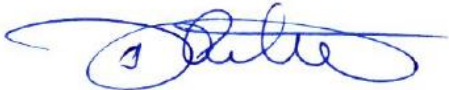

RESOLUTION 2024-11 -TO ESTABLISH WATER STANDBY ASSESSMENTS

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution 2024-11, making a determination to fix, levy, and collect water standby assessments for fiscal year 2024-2025.

SUMMARY

The District is required to conduct a public hearing for the purpose of placing water standby charges on the Riverside County property tax roll. The standby charges apply to certain properties that have not been disallowed by California Proposition 218. The standby assessment is deleted from the tax rolls when the subject property acquires water service.

ANALYSIS

Standby charges were developed for the purpose of paying the costs to maintain water lines that front undeveloped property. California Proposition 218 precludes any additional properties from being added to the standby rolls. The proposition does not require the cessation of charges on existing properties prior to the passage of the Proposition. The standby charge that was in effect at the time of passage of Proposition 218 cannot be increased. The standby assessment roll will eventually disappear as the affected properties are developed.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024-11

**A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MISSION SPRINGS
WATER DISTRICT MAKING ITS DETERMINATION TO FIX, LEVY AND COLLECT
WATER STANDBY ASSESSMENTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2024-2025**

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 66-23 in 1966, the Board of Directors elected to proceed under Section 31032.1 of the Water Code to fix, levy and collect water standby assessments to finance, in part, the capital costs and maintenance and operation expenses for the facilities which provides water service availability to the properties upon which it levied; and

WHEREAS, a written Report of Water Standby Assessments for 2024-2025 was prepared by Willdan Financial Services using the same methodology as was used in 1966 and in subsequent years, and which report was filed with the District Secretary; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary has caused notice of time and place for public hearing on the Report of Water Standby Assessments to be published and mailed pursuant to Section 31032.2 of the Water Code; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on said Report at the time and place specified in said notice; and

WHEREAS, at said public hearing, all objections or protests to said Report were heard and considered by the Board of Directors;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of Mission Springs Water District does hereby **RESOLVE, DETERMINE AND ORDER** as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Directors has found and determined that the water standby assessment is levied to finance, in part, the capital costs and maintenance and operation expenses for the facilities that provide water service availability to the properties upon which it is levied.

Section 2. That all objections and protests to the Report of Water Standby Assessments received have been considered and are hereby overruled.

Section 3. That the Report and each water standby assessment contained therein is hereby approved and adopted.

Section 4. That the water standby assessments for Improvement District Nos. 2, "B", "F", "G" and Service Area No. 2 for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2025, be and are hereby fixed as follows:

- a. \$26.80 for each parcel of land less than an acre, which abuts a street or easement in which a water distribution line operated by the district is located.
- b. \$26.80 per acre for each parcel of land of an acre, and any portion in excess thereof will be charged \$26.80 times the actual acreage located within a distance of approximately 330 feet from the centerline of the street or easement in which a water distribution line operated by the district is located; provided, however, that such parcel abuts said street or easement.

- c. \$13.40 per acre for each parcel of land of an acre, and any portion in excess thereof will be charged \$13.40 times the actual acreage located within a distance of approximately 330 feet to 1320 feet from the centerline of a street or easement in which a water distribution line operated by the district is located; provided, however, that such parcel abuts said street or easement.

Section 5. That the water standby assessment for Improvement District Nos. 2, "B", "F", "G" and Service Area No. 2 shall not apply to certain parcels of land as follows:

- a. Parcels of land which do not abut a street or easement in which a water distribution line operated by the district is located.
- b. Parcels of land less than an acre on which an active metered service connection exists at the time the report is prepared.
- c. With respect to parcels of an acre or more, one acre of land shall be exempted from the water standby assessment for each active metered service connection which exists thereon at the time the report is prepared.

Section 6. That the Secretary shall file with the Riverside County Auditor, in the time and manner specified by the County Auditor, a copy of such written Report with a statement endorsed thereon over the signature of the Secretary that such report was finally adopted by this Board of Directors; and the County Auditor shall enter the amount of such assessments against the respective lots or parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll, pursuant to Section 31032.4 of the Water Code.

Section 7. That the County Tax Collector shall include the amount of such assessments on bills for taxes levied against the respective lots and parcels of land, and thereafter, the amount of such assessments shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner and by the same persons, as together with and not separately from, the general taxes for the District, and shall be delinquent at the same time and thereafter be subject to the same delinquency penalties, pursuant to Section 31032.6 of the Water Code.

California Proposition 218 precludes any additional properties from being added to the standby rolls. The proposition does not require the cessation of charges on existing properties prior to the passage of the Proposition. The standby charge that was in effect at the time of passage of Proposition 218 cannot be increased. The standby assessment roll will eventually disappear as the affected properties are developed.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 74-12 in 1974, the Board of Directors elected to proceed under Section 31104 of the Water Code to fix, levy, and collect sewerage and waste service standby assessments in Improvement District "S"; and

WHEREAS, a written Report of Sewerage and Waste Service Standby Assessments for Fiscal Year 2024-2025 was prepared by Willdan Financial Services using the same methodology as was used in 1974 and in subsequent years, and which Report was filed with the District Secretary; and

WHEREAS, the sewerage and waste standby assessment is levied to finance, in part, the capital costs and maintenance and operation expenses for the facilities that provide sewerage and waste service availability to the properties upon which it is levied; and

WHEREAS, the Secretary has caused notice of time and place for public hearing on the Report of Sewerage and Waste Service Standby Assessments to be published and mailed pursuant to Section 31032.2 of the Water Code; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held on said Report at the time and place specified in said notice; and

WHEREAS, at said public hearing, all objections or protests to said Report were heard and considered by the Board of Directors;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Board of Directors of Mission Springs Water District does hereby **RESOLVE, DETERMINE, AND ORDER** as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Directors has found and determined that the sewerage and waste standby assessment is levied to finance, in part, the capital costs and maintenance and operation expenses for the facilities, which provide sewerage and waste service availability to the properties upon which it is levied.

Section 2. That all objections and protests to the Report of Sewerage and Waste Service Standby Assessments received have been considered and are hereby overruled.

Section 3. That the Report and each sewerage and waste service standby assessment contained therein is hereby approved and adopted.

Section 4. That the sewerage and waste service standby assessments for Improvement District "S" for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2024, and ending June 30, 2025, be and are hereby fixed as follows:

- a. \$10.00 for each parcel of land less than an acre, which abuts a street or easement in which a sewage collection line operated by the district is located.

- b. \$10.00 per acre for each parcel of land of an acre, and any portion in excess thereof will be charged \$10.00 times the actual acreage located within a distance of approximately 330 feet from the centerline of a street or easement in which a sewage collection line operated by the district is located; provided that such parcel abuts said street or easement.

Section 5. That the sewerage and waste service standby assessment for Improvement District "S" shall not apply to certain parcels of land as follows:

- a. Parcels of land, which do not abut a street or easement in which a sewage collection line operated by the district is located.
- b. Parcels of land less than an acre on which an active service connection exists at the time the report is prepared.
- c. With respect to parcels of one acre or more, one acre shall be exempted from the assessment for each equivalent single-family residential service connection, which is active and exists thereon at the time the report is prepared.

Section 6. That the Secretary shall file with the Riverside County Auditor in the time and manner specified by the County Auditor a copy of such written Report with a statement endorsed thereon over the signature of the Secretary that such report was finally adopted by this Board of Directors and the County Auditor shall enter the amount of such assessments against the respective lots or parcels of land as they appear on the current assessment roll, pursuant to section 31032.4 of the Water Code.

