X. Old Business

- Mayor Doud was recently contacted by Coast Guard Sector Sault regarding shutting down the straits for the season, which requires a 72-hour notice
 - Councilman St. Onge commented that he would like to wait to see what the upcoming 30degree weather does for the ice conditions before we call for things to be closed
 - Mayor agreed to wait and see where things are after the weekend
- Mackinac Island Police Department hiring of a local K-9 Unit
 - Committee's recommendation to hire Sue Stejskal and her K9 dogs beginning in April 2025 with the new budget. Proposed that Ms. Stejskal will receive an annual salary of \$1,220.00 and an activation fee of \$20.00 per hour for a one-year period. Position will be reviewed in February 2026 to assess numbers, see if the services were used and if so how many times.
 - Councilman Moskwa noted that there were offers to donate the funds to cover the annual salary

Motion made by St. Onge, seconded by Moskwa, to send the hiring of local K-9 unit to the Public Safety Committee for further discussion.

 - Councilwoman Myers asked that Attorney Evashevski lay out all of the options for Council to review

- Modular lengths for the Jaquiss residence located at 6948 Main St.
 - City ordinance states a maximum 44' length & 14' feet wide
 - Ms. Jaquiss is requesting to bring modular sections that measure 12 ft wide by 43' & 3.5" to 56' & 1"
 - Sections will be staged at Mission Point (permission confirmed by Liz Ware at the meeting)
 - Councilman St. Onge commented that he would consider granting the ordinance deviation due to the specific location – delivery route would not impede traffic and shouldn't cause any road blockage
 - By voting yes, Councilman St. Onge stated that he does not agree with everything stated in the letters presented by Mr. Murray on Ms. Jaquiss' behalf
 - Consideration for this type of ordinance deviation has to be on a case by case basis depending on the delivery location.
 - If the ordinance deviation for sizing is granted, there is no possibility of them being delivered to the Coal Dock. Consideration of this ordinance deviation only applies to the specific route from the British Landing dock with the delivery to the specified location only.
 - Councilwoman Myers commented that she does not believe that, as stated in the submitted letters, that this case is a cause for an ordinance amendment. Requests such as these need to be considered on a case by case basis.

Motion made by St. Onge, seconded by Corrigan, to grant an ordinance deviation for longer modular sections, set forth in the City's Motor Vehicle Ordinance, section 66.95-3, for Cheryl Jaquiss' residence located at 6948 Main Street, based on the criteria that the route of travel from the State Dock at British Landing should not be inhibited by the modular lengths and that the time-frame requested to deliver and set the sections are within the permitted times for the vehicle zone the residence is located in.

SPECIAL CITY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES FERRY & AIR TRANSPORTATION

Wednesday, January 29, 2025 at 12:30 PM City Hall - Council Chambers, 7358 Market St., Mackinac Island, Michigan

I. Call to Order

Mayor Doud called the meeting to order at 12:30 pm

II. Roll Call

VI. New Business

- Discussion of Air & Ferry Transportation
 - o Fresh Air
 - Depend on winter service to be able to provide year-round service to Mackinac Island
 - Would like to discuss operations with the Mackinac Island Transportation Authority (MITA)
 - Councilman St. Onge noted that the formation of MITA was to ensure that the Island had a year-round (or ice to ice) boat service
 - The Council needs to make mainland access obtainable cannot force residents to travel air only, especially as it is the higher cost for travel
 - Fresh Air proposed the ferry passenger service temporarily shutting down each winter from February 1st through March 1st
 - Councilman St. Onge noted that Mackinac Island Ferry Company holds the Winter Service Contract with the City of Mackinac Island, which makes them the sole ferry passenger service from November through April of each year. Fresh Air is not the sole operator for aviation services, and if they were, rates would need to be regulated
 - Councilwoman Myers noted that the City Charter gives authority to the City Council over the Island's docks and ferry service. Plane service is operated through the Mackinac County and Mackinac State Park airports. The council has discussed subsidizing the airlines in the past, but the City does not have the authority to do so.
 - A conversation with MITA may provide different options than what the City has access to
 - Also need to keep in mind that Mackinac Island Ferry Co. has a Franchise Agreement and a five (5) year Winter Service Contract with the City to run a ferry passenger service in the winter months
 - Councilman Corrigan inquired if there was any chance for a discounted rate for island residents like the ferry service offers
 - Fresh Air responded that this is something they could look in to, but no guarantees

o Arnold Transit

- It is critical that there is a backup transportation system for the Island, and Fresh Air can provide that as long as it is sustainable for them
- Would agree with shutting the ferry passenger service for the month of February
- Councilwoman Myers inquired what would happen in that situation for the boat line? What if there was a storm during that time that boat travel was possible, but air travel was not?
 - Ms. Dobrowolski noted that Arnold Transit would work together with Fresh Air to make a form of transportation available
- Andy McGreevy of MITA commented that they may be able to provide some sort of funding or financial support to the airline like they do with the boat line. Can continue to look in to what funds may be available.
 - Mr. McGreevy further commented that it would be ideal to keep both ferry and air services available throughout the winter months

