- **WHEREAS:** The New Jersey Blind Men's Club was created in 1910 by four courageous blind men in the Newark area with the intent to provide support, education, and socialization activities for the blind and visually impaired, allowing them to lead happy and productive lives while promoting acceptance to the public; and
- **WHEREAS:** In 1929, these forward-thinking men created an innovative camp-like experience in Leonardo which became known as Camp Happiness. They named the camp this since it was the first time these individuals were not defined by their blindness and were able to venture out on their own in a safe environment, learn independent living skills, and participate in social activities such as swimming, boating, and fishing; and
- **WHEREAS:** In 1930, Middletown Township celebrated this creative program with a parade, fanfare, and a proclamation recognizing July 10, 1930 as "Camp Happiness Day"; and
- WHEREAS: In 1987, the organization officially changed its name to the New Jersey Blind Citizens Association, Inc. (NJBCA) as it began accepting women and promoting inclusivity; and

WHEREAS: Now in its 113th year of providing free services, the NJBCA still serves as a statewide resource and referral center for the blind and visually impaired, as well as their families and caregivers. On its 94th anniversary, Camp Happiness continues in the spirit of its founders by offering educational forums, arts and crafts, wellness programs, music and computer technology events, and peer support groups. Campers are also able to give back through community collaborations, fostering an environment of hope and purpose. Now,

Resolution 23-194 - Amending Resolution 23-67 - State Contract Purchase Thresholds

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no certification of funds from the Chief Financial Officer has been attached because these contracts are open-ended pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:30-11-10. If needed, individual purchase orders will be processed prior to release of the order to the vendor.

<u>Resolution 23-195</u> - Resolution Extending Grace Period For Payment Of 3rd Quarter 2023 Taxes

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 54:4-64 provides that third quarter tax bills were to be mailed at least 47 days prior to the due date of August 1, 2023; and

WHEREAS, because of delays outside of the Township's control, the bills could not be mailed prior to this deadline; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 54:4-66.3d provides that when third quarter tax bills cannot be mailed by June 14, taxes shall not be subject to interest until at least 25 days after the tax bills are mailed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that the interest charged as per Resolution No. 23-44, shall be waived if payment of third quarter tax bills is

received by August 22, 2023. Any payments not made within this time shall be charged interest from the State set due date of August 1, 2023.

<u>Resolution 23-196</u> - Resolution Making Cost of Living Adjustment For The Township's LOSAP Program

WHEREAS, pursuant to Chapter 53 of the Township Code, the Township of Middletown (the "<u>Township</u>") has had a Length of Service Awards Program ("<u>LOSAP</u>") in place for eligible volunteer members of the Township's fire companies and first aid squads to provide a small incentive for emergency service volunteers; and

WHEREAS, the Division of Local Government Services periodically authorizes increases in the allowable maximum contributions permitted under local LOSAP programs; and

WHEREAS, the Township has determined to make certain adjustments to the rate of its LOSAP contributions to its volunteer first responders for volunteer services rendered in 2022 with LOSAP credits being paid in 2023.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown in the County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that it hereby sets forth the 2023 LOSAP contribution rates for each eligible volunteer member of its fire companies and first aid squads, as follows:

Resolution 23-197 – Resolution Authorizing the Payment of Bills for July 17, 2023

The Township Committee hereby approves a resolution authorizing the payment of bills for July 17, 2023 in the amount of \$7,237,104.43.

<u>Resolution 23-198</u> - Resolution Authorizing and Extending Shared Service Agreement with Fair Haven for Chief Financial Officer, Tax Collection, And Other General Financial Administrative Services

WHEREAS, the "Uniform Shared Services and Consolidation Act" <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:65-1 through 40A:65-35 (the "<u>Act</u>"), authorizes local units of this State to enter contracts with any other local unit or units for the joint provision within their several jurisdictions of any service which any party to the agreement is empowered to render within its own jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, the Township of Middletown (the "<u>Township</u>") and the Borough of Fair Haven (the "<u>Borough</u>") originally entered a Shared Services Agreement for municipal tax collection services that was a success, which expired on December 31, 2016, that was merged into a First Amended Shared Services Agreement to include Chief Financial Officer ("<u>CFO</u>") and Qualified Purchasing Agent ("<u>OPA</u>") related services, in addition to continuing tax collection services; and

WHEREAS, effective January 1, 2019, the parties entered a Second Amended Shared Services Agreement that increased the scope of the original agreement to include general financial and administrative services on an as-needed basis for set hourly rates and still included QPA services; and

WHEREAS, the Township and the Borough are no longer sharing QPA services, and the 2019 agreement expired without further extension on December 31, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Township and the Borough would like to extend and modify their Shared Services Agreement to include only CFO, Tax Collection, and general financial and administrative services on an as-needed basis through December 31, 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown in the County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that it hereby authorizes and directs the Mayor to enter into a newly extended Shared Services Agreement with Fair Haven for the services of its CFO, Tax Collector and other employees pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth therein through December 31, 2025.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Municipal Clerk shall transmit a copy of this Resolution and the executed Agreement to the Division of Local Government Services at the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs for informational purposes pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:65-4b.
