WHEREAS, state law authorizes a municipality to either appoint or elect a municipal judge for a term of office, the Mission Municipal Court is a state court, and its judges are members of the state judiciary.

WHEREAS, the procedures for the Mission Municipal Court operations are set forth in the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure and other laws of the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, the City of Mission is committed to the notion that our legal system is based on the principle that an independent, fair, and competent judiciary will interpret and apply the laws that govern us and that judges and court personnel should comply with the law and act in a manner that promotes public confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary;

WHEREAS, Mission Municipal Judges are not policy makers for the City of Mission but are bound by the law and the Canons of Judicial Conduct and are required to make decisions independent of the governing body of the City Council, city officials, and employees;

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes that the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas contain procedural safeguards in criminal cases for all defendants, including indigent defendants, and supports the Mission Municipal Court in complying with such legal requirements.

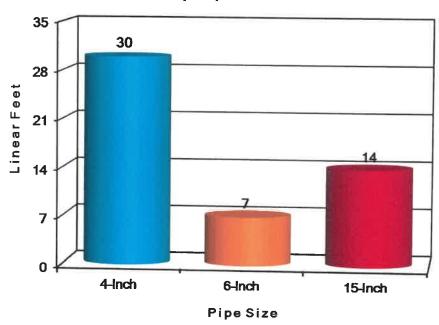

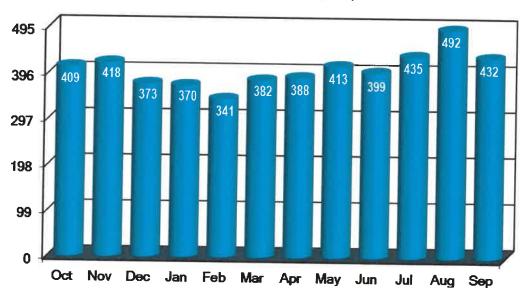

## 2024-25 Water Production Million Gallons (MG)



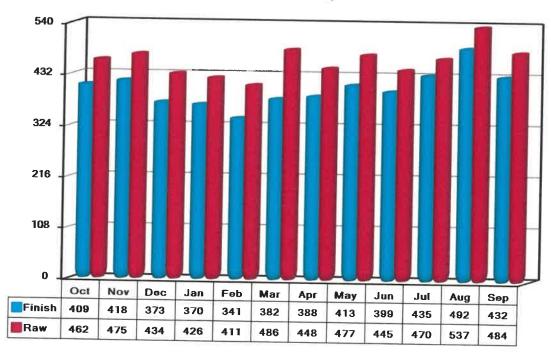
#### Operations and Maintenance - North Water Treatment Plant

- The International Dioxide Company (IDI) collected the monthly chlorite samples.
- Staff continued with performing maintenance on pumps and motors.
- Operators performed required daily and monthly water lab analysis, backwashed and cleaned required filters.
- COVID-19 safety practices continue based on the CDC Guidelines and staff are encouraged to wear masks and practice social distancing.
- Reviewed water quality lab results from the following certified laboratories:
  - 1. Ana-Lab (Chlorite, TOC, SUVA)
  - 2. Eurofins Eaton Analytical (Chlorite)

#### Operations and Maintenance - South Water Treatment Plant

- The International Dioxide Company (IDI) collected the monthly chlorite samples.
- Operators continued with regular maintenance of pump and motors, as well as, kept up with mowing grass in the facilities and towers.
- As of October 3, 2025, the Falcon Reservoir water level is at 16.7% and the Amistad Reservoir
  water level is at 35.8%, respectively. According to the Brownsville Area Reservoirs Monitor, the
  average of both reservoir levels is at 26.9%.
- Operators performed daily and monthly water lab analysis, backwashed and cleaned required filters.
- Staff performed necessary Water Plant and Reservoir adjustments; such as water influent, water effluent, water levels and chemical adjustments.
- Staff maintained grass trimmed at two treatment plants, reservoirs and distribution Water Towers.
- Initiated preventive maintenance on equipment as deemed necessary and exercised Emergency Generators weekly.

#### Water Treatment Plants 2024-25 Raw & Finish Water Million Gals. (MG)



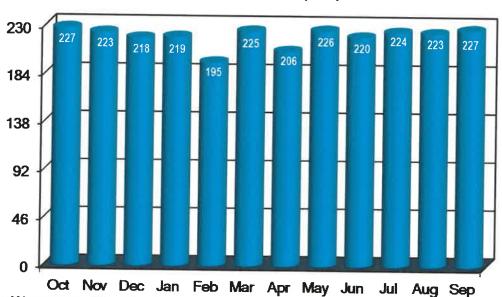

**Wastewater - Wastewater Plant Status** There were no violations for September; there were no violations for August 2025 that was pending. Plant operated at 53.43% capacity; Plant is rated at 13.5 mgd; and the Plant Yearly Average was 7.213 mgd. There was 7.1 inches of rainfall.

**Wastewater - Risk Management Program** All employees received Proper Protection Equipment as they may be exposed to hazardous environments. All cleaning and disinfection are done by janitorial staff to keep Plant disinfected as possible. Risk Reducing Training was conducted for severe heat exposure to all Plant Staff.

**Wastewater - Staff Developments** David Garza was recently promoted from Laborer to Operator Trainee and passed the TCEQ "D" level license and is now a licensed Plant Operator. Andres Garcia will continue to train to obtain his "C" license level of operating the Plant. Eric Hernandez passed his first required exam and is now being trained for other process control operations; his next class is Wastewater Treatment for various types of wastewater processes.

Wastewater - Facility Activities Supervisory Staff continues to support the team with training goals and best practices towards maintaining the Plant in compliance with TCEQ regulatory inspections. Other rehabilitation projects are being discussed for future developments and are pending approvals. These projects will allow the Plant to continue to provide effective sewage treatment and environmental protection of water for the State of Texas.

**Wastewater - General Maintenance** Staff maintained grass trimmed, initiated preventive maintenance on equipment as deemed necessary; and (automatically) exercised two emergency generators, weekly. The following repairs were completed in-house.

- 1. Odor control systems were monitored and adjusted to reduce malodorous emissions.
- 2. Operators continue routine cleaning of Clarifiers side walls to remove algae buildup.
- 3. Pumps at our Main Lift Station were exercised for better flow to our Screening System at head works.
- Operators cleaned "Tea Cup" Grit System at head works on a weekly basis.
- 5. Maintenance Crew worked on the Lift Station pumps and exercised all pumps at the Main Lift Station.
- Maintenance Operators worked on thickener pump leaks, repairs and adjustments.

- 7. Operators worked on maintaining a proper level at the Pretreatment Pond.
- 8. Maintenance greased bearings on schedule.
- 9. Operators worked on rotor system at the digester tanks.
- 10. Grounds keeping was done by all Operators and Grounds Keeper.

#### Wastewater - Contract Work

City's Contracted out electricians worked on the following.

- Hill-Tex work done at the Plant was as follows.
  - · Worked on UV hoist for old side disinfection system.
  - · Worked on Lift Station level meter.

#### Wastewater - Other Contract Work

- 1. CB3 continued to provide the Plant with sludge and grit removal services.
- Cintas provided uniform services and door mat replacement weekly.
- Polydine supplied us with polymer totes for aiding in sludge de-watering at Belt Press System.
- Facilities Department worked on the Administration building and air filter exchanges for Plant.

Wastewater - Lab Status All equipment and supplies met TCEQ standards for analysis and are concurrent with Standard Methods Procedures. ERA annual testing was completed and the City's Lab passed all analysis categories. Reports

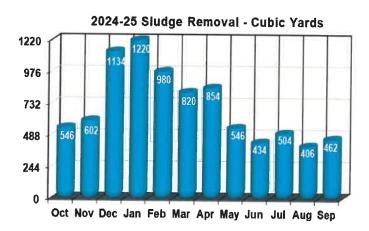
are pending to be finalized and sent to TCEQ for annual compliance. Plant Supervisor continues using the EPA Discharge Monitoring Report Federal Reporting System to comply with TCEQ Rules and Regulations. Staff is dedicated and committed to the cleaning and disinfection of water and its reintroduction back to the environment.

Wastewater - Special Projects The Capital Improvement Projects include clarifier covers for UV light protection Industrial Pond Rehab, Digester Aeration upgrade and other needed projects; Being discussed are future improvements for redundancy at our Dewatering Sludge System (Belt Press). Clarifier Covers are equipment needed for algae removal it is a project that the Plant is initializing. The removal of algae buildup at the clarifier walls and weirs, the treatment process gains a significant increase in disinfection, equipment downstream of the Clarifier System is cleaner, decreases wear and tear of UV light bulbs and will eliminate Operator man hours and reduces the risk of injury.

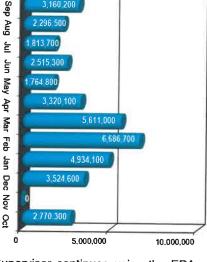
Pretreatment Three surface Aerators and motors are operational. Clarifier at Pretreatment was cleaned up of debris on the surface. All industrial flows to the Plant continue to be accounted for by meter totalizers and truck tickets. The Lone Star Citrus Company transported 33 truckloads of 165,000 gallons of citrus wastewater to the Pretreatment System. Pretreatment flow of waste from Rio Grande Juice Company and MPI (Metal Plating Industry) was 3,160,200 million gallons. Total sludge hauled was 462 cubic yards equivalent to 33 roll off containers.

Renewal for the Sale & On-Site Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages – The Ice House, LLC in a property zoned General Business (C-3) District, being the South 109.5 feet of Lot 2, Block 137, Mission Original Townsite Subdivision and all of Lot 52, John H. Shary Industrial Subdivision, located at 815 N. Francisco Avenue. Applicant: Lane Rangel, Adoption of Ordinance #\_\_\_\_\_\_ - Cervantes

#### **NATURE OF REQUEST:**

#### **Project Timeline:**

- September 15, 2025 Application for a Conditional Use Permit ("CUP") submitted to the City.
- October 3, 2025 Following State and local law, notice of the required public hearings mailed to all property owners within 200 feet of the subject tract.
- October 15, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of the requested Conditional Use Permit by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z).
- October 28, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of the requested Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.

#### Summary:

- The subject site is located at the Northwest corner of Francisco Avenue and E. 8<sup>th</sup> Street.
- Per the Code of Ordinance a bar, cocktail lounges and taverns require the approval of a Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.
- This business has been in operation since 1960 but during the renewal of the conditional use permit, the City Council placed a condition of no live music outdoors at any time. This was done during the April 14, 2025 meeting.
- The applicant has submitted a petition signed by 228 citizens in support of bringing back outdoor music at the venue. Four (4) of the petitioners are property owners within the 200foot notification area (18.69%).
- For the last two years there have been three (3) abandoned vehicle, one loud noise, one incident, and one theft report.
- The hours of operation are as follows: Monday thru Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 12 a.m. and Sundays from 12:p.m. to 12:00 a.m.
- Staff: 3 employees
- Parking: Due to the total of 164 proposed chairs, a total of 55 parking spaces are required.
  There are a total of 12 off-street parking spaces at the site. Since this property is located
  within the Mission's Central Business District, it is exempt from parking requirements for the
  existing structure.

- Such uses require that no alcoholic beverages be sold within 300' of a residence, church, public schools, private school or public hospital.
- There is a residential subdivision within 300 feet, therefore, a waiver of the separation requirement would need to be approved.
- The Planning staff has not received any objections to the request from the surrounding property owners. Staff mailed out (24) legal notices to the surrounding property owners.
- In accordance with the zoning ordinance, the P&Z and City Council may impose requirements
  and conditions of approval to ensure that a use requested by a Conditional Use Permit is
  compatible and complementary to adjacent properties.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval with the conditions below:

- 1. Permit for one (1) year to continue to assess this business.
- 2. Continued compliance with all City Codes (Building, Fire, Health, etc.)
- 3. Waiver of the 300' separation requirement from the residential homes.
- 4. Continued compliance with TABC requirements.
- 5. CUP is not transferable to others.
- 6. Must have security cameras inside and outside with a minimum 30-day retention.
- 7. Must comply with the noise ordinance.
- 8. Maximum occupancy for the inside area to be 60 people with tables and chairs, 130 people with chairs and 182 people if standing. For the outside area the maximum occupancy to be 166 people with tables and chairs, 357 people with chairs only and 464 people standing only.
- 9. Hours of operation: Monday thru Saturday from 10:00 a.m. to 12 a.m. and Sundays from 12 p.m. to 12:00 a.m.
- 10. Live music allowed outside

### **NATURE OF REQUEST:**

### **Project Timeline:**

- September 4, 2025 Application for Conditional Use Permit submitted to the City for processing.
- September 19, 2025 In accordance with State and local law, notice of required public hearings
  was mailed to all property owners within 200 feet of the subject tract, and notice of public hearings
  was published in the Progress Times.
- October 1, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of a Conditional Use Permit by the Planning and Zoning Commission.
- October 28, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of a Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.

### Summary:

- The subject site is located approximately 450' north of 1st Street along the west side of Shary Road.
- Per Code of Ordinance, the Sale & On-site Consumption of Alcoholic Beverages requires the approval of a Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.
- The applicant is leasing a 4,004 square foot suite within a commercial plaza for a Mexican Restaurant. She has been in operation at this location since February of this year. She would like to continue to offer alcohol with her meals. Therefore, the need to renew her conditional use permit. Access to the site is via two 30' driveways off Shary Road.
- The proposed days and hours of operation are Monday-Sunday from 7:00 am to 12:00 am.
- Staff: 15 employees in different shifts
- Parking: In reviewing the floor plan, there is a total of 113 seating spaces proposed, which require 38 parking spaces (113 seats/1 space for every 3 seats – 37.6 parking spaces). It is noted that the parking is held in common. There are 143 existing parking spaces available and are shared with the other businesses within the commercial plaza.
- Sale of Alcohol: The restaurant includes a 'bar' component. Section 1.56(3)(a) of the Zoning Code requires a minimum separation of 300' from the property line of any church, school, publicly owned property, or residence. There are no land uses within the above radius, measured doorto-door for churches or hospitals, or measured lot line to lot line for schools.
- The Planning staff has not received any objections to the request from the surrounding property owners. Staff mailed out (15) legal notices to surrounding property owners.
- Staff asked PD for any reports of this location regarding alcohol. As of this date, no incidents have been reported.

In accordance with the zoning ordinance, the P&Z and City Council may impose requirements
and conditions of approval to ensure that a use requested by a Conditional Use Permit is
compatible and complementary to adjacent properties.

### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

With no incidents occurring during their last approval, Staff recommends approval of the request subject to compliance with the following conditions:

- 1. Two Years with the understanding that the permit could be revoked due to noncompliance.