- Mayor Doud and other council members made it clear that the option of the ferry passenger service shutting down for the month of February is not a possibility for 2025
- Suggested that Fresh Air and Arnold Transit speak with MITA and then make a proposal with future plans to present to the City Council for consideration
- Closing of the Straits of Mackinac
 - Ms. Dobrowolski stated that even if the Straits are closed, Arnold Transit can still run
 - passenger and freight services, they just need to keep the Coast Guard updated daily
 - Capacity
 - Coast Guard has become stricter over many things, especially traveling through ice
 - Straights II is not an "ice boat"
 - Freight boat Senator can carry up 100 people
- Update on the Ottawa and Huron
 - Ottawa is waiting for electrical work to be completed
 - Looking at the first week in February for the electricians to come back and complete the work. Once on site, the work shouldn't take more than a week
 - o Huron
 - More progress is being made
 - Interior is being put back together
 - Looking more like mid-February before final work will be completed
- Hours for Fresh Air
 - Plowing and daylight can delay morning flight times
 - First flight is typically 7:00 am or 7:30 am with the last flight being around 5:00 pm or 5:15 pm multiple planes are flying during this time
 - These hours are Monday through Friday only
 - Weekends currently have low demand, therefore providing a limited schedule
- At this time, this is being referred to the Transportation Authority for further discussion. A
 representative from MITA will be in touch with Fresh Air.

Discussion of Senior Transport MIPD - Chief Mike Gruits met with the committee about the senior transport, the recently updated and changed items on the forms policy for this winter season. The committee and Chief Gruits spoke in depth about the times, staff, the amount of transports between 50-60 a day with the lack of snow, the discussion was around the necessity of the transport trips, officer safety concerns, history was a part of the conversation and the written policy, the time frame was instituted due to lack of staff and shift changes, alcohol consumption, the taxi being available for taxi services was talked about and how they are underutilized, that the transport should not be a taxi service. During previous meetings changes were talked about and the committee had asked in the past for the MIPD to figure out their changes and bring it back to committee for approvals/communication purposes so the council and committee can be aware of possible changes and weigh in on them moving forward. At this time the policy will remain the same, however if changes are being made the committee would like to see them and we can revisit the current policy with the possible hiring of the extra officer to be fully staffed to extend the hours on the weekends. At this time the officers are trying to accommodate some of those later trips, however it comes down to manpower, chief Gruits possibly can look at current schedules to see if we can accommodate this request. This is a possible ongoing discussion.

Continued Discussion of K-9 Position MIPD – Chief Mike Gruits met with the Committee about the K-9 position, He was approached by a donor that is willing to pay for the annual salary of \$1,220.00, that will help maintain the dogs and their work. She is requesting \$20.00 an hour if activated. In the event of a search her dog is able to follow a scent, and is a cadaver dog. She also has a therapy K-9. She can offer support to officers, school students, medical care staff and other EMS responders for their well-being. She can be used in a crisis. She is willing to be a private contractor. The Committee has asked the chief to track the utilization of Sue and her K-9's if approved at Council. The Committee recommends approving this as a temporary basis, starting in the new April 1, 2025 budget and is to be reviewed in a one-year period next February 2026 to assess the use of her contract.

Continued Discussion of Social Worker Position MIPD – Chief Gruits spoke to the committee about the need of a social worker position, however if he has to choose between the office priorities he believes the additional officer is the bigger priority and more of a dire need. The committee has still asked for the MIPD to apply for the grant for the Social worker position previously discussed in other meetings. There was some discussion if a Social worker would be a better fit for another organization. Chief Gruits informed the committee the grant funding is only for a new position for a police station. This is an ongoing discussion.

Discussion of possibly adding the hiring of a 6th officer (Part Time Seasonal) in Section VIII, Itema. not to exceed the 9-month mark – Chief Gruits spoke with the committee in length about response, emergencies, routine patrol, transport services, incidents, summer and winter activity on the Island and response times. Currently there is one officer working alone on the night shift, which is a concern for the officer on duty and feels insufficient. Chief Gruits spoke to the committee about a properly staffed police department which would be two officers on during the day shifts and two officers on during the night shifts. There is an officer the MIPD has in mind and ready to start work during February. The committee has asked myself and chief Gruits to work on some numbers as this was not budgeted for, pay rate, weekly hours, some mock up schedules and current budgetary numbers. This is an ongoing discussion.

