South Mercer Playfield Project

- The City and School District are working on joint project. With MISD as the project Manager.
- The project began in early July with completion scheduled for November.
- The project focuses on converting field #3 and field #4 to synthetic turf and installing lights, as well as replacing turf on fields #1 and #2.
- Light poles have been installed and the turf will arrive next week!

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Luther Burbank South Shoreline Project



- 2 year project which started in 2022, and will complete in 2023.
- The previous trail connecting the swim beach area and dock area was eroding.
- We had anticipated significant progress this summer, however key staff moved into new positions, leaving this project without field leadership.
- And then the rains came...or will come. During the rainy season we will postpone work until April 2023.
- Significant elements of this project include in-water work to enhance fish habitat, this work will need to take place in the summer during the "fish window".
- This project is entirely funded by grants and the King County Parks Levy.
- The current trail is still open.

Bike Skills Area Update

- Chair McCarthy, Vice Chair Struck and Commissioner Burstein participated in RFQ interview with staff
- American Ramp Company (ARC) chosen as consultant, great depth of experience in designing bike parks
- ARC is partnering with Board & Vellum, who will lead landscape architecture and public outreach components
- Staff held kickoff meeting with consultant team this week to begin work on project parameters for design and public engagement strategy
- Surveyor has completed topographic and tree survey of Deane's Children's Park; will deliver to City 10/7/22
- White dots DO NOT indicate a planned removal! The white dots identify which trees have been surveyed.
- Staff will perform tree inspections once tree survey has been received, to assess health and identify trees that require pruning or removal to mitigate risk.

Volunteer Coordinator- Jordan Fischer

Seasonal position focused on volunteer management in our natural areas (ends this winter).

From June- Sept 2022 hosted 23 events with 223 volunteers for a total of 586 hours.

Has led **2 Forest Steward Orientation** and established **10 new Forest Stewards** at 4 new locations.


Started a Volunteer Photography position with 5 active photographers.

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










Homecoming Parade

SUMMARY

The City's *Strategy for the Mercer Island Community and Event Center and Recreation Programs and Services* (also known as the Reset Strategy) calls for updating existing or developing new policies to ensure that Parks and Recreation Department actions are consistent with the Reset Strategy.

The purpose of this staff report is to introduce the current *Park Improvement, Gift Acceptance and Donor Recognition Policy* (Exhibit 1) and a revised version (Exhibit 2), which builds on the foundation of the current policy by clarifying language and purpose, while removing procedural elements. A revised *Park Improvement, Gift Acceptance and Donor Recognition Policy* will provide guidance, criteria, and clarity for the solicitation and acceptance of donations, recognitions, and memorials in Mercer Island parks and facilities. Tonight, staff will seek consensus from the Parks and Recreation Commission on elements for a revised policy.

Background

The City of Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department has traditionally welcomed and encouraged support from private individuals and entities to support the programs and services the Department provides to the public. Examples of recent and significant contributions from the community have included park item donations (such as benches and works of art), batting cages at South Mercer Playfields and Island Crest Park, synthetic turf projects at Island Crest Park, the original and newly opened Mercerdale Playground and Luther Burbank Playground, as well as countless donations to various programs and special events including Summer Celebration and Illuminate MI.

Currently the Department has a *Park Improvement, Gift Acceptance and Donor Recognition Policy*, however the current version is out of date, includes intermixed and dated procedures, and has been inconsistently implemented with the boards, community, and staff.

During the establishment of the Reset Strategy, the revision of a number of policies was identified as a priority. A revision to the *Park Improvement, Gift Acceptance and Donor Recognition Policy* is a priority for the

Department, as the recent year has seen numerous requests to donate park assets and projects for community and individual benefit. A revision to this policy will establish criteria and guidelines for receiving proposals, gifts, donor recognition projects and other items that modify park property and appearances. This criterion will assist donors and staff alike in the review of proposals and requests.

Discussion

Tonight, staff requests input on policy elements from the Parks and Recreation Commission as staff seeks to update the policy. The draft and current policies have been provided for comparison. Some key suggested elements contained within the draft revised policy include:

- 1. The City encourages gifts and donations which enhance our park spaces.
- 2. Prohibits memorial donations in the parks and clarifies how and where donors may be recognized.
- 3. Informs that no contingencies may be required by a donor other than for a specific activity or programing area.
- 4. To limit improvements to items that complement the designated location.
- 5. To limit donor recognitions or improvements which alter the character of a space or detract from the characteristics of our parks.
- 6. Removal of procedural elements from the policy.
- 7. Updating language to meet the standards of the Department and to be inclusive of Staff and Commission roles.