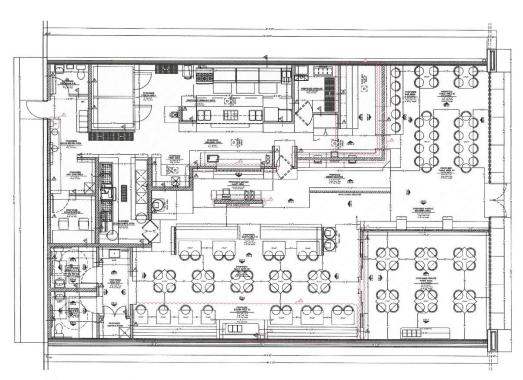

- <u>September 19, 2025</u> In accordance with State and local law, notice of required public hearings was mailed to all property owners within 200 feet of the subject tract, and notice of public hearings was published in the Progress Times.
- October 1, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of a Conditional Use Permit by the Planning and Zoning Commission.
- October 28, 2025 Public hearing and consideration of a Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.

### Summary:

- The subject site is located at the Southeast corner of Cummings and Leo Najo Street.
- Per Code of Ordinance, a daycare center in a residential zone requires the approval of a Conditional Use Permit by the City Council.
- The applicant has been running the daycare at this location since October 2018.
- The applicant has a total of 25 children ranging from infants to 12 year old at different times.
- The last conditional use permit for this home occupation at this location was approved on October 10, 2022 for a period of 3 years. Staff notes that this would be the applicants 4<sup>th</sup> renewal.
- Since the applicant does not reside at this location, he needs to comply with Section 1.56(1)(g) of the Zoning Code which states: The Planning and Zoning Commission may, under extenuating or special circumstances unique to the home occupation, recommend waiver of this provision on a temporary or permanent basis to the City Council who shall have, the ultimate authority on the matter. Subsections 1.56-1(a), (d), and/or (f), states that a minimum of 90 percent of the property owners within 200' mailout radius shall provide written support for the proposed home occupation since the applicant has a daycare center.
- The proposed days and hours of operation are Monday–Friday from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm, and Saturday from 7:00 am to 2:00 pm
- Staff: 5 employees
- Parking: Being a triplex, 6 parking spaces can be used for the daycare operation. Parking has not been an issue since most of the children are dropped off or picked up by the applicant.
- The applicant is the owner of the apartments.
- Since the applicant has obtained 90% of the signatures and has complied with all the requirements, staff does not object to renewing the conditional use permit.
- The Planning staff has not received any objections to the request from the surrounding property owners. Staff mailed out (18) legal notices to surrounding property owners.

## 7. August 2025 Employee of the Month - Munguia

Noemi Munguia, Human Resources Director, presented Idalia Cardoza, Custodian at Speer Memorial Library, as the Employee of the Month for the month of August. Ms. Cardoza had beed employed at the Speer Memorial Library for two years now. She had taken great pride in her work at the library and was eager to assist when needed.

## 8. Quarterly Report by Ambulance Board on EMS - Tim Brown / A. Garcia

Tim Brown, Chairman of the Ambulance Board, gave an update on the current operations of the Mission Fire Department's EMS services. Mr. Brown stated that the EMS program had been working extremely well. The purpose of the EMS program was not to bring in revenue but to serve the citizens. EMS was averaging about 500 calls per month and of those calls 78% of patients were being transported. Mission had always maintained an above average response time. They were averaging about 6 minutes and 41 seconds per call. Patients are transported to various health care facilities with 43% of them being taken to Mission Regional Medical Center. They had been working to distribute service calls as evenly as possible between the four medic units. There were a few overlapping calls; however those should be decreasing as the department had received two new units. Emergicon, the third party administrator had been doing a great job in collecting revenue.

## 9. Recognition of Fire Department Personnel - Silva

Michael Silva, Fire Chief, recognized Lt. Justin Longoria, Engineer Paramedic Noe Carrion, Engineer EMT Horacio Longoria, Firefighter EMT George Wyant and Firefighter EMT Armando Guerrero Jr. for their swift actions upon arrival to an apartment complex where a resident was in labor. The team assisted in the delivery of the infant and transported both mom and baby to the

hospital safely. This was the first baby that was delivered by the City of Mission's EMS team. Their work demonstrated their commitment to provide the highest level of care possible to our residents.

### 10. Presentation by Leadership Mission – Kotsatos

Representatives for Leadership Mission spoke about their upcoming Pumpkin & Paws Event. They cordially invited the Mayor, City Council and the community to their upcoming "Paws & Pumpkins" Event this Saturday, October 18<sup>th</sup>. It would be a family friendly event with a lot of activities and the unveiling of the new mural. This project had been made possible through collaborations with various organizations.

# 11. Presentation of Harry Shimotsu Elementary Recognized as 2025 Lone Star Ribbon School – Hernandez

Sydney Hernandez, Media Relations Director, presented Harry Shimotsu Elementary. This school was recognized as 2025 Lone Star Ribbon School. Harry Shimotsu Elementary was one of 28 schools in the State of Texas to receive this recognition which was accomplished by having outstanding academic performance. This award was not something that was given annually and took years to receive. Harry Shimotsu had been work hard over the years to receive this honor.

## 12. Report from Mission Economic Development Corporation - Teclo Garcia

Teclo Garcia, MEDC CEO, gave an update on the operations of the EDC. Ruby Red Ventures was still open for applications through October 31<sup>st,</sup> and applicants could receive up to \$15,000. The EDC awarded \$10,000 to Region One's ESCs Teacher Alternative Certification Program. They also attended a ribbon cutting for Paddel Club which was very nice. Students came in to visit the CEED building as part of National Gear Up Week. The new website for MEDC was now up and running.

## 13. Update on Bryan Road Construction Project – Terrazas

Juan Pablo "JP" Terrazas, Co-Interim City Manger gave an update regarding the on-going construction on Bryan Road. Mr. Terrazas introduced Mr. Javier Hinojosa who was the engineer in charge of the project and Javier Venser and Fabian Ochoa of Venser Contractors, LLC who were the ones completing the work. Mr. Terrazas stated that this project had been in the works since 2018, and was now underway. Venser Contractors had been working diligently, with extra crews, extended hours and weekends to complete this project as soon as possible. Weather permitting, the project should be complete late summer 2026. Mr. Terrazas also thanked Chief Torres for the police department's efforts in keeping the area safe and assisting with traffic control.

At 6:00 p.m., Mayor Garza called for a recess.

The applicant was requesting to rezone the subject property from Agricultural Open Interim District ("AO-I") to Large Lot Single-family Residential District ("R-1A") to develop a single-family residential development. The irregular-shaped tract of land had 9.851 acres in area and measured 405.31 feet along N. Taylor Road and 358.4 feet along E. Mile 2 Road. The surrounding zones were Agricultural Open Interim (A-OI) to the West, Large Lot Single-family Residential (R-1A) to the North, Large Lot Single-family Residential (R-1A), Single-family Residential (R-1), Agricultural Open Interim (A-OI), Office Building (C-1) to the South, and outside the city limits to the East. The surrounding land uses include single-family homes in all directions and an office building with parking at the Northwest corner of Mile 2 and N. Taylor Roads. Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Mayor Garza asked if there were any comments for or against the request.

Rene Lizcano, 3212 Melody Lane, inquired if the road/alleyway would be expanded in this area. He said there had been issues with the garbage truck getting through. He also wanted if there would be an extension of the easement. Aesthetically, he wanted to know what type of fence would be put up and what size the lots would be.

Alan Oakley, 3209 Melody Lane, echoed the concerns of Mr. Lizcano.

Mayor Garza advised that this was just to approve the rezoning of the property, and a meeting would be held at a later date to discuss the plat. She asked Mr. Cervantes to call both citizens to invite them to the meeting so that their questions could be addressed.

Emigdio Villanueva Jr., owner of Villa Homes, stated that he was glad to be able to hear some of the citizen's concerns for this project. He would be taking all the concerns into consideration when presenting the plat for approval.

The applicant was requesting to rezone the subject property from Single-family Residential District ("R-1") to Multi-family Residential District ("R-3") to develop an apartment complex. The tract of land has 0.6026 acres in area and measured 150 feet along Glasscock Road and had a depth of 175 feet. The surrounding zones were Neighborhood Commercial (C-2) to the North, Single-family Residential (R-1) to the West and South, and Multi-family Residential (R-3) to the East. The surrounding land uses included single-family homes to the West, North and South. The land uses to the East include apartments. The subject property was vacant. The Future Land Use Map showed the property designated for low density residential uses. The requested rezoning was not in line with the comprehensive plan, but staff felt that the area is in transition to multi-family residential uses. In January 2021, there was an attempt to rezone the property to R-3, but due to opposition from the surrounding property owners, the application was denied by the City Council. Subsequently in April of 2023, the property across the street to the East was rezoned from R-2 to R-3 and was later developed as a subdivision for apartments. The property to the North was zoned Neighborhood Commercial (C-2) prior to the year 2012. Notices were mailed to 23 surrounding property owners. Planning staff received no phone calls in opposition to the rezoning.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Mayor Garza asked if there were any comments for or against the request.

Annette Zavala, 909 Victoria, spoke in favor of the request. They had been looking forward to this property being developed to improve the area.

Jose Gonzalez, owner of the property, asked for the opportunity to be able to develop this property. The lot had been vacant for several years and had been used as a site for illegal dumping. He waned to invent in the property to beautify it.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to approve the rezoning request from Single-family Residential District ("R-1") to Multi-family Residential District ("R-3"), being a 0.6026 of one acre tract of land out of Lot 182, John H. Shary Subdivision, located at 200 N. Glasscock. Applicant, Jose R. & Veronica L. Gonzalez, Adoption of Ordinance #5724. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 5-0.

Mayor Garza expressed concerns about having more than four units on this property. She did not want for parking or increased traffic to become an issue. She asked if they could condition that they only build 4 apartments.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the plans showed 8 apartments, each having two respective parking spaces. The R-3 zoning allowed for multiple units. If they would like to only approve 4 units they would have to change the zoning to R-2.

Councilman Vela and Councilwoman Ortega rescinded their previous motion.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval subject to the following conditions: 1-year re-evaluation, Must comply with all City Codes (Building, Fire, Health, etc.), Hours of operation were Every Day from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 a.m.; Must comply with the noise ordinance; Must obtain a business license prior to occupancy; Maximum occupancy ws 80 people; Must have security cameras inside and outside with a minimum 30-day retention; CUP was not transferable to others.

Mayor Garza asked if there were any comments for or against the request.

There were no comments.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to approve the Conditional Use Permit for an Event Center – Le Jardin, in a General Business (C-3) District, being Lot 1, J. Reyes Subdivision, located at 3009 N. Conway Avenue, Suite 5. Applicant: Nora Marroquin, Adoption of Ordinance #5728. Motion was seconded by Councilwoman Gerlach and approved unanimously 4-0.

Applicant: City of Mission, Adoption of Ordinance #5729 - Cervantes

Due to other factors on November 25, 2019, a provision was removed from the list of possible conditional uses that would previously allow event centers and bed and breakfasts to be established in a property zoned Agricultural Open Interim. The language that was removed would allow as a conditional use other uses which, as determined by the Planning and Zoning Commission, were not contrary to the purpose established for the district. By the removal of that language from the code of ordinance, an event center or a bed and breakfast facility became not a possible conditional use under this zoning category. The proposed ordinance would allow those types of facilities with a conditional use permit after public hearings are held.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

# 26. Approval of Addendum to the Professional Services Contract between City of Mission and Westwood to include required federal regulation provisions for the Astroland Climate Resilient Flood Risk Reduction Project- Elizalde

This award and the resulting contract were subject to compliance with all applicable Federal Regulations and procurement standards, including but not limited to 2 CFR Part 200 (Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards). The addendum to the professional services contract to include the required federal regulation provisions would serve as the city's compliance pertaining to the federally funded project.

# 27. Approval of amended Memorandum of Understanding between Rio Grande Valley Texas Anti-Gang Program and the City of Mission Police Department – Torres

Amended MOU. The purpose of this MOU was to set forth an agreement and the relationship between the Rio Grande Valley Texas Anti-Gang Program and the Mission Police Department.

This agreement would dictate the personnel, formalize relationships between participating agencies for guidance, equipment, planning, training and maximize inter-agency cooperation.

# 28. Authorization to participate in a Drone as First Responder trial program (BRINC MSI Takeoff Program) with BRINC & Motorola, at no cost to the city for the first year - Torres

The Mission Police Department was requesting authorization to participate in the Drone as First Responder trial program (BRINC MSI Takeoff Program) with Motorola. The City of Mission's Police Department and municipal court utilize Tyler Technologies Enforcement Mobile providing officers electronic citation solution. From data capture, to processing, to transmittal, straight into municipal court and records system.

As the purchase exceeded the \$25,000 threshold established in the City's Purchasing Policy, City Council approval is required.

# 33. Authorization to Solicit for Bids for Striping/Pavement Markings and Crack Seal for the Public Works Department – Gonzalez

Staff was seeking authorization to solicit bids for the purchase of Striping/Pavement Markings and Crack Seal for Public Works. Striping/Pavement Markings and Crack Seal were needed by the Public Works Department.

# 34. Authorization to Solicit for Bids for Sealcoat Services for the Public Works Department – Gonzalez

Staff was seeking authorization to solicit bids for the purchase of Sealcoat Services for Public Works. Sealcoat Services were needed by the Public Works Department.

# 35. Authorize Mayor to execute a reimbursement agreement between the City of Mission and the Mission Economic Development Corporation related to the Mission Animal Shelter – T. Garcia

Staff was requesting the approval of a reimbursement agreement between the City of Mission and the Mission Economic Development Corporation related to the Mission Animal Shelter. Mission EDC would like to assist the shelter with improvements consisting of repairs, landscaping, design, construction, and equipment, in the amount not to exceed \$50,000. The MEDC Board approved the agreement on September 17.

The proposed Reimbursement Agreement was attached.

The City of Mission currently holds a contract with South Texas Landscapes, Irrigation, and Pest Control, LLC for Right-of-Way Mowing and Maintenance Services. The contract contained a Termination Clause (Section 40: Termination Due to Unacceptable Work Performance), which provided the City the right to terminate the agreement with a 30-day written notice. Staff recommended termination of contract based on poor work performance and failure to perform services in a timely manner as per contract.

# 37. Authorization to Solicit for bids for Right of Way Mowing and Maintenance Services – Bentsen

Staff was seeking authorization to solicit bids for mowing, bed maintenance, tree trimming and litter/debris removal on City Right of Ways. Services would include all supervision, labor, materials, supplies, tools and equipment necessary for cleaning, clearing, trimming, loading and disposal of all trash, debris, municipal solid waste, special waste and tires. The contractor would mow all grasses, weeds and underbrush, provide bed maintenance and litter removal when needed and trim tree branches and sucker growth below 8 ft. and palm fronds on palms and seed branches on palm trees with a minimum of 8 ft. trunk height.

