long been predictable.

In the wake of the January 8 accident, the community has stepped up to implore the Town to take action to improve traffic safety along Blossom Hill Road and at the intersections of the three Belwood streets. Many ideas have been presented, including prohibiting parking along some stretches of Blossom Hill Road to improve visibility, and we would like to add our voices to those of our neighbors in asking the Town to make Blossom Hill Road traffic safety a top priority. At this point, the Town and Council are on notice of this dangerous situation, and it needs to be addressed immediately before anyone else loses their life.

As the coordinator of the weekly shower ministry at Los Gatos United Methodist Church, I (along with our volunteers) see the great need for more regular, dependable services for these people. Specifically:

- 1) A designated professional case manager whom clients could have an established relationship with to help with social services, finances, accessing medical care and more. As volunteers, we are not trained to provide these types of services, and yet clients present with needs every week.
- 2) Shelter during severe weather, throughout the year. With climate change making weather patterns more extreme, those living outside are exposed to more days of intense heat, cold and wet weather. We only need to look at the horrible storms of a few weeks ago to see the devastation in this community people lost their belongings, one man was stranded in a tree above the creek for 12 hours, people reporting dogging falling trees and fearing for their lives. Local, temporary cooling and warming shelters are desperately needed.
- 3) A regular funding source for the cleaning of the showers and restrooms. Each year we need to apply for a grant from the Town and compete for funds for the weekly cleaning. Currently this ministry receives funding from both the Los Gatos United Methodist Church and the Town of Los Gatos. This is not a "special project" with unique program aspects that change each year, like many of the great projects funded through grants by the town. It's a regular shower for our unhoused residents, most of whom have lived in our community for many many years. Having a defined line item for this \$150/week expenses would enable the shower program to know that funds don't need to be re-secured every year, reducing the risk of funding not being available with very little notice. and demonstrating a firm commitment by the Town to support this essential service.

My name is Benaifer Dastoor and I am Manager of Client Services at West Valley Community Services (WVCS), a nonprofit that serves the west valley community including the Town of Los Gatos.

As an agency that serves our homeless population, WVCS sees firsthand the dire need for support for our unhoused community members. I am writing to ask you to include homelessness as a strategic priority.

It is inhuman to let our fellow citizens remain unsheltered and live in deplorable conditions which impacts their physical and mental health. Everyday in my field of work I hear heartbreaking stories of how an individual or family became homeless. I have not come across anyone who has chosen homelessness over a roof on their head to start with. It is the circumstances – high rent, lack of affordable housing options in cities they live in, low wages, loss of work, unplanned medical expenses due to illness which took their homes away from them. Once caught in the downward spiral with no affordable options available they are reduced to living on streets and cars – days turn to months and months turn to years.

The longer we ignore the problem of homelessness the cost to the society will be enormous — we then are not just battling with homelessness but also substance abuse, deteriorating mental and physical health, loss of productivity — all of which will require huge investments. It is time that people in power and cities with millions of dollars in their coffers now focus their attention on this humanity and explore options of shelter, affordable housing for the unsheltered.

My Verbal comments for the Strategic Priorities meeting

My name is Lisa Wade and I have lived in the town of Los Gatos for over 30 years. I want to thank the town council for all you do.

My request is for the town to provide a small amount of funding for the Green Monday program. We realize that the town cannot provide funding for new programs. The Green Monday Resolution was adopted by the town council in 2018 and has been manifested as a handful of library programs that were all very well received.

Starting this year Plant-Based Advocates has partnered with the library to provide monthly programs to educate the public on the hows and whys of plant-based eating. We had a cooking demo earlier this month that was very popular with an outstanding attendance of 113 participants People are very interested in this topic and they want more.

In order for these library programs to continue we will need funding. Plant-based advocates is paying for the initial programs this year, but we are a self-funded nonprofit which means that we as individuals are literally paying for the programs from our own pockets. This is clearly unsustainable. Also, we have not been able to afford any in-person cooking classes that have been requested by the residents. The zoom class was a huge success but people can learn so much more from an in-person demo or class.

So why do we think the town should fund plant-based education when budgets are so tight?