To assist in discussion, please consider the following questions:

- 1. Should the Department accept donations- including monetary, project based, artistic, and/or equipment?
- 2. Are there donations, gifts, or projects that should be more strongly clarified for rejection within the policy?
- 3. Do you agree that memorials should be prohibited in parks?
- 4. Do you agree that corporate donors who have a corporate sponsorship requirement should fall under a separate policy?
- 5. Does the Commission agree with the policy elements?

Next Steps

- 1. Staff will consider Commission input tonight and refine an updated draft policy.
- 2. Staff will present a revised policy at the November 3 meeting for Commission review and endorsement.
- 3. Once endorsed, Staff will begin development on procedures to accompany the policy.
- 4. Staff will implement the policy and communicate opportunities for donations and gifts.
- 5. Staff anticipates developing (in collaboration with the Commission) additional supporting policies such as:
 - a. Facility Dedications and Naming Rights
 - b. Corporate Sponsorships and Recognition

<u>Purpose</u>

The City of Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department welcomes and encourages support from private individuals and entities that support the programs and services the Department and its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils, and groups provide to the public.

The purpose of this policy is to establish criteria and guidelines for receiving and considering proposals to initiate funded, partially funded, or unfunded capital projects, including gift and donor recognition projects, park asset donations, or to undertake changes to a park property that will in the judgment of the director, modify the property's use, appearance, or overall aesthetics.

Definitions

- I. <u>Parks and Recreation Department</u> consists of the Park Maintenance Division and Recreation Division within the Public Works Department under the direction of the Chief of Operations (director).
- II. <u>Assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils, or groups</u> are any working or advisory board or committee created by City Council action or initiated by the Mayor or City Manager's Office and assigned to or administratively supported by the Parks and Recreation Department.
- III. <u>Gifts</u> are all gifts, bequests, or donations to include but not be limited to endowments, real property, structures, or portions of structures; money or negotiable securities; materials; equipment, flora, or fauna; improvements to facilities or land; statues, monuments, sculptures, murals, and other works of art; plaques, graphics and/or signs; or recreation and cultural arts program instruction, equipment, and supplies.
- IV. <u>Donor Recognition Object</u> is a physical object placed in a park to acknowledge a donor.
- V. <u>Donor</u> is a private individual, for-profit company, non-profit organization, or public agency wishing to donate funds or objects to the Department.
- VI. <u>Donor Recognition Project</u> is a proposal and plan for placing a donor recognition object at a park or park facility.
- VII. <u>Gift Needs Inventory</u> is a list of identified Department operational and capital needs which would make appropriate gifts.

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- VIII. <u>Memorial Art</u> is any statue, monument, sculpture, mural, memorial, or other structure or landscape feature designed to perpetuate in a permanent manner the memory of a person, group, event, or other significant element of history.
- IX. <u>Park Improvement Proposal</u> may include a funded, partially funded, or unfunded capital project(s) request consisting of real property, structures, or portions of structures; materials; equipment; flora or fauna; improvements to facilities or land and other non-art items.
- X. <u>Park Improvement Proposer</u> is a private individual, for-profit company, non-profit organization, or public agency wishing to initiate a funded, partially, funded, or unfunded capital project(s) consisting of real property, structures, or portions of structures; materials; equipment; flora or fauna; improvements to facilities or land and other non-art items.

Policy

It is the policy of the City of Mercer Island:

- 1.1 To facilitate and solicit publicly and privately funded park improvement proposals and encourage public and private gifts, bequests, and such contributions that enhance, beautify, improve, supplement, support, or otherwise benefit the park and recreation system and community of Mercer Island.
- 1.2 To accept only those gifts, memorial art, park improvements and donor recognition objects that are consistent with the mission, policies, park property restrictions, park master plans and most current Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan and associated trails and arts plans of the Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department and the mission and policies of its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils, or groups.
- 1.3 To accept only those gifts, memorial art, park improvements and donor recognition objects given with the full understanding that they become the property of the City and are subject to the laws, policies and procedures that govern the Parks and Recreation Department and its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils, or groups.
- 1.4 To accept gifts of land, from private individuals, for-profit corporations, not-for-profit organizations and public entities when City ownership will further the objectives of the City as identified in the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan and associated trails and arts plans.
- 1.5 To accept gift, memorial art, and park improvement proposals, other than land, from private individuals, for-profit corporations, not-for-profit organizations, and public entities which:
 - 1.5.1 Are given with no contingencies other than that they be used for a specific program, activity, or area of programming. (Gifts from corporate donors who have a corporate sponsorship requirement fall under a yet to be developed Corporate Sponsorship Policy);
 - 1.5.2 The City is not obligated to replace if the gift or park improvement is stolen, vandalized, worn out, irreparably damaged, or destroyed.

- 1.6 To reject gift, memorial art, and park improvement proposals that, in the judgment of the director, are incompatible with the park or facility location, other facility uses or users.
- 1.7 To prohibit gift, park improvement proposals, and donor recognition object proposals that are memorial in nature (excluding memorial art).
 - 1.7.1 The City may elect to recognize a community member, individual, family, group, or organization in the naming of a facility. In these limited and unique scenarios, the donor recognition object may provide memorial recognition as deemed appropriate by the director. Naming rights to facilities will be included in a to be developed policy.
- 1.8 To protect designated open space and green space areas as fundamental aspects of the quality of life on Mercer Island, and to limit gifts and park improvements to those which maintain or enhance the character of the space and/or meet identified objectives within the Parks, Recreation, and Open Space Plan and associated trails and arts plans.
- 1.9 To prohibit donor recognition objects on gifts in designated open space areas.
- 1.10 To limit, as much as possible, plaques and visible recognition objects to areas of a park recognized as "built" environments, i.e., benches, picnic tables, water fountains, buildings, play areas, ballfields, tennis courts, etc.
- 1.11 To limit, as much as possible, all gifts and park improvements to items that complement the proposed location, e.g., murals for buildings; turf/fall surfacing/sand/benches/tables/play equipment for play areas; turf/backstops/bleachers/scoreboards/fences for ballfields; nets/posts for tennis courts; backboards/nets/scoreboards for basketball courts.
- 1.12 To limit, as much as possible, the number of donor recognition projects that involve decorative tiles, pavers, and artwork that require mounting on walls, concrete, or any other surface that detracts from the characteristics of our parks. Such projects may require a verifiable demonstration of community support.
- 1.13 To limit, as much as possible, the number of park improvements that involve installations which detract from characteristics of our parks. Such projects may require a verifiable demonstration of community support.
- 1.14 To maintain and update annually a Gift Needs Inventory document.
- 1.15 To ensure that all park improvement proposals, gifts, memorial art, and donor recognition objects are consistent with all applicable provisions of the City of Mercer Island City Code.

Procedure(s)

Additional procedures will be established and approved, administratively, by the department director and division manager, following approval of the policy.

DEPARTMENT POLICY

City of Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department PARK IMPROVEMENT, GIFT ACCEPTANCE AND DONOR RECOGNITION

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The City of Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department welcomes and encourages support from private individuals and entities that support the programs and services the Department and its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils and groups provide to the public.

2.0 PURPOSE

To establish a policy, criteria, guidelines and procedures for receiving and considering proposals to initiate funded, partially funded or unfunded capital projects, including gift and donor recognition projects or undertake changes to a park property that will in the judgment of the Director, modify the property's use, appearance or overall aesthetics

3.0 POLICY

It is the policy of the City of Mercer Island:

- 3.1 To facilitate publicly and privately funded park improvement proposals and encourage public and private gifts, bequests, and such contributions that enhance, beautify, improve, supplement, support, or otherwise benefit the park and recreation system.
- 3.2 To accept only those gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects that are consistent with the mission, policies, park property restrictions, park master plans and most current Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, Open Space, Trails and Art Plan of the Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Department and the mission and policies of its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils or groups.
- 3.3 To accept only those gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects given with the full understanding that they become the property of the City and are subject to the laws, policies and procedures that govern the Parks and Recreation Department and its assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils or groups.
- 3.4 To encourage the development of park master plans for major park, open space, trail and recreation areas (i.e. Luther Burbank Park, I-90 Lid, Mercerdale Park, Homestead Field, Island Crest Park, South Mercer Playfields, and Pioneer Park), and to update such plans as needed to incorporate significant changes in trends, use patterns, amenities and features, operations and maintenance and/or incorporate adjacent or connecting properties.
- 3.5 To solicit and encourage public comment and involvement in the development of park master plans.
- 3.6 To accept gifts of land, from private individuals, for-profit corporations, not-for-profit organizations and public entities when City ownership will further the objectives of the City as identified in the park and open space evaluation and acquisition

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procedures and current Comprehensive Parks, Recreation, Open Space, Trails and Art Plan.

