<u>Resolution 22-151</u> - Resolution Committing the Township of Middletown to The Sustainable Land Use Pledge

WHEREAS, land use is an essential component of overall sustainability for a municipality; and

WHEREAS, poor land-use decisions can lead to and increase societal ills such as decreased mobility, high housing costs, increased greenhouse gas emissions, loss of open space and the degradation of natural resources; and

WHEREAS, well planned land use can create transportation choices, provide for a range of housing options, create walkable communities, preserve open space, provide for adequate recreation, and allow for the continued protection and use of vital natural resources; and

WHEREAS, given New Jersey's strong tradition of home rule and local authority over planning and zoning, achieving a statewide sustainable land use pattern will require municipalities to take the lead;

NOW THEREFORE, the Township of Middletown resolves to take the following steps with regard to our municipal land-use decisions with the intent of making Middletown a truly sustainable community. It is our intent to include these principles in the next Master Plan revision and Reexamination Report and to subsequently update our land-use, zoning, natural resource protection, and other ordinances to reflect these principles.

- 1. Regional Cooperation We pledge to reach out to administrations of our neighboring municipalities concerning land-use decisions, and to take into consideration regional impacts when making land-use decisions.
- 2. Transportation Choices We pledge to create transportation choices with a "complete streets" approach by considering all modes of transportation, including walking, biking, transit and automobiles through, when planning transportation projects and reviewing development applications. We will reevaluate our parking with the goal of limiting the amount of required parking spaces, promoting shared parking and other innovative parking alternatives, and encouraging structured parking alternatives where appropriate.
- 3. Natural Resource Protection We pledge to take action to protect the natural resources of the State for environmental, recreational and agricultural value, avoiding or mitigating negative impacts to these resources. Further, we pledge to complete an update to the Township's Natural Resources Inventory when feasible to identify and assess the extent of our natural resources and to link natural resource management and protection to carrying capacity analysis, land-use and open space planning. Mix of Land Uses We pledge to use our zoning power to allow for a mix of residential, retail, commercial, recreational and other land use types in areas that make the most sense for our Township and the region.

- 4. Housing Options We pledge, through the use of our Zoning Ordinance and Master Plan Housing Element, to foster a diverse mix of housing types and locations, including single- and multi-family, for-sale and rental options, to meet the needs of all people at a range of income levels.
- 5. Green Design We pledge to incorporate the principles of green design and renewable energy generation into municipal buildings to the extent feasible and when updating our site plan and subdivision requirements for residential and commercial buildings.
- 6. Municipal Facilities Siting We pledge, to the extent feasible, to take into consideration factors such as walkability, bikeability, greater access to public transit, proximity to other land-use types, and open space when locating new or relocated municipal facilities.

Resolution 22-153 - Resolution Concurring with The Township of Middletown Planning Board's Redevelopment Investigation Findings and Designating the Delineated Area of Block 1131, Lots 30-32, And Block 1086, Lots 29-30 As an Area in Need of Redevelopment for Non-Condemnation Purposes

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2022, by Resolution No. 22-75, the governing body, acting as the Township's Redevelopment Entity, authorized and requested the Township of Middletown Planning Board ("<u>Planning Board</u>") to undertake a preliminary investigation ("<u>Investigation</u>") to determine whether Block 1086, Lots 29 and 30; Block 1089, Lots 1 and 2; and Block 1131, Lots 30, 31, and 32 (the "<u>Area of Investigation</u>") qualify as an "area in

need of redevelopment" according to the criteria set forth in the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law ("LRHL"), specifically N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5 and N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-3; and

