2. Receive Informational Presentation from Los Gatos Thrives Foundation

The CHSSC heard and reviewed the Los Gatos Thrives Foundation's interim progress on its "needs report" for a new Los Gatos Community Center, appreciated the opportunity given to the CHSSC and community to provide input on that report, and encouraged the LGTF to continue its work on finalizing the Los Gatos Community Center's Needs Report.

3. Approve Minutes of the CHSSC June 11, 2024 Special Meeting

4. Provide a Recommendation to Town Council Regarding the Senior Services Coordinator Position.

The CHSSC reviewed and discussed the 3 options the Town Staff presented to the Town Council re: an Administrative Assistant, an Administrative Analyst and a Case Manager and the input report submitted by LGSRec 55+ Plus program.

1. The CHSSC agreed that much of the Administrative Assistant position is already being done by the LGSRec 55+ program and they should continue doing so.

2. The CHSSC reviewed the Administrative Analyst position and while it is a more appropriate level of responsibility, it does not exactly capture all the Coordinator Responsibilities envisioned by the CHSSC.

3. The CHSSC noted the Case Manager Position and clarified that the CHSSC already recommended funding up to a 0.5FTE Case Manager position utilizing the grant money that was also used to fund an additional 1.0 FTE position in the Adult Day Care Program.

4. The CHSSC also noted and discussed the report submitted by the LGSRec 55+ Program.

5. The CHSSC furthermore noted that "service providers" cannot be mandated to make changes because they do not come under the purview of the Town. But, it was clarified that any contracts signed between the Town and Service Providers could address this issue.

6. The CHSSC agreed that this new position should be a "pilot, contracted position" in order to fully assess its effectiveness in moving the Roadmap implementation to the next level.

The Town Council expressed their appreciation and noted that the Annual Report was comprehensive and excellent! Acknowledgement was given to the hard work of all the Commissioners, as well as the Asst. Town Manager Katie Nomura, Staff Liaison Ryan Baker and Service Providers in compiling the report.

#### Listed below are some anecdotal comments, suggestions, and/or questions about each goal area:

## •Goal 1:Welcoming and Inviting Facility

•All the work the LGTF has undertaken thus far was applauded.

•The Council expressed appreciation for the synergy and collaboration between CHSSC and the LGTF.

•Town Council requested CHSSC to suggest any additional repairs/upgrades that could still be made to the Interim Community Center with the remaining budget dollars.

•Town Council discussed whether or not the "new intergenerational community center" should be identified as a Town Project. This would be a big undertaking where roles and responsibilities would need to be developed. Plus, staff would need to be working directly on this project. Typically, if this were to occur, it would be when Strategic Priorities are being developed each year. There was agreement that this was not needed at this time.

#### •Goal 2: Core Senior Services

•Service Providers: there was discussion about the request made by Service Providers for free use of a room in the interim Community Center to provide more access for seniors. When the Town issued an RFI proposal, only 2 Service Providers responded. But, the CHSSC had received this input from more groups so it feels this is still a worthwhile request but the fees suggested by the Town could be a barrier for some. The Navigator Program in the library is seen as a model for this kind of program.

•Senior Services: Regarding the need for more awareness in the community of Senior Services, the CHSSC realizes that we need to develop a greater presence in the community not only via increased use of social media to promote programs but for programs to be more advertised in print and local newsletters, i.e. the Town's Newsletter.

#### •Goal 3: Communication and Engagement

•*HUB*: The development of the HUB and its on-going updates has proven to be a very effective way to communicate and engage not only with seniors but also other age groups. The HUB receives an average of 350 clicks per month. CHSSC is interested in increasing awareness of the HUB as evidenced by increasing numbers of clicks.

•*The Print:* The publication of the monthly LGSRec' 55+ program's, *The Print,* effectively promotes senior engagement and awareness.

•*The Outlook:* delivered to all senior households in LG each month provides more awareness of senor programming and services.

<u>\*The Los Gatan and the LG Weekly:</u> articles are published in these two newspapers frequently advertising senior services. One Commissioner publishes an almost weekly article in The Los Gatan.

•*HUB:* The CHSSC will be working to increase awareness of the HUB by additional advertising on social media sites, producing some hard copy flyers,etc.

•*HUB* – suggestions have been made of additional links on the HUB, which the CHSSC will work with LGS Rec 55+program, to implement.

## •Goal 4: Volunteer Support and Engagement

•*Volunteer:* maybe change approach – have local, non member Service Providers provide info on volunteer needs (perhaps another mini Resource Fair.)