- 3.7 To accept gift and park improvement proposals, other than land, from private individuals, for-profit corporations, not-for-profit organizations and public entities which:
 - 3.7.1 Are given with no contingencies other than that they be used for a specific program, activity or area of programming. (Gifts from corporate donors who have a corporate sponsorship requirement fall under a yet to be developed Corporate Sponsorship Policy);
 - 3.7.2 The City is not obligated to replace if the gift or park improvement is stolen, vandalized, worn out, irreparably damaged or destroyed.
- 3.8 To strongly discourage gift and park improvement proposals that, in the judgment of the Parks and Recreation Director, are incompatible with the park location, other park uses or users.
- 3.9 To strongly discourage gift, park improvement and donor recognition object proposals that are memorial in nature, to emphasize that the park system exists to meet the varied recreational, social, wellness, and educational needs of park users.
- 3.10 To protect designated open space and green space areas as fundamental aspects of the quality of life on Mercer Island, and to limit gifts and park improvements in those areas to benches, trees or other plant materials. Benches should be placed only where placement is deemed a park or recreational necessity as determined by guidelines developed, monitored, and evaluated by Department staff and designated landscape architects.
- 3.11 To prohibit donor recognition objects on gifts in designated open space and green space areas.
- 3.12 To limit, as much as possible, plaques and visible recognition objects to areas of a park recognized as "built" environments, i.e., benches, picnic tables, water fountains, buildings, play areas, ballfields, tennis courts, etc.
- 3.13 To limit, as much as possible, all gifts and park improvements in "built" environments to items that complement those environments, e.g., murals for buildings; turf/fall surfacing/sand/benches/tables/play equipment for play areas; turf/backstops/bleachers/scoreboards/fences for ballfields; nets/posts for tennis courts; backboards/nets/scoreboards for basketball courts.
- 3.14 To limit, as much as possible, the number of donor recognition projects that involve decorative tiles, pavers, and artwork that require mounting on walls, concrete, or any other surface that enhances the "gray" and detracts from the "green" characteristics of our parks. Such projects may require a verifiable demonstration of community support.

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- 3.15 To limit, as much as possible, the number of park improvements that involve surfaces that enhance the "gray" and detract from the "green" characteristics of our parks. Such projects may require a verifiable demonstration of community support.
- 3.16 To ensure that all donor recognition objects are consistent with design guidelines approved by the City of Mercer Island.

4.0 **DEFINITIONS**

- 4.1. <u>Assigned advisory boards, commissions, councils or groups</u> are any working or advisory board or committee created by City Council action or initiated by the Mayor or City Manager's Office and assigned to or administratively supported by the Parks and Recreation Department.
- 4.2. <u>Gifts</u> are all gifts, bequests, or donations to include but not be limited to endowments, real property, structures or portions of structures; money or negotiable securities; materials; equipment, flora, or fauna; improvements to facilities or land; statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of art; plaques, graphics and/or signs; or recreation and cultural arts program instruction, equipment and supplies.
- 4.3. <u>Donor Recognition Object</u> is a physical object placed in a park to acknowledge a gift donor
- 4.4. <u>Donor</u> is a private individual, for-profit company, non-profit organization, or public agency wishing to donate funds or objects to the Department
- 4.5. <u>Donor Recognition Project</u> is a proposal and plan for placing a donor recognition object at a park or park facility
- 4.6. <u>Gift Needs Inventory</u> is a list of identified Department operational and capital needs which would make appropriate gifts.
- 4.7. <u>Memorial Art</u> is any statue, monument, sculpture, mural, memorial, or other structure or landscape feature designed to perpetuate in a permanent manner the memory of a person, group, event or other significant element of history.
- 4.8. <u>Park Improvement Proposal</u> may include a funded, partially funded or unfunded capital project(s) request consisting of real property, structures, or portions of structures; materials; equipment; flora or fauna; improvements to facilities or land and other non-art items.
- 4.9. <u>Park Improvement Proposer</u> is a private individual, for-profit company, non-profit organization, or public agency wishing to initiate a funded, partially, funded or unfunded capital project(s) consisting of real property, structures, or portions of structures; materials; equipment; flora or fauna; improvements to facilities or land and other non-art items.