Discussion of E-bikes, Signage and the Ordinance. – There was a short discussion about enforcement, signs and an Ordinance Committee Meeting needed. E-bikes has been sent to the next Public Safety Committee meeting on January 29th at 2:00pm, so the committee would have more time to go in depth and discuss this subject.

Discussion of possible weekly or bi-weekly chief notes to Mayor and Public Safety Committee, similar to what Allen Burt does for the DPW/City Council – Steve talked to chief Gruits about doing a biweekly update of some of the informational items that take place, not police information, appropriate community type information and updates of incident summaries, etc. Chief Gruits agreed and will be sending out some communication to keep Council and the Mayor up to date with the happenings on the Island. Currently he does provide the Mayor with updates. Public Safety Committee Meeting

Continued Discussion of K-9 Position MIPD – At the last council meeting the K-9 subject was sent back to Committee level. Chief Gruits spoke again to the Committee about having a donor and the money ready to pay for the annual Salary of \$1,220.00 for the first year of the contract. He would like approach this topic a little less about the money and about the unique skill set this can provide at least for a year and see how it goes and reevaluate. We can budget for the \$20.00 an hour activation. The other entities should they want to use the services would have to reach out to Sue Stejskal and her K-9 unit if they want to use the services. The committee has recommended to move forward with the contract for the K-9 unit with the same stipulations as previously discussed. They have asked the Chief of Police to bring to council in writing the clarification as to her abilities, services, emergency situations, uses and time frames etc.

Continued Discussion of Social Worker Position MIPD – Chief Gruits informed to council he was working with someone at Hiawatha Services to provide a social worker and mental health services at the Mackinac Island Medical Center a couple times a week and they would be available for online consultations. He believes this is a better fit for this position instead of the MIPD at this time.

Discussion of possibly adding the hiring of a 6th officer (Part Time Seasonal) in February, not to exceed the 9-month mark – Chief Gruits presented the numbers to the Committee that we worked out. The pay for two months on the higher pay grade would be approximately \$6,000.00 in advance of the upcoming season and current budget. Chief Gruits provided schedules and financials. MIPD would like to employ the candidate mid-February. The department had a deficiency in officers when chief Gruits was promoted to Chief. City attorney and chief Gruits will work on the proper pay rate that matches the collective bargaining agreement, which could result in the \$6,000.00 to be a lower rate. After extensive conversations with the Committee and City Attorney, the Committee recommends hiring the part time seasonal officer this year earlier than April 2025.

Discussion of E-bikes, Signage and the Ordinance. – Signage for current speed limits, State Park and the City need to move forward with the signage to be able to have them hung and available by no later than April. The committee had a conversation about the signs and placements of the signage. By the Library, by Mission Point and at Fort Street, dual sides so a total of 6 signs on M-185 with the speed limits on them. After lengthy conversations of placement, how many signs, etc. the Committee has asked City Foreman Mike Ruddle and Chief Gruits to work with Myron Johnson at the State Park to keep this moving forward. Chief Gruits also touched on the information campaign previously talked about in other meetings for informational purposes to residents and visitors.

POSITION:

The Mackinac Island Police Department seeks a certified and experienced canine / K9 and handler for search and rescue missions and wellness services as requested.

QUALIFICATIONS REQUIRED FOR POSITION:

A. Age: Minimum twenty-one (21) Years of Age

B. Citizenship: United States

<u>C. Education</u>: High school diploma or GED (Other as required)

D. Criminal History: No felony convictions.

E. Driver's License: Must possess a valid Michigan Operator's License.

F. Background: Must successfully pass a department background investigation.

<u>G. Physical:</u> Candidate should be in good physical condition and must successfully pass a physical examination with a Physician.

<u>H. Experience</u>. Candidate must be experienced in K9 search and rescue and the care and training of a canine (K9) for at least 3 years prior to accepting this position.

<u>I. Certification</u>. Candidate must be a certified K9 Handler with their own certified K9 under State of Michigan standards to be eligible for the position.

<u>J. Training / Records</u>. Candidate must maintain all K9 and Handler training records and provide them to the Chief of Police monthly or as requested.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

- A. The handler and K9 must be able to assist in searching for missing persons and limited article searches, when available.
- B. The handler and K9 may provide wellness visits and educational opportunities as requested.
- C. The handler and K9 as a team will need to be able to locate, report, and document searches and finds.

DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES (CONTINUED):

- D. The handler and K9 must be able to work well with other entities of public safety and the community under stressful conditions.
- E. The handler must be able to document and report information via radio and in written communication form as needed.
- F. Other requirements deemed necessary by the Chief of Police.