# 38. Approval of Professional Services Consultant Contract for the Civil Service Director between the City of Mission and Jesse Lerma in accordance with Chapter 143 of the Texas Local Government Code to include administration of the City's 311 application – Garcia

Consultant agreed to meet the requirements pursuant to Chapter 143 for eligibility to serve as Civil Service Director throughout the duration of this Agreement. Consultant would provide overall management and administration of the City's 311 Application. To include coordinating with City staff to ensure monitoring and managing of service requests by tracking, routing, and ensuring timely follow-up with the appropriate departments. Consultant shall also make direct contact with

City residents regarding requests. This Agreement shall be for a period of one (1) year beginning on November 1, 2025, and ending on October 31, 2026 at a cost of \$3,500.00 per month.

# 39. Approval of the yearly 2025-2026 maintenance renewal of ERP (Enterprise Resource Planning) Pro and Municipal Justice software from Tyler Technologies, a sole source vendor, at a cost of \$182,197.44 – Ramirez

Approval of the yearly 2025-2026 maintenance renewal of ERP (Enterprise Resource Planning) Pro and Municipal Justice software from Tyler Technologies, a sole source vendor, at a cost of \$182,197.44

The City of Mission utilized Tyler Technologies ERP Pro software as its primary enterprise resource planning (ERP) system to manage critical municipal operations, including finance, payroll, purchasing, human resources, and budget administration. Municipal Justice software was used to manage municipal court operations, including case management, fine collections, docket scheduling, and reporting functions.

# 40. Approval of the yearly 2025-2026 maintenance renewal of Enterprise Public Safety from Tyler Technologies, a sole source vendor, at a cost of \$122,664.44 – Ramirez

Approval of the yearly 2025-2026 maintenance renewal of Enterprise Public Safety from Tyler Technologies, a sole source vendor, at a cost of \$122,664.44.

The City of Mission's Police Department utilized Tyler Technologies Enterprise Public Safety Software which supported law enforcement operations. The system integrated computer-aided dispatch (CAD), records management, mobile data, and analytics to ensure timely response, accurate reporting, and compliance with state and federal reporting requirements.

# 41. Authorization to Purchase Digital Water Meters Via Sole Source from Aqua Metric Sales Company – Terrazas

Requesting authorization to purchase digital AMI water meters on an as needed bases via sole source from Aqua Metric Sales Company. Digital Water meters would be used for the installation of new residential and commercial water services throughout the City of Mission. Pricing information had been received from the vendor. This information was considered proprietary and confidential; accordingly, it was not included in the public agenda materials in order to protect sensitive business information.

As purchases with this vendor were expected to exceed the \$25,000 threshold established in the City's Purchasing Policy, City Council approval was required.

# 42. Approval of Publicity and Tourism Agreement with the Greater Mission Chamber of Commerce, Inc. in the amount not to exceed \$350,000 from Hotel Motel Occupancy Tax and \$92.000 from the General Fund – Roman

Approval of Publicity and Tourism Agreement with the Greater Mission Chamber of Commerce, Inc. for Fiscal Year 2025-26. These were funds that were received from the Hotel Motel Occupancy Tax under VATS Tax Code, Section 351.101 to use hotel occupancy tax funds for attracting and promoting tourism and the convention and hotel industry.

Attached was a copy of the 2025-2026 agreement to be effective October 1, 2025 through September 30, 2026 in the amount not to exceed \$350,000.00 from the Hotel Motel Occupancy Tax and \$92,000 from the General Fund.

# 43. Approval of Resolution #2004 approving an Agreement between the City of Mission and the Boys and Girls Club of Mission, Inc. regarding the transition of the Club from a City department to an independent nonprofit entity operating as a 501(c)(3) – Venecia

Boys and Girls Club of Mission, Inc. was an independent nonprofit organization that provided youth services to families and children residing with the City of Mission. The City of Mission had previously provided operational and administrative services to BGCM, such as HR services and payment processing services, to assist BGCM with its administrative functions. The City and the Board of Directors of BGCM have mutually determined that the City providing certain administrative services to the BGCM would be mutually beneficial to both entities. The City shall provide the following exclusive list of services for BGCM. The City of Mission's Finance Department shall not be involved and/or shall not review investments, budget, and purchasing policies. City of Mission shall provide BGCM funding in the amount of \$700,000 each fiscal year for administrative and utility expenses. BGCM Personnel shall be employees of the City of Mission, which would continue to provide benefits to employees. City of Mission shall transfer ownership of fixed assets located at BGCM sites to BGCM.

BGCM shall maintain a bank account that was separate from any City of Mission bank account, create and manage its own purchasing, procurement and investment policies, shall approve and submit approved timesheets for payroll and city shall continue to process BGCM payroll for insurance and benefits. At the request by the City BGCM shall make available all accounting and financial documents, records, audits for the City's review. BGCM would be responsible for employment processing of its own employees, including onboarding new hires, background checks, new hire orientation, and employee discipline including termination. BGCM shall develop its own internal HR policies per Boys & Girls Clubs of America policies and requirements. Term of the agreement shall be from November 1, 2025 to September 30, 2026.

The public improvements consist of the design, engineering, construction management, material testing, and utility improvement of the Public Improvements that were eligible for financing by the Authority under the Project and Financing Plan for the Inspiration Road Trunk Masterplan, not to exceed \$1,386,840.00.

The Reimbursement Agreement was approved by the MRA on October 7, 2025. A budget amendment was required to recognize revenue from the TIRZ reimbursement agreement and the cost of design and engineering services.

The budget amendment would be presented during the mid-year review.

# 45. Ratification of Work Authorization No. 28 with Melden and Hunt, Inc. for Lift Station No. 10 Re-Route Project in the amount of \$185,640.00, in accordance with the approved Reimbursement Agreement – Terrazas

The Mission Redevelopment Authority/TIRZ #1 Board approved the Reimbursement Agreement at their October 7, 2025 meeting for the Lift Station No. 10 Re-route project. This item was a ratification of Work Authorization No. 28 with Melden & Hunt, Inc. In accordance with Texas Government Code Sec. 2254.004 (a) (2) "Contract for Professional Services of Architect, Engineer, or Surveyor," a fair and reasonable fixed rate of the total construction cost was established as follows: Design Survey 2% - \$21,840.00; Engineering Fee 8% - \$87,360.00; Construction Management 2% - \$21,840.00; and Material Testing 5% - \$54,600.00, for an estimated total amount of \$185,640.00.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to approve all consent agenda items 24 thru 45 as presented. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

46. Plat Approval: Mayfair at Trinity, a Private Subdivision, being a 27.272 acre tract of land out of Lot 15-11, West Addition to Sharyland and out of Lots 1 and 4, and all of Lot 2 and 3, Rees Subdivision, Developer: Dolcan Development, Inc., Engineer: Melden & Hunt, Inc., - Cervantes

The property was located at the Northeast corner of Bryan Road and Trinity Street. The land was currently open with a proposed use of 77 single family residential lots and 1 commercial lot. This subdivision would be private/gated. A payment in the amount of \$500.00 per dwelling unit shall be required as per the parks ordinance prior to plat recording. The internal streets were 32' Backto-Back within a 50' ROW. Access to the subdivision will be from Bryan Road and Trinity Street. All internals streets would be private. This subdivision was granted 2 variances: The developer would utilize private street names vs. the City's grid system. In addition, a variance was granted to allow 5 foot side setback. Water would be supplied through main lines running to and through the subdivision which would be looped from Bryan Road and Trinity Street. There would be 9 fire hydrants protecting the site as per the direction of the Fire Marshal's office. Water Rights conveyance or payment shall be collected in the amount of \$3000 per acre prior to recordation of the subdivision The City's sanitary sewer would collect from 4" stubouts placed front and center of each lot. The Capital Sewer Recovery fee would be imposed at \$200 per lot and \$750 per acre for the commercial lot. This subdivision lied in flood zone "B" per FEMA Community Panel No. 480334 0400 C. Drainage for this subdivision shall consist of surface runoff into the streets and collected by inlets and discharge into the existing South Mission Lateral. The City's engineering department had reviewed and approved the drainage report and design.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to approve the plat: Mayfair at Trinity, a Private Subdivision, being a 27.272 acre tract of land out of Lot 15-11, West Addition to Sharyland and out of Lots 1 and 4, and all of Lot 2 and 3, Rees Subdivision, Developer: Dolcan Development, Inc., Engineer: Melden & Hunt, Inc. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

47. Granting a Variance of Ordinance No. 2198 allowing Mission CISD fireworks display on Friday, October 31, 2025 for Homecoming festivities under the supervision of Mission Fire Department and Mission Fire Prevention – Silva

Consideration of a request to authorize a fireworks display on Friday, October 31, 2025, following the Homecoming game at approximately 10:00 p.m., to be held at Tom Landry High School Football Stadium, practice field on the west side of the stadium. All required safety precautions would be observed.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Gerlach moved to grant a Variance of Ordinance No. 2198 allowing Mission CISD fireworks display on Friday, October 31, 2025 for Homecoming festivities under the supervision of Mission Fire Department and Mission Fire Prevention. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

# 48. Request of the implementation of a speed hump in the area of 3112 N. Cummings Ave., in accordance with the City of Mission Code of Ordinances, Division 5, Speed humps, Section 110.351 to Section 110.354 – Torres

The Mission Police Department received a request for a speed hump in the area of 3112 N. Cummings Ave. Representatives of the area previously filed an application with the City of Mission for the aforementioned speed hump. After review of the application by the City of Mission Planning Department, it was confirmed that over sixty-six percent of the homeowners were in favor of the placing of speed humps on their street. On June 12, 2025, the Traffic Safety Committee met and reviewed the request. The Traffic Safety Committee recommended implementing the requested speed humps in the area of 3112 N. Cummings Ave. The request was being forwarded to you for your review and consideration.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval of rumble strips.

Councilman Vela moved to implement of a speed hump in the area of 3112 N. Cummings Ave., in accordance with the City of Mission Code of Ordinances, Division 5, Speed humps, Section 110.351 to Section 110.354. Motion was seconded by Councilwoman Ortega and approved unanimously 4-0.

# 49. Authorization to enter a Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Mission Police Department and the Mission Doctors Group in the yearly amount of \$141,000.00 to be paid with the TxDOT Grant with in kind match from the city – Torres

The Mission Police Department was requesting authorization to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Mission Doctors Group, for the purpose of clarifying the registered nurse's role and expectations from the police department, as it applied to the blood search warrant process and grant activities for the newly awarded TXDOT grant. This agreement outlines the responsibilities and abilities for both agencies. This agreement would be in effect upon approval, for one year. Total Yearly Cost of \$141,000.00 to be paid for with the TxDOT grant. With an inkind match from the city.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Mission Police Department and the Mission Doctors Group in the yearly amount of \$141,000.00 to be paid with the TxDOT Grant with in kind match from the city. Motion was seconded by Councilwoman Gerlach and approved unanimously 4-0.

# 50. Authorization to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 Operation Lone Star Grant Program in the amount of \$350,040 – Torres

On September 29, 2025, the City of Mission received notification from the Texas Office of the Governor of a grant award for the FY26 Operation Lone Star Grant Program. The award was in the amount of \$350,040 and would allow the Police Department to acquire three (3) Chevrolet Silverado 1500 Trucks for law enforcement operation and would further support overtime costs for law enforcement officers working Operation Lone Star. The program did not have a match requirement. Budget amendment would be presented mid-year.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 Operation Lone Star Grant Program in the amount of \$350,040. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

# 51. Authorization to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 Rifle Resistant Body Armor Grant Program in the amount of \$194,862.48 – Torres

On September 29, 2025, the City of Mission received notification from the Texas Office of the Governor of a grant award for the FY26 Rifle Resistant Body Armor Grant Program. The award was in the amount of \$194,862.48 and would allow the Police Department to acquire approximately 151 rifle resistant body armors. The program did not have a match requirement. Budget Amendment would be presented at mid-year.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 Rifle Resistant Body Armor Grant Program in the amount of \$194,862.48. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

The award was in the amount of \$234,604.98 and would allow the Fire Department to acquire three (3) All-Terrain Vehicles, a Big Tex Tilt Trailer, and various office equipment to support daily operations. The program did not have a match requirement. Respective budget amendment would be presented at mid-year.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 Border Zone Fire Department Grant Program in the amount of \$234,604.98. Motion was seconded by Councilwoman Gerlach and approved unanimously 4-0.

# 53. Authorization to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 First Responder Mental Health Program in the amount of \$70,000 with an in-kind match of \$17,500 – Elizalde

On September 29, 2025, the City of Mission received notification from the Texas Office of the Governor of a grant award for the FY26 First Responder Mental Health Program. The award was in the amount of \$70,000 with a 20% in-kind match of \$17,500. The project would allow the Mission Fire Department to implement a trauma informed program developed with the primary goals of improving the coping mechanisms of the first responders, while reducing the stigma associated with seeking help. The program included well-being checks on first responders that

would serve as an early intervention tool, helping address mental health concerns before they escalate. The grant would fund professional services and allow acquisition of office supplies and furniture to meet the needs of the program. Respective budget amendment would be presented at mid year.

Staff and Co-Interim City Managers recommended approval.

Councilwoman Ortega moved to accept grant award from the Office of the Governor for the FY26 First Responder Mental Health Program in the amount of \$70,000 with an in-kind match of \$17,500. Motion was seconded by Councilman Vela and approved unanimously 4-0.

# SHARY GOLF COURSE ADVIOSRY BOARD MINUTES SEPTEMBER 11TH, 2025

### Call to Order

Mr. Isaac Martinez called the meeting to order.

### Roll Call

### Approval of Minutes

- The minutes from the August 6th, 2025 were approved as written. Motion made to accept Thomas Lee, seconded Ben Lau, approved unanimously.
- The minutes from the August 19<sup>th</sup>, 2025 special meeting were approved as written. Motion made to accept Ben Lau, seconded Nacho Pecina, approved unanimously.

### • Golf Director's Report

 Progress Report on Holes 19 to 27 Renovation. The September report from VM Golf Services dated September 10<sup>th</sup>, 2025 was supplied to the board for their review. The work complete section is getting greater and work planned and in progress is getting less. Work in progress includes the grass prep on the greens and surrounds and working with irrigation sequence and its proper function. The project has progressed as planned, aside from delays from the sand supplier, which hindered the ability to construct greens and install irrigation. VM has also encountered aging irrigation controllers in need of up to date parts, including switch cards, etc. They have recommended to staff to review needs and purchase to replace. Weather and the related rain caused the greens to lose its shape, and standing water issues were visible. Bottom line is they were supposed to be finished by August 30<sup>th</sup> and are 2 weeks behind schedule. It looks like now the end of November for grow in completion, weather permitting. Cart paths came out really good as well as the extra work being done that was not in the initial scope of work. The electric construction by MUSCO has progressed beyond expectations and at this time they are only waiting on AEP for service and running the lines under the concrete paths. The board was most complimentary of Zitro's work. It was mentioned that Zitro had brought in a second crane and crew to install the poles. Discussion arose about the height of the poles, and light direction, along with the different types of grass being planted. It was duly noted that the fairway grassing was added to the scope that was not initially included. Also mentioned was the timing of the grow in and how

long it was going to take. End of November looks like a realistic date if the weather cooperates. There was no further discussion regarding the Golf Director's report.

