City Hall Closure


- To ensure the safety of staff and visitors, City Hall is temporarily closed after disturbed tiles and materials were discovered that were later confirmed to contain asbestos.
- These materials are located in the building's boiler room, which also contains air-handling equipment.
- The City is working with experts to conduct testing throughout the building.
- It is estimated that testing and any subsequent remediation will require City Hall to remain closed throughout the month of May.
- Staff continue to provide services virtually or from alternate facilities during this time and there will be no change to Police or Public Works response.



Annual Boards & Commissions Recruitment Underway



Bike Skills Area-Update

Design and Construction

- Staff and American Ramp Company are preparing to submit for permits later this month.
- Volunteer opportunities to assist with removing old vegetation and other work to prepare the site for construction will be announced soon.
- We are still targeting a late summer/early fall construction window.

Safety on ICP Trails

- Safety improvements on 84th Ave SE are being designed by the City's Transportation Engineer and greenlighted for completion later this spring.
- The Parks Operations team is also coordinating vegetation trimming to improve trailhead sight lines on 84th Ave SE.
- Staff started conducting trail usage counts to establish a baseline for pedestrian, biking, and other trail uses. More counts will be conducted before the new facility opens.

SUMMARY

PURPOSE

The purpose of this agenda item is to provide the Parks and Recreation Commission and community with an annual update of operations at the King County Library System (KCLS) Mercer Island Branch, and to continue to provide a forum for the Mercer Island community to engage KCLS. The presentation will be focused on 2022 operations and what services to expect in 2023 at the Mercer Island branch of KCLS.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of the Parks & Recreation Commission is to serve in a policy advisory capacity to the City Council and any other board or commission of the city on matters involving the Mercer Island parks system, recreation programming, and the Mercer Island Community & Event Center.

Additionally, pursuant to MICC 3.53.020 and included in the various duties and responsibilities of the Parks and Recreation Commission is to "provide a forum for the community to express their views regarding library services on Mercer Island and serve in an advisory capacity to the King County Library System."

KCLS provided their previous annual update to the Parks and Recreation Commission on March 3, 2022.

DISCUSSION

Ahead of the meeting, city staff provided KCLS staff with a broad set of questions (Exhibit 1) submitted by commissioners to assist in the development and presentation of this annual update. Tonight, KCLS staff will utilize those questions to present current library services and plans for 2023.

Parks and Recreation Commission Questions

(May 4, 2023)

*City staff solicited questions from the Parks and Recreation Commission and forwarded the following on to KCLS staff ahead to help inform on information to be presented.

I. Review of the Past Year

- a. At the March '22 Park & Recreation Commission ("PRC"), Director Rosenblum provided feedback on the following topics:
 - i. Outreach In the slide presentation, it was mentioned that the Mayor and City Council receive regular e-mail updates from KCLS.
 - 1. Are these e-mails different or separate in content to what is sent to Library patrons or the general public?
 - a. If so, is there any reason why those updates cannot be provided to interested community members?
 - ii. Hours The executive director indicated they needed to look at data, etc. Can KCLS provide what data has been reviewed?
 - iii. Scheduling It was mentioned by a KCLS staffer that a part of the scheduling process was to determine what services were most important to the specific library.
 - 1. How is the relative importance of various services determined?
 - 2. What input has been obtained or received from the community on these service offerings?
- b. Provide a data table like last year so the PRC can gain a better understanding of community usage patterns:
 - i. Patron traffic for the Mercer Island Library (by day and month) for the years 2021 & 2022.
 - 1. How do these activity levels compare to the system overall?
- c. What improvements have been made in the past year to the MI Library in terms of:
 - i. facilities,
 - ii. technology,
 - iii. programs,
 - 1. Summer Reading Program What was the participation rate at the MI Library?
 - iv. circulation,
 - 1. During COVID, the turn time on holds and the recirculation of books was increased due to additional safety measures. The 1/6/23 Director's Blog posting suggests of a "Lean Library Project" to reduce turnaround time of materials. A priori, are there quantifiable goals for this project in terms of turn times?

- v. safety,
 - 1. Has the MI Library had any reported incidents in the past year that could have affected staff and patron safety?
- vi. operating hours,
 - 1. Pre-Covid, the MI Library was open 7 days a week for a total of 63 hours.
 - 2. In December '22, the MI Library is open 6 days a week for a total of 42 hours (67% of pre-Covid)
 - 3. In its' 2023 list of strategic objectives, KCLS endeavors to increase operating hours by 26%, or about nine add'l hours for the MI Library
 - a. Please comment on the plans for the MI Library considering this objective
 - 4. A 2022 community survey compiled by Mercer Island high school students showed that residents strongly preferred that the MI Library should be open on Saturday
- vii. staffing levels any changes?
- viii. volunteer opportunities the Mercer Island community has a long history of volunteerism, and what's the status of a volunteer program, and is there an intent to expand/change?
- d. Describe the types of outreach efforts that have been employed to inform patrons of various library activities, e.g., programs, events, etc.
 - i. What has been successful (and how do you define success)?
- e. Has KCLS undertaken any "customer satisfaction" surveys, and if so, what are the results?
 - i. It was noted in a 5/6/22 e-mail from John Sheller to the City that such a survey was in the planning stages.
 - ii. In that same e-mail it was noted that KCLS "gathers feedback from our virtual outlets such as social media sites ..." Are there examples of how that feedback is then incorporated into policy or procedures?