•*Volunteer:* Maybe low tech solution – produce a binder of the HUB and place them strategically throughout the community for easy access.

•Volunteer - Another approach – link to a general page for people going thru transitions and label various volunteer opportunities such as: looking for social interaction, contribute to my local community, help the less fortunate, promote literature, art, etc., preserve the town, put on an event, clean up the community.

•*CHSSC recommendation:* full time Senior Services Coordinator is needed to make this goal fully achievable.

## •Goal 5: Enhanced Transportation Options

<u>•*Taste & Ride Outcomes*</u> – this program was highly praised and appreciated. It was suggested that the main outcomes for each Ride and Taste participant should be that each person learns how to read a bus schedule, learns where the bus stops are located, gets a self-paid or free clipper card, and uses public transit in the future.

•*Ride and Taste Funding* was clarified. This first year, Complete Streets and Transportation Commission funded the first ride and then Sassy funded the rest of the year. CHSSC was interested in supporting it via our budget but the new Town policy does not allow for donations to another entity.

•*The use of Commission budgets* was discussed. The new policy was just developed and the issue of donations can be re-examined to possibly include such donations because that was not the expected intent or outcome of the new policy. It was noted that LGTF has applied for a Town grant to ensure funding for this program.

<u>•Senior Signage:</u> - clarification was requested regarding the need for more senior signage. An example given was needed signage to the many walking trails in Los Gatos. Most people.do not know about them. A link could also be developed on the HUB re: these trails and/or more info could be included on signage to the parks. Perhaps, the Taste and Ride could point out trails or maybe even drop off for a short walk on one of the trails.

•*<u>Highway 17 Interchange</u>*: Town inquired if most people are aware of the extensive redevelopment of the H'way 17 interchange with Sar-Sunnyvale Road that is in the works. It is a long term project which most people do not seem to be aware of. It needs to be advertised and highlighted more. It will definitely improve safety at that interchange/intersections.

## •Goal 6: Senior Housing Options and Information

•*Housing Report* – it was decided that work on this Goal Area be delayed until the Town's Housing Element was approved. Since that has occurred, the editing/updating of the Town Housing Report (which one can access from the HUB) will begin. The Town also requested that in addition to the basic editing/updating, that the needs of the Senior Community in terms of what kinds of housing they feel is needed or desired be addressed. If any gaps in the kinds of housing are found, they should be noted as well as responding to : Do we need to build more affordable or some other kinds of housing?

#### •Goal 7: Integrated Governance, Funding, and Accountability

•*The CHSSC Goal 7 Task Force* has taken first steps in developing a matrix of accountability. Some Service Providers have pushed back on reporting details needed to assess effectiveness and accountability because **they report to their primary organization and/or the Town Council.** •*Funding and Sustainability:* Three of our local Service Providers all expressed concerns about their funding and its impact on program sustainability. A question was raised about the One Million Dollar Grant LGS Rec55+ program was awarded and its impact on this issue. The CHSSC was surprised to learn that not all of that money will go towards the 55+ program; rather it will be used more broadly to support older services throughout the community. When asked if the CHSSC could, in our role of assessing program accountability, determine how much is being used specifically to support the LGS Rec 55+Program, it was explained that the CHSSC does not have access to that level of budgetary detail.

#### •Suggestions, Requests, Recommendation:

<u>Youth Commissioner</u>: has been an on going problem for the CHSSC. Clarity is needed re: expectations of attendance and participation. Ironically, when a recent group of Youth Commissioners was polled – most expressed interest in CHSSC. Ideas: identify project(s) for the Youth Commissioner to do, such as: liaison with school PTA, social media advertising, etc.
<u>CHSSC recommended</u> that a full time Senior Services Coordinator be funded in order to bring the implementation of the Roadmap to the next level. There was an extensive discussion about this recommendation in the agenda item labeled re: Provide Direction on Senior Services Coordinator Options. The final recommendation was to send this item back to the CHSSC to get their input/recommendation working together with the LGSRec's 55+ Program. This item will be agendized on the CHSSC meeting on Aug. 22, 2024.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Discuss if opportunities exist for CHSSC involvement in community health projects.

#### BACKGROUND:

The Chair has requested that the Commission discuss opportunities for involvement in community health. The following excerpt outlines the one goal and seven polices addressing health that were adopted by Town Council as part of the 2040 General Plan:

## 6.13 Healthy Community

A healthy community promotes a positive physical, social, and economic environment that supports the overall well-being of its residents. While other parts of the General Plan also touch on aspects of health and quality of life, the purpose of section is to promote a healthy lifestyle and improve residents' quality of life.