Section 7. That the County Tax Collector shall include the amount of such assessments on bills for taxes levied against the respective lots and parcels of land, and thereafter, the amount of such assessments shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner and by the same persons, as together with and not separately from, the general taxes for the District, and shall be subject to the same delinquency period.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution No. 2024-13, requesting the Addition of Delinquent Water and Sewer Charges and Other Fees of \$5.00 or more to the 2024-2025 Riverside County Tax Rolls.

SUMMARY

Pursuant to Water Code sections 31701 and 31701.5, account balances in excess of \$5.00 and more than 60 days delinquent are placed on the County tax rolls annually.

ANALYSIS

Approximately 170 accounts were identified with a minimum balance of \$5.00 and over 60 days delinquent for approximately \$200,700 of delinquent charges that are being proposed to be added to the 2024-2025 tax rolls.

GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

June 17, 2024

To the Board of Directors:

Mission Springs Water District has proudly served residents in the greater Desert Hot Springs Area for more than 71 years, and we remain well-positioned to continue to provide water and wastewater services for our current and future customers.

Ensuring we can continue to meet demand in the future requires a calculated approach. With this in mind, the District has focused on responsible planning to meet our long-term goals. These efforts include creating and adopting new Strategic, Water/Wastewater Master, and Long-Range Financial plans.

Developed and adopted by our Board of Directors, the Strategic Plan provides the management team with an overall vision for the District's future. Our plan focuses on the District's key functions, including customer communications, water supply, system reliability, financial management, technology and processes, environmental sustainability, and workforce excellence. Focusing on these critical initiatives will allow us to deliver enhanced services, improve efficiency, and promote environmental stewardship.

Aligning with that vision, the District recently started work revising its Water and Wastewater Master Plans, which include an examination and analysis of Capital Improvement Projects. These plans will help identify and prioritize infrastructure improvements needed to keep up with demand and maintain the high standards placed on the District's water and wastewater treatment systems.

Prioritization of the capital improvement projects and their subsequent costs will be vital for the completion of our new Long-Range Financial Plan, which is currently under development. This plan takes a closer look at projected revenue and anticipated expenses in the years to come, allowing the District to make informed decisions on projects and timelines while minimizing the impact on customer bills.

These strategic initiatives come amid new leadership here at MSWD. Following the retirement of our previous general manager, I was honored to be chosen to lead this incredible organization, and I am committed to responsible stewardship of the vital services the District provides to the community.

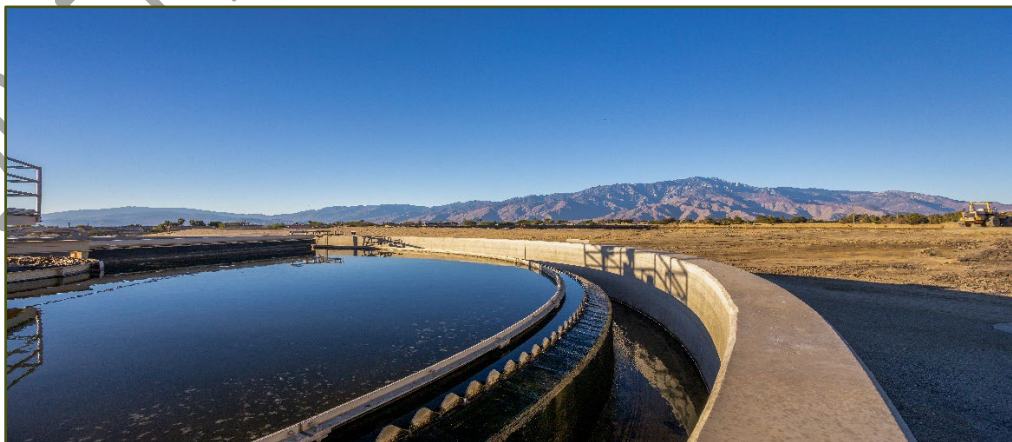
Budget Highlights

The operating budget for fiscal year (FY) 2025 is \$27,077,762 as shown in **Table 1** below. There is an additional \$44,810,257 in capital improvements proposed for a total budget of \$71,888,019. This is a significant decrease in total budget expenses when compared to FY 2024. The decrease is primarily in the capital improvements budget due to the final construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Facility (RWRF) expected to be completed in early FY 2025. Also, MSWD staff continues to monitor the impacts of strict State regulations and drought mandates on District operations and will make any necessary changes to the budget as part of the mid-year budget evaluation.

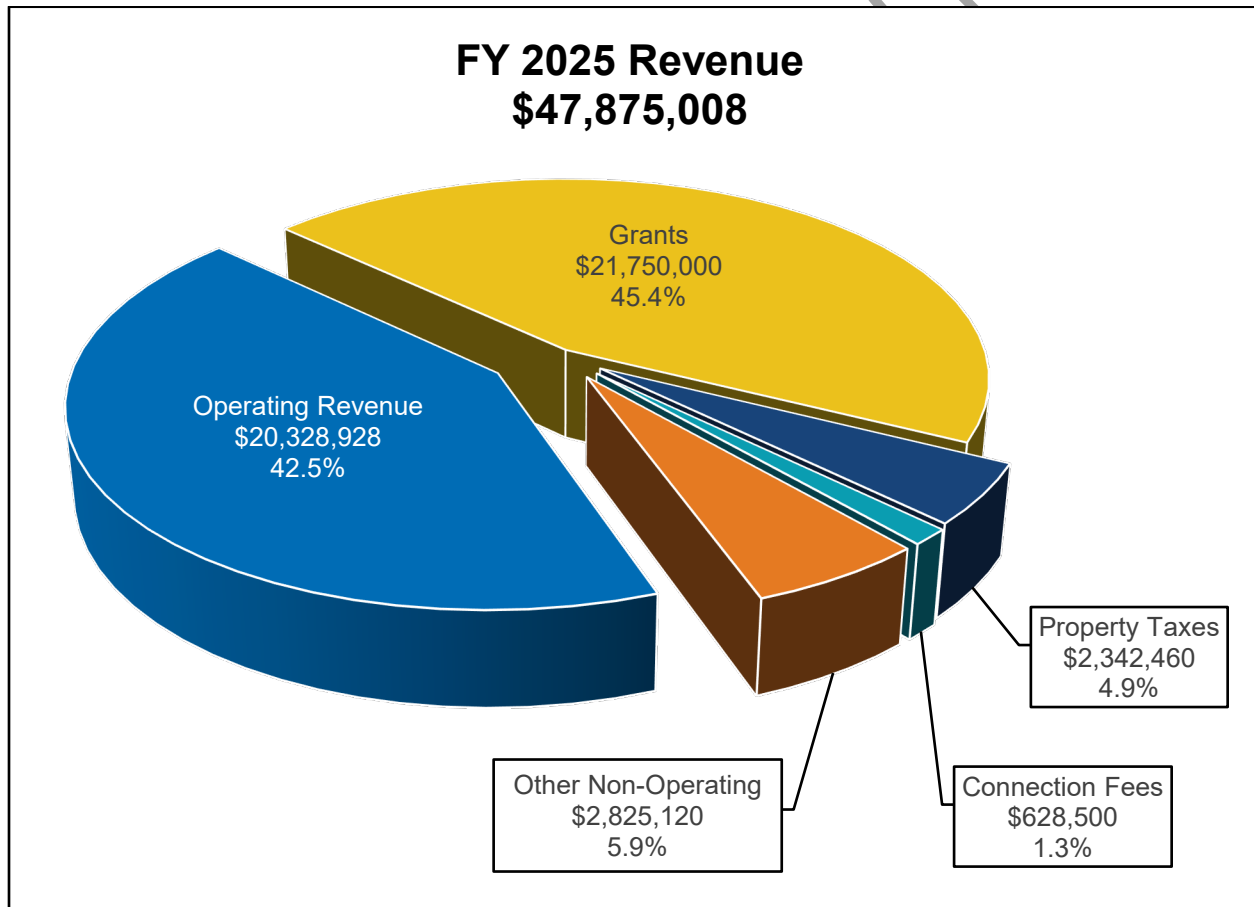


Revenues

MSWD receives funding from a variety of sources: domestic water sales, wastewater service charges, water and sewer connection fees, property taxes, grants, investment income, rental property, cellular tower leases, solar power generation, and charges for miscellaneous services.

