Madison Township Board Meeting Held in Person and Electronically (Zoom) Minutes of August 12, 2025

7:00 p.m. Board Meeting called to order, with a silent prayer, and pledge to the flag said by all.

ROLL CALL:

All present in person: Bales, Gregg, Moden, Rank, Benschoter, and Rodgers. Absent Schutte, out of town.

AMENDMENTS TO THE AGENDA: None

PETITIONS & COMMUNICATIONS: Clerk Moden noted that there would be an election held on Nov. 4 at the township offices for Madison School District residents only, for a millage proposal.

INTRODUCTION OF SPECIAL GUESTS: None

LIMITED PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS: None

3-MINUTE DEPT. HEAD UPDATES:

Fire: Chief Wilson stated that our new ambulance billing system, EMS has had some bumps in the road getting up and running, a new representative of the EMS system has been assigned to us and we are starting to get things straightened out. The EMS rep is trying to work with Vitalcore, the new Gus Harrison Prison insurer for the State of Michigan owes the township over \$130,000.00 from the last insurer that went bankrupt, and now we are behind an additional \$100,000 in unpaid bills from the State insurer. We have been in touch with our State representatives, as this is a statewide issue with unpaid bills. We are not allowed to stop servicing the prison on 911 calls, just because the bills are not paid. We are asking residents to call their representatives at the State level and complain, because the township residents are now paying for these emergency runs to the prison.

Police: Chief Gentner stated that 22 ordinance violations are now either cited or in court at this time. Officer Bailey will be going to Fire Arms instructor training next week. The SRO grant has been renewed for another 3 years with Sand Creek School System.

Water/Sewer: Watterson stated that new exterior lights had been installed on the DPW building recently. He is currently working on getting pricing for improvement of water and sewer on Carleton Rd between M-52 and Treat Rd. He received and estimated bill for replacement of all water meters. He also stated that most likely a pump station would be needed for sewer between U.S. 223 to Carleton Rd on Treat if improvements were made.

Inspection: Building Official, Rincon reported that permits and inspections have been steady very busy this month in Adrian and Madison townships. Last week there were 34 inspections in Madison township alone, and 45 in Adrian township.

Invited everyone to tour the new additions at the Maurice Spear Campus on September 24, 2025 from 1-2.

Legal: None present

APPROVAL OF CONSENT AGENDA: Motion by Rodgers, supported by Benschoter to approve the consent agenda and previous month's board meeting minutes. Roll call vote: Bales, Yes; Gregg, Yes; Moden, Yes; Rank, Yes; Rodgers, Yes; Benschoter, Yes;. Motion carried 6-0.

OLD BUSINESS/UNFINISHED BUSINESS: None

NEW BUSINESS:

Building Dept. Vehicle Purchase:

In 2024 the Fire Dept. purchased a 2024 GMC pickup truck to use as a replacement ECHO unit for the Dept. but once received it did not meet the qualities needed for this type of unit. The building dept has need to replace the Building Inspectors vehicle, which is in need of major repairs, so the Building Dept will purchase a 2025 Tahoe with the price not to exceed \$56,000 and then exchange vehicles with the Fire Dept. A motion by Rodgers, seconded by Benschoter to approve the sale of the Fire Dept pick up to the Building Dept. for use as Building Inspectors vehicle.

Roll call vote: Bales, Yes; Gregg, Yes; Moden, Yes; Rank, Rodgers, Yes; and Benschoter, Yes. Motion carried 6-0.

Budget Amendment:

Every year we have been paying the County for assessing costs, and it was done every 6 months, but was always 6 months behind schedule due to timing, which created a problem with our budgets from year to year. We have now switched to paying the county annually, but we have to make an adjustment to our 2025 budget numbers to do that.

101-257-822-001 \$4714.67 LCAB - Assessing Costs

Motion by Rodgers, supported by Benschoter to approve this budget amendment to the assessing line item for \$4714.67.

Roll call vote: Bales, Yes; Gregg, Yes; Moden, Yes; Rank, Rodgers, Yes; and Benschoter, Yes. Motion carried 6-0.