Outdoor activity is also part of a healthier community. Bicycle and pedestrian options are covered in Section 5.2 (Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities) in the Mobility Element and in Section 6.2 (Parks and Recreation) in the Open Space, Parks, and Recreation Element.

The following goal and policies address health in Los Gatos.

PFS-26	Ensure all residents have access to healthy foods, including plant-based options.
PFS-26.1	Healthy Food Options Encourage farmer's markets and healthier food options within neighborhoods or near child- oriented uses (e.g., schools, day care, and parks).
PFS-26.2 нс	Limit Concentrations of Alcohol and Tobacco Establish zoning code requirements to guide locations and restrict concentrations of businesses selling alcohol and tobacco near sensitive land uses.
<b>PFS-26.3</b> нс	Healthier Diet Options Support programs that guide healthier diet and plant-based eating options within the community.

PFS-26.4 ЕЈ НС	Support Santa Clara County Efforts Support Santa Clara County efforts and public health programs that improve access to healthy foods, address food inequities, and provide food education to help residents make healthier food choices.
PFS-26.5 ЕЈ НС	Support Acceptance of Government-Issued Vouchers Support the acceptance of Government-issued food vouchers (such as WIC and Cal FRESH) via an Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card at food retailers and farmers markets.
РFS-26.6 нс	Healthy Food at Government-sponsored Events The Town shall provide healthy foods at Town-sponsored meetings and events when food is provided.

#### LOS GATOS BEHAVIORAL HEALTH REPORT

#### I Background

During the past several years there has been a significant decline in behavioral health (BH), including mental health (MH) and substance use (SU), throughout our county across all age groups. Community Health Needs Assessments (CHNAs) by numerous health care providers and the Santa Clara County (SCC) Public Health Department captured that decline. Locally, according to a recent survey of Older Adults in Los Gatos (CASOA) conducted by SASCC, 21% of the respondents reported mental health challenges. Another county survey found that about 30% of residents over age 60 live with depression and 80% said they do not have access to quality mental health care. Mental health issues also affect early adult and middle age residents, the missing middle, who struggle to find therapists. CASSY and ASPIRE have reported a significant increase in depression among Los Gatos students.

#### II Local Needs Assessment

Service providers and community organizations are doing heroic work every day to support the mental health of youth, adults, and seniors. While different groups address different parts of the problem and implement different solutions, all of them face significant challenges. A number of these groups were interviewed over the past few months to help answer the following basic questions:

- What initiatives should Los Gatos undertake to advance behavioral health in our community?
- How should the town respond to the increasing demand for services across all demographics?
- Are there things the Los Gatos community can do to destigmatize mental health issues?
- What community outreach programs work?

Interviews were held with the following individuals and typically lasted an hour per interview.

Marico Sayoc, Executive Director of CASSY Joseph Sandoval, Jonathan Cowan, and Lauren Johnson, El Camino Hospital Jeannie Anderson, Good Samaritan Hospital Matt Savage and Joe Simitian, Santa Clara County Supervisor's Office Margaret Obilor and Elania Reis, SCC Behavioral Health Services Department Vic Ojakian, National Alliance on Mental Illness Jere King, Children's Health Council Jason Noriega, Momentum for Mental Health Anna Nguyen, ACT for Mental Health

In addition to these interviews, an extended discussion with service providers was held at a Los Gatos/Saratoga Service Providers Quarterly Meeting to explore services and resources needed. The SASCC Health Fair 2022, Stop The Stigma, gave us the opportunity to engage with additional providers as they endeavored to respond to questions and concerns raised by attendees.

#### III Behavioral and Mental Health Ecosystem in Los Gatos, a Service Assessment

After gathering data from the array of sources summarized above, the Commission analyzed the results and determined that Los Gatos, and in fact the entire West Valley, needed to improve access to mental health care. Our current assessment is that there is:

- Insufficient provision of behavioral health services
- Insufficient live therapy sessions, which are important for building trust
- Inadequate supply of licensed clinicians, social workers, and case managers
- Difficult to navigate county service tools and no tools available in Los Gatos
- After school programs, long term counseling, and parent workshops need expansion