For FY 2025, the Operating Revenue and Non-Operating Revenue budgets amounted to \$20,328,928 and \$27,546,080, respectively, for a total revenue budget of \$47,875,008 as shown in **Figure 1** below. Significant sources of funding are grants expected for capital improvement projects. These state and federal grants have allowed MSWD to adopt a budget that includes capital improvements with no projected fee or rate increases for its services.

Figure 1: Total Revenue by Type for FY 2025

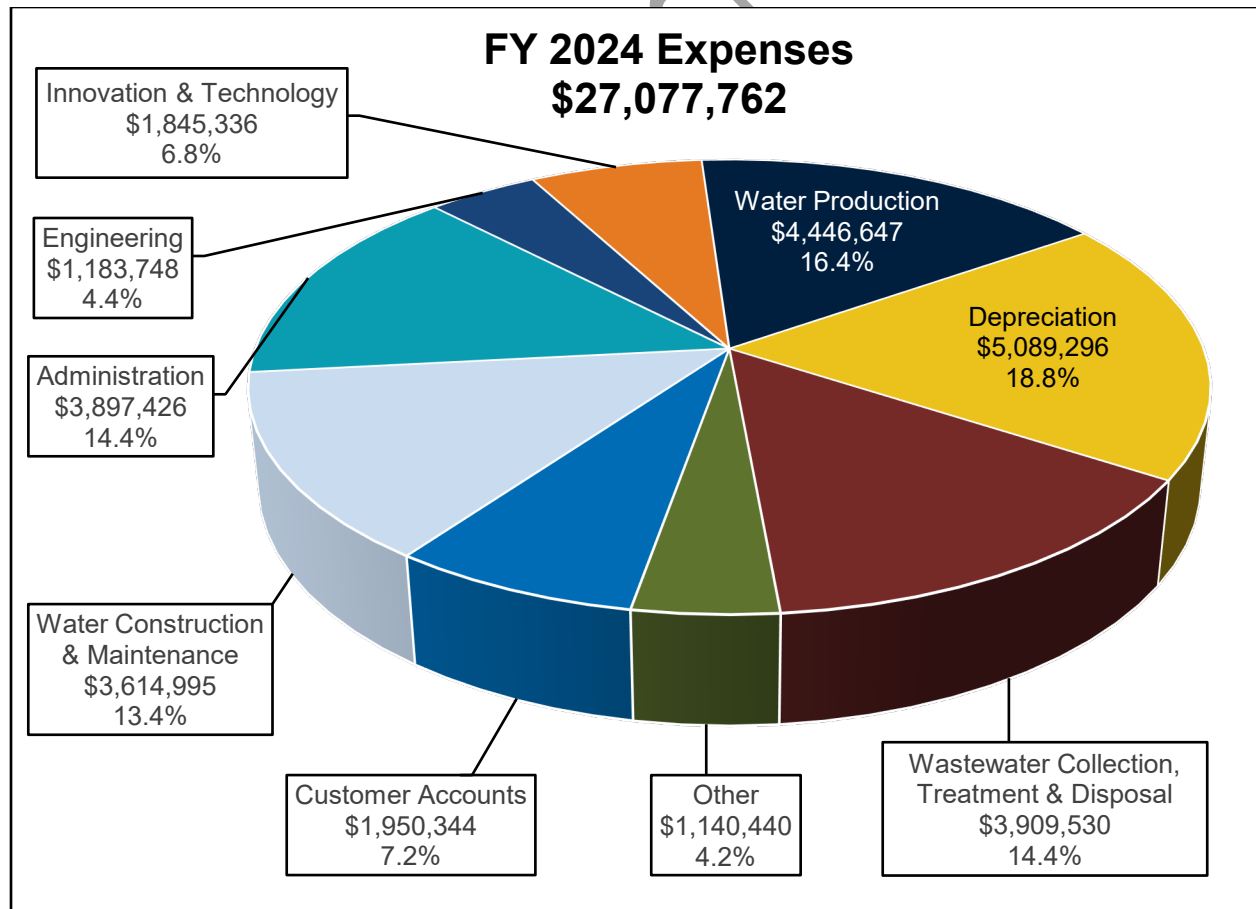


Expenses

Operating expenses for FY 2025, amount to \$27,077,762 as shown in **Figure 2** below, representing an increase of \$2,166,336 from FY 2024. To keep up with an increase in contract work, the District added a new Contracts Analyst position. There is also an expected increase in Electric expense of at least 20% over FY 2024. The RWRf is coming online increasing operating costs. Finally, the increase in operating expenses also reflects an increase in deferred maintenance cost on District pipeline and equipment that is being addressed in FY 2025. For FY 2025, the Board approved a 4.78% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) as recommended by the Human Relations Committee.

There is also \$44,810,257 in capital improvement expenses made up primarily by the final construction of the RWRf Conveyance and septic to sewer conversion projects. There are several developer driven projects for Wells 34 and 35, and the beginning of construction for the new administrative building, of approximately \$3.9 million and \$5 million, respectively. The District continues to prioritize capital improvements that can be covered by grant revenue.

Financial Stability

MSWD continues to maintain strong reserves through prudent and conservative money management practices, despite a volatile financial market. The District maintains a Capital Reserve Fund of \$45,707,208 as of May 31, 2024. While the FY 2025 budget was adopted with no rate increases, future budgets may require rate increases to ensure reserve targets and expenses are met.

In Conclusion

As we keep an eye toward the future, our mission remains the same: to Provide, Protect and Preserve our most precious resource... water. This budget addresses the priorities established for FY 2025 to continue to meet customer needs and provide exceptional water and wastewater services.

I would like to express my appreciation to the management team and staff who worked diligently in developing a budget that reflects the needs of MSWD and its customers. A special note of thanks to the Finance Department for their excellence in gathering, analyzing, and presenting information clearly and accurately. We are confident that this budget reflects the policies and direction of the Board of Directors and provides the financial plan for a successful year.

Profile of the Mission Springs Water District



PROFILE OF THE MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT

A Brief History

While prospecting for water, early homesteaders in the desert discovered the hot springs that made this area famous. It was not until 1940, however, that the first subdivisions were established and L.W. Coffee started the village he called Desert Hot Springs.

The critical need for freshwater led residents to form a mutual water company, which eventually proved unsatisfactory. Later, a privately-owned utility, called the Desert Hot Springs Mutual Water Company, acquired its assets. But this too failed and widespread dissatisfaction led local citizens to form a publicly-owned water district.

Formation

By 1953, an election swept the new Desert County Water District into existence with a vote of 246 to 9. The new District began with 100,000 feet of pipelines, five water wells, and two reservoirs. It covered one square mile.

The District was later renamed the Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) and expanded rapidly. It absorbed parts of the Coachella Valley County Water District, the West Palm Springs Village, and San Geronio Mutual Water Company systems. Today, it boasts more than 1.25 million feet of pipelines, 13 water wells, and 24 reservoirs, serving an area of 135 square miles.

As early as 1954, local citizens petitioned for sewer service. The cost, however, was prohibitive. But growth brought an overload to the septic systems and health hazards to the community. MSWD built the Alan L. Horton Wastewater Treatment Plant in 1972, and it has expanded four times to a treatment capacity of 2.0 million gallons of wastewater per day.

Government

Mission Springs Water District (MSWD) is County Water District under Subsection 30000 et seq. of the California Water Code and was incorporated in 1953. MSWD is governed by a five-member, publicly elected Board of Directors. Directors are elected concurrent with the general elections every even-numbered year in their specific division. Director's terms are four years. The election of Directors alternates between three seats and two seats, respectively, every two years.

