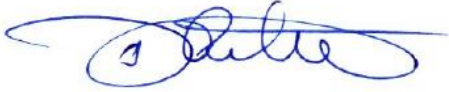

ADOPTION OF ORDINANCE 2025-01 ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE FOR PROPERTY OWNER OBJECTIONS TO PROPOSED WATER/SEWER FEES OR SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board of Directors adopt Ordinance No. 2025-01, establishing a procedure for property owner objections to proposed water/sewer fees or special assessments.

SUMMARY

California recently enacted AB 2257, a bill sponsored by the ACWA and authored by Assemblymember Lori Wilson (D-Suisun City), which assists local agencies in defending against lawsuits under Proposition 218, which governs assessments, fees, and charges levied by local agencies. The bill establishes a formal objection procedure for ratepayers to raise concerns about proposed rate changes before litigation becomes an option. This process is designed to address disputes during the public participation stage, reducing the likelihood of surprise lawsuits after rates are approved. AB 2257 aligns with existing constitutional provisions and Proposition 218, which set standards for public notice, hearings, and protest procedures.

ANALYSIS

This legislation mirrors the California Environmental Quality Act process, emphasizing transparency and early resolution of disputes. It does not bypass the public participation process mandated by Proposition 218 but enhances it by creating a parallel objection mechanism. By fostering communication between agencies and ratepayers, AB 2257 seeks to minimize litigation risks and promote collaborative problem-solving in public rate-setting processes.

FISCAL IMPACT & STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

This action does not necessitate additional budget adjustments or impose new costs. It aligns with Strategic Plan Smart Goal No. 3 ensuring long-term financial stability by implementing sound financial management practices and minimizing risks.

ORDINANCE 2025-01
AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE
MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT
ESTABLISHING A PROCEDURE FOR PROPERTY OWNER OBJECTIONS
TO PROPOSED WATER/SEWER FEES OR SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS

A. The Mission Springs Water District (hereinafter “District”) is a California county water district organized under the California County Water District Law, codified at Section 30000, *et seq.*, of the California Water Code, to provide water and sewer service among other purposes to customers/ratepayers within the District’s boundaries.

B. California law requires that certain changes to water/sewer fees or special assessments must be adopted or approved in accordance with procedures outlined in Article XIII D, of the California Constitution, commonly referred to as “Proposition 218.”

C. Article XIII D, Section 4, establishes certain procedural requirements and substantive limitations a local public agency must follow to adopt a special benefit assessment.

D. Article XIII D, Section 6, establishes certain procedural requirements and substantive limitations a local public agency must follow to adopt a property related fee for water/sewer service.

E. The purpose of this ordinance is to provide a meaningful opportunity for a ratepayer to present an objection to a proposed new or amended water/sewer fee or special amendment before resorting to litigation after the new or amended fee or special assessment is approved.

F. This ordinance is intended to provide a procedure for ratepayers to bring an objection regarding a new or amended water/sewer fee or special amendment to the District’s attention early in the fee consideration process, and to provide an opportunity for the District to address or resolve any objections before the District’s Board of Directors makes a final decision on whether to adopt a proposed water/sewer fee or special assessment pursuant to Proposition 218.

G. This procedure will generally require the District to make available the proposed water/sewer fee or special assessment, post the written basis for the proposed water/sewer fee or special assessment on its internet website, provide 45 days for the property owner to review the proposed fee or assessment and timely submit to the District a written objection to the fee or assessment that specifies the grounds for alleging noncompliance, and require the District to consider and respond in writing to timely submitted objections prior to the close of the protest hearing or ballot tabulation hearing required under Section 4 or Section 6 of Article XIII D of the California Constitution; and

H. For purposes of the proposed water/sewer fee or assessment adopted by the District pursuant to Section 4 or Section 6 of Article XIII D of the California Constitution, a person or entity shall be prohibited from bringing a judicial action or proceeding alleging noncompliance with Article XIII D of the California Constitution for any new, increased, or extended water/sewer fee or assessment, unless that person or entity has timely submitted to the District a written objection to that fee or assessment that specifies the grounds for alleging noncompliance; and

I. **WHEREAS**, the Board of Directors hereby intends to adopt the exhaustion of administrative remedies procedure as outlined in Government Code section 53759.1, and the administrative record principles contained in Government Code section 53759.2.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Directors of the Mission Springs Water District as follows:

1. The District Board hereby adopts the exhaustion of administrative remedies procedure contained in Government Code section 53759.1.
2. For purposes of any proposed water/sewer fee or assessment adopted by the District pursuant to Section 4 or Section 6 of Article XIII D of the California Constitution, a person or entity shall be prohibited from bringing a judicial action or proceeding alleging noncompliance with Article XIII D of the California Constitution for any new, increased, or extended water/sewer fee or assessment, unless that person or entity has timely submitted to the District a written objection to that fee or assessment that specifies the grounds for alleging noncompliance, in compliance with Government Code section 53759.1.
3. The District Board hereby adopts the administrative record principles contained in Government Code section 53759.2.
4. In the event of any conflict between the terms, provisions, conditions, or requirements of this ordinance and those of any other ordinance, regulation or policy of the District, the terms provisions, conditions, and requirements of this ordinance shall prevail and be deemed superior, except where preempted by state or federal law.
5. This ordinance will take effect immediately after initial board adoption and shall be published once in full in a newspaper of general circulation, printed, published and circulated in the district within ten (10) days after adoption, or if there be no such newspaper it shall be posted within ten (10) days after adoption in three (3) public places within the district as provided in Water Code Section 31027. Upon adoption, the ordinance will apply to any proposed new or amended

water/sewer fees or special assessments of which notice is provided pursuant to Proposition 218 and the procedures specified herein.

6. The Board authorizes District staff to take such other and additional actions as may be reasonably necessary to implement the purpose of this ordinance and implement the exhaustion of administrative remedies procedure adopted herein.

The Mission Springs Water District Board of Directors will conduct a public hearing on Tuesday, February 18, 2025, at 3 p.m. at the District's offices located at 66575 Second Street, Desert Hot Springs, CA 92240. The hearing will consider the adoption of an ordinance establishing a procedure for property owner objections to proposed water/sewer fees or special assessments.

This ordinance establishes procedures for the Mission Springs Water District to comply with California law (Proposition 218 and related statutes) when proposing new or amended water/sewer fees or special assessments. The proposed Ordinance includes the following key provisions:

Purpose: The ordinance aims to resolve disputes early in the process by ensuring ratepayers have a meaningful opportunity to object to proposed water/sewer fees or assessments before litigation becomes necessary.

Procedure for Objections: The District must make proposed fees or assessments publicly available on its website, including the written rationale. A 45-day review period is provided for property owners to submit written objections detailing alleged noncompliance. The District must respond in writing to objections before the conclusion of hearings required by Proposition 218.

Exhaustion of Administrative Remedies: Individuals or entities are barred from initiating judicial proceedings to challenge compliance with Proposition 218 unless they first submit a timely written objection to the District specifying their concerns.

Adoption of Legal Principles: The District formally adopts procedures outlined in Government Code Section 53759.1 (exhaustion of remedies) and Section 53759.2 (administrative record principles) to ensure compliance and maintain consistency.

Conflict Resolution: In case of conflicts between this ordinance and other District regulations, the ordinance takes precedence unless overridden by state or federal law.

Effectiveness and Publication: The ordinance takes immediate effect upon adoption and will be published or posted as required by law. It applies to all new or amended fees or assessments subject to Proposition 218 after its adoption.

Implementation: District staff are authorized to take additional necessary actions to implement the ordinance and its procedures.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends board approval of proposed Policy No.2025-01 Use of Artificial Intelligence Tools.

SUMMARY

The MSWD Artificial Intelligence (AI) Tools Policy aims to leverage AI tools to benefit the District, customers, and communities we serve while managing associated risks. It covers all employees, contractors, and partners, ensuring AI technologies are used ethically and responsibly. The policy mandates adherence to legal frameworks, continuous monitoring of AI systems, and clear communication about AI usage. Prohibited uses include sharing personal or confidential information, real-time biometric identification, and fully automated decisions without human oversight

ANALYSIS

The proposed AI policy for MSWD is a comprehensive framework designed to balance innovation with caution. By covering all aspects of AI usage, from ethical considerations to legal compliance, the policy ensures that AI tools are used responsibly and transparently. The inclusion of prohibited uses, such as sharing personal information and fully automated decisions, highlights the district's commitment to protecting individual rights and preventing misuse. Continuous monitoring and clear communication about AI usage further reinforce the policy's focus on ethical and responsible AI adoption.

Policy No.2025-01 Use of Artificial Intelligence Tools

A. Policy

MSWD recognizes the value of Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools that, through thoughtful application, can significantly benefit our agency, our clients, and the communities they serve. We are equally mindful of the risks and challenges associated with AI and the potential for unintended consequences. Our goal is to understand AI systems and tools, their ethical and equitable use, and manage associated risks. Our approach to AI adoption is a careful balance between innovation and caution.

This policy encompasses all employees, contractors, and partners of MSWD. It covers the use of existing and future AI tools, systems, and platforms, including but not limited to Large Language Models (LLMs), AI-powered plug-ins, and data-driven analytical tools. The scope extends to all operational and decision-making processes within MSWD where AI technologies are utilized, ensuring our approach to AI remains human-centered, adaptive, and forward-thinking. When operating, configuring, purchasing, developing, or maintaining AI systems, MSWD will:

1. Uphold this AI policy and any other related AI policies and procedures. MSWD uses AI to provide comprehensive insights, predictive analysis, and streamlined processes, while human expertise ensures that final decisions are made with compassion, ethical consideration, and a deep understanding of the internal and external communities we serve. MSWD will also adhere to all relevant legal frameworks governing AI, including data protection, privacy, and intellectual property laws. Our policy mandates continuous monitoring of the legal landscape to ensure compliance with both local and international AI regulations, safeguarding against legal and ethical risks.
2. Conduct AI tool/system reviews to assess potential risk. MSWD is committed to utilizing AI responsibly, preventing harm and avoiding facilitation of malicious activities. MSWD will provide clear information about how AI is being used within our organization, the data it processes, and the decision-making frameworks it supports.
3. Obtain technical documentation about AI tools/systems in use.
4. Require AI contractors to comply with established requirements. MSWD requires adherence to ethical and legal standards from all third-party AI providers and systems to safeguard the integrity and respect for individual rights in AI-related activities.

- B. Prohibited Uses – The use of certain AI systems or specific activities using AI systems are prohibited due to the sensitive nature of the information processed and severe potential risk. When using AI systems, MSWD employees, contractors and business partners may not:

1. Enter or otherwise share personal, confidential or individually identifying health information.
2. Use real-time and covert biometric identification or falsification (e.g., facial recognition, voice identification or simulation).
3. Enable fully automated decisions that do not include meaningful human oversight and substantially impact individuals' legal rights, financial status, employment opportunities, workplace accommodation, disciplinary status, access to essential services, health, safety, or privacy.
4. Engage in cognitive behavioral manipulation of people.

C. AI-Related Definitions

Artificial Intelligence: “Artificial intelligence” or “AI” is any machine-based system that can, for a given set of human-defined objectives, make predictions, recommendations, or decisions influencing real or virtual environments. Artificial intelligence systems use machine- and human- based inputs to perceive real and virtual environments; abstract such perceptions into models through analysis in an automated manner; and use model inference to formulate options for information or action.

Algorithm: A series of logical steps through which an agent (typically a computer or software program) turns particular inputs into particular outputs.

AI system: Any system, software, sensor, or process that automatically generates outputs including, but not limited to, predictions, recommendations, or decisions that augment or replace human decision-making. This extends to software, hardware, algorithms, and data generated by these systems, used to automate large-scale processes or analyze large data sets.

Cognitive behavioral manipulation of people or specific vulnerable groups: Cognitive behavioral manipulation refers to AI-driven tools or algorithms designed to influence or alter an individual's decision-making process or belief system. These systems use psychological, behavioral, or emotional data to create targeted strategies that can manipulate thoughts, feelings, or actions, particularly focusing on vulnerable groups or individuals.

Personal and medical identifying information: Personal identifying information includes data that identifies an individual personally, such as name, address, email address, social security number, passport number, driver's license number, financial information, and telephone number. Individually identifiable health information includes data related to an individual's physical or mental health condition, provision of health care, or payment for the provision of healthcare that can be linked to a specific individual. This includes medical records, health insurance information, laboratory test results, medical history, and other individually identifiable data collected during the provision of healthcare services.

Real-time and covert biometric identification: The live identification of an individual using technologies including, but not limited to, facial recognition and iris scanning, without that individual's knowledge or meaningful consent.

D. Responsibilities of Users – All MSWD employees are responsible for following this policy, as well as any other MSWD AI-related policies or procedures.

1. MSWD employees must notify their supervisor when they are using AI tools or systems for work. Supervisors are responsible for ensuring that staff are properly trained to both use the AI tool and to assess and mitigate potential negative consequences.

4.2. Employees are permitted to use only those AI tools that have been authorized by the District. The installation or use of any unauthorized AI tools on MSWD-issued electronic devices is strictly prohibited.

2.3. If MSWD staff become aware of an instance where an AI system has caused harm, staff must report the instance to both their supervisor and the designated MSWD administrative staff member. If MSWD employees are harmed, staff must also notify MSWD’ Human Resources Manager.

3.4. If an AI system operated by MSWD or on its behalf ceases to provide a positive utility to MSWD’ employees, clients, and/or client community, then the use of that AI system must be discontinued. If the abrupt cessation of the AI system would significantly disrupt service delivery, usage of the AI system shall be phased out.

4.5. MSWD is subject to the California Public Records Act (CPRA). MSWD staff must follow all current procedures for records retention and disclosure of any records associated with AI systems.

5.6. In accordance with MSWD Administrative Code 3 – Personnel, appropriate remedial measures and corrective action, including termination, will be instituted if prohibited behavior or violations of this policy are found.

E. Oversight Roles – The General Manager will designate a member of administrative management to develop and enforce such procedures or practices as are needed to:

1. Ensure AI systems are used in accordance with this policy and any other MSWD policies and procedures.
2. Oversee AI enterprise security infrastructure, cybersecurity operations, updating security policies, procedures, standards, guidelines, and policy compliance.
3. Notify MSWD departments when an update to this policy or any other MSWD AI policies or procedures are released.
4. Oversee the procurement of AI systems and require vendors to comply with MSWD organizational values and policy standards through contractual agreements.
5. Consult with the District’s Legal Counsel as needed regarding any legal issues or risks associated with MSWD AI systems usage.
6. At their discretion, inspect the usage of AI systems and require a department/service line to alter or cease its usage of AI systems or a partner’s usage of AI systems on behalf of the department/service line.

AWARD OF CONTRACT TO BORDEN EXCAVATING, INC. FOR GQPP AD-18 AREA D-3 SEWER CONSTRUCTION AND WATER LINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT AND CAPITAL BUDGET AUGMENTATION

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the General Manager to award a contract for the GQPP AD-18 Area D-3 Sewer Construction and Water Line Replacement Project to the lowest responsible bidder, Borden Excavating, Inc., in the amount of \$5,252,252, plus a 10% contingency (total \$5,777,477.20), augment the capital improvement budget amount by \$1,820,622.20 for Job No. 11876, and to do all things necessary to complete the project, including but not limited to preparation and filing of a Notice of Exemption to comply with CEQA requirements.

SUMMARY

This project is for the construction of new sanitary sewer and water main replacement in the AD-18 Area D-3 sewer area. The scope of work involves installation of 4,402 linear feet of sanitary sewer lines, 102 sewer laterals, 17 sewer manholes and over 5,448 linear feet of water main, 131 water services, and 19 fire hydrants, including street restoration throughout the project area located within the City of DHS. Abatement will proceed with the assistance of the District’s “Make the Connection” program following the completion of the sanitary sewer project.

FISCAL IMPACT & STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

Sanitary sewer costs are being funded by Prop 1 Round 1 and Prop 1 Round 2 grants in the amount of \$951,988, AD-18 proceeds in the amount of \$815,966.12, and Capital Budget 11693 in the amount of \$2,334,764.00. The water main replacement will be funded through Capital Budget 11876 in the amount of \$3,892,293.08. Budget adjustment of \$1,820,622.20 for Capital Budget 11876 is being requested for the water main replacement for a total budget of \$3,892,293.08. This action is consistent with Strategic Plan Goal 4.3-Maintain and renew assets while facilitating strategic Capital Improvements.

PROJECT HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

This project was originally part of Assessment District (AD) 12, with design work carried out by USACE for AD-12 Areas M, F, and D. Initially, this project was put out for bidding under AD-12 Area D-2 Sewer, specifically as bid alternatives 2 and 3. However, due to high bid costs, only the base bid and bid alternate 1 were constructed at that time. Following the sunset of AD-12 in 2014, the remaining sub Areas (A, D-3, G, H, I, J-2, and K) lacked a program for advancement until the establishment of AD-18. This project, now known as Area D-3, has been progressing since AD-18 formation in 2019, with funding secured for construction commencing now.

In December 2024, staff initiated the bidding process, receiving bids from nine contractors, marking a significant milestone for the District in safeguarding groundwater resources from risks linked to densely concentrated septic tanks. The project's objective is to provide sewer access to 82 developed lots and 20 vacant lots, alongside relocating water lines out of easements to enhance accessibility and mitigate potential liability.

The construction of sanitary sewer systems and the abatement of septic systems are critical steps in protecting our groundwater resources. Septic systems, when not properly maintained or located in areas of high density, can leak harmful contaminants into the soil, which may ultimately seep into the groundwater supply. These contaminants, including bacteria, viruses, and chemicals, pose serious risks to public health and the environment. By replacing septic systems with a modern sanitary sewer system, we can significantly reduce the potential for groundwater contamination, ensuring cleaner, safer water for our community.

The District's Groundwater Quality Protection Program plays a vital role in this effort. This program is designed to monitor, manage, and mitigate the risks associated with groundwater contamination, focusing on preventing the infiltration of pollutants into the aquifers that supply our drinking water. By transitioning from septic systems to sewer connections, we are actively contributing to the success of this program. The installation of sanitary sewer infrastructure, alongside the proper decommissioning of septic systems, helps to safeguard our groundwater resources, ensuring the long-term availability and quality of water for current and future generations.