5.0 **RESPONSIBILITY**

- 5.1. The Parks and Recreation Director, or appointed designee, is responsible for:
 - 5.1.1. Receiving all gift, park improvement and donor recognition proposals, including memorial and non-memorial art, and related donor recognition objects and making an initial decision to either accept or reject.
 - 5.1.2. Determining the appropriateness and compatibility of all details of the proposed gift, park improvement and/or donor recognition object, including but not limited to the location, impact on other park uses or users, the size, scale, color, design, materials, contractor, and construction schedule
 - 5.1.3. Advancing approved gift and park improvement proposals to assigned and applicable advisory boards, commissions, councils or groups for design review and refinement.
 - 5.1.4. Making the final decision on acceptance of all gift, park improvement and donor recognition object proposals, unless determining it appropriate for City Council Park and Recreation Committee consideration or full City Council decision.
 - 5.1.5. Declining proposed gift, park improvement or donor recognition object proposals that are limited by special restrictions, conditions or covenants, which pose extreme budgetary obligations on the City, or which, in the opinion of the Director, may not be in the best interest of the park system and/or citizens of Mercer Island.
 - 5.1.6. Making the final decision on the park, recreation area, trail and open space location for the placement of specific gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects.
 - 5.1.7. Determining the life expectancy of gifts and park improvements; their appropriateness, usefulness and continued value to the park system and to the City; and their retention, relocation, modification, improvement, return to donor, transfer, sale, donation to other agency, or other disposition in conjunction with the Arts Council policies for art deaccessioning.
 - 5.1.8. Determining anticipated costs associated with ongoing maintenance of gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects, including statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of memorial and non-memorial art and related donor recognition objects, in conjunction with other advisory boards, commissions, councils or groups as appropriate.
 - 5.1.9. Generating a "Gift Needs Inventory" and reviewing it for currency once a year.
- 5.2. The Donor or Park Improvement Proposer is responsible for:
 - 5.2.1. A portion or all of the financial costs of gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects, and their installation if determined appropriate by the

Parks and Recreation Director. (The City is under no obligation to replace stolen, vandalized, irreparably damaged or destroyed recognition objects).

- 5.2.2. A portion or all of the financial costs associated with ongoing maintenance of gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects, including statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of art and related donor recognition objects, if determined appropriate by the Parks and Recreation Director, in consultation with applicable advisory councils, commissions, boards or groups as appropriate.
- 5.2.3. Appearing before the applicable advisory council, commission, board or group to present their gift, park improvement and/or donor recognition object proposal.
- 5.3. The Arts Council is responsible for:
 - 5.3.1. Receiving and considering a gift proposal advanced from the Parks and Recreation Director, or designee, that is in the form of a memorial or nonmemorial statue, monument, sculpture, mural, and other work of art and associated donor recognition object.
 - 5.3.2. Advancing the gift proposal for memorial or non-memorial art and associated donor recognition object to the Public Art Committee and Parks and Recreation liaison for design review and approval considering applicable Arts Council criteria which may include: artistic merit, aesthetic quality, credentials of the artist, installation methods, maintenance requirements, proposed location, the functional or design contribution to the setting, relationship to circulation and use patterns, quality, scale and character of the art proposal and, and installation methods and refining the proposal as needed.
 - 5.3.3. Receiving the refined gift proposal for memorial or non-memorial art from the Public Art Committee for further refinement as needed and advancing the recommended proposal to the Parks and Recreation Director, or designee, for final approval.
 - 5.3.4. Insuring that public comment and feedback is solicited and considered for all art and associated donor recognition objects by providing for a public comment period which may include neighborhood mailings, workshops, open houses, public meetings, advertisements and notices in local media, postings on the City's website, and other methods appropriate to collect citizen input.
 - 5.3.5. Providing the Parks and Recreation Director the name(s) of recommended park, recreation area, trail and open space locations for the placement of statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of art and associated donor recognition objects.
 - 5.3.6. Determining anticipated costs associated with ongoing maintenance of memorial and non-memorial statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of art and related donor recognition objects, in conjunction with

the Parks and Recreation Director and/or other advisory councils, commissions, boards or groups as appropriate.