- 1. A small amount of money would go a long way. The city of Mountain View conducted a consumption-based Green House Gas emissions inventory and found that funding plant-based education would give them the biggest bang for their buck in addressing climate change.
- 2. Residents of Los Gatos have asked the town to fund plant-based education. During the General plan process, the Town council received hundreds of emails from residents of Los Gatos asking for plant-based education. In fact, there were more emails received about housing and plant-based education than any other issue on the General plan. We also submitted a petition from residents with about 300 names. People want to eat fewer animal products but they don't always know what to eat instead. They want education.

3. It gets to the root of the problem

Most people who have spoken at council meetings during the General plan process have been in favor of town funding for plant-based education. However, there have been some who have said that while plant-based eating is a good idea they don't understand why the town should fund it when the town is experiencing serious problems like the threat of wildfires and flooding. This is exactly why we need to fund such programs. We need to get to the root of the problem. Of course, we need a robust fire prevention program and emergency relief services but these problems will only get worse if we don't address the root cause. The beauty of plant-based education is that it can make a huge impact with very little funding. it will go a long way in preventing these problems in the first place. We have to start addressing climate change and other environmental issues. Diet change addresses so many problems greenhouse gas emissions, water scarcity, species extinction, pollution of our land and water and the list goes on. Let's get to the root of the problem or things will only get worse. Let's not get lost in crisis management let's do something to prevent or mitigate our toughest problems. Even traffic won't be an issue if we don't save our planet.

4. City government can actually make changes.

It is very difficult to make changes on a federal or state level because of bureaucracy and powerful lobbying. Local government officials can actually make important changes and that is what we are asking you to do. The city of Mountain View allocated \$30, 000 for plant-based education which is a drop in the bucket of the city budget. We are not even asking for nearly that. \$5,000 or less would go a long way in making a big impact.

So many residents have asked the town to provide education so they can learn how to eat delicious, nutritious plant-based foods. They want to know what they can eat to get their protein on a plant-based diet. Plant-based education is also important for those who don't yet understand why we should prioritize plant-based eating. Some people don't yet know about the huge impact a diet shift can make. Let's get the information out there so people can make informed choices.

I have been paying attention to the ARC and Seniors 55+ issue that I and others are advocating to be put onto the Strategic Priorities docket this evening. I did ask Nancy Rollett to forward the "expectations" of the ARC as it pertained to management of the 55+ program so that I could discern what the discussion was about. Those are found in Exhibit F of the lease agreement. (see attached)

Exhibit F is a 14 year old loosely written document (virtually useless to manage to or measure results) that I doubt it has been looked into until the Senior Services and the Roadmap came into the picture. The rubber hit the road when the ARC board decided to no longer subsidize senior services, forcing everybody to look hard at what was or wasn't working.

I don't know anything about the rest of the lease, but I do think a lobotomy is needed on Exhibit F. That might also indicate the rest of the lease needs review. Because Ms Rollett runs a well oiled machine, I doubt there would be any discussion of the ARC's future had it not been for the ARC board pulling out their "subsidizing" of the Senior's program; assuming that subsidizing is the right description of what has happened.

This is an inflection point and all organizations have them. It's the perfect time to clean up the failings of the past. In my mind, the failings have been the lack of reviewing Exhibit F. Times have changed dramatically in the last 14 years. My personal view, after looking at Exhibit F is that the lobotomy is a good thing and everyone should want to renegotiate the lease, the expectations and the time lines. My knowledge of Ms. Rollett's management skills if fairly good and **I do not think there is a better person** more qualified to do the job. The Los Gatos Community Alliance fully endorse her capabilities. I believe that the organization cut their own pay 20% while the Town gave everyone 55% increases in salary?

You may or may not have been made aware of the Town's real financial position. As usual, we look below the canvas and point out that the Town is currently quite flush with funds for this discussion.

- 1) The TC likely isn't aware of the excess liquidity in FY 22. They should be, especially when 2 town service organizations (ARC and NUMU) are asking for permanent rent abatement for programs that have far exceeded the requirements set forth in the 2009 lease (Exhibit
- **F)** The impression at the TC level is that the Town can't afford to say yes when we think they can. Remember that in the case of the RecCenter, there are **no other towns/cities that charge rent** to their own service organizations. As it stands, our library is a large financial loss center when you include the bond repayment, and that's without charging them rent as we do the ARC and NUMU.