### Golf Course Superintendents Update

 Superintendent Gutierrez stated that it is business as usual on hole 1 to 18 and that himself and a few crew members have been busy on the renovation assisting with the irrigation and its electrical component. The pond in front of the new 8 tee box was discussed about its flow and design. One of the greens mowers are down due to leaking oil and has been sent back to the area distributor to be fixed. Due to this, the course is down to one greens mower and that is why the greens have not been verti cut and sanded. Ideally another greens mower being purchased would be would be an ideal solution when we have one greens mower not functioning, but would be very beneficial to the new 9 holes mostly due to the type of turf grass. Question was asked about the equipment lease term and the answer was provided that some JD equipment will term in the fall of 2026. There was further discussion brought up by the board concerning the sod that was laid and its effectiveness. Gutierrez went on to mention the green difference between holes 17 and 18, practice putting green which look really good and the greens across the street and how they are struggling. Gutierrez went on to mention that he thinks the sod was messed with causing a color change, etc. An agronomist that Efrain talked with mentioned the greens need to be flushed and aerified to help with the growth. The lack of no verti cutting and top dressing has also affected the quality of the new sod and the putting surface. Goose grass coming up on the putting surface is still a problem. Gutierrez mentioned changing chemicals and being more consistent with applications to see if that will kill the goose grass. Due to be being down a mower it was discussed about hiring an outside source to perform the verticut project. Further discussion involved the use of the fertigation pump, finding a local source to repair the equipment, but it was noted that if warranty exists it needs to be sent back to the distributor. Golf course equipment and its lease term was brought up again in order to keep the equipment new.

On Course Restrooms are being designed with one toilet and one urinal with the ladies two toilets. The restroom will be ADA compliant which will increase the size. Location will be on the northwest side between new holes 5 and 6. Some discussion regarding being ADA compliant occurred. Starter shack is being renovated already as we speak. Pro shop relocation etc is behind schedule. This falls on the Director. Perimeter fencing is to be decided on when and what type of fence to use. Black aluminum, cable with posts and chain link pros and cons

were discussed. The least inexpensive looks like posts and cable which means we can afford do more and satisfy everyone's needs. Questions also arose about where the perimeter fencing was going to start and end, in course out of bounds,

### • Chairman's Comments

- o Mr. Martinez is concerned about the food here at the course. Not having it available is his biggest concern when we open up the night operation. The starter shack will be a part of the food operation. Quality of the water from the well and what is being done to remedy the quality came up. Mitigation is happening by the mixing of the well water and district irrigation water when available is happening now. Flushing of the greens and instituting fertigation pump to happen later. Beverage cart has arrived and on-site. Further discussion happened with the range ball dispenser and the wireless payment options and how it will work with the new POS system. Chairman Martinez asked about a membership card and possibly a trail fee card for the starters to check when they have an i-pad. The volunteer usage and when was further discussed especially regarding the night.
- o Mr. Lau mentioned changing the culture of the golfers here at the course to try and reduce people doing bad things. Again, volunteer program may need to change in order to get more of them and better quality of volunteer. Mr. Pecina mentioned instituting a basic rules sheet to hand out when golfers come in and pay. ACM Andy Garcia would like to try and meet more often but with a smaller group to try and get more things done. Creation of an ad-hoc subcommittee consisting of Ben Lau to help with the opening of the night operation was approved.

### 4. HCLS

Yenni Espinoza, Library Director, reported that from May to August, McAllen was moving out of Insignia and back to TLC. Yenni informed the board members that all of McAllen's Patrons' records would have to be removed from Insignia to avoid paying for unused records. To help, McAllen patrons will receive their first library card for free from any of the 12 other libraries. As a result of

this change patrons will not be able to place holds on books belonging to McAllen we would have to do it through the state ILL system.

Additionally, Yenni notes that SB412 does not require libraries to review materials in their collections, establish age verification measures, restrict access to materials, or remove materials from the collections. It also does not change the Texas Penal Code Section 43.24(a)(2) definition of "harmful material "and

HB 3225 aims to restrict minors' access to sexually explicit materials in municipal public library collections in Texas. The bill introduces Chapter 310 to the Local Government Code, which defines key terms such as "minor," "sexually explicit material," and "municipal public library." It prohibits libraries from maintaining sexually explicit materials in sections designated for minors. It requires libraries to implement age verification measures to prevent minors from accessing such materials without parental consent. Additionally, libraries must conduct annual reviews of their collections to ensure compliance with these regulations.

The bill also establishes civil penalties for libraries that fail to comply with the new restrictions, with fines of up to \$10,000 for each violation. The Texas State Library and Archives Commission is tasked with creating guidelines for library collection reviews and ensuring that libraries adhere to these new standards to remain eligible for state grants. The act is set to take effect on September 1, 2025, with a requirement for libraries to complete a review of their existing collections by September 1, 2027.

#### 5. Librarian's Report

Yenni Espinoza presented the Board members with the monthly reports for the months of May up to today. Yenni Espinoza reported on the numerous library activities held for each Department. Which included The Children's Dr Seuss program took place in March. We also had a Spring Break Week where the children came out to make their own silly hats, wacky headbands, and crazy socks. They were able to come in pajamas and lounge around watching movies all day while enjoying their popcorn. As usual, we had our weekly programs, including Movie Night, STEM, Toddler Time, Little Sprouts, and Tiempo de Cuentos.

MINA DE ORO STREET, APPLICANT: GUADALUPE GARCIA

Ms. De Luna stated that the applicant is requesting a special accommodation request to allow the following: 1) a 15'-9" x 21'-9" carport with a 0' front setback and a 1'-5" side setback, and 2) a 10' x 12' shed to have a 3' side setback that were constructed without a building permit. Due to the applicant's disabilities, she requires the carport for shade when getting in and out of the vehicle and to relax after completing errands.

Staff notes that these structures were built without obtaining the proper permits. Our Code Enforcement Officers have an ongoing case in Municipal Court regarding these structures

Staff recommends approval of the special accommodation request, subject to: 1) Signing a hold harmless agreement stating that the structures will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied thereafter; and 2) Obtain a building permit and assess a double permit fee

Mr. Ueckert asked if the storage unit was within the setbacks.

Ms. De Luna replied that the required setback was six feet, and what was left was three feet.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mrs. Lilia Mungallo was present, representing her mother, Mrs. Guadalupe Garcia. She mentioned that her mother was out of state at the moment, and she was present on her behalf. She stated that her brother built the carport so her mother could relax outside after doctor's appointments.

Ms. Elizondo asked if a storage shed was in the back of her property.

Mrs. Mungallo replied Yes.

Ms. Elizondo asked what the storage shed was used for.

Ms. Mungallo replied to store the lawn mower.

Ms. Elizondo asked if the storage shed was movable.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the subject site was located approximately 450 feet north of River Bend Drive along the west side of Lake View Drive. Meadow Country Club Phase 1B was recorded on March 17, 1987. The regular lot measures a total of 8,394 square feet. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep an already constructed 17' x 40' roof structure partly located within the rear setback.

There is currently an existing 1,357 square foot single-family residence on the property. The applicant constructed a roof structure without obtaining the property building permits. City officials from the Code Enforcement Division noticed the roof structure in the backyard and gave the property owner a notice of the violation.

Staff notes that the applicant applied for a building permit on April 7, 2025, but it was denied due to not meeting the setbacks. A revised application was submitted on April 11, 2025 indicating that she was proposing a 10' rear setback, but it was also denied. The required rear setback is 15' due to a utility easement. The applicant was advised that the 15' requirement needed to be met. The

applicant signed the application, indicating that the structure would be constructed meeting set The permit was issued on April 23, 2025, however that was not what was done at the site.

Item 14.

Staff recommends disapproval of the variance request as: 1) The request does not meet the standards for the issuance of a variance as described in the City of Mission Code of Ordinances; and 2) This is a self-imposed hardship.

However, if ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request, then staff would recommend that the applicant comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, with an acknowledgement of the utility easement and no access from Inspiration Road, and 2) The vehicle access gate must be modified to a pedestrian gate.

Ms. Elizondo asked if the gate was the buffer?

Mr. Cervantes replied yes. He added that the carport could be used for gatherings but not for the use of vehicles to go in and out through Inspiration Road. He mentioned that the gate had to be modified for the use of a pedestrian only.

Chairman Flores asked if there was anyone in favor or against this request.

The applicant Mrs. Elsa Covarrubias was present. She mentioned that she would like the board to consider approving her carport as is, since it was built already and would cost her money to modify it. She added that she would use the carport for gatherings and to protect her belongings from the heat or ugly weather.

Chairman Flores asked if the board had any questions for the applicant?

Ms. Elizondo stated that the applicant applied proposing to modify the carport to 10 feet instead of the required 15 feet. She stated that the applicant had no intention to modify the carport.

Mrs. Elsa Covarrubias mentioned that she wanted a solution to the problem, but then she started to think about all the money that was needed to modify the carport. She stated that she had invested a lot of money on the carport, and didn't have money to modify it.

Mr. Ueckert asked if staff spoke to the applicant in regards to leaving the carport as is, and removing the gate and making it into a pedestrian entrance only.

Mr. Cervantes replied that he was going to explain to the applicant during the meeting. He stated in Spanish to the applicant the recommendation that was being proposed.

Mrs. Elsa Covarrubias mentioned that she agreed to the proposal, but she needed time so she can build a carport in the front to protect her vehicles. She stated that she didn't have the funds to do any modifications at the moment.

Mr. Cervantes asked how much time was needed to fix the gate.

Mrs. Elsa Covarrubias replied if that was the solution to leave everything as is and build a small gate or seal it, she would need enough time to build a carport in the front.

Mr. Cervantes replied that she could take as much time that she needed to build the carport in the front. He stated that the problem was the gate.

Item 14.

There being no further discussion. Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Ms. Elizondo moved to close the public hearing. Mr. Salazar seconded the motion. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Ueckert moved to approve the variance request to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, with an acknowledgement of the utility easement and no access from Inspiration Road, and 2) The vehicle access gate must be modified to a pedestrian gate. Ms. Elizondo seconded the motion. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. William Ueckert abstained from voting on item #6

#### ITEM#6

TO ALLOW A 2.1' REAR SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 10' FOR A 9' BY 12' GAZEBO STRUCTURE, AT 2601 E. 20<sup>TH</sup> STREET, BEING LOT 11, OLIVE TREE ESTATES SUBDIVISION, AS REQUESTED WILLIAM UECKERT

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located along the North side of E. 20<sup>th</sup> Street approximately 880 feet West of Taylor Road. The applicant is requesting a variance to construct a 9' by 12' gazebo partly within the 10' rear setback. The subject property is a rectangular lot that has a depth of 118.55 feet and a width of 80 feet along 20<sup>th</sup> Street. The applicant submitted emails from utility companies with no objections.

Mr. Cervantes mentioned that the applicant was proposing a hold harmless agreement and, that if a utility company would need to access his property he would agree to remove the structure.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends denial. This request does not qualify as an undue hardship.

However, if ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would need to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, and 2) obtaining a building permit fee.

Chairman Flores asked if the board had any questions for staff.

There was none.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mrs. Dolores Ueckert who resides at 2601 E. 20<sup>th</sup> Street was present. She mentioned that she was asking for consideration from the board to allow her to place the 9'x12' Gazebo. She added that the gazebo was not a permanent structure that it would be installed by her and her husband, and would be placed over the pavers they had.

Ms. Elizondo stated that if the structure was not part of the lot, it was not an improvement.

Mr. Cervantes replied that a building permit was submitted for review and was denied because encroachment.

Item 14.

Ms. Elizondo asked if it was considered a structure, since it was not placed into the ground?

Mr. Cervantes replied that it would be placed on the ground but was removeable.

Mrs. Ueckert stated that it probably needed to be drilled on the ground, was not sure.

There being no further discussion. Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Ms. Elizondo moved to close the public hearing. Mr. Garza seconded the motion. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

There being no discussion. Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Garza moved to approve the variance request. Mr. William Ueckert abstained. Ms. Elizondo seconded the motion. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### **OTHER BUSINESS**

There was none.

Chairman Flores called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m.

#### CITIZENS PARTICIPATION

Chairman Flores asked if anyone in the audience had anything to present or express that was not on the agenda.

There was none.

## APPROVAL OF MINUTES FOR JUNE 25, 2025

Chairman Flores asked if there were any corrections to the minutes. Mr. Ueckert moved to approve the minutes as presented. Ms. Elizondo seconded the motion. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### ITEM#1

TO ALLOW A 2' REAR SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 10' AND A 4' SIDE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 6' FOR A 27' BY 19' PATIO STRUCTURE AND TO ALLOW A 1' REAR SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 10' AND A 1' SIDE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 6' FOR A 10' BY 8' SHED AND TO ALLOW A 0' GARAGE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 18' FOR A 18' BY 21' CARPORT AT 1909 W. 26<sup>TH</sup> STREET, BEING LOT 37, MONTECRISTO SUBDIVISION AS REQUESTED BY CRAIG KING.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the subject site was located along the South side of 26<sup>th</sup> Street, approximately 230 feet West of Inspiration Road. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep an already-constructed carport, patio structure, and shed. In this case, a carport was built without a permit, and when inspecting the property, we found structures in the backyard that were built without permits and encroachments on the setbacks. He added that staff didn't receive any calls in opposition, but received several calls in support from Mr. King's neighbors.

Staff recommends denial. The structures need to be modified or removed to comply with the required setbacks

However, if the ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would n ltem 14. comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structures will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structures are ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, and 2) obtaining a building permit and paying a double fee

- Mr. Cervantes replied that it was built several months ago.
- Ms. Elizondo stated that both easements were being encroached on.
- Mr. Cervantes replied on the sides, rear, and front.
- Ms. Elizondo asked if it was a neighborhood sweep.
- Mr. Cervantes replied that code enforcement officers noticed the carport, since it was the only one in that neighborhood. He mentioned that it was a relatively new subdivision with very nice houses.
- Ms. Elizondo asked if any variances were approved or denied for that subdivision.
- Mr. Cervantes replied no.
- Ms. Elizondo stated that Mr. Garza mentioned that the shed had been there for a long time.
- Mr. Garza stated the shed looks old.
- Mr. Cervantes replied that the subdivision is not that old.
- Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

The applicant, Mr. Craig King, was present. He mentioned that two years ago, there was a bad hailstorm that damaged his cars. He stated that he built the carport to protect his vehicles. The back shed is just rusted from all the rain. The utility company came a month ago and ran a line in my backyard for the neighbor's cable.

- Ms. Elizondo asked if Mr. King had use for his garage.
- Mr. King replied that there was enough room for one car. He mentioned that he had two old dogs in the garage with an air conditioner running constantly.
- Mr. Salazar asked who built the carport.
- Mr. King replied that he didn't remember the name of the company.
- Mr. Christopher Tarbutton resides at 1904 West 26th Street. He mentioned that he lived right in front of Mr. King's home. He stated that he speaks highly of Mr. King and understood that there was an ordinance to be followed. He said he had no problem with what Mr. King built for himself and his family.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Mr. Garza moved to close the public hearing, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Ueckert asked if there was a homeowner's association.

