BACKGROUND:

Since June 2004, Council has appointed students in Grades 8 through 12 as members of the Youth Commission. The Youth Commission fosters and encourages civic and neighborhood pride in Los Gatos youth and builds a sense of identity through knowledge, understanding, and involvement in the Town's municipal affairs.

The Town used a variety of mechanisms to recruit for the Youth Commission. Commissioners with terms expiring received notification of the recruitment and notices of the upcoming vacancies were posted at Town Hall. Information regarding the recruitment was distributed on the Town's What's New email blast, the Town's social media accounts, and posted on the Town's website. In addition, the Town also contacted local schools requesting they help promote the Youth Commission opportunities.

DISCUSSION:

The application deadline was April 28, 2023, and the Town received seventeen (17) applications. On May 3, 2023, the Town Council Selection Committee, comprised of Mayor Ristow, Vice Mayor Badame, Chief Field, and Youth Commission Chair Quincy Scott, interviewed fifteen (15) applicants for fifteen (15) available positions. Two of the applicants did not attend the interview and therefore were not considered for appointment.

RESOLUTION 2018-008

RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS RESCINDING RESOLUTION 2016-059 AND ESTABLISHING RULES FOR THE YOUTH COMMISSION

WHEREAS, it is recognized that a youth perspective on issues which pertain to the youth in the community is an important part of decision making in Town; and

WHEREAS, there is value in increasing communication between adults and youth; and

WHEREAS, there is value in having a mechanism for youth to have a voice in Town affairs and issues relating to youth; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos found and determined that the purpose of the Youth Commission is to foster and encourage civic and neighborhood pride and a sense of identity through the knowledge, understanding, and increased involvement of the Town's youth in the Town's present and future municipal affairs.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS THAT:

- There is a need for a Youth Commission to function in the Town of Los Gatos, which would establish a formal body by which the youth of Los Gatos would have a voice in the community.
- There is hereby established a Youth Commission which shall generally be responsible for studying various problems, activities and other issues of concern to the youth in general, and for advising Council on matters pertaining to issues involving the youth of Los Gatos.
 - a. Membership/Organization
 - The Youth Commission shall consist of twenty (20) members. The
 members shall be students who are entering grades 8 through 12.
 Membership for the students requires residency in the incorporated
 limits of the Town of Los Gatos or residency in the unincorporated areas
 of the County of Santa Clara, which have a Los Gatos mailing address.
 - ii. Members shall serve a term of two (2) years and until their successors are appointed and qualified. Members who are entering grade 12 when appointed and first time appointees shall serve a term of one (1) year.

ATTACHMENT 2

- iii. The Commission shall appoint one (1) primary member and one (1) alternate to serve as one voting member on the following Town Boards and Commissions:
 - 1. Arts and Culture Commission
 - 2. Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Commission
 - 3. Community and Senior Services Commission
 - 4. Library Board
 - 5. Parks Commission
 - 6. Transportation and Parking Commission
 - iv. In addition to all Youth Commission meetings, the primary member shall attend all meetings of the Board or Commission they are appointed to. If the primary member is not able to attend the meeting of the Board or Commission they are assigned, it shall be the responsibility of the alternate to attend the meeting. If the primary member misses three (3) meetings of the Board or Commission the Youth Commission shall appoint a new primary member, and if necessary, a new alternate.
 - v. Liaisons shall provide a monthly report to the Youth Commission and be responsible for conveying the Youth Commission's input to the Board or Commission.
 - vi. A majority of members shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting business.
 - vii. Commission members shall serve without compensation, provided that, with advance budgetary approval of the Town Council, the actual and necessary expenses (if any) incurred by the members in the conduct of Town business shall be reimbursable pursuant to the current Council policy.
- 3. The Commission shall hold a regular meeting at least once each month between September and June. The Commission shall establish a regular time and location for its meetings and shall otherwise call and conduct its meetings in compliance with the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code Sections 54950 and following.)
- 4. The Commission shall elect a Chair and Vice-Chair, both of whom shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission. Terms of office shall be for one (1) year and shall begin on the first meeting in September and end the following June.
- 5. Minutes of the actions taken during its meetings shall be kept and filed with the Town Clerk Administrator.

- 6. Meeting attendance requirements will conform with all current Town Resolutions and Policies.
- 7. The duties of the Commission shall include the following:
 - a. Foster greater involvement of youth in municipal government affairs.
 - b. Study problems, activities, and concerns of youth, especially as they relate to municipal programs or projects of the Town of Los Gatos.
 - c. Hold forums on problems, activities and concerns of youth, either alone or in conjunction with other governmental agencies and community organizations, as the Commission deems desirable.
 - d. Review municipal matters referred to the Commission by the Town Council or other Town boards, committees, or commissions and, as appropriate, make recommendations on those matters.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Resolution 2016-059 is hereby rescinded.

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on this 7th day of December 2021 by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and AMS Electric LLC dba Prime Electric LLC, whose address is 1941 Ringwood Ave. Suite 140, San Jose, CA, 95131. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 The Town desires to engage Consultant to provide Design-Build services for development of plans and construct a Battery Electrical storage system at the Library.
- 1.2 The Consultant represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Consultant warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement.

 Consultant acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Consultant.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Consultant shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on December 1, 2021, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A and B.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. This contract will remain in effect from date of execution to June 30, 2023.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Consultant represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession. Consultant shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Consultant shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Information/Report Handling</u>. All documents furnished to Consultant by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Consultant under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of Consultant's services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Consultant in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and

the Consultant shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Consultant or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Consultant in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Consultant expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Consultant which is and has been confirmed in writing by Consultant to be a trade secret of Consultant.

- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation for Consultant's professional services **shall not exceed \$513,000**, inclusive of all costs. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.
- 2.7 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.8 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Consultant shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Consultant shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Consultant's offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Consultant. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.10 Independent Contractor. It is understood that the Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Consultant may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Consultant agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under

this Agreement. Consultant shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Consultant or is based on allegations of Consultant's negligent performance or wrongdoing.

- 2.11 <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. Consultant understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Consultant has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Consultant has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Consultant warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Consultant shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person, Consultant discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 Equal Employment Opportunity. Consultant warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Consultant nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Consultant agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Consultant shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Consultant agrees that all

- certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.
- iv. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, professional liability insurance in amounts not less than \$1,000,000 which is sufficient to insure Consultant for professional errors or omissions in the performance of the particular scope of work under this agreement.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant, premises owned or used by the Consultant. This requirement does not apply to the professional liability insurance required for professional errors and omissions.
- ii. The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Consultant shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Consultant shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Consultant provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Consultant shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities,

penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Consultant, or any of the Consultant's officers, employees, or agents or any subconsultant.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Consultant shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Consultant shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Consultant. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Consultant an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Prevailing Wages</u>. This project is subject to the requirements of Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code requiring the payment of prevailing wages, the training of apprentices and compliance with other applicable requirements. Contractors and all subcontractors who perform work on the project are required to comply with these requirements. Prevailing wages apply to all projects over \$1,000 which are defined as a "public work" by the State of California. This includes: construction, demolition, repair, alteration, maintenance and the installation of photovoltaic systems under a Power Purchase Agreement when certain conditions are met under Labor Code Section 1720.6. This include service and warranty work on public buildings and structures.
 - 4.4.1 The applicable California prevailing wage rate can be found at www.dir.ca.gov and are on file with the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department, which shall be available to any interested party upon request._The contractor is also required to have a copy of the applicable wage determination posted and/or available at each jobsite.
 - 4.4.2 Specifically, contractors are reminded of the need for compliance with Labor Code Section 1774-1775 (the payment of prevailing wages and documentation

- of such), Section 1776 (the keeping and submission of accurate certified payrolls) and 1777.5 in the employment of apprentices on public works projects. Further, overtime, weekend and holiday pay, and shift pay must be paid pursuant to applicable Labor Code section.
- 4.4.3 The public entity for which work is being performed or the California Department of Industrial Relations may impose penalties upon contractors and subcontractors for failure to comply with prevailing wage requirements. These penalties are up to \$200 per day per worker for each wage violations identified; \$100 per day per worker for failure to provide the required paperwork and documentation requested within a 10-day window; and \$25 per day per worker for any overtime violation.
- 4.4.4 As a condition to receiving progress payments, final payment and payment of retention on any and all projects on which the payment of prevailing wages is required, the contractor agrees to present to the TOWN, along with its request for payment, all applicable and necessary certified payrolls (for itself and all applicable subcontractors) for the time period covering such payment request. The term "certified payroll" shall include all required documentation to comply with the mandates set forth in Labor Code Section 1720 et seq, as well as any additional documentation requested by the Agency or its designee including, but not limited to: certified payroll, fringe benefit statements and backup documentation such as monthly benefit statements, employee timecards, copies of wage statements and cancelled checks, proof of training contributions (CAC2 if applicable), and apprenticeship forms such as DAS-140 and DAS-142.
- 4.4.5 In addition to submitting the certified payrolls and related documentation to the TOWN, the contractor and all subcontractors shall be required to submit certified payroll and related documents electronically to the California Department of Industrial Relations. Failure to submit payrolls to the DIR when mandated by the project parameters shall also result in the withholding of progress, retention and final payment.
- 4.4.6 No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5 [with limited exceptions from this requirement for bid purposes only under Labor Code section 1771.1(a)].
- 4.4.7 No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project, unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. Contractors MUST be a registered "public works contractor" with the DIR AT THE TIME OF BID. Where the prime contract is less than \$15,000 for maintenance work or less than \$25,000 for construction alternation, demolition or repair work, registration is not required.
- 4.4.8 Should any contractor or subcontractors not be a registered public works contractor and perform work on the project, Contractor agrees to fully indemnify the TOWN for any fines assessed by the California Department of

- Industrial Relations against the TOWN for such violation, including all staff costs and attorney's fee relating to such fine.
- 4.4.9 The TOWN shall withhold any portion of a payment; including the entire payment amount, until certified payroll forms and related documentation are properly submitted, reviewed and found to be in full compliance. In the event that certified payroll forms do not comply with the requirements of Labor Code Section 1720 et seq., the TOWN may continue to hold sufficient funds to cover estimated wages and penalties under the contract.
- 4.5 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Consultant.
- 4.6 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.7 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Consultant. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

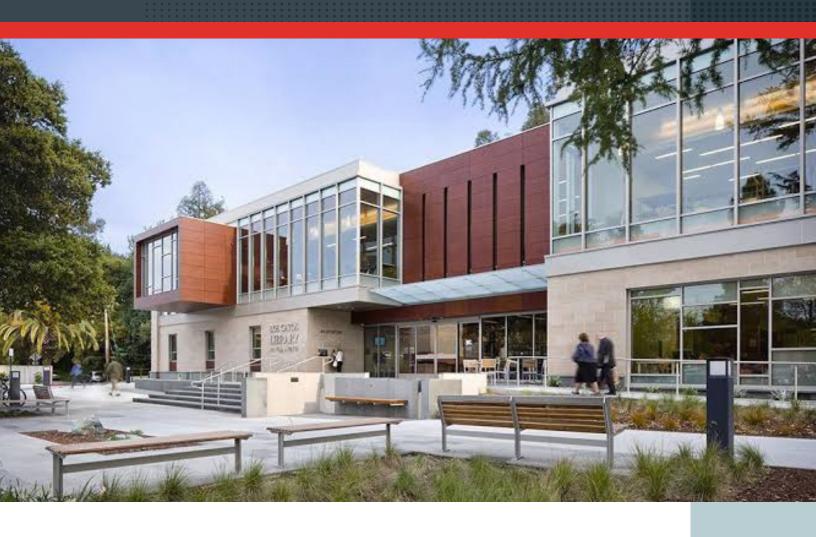

Solar Technologies will design and furnish a 125-kilowatt ELM Microgrid Battery Storage system to provide 100% backup power during grid outage. The ELM Microgrid ESS has been engineered to form a microgrid, and can perform demand response, Time of Use, and self-consumption. The microgrid system integrates an EPC bi-directional inverter (PCS), Kore's UL 9540a lithium-ion battery, ELM Fieldsight energy management software and an energy meter which measures your facility's energy consumption and deploys energy as needed. All of these components are bundled in a pre-engineered NEMA 3R enclosure which includes thermal management.

The system will be designed with a charging or discharging power of 125 KW and an energy storage capacity of 330 kWh. The energy storage capacity is capable of future expansion up to 440 kWh.

The system will include a free standing NEMA 3R battery cabinet inclusive of battery modules, battery racks, integral controls, and fire suppression system. During times the grid is functioning, the system will provide self-consumption, energy arbitrage and demand charge management peak shaving functionality.

SYSTEM OPERATION

ELM's Energy storage system can be used in 4 key storage applications for commercial battery systems:

Forms a Microgrid: The system will form a microgrid either for the lifetime of the system or intermittently upon grid failure. Included in the standard microgrid system is a battery, inverter, internal UPS used for system controls, wiring box, grid relay and contactor.

Demand Response: Energy Storage system is used to offset a facilities demand charges by reducing the demand to the local utility by deploying energy from the battery during preset peak demand times

Time of Use Shifting (TOU): This system will store less expensive off-peak energy into the battery and then deploys that energy from the battery during more expensive peak rate times.

Self-Consumption: In markets that do not allow net metering your battery system can store excess PV generation thus preventing the system from back-feeding PV power to the grid.

System Overview & Functionality:

This system will have full Microgrid functionality as well as additional functionality that may be used to add capabilities and decrease electricity costs. Depending on how much electricity is being used, the system will provide power for at least 2 hours and could run infinitely with solar input. An onsite generator could also be used for onsite power. The preferred scenario would be that the generator would only need to be used in rare circumstances during times of especially low solar production (e.g. a large winter storm in January) Below is a typical system of operations.

Sequence of Operations

The two main operational modes are Island (backup) and Grid Tied.

1.1 Island Mode (SOO2/SOO3)

In this mode, the Microgrid will operate as an island isolated from the utility grid. The goal in this mode is to maximize the use of available battery and PV and minimize the use of the generator. In this mode, there are two operational modes and three sub modes:





- Genset ON (SOO2): When the combined maximum output of the PV array and battery (a minimum SOC threshold for the battery has been reached) is insufficient to support the loads, the site controller should turn ON the genset incorporating a seamless transition. While the genset is ON, the storage inverter will be utilized to support the load and charge the battery in current source mode. The generator will be operating in a constant power mode while charging the batteries with excess power generation. PV will be utilized if available.
- Genset OFF (SOO3): While there is sufficient PV generation and battery capacity available, the
 generator will remain off and the storage inverter will form the grid and act as the Microgrid
 master. The PV inverters will sense the AC voltage on their terminals and follow the storage
 inverter.

1.2 Grid Tied Mode (SOO6/SOO5)

In this mode, the Microgrid will operate in parallel with the utility grid. The goal is to maximize the local consumption of the PV generation and battery while keeping the batteries charged to prepare for an outage. If there is sufficient PV generation, the solar array will power the loads on site. If the load is fully met, PV will prioritize charging the battery bank until the battery state-of-charge (SOC) reaches 100%. If the PV generation exceeds the amount of power the battery can absorb (either due to high SOC or charge power limitations), the Microgrid can either export excess PV generation to the utility grid if allowed or curtail excess PV to prevent from exporting PV power to the grid. The microgrid will never export any battery power to the grid.

- Peak Shaving (SOO6): The Microgrid can be enabled to use PV and the battery up to a specific SOC threshold (configurable) to minimize grid import power by setting a load threshold the user wants to keep the grid power below.
- Demand Response (SOO6): The Microgrid can be enabled to use PV and the battery up to a specific SOC threshold (configurable) to minimize grid import power only during certain times by setting a load threshold the user wants to keep the grid power below.

We will provide equipment cutsheets, shop drawings, factory test reports, wiring diagrams, commissioning reports, as-builts and O&M Data as specified.





PROPOSAL ASSUMPTIONS, CLARIFICATIONS AND EXCLUSIONS

- Building permit fee and PG&E interconnection applications are excluded, to be passed through at direct cost without markup; we will request an estimate from AHJ prior to execution of contracts.
- New concrete pad with steel bollards for protection of energy storage enclosure to be provided by others. Included.
- Site preparation, including grading, soil stabilization, removal of landscaping and final grading is excluded and to be performed by others if needed.
- Microgrid control system programming & commissioning is excluded.
- Microgrid metering, relays, critical load panels and other related infrastructure and labor is excluded.
- Proposal assumes the existing Solar PV source circuit can be re-routed to energy storage system bussing.
- Proposal assumes as-built plan sets, C-ALTA, Geotechnical and Title Reports provided by Customer are sufficient for system engineering and permitting approval requirements. Additional studies or engineering reports will be charged in addition to proposal if required.
- On-site construction and labor services are excluded from our quote, prevailing wages would not apply.
- Repairs or upgrades to the property not described within this Proposal which are otherwise required or discovered during the project. This can include existing electrical equipment, structural improvements, roof system repairs, etc.
- Utility company interconnection requirements such as NGOM meters or upgrades to Utility company infrastructure or mitigation work required through the utility interconnection application are excluded.
- Any extraordinary engineering, approvals, discretionary reviews, special certification or testing would be charged in addition to this Proposal.

Los Gatos Library Battery for Electrical Storage Project

The Los Gatos Library is currently equipped with a 40kw solar photovoltaic system and is an ideal site for community energy resilience project. The scope of work for this project includes an evaluation of the existing solar photovoltaic (PV) system, the design of a battery electrical storage system, assembly of specified equipment and connection to the electrical and solar PV systems in the building. The Town of Los Gatos plans on using SVCE grant funding to pay for the consultant portion of the project, which will include the evaluation of existing equipment and design of a battery storage system including battery equipment location. The construction of the battery system will allow for future expansion of the system. The battery in conjunction with the electrical system will be set up to provide backup power to a designated area in the Library which will accommodate patrons with lighting, backup power for electronic device charging and minimal air conditioning to meet the needs of a Community Resource Center.

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a First Amendment to the Agreement with Pacific Water Art for fountain maintenance and repair services (Attachment 1), extending the term to June 30, 2024, and to add to the compensation \$46,495 for a total Agreement amount not to exceed \$253,505.

BACKGROUND:

The Town of Los Gatos has used contract services for the maintenance and repair of the interactive fountain located in Plaza Park for the past 22 years and the Civic Center fountain for the past five years. Staff reviews these maintenance contracts regularly to ensure that the services provided are being performed satisfactorily, are competitively priced, and continue to meet the Town's expectations and contract terms.

Pacific Water Art built the Plaza Fountain 22 years ago as part of a Town Plaza Capital Improvement Project, along with providing ongoing maintenance and repair services. In 2018 the Town issued a Request for Proposals and subsequently entered into an agreement with Pacific Water Art to provide maintenance services for both of these assets following a competitive bidding process (Attachment 2).

DISCUSSION:

Pacific Water Art, Inc. is the best qualified vendor to provide the requested services. The extension of the Agreement term would allow for continuity of service and maximizes savings by engaging the vendor for another year. The contract language provides for cancellation should the need arise during the contract term and ties the work to the budget appropriated by the Town Council annually. To accommodate the potential impacts of inflation on the service, the contract allows for annual increases based on the Consumer Price Index (CPI).

The current fountain maintenance and repair contract with Pacific Water Art will expire on June 30, 2023. Due to the extreme storms experienced this year and the damage to the many trees, streets, and sidewalks still outstanding, resources have been shifted to prioritize those efforts and a new Request for Proposals for the fountain maintenance and repair was not able to be issued. As such, staff is requesting the time extension and additional budget required to continue operation of the fountains for one additional year.

CONCLUSION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a First Amendment to the Agreement for Services with Pacific Water Art to provide services for fountain maintenance and repair services, extending the term to June 30, 2024, and to add to the compensation \$46,495 for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$253,505.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The Proposed FY 2023/24 Operating Budget includes sufficient funding for these services.

ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:

The proposed agreement and related services are not a project defined under CEQA, and no further action is required.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT

This FIRST AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES is dated for identification this 6th day of June 2023 and amends that certain AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES dated July 1, 2018, made by and between the Town of Los Gatos, ("Town,") and the Pacific Water Art ("Service Provider") identified as an S Corporation and whose address is 330 Matthew Street, Santa Clara, CA 95050.

RECITALS

- A. Town and Service Provider entered into an Agreement for Services on July 1, 2018 ("Agreement"), copies of which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference as Exhibit A to this Amendment.
- B. Town desires to amend the Agreement for Services to extend the term, add to the compensation and add to the minimum scope of insurance of the agreement.

AMENDMENT

1. Section 2.2 Term and Time of Performance is amended to read:

This contract will remain in effect from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2024.

2. Section 2.6 Compensation is amended to read as follows:

Compensation for July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024:

- Routine maintenance and repair services shall not exceed \$19,870.
- Unforeseen repairs to interactive fountain components shall not exceed \$26,625, for a total amount of \$46,495.
- Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.

The total agreement amount for years 1-6 shall not exceed \$253,505, inclusive of all costs.

3. Section 3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance is amended to read as follows:

Service Provider agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: two million dollars (\$2,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.

4. All other terms and conditions of the Agreement remain in full force and effect.

Agreement for Services

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 1st of July 2018 and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and Pacific Water Art, Inc., ("Service Provider"), whose address is 1244 Birchwood Drive, Sunnyvale, CA 94089. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 The Town desires to engage Service Provider to provide fountain maintenance and repair services.
- 1.2 The Service Provider represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Service Provider warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Service Provider acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Service Provider.

II. AGREEMENT

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Service Provider shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on May 25, 2018, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. The effective date of this Agreement shall begin on July 1, 2018 and will continue through June 30, 2023, subject to appropriation of funds, notwithstanding any other provision in this agreement.
- 2.3 Compliance with Laws. The Service Provider shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Service Provider represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Service Provider to practice its profession. Service Provider shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Service Provider shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Information/Report Handling</u>. All documents furnished to Service Provider by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Service Provider under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Service Provider in connection with the performance of its services pursuant

to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Service Provider shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Service Provider or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Service Provider pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Service Provider in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Service Provider expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Service Provider which is and has been confirmed in writing by Service Provider to be a trade secret of Service Provider.

2.6 <u>Compensation</u>.

- Compensation for routine maintenance and repairs services for the first year:
 - Shall not exceed \$15,777. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.
- Compensation for unforeseen repairs to interactive fountain components:
 - Shall not exceed \$25,625 annually. Payment shall be based upon Town approval
 of each task.
- Compensation for routine maintenance and repairs services for years two through five:
 - Shall be adjusted upward annually for the remaining term of this Agreement by the change, if any, in the San Francisco – Oakland – San Jose Metropolitan Area Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, all items (CPI). The adjustment shall be based upon the CPI published on December 31 of the preceding year.
 - o If the CPI indicates a downward adjustment, compensation would remain at the base amount.
- 2.7 Failure to Perform. It is mutually agreed by SERVICE PROVIDER and TOWN that in the event that performance of the work by SERVICE PROVIDER under this Agreement is not completed as scheduled, TOWN will suffer damages and will incur other costs and expenses of a nature and amount which is difficult or impractical to determine. The Parties agree that by way of ascertaining and fixing the amount of damages, costs and expenses, and not by way of penalty, SERVICE PROVIDER shall pay to TOWN the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per location per scheduled service in liquidated damages for every missed service beyond three missed services in a month in addition to reducing the monthly payment by the cost of that service. In the event that the liquidated damages are not paid, SERVICE PROVIDER agrees that TOWN may deduct the amount of unpaid damages from any money due or that may become due to SERVICE PROVIDER under this Agreement.
- 2.8 <u>Schedule</u>. Service Provider shall provide a schedule to the Town prior to beginning work. The schedule shall identify dates of service for each location. Schedule changes shall be approved by the Town with 24-hour notice. Each missed location shall be considered a failure to perform, unless the contractor provides advance notice of schedule change.

2.9 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.10 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Service Provider shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Service Provider shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Service Provider offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.11 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Service Provider. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.12 Independent Service Provider. It is understood that the Service Provider, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent Service Provider and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent Service Provider he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Service Provider may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Service Provider agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Service Provider shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Service Provider or is based on allegations of Service Provider's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.13 <u>Conflict of Interest.</u> Service Provider understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Service Provider has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Service Provider has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Service Provider warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Service Provider shall not knowingly and shall take

reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person Service Provider discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement Service Provider shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.