COMPENSATION:

- A. This is a non-union position with no benefits.
- B. The compensation will be determined upon mutual agreement between the City and the selected candidate.
- C. The position is strictly at will and may be eliminated at any given time as determined by the Chief of Police.
- D. The position is a subcontractor position and not an employee of the City of Mackinac Island.

AUTHORITY OF POSITION:

This is a civilian subcontractor position with no arrest powers. It is limited to search and rescue functions and wellness services.

DEFERRAL

Anything not covered in this job description and explained in its entirety is hereby reserved as a right of the City of Mackinac Island to make the final determination.

POLICE SERVICE CANINE HANDLER

PART-TIME POSITION PROPOSAL

GOAL:

Through the use of a certified police service therapy canine (PSTC) for the Mackinac Island Police Department (MIPD), animal-assisted interactions will be provided for the well being of departmental officers, support staff, medical care staff, and other emergency responders. The PSTC team will also provide educational opportunities and staff wellness visits as requested at the Mackinac Island Public School. The team will also participate in outreach for the MIPD at various public events.

It is anticipated that the costs for this program will be nominal based on a combination of private and public donations that should offset program costs.

This civilian position will be part-time and is written specifically for Susan M. Stejskal, LVT, PhD as the PSTC handler and program lead.

JUSTIFICATION:

The increasing popularity of using therapy or comfort dogs in many different venues throughout the United States is evident by articles published in the popular press, scientific journals and in social media. Teams are used in schools, nursing homes, hospitals, and different places of employment. It has been established that animal-assisted therapy or interactions have been a very effective and well accepted tool to help people after critical events or who work in emotionally challenging conditions.

There is a wide variety in the training, certification, and deployment of many therapy dog teams. Some of these teams are made up of well-meaning dog owners who elect to visit with their pets without specialized training. Dogs used in animal-assisted therapy should be intentionally trained and the team should be certified annually by a national certifying organization. Dogs that are used to provide support for responders and/or victims after mass casualty or fatality incidents should be handled by people who have gone through Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) training and the team certified annually.

A few years rgc. the United States Police Association (USPCA) recognized the tridical role that welltrained canine teams can make in law enforcement agencies. As with patrol and detection canines, the USPCA PSTC teams must be certified annually.

PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATIONS:

The PSTC Team (Stejskal & K9 Sheriff Woody)

K9 Woody and I certify annually with the USPCA as a PSTC team. Additionally, after over 100 hours of critical incident stress management (CISM) training and specific K9 training, K9 Sheriff Woody and I are part of the Michigan Disaster Recovery Team (Mi-DART), part of the Michigan Mortuary Operations Response Team (MiMORT). We are also a working team for Crisis Response Canines, a national organization that provides animal-assisted interactions for first responders after mass shootings and other critical incidents.

Susan M. Stejskal, LVT, PhD

As a law enforcement K9 handler for over 20 years, I have been recognized by the courts as an expert witness in canine olfaction, forensic taphonomy, and the training and deployment of detector canines. My educational and professional experience in academia and the private sector allowed me to develop training in a variety of forensics topics for detectives, investigators, crime scene personnel, and canine handlers from law enforcement agencies throughout the United States and Canada.

I have provided presentations and training at national, regional, and state conferences throughout the US including the International Association for Identification (national and regional), the Midwest Association of Forensic Scientists, the National Association of Forensic Entomology, the American Veterinary Medical Association, along with many others. I have also provided training for Toronto Police Services, the New York Police Department (Emergency Services Canine Unit), USPCA Region 7 (New York), the New York States Canine Association, the Connecticut Police Work Dog Association, the Massachusetts Police Work Dog Association, and others.

I am a member and regional certifying official for detector canines for the USPCA, a member of the International Association for Identification, US National Institute of Science and Technology's

Organization of Scientific Area Forensic Committee - Dogs and Sensors Subcommittee, and am a past member of the Michigan Mortuary Operations Response Team.

I am the author of "Death, Decomposition, and Detector Dogs: from science to scene" (CRC Press, 2nd edition, 2022 and 1st edition, 2013), "Beds, Bugs, and Breakfasts" (CDCS, 2019), and two children's books, "The Little Dog Who Did Big Things" and "Buzz Visits Mackinac Island". I have also written several book chapters, case reports, and scientific journal and magazine articles. The most recent article ("What is a police therapy canine and how do I get there") was published in the USPCA Canine Courier.

After over 20 years of service, I recently retired as a Special Deputy/Forensic K9 Handler (Human Remains Detector or HRD K9s) and former lead of the Forensic Services Unit/Criminal Investigations of the St. Joseph County Sheriff's Department. I am still a member of the Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Office Water Safety and Recovery Team where I work as an HRD K9 handler on an as-needed and as-available basis.