Mr. Cervantes replied no.

Mr. Garza asked if there was no opposition from the utility companies to the easements. Is there any documentation in case something comes up?

Ms. Elizondo stated that the back patio was not discussed. We are talking about the front part, and I have the same concern that Mr. Garza has about the utility easement.

Ms. De Luna stated that we were asked not to target structures older than three years. She added that the only thing we would consider would be the carport.

Ms. Elizondo stated that Jessica mentioned that the shed was from 2023. Is the shed on concrete?

Mr. King replied Yes.

Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Ueckert moved to deny the variance request for the carport, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Ms. Elizondo stated that she would like to table the shed until Mr. King gets utility clearance or at least does the utility locator.

Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Ms. Elizondo moved to table the variance request for the shed until a utility locator is done, and Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### ITEM #2

TO ALLOW A 6' 2" REAR SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 18' AND A 5' 9" CORNER SIDE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 10' FOR A 30' X 20' 2" CARPORT, AT 101 ALBERTO TREVINO DRIVE, BEING LOT 6, GEORGEANNA ESTATES SUBDIVISION, AS REQUESTED JAVIER SALINAS.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located at the Northwest corner of Alberto Trevino Drive and Paseo Encantado. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep an already-constructed carport in the property's backyard.

Staff recommends denial. The structures must be modified or removed to comply with the required setbacks.

However, if the ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would need to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structures will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structures are ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, and 2) obtaining a building permit and paying a double fee.

Chairman Flores asked if there was an alley in the back.

Mr. Cervantes replied Yes.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Javier Salinas, who resides at 101 Alberto Trevino, was present. He mentioned that he had two antique Mustangs and would use the carport to protect them. He stated that the contractors were from the Facebook marketplace and that his dad helped him hire them.

Ms. Elizondo stated, "So you're in a corner, where there's an alley behind you and a street next to you."

- Mr. Salinas replied Yes.
- Mr. Ueckert asked How do you get your vehicle under the carport?
- Mr. Salinas replied I drive through the side.
- Ms. Elizondo asked if there was a car parked in front of where it would say ten-foot corner.
- Mr. Salinas replied yes, he mentioned that the car was the one that he was fixing up.
- Mr. Ueckert asked when the carport was built.
- Mr. Salinas replied three months ago.
- Mr. Garza stated he had a question for Mr. Cervantes and the planning staff. If he adjusted the pole, could the overhang stay there?
- Mr. Cervantes replied that the entire structure could be moved so that it won't encroach on the setback.
- Ms. Elizondo stated that Mr. Salinas didn't have a cement pad.
- Mr. Garza stated that he could move the poles to clear the setbacks.
- Mr. Cervantes stated that the overhang cannot encroach on the setbacks; it is considered airspace.
- Ms. Elizondo asked the staff a question. Are we no longer publishing previous approvals or denials in the neighborhood?
- Ms. De Luna replied Yes.
- Ms. Elizondo asked, so there isn't any in this neighborhood.
- Ms. De Luna replied no.
- Chairman Flores asked if the lot was considered an irregular lot.
- Mr. Cervantes replied Yes.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public he tem 14. Mr. Garza moved to close the public hearing, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the hours passed unanimously.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Salazar moved to approve the variance request to the footprint, and Mr. Garza seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### **ITEM #3**

TO ALLOW A 0' FRONT CARPORT AND GARAGE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 18', AT 203 OBLATE AVENUE, BEING LOT 7, BLOCK 52, MISSION ORIGINAL TOWNSITE SUBDIVISION, AS REQUESTED BY DELMIRO & MARIA GARCIA.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located at the Northwest corner of Oblate Avenue and E. 2nd Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep an already-constructed carport located in the front driveway of the house.

Staff recommends denial. The structures must be modified or removed to comply with the required setbacks.

However, if the ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would need to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structures will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structures are ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, and 2) obtaining a building permit and paying a double fee.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mrs. Maria Garcia, who resides at 203 Oblate Avenue, was present. She mentioned that when she was approached to build the carport, the man who did her paperwork said that it was taken care of. But when she came to the city, they said, "You should have taken care of it and not taken his word for it.".

Ms. Elizondo asked what the reason was for building the carport?

Mrs. Garcia replied to protect the cars.

Mr. Salazar stated that the person who told you it was okay was from the city. Who was it?

Mrs. Garcia replied that he was from Dream Homes.

Mr. Salazar asked if he was affiliated with the City of Mission or anybody in any official capacity.

Mrs. Garcia stated No.

Ms. Elizondo stated that she had a comment. We continue to take the citizens of Mission's vulnerability and put them in the back seat, and not go after builders and contractors who take advantage of the elderly. I still think that there needs to be some kind of monetary punishment for contractors who behave this way.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public he ltem 14. Mr. Garza moved to close the public hearing, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the limited passed unanimously.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Garza moved to approve the variance request to its footprint and sign a hold harmless agreement, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### TEM#4

TO ALLOW A 0' FRONT SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 20' FRONT SETBACK FOR A 21'X18'-5" CARPORT AT 611 W. 30TH STREET, BEING LOT 73, TABASCO SUBDIVISION, AS REQUESTED BY JUANA RODRIGUEZ.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located along the South side of W. 30th Street, approximately 190 feet West of Peace Avenue. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep a 21' by 18'-5" carport within the 20' front setback.

Staff recommends denial. this request does not qualify as an undue hardship.

However, if ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request, then the applicant would need to comply 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain with the following: perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, and 2) obtain a building permit fee.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mrs. Juana Rodriguez, who resides at 611 West 30th Street, was present. She mentioned that she requested a permit but was denied because she didn't have the plans for the carport, she only had the measurements. She added that she found someone building a carport and they advised her to build the carport and eventually the city will just charge you a fee for building it.

Ms. Elizondo asked how much Mrs. Rodriguez paid for the carport.

Mrs. Juana Rodriguez replied \$3,600.

Mr. Garza asked if the variance could be approved if Mrs. Rodriguez removed what was on the rightof-way.

Ms. Elizondo stated that the plat had a note that stated any unauthorized structure will be removed. She added that you can't go against what the entity records and signs.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the plat note was for the irrigation district, right, Alex?

Mr. Salazar asked if it was standard verbiage for planning?

Mr. Cervantes replied that it could be something that the irrigation department may have asked for with the city. Sometimes the city council approves licenses to encroach. So, if this was approved today the remaining portion could be approved by the city council through a license to encroach on the right of way.

Item 14.

Ms. Elizondo stated that she agreed with Mr. Cervantes, however it could be the irrigation distrihad that note inserted there. If they abandon the easement, then we could proceed.

- Mr. Garza stated that the carport was in the front and the irrigation easement was in the rear.
- Mr. Salazar stated that he noticed that no other variances had been approved in this subdivision.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Mr. Garza moved to close the public hearing, and Ms. Elizondo seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Ms. Elizondo moved to deny the variance request due it not being an undue hardship, and Mr. Ueckert seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### ITEM#5

TO ALLOW A 4-FOOT FRONT SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 20 FEET, AND A 1-FOOT SIDE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 6 FEET FOR A 25' X 30' CARPORT AT 707 W.  $30^{\text{TH}}$  STREET, BEING LOT 81, TABASCO SUBDIVISION, AS REQUESTED BY ROBERTO GOMEZ.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located approximately 260 feet east of Nicholson Avenue along the south side of W. 30<sup>th</sup> Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep a 25'x30' carport within the front and side setback.

Staff recommends disapproval of the variance request as follows: 1) The request does not meet the standards for the issuance of a variance as described in the City of Mission Code of Ordinances; 2) The structure was built without a permit, and 3) This is a self-imposed hardship.

However, if ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would need to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, 2) obtaining a building permit, and 3) paying a double permit fee.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Roberto Gomez who resides at 707 W 30<sup>th</sup> Street was present. He mentioned that the reason he made the carport for three cars was to prevent his third car from being in the sidewalk. He added that his kids play on there bikes on the sidewalk and instead of building the carport over the sidewalk he decided to extend it to one side. He stated that he was not the only one with a carport that there were several in the neighborhood.

- Ms. Elizondo asked if Mr. Gomez knew the addresses of the other carports?
- Mr. Gomez replied that one of the houses was on 30<sup>th</sup> Street. He stated that he thinks it was lot 60 or 61.
- Ms. Elizondo asked if a variance was approved for any of those lots.
- Ms. De Luna replied that the only variance that she was aware of was lot 26.

Mr. Gomez replied that it was him and his friend.

Chairman Flores asked if anyone in favor or against this variance request. There was none.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Ms. Elizondo moved to close the public hearing, and Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the previous variance request that was just denied was in the same street and same subdivision.

Ms. Elizondo mentioned that it was self-inflicted, because there was an awareness of a letter from a neighbor previously and he moved forward with building the carport.

Mr. Cervantes stated that there was a five-foot utility easement in the front.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Ueckert moved to deny the variance request, and Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

#### ITEM#6

TO ALLOW A 4 FOOT FRONT SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 30 FEET, AND A 1 FOOT SIDE SETBACK INSTEAD OF THE REQUIRED 6 FEET FOR A 25' X 22' CARPORT AT 931 BOWEN STREET, BEING LOT 9, BLOCK B, EAGLE HEIGHTS UT 3 SUBDIVISION AS REQUESTED BY JORGE ADAME

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located at the northwest corner of Jones Avenue and Bowen Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep a 25'x22' carport within the front and side setback.

Staff recommends disapproval of the variance request as: 1) The request does not meet the standards for the issuance of a variance as described in the City of Mission Code of Ordinances; 2) The structure was built without a permit, and 3) This is a self-imposed hardship.

However, if ZBA is inclined to approve this variance request then the applicant would need to comply with the following: 1) Sign a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain perpetually "open and to its footprint" and if the structure is ever removed, the prevailing setbacks shall be complied with thereafter, 2) obtaining a building permit, and 3) paying a double permit fee.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the next-door neighbor had a carport but wasn't sure if they got a variance or it was past the three years.

Ms. De Luna stated that the carport next door was passed the three years. She mentioned that the house in the back applied for a permit back in 2020, but the city of mission had different setback requirements, which allowed it at ten feet.

Mr. Salazar asked what was time frame for that city ordinance, and what was the reason for it?

Ms. De Luna replied for a year and it was to comply with the front setback. She added but they reverted the ordinance back to its original setback.

Ms. Elizondo stated that she was going to recuse herself from this item, because she owns a property on Bowen Street.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Representing the applicant was the applicant's daughter Ms. Jacqueline Adame. She mentioned that there was a big storm that damaged all their cars and the main reason for building the carport was to protect all her vehicles. She stated that there was a garage in the back, but it was for one car only and they are a family of six.

Mr. Ueckert stated that he noticed that the driveway is concrete, and the other side is gravel.

Ms. Adame replied that it was concrete, but its damaged. I would need to ask my dad but he is working out of town.

Chairman Flores asked if the front of the house was where the carport was built?

Ms. Adame replied Yes.

Chairman Flores asked if the carport meets the front setbacks?

Mr. Cervantes replied that the front setback was thirty feet.

Mr. Salazar asked who built the carport?

Ms. Adame replied no, it was a contractor.

Mr. Salazar asked how much did the carport cost?

Ms. Adame replied forty-five hundred.

Mr. Ueckert asked when was the carport built?

Ms. Adama replied 2021.

Mr. Salazar asked if the neighbor to the east requested a variance.

Ms. De Luna replied that the carport complies with the three years, the home on Burris Street requested a variance and was approved.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Mr. Garza moved to close the public hearing, and Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Mr. Garza moved to approve the variance request, subject to signing a hold harmless agreement stating that the structure will remain open and within to footprint. Ms. Elizondo abstained. Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was located at the corner of Kickapoo Creek and Warjebo Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to construct a 14' x 30' Swimming Pool within the 20' rear setback.

Mr. Cervantes mentioned that the swimming pool was outside of the utility easements but within the setbacks, and that it was a proposed new swimming pool.

Staff recommends denial.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Jorge Padilla and Raul Garcia were present. Mr. Padilla mentioned that he wants to built a pool for his family. He stated that as they get older, they want different kinds of exercise nothing that puts pain on their ankles.

Mr. Salazar asked if there was anywhere else on the lot where the pool could be built?

Mr. Padilla replied that it was the best place he had. He stated we have good visibility to ensure we can see from the inside out.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion to close the public hearing. Ms. Elizondo moved to close the public hearing, and Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Ms. Elizondo moved to approve the variance request, Mr. Salazar seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the site was at the cul-de-sac of Cardinal Street and E. 20<sup>th</sup> Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to construct a 790 square feet pool house within the 20' rear setback off Glasscock Road.

The proposed pool is going to encroach on the setbacks but not on the utility easement. When I spoke to the applicant, he mentioned he would apply for a permit for both the pool house and the swimming pool, but desires to build the pool house first and then the swimming pool.

Chairman asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Guillermo Guerrero, who resides at 2004 E. 20<sup>th</sup> Street. He mentioned that he was asking for a five-foot variance. He stated that he had been saving money to build a pool and a pool house for guests or anyone to use.

Chairman Flores asked if there was anyone in favor of or against this variance request.

Mrs. Olga Galvan, who resides at 1903 Cardinal Street, was present. She mentioned that her backyard was connected to Mr. Guerrero back backyard. She stated that Mr. Guerrero had an above-ground pool, and the motor would make a lot of noise, which affected her lifestyle. She added that she didn't understand the letter she received and wanted to ensure that Mr. Guerrero complied with the six-foot side setback with whatever he was proposing to build.

Mr. Guerrero stated that after meeting with his contractor, who is building the pool, he advised me that the motor for the pool will be on the opposite side of Mrs. Galvan.

Ms. Elizondo stated that the board was addressing the pool house and not the pool.

Mr. Guerrero replied Yes, but her concern was the noise of the motor.

Chairman Flores asked if most motors were on the side of the house.

Ms. Elizondo replied that motors need electricity.

Mr. Salazar asked Mr. Guerrero what the reason was for the variance request.

Mr. Guerrero replied that it was an irregularly shaped lot.

Mr. Salazar asked Why do you want the pool house there.

Mr. Guerrero replied that it was the best place where the pool house could fit.

Mr. Salazar stated You can reduce it, right? The pool house could be reduced, or your pool house could be smaller.

Mr. Guerrero replied, Yeah.

Mr. Salazar stated it wouldn't kill your project. It would just have to be moved or modified to fit tem 14.

Ms. Elizondo asked if Mr. Guerrero had a site plan for the future pool.

Mr. Guerrero replied no.

the setbacks.

Mr. Cervantes replied yes, and the variance that was being requested was on the west side.

There being no further discussion, Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Ms. Elizondo moved to approve the variance request, and Mr. Flores seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion died with a 3/1 vote.