2.14 Equal Employment Opportunity. Service Provider warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Service Provider nor its subService Providers do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- Service Provider agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Service Provider shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Service Provider agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Service Provider; products and completed operations of Service Provider, premises owned or used by the Service Provider.
- ii. The Service Provider's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any

insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Service Provider's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Service Provider's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made, or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Service Provider shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Service Provider shall ensure that all subService Providers employed by Service Provider provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Service Provider shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Service Provider, or any of the Service Provider's officers, employees, or agents or any subService Provider.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.

- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Service Provider shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Service Provider shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Service Provider. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Service Provider an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Service Provider.
- 4.5 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.6 <u>Prevailing Wages</u>. In accordance with the provisions of Sections 1770 <u>et seq.</u>, of the Labor Code, the Director of the Industrial Relations of the State of California has determined the general prevailing rate of wages applicable to the work to be done. Service Provider will be required to pay to all persons employed on the project by the Service Provider sums not less than the sums set forth in the documents entitled "General Prevailing Wage Determination made by the Director of Industrial Relations pursuant to California Labor Code, part 7, Chapter 1, Article 2, Sections 1770, 1773, 1773.1." These documents may be obtained from the State of California.

Pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5, no Service Provider or subService Provider may be awarded a contract for public works on a public works project unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations.

This project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the Department of Industrial Relations and/or the Town of Los Gatos.

The Service Provider is required to post notices on Public Works requirements.

4.7 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

- or personally delivered to Service Provider to such address or such other address as Service Provider designates in writing to Town.
- 4.8 Order of Precedence. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Service Provider. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

RECOMMENDATION:

- a. An increase to the contract amount for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022/23 in the amount of \$53,381, for a fiscal year amount of \$238,381 and a total agreement amount not to exceed \$953,948; and
- b. An expenditure budget adjustment in the amount of \$53,381 from available Capital/Special Project Reserve.

BACKGROUND:

The Town of Los Gatos utilizes contractual services for the routine maintenance of traffic signals and streetlights, the repair of traffic signals and streetlights, and underground utility locating services relating the electric services within the Town's jurisdiction. Traffic signal and streetlight contractual services include repairs on an as-needed basis, periodic inspections, testing of the equipment, and lamp replacements. Underground utility locating services involve

BACKGROUND (continued):

responding to Underground Service Alert (USA) requests to identify and mark the Town's underground infrastructure at construction sites prior to any digging operations.

Staff has determined that contractual services are the most cost-effective delivery method due to technical expertise and specialty equipment required for this work.

On September 15, 2020, the Town Council authorized the execution of a five-year Agreement for Services (FY 2020/21 through FY 2024/25) with St. Francis Electric, Inc. (Exhibit A) to provide traffic signal and streetlight repair and maintenance and USA locating services for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$675,000 (\$135,000 per year).

On August 3, 2021, the Town Council authorized a first amendment to the Agreement (Exhibit A) for an increase of \$8,567 for FY 2020/21 to cover the cost overage from a high number of USA requests received for various development and Town capital improvement projects for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$683,567.

On March 15, 2022, the Town Council authorized a second amendment to the Agreement (Exhibit A) for: a) an increase of \$67,000 for FY 2021/22 to cover cost overages for routine and response maintenance and USA requests; and b) an increase of \$50,000 per year to the base compensation of the agreement (\$150,000 total) for remaining three fiscal years. This resulted in a total agreement amount of \$900,567.

DISCUSSION:

The service needs and resulting costs each fiscal year depend on the number of traffic signal and streetlight repair and maintenance calls and USA requests. The budget for response repair and maintenance services has been exhausted for this fiscal year, with pending invoices that need to be paid. The Town encountered numerous traffic signal repair issues during this current fiscal year due to the excessive winter storms and traffic crashes that damaged equipment; more funds are needed to replace and maintain traffic signal cabinets, conduits, wiring, and poles for the remainder of the fiscal year.

This third amendment is for an additional \$53,381 for the response maintenance repairs needed for the remainder of FY 2022/23 to continue the contract services by St. Francis Electric without disruptions.

The table on the next page reflects the amendment amounts, increasing the total five-year contract amount not to exceed \$953,948.

AGREEMENT FOR SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 15th of September 2020, and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and St. Francis Electric ("Service Provider"), whose address is 975 Carden St., San Leandro, CA. 94577. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town sought quotations for the services described in this Agreement, and Service Provider was found to be the lowest responsible supplier for this purchase.
- 1.2 Service Provider represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Town desires to engage Service Provider to provide a comprehensive Street Lighting and Traffic Signal Preventive Maintenance and Repair Services.
- 1.4 Service Provider warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Service Provider acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Service Provider.

II. AGREEMENT

- 2.1 <u>Scope of Services</u>. Service Provider shall provide services as described in that certain Proposal sent to the Town on August 26, 2020, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. The effective date of this Agreement shall begin November 1, 2020 and will continue through June 30, 2025, subject to appropriation of funds, notwithstanding any other provision in this agreement.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Service Provider shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Service Provider represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Service Provider to practice its profession. Service Provider shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Service Provider shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.

2.5 Information/Report Handling. All documents furnished to Service Provider by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Service Provider under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Service Provider in connection with the performance of its services pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Service Provider shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Service Provider or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Service Provider pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Service Provider in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Service Provider expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Service Provider which is and has been confirmed in writing by Service Provider to be a trade secret of Service Provider.

2.6 Compensation:

Compensation for year one shall not exceed \$135,000. Compensation for future years will be the base cost of \$135,000 and shall be adjusted upward annually for the remaining term of this agreement by the change, if any, in the San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose Metropolitan Area Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, all items (CPI). The adjustment shall be based upon the CPI published on December 31 of the preceding year. If the CPI indicates a downward adjustment, compensation would remain at the base amount. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.

2.7 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

- 2.8 <u>Availability of Records</u>. Service Provider shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Service Provider shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Service Provider offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Service Provider. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.10 Independent Contractor. It is understood that the Service Provider, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Service Provider may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Service Provider agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Service Provider shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is brought by Service Provider or is based on allegations of Service Provider's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.11 Conflict of Interest. Service Provider understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Service Provider has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Service Provider has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Service Provider warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Service Provider shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. employment of a person Service Provider discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement Service Provider shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 <u>Equal Employment Opportunity</u>. Service Provider warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Service Provider nor its subcontractors do and neither shall

discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Service Provider agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Service Provider shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Service Provider agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Service Provider; products and completed operations of Service Provider, premises owned or used by the Service Provider.
- ii. The Service Provider's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Service Provider's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Service Provider's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Service Provider shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Service Provider shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Service Provider provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. The Service Provider shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Service Provider, or any of the Service Provider's officers, employees, or agents or any subcontractor.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law</u>. This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. The Town and the Service Provider shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15)

written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Service Provider shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Service Provider. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Service Provider an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.

- 4.4 <u>Prevailing Wages</u>. This project is subject to the requirements of Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code requiring the payment of prevailing wages, the training of apprentices and compliance with other applicable requirements. Contractors and all subcontractors who perform work on the project are required to comply with these requirements. Prevailing wages apply to all projects over \$1,000 which are defined as a "public work" by the State of California. This includes: construction, demolition, repair, alteration, maintenance and the installation of photovoltaic systems under a Power Purchase Agreement when certain conditions are met under Labor Code Section 1720.6. This include service and warranty work on public buildings and structures.
 - 4.4.1 The applicable California prevailing wage rate can be found at www.dir.ca.gov and are on file with the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department, which shall be available to any interested party upon request. The contractor is also required to have a copy of the applicable wage determination posted and/or available at each jobsite.
 - 4.4.2 Specifically, contractors are reminded of the need for compliance with Labor Code Section 1774-1775 (the payment of prevailing wages and documentation of such), Section 1776 (the keeping and submission of accurate certified payrolls) and 1777.5 in the employment of apprentices on public works projects. Further, overtime, weekend and holiday pay, and shift pay must be paid pursuant to applicable Labor Code section.
 - 4.4.3 The public entity for which work is being performed or the California Department of Industrial Relations may impose penalties upon contractors and subcontractors for failure to comply with prevailing wage requirements. These penalties are up to \$200 per day per worker for each wage violations identified; \$100 per day per worker for failure to provide the required paperwork and documentation requested within a 10-day window; and \$25 per day per worker for any overtime violation.
 - 4.4.4 As a condition to receiving progress payments, final payment and payment of retention on any and all projects on which the payment of prevailing wages is required, the contractor agrees to present to the TOWN, along with its request for payment, all applicable and necessary certified payrolls (for itself and all applicable subcontractors) for the time period covering such

- payment request. The term "certified payroll" shall include all required documentation to comply with the mandates set forth in Labor Code Section 1720 et seq, as well as any additional documentation requested by the Agency or its designee including, but not limited to: certified payroll, fringe benefit statements and backup documentation such as monthly benefit statements, employee timecards, copies of wage statements and cancelled checks, proof of training contributions (CAC2 if applicable), and apprenticeship forms such as DAS-140 and DAS-142.
- 4.4.5 In addition to submitting the certified payrolls and related documentation to the TOWN, the contractor and all subcontractors shall be required to submit certified payroll and related documents electronically to the California Department of Industrial Relations. Failure to submit payrolls to the DIR when mandated by the project parameters shall also result in the withholding of progress, retention and final payment.
- 4.4.6 No contractor or subcontractor may be listed on a bid proposal for a public works project unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5 [with limited exceptions from this requirement for bid purposes only under Labor Code section 1771.1(a)].
- 4.4.7 No contractor or subcontractor may be awarded a contract for public work on a public works project, unless registered with the Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code section 1725.5. Contractors MUST be a registered "public works contractor" with the DIR AT THE TIME OF BID. Where the prime contract is less than \$15,000 for maintenance work or less than \$25,000 for construction alternation, demolition or repair work, registration is not required.
- 4.4.8 Should any contractor or subcontractors not be a registered public works contractor and perform work on the project, Contractor agrees to fully indemnify the TOWN for any fines assessed by the California Department of Industrial Relations against the TOWN for such violation, including all staff costs and attorney's fee relating to such fine.
- 4.4.9 The TOWN shall withhold any portion of a payment; including the entire payment amount, until certified payroll forms and related documentation are properly submitted, reviewed and found to be in full compliance. In the event that certified payroll forms do not comply with the requirements of Labor Code Section 1720 et seq., the TOWN may continue to hold sufficient funds to cover estimated wages and penalties under the contract.
- 4.5 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Service Provider.

- 4.6 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.7 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

or personally delivered to Service Provider to such address or such other address as Service Provider designates in writing to Town.

- 4.8 <u>Order of Precedence</u>. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Service Provider. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

RECOMMENDATION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a revised Use Agreement with West Valley Red Hawks Lacrosse Club (Attachment 3).

BACKGROUND:

West Valley Red Hawks Lacrosse Club (the Club) executed a use agreement in 2014 with the Town of Los Gatos for Creekside Sports Park. One amendment to the agreement was executed to extend the expiration to June 30, 2020. Attachment 1 includes a copy of the original agreement and amendment. Due to COVID-19 restrictions and changes in park use during the COVID-19 pandemic, the agreement lapsed.

At its February 21, 2023 meeting, Town Council authorized the Town Manager to execute a new use agreement with the Club (Item 7). In executing the agreement after Councils' action, the Club requested changes to the terms of the Use Agreement. The requested changes include (see Attachment 2 redlined agreement):

- Section 1.3, a new affiliation
- Section 2.4, 10% decrease in the Annual Use Fee
- Section 2.6, a good faith clause
- Section 3.1, removal of automobile coverage
- Section 4.6, an address change

BACKGROUND (continued):

The Parks and Public Works Department was recently informed that the Club have programmed with Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education Recreation for youth lacrosse programs at Creekside Sports Park. This additional information has been added to Section 2.2 of the Use Agreement.

All other terms of the Use Agreement have remained the same.

DISCUSSION:

The Club is interested in continuing to use the Creekside Sports Park and an updated draft use agreement is included as Attachment 3 (clean version of changes noted in Attachment 2). The terms are similar to the recently approved agreement with the Red Hawks, with the main terms as follows:

- 1. The term of the agreement is five years and may be extended for up to two additional five-year periods upon mutual written consent of the parties.
- 2. The Club shall have exclusive use of the Premises, except bathrooms and parking, which are open to the public at large, only during those times and dates as shown on "Annual Schedules". The Annual Schedule shall cover camps and classes for the Winter, Spring, Summer, and Fall sessions.
- 3. Saturdays, the Club has programmed with Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education Recreation for youth lacrosse programs at Creekside Sports Park. The use hours and Facility Maintenance Fee will be paid by the Club through this Use Agreement.
- 4. The Club shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee of \$5,850 for the use of the Premises which will escalate annually. Table 1 provides a comparison in the use fee for groups with which the Town has Park Use Agreements.

DISCUSSION (continued):

5. The Club shall pay the Town of Los Gatos a Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) of \$4.00 per participant per program or class offered by the Club at Creekside Sports Park. This is consistent with all other user groups, with the possible exception of Los Gatos Saratoga Recreation who have requested a \$2.00 per participant per session fee. That fee reduction is under consideration as another item on this Council Agenda for June 6, 2023.

- 6. The Club shall perform maintenance as set forth in the Maintenance Responsibilities section of the Agreement.
- 7. The Club shall comply, without limitation, with all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation provisions. The Club shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations and Town of Los Gatos Creekside Sports Park Special Use Policies.

Creekside Sports Park offers a large artificial turf field for year-round sporting activities. Creekside is open to the general public Monday – Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. After 3:00 p.m. and on the weekends the field is exclusively used by the Club and Los Gatos United Soccer Club (LGUSC). The field use schedule meets the needs of the Club, as well as provides designated hours for youth soccer. The allotted field use is divided into 20% for the Red Hawks and 80% for LGUSC. This ratio is adjusted yearly between the clubs and the Town based on an agreed schedule.

CONCLUSION:

Staff is recommending that the Town Council authorize the Town Manager to execute the revised Use Agreement between the Town of Los Gatos and West Valley Red Hawks Lacrosse Club (Attachment 3).

FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of the use agreement with the Club for the use of Creekside Sports Park would result in annual revenue of \$5,850 and on July 1, 2024, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted according to the percent change in the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, All Items, All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose, 1982-84-100 Index, plus \$4.00 per participant per class or program. Payments will be made to the Town of Los Gatos by Red Hawks on an annual basis.

This FIRST AMENDMENT to USE AGREEMENT is entered into this 17th day of May, 2018, by and between the **TOWN OF LOS GATOS**, State of California ("Town"), and **WEST VALLEY RED HAWKS LACROSSE CLUB**, a California nonprofit corporation ("Red Hawks").

RECITALS

- A. Town and Red Hawks entered into a Use Agreement on July 16, 2014, for use of the Los Gatos Creekside Sports Park, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference as Attachment 1 to this Amendment.
- B. Town and Red Hawks mutually desire to extend the term of the existing Use Agreement for one three-year period.

FIRST AMENDMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be extended for one additional three-year term as outlined in section 3 of the Use Agreement from July 1, 2017 through June 30, 2020.
- 2. All other Terms and Conditions of the Use Agreement shall remain in effect.

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USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS AND WEST VALLEY RED HAWKS LACROSSE CLUB

RECITALS

- A. Town is the owner of Creekside Sports Park, located at 930 University Avenue, Los Gatos, California.
- B. The Red Hawks is a non-profit, club sponsored program run by volunteers and parent coaches established in 2004 to bring the sport of lacrosse to the Los Gatos-Saratoga area, with boys teams ranging from 2nd through 8th grade and girls teams from 2nd through 6th grade, which will expand to 7th and 8th grade in the future.
- C. Red Hawks is an affiliate of the Northern California Junior Lacrosse Association (NCJLA) and as such, its coaches, players, officials and parents are required to abide by the United States Lacrosse "Code of Conduct" that embodies basic common sense principles, demonstrates consideration of others, and projects a positive image to the boys and girls that participate in their programs.
- D. The Red Hawks were one of the community partners that supported the acquisition and development of the Creekside Sports Park.
- E. Town and Red Hawks each desire an agreement between them setting forth the specific terms and conditions under which the Red Hawks may use the Creekside Sports Park, including: hours of use; responsibility for maintenance of the fields and adjacent grounds; use and maintenance of associated facilities and structures, storage of Red Hawks goods and equipment; and other related items.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Subject Premises</u>. The Premises covered by this Agreement is the Creekside Sports Park, located at 930 University Avenue, Los Gatos, California. A drawing depicting the Premises is attached hereto and incorporated by reference (Attachment A).
- 2. <u>Use of Premises.</u> Red Hawks shall have exclusive use of the Premises, except bathrooms and parking, which are open to the public at large, only during those times and dates as shown on Attachment B, "Annual Schedule". No later than October 15th of each year this Agreement is in force, Red Hawks and Town staff shall meet to develop an Annual Schedule for the following calendar year. Town retains the right to use or authorize the use of the Premises for all dates and times not allocated to Red Hawks in the Annual Schedule.

Red Hawks may request changes to the Annual Schedule by written notification to the Department of Parks and Public Works, but shall endeavor to minimize changes to the schedule

during each calendar year. All changes should be made in writing no less than 30 days prior to the effective date of the change. The Town of Los Gatos shall have sole authority to approve the Annual Schedule and any requested changes to the Annual Schedule.

- 3. Term of Agreement. Unless terminated sooner pursuant to Section 16 of this Agreement, this Agreement shall expire on June 30, 2017. The term of this Agreement may be extended for up to two additional three year periods upon mutual written consent of the parties.
- 4. Annual Use Fee. Beginning July 1, 2014, and every year thereafter. Red Hawks shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee for the use of the Premises. The initial Annual Use Fee shall be \$5,000. The Annual Use Fee shall be considered full and fair compensation for exclusive use of the facility for those days and times indicated on the Annual Schedule. On July 1, 2015, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted according to the percent change in the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, All Items, All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose, 1982-84-100 Index.
- 5. Facility Maintenance Fee. Beginning July 1, 2014, and continuing for the full term of this agreement, including any extensions, each participant in the Red Hawks Lacrosse program using the Creekside Sports Park will be charged a \$2.00 Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) per season. The Facility Maintenance Fee shall be assessed by the Red Hawks at the time of registration or and payment of program fees, and shall be retained by the Red Hawks in a separate account and remitted to the Town annually in conjunction with payment of the Annual Use Fee, no later than July 1 of each year this agreement is in force. Participants shall be charged a FMF for each distinct season at which registration and fees are typically collected by the Red Hawks.

FMF revenue received by the Town from the Red Hawks shall be used solely to fund the cost of maintenance and operations of the Premises.

- 6. Additional Annual Use Fee Adjustment. Should Red Hawks increase or decrease its requested hours of use as set forth in Attachment B, Annual Schedule, by 5% or more, the Annual Use Fee shall be adjusted proportionally based on the percentage change in hours. In no case shall the Annual Use Fee be decreased by more than 10% below the initial Annual Use Fee set forth in Section 4.
- Maintenance. Red Hawks shall be responsible for the maintenance responsibilities set forth in Attachment C, Maintenance Responsibilities.
- Facility Use Policies. Red Hawks shall comply, without limitation, to all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation. Red Hawks shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Attachment D, Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations, and Attachment E, Town of Los Gatos Creekside Sports Park Special Use Policies. Failure to comply with these policies may result in suspension and/or termination of this agreement.
- 9. Payment. Red Hawks shall make all payments required pursuant to this Agreement, whether or not invoiced by Town, no later than July 1 of each year payments are due. All payments shall be mailed by first class mail or delivered in person at Town offices and addressed as follows:

- 10. <u>Assignment</u>. Red Hawks shall not assign any portion of this Agreement, or allow any use of the Premises by any other person or entity contrary to the terms of this Agreement, without prior written approval of Town. Red Hawks is expressly prohibited from use of the Premises for any activity other than actives sanctioned and associated with Red Hawks.
- 11. Personal Property. Personal property of Red Hawks shall be Red Hawks' sole responsibility to acquire, repair, replace and store. Red Hawks shall remove its personal property at the expiration or termination of this Agreement. Any personal property not so removed shall become the sole property of Town with no compensation.

12. Insurance.

(a) Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- (i) Red Hawks agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring the Red Hawks, its officers and employees to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current Best's rating of no less than B+.
- (ii) Red Hawks agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy insuring the Red Hawks, its officers and employees to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- (iii) Red Hawks shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Red Hawks shall provide all certificates and endorsements before term of Agreement begins.

(b) General Liability:

- (i) The Town, its officers, employees and volunteers are to be covered as additional insured as respects to liability arising out of activities occurring on or related to the occupancy and use of the Premises by the Red Hawks.
- (ii) The Red Hawks insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Town, its officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Red Hawks insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- (iii) Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- (iv) The Red Hawks insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.

- (c) All Coverages. Each insurance policy required in this Paragraph 12 shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. The Red Hawks shall ensure that current certification of such insurance is on file at all times with the Town Clerk during the term of this agreement.
- (d) Workers' Compensation. In addition to these policies, Red Hawks shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law. Further, Red Hawks shall ensure that all contractors employed on the Premises by the Red Hawks provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- (e) Property Insurance. Town shall have no obligation to maintain any insurance of the Premises or any personal property placed on the Premises. Red Hawks shall be solely responsible for obtaining whatever insurance coverage that the Red Hawks believes may be appropriate to protect and indemnify the Red Hawks for loss to the Premises or to any personal property that the Red Hawks may place on the Premises.
- 13. <u>Indemnification</u>. Red Hawks agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the Town, its officers, employees, volunteers, and agents, from and against any and all damages, claims or liability, penalties, costs or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise from any loss, damage, or injury to persons or property occurring in or about the Premises that arises out of or incident to the Red Hawks' use of the Premises, including use by anyone that the Red Hawks has permitted or allowed to use the Premises. This obligation to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend applies whether or not the incident or claim or liability is or may be related to negligence on the part of the Town.

Damage and Destruction.

- (a) Damage or destruction of any portion of the Premises by any cause shall not terminate this Agreement or otherwise affect the respective obligations of the two parties, any present or future law to the contrary notwithstanding, except pursuant to the provisions of this Paragraph 13.
- (b) If because of the destruction or damage to the Premises, the Premises is entirely unsuitable or inadequate for the use specified herein, Red Hawks shall be entitled to a pro rata rebate of the fee paid to the Town calculated by dividing the Annual User Fee by the total number of hours of exclusive use as shown in Attachment A, Annual Schedule and then multiplying this calculated hourly rate by the number of hours remaining on the Annual Schedule after the date of the damage or destruction of the Premises.
- (c) Under no circumstances does the Town have any obligation to provide the Red Hawks with an alternative property to conduct its operations, and the Red Hawks is solely responsible for obtaining such insurance as the Red Hawks deems appropriate to protect its interests should damage or destruction to the Premises occur.
- (d) Red Hawks shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury to the field and/or Sports Park premises as a result of the direct or indirect use of the premises by Red Hawks under this agreement.
- Compliance with Town Code. Red Hawks shall comply with all provisions of the Town Code, including the provisions of Chapter 19 of the Code concerning Parks and Recreation.

16. Termination.

- (a) Should Town terminate prior to the end of the term of this Agreement, Red Hawks shall be entitled to a pro rata rebate of the Annual Use Fee calculated by dividing the Annual User Fee by the total number of hours of exclusive use as shown in Attachment B, Annual Schedule and then multiplying this calculated hourly rate by the number of hours remaining on the Annual Schedule after the effective date of termination.
- (b) Red Hawks shall promptly terminate its use of the Premises at the termination of this Agreement, leaving the Premises in the same condition it was received, in good order and repair, reasonable wear and tear and damage by the elements excepted. All improvements and alterations made by the Red Hawks shall become the property of the Town upon termination of the Agreement without compensation by Town. Any personal property not removed by the Red Hawks within thirty (30) days of the termination of this License Agreement shall become the property of the Town and may be disposed of as the Town in its sole discretion deems advisable.
- (c) This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect unless prior to February 1st of any calendar year, either Party provides written notice to the other Party that it desires to terminate the Agreement for convenience and, upon such notice, the Agreement shall terminate on June 30th of the same calendar year.
- (d) If Town in its sole discretion determines that it requires the Premises for any public purpose, Town may terminate this Agreement upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice. In the event of an emergency, Town may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice. "Emergency," for the purposes of this paragraph, is defined as when the Town Council declares a State of Emergency. Upon termination of this Agreement in the event of an Emergency, Town and Red Hawks will work cooperatively to develop a written plan for transition of services and vacation of Premises by Red Hawks.
- (e) In the event of any material default or breach by Red Hawks, Town may at any time thereafter, following any notice required by statute, and without limiting Town in the exercise of any right or remedy which may have reason of such default or breach:
 - a. Terminate Red Hawks' right to possession of the Premises by any lawful means, in which case this Agreement shall terminate and Red Hawks shall immediately surrender possession of the Premises to Town. In such event, Town shall be entitled to recover from Red Hawks any damages incurred by Town by reason of Red Hawks' default including but not limited to: the cost of recovering possession of the Premises and reasonable attorneys' fees.
 - b. Pursue any other remedy now or hereafter available to Town under the laws of the State of California. Town shall have all remedies provided in law and equity.
- (f) Red Hawks waives all rights of redemption or relief from forfeiture under California Code of Civil Procedure sections 1174 and 1179, and any other present and future law, in the event Red Hawks is evicted or Town otherwise lawfully takes possession of the Premises by reason of any default or breach of this Agreement by Red Hawks.
- (g) If Red Hawks fails to remove any personal property belonging to Red Hawks from the Premises after forty-five (45) days of the expiration or termination of this Agreement, such

property shall at the option of the Town be deemed to have been transferred to Town. Town shall have the right to remove and to dispose of such property without liability to Red Hawks or to any person claiming under Red Hawks, and the Town shall have no need to account for such property.