- (2) The TM makes reference to the Town's financial condition in her cover letter, but frankly we have no idea what the real condition is since the GF FY 22 revenues were at least \$4m greater than the adopted budget (how did that happen?) and operating expenses were at least \$2m less because of the number of open positions. And that doesn't include the \$3.4m in ARPA revenue.
- 3) **Mark to market** adjustments are non realized adjustments (it was a debit to revenue) and they need to be added back to properly determine cash flow. Furthermore the Town's bonds are held to maturity and redeemed at par and therefore a loss is never realized.

Observations:

- 1. The Senior Services direct and indirect scopes of work (Exhibit F) are, terribly lacking. They are inadequate at best and certainly not a management tool.
- 2. Reading between the lines, it seems that the Council has realized that the Senior Services costs money to operate, but they have no clue as to how much it does cost in todays' dollars. All they see is the inadequate list of requirements, and a request to abate rent and pay for the expenses of running the senior programs which by the way are found in our current Strategic Priorities.
- 3. I note that the original lease lists the services as "direct" and "indirect". Then in the governance reference, it refers to "baseline" and "essential" with no definition of either. As written, it seems to be apples vs oranges. That is the type of thing that needs to be cleaned up.
- 4. Using the 2009 agreement is useless in our opinion and a complete renegotiation should be committed to by all parties. As I read Councilmember Hudes suggestions moving forward, he seems to be supportive of keeping ARC alive for another year as this overall revamping of the lease, and review of the vast amount of services now offered, determine whether or not the Town is getting less than, or more than they bargained on. It's my opinion that Ms. Rollett has run such an efficient, popular program that it would have gone on unnoticed for years had it not been for the board pulling back Rec funds that subsidize the Senior Programs.

Putting everything on the table will take some time and there may be some give and take, but the end result would be a thorough statement of expectations and costs. I think that's what should eventually resolve this problem mainly caused by a poorly executed list of expectations, and then receiving much more than the Town pays for.

In summary:

The Town has more than enough money that can forever abate the lease costs to both the ARC and NUMU. No other towns charge their service organizations rent. For example, Los Gatos does not charge the library rent.

The ARC and NUMU are well run machines with talented a management. Let's not lose more top managers.

The expectations in Exhibit F are too loose to measure success or failure. They need a major overhaul.

Please be advised I represent David and Anita Goddard of 18251 Overlook Road, Gerard Hayden and Mary O'Connell of 18151 Overlook Road, Nate and Bobbi Vandegrift of 18201 Overlook Road, and Linda Rodriguez of 600 Pennsylvania Avenue (collectively, "Residents").

As you may be aware, on January 10, 2023, at approximately 2:00 a.m., two eucalyptus trees owned by the Town of Los Gatos ("Town") fell directly on properties at 18201 Overlook Road, and 18151 Overlook Road. This is not a situation where one tree knocked over another; rather, one tree fell and then the adjacent tree fell. These trees crushed two cars, a sewage line, hardscape, etc., at 18201 Overlook Road. The trees also crushed utility lines. The trees fell very close to homes and a few feet more could have caused serious bodily injury to occupants of the homes. The cars alone were worth approximately \$100,000. The trees also damaged a car on 18151 Overlook Road. The trees snapped a telephone pole in half, which resulted in power disruption for four days. It took the Town over three days to clear the fallen eucalyptus trees. The stumps still remain. Several residents were unable to exit their homes for days due to tree blockage and fallen power lines. Telephone service is still out with cables on the ground and

draping trees nearly two weeks after the event. I understand approximately 18 eucalyptus tree remain on Overlook Road from Wissahickon Avenue up to Chestnut Avenue. All of these trees are on Town property.