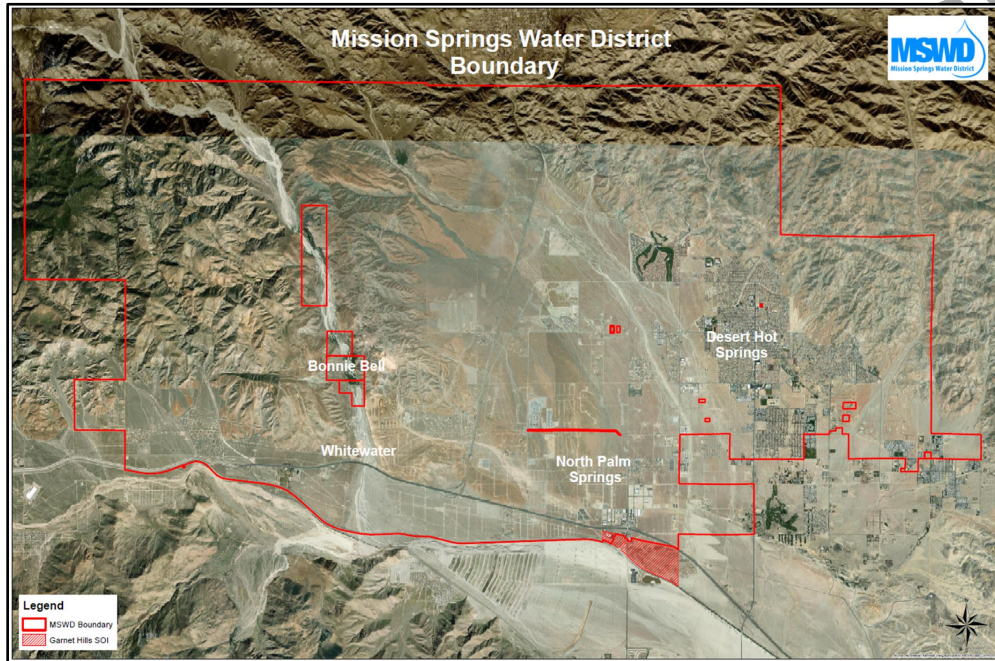


MSWD has statutory authority over water supply and provides water services to residential and commercial customers.

Service Area

Located in Riverside County, California, MSWD initially covered an area of one square mile in 1953. Today, MSWD covers an area of about 135 square miles including the City of Desert Hot Springs, and the unincorporated areas of North Palm Springs, Whitewater, and Bonnie Bell serving a population of over 44,000 residents as shown in **Figure 3**.

Water Production & Distribution

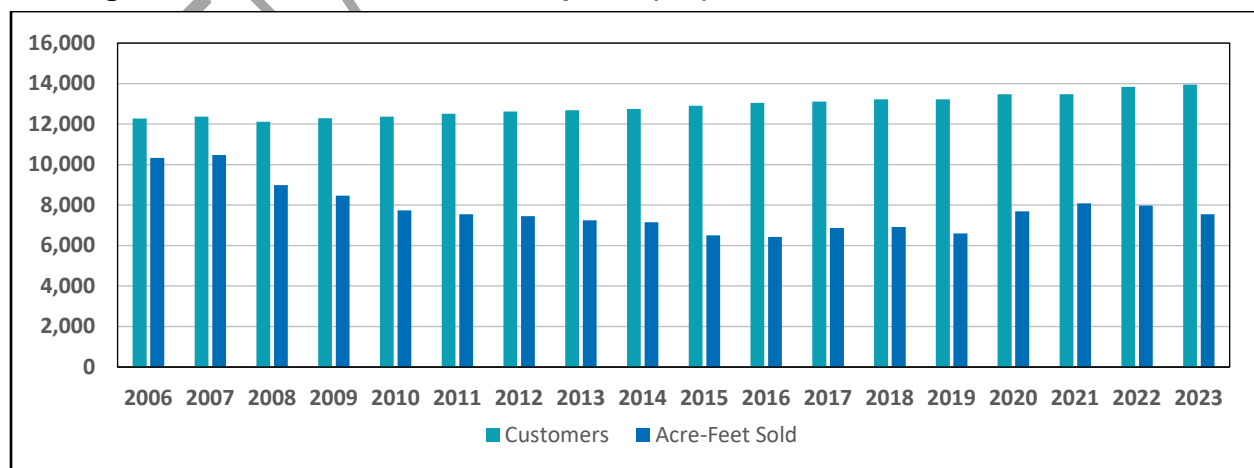
Within the initial one square mile covered by MSWD, it began with about 100,000 feet of pipelines, five water wells, and two reservoirs. MSWD expanded rapidly, and absorbed parts of the Coachella Valley County Water District, the West Palm Springs Village and San Geronio Mutual Water Company systems, and the Dos Palmas Mutual Water Company. Today, MSWD includes more than 1.25 million feet of pipelines, 13 water wells, 12 booster stations, and 24 reservoirs.

The distribution system includes three separate and distinct community systems including West Palm Springs Village, Village Crest, and Desert Hot Springs. The largest system is the greater Desert Hot Springs service area.

MSWD’s sole source of supply for its 13,957 water accounts is groundwater. MSWD produces groundwater from the Mission Creek Subbasin, San Geronio Pass Subbasin, and Garnet Hill Subarea of the Indio Subbasin, in the greater Coachella Valley Groundwater Basin. The quality of the groundwater is remarkably high and has been awarded an unprecedented 10 medals, including best tasting municipal water in the world, at the International Water Tasting Competition in Berkely Springs, West Virginia.

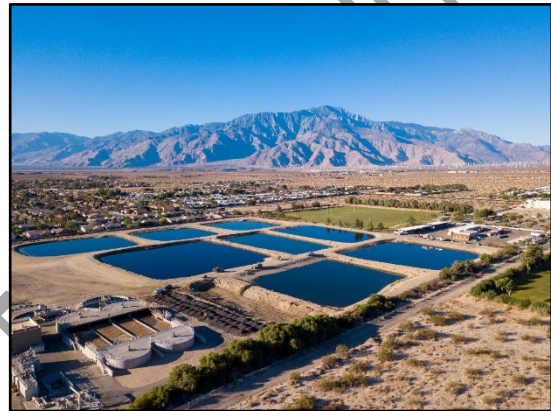
Figure 5: Annual Water Consumption (AF) vs. Total Number of Customers

For over 70 years, MSWD has been managing groundwater through conservation, groundwater protection projects, and general stewardship of its multi-award-winning water resource. The District is, and has always been, committed to a sustainable future both in water supply and finance. As the state requires ongoing, and possibly increased regulations, through Conservation and the Sustainable Groundwater Management Act (SGMA), MSWD has responded to ensure compliance both now and in the future. Over the last 18 years, MSWD has already witnessed the beneficial effects of these efforts as total annual water consumption decreased while the total number of customers has increased as shown in **Figure 5** below.

Wastewater Collection, Treatment, & Disposal

MSWD currently serves 9,719 sewer connections. Wastewater is treated at the Horton Wastewater Treatment Plant and the Desert Crest Wastewater Treatment Plant. MSWD treats about 2 million gallons per day (MGD) prior to discharging effluent in an environmentally sustainable manner. MSWD is also constructing a new Regional Water Reclamation Facility that is expected to be operational in 2024. This facility continues to be the largest capital project and will serve as the long-term central wastewater treatment and reclamation facility for the region.

The District's Groundwater Quality Protection Plan (GQPP) began in 1996 and has been highly successful to date. Over \$22 million of grant funds have been secured by the District for this program which has made over 4,500 parcels sewer service ready. This includes the abatement of over 2,800 septic tanks and the installation of over 33 miles of sewer lines. The pursuit of these grant funds continues today for the disadvantaged communities served by the District. The GQPP is ongoing and a significant part of the FY 2025 capital improvement program.