Ensuring the reliability of the District's water distribution system is a critical priority, especially when it comes to preventing costly and disruptive water main breaks. The existing 4" asbestos-cement (AC) pipe, installed in 1969 within easements, has become increasingly vulnerable due to its age and material, leading to higher risks of leakage, fractures, and other failures that can disrupt water service. To address this, the project involves upgrading the outdated AC pipe with a new, more durable 8" ductile iron pipe (DIP) installed in the streets fronting the project area.

DIP is recognized for its strength, longevity, and resistance to corrosion, making it a more reliable material for water distribution systems. By replacing the old AC pipe with new DIP, the District will significantly reduce the likelihood of water main breaks, ensuring more consistent and uninterrupted water service to the community. This upgrade not only improves the overall reliability and efficiency of the water distribution network but also aligns with the District's long-term goal of maintaining a sustainable, secure, and resilient infrastructure to meet the growing needs of its customers.

Accordingly, Owner and Contractor agree that the sum of \$500 per day is a reasonable sum to assess as damages to Owner by reason of the failure of Contractor to complete the Work within the time specified.

TKE has completed its review of the nine bid proposals submitted for the GQPP AD-18 D-3 Sewer Construction and Water Line Replacement Project (Project), MSWD Project Order Nos. 22-004-S and 25-001-W. TKE finds that Borden Excavating Inc. has generally met the bid requirements and is deemed the lowest responsible and responsive bidder. Below is a summary of each bid submittal and our findings related to responsiveness.

Borden Excavating, Inc:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. Borden Excavating, Inc. has 15 years of experience and provided three (3) project references for waterline projects. Their list designation of subcontractor includes three (3) subs equating to approximately 21% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers includes: Mission Clay, Old Castle, Pacific Plastic, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, James Jones, Cambridge Lee, Merit Brass, and Stream line.

Borden Excavating, Inc bid of \$5,252,252.00 is the lowest bid. As such, TKE finds that Borden Excavating, Inc has generally met the bid requirements and is deemed the lowest responsible and responsive bidder.

RE Chaffee Construction (RE Chaffee):

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. RE Chaffee has 7 years of experience and provided four (4) project references for sewer construction and three (3) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes two (2) subs equating to approximately 21% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, Manhole Builders, Charlotte, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Tyler Union, James Jones, and Cerro.

TKE finds that RE Chaffee has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, RE Chaffee bid of \$5,437,020.20 was approximately \$184,798.20 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

Dominguez General Engineering Inc.:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. Dominguez General Engineering Inc. 23 years of experience and two (2) project references for sewer construction and five (5) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes six (6) subs equating to approximately 12% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, Old Castle Infrastructure, Pacific Plastic, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, James Jones, Cambridge Lee, and Merit Brass.

TKE finds that Dominguez General Engineering Inc. has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, Dominguez General Engineering Inc. bid of \$5,622,664.00 was approximately \$370,412.00 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

Tir-Star Contracting II, Inc:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. Tri-Star Contracting II, Inc. has 17 years of experience and two (2) project references for sewer construction and two (2) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes four (4) subs equating to approximately 9% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, National Casting, Manhole Builders, Pacific Plastic, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, James Jones, Cambridge Lee, and Merit Brass.

TKE finds that Tri-Star Contracting II, Inc. has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, Tri-Star Contracting II, Inc. bid of \$5,624,395.36 was approximately \$372,143.36 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

Kirtley Construction Inc.:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. Kirtley Construction Inc. has 22 years of experience and two (2) project references for sewer construction and two (2) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes four (4) subs equating to approximately 17% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Building Products Co LLC, Mission Clay, Manhole Construction Specialists, South Bay Foundry, NDS, MCWANE, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, Sigma, James Jones, Muller Streamline, and Muller Brass.

TKE finds that Kirtley Construction Inc. has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, Kirtley Construction Inc. bid of \$6,347,283.60 was approximately \$1,095,031.60 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

E.J. Meyer Company:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. E.J. Meyer Company has 62 years of experience and five (5) project references for sewer construction and twenty-five (25) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes two (2) subs equating to approximately 30% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, Oldcastle, Southbay Foundry, Pacific Plastic, U.S. Plastic, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, James Jones, Mueller, Cambridge, Merit Brass.

TKE finds that E.J. Meyer Company has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, E.J. Meyer Company bid of \$6,393,333.00 was approximately \$1,141,081.00 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

J.R. Filanc Construction Company Inc.:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. J.R. Filanc Construction Company Inc. has 72 years of experience and one (1) project reference for sewer construction and ten (10) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes two (2) subs equating to approximately 9% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, MCS, Southbay Foundry, NDS, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe, James Jones, and Mueller Streamline.

TKE finds that J.R. Filanc Construction Company Inc. has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, J.R. Filanc Construction Company Inc. bid of \$7,401,299.16 was approximately \$2,149,047.16 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

JPI Development Group Inc:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. JPI Development Group Inc. has 24 years of experience and seven (7) site utilities and plumbing projects. It is unclear if the experience provided is comparable to sewer and water projects. TKE did not call references to verify, as JPI was not the low bidder. Their list designation of subcontractors includes one (1) sub equating to approximately 8% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, Manhole Builders, National Casting Corp., Pacific Plastics, Mc Wane, M+H Valve, Star Pipe Products, James Jones, and Mueller Streamline Co.

TKE finds that JPI Development Group Inc. has generally met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, JPI Development Group Inc. bid of \$8,038,488.00 was approximately \$2,786,236.00 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

Gentry General Engineering, Inc:

The bidder submitted all required bid documentation. Gentry General Engineering, Inc. has 13 years of experience and two (2) project references for sewer construction and two (2) waterline project. Their list designation of subcontractors includes one (1) sub equating to approximately 3% of the total work. In addition, the list of manufacturers include: Mission Clay, NDS, U.S. Pipe, Mueller, Star Pipe Products, and James Jones.

TKE finds that Gentry General Engineering, Inc. has met the bid requirements and is deemed responsible. However, Chaffee's bid of \$8,209,856.00 was approximately \$2,957,604.00 higher than Borden Excavating, Inc., as such, they are not the low bidder.

BOARD ACCEPTANCE OF A CONTRACT CHANGE ORDER WITH J.F. SHEA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NANCY WRIGHT REGIONAL WASTEWATER RECLAMATION FACILITY

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the General Manager to execute a Contract Change Order with J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. for additional costs due to unforeseen tasks and field issues during construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Facility in the amount of \$1,698,569.

SUMMARY

On October 18, 2021, the Board of Directors awarded a contract for the construction of the Nancy Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility Project (NWRWRF) to J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. (J.F. Shea), in the total amount of \$43,035,300.00. On August 25, 2022, the Board of Directors approved to increase the project contingency from 5% to 10% for a total construction contract amount of \$45,084,600.00. An additional contract change order with J.F. Shea is necessary to cover unforeseen tasks and field issues related to the construction of the NWRWRF.

ANALYSIS

J.F. Shea was affected by issues that impacted their ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There were several significant unforeseen events, including directives for extra work, burrowing owl monitoring, mitigation, relocation, adverse weather days, and delays due to the completion of the Regional Sewer Conveyance Line (RSCL) that have contributed to the overall project delays. The requested Contract Change Order of \$2,508,479.00 was negotiated down to \$1,698,569.00; and is reimbursable through the State of California Grant for the construction of the NWRWRF project. A Contract Change Order is required to avoid litigation of project claims.

FISCAL IMPACT & STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

The increase in contract costs of \$1,698,569.00 for J.F. Shea is required to bring the project to completion. This action is consistent with Strategic Smart Plan Goal 4.3 Maintain and renew assets while facilitating strategic Capital Improvements.

Dear Mr. Rathe,

J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. (JFS) has been in discussion with Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) regarding the issues that have impacted our ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There are several significant unforeseen events that have contributed to the overall project delays. This summary is intended to provide facts related to the issues and a guideline to acknowledging merit for these impacts.

During the preparation stage for commencing work in the south infiltration basins area, an email was issued providing notification to stop all work associated with clearing and grubbing in the infiltration pond areas (entire southern half of the project site) until further notice. It was determined that the stop notice was due to a burrowing owl that had been discovered by the Biologist performing a pre-construction inspection of the upcoming work area. Several workarounds had to be implemented including a temporary basin to manage structure testing water and resequencing of earthwork activities and crews due to the inability to perform work as planned. Ultimately the delay to this significant portion of work caused impacts throughout the project, including unavoidable operation inefficiencies. JFS has continued to work through this issue with MSWD, including special Biologist requests and a complete resequencing of work to work within the evolving work boundaries resulting from this issue.

MSWD provided a response on April 3, 2023, to JFS's Burrowing Owl Delay Notification dated March 3, 2023, including a suggestion that JFS could be at fault for this delay since nesting bird season was nearing at the time of discovery. JFS is in disagreement with the suggestion that "JFS had ample opportunity" to construct the basins "outside of the nesting bird season". The Contract Documents do not provide limitations to the Contractor's work for any period/ season or in any area of the project. Furthermore, the Burrowing Owl issue falls under MMRP Section 4.5-1 which only requires a 30-day notification for a clearance survey with *no further restrictions*. The nesting bird survey per MMRP Section 4.5-3 is a stand-alone requirement that does not apply directly to the Burrowing Owl, as this section is intended to monitor for "raptors" and "migratory birds" with *no correlation to burrowing owls*. JFS stands behind its interpretation that this is a delay beyond the Contractor's control.

The timeline below provides insight to the time impacts caused by this change:

- 2/23/23 – Owner provided Stop Notice for all work on south side of project site due to discovery of burrowing owl

- 3/03/23 – JFS provided delay notification to MSWD due to work stoppage
- 4/03/23 – MSWD responded to delay notification
- 10/18/23 – Obtained partial authorization to work in south areas
- 10/18/23 – JFS resequenced work and started south structures work, followed by Basin #3 excavation.
- 1/23/24 – MSWD provided authorization/ clearance to work in all areas.

The south basins work was originally planned to start March 15, 2023, and be completed by August 9, 2023, including earthwork, structures, mechanical and electrical work. The work restrictions continued for 334 calendar days from the day the stop notice was issued through the date full authorization to work in all areas was provided. JFS used best judgement to resequence work and shift personnel and equipment to accommodate this issue, and to attempt to minimize impacts to operational direct cost. Unfortunately, the duration of the delay caused the project to lose key personnel and did not allow for operations to be conducted efficiently and at the lowest cost possible. Based on this, most earthwork related operations on the project suffered significant inefficiencies and our crews did not have the ability to recover from these.

JFS has evaluated the impacts to operational direct cost and has determined that this delay has caused significant direct cost losses due to the evolving work restrictions and the inability to perform major portions of work in a single mobilization. JFS has compiled actual direct cost for specific impacted operations in order to compare against the original estimated budgets. Please reference Exhibit 1 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Burrowing Owl Impacts – Earthwork Operations Cost Code Report. Note, this cost information is confidential and must not be shared outside of your organization without explicit approval from JFS.

In accordance with General Conditions Section 2.13, J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. is hereby providing a Lump Sum Cost Proposal in the amount of **\$295,107.00** for the Burrowing Owl Impacts - Earthwork Operations Inefficiencies. Please reference Exhibit 2 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Burrowing Owl Impacts Cost Summary. Per General Conditions Section 2.13, J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. is requesting issuance of a Change Order in order to formalize this change request. Dear Mr. Torres,

The District is in receipt of JF Shea's (JFS) Cost Proposal Letter dated 07/03/2024 requesting payment in the amount of \$295,107.00 for cost associated with Earthwork Operations Inefficiencies due to Burrowing Owl Impacts.

In light of discussions had during the meet and confer between JFS and the District held on November 7, 2024, the District has performed additional review of the proposed cost associated with PCO 038.

The District acknowledges that JFS experienced inefficiencies resulting in direct cost losses due to work restrictions caused by Burrowing Owl Impacts. JFS's willingness to shuffle labor force and equipment to other areas of the project to continue progress and attempt to mitigate schedule delays did not allow for the Infiltration Basins at the south portion of the project to be constructed in a single mobilization. The District appreciates JFS's efforts and flexibility with respect to completion of the Infiltration Ponds while complying with Environmental Constraints.

The Districts review of the proposed cost determined that some of the quantities used in JFS's analysis appear to include quantities for the entire project. The District is prepared to acknowledge inefficiencies for work that pertain only to areas directly affected by the Burrowing Owl Constraints, more specifically, only that work which is associated with the construction of the Infiltration Basins. The District performed a take-off (Bluebeam, see attached Sheet C-002) for the area in question to determine quantities to be compared to JFS's analysis (See attached). Construction activities in question include Slope Finish, Subgrade Finish, and Install Redwood Header. Where the District has determined a different quantity than JFS, the District considered the difference in cost based on "Estimate Unit Cost" vs. "Job to Date Unit Cost".

The Districts analysis has determined that JFS may be entitled to payment in the amount of \$220,889.00 for Earthwork Inefficiencies due to Burrowing Owl Impacts.

A change order for the above mentioned inefficiencies shall be executed upon receipt of JFS acceptance of the Districts cost proposal.

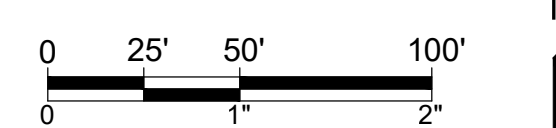
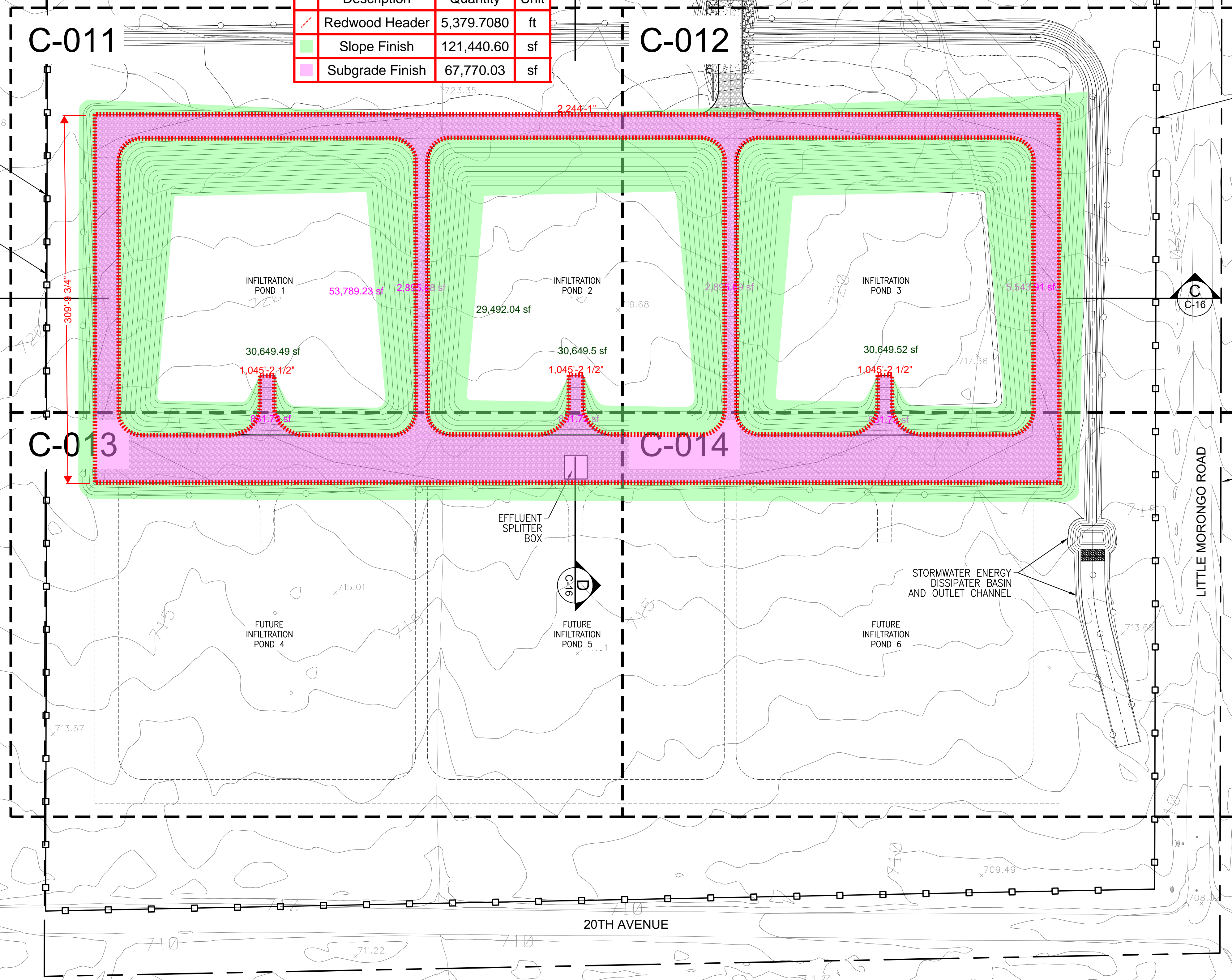

Dear Mr. Rathe,

J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. would first like to recognize the great working relationship between the Contractor's staff and the Owner/ Construction Management staff. This project is an exemplary model for construction project working relationships and we commend all personnel involved. J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. (JFS) has been in discussion with Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) regarding the issues that have impacted our ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There are several significant unforeseen events, including directives for extra work, that have contributed to the overall project delays. This summary is intended to provide facts related to the issues and a guideline to acknowledging merit for these impacts.

The following list of impacts have been identified as the most significant and impactful, although most extra work directives have the ability to impact the schedule in a manner that is challenging to substantiate. Please reference Exhibit 1 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Major Events/ Changes with Most Significant Time Impacts.

1. Adverse Weather Related Impacts

In accordance with the bidding documents and contract (Reference pre-bid Q&A #130, 224, 269), a 15-working day (WD) allowance was designated for adverse weather. The contractual project duration of 600 calendar days to Substantial Completion equates to 412 working days. Based on the 15 WD allowance, 3.6% of the contractual working days would have been expected to be impacted by adverse weather. Please reference Exhibit 2 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Adverse Weather Days Summary.

This project has experienced an unprecedented and unforeseen amount of adverse weather days. A total of 77 WD have been affected by adverse weather, 62 WD of which can be claimed as unforeseen. The 62 WD are equivalent to a 15.1% unplanned weather impacts to available working days to construct the project, thereby delaying project completion by an indetermined amount.