#### IV Summary of Suggestions from Needs Assessment

- Consider ways to make services better known, easier to access, and feel "local" hubs, fairs, flyers, forums, webinars.
- Find ways to optimize service provider assignment to leverage scarce resources.
- Develop a physical location in town to serve as a mental health resource center. Include a physical setup for telehealth operations.
- Develop programs that teach older adults how to navigate the mental health landscape and select a mental health provider.
- Find ways to structure financial partnerships with mental health service providers.
- Deepen youth and family support programs, programs that educate parents, and those that enable long term counseling.
- Support the development of after school counseling programs such as ASPIRE and allcove.
- Encourage the expansion of respite care and storytelling for seniors.
- Increase collaboration by affiliating with regional entities and jointly sponsoring activities.
- Seek funding from county/state/MHSA sources for pilot programs to advance MH services.
- Expand county MH outreach with an access point or satellite operation in Los Gatos.
- Expansion of outpatient therapy would have a significant impact.
- Facilitate the development of peer-based support groups widows, drug users, jail moms, etc.
- V. Potential Funding Sources and Collaborations

In an October memorandum, SCC Supervisor Simitian requested that the Board of Supervisors develop options for improving access to mental health care in the West Valley. This could include partnering with one of more community organizations and SCC financing of pilot studies through the Mental Health Services Act. The possibility of such a partnership has taken a major step forward recently with the announcement of the county undertaking a feasibility study to bring a Valley Health Center clinic to the De Anza Community College campus in Cupertino.

The El Camino Hospital Foundation expressed an interest in fundraising initiatives and special events that would support mental health programs such as ASPIRE. El Camino offered to present some of these ideas to the CHSSC and town council.

CASSY has expressed an interest in creating a program in Los Gatos similar to the one it developed in Ravenswood with support from donors and developers.

The Los Gatos Senior Services Committee has proposed establishing a 501(c)3 nonprofit to support fundraising for seniors services. A similar approach could be utilized for mental health services.

#### VI Recommendations

Some of the suggestions can be implemented with little additional cost to the town. Others require investment, but there are means to limit its extent. For example, the Los Gatos Town Council created a Senior Services Committee over a year ago to examine the longer-term needs of its older adult community. It developed a 10-year roadmap for revitalizing senior service in Los Gatos. With support from Santa Clara County, surrounding communities, and engaged service providers, a similar plan could be developed for mental health services in the West Valley. The town should encourage and become actively involved in any effort to develop such a plan. There is already evidence of momentum at the county level.

The CHSSC should take the initiative by creating a subcommittee to prepare a mental health services roadmap. The subcommittee ought to invite expert guests from the County Behavioral Health Services Department and the population of local service providers to contribute. Some key elements of the roadmap will be education, outreach, and service integration. The CHSSC should also assist CASSY in developing a proposal for improved case management of youth mental health services in Los Gatos.

The town ought to actively explore the possibility of a local service network by allocating space for a county satellite operation and providing a facility to support telehealth operations.

## Programs and Classes to Assist Youth with Mental Health Issues

Here are some programs and classes that can equip college students and adults to support young people's mental health:

## Mental Health First Aid (MHFA)

- Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA): This program teaches individuals how to identify, understand, and respond to signs of mental illness and substance use disorders in young people.
- Mental Health First Aid for Adults: Similar to YMHFA, this program focuses on adults who may be experiencing mental health issues.

## **Course Evaluation:**

- Pre- and post-course assessments
- Participant feedback surveys
- Observation of volunteer interactions with youth

Prioritize proposed Senior Coordinator duties

## BACKGROUND:

At their September 17, 2024 meeting, the Town Council approved hiring a .48FTE Senior Coordinator. As this approval will provide a workload less than what was recommended by the CHSSC, the Council has asked the CHSSC to prioritize their proposed duties of the position.

## CHSSC Recommends: Appointment of an Age Friendly/Senior Services Coordinator

Vibrant communities provide opportunities for older members to become volunteers and/or to find needed assistance from volunteers. Promoting and supporting volunteerism allows the community to marshal the expertise of older adults and to increase engagement of older adults for the benefit of the entire community. Our Committee found that many older adults want to volunteer, and many others need volunteers for help. With volunteer time in California currently estimated at approximately \$30hr by the Independent Sector organization, the many 1000's of hours available locally represents an important resource for the Town to take advantage of as much as possible.