ELECTED OFFICIALS' COMMENTS:

Rank: Stated that Heather would be out the rest of this week due to a death in her family.

Bales: Brought up that he appreciated the Committee of the Whole that allowed the board members to get vital information about issues such as the problems with the truck the Fire Dept purchased and it would give the board the opportunity to go over the specs before it is ordered if needed.

Rodgers: Stated that the planning commission has been looking at the Master Plan, and it seems that the Land Use Plan is not considered a Master Plan, but that the commission is still going to evaluate the current Land Use Plan going forward. Tim Watterson, DPW asked to be also included in the meeting regarding this evaluation of the Land Plan.

AUDIENCE COMMENTS:

Resident William Gira questioned why no one had been in contact with him regarding the results of his signed complaint regarding another township resident. He also stated that the microphones in front of the board members did not work well, and the audience cannot hear or understand some of people on the board when they speak. Other residents in attendance also agreed that the microphone was not being used adequately.

Residents, Mr./Mrs. John Hickman from Fairlawn Ave, expressed that they had seen some improvement in the ordinance compliance since there have been more citations written in their neighborhood, but the neighbors errant chickens are still an issue for them.

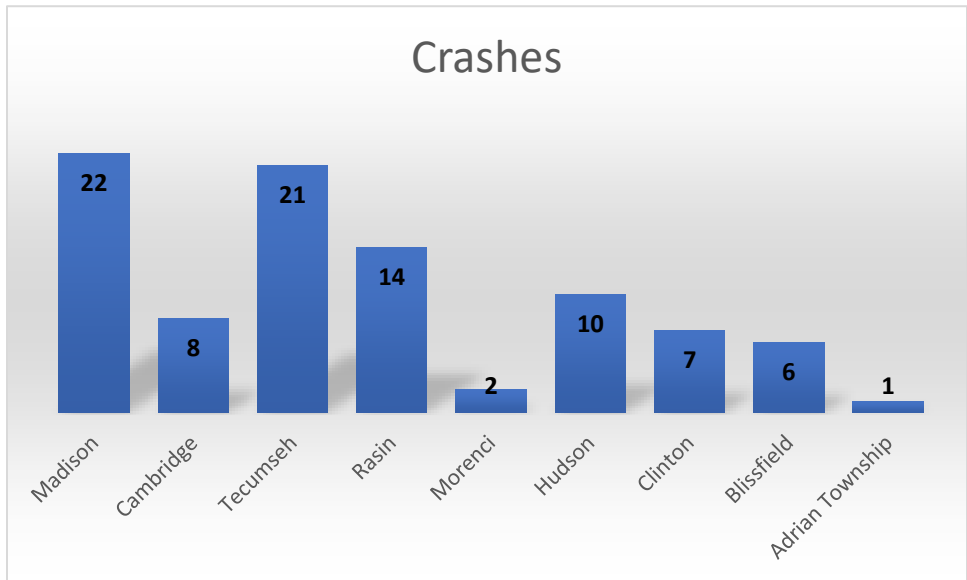
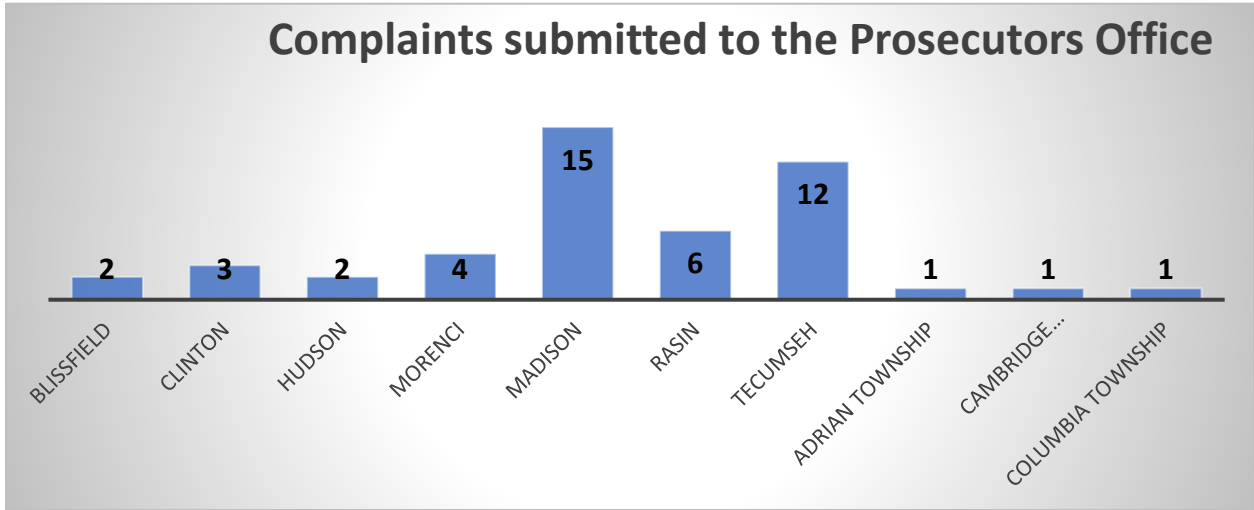