2. Site Security System (PCO-012/ CO-012)

In accordance with the bidding documents and contract, an allowance for \$400,000.00 was included in the bid price as Bid Item 14. The Site Security System allowance did not provide any details related to the scope or magnitude of the potential work. The change order resulting from execution of this allowance ultimately required the following added working days; JFS Trenching/ Bases +14 WD, Baker Elec UG Conduit +13 WD/ AG Conduit +37 WD, Baker Security Hardware/ Wiring +35 WD, Baker Security

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Program/ Testing +18 WD = 117 WD, including an additional 3,208 manhours. Additionally, the coordination and execution of the final scope consumed valuable schedule time which forced this work to be authorized at a later than expected date resulting in impacts to Substantial Completion. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by variations to the scope of work during the change order negotiation process:

- 6/21/22 – Original RFP issued by MSWD
- 8/04/22 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 3/08/23 – Revised RFP issued by MSWD
- 5/18/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- *Issue discovered relating to proprietary door hardware*
- 6/20/23 – Revised cost proposal without door hardware submitted by JFS
- 9/13/23 – MSWD final approval of cost

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 469 Calendar Days

3. Delay due to Electrical Equipment Procurement (PCO-021)

A potential issue was disclosed early in the project with regards to the bid listed MCC/ VFD supplier (ABB/ General Electric) regarding the manufacturer's ability to honor the quoted fabrication and lead times provided at bid time (Bid Lead Time: 30 weeks/ Updated Lead Time: 60 weeks, including submittal and fabrication). An early decision to substitute Eaton Corporation for this equipment was authorized and the change was made, primarily due to promised technical submittal and fabrication lead time improvements. During the procurement and expediting process, it became clear that Eaton was experiencing similar broad-based supply chain issues brought on by COVID and other global events. This is an industry wide issue and has been fueled by constrained labor availabilities, global shortages of raw materials, unreliable transportation, etc. In addition to material and component shortages, the motor control center market was experiencing unprecedented growth, further straining manufacturers and causing factory overloading. Due to these compounded issues related to MCC fabrication, the manufacturers did not have the flexibility to support expediting requests. These procurement delays are considered unforeseen events and beyond the control of both the Contractor and the Owner, as described in General Conditions Section 2.15.04(b). The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by the delayed procurement primarily occurring during the equipment fabrication process:

- 4/19/22 – JFS provided delay notification to MSWD due to Electrical Equipment procurement delays, including manufacturer substitution request
- 5/27/22 – MSWD accepts substitution request in effort to mitigate potential delays
- 6/13/22 – JFS submittal to MSWD for MCC equipment
- 6/16/22 – MSWD approval for MCC equipment
- 9/15/22 – JFS provided delay notification to MSWD due to MCC Equipment procurement delays
- 2/06/23 – MSWD provided response to delay notification
- 1/10/24 – JFS/ Baker Electric attended MCC factory testing
- 1/22/24 – MCC equipment delivered to the jobsite

Inception of issue through delivery of equipment = 643 Calendar Days

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4. SCE Revised Layout (PCO-022/ CO-007)

The original bidding documents provided a raceway and equipment placement plan for the Southern California Edison (SCE) power feed to the facility. During MSWD and SCE coordination, a change was made to the power feed source, requiring a revision to the onsite raceway routing from the east side of the facility and relocated to the south. This change required a significant amount of additional trenching and conduit, including the following added working days; JFS trenching/ encasements/ cable trench +12WD, Baker Electric conduits +14WD. Additionally, this change required a postponement of procurement for precast structures until SCE issued the final work order and the technical data was approved. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by the coordination of the SCE final work order and physical work through the energization date:

- 9/16/22 – MSWD provided copy of SCE Preliminary Work Order for review and pricing of changes
- 10/21/22 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 11/02/22 – MSWD issues SCE Final Work Order including revised power feed routing
- 1/31/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 2/08/23 – MSWD final approval of cost
- 5/09/23 – JFS started work on power feed infrastructure
- 8/01/23 – JFS completed work for power feed infrastructure
- 10/09/23 – SCE onsite to install conductors with plans to energize MSB-1 by 10/13/23
- 10/12/23 – SCE discovers incorrect transformer procurement
- 11/28/23 – SCE furnished alternate transformer and energized MSB-1

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 145 Calendar Days

Completion of infrastructure work through energization = 119 Calendar Days

5. pH Monitoring Added Wiring (PCO-030/ CO-008)

The original bidding documents provided for a single pH analyzer in the combined SBR effluent channel. During the SBR System technical submittal process, it was discovered that individual pH analyzers were required for each SBR basin (1-4). This change would require additional conduit and wiring between the SBR basins and the SBR control panel located in the Electrical Room, including the following added working days; JFS trenching/ encasements +1WD, Baker Electric conduit and wiring +12WD. This issue is significant as the SBR basins contain the largest concentration of critical path manhours. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 12/14/22 – JFS submitted RFI201 due to need for additional wiring for pH analyzers on SBR system
- 1/09/23 – MSWD responded to RFI201 confirming need for additional wiring
- 2/17/23- Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 4/04/23 - MSWD final approval of cost

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 111 Calendar Days

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6. ALP Thermal Expansion (PCO-031/ CO-008)

The original bidding documents detailed an ALP (Low Pressure Air) system with no provisions for thermal expansion. During the mechanical detailing process, an RFI was submitted to clarify the pipe wall penetrations which in turn yielded a response to add thermal expansion to the ALP system. This change would require the modification of air piping to include expansion joints/ couplings for thermal expansion, including the following added working days; JFS procurement +28WD, JFS additional work +6WD. This issue is significant as the SBR basins contain the largest concentration of critical path manhours. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 12/14/22 – JFS submitted RFI214 to clarify ALP piping wall penetrations
- 2/08/23 – MSWD responded to RFI214 with direction to provide thermal expansion for ALP system
- 2/17/23 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 3/10/23 - MSWD final approval of cost

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 86 Calendar Days

7. Burrowing Owl (PCO-038)

During the preparation stage for commencing work in the south infiltration basins area, an email was issued by MSWD providing notification to stop all work associated with clearing and grubbing in the infiltration pond areas (entire southern half of the project site) until further notice. It was determined that the stop notice was due to a burrowing owl that had been discovered by the Biologist performing a pre-construction inspection of the work area. Several workarounds had to be implemented including a temporary basin to manage structure testing water and resequencing of earthwork activities and crews due to the inability to perform work as planned. Ultimately the delay to this significant portion of work caused impacts throughout the project, including unavoidable operation inefficiencies. JFS has continued to work through this issue with MSWD, including special Biologist requests and a complete resequencing of work to work within the evolving work boundaries resulting from this issue. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 2/23/23 – Owner issued Stop Notice for all work on south side of project site due to discovery of burrowing owl
- 3/03/23 – JFS provided delay notification to MSWD due to work stoppage
- 4/03/23 – MSWD responded to delay notification
- 10/18/23 – Obtained partial authorization to work in south areas
- 10/18/23 – JFS resequenced work and started south structures work, followed by Basin #3 excavation.
- 1/23/24 – MSWD provided authorization/clearance to work in all areas.

8. SBR Decanter Conflicts (PCO-041/ CO-009)

This issue was discovered during installation of mechanical piping in the SBR basins. An RFI was submitted to point out the conflict between the decanter mooring posts and the 8"-ALP piping in all four basins. The response included a directive to reroute the piping to avoid the conflict. This work required re-fabrication of piping materials already onsite, including the following added working days; JFS procurement +30WD, JFS additional work +6WD. This issue is significant as the SBR basins contain the largest concentration of critical path manhours. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 12/14/22 – JFS submitted RFI251 due to conflict between decanter mooring posts and 8"-ALP piping
- 3/21/23 – MSWD responded to RFI251 with direction to reroute ALP piping to avoid conflict
- 4/25/23 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 9/14/23 – MSWD final approval of cost

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 274 Calendar Days

9. Fire Sprinkler Revisions (PCO-042/ CO-008)

This issue was first discovered by the fire alarm subcontractor in the process of obtaining Riverside County Fire Dept (RCFD) approvals and permit and followed by a similar notification from the fire sprinkler subcontractor. Both notifications from RCFD were similar in nature requesting the 'Building Plans' be approved by the City of Desert Hot Springs then forwarded to RCFD as a reference for their fire approvals. This issue would not allow for the approvals, release of materials nor installation of the required fire protection systems. Additionally, a request was made for clarification if fire sprinkler coverage in the Operation Bldg via RFI242, as the contract documents only showed partial building coverage. The response to RFI242 provided revised plans showing complete coverage of the building interior. The issue of RCFD approvals/ permits, additional fire sprinkler coverage and the ongoing effort to complete the Operation Bldg, converged to create delays and impacts that were impossible to recover from. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 8/12/22 – Original Fire Sprinkler shop drawing submittal
- 1/04/23 – Notified MSWD of RCFD permitting issues related to fire alarm
- 1/17/23 – Notified MSWD of RCFD permitting issues related to fire sprinklers
- 2/23/23 – JFS submitted RFI242 requesting clarification on fire sprinkler coverage
- 4/14/23 – MSWD responded to RFI242 including revised Fire Sprinkler plans
- 4/19/23 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS based on new plans
- 5/02/23 – JFS provided delay notification to MSWD due to plan approval issue
- 5/09/23 – MSWD final approval of cost
- 5/15/23 – Owner provided Stop Notice for work in Admin Room to allow for Fire Sprinkler installation
- 6/02/23 – MSWD submitted City approved plans to RCFD
- 6/22/23 – JFS submitted revised Fire Sprinkler shop drawings
- 8/23/23 – Titan Fire started Fire Sprinkler installation work
- 10/03/23 – Titan Fire completed installation

Fire Sprinkler Work: Original planned start 2/08/23 – Planned finish 2/22/23

Inception of issue through commencement of fire sprinkler work = 231 Calendar Days

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10. Grading Revisions (PCO-053/ CO-010)

This change request was issued by MSWD due to steeper than desirable design finish grades/ slopes. This change required the removal of additional soil from the north end of the site and a rebalancing of the site materials. A total of 1,502 CY of additional excavation was required and included the following added working days: JFS additional work +11WD. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 7/24/23 – MSWD issued directive for grading changes
- 9/19/23 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 10/19/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 12/14/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 12/21/23 – MSWD final approval of cost

Inception of issue through final approval of cost = 150 Calendar Days

11. RC Fire Dept Pavement Revisions (PCO-054/ CO-010)

This change request was issued by MSWD to comply with Riverside County Fire Dept (RCFD) preliminary plan review comments. This change originally increased the plant paving thickness from 4" AC Pavement/ 6" CAB to 6" AC Pavement/ 12" CAB and added pavement at the entrance gates. The thicknesses were later modified to save on crushed aggregate base (CAB) cost. The work included additional excavations of 574 CY and 1,386 Tons of asphalt paving, including the following added working days; JFS additional work +2WD, Paving Sub added work +1WD. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

- 8/01/23 – MSWD issued updated conformed plans
- 10/05/23 – Cost proposal submitted by JFS for pavement revisions
- 10/19/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 11/13/23 – MSWD issued revised paving details
- 12/14/23 – Revised cost proposal submitted by JFS
- 12/21/23 – MSWD final approval of cost

12. Decanter Reversing Starters (PCO-061/ CO-012)

This issue was discovered during the ongoing startup/ commissioning meetings. It was determined by the SBR System supplier that reversing motor starters were required for the decanters in order to allow for raising and lowering of the weirs. The MCC motor starters were not adequate and to avoid delaying the MCC equipment further, the decision was made to provide a separate sub-panel to house the required reversing motor starters. This would require a new submittal, procurement of equipment, fabrication and delivery of the newly designed control panel, and additional field wiring. The change required the following added working days; Control panel procurement +50WD, Baker Electric added work +10WD. The timeline below provides insight to the impacts caused by this change:

As detailed above, each of the significant issues has impacted the project in some manner during the coordination process, review of scope and cost, or by the addition of labor, equipment and materials not originally planned. This representation shows how a combination of these issues and changes have affected the project completion date, and no single issue can be attributed to the delays. Furthermore, due to the project completion delays, project staffing and overhead has been significantly impacted. References: Potential Change Order No. 080; Notice of Claim Due to Overall Impacts Time Related Overhead (11-20-24)

Dear Mr. Torres,

Mission Springs Water District (MSWD or District) is in receipt of JF Shea's (JFS) Notice of Claim Due to Overall Impacts Time Related Overhead dated November 20, 2024 which incorporates a revised Cost Proposal Letter associated with PCO 080 requesting payment in the amount of \$1,578,538.00 for Time Related Overhead (TRO) cost impacts. Your letter outlines 12 individual change events that occurred during the project.

In light of discussions had during the meet and confer between JFS and the District held on November 7, 2024, the district has performed additional review of the proposed cost associated with PCO 080 and Notice of Claim Due to Overall Impacts Time Related Overhead. District analysis and position for each potential impact are as follows:

Adverse Weather

Costs associated with Adverse Weather are addressed in PCO 082 in which the measure of payment is based explicitly on time and the effects on direct labor. Adverse Weather impacts shall not be considered as it pertains to this PCO 080.

Site Security System

The District acknowledges JFS's analysis of the extra work performed as a result of the added scope. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation, the District's review of this potential impact considers an additional **117** working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

MCC Delay – Critical Delay

The District acknowledges JFS's additional efforts and analysis of the MCC delay as noted in Notice of Claim Due to Overall Impacts Time Related Overhead resulting in a reduction of the original PCO cost proposal in the amount of (\$141,386.00). The District also acknowledges JFS's efforts and willingness to negotiate in good faith to come to a reasonable and fair price for all parties as apparent by a further reduction in original PCO cost proposal in the amount of (\$100,598.00) representing markups already paid on Contract Change Orders.

No additional consideration will be given to his item as it pertains to this PCO.

SCE Revised Layout

The District acknowledges JFS's analysis of the extra work performed as a result of the revised scope. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation, the District's review of this potential impact considers an additional **26** working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

pH Monitoring Added Wiring

The District acknowledges JFS's analysis of the extra work performed as a result of the revised scope. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation, the District's review of this potential impact considers an additional **13** working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

ALP Thermal Expansion

Engineer of record responded to RFI 214 during the mechanical detailing process that required JFS to modify air piping to include expansion joints and couplings for thermal expansion. JFS claims that this potential impact added an additional 28 working days for procurement and an additional 6 working days to perform the work for a total of 34 working days. The District does not dispute that it may have taken 28 days to procure the equipment required for this work, however crews continued work on other activities on the critical path. Mechanical work did not stop for 28 days to wait for procurement. The District acknowledges JFS's duration of an extra 6 days to perform extra work associated with the potential impact.

The District's review of this potential impact considers an additional 6 working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Burrowing Owl

Cost associated with Burrowing Owl impacts addressed in PCO 038. No further consideration will be given as it pertains to this PCO.

SBR Decanter Conflicts

Response to RFI 251 resulted in a reroute of 8" ALP piping in all four SBR Basins. JFS claims that this potential impact added an additional 30 working days for procurement and an additional 6 working days to perform the work for a total of 36 working days. The District does not dispute that it may have taken 30 days to procure the equipment required for this work, however crews continued work on other activities on the critical path. Mechanical work did not stop for 30 days to wait for procurement. The District acknowledges the extra work for fabrication and reworking of piping that resulted in an additional 6 days to complete work associated with this potential impact.

The District's review of this potential impact considers an additional 6 working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Fire Sprinkler Revisions

The District acknowledges potential impacts due to the delayed permitting and plan review process with the City of Desert Hot Springs and Riverside County Fire. Plan review and response to subsequent RFI 242 resulted in added fire sprinkler scope in the Operations Building. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation in comparison to baseline schedule durations the District has determined that Fire Sprinkler revisions resulted in an additional 15 working days to complete.

The District's review of this potential impact considers an additional 15 working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Grading Revisions

The District acknowledges JFS's analysis of the extra work performed as a result of the revised scope. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation, the District's review of this potential impact considers an additional 11 working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Riverside County Fire Department Pavement Revisions

The District acknowledges JFS's analysis of the extra work performed as a result of the revised scope. Based on project inspection reporting and photo documentation, the District's review of this potential impact considers an additional 3 working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Decanter Reversing Starters

Response to RFI 311 directed JFS to provide reversing motor starters as required by the SBR System supplier. Subsequently, JFS would need a separate sub-panel to house the required reversing motor starters. The response to RFI 311 would ultimately require a new submittal, procurement of equipment, fabrication and delivery of the newly designed control panel, and additional field wiring. JFS claims that this potential impact added an additional 50 working days for

procurement and an additional 10 working days to perform the work for a total of 60 working days. The District does not dispute that it may have taken 50 days to procure the equipment required for this work, however crews continued work on other activities on the critical path. Electrical work did not stop for 50 days to wait for procurement. The District acknowledges 10 additional working days required to complete installation of new Subpanel and Reversing Motor Starters associated with this potential impact.

The District’s review of this potential impact considers an additional **10** working days to be incorporated in cost analysis.

Conveyance Pipeline Project

In addition to the original cost proposed under PCO 080, JFS has included anticipated cost for remaining work to be performed to achieve project completion. Remaining work has been on hold because of Conveyance Pipeline Project delays due to Southern California Edison conflicts. JFS has proposed a “Not to Exceed” cost of \$230,464.00. The District has considered JFS proposal in our cost analysis and has incorporated an additional 30 “Man Weeks” (MW) to achieve project completion.

District review of this potential impact considers an additional **30 MW** to be added to the 41.4 MW shown in Table 1 for a total of **71.4 MW**. See attached Cost Summary.

Miscellaneous Cost

There have been many issues that can be attributed to the overall delay of this project. The District understands that as a the project schedule experiences delays misc. cost will be incurred as a result. The District acknowledges miscellaneous cost such as Office Trailers, Portable Toilets, Temp Fencing, etc. as shown in TRO cost summary items 4-20 (See attached). Items 9 through 12 are “estimated” due to a representative invoice being used for each item and developed into weekly values.

Extended Builders Risk

The District accepts JFS’s cost associated with Extended Builders Risk as submitted items No. 21, 22, & 23 of attached TRO Cost Summary (See attached).

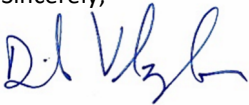
Summary:

(JFS) has been in discussion with Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) regarding the issues that have impacted our ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There are several directives for extra work, including significant unforeseen events, that have contributed to the overall project delays. This summary is intended to provide facts related to the issues and a guideline to acknowledging merit for these impacts.