Water Conservation

In 2009, the California legislature passed SBx7-7 which required a statewide 20% reduction in urban per capita water use by 2020. It required that urban water retail suppliers determine baseline water use and set reduction targets according to specified requirements and required agricultural water suppliers to prepare plans and implement efficient water management practices. A combination of a population and land-use-based demand forecasting was used to project future demands in the District's service area. Based on the District's evaluation of years 1997 to 2006, the 10-year maximum per capita water use was 289.7 gallons per capita per day. In addition, based on the District's evaluation of years 2004 to 2008, the 5-year maximum per capita water use was 291.2 gallons per capita per day. To achieve a 20% reduction by 2020 as written under SBx7-7, the average per capita demand target was set at 234.9 gallons per capita per day.

From 2012 to 2017, California experienced historic drought conditions. In April 2015 the State Water Board set conservation standards for each water supplier, and based on this reduction, the District was required to set a conservation target of 32% as compared to 2013. On August 18, 2014, the Stage 1A-Drought Contingency Plan was implemented by the District. On April 27, 2015, the Stage 2-Threatened Water Supply Shortage was implemented by the District. During this time, the District also implemented a toilet

replacement rebate program, a turf replacement rebate program, a conservation kit program, and multiple conservation educational programs for customers. On April 7, 2017 the Governor issued an Executive Order lifting the emergency drought declaration. By 2020, the District’s maximum per capita water use was 189 gallons per capita per day, far exceeding the targeted reduction goal.

On July 19, 2021, the District adopted a Water Shortage Contingency Plan (WSCP) in conjunction with a Regional Urban Water Management Plan. In the Winter months of 2022, drought conditions in Northern California prompted the Governor to issue an Executive Order requiring the State Water Board to design and adopt emergency water conservation regulations. On May 24, 2022, the State Water Board adopted regulations that require urban water supplies to implement Level 2, at a minimum, of their Water Shortage Contingency Plans, as well as other measures. However, the regulations stop short of the one-size-fits-all philosophy by recognizing local water supply conditions, investments and conservation efforts by providers.

Making Conservation a California Way of Life is a new way of managing urban water use. The State Water Board will consider a regulation that establishes unique efficiency goals for each Urban Retail Water Supplier in California and provides those suppliers flexibility to implement locally appropriate solutions. As part of the state’s all-of-the-above strategy to expand storage, develop new water supplies, and promote more efficient water use, this regulation seeks to cultivate long-term practices that help communities adapt to California’s ongoing water challenges. The proposed regulation will lessen the need for the emergency water use reduction targets that were important in recent droughts. As part of the proposed regulation, urban retail water suppliers, not individual households or businesses, will be held to “urban water use objectives.” An urban water use objective is the sum of standard-based budgets for a subset of water uses, such as residential outdoor use.

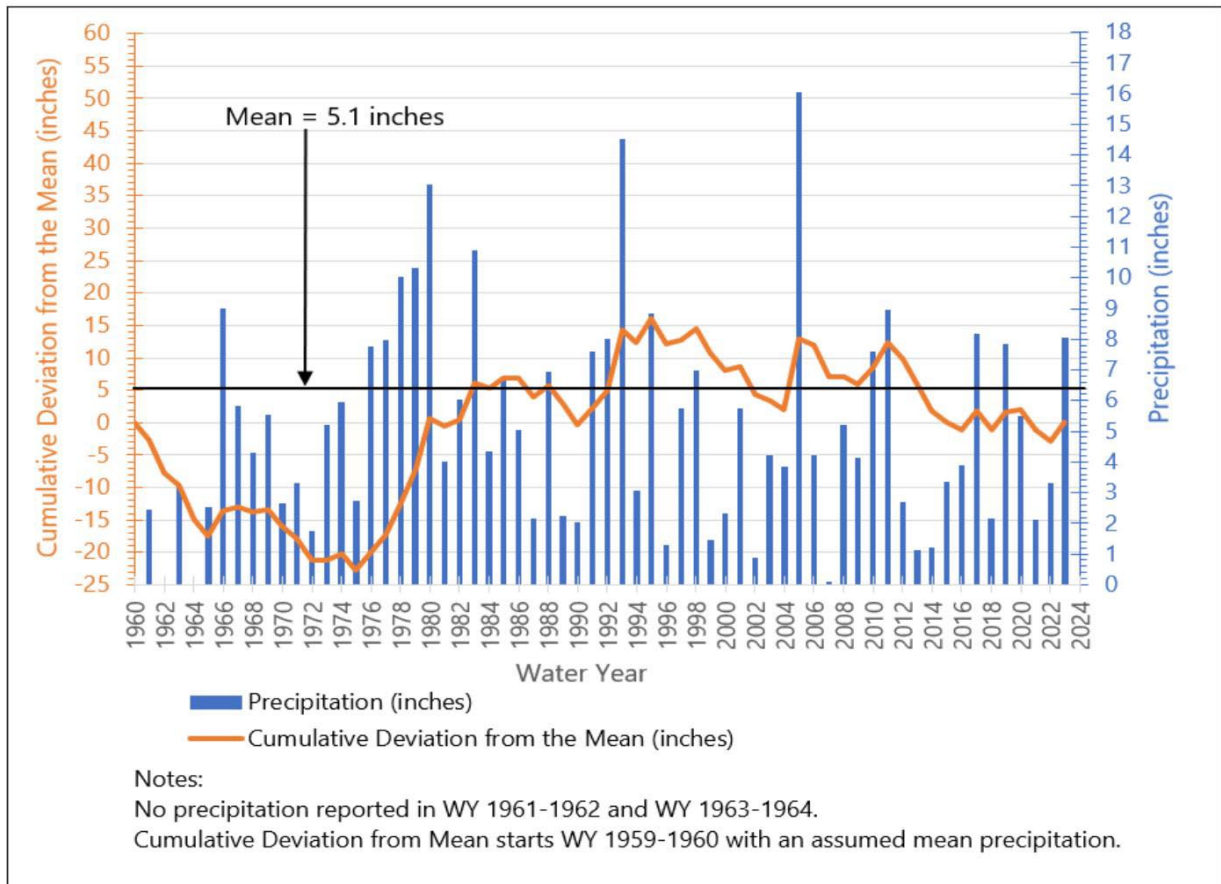

Climate

Average high temperatures exceed 100 degrees Fahrenheit (°F) in the months of June, July, August, and September. Based on National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) records from 1991 to 2020, average high temperatures in May and October are in the low to mid 90s°F and average high temperatures in the months of November through April range from 69°F to 87°F. Average low temperatures range from 46°F in December to 80°F in August.

Annual precipitation from Water Year (WY) 1960-1961 to WY 2022-2023 for the Riverside County Flood Control and Water Conservation District station at Desert Hot Springs is shown in **Figure 6** below. The mean annual precipitation for the water year over the period of record was 5.1 inches, with a standard deviation of 3.5 inches. The maximum precipitation was just over 16 inches in WY 2004-2005.