- 17. No Property Rights. Nothing in this Agreement is in any way intended to establish, convey, create or otherwise grant to Red Hawks any form of property rights in the Premises, nor shall such rights be established, conveyed, created or otherwise granted by Red Hawks's use of the Premises pursuant to this Agreement. Red Hawks hereby acknowledges that it currently has no property interest in the Premises or any improvements thereto or fixtures location thereon, and that any claim it may have to same is hereby and forever waived.
- 18. <u>Notices</u>. Any written correspondence or Notices given under this Agreement shall be addressed as follows:

Notices shall be delivered by first class, postage prepaid mail or in person. If mailed, a notice shall be deemed effective on the fifth day following deposit in the U.S. Mail.

- 19. Waiver. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this License Agreement.
- 20. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between Town and Red Hawks. No terms, conditions, understanding or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

MAINTENANCE RESPONSIBILITIES

Red Hawks shall be responsible for the following:

- 1. Following each scheduled use, pick up and deposit in receptacles or dumpsters all recyclables, litter and trash from field, walkways, building areas and parking lot.
- Emptying of receptacles and recycling containers on an "as-needed" basis during or following scheduled use, particularly during tournaments or other heavy use events.
- 3. Maintaining all lacrosse goals and associated equipment, and ensuring that they are used in a safe and secure manner.

The Town of Los Gatos shall be responsible for the following:

- 1. Opening and closing of premises and restrooms.
- 2. Cleaning and restocking of restrooms on a daily basis.
- 3. Providing extra liners for garbage and recycling receptacles as may be needed by Red Hawks.
- 4. Maintenance of building, parking lot and security lighting.
- 5. Landscape and irrigation maintenance.
- 6. Maintenance of all structures, walkways, hardscape, fencing, gates and other surfaces.
- 7. Field maintenance including twice-a-year relining of the field, once prior to February 20th, and the second time at the discretion of the Town.
- 8. Parking lot sweeping.
- 9. Graffiti abatement.

ATTACHMENT D

TOWN OF LOS GATOS PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS

All park users shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation of the Los Gatos Town Code, and the these Park Rules and Regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code

General

No Smoking

Smoking is prohibited within any park or on any trail.

Food & Alcohol

- Beer and wine are allowed with a picnic meal but must not leave the picnic site.
- A Vehicle Escort Permit is required when a caterer delivers food to a picnic site.
- Barbecues are not allowed at Belgatos Park.

Decorations & Signs

- Decorations must not interfere with other picnic sites.
- Decorations must be cleaned up and removed before leaving the park.
- Directional signs may be posted in designated areas, but must be removed before leaving.
- No tacks, nails or staples on park signs, tables or trees.
- No confetti, Egg toss or piñatas are allowed.

Dogs

- A six (6) foot leash is required at all times and dogs must be kept under physical control.
- Pet owners are required to immediately clean-up after their pets.

Miscellaneous

- Portable BBQs (gas or charcoal) are allowed in picnic areas only.
- Portable radios are allowed.
- Loud music is not allowed at any hour.
- Volleyball and Badminton nets are allowed.
- Portable toilets are not allowed.
- · Petting zoos and pony rides are not allowed.
- Water slides and 'Slip-n-Slides" are not allowed.
- Organized sports activities are not allowed without a permit.
- No golfing within any park.
- No overnight camping allowed.
- No sale or vending or other commercial activity except by permit.

Clean-Up

- Facilities rented and used must be left in clean condition. A fee will be assessed to you for leaving the picnic area unclean or damaged.
- Applicant should provide means to clean up site, including extra trash bags.
- Pick-up and dispose of all trash and food waste materials at reserved park site.
- Remove cans, bottles, bags, decorations, balloons, food and debris from park site.
 Use trash cans.
- Allow fires in barbecue pits to burn out. Do not use water because it will damage the grill and pit.

Reservations

- Prior to selecting and reserving any picnic area or bandstand/gazebo, we recommend that the applicant visit the park facility in advance or view <u>Parks & Trails Map</u> to obtain details of each of Town's parks and trails, including maps and driving directions. A <u>Park and Trails Map</u> is available online and at Town offices.
- The Parks and Public Works Department staff will finalize your reservation request once you have completed the <u>on-line reservation</u> process and payment by credit card in full is received. Checks will no longer be accepted. A reservation fee will be charged for each site you reserve. If you reserve two or more sites, a fee will be assessed for each site, as applicable. Park reservations do not include parking. Please view the Fee Schedule for current charges.
- Requests to reserve a picnic area should not be submitted with less than 48 hours of advance notice prior to the requested reservation date. All reservation requests must be completed through the on-line reservation process. Reservations by phone will not be accepted.
- All information collected is only for the use of the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department for park reservations and will not be sold or shared with

outside vendors. Also be assured that all data you send as part of this reservation process is through a secure server and the data is encrypted for transmission. We do not keep any of your credit card information on our system.

Permits

- Special Use Permits are required for the following:
 - 1. Use of a group area for 25 people or more.
 - 2. Use of a jump house at any park in Los Gatos.
 - 3. Use of a vehicle escort at any park.
 - 4. Use of Bocce ball Courts at Oak Meadow Park.
 - 5. Use of Gazebo/Bandstand at Oak Meadow Park.
 - For any organized recreational activities, such as formal classes or other similar activities.
- The permitee, under Town Municipal Code, Section 19.30.025, shall be bound by all park rules and regulations, and all applicable ordinances. The person to whom such permit is issued shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury sustained by the Town or by any person whomsoever by reason of the negligence of the person to whom such permit shall have been issued.
- Special Use Permit is approved by the Parks & Public Works Department upon review of reservation request and payment of applicable deposit.
- Use of a disc jockey (DJ) at the Gazebo/Bandstand at Oak Meadow Park is allowed only after receiving a Special Events Permit from the Los Gatos-Monte Sereno Police Department. The Police Department number is (408) 354-8600.
- An insurance certificate in the amount of \$1 million, naming the Town of Los Gatos, its Council members, Boards, Commissions, employees and agents as additionally insured is required for groups of over 100 people (reservations for events such as weddings, reunions and company picnics).
- Permits cannot be transferred, assigned or sublet.

Jump Houses

- Use of a jump house requires a Special Use Permit. At Oak Meadow Park, a Special Use Permit for jump houses can be requested only if the associated picnic area is reserved concurrently.
- Jump houses can be rented only from companies that have provided proof of liability insurance naming the Town of Los Gatos as the additional insured. The following companies have registered with the Clerk's Office and have provided the required certificate:

 Any jump house company not listed above must provide insurance to the Town of Los Gatos Clerk's Office for consideration. A permit will not be issued to an applicant without providing proof of insurance from the vendor.

- Jump houses must be hand carried in to the park and placed in the area specified by the Parks Service Officer.
- No electricity is provided at the park for jump houses.
- Jump houses with combined features such as a jumper and a slide and/or obstacle course, and features containing water are not allowed.
- Personally owned jump houses are not allowed.
- Jump house fees for residents are \$95. Non-resident fees are \$125.
- A Jump House Permit does not include Picnic Area Use Permit. Each must be obtained separately.

Vehicle Escort

Individuals renting a park facility can request a staff vehicle escort to assist with the transport of supplies to/from a designated picnic area. Reservations must be made five (5) business days in advance of the event date for this service.

- No vehicles are allowed beyond designated public parking lots. If an individual would like to drop off supplies or equipment beyond these areas in a vehicle, a vehicle escort is required.
- Vehicle escorts conducted by a Park Service Officer must be scheduled in advance.
- Vehicle escorts are not available for Picnic Areas 1, 2, & 7 at Oak Meadow Park.

ATTACHMENT E

TOWN OF LOS GATOS CREEKSIDE SPORTS PARK SPECIAL USE POLICIES

All park users shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation of the Los Gatos Town Code; Park Rules and Regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code; and these Special Rules and Regulations, also established pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code. Permitted groups have priority use and other users shall promptly vacate field upon request by permitted users

No Smoking

 Smoking of any substance and use of any tobacco product, including chewing tobacco, is prohibited.

Artificial Turf Field and Warm Up Area Use

- No metal cleats or spikes allowed.
- No metal stakes, such as umbrellas or shade structures permitted.
- No bare feet.
- No spitting on artificial turf surfaces.
- No vehicles allowed on field or warm-up area
- No marking or painting of turf unless approved by the Town of Los Gatos.
- No golfing or use of golf clubs.
- No discus, hammer, javelin or other field events permitted.

Food & Beverages

- No alcoholic beverages permitted within Creekside Sports Park.
- No open fires, flames or portable barbecues (gas or charcoal) permitted.
- No chewing gum or sunflower seeds allowed within Creekside Sports Park.
- No food or beverages allowed on playing field other than water.
- No glass bottles or containers allowed on field or warm-up areas.

Dogs and Other Animals

No dogs or other animals allowed except for certified guide animals.

Signage

- Signs may be affixed with string, rope or ties only. No tape, tacks, staples, or nails allowed.
- All signage and ties must be removed after use.
- No staking of any team signs or banners allowed.

USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS AND WEST VALLEY RED HAWKS LACROSSE CLUB

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 1st day of July 2022 and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, State of California ("Town") and WEST VALLEY RED HAWKS LACROSSE CLUB ("Red Hawks") identified as a nonprofit organization and whose address is 15151 Old Ranch Road 18921 Bear Creek Road, Los Gatos, California 95033.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Town is the owner of Creekside Sports Park, located at 930 University Avenue, Los Gatos, California.
- 1.2 The Red Hawks is a non-profit, club-sponsored program run by volunteers and parent coaches established in 2004 to bring the sport of lacrosse to the Los Gatos-Saratoga area.
- 1.3 Red Hawks is an affiliate of the Northern California Junior Lacrosse Association (NCJLA)
 South Bay Consortium of teams and as such, its coaches, players, officials, and parents are required to abide by the United States Lacrosse "Code of Conduct" that embodies basic common-sense principles, demonstrates consideration of others, and projects a positive image to the boys and girls that participate in their programs.
- 1.4 The Red Hawks were one of the community partners that supported the acquisition and development of the Creekside Sports Park.
- 1.5 Town and Red Hawks each desire an agreement between them setting forth the specific terms and conditions under which the Red Hawks may use the Creekside Sports Park, including hours of use; responsibility for maintenance of the fields and adjacent grounds; use and maintenance of associated facilities and structures; storage of Red Hawks goods and equipment; and other related items.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Subject Premises</u>. The Premises covered by this Agreement is the Creekside Sports Park, located at 930 University Avenue, Los Gatos, California. A drawing depicting the Premises is attached hereto and incorporated by reference (Attachment A).
- 2.2 Use of Premises. Red Hawks shall have exclusive use of the Premises, except bathrooms and parking, which are open to the public at large, only during those times and dates as shown on "Annual Schedules". The Annual Schedule shall cover camps and classes for the Winter, Spring, Summer, and Fall sessions. No later than October 1st of each year this Agreement is in force, Red Hawks and Town staff shall meet to develop an Annual Schedule for the following calendar year. Town has the final say in establishing the master

schedule. Town will attempt to accommodate user groups at their requested time but reserves the right to propose use hours that balance the needs of all user groups equitably. Town retains the right to use or authorize the use of the Premises for all dates and times not allocated to Red Hawks in the Annual Schedule.

Red Hawks may request changes to the Annual Schedule by written notification to the Department of Parks and Public Works but shall endeavor to minimize changes to the schedule during each calendar year. All changes should be made in writing no less than 30 days prior to the effective date of the change. The Town of Los Gatos shall have sole authority to approve the Annual Schedule and any requested changes to the Annual Schedule.

Saturdays, the Red Hawks have programmed with Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education Recreation for youth lacrosse programs at Creekside Sports Park. The use hours and Facility Maintenance Fee will be captured under the Red Hawks Use Agreement.

- 2.3 <u>Term of Agreement</u>. Unless terminated sooner pursuant to Section 4.3 of this Agreement, the Use Agreement remains in effect from July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2027. The term of this Agreement may be extended for up to two additional five-year periods upon mutual written consent of the parties.
- 2.4 Annual Use Fee. Beginning July 1, 2022, and every year thereafter, Red Hawks shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee for the use of the Premises. The initial Annual Use Fee shall be \$6,500 \$5,850. The Annual Use Fee shall be considered full and fair compensation for the exclusive use of the facility for those days and times indicated on the Annual Schedule. On July 1, 2023, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted according to the percent change in the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, All Items, All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose, 1982-84-100 Index.
- 2.5 <u>Facility Maintenance Fee</u>. Beginning July 1, 2022, and continuing for the full term of this agreement, including any extensions, each participant in the Red Hawks Lacrosse program using Creekside Sports Park will be charged a \$4.00 Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) per season. The Facility Maintenance Fee shall be assessed by the Red Hawks at the time of registration or any payment of program fees and shall be retained by the Red Hawks in a separate account and remitted to the Town annually in conjunction with payment of the Annual Use Fee, no later than July 1 of each year this agreement is in force. Participants shall be charged an FMF for each distinct season at which registration and fees are typically collected by the Red Hawks.

FMF revenue received by the Town from the Red Hawks shall be used solely to fund the cost of maintenance and operations of the Premises.

2.6 <u>Additional Annual Use Fee Adjustment</u>. Should Red Hawks increase or decrease its requested hours of use as set forth in the Annual Schedule, by 5% or more, the Annual Use

Fee shall be adjusted proportionally based on the percentage change in hours. In no case shall the Annual Use Fee be decreased by more than 10% below the initial Annual Use Fee set forth in Section 2.4. Town will adjust use hours and Annual Use Fee per calendar year upon agreed schedule between the Town and Red Hawks.

- 2.7 <u>Maintenance</u>. Red Hawks shall be responsible for the maintenance responsibilities set forth in Attachment B, Maintenance Responsibilities.
- 2.8 <u>Facility Use Policies</u>. Red Hawks shall comply, without limitation, with all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation provisions. Red Hawks shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Attachment C, Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations, and Attachment D, Town of Los Gatos Creekside Sports Park Special Use Policies. The Red Hawks agrees to apply with the current rules and regulations available at www.losgatosca.gov/parkres as well as any future amendments to those rules and regulations. Failure to comply with these policies may result in suspension and/or termination of this Agreement.

Red Hawks agrees to comply with the state "Fair Play in Community Sports Act." Red Hawks will not discriminate on the basis of gender and boys' and girls' teams will have equal access to the facilities.

2.9 <u>Payment</u>. Red Hawks shall make all payments, whether or not invoiced by Town, required pursuant to this Agreement no later than February 1 of each year payments are due. All payments shall be mailed by first class mail or delivered in person at the Town office and addressed as follows:

- 2.10 <u>Assignment</u>. Red Hawks shall not assign any portion of this Agreement or allow the use of the Premises by any other person or entity contrary to this Agreement's terms, with the out Town's prior written approval. Red Hawks is expressly prohibited from use of the Premises for any activity other than activities sanctioned and associated with Red Hawks.
- 2.11 <u>Personal Property</u>. Personal property of Red Hawks shall be Red Hawks' sole responsibility to acquire, repair, replace and store. Red Hawks shall remove its personal property at the expiration or termination of this Agreement. Any personal property not so removed shall become the sole property of Town with no compensation

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Red Hawks agrees to have and maintain for the duration of this Agreement, General Liability insurance policies insuring Red Hawks, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents to an amount not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current Best's rating of no less than B+.
- ii. Red Hawks agrees to have and maintain for the duration of this Agreement, an Automobile Liability insurance policy insuring the Red Hawks, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents to an amount not less than one million (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Red Hawks shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Red Hawks shall provide all certificates and endorsements before term of Agreement begins.

General Liability:

- The Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents are to be covered as additional insured as respects to liability arising out of activities occurring on or related to the occupancy and use of the Premises by Red Hawks.
- ii. Red Hawks insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, or agents shall be excess of the Red Hawks' insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with the reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. Red Hawks insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has

been given to the Town. The Red Hawks shall ensure that current certification of such insurance is on file at all times with the Town Clerk during the term of this agreement.

- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Red Hawks shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law. Further, Red Hawks shall ensure that all contractors employed on the Premises by the Red Hawks provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- Property Insurance. Town shall have no obligation to maintain any insurance of the Premises or any personal property placed on the Premises. Red Hawks shall be solely responsible for obtaining whatever insurance coverage that Red Hawks believes may be appropriate to protect and indemnify Red Hawks for loss to the Premises or to any personal property that Red Hawks may place on the Premises.
- 3.5 <u>Indemnification</u>. Red Hawks agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents, from and against any and all damages, claims or liability, penalties, costs or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise from any loss, damage, or injury to persons or property occurring in or about the Premises that arises out of or incident to the Red Hawks' use of the Premises, including use by anyone that the Red Hawks has permitted or allowed to use the Premises. This obligation to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend applies whether or not the incident or claim or liability is or may be related negligence on the part of the Town.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

4.1 <u>Damage and Destruction</u>. Damage or destruction of any portion of the Premises by any cause shall not terminate this Agreement or otherwise affect the respective obligations of the two parties, any present or future law to the contrary notwithstanding, except pursuant to the provisions of this Section 4.1.

Under no circumstances does the Town have any obligation to provide Red Hawks with an alternative property to conduct its operations, and Red Hawks is solely responsible for obtaining such insurance as Red Hawks deems appropriate to protect its interests should damage or destruction to the Premises occur.

Red Hawks shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury to the field and/or Premises as a result of the direct or indirect use of the Premises by Red Hawks under this agreement.

This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect unless prior to February 1st of any calendar year, either Party provides written notice to the other Party that it desires to terminate the Agreement for convenience and, upon such notice, the Agreement shall terminate on June 30th of the same calendar year.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to effect Town donations and solicitations in a manner that complies with both the letter and spirit of California ethics laws and, within that that framework, to expand the potential for community donations by establishing a mechanism by which individuals and organizations may be more readily advised of donation opportunities.

SOLICITATION GUIDELINES

Targeted Solicitation

Targeted solicitation is defined as the direct petition or contact of specific individuals, companies, foundations or other entities initiated by the Town Council and other elected officials, Council advisory bodies, and Town employees herein called "Town Officials" for the purpose of receiving goods, services, or other contributions for the Town. Targeted solicitation excludes the direct petition for government, private, or non-profit grants for Council-approved programs, projects, and services. Unless prior approval has been given by the Council, Town Officials shall not engage in targeted solicitation activities on behalf of the Town.

BROAD OUTREACH GUIDELINES

Broad Outreach

Broad outreach is defined as the process of informing a broad spectrum of individuals, companies, foundations, non-profit organizations, or other entities of donation opportunities through various communication vehicles, including but not limited to written, electronic, or internet-related publications, flyers, brochures, news releases, and television or radio announcements. Broad outreach is permitted by the Town Manager or designee subject to the guidelines provided in this policy.

The following broad outreach guidelines apply when communicating a Town need for goods, services, or other contributions:

- Broad outreach must relate to a Town Council-approved purpose, service, project, or program.
- Broad outreach for goods, services, or other contributions should be made by using a variety of communication methodologies to ensure outreach to the entire community.
- Donations shall not be made under the guise, pretense, or presumption of receiving official Town endorsement or approval of the donating party, product, project, or activity.

PROCEDURE FOR ESTABLISHING COUNCIL APPROVED TOWN NEEDS

The Council shall direct the Town Manager to develop a list of recommended Town needs for donation opportunities. Council consideration and approval of the list of Town needs may occur as part of the annual operating and capital budget development process and can be amended by Council at any time.

DONATION ACCEPTANCE GUIDELINES

All goods, services, or other contributions offered by individuals, companies, foundations, non-profit organizations, or other entities will be considered for acceptance or rejection, including items offered for donation that are identified on a Council approved list of needs. The acceptance of all donations to the Town will be based on the following guidelines.

- Purpose of the donation.
- Community or municipal need for the donation.
- Compatibility of the donation with Los Gatos Municipal Code, policies, programs, and other applicable laws.
- Timeliness of the donation as it relates to implementation.
- Level of benefit and financial impact to the Town.

All donations should be reviewed by the Town Manager or designee in advance of acceptance to ensure consistency with established policy guidelines.

AUTHORITY TO ACCEPT DONATIONS

The authority to accept all donations is based on the market value of the donation as reasonably determined.

Donations \$25,000 and Under

The Town Manager or designee is authorized to accept or reject all minor donations that have a market value equal to or less than \$25,000.

Donations over \$25,000

The Town Council shall consider and accept or reject all major donations that have a market value greater than \$25,000.

Ongoing Annual Donations from 501(c)(3) Organizations dedicated to supporting specific Town Departments in Offering Community Services:

- Potential uses for donation funds will be discussed and agreed upon with the respective non-profit bodies, in accordance with the Council approved Solicitation and Donation Policy.
- Funds donated will be placed into accounts as designated by the Finance Director.
- The departments may expend donated funds once received and deposited into the appropriate
 account only for items identified on the Council approved Town of Los Gatos Donation
 Opportunities List of Town Needs, which is approved annually with the Town's operating
 budget.
- At the end of each fiscal year, a written listing of items purchased from these accounts, in accordance with the Donation Policy, shall be provided to the Town Manager and Town Council.

PROCEDURES FOR ACCEPTING MAJOR DONATIONS

For all major donations, a staff report, containing analysis based on the donation acceptance guidelines established in this policy, will be written to guide the Council when considering major donations. The report will also provide donation recognition alternatives for Council consideration should the donation be accepted. The Council will determine on a case by case basis if the donation should be accepted or rejected.

DONOR RECOGNITION GUIDELINES

Acceptance of donations shall be acknowledged by the Town. Donation recognition practices shall be implemented in a consistent manner and adhere to Town Municipal Code, all applicable laws, regulations, and policies. Recognition of donations will be determined by the Council or Town Manager and shall be consistent with acceptance requirements of this policy and the guidelines set forth below:

Donations accepted by the Town may be acknowledged through one or more of the forms of recognition as indicated below. Other forms of recognition may be approved by the Town Council via resolution if compelled by special circumstances which shall be specified in the resolution.

- Written and/or verbal recognition.
- Public recognition at Town Council meetings.
- Inclusion in Town public communication materials, such as electronic media and selected publications.
- Plaques.

Plaques may be used to commemorate donations accepted by the Town from persons, businesses, and organizations according to the following standards:

Plaques used for recognition purposes may be affixed to an appropriate Town facility, which includes, but is not limited to a building or any portion thereof, structure, equipment, furniture or natural asset. Plaques shall include the name(s) of the person(s) being recognized and applicable date, with standard wording limited to:

The size of the plaque shall not exceed 8"x10," unless the number of donors exceeds the allowable space. For multiple donors, the names of the donors should be proportioned thereto, and the size of the plaque shall not exceed four (4) square feet. The location, materials, size and color of plaques shall be consistent with acceptance requirements of this policy or by Council on a case by case basis should special circumstances exist, which shall be specified in a resolution. Unless compelled by special circumstances and approved by the Town Council via resolution, Town facilities shall not be named after an individual, group, organization or business as a result of any donated good, service, or other contribution to the Town.

BACKGROUND:

As part of its Engineering Development Services, the Town conducts various mapping, map check review, and land surveying services. The Parks and Public Works Department does not have a Town Surveyor on staff, so these services are performed by a consultant who acts as the Town Surveyor. This includes the review of parcel maps and final maps; legal descriptions and plats for lot line adjustments, easements, and rights-of-way dedications; certificates of compliance; and other documents for technical correctness, adherence to codes, ordinances, the Professional Land Surveyor's Act, and the Subdivision Map Act.