II. Looking to the next year or two.....

- a. What types of improvements (see above for list) can the Mercer Island community expect to see at the MI Library?
- b. The City of Mercer Island is developing a Climate Action Plan that includes a strategy to respond to climate emergencies to protect residents from climate impacts (such as additional cooling centers and air shelters).
 - i. KCLS has designated several libraries as "cooling centers" when extreme heat is forecasted for its service area.
 - 1. What are the criteria for such a designation, and can the MI Library expect to qualify?

- c. Similarly, the MI Library has emergency generator capacity that would be useful when in the event of a large-scale electrical outage the MI Library could be made available for re-charging of phones, tablets, etc.
- d. Can you please suggest the ways the City of Mercer Island and community residents can help KCLS to make the MI Library better?

III. Questions From the Community

- a. Many community members have commented that it's difficult to get to know staff as they do not seem to stay very long. Please comment on how staff are placed at locations, and how they are rotated.
- b. When will the monthly Board of Trustee meetings be recorded for the community to watch on Youtube or some other streaming service. It's sometimes difficult to be available to watch live (or in-person) on the fourth Wednesday of the month. As an aside, the City of Mercer Island makes available its City Council meetings as well as several boards and commissions on Youtube for viewing.
- c. When a library patron submits a request to KCLS for the acquisition of a particular book or magazine title, what is the process that KCLS goes through to evaluate that request?
 - i. How many requests does KCLS receive in a year, and how many are approved?





The River That Made Seattle

Tuesday, March 28th at 6:00 pm

Presented by BJ Cummings

For adults.

Attendance: 45

Once teeming with bountiful salmon and fertile plains, Seattle's Duwamish River drew both Native peoples and settlers to its shores over centuries for trading, transport, and sustenance. Unfortunately, the very utility of the river was its undoing, as decades of dumping led to the river being declared a Superfund cleanup site.

Much of Washington's history has been told through the perspective of its colonizers, obscuring and mythologizing the changes to these lands that have long been occupied by Native peoples. Through the story of the river, author BJ Cummings explores previously unrecorded Native and immigrant histories, and exposes settler falsehoods about the founding of the state. The river's story is a call to action to align future decisions with values of collaboration, respect, and justice.



SUMMARY

The purpose of this staff report is to conclude the 30% design development process by the Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) for the Aubrey Davis Trail Safety Improvement Project. And for the PRC to approve a memo which will convey its recommendation to the City Council.

BACKGROUND

In December 2019 the City Council approved the Aubrey Davis Park Master Plan and directed the City Manager and PRC to develop a recommendation for the use of a \$500,000 Department of Commerce Grant for trail safety improvements in the park. Over the past 3 years the PRC has engaged the community and developed a recommendation.

Engagement, input, and resolution about 30% design elements occurred at the following meetings:

- April 7, 2022: The PRC reviewed public input from the online open house and survey in February 2022 and provided initial direction on the 30% design to the design team at KPG Psomas.
- June 2, 2022: The PRC reviewed a 30% preliminary design presented by the design team. The focus of the discussion was on the restroom and 72nd Ave overpass area. The PRC agreed that most of the West Mercer Way improvements were a lower priority and that the trail intersection at the 72nd Ave overpass was a higher priority. PRC also discussed the extent of additional impervious surfacing, the effect of concrete versus asphalt paving in changing user behavior, and the effectiveness of placemaking elements in reducing trail user conflicts.
- <u>July 7, 2022:</u> The PRC reviewed revisions to the 30% design. Revisions were mostly focused on the ballfield/restroom area and included reducing amenities, reducing pavement areas and increasing the diameter of a potential roundabout with grass or vegetation in the center.

- <u>September 1, 2022:</u> The design team went over a range of project details and addressed them in
 discussion with PRC. The PRC provided consensus on a proposed recommendation which evolved
 from recommending a specific 30% design to recommending that the 30% design proceed to 60%
 design, with PRC review at the conclusion of that design phase. Outstanding design issues were
 enumerated for additional review in the 60% design phase. The revision of the draft recommendation
 memo was turned over to a subcommittee for drafting.
- January 5, 2023: Between the September and January meetings, WSDOT provided the City its review of the potential roundabout design. As a result, staff presented PRC with two roundabout options for the 72nd Overpass trail intersection. Option 1, the larger roundabout with a 14' travel way and a prominent 16' diameter center island, was preferred by WSDOT and presented as the staff recommendation. Option 2, the smaller roundabout, had a 12' travel way and an at-grade 10' diameter concrete center. The PRC had many concerns about both options and asked staff to provide alternatives at its next meeting before recommending a 30% design.
- March 2, 2023: Staff returned with 3 options for the PRC to review. The PRC voted to include Option 3, improving the existing intersection, for the 72nd Overpass trail intersection in the 30% design. Staff agreed to present the PRC a complete 30% design package at its next meeting (tonight) which would include elements the PRC provided direction on.