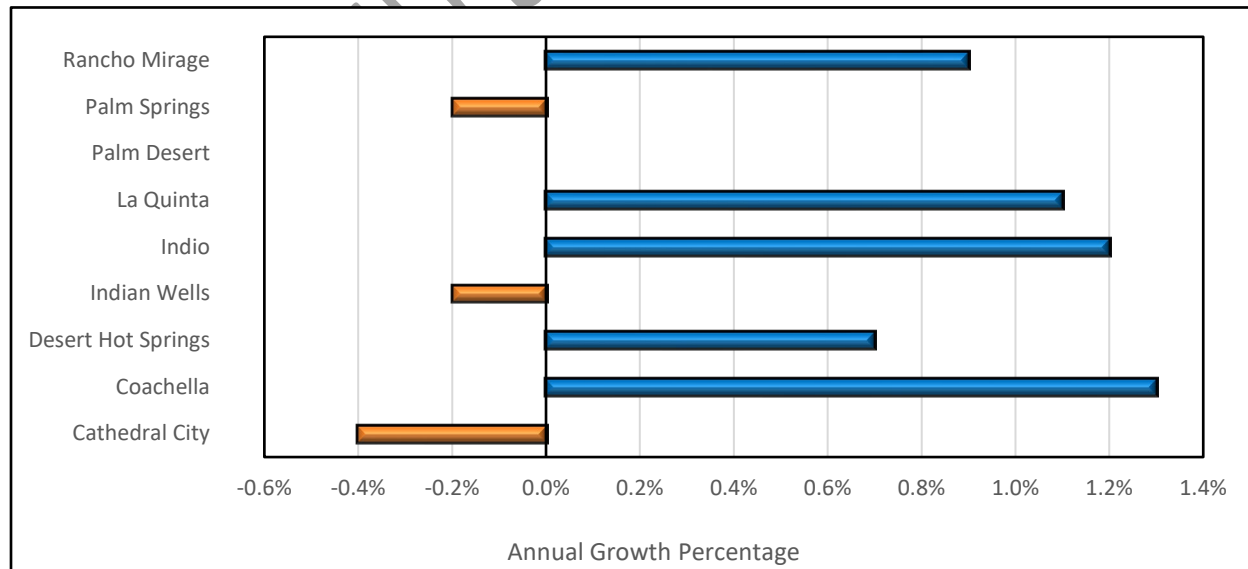

Figure 8: Water Service Accounts by Type

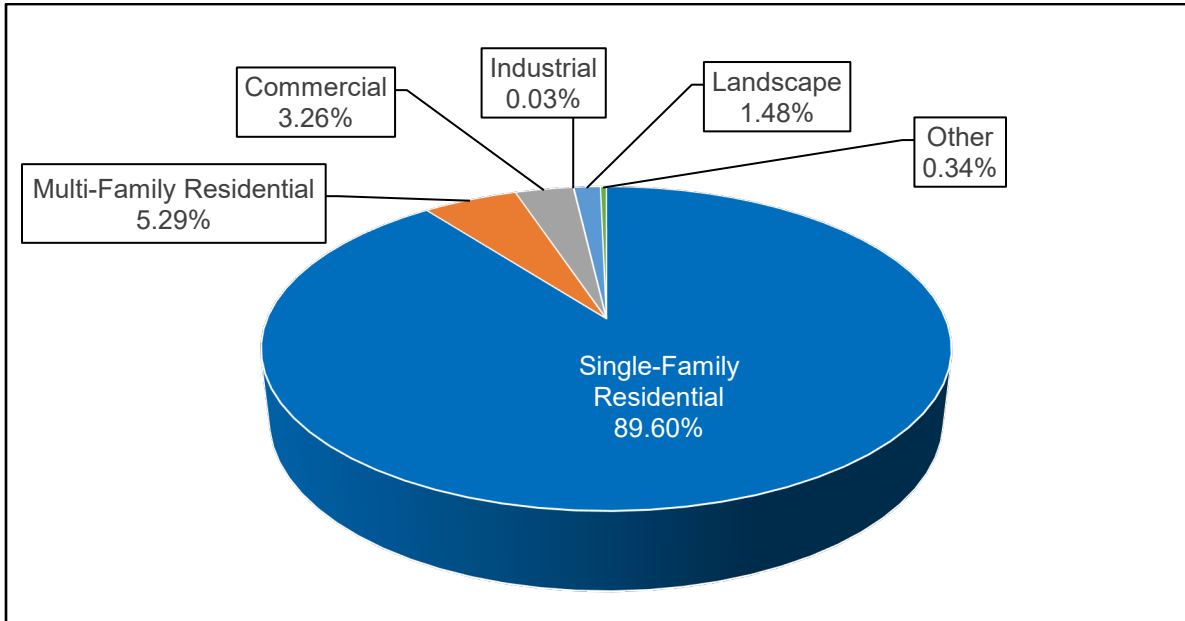
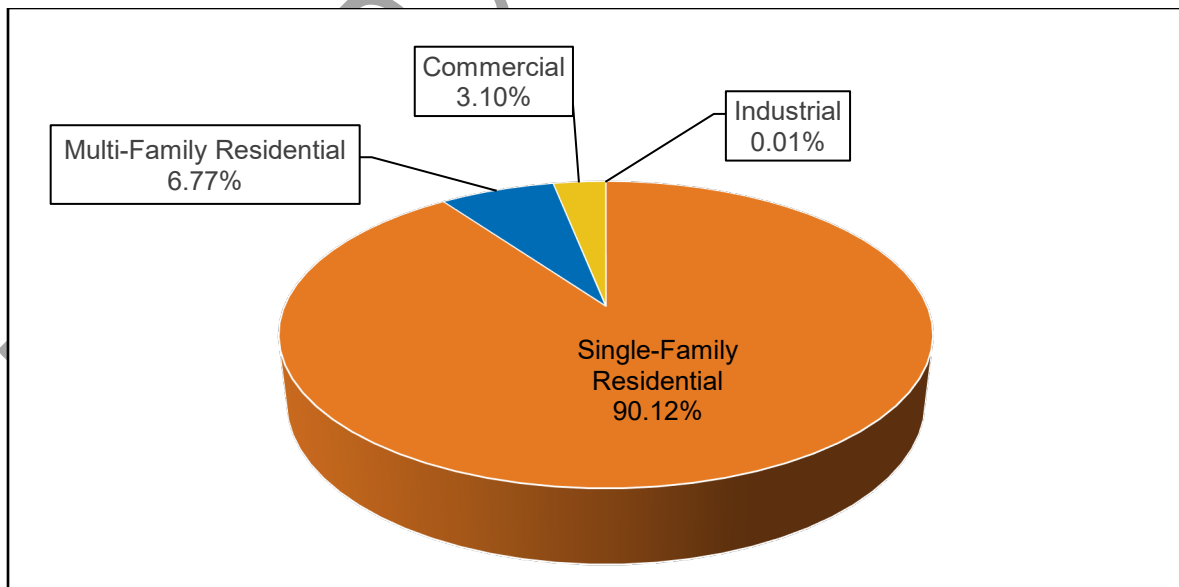


Figure 9: Sewer Service Accounts by Type

Summary of Authorized Positions

On July 1, 2016, MSWD began a reorganization process. The organizational structure was adjusted to meet current operational and fiscal needs. This effort is ongoing and includes positional/staffing changes, changes in corporate culture, greater integration of its mission, vision, and values of the organization, a customer experience overhaul, and streamlining of policies and procedures. In FY 2024, MSWD repurposed the Regulatory Compliance & Safety Officer position to a GIS Specialist position, as well as a Customer Service Representative I/II position to an Office Specialist I/II position. There was also a downgrade of the Field Service Supervisor to a Lead Field Service Representative position. For FY 2025, MSWD repurposed two Office Specialist I/II positions to a Business Analyst position and an Accounting Technician position. There was also a downgrade of the Government & Public Affairs Manager to a Programs & Public Affairs Specialist position. To keep up with an increase in contract work, the District added a new Contracts Analyst position. These adjustments and 54 funded full-time equivalent (FTE) positions are reflected in the current budget as shown in **Table 8**.