The original electrical scope (as-bid design) has been inundated with changes and extra work primarily due to design omissions and insufficient pre-bid vendor coordination. Please reference Exhibit 1 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Baker Electric Change Order Log. Using the values provided in Exhibit 1, the following figures are being presented to show the significance of impacts related to the Electrical scope:

Dear Mr. Rathe,

J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. (JFS) has been in discussion with Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) regarding the issues that have impacted our ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There are several significant unforeseen events that have contributed to the overall project delays. This summary is intended to provide facts related to the issues and a guideline to acknowledging merit for these impacts.

In accordance with the bidding documents and contract (Reference Pre-bid Q&A #130, 224, 269), a 15-working day (WD) allowance was designated for adverse weather. The contractual project duration of 600 calendar days through Substantial Completion equates to 412 working days. Based on the 15 WD allowance, 3.6% of the contractual working days would have been expected to be impacted by adverse weather.

This project has experienced an unprecedented and unforeseen amount of adverse weather days. Please reference Exhibit 1 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Adverse Weather Days Summary. A total of 77 WD have been affected by adverse weather, 62 WD of which can be claimed as unforeseen. The 62 WD are equivalent to a 15.1% unplanned weather impacts to available working days to construct the project, thereby delaying project completion by an indetermined amount.

JFS has evaluated the effects of adverse weather impacts to operational direct cost and has determined that these events have caused significant direct cost losses due to the inability to perform work safely and at a cost-effective production rate. In most cases, high winds caused grounding of cranes based on manufacturer safety guidelines. Additionally, general project safety risks such as eye injuries and materials storage became increasingly difficult to control during these events.

JFS has compiled actual direct cost data for the project and used an inefficiency factor to develop a value for the operational impacts. Please reference Exhibit 2 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Adverse Weather Impacts – Direct Operations Inefficiencies. Note, this cost information is confidential and must not be shared outside of your organization without explicit approval from JFS.

In accordance with General Conditions Section 2.13, J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. is hereby providing a Lump Sum Cost Proposal in the amount of **\$428,086.00** for the Adverse Weather Direct Operations Inefficiencies. Please reference Exhibit 3 – 17002S-MSWD-RWRF Adverse Weather Impacts Cost Summary.

Dear Mr. Torres,

The District is in receipt of JF Shea's (JFS) Cost Proposal Letter dated 07/03/2024 requesting payment in the amount of \$428,086.00 for cost associated with Adverse Weather Direct Operations Inefficiencies. The District is also in receipt of JFS's Notification of Claim Due to Adverse Weather Impacts dated November 6, 2024 which provided additional information and Historical Data as it pertains to Adverse Weather at the project location.

Considering discussions had during the meet and confer between JFS and the District held on November 7, 2024, the District has performed additional review of the proposed cost associated with PCO 082.

The District acknowledges that there were 77 days of Adverse Weather as illustrated in "Exhibit 1 17002S-MSWD-RWRF" of JFS's PCO 082. Ninety Percent (90%) of the Adverse Weather Days were due to high winds. The primary construction activity affected by high winds are those activities requiring the use of cranes. Review of daily reports and photo documentation indicates that all critical path construction activities requiring the use of cranes had been completed by May 31, 2023. There had been 35 Adverse Weather days at that point in the project. Contract documents allowed for 15 weather days. On May 31, 2023 JFS would have been entitled to 20 Adverse Weather Days. The remaining 42 (77-35) days are subject to debate.

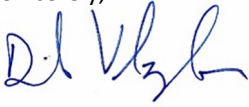
The District has considered the information and historical data provided in JFS's Notification of Claim Due to Adverse Weather Impacts. The District acknowledges that 15 contractual Adverse Weather Days may not be an accurate assessment of the weather conditions to be expected at the project site based on geographic location and historical data available from nearby weather stations. Further consideration was given to JFS's ability to work efficiently during windy conditions. The District acknowledges JFS's "Adverse Weather Inefficiency Factor of approx.. 25% as outlined in calculations per "Exhibit 2 17002S-MSWD-RWRF" of PCO 082.

The Districts will recognize the 20 weather days up to May 31, 2023. Considering historical information, and in effort to reach a fair and reasonable resolution for the District and JFS, the District proposes to also accept half of the remaining Adverse Weather Days in question for a total of 41 Adverse Weather Days.

The District has determined that JFS may be entitled to payment in the amount of **\$269,858.00** for cost associated with Adverse Weather Direct Operations Inefficiencies (See attached Cost Summary)

A change order for the above mentioned inefficiencies shall be executed upon receipt of JFS's acceptance of the Districts cost proposal.

The following changes are hereby made to the Contract:

The following is an additive change order for construction related impacts and time related overhead that affected the Contractor. In addition, a detailed breakdown of the total cost is attached.

JUSTIFICATION

The Contractor has presented four (4) Potential Change Orders (PCO) to the District that include additions to the original contract price. These construction related impacts and time related overhead were discussed between the parties and they are in agreement with the District. An addition of \$2,508,479.00 was initially requested by the Contractor for the four (4) PCOs presented herein. Following negotiations, an addition of \$1,698,569.00 is accepted.

PCO-038 – Burrowing Owl Impacts

On February 23, 2023 the construction management team issued a stop notice for all work on the south side of the project site due to the discovery of a burrowing owl. After mitigation, monitoring and relocating the burrowing owl, the construction management team provided authorization for work to proceed in all areas on January 23, 2024. The contractor evaluated the impacts to direct operational costs and determined that this delay caused significant direct cost losses due to the evolving work restrictions and the inability to perform major portions of work in a single mobilization. The cost includes the additional materials, labor and equipment required to complete the work due to these inefficiencies. Based on the proposed impact, an addition of \$220,889.00 will be accepted.

PCO-080 – Overall Project Impacts Time Related Overhead

The contractor presented issues that impacted their ability to complete the project per the original schedule. There are several significant unforeseen events, including directives for extra work, Southern California Edison design revisions, and Regional Sewer Conveyance Line delays that contributed to the overall project delays. The cost includes the materials, labor and equipment overhead required to complete the work due to the unforeseen events that caused the schedule delays. Based on the proposed change, an addition of \$1,114,322.00 will be accepted.

PCO-081 – Electrical Subcontractor Time Related Overhead

Baker Electric, the electrical sub-contractor, presented issues that impacted their ability to complete the project per their original schedule. There are several significant unforeseen events, including directives for extra work and Southern California Edison design revisions that contributed to the overall project delays. The prime contractor, J.F. Shea, opted to waive their 5% markup in the change order cost. The cost includes the materials, labor and equipment overhead required to complete the work due to the unforeseen events that caused the schedule delays. Based on the proposed change, an addition of \$93,500.00 will be accepted.

PCO-082 – Adverse Weather Direct Cost Inefficiencies

The contractor evaluated the effects of adverse weather impacts to operational direct cost and determined that these events have caused significant direct cost losses due to the inability to perform work safely and at a cost-effective production rate. In most cases, high winds caused grounding of cranes based on manufacturer and OSHA safety guidelines. Additionally, general project safety risks such as eye injuries and materials storage became increasingly difficult to control during these events. The cost includes the additional labor and equipment required to complete the work due to the inefficiencies. Based on the proposed impact, an addition of \$269,858.00 will be accepted.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT, made this 16th day of December, 2021, by and between the MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT hereinafter called "Owner", and J.F.Shea Construction, Inc. doing business as Corporation*, hereinafter called "Contractor".

WITNESSETH: That for and in consideration of the payments and agreements hereinafter mentioned, it is agreed that:

1. The Contractor will commence and complete the construction of "**Regional Water Reclamation Facility**"
2. The Contractor will furnish all of the material, supplies, tools, equipment, labor and other services necessary for the construction and completion of the Project described herein.
3. The Contractor will commence the Work required by the Contract Documents on or before the date specified to commence Work in the Notice to Proceed and will complete the same within **Six Hundred Ninety (690) consecutive calendar days with substantial completion within Six Hundred (600) consecutive calendar days** unless the period for completion is extended otherwise by the Contract Documents.
4. Owner and Contractor have discussed the provisions of Civil Code 1671 and the damages that may be incurred by Owner if the Work is not completed within the time specified in this Agreement. Owner and Contractor hereby represent that at the time of signing this Agreement, it is impracticable and extremely difficult to fix the actual damage that will be incurred by Owner if the Work is not completed within the number of calendar days allowed. Accordingly, Owner and Contractor agree that the sum of \$1,000 per day is a reasonable sum to assess as damages to Owner by reason of the failure of Contractor to complete the Work within the time specified.
5. The Contractor agrees to perform all of the Work described in the Contract Documents and comply with the terms therein for the sum of \$ **40,986,000.00** or as shown in the Bid Schedule; subject to additions and deductions, if any, in accordance with said documents.

- 7. The Owner will pay to the Contractor in the manner and at such times as set forth in the General Conditions such amounts as required by the Contract Documents.

9. Should any litigation or arbitration be commenced between the parties hereto concerning said project, any provision of this Contract, or the rights and obligations of either in relation thereto, the party, Owner or Contractor, prevailing in such litigation shall be entitled, in addition to such other relief as may be granted, to a reasonable sum as and for his attorney's fees in such litigation, and costs.
10. Pursuant to Section 1770, and following, of the California Labor Code, the successful bidder shall pay not less than the prevailing rate of per diem wages as determined by the Director of the California Department of Industrial Relations. Copies of such prevailing rate of per diem wages are on file at the office of the Owner, which copies shall be made available to any interested party on request. The successful bidder shall post a copy of such determination at each job site.
11. This project is subject to the State of California "Prevailing Wage Rates". This project is subject to the requirements of California Labor Code Section 1720 et seq. requiring the payment of prevailing wages, the training of apprentices and compliance with other applicable requirements. In accordance with provisions of Section 1773 of the Labor Code, the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations has ascertained the general prevailing rate of wages and employer payments for health and welfare, pension, vacation, and similar purposes applicable to the particular craft, classification, or type of workers employed on the work. The wage determinations shall be included in the bid specifications. All pertinent wage determinations shall be posted on the jobsite. If federal funding is included in the project, the higher of the State and Federal wage rates shall be used.

Pursuant to SB854, no contractor or subcontractor may work on a public works project unless registered with DIR for contracts awarded by the District on/after April 1, 2015. General Contractors shall ensure all subcontractors executing work under the contract are DIR registered. All public works contractors and subcontractors to furnish Certified Payrolls and related records to the Agency's representative and shall also furnish electronic certified payroll records directly to the Labor Commissioner using the DLSE's online portal.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION

MID-YEAR BUDGET REVIEW AND DISCUSSION FY 2024/2025

General Manager Brian Macy presented the Mid-Year Budget adjustments for FY 2024/25, covering revenue and expenditure updates. Revenue projections remain unchanged despite a hotter summer, increasing water usage by 10%. Expenditures increased by nearly \$4 million, mainly due to over \$9 million in capital improvements. Key projects include septic-to-sewer conversions, well rehabilitations, monitoring wells, energy efficiency services, and groundwater quality protection. Operational costs include hiring one new full-time employee and addressing regulatory needs, wastewater permit costs, and maintenance expenses. Despite increased spending, the budget retains positive cash flow, with grants funding many capital projects. The team is also exploring vehicle cameras and paving plans for the Nancy Wright facility.

REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY CONTRACT AMENDMENT DISCUSSION

General Manager Brian Macy and Engineering Manager Eric Weck lead this discussion. The discussion focused on updates and challenges related to the Regional Water Reclamation Facility project and contract amendments. The project has received \$44 million of its \$68 million budget, with \$24.5 million still available. Payment delays were attributed to both state and internal inefficiencies, which are now being addressed with clearer documentation and reconciliation by consultants. Negotiations with contractors resulted in significant cost reductions for change orders related to weather impacts, burrowing owl constraints, and additional construction requirements. Adjustments include splitting responsibilities for unanticipated costs like weather delays and redesigning sections due to storm damage, leading to total savings of \$889,000 from negotiated reductions.

A contract amendment for construction management, handled by TK Engineering, increased costs by \$4.9 million but remains within reimbursable limits. Detailed tracking ensures compliance with state funding rules, including caps on per diem and soft costs. Upcoming challenges include pending state approval for additional phases, especially the M2 septic-to-sewer conversion, and managing new burrowing owl guidelines, which are anticipated to require additional monitoring and coordination. Board discussions emphasized ensuring accurate cost tracking, assessing soft cost limits, and clarifying future funding needs.

GROUNDWATER QUALITY PROTECTION PROGRAM, AD 18, D3 DISCUSSION

General Manager Brian Macy and Engineering Manager Eric Weck facilitated this discussion. The meeting focused on the D3 Septic-to-Sewer project, covering funding scenarios and strategies to reduce resident impact during construction. The D3 project encompasses 102 properties, with grants of \$77,000 and \$875,000 available, due in March and December 2025, respectively. This project includes waterline enhancements and septic-to-sewer conversions to improve infrastructure in easements. Three funding scenarios were discussed, with costs varying from \$470 to \$940 per linear foot of sewer line. Scenario 1 requires \$331,000 from the district; Scenario 2 involves moderate expansion with increased district involvement; and Scenario 3 entails full project execution with a \$32,000 district contribution. Funding sources include grant funds, assessment district revenues, and additional district contributions.

The board reiterated its goal of minimizing disruptions for residents, aiming to prevent repeated construction in the same areas. Concerns included road resurfacing, property access, and coordinating sewer and waterline improvements simultaneously. The D3 project is a priority within the AD18 assessment district, which concludes in 2028. Some residents in Mission Lakes have endorsed sewer projects in line with state mandates for septic system removal near sewer infrastructure. The project is currently out for bid, with a January 29, 2025 deadline. The results will inform the board's final decision on project scope and costs by February or March.

Key takeaways from the meeting emphasize proactive planning to maximize grant use and minimize financial burdens on the district, awareness of resident impacts, and efforts to coordinate projects to lessen inconvenience. The focus on securing and utilizing grants ensures cost efficiency while adhering to regulatory requirements. The meeting wrapped up with a recognition of strong community support and a commitment to aligning project execution with funding and resident priorities.

RESOLUTION 2025-01 ~ MSWD REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY – INSTALLMENT PURCHASE AGREEMENT EXTENSION (ACTION WILL BE TAKEN AT STUDY SESSION)

The Board adopted Resolution No. 2025-01, extending the Installment Purchase Agreement related to the MSWD Regional Water Reclamation Facility (Reclamation Facility) for one year through January 2026.

General Manager Brian Macy presented a resolution to extend the installment purchase agreement with Wells Fargo for one year. Initially approved in 2023 for \$15 million, the agreement was intended to support cash flow during the Nancy Wright facility project. Due to construction delays and slow state reimbursements, the extension is necessary to prevent liquidating investments at a loss. The current interest rate is 4.5%, with the final rate to be determined next Tuesday. Although the district has received \$40 million from the state, cash flow and reserves remain tight, making this financial safeguard essential.

The Board was encouraged to take action on this matter today rather than at the Board Meeting on Tuesday.

FEDERAL ADVOCACY SERVICES – CARPI & CLAY, INC.

It is recommended to authorize the Interim General Manager to execute an Agreement for Services with Carpi & Clay Government Relations in the amount of \$5000/month for the term February 1, 2025, to January 31, 2026.

Assistant General Manager Marion Champion presented. Laura Morgan Kessler from Carpi & Clay provided an update on federal advocacy efforts and funding secured for the district. With over 20 years of experience advocating for public agencies, Laura has served as the district's Washington representative for six years, securing significant federal funding for groundwater quality protection and infrastructure projects. Recent funding achievements include \$2.7 million for the septic-to-sewer conversion project through the Army Corps of Engineers, marking the most significant single-year award for the project. Additionally, the district supported key legislative efforts, including the Water Conservation Tax Parity Act and the Low-Income Household Water Assistance Program Establishment Act. Laura also discussed the impact of the November elections, noting a shift in political power with Republicans gaining control of the House, Senate, and White House. She provided insights into the tight margins in Congress, committee assignments, and upcoming federal appointments under the new administration. Board members expressed appreciation for Laura's advocacy efforts, noting the importance of securing funding for district projects. They commended the transparency and clarity in financial reporting and acknowledged the challenges ahead in navigating the political landscape.

RESOLUTIONS 2025-02, 2025-03 AND 2025-04 ~ REVISED FY 2024/25 OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGET, APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT, AND CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION PLAN

It is recommended that Resolutions 2025-02, 2025-03, and 2025-04 be adopted related to the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, and revised Operating and Capital Budget, Appropriations Limit, and Classification Plan.

The board reviewed and adopted Resolutions 2025-02, 2025-03, and 2025-04 related to the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, which included updates to the revised operating and capital budget, appropriations limit, and classification plan. The General Manager presented the budget overview in the absence of the Finance Director, noting no changes to revenue projections but an overall expense increase of \$9.4 million. Key areas of increase included operating expenses, the addition of a full-time administrative assistant, wastewater cost increases, consulting services, and capital improvements such as Well Rehabilitation, sewer and water construction, and monitoring well enhancements. Some capital expenditures, including cybersecurity upgrades, are expected to be covered by grant funding. The board discussed potential adjustments to budget allocations, including a paving estimate and the need for more consistent naming of projects, particularly the Critical Service Center. The General Manager confirmed ongoing efforts to secure additional grant funding and potential financial resources for large-scale projects. Board members expressed appreciation for staff efforts and sought clarification on specific budget line items, with commitments to follow up on outstanding questions by the next meeting.

APPOINTMENTS TO BOARD STANDING COMMITTEES

President Sewell may appoint members to the District's standing committees.

President Sewell encouraged discussion of this and the next item (Affiliation Listing). He announced his desire to keep the standing committees the same.

President Sewell mentioned he only received feedback from two other Board members on this list. An amended list was distributed to the Board based on the feedback received. Changes are minor, and he encouraged review for discussion and action to be taken on Tuesday.

ACCEPTANCE OF BILL OF SALE FOR SKYBORNE VILLAGE III PHASE II WATER AND SEWER INFRASTRUCTURE

It is recommended that the General Manager be approved to execute the Bill of Sale for the Water and Sewer Infrastructure for the Skyborne Village III, Tract No. 32030-3 Phase II project located on East Parkwalk Lane, Mooncrest Drive, Highwing Street, Inspiration Drive, Skyvista Drive, Starloft Circle, North Star Lane, and Rainbow Lane, west of Karen Avenue, north of Promenade Drive, in the City of Desert Hot Springs, as contributed assets.