K9 Sheriff Woody (Hundeleben Oh It's Sheriff Woody, CGC, TKN, RN, RI, USPCA(PSTC)

K9 Woody is a miniature wirehaired dachshund born in 2019 and moved to Michigan to live with me as his owner/trainer/handler. Woody has earned many titles from the American Kennel Club including the Canine Good Citizen, Trick Dog Novice, Rally Obedience Novice and Rally Obedience Intermediate titles. Sheriff Woody works as a Human Remains Detector (HRD) K9 focusing on helping locate drowning victims. Because of his detection success, K9 Woody received a regional award from the USPCA for his detection work in law enforcement.

K9 Woody certifies annually as a PSTC with the USPCA and is a working canine MiDART and for Crisis Response Canines.

K9 Maple (Springville Maple Rush, CGC, TKN, RN, RI, USPCA(HRD)

K9 Maple is an English Springer Spaniel born in Canada in 2015 and like K9 Woody, has many titles from the American Kennel Club. K9 Maple was also deputized and worked as an HRD K9 and has been involved in criminal investigations and missing person cases throughout the midwestern US and Canada. K9 Maple and I are also part-time employees of the Mackinac Island Historic State Park Airport, helping in avian and wildlife deterrence and control. K9 Maple may be also utilized in an educational or outreach capacity.

Most recently, K9 Maple and I have been asked by the Michigan Pollinator Initiative (Michigan State University) to develop a specialized program focusing on training dogs to detect a bacteria that causes American Foul Brood disease. AFB has been implicated in killing honey bees around the world for over a decade. Because she had to medically retire in May following bilateral elbow surgery, this is a perfect segue for us to start a new chapter while providing a needed service. The project will end with me writing a manual on how-to-train-an-AFB-detection-canine that will be published and distributed through Michigan State University Extension.

Attachment 1 is included and shows the activity and events that K9 Handler Stejskal and K9 Maple and K9 Woody completed in 2023.

PROJECTED BUDGET:

This part-time position is for a civilian (non-sworn) K9 handler (and certified PSTC) that will provide scheduled and unscheduled deployments as the PSTC team as available.

Acquisition Costs

The cost to purchase a trained PSTC from a private vendor can exceed \$10,000, but in this case there is no cost as K9 Handler Stejskal will provide an already trained and certified working canine(s).

Other Costs

All costs purchasing feed, veterinary medications and services, training equipment and costs associated with training, certification, and travel are covered by K9 Handler Stejskal (Attachment 1).

Salary

The total annual amount for salary is \$620. This is based on an hourly deployment rate of \$20/hour and an estimated 2 hours per month for routine Officer/Employee Wellness Visits (8 months) and \$20/hour for a projected 15 hours for educational and outreach programs.

The US Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) does stipulate that a K9 handler be compensated for daily care and training of a police K9 or for a K9 used as a department resource. FLSA does allow a different rate of pay for canine care, taking 30 minutes a day to complete. Based on a hourly rate of \$5 for canine care (\$2.50 per day) for 8 months (240 days) of the year, the canine care salary is \$600 per year.

The combined deployment and canine care salary is estimated to be \$1220 per year.

Potential Offsets

Many law enforcement departments offset the costs of a PSTC team through donations from private citizens and/or community foundations. With a modest annual budget and a potential grant from the Mackinac Island Community Foundation, there should be little to no cost to the city or the police department.

CONCLUSIONS

This proposal is being submitted to secure a part-time civilian police service therapy canine handler position with the Mackinac Island Police Department. The PSTC team would provide animal-assisted interactions for employee wellness and to provide opportunities for education and department outreach. Because much of the inherent costs associated with a certified PST canine are provided by K9 Handler Stejskal, the rest of the funding could come from private and public (community) donations making this a low cost, yet very valuable resource.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND OUTCOMES

So far 2023 has been a busy year for K9 Maple and K9 Sheriff Woody. Both dogs have been involved in a total of over 100 events/deployments and interacting with many people.

Some of the highlights for 2023 are:

- K9 Maple and K9 Sheriff Woody each received their Rally (obedience) Intermediate titles from the American Kennel Club (AKC).
- K9 Maple and K9 Sheriff Woody continue to provide detection work for the St. Joseph County Sheriff's Department Criminal Investigation Unit and the Dive Rescue and Recovery team.
- K9 Maple assists the Mackinac Island State Park airport as a wildlife deterrence K9, helping keep the airport safe.
- K9 Sheriff Woody works as a Police Service Therapy Canine for the Mackinac Island Police Department.
- After an extensive application process and in April, acceptance of a complicated obedience audition video, K9 Woody was accepted as a member of Crisis Response Canines, a national organization whose mission is to provide support for first responders and others after an mass fatality/casualty incident.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND OUTCOMES

So far 2024 has been a different year for K9 Maple and K9 Sheriff Woody. Both dogs have faced profound health challenges, necessitating some changes in service for both dogs. The following table provides the highlights for the first half of 2024.

