<u>Proclamation Commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the Middletown Township Public</u> <u>Library</u>

Library Director Heather Andolsen and Board of Trustees President Bill Bucco accepted the Proclamation. They discussed some of the upcoming events and projects centered around the MTPL's centennial.

- **WHEREAS:** A group of civic-minded residents appointed as Trustees by the Township Committee, responding to the needs of the growing community, organized and opened the public library with donations of over 4,000 books from the community, and with a donation from a friend of the State Librarian who gave \$5,000 and \$1,000 each year after that to buy new books, on June 4th, 1921; and
- **WHEREAS**: With Middletown Township being a rural community with deposit stations in public areas of town and at private homes, a book truck was constructed for \$1,000, with a route driven by first librarian Dorothy Norton that covered 160 miles, this traveling library was the first in the State; and

- **WHEREAS**: From these modest beginnings the Library's collections grew to the point that a new 26,000 sq. ft. building was erected on 6 acres at 55 New Monmouth and expanded to 39,000 sq. ft in 2003; and
- WHEREAS: Over the years, the Library has offered programs for all ages, outreach services, literacy initiatives, job seekers and small business resources, expanding information services, computer training, Internet access, and other means of community support and enrichment; and
- **WHEREAS**: The Middletown Township Public Library engages the lives of its patrons with an average of over 617,000 items a year circulated, and 70,000 people attend over 1,600 programs in a year; and
- **WHEREAS**: Through times of recession and prosperity, war and peace, the Library has continued to serve the people of Middletown as a place of learning, culture and community; and
- **WHEREAS**: The enduring commitment of the Middletown Township Public Library, the Middletown Township Board of Trustees, the Middletown Township governance and the community has been the cornerstone of the Middletown Township Public Library reaching this 100th anniversary; Now