Several complicated and sometimes invalid requests for lot line adjustments and map approvals come from developers looking to create new developable lots in the Town. These requests require review by an experienced survey consultant with extensive knowledge in the field of historical chain of title review to verify the validity of these requests.

BACKGROUND (continued):

In 2018, the Town Council authorized a five-year agreement with Kier and Wright Civil Engineers and Surveyors, Inc. (Exhibit A) to serve as the Town's Surveyor, which will expire June 30, 2023.

The Town is required to use a licensed surveyor by California's Subdivision Map Act Law for review and signing of development maps and other land development documents. The Engineering Division has staff shortages and currently does not have the staff capacity to issue a new Request for Qualifications (RFQ) prior the expiration of the current agreement term.

DISCUSSION:

In addition to their previous experience completing challenging mapping services for the Town, Kier and Wright has a total of 12 California registered land surveyors on staff and available to assist the Town with complicated land development applications. This contract extension to June 30, 2024 will allow Kier and Wright to continue to review and sign the development maps and other land development documents, allowing engineering staff to develop a new RFQ and put a new contract with a qualified firm into effect by July 1, 2024.

CONCLUSION:

Authorize the Town Manager to execute a First Amendment to the Agreement for Consultant Services with Kier and Wright to provide services as the "Acting Town Surveyor" for various land development mapping services extending the term to June 30, 2024.

FISCAL IMPACT:

This agreement is based a cost recovery activity as part of the development review process in which the Town uses fees and deposits collected from various development applications to pay for these services.

The original agreement was written with a 'not to exceed' amount of \$125,000; however, the First Amendment will reflect the following for compensation language:

Compensation for Consultant's professional services shall not exceed the established hourly rates and payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.

AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTANT SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on August 7, 2018 by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, a California municipal corporation, ("Town") and Kier & Wright Civil Engineers and Surveyors, Inc., ("Consultant"), whose address is 2850 Collier Canyon Road, Livermore, CA 94551. This Agreement is made with reference to the following facts.

I. RECITALS

- 1.1 The Town desires to engage Consultant to provide services as the designated "Acting Town Surveyor" for various land development mapping services as needed.
- 1.2 The Consultant represents and affirms that it is willing to perform the desired work pursuant to this Agreement.
- 1.3 Consultant warrants it possesses the distinct professional skills, qualifications, experience, and resources necessary to timely perform the services described in this Agreement. Consultant acknowledges Town has relied upon these warranties to retain Consultant.

II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 Scope of Services. Consultant shall provide services as described in that certain Request for Statement of Qualifications for Town Surveyor Consultant Services 2018, which is hereby incorporated by reference and attached as Exhibit A. Services will include lot line adjustments, map review, vacations, review of right of way, Certificates of Compliance, plats and legals, dedications/proposed easements, easement abandonment, lot mergers and general land surveying services. The Consultant will review, sign and stamp documents as needed and identified in the State of California Subdivision Map Act on behalf of the Town.
- 2.2 <u>Term and Time of Performance</u>. This contract will remain in effect from August 7, 2018 to June 30, 2023.
- 2.3 <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. The Consultant shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, ordinances, and regulations of governing federal, state and local laws. Consultant represents and warrants to Town that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession. Consultant shall maintain a Town of Los Gatos business license pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Code of the Town of Los Gatos.
- 2.4 <u>Sole Responsibility</u>. Consultant shall be responsible for employing or engaging all persons necessary to perform the services under this Agreement.
- 2.5 <u>Information/Report Handling</u>. All documents furnished to Consultant by the Town and all reports and supportive data prepared by the Consultant under this Agreement are the Town's property and shall be delivered to the Town upon the completion of Consultant's services or at the Town's written request. All reports, information, data, and exhibits prepared or assembled by Consultant in connection with the performance of its services

pursuant to this Agreement are confidential until released by the Town to the public, and the Consultant shall not make any of these documents or information available to any individual or organization not employed by the Consultant or the Town without the written consent of the Town before such release. The Town acknowledges that the reports to be prepared by the Consultant pursuant to this Agreement are for the purpose of evaluating a defined project, and Town's use of the information contained in the reports prepared by the Consultant in connection with other projects shall be solely at Town's risk, unless Consultant expressly consents to such use in writing. Town further agrees that it will not appropriate any methodology or technique of Consultant which is and has been confirmed in writing by Consultant to be a trade secret of Consultant.

- 2.6 <u>Compensation</u>. Compensation for Consultant's professional services **shall not exceed \$125,000**, inclusive of all costs. Payment shall be based upon Town approval of each task.
- 2.7 <u>Billing</u>. Billing shall be monthly by invoice within thirty (30) days of the rendering of the service and shall be accompanied by a detailed explanation of the work performed by whom at what rate and on what date. Also, plans, specifications, documents or other pertinent materials shall be submitted for Town review, even if only in partial or draft form.

Payment shall be net thirty (30) days. All invoices and statements to the Town shall be addressed as follows:

Invoices: Town of Los Gatos Attn: Accounts Payable P.O. Box 655 Los Gatos, CA 95031-0655

- Availability of Records. Consultant shall maintain the records supporting this billing for not less than three years following completion of the work under this Agreement. Consultant shall make these records available to authorized personnel of the Town at the Consultant's offices during business hours upon written request of the Town.
- 2.9 <u>Assignability and Subcontracting</u>. The services to be performed under this Agreement are unique and personal to the Consultant. No portion of these services shall be assigned or subcontracted without the written consent of the Town.
- 2.10 <u>Independent Contractor</u>. It is understood that the Consultant, in the performance of the work and services agreed to be performed, shall act as and be an independent contractor and not an agent or employee of the Town. As an independent contractor he/she shall not obtain any rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to Town employee(s). With prior written consent, the Consultant may perform some obligations under this Agreement by subcontracting, but may not delegate ultimate responsibility for performance or assign or transfer interests under this Agreement. Consultant agrees to testify in any litigation brought regarding the subject of the work to be performed under this Agreement. Consultant shall be compensated for its costs and expenses in preparing for, traveling to, and testifying in such matters at its then current hourly rates of compensation, unless such litigation is

- brought by Consultant or is based on allegations of Consultant's negligent performance or wrongdoing.
- 2.11 Conflict of Interest. Consultant understands that its professional responsibilities are solely to the Town. The Consultant has and shall not obtain any holding or interest within the Town of Los Gatos. Consultant has no business holdings or agreements with any individual member of the Staff or management of the Town or its representatives nor shall it enter into any such holdings or agreements. In addition, Consultant warrants that it does not presently and shall not acquire any direct or indirect interest adverse to those of the Town in the subject of this Agreement, and it shall immediately disassociate itself from such an interest, should it discover it has done so and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, divest itself of such interest. Consultant shall not knowingly and shall take reasonable steps to ensure that it does not employ a person having such an interest in this performance of this Agreement. If after employment of a person, Consultant discovers it has employed a person with a direct or indirect interest that would conflict with its performance of this Agreement, Consultant shall promptly notify Town of this employment relationship, and shall, at the Town's sole discretion, sever any such employment relationship.
- 2.12 Equal Employment Opportunity. Consultant warrants that it is an equal opportunity employer and shall comply with applicable regulations governing equal employment opportunity. Neither Consultant nor its subcontractors do and neither shall discriminate against persons employed or seeking employment with them on the basis of age, sex, color, race, marital status, sexual orientation, ancestry, physical or mental disability, national origin, religion, or medical condition, unless based upon a bona fide occupational qualification pursuant to the California Fair Employment & Housing Act.

III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring him/her and his/her firm to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage.
- ii. Consultant agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy ensuring him/her and his/her staff to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. Consultant shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. Consultant agrees that all certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Town before work commences.

iv. Consultant agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, professional liability insurance in amounts not less than \$1,000,000 which is sufficient to insure Consultant for professional errors or omissions in the performance of the particular scope of work under this agreement.

General Liability:

- i. The Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insured as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Consultant; products and completed operations of Consultant, premises owned or used by the Consultant. This requirement does not apply to the professional liability insurance required for professional errors and omissions.
- ii. The Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurances maintained by the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. Current certification of such insurance shall be kept on file at all times during the term of this agreement with the Town Clerk.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, Consultant shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law and shall provide evidence of such policy to the Town before beginning services under this Agreement. Further, Consultant shall ensure that all subcontractors employed by Consultant provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- Indemnification. The Consultant shall save, keep, hold harmless and indemnify and defend the Town its officers, agent, employees and volunteers from all damages, liabilities, penalties, costs, or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise or be set up because of damages to property or personal injury received by reason of, or in the course of performing work which may be occasioned by a willful or negligent act or omissions of the Consultant, or any of the Consultant's officers, employees, or agents or any subconsultant.

IV. GENERAL TERMS

- 4.1 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 4.2 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement, regardless of where executed, shall be governed by and construed to the laws of the State of California. Venue for any action regarding this Agreement shall be in the Superior Court of the County of Santa Clara.
- 4.3 Termination of Agreement. The Town and the Consultant shall have the right to terminate this agreement with or without cause by giving not less than fifteen days (15) written notice of termination. In the event of termination, the Consultant shall deliver to the Town all plans, files, documents, reports, performed to date by the Consultant. In the event of such termination, Town shall pay Consultant an amount that bears the same ratio to the maximum contract price as the work delivered to the Town bears to completed services contemplated under this Agreement, unless such termination is made for cause, in which event, compensation, if any, shall be adjusted in light of the particular facts and circumstances involved in such termination.
- 4.4 <u>Amendment</u>. No modification, waiver, mutual termination, or amendment of this Agreement is effective unless made in writing and signed by the Town and the Consultant.
- 4.5 <u>Disputes</u>. In any dispute over any aspect of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to reasonable attorney's fees, including costs of appeal.
- 4.6 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice required to be given shall be deemed to be duly and properly given if mailed postage prepaid, and addressed to:

- 4.7 Order of Precedence. In the event of any conflict, contradiction, or ambiguity between the terms and conditions of this Agreement in respect of the Products or Services and any attachments to this Agreement, then the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall prevail over attachments or other writings.
- 4.8 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement, including all Exhibits, constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between the Town and Consultant. No terms, conditions, understandings or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement,

unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

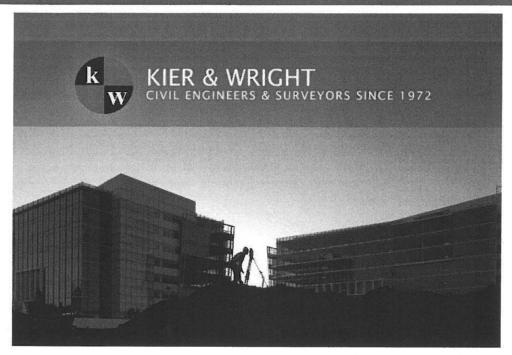

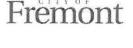

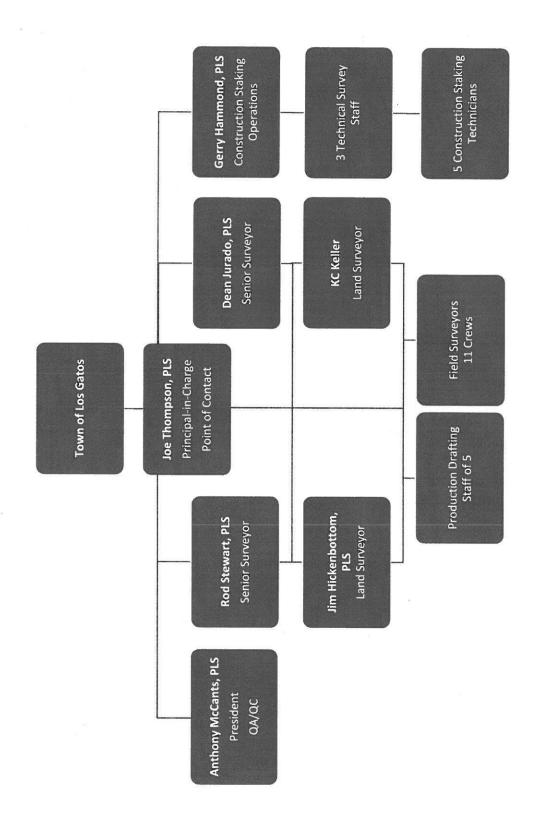

BACKGROUND:

On September 7, 2021, the Town Council approved allocating \$100,000 of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding to KCAT to develop a community of 55+ volunteers who would help create and run local public access TV and internet radio. The program was designed to help ease senior isolation through increased senior engagement.

As the guidelines for the use of ARPA funds evolved, the Town has subsequently used the "simplified" approach by allocating ARPA funding to qualifying expenditures specifically to cover Police staffing costs. This has subsequently freed other General Fund dollars for Council priorities. For auditing and other purposes, staff is tracking these General Fund dollars to ensure that grant recipients provide appropriate documentation for the use of the funds. The unallocated proceeds are in the Council Priorities-Economic Recovery Reserve.

TOWN OF LOS GATOS GRANT AGREEMENT

Summary:

The Town of Los Gatos ("Town") has awarded a grant to **KCAT** ("Grantee") in the total amount not to exceed **\$100,000** for the period from **June** ____, **2023** to **June 30, 2024.** This letter ("Agreement") sets forth the terms and conditions of the grant award.

Payment Terms and Use of Funds:

Grantee must accept the terms of this Agreement prior to disbursement of grant funds. Grant disbursement to the Grantee shall be made after receipt of the grant claim form and the countersigned original of this Agreement. Please submit award claim and signed copy of this agreement to: Town of Los Gatos, Town Manager's Office, Attention: Town Clerk, 110 E. Main Street, Los Gatos, CA 95030.

Grant funds shall be used exclusively to support the project(s) as set forth in the Grantee's proposal, which is attached as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference, with the exception of funding for print or community outreach proposals. Any use of funds for a purpose other than that described in the Grantee's original proposal requires the Town's prior written consent.

Unused Funds:

At the conclusion of the grant period, Grantee agrees to return any unexpended or unaccounted for funds to the Town. Grantee agrees to return all disbursed funds if (1) grant funds have not been used for their intended purpose, or (2) have been used inconsistently with the terms of this Agreement, or (3) if the activities or outputs funded by the grant are materially incomplete by the end of the grant period, as determined by the Town in its sole discretion.

No Pledge:

This Agreement shall not be interpreted to create any pledge or any commitment by the Town to make any further grants or contributions to Grantee or any other person or entity for this or any other project.

Reporting and Records:

Grantee agrees to deliver to the office of the Town Clerk a final written report in the form attached as Exhibit B to this Agreement by **July 31, 2024**. The written report must include copies of completed contracts, paid invoices, timecards, payroll check register report, cash receipts, vouchers, cancelled checks, bank statements and/or other official documentation to show the Town how the grant funds were expended. This documentation shall explain how each expense is related to the approved purpose of the grant. The final written report is a publicly accessible document.

Original receipts and invoices must be maintained by Grantee for five years and shall be made available to the Town upon request. Grantee agrees to maintain adequate financial records consistent with generally accepted accounting practices, and to retain such records for at least five years after the

conclusion of the grant period. The Town may monitor and conduct an evaluation of the Grantee's operation to ensure compliance with this Agreement.

Grantee will provide a minimum of one site visit or project observation at a mutually agreed upon time during the grant period to a Town staff representative. An interim check-in by phone, video meeting or email may also by requested at any time during the grant period by either the Town or the Grantee.

Publicity Acknowledgement:

Grantee will acknowledge the Town's support in any publications or materials related to the project, as follows: "Supported in part by a grant from the Town of Los Gatos". Grantee agrees that The Town may include information about the Grantee and its activities in its own reports and publications and may distribute such information to third parties.

No Agency:

Grantee is solely responsible for the results of its services, compliance with the terms of this Agreement, and for all activities supported by the grant. Nothing in this Agreement creates a partnership, agency, joint venture, employment, or any other type of relationship between the Grantee and the Town. The Grantee shall not represent itself as an agent of the Town for any purpose and has no authority to bind the Town in any manner whatsoever.

No Lobbying:

Grantee confirms that the grant funds will not be used for the purpose of lobbying, carrying on propaganda or otherwise attempting to influence legislation as defined by the United States Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No Assignment:

Grantee may not assign this Agreement or delegate performance of the terms of this Agreement or of the project to any other person or entity without the prior written consent of the Town.

Indemnity:

Grantee agrees, to the fullest extent permitted by law, to indemnify and hold harmless the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents, from any and all claims, injury, liabilities, losses and expenses (including attorney's fees) directly, indirectly wholly or partially arising from or in connection with any act or omission of Grantee, its employees or agents, in applying for or accepting the grant, in expending or applying grant funds, or in carrying out the project as set forth in the proposal. Grantee shall defend Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents, against any such claims.

Compliance with Law:

Grantee shall comply with and cause all its contractors and employees, if any, to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, codes, regulations.

THE PRODUCERS program is intended to be a new, impactful and, once established, sustainable TV and radio production program for the betterment of our senior "55 plus" community. Implementation of THE PRODUCERS will contribute to decreasing senior isolation and increasing senior engagement and programming, noted issues of concern to CHSSC.

Conveniently located on the Los Gatos High School campus, the KCAT TV studio, Control Room and Podcast/Radio studio provides an additional venue and workspace for Los Gatos seniors to gather while sharing their talents and learning new skills; creating; socializing; and enjoying accomplishments with friends and neighbors.

We know that television remains a beloved platform to all for news and entertainment, particularly in our current digital media environment. As a community access TV station, we are always looking for local content. Here are some ideas that THE PRODUCERS could embrace when brainstorming to create a TV show with an entire season of episodes:

- Cooking, Favorite Local Restaurants, Farm to Table,
- Painting, Crafts, Art History, Intro to Art and Wine, Antiques
- Gardening, Planting an Herb Garden, Bird Watching
- Road Tripping in the USA, Best Local Trails, Health & Wellness
- Local News, In-depth Stories and Interviews, Trivia, documentaries

THE PRODUCERS will have complete freedom to bring their ideas to life and create shows of interest to them and the community. Here is an example of how large groups with a variety of talents can produce a show:

Let's say someone identifies as having "the gift of gab" from the list above. That same individual also loves to bake and has a friend who bakes as well. They would have a great time as hosts of a new cooking show! KCAT would then assist in finding other individuals to produce, direct, write scripts, film, edit and market an endless amount of episodes. As a team, everyone involved shares in the pride of creating "The Baking Show" and seeing their names in the credits as their production comes to life through the magic of television! What could be a more exciting reason to celebrate our volunteers!

SUSTAINABILITY AND REACH

With the support from ARPA seed funding, KCAT will take its training expertise to local seniors. THE PRODUCERS will be certified as qualified to use KCAT's equipment, in studio or on location. Importantly, after training and with experience, THE PRODUCERS will have the skills necessary to continue to produce their own shows for broadcast and internet distribution in the years to come. Participants in KCAT's inaugural year of THE PRODUCERS program will be able to pass on their knowledge to incoming seniors.

Our Comcast TV Channel 15 geographical area served includes Los Gatos and Monte Sereno, California; however, because we offer streaming and on-demand programming at www.kcat.org, Apple TV or Roku, our geographical area extends to Silicon Valley, the Bay Area and beyond—essentially, we're viewable worldwide through our website. The same can be said for our new KCAT internet radio, which will be available via an internet radio website and through Spotify and other streaming services.

CROSS-GENERATIONAL

KCAT has a substantial presence on the Los Gatos High School campus and works closely with middle, high school and college students throughout the community. We intend to foster and encourage an atmosphere of collaboration and learning experiences shared by seniors and our youth. This is a win-win environment: THE

PRODUCERS will benefit by new digital/social media and mobile approaches familiar to youth, and the youth will be able to leverage the experience and skill set of THE PRODUCERS.

BRING BACK LOCAL INITIATIVE

KCAT will encourage THE PRODUCERS to help fill the local news gap by embracing a "Bring Back Local" initiative. We'll inspire the kind of locally sourced TV and podcast content that our community desperately misses. THE PRODUCERS volunteers will help spread the word about this unique new senior program by contributing feature stories and news articles to local publications that seniors read. Additionally, our senior volunteers who are trained for on-location filming and interview technique will themselves become valuable resources and ambassadors within our community: They will be able to film community events, LGS Recreation programs, ribbon cuttings and service club projects, for example.

THE PRODUCERS ROLL-OUT PLAN & BUDGET

The requested short-term funding of \$200,000 will be allocated as follows:

\$60,000 THE PRODUCERS Program Engagement & Marketing Manager

Develop an ongoing and adaptive plan to recruit seniors 55+; implement an ongoing marketing strategy that results in measurement, such as number of volunteers recruited and active; identify, develop and match people's skills and interests to roles, create and manage database, implement programs, such as friends bring friends, etc.

\$20,000 **Program Volunteer Coordinator**

Supports the manager: admin, scheduling, follow-up, meetings, coordinating events

\$40,000 **Tech Support & Training**

Ongoing classes/training by KCAT staff and outside resources for seniors to learn the TV station, become proficient in using equipment and develop skills and interests

\$30,000 Marketing and engagement

- Create an exciting video outlining THE PRODUCERS program and distribute it to all senior living facilities, active adult groups, Nextdoor, TV before Council meetings, etc.
- Continual distribution of print ads and articles (The Outlook), TV, and Radio ads, flyers, social media platforms; social activities, volunteer recognition events

\$10,000 Content curation and programming

In addition to producing new content, curating content for KCAT TV is another exciting project for seniors, for example researching and purchasing documentaries, student films or other shows from around the Bay that would draw community interest on TV

\$40,000 Program-specific equipment

- Purchase program-related and user-friendly equipment beyond the full KCAT inventory
- In support of programs, software and license subscriptions will be purchased that are necessary to produce a show, for example: editing, graphic templates, music, etc.

KCAT management will oversee THE PRODUCERS program budget. KCAT adheres to strict accounting of employee hours and will be happy to provide programmatic expenses or performance reports as agreed upon.

PHASE ONE: RECRUITING VOLUNTEERS

- Host an event with Town Council members, all Los Gatos Commissioners, community members to
 create "buzz," raise awareness of the program, and kickstart outreach to our senior community for the

THE PRODUCERS program is intended to be a new, impactful and, once established, sustainable TV and radio production program for the betterment of our senior "55 plus" community. Our long-term goal is having individuals and groups of seniors become KCAT TV and radio producers, developing and directing entire seasons of shows on an on-going, "rolling" basis.

During this inaugural year, THE PRODUCERS program's effectiveness will be evaluated in the following ways:

- Satisfaction of the senior participants: 100% of the seniors participating in the THE PRODUCERS will say that they have gained valuable skills and experiences
- Participants will enjoy the program which will encourage them to bring others to join the fun.
- Number of active THE PRODUCERS groups: Our goal isn't so much the quantity of shows but having
 multiple groups of seniors getting together to learn and implement the TV, podcast or radio entire
 production process: brainstorming, scriptwriting/storyboarding, producing, directing, filming, acting,
 tech, editing, marketing, and sponsorship/business planning. KCAT intends to create 5-10 such groups,
 approx. 30-50 active participants, during the inaugural year.

- KCAT will measure audience viewership, listenership and engagement through analytics, ratings
 providers, surveys, targeted advertising, and online and social media strategies to drive viewers, and
 possibly subscription services.
- Percentage of participants that join a post-inaugural year production team: KCAT will strive to have 50% or more of the participants continue on to produce original broadcast content past THE PRODUCERS' inaugural year which will be sustained through show sponsorships, fundraising and grants secured by THE PRODUCERS and KCAT staff.

BACKGROUND:

In June 2020, the Town of Los Gatos was awarded a Measure B grant from the Valley Transit Authority (VTA) in the amount of \$1,734,250 for the design and construction of the Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets Project. In addition, the Town has allocated a total of \$743,251

BACKGROUND (continued):

from the General Fund Appropriated Reserve (GFAR) for this project, of which \$601,926 remains. The total engineer's estimate for this project is in excess of \$72 million.

During development of the Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget for 2023/24 – 2027/28, staff suggested that design and construction of the Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets Project not be pursued at this time and that the existing funds be reallocated to other projects that are in process but not fully funded. At its March CIP discussion, the Town Council agreed.