Some of the highlights for 2024 so far are:

- K9 Maple and K9 Sheriff Woody provided detection work for the St. Joseph County Sheriff's Department Criminal Investigation Unit and the Dive Rescue and Recovery team up through May.
- K9 Maple had to medically retire as a human remains detection (HRD) K9 following her bilateral elbow surgery in mid-May.
- Due to time commitments and Maple having to retire, both dogs and I retired from the St. Joseph County Sheriff's Department in May.
- K9 Sheriff Woody continues to work as a member of the Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Office Water Safety and Recovery team, with the ability to provide K9 coverage through mutual aid as requested for the St. Joseph County dive team.
- K9 Woody also works as a Police Service Therapy Canine for the Mackinac Island Police Department following annual certification by the United States Police Canine Association.
- K9 Woody is now part of the Disaster Assistance Recovery Team of the Michigan Mortuary Operation Response Team working in canine-assisted intervention and therapy for first responders responding to mass fatality incidents in Michigan.
- K9 Woody also continues as a member of Crisis Response Canines, a national organization whose mission is to provide support for first responders and others after a mass fatality/casualty incidents.

The rest of 2024 and beyond...

- In early 2024, I was contacted by Dr. Meghan Milbrath of the Michigan Pollinator Initiative asking if I could possible train a dog to detect a bacteria that kills honey bees around the world and then write a how-to-train-a-dog-to-do-that manual which will be distributed through Michigan State University Extension. This is an amazing opportunity that could help impact the health of apiculture (bee keeping) around the world. Although there is a small stipend provided through a grant, we are basically volunteering our time and skills to complete this project and assist beekeepers in the future.
- In April, K9 Woody and I were one of about 40 people invited to participate in the National Symposium for the Standards of Goal-Based Canine Interventions held in Atlantic City New Jersey in April. The primary discussion was focused on roles for different types of therapy dogs in

the United States. While some dogs provide basic comfort support for residents in nursing homes, others work in hospitals providing specific highly trained roles in hospitals (such as working with patients in pediatric intensive care units, etc.) or in canine assisted interventions. Because of the varying roles dogs can be used in, there is a need to more clearly define roles and different training, certification, and performance requirements of each type of "therapy dog". This is an exciting opportunity for us to help shape the future roles of canine-assisted intervention or therapy dogs.

UTILIZATION OF FUNDING

The funds provided by the Sturgis Kennel Club for health insurance for both dogs has been greatly appreciated and unfortunately utilized a lot in 2024.

In January, Woody ingested a foreign object that resulted in emergency surgery. Following his recovery, he returned to service. The following table describes the utilization of both dogs in the first half of 2024.

In February, Maple started to exhibit some abnormal signs that caused concern. Following several biopsies, Maple was determined to be clear of cancer. However, over the past few years, Maple demonstrated on-and-off lameness after large area searches. We had been addressing those episodes, but after a large cold case search, it became apparent this was not going to go away with rest and anti-inflammatory therapy. In April, we were able to have more testing done and found that Maple had likely injured both elbows (and broke two toes) in the past few years. She is one of those dogs who has more drive to work over sense and looking back, I believe she may have done this a few years ago. The result was bilateral arthroscopic elbow surgery followed by a strict 8-week recovery period (crate and minimal walking), and then a slow return to 'normal'. Fortunately, the bee bacteria detection project came at the right time, allowing her to continue to serve, but in a more confined and slower fashion.

The medical insurance provided by the Sturgis Kennel Club has allowed both K9s Maple and Woody continue to serve locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally.

<u>2024 ANNUAL REPORT</u>

December 2024

Welcome,

The following report details the activities of Mackinac Marine Rescue (MMR) over the last year. The MMR crew continues to train hard to meet the needs of the Straits community. The passion for community service among this crew is humbling.

The MMR season started with the rescue of two gentlemen who had been kayaking off the northern shores of St. Ignace. The call came in with only a vague location. Daylight was just beginning to fade. The water temperatures were in the low 50s. We, and they, got lucky. We found one swamped, but empty, kayak and worked our way toward shore following the wind and waves quickly locating the two. Once onboard, they were treated for serious hypothermia. The crew jumped into action to get them as dry as possible and warming up. The boaters had spent nearly an hour in the cold water. I don't think they would have lasted much longer. Both kayaks fully sank and were never recovered.