My clients have had an arborist look at the trees and I understand they are approximately 150 years old. The two trees that fell were approximately 147 feet tall. The fallen trees are not the tallest of the trees located on the Town's property. It is estimated that the remaining trees are approximately 170-180 feet tall. Many of the trunks are seven to eight feet in diameter. The largest is nine feet in diameter. These trees are a matter of feet (less than 30) from several homes. These trees, due to their size and proximity to homes, can only fall within an angle of roughly 20 degrees to avoid hitting a structure. Even within this narrow angle, other property is destroyed. The arborist opines that these trees pose an imminent danger to the Residents.

There is a history with these trees. In 2018, residents attempted to engage with the Town regarding concerns over the Town's management of these eucalyptus trees. Steve Regan assured David Goddard and other concerned residents in an August 2, 20218 e-mail that, "The ... Eucalyptus trees have been found to be in good health and structurally sound." He characterized the Town's approach as "proactive." David Goddard questioned why a more aggressive approach, with a focus on "protecting property and life, [was] not being taken with these trees." Rob Moulden wrote in response that he was satisfied with recent pruning of these trees, and assured concerned residents on August 24, 2018, that the trees were stable and were being properly maintained by thinning out on a regular basis (every 5+ years).

The Town's strategy for managing the risk posed by these eucalyptus trees is outlined in a proposal with subject line "Tree Trimming and Maintenance Services," dated May 30, 2018. This proposal was prepared by Steve Regan, Parks and Public Works Superintendent, and submitted by Laurel Prevetti, Town Manager, to the Los Gatos Town Council meeting on June 5, 2018. Regarding the Overlook eucalyptus trees, Steve Regan refers to the trees as "approximately 100 feet tall and 48 inches in diameter". This is completely inaccurate. Steve Regan writes in his proposal: "Proactive tree care through removal of up to 25% of the canopy [every 7 years] greatly reduces the chance for structural failure and fire hazard." It appears this program has failed.

To be fair, Steve Regan correctly acknowledges that eucalyptus trees in general and these trees in particular require high levels of maintenance and pose a "real danger...especially during heavy rain storms and high wind events." There are regular high wind events on Overlook Road and winds blow over the pass from Santa Cruz. This is the reason the trees were planted 150 years ago. There were only orchards present then. The trees were meant as a wind break.

Steve Regan also correctly acknowledges that eucalyptus trees pose a "high fire danger." The neighborhood is in the "very high" wildfire risk zone; in fact, the highest. Please refer to the Los Gatos 2040 plan for a map and discussion. If these eucalyptus trees go up in flames, the entire Glen Ridge/Almond Grove neighborhood is at risk as embers leap forward.

Los Gatos rezoned the Overlook neighborhood for single family housing in approximately 1970. Most of the current housing was built around that time. Despite this, and despite assertions to the contrary, the Town's strategy for managing the adjacent eucalyptus trees has not been "proactive" and has been based on incorrect assumptions regarding the actual size of these trees. Many other Bay Area cities are taking real responsibility for protecting residents' lives and property by removing city eucalyptus trees and mandating removal of private ones, as well. Examples include San Francisco, Saratoga, Los Altos Hills, Oakland (the Oakland zoo is removing 300 Eucalyptus to protect the animals as well as people).

Residents on Overlook Road are currently collecting signatures in support the removal of these 18 remaining eucalyptus trees. To date, approximately 30 neighborhood households have expressed support. A list will be forthcoming.

We are in the process of obtaining a written report from an arborist, which will confirm that these trees pose a significant and immediate health and safety risk, and could cause bodily injury. I am not an arborist; however, it is common knowledge that eucalyptus trees are not native to this area. Eucalyptus trees are prone to falling down because they have shallow, spreading roots that do not sufficiently anchor the trees. Eucalyptus trees are also a fire hazard. Eucalyptus oil emit flammable fumes, which are easily ignitable, causing the trees to explode. The Town of Los Altos, for example, previously unanimously approved the introduction of a eucalyptus policy mandating their removal. The council cited fire risks and the shallow root system posed a significant threat to residents. This is an example of how cities in this area have handled the threats posed by eucalyptus trees.

The Residents demand that the Town remove these 18 eucalyptus trees and that adequate funding be appropriated in the current budget cycle for this purpose.

The Residents respectfully request that this letter and the matter of the eucalyptus trees be addressed as a desk item in the Town Council Meeting today.