- 5.3.7. Providing an appraisal of memorial and non-memorial statues, monuments, sculptures, murals and other works of art after final acceptance by the Parks and Recreation Director and updating appraisal information as needed consistent with established Arts Council policies and procedures and City insurance requirements.
- 5.4. The City Council is responsible for:
 - 5.4.1. Reviewing proposals for gifts, park improvements and donor recognition objects referred to it by the Parks and Recreation Director and for making a final acceptance or rejection decision.

Monetary Donations

- The city manager is authorized to accept donations in any amount.
- If donations are conditioned on how to be spent, the City manager may accept for a city-budgeted expenditure.
- City Council approval is required for any donation with specific terms or conditions outside of the City Budget.

Non-monetary Donations

- The city manager is authorized to determine the appropriateness, usefulness and value to the city of all nonmonetary donations with a fair market value of up to \$10,000.00
- City council approval shall be required for the appropriation, retention, improvement, return to donor, transfer, trade, sale, donation to other agency, or other disposition of all other nonmonetary donations.





Key Policy Elements

2. Prohibits memorial donations in the parks and clarifies how and where donors may be recognized.

SUMMARY

BACKGROUND

At its <u>September 1, 2022</u> meeting, the Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) focused on its goal to send a 30% design recommendation to City Council. The PRC's discussion led to several outcomes:

- The PRC's proposed recommendation evolved from recommending a specific 30% design to recommending that the 30% design proceed to 60% design, with PRC review at the conclusion of that design phase.
- Outstanding design issues were enumerated for additional review in the 60% design phase.
- The revision of the draft recommendation memo was turned over to a subcommittee for drafting.
- The PRC would review the revised memo at the October 6, 2022 meeting.

Following the meeting, the subcommittee quickly completed its work and produced the memo presented in Exhibit 1. The 30% design was not revised further and is presented for reference in Exhibit 2. It would be attached to the memo as an exhibit when presented to City Council. PRC received two email comments on the project since the September meeting. These are attached in Exhibit 3.

IMPACTS OF THE RECOMMENDATION

Staff have reviewed the memo and support PRC's recommendation. The level of community interest in this project warrants additional stewardship by the PRC. A consequence of this direction is that additional costs will be incurred, and construction of the project will be delayed. Originally targeted to begin construction in the spring of 2023, it is anticipated construction will now begin in fall 2023 or spring 2024. It should also be noted, that due to the additional design reviews requested, the design budget is increasing and will be added to the full project cost as part of the Council construction award and appropriation request.

NEXT STEPS

Staff has placed this item on the agenda of the November 1 City Council meeting. If accepted by City Council, City staff will continue to work with the Design Team to develop the 60% design. Staff expect to return to the

PRC in early 2023 for 60% design review. Based on the PRC recommendation, the construction of this project is now expected in fall 2023 or spring 2024.

The Mercer Island Parks and Recreation Commission (PRC) presents our recommendation on the Aubrey Davis Park Trail Safety Improvements 30% Design.

Summary Recommendation:

Our recommendation is to proceed to a 60% Design phase with further review by the Parks and Recreation Commission at the conclusion of that phase.

The PRC commenced review of this matter on April 7, 2022 and discussed the topic over four meetings. The project design team collected public input through a virtual open house held on February 17, 2022 and an online survey conducted from February 17 to March 17, 2022 as well as public comments received via the project page on Let's Talk. The open house was attended by 24 people, and survey responses were received from 86 participants. This input was presented to the PRC for consideration at the outset of its deliberations.

The 30% Design includes a roundabout, low fencing, signage and pavement markings at trail intersections throughout the Lid Park. It also provides additional trail modifications in the ballfield/restroom area that will reduce speeds, channelize cross-trail traffic and alert all users to the "mixing zone" they are entering.

Project Priorities:

The design prioritizes improvements that will directly enhance trail safety and focuses major improvements at the ballfield/restroom area, which is a critical area of concern.

Focus on safety

The PRC initially considered a suite of improvements that were collected from public input. With the limited budget, the PRC chose to prioritize improvements that would directly enhance

safety. The utility of other improvements such as benches, kiosks, and pull-out areas was not as clear.