On a rough and windy day, we received a call for an overturned boat near Devil's Kitchen. With emergency crews on shore giving us a precise location, the U.S. Coast Guard 29' boat, Shepler's ferry, and MMR all arrived on scene at the same time. Working together, all three boats retrieved the 5 victims and their dog safely and coordinated their return to shore in St. Ignace. All were in good shape. USCG, emergency response on the Island, and MMR coordinated to collect and return as much of the boater's personal property as possible.

Of all the runs we had last summer, none hit the crew, and the community, harder than the drowning of Mari Dyer. Many of the crew knew her personally. I have gone over that run many, many times in my mind and I do not see anything we could have done differently to have reached a good outcome. Everyone did everything they were trained to do to the best of their ability. It was truly a tragedy. I never want to look in another family member's eyes again and apologize for not being able to answer the question "Why?"

The 68 runs and the long hours of training performed by MMR last season are a testament to the community service commitment of this crew. The crew continues to work to learn new skills and sharpen the old training.

As always, we are thankful for the support of the Council, local community, and that of the larger Straits region.

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Year in Review

Medical Evacuations (MEDEVAC):

MEDEVAC responses continue to be an important part of MMR's mission. During the summer of 2024, MMR conducted 37 MEDEVAC missions up 54% from the past year. Working with the Mackinac Island Medical Center we assisted in the transfer of medical and trauma patients to a higher level of care on the mainland. An integrated system of patients, physicians, nurses, EMS, and MMR staff all worked together for the most efficient and best transport for the patient. MMR received critical calls from Bois Blanc Island Fire/EMS again this summer requesting transportation to the mainland for 911 calls when flights were unavailable.

Search and Rescue (SAR):

MMR responded to 13 search and rescue missions that were called into 911. This is a 333% increase over the past year. The SAR missions MMR responded to this season were related to boats aground, drowning victims, adrift vessels and missing swimmers.



Assists Other Agencies:

On 21 separate occasions Mackinac Marine Rescue was called to assist other agencies during 2024. Events MMR supported: Mackinac Island's Fourth of July fireworks and Labor Day Bridge Walk.

MMR continued to be an asset to the community as we regularly returning EMS and police personnel to the island after they had escorted patients to the mainland on the last boat. Thanks to this assistance, EMTs and officers serve Mackinac Island for the remainder of the night. MMR has also assisted Mackinac County's 911 and Emergency Management.

Chemical, Biological, Radiological, Nuclear and High Yield Explosives Detection (CBRNE):

Mackinac Marine Rescue was initially funded by a FEMA port security grant. Part of the grant required the boat be equipped with hazardous materials screening equipment and the crew be trained in its use. MMR met these expectations with random, passive screening of vessels and docks while underway this summer. MMR acted as a PRND (Preventive Radiological Nuclear Detection) screening vessel during the Mackinac Bridge Labor Day walk in 2024. Being able to use the PRND equipment while underway for other missions kept our staff current on its use even with a limited number of events. On July 27th, MMR was asked by Mackinac Island Fire Department to stand by to use the RAD detection equipment for a bomb threat called into the City of Mackinac Island's Community Hall. Fortunately, the threat was false.
Training:

MMR had 23 training sessions with over 45 hours. MMR took advantage of every available opportunity to train and work with our new members including time with our partner, USCG Station St. Ignace. We train to the standards of our United States Coast Guard (USCG) counterparts, and this is a high bar to reach. Training can include docking, cross towing with USCG29, driver training, and search pattern drills among other duties.

With the assistance of Mackinac Island EMS, MMR personnel have renewed their CPR skills and obtained certification in the Stop The Bleed program every other year. In 2024, the team worked with EMS for TECC, Tactical Emergency Casualty Care designed to present a strong foundation of topics, concepts, principles, and skills specific to delivering emergency medical care for patients in a civilian tactical environment. This training was provided by a grant from Mackinac Island Community Foundation.

Partnerships:

Working together and building relationships with our area partners has been a cornerstone of the MMR mission since our inception. We are proud of the relationships we have fostered and how these relationships have improved our team and joint responses. The Mackinac Marine Rescue Team could not be successful without the help and support of our partners.