DISCUSSION:

Parks and Public Works staff has reviewed the existing project inventory and considered potential uses for the Measure B and GFAR Funding. Measure B funding can only be allocated to projects that were submitted by the Town during the call for projects. The Town has four projects on the Measure B list, including the Winchester Complete Streets Project. The three other project eligible for Measure B funding are:

- 1. Los Gatos Creek Trail Connector at Highway 9 (CIP No. 832-4505). This project was bid for construction in April 2023 and costs were higher than anticipated. Staff has been able to identify funding except for \$576,672. The existing project funding already includes \$693,500 in Measure B funding. Construction awards for this project must be made by August 4, 2023 to prevent the need to rebid the project.
- 2. Kennedy Road Sidewalks Los Gatos Boulevard to Englewood (CIP No. 813-0241). This project will improve pedestrian and bicycle connectivity to Van Meter Elementary School, Fisher Middle School, and Los Gatos High School. Construction is expected to include Class II bike lanes and sidewalks along the approximately 2,100 feet of Kennedy Road in the project reach. The projected cost of design and construction is estimated to be \$3,000,000 to \$3,300,000 based on concept planning. The project has existing Measure B funding of \$832,300, plus GFAR of \$59,400. This leaves a projected funding gap of \$2,108,600 to \$2,408,300.
- 3. <u>Highway 17 Bicycle and Pedestrian Overcrossing (CIP No. 818-0803)</u>. The design of this project is fully funded through construction. Design funding included \$2,754,990 of Measure B funding. At this time there is no funding allocated for construction. The current funding gap for this project therefore is approximately \$25 million.

DISCUSSION (continued):

Staff recommends that the Town request that VTA Board of Directors approve reallocation of all Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets Measure B funds to the Kennedy Road Sidewalks project. Using this Measure B funding for the Los Gatos Creek Trail Connector project is not possible since the reallocation of Measure B funding requires an act of the VTA Board of Directors. Such action cannot be taken before the August 4 deadline for construction award.

Staff is recommending that the GFAR associated with the Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets project be split, with \$169,000 allocated to the Los Gatos Creek Trail Connector at Highway 9, and the remaining \$432,926 allocated to the Kennedy Road Sidewalks project. This action will fill the funding gap for the Trail Connector Project and allow the proposed construction award to be presented to Town Council at its meeting for August 1, 2023.

CONCLUSION:

The Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets project is an important element of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, but the limited PPW staffing available for capital projects has prevented the project from moving forward. In addition, the total cost for design and construction exceeds a reasonable amount that the Town currently has available. Therefore, staff recommends that a request be submitted to the VTA to reallocate all Measure B funds from the Winchester Complete Streets Project to the Kennedy Road Sidewalks project. If approved by the VTA Board, a subsequent Town Council action will be needed for the allocation to the Kennedy Road Sidewalks project. Staff recommends that the GFAR associated with the Winchester Complete Streets Project be allocated to Los Gatos Creek Trail Connector and Kennedy Road Sidewalks Project.

COORDINATION:

This memorandum has been coordinated with the Finance Department, Attorney's Office and VTA staff.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The proposed action calls for reallocating existing funding between existing projects. There is no net increase or decrease to overall funding in the capital program as a result of this request.

BACKGROUND:

The Los Gatos Creek Trail to Highway 9 Trailhead Connector Project (Project) was identified as a priority in the 2017 Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan and the 2020 Update to the Plan. Design of the Project was started in 2018 and staff has been working on design, environmental clearance, and development of construction documents ever since.

On January 17, 2023, Town Council authorized staff to issue two bids for the Project: one for construction and a second for construction management, inspection, and material testing services. Construction bids were opened on April 6, 2023 and a total of five bids were received. Bids for construction management, inspection, and material testing were based on qualifications, and cost negotiations with the preferred consultant are still in progress. For both bids, preliminary review is ongoing and a bid award memo will be brought to Town Council on August 1, 2023; however, initial analysis of the bids suggests that the construction costs for the project will exceed the total project cost presented in the January 17, 2023 report.

DISCUSSION:

Table 1 compares the costs presented in January 2023 with the updated costs. At this time staff believes the May 2023 costs accurately represent the Project.

The construction costs were significantly higher than expected as noted above. Staff reviewed the construction bids with the design engineering team and found that the overages are not attributed to any one specific line item, but rather than a number of items are proposed at higher costs than anticipated. Examples of this include traffic control, mobilization, handrailing systems, and structural concrete. The overages are the result of higher than expected inflation,

the relatively small size of the Project compared to other transportation projects, the complexity of the work area adjacent to Route 9 and the existing trail, and worker shortages in the construction trades. Follow up conversations with staff at Valley Transportation Agency (VTA) confirmed that many transportation-related projects are seeing similar cost increases.

Throughout the Project development, staff had been seeking grants and working to secure project funding. Following the bid opening, staff evaluated the existing funding and attempted to identify additional potential sources. Table 2 shows the funding sources presented in January in comparison to funding that has been identified to meet the updated total project cost.

One Bay Area Grant Cycle II (OBAG II) — In mid-April, VTA sent a message to all Santa Clara County jurisdictions that an OBAG II funded project in another jurisdiction had been cancelled. VTA asked for other potential projects that might use the funding. Staff notified VTA of the construction funding shortfall for the Project. VTA reviewed the Project with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and offered the Town additional OGAB II funding of \$2,842,000 to support the Project. The Town had executed a Master Agreement with the California Department of Transportation (CalTrans) for OBAG II funding in 2019 (Attachment 1). A Supplemental Agreement (Attachment 2) was executed in February 2023 to accept \$3,351,000 for construction. Staff is working with CalTrans to develop and execute a second supplement to for the additional \$2,842,000, which is expected to follow the same form as shown in Attachment 2. The new supplement is expected to be available for signing in July 2023. Staff is seeking authorization for the Town Manager to execute the supplement now to allow the grant funds to be recognized before the construction award is considered by the Council on August 1, 2023.

DISCUSSION (continued):

<u>General Fund Appropriated Reserve (GFAR)</u> – With the cancellation of the Winchester Boulevard Complete Street project, staff has requested that \$169,000 of GFAR be transferred to this Project. This is the amount needed to balance the project budget after all other sources were evaluated. A separate Council agenda item addresses this request.

<u>Measure B</u>: The Project was awarded Measure B funds and the requisite funding agreement was executed in February 2023. Staff considered reallocating a portion of the Winchester Boulevard Complete Streets Measure B funding to the Project, but reallocation of Measure B funding requires an act of the VTA Board of Directors and there was not enough time for that action to occur before construction bids expire on August 4, 2023.

<u>Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA)</u>: The project has received \$755,921 in TFCA funds and the grant agreement has been executed.

<u>Transportation and Development Act Article 3 (TDA3)</u>: Through the MTC, VTA distributes TDA3 funding to Santa Clara County cities and towns annually. This funding can be used for any bicycle and pedestrian project. Los Gatos has \$68,884 of TDA3 available and is proposing to use the funding for the Project. Use of the funding requires a Council resolution and application to MTC as noted in Attachment 3.

CONCLUSION:

The funding identified can fully fund the Project and staff is seeking approval of this funding plan before returning with the construction and construction inspection award contracts. If this funding plan is not authorized, then it is unlikely the project will move forward to construction at this time.

COORDINATION:

This memorandum was coordinated with the Finance Department and VTA.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal table below reflects the updated costs and budget sources for the construction phase of the project, which will be sufficient to fund the project.

This AGREEMENT, is entered into effective this _____ day of _____ day of ______, 20 / 9, by and between City of Los Gatos, hereinafter referred to as "ADMINISTERING AGENCY," and the State of California, acting by and through its Department of Transportation (Caltrans), hereinafter referred to as "STATE", and together referred to as "PARTIES" or individually as a "PARTY."

RECITALS:

- 1. WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States has enacted the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA) of 1991 and subsequent Transportation Authorization Bills to fund transportation programs; and
- 2. WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of California has enacted legislation by which certain federal-aid funds may be made available for use on local transportation related projects of public entities qualified to act as recipients of these federal-aid funds in accordance with the intent of federal law; and
- 3. WHEREAS, before federal funds will be made available for a specific program project, ADMINISTERING AGENCY and STATE are required to enter into an agreement to establish terms and conditions applicable to the ADMINISTERING AGENCY when receiving federal funds for a designated PROJECT facility and to the subsequent operation and maintenance of that completed facility.

NOW, THEREFORE, the PARTIES agree as follows:

ARTICLE I - PROJECT ADMINISTRATION

- 1. This AGREEMENT shall have no force or effect with respect to any program project unless and until a project-specific "Authorization/Agreement Summary", herein referred to as "E-76" document, is approved by STATE and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).
- 2. The term "PROJECT", as used herein, means that authorized transportation related project and related activities financed in part with federal-aid funds as more fully-described in an "Authorization/ Agreement Summary" or "Amendment/Modification Summary", herein referred to as "E-76" or "E-76 (AMOD)" document authorized by STATE and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA).
- 3. The E-76/E-76 (AMOD) shall designate the party responsible for implementing PROJECT, type of work and location of PROJECT.
- 4. The PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT sets out special covenants as a condition for the ADMINISTERING AGENCY to receive federal-aid funds from/through STATE for designated PROJECT. The PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT shall also show these federal funds that have been initially encumbered for PROJECT along with the matching funds to be provided by ADMINISTERING AGENCY and/or others. Execution of PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT by the PARTIES shall cause ADMINISTERING AGENCY to adopt all of the terms of this AGREEMENT as though fully set forth therein in the PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT. Unless otherwise expressly delegated in a resolution by the governing body of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, and with written concurrence by STATE, the PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT shall be approved and managed by the governing body of ADMINISTERING AGENCY.
- 5. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to execute and return each project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT within ninety (90) days of receipt. The PARTIES agree that STATE may suspend future authorizations/obligations and invoice payments for any on-going or future federal-aid project performed by ADMINISTERING AGENCY if any project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT is not returned within that ninety (90) day period unless otherwise agreed by STATE in writing.
- 6. ADMINISTERING AGENCY further agrees, as a condition to the release and payment of federal funds encumbered for the PROJECT described in each PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, to comply with the terms and conditions of this AGREEMENT and all of the agreed-upon Special Covenants or Remarks incorporated within the PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, and Cooperative/Contribution Agreement where appropriate, defining and identifying the nature of the specific PROJECT.
- 7. Federal, state and matching funds will not participate in PROJECT work performed in advance of the approval of the E-76 or E-76 (AMOD), unless otherwise stated in the executed project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that it will only proceed with the work authorized for that specific phase(s) on the project-specific E-76 or E-76 (AMOD). ADMINISTERING AGENCY further agrees to not proceed with future phases of PROJECT prior to receiving an E-76 (AMOD) from STATE for that phase(s) unless no further federal funds are needed or for those future phase(s).

- 8. That PROJECT or portions thereof, must be included in a federally approved Federal Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (FSTIP) prior to ADMINISTERING AGENCY submitting the "Request for Authorization".
- 9. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall conform to all state statutes, regulations and procedures (including those set forth in the Local Assistance Procedures Manual and the Local Assistance Program Guidelines, hereafter collectively referred to as "LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES") relating to the federal-aid program, all Title 23 Code of Federal Regulation (CFR) and 2 CFR part 200 federal requirements, and all applicable federal laws, regulations, and policy and procedural or instructional memoranda, unless otherwise specifically waived as designated in the executed project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT.
- 10. If PROJECT is not on STATE-owned right of way, PROJECT shall be constructed in accordance with LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES that describes minimum statewide design standards for local agency streets and roads. LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES for projects off the National Highway System (NHS) allow STATE to accept either the STATE's minimum statewide design standards or the approved geometric design standards of ADMINISTERING AGENCY. Additionally, for projects off the NHS, STATE will accept ADMINISTERING AGENCY-approved standard specifications, standard plans, materials sampling and testing quality assurance programs that meet the conditions described in the then current LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES.
- 11. If PROJECT involves work within or partially within STATE-owned right-of-way, that PROJECT shall also be subject to compliance with the policies, procedures and standards of the STATE Project Development Procedures Manual and Highway Design Manual and, where appropriate, an executed Cooperative Agreement between STATE and ADMINISTERING AGENCY that outlines the PROJECT responsibilities and respective obligations of the PARTIES. ADMINISTERING AGENCY and its contractors shall each obtain an encroachment permit through STATE prior to commencing any work within STATE rights of way or work which affects STATE facilities.
- 12. When PROJECT is not on the State Highway System but includes work to be performed by a railroad, the contract for such work shall be prepared by ADMINISTERING AGENCY or by STATE, as the PARTIES may hereafter agree. In either event, ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall enter into an agreement with the railroad providing for future maintenance of protective devices or other facilities installed under the contract.
- 13. If PROJECT is using STATE funds, the Department of General Services, Division of the State Architect, or its designee, shall review the contract PS&E for the construction of buildings, structures, sidewalks, curbs and related facilities for accessibility and usability. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall not award a PROJECT construction contract for these types of improvements until the State Architect has issued written approval stating that the PROJECT plans and specifications comply with the provisions of sections 4450 and 4454 of the California Government Code, if applicable. Further requirements and guidance are provided in Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations.
- 14. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will advertise, award and administer PROJECT in accordance with the current LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES unless otherwise stated in the executed project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT.

- 15. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall provide or arrange for adequate supervision and inspection of each PROJECT. While consultants may perform supervision and inspection work for PROJECT with a fully qualified and licensed engineer, ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall provide a full-time employee to be in responsible charge of each PROJECT who is not a consultant.
- 16. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall submit PROJECT-specific contract award documents to STATE's District Local Assistance Engineer within sixty (60) days after contract award. A copy of the award documents shall also be included with the submittal of the first invoice for a construction contract by ADMINISTERING AGENCY.
- 17. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall submit the final report documents that collectively constitute a "Report of Expenditures" within one hundred eighty (180) days of PROJECT completion. Failure by ADMINISTERING AGENCY to submit a "Report of Expenditures" within one hundred eighty (180) days of project completion will result in STATE imposing sanctions upon ADMINISTERING AGENCY in accordance with the current LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES.
- 18. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall comply with: (i) section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability in federally assisted programs; (ii) the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability irrespective of funding; and (iii) all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to both the Rehabilitation Act and the ADA.
- 19. The Congress of the United States, the Legislature of the State of California and the Governor of the State of California, each within their respective jurisdictions, have prescribed certain nondiscrimination requirements with respect to contract and other work financed with public funds. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to comply with the requirements of the FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES ADDENDUM (Exhibit A attached hereto) and the NONDISCRIMINATION ASSURANCES (Exhibit B attached hereto). ADMINISTERING AGENCY further agrees that any agreement entered into by ADMINISTERING AGENCY with a third party for performance of PROJECT-related work shall incorporate Exhibits A and B (with third party's name replacing ADMINISTERING AGENCY) as essential parts of such agreement to be enforced by that third party as verified by ADMINISTERING AGENCY.

ARTICLE II - RIGHTS OF WAY

- 1. No contract for the construction of a federal-aid PROJECT shall be awarded until all necessary rights of way have been secured. Prior to the advertising for construction of PROJECT, ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall certify and, upon request, shall furnish STATE with evidence that all necessary rights of way are available for construction purposes or will be available by the time of award of the construction contract.
- 2. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to indemnify and hold STATE harmless from any liability that may result in the event the right of way for a PROJECT, including, but not limited to, being clear as certified or if said right of way is found to contain hazardous materials requiring treatment or removal to remediate in accordance with Federal and State laws. The furnishing of right of way as provided for herein includes, in addition to all real property required for the PROJECT, title free and clear of obstructions and encumbrances affecting PROJECT and the payment, as required by applicable law, of relocation costs and damages to remainder real property not actually taken but injuriously affected by PROJECT. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall pay, from its own non-matching funds, any costs which arise out of delays to the construction of PROJECT because utility facilities have not been timely removed or relocated, or because rights of way were not available to ADMINISTERING AGENCY for the orderly prosecution of PROJECT work.
- 3. Subject to STATE approval and such supervision as is required by LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES over ADMINISTERING AGENCY's right of way acquisition procedures, ADMINISTERING AGENCY may claim reimbursement from federal funds for expenditures incurred in purchasing only the necessary rights of way needed for the PROJECT after crediting PROJECT with the fair market value of any excess property retained and not disposed of by ADMINISTERING AGENCY.
- 4. When real property rights are to be acquired by ADMINISTERING AGENCY for a PROJECT, said ADMINISTERING AGENCY must carry out that acquisition in compliance with all applicable State and Federal laws and regulations, in accordance with State procedures as published in State's current LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES and STATE's Right-of-Way Manual, subject to STATE oversight to ensure that the completed work is acceptable under the Federal Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970, as amended.
- 5. Whether or not federal-aid is to be requested for right of way, should ADMINISTERING AGENCY, in acquiring right of way for PROJECT, displace an individual, family, business, farm operation, or non-profit organization, relocation payments and services will be provided as set forth in 49 CFR, Part 24. The public will be adequately informed of the relocation payments and services which will be available, and, to the greatest extent practicable, no person lawfully occupying real property shall be required to move from his/her dwelling or to move his/her business or farm operation without at least ninety (90) days written notice from ADMINISTERING AGENCY. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will provide STATE with specific assurances, on each portion of the PROJECT, that no person will be displaced until comparable decent, safe and sanitary replacement housing is available within a reasonable period of time prior to displacement, and that ADMINISTERING AGENCY's relocation program is realistic and adequate to provide orderly, timely and efficient relocation of PROJECT-displaced persons as provided in 49 CFR, Part 24.

6. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall, along with recording the deed or instrument evidencing title in the name of the ADMINISTERING AGENCY or their assignee, also record an Agreement Declaring Restrictive Covenants (ADRC) as a separate document incorporating the assurances included within Exhibits A and B and Appendices A, B, C and D of this AGREEMENT, as appropriate.

ARTICLE III - MAINTENANCE AND MANAGEMENT

- 1. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will maintain and operate the property acquired, developed, constructed, rehabilitated, or restored by PROJECT for its intended public use until such time as the parties might amend this AGREEMENT to otherwise provide. With the approval of STATE, ADMINISTERING AGENCY or its successors in interest in the PROJECT property may transfer this obligation and responsibility to maintain and operate PROJECT property for that intended public purpose to another public entity.
- Upon ADMINISTERING AGENCY's acceptance of the completed federal-aid construction contract or upon contractor being relieved of the responsibility for maintaining and protecting PROJECT, ADMINISTERING AGENCY will be responsible for the maintenance, ownership, liability, and the expense thereof, for PROJECT in a manner satisfactory to the authorized representatives of STATE and FHWA and if PROJECT falls within the jurisdictional limits of another Agency or Agencies, it is the duty of ADMINISTERING AGENCY to facilitate a separate maintenance agreement(s) between itself and the other jurisdictional Agency or Agencies providing for the operation, maintenance, ownership and liability of PROJECT. Until those agreements are executed, ADMINISTERING AGENCY will be responsible for all PROJECT operations, maintenance, ownership and liability in a manner satisfactory to the authorized representatives of STATE and FHWA. If, within ninety (90) days after receipt of notice from STATE that a PROJECT, or any portion thereof, is not being properly operated and maintained and ADMINISTERING AGENCY has not satisfactorily remedied the conditions complained of, the approval of future federal-aid projects of ADMINISTERING AGENCY will be withheld until the PROJECT shall have been put in a condition of operation and maintenance satisfactory to STATE and FHWA. The provisions of this section shall not apply to a PROJECT that has been vacated through due process of law with STATE's concurrence.
- 3. PROJECT and its facilities shall be maintained by an adequate and well-trained staff of engineers and/or such other professionals and technicians as PROJECT reasonably requires. Said operations and maintenance staff may be employees of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, another unit of government, or a contractor under agreement with ADMINISTERING AGENCY. All maintenance will be performed at regular intervals or as required for efficient operation of the complete PROJECT improvements.

ARTICLE IV - FISCAL PROVISIONS

- 1. All contractual obligations of STATE are subject to the appropriation of resources by the Legislature and the allocation of resources by the California Transportation Commission (CTC).
- 2. STATE'S financial commitment of federal funds will occur only upon the execution of this AGREEMENT, the authorization of the project-specific E-76 or E-76 (AMOD), the execution of each project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, and STATE's approved finance letter.
- 3. ADMINISTERING AGENCY may submit signed invoices in arrears for reimbursement of participating PROJECT costs on a regular basis once the project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT has been executed by STATE.
- 4. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, at a minimum, to submit invoices at least once every six (6) months commencing after the funds are encumbered on either the project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT or through a project-specific finance letter approved by STATE. STATE reserves the right to suspend future authorizations/obligations, and invoice payments for any on-going or future federal-aid project by ADMINISTERING AGENCY if PROJECT costs have not been invoiced by ADMINISTERING AGENCY for a six (6) month period.
- 5. Invoices shall be submitted on ADMINISTERING AGENCY letterhead that includes the address of ADMINISTERING AGENCY and shall be formatted in accordance with LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES.
- 6. ADMINISTERING AGENCY must have at least one copy of supporting backup documentation for costs incurred and claimed for reimbursement by ADMINISTERING AGENCY. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to submit supporting backup documentation with invoices if requested by State. Acceptable backup documentation includes, but is not limited to, agency's progress payment to the contractors, copies of cancelled checks showing amounts made payable to vendors and contractors, and/or a computerized summary of PROJECT costs.
- 7. Payments to ADMINISTERING AGENCY can only be released by STATE as reimbursement of actual allowable PROJECT costs already incurred and paid for by ADMINISTERING AGENCY.
- 8. Indirect Cost Allocation Plans/Indirect Cost Rate Proposals (ICAP/ICRP), Central Service Cost Allocation Plans and related documentation are to be prepared and provided to STATE (Caltrans Audits & Investigations) for review and approval prior to ADMINISTERING AGENCY seeking reimbursement of indirect costs incurred within each fiscal year being claimed for State and federal reimbursement. ICAPs/ICRPs must be prepared in accordance with the requirements set forth in 2 CFR, Part 200, Chapter 5 of the Local Assistance Procedural Manual, and the ICAP/ICRP approval procedures established by STATE.
- 9. Once PROJECT has been awarded, STATE reserves the right to de-obligate any excess federal funds from the construction phase of PROJECT if the contract award amount is less than the obligated amount, as shown on the PROJECT E-76 or E-76 (AMOD).
- 10. STATE will withhold the greater of either two (2) percent of the total of all federal funds encumbered for each PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT or \$40,000 until ADMINISTERING AGENCY submits the Final Report of Expenditures for each completed PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT PROJECT.

- 11. The estimated total cost of PROJECT, the amount of federal funds obligated, and the required matching funds may be adjusted by mutual consent of the PARTIES hereto with a finance letter, a detailed estimate, if required, and approved E-76 (AMOD). Federal-aid funding may be increased to cover PROJECT cost increases only if such funds are available and FHWA concurs with that increase.
- 12. When additional federal-aid funds are not available, ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that the payment of federal funds will be limited to the amounts authorized on the PROJECT specific E-76 / E-76 (AMOD) and agrees that any increases in PROJECT costs must be defrayed with ADMINISTERING AGENCY's own funds.
- 13. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall use its own non-federal funds to finance the local share of eligible costs and all expenditures or contract items ruled ineligible for financing with federal funds. STATE shall make the determination of ADMINISTERING AGENCY's cost eligibility for federal fund financing of PROJECT costs.
- 14. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will reimburse STATE for STATE's share of costs for work performed by STATE at the request of ADMINISTERING AGENCY. STATE's costs shall include overhead assessments in accordance with section 8755.1 of the State Administrative Manual.
- 15. Federal and state funds allocated from the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) are subject to the timely use of funds provisions enacted by Senate Bill 45, approved in 1997, and subsequent STIP Guidelines and State procedures approved by the CTC and STATE.
- 16. Federal funds encumbered for PROJECT are available for liquidation for a period of six (6) years from the beginning of the State fiscal year the funds were appropriated in the State Budget. State funds encumbered for PROJECT are available for liquidation only for six (6) years from the beginning of the State fiscal year the funds were appropriated in the State Budget. Federal or state funds not liquidated within these periods will be reverted unless a Cooperative Work Agreement (CWA) is submitted by ADMINISTERING AGENCY and approved by the California Department of Finance (per Government Code section 16304). The exact date of fund reversion will be reflected in the STATE signed finance letter for PROJECT.
- 17. Payments to ADMINISTERING AGENCY for PROJECT-related travel and subsistence (per diem) expenses of ADMINISTERING AGENCY forces and its contractors and subcontractors claimed for reimbursement or as local match credit shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid rank and file STATE employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules. If the rates invoiced by ADMINISTERING AGENCY are in excess of DPA rates, ADMINISTERING AGENCY is responsible for the cost difference, and any overpayments inadvertently paid by STATE shall be reimbursed to STATE by ADMINISTERING AGENCY on demand within thirty (30) days of such invoice.
- 18. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to comply with 2 CFR, Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles and Audit Requirement for Federal Awards.
- 19. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, and will ensure that its contractors and subcontractors will be obligated to agree, that Contract Cost Principles and Procedures, 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31, et seq., shall be used to determine the allowability of individual PROJECT cost items.