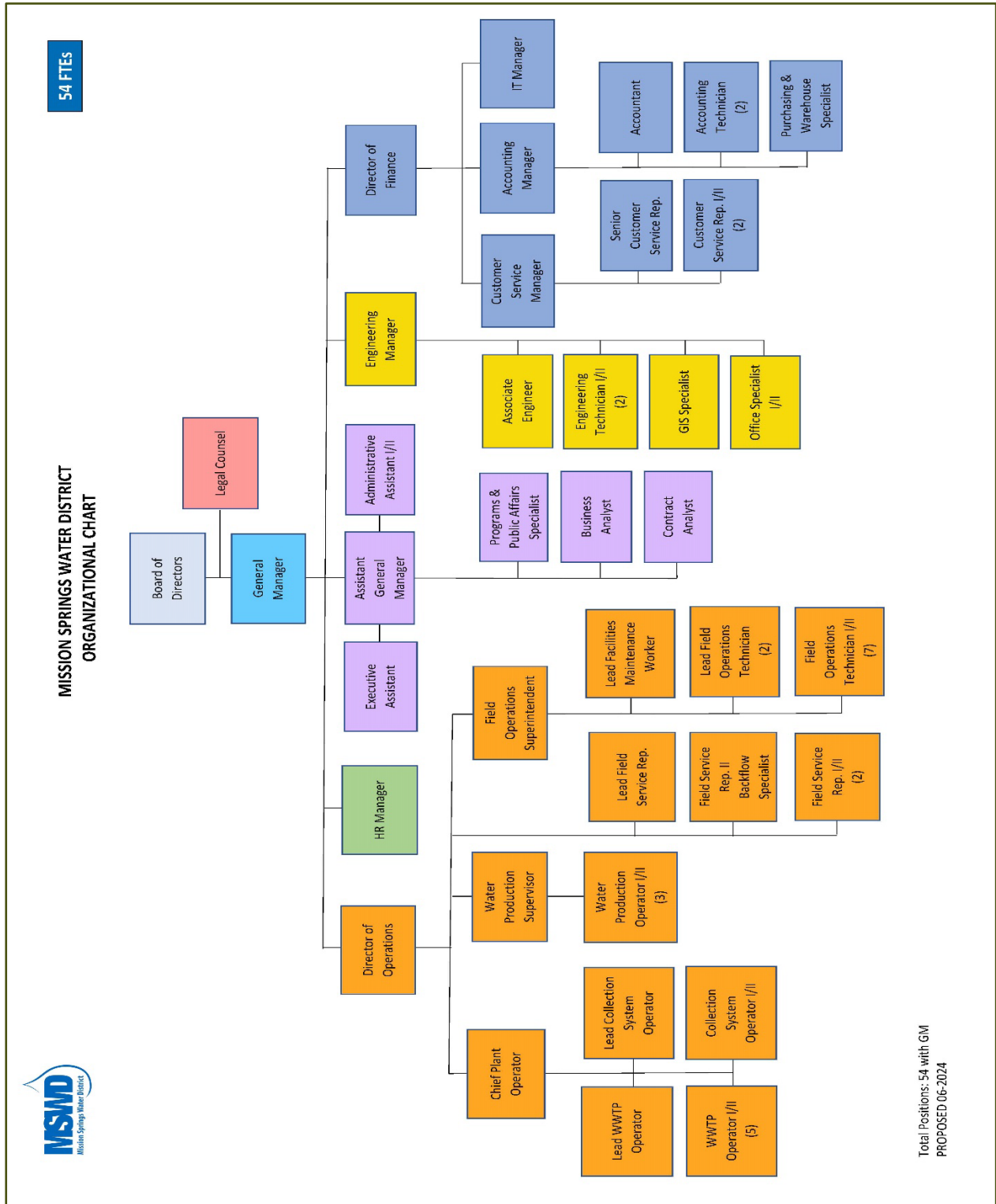

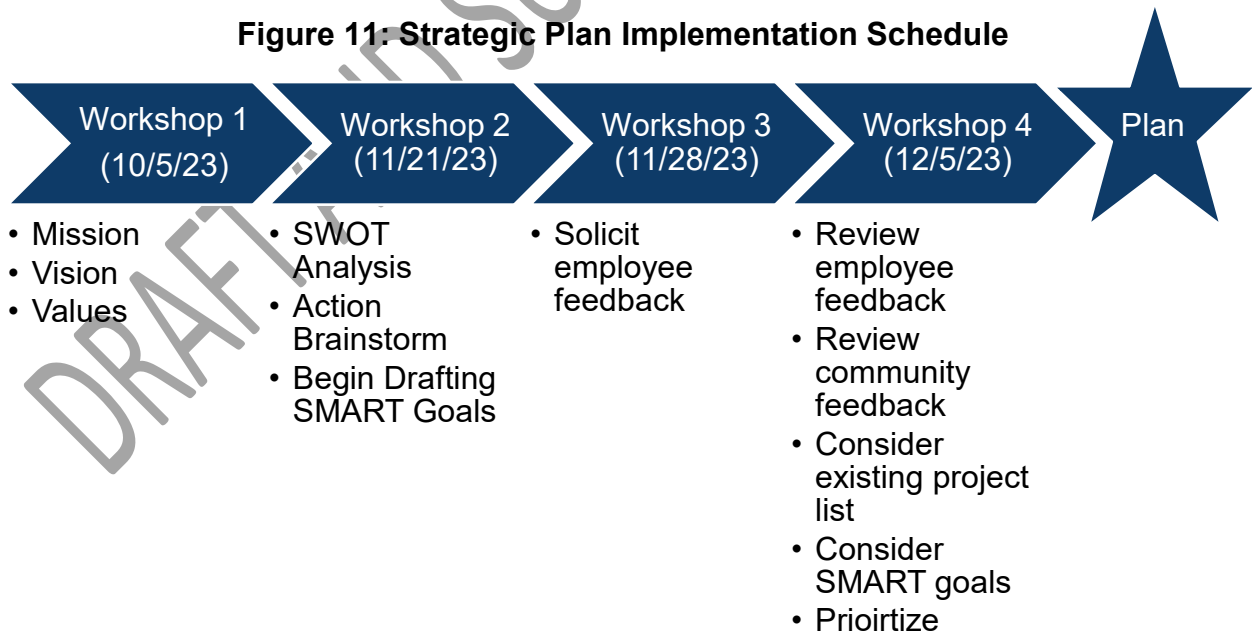

1.1 Develop and initiate an annual plan to increase customer outreach and engagement through various communication channels, technologies, and community events. The goal is to enhance customer trust, satisfaction, and understanding of water services with ongoing refinement of the communications plan and its goals.

Key Success Measures

1. By the end of the second quarter 2024, identify and design an annual plan outlining deliberate strategies to increase customer outreach and engagement.
2. Leverage a mix of communication channels, technologies, and community events to convey information and engage with the community effectively.
3. Cultivate a vital customer service focus through communicating and engaging with the community on matters important to our region.
4. Survey customer groups involved in water-related events (e.g., construction activities, service interruptions, water quality changes, emergencies, and other vital issues) to hear about the customer experience and determine if MSWD can improve how the event is handled.
5. Refine the communications plan annually based on feedback, evolving customer needs, and emerging communication trends.
6. Incorporate District initiatives, including Chromium-6, conservation and fleet electrification, and other mandated projects so that customers understand District operations and mandates better.
7. Communicate the goals of the strategic plan to both internal and external customers. Improve recognition and familiarity of MSWD and the services we provide. Differentiate the District from its State Water Contractor and City, and clearly explain the nexus between the agencies. Use regular customer polling to document progress made in this area.

1.2 When customers better understand what the District does and how it operates, they will recognize MSWD's work to protect and provide water services. Enhancing customer education will increase trust in the District's services.

Key Success Measures

1. Continue providing Water 101 presentations for schools, service organizations, and elected officials.
2. Hold monthly Water Talks to engage and educate the public on water issues facing our valley and state water systems. Include information on District infrastructure, water quality, financials, and/or future water issues.
3. As the Long-Range Financial Master Plan is completed, ensure customers' understanding of water costs and impacts on rates.
4. Establish a communication plan that empowers our customer service workers to be brand ambassadors and build relationships with the public.
5. Expand tour and lecture opportunities and work with staff to create a speaker's bureau of knowledgeable presenters.