## An Age-Friendly Coordinator could address many of these goals:

- •Integrate the delivery of services to older adults
- •Assist with implementing the Senior Services Committee's Road Map

•Report and make recommendations to the Town Council about his/her observations concerning the delivery of services and how best to streamline the services provided by service providers

•Act as the point of contact for the Commissions, Service Provider organizations, Los Gatos Foundation For Older Adults To Thrive, and regional nonprofits providing services for Los Gatos older adults

•Be the point of contact for the key provider of recreational services to older adults (currently LGS Recreation)

•Receive information from the three CHSSC activities coordinators involving Communication & Engagement, Roadmap Tracking, and Annual Assessments

•Serve as the point of contact for questions about volunteer opportunities as Roadmap projects advance in support of this goal

•Facilitate review and presentation to Town Council of the Annual Assessment of Senior Services provided by the CHSSC for receipt by the Town Council

•Provide information and support for the Town Council review of the Roadmap progress and governance on a semiannual basis

As the Roadmap successes accrue in future years and senior services delivery advances, there may be considerable leverage gained by increasing the fractional 0.5 FTE allocation to the Town's Age-Friendly Coordinator. This graded approach could facilitate the transition of Los Gatos senior services governance from a fragmented model to an integrated partnership model.

#### Next steps:

- 1. An Age-Friendly Coordinator is hired
- 2. Funding: Town of Los Gatos, Los Gatos Thrives Foundation, Grants,
- Purposed: Ensure the Coordinator is briefed on the senior services landscape. This position would provide an important step to realizing the Roadmap vision of a coordinated partnership for senior services between the Town, Town commissions and boards, the Los Gatos Foundation For Older Adult to Thrive, community service providers, and other nonprofits and regional providers.

## I. DUTIES OF COORDINATOR:

**Senior Services Landscape Assessment:** The Senior Coordinator shall conduct a comprehensive assessment of the senior services landscape in Los Gatos, including:

- Identifying existing service providers and their offerings
- Assessing service gaps and unmet needs
- Understanding the demographic characteristics of the senior population

**HUB Access:** The Senior Coordinator shall have full access to the HUB for all purposes related to senior services coordination.

**Metric Development and Monitoring:** The Senior Coordinator shall establish and monitor key performance indicators (KPIs) to measure the effectiveness of senior services, including:

- Service utilization rates
- Participant satisfaction
- Cost-effectiveness
- Accessibility
- Collaboration among providers

**Service Integration and Streamlining:** The Senior Coordinator shall conduct analysis to identify overlaps in service delivery, integrate services where appropriate, and make recommendations to streamline the services provided by service providers.

**Community Engagement:** The Senior Coordinator shall:

- Attend and participate in meetings of the Community Health and Senior Services Commission (CHSSC)
- Report to the CHSSC on the progress of senior services initiatives
- Assist with the implementation of the Senior Services Road Map
- Serve as the point of contact for the provider of recreational services to older adults
- Receive information from the CHSSC on its activities
- Be the point of contact for questions about volunteer activities
- Facilitate the review and presentation of the annual assessment of senior services to the Town Council

#### BACKGROUND:

The following is the list of Community Grant Recipients for FY24-25. No action is needed by the Commission.

The Town of Los Gatos is pleased to announce the awardees for the FY2024-25 Community Grants. This year was a highly competitive application process with 38 applications received by the deadline. \$180,000 will be awarded in the Community Grant category, \$25,000 will be awarded in the Rental Assistance category, and \$95,000 will be awarded in the Sustaining Grant category.

#### Community Grant awards will be made to (in alphabetical order):

- Art Docents of Los Gatos, for \$4,500 to host community events aiming to retain and recruit volunteers crucial for continuing to teach the students in the Los Gatos Union School District.
- Billy Jones Wildcat Railroad, for \$10,000 to purchase new rail to replace worn sections.
- Collaborating Agencies' Disaster Relief Effort (CADRE), for \$10,000 to connect Los Gatos nongovernmental, faith-based groups, businesses, transportation services, mass care services and existing networks with our countywide support networks to enhance disaster resilience.
- Girls on the Run of Silicon Valley, for \$10,000 to support the 2025 Girls on the Run of Silicon Valley (GOTRSV) 5K Fun Run in Oak Meadow & Vasona Parks.
- Jewish Silicon Valley, for \$10,000 for a fitness event for the special needs community, active older adults, and other interested parties.
- Kyle J. Taylor Foundation, for \$10,000 to screen the hearts of 500 Los Gatos youth ages 12-25 to protect them from life-threatening underlying conditions that go undetected in most young people.
- Los Gatos Community Concert Association, for \$7,500 to support four professional music groups performing in Los Gatos during the 2024 2025 season.
- Los Gatos Foundation for Older Adults to Thrive, for \$1,500 to support five events to train and encourage seniors to ride the bus in partnership with VTA.