- 20. Every sub-recipient receiving PROJECT funds under this AGREEMENT shall comply with 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR Chapter 1, Part 31, Local Assistance Procedures, Public Contract Code (PCC) 10300-10334 (procurement of goods), PCC 10335-10381 (non-A&E services), and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations.
- 21. Any PROJECT costs for which ADMINISTERING AGENCY has received payment or credit that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under 2 CFR, Part 200, 23 CFR, 48 CFR, Chapter 1, Part 31, and other applicable STATE and FEDERAL regulations, are subject to repayment by ADMINISTERING AGENCY to STATE.
- 22. Should ADMINISTERING AGENCY fail to refund any moneys due upon written demand by STATE as provided hereunder or should ADMINISTERING AGENCY breach this AGREEMENT by failing to complete PROJECT without adequate justification and approval by STATE, then, within thirty 30 days of demand, or within such other period as may be agreed to in writing between the PARTIES, STATE, acting through the State Controller, the State Treasurer, or any other public entity or agency, may withhold or demand a transfer of an amount equal to the amount paid by or owed to STATE from future apportionments, or any other funds due ADMINISTERING AGENCY from the Highway Users Tax Fund or any other sources of funds, and/or may withhold approval of future ADMINISTERING AGENCY federal-aid projects.
- 23. Should ADMINISTERING AGENCY be declared to be in breach of this AGREEMENT or otherwise in default thereof by STATE, and if ADMINISTERING AGENCY is constituted as a joint powers authority, special district, or any other public entity not directly receiving funds through the State Controller, STATE is authorized to obtain reimbursement from whatever sources of funding are available, including the withholding or transfer of funds, pursuant to Article IV 22, from those constituent entities comprising a joint powers authority or by bringing of an action against ADMINISTERING AGENCY or its constituent member entities, to recover all funds provided by STATE hereunder.
- 24. ADMINISTERING AGENCY acknowledges that the signatory party represents the ADMINISTERING AGENCY and further warrants that there is nothing within a Joint Powers Agreement, by which ADMINISTERING AGENCY was created, if any exists, that would restrict or otherwise limit STATE's ability to recover State funds improperly spent by ADMINISTERING AGENCY in contravention of the terms of this AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE V AUDITS, THIRD PARTY CONTRACTING, RECORDS RETENTION AND REPORTS

- 1. STATE reserves the right to conduct technical and financial audits of PROJECT work and records and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees, and shall require its contractors and subcontractors to agree, to cooperate with STATE by making all appropriate and relevant PROJECT records available for audit and copying as required by paragraph three (3) of ARTICLE V.
- 2. ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its contractors and subcontractors shall establish and maintain a financial management system and records that properly accumulate and segregate reasonable, allowable, and allocable incurred PROJECT costs and matching funds by line item for the PROJECT. The financial management system of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its contractors and all subcontractors shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices sent to or paid by STATE.
- 3. ADMINISTERING AGENCY, ADMINISTERING AGENCY's contractors and subcontractors, and STATE shall each maintain and make available for inspection and audit by STATE, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of STATE or the United States all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of such contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts and ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall furnish copies thereof if requested. All of the above referenced parties shall make such AGREEMENT, PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT and contract materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the entire PROJECT period and for three (3) years from the date of submission of the final expenditure report by the STATE to the FHWA.
- 4. ADMINISTERING AGENCY is required to have an audit in accordance with the Single Audit Act of 2 CFR 200 if it expends \$750,000 or more in Federal Funds in a single fiscal year. The Federal Funds received under a PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT are a part of the Catalogue of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) 20.205.
- 5. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to include all PROGRAM SUPPLEMENTS adopting the terms of this AGREEMENT in the schedule of projects to be examined in ADMINISTERING AGENCY's annual audit and in the schedule of projects to be examined under its single audit prepared in accordance with 2 CFR, Part 200.
- 6. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall not award a non-A&E contract over \$5,000, construction contract over \$10,000, or other contracts over \$25,000 (excluding professional service contracts of the type which are required to be procured in accordance with Government Code sections 4525 (d), (e) and (f)) on the basis of a noncompetitive negotiation for work to be performed under this AGREEMENT without the prior written approval of STATE. Contracts awarded by ADMINISTERING AGENCY, if intended as local match credit, must meet the requirements set forth in this AGREEMENT regarding local match funds.

- 7. Any subcontract entered into by ADMINISTERING AGENCY as a result of this AGREEMENT shall contain provisions 5, 6, 17, 19 and 20 of ARTICLE IV, FISCAL PROVISIONS, and provisions 1, 2, and 3 of this ARTICLE V, AUDITS, THIRD-PARTY CONTRACTING RECORDS RETENTION AND REPORTS.
- 8. To be eligible for local match credit, ADMINISTERING AGENCY must ensure that local match funds used for a PROJECT meet the fiscal provisions requirements outlined in ARTICLE IV in the same manner as required of all other PROJECT expenditures.
- 9. In addition to the above, the pre-award requirements of third-party contractor/consultants with ADMINISTERING AGENCY should be consistent with the LOCAL ASSISTANCE PROCEDURES.

ARTICLE VI - FEDERAL LOBBYING ACTIVITIES CERTIFICATION

- 1. By execution of this AGREEMENT, ADMINISTERING AGENCY certifies, to the best of the signatory officer's knowledge and belief, that:
- A. No federal or state appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any STATE or federal agency, a member of the State Legislature or United States Congress, an officer or employee of the Legislature or Congress, or any employee of a Member of the Legislature or Congress in connection with the awarding of any STATE or federal contract, including this AGREEMENT, the making of any STATE or federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative contract, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any STATE or federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative contract.
- B. If any funds other than federal appropriated funds have been paid, or will be paid, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a member of Congress in connection with this AGREEMENT, grant, local, or cooperative contract, ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL, "Disclosure Form to Rep Lobbying," in accordance with the form instructions.
- C. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this AGREEMENT and each PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT was or will be made or entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this AGREEMENT imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, United States Code. Any party who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000 and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.
- 2. ADMINISTERING AGENCY also agrees by signing this AGREEMENT that the language of this certification will be included in all lower tier sub-agreements which exceed \$100,000 and that all such sub-recipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

ARTICLE VII - MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

- 1. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees to use all state funds reimbursed hereunder only for transportation purposes that are in conformance with Article XIX of the California State Constitution and the relevant Federal Regulations.
- 2. This AGREEMENT is subject to any additional restrictions, limitations, conditions, or any statute enacted by the State Legislature or adopted by the CTC that may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this AGREEMENT in any manner.
- 3. ADMINISTERING AGENCY and the officers and employees of ADMINISTERING AGENCY, when engaged in the performance of this AGREEMENT, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of STATE or the federal government.
- 4. Each project-specific E-76 or E-76 (AMOD), PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT and Finance Letter shall separately establish the terms and funding limits for each described PROJECT funded under the AGREEMENT. No federal or state funds are obligated against this AGREEMENT.
- 5. ADMINISTERING AGENCY certifies that neither ADMINISTERING AGENCY nor its principals are suspended or debarred at the time of the execution of this AGREEMENT. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that it will notify STATE immediately in the event a suspension or a debarment occurs after the execution of this AGREEMENT.
- 6. ADMINISTERING AGENCY warrants, by execution of this AGREEMENT, that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit or secure this AGREEMENT upon an agreement or understanding for a commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee, excepting bona fide employees or bona fide established commercial or selling agencies maintained by ADMINISTERING AGENCY for the purpose of securing business. For breach or violation of this warranty, STATE has the right to annul this AGREEMENT without liability, pay only for the value of the work actually performed, or in STATE's discretion, to deduct from the price of consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of such commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingent fee.
- 7. In accordance with Public Contract Code section 10296, ADMINISTERING AGENCY hereby certifies under penalty of perjury that no more than one final unappealable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against ADMINISTERING AGENCY within the immediate preceding two (2) year period because of ADMINISTERING AGENCY's failure to comply with an order of a federal court that orders ADMINISTERING AGENCY to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board.
- 8. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall disclose any financial, business, or other relationship with STATE, FHWA or Federal Transit Administration (FTA) that may have an impact upon the outcome of this AGREEMENT. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall also list current contractors who may have a financial interest in the outcome of this AGREEMENT.
- ADMINISTERING AGENCY hereby certifies that it does not have nor shall it acquire any financial or business interest that would conflict with the performance of PROJECT under this AGREEMENT.

- 10. ADMINISTERING AGENCY warrants that this AGREEMENT was not obtained or secured through rebates, kickbacks or other unlawful consideration either promised or paid to any STATE employee. For breach or violation of this warranty, STATE shall have the right, in its discretion, to terminate this AGREEMENT without liability, to pay only for the work actually performed, or to deduct from the PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT price or otherwise recover the full amount of such rebate, kickback, or other unlawful consideration.
- 11. Any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under this AGREEMENT that is not disposed of by agreement shall be decided by the STATE's Contract Officer who may consider any written or verbal evidence submitted by ADMINISTERING AGENCY. The decision of the Contract Officer, issued in writing, shall be conclusive and binding on the PARTIES on all questions of fact considered and determined by the Contract Officer.
- 12. Neither the pending of a dispute nor its consideration by the Contract Officer will excuse ADMINISTERING AGENCY from full and timely performance in accordance with the terms of this AGREEMENT.
- 13. Neither ADMINISTERING AGENCY nor any officer or employee thereof is responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by STATE, under or in connection with any work, authority or jurisdiction arising under this AGREEMENT. It is understood and agreed that STATE shall fully defend, indemnify and save harmless the ADMINISTERING AGENCY and all of its officers and employees from all claims, suits or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation and other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by STATE under this AGREEMENT.
- 14. Neither STATE nor any officer or employee thereof shall be responsible for any injury, damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by ADMINISTERING AGENCY under, or in connection with, any work, authority or jurisdiction arising under this AGREEMENT. It is understood and agreed that ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall fully defend, indemnify and save harmless STATE and all of its officers and employees from all claims, suits or actions of every name, kind and description brought forth under, including, but not limited to, tortious, contractual, inverse condemnation or other theories or assertions of liability occurring by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by ADMINISTERING AGENCY under this AGREEMENT.
- 15. STATE reserves the right to terminate funding for any PROJECT upon written notice to ADMINISTERING AGENCY in the event that ADMINISTERING AGENCY fails to proceed with PROJECT work in accordance with the project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, the bonding requirements if applicable, or otherwise violates the conditions of this AGREEMENT and/or PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, or the funding allocation such that substantial performance is significantly endangered.

- 16. No termination shall become effective if, within thirty (30) days after receipt of a Notice of Termination, ADMINISTERING AGENCY either cures the default involved or, if not reasonably susceptible of cure within said thirty (30) day period, ADMINISTERING AGENCY proceeds thereafter to complete the cure in a manner and time line acceptable to STATE. Any such termination shall be accomplished by delivery to ADMINISTERING AGENCY of a Notice of Termination, which notice shall become effective not less than thirty (30) days after receipt, specifying the reason for the termination, the extent to which funding of work under this AGREEMENT is terminated and the date upon which such termination becomes effective, if beyond thirty (30) days after receipt. During the period before the effective termination date. ADMINISTERING AGENCY and STATE shall meet to attempt to resolve any dispute. In the event of such termination, STATE may proceed with the PROJECT work in a manner deemed proper by STATE. If STATE terminates funding for PROJECT with ADMINISTERING AGENCY, STATE shall pay ADMINISTERING AGENCY the sum due ADMINISTERING AGENCY under the PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT and/or STATE approved finance letter prior to termination, provided, however, ADMINISTERING AGENCY is not in default of the terms and conditions of this AGREEMENT or the project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT and that the cost of PROJECT completion to STATE shall first be deducted from any sum due ADMINISTERING AGENCY.
- 17. In case of inconsistency or conflicts with the terms of this AGREEMENT and that of a project-specific PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT, the terms stated in that PROGRAM SUPPLEMENT shall prevail over those in this AGREEMENT.
- 18. Without the written consent of STATE, this AGREEMENT is not assignable by ADMINISTERING AGENCY either in whole or in part.
- 19. No alteration or variation of the terms of this AGREEMENT shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the PARTIES, and no oral understanding or agreement not incorporated herein shall be binding on any of the PARTIES.

EXHIBIT A

FAIR EMPLOYMENT PRACTICES ADDENDUM

- 1. In the performance of this Agreement, ADMINISTERING AGENCY will not discriminate against any employee for employment because of race, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, ancestry or national origin, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, political affiliation, family and medical care leave, pregnancy leave, or disability leave. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will take affirmative action to ensure that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, sex, sexual orientation, color, religion, ancestry, or national origin, physical disability, medical condition, marital status, political affiliation, family and medical care leave, pregnancy leave, or disability leave. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment; upgrading; demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall post in conspicuous places, available to employees for employment, notices to be provided by STATE setting forth the provisions of this Fair Employment section.
- 2. ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its contractor(s) and all subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code Section 1290-0 et seq.), and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder (California Code of Regulations, Title 2, Section 7285.0 et seq.). The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment and Housing Commission implementing Government Code, Section 12900(a-f), set forth in Chapter 5 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations are incorporated into this AGREEMENT by reference and made a part hereof as if set forth in full. Each of the ADMINISTERING AGENCY'S contractors and all subcontractors shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreements, as appropriate.
- 3. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this clause in all contracts and subcontracts to perform work under this AGREEMENT.
- 4. ADMINISTERING AGENCY will permit access to the records of employment, employment advertisements, application forms, and other pertinent data and records by STATE, the State Fair Employment and Housing Commission, or any other agency of the State of California designated by STATE, for the purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with the Fair Employment section of this Agreement.
- 5. Remedies for Willful Violation:
- (a) STATE may determine a willful violation of the Fair Employment provision to have occurred upon receipt of a final judgment to that effect from a court in an action to which ADMINISTERING AGENCY was a party, or upon receipt of a written notice from the Fair Employment and Housing Commission that it has investigated and determined that ADMINISTERING AGENCY has violated the Fair Employment Practices Act and had issued an order under Labor Code Section 1426 which has become final or has obtained an injunction under Labor Code Section 1429.

(b) For willful violation of this Fair Employment Provision, STATE shall have the right to terminate this Agreement either in whole or in part, and any loss or damage sustained by STATE in securing the goods or services thereunder shall be borne and paid for by ADMINISTERING AGENCY and by the surety under the performance bond, if any, and STATE may deduct from any moneys due or thereafter may become due to ADMINISTERING AGENCY, the difference between the price named in the Agreement and the actual cost thereof to STATE to cure ADMINISTERING AGENCY's breach of this Agreement.

EXHIBIT B

NONDISCRIMINATION ASSURANCES

ADMINISTERING AGENCY HEREBY AGREES THAT, as a condition to receiving any federal financial assistance from the STATE, acting for the U.S. Department of Transportation. it will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. 2000d-42 U.S.C. 2000d-4 (hereinafter referred to as the ACT), and all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, "Nondiscrimination in Federally-Assisted Programs of the Department of Transportation - Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964" (hereinafter referred to as the REGULATIONS), the Federal-aid Highway Act of 1973, and other pertinent directives, to the end that in accordance with the ACT, REGULATIONS, and other pertinent directives, no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, religion, age or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity for which ADMINISTERING AGENCY receives federal financial assistance from the Federal Department of Transportation. ADMINISTERING AGENCY HEREBY GIVES ASSURANCE THAT ADMINISTERING AGENCY will promptly take any measures necessary to effectuate this agreement. This assurance is required by subsection 21.7(a) (1) of the REGULATIONS.

More specifically, and without limiting the above general assurance, ADMINISTERING AGENCY hereby gives the following specific assurances with respect to its federal-aid Program:

- 1. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that each "program" and each "facility" as defined in subsections 21.23 (e) and 21.23 (b) of the REGULATIONS, will be (with regard to a "program") conducted, or will be (with regard to a "facility") operated in compliance with all requirements imposed by, or pursuant to, the REGULATIONS.
- 2. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall insert the following notification in all solicitations for bids for work or material subject to the REGULATIONS made in connection with the federal-aid Program and, in adapted form, in all proposals for negotiated agreements:

ADMINISTERING AGENCY hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that in any agreement entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises will be afforded full opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, religion, age, or disability in consideration for an award.

- 3. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall insert the clauses of Appendix A of this assurance in every agreement subject to the ACT and the REGULATIONS.
- 4. That the clauses of Appendix B of this Assurance shall be included as a covenant running with the land, in any deed effecting a transfer of real property, structures, or improvements thereon, or interest therein.

- 5. That where ADMINISTERING AGENCY receives federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the Assurance shall extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- 6. That where ADMINISTERING AGENCY receives federal financial assistance in the form, or for the acquisition, of real property or an interest in real property, the Assurance shall extend to rights to space on, over, or under such property.
- 7. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall include the appropriate clauses set forth in Appendix C and D of this Assurance, as a covenant running with the land, in any future deeds, leases, permits, licenses, and similar agreements entered into by the ADMINISTERING AGENCY with other parties:

Appendix C;

(a) for the subsequent transfer of real property acquired or improved under the federal-aid Program; and

Appendix D;

- (b) for the construction or use of or access to space on, over, or under real property acquired, or improved under the federal-aid Program.
- 8. That this assurance obligates ADMINISTERING AGENCY for the period during which federal financial assistance is extended to the program, except where the federal financial assistance is to provide, or is in the form of, personal property or real property or interest therein, or structures, or improvements thereon, in which case the assurance obligates ADMINISTERING AGENCY or any transferee for the longer of the following periods:
- (a) the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which the federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits; or
- (b) the period during which ADMINISTERING AGENCY retains ownership or possession of the property.
- 9. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the U.S. Secretary of Transportation, or the official to whom he delegates specific authority, to give reasonable guarantee that ADMINISTERING AGENCY, other recipients, sub-grantees, applicants, sub-applicants, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants of federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed by, or pursuant to, the ACT, the REGULATIONS, this Assurance and the Agreement.
- 10. That ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that the United States and the State of California have a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the ACT, the REGULATIONS, and this Assurance.

11. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, age, disability, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of any STATE assisted contract or in the administration on its DBE Program or the requirements of 49 CFR Part 26. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall take all necessary and reasonable steps under 49 CFR Part 26 to ensure non-discrimination in the award and administration of STATE assisted contracts. Implementation of this program is a legal obligation and failure to carry out its terms shall be treated as a violation of this agreement. THESE ASSURANCES are given in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining any and all federal grants, loans, agreements, property, discounts or other federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to ADMINISTERING AGENCY by STATE, acting for the U.S. Department of Transportation, and is binding on ADMINISTERING AGENCY, other recipients, subgrantees, applicants, sub-applicants, transferees, successors in interest and other participants in the federal-aid Highway Program.

During the performance of this Agreement, ADMINISTERING AGENCY, for itself, its assignees and successors in interest (hereinafter collectively referred to as ADMINISTERING AGENCY) agrees as follows:

- (1) Compliance with Regulations: ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall comply with the regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally assisted programs of the Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21, as they may be amended from time to time, (hereinafter referred to as the REGULATIONS), which are herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this agreement.

- (5) Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of ADMINISTERING AGENCY's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this agreement, STATE shall impose such agreement sanctions as it or the FHWA may determine to be appropriate, including, but not limited to:
- (a) withholding of payments to ADMINISTERING AGENCY under the Agreement within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed 90 days; and/or
- (b) cancellation, termination or suspension of the Agreement, in whole or in part.

(6) Incorporation of Provisions: ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall include the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (6) in every sub-agreement, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the REGULATIONS, or directives issued pursuant thereto. ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall take such action with respect to any sub-agreement or procurement as STATE or FHWA may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance, provided, however, that, in the event ADMINISTERING AGENCY becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a sub-applicant or supplier as a result of such direction, ADMINISTERING AGENCY may request STATE enter into such litigation to protect the interests of STATE, and, in addition, ADMINISTERING AGENCY may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

The following clauses shall be included in any and all deeds effecting or recording the transfer of PROJECT real property, structures or improvements thereon, or interest therein from the United States.

(GRANTING CLAUSE)

NOW, THEREFORE, the U.S. Department of Transportation, as authorized by law, and upon the condition that ADMINISTERING AGENCY will accept title to the lands and maintain the project constructed thereon, in accordance with Title 23, United States Code, the Regulations for the Administration of federal-aid for Highways and the policies and procedures prescribed by the Federal Highway Administration of the Department of Transportation and, also in accordance with and in compliance with the Regulations pertaining to and effectuating the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252; 42 U.S.C. 2000d to 2000d-4), does hereby remise, release, quitclaim and convey unto the ADMINISTERING AGENCY all the right, title, and interest of the U.S. Department of Transportation in, and to, said lands described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

(HABENDUM CLAUSE)

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said lands and interests therein unto ADMINISTERING AGENCY and its successors forever, subject, however, to the covenant, conditions, restrictions and reservations herein contained as follows, which will remain in effect for the period during which the real property or structures are used for a purpose for which federal financial assistance is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits and shall be binding on ADMINISTERING AGENCY, its successors and assigns.

ADMINISTERING AGENCY, in consideration of the conveyance of said lands and interests in lands, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the land for itself, its successors and assigns,

- (1) that no person shall on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, religion, age or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination with regard to any facility located wholly or in part on, over, or under such lands hereby conveyed (;) (and) *
- (2) that ADMINISTERING AGENCY shall use the lands and interests in lands so conveyed, in compliance with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations may be amended (;) and
- (3) that in the event of breach of any of the above-mentioned nondiscrimination conditions, the U.S. Department of Transportation shall have a right to re-enter said lands and facilities on said land, and the above-described land and facilities shall thereon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the U.S. Department of Transportation and its assigns as such interest existed prior to this deed.*
- * Reverter clause and related language to be used only when it is determined that such a clause is necessary in order to effectuate the purposes of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The grantee (licensee, lessee, permittee, etc., as appropriate) for himself, his heirs, personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree (in the case of deeds and leases add "as covenant running with the land") that in the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the said property described in this (deed, license, lease, permit, etc.) for a purpose for which a U.S. Department of Transportation program or activity is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.), shall maintain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all other requirements imposed pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of Secretary, Part 21, Nondiscrimination in federally-assisted programs of the Department of Transportation - Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations may be amended.

(Include in licenses, leases, permits, etc.)*

- 1. A. The ADMINISTERING AGENCY will advertise, award and administer this project in accordance with the current published Local Assistance Procedures Manual.
  - B. ADMINISTERING AGENCY agrees that it will only proceed with work authorized for specific phase(s) with an "Authorization to Proceed" and will not proceed with future phase(s) of this project prior to receiving an "Authorization to Proceed" from the STATE for that phase(s) unless no further State or Federal funds are needed for those future phase(s).
  - C. STATE and ADMINISTERING AGENCY agree that any additional funds which might be made available by future Federal obligations will be encumbered on this PROJECT by use of a STATE-approved "Authorization to Proceed" and Finance Letter. # **BACKGROUND**:

On April 17, 2023, the Proposed FY 2023/24 Operating and Capital Budgets were posted to the Town's website. Per Measure A, the Finance Commission received the Proposed Budgets 21 business days before May 16, 2023, which is the first meeting at which the Proposed Budgets were considered by the Town Council. The Finance Commission held three public meetings at which Commissioners discussed the Proposed Budgets and provided recommendations to the Town Council per Measures A and G.

On May 16 2023, the Town Council conducted public hearings to discuss the proposed FY 2023/24 Operating and Capital Summary Budget and Proposed FY 2023/24—2027/28 Capital Improvement Program. The Town Council considered public testimony, discussed both documents, considered the Finance Commission recommendations, and directed staff to bring back the documents for final approval incorporating the Council recommendations.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The draft resolution (Attachment 1) incorporates the budget direction provided by the Council at the May 16, 2023 budget hearing including building in a 4.6% vacancy factor.

Attachment 2 contains the resolution to formally move General Fund balances based on the Town Council General Fund Reserve Policy and additional Council direction consistent with General Accounting Standards Board (GASB) 54.

In May, the Council directed that the proposed revenues reflect 100% of the projected Education Realignment General Fund (ERAF) revenue. This is built into the Resolution for the adoption of the budget (Attachment 1).