Eric Weck, Engineering Manager, presented to the Board. The board reviewed the acceptance of a bill of sale for the Skyborne Village 3 Phase 2 development, incorporating water and sewer infrastructure into the district's system. Developers are required to construct these improvements to meet district standards, and in this case, the infrastructure has been inspected and confirmed to comply. MW Consulting, a subcontractor, conducted the inspection and performed an on-site physical evaluation to ensure all necessary access points and structures met district requirements. Board members inquired about the thoroughness of the inspections, with confirmation that they were conducted in person rather than based solely on plan reviews.

CONTRACT AMENDMENT NO. 1 WITH TOM DODSON & ASSOCIATES FOR ON-CALL ENVIRONMENTAL CONSULTING FOR THE MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT SOLAR PROJECT

It is recommended to authorize the General Manager to approve Contract Amendment No. 1 with Tom Dodson and Associates in the amount of \$54,000 for the preparation of necessary CEQA studies, biological surveys, and modeling for the Solar Improvement Project, with a 10% contingency in the amount of \$5,400 for a not to exceed contract total amount of \$134,400.

Eric Weck, Engineering Manager, presented to the Board. The board discussed a contract amendment with Tom Dodson and Associates, an on-call consultant specializing in environmental compliance. The district seeks to utilize their services for environmental compliance related to an upcoming solar improvement project across seven district sites. Tasks include preparing categorical exemptions, biological surveys, cultural resource reporting, air quality analysis, and securing a notice of determination to proceed with construction. The amendment proposes an additional \$59,400, including a 10% contingency, to be completed by late fall 2025. Concerns were raised about the classification of the amendment versus a new contract, with board members questioning why this work was not separately contracted. Staff explained that maintaining the amendment structure aligns with procurement processes and retains existing contract terms and conditions. Board members requested clearer tracking of remaining contract funds for transparency. Staff agreed to include cost-tracking details in future documents while maintaining efficiency in reporting.

BOARD ACCEPTANCE OF A CONTRACT CHANGE ORDER WITH JF SHEA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NANCY WRIGHT REGIONAL WASTEWATER RECLAMATION FACILITY

It is recommended to authorize the General Manager to execute a contract change order with J.F. Shea Construction, Inc. for additional costs due to unforeseen tasks and field issues during construction of the Nancy Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility in the amount of \$1,698,569.00 and augment the Capital Project Budget \$2,000,000.

Eric Weck, Engineering Manager, presented the change order to the Board. The contract change order with JF Shea, the prime contractor for the Nancy Wright Regional Wastewater Reclamation Facility, was originally awarded in 2021 for \$4.986 million. Construction began in 2022 and is now substantially complete. However, several factors, including design revisions, field issues, burrowing owl nesting restrictions, power connection delays, and weather impacts, led to project delays and cost increases. After negotiations with the contractor, the total change order cost was reduced to \$1.69 million.

Board members raised concerns regarding contractor markup fees, totaling approximately \$344,000, and whether these costs were eligible for state grant reimbursement. Staff confirmed that the negotiated costs were within the approved grant amount, but additional documentation will be provided to reconcile changes. Specific issues discussed included discrepancies in weather-related work stoppages, the impact of burrowing owl protections, and security system costs.

Board members requested further details on environmental compliance reports, security expenses, and the reconciliation of negotiated versus initial markup costs. Staff agreed to provide additional documentation and ensure future contracts limit unnecessary cost markups, particularly for state and federally reimbursed projects. The board acknowledged staff efforts in negotiating cost reductions and improving transparency in financial reporting.

BOARD ACCEPTANCE OF A CONTRACT AMENDMENT WITH TKE ENGINEERING FOR THE REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION PROGRAM

It is recommended to authorize the General Manager to execute a contract amendment with TKE Engineering, Inc. for additional costs due to unforeseen tasks and field issues during construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Program in the amount of \$1,229,576.91.

Eric Weck, Engineering Manager, reviewed with the Board a contract amendment with TKE Engineering for construction management and inspection services for the Nancy Wright Regional Wastewater Reclamation Facility. Initially awarded in 2021, the contract was negotiated down from \$7.12 million to \$3.67 million, with an understanding that future budget adjustments might be necessary. The proposed amendment increases the contract amount to \$4.9 million, leaving \$475,000 in reimbursable state grant funds.

Additional costs arose due to unforeseen issues, including burrowing owl monitoring, site surveys, and mitigation plans required by the Department of Fish and Wildlife. TKE also provided oversight for three monitoring wells mandated by the Department of Water Resources, which were not part of the original project scope. The board was provided with detailed documentation and invoices outlining these costs.

Board members sought clarification on specific line items, including staff hours, subcontractor expenses, and project tracking. Concerns were raised about expense reporting, markup costs, and consistency in documentation. Staff confirmed that negotiations had taken place to manage costs, and TKE addressed questions regarding billing and subcontractor oversight. The board acknowledged the necessity of the contract amendment while emphasizing the importance of cost transparency and budget accountability.

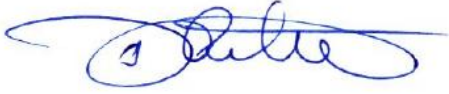

RESOLUTION 2025-01 ~ MSWD REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION FACILITY – INSTALLMENT PURCHASE AGREEMENT EXTENSION (ACTION WAS TAKEN AT STUDY SESSION)

The Board adopted Resolution No. 2025-01, extending the Installment Purchase Agreement related to the MSWD Regional Water Reclamation Facility (Reclamation Facility) for one year through January 2026.

General Manager Brian Macy announced we are locked in a 3.9% interest rate.

FEDERAL ADVOCACY SERVICES – CARPI & CLAY, INC.

The Board authorized the General Manager to execute an Agreement for Services with Carpi & Clay Government Relations in the amount of \$5000/month for the term February 1, 2025, to January 31, 2026.

RESOLUTIONS 2025-02, 2025-03 AND 2025-04 ~ REVISED FY 2024/25 OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGET, APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT, AND CLASSIFICATION AND COMPENSATION PLAN

The Board adopted Resolutions 2025-02, 2025-03, and 2025-04 related to the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, and revised Operating and Capital Budget, Appropriations Limit, and Classification Plan.

General Manager Brian Macy reviewed the changes to the mid-year budget, addressing the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025, including updates to the operating and capital budget, appropriations limit, and

classification and compensation plan. The General Manager provided an overview of key budget changes, highlighting a total expense increase of \$9.4 million. This includes operating expenses such as adding a full-time administrative assistant, wastewater permit costs, temporary staffing, maintenance, and consulting services. Capital improvements totaling \$9.1 million were also discussed, with adjustments made for the Nancy Wright facility, roadway improvements, sewer and water construction, well rehabilitation, monitoring well assessments, solar project enhancements, and groundwater quality protection initiatives.

Revenue projections remained unchanged despite a 10% increase in water usage during the first half of the fiscal year, attributed to hot weather and increased outdoor irrigation. Grant funding from the Army Corps, FEMA, and other sources has been awarded but is pending final approval, with budget augmentations to be made once contracts are executed.

The board also reviewed specific capital project adjustments, including funding for well rehabilitation to address Chrome 6 compliance, monitoring well replacements at the Horton facility, grant-funded interconnection design, and increased costs for roadway and solar projects. Staff clarified that some capital project costs were revised based on updated contract amendments and grant allocations.

Board members reiterated that the budget remains a dynamic document subject to ongoing adjustments as projects evolve. They acknowledged staff efforts in compiling the revisions and ensuring transparency, emphasizing that public updates would be made available as modifications occur.

ACCEPTANCE OF BILL OF SALE FOR SKYBORNE VILLAGE III PHASE II WATER AND SEWER INFRASTRUCTURE

The General Manager has been authorized to approved and execute the Bill of Sale for the Water and Sewer Infrastructure for the Skyborne Village III, Tract No. 32030-3 Phase II project located on East Parkwalk Lane, Mooncrest Drive, Highwing Street, Inspiration Drive, Skyvista Drive, Starloft Circle, North Star Lane, and Rainbow Lane, west of Karen Avenue, north of Promenade Drive, in the City of Desert Hot Springs, as contributed assets.

Engineering Manager Eric Weck reminded the Board that everything within the black polygon (pictured in the meeting recording) is the area affected by the Bill of Sale. As part of standard development conditions for industrial, commercial, and residential projects, Mission Springs Water District requires developers to install necessary water and sewer improvements. The infrastructure for this development has been completed in compliance with district requirements and is now incorporated into the district's system.

CONTRACT AMENDMENT NO. 1 WITH TOM DODSON & ASSOCIATES FOR ON-CALL ENVIRONMENTAL CONSULTING FOR THE MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT SOLAR PROJECT

The General Manager was authorized to approve Contract Amendment No. 1 with Tom Dodson and Associates in the amount of \$54,000 for the preparation of necessary CEQA studies, biological surveys, and modeling for the Solar Improvement Project, with a 10% contingency in the amount of \$5,400 for a not to exceed contract total amount of \$134,400.

Engineering Manager Eric Weck presented a contract amendment with Tom Dodson and Associates for \$54,000, including a 10% contingency, to provide environmental compliance studies and analysis for the district's solar project. Tom Dodson and Associates currently hold an on-call contract with the district for \$75,000, which is utilized for reviewing environmental studies related to development projects in Desert Hot Springs and Palm Springs. As of the meeting date, \$26,341 of the on-call contract had been used, leaving a balance of \$48,658. Board members sought clarification on the distinction between the on-call contract and the new solar project-specific contract, with staff confirming that the requested amount is separate from the remaining on-call funds.

BOARD ACCEPTANCE OF A CONTRACT CHANGE ORDER WITH JF SHEA FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF THE NANCY WRIGHT REGIONAL WASTEWATER RECLAMATION FACILITY

The General Manager was authorized to enter a second mediation with JF Shea to renegotiate the change order terms.

Engineering Manager Eric Weck reviewed the presentation from the Study Session. The board reviewed a contract change order with JF Shea for the Nancy Wright Regional Wastewater Reclamation Facility, originally awarded in 2021 for \$4.986 million. Construction, which began in 2022, is now substantially complete, but unforeseen issues such as burrowing owl nesting restrictions, Southern California Edison design revisions, conveyance line delays, and weather conditions contributed to project scope increases and timeline impacts. After negotiations, the change order was reduced to \$1,698,569.

Board members raised concerns about contractor markups, unclear project costs, and inconsistencies in documentation. Specific issues discussed included discrepancies in reported weather delays, the handling of burrowing owl mitigation, and security system costs. Some members expressed dissatisfaction with JF Shea's lack of direct engagement with the board and questioned the justification

for certain cost increases. Additionally, concerns were raised about indirect project costs not covered by the state grant, such as loan interest and legal fees.

Given the unresolved concerns, the board did not approve the change order. The board also discussed the potential involvement of an ad hoc committee or an executive committee in the mediation process to facilitate more direct engagement with the contractor.

A motion was made to direct staff to enter a second mediation with JF Shea to renegotiate the terms of the change order.

BOARD ACCEPTANCE OF A CONTRACT AMENDMENT WITH TKE ENGINEERING FOR THE REGIONAL WATER RECLAMATION PROGRAM

The General Manager was authorized to execute a contract amendment with TKE Engineering, Inc. for additional costs due to unforeseen tasks and field issues during the construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Program in the amount of \$1,229,576.91.

Engineering Manager Eric Weck reviewed the facts previously presented at the Study Session. He discussed and reviewed a contract amendment with TKE Engineering for construction management and inspection services related to the Nancy Wright Regional Wastewater Reclamation Facility, the conveyance line, and the upcoming Area M2 sewer project. Initially awarded in 2021, TKE's contract was negotiated down from \$7.12 million to \$3.67 million, with an understanding that future adjustments may be necessary. The proposed amendment would increase the contract to \$4.9 million, leaving \$475,000 in reimbursable state grant funds.

Additional costs stem from out-of-scope work, including burrowing owl mitigation efforts and oversight of three monitoring wells mandated by the Department of Water Resources, which were not originally included in the project scope. The board requested clarification on the distinction between completed work requiring reimbursement and projected future costs, ultimately suggesting that future expenses be considered separately in an upcoming meeting. Staff clarified that some costs have already been reimbursed through the grant, while others are pending submission.

Concerns were raised regarding delays in the approval process from the state, particularly for the Area M2 sewer project, which has been awaiting bid package approval since August. Staff indicated that ongoing state delays are preventing the project from moving forward, potentially impacting revenue. Additionally, potential further costs were noted due to new state regulations elevating the burrowing owl to a critical threatened species, which may require additional monitoring and permitting. The board acknowledged these concerns and emphasized the need for continued oversight while moving forward with project funding requests.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

CRITICAL SERVICES CENTER AND ADMINISTRATIVE BUILDING UPDATE

General Manager Brian Macy provided an update on ongoing negotiations with the City regarding right-of-way improvements near the school property north of Park Lane. The City has requested that Mission Springs Water District complete improvements on the north section of the property; however, the district does not have control over this right-of-way. While an easement exists for sewer access, ownership details are still being clarified to determine the feasibility of expanding the road into that area. Staff is working with the City to explore options, including potential escrow arrangements to address future improvements.

Board members raised concerns about the fairness of requiring the district to cover the full cost of improvements, noting that standard development practices typically require developers to fund only the portion of the roadway adjacent to their property. The board also questioned why the school district, which benefits from the improvements, was not involved in the discussions or responsible for its share of the costs. Additionally, concerns were expressed about the use of ratepayer funds for projects beyond the district's core responsibilities.

Staff confirmed that discussions with the City are ongoing and that the City has not imposed any firm restrictions preventing the project from moving forward. The General Manager will meet with the City Manager to discuss the issue further, incorporating the board's feedback regarding ratepayer responsibility and school district involvement. The board emphasized the importance of ensuring a fair and equitable cost distribution and avoiding unnecessary project delays.

Assistant General Manager Marion Champion presented the Public Affairs update. General Manager Brian Macy updated two key items. First, regarding a question from the General Manager's report on Thursday about delinquent bill amounts exceeding regular bill amounts, staff explained that lower consumption has reduced regular bills. In contrast, delinquent amounts have increased due to higher usage, unpaid prior balances, and compounding late fees. The holiday season also contributed to this trend, as shut-offs were not conducted, allowing unpaid bills to accumulate additional fees. Staff confirmed that adjustments may occur when customers negotiate payments or leak-related charges.

Second, the board was informed of an accident at a district construction site where a trench collapsed, injuring a contractor's employee. The worker was taken to the hospital, and the district ensured that the contractor fulfilled OSHA's requirement to report the incident within eight hours. While the contractor remains fully responsible for their activities, the district's construction management team followed up to confirm compliance. No further action was required from the district at this time.

ENGINEERING DIVISION

Engineering Department

Below is a list of Capital Projects and status updates for January 2025.

Well 42 Project

The design engineer, AECOM, prepared a conformed set of plans to clarify changes to project for the completion of construction. The contractor, Layne Christensen, is scheduled to begin the civil site improvements in the coming weeks.

Well 22 Rehabilitation

Staff continued to work with the contractor, Canyon Springs Enterprises, on reviewing and approving material submittals, procuring materials, and responding to requests for information (RFIs).

Water and Wastewater System Comprehensive Master Plan Updates

Staff and consultants continued progress on evaluating the future demands and system needs, as well as finalizing the master plans and capital improvement programs. Staff continued to review and comment on the final draft chapters for both master plans. Staff anticipates completing the plans and presenting them to the Board in the coming weeks.

AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Area “D3”

Staff received the final bid package and completed bidding of the sewer improvement and water line replacement project. Staff is also reviewing and qualifying bids with the intent to bring the lowest responsive bidder to the Board for contracting in the February 2025 Board meeting.

AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Areas “A” & “G”

The Army Corps of Engineers has placed the design on hold due to contracting issues. They are developing a remedy and path forward to complete the final design.

Well 34 Rehabilitation

The contractor, Legend Pump, has completed work on Well 34 and staff will present the Notice of Completion for the project during the March 2025 Board meeting. MSWD staff reviewed the project site and well improvements with the contractor and determined the project to be completed and within budget.

Skyborne Village II – Housing Development

The developer's contractor has completed all improvements and expects sign-off from the District following inspection of the final punch list items in February 2025.

Skyborne Village III – Housing Development

The developer's contractor has completed sewer main installations throughout the project and continues to make progress with watermain installation in the west half of the project. The completion of watermain installation is expected in February 2025. MSWD's contract inspector, MWH Constructors, has been inspecting and verifying the work to ensure it meets MSWD construction standards.

PODS Storage

The developer's contractor is in the process of addressing the punch list items, including correcting sewer line deficiencies. MSWD's contract inspector, TKE Engineering, has been inspecting and verifying the work meets MSWD construction standards.

Project Viento

The developer's contractor continued progress on the water, sewer, and force main system. MSWD's contract inspector, TKE Engineering, has been inspecting and verifying the work meets MSWD construction standards.

Regional Water Reclamation Facility

The Project Team continued responding to RFIs, and processing change orders and payment requests submitted by the treatment plant contractor, JF Shea Construction.

The contractor has returned to the site to prepare for initial wastewater treatment startup, testing, and commissioning scheduled for February 19, 2025.

The Project Team continues to coordinate with the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) on the SRF/Grant funding agreement and reimbursement requests. Staff continued preparing Disbursement Request No. 8 for Q4 2024 and associated quarterly report. Both are expected to be submitted to the State in the coming weeks.

RWRF Conveyance Line

The Project Team continued responding to RFIs and processing change orders and payment requests submitted by the contractor, Downing Construction.

The contractor resumed construction of the gravity sewer portion across the SCE transmission crossing on January 6, 2025. Construction of the sewer mainline has been completed and has begun testing. The sewer testing is scheduled for completion in early February 2025.

Staff continued preparing the disbursement request documentation covering the period from the start of construction through Q4 2024.

Area M2 Sewer Collection System (AD-15)

Staff received RFIs from the State regarding the final bid package. Staff provided responses and continued to monitor the status of final approval with the State. Staff plans to bid the project following the State's approval.

RWRF Roadway Design (19th Avenue, Little Morongo Road, and 20th Avenue)

Staff received the 90% design package for plan check and has also been submitted to the City of Desert Hot Springs for their review.

The consultant continued progress on the draft CEQA document, expecting completion in February 2025 for review. Following review, the draft document will be published for public comment.

Water Resources Department

Below is a list of water resources related activities for January 2025.

Integrated Regional Water Management Planning

The Coachella Valley Regional Water Management Group (CVRWMG) implements the Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Plan for the Coachella Valley IRWM Region.