August Board Report



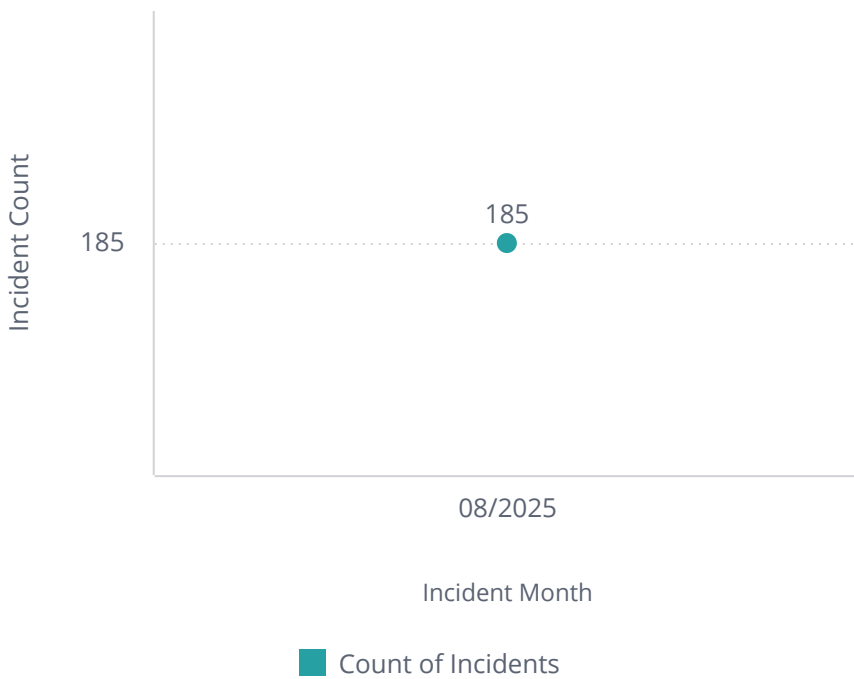
Total Number of Incidents



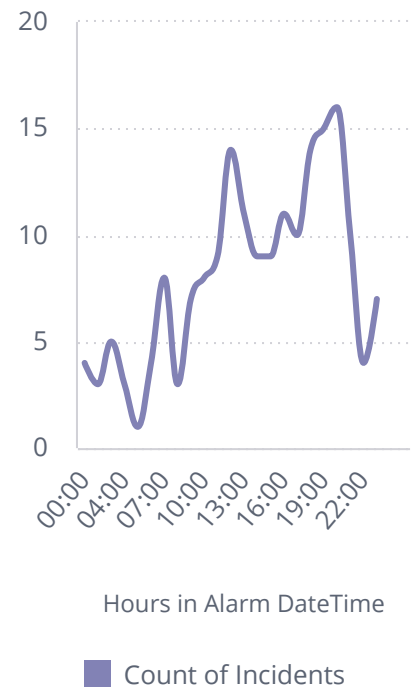
Average Time on Scene



Incident Trend



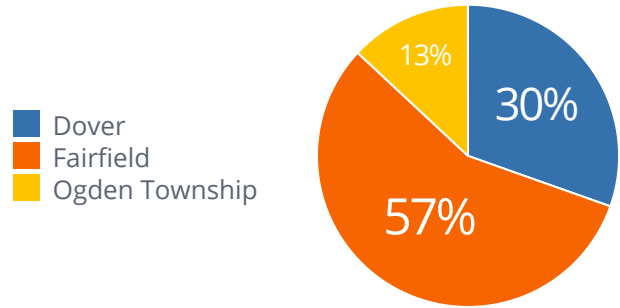
Time of Incidents



Percent of Incident Responses by Incident Type



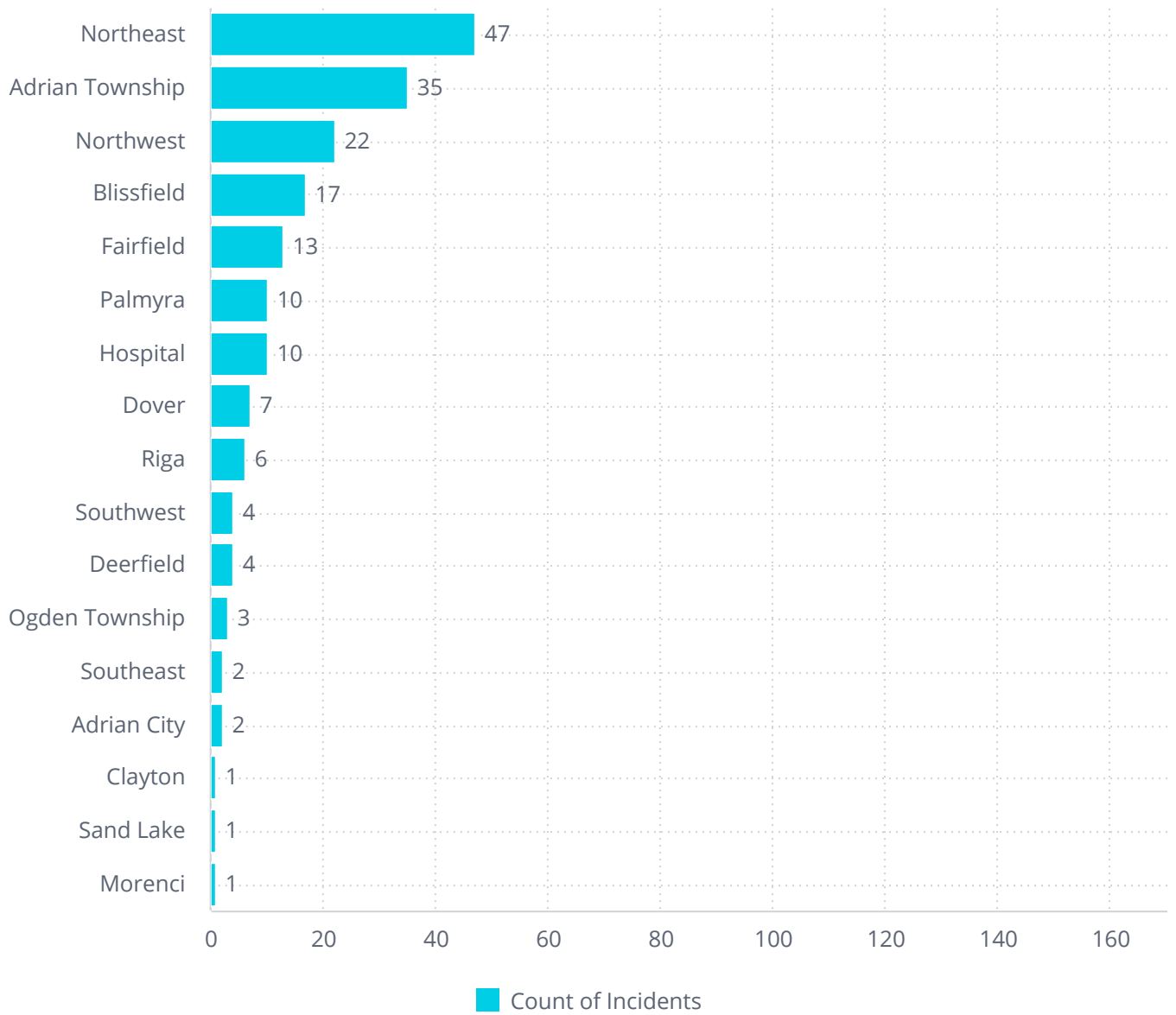

- Sewer usage for the month of August was 10.4 million gallons.
- Water usage for Fairfield Twp. for the month of August was 1.3 million gallons.

- Miss Digs for the month of August was (78). All Miss Digs were reviewed and serviced as needed.
- Water meters were read, and all work orders were completed.
- All sewer reads for the month of July were submitted to the City of Adrian.
- Lift stations and generators were inspected for the month of August.
- Monthly operating report submitted to EGLE.
- Backwashing of iron filter as necessary.
- Monthly Drinking water sampling has been completed.
- Wastewater discharge sampling at water treatment plant.

Communications

- 1.) The water and sewer committee met on August 22nd, 2025, at 9am in the conference room. Public works presented quotes for a new line locator for marking out underground utilities, committee recommended purchase at a cost of \$5,700 from Batco. 