THE TRANSMITTAL PACKAGE

The 30% design plans (Exhibit 1) have been updated from the version that was last reviewed at the <u>September 1, 2022</u> to include Option 3 components as directed by the PRC. The PRC's transmittal memo (Exhibit 2) provides City Council with an overview of the PRC's considerations in recommending this design concept. The agenda bill for City Council that accompanies the plans and memo will provide additional background information to document the design process. Included with this will be the most current construction cost estimate for the project (Exhibit 3).

NEXT STEPS

Once the design is approved by the PRC, City staff will work with the chair to transmit the memo to the City Council at its May 16 meeting. The Design Team will then develop the 60% design and, if directed by the City Council, return to the PRC in Q3 2023 for 60% design review. The project was originally scheduled to construct in spring 2023; however, construction is now expected to begin in fall 2023 or later.

RECOMMENDED ACTION

- 1. Approve the 30% design recommendation and;
- 2. Approve the transmittal memo and authorize the chair to submit the memo and recommendation to City Council.



The Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) presents our recommendation on the Aubrey Davis Park Trail Safety Improvements 30% Design.

Summary Recommendation:

Our recommendation is to proceed to a 60% Design phase with further review by the Parks and Recreation Commission at the conclusion of that phase.

The PRC commenced review of this matter on April 7, 2022 and discussed the topic over six meetings. The project design team collected public input through a virtual open house held on February 17, 2022 and an online survey conducted from February 17 to March 17, 2022, as well as public comments received via the project page on Let's Talk, emails, and from speakers at Commission meetings. The open house was attended by 24 people, and survey responses were received from 86 participants. This input from interested citizens and user groups was presented to the PRC for consideration before and during the course of its deliberations.

The 30% Design provides significant improvements to the intersections at the 72nd Avenue underpass area and the ballfield/restroom area intended to reduce speeds, channelize cross-trail traffic and alert all users to the "mixing zone" they are entering. The 30% design also includes minor signage, pavement markings and wayfinding at other intersections along the I-90 trail throughout the Lid Park.

Project Priorities:

The design prioritizes improvements that will directly enhance trail safety and focuses major improvements at the ballfield/restroom area, which is a critical area of concern.

Focus on safety

The PRC initially considered a suite of improvements that were collected from public input. With the limited budget, the PRC chose to prioritize improvements that would directly enhance safety. The utility of other improvements such as benches, kiosks, and pull-out areas was not as clear.

Focus on the ballfield/restroom and 72nd Ave. underpass areas

The initial design included substantial improvements at the West Mercer Way crossing. The PRC concluded that these improvements, while potentially useful, were not as critical to trail safety as the improvements proposed for the ballfield/restroom area and the 72nd Avenue underpass area. The PRC concluded that the project should focus trail improvements in those areas. In particular, the importance of safety enhancements at the entrance to the ballfield/restroom area, at the 72nd Avenue underpass, was identified as key to controlling traffic flow <u>before</u> trail users enter the "mixing zone" near the restroom.

Using concrete pavement to better define the ballfield/restroom mixing zone will further signal the need to be alert to the areas where park users enter the trail. Installation of low-level fencing will channel pedestrians to marked crossings and improve predictability for pedestrians and cyclists.

Several different options for the 72nd Ave. underpass area were considered over multiple Commission meetings. In addition to staff analysis and citizen input, the Commission solicited and received information and testimony from the Washington State Dept. of Transportation (WSDOT), the owner of the property.

On March 2, 2023, the Commission considered three options – two options contained concrete roundabouts and one option did not. WSDOT noted that all three options were acceptable. The Commission voted in favor of the option without a roundabout given that there is no evidence that a traffic feature of this magnitude is needed at this time. The preferred option features improved sight lines by removing vegetation, increases awareness with signage and pavement markings, and restores trail shoulders.

The recommended design improves safety, with the smallest increase in impervious surface, and lowest cost. Although City staff and the design consultant favored a roundabout model for the 72nd Ave. underpass area, they concur that the option the Commission chose will improve the safety at this trail intersection. The Commission notes that if trail usage increases, and if evidence indicates that a roundabout feature would further improve the safety of the area, this may be considered in future years.

Stay within the available budget:

While budget decisions are ultimately the City Council's responsibility, trying to stay within budget as much as possible, while still including meaningful safety improvements, was a factor considered by the Commissioners.

Other Considerations:

On June 2, the PRC and the Mercer Island Arts Council held a joint meeting and discussed opportunities to integrate art and/or placemaking elements into the project that would be consistent with the Aubrey

Davis Park Master Plan. The PRC understands that placemaking elements incorporated into the trail could foster more considerate behaviors among trail users but also wants any features to be compatible with the park's natural landscape, including employing judicious selection of themes and colors. These recommendations will be transmitted to the Arts Council to further inform their discussions of how to use the project's 1% for Art in Public Places contribution (approximately \$3,500).

Conclusion:

We look forward to seeing this project advance to 60% Design and request the opportunity to provide our recommendation at the completion of that phase.



Aubrey Davis Park Trail Improvements