Mr. Cervantes mentioned that the applicant could request a full board.

Mr. Salazar said he would like to review the site plan, including the swimming pool.

Chairman Flores entertained a motion. Ms. Elizondo rescinded her first motion and motioned to table item #8; Mr. Ueckert seconded it. Upon a vote, the motion passed.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the property was approximately 200 feet east of Holland Road along the south side of W. 25th Street. The applicant is requesting a variance to allow a 0-foot side setback on the west side of Lot 2 in order to match the ordinance setback for the adjacent Lot 3. Lot 1 is a stormwater detention area and will not have a building on it. The lot is currently vacant, and the applicant would like to construct a townhome.

Ms. Elizondo asked if the plat was recorded?

Mr. Cervantes replied Yes.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Cervantes stated that the property was located at the Northwest corner of Princeton and Audrey Drives. The applicant is requesting a variance to keep an already-constructed patio structure with an outdoor kitchen. A variance was denied on March 13, 2025, for both the outdoor patio structure and a canopy structure encroaching on the side setback. The variances were denied due to opposition from the property owner to the west. The encroachment to the side setback has been cleared by the applicant, and he is now requesting reconsideration of the variance for the outdoor patio structure rear setback encroachment.

Chairman Flores asked if the applicant was present.

Mr. Conne A. Gomez, who resides at 1713 Audrey Drive, was present. He mentioned that he was requesting a variance to keep his back patio. Staff: 2 employees. Parking: There is a total of 8 parking spaces available that will be shared amongst the two businesses. Staff notes that the Chiropractic Clinic operates by appointment only. The last conditional use permit approved for the mobile food unit for this location was on October 28, 2024 for a period of 1 year. Staff notes that this would be the 1st renewal. The Planning staff has not received any objections to the request from the surrounding property owners. Staff mailed out (14) legal notices to surrounding property owners. In accordance with the zoning ordinance, the P&Z and City Council may impose requirements and conditions of approval to ensure that a use requested by a Conditional Use Permit is compatible and complementary to adjacent properties. Staff recommends approval of the request subject to compliance with the following conditions: 1) Permit for two (2) years to continue to assess this

conditional use permit; 2) Continued compliance with all City Codes (Building, Fire, Health, Sign codes, etc.); 3) CUP is not transferable to others; and 4) Hours of operation to be as follows: Monday – Saturday from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm.

Mr. Cervantes stated the applicant is requesting to rezone the subject property from Single-family Residential District ("R-1") to Multi-family Residential District ("R-3") to develop an apartment complex. The tract of land has 0.6026 acres in area and measures 150 feet along Glasscock Road and has a depth of 175 feet. The surrounding zones are Neighborhood Commercial (C-2) to the North, Single-family Residential (R-1) to the West and South, and Multi-family Residential (R-3) to the East. The surrounding land uses include single-family homes to the West, North and South. The land uses to the East include apartments. The subject property is vacant. The Future Land Use Map shows the property designated for low density residential uses. The requested rezoning is not in line with the comprehensive plan, but staff feels that the area is in transition to multi-family residential uses. In January 2021, there was an attempt to rezone the property to R-3, but due to opposition from the surrounding property owners, the application was denied by the City Council. Subsequently In April of 2023, the property across the street to the East was rezoned from R-2 to R-3 and was later developed as a subdivision for apartments. But other than that, your neighborhood should not be affected in any way.

Ms. Rodriguez asked would it be something that the City of Mission would consider since the traffic jam is going to get worse once we bring another neighborhood. Additionally, there will be more children at Leal Elementary. As you said, it is a plus, as it means more children for the school district. She isn't sure how effective that is, given that teachers are often overwhelmed with the number of children in each classroom. However, the traffic there is the main concern. What are we going to do to keep things safe? She mentioned as of Right now, nothing has been done. Obviously, you have kids crossing the road from our neighborhood to Los Ebanos to get to school, she often has seen cars speeding, she stated she has called Mission PD because she has seen that there's going to be a lot more traffic going through there. There will be a lot more traffic in the neighborhood. She asked How can we improve this for everyone. She mentioned she doesn't have a problem with a new neighborhood and with beautifying the area because it will look nicer.

The development surface will be graded to direct storm water toward curb and gutters and intercepted by type "A" curb inlets that lead to a detention facility. This system will bleed into City of Mission systems. The Engineering Department has reviewed and approved the drainage report. Water service will be provided by connecting to an existing 8" water line located along the East side of N. Trosper Road and looped to an existing main line within the recorded Amber Groves Estates Subdivision which is prepped with a flush valve that will be removed. Each lot will be serviced by a 2" water line to accommodate each duplex/fourplex. There is a total of 3 fire hydrants as per the Fire Marshall's directive. The sanitary sewer line runs to and thru the subdivision collecting from 4" sewer stub. A Capital Sewer Recovery Fee is required at \$670 per lot which equates to \$20,100.00. Required fees include Park Fee (\$500xUnit), Conveyance or Payment of Water Rights (\$3000 per acre), and all other format findings will be complied with prior to the recording of the plat. The internal street is public 32 feet back-to-back within a 50 feet rightof-way and an access only thru N. Trosper Road. Staff recommends approval of the Plat subject to conditions: Payment of Capital Sewer Recovery Fees, Payment of Park Fees, Conveyance or Payment of Water Rights, and approval of the infrastructure from the different City departments as per the approved construction plans.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS FINDING THAT TEXAS GAS SERVICE COMPANY'S, A DIVISION OF ONE GAS, INC., STATEMENT OF INTENT TO INCREASE RATES FILING WITHIN THE CITY SHOULD BE DENIED; FINDING THAT THE CITY'S REASONABLE RATE CASE EXPENSES SHALL BE REIMBURSED BY THE COMPANY; FINDING THAT THE MEETING AT WHICH THIS RESOLUTION IS PASSED IS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC AS REQUIRED BY LAW; REQUIRING NOTICE OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE COMPANY AND LEGAL COUNSEL.

WHEREAS, the City of Mission Texas ("City") is a gas utility customer of Texas Gas Service Company, a Division of ONE Gas, Inc., ("TGS" or "Company") within the unincorporated areas of the Central-Gulf, West North, and Rio Grande Valley Service Area, and a regulatory authority with an interest in the rates and charges of TGS; and

WHEREAS, the City is a member of Cities Served by Texas Gas Service Company (such participating cities are referred to herein as "TGS Cities"), a coalition of similarly situated cities served by TGS that have joined together to efficiently and cost effectively review and respond to natural gas issues affecting rates charged in TGS' Central-Gulf, West North, and Rio Grande Valley Service Area; and

WHEREAS, on or about June 30, 2025, TGS filed with the City a Statement of Intent to Increase Rates seeking to increase natural gas revenues by \$41.1 million annually and to all customers residing in the City; and

WHEREAS, TGS Cities has coordinated its review of TGS' Statement of Intent filing and designated attorneys and consultants to resolve issues in the Company's filing; and

WHEREAS, through review of the application, TGS Cities' consultants determined that TGS' proposed rates are excessive; and

WHEREAS, TGS Cities' members and attorneys recommend that TGS Cities members deny the Statement of Intent; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the rates proposed by TGS to be recovered through its gas rates charged to customers located within the City limits, are hereby found to be unreasonable and shall be denied.

## MODEL STAFF REPORT REGARDING TEXAS GAS SERVICE COMPANY'S STATEMENT OF INTENT FILING

## \*\*\*FINAL ACTION MUST BE TAKEN TO DENY THE REQUESTED RATE CHANGE BY NOVEMBER 17, 2025\*\*\*

#### **Overview**

On June 30, 2025, Texas Gas Service Company (TGS or Company) filed a Statement of Intent to Increase Rates application with each of the cities in their Central-Gulf, West North, and Rio Grande Valley service areas. In the filing, the Company asserted that it is entitled to a \$41.1 million increase or a 9.83% increase over current adjusted revenues, excluding gas costs.

In June, the Cities Served by Texas Gas Service Company (TGS Cities) engaged the services of consultants to review the Company's filing. The consultants identified numerous unreasonable expenses and proposed significant reductions to the Company's request. Accordingly, TGS Cities' attorney recommends that all TGS Cities members adopt the Resolution denying the rate change. Once the Resolution is adopted, TGS will have 30 days to appeal the decision to the Railroad Commission where the appeal will be consolidated with TGS' filing for the environs and those cities that have relinquished their jurisdiction (i.e. Gas Utility Docket 28202) currently pending at the Railroad Commission.

Under the law, cities with original jurisdiction over this matter have 125 days from the initial filing to take final action on the application. By the agreement of the parties, this deadline was suspended until November 17, 2025. As such, all cities with original jurisdiction will need to adopt the resolution no later than November 17.

Accordingly, the purpose of the Resolution is to deny the rate application proposed by TGS.

#### **Explanation of "Be It Resolved" Paragraphs:**

- 1. This paragraph finds that the Company's application is unreasonable and should be denied.
- 2. This section states that the Company's current rates shall not be changed.
- 3. The Company will reimburse Cities for their reasonable rate case expenses. Legal counsel and consultants, approved by the TGS Cities will submit monthly invoices that will be forwarded to TGS for reimbursement.
- 4. This section merely recites that the Resolution was passed at a meeting that was open to the public and that the consideration of the Resolution was properly noticed.
- 5. This section provides TGS and counsel for the cities will be notified of the City's action by sending a copy of the approved and signed resolution to counsel.

## AGREEMENT FOR THE TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF STATE RIGHT-OF-WAY

**THIS AGREEMENT** is made by and between the State of Texas, acting by and through the Texas Department of Transportation, hereinafter called the "State," and the City of <u>Mission</u>, a municipal corporation, acting by and through its duly authorized officers, hereinafter called the "City."

#### WITNESSETH

**WHEREAS**, the State owns and operates a system of highways for public use and benefit, including <u>Mission</u>, in <u>Hidalgo</u>, County; and

WHEREAS, the City has requested the temporary closure of <u>eastbound lanes on U.S.</u>
Business 83 from Holland avenue to Stewart road, southbound lanes on Conway Avenue from Tom Landry to 8th street, and southbound lanes on Bryan road (F.M. 396) from Elm Street to Matamoros street only for the purpose of the City of Mission Veterans Day Parade, as described in the attached "Exhibit A," hereinafter identified as the "Event;" and

WHEREAS, the Event will be located within the City's incorporated area; and

**WHEREAS**, the State, in recognition of the public purpose of the Event, wishes to cooperate with the City so long as the safety and convenience of the traveling public is ensured and that the closure of the State's right-of-way will be performed within the State's requirements; and

**WHEREAS**, 43 TAC, Section 22.12 establishes the rules and procedures for the temporary closure of a segment of the State highway system; and

**WHEREAS**, this agreement has been developed in accordance with the rules and procedures of 43 TAC, Section 22.12;

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements of the parties hereto, to be by them respectively kept and performed as hereinafter set forth, it is agreed as follows:

#### AGREEMENT

#### Article 1. CONTRACT PERIOD

This agreement becomes effective upon final execution by the State and shall terminate upon completion of the Event or unless terminated or modified as hereinafter provided.

#### Article 2. EVENT DESCRIPTION

The description of the Event, including the proposed schedule of start and stop times, approximate number of people attending the Event, and equipment involved shall be attached hereto and identified as "Exhibit C."

#### Article 3. OPERATIONS OF THE EVENT

- **A.** The City shall assume all costs for the operations associated with the Event, to include but not limited to, plan development, materials, labor, public notification, providing protective barriers and barricades, protection of highway traffic and highway facilities, and all traffic control and temporary signing.
- **B.** The City shall submit to the State for review and approval the construction plans, if construction or modifications to the State's right-of-way is required, the traffic control and signing plans, traffic enforcement plans, and all other plans deemed necessary by the State.
- **C.** The City will not initiate closure prior to 24 hours before the scheduled Event and all barriers and barricades will be removed and the highway reopened to traffic within 24 hours after the completion of the Event.
- **D.** The City will provide adequate enforcement personnel to prevent vehicles from stopping and parking along the main lanes of highway right-of-way and otherwise prevent interference with the main lane traffic by both vehicles and pedestrians. The City will prepare a traffic enforcement plan, to be approved by the State in writing at least 48 hours prior to the scheduled Event. Additionally, the City shall provide to the State a letter of certification from the law enforcement agency that will be providing traffic control for the Event, certifying that they agree with the enforcement plan and will be able to meet its requirements.
- **E.** The City hereby assures the State that there will be appropriate passage allowance for emergency vehicle travel and adequate access for abutting property owners during construction and closure of the highway facility. These allowances and accesses will be included in the City's traffic control plan.
- **F.** The City will avoid or minimize damage, and will, at its own expense, restore or repair damage occurring outside the State's right-of-way and restore or repair the State's right-of-way, including roadway and drainage structures, signs, and pavement, etc. to a condition equal to that existing before the closure, and, to the extent practicable, restore the natural environment, including landscape features.

#### Article 4. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

Upon completion or termination of this agreement, all documents prepared by the City will remain the property of the City. All data prepared under this agreement shall be made available to the State without restriction or limitation on their further use.

#### Article 5. TERMINATION

- **A.** This agreement may be terminated by any of the following conditions:
  - (1) By mutual written agreement and consent of both parties.
  - (2) By the State upon determination that use of the State's right-of-way is not feasible or is not in the best interest of the State and the traveling public.
  - (3) By either party, upon the failure of the other party to fulfill the obligations as set forth herein.
  - (4) By satisfactory completion of all services and obligations as set forth herein.

**B.** The termination of this agreement shall extinguish all rights, duties, obligations and liabilities of the State and City under this agreement. If the potential termination of this agreement is due to the failure of the City to fulfill its contractual obligations as set forth herein, the State will notify the City that possible breach of contract has occurred. The City must remedy the breach as outlined by the State within ten (10) days from receipt of the State's notification. In the event the City does not remedy the breach to the satisfaction of the State, the City shall be liable to the State for the costs of remedying the breach and any additional costs occasioned by the State.

#### Article 6. DISPUTES

Should disputes arise as to the parties' responsibilities or additional work under this agreement, the State's decision shall be final and binding.

#### Article 7. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE PARTIES

The State and the Local Government agree that neither party is an agent, servant, or employee of the other party and each party agrees it is responsible for its individual acts and deeds as well as the acts and deeds of its contractors, employees, representatives, and agents.

#### Article 8. INSURANCE

- **A.** Prior to beginning any work upon the State's right-of-way, the City and/or its contractors shall furnish to the State a completed "Certificate of Insurance" (TxDOT Form 1560, latest edition) and shall maintain the insurance in full force and effect during the period that the City and/or its contractors are encroaching upon the State right-of-way.
- **B.** In the event the City is a self-insured entity, the City shall provide the State proof of its self-insurance. The City agrees to pay any and all claims and damages that may occur during the period of this closing of the highway in accordance with the terms of this agreement.