2.) reviewed quotes for new fire hydrants that were never installed from unfinished development in the woodland hills subdivision, committee recommended purchase at \$7,700 from Michigan pipe and valve. 3.) special guest from plastic omnium- Mobility on W. Beecher, requesting credit for water that was supplied to facility and gets lost to evaporation and does not enter the sanitary sewer. Public works will work with the facility maintenance personnel and select a meter that measures sewer flow leaving the facility.
- The Department of public works will be flushing fire hydrants and water mains beginning on September 17th, 2025, flushing will continue until October 24th 2025. Residents are reminded to check cold water for clarity prior to washing light colored clothing.

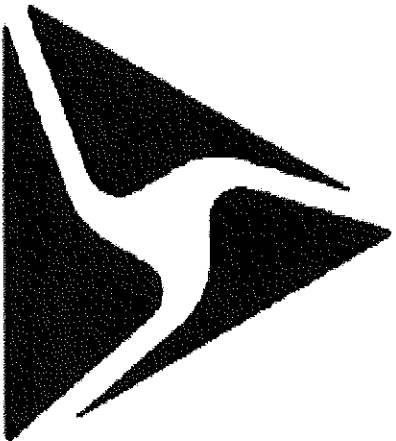

ORDINANCE NO. _____**

At a regular meeting of the Township Board of Madison Charter Township, Lenawee County, Michigan, held at the Madison Charter Township Hall on _____, 2025, at _____ p.m., Township Board Member _____ moved to adopt the following Ordinance, which motion was seconded by Township Board Member _____:

An Ordinance to amend Madison Charter Township Ordinance No. 35 to provide additional regulations promoting the health, safety, and welfare of the people of Madison Charter Township by regulating the use of public property, prohibiting harassment, and regulating conduct during public meetings.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF MADISON ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment to Add Sections 8 Through 13. Madison Charter Township Ordinance No. 35 shall be amended to add the following as sections 8 through 13 and the remainder of the existing ordinance shall be recodified to follow:

Section 8. Uses and Occupation of Public Property.

A. Hours of Operation. Except as stated in subsection (2) of this Section, the Township Board shall have full discretion and authority to provide for the normal hours of operation of public property.

B. Closure by a Township Official. Public property may be declared closed to the public by any person with authorization under Section 13 of this Ordinance at any time and for any interval of time, either temporarily or at regular stated intervals (daily or otherwise), either entirely or merely for specific uses, as deemed reasonably necessary for the interests of public safety.