- **WHEREAS**, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6, the Planning Board specified and gave public notice that on May 4, 2022, a hearing would be held for the purpose of hearing persons who are interested in or would be affected by a determination that the properties in the Area of Investigation are an area in need of redevelopment as that term is defined under the LRHL for non-condemnation purposes; and
- **WHEREAS,** Francis Reiner, LLA, PP of DMR Architects publicly presented a "Report of Preliminary Investigation for Determination of an Area in Need of Redevelopment" for the designated Area of Investigation dated April 2022 ("the **Investigation Report**"), which is attached hereto and made part hereof as **Exhibit A**; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Investigation Report determined that Block 1086, Lots 29 and 30, and Block 1131, Lots 30, 31, and 32 within the Area of Investigation evidence conditions and characteristics that qualify these properties as an "area in need of redevelopment" because they satisfy the "b" statutory criterion in N.J.S.A. 40A-12A-5; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Investigation Report determined that Block 1089, Lots 1 and 2 did not satisfy the redevelopment criteria pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Investigation Report demonstrates significant vacancies in the buildings within Block 1086, Lots 29 and 30, and Block 1131, Lots 30, 31, and 32 for at least two consecutive years when compared to industry standards for vacant office space, which is demonstrated through the pictures, narrative, Township records and uncontested testimony of Mr. Reiner; and
- **WHEREAS,** on May 4, 2022, the Planning Board held a properly-noticed public hearing pursuant to the requirements of N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6 concerning the Area of Investigation; and
- **WHEREAS**, the hearing was open to all persons from the public who were generally interested in or would be affected by a finding that the properties within the Area of Investigation constitute an area in need of redevelopment under <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12A-5 and/or <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 40A:12A-3; and
- **WHEREAS,** on May 4, 2022, the Planning Board received uncontested testimony from Mr. Reiner, providing a first-hand account of the conditions that he observed during his exhaustive examination of the properties within the Area of Investigation, which confirmed the description of the conditions and findings contained in the Investigation Report; and
- **WHEREAS,** on May 4, 2022, the Planning Board recommended that the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown designate Block 1086, Lots 29 and 30, and Block 1131, Lots 30, 31, and 32 as a non-condemnation area in need of redevelopment due to the

substantial evidence that they meet the criteria enumerated in the Investigation Report, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5(b).

- **NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown in the County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey that it hereby adopts the above recitals, findings of the Planning Board and the Investigation Report attached hereto as Exhibit A prepared by Francis Reiner, LLA, PP of DMR Architects, as if set forth fully herein, therefore, determining and hereby declaring that Block 1086, Lots 29 and 30, and Block 1131, Lots 30, 31, and 32 are hereby determined to be an "Area in Need of Redevelopment" according to the criteria set forth under N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-5 for noncondemnation purposes.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6(b)(5)(c), the Municipal Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution to the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs for review.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6(b)(5)(d), the Municipal Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution upon all record owners of the properties located within the delineated Area of Investigation as those names are listed within the official Tax Assessor's records within ten (10) days of the adoption hereof.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-6(b)(5)(d), the Municipal Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution upon each person, if any, who filed a written objection and stated in such submission an address to which notice of this determination may be sent.
- **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that that a certified copy of this Resolution and underlying documents shall be available for public inspection during regular business hours at the Office of the Municipal Clerk.

<u>Resolution 22-156</u> - Resolution of Need for Affordable Housing Units Sponsored by CIS, Inc.

WHEREAS, the Township of Middletown ("Middletown) and Toll NJ XII, LP ("Toll") are party to a certain Redevelopment Agreement (Agreement) designating Toll as the Developer of a certain tract of land designated therein; and

WHEREAS, Community Investment Strategies, Inc ("CIS") has been determined to be a "Qualified Transferee" of Phase II of the redevelopment as referred to in the Agreement; and

WHEREAS Toll has transferred the rights and obligations for the construction of Phase II of the redevelopment to CIS consistent with Section 4.2 of the Agreement which is the affordable housing component of the overall development; and

WHEREAS, Community Investment Strategies, Inc. (hereinafter referred to as the "Affordable Housing Sponsor") propose to construct a 70 unit housing project (hereinafter referred to as the "Project") pursuant to the provisions of the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency Law of 1983, as amended (N.J.S.A. 55:14K-1 et seq.), the rules promulgated thereunder at N.J.A.C. 5:80-1.1 et seq., and all applicable guidelines promulgated thereunder (the foregoing hereinafter collectively referred to as the "HMFA Requirements") within the Township of Middletown (hereinafter referred to as the "Municipality") on a site described as Block 825, Lot 53.02, as shown on the Official Assessment Map of the Township of Middletown, Monmouth County, New Jersey; and

WHEREAS, the Project will be subject to the HMFA Requirements and the mortgage and other loan documents executed between the Sponsor and the New Jersey Housing and Mortgage Finance Agency (hereinafter referred to as the "Agency"); and