#### Article 9. AMENDMENTS

Any changes in the time frame, character, agreement provisions or obligations of the parties hereto shall be enacted by written amendment executed by both the City and the State.

#### Article 10. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

The City shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local environmental laws, regulations, ordinances and any conditions or restrictions required by the State to protect the natural environment and cultural resources of the State's right-of-way.

#### **Article 11. LEGAL CONSTRUCTION**

In case one or more of the provisions contained in this agreement shall for any reason be held invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability shall not affect any other provisions hereof and this agreement shall be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.

#### Article 12. NOTICES

All notices to either party by the other required under this agreement shall be delivered personally or sent by certified U.S. mail, postage prepaid, addressed to such party at the

**WHEREAS**, the City of Mission, as a home-rule municipality, may "lease, grant, or convey" personal property in accordance with the Texas Constitution and state law; and

**WHEREAS**, included among the management responsibilities of public property is the authority and duty to declare property determined to be of no further use to the City to be surplus; and,

**WHEREAS**, surplus property is personal property that is not needed or required for an entity's foreseeable needs but still has some usefulness for the purpose it was originally intended; and

**WHEREAS**, the City is authorized to dispose of personal property that is found to be surplus in any manner that does not violate the Constitution; and

**WHEREAS**, the City has determined that the disposition of property seen in Exhibit A of this resolution would be beneficial to the City and serve a public purpose.

# NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS:

- Section 1. The City Council of the City of Mission, Texas hereby declares the property listed in the attached **Exhibit A** as surplus, authorizes the listing and sale of such property via online auction and/or disposed of as surplus, donate to non-profit organizations or the City's Sister City program if the property is determined to have no resale value, and authorizes the City Manager and their staff to execute all necessary documents to complete the transfer of said property in accordance with the forgoing legislative findings.
- Section 2. The recitals contained in the preamble hereof are hereby found to be true, and such recitals are hereby made a part of this Resolution for all purposes and are adopted as a part of the judgment and findings of the City Council.
- Section 3. All resolutions or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this Resolution are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this Resolution shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.
- Section 4. This Resolution shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.
- Section 5. If any provision of this Resolution or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held to be invalid, the remainder of this Resolution and the application of such provision to other persons and circumstances shall nevertheless be valid, and the City Council hereby declares that this Resolution would have been enacted without such invalid provision.

# AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE #5714 ADOPTING THREE (3) ADDITIONAL PERSONNEL TO THE CLASSIFIED POSITION OF FIREFIGHTER FOR THE MISSION FIRE DEPARTMENT

Whereas, the City Council in Ordinance 2963 established the civil service policies for the City of Mission and in this ordinance establishes the classifications in the Fire Department for each FY. The Mission Fire Department had requested and established 57 positions for the Classified Position of Firefighters by the adoption of Ordinance #5714 for the FY 2025-26. On October 28, 2025, City Council approved funding for the Mission Fire Department that allows the hiring of three (3) additional firefighters.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TX. THAT,

**SECTION 1:** The classified positions for Firefighters will increase to 60 with the addition of three (3) new positions for the Mission Fire Department and shall be set out in the attached exhibit and incorporated herein.

**SECTION 2**: This ordinance shall be effective on October 28, 2025, and shall be subject to amendment or repeal in accordance with the fiscal year for the City of Mission which shall expire on September 30, 2026.

**SECTION 3**: The City Secretary of the City of Mission is hereby authorized and directed to publish such ordinance in a newspaper having circulation in Mission, Texas in Hidalgo County.

**SECTION 4**: If any part or parts of this ordinance are found to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court having competent jurisdiction, then such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not affect the remaining parts hereof and such remaining parts shall remain in full force and effect, and to that extent this ordinance is considered severable.

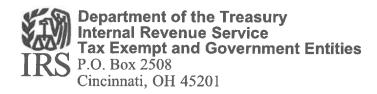

Unfortunately, there are very limited opportunity for our conjunto students throughout Texas.

Conjunto programs are growing all over our RGV schools. The "TCS" is the first of it's kind that will provide instruction in addition to the performance component. The goal is to provide workshops for students that will help increase their knowledge and love for this beautiful music. We also want to include vendors to provide resources for school programs, a competition with evaluations from judges, and a community event to promote music education with live music, vendors, and food trucks that includes a concert to bring the beauty and brilliance of this music to the community. Any positive revenue will be invested back for educational resources, scholarships and for future music education events.

What makes this event different from others? The easiest answer is the educational component. There are only a couple of other conjunto competitions as it is and those competitions focus on trophies. This event, although it will have a competition aspect, TCS will focus on the educational component first. The main goal to promote musical growth for both students and their directors. In other competitions, evaluations and scoring are not clear or are not even provided. I have created specific evaluation forms that aim to assist in really providing constructive feedback. Feedback from directors has been extremely positive and we are already having schools reaching out wanting to register for this event.

In my team is also Adrian Zambrano who is serving as my assistant producer. Adrian brings over 20 years of experience as a conjunto/norteño perfomer and educator. He performs professionally with his band "Alianza" and is also one of the directors for the award-winning Palmview HS Conjunto La Tradicion. His connections in the conjunto world span artists like Ramon Ayala, Intocable, Signo, Grupo Frontera along so many other artists, recording studios and entertainment industry members. His knowledge and connections will help bring awareness and support for this event making it a hugely successful event for our community.

We are wanting to hold the two day event at the Mission Event Center on March 12-13, 2026. We are trying to not charge schools anything or keep costs as minimal as possible to encourage participation which is where we need help. We are requesting that the use of the facilities be donated for the use of the event. Our first annual event was was held June 2025 at the McAllen Convention Center and was hugely successful. This coming event will be the first of this kind as we are now incorporating the workshop component and we would love to host it in Mission, TX because Adrian and I are both residents of this beautiful city. I will emphasize that this type of event for conjunto does not exist anywhere else.

We would also use this event to bring more traffic to the area for our businesses. We want to include local businesses in our event and the event competition and concert would be open for the public. We will incorporate the City of Mission and the Mission Event Center in all of our publicity as well.

Beside being a music educator, I have also been an event planner for many years in the education and entertainment sector. I have planned state-wide events for music education as well as smaller local events. Just this past summer I planned a four-day mariachi conference and the McAllen Convention Center where we used all of their facilities including Oval Park and the PAC. This event brought schools and participants from all over the country with over 600 students involved. The events that were open to the community saw estimated total attendance of over 3000 people (not including conference participants). This was a hugely successful event for the City of Mcallen. However, for the Texas Conjunto Showdown, I would love to bring this to Mission, TX!

This event is brand new and I am in the process of getting things ready to file for non-profit status. In the meantime, we are working as a not-for-profit organization. Our funding comes from financial and in-kind sponsors. However, most of our sponsors donate things like instruments and meals for the students. Any current funding we have is going to be used for things like production costs of staging/lighting, music binders, instructional fees for workshops instructors etc.

Our budget for a venue is only \$2500. I'm not sure if you can do anything with this. I'm hoping that you are able to see the value in what we are trying to do for our students.

Please review some of the attached preliminary planning documents so that you can get a better idea of what the event is. I would also love to meet in person to discuss this further.

Feel free to contact me with any questions. Please note that time is of the essence with this. For schools, the directors need months in advance to plan for travel. We need to get everything underway in the next few weeks. Thank you so much for your consideration and I thank you in advance for your support!

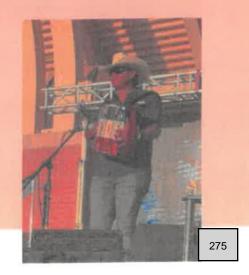

# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN REGION ONE EDUCATION SERVICE CENTER AND THE CITY OF MISSION

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is entered into by Region One Education Service Center and the City of Mission for the purpose of achieving the various goals and objectives relating to the GROW RGV, Tree Canopy Project. This agreement will be effective from November 1, 2025, to December 31, 2027.

This Partnership seeks to improve tree care practices and policies with 7 "Crucial Greening Communities" in the RGV. "Crucial Greening Communities" have lower tree canopy coverage and higher heat island temperatures than recommended by the US Forest Service. All trees within a city make up an "Urban Forest." This partnership seeks to increase the size of Mission's Urban Forest by planting 700 climate resilient trees in public parks, trails, green spaces, and private residences.

This Partnership acknowledges that it is vital to improve tree care practices that increase the health, growth, canopy, and longevity of Community Trees.

## I. Roles and Responsibilities for Region One Education Service Center

- 1. Provide 700 trees of various species and sizes to Mission & residents.
- 2. Provide tree care "Best Practices" trainings to Mission Staff and residents. Provide "Native Plant Society of Texas" classes to 6 Staff members to become **Certified** in Native Landscape Maintenance with the goal of increasing employee wages as they increase their knowledge and abilities to provide better tree care for the community.
- 3. Provide \$10,000 worth of "water-wise irrigation" for proper watering of trees. \$1,000 worth of mulch & \$1,000 worth of organic compost to be applied during planting.
- 4. Collaborate with UTRGV- Agroecology students to assist with tree data collection, social media and limited tree planting assistance for residents who "adopt a tree."

## **II. Roles and Responsibilities for the City of Mission**

- Improve tree care practices within all departments providing any tree
  planting or tree maintenance. These practices should follow the most
  current ISA- International Society of Arboriculture guidelines and Appendix
  A- Standards and Specifications for Purchasing, Planting, and Maintaining
  young trees.
- 2. Always apply the "Right tree, right place" decision process when choosing the location for a specific tree species.
- 3. Use 3" of mulch on all newly planted trees and train ground crews how to reduce grass and weeds from growing into the mulched tree rings.
- 4. Assure that all newly planted trees are properly watered to maximize growth and root development. Allow the strongest lower limbs to remain on the tree to increase trunk diameter.
- 5. Help organize "Tree Adoptions" for the residents of Mission to receive tree planting and tree care trainings prior to taking their adopted trees home to plant. Help establish a "Social Media" campaign that encourages residents to upload pictures of their newly planted trees and highlights the city's actions to increase tree diversity and canopy.
- 6. Allow 6 City employees to take Class 1 & 3 of the Native Plant Society of Texas, Rio Grande Valley Chapter, to receive a Native Landscape Maintenance Certificate. These city employees will be chosen by their willingness to participate in some form of tree care maintenance or supervision of city tree care practices. The city will compensate these "Tree Care" employees for their new skills and abilities to improve the quality of life for Mission residents by increasing the health and quantity of community trees.
- 7. Collaborate with Region One ESC to leverage the values of increased tree care and tree plantings throughout the Rio Grande Valley.

## **III. Term and Termination**

This MOU shall be effective through December 31, 2027, unless earlier terminated by either party, and shall automatically terminate unless extended or renewed by written agreement, signed by authorized representatives of both parties.

Either party may terminate this MOU, without cause, upon at least sixty (60) days of prior written notice to the other party, with termination efffective upon the expiration of the sixty (60) days or as mutually agreed to by the parties.

## V. Notices

All notices or other communications required or permitted hereunder shall be in writing, and shall be personally delivered or sent by registered or certified mail, and shall be deemed received upon the earlier of (a) the date of delivery, if personally delivered, or (b) three (3) business days after the date of posting by the U.S. postal service, if mailed. Either party may change such address for notice for the party designated to receive such notice by giving advance written notice to the other party as provided in this paragraph. #### Summary:

- While doing some research staff came across a program that the City of Lewisville, Texas has in place that could be of interest to the City Council.
- In Lewisville they have the Roots for Wings Program that encourages residential gardening choices that support natural and sustainable landscaping. The purpose of the program is to reduce irrigation and mowing requirements in the community.
- The first step is that interested residential property owners are asked to attend a 4-hour workshop. The second step is to establish the garden. The third step is to apply for the designation and submit photos.
- After the initial application review is approved by the program manager, a site inspection is scheduled. If the site inspection passes, the city provides a yard sign. The program manager then notifies the Code Enforcement Department that the property is exempt from weedy lot notices.
- In Lewisville the property owners must renew their certificate every three (3) years.
- No ordinances were amended to establish the Roots for Wings Program in Lewisville.
- The committee made up of experts in the field would be needed to review the applications.

#### **NATURE OF REQUEST:**

Staff is requesting the approval of an Advance Funding Agreement between the City of Mission and the Mission Economic Development Corporation (MEDC) related to the construction of infrastructure improvements needed for a property owned by MEDC, a 5+ acre-tract located at 1407 East Expressway 83, Mission. The improvements consist of water lines, sanitary sewer lines, and drainage infrastructure on the property, in an amount not to exceed \$237,000 to be paid in advance. These improvements are crucial to making the property marketable and enhancing its development potential. The MEDC Board approved the Advance Funding Agreement on October 15, 2025. A corresponding budget amendment will be introduced at midyear.

## ADVANCE FUNDING AGREEMENT

This Advance Funding Agreement (this "Agreement"), effective as of \_\_\_\_\_\_, 2025, is made by and between MISSION ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION, a Texas Economic Development Corporation and governed by Texas Local Government Code chapters 501, 502 and 505 and the Texas Non-Profit Corporation Act, (the "MEDC") acting by and through its governing body, the Board of Directors (the "MEDC Board"), , and THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS (the "City"), a Texas home-rule city.

## **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of MEDC has determined that it is in the best interests of MEDC to contract with the City, in its capacity as a developer, to provide for the efficient and effective implementation of the construction of infrastructure improvements on the Property (as hereinafter defined), which is owned by MEDC; and

WHEREAS, on <u>October 15, 2025</u>, the MEDC authorized the allocation for the purposes of funding the construction of the infrastructure improvements on the Property; and

WHEREAS, the MEDC as a Type B Corporation may provide funding for public improvements to recreational and community facilities pursuant to Chapter 505 of the Texas Local Government Code; and

WHEREAS, MEDC finds that such investment will improve the quality of life for the Mission community and residents; and

WHEREAS, the City has determined that it will carry out the construction of such improvements and MEDC cover the cost of such construction.

## **AGREEMENT**

For and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, obligations, and benefits contained herein, the MEDC and the City contract and agree as follows:

## ARTICLE 1 GENERAL TERMS

1.1 <u>Definitions</u>. The terms "Agreement," "City," "MEDC," and "MEDC Board," have the above meanings, and the following terms have the following meanings:

"Code" means the Texas Local Government Code, as amended.

"County" means Hidalgo County, Texas.

"City Advances" means any funds advanced by the City pursuant to Section 6.1 of this Agreement, expressly including, but not limited to, out-of-pocket expenses.

"Party" or "Parties" means one or more of the MEDC, and the City, the parties to this Agreement.

"Project" means the construction and installation of the Public Improvements on the Property;

"Project Costs" means all costs relating to the planning, design, engineering, construction, and installation of the Public Improvements.

"Property" means the real property described as Exhibit "A".

"Public Improvements" means, collectively, the projects described in Section 3.1, below.

"State" means the State of Texas.

1.2 <u>Singular and Plural</u>. Words used herein in the singular, where the context so permits, also include the plural and vice versa. The definitions of words in the singular herein also apply to such words when used in the plural where the context so permits and vice versa.