C. Use and Occupation of Public Property. It shall be a violation of this Ordinance for any person to use or occupy public property unless the property is officially open to the general public or said person has or is a part of a group that has a permit or permission of the Township Supervisor to be on a closed portion of the public property.

D. Public Property Defined. For the purposes of this Ordinance, “public property” shall mean all parks, playgrounds, cemeteries, nature areas, parking areas, transfer stations, and public property which are owned or otherwise controlled by the Township, together with public bodies of water within or adjacent to such lands and buildings and roads, parking areas, and bicycle paths serving such property.

Section 9. Violent Acts on Public Property. It shall be a violation of this section for any person to engage in any fight or quarrel on public property, regardless of which participant in the fight or quarrel initiated such fight or quarrel.

Section 10. Loitering on Public Property.

A. Generally. No person shall loiter on public property in such a manner as to:

1. Intentionally and unreasonably create, or cause to be created, a danger or breach of the peace;
2. Intentionally and unreasonably obstruct the free passage of pedestrians, Township staff and personnel, or vehicles;
3. Intentionally and unreasonably obstruct, assault, intimidate, or interfere with any person lawfully in any public place of the Township; or
4. Follow another person in or about a public place with the intent and effect of harassing, annoying, or alarming another person and in such a way that would have the effect of harassing, annoying, or alarming a reasonable person.

B. Requests to Leave. Whenever the presence of any person in any public place is causing any of the conditions enumerated in subsection (A) of this section, the person rightfully in charge of the public place, and including at all times for all public places, the Township Supervisor, or any person given authority to enforce this ordinance under Section 13 may order that person to leave that place. Any person who shall refuse to leave after being ordered to do so shall be in violation of this Ordinance.

Section 11. Harassment.

A. Harassment Prohibited. It shall be a violation of this Section for any person, with intent to harass, annoy, or alarm another person, to:

1. Follow a person in or about a public place; or
2. Engage in a course of conduct or repeatedly commit acts that alarm, disturb, or annoy a reasonable person.

B. Harassment Defined. For the purposes of this Ordinance, harassment shall be defined as repeated nonverbal conduct which is specifically intended to frighten, embarrass, or anger the person or persons who are the object of such conduct or which the person accused has reason to know is likely to produce such reactions, or as any verbal communication which, by its very utterance, breaches the peace by disrupting, disturbing, or impeding orderly conduct.

Section 12. Prohibited Conduct in Public Meetings. The Township hereby prohibits the following conduct during the course of any public meeting. For the purposes of this

Ordinance, public meeting shall mean any meeting conducted by the Township pursuant to the Open Meetings Act.

1. Any behavior that could or does deface, vandalize, or damage the Township’s equipment, materials, furniture, or other real or personal property;
2. Physical or verbal abuse, fighting, harassment, or threatening behavior;
3. Engaging in illegal behavior, such as but not limited to harassment;
4. Intentional and unreasonable loud disturbances or other disruptive behavior;
5. Consuming illegal drugs or alcohol or acting under the influence of illegal drugs or alcohol;
6. Smoking, vaping, use of e-cigarettes, chewing, and the use of tobacco or marihuana; and
7. Soliciting or panhandling without prior notification to and approval from the Township Supervisor.

Section 13. Enforcement. It shall be the responsibility of the Madison Charter Township Board, the Township Supervisor, or its designee, and the Madison Township Police Department to enforce the terms of this Ordinance, together with the authority to institute proceedings for injunction, mandamus, abatement, or other appropriate remedies to prevent, enjoin, abate, or remove any violations of this Ordinance.

Section 2. Severability. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby declared severable. If any part of this Ordinance is declared invalid for any reason by a court of competent jurisdiction, that declaration does not affect or impair the validity of all other provisions that are not subject to that declaration.

Section 3. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take immediate effect after publication of a notice of adoption of this Ordinance in the local newspaper.