WHEREAS, the Project may be subject to requirements of the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (hereinafter referred to as the "Department of Community Affairs"), Neighborhood Preservation Balanced Housing Program in accordance with N.J.S.A. 52:27D-320 and applicable rules promulgated thereunder at N.J.A.C. 5:43-1.1 et seq., and the mortgage and other loan documents executed between the Sponsor and the Commissioner of the Department of Community Affairs, or any other Department of Community Affairs programs as applicable; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the HMFA Requirements, the governing body of the Municipality hereby determines that there is a need for this housing project in the Municipality.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Committee of the Township of Middletown (the "Committee") that:

- (1) The Committee finds and determines that the Project proposed by the Affordable Housing Sponsor meets or will meet an existing housing need as determined by the Court;
- (2) The Committee does hereby adopt the within Resolution and makes the determination and findings herein contained by virtue of, pursuant to, and in conformity with the provisions of the HMFA Law to enable the Agency to process the Sponsor's application for Agency funding to finance the Project.

- **WHEREAS**, the Township of Middletown (the "<u>Township</u>") has chosen to avail itself of energy consulting and management services provided by TFS Energy Solutions, LLC d/b/a Tradition Energy, pursuant to Contract 2018-017 procured through the City of Mesquite's OMNIA Partners, Public Sector, f/k/a/ U.S. Communities Government Purchasing Alliance Request, which is a nationally-recognized purchasing cooperative; and
- **WHEREAS,** pursuant to <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 52:34-6.2(b)(3), the Township is authorized to enter into purchases through a nationally-recognized cooperative, provided the Township determines that the use of same "shall result in cost savings after all factors, including charges for service, material, and delivery, have been considered"; and
- **WHEREAS**, in accordance with the Electric Discount and Energy Competition Act (P.L. 1999, Chapter 23), Tradition Energy previously sought competitive pricing in the marketplace for electric supply service for the 69 Township accounts shown on **Exhibit A**; and
- **WHEREAS**, Tradition Energy utilized its online pricing system to perform an indicative Request for Proposals for preliminary bid prices on March 24, 2020 from Tier 1 electricity suppliers that serve Jersey Central Power and Light ("<u>JCP&L</u>")'s territory for the 69 Township accounts; and
- **WHEREAS**, on April 6, 2020, pursuant to Resolution No. 20-103, the Township authorized the procurement of electric supply services from Constellation NewEnergy, Inc.; and
- **WHEREAS**, due to current high energy market prices and extreme volatility, Tradition has recommended that the Township enter a new contract term with Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. for 18 months; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Township determined that the pricing available through the national cooperative and its current supplier contract is lower than the pricing otherwise available to the Township; and
- **WHEREAS**, procuring electricity supplied through the national cooperative and its current supplier will result in cost savings relative to current market conditions after all factors, including charges for service, material, and delivery, have been considered; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2022, Tradition Energy received updated pricing from Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. for fully-fixed capacity pricing for electric supply service for the Township's 69 accounts for a period of 18 months, pursuant to the draft agreement attached hereto as **Exhibit B** and incorporated by reference (the "**Agreement**"); and

WHEREAS, due to current volatility in the marketplace, it is in the best interest of the Township to enter into the Agreement for its 69 Accounts with Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. for electric supply, for a period of 18 months, beginning on the June 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost for electric supply during the 18-month term of the contract is \$347,532; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer of the Township has certified that adequate funds for such contract are available.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Middletown in the County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, that it hereby awards a contract to Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. for electric supply service with fully-fixed capacity pricing for a period of 18 months beginning June 1, 2022, consistent with the foregoing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and Township Clerk are hereby authorized to execute a contract with Constellation NewEnergy, Inc., substantially in the form attached hereto and incorporated by reference, subject to the final review and approval of the Township Attorney.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. shall comply with requirements of N.J.S.A. 10:2-1 (Anti-Discrimination in Employment), <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 10:5-31 <u>et seq.</u> and <u>N.J.A.C.</u> 17:27 <u>et seq.</u> (Equal Employment Opportunity), 42 <u>U.S.C.</u> 12101 <u>et seq.</u> (Americans with Disabilities Act), and <u>N.J.S.A.</u> 52:32-44 et seq.