# ARTICLE 2 REPRESENTATIONS

- 2.1 <u>Representations of the MEDC</u>. The MEDC hereby represents to the City that:
  - (A) The MEDC is duly authorized, created and existing in good standing under the laws of the State of Texas and is duly qualified and authorized to carry out the governmental functions and operations contemplated by this Agreement.
  - (B) The MEDC has the power, authority, and legal right to enter into and perform this Agreement and the execution, delivery, and performance hereof (a) have been duly authorized, (b) to the best of the MEDC's knowledge, will not violate any applicable judgment, order, law, or regulation, and (c) do not constitute a default under, or result in the creation of, any lien, charge, encumbrance, or security interest upon any assets of the MEDC under any

agreement or instrument to which the MEDC is a party or by which the MEDC or its assets may be bound or affected.

- (C) The Public Improvements and the Project Costs are components of or are consistent with the Project, and the Project Costs are eligible for payment in accordance with the Code
- (D) This Agreement has been duly authorized, executed, and delivered by the MEDC and, constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation of the MEDC, enforceable in accordance with its terms except to the extent that (a) the enforceability of such instrument may be limited by bankruptcy, reorganization, insolvency, moratorium, or other similar laws of general application in effect from time to time relating to or affecting the enforcement of creditors' rights and (b) certain equitable remedies including specific performance may be unavailable.
- (E) The execution, delivery, and performance of this Agreement by the MEDC do not require the consent or approval of any person which has not been obtained.
- 2.2 <u>Representations of the City</u>. The City hereby represents to the MEDC that:
- (A) The City is duly authorized, created, and validly existing under the laws of the State of Texas.
- (B) The City has the power, authority, and legal right to enter into and perform the obligations set forth in this Agreement, and the execution, delivery, and performance hereof (a) have been duly authorized, (b) will not, to the best of the City's knowledge, violate any judgment, order, law, or regulation applicable to the City or any provisions of the City's organizational documents, and (c) do not constitute a default under or result in the creation of, any lien, charge, encumbrance, or security interest upon any assets of the City under any agreement or instrument to which the City is a party or by which the City or its assets may be bound or affected.
- (C) The City will have sufficient capital to perform its obligations under this Agreement at the time it needs to have sufficient capital.
- (D) This Agreement has been duly authorized, executed, and delivered and constitutes a legal, valid, and binding obligation of the City, enforceable in accordance with its terms except to the extent that (a) the enforceability of such instruments may be limited by bankruptcy, reorganization, insolvency, moratorium, or other similar laws of general application in effect from time to time

relating to or affecting the enforcement of creditors' rights and (b) certain equitable remedies including specific performance may be unavailable.

## ARTICLE 3 THE PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS

- 3.1 <u>Public Improvements</u>. The Public Improvements consist of the design, construction, and installation of infrastructure improvements, including but not limited to water lines, sanitary sewer lines, and drainage infrastructure on the Property (the "Public Improvements"). The Parties acknowledge that the Public Improvements will be financed and designed, and will be acquired by the City and consistent with the terms of this Agreement.
- 3.2 <u>Project Costs</u>. The Project Costs eligible under this Agreement shall be the City's actual expense costs of the Public Improvements, not to exceed \$237,000.00, and shall not include interest.

## ARTICLE 4 DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CITY

- 4.1 <u>Acquisition of Public Improvements</u>. The City shall be responsible for the acquisition and installation of the Public Improvements and complying with all applicable competitive bidding laws. As applicable, the City will provide bid tabs and other information reasonably requested by the MEDC to document the scope of the Public Improvements, and the costs thereof. A summary of the anticipated costs associated with the Public Improvements for which the City seeks funding is attached hereto as **Exhibit "B"**. The City will document the extent of the Public Improvements to the MEDC as soon as practicable following completion thereof.
- 4.2 <u>Cooperation</u>. The City agrees that it will cooperate with the MEDC and will provide all necessary information to the MEDC to evidence completion of the Project.

# ARTICLE 5 DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF MEDC

5.1 <u>Payment by MEDC</u>. The MEDC shall pay to the City the Project Costs, without interest, in the amount of the actual eligible costs of the Public Improvements as described herein. The total, actual Project Costs of the Public Improvements for which the MEDC shall be responsible under the terms of this Agreement shall not exceed \$237,000.00.

## ARTICLE 6 PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS FINANCING AND FUNDING

6.1 <u>Payment of the Project Costs</u>. MEDC shall pay the Project Costs by advancing the sum of \$237,000.00 to the City upon execution of this Agreement by both parties.

# ARTICLE 7 DEFAULT

#### 7.1. Default.

- (A) If the MEDC does not perform its obligations hereunder in compliance with this Agreement in all material respects, in addition to the other rights given the City under this Agreement, the City may enforce specific performance of this Agreement or seek actual damages incurred by the City for any such default if such default is not cured within 30 days after receipt by the MEDC of a written notice of default (or such longer period as is reasonably necessary; provided that actions reasonably calculated to cure the default are being diligently pursued to completion).
- (B) In the event the City completes the Public Improvements but does not otherwise perform its obligations hereunder in all material respects in substantial compliance with this Agreement, in addition to the other rights given to the MEDC under this Agreement, the MEDC may enforce specific performance or seek actual damages incurred for any such default if such default is not cured within thirty (30) days after receipt by the City of a written notice of default (or such longer period as is reasonably necessary; provided that actions reasonably calculated to cure the default are being diligently pursued to completion).
- (C) Force majeure. If force majeure prevents either Party hereto from performing any of its obligations under this Agreement, in whole or part, then the obligations of such Party, to the extent affected by such force majeure, shall be suspended during the continuance of any inability, provided that such Party is exercising due diligence to resume performance at the earliest practical time. As soon as reasonably possible after occurrence of the force majeure relied upon, the Party whose contractual obligations are affected thereby shall give notice and full particulars of such force majeure to the other Party. The term "force majeure," as used herein, shall include, without limitation of the generality thereof, acts of God, strikes, lockouts, or other industrial disturbances, acts of the public enemy, direct orders of any kind of the government of the United States or the State of Texas or any civil or military authority, insurrections, riots, epidemics, landslides, lightning, earthquakes, fires, hurricanes, storms, floods, washouts, droughts,

arrests, restraints of government and people, civil disturbances, explosions, and any other inabilities of either Party, whether similar to those enumerated or otherwise, which are not within the control of the Party claiming such inability, and which such Party could not have avoided by the exercise of due diligence and care. It is understood and agreed that the settlement of strikes and lockouts shall be remedied with all reasonable dispatch, but shall not require the settlement of strikes and lockouts by acceding to the demands of the opposing party or parties when such settlement is unfavorable to it in the judgment of the Party having the difficulty.

## ARTICLE 8 GENERAL

- 8.1 <u>Inspections</u>. The City agrees to keep such operating records relating to the Public Improvements as may be required by the MEDC, or by state and federal law or regulation for a period not to exceed four years after completion, unless otherwise required by law. The City shall allow the MEDC reasonable access to documents and records in the City's possession, custody or control that the MEDC deems necessary to assist the MEDC in determining the City's compliance with this Agreement.
- 8.2 <u>Personal Liability of Public Officials</u>. To the extent permitted by state law, no director, officer, employee or agent of the MEDC, and no officer, employee, or agent of the City, shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under or growing out of the Agreement.
- 8.3 <u>Notices</u>. Any notice sent under this Agreement (except as otherwise expressly required) shall be written and mailed (certified, return receipt requested), or sent by facsimile transmission confirmed by mailing written confirmation at substantially the same time as such facsimile transmission, or personally delivered to an officer of the receiving Party at the following addresses:

Each Party may change its address by supplying written notice to the other Party in accordance with this Section. Any communication addressed and mailed in accordance

with this Section shall be deemed to be given when so mailed, any notice sent by facsimile transmission shall be deemed to be given when receipt of such transmission is acknowledged, and any communication delivered in person shall be deemed to be given when actually received by the MEDC or the City, as the case may be.

- 8.4 Amendments and Waivers. Any provision of this Agreement may be amended or waived if such amendment or waiver is in writing and is signed by the MEDC and the City. No course of dealing on the part of the City, nor any failure or delay by the City with respect to exercising any right, power or privilege of the City under this Agreement shall operate as a waiver thereof, except as otherwise provided in this Section.
- 8.5 <u>Invalidity</u>. In the event that any of the provisions contained in this Agreement shall be held unenforceable in any respect, such unenforceability shall not affect any other provision of this Agreement.
- 8.6 <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. All covenants and agreements made herein by or on behalf of the MEDC shall bind its successors and assigns and shall inure to the benefit of the City and its successors and assigns. The MEDC may assign its rights and obligations under this Agreement or any interest herein, with the prior written consent of the City, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed.
- 8.7 Exhibits; Titles of Articles, Sections and Subsections. The exhibits attached to this Agreement are incorporated herein and shall be considered a part of this Agreement for the purposes stated herein, except that in the event of any conflict between any of the provisions of such exhibits and the provisions of this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail. All titles or headings in this Agreement are included only for the convenience of the Parties and shall not be construed to have any effect or meaning as to the agreement between the Parties. Any reference herein to a Section or Subsection shall be considered a reference to such Section or Subsection of this Agreement unless otherwise stated. Any reference herein to an exhibit shall be considered a reference to the applicable exhibit attached hereto unless otherwise stated.
- 8.8 <u>Construction</u>. This Agreement is a contract made under and shall be construed in accordance with and governed by the laws of the United States of America and the State of Texas, as such laws are now in effect.
- 8.9 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. THIS WRITTEN AGREEMENT REPRESENTS THE FINAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE PARTIES AND MAY NOT BE CONTRADICTED BY EVIDENCE OF PRIOR, CONTEMPORANEOUS, OR SUBSEQUENT ORAL AGREEMENTS OF THE PARTIES. THERE ARE NO UNWRITTEN ORAL AGREEMENTS BETWEEN THE PARTIES.

- 8.10 <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be in force and effect from the date of execution hereof for a term expiring on the date the City Advances have been repaid in full.
- 8.11 <u>Approval by the Parties</u>. Whenever this Agreement requires or permits approval or consent to be hereafter given by any of the Parties, the Parties agree that such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- 8.12 <u>Additional Actions</u>. The Parties agree to take such actions, including the execution and delivery of such documents, instruments, petitions and certifications as may be necessary or appropriate, from time to time, to carry out the terms, provisions, and intent of this Agreement, and to aid and assist each other in carrying out such terms, provisions, and intent.

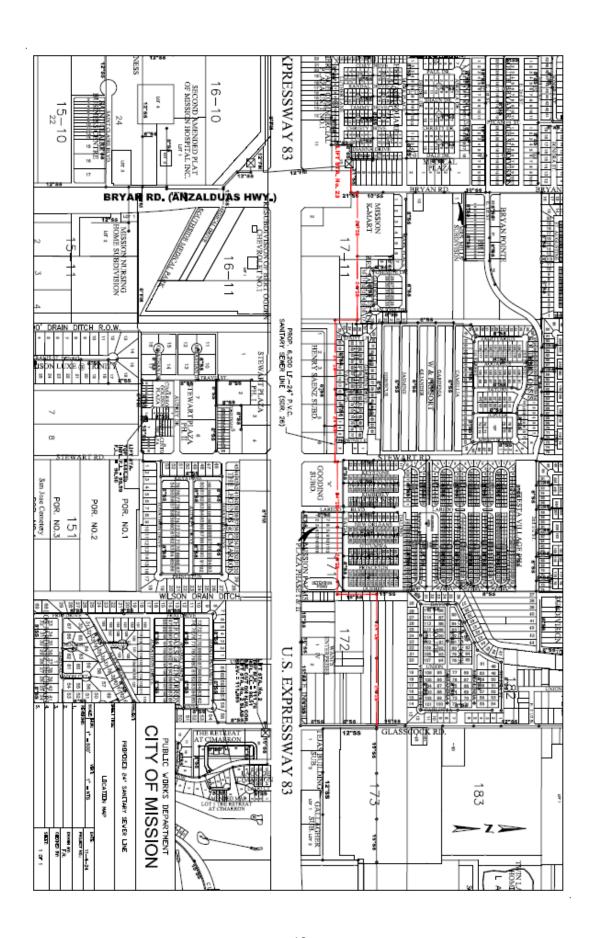

City staff have met with representatives from Texas National Bank, who have expressed their willingness to continue services under the current terms. Upon Council approval, a formal letter will be sent to the bank confirming the extension, with no changes to service levels or banking fees.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS, SUPPORTING AN EDUCATIONAL CAMPAIGN REGARDING PROPOSITION 4 TO AMEND THE TEXAS CONSTITUTION TO DEDICATE A PORTION OF REVENUE DERIVED FROM STATE SALES AND USE TAXES TO THE TEXAS WATER FUND

WHEREAS, the City of Mission recognizes the importance of maintaining reliable and sustainable water resources to meet the needs of residents, agriculture, and industry, while supporting continued growth and economic development; and

WHEREAS, the City of Mission works in partnership with regional and state entities, including counties, drainage districts, and water authorities, to address ongoing challenges related to water supply, wastewater management, drainage, and flood mitigation; and

WHEREAS, the Rio Grande Valley continues to experience rapid population and economic growth, increasing the demand for long-term investment in water infrastructure and resilience; and

WHEREAS, the State of Texas has identified significant water supply gaps in the Rio Grande Basin and the Lower Rio Grande Valley region over the next 50 years, underscoring the need for continued funding for regional water projects; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Water Development Board ("TWDB") plays a key role in providing financial and technical assistance for projects that improve water availability, quality, and infrastructure resiliency across the state; and

WHEREAS, ensuring a dependable and sustainable water supply is essential to public health, economic stability, and the overall well-being of the City of Mission and the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature has taken proactive steps to strengthen the state's water future through the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas, the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas, and the Texas Water Fund; and

WHEREAS, in November 2023, Texas voters approved Proposition 6, providing a one-time \$1 billion investment into the Texas Water Fund to enhance statewide water supply and infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, during the 89th Legislative Session, the Texas Legislature passed a proposed constitutional amendment—Proposition 4—that would dedicate a portion (up to one billion dollars) of state sales and use tax revenue annually for up to 20 years to the Texas Water Fund; and

WHEREAS, approval of Proposition 4 would not create new taxes or fees, but instead dedicate existing surplus revenue to strengthen critical water and drainage infrastructure across the state, following a model similar to transportation funding initiatives; and

WHEREAS, funds administered by the Texas Water Development Board would be available to Texas cities, including the City of Mission, to support long-term investments in water, wastewater, and flood resilience infrastructure;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MISSION, TEXAS:

**SECTION 1.** The City Council hereby expresses its strong support for the educational campaign regarding Proposition 4, which will appear on the ballot for the November 4, 2025 election. The Council encourages all Mission residents to review the proposed constitutional amendment, consider its benefits to the region and the state, and participate in the upcoming election.

**SECTION 2.** This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval.