The CVRWMG met to discuss on-going grant funded projects and upcoming grant opportunities, including continued discussion on Conservation Regulations and Chromium VI compliance.

Mission Creek Subbasin Sustainable Groundwater Management Act Compliance

The consultant completed preparation of the draft Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA) Annual Report. The Mission Creek Subbasin Management Committee provided comments on the draft report. The final report is expected in February 2025 and is due to DWR by April 1, 2025.

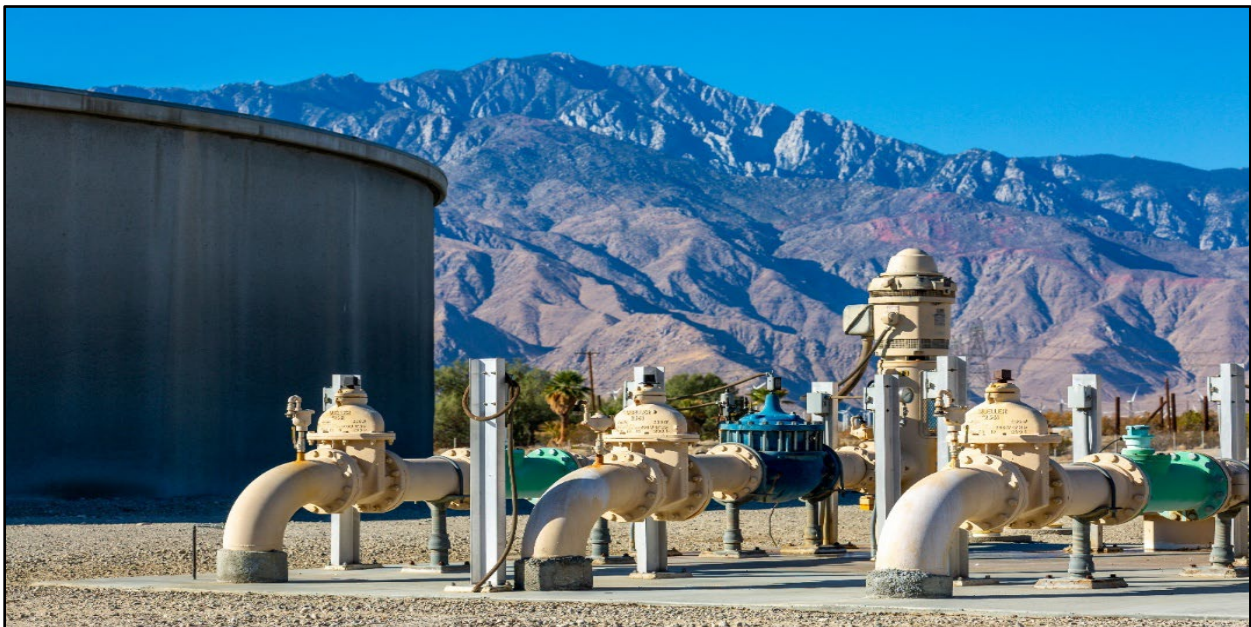
The Mission Creek Subbasin Management Committee issued an RFP for the 2027 periodic update of the Alternative Plan. Proposals are expected in February 2025.

San Gorgonio Pass Subbasin SGMA

Staff provided water supply and quality data to the consultant preparing the SGMA Annual Report. The draft report is expected in February 2025 for review and comment.

Salt and Nutrient Management Planning

Staff attended the monthly Steering Committee meeting to discuss progress and comment on the draft Technical Memorandum #3 (TM3), Delineate Management Zones and Characterize Beneficial Uses. The public draft TM3 is scheduled for release in the coming months.

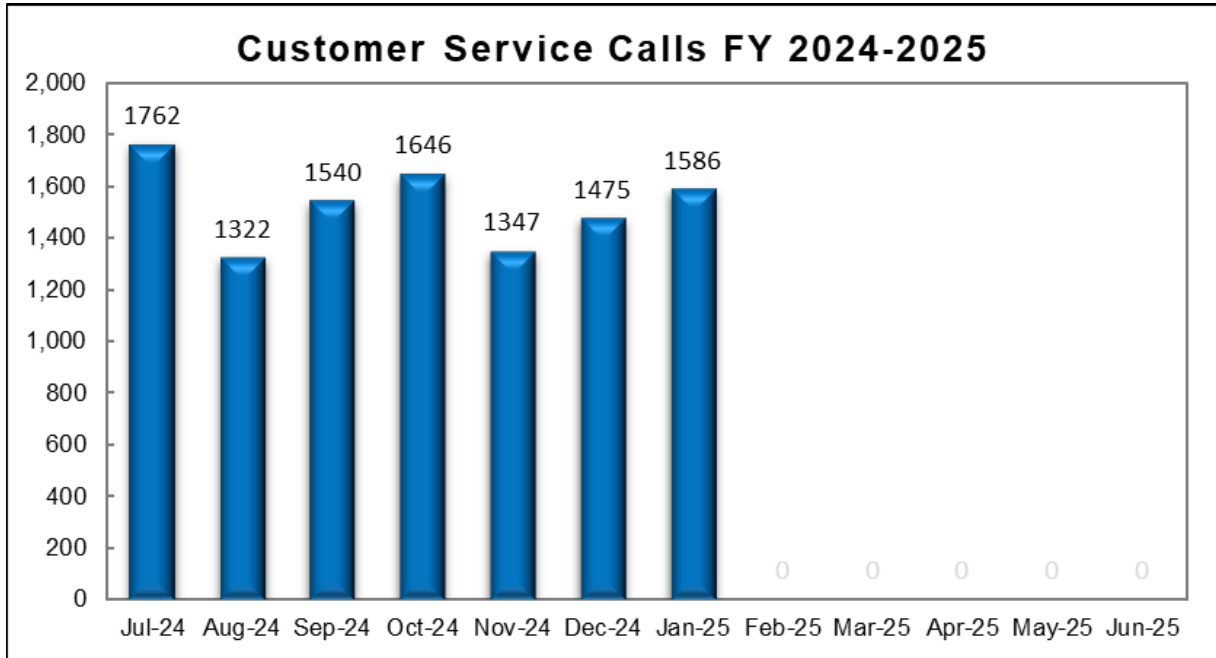

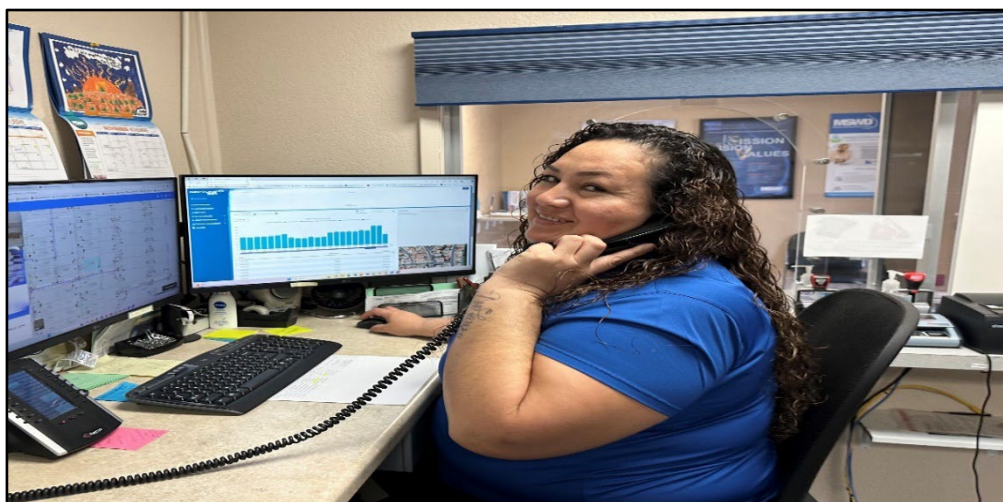

Finance & Accounting Department

The Finance and Accounting department continues to work with its vendors to complete the yearly and necessary tasks to meet State and Federal reporting requirements and the strategic goals established by the MSWD Board of Directors. Below are project highlights and summaries for January 2025.

Payroll

The IRS Form 941, which reports quarterly tax returns, was reviewed, completed, and filed electronically. This ensures accurate reporting of wages, tips, and taxes withheld for the final quarter of 2024. This quarter of payroll taxes for both federal and state were successfully reviewed and submitted on time, including all applicable taxes for the period covering October through December 2024.

W2 Processing

The W2 forms for all agency employees were reviewed, verified for accuracy, and processed in compliance with IRS guidelines. No discrepancies were found, all W2 Forms were printed and mailed to employees by the January 31, 2025, deadline. All employees should receive their forms as required.

1099 Processing for District Contractors

The 1099 Forms for independent contractors associated with the District were reviewed, verified, and processed for the 2024 tax year. The forms were filed electronically with the IRS and copies have been sent to the contractors before the January 31, 2025, deadline. No discrepancies were noted.

Overall Compliance and Timeliness

All required forms were filed within the mandated deadlines, ensuring full compliance with federal and state regulations. All employees and contractors received their tax documents in a timely manner, avoiding any delays or penalties. Staff continued to monitor any feedback or corrections from the IRS or state agencies regarding the submitted forms.

Budget

There were no budget transfer requests for the month of January 2025, and year-to-date budget transfers total \$149,511.00.

Finance

Staff began working with the OpenGov team in January 2025 to integrate their system with our current financial data. Staff have provided OpenGov the budget and actuals data from prior years and are currently configuring the reporting parameters to ensure accuracy in the financial data provided.

Continued ongoing meetings with Wells Fargo Lockbox services. Accounting, Customer Service, and IT are working closely with the Wells Fargo programmer to ensure proper integration and formatting of payment files.

Current Work Priorities

The Accounting department continues to support other departments as needed:

- Engineering
 - Accounts Payable continues to process vendor requisitions.
- Operations
 - Accounting continues to support Operations on reimbursable jobs that include primarily damage to District property where a police report was filed.
- Human Resources
 - Accounting continues to work with Human Resources to update employee information related to new hires and CalPERS appointments.
 - Assist in identifying and correcting errors related to new employees or change of status involving pay rates and deductions.
- Customer Service
 - Processing multiple customer refunds for credit balances on closed accounts.

Cash

Total cash receipts for the month of January 2025 amounted to \$6,408,226.27, with the largest contributors from Secured Annual Property Taxes amounting to \$4,311,002.95, and from normal water and sewer customer account payments amounting to \$1,314,747.62.

Innovation & Technology Department

The Innovation and Technology (IT) department continues to work with staff and vendors to achieve technological enhancement and meet innovation goals established by the MSWD Board of Directors. Below are project highlights and summaries for January 2025.

2024 State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program (SLCGP) Award

The CalOES Grants Analyst has begun the setup process for the District's cybersecurity grant award. The process has not yet advanced to the stage where the District has received approval to proceed with the projects.

Department Updates

The IT department continues to assist Wastewater and Engineering with technical needs for the Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility.

IT also continues to assist the Finance and Contracts departments with the set up and integration of the OpenGov Budget and Procurement platforms.

IT continues to assist Customer Service with the onboard of a new customer check deposit system.

Technology Improvements

The migration of the new file server has been completed.

The adoption of the mobile device management system continues to move forward as more devices are brought under management.

Cybersecurity improvements continue to be made to improve District security.

Desktop computers and laptop upgrades continue as needed.

Cyber Security News Roundup

The IT Department tracks trends in cyber security to note new opportunities for security and new concerns to defend against. The news below is a brief selection intended for informational purposes and provides no insight to the district's cybersecurity controls.

- The FTC warns of a surge in fake toll road text phishing scams linked to Chinese hackers. These texts claim unpaid tolls and prompt users to enter sensitive information. The FTC advises not to click on links, verify texts with official sources, and report unwanted messages to combat these scams. ([GovTech](#))
- The FBI, with French assistance, removed Chinese government-backed PlugX malware from over 4,200 U.S. computers. The malware, spread by Twill Typhoon, was used for espionage. This is an example of the ongoing cyber threats from China. ([NextGov](#))
- The Trump administration has cleared non-government members from the DHS Cyber Safety Review Board to cut costs. This move delays the investigation into the Salt Typhoon hacks, a major Chinese cyber intrusion into U.S. telecom systems. ([NextGov](#))

- A data breach at education software provider PowerSchool affected over 33,000 Maine residents, exposing personal information such as names, birthdates, and Social Security numbers. The breach, discovered in December 2024, impacted at least nine school districts. ([NextGov](#))

Intelesys IT Support

The District receives IT services and support through Intelesys. The Intelesys Monthly Client Report for January 2025 activities can be found in Appendix A.

Purchasing Department

Continue to source sanitization supplies to ensure wipes, hand sanitizers, disinfectants are available in all district buildings, and vehicles for the safety of the staff.

Price increases and supply chain issues continue to surface in our industry. Specifically, PVC pipe and fittings, ductile iron pipe and service brass fittings, restraints, hydrants, and valves, as well as many other products, are experiencing significant shortages that could lead to extended lead times. Along with these supply chain problems, pricing continues to escalate. These problems exist with both domestic and import materials. We will continue to monitor the situation and do our due diligence in getting all the material that is needed to maintain our water systems.

Total inventory purchases were \$54,881.13 and the total issued for use by field crews was \$34,334.98 for the month of January 2025.



OPERATIONS & MAINTENANCE DIVISION

Construction & Maintenance Department

Water Line Locations

Staff completed approximately 296 water line location requests using iPads and the GeoViewer Mobile app to streamline and manage line locations.



Water System Repairs/Replacement

Staff continued to repair and replace components of the water distribution system keeping it in optimum working order and properly functioning without any interruption. Below is a summary of the repairs and replacements completed in January 2025.

- Four water service lines were replaced with copper.
- Ten service line leaks were repaired.
- Four mainline leaks were repaired.
- Three fire hydrants were repaired.



Water System Maintenance

Staff continued to implement preventative maintenance and inspection programs to keep the water distribution system in optimal working order and properly functioning without any interruption. Below is a summary of the maintenance completed in January 2025.

- 295 ground valves were exercised.
- 123 fire hydrants were flushed, maintained, and painted.
- Two air-release valves were inspected and/or rebuilt. Annual air-release valve maintenance has been completed.
- Zero Cla-Val valves were repaired.
- 64 blow-offs were flushed.



CMMS Workorder Program

A total of 20 work orders were processed in January 2025 using the CMMS program.

New Water Meter Service Installation

Staff installed one new water service line in January 2025

Fire Flow Testing

Staff conducted 13 field fire flow tests for the Engineering Department in January 2025.

Cla-Val Replacement

Construction and Maintenance replaced four Cla-Vals at the Terrace Reservoir for Boosters 1 through 4 due to valve deterioration. The replacement was part of an approved capital project.



Fleet & Facility Maintenance Department

Janitorial Services

A 30-day termination letter was issued on January 28, 2025, to our janitorial company, Premier Property Preservation, due to unresolved performance issues. An RFP for annual janitorial services was circulated in late January 2025. District staff is self-performing janitorial duties until we contract with another company.

Building Maintenance

Staff completed the following building maintenance during the month of January 2025.

- Lowered flags to half-staff at Administration Building in honor of President Jimmy Carter's passing.
- Repaired four irrigation line leaks and six bubblers at Well 28.
- Installed a new irrigation controller at Vista Tank.
- Performed janitorial duties at the Administration Building and Corporate Yard.
- Repaired three irrigation leaks at Wells 27/31.
- Replaced both flags at the Administration Building.
- Routine policing of trash pickup at Corporate Yard, specifically the gate areas due to heavy wind events.
- Repaired three irrigation leaks at Two Bunch Reservoir.
- Performed bi-weekly cleanup at Old Stores.
- Removed upstairs women's restroom toilet and had drain snaked by Wastewater Department due to drain being clogged. Reinstalled toilet and applied silicone.
- Replaced door handle to the shop entry door at the Corporate Yard.
- Replaced batteries on Well 25 and Well 25A irrigation controllers.
- Replaced the failed gas line to welder in Corporate Yard shop.

Standby Generator Monthly Maintenance Program

Monthly testing is conducted to ensure that all generators are in good working order and ready for use when needed. There were no issues with the generators this month.

Fleet Maintenance/Repairs

- Unit 410 was taken into Palm Springs Motors for an airbag light, and a sub-harness was replaced. PM service was performed in-house, with an oil change, tire rotation, and all four shocks replaced
- Unit 450 had emergency strobes and radio installed.
- Unit 400 had the battery replaced.
- Unit 117 had the suction tube repaired, and the left front tire patched by Desert Tire.
- Unit 449 had emergency strobes installed, radio mounted and wired to power, and side-mount toolboxes installed.
- All generators ran and run time was logged on corresponding sheets.
- Unit 418 had the front struts replaced and transmission serviced.
- Unit 367 was dropped off at Ontario Pick Your Part for dismantling as part of the AQMD grant requirements.
- Unit 433 had GPS installed and an oil change performed, a patch was done on the left rear outer tire by Desert Tire.
- Unit 442 had the oxygen and acetylene bottles replaced.

- Unit 454 had the unit numbers applied.
- Unit 420 had the battery recharged.
- Generator 441 had 26.1 gallons of fuel added during use at Well 26A.
- Unit 415 had all rear duals rotated.
- Trailer 395 had all four inner hub seals and brake assemblies replaced, and right front drum and hub replaced in-house, along with two left rear tires replaced by Parkhouse Tire.
- Unit 453 had a 10A fuse replaced twice in-house, will be repaired under warranty with John Deere.
- Unit 421 had both front valve stems replaced.
- Unit 385 had the in-tank ball-check and cage replaced, two tool stays rebuilt, and battery recharged.
- Unit 419 had an oil change and tire rotation performed.
- Unit 439 had an oil change performed.
- Unit 390 had the license plate lights replaced.
- Unit 431 had the right rear outrigger hydraulic line replaced.
- Unit 362 had a bucket tooth pin replaced.
- Unit 433 had an oil change performed.
- Unit 369 had a borrowed hub cover replaced.

Field Services Department

WaterSmart / Neptune 360

Cross Connection Control Program

The Backflow and Cross Connection Specialist performs annual testing of Backflow Prevention Assemblies (BPAs) throughout the District as required by the SWRCB Cross Connection Control Policy Handbook. There were 68 BPAs tested in January 2025.