In addition to the City of Mackinac Island, there are many agencies that assisted in making MMR a successful program. We would especially like to thank the following:

- Mackinac State Historic Parks (Indoor equipment storage)

City of Mackinac Island Resolution for Poverty Exemption

Resolution No. 25-002

WHEREAS, the adoption of guidelines and application for a poverty exemption is required of the Mackinac Island City Council, and

WHEREAS, the principal residence of persons, who the Assessor and Board of Review determines by reason of poverty to be unable to contribute to the public charge, is eligible for exemption in whole or in part from taxation under Public Act 390 of 1994 (MCL 211.7u); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to PA 390 of 1994, the City of Mackinac, Mackinac County adopts the following guidelines for the Board of Review to implement. The guidelines shall include but be limited to the specific income and asset levels of the claimant and all persons residing in the household, including any property tax credit returns, filed in the current or immediately preceding year;

To be eligible, a person shall do all the following on an annual basis:

- 1) Be owner of the occupancy as a principal residence the property for which an exemption is requested.
- 2) File a claim with the Assessor or Board of Review, accompanied by federal and state income tax returns for all persons residing in the principal residence, including any property tax returns filed in the immediately preceding year or in the current year.
- 3) File a claim reporting that the combined assets of all persons do not exceed the overall asset limit of \$20,000. Assets include but are not limited to, real estate other than the principal residence, personal property, motor vehicles, recreational vehicles and equipment, certificates of deposit, savings accounts, checking accounts, stocks, bonds, life insurance, retirement funds, etc.
- 4) Produce a valid driver's license or other form of identification.
- 5) Produce, if requested, a deed, land contract, or other evidence of ownership of the property for which an exemption is requested.
- 6) Meet the federal poverty income guidelines as defined and determined annually by the United States Department of Health and Human Services or alternative guidelines adopted by the governing body providing the alternative guidelines do not provide eligibility requirements less than the federal guidelines.
- 7) The application for an exemption shall be filed after January 1, but one day prior to the last day of the Board of Review. The filing of this claim constitutes an appearance before the Board of Review for the purpose of preserving the right to appeal to the Michigan Tax Tribunal.

The following re the federal poverty income guidelines which are updated annually by the United States Department of Health and Human Services. The annual allowable income includes income for all persons residing in the principal residence.

Accounting for Swimmers:

Start of Race – All athletes start on the Shepler's Dock. We have a dedicated start line. They all have timing chips on their ankles. They will cross the start line and it will record them crossing the start line so we will know every person that starts the race.

During the Race – During the event there are two ways we account for the swimmers. 1) We have checkpoints at periodic swim exits. At these spots we will have chip readers for even more accuracy but manual will still always be our fallback. 2) During the run sections of the course we have medical team members assigned to the areas they run to monitor as they ride their bikes back and forth in the sections. We can always identify the athletes by their number that is assigned to them.

End of the Race – Same as the start. We have a finish line and when they cross it instantly shows them as finished and records their time. We know who has finished and who still needs to. Between knowing who started, who has exited each swim, who is on the runs, and who is finished, we have a great look at the progress of the athletes during the day.

Utilizing Vessels for Safety Purposes:

Each swim will have 1-4 kayaks assigned to it. The number of kayaks depends on the length of the swim and how far into the race that swim is. All swims are about chest deep so swimmers can also stand up. All kayaks will have 1 kayaker onboard with bright shirts or vests to identify themselves and help with the athletes being able to see them. They will line the outer boundary of the course keeping swimmers between them and the shore and correcting anyone off course. They also serve as a sighting line for swimmers since marking buoys will not be anywhere outside of the start and finish of the swim courses (not allowed by the island).

Procedure for an athlete that DNFs:

There are two types of "Do Not Finish" (DNF). Type 1 is an athlete that is physically ok but just chooses not to continue. In this case the athlete knows to find the closest area with race personnel (kayak, swim exit, water stop, medical, volunteer) and give them their timing chip and name and reason for the DNF to report to our staff (director, timer, medical director). If they are in the water and choose to DNF we make

sure they can walk to shore in a safe place and get there (assuming they let us know while they're in the water). Type 2 is a swimmer in distress that DNFs. A swimmer that is in distress is told to wave their arms while floating on their back making some commotion so that our kayaks can get to them and help get them to shore. While this action is occurring the kayak also relays the evac info to our medical director who coordinates a medical crew member meeting them at shore to assess the situation. Obviously if it's very serious the kayaker's first duty is to call 911 or convey to us the severity of the situation so that we can do so. This is also why we have a handful of motorized rescue boats around the Island monitoring the swim course(s). If there is a serious in-water situation and the swimmers needs to quickly get to the harbor and/or mainland to the available EMS, that motorized boat is there to load the swimmer and quickly get them where they need to be. This is all communicated in detail to the kayakers, medical, and motorized boats. In less serious situations we help them to shore and hook them up with medical who handles the situation from there.

Attached is my notarized permit application with course maps and my safety plan. I seek tentative approval from the council, intending to send the permit fee and insurance paperwork shortly after. I expect to have the insurance paperwork this week or next month.