Focus on the ballfield/restroom area

The initial design included substantial improvements at the West Mercer Way crossing. The PRC concluded that these improvements, while potentially useful, were not as critical to trail safety as the improvements proposed for the ballfield/restroom area. The PRC concluded that the project should focus trail improvements there. Particularly, the importance of a roundabout at the entrance to this area was identified as key to controlling traffic flow <u>before</u> trail users enter the mixing zone at the ballfield. Additional analysis is needed to determine the exact composition and configuration of the roundabout. Using concrete pavement to better define the restroom mixing zone will also further signal the need to be alert to the areas where park users enter the trail. Installation of low-level fencing will channel pedestrians to marked crossings and improve predictability for pedestrians and cyclists.

Stay within the available budget

The Consultant's initial estimate included three schedules totaling nearly \$783,000 for all three schedules. With the refinements noted above, the current estimate for the recommended 30% Design exceeds the available budget of \$350,000 by approximately \$25,000. The PRC is pleased that this 30% Design has incorporated safety elements from multiple schedules. The PRC recommends moving forward with this scope of work, as the design achieves the goals of the project, and the estimate is a planning-level estimate that is likely to change when the project is publicly bid for construction.

Other Considerations:

On June 2, the PRC and the Mercer Island Arts Council held a joint meeting and discussed opportunities to integrate art and/or placemaking elements into the project that would be consistent with the Aubrey Davis Park Master Plan. The PRC understands that placemaking elements incorporated into the trail could foster more considerate behaviors among trail users but also wants any features to be compatible with the park's natural landscape, including employing judicious selection of themes and colors. These recommendations will be transmitted to the Arts Council to further inform their discussions of how to use the project's 1% for Art in Public Places contribution (approximately \$3,500).

Conclusion:

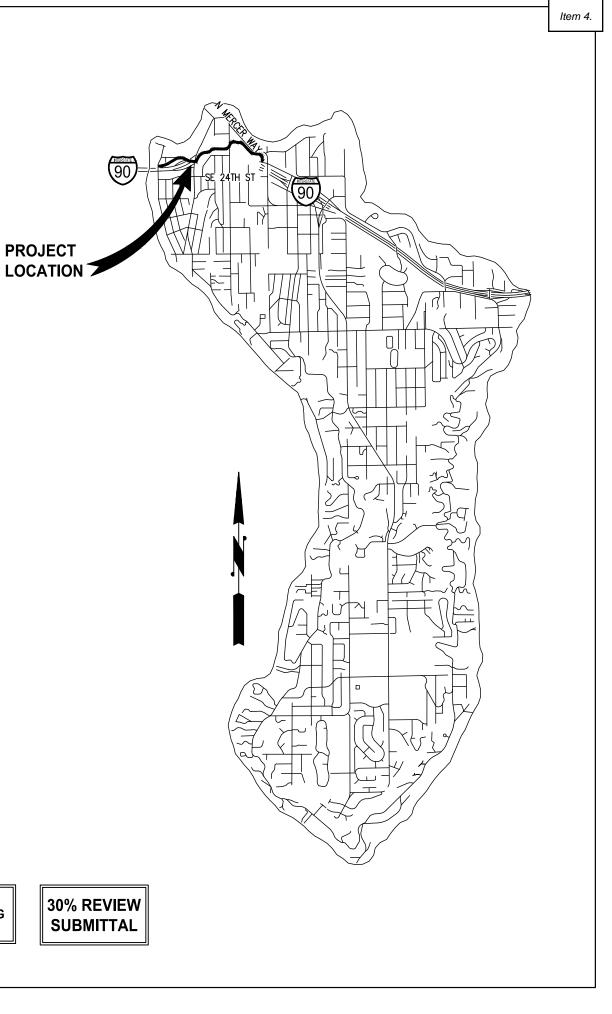
The PRC believes the 30% Design provides much-needed improvements and that some elements of the design require further review in the next phase of design. These elements include:

- Refining the design of the roundabout
- Consider adding lighting in the roundabout area
- Number, placement and wording of signs
- Safety, effectiveness and placement of Thermoplastic striping

We look forward to seeing this project advance to 60% Design and request the opportunity to provide our recommendation at the completion of that phase.



AUBREY DAVIS PARK TRAIL SAFETY IMPROVEMENTS SEPTEMBER 2022