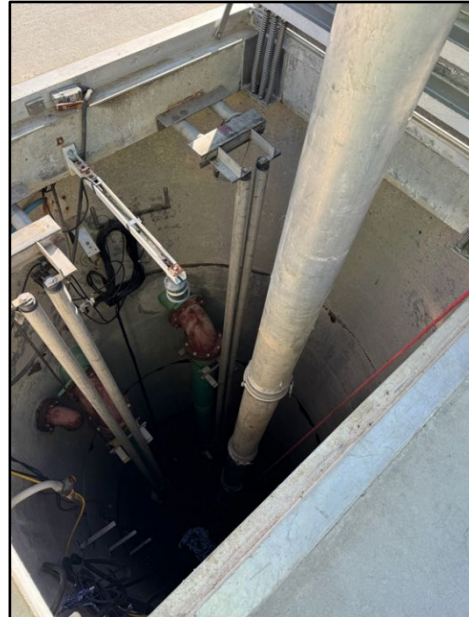
Wastewater Collection Department

Sanitary Sewer Overflow

There were no Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSOs) in the collection system this month.

Dos Palmas Lift Station

Operators conducted daily site visits to ensure proper pump operation, Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system functionality, and site security. Staff removed the grease and rags from the top of the Dos Palmas Lift Station.



Sewer Line Locations

Staff completed 305 sewer line location requests using iPads and the GeoViewer mobile application to streamline and manage line locations.

Sewer Line/Collections Maintenance

Staff completed zero CCTV inspections in January 2025.

Staff cleaned 5,148 feet of sewer mainline in January 2025 in Assessment District 18A, a total of 22 pipe segments.



Wastewater Treatment & Disposal Department

Plant Maintenance

Staff spent 811-man hours performing routine plant maintenance, equipment maintenance, and plant operations at the Horton and Desert Crest Wastewater Treatment Plants (WWTPs). Also, during this timeframe staff spent 140.3-man hours operating the sludge belt filter press, including filling and removing 23 trailers of sludge from the Horton and Desert Crest WWTPs.

Staff continued to have issues with the gearbox located on the vertical auger for the belt press. Staff have ordered a new gearbox and shaft and once they have been trained on the new telehandler, they will both be replaced. During this time, staff welded the gearbox to the shaft to allow continued operation.



Staff completed a confined space entry into the grit vortex to remove a blockage in the sump pump. Staff removed the paddles, grit, and rags causing blockage, allowing the vortex to return to normal operation.



Staff worked on replacing the horizontal auger for the belt press. This project was part of a Capital Improvement Project to replace the components of the auger such as the gearbox, augers, bearings, shafts, etc.



Pond Maintenance

Ponds 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 were cleaned and rehabilitated during January 2025. Staff has noticed an increase in solid levels within the aeration and clarifier tanks, there is more evidence of the solids going out of the ponds, but the ponds continue to percolate at a high rate.



Sampling and Laboratory

Staff collected 44 samples and spent 88-man hours performing laboratory duties and analysis for process control and regulatory reporting purposes. Both plants are producing an effluent that meets the District's permit discharge requirements.

Staff continue to sample from the pond lysimeters in Ponds 1, 6, and 8 for the nitrogen study. The objective is to determine whether the total nitrogen is being reduced as it percolates through the sand.

Weekly Wastewater Training

The training courses aim to provide all operators with consistent knowledge and a better understanding of processes, including operating equipment more proficiently. This training helps keep operators safe while completing maintenance. A summary of this month's training includes:

Nancy Wright RWRP

Staff continued to visit the site in preparation for the plant's startup. The expected startup should occur in February 2025.

Water Production Department

Water Pumped/Produced

During the month of January 2025, the District's three public water systems produced the following volume of water:

- MSWD (CA3310008) – 560.13 Acre Feet (182.52 MG)
- West Palm Springs Village (CA3310078) – 7.64 Acre Feet (2.49 MG)
- Palm Springs Crest (CA3310081) – 4.47 Acre Feet (1.46 MG)

Water Sampling/Testing

- Bacteriological Sampling – Staff collected 50 routine samples in the MSWD system, four routine samples in the ID-E area which includes the West Palm Springs Village (WPSV) and Palm Springs Crest (PSC) systems, and four well samples in ID-E.
- Staff collected 16 general physical samples in the MSWD system and two general physical samples in ID-E.
- Well 26A Uranium Treatment (IXP) Sampling – The monthly uranium sampling was completed on January 6, 2025.
- Monthly Reporting – The District's Monthly Coliform Monitoring Report for all three water systems was sent to the SWRCB Department of Drinking Water (DDW) on January 10, 2025.
- Chromium-6 Sampling – Staff will continue to collect monthly Chromium-6 sampling until otherwise instructed. Additionally, staff sampled Well 31 daily between October 28 and November 1, 2024, while Well 27 was left off.

Chlorination System Updates

- Chlorination Pumps – Staff conducted routine maintenance and inspections on all chlorine pumps and related equipment at well sites. Staff made necessary adjustments, repairing and/or rebuilding to ensure proper operation. Most chlorinator pumps continue to function properly, with only typical preventative maintenance required (i.e., repair of cracked chlorination suction/feed tubing).
- Chlorinator Pump Cleaning – All of the chlorinator pumps were cleaned twice during the month of January 2025.
- Sodium Hypochlorite (Chlorine) Usage – During the month of January 2025, a total of 1,384 gallons of chlorine (12.5% solution strength) was used to disinfect the distribution system and our production facilities. (Reflects usage in the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)
- Chlorine Residuals at Production Well Sites – In January 2025, the Water Production staff checked and documented the chlorine residuals at all wells in use 214 times. The average chlorine residual of these readings was 0.97 ppm. (This data reflects the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)
- Distribution System Chlorine Residuals – During the month of January 2025, the Water Production staff checked and documented the chlorine residuals throughout the distribution system a total of 75 times. The average chlorine residual of these readings is 0.85 ppm. (This data reflects the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)

Well Soundings

Staff continued to sound the groundwater levels for 13 production wells and nine monitoring wells. Staff aim to complete these by the 15th of each month.

Water Production Facility Updates

Staff oversee all water production sites, making necessary adjustments. They conduct monthly overflow maintenance as needed by climbing reservoirs. Staff also inspect reservoir roofs using a drone.

- Gateway Fire Pump Monthly Testing – Staff performed the monthly fire pump testing on January 14, 2025. All systems functioned properly. Water loss data was captured and entered onto our water loss tracking worksheet.

Well 33 Solar Site

Staff continue to monitor the performance of the solar system. However, MSWD is still working with Kenwood Energy to review past maintenance reports and the current condition of the facility. They are also helping prepare an RFP for an O&M service contract. Kenwood Energy has reached out to Total Energies requesting maintenance data and repair log. Staff reached out to a third-party maintenance company to assess the maintenance and repair needs for the solar site. A proposal is still pending.



Water Report

Legislative Updates

Federal: Emergency Measures to Provide Water Resources in California and Improve Disaster Response in Certain Areas

Directs all federal agencies to take all measures consistent within their authority to ensure adequate water resources in Southern California to manage the wildfires. Directs the Secretary of the Interior to use authorities to increase hydropower generation in the Central Valley Project (CVP) to increase water storage and conveyance. Directs OMB to review "all Federal programs, projects, and activities for all relevant agencies that impact land management, water supply, water storage and delivery, water infrastructure, and disaster preparedness and response." Directs additional federal aid to restore housing, remove waste, and increase fire preparedness in California, and additional housing and infrastructure aid to areas affected by Hurricane Helene. EPA Releases Final CWA.

Federal: House Passes Bipartisan Federal Disaster Coordination Bill

The House passed the Federal Disaster Assistance Coordination Act (H.R. 152) on January 14, 2025, by a vote of 405-5. The bipartisan legislation directs the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to study and streamline data collection and damage assessments following a natural disaster to ease the application process for federal disaster assistance. The legislation heads to the Senate for consideration.

State: First month of the 2025-26 Legislative Session

The first month of the 2025-26 Legislative Session has come to a close. While bills continue to be introduced, much of the focus has remained on wildfire relief. Legislators are working to introduce legislation aimed at addressing the immediate needs of wildfire victims, while also developing long-term proposals to tackle the root causes of these disasters, particularly the impacts of climate change.

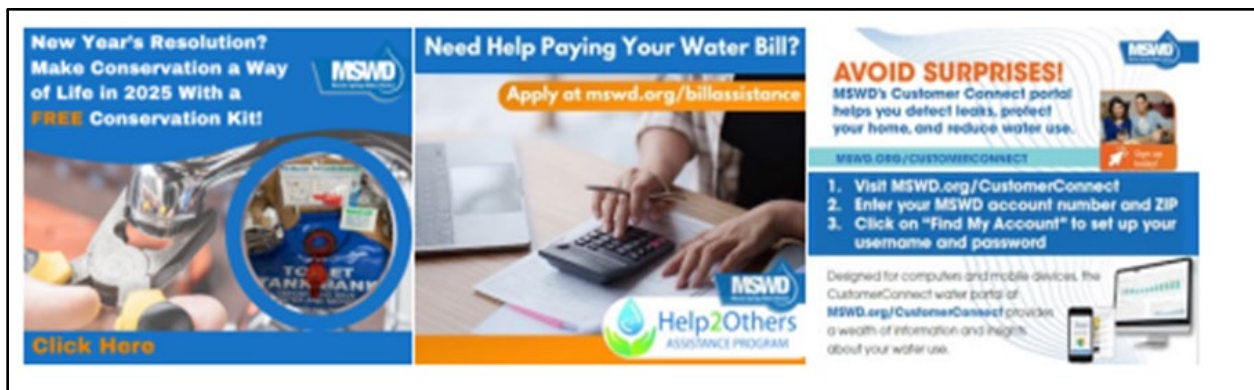
On January 13, 2025, Governor Newsom expanded the Special Session he called in November 2024 to provide funding for wildfire recovery in Los Angeles. The Legislature and Governor quickly passed legislation to provide \$2.5 billion for response and recovery efforts, \$4 million to expedite rebuilding, and \$1 million to rebuild school facilities.

Bill introductions have been slower than usual this year due to fire response and the newly reduced bill limits. We have been reviewing all of the bills introduced for any impact on Mission Springs Water District and will discuss legislative positions with District staff. Legislators have until February 21, 2025, to introduce regular, non-urgency, bills.

MSWD Digital Advertising

For the month of January 2025, the District featured three Google and Facebook/Instagram ads promoting various MSWD programs. The Google campaign garnered 257.01K impressions, and 221 link clicks. Our Facebook/Instagram (Meta) ads garnered a large increase from 271.7K last month to 369.4K impressions and 352 link clicks. The largest increase was due to the Conservation Kit campaign with 176k impressions and 143 clicks. The MSWD website saw 5,477 users, 18,574 views, and 6,077 engaged sessions. Social Media

This report highlights activities and posts on the District’s social media platforms. Some of our most engaging posts included the CWEA CORBS Awards, the Emergency Preparation (in response to the wildfires), and Worker Wednesday – Keeping Pumps Running Smoothly. Our most shared posts were the CWEA CORBS Awards, and the Worker Wednesday.

We had notable gains on Facebook with 312,182 (up 45.3%) impressions and 40 new likes. Instagram continues to grow with 7 new followers and 76,792 impressions (up 91.7%), LinkedIn is growing with 2 new followers, impressions were down, but engagement is up 2.5%.

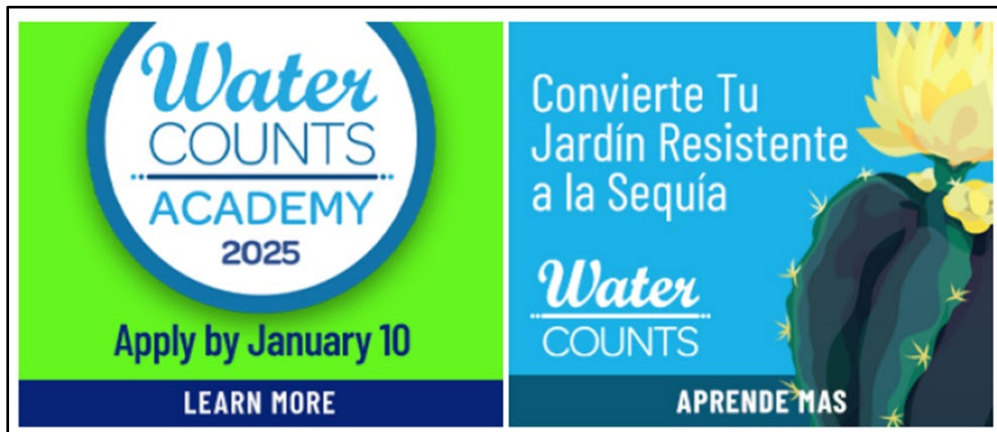

CV Water Counts

CV Water Counts continues with strong digital marketing efforts in January 2025, with 317.62K display ad impressions, 11,061 search ad impressions, and 111.18K video ad impressions. Social media engagement remained high, with Facebook ads generating 87,920 impressions and Instagram reaching 3,999 impressions. 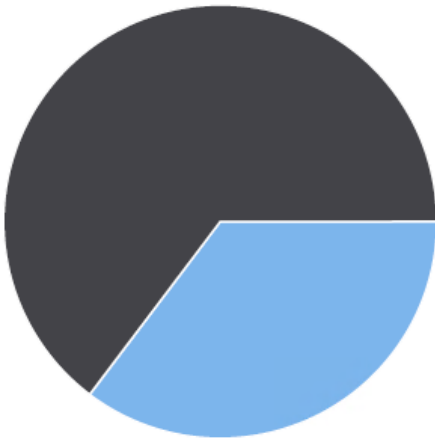

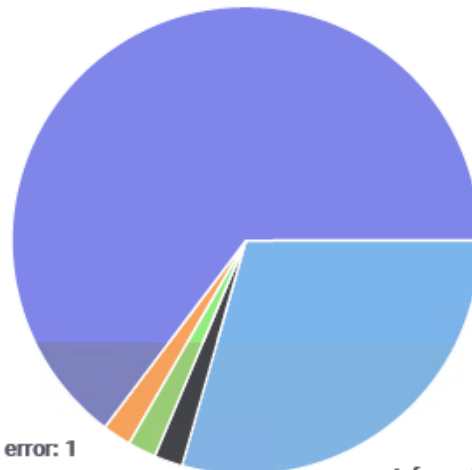

APPENDIX C – Federal & State Legislative Information

Mission Springs Water District Federal Update

January 31, 2025

Federal Funding Freeze

On January 27th, acting Director of the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Matthew Vaeth issued a memo (**M-25-13**) titled *Temporary Pause of Agency Grant, Loan, and Other Financial Assistance Programs*. This memo directed all federal agencies to temporarily pause all federal grants, loans, and other financial assistance programs effective 5:00 pm on January 28th. Prior to the 5:00 pm deadline on the 28th, a legal challenge to the memo was brought before a District Court in Washington, D.C. and a federal judge issued a stay on the funding freeze until February 3rd. On January 29th, OMB issued another memo that rescinded the memo released on the 27th. At the time, it was believed that the rescission of OMB's memo would put an end to the funding freeze. However, about an hour later, White House Press Secretary Karoline Leavitt posted on X, clarifying that rescinding the memo does not, in fact, lift the funding freeze. Following these actions, a coalition of 22 state attorneys general sought a restraining order in a District Court in Rhode Island. They argued that public statements and the X post indicate “the original sweeping spending freeze is still in effect, even if the OMB memo describing it has been pulled.” In response, U.S. District Court Judge McConnell stated that he plans to issue a restraining order, stating that withdrawing the “hugely ambiguous” OMB directive is merely a distinction without a difference, “based on comments by the president’s press secretary.”

President Trump Issues Slate of Executive Orders

President Trump began his second term by issuing a slate of EOs and memoranda affecting a broad swath of federal policy, including the rescission of policies under former President Joe Biden’s administration. Notable EOs include:

- **Regulatory Freeze Pending Review**: directs federal agencies to freeze rulemakings, rescind unpublished rules, and postpones the effective date of any previously published rules by 60 days.
- **Putting People Over Fish: Stopping Radical Environmentalism to Provide Water to Southern California**: directs the Secretaries of Commerce and the Interior to “route more water from the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to other parts of the state for use by the people there who desperately need a reliable water supply.”
- **Emergency Measures to Provide Water Resources in California and Improve Disaster Response in Certain Areas**: directs all federal agencies to take all measures consistent within their authority to ensure adequate water resources in Southern California to manage the wildfires. Directs the Secretary of the Interior to use authorities to increase hydropower

generation in the Central Valley Project (CVP) to increase water storage and conveyance. Directs OMB to review “all Federal programs, projects, and activities for all relevant agencies that impact land management, water supply, water storage and delivery, water infrastructure, and disaster preparedness and response.” Directs additional federal aid to restore housing, remove waste, and increase fire preparedness in California, and additional housing and infrastructure aid to areas affected by Hurricane Helene.

- **Unleashing American Energy**: supports the advancement of energy and natural resources projects but also seeks to halt EV programs and grants established by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law and the Inflation Reduction Act.
- **Declaring a National Energy Emergency**: revokes the Council on Environmental Quality’s authority to tell agencies how to comply with the environmental review process for energy projects.
- **Council to Assess the Federal Emergency Management Agency**: creates a 20-member council to review federal emergency management policies, practices, and authorities to provide “immediate, effective, and impartial response to and recovery from disasters.”
- **Establishing and Implementing the President’s “Department of Government Efficiency”**: creates and authorizes the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) to be led by Elon Musk.
- **Reforming The Federal Hiring Process and Restoring Merit to Government Service**: part of President Trump’s efforts to remove diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) provisions implemented by former President Biden.
- **Return to In-Person Work**: requires federal agencies to begin terminating remote work arrangements and bring the federal workforce back into the office.
- **Hiring Freeze**: orders a federal hiring freeze for civilian positions across the executive branch. Within 90 days, OMB must develop a plan to reduce the federal workforce through efficiency and attrition. The freeze will expire for most agencies once the plan is issued, except for the IRS, where it remains in effect until further notice. The freeze does not apply to military personnel, positions related to immigration enforcement, national security, public safety, or services for Social Security, Medicare, or Veterans’ benefits.
- **Restoring Accountability to Policy-Influencing Position Within the Federal Workforce**: reinstates and expands Schedule F, reclassifying certain federal positions as "Schedule Policy/Career" which allows for the reassignment or dismissal of federal employees in these positions who are deemed underperforming or not aligned with the administration’s policies, reversing restrictions imposed by the previous administration.
- **Restoring Accountability for Career Senior Executives**: increases accountability among Senior Executive Service (SES) officials, ensuring they align with the administration’s policies. The directive calls for new performance plans, reassignments, restructuring of oversight boards, and potential removal of SES members whose performance is deemed inconsistent with their duties.
- **Ending Radical and Wasteful Government DEI Programs and Preferencing**: terminates federal diversity, equity, inclusion (DEI), and environmental justice programs. All DEI-related positions, programs, mandates, and training, including "Chief Diversity Officer" roles and "equity action plans," are to be ended within 60 days. The Assistant to the

President for Domestic Policy will monitor agency compliance, assess barriers to implementation, and recommend additional measures to ensure adherence to the order.