As requested by Town Council, at least three other jurisdictions in Santa Clara County with ERAF proceeds over \$1 million have started to reserve the at-risk amount since FY 2021/22 (Milpitas

30%, Palo Alto 25%, and Santa Clara 30%). Mountain View and Sunnyvale are recognizing the ERAF revenue as a one-time revenue.

Based on this information, staff recommends establishing an ERAF Risk Reserve and reserve 30% of the anticipated proceeds in FY 2022/23 and FY 2023/24. Staff recommends continuing to reserve the at-risk amount until the lawsuit is resolved. If the result of the lawsuit in unfavorable to the Town, the County will reduce the Town Property Tax distribution by the atrisk amount; in this case, this reserve would provide the funding gap. If the lawsuit result is favorable to the Town, staff will come back to Council for direction on how to spend the accumulated reserve.

Upon Treasury's release of the simplified reporting process for entities awarded less than \$10 million in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funding and additional guidance received through staff review of federal compliance issues, the Town recognized the \$3.4M in FY 2021/22 and will recognize the \$3.6M FY 2022/23 cash collections of ARPA revenues as qualified revenue loss under the Treasury provisions for use in providing essential government services. To further aid in compliance with federal uniform guidance and Single Audit requirements, staff claimed the lost revenue for use in providing essential government services and eligible public safety payroll costs for both FY 2021/22 and FY 2022/23. This action allocates all ARPA "replacement" revenues to the General Fund which in turn will unencumber other General Fund operating revenues which were previously dedicated for public safety costs.

Once the ARPA Revenues were fully recognized as loss revenue, it became part of General Fund and available for Council direction for any lawful government service. Staff is tracking the \$7.2 million total revenue received against Council directed use through pass through revenues and expenditures (Attachment 3). Staff is recommending establishing a Council Priorities – Economic Recovery Reserve to track any unallocated amount of the \$7.2 million.

In anticipation of the end of the 2022/23 fiscal year, the Council is being asked to make several revenue and expenditure budget adjustments. These adjustments recognize circumstances that have changed since the Mid-Year Review last February and assist with the annual audit.

As part of the Budget adoption process, the Town Council needs to adopt the salary schedules as separate actions (Attachment 4 through 10). As described in the Proposed Operating

Budget, the schedules reflect an approved 3% cost of living increase in the Memoranda of Understanding with the bargaining units. All unrepresented staff would receive the same cost of living increase. In addition, unrepresented Management did not receive a 5% market increase last summer as did all other employees. The Proposed Budget includes a 3% market increase for Management classifications retroactive to April (Attachment 4).

# RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS APPROVING COMMITMENTS OF FUND BALANCE UNDER GASB 54

WHEREAS, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) has issued its Statement No. 54, Fund Balance and Governmental Fund Type Definitions with the intent of improving financial reporting by providing fund balance categories that will be more easily understood and to improve the comparability of governmental fund financial statements; and

**WHEREAS**, GASB 54 provides that the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos classify governmental fund balances as restricted, assigned, or committed fund balances; and

WHEREAS GASB 54 provides that restricted reserves are funds that are restricted for externally imposed constraints such as legal contracts or state law, assigned amounts are constrained by the Town's intent to use them for specific purposes, and committed amounts are dedicated for specific purposes under constraints and formal action taken by the Town Council and these committed amounts cannot be used for any other purposes unless the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos removes or changes the specific use through the same formal action to establish the commitment; and

WHEREAS, there exists a Restricted General Fund Pension Reserve in the form of an IRS 115 Pension Trust; and

WHEREAS, there exists a balance of \$1,380,00 as of June 30, 2023 in the restricted Pension Reserve; and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Los Gatos has established a General Fund Reserve Policy providing for minimum fund balance dollar target amounts for Budget Stabilization and Catastrophic Reserve fund balances and outlines policies and procedures for use and restoration of these balances; and

**WHEREAS**, there exists an assigned General Fund Compensated Absences Reserve allocated to fund 50% of all vested hours of sick leave, compensation, and vacation time with the actual reserve amount to be determined at the close of FY 2022/23; and

WHEREAS, there exists an assigned Capital/Special Projects Reserve to fund key infrastructure and capital/special projects as identified in the Town's five-year Capital Improvement Plan, and/or other Council priorities; and

**WHEREAS**, there exists an assigned authorized Carry Forward Reserve for materials and services on approved purchase order and contracts which were issued but not finalized or fulfilled as of the end of the fiscal year but for which funds will be carried forward to the following fiscal year. Actual reserve balance will be established at the close of FY 2022/23; and

WHEREAS, in June 2016, the Town Council established the committed Pension/OPEB Reserve to provide funding toward pension and Other Post-Employment Benefits (OPEB) unfunded obligations by placing discretionary amounts to the reserve with formal Council action and transferring available year-end surpluses based on the General Fund Reserve Policy; and

WHEREAS, there is anticipate an excess balance of \$300,000 as of June 30, 2023 in the assigned OPEB/Pension Reserve, that will confirmed at the close of FY 2022/23 and

WHEREAS, on November 6, 2018, the Town Council provided direction to establish an unassigned Surplus Property Revenue General Fund Reserve that any monies received from the sale of the property located on Winchester Boulevard and any monies received from the sale of future surplus property be placed in this reserve, and the provisions for the reserve specifically indicate that Council may, at its discretion, distribute those funds as it deems appropriate; and

WHEREAS, The Town Council established the assigned Sustainability Reserve in FY 2008/09 by closing the Solid Waste Management fund and placing the initial residual balance dedicated for conservation, recycling, and sustainability; and

WHEREAS, there exists an excess balance of \$140,553 as of June 30, 2023 in the assigned Sustainability Reserve; and

WHEREAS, there exists an assigned Market Fluctuation Reserve that represent fund balance amounts for unrealized investment gains that have been recorded as investment income in the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of GASB 31 in the amount of \$0, actual reserve balance will be established at the close of FY 2022/23; and

**WHEREAS**, there exists an assigned Measure G 2018 District Sales Tax Reserve to track receipt and use of the 1/8 cent district tax funds collected by the Town; and

WHEREAS, an excess balance of \$689,608 exists as of June 30, 2023 in the assigned ERAF Risk Reserve, with the actual amount will be determined at the close of FY 2022/23; and

WHEREAS, the \$1,615,000 transfer from the Capital/Special Project Reserve to the General Fund Appropriated Reserve provides funding to the five-year capital plan; and

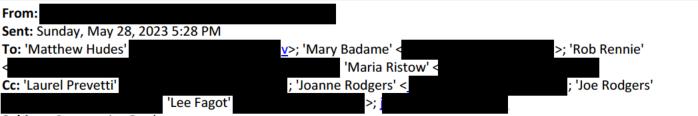

## Dear Town Council Members,

I am writing to express my concern that the town is considering spending \$195,000 on a community garden. I want to be clear, I am not opposed to the idea of the town having a community garden, but not if it is from the town budget. We are in a deficit. Perhaps the people who want a community garden can seek private funding, hold a fund raiser, or seek grants to support their cause as a means to make it happen.

If the town has an extra \$195,000 to spend, I would suggest directing it towards safety projects that benefit the entire community. For example installing speed bumps for traffic calming, more speed limit signs, or installing flashing crosswalk signal lights. We have had several deaths on our community streets in the last few years and to me that seems safety should be more of a priority.

The other things to consider if the town spends money on a community garden are;

- 1. Having smaller gardens peppered throughout the community for all residents to enjoy, rather than having one on the far side of East Los Gatos, that isn't even centrally located.
- 2. How much will this cost in perpetuity to maintain and where will the continuous funding come from? Our town is already in a deficit.
- 3. How will vandalism and theft be addressed? The Cabana Club in the Belwood neighborhood at Belwood Gateway and Blossom Hill in Los Gatos always had problems with youth climbing the 6 foot fence to gain access and vandalizing the grounds. This is being built near a middle school and not far from a high school.

I urge the Town Council to have a robust discussion on what fiscal responsibility looks like and other ways it could spend \$195,000, rather than a community garden. We are in a deficit and that is not changing anytime soon.

## **RECOMMENDATION:**

Provide direction on terms and authorize the Town Manager to execute a Use Agreement with Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education and Recreation.

## **BACKGROUND**:

Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education and Recreation ("LGSR"), a joint powers agency of the Los Gatos Union School District, Saratoga Union School District, and Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High School District, was established in 1956 to ensure the effective and efficient provision of community education and recreation services to the residents of Los Gatos, Saratoga, Monte Sereno, and Santa Cruz Mountains communities.

In 2009, the Town entered into a lease agreement for 208 East Main Street with LGSR. The parties agreed that LGSR would provide programming for Town senior residents (age 55 years and older) in exchange for rent payments that were below market rate. LGSR has been generally providing those services ever since.

In 2014, the Town and LGSR entered into an agreement for recreation-based programming in certain Town Parks. The initial agreement was extended through May 31, 2020 (Attachment 1). In accordance with Council action taken on April 21, 2020 (item #12) regarding relief during the pandemic, use charges were waived during 2020, 2021, and the first six months of 2022. A use agreement renewal was not executed during that period.

## **DISCUSSION**:

The proposed Use Agreement (Attachment 2) provides LGSR the use of certain facilities at Blossom Hill Park, Creekside Park, La Rinconada Park, and Oak Meadow Park (collectively, the "Premises").

The main terms of the proposed agreement upon which both parties agree are as follows:

- 1. <u>Length of Agreement</u>: The term of the agreement is one year with nine additional one-year periods. Either party may terminate the agreement by providing written notice on or before February 1 of the calendar year.
- 2. <u>Schedule of Use</u>: LGSR shall provide a schedule for fall programming by June 30th of each calendar year for Fall session, by September 30th of Winter and Spring sessions, and February 28th for the Summer session. A sample of schedule for Summer 2023 is show in Attachment 3.
- 3. <u>Annual Use Fee Adjustment</u>: On each anniversary of the agreement (starting July 1, 2024), the Annual User Fee will be adjusted according to the percent change in the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, *All Items, All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose, 1982-84-100 Index.*
- 4. <u>Clean-Up</u>: LGSR shall be responsible for general site clean-up including pick up and disposal of trash that may result from the approved use of the Premises.
- 5. Adherence to the Town Code and Rules: LGSR shall comply, without limitation, with all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation provisions. LGSR shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations.

## **REQUESTED DIRECTION**

There are two agreement terms for which staff is seeking direction from Town Council. These are as follows and alternative language for each item is presented in the draft agreement in Attachment 2.

## <u>Annual Use Fee</u>

Staff has established a use fee of \$15,500 for the contract base year. This cost would provide for up to 4,607 hours of park use by LGSR for their programming. Los Gatos has a Use Fee for sport fields of \$95 per day for the first day of use plus \$55 per day after that, which is well below the current rates charged by neighboring communities.

Table 1 provides the use fee per hour for groups with which the Town has Park Use Agreements.

LGSR has discussed with staff the idea that there be no charge for senior programming provided in the Town Parks covered in this agreement. LGSR provides 671 hours of pickleball programming at the present time. While this is not specifically a senior program, many of the participants in this program are over 55, which is the assumed age that senior programming would target. Using the \$3.36 per hour use fee noted above, free pickleball programming would result in a net reduction in the Use Fee of \$2,254.56. The annual fee for 2023/24 would then be \$13,245.22, or \$2.88 per use hour.

Per the terms of the proposed agreement, the addition of future senior programming would not result in an increase in charges; however, the use would need to be provided to Town staff in the annual schedule. Staff would need to balance the community interest and public use of the park amenities with the additional programming requests made by LGSR, which is typical of all use agreements.

## Facility Maintenance Fee

Past Use Agreements with LGSR have included a Facility Maintenance fee of \$2.00 per participant per session. With the renewal of agreements with Los Gatos Little League, Red Hawks Lacrosse, and Los Gatos United Soccer, a \$4.00 per participant per season Facility Maintenance Fee was included in the contract, and staff is suggesting the same for LGSR. Table 2 shows projected Facility Maintenance Fees for groups with which the Town has Use Agreements.

LGSR has asked that their Facility Maintenance Fee be retained at \$2.00 per participant and staff is seeking Town Council direction on this topic.

## CONCLUSION:

Staff is asking that the Town Council provide direction on the Use Agreement between the Town of Los Gatos and Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education and Recreation, specifically with regard to the Use Fee and Facility Maintenance Fees.

## FISCAL IMPACT:

Approval of the Use Agreement with LGSR would result in annual revenue of \$15,500 (or \$13,245.22 if pickleball hours are provided at no charge to LGSR) beginning July 1, 2023. Each future year of the agreement the fee would increase as defined in the Agreement Terms. Additional revenue will be derived from the Facility Maintenance Fee, which will be paid to the Town on a semi-annual basis. The amount of revenue will depend on Council's direction on this issue.

## **ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT:**

The recommended action is not a project defined under CEQA, and no further action is required.

## USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS AND LOS GATOS-SARATOGA RECREATION

This FIRST AMENDMENT to USE AGREEMENT is entered into this 31st day of October 2017, by and between the TOWN OF LOS GATOS, State of California ("Town"), and LOS GATOS-SARATOGA RECREATION ("LGSR").

## RECITALS

- A. Town and LGSR entered into a Use Agreement on June 25, 2014 to provide fee-based public recreation, supplemental education and child care programs for Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, Saratoga and the Santa Cruz Mountain communities, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference as Attachment 1 to this Amendment.
- B. Town and LGSR mutually desire to extend the term of the existing Use Agreement through May 31, 2020.

## FIRST AMENDMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The term of this Agreement shall be extended for one additional three-year term as outlined in section 3 of the Use Agreement from June 1, 2017 through May 31, 2020.
- 2. All other Terms and Conditions of the Use Agreement dated June 25, 2014 remain in full force.

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## USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS AND LOS GATOS-SARATOGA RECREATION

This USE AGREEMENT is entered into this 25th day 1000 , 2014, by and between the TOWN OF LOS GATOS, State of California ("Town"), and LOS GATOS-SARATOGA RECREATION, ("LGSR").

## RECITALS

- A. Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education and Recreation ("LGSR"), a joint powers agency of the Los Gatos Union School District, Saratoga Union School District and Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High School District, was established to ensure the effective and efficient provision of community education and recreation services to the communities of Los Gatos, Saratoga, Monte Sereno and Santa Cruz Mountains communities.
- B. LGSR provides fee-based public recreation, supplemental education and child care programs for Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, Saratoga and the Santa Cruz Mountains communities.
- C. In order to provide convenient and effective programs to its constituent communities, LGSR desires to use various parks and open spaces owned and maintained by the Town of Los Gatos ("Town").
- D. The Town and LGSR each desire an agreement between them setting forth the specific terms and conditions under which LGSR may use certain Town parks, facilities and open spaces, including days and hours of use, and the fees payable by LGSR for the exclusive use of the designated facilities.

## **AGREEMENT**

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES HERETO AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Subject Premises.</u> The premises covered by this agreement are Creekside Sports Park, Blossom Hill Park, Town Plaza Park (for Santa in the Park only) and Oak Meadow Park (collectively, the "Premises"). LGSR may request the use of additional premises, which shall be considered by the Town and authorized for use as more fully described in Section 7.
- 2. Use of Premises. LGSR shall be allowed use of the Premises for approved Programs during those times and dates as shown on Attachment A, "Annual Schedule". The initial Annual Schedule shall cover camps and class for the 2014 Summer Session through the 2015 Spring Session ("Initial Program Year"), and shall identify what portion or portions of the Premises shall be designated for each approved Program. No later than July 15th of each year this Agreement is in force, LGSR shall submit to the Town a schedule for the upcoming Fall and Winter sessions, including the dates for the December Santa in the Park event. No later than December 15th of each year this agreement is in session, LGSR shall submit a schedule for the upcoming Spring and Summer sessions. The period from Summer through the following Spring shall constitute a "Program Year" for purposes of this agreement, with Premises use shown on the Annual Schedule.

LGSR may request changes to the Annual Schedule by written notification to the Department of Parks and Public Works, but shall endeavor to minimize changes to the schedule during the Initial Program Year and each subsequent Program Year. All changes should be made in writing no less

- than 30 days prior to the effective date of the change. The Town of Los Gatos shall have sole authority to approve the Annual Schedule and any requested changes to the Annual Schedule.
- 3. <u>Term of Agreement</u>. Unless terminated sooner pursuant to Section 19 of this Agreement, this Agreement shall expire on May 31, 2017. The term of this Agreement may be extended for up to two additional three year periods upon mutual written consent of the parties.
- 4. Annual Use Fee. Beginning June 1, 2014, and every year thereafter, LGSR shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee for the use of the Premises. The initial Annual Use Fee shall be \$10,000. The Annual Use Fee shall be considered full and fair compensation for use of the Premises for those days and times on the approved Annual Schedule, and in conjunction with the Facility Maintenance Fee described in Section 5, shall be used by the Town to help fund the cost of maintenance of the Premises.
- 5. Facility Maintenance Fee. Beginning June 1, 2014, and continuing for the full term of this agreement, including any extensions, each participant in programs or classes offered by LGSR on Town premises will be charged a \$2.00 Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) per class or program. The Facility Maintenance Fee shall be assessed by LGSR at the time of registration or payment of program fees, and shall be remitted to the Town quarterly. Participants shall be charged a FMF for each separate registration in a program or class offered by LGSR offered on the Premises covered by this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Annual Use Fee Adjustment—Change in CPI.</u> On June 1, 2015, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted equal to the CPI adjustment approved by the Town Council as part of its annual Comprehensive Fee Schedule adoption, which is based on the average increase in the CPI for the previous calendar year.
- Annual Use Fee Adjustment—Change in Programming or Facilities. On June 1, 2015, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall also be adjusted based on programming changes resulting in a material increase or decrease in the use of the Premises. In addition, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted to reflect the addition of any new facilities or the cessation of use at any of the facilities that comprise the Premises. Any fee adjustment under this section will be negotiated in good faith between the Town and LGSR as part of the development of the Annual Schedule described in Section 2 above.
- 8. <u>Maintenance</u>. LGSR shall be responsible for general site clean-up including pick up and disposal of trash that may results from the approved use of the Premises.
- 9. Facility Use Policies. LGSR shall comply, without limitation, to all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation. LGSR shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Attachment B, Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations, and Attachment C, Town of Los Gatos Creekside Sports Park Special Use Policies. Failure to comply with these policies may result in suspension and/or termination of this agreement.
- 10. Payment LGSR shall make all payments, whether or not invoiced by Town, required pursuant to this Agreement no later than July 1° of each year that such payments are due. All payments shall be mailed by first class mail or delivered in person at Town offices and addressed as follows:

- 11. Assignment. LGSR shall not assign any portion of this Agreement, or allow any use of the Premises by any other person or entity contrary to the terms of this Agreement, without prior written approval of Town. LGSR is expressly prohibited from use of the Premises for any activity other than activities sanctioned and associated with LGSR.
- 12. Personal Property. Personal property of LGSR shall be LGSR's sole responsibility to acquire, repair, replace and store. Any storage of personal property on the Premises shall require prior approval by the Town. LGSR shall remove all personal property at the expiration or termination of this Agreement, or sooner, as directed by the Town in its sole discretion. Any personal property not so removed with 30 days of notification by the Town shall become the sole property of Town with no compensation.
- 13. Temporary Signage. LGSR shall be permitted to install temporary event signage on the Premises upon approval of an application to the Town of Los Gatos Planning Department pursuant to the provisions of Section 29.10.120 (4) Event Signs of the Town Code. Each LGSR Activity Quarter (summer, fall, spring, winter) shall be eligible for temporary event signage. All temporary event signage must include the LGSR logo of such size and placement that it is clear that the signage is for a program or activity sponsored by LGSR. The Town shall charge a single Temporary Signage fee for each Program Year.
- 14. New Program Vendors Referral. The Town and LGSR shall meet and negotiate in good faith a New Program Vendor Referral procedure, wherein the Town directs prospective new program vendors to LGSR for initial consideration prior to any issuance of permits or negotiation of use agreements directly between the Town and the prospective vendor.

### Insurance.

- (a) Minimum Scope of Insurance:
  - (i) LGSR agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of the contract, General Liability insurance policies insuring the LGSR, its officers and employees to an amount not less than: one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current Best's rating of no less than B+.
  - (ii) LGSR agrees to have and maintain for the duration of the contract, an Automobile Liability insurance policy insuring the LGSR, its officers and employees to an amount not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
  - (iii) LGSR shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. LGSR shall provide all certificates and endorsements before term of Agreement begins.

### (b) General Liability;

- (i) The Town, its officers, employees and volunteers are to be covered as additional insured as respects to liability arising out of activities occurring on or related to the occupancy and use of the Premises by the LGSR.
- (ii) The LGSR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its officers, officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Town, its officials, employees or volunteers shall be excess of the LGSR's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- (iii) Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- (iv) The LGSR's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- (c) All Coverages. Each insurance policy required in this Paragraph 12 shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. The LGSR shall ensure that current certification of such insurance is on file at all times with the Town Clerk during the term of this agreement.
- (d) Workers' Compensation. In addition to these policies, LGSR shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law. Further, LGSR shall ensure that all contractors employed on the Premises by the LGSR provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- (e) Property Insurance. Town shall have no obligation to maintain any insurance of the Premises or any personal property placed on the Premises. LGSR shall be solely responsible for obtaining whatever insurance coverage that the LGSR believes may be appropriate to protect and indemnify the LGSR for loss to the Premises or to any personal property that the LGSR may place on the Premises.
- 16. Indemnification. LGSR agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the Town, its officers, employees, volunteers, and agents, from and against any and all damages, claims or liability, penalties, costs or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise from any loss, damage, or injury to persons or property occurring in or about the Premises that arises out of or incident to the LGSR's use of the Premises, including use by anyone that the LGSR has permitted or allowed to use the Premises. This obligation to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend applies whether or not the incident or claim or liability is or may be related to negligence on the part of the Town.

### 17. Damage and Destruction.

(a) Damage or destruction of any portion of the Premises by any cause shall not terminate this Agreement or otherwise affect the respective obligations of the two parties, any present or future law to the contrary notwithstanding, except pursuant to the provisions of this Section 17

- (b) If because of destruction or damage, a portion of the Premises becomes unsuitable or inadequate for a use as specified in the Annual Schedule, the Town and LGSR shall meet and work cooperatively to identify an alternative location for the use. If the alternative location can be found on Town-owned property, then no modification of the Annual Use Fee shall be made. If no alternative location can be found, or if an alternative location is found that is not on Town-owned property, than LGSR shall be entitled to a prorated refund of the Annual Use Fee, calculated by determining the fee that would have been assessed for the displaced program or activity is if it had been issued a Facility Use Fee Permit. Any such calculation will be based on the Town's approved schedule of Annual Fees and Charges in effect at the time of the program displacement.
- (c) Under no circumstances does the Town have any obligation to provide LGSR with an alternative property to conduct its operations, and LGSR is solely responsible for obtaining such insurance as the LGSR deems appropriate to protect its interests should damage or destruction to any of the Premises occur.
- (d) LGSR shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury to the Premises as a result of the direct or indirect use of the Premises by LGSR under this agreement.
- Compliance with Town Codes LGSR shall comply with all provisions of the Town Code, including the provisions of Chapter 19 of the Code concerning Parks and Recreation.

## 19. Termination.

- a) LGSR shall promptly terminate its use of the Premises at the expiration of this Agreement, leaving the Premises in the same condition it was received, in good order and repair, reasonable wear and tear and damage by the elements excepted. Any personal property not removed by the LGSR within thirty (30) days of the termination of this Agreement shall become the property of the Town and may be disposed of as the Town in its sole discretion deems advisable.
- b) This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect unless prior to February 1s of any calendar year, either Party provides written notice to the other Party that it desires to terminate the Agreement for convenience and, upon such notice, the Agreement shall terminate on June 30sh of the same calendar year.
- c) If Town in its sole discretion determines that it requires the Premises for any public purpose, Town may terminate this Agreement upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice. In the event of an emergency, Town may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice. "Emergency," for the purposes of this paragraph, is defined as when the Town Council declares a State of Emergency. Upon termination of this Agreement in the event of an Emergency, Town and LGSR will work cooperatively to secure alternative facilities for LGSR programs.
- d) In the event of any material default or breach by LGSR, Town may at any time thereafter, following any notice required by statute, and without limiting Town in the exercise of any right or remedy which may have reason of such default or breach:
  - a. Terminate LGSR's right to possession of the Premises by any lawful means, in which case this Agreement shall terminate and LGSR shall immediately surrender possession of the Premises to Town. In such event, Town shall be entitled to recover from LGSR any

damages incurred by Town by reason of LUSL's default including but not limited to: the cost of recovering possession of the Premises and reasonable attorneys' fees.