President Trump to Address Congress on March 4th

Speaker of the House Mike Johnson (R-LA) [sent a letter](#) to President Trump inviting him to give an address during a Joint Session of Congress on March 4th. This speech will be President Trump's first address to Congress in his second term in office.

Treasury Begins Extraordinary Debt Limit Measures

On January 17th, outgoing Secretary of the Treasury Janet Yellen [sent a letter](#) to Speaker Johnson announcing that the Department of the Treasury (Treasury) will begin extraordinary measures to prevent default on the national debt effect January 21st. The *Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2023* ([P.L. 118-5](#)) suspended the debt limit until January 1st of this year, and a new limit was established on January 2nd. The extraordinary measures include temporarily withholding investments in the Civil Service Retirement and Disability Fund and the Postal Service Retiree Health Benefits Fund. Both funds will receive payments once Congress acts to increase or suspend the debt limit. President Trump announced his desire for the debt ceiling to be increased as part of the budget reconciliation package under development by House Republicans.

CONGRESSIONAL ACTIVITY

House Passes Bipartisan Federal Disaster Coordination Bill. The House passed the *Federal Disaster Assistance Coordination Act* ([H.R. 152](#)) on January 14th by a vote of 405-5. The bipartisan

legislation directs the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to study and streamline data collection and damage assessments following a natural disaster to ease the application process for federal disaster assistance. The legislation heads to the Senate for consideration.

House Democrats Urge Support for OSHA’s Heat Injury and Illness Prevention Rule. A group of 57 House Democrats [sent a comment letter](#) to the Department of Labor supporting the Occupational Safety and Health Administration’s (OSHA) proposed rule to protect workers from occupational exposure to extreme heat. The Biden Administration released the [Heat Injury and Illness Prevention in Outdoor and Indoor Work Settings](#) notice of proposed rulemaking in August 2024, with the comment period ending January 14th. The letter requests a comprehensive standard that provides workers with adequate hydration, rest breaks, areas of rest breaks out of direct sun or in air conditioning, medical services and training to address heat related illnesses, and a plan for acclimatization to high-heat work conditions.

FEDERAL FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

Reclamation Announces \$95 Million WaterSMART Aquatic Ecosystem Restoration NOFO. The Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) announced a \$95 million [NOFO](#) through the WaterSMART Aquatic Ecosystem Restoration program. Funding will support projects to study, design, and construct collaboratively developed ecosystem aquatic ecosystem restoration projects. Applications are due by April 15th.

Reclamation Announces WaterSMART Cooperative Watershed Management NOFO. Reclamation announced a [NOFO](#) through Phase I of the WaterSMART Cooperative Watershed Management Program for up to \$300,000 per applicant over a three-year period. Funding will support development activities, watershed restoration planning, and watershed management project design. Applications are due by May 20th.

GRANT AWARD ANNOUNCEMENTS

Reclamation Announces \$41 Million in FY24 WaterSMART Environmental Water Resources Awards. Reclamation [announced](#) \$41 million in grants for 21 projects in 11 states through the WaterSMART Environmental Water Resources program. Funding supports projects that bolster water resources, ecosystem health, and resilience in communities facing drought and other climate-related concerns.

Reclamation Announces \$223.2 Million in Title XVI Water Reclamation, Reuse, and Desalination Grants. Reclamation [announced](#) \$223.2 million in Title XVI Water Reclamation, Reuse, and Desalination grants for 18 projects in 8 states. The projects are expected to create 305,936 acre-feet of recycled water annually through water storage, conservation and conveyance, nature-based solutions, dam safety, water purification and reuse, and desalination.

REGULATORY ACTIONS TAKEN IN JANUARY UNDER THE PREVIOUS ADMINISTRATION

The following actions were taken in January by the prior Administration. It is possible that these actions could be amended or revoked.

EPA Adds Nine Additional PFAS to the Toxic Release Inventory. EPA [automatically added](#) nine per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) to the Toxic Release Inventory (TRI) beginning with reporting year 2025. The automatic addition of PFAS to the TRI is authorized by the FY20 National Defense Authorization Act which provides the framework for additions based on EPA activity related to PFAS. A total of 205 PFAS are now subject to annual TRI reporting requirements.

EPA Releases Draft Sewage Sludge Risk Assessment for PFAS. The EPA released a [Draft Sewage Sludge Risk Assessment for PFOA and PFOS](#) to address potential human health risks related to PFAS. Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS) exposure risks may be prevalent with all three methods of disposing of sewage sludge: land application of biosolids, surface disposal in landfills, or incineration. The risk assessment focuses on individuals living on or near impacted sites and those who rely on food crops, animal products, and drinking water at risk of contamination. EPA developed a [landing page](#), a [general fact sheet](#), a [fact sheet for wastewater treatment plants](#), and a [frequently asked questions document](#) to provide more information. Comments on the draft are due by March 17th.

Reclamation Announces Revisions to NEPA Categorical Exclusions. Reclamation announced [final revisions](#) to seven categorical exclusions under NEPA. The revisions aim to streamline the environmental review process for water-related contracting, use authorizations, financial assistance, loans, and funding activities. The revisions are effective as of January 13th.

FEDERAL AGENCY ANNOUNCEMENTS AND PERSONNEL CHANGES

EPA Releases Framework for Permitting Innovation in the Wastewater Sector. EPA issued a [“Framework for Permitting Innovation in the Wastewater Sector”](#) to raise awareness of and prioritize improving permitting processes to address discharges associated with innovative technologies and management strategies.

EPA Releases Q&A Document on Potable Reuse and PFAS. EPA released a question and answer (Q&A) document titled [“Potable Reuse and PFAS.”](#) The document was developed in response to the volume of questions related to EPA’s rules and regulations on potable water reuse and PFAS.

EPA Releases Environmental Value of Applying Compost Report. EPA issued a report titled "[Environmental Value of Applying Compost: Improving Soil Health for Stormwater Management, Contaminated Site Remediation, Ecosystem Restoration, Landscaping and Agriculture](#)." The report summarized the environmental value of compost used across various sectors, including green infrastructure, stormwater management, ecosystem conservation and restoration, contaminated site remediation, and other applications.

Reclamation Announces Deputy Regional Director for Lower Colorado Basin Region. Reclamation [announced](#) that Genevieve Johnson will serve as the Deputy Regional Director for the Lower Colorado Basin region. Johnson previously served as Manager of the Lower Colorado Basin Region Project and Program Office.

Mission Springs Water District Sacramento Update

January 2024

The first month of the 2025-26 Legislative Session has come to a close. While bills continue to be introduced, much of the focus has remained on wildfire relief. Legislators are working to introduce legislation aimed at addressing the immediate needs of wildfire victims, while also developing long-term proposals to tackle the root causes of these disasters, particularly the impacts of climate change.

On January 13 Governor Newsom expanded the Special Session he called in November to provide funding for wildfire recovery in Los Angeles. The Legislature and Governor quickly passed legislation to provide \$2.5 billion for response and recovery efforts, \$4 million to expedite rebuilding and \$1 million to rebuild school facilities.

Bill introductions have been slower than usual this year due to fire response and the newly reduced bill limits. We have been reviewing all of the bills introduced for any impact on Mission Springs and will discuss legislative positions with District staff. Legislators have until February 21 to introduce regular, non-urgency, bills.

State Budget

As required by the State Constitution, Governor Newsom released his proposed 2025-26 fiscal year budget in early January. The Governor's total budget is \$322.3 billion and kicks off the six-month process of negotiations with the Legislature before final passage of the 2025-26 budget by the start of the new fiscal year on July 1.

As expected, the Governor's revenue projections are more optimistic than the Legislative Analyst Office (LAO) which released their revenue number in November and projected a deficit of approximately \$2 billion. The Governor's budget estimates a small, \$363 million, surplus. The bulk of the difference between the Governor and LAO's revenue numbers are due to current fiscal year revenues being \$16.5 billion higher than the 2024-25 budget projected. Additionally, it is important to note that the Governor's projected surplus is dependent on \$7.1 billion being withdrawn from the state's reserves, the Budget Stabilization Account (BSA).

The 2024 Budget Act withdrew approximately \$5.1 billion in the 2024-25 fiscal year and assumed \$7.1 billion would be withdrawn in the 2025-26 fiscal year. The Governor's Budget

maintains the planned withdrawal of approximately \$7.1 billion from the BSA in the 2025-26 fiscal year.

The Governor's optimistic revenue projections in early January have now shifted due to the Southern California fires. In late January, the Governor's Department of Finance sent a letter to all state agencies to notify them that there will not be any adjustments or new expenditures to the proposed state budget. A copy of the letter is available [here](#).

The letter states, *"Given the projected structural deficits in future years and fiscal uncertainty the state continues to face, the Administration will not propose any April 1 Finance Letter spending adjustments or May 1 capital outlay adjustments to the Legislature."*

This is expected to have the most impact on newly enacted legislation that state agencies and departments would be seeking additional funding and staff positions to implement.

Agencia Local Revela Audaz Iniciativa de Distribución de Agua Regional

La Agencia de Aguas del Paso de San Geronio (SGPWA) dio un paso importante para garantizar la seguridad hídrica a largo plazo en la región al organizar un taller muy esperado el 30 de septiembre, donde revelaron detalles del ambicioso Proyecto de Tubería Básica. Este proyecto transformador tiene como objetivo mejorar la distribución de agua importada en toda el área del Paso de San Geronio, prometiendo un futuro hídrico sostenible para las comunidades locales.

El evento atrajo la participación de varios contratistas de agua estatales, partes interesadas locales, ciudades asociadas, distritos de agua minoristas y representantes tribales locales, todos los cuales compartieron activamente sus ideas sobre los planes propuestos. Esta participación destacó el esfuerzo colaborativo necesario para avanzar con el proyecto.

El Proyecto de Tubería Básica, una visión que se desarrolló durante más de dos décadas, ahora está más cerca que nunca de convertirse en realidad, gracias al creciente apoyo de múltiples agencias. El oleoducto propuesto transportaría la asignación de agua del Proyecto Estatal de Agua (SWP) de SGPWA desde el oleoducto de extensión de la rama este existente en la ciudad de Beaumont a múltiples instalaciones en toda la región del Paso de San Geronio, ter-



minando en una cuenca de recarga de agua subterránea en Cabazon.

"Este proyecto representa un momento crucial para la región", dijo el presidente de la junta, Mickey Valdivia. "Al mejorar la distribución de agua importada a nuevas instalaciones de recarga, el oleoducto principal garantizará una fuente de agua confiable para las generaciones futuras. Las comunidades de toda el área del Paso de San Geronio se beneficiarán de esta mayor seguridad hídrica".

En octubre de 2023, Albert A. Webb & Associates realizó un estudio de viabilidad para describir los requisitos, permisos y fondos necesarios para llevar a cabo el proyecto. Esto incluyó recomendaciones para el oleoducto principal que transportaría agua desde el oleoducto de extensión de la rama este del Proyecto Estatal de Agua a las comunidades de Banning y Cabazon para recargar las cuencas de agua subterránea y proporcionar agua adicional a los residentes.

El costo total estimado para el proyecto es de hasta \$150 millones, y SGPWA se comprometió a obtener fondos a través de subvenciones estatales y federales. La construcción del oleoducto se desarrollará en cinco fases, que implicarán la

instalación de tuberías de transmisión de acero soldado de 48 pulgadas, 36 pulgadas, 30 pulgadas y dos de 24 pulgadas. El proyecto terminado dará como resultado 88,700 pies lineales de tuberías que se extenderán por toda la región del Paso de San Geronio.

La Junta y las partes interesadas que participaron en el taller también discutieron la exploración de asociaciones adicionales y alternativas de diseño que podrían resultar en ahorros de costos significativos para todas las partes involucradas en el proyecto.

SGPWA se coordinará con la Ciudad de Beaumont, la Ciudad de Banning, la Ciudad de Riverside, Caltrans, Cabazon Water District, Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District, Union Pacific Railroad, Riverside County Flood Control & Water Conservation District y la Banda Morongo de Indios de la Misión para garantizar el cumplimiento de todas las regulaciones y permisos estatales.

Este proyecto marca un paso crucial para salvaguardar el futuro del agua en la región y garantizar un suministro resistente para las próximas décadas.

CVWD obtiene una subvención de 39 millones de dólares para la ampliación de la planta que combina agua reciclada y de canal para riego

El Distrito de Aguas del Valle de Coachella ha obtenido una subvención federal de 39 millones de dólares para ampliar la Planta de Tratamiento Térmico de Aguas Residuales.

Los fondos respaldarán la Fase 1 de un proyecto plurianual que permitirá a la planta proporcionar una mezcla de agua reciclada y de canal para el riego de cultivos y varios paisajes en el este del Valle de Coachella. Esta será la primera planta de tratamiento de CVWD que ofrezca este tipo de suministro de agua mezclada a los clientes de riego.

La subvención, de la Oficina de Recuperación de los EE. UU., es crucial para el compromiso del Distrito con la preservación a largo plazo de la Cuenca Baja del Río Colorado como un recurso hídrico confiable para la comunidad. La fase inicial de este proyecto conservará 33,600 acres-pies de agua del Río Colorado durante 30 años, lo que contribuirá a la estabilidad del Lago Mead.

Este proyecto destaca el compromiso de CVWD con la gestión sostenible del agua y, al mismo tiempo, con la entrega de agua de alta calidad a sus clientes.

Un componente clave de este compromiso, descrito en los objetivos de sostenibilidad del Plan de Gestión del Agua de la Subcuenca Indio Revisado de 2022, es el desarrollo continuo del agua reciclada como un suministro confiable.

La expansión de la Planta de Tratamiento Térmico de Aguas Residuales incluye dos fases adicionales que se completarán en los próximos cinco años.

Una vez completada, la instalación tendrá la capacidad de utilizar todo su suministro de agua reciclada de 10 millones de galones diarios.

Esta subvención es parte de una inversión más amplia de \$284.8 millones por parte de la Oficina de Recuperación en proyectos de conservación a largo plazo en cuatro distritos hídricos de la Cuenca del Río Colorado. Financiados a través de la Ley de Reducción de la Inflación, estos proyectos conservarán colectivamente más de 492,000 acres-pies de agua y ayudarán a estabilizar el lago Mead.

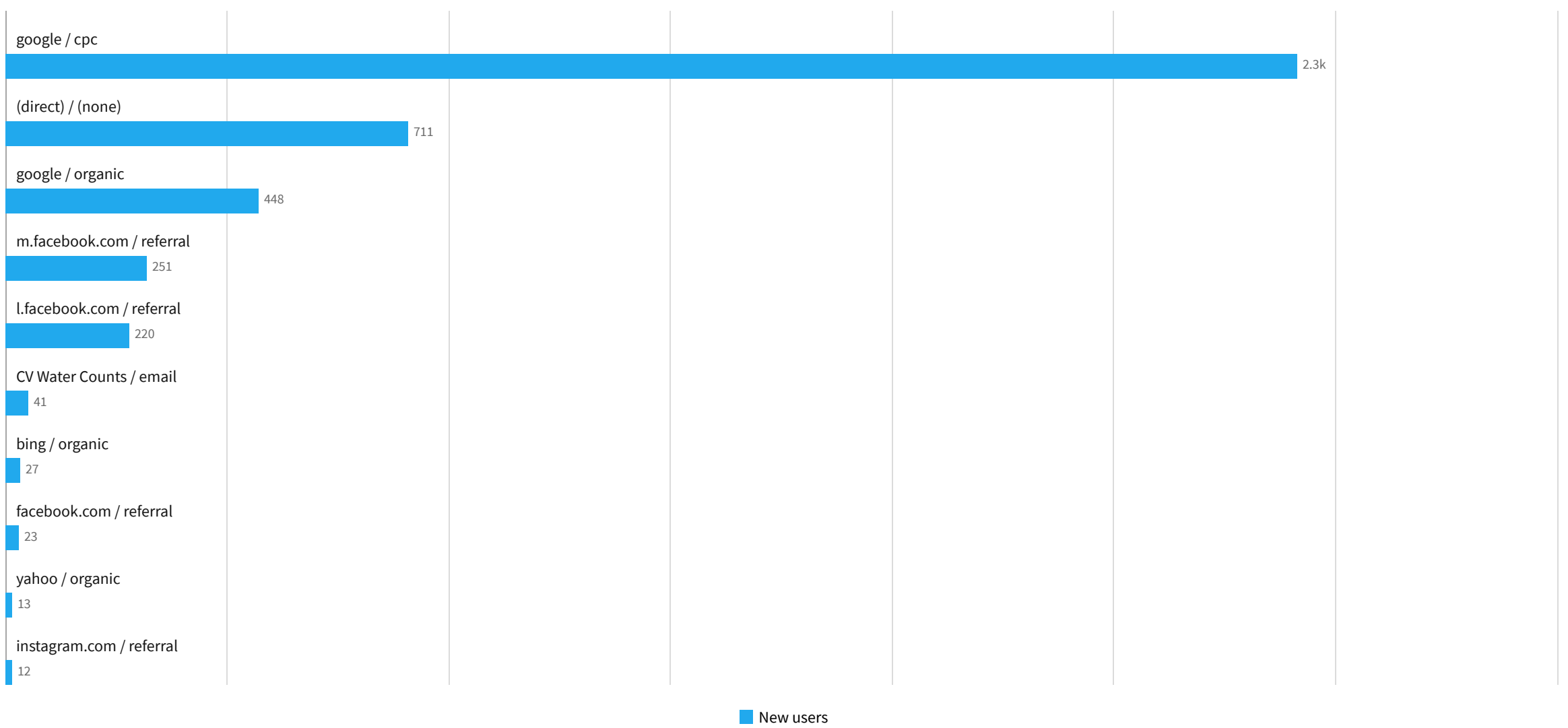

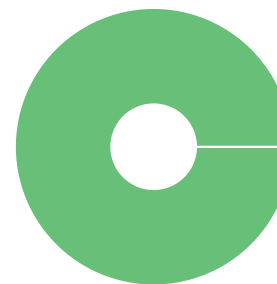