- b. Pursue any other remedy now or hereafter available to Town under the laws of the State of California. Town shall have all remedies provided in law and equity.
- e) LGSR waives all rights of redemption or relief from forfeiture under California Code of Civil Procedure sections 1174 and 1179, and any other present and future law, in the event LGSR is evicted or Town otherwise lawfully takes possession of the Premises by reason of any default or breach of this Agreement by LGSR.
- 20. No Property Rights. Nothing in this Agreement is in any way intended to establish, convey, create or otherwise grant to LGSR any form of property rights in the Premises, nor shall such rights be established, conveyed, created or otherwise granted by LGSR's use of the Premises pursuant to this Agreement. LGSR hereby acknowledges that it currently has no property interest in the Premises or any improvements thereto or fixtures location thereon, and that any claim it may have to same is hereby and forever waived.
- Notices. Any written correspondence or Notices given under this Agreement shall be addressed as follows:

Notices shall be delivered by first class, postage prepaid mail or in person. If mailed, a notice shall be deemed effective on the fifth day following deposit in the U.S. Mail.

- 22. Waiver. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of a subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this License Agreement.
- 23. Entire Agreement. This Agreement constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between Town and LGSR. No terms, conditions, understanding or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.

## PARK RULES AND REGULATIONS (Effective March 1, 2013)

All park users shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation of the Los Gatos Town Code, and the these Park Rules and Regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code

## General

Parks and trails are open from official sunrise to one-half hour after

## No Smoking

Smoking is prohibited within any park or on any trail.

## Food & Alcohol

- Beer and wine are allowed with a picnic meal but must not leave the picnic site.
- A Vehicle Escort Permit is required when a caterer delivers food to a picnic site.
- Barbecues are not allowed at Belgatos Park.

## **Decorations & Signs**

- · Decorations must not interfere with other picnic sites.
- Decorations must be cleaned up and removed before leaving the park.
- Directional signs may be posted in designated areas, but must be removed before leaving.
- No tacks, nails or staples on park signs, tables or trees.
- No confetti, Egg toss or piñatas are allowed.

### Dogs

- A six (6) foot leash is required at all times and dogs must be kept under physical control.
- Pet owners are required to immediately clean-up after their pets.

## Miscellaneous

- Portable BBQs (gas or charcoal) are allowed in picnic areas only.
- Portable radios are allowed.
- Loud music is not allowed at any hour.
- Volleyball and Badminton nets are allowed.
- Portable toilets are not allowed.
- Petting zoos and pony rides are not allowed.
- Water slides and 'Slip-n-Slides" are not allowed.
- Organized sports activities are not allowed without a permit.
- No golfing within any park.
- No overnight camping allowed.
- No sale or vending or other commercial activity except by permit.

## Clean-Up

- Facilities rented and used must be left in clean condition. A fee will be assessed to you for leaving the picnic area unclean or damaged.
- Applicant should provide means to clean up site, including extra trash bags.
- Pick-up and dispose of all trash and food waste materials at reserved park site.
- Remove cans, bottles, bags, decorations, balloons, food and debris from park site.
   Use trash cans.
- Allow fires in barbecue pits to burn out. Do not use water because it will damage the grill and pit.

## Reservations

- Prior to selecting and reserving any picnic area or bandstand/gazebo, we recommend that the applicant visit the park facility in advance or view <u>Parks & Trails</u> <u>Map</u> to obtain details of each of Town's parks and trails, including maps and driving directions. A <u>Park and Trails Map</u> is available online and at Town offices.
- The Parks and Public Works Department staff will finalize your reservation request once you have completed the <u>on-line reservation</u> process and payment by credit card in full is received. Checks will no longer be accepted. A reservation fee will be charged for each site you reserve. If you reserve two or more sites, a fee will be assessed for each site, as applicable. Park reservations do not include parking. Please view the <u>Fee Schedule</u> for current charges.
- Requests to reserve a picnic area should not be submitted with less than 48 hours of advance notice prior to the requested reservation date. All reservation requests must be completed through the on-line reservation process. Reservations by phone will not be accepted.
- All information collected is only for the use of the Town of Los Gatos Parks and Public Works Department for park reservations and will not be sold or shared with

outside vendors. Also be assured that all data you send as part of this reservation process is through a secure server and the data is encrypted for transmission. We do not keep any of your credit card information on our system.

### **Permits**

- Special Use Permits are required for the following:
  - 1. Use of a group area for 25 people or more.
  - 2. Use of a jump house at any park in Los Gatos.
  - 3. Use of a vehicle escort at any park.
  - 4. Use of Bocce ball Courts at Oak Meadow Park.
  - 5. Use of Gazebo/Bandstand at Oak Meadow Park.
  - 6. For any organized recreational activities, such as formal classes or other similar activities.
- The permitee, under Town Municipal Code, Section 19.30.025, shall be bound by all park rules and regulations, and all applicable ordinances. The person to whom such permit is issued shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury sustained by the Town or by any person whomsoever by reason of the negligence of the person to whom such permit shall have been issued.
- Special Use Permit is approved by the Parks & Public Works Department upon review of reservation request and payment of applicable deposit.
- Use of a disc jockey (DJ) at the Gazebo/Bandstand at Oak Meadow Park is allowed only after receiving a Special Events Permit from the Los Gatos-Monte Sereno Police Department. The Police Department number is (408) 354-8600.
- An insurance certificate in the amount of \$1 million, naming the Town of Los Gatos, its Council members, Boards, Commissions, employees and agents as additionally insured is required for groups of over 100 people (reservations for events such as weddings, reunions and company picnics).
- Permits cannot be transferred, assigned or sublet.

## Jump Houses

- Use of a jump house requires a Special Use Permit. At Oak Meadow Park, a Special Use Permit for jump houses can be requested only if the associated picnic area is reserved concurrently.
- Jump houses can be rented only from companies that have provided proof of liability insurance naming the Town of Los Gatos as the additional insured. The following companies have registered with the Clerk's Office and have provided the required certificate:

 Any jump house company not listed above must provide insurance to the Town of Los Gatos Clerk's Office for consideration. A permit will not be issued to an applicant without providing proof of insurance from the vendor.

- Jump houses must be hand carried in to the park and placed in the area specified by the Parks Service Officer.
- No electricity is provided at the park for jump houses.
- Jump houses with combined features such as a jumper and a slide and/or obstacle course, and features containing water are not allowed.
- Personally owned jump houses are not allowed.
- Jump house fees for residents are \$95. Non-resident fees are \$125.
- A Jump House Permit does not include Picnic Area Use Permit. Each must be obtained separately.

## **Vehicle Escort**

Individuals renting a park facility can request a staff vehicle escort to assist with the transport of supplies to/from a designated picnic area. Reservations must be made five (5) business days in advance of the event date for this service.

- No vehicles are allowed beyond designated public parking lots. If an individual would like to drop off supplies or equipment beyond these areas in a vehicle, a vehicle escort is required.
- Vehicle escorts conducted by a Park Service Officer must be scheduled in advance.
- Vehicle escorts are not available for Picnic Areas 1, 2, & 7 at Oak Meadow Park.

### ATTACHMENT C

## CREEKSIDE SPORTS PARK SPECIAL RULES AND REGULATIONS (Effective March 1, 2013)

All park users shall comply with the provisions of Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation of the Los Gatos Town Code; Park Rules and Regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code; and these Special Rules and Regulations, also established pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Los Gatos Town Code. Permitted groups have priority use and other users shall promptly vacate field upon request by permitted users

## No Smoking

 Smoking of any substance and use of any tobacco product, including chewing tobacco, is prohibited.

## Artificial Turf Field and Warm Up Area Use

- No metal cleats or spikes allowed.
- · No metal stakes, such as umbrellas or shade structures permitted.
- No bare feet.
- No spitting on artificial turf surfaces.
- No vehicles allowed on field or warm-up area
- No marking or painting of turf unless approved by the Town of Los Gatos.
- No golfing or use of golf clubs.
- No discus, hammer, javelin or other field events permitted.

## Food & Beverages

- No alcoholic beverages permitted within Creekside Sports Park.
- No open fires, flames or portable barbecues (gas or charcoal) permitted.
- No chewing gum or sunflower seeds allowed within Creekside Sports Park.
- No food or beverages allowed on playing field other than water.
- No glass bottles or containers allowed on field or warm-up areas.

## **Dogs and Other Animals**

No dogs or other animals allowed except for certified guide animals.

## Signage

- Signs may be affixed with string, rope or ties only. No tape, tacks, staples, or nails allowed
- All signage and ties must be removed after use.
   No staking of any team signs or banners allowed.

## USE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF LOS GATOS AND

### LOS GATOS-SARATOGA COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND RECREATION

THIS AGREEMENT is dated for identification this 1st day of July 2023 and is made by and between TOWN OF LOS GATOS, State of California ("Town") and LOS GATOS-SARATOGA COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND RECREATION ("LGSR") identified as a California nonprofit corporation and whose address is 123 E. Main Street, Los Gatos, CA 95030.

## I. RECITALS

- 1.1 Los Gatos-Saratoga Community Education and Recreation ("LGSR"), a joint powers agency of the Los Gatos Union School District, Saratoga Union School District, and Los Gatos-Saratoga Union High School District was established to ensure the effective and efficient provision of community education and recreation services to the communities of Los Gatos, Saratoga, Monte Sereno, and Santa Cruz Mountains communities.
- 1.2 LGSR provides fee-based public recreation, supplemental education, and childcare programs for Los Gatos, Monte Sereno, Saratoga, and the Santa Cruz Mountains communities. LGSR and the Town have been under contract since 2014 for programs within certain parks that are owned and operated by the Town.
- 1.3 In order to provide convenient and effective programs to its constituent communities, LGSR desires to use various parks and open spaces owned and maintained by the Town of Los Gatos ("Town").
- 1.4 The Town requested and LGSR has agreed to provide recreational programming for adults aged 55 years and older for the Town of Los Gatos.

## II. AGREEMENTS

- 2.1 <u>Subject Premises</u>. The premises covered by this agreement are the portions of Blossom Hill Park, Creekside Sports Park, La Rinconada Park, and Oak Meadow Park (collectively, the "Premises") denoted in Attachment 1. LGSR may request the use of additional premises which shall be considered by the Town and authorized for use as more fully described in Section 2.7.
- 2.2 <u>Use of Premises</u>. LGSR shall be allowed the use of the Premises for approved Programs during those times and dates as shown on the "Annual Schedule". The Annual Schedule shall cover camps and classes and shall identify what portion or portions of the Premises shall be designated for each approved Program. Each year this Agreement is in force, LGSR shall submit a schedule no later than June 30th for the upcoming Fall session, no later than

September 30th for the upcoming Winter and Spring session, and no later than February 28th for the upcoming Summer session.

LGSR may request changes to the Annual Schedule by written notification to the Department of Parks and Public Works but shall endeavor to minimize changes to the schedule. All changes should be made in writing no less than 30 days prior to the effective date of the change. Town has the final say in establishing the master schedule. Town will attempt to accommodate user groups at their requested time but reserves the right to propose use hours that balance the needs of all user groups equitably. The Town of Los Gatos shall have sole authority to approve the Annual Schedule and any requested changes to the Annual Schedule.

LGSR may partner with third party providers that have executed Use Agreements with the Town. In the case of such partnerships the Use Hours and Facility Maintenance Fee payments will be paid by the third party and not by LGSR.

- 2.3 <u>Term of Agreement</u>. Unless terminated sooner pursuant to Section 4.3 of this Agreement, the Use Agreement remains in effect from July 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024. The term of this Agreement may be extended for up to nine additional one-year periods.
- 2.4 <u>Annual Use Fee</u>. Beginning July 1, 2023, and every year thereafter, LGSR shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee for the use of the Premises. The initial Annual Use Fee shall be \$15,500, which represents 4,607 hours of Premises Use. The Annual Use Fee shall be considered full and fair compensation for use of the Premises for those days and times on the approved Annual Schedule, and in conjunction with the Facility Maintenance Fee described in Section 2.5, shall be used by the Town to help fund the cost of the maintenance of the Premises.

## ALTERNATIVE LANGUAGE. TO BE USED IF COUNCIL ACCEPTS THAT PICKLEBALL IS A SENIOR PROGRAM

- Annual Use Fee. Beginning July 1, 2023, and every year thereafter, LGSR shall pay the Town of Los Gatos an Annual Use Fee for the use of the Premises. The based initial Annual Use Fee shall be \$13,245.22, which represents 3,936 hours of Premises Use. The parties recognize that 671 hours of pickleball programming at LaRinconada Park is not included in this calculation in consideration of pickleball as a senior program serving people aged 55 years and older. The Annual Use Fee shall be considered full and fair compensation for use of the Premises for those days and times on the approved Annual Schedule, and in conjunction with the Facility Maintenance Fee described in Section 2.5, shall be used by the Town to help fund the cost of the maintenance of the Premises.
- 2.5 <u>Facility Maintenance Fee.</u> Beginning July 1, 2023, and continuing for the full term of this agreement, including any extensions, each participant in programs or classes offered by LGSR on Town premises will be charged a four (\$4.00) Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) per

session. The Facility Maintenance Fee shall be assessed by LGSR at the time of registration or payment of program fees and shall be remitted to the Town quarterly. Participants shall be charged an FMF for each separate registration in a program or class offered by LGSR offered on the Premises covered by this agreement.

## ALTERNATIVE LANGUAGE: TO BE USED IF COUNCIL ACCEPTS THE REDUCED FACILITY USE FEE FOR LGSR

- Facility Maintenance Fee. Beginning July 1, 2023, and continuing for the full term of this agreement, including any extensions, each participant in programs or classes offered by LGSR on Town premises will be charged a two (\$2.00) Facility Maintenance Fee (FMF) per session. The Facility Maintenance Fee shall be assessed by LGSR at the time of registration or payment of program fees and shall be remitted to the Town quarterly. Participants shall be charged an FMF for each separate registration in a program or class offered by LGSR offered on the Premises covered by this agreement.
- 2.6 <u>Annual Use Fee Adjustment-Change in CPI</u>. On July 1, 2024, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted according to the percent change in the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics Consumer Price Index, *All Items, All Urban Consumers, San Francisco-Oakland-San Jose, 1982-84-100 Index*.
- 2.7 Annual Use Fee Adjustment-Change in Programming or Facilities. On July 1, 2024, and each anniversary thereafter, the Annual User Fee shall also be adjusted based on programming changes resulting in a material increase or decrease in the use of the Premises. In addition, the Annual User Fee shall be adjusted to reflect the addition of any new facilities or cessation of use at any of the facilities that comprise the Premises. Should LGSR increase or decrease its requested hours of use as set forth in the Annual Schedule, by 5% or more, the Annual Use Fee shall be adjusted proportionally based on the percentage change in hours. Any fee adjustment under this section will be negotiated in good faith between the Town and LGSR as part of the development of the Annual Schedule. Programming that is specifically marketed to and participation is limited to senior participants aged 55 years and older shall not be included in the calculated increase of hours.
- 2.8 <u>Maintenance</u>. LGSR shall be responsible for general site clean-up including pick up and disposal of trash that may result from the approved use of the Premises.
- 2.9 <u>Facility Use Policies</u>. LGSR shall comply, without limitation, with all applicable provisions of the Los Gatos Town Code, with special attention to Chapter 19, Parks and Recreation provisions. LGSR shall also comply with any park rules and regulations established by the Director of Parks and Public Works pursuant to Section 19.10.025(17) of the Town Code, including those rules set forth in Attachment A, Town of Los Gatos Park Rules and Regulations. LGSR agrees to comply with the current rules and regulations available at <a href="https://www.losgatosca.gov/parkres">www.losgatosca.gov/parkres</a> as well as any future amendments to those rules and

regulations. Failure to comply with these policies may result in suspension and/or termination of this agreement.

LGSR agrees to comply with the state "Fair Play in Community Sports Act." LGSR will not discriminate on the basis of gender and boys' and girls' teams will have equal access to the facilities.

2.10 <u>Payment</u>. LGSR shall make all payments, whether or not invoiced by Town, required pursuant to this Agreement no later than November 1 and April 1 of each year that such payments are due. All payments shall be mailed by first class mail or delivered in person at Town offices and addressed as follows:

- 2.11 <u>Assignment</u>. LGSR shall not assign any portion of this Agreement or allow any use of the Premises by any other person or entity contrary to this Agreement's terms, without the Town's prior written approval. LGSR is expressly prohibited from use of the Premises for any activity other than activities sanctioned and associated with LGSR.
- 2.12 <u>Personal Property</u>. Personal property of LGSR shall be LGSR's sole responsibility to acquire, repair, replace and store. Any storage of personal property on the Premises shall require prior approval by the Town. LGSR shall remove all personal property at the expiration or termination of this Agreement, or sooner, as directed by the Town in its sole discretion. Any personal property not so removed with 30 days of notification by the Town shall become the sole property of Town with no compensation.
- 2.13 <u>Temporary Signage</u>. LGSR shall be permitted to install temporary event signage on the Premises upon approval of an application to the Town of Los Gatos Planning Department pursuant to the provisions of <u>Section29.10.120 (4) Event Signs</u> of the Town Code. Each LGSR Activity Quarter (summer, fall spring, winter) shall be eligible for temporary event signage. All temporary event signage must include the LGSR logo of such size and placement that it is clear that the signage is for a program or activity sponsored by LGSR. The Town shall charge a single Temporary Signage fee for each year.
- 2.14 New Program Vendors Referral. The Town and LGSR shall meet and negotiate in good faith a New Program Vendor Referral procedure, wherein the Town directs prospective new program vendors to LGSR for initial consideration prior to any issuance of permits or negotiation of use agreements directly between the Town and the prospective vendor.

### III. INSURANCE AND INDEMNIFICATION

## 3.1 Minimum Scope of Insurance:

- i. LGSR agrees to have and maintain for the duration of this Agreement, General Liability insurance policies insuring LGSR, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents to an amount not less than two million dollars (\$2,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current Best's rating of no less than B+.
- ii. LGSR agrees to have and maintain, for the duration of this Agreement, an Automobile Liability insurance policy insuring the LGSR, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents to an amount not less than one million (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- iii. LGSR shall provide to the Town all certificates of insurance, with original endorsements effecting coverage. LGSR shall provide all certificates and endorsements before term of Agreement begins.

## General Liability:

- The Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees and agents are to be covered as additional insured as respects to liability arising out of activities occurring on or related to the occupancy and use of the Premises by LGSR.
- ii. The LGSR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees and agents. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees or agents shall be excess of the LGSR's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- iii. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Town, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers.
- iv. The LGSR's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made, or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.

- 3.2 <u>All Coverages</u>. Each insurance policy required in this item shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, canceled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days' prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Town. The LGSR shall ensure that current certification of such insurance is on file at all times with the Town Clerk during the term of this agreement.
- 3.3 <u>Workers' Compensation</u>. In addition to these policies, LGSR shall have and maintain Workers' Compensation insurance as required by California law. Further, LGSR shall ensure that all contractors employed on the Premises by the LGSR provide the required Workers' Compensation insurance for their respective employees.
- Property Insurance. LGSR shall have no obligation to maintain any insurance of the Premises or any personal property placed on the Premises. LGSR shall be solely responsible for obtaining whatever insurance coverage that the LGSR believes may be appropriate to protect and indemnify the LGSR for loss to the Premises or to any personal property that the LGSR may place on the Premises.
- 3.4 <u>Indemnification</u>. LGSR agrees to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend the Town, its elected and appointed officials, employees, and agents, from and against any and all damages, claims or liability, penalties, costs or expenses in law or equity that may at any time arise from any loss, damage, or injury to persons or property occurring in or about the Premises that arises out of or incident to the LGSR's use of the Premises, including use by anyone that the LGSR has permitted or allowed to use the Premises. This obligation to indemnify, hold harmless, and defend applies whether or not the incident or claim or liability is or may be related negligence on the part of the Town.

## IV. GENERAL TERMS

4.1 <u>Damage and Destruction</u>. Damage or destruction of any portion of the Premises by any cause shall not terminate this Agreement or otherwise affect the respective obligations of the two parties, any present or future law to the contrary notwithstanding, except pursuant to the provisions of this Section 4.1.

If because of destruction or damage, a portion of the Premises becomes unsuitable or inadequate for use as specified in the Annual Schedule the Town and LGSR shall meet and work cooperatively to identify an alternative location for the use. If the alternative location can be found on Town-owned property, then no modification of the Annual Use Fee shall be made. If no alternative location can be found, or if an alternative location is found that is not on Town-owned property, then LGSR shall be entitled to a prorated refund of the Annual Use Fee, calculated by determining that fee that would have been assessed for the displaced program or activity is if it had been issued a Facility Use Fee Permit. Any such calculation will be based on the Town's approved schedule of Annual Fees and Charges in effect at the time of the program displacement.

Under no circumstances does the Town have any obligation to provide LGSR with an alternative property to conduct its operations, and LGSR is solely responsible for obtaining such insurance as the LGSR deems appropriate to protect its interests should damage or destruction to any of the Premises occur.

LGSR shall be liable for any loss, damage, or injury to the Premises as a result of the direct or indirect use of the Premises by LGSR under this agreement.

- 4.2 <u>Compliance with Town Codes</u>. LGSR shall comply with all Town Code provisions, including Chapter 19 of the Code concerning Parks and Recreation.
- 4.3 <u>Termination of Agreement</u>. LGSR shall promptly terminate its use of the Premises at the expiration of this Agreement, leaving the Premises in the same condition it was received, in good order and repair, reasonable wear and tear and damage by the elements excepted. Any personal property not removed by LGSR within thirty (30) days of the termination of this Agreement shall become the property of the Town and may be disposed of as the Town in its sole discretion deems advisable.

This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect unless prior to February 1st of any calendar year, either Party provides written notice to the other Party that it desires to terminate the Agreement for convenience and, upon such notice, the Agreement shall terminate on June 30th of the same calendar year.

If Town in its sole discretion determines that it requires the Premises for any public purpose, Town may terminate this Agreement upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice. In the event of an emergency, Town may terminate this Agreement upon five (5) days written notice. "Emergency," for the purpose of this paragraph, is defined as when the Town Council declares a State of Emergency. Upon termination of this Agreement in the event of an Emergency, Town and LGSR will work cooperatively to secure alternative facilities for LGSR programs.

In the event of any material default or breach by LGSR, Town may at any time, thereafter, following any notice required by statute, and without limiting Town in the exercise of any right or remedy which may have reason of such default or breach:

Terminate LGSR's right to possession of the Premises by any lawful means, in which case this Agreement shall terminate and LGSR shall immediately surrender possession of the Premises to Town. In such event, Town shall be entitled to recover from LGSR any damages incurred by Town by reason of LGSR's default including but not limited to the cost of recovering possession of the Premises and reasonable attorneys' fees.

Pursue any other remedy now or hereafter available to Town under the laws of the State of California. Town shall have all remedies provided in law and equity.

LGSR waives all rights of redemption or relief from forfeiture under California Code of Civil Procedure sections 1174 and 1179, and any other present, and future law, in the event LGSR is evicted or Town otherwise lawfully takes possession of the Premises by reason of any default or breach of this Agreement by LGSR.

- 4.4 No Property Rights. Nothing in this Agreement is in any way intended to establish, convey, create or otherwise grant LGSR any form of property rights in the Premises, nor shall such rights be established, conveyed, created or otherwise granted by LGSR's use of the Premises pursuant to this Agreement. LGSR hereby acknowledges that it currently has no property interest in the Premises or any improvements thereto or fixture's location thereon, and that any claim it may have to same is hereby and forever waived.
- 4.5 <u>Notices</u>. Any written correspondence of Notices given under this Agreement shall be addressed as follows:

Notices shall be delivered by first class, postage prepaid mail or in person. If mailed, a notice shall be deemed effective on the fifth day following in the U.S. Mail.

- 4.6 <u>Waiver</u>. No failure on the part of either party to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder, nor does waiver of a breach or default under this Agreement constitute a continuing waiver of subsequent breach of the same or any other provision of this License Agreement.
- 4.7 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement constitutes the complete and exclusive statement of the Agreement between Town and LGSR. No terms, conditions, understanding, or agreements purporting to modify or vary this Agreement, unless hereafter made in writing and signed by the party to be bound, shall be binding on either party.