6. Increase school opportunities and expand the Groundwater Guardian activities within the schools.
7. Partner with the DHS High School Real Academy to increase school opportunities for students to learn more about the District.

1.3 Deliberate customer outreach also has a ripple effect of educating employees about the District. Employees can serve as ambassadors for the District, helping create and strengthen customer relationships.

Key Success Measures

1. Create an internal Intranet as a hub for employee communications.
2. Resume employee tours and onboarding programs so new employees can learn about our operations better.
3. Promote water outreach opportunities to employees, like the CV Water Counts Academy.
4. Enhance and strengthen the organizational culture by promoting the District’s Strategic Plan, Mission, Vision, and Values. Work with Human Resources to add these to the employee evaluation process.

1.4 Cultivate positive community relations and partnerships with industry, media, and legislative contacts.

Key Success Measures

1. Create a culture of transparency and provide comprehensive information on the MSWD website.
2. Cultivate supportive and positive relationships with federal, state, and local agencies that may impact District operations.
3. Cultivate positive relationships with key industry professionals to stay informed and gather feedback.
4. Pursue grants and projects that would benefit our customers.
5. Develop and enhance media relationships and write and distribute press releases promptly to communicate topics important to the community. Share these stories on social media and to industry publications for greater pickup.
6. Identify and influence legislation that aligns with the District’s Legislative Platform and continue to foster positive relationships with city, county, state, and federal legislators.
7. Participate in ACWA, CASA, CSDA, and other industry committees to help shape industry trends and bring back best practices to the organization.



8. Apply for and receive individual and organizational certifications for leadership, transparency, and excellence and publish these accomplishments as an example of MSWD's leadership within the water/wastewater industries

SMART Goal 2 – Water Supply

Comprehensively evaluate and present viable options for implementing a diversified water supply.

Water supply is of the utmost importance to the District. Several types of concerns about water supply were identified throughout the strategic planning process; ensuring and securing long-term water supply is a critical priority for the District. This goal will investigate options for creating recycled water and stormwater capture programs to ensure sustainable and reliable water provision for its customers.

2.1 Ensure excellence in regulatory compliance.

Key Success Measures

1. Actively monitor new regulations and engage in the rulemaking process.
2. Deliver services in accordance with standards set by regulatory agencies.
3. Chromium-6 MCL
 - a. Share best practices and collaborate with other water districts in the Coachella Valley through our consultant to develop a cost-effective approach to managing Chromium-6 levels within our water supply.
 - b. Increase transparency, create an education and outreach plan to share the District's approach with the community, and increase overall awareness of water quality and supply issues facing the District.
 - c. Ensure the District's Chromium-6 plan is incorporated in the Long Range Financial Plan and that any capital projects are incorporated into the Five-Year CIP Program.
4. Lead & Copper Rule
 - a. Develop a lead service line inventory and make it publicly available.
 - b. Develop a lead service line replacement plan.
 - c. Sample schools and childcare facilities for lead and copper.
 - d. Strengthen treatment to comply with the new 10 microgram/liter ($\mu\text{g/L}$) trigger level.
 - e. Develop a communications plan to educate the public about the Lead and Copper Rule Revision's requirements and the steps MSWD takes to meet them.
5. Conservation as a Way of Life
 - a. Continue to work with regulators to address the feasibility of state-set conservation goals.
 - b. Continue to review regulations and apply for variances based on agriculture, evaporative coolers, and seasonal populations while evaluating other areas that may reduce conservation targets.

- c. Solicit grant support to help pay for an MSWD weather station to obtain better precipitation and evaporation rates in our service area.
- d. Enhance customer rebate programs to include water-saving appliances like dishwashers, clothes washers, and high-efficiency toilets.
- e. Budget for and incorporate a Conservation as a Way of Life engagement campaign into the annual customer communications plan.
- f. Solicit grant funding to develop an Evaporative Cooler Maintenance and Replacement Program.
- g. Review the turf rebate program and target outreach efforts to customers with turf.
- h. As part of the new Critical Services Center, construct a new demonstration garden to encourage the use of native drought-resilient plants.

2.2 Support / Advocate regional development of local water supply and reduce reliance on imported supply.

Key Performance Measures

- 1. Explore options and grant funding to create a financially feasible recycled water program (looking at potable and non-potable options) at the Horton and Wright facilities.
- 2. Work with the City and other water districts to encourage the use of native drought-resilient plants; work with the City to add to developer requirements.
- 3. Evaluate options for stormwater capture and reuse.
- 4. Participate in negotiations for the final determination of the Ground Sustainability Agency for basins within the District's service area, which include the San Gorgonio Pass Sub-Basin, the Mission Creek Sub-Basin, the Indio Sub-Basin, and the Desert Hot Springs Sub-Basin.
- 5. Work with the Salt Nutrient Management Plan stakeholders to continue monitoring Total Dissolved Solids in the Coachella Valley and advocate for project funding to protect our aquifer.
- 6. Continue to explore opportunities with the Agua Caliente Indian Reservation to access groundwater.
- 7. Review and explore options with our State Water Project allocation, preparing for contract expiration and the possibility of reduced Colorado River supplies.
- 8. As part of the Water Master Plan, include projects that connect the MSWD IDE areas to the MSWD "main" system.

SMART Goal 3 – Financial Management

Ensure long-term financial stability and resilience by implementing sound financial management practices, optimizing revenue streams, and minimizing financial risks.

Enhancing Mission Springs Water District’s financial sustainability and resilience will result in a more stable, flexible, and forward-looking organization. It strengthens the

District's ability to navigate challenges, fulfill its mission, and provide reliable water services to the community.

3.1 Conduct Long Range Financial Planning to ensure adequate and reliable revenue streams.

Key Success Measures

1. Update of the Long-Range Financial Master Plan
 - a. Review and maintain a robust reserve fund to mitigate the impact of unforeseen financial challenges or emergencies. Ensure the District has a clear policy for allocating and replenishing the reserve fund based on financial risk assessments.
 - b. Evaluate existing debt structures and explore opportunities to refinance or restructure debt for better terms. Implement a disciplined approach to debt management, ensuring that new debt is acquired strategically and aligned with long-term financial goals.
 - c. Develop a prioritized infrastructure investment plan that aligns with the District's long-term goals and regulatory requirements. Explore financing options for major infrastructure projects, considering short-term and long-term financial implications.
 - d. Assess financial risks, including market fluctuations, regulatory changes, and environmental factors. Develop contingency plans and risk mitigation strategies to safeguard financial stability in the face of unforeseen challenges.
2. Update Cost of Service Study – Water & Sewer
 - a. Conduct a comprehensive review of current water/sewer rates and fees to ensure they align with operational costs and market trends.
 - b. Implement efficiency measures, such as adopting technology solutions and streamlined processes, to reduce operational expenses.
 - c. Adopt a flexible rate structure that allows the District to react to external factors and internal demands.
 - d. Considers regulatory compliance needs, conservation requirements, and drought restrictions and ensures the model can perform what-if scenarios.
 - e. Ensure the rate structure is sound and defensible and that customer groups are charged appropriately.
 - f. Increase revenue stability by recovering more fixed costs through fixed charges while maintaining customer group fairness.
3. Update of Water and Wastewater Master Plans
 - a. Conduct a financial and operational analysis of the impact of future residential and commercial development based on the Cities of Desert Hot Springs' and Palm Springs' General Plan.
 - b. Evaluate options for relocation of existing water infrastructure within inaccessible areas of the District for ease of maintenance.

- c. Pipeline replacement project for aging pipes within the water distribution system. Incorporate the project in the Master Plan updates.

3.2 Control costs and manage debt responsibly.

Key Success Measures

1. Actively manage costs and live within the "approved" budget.
2. Adjust spending in response to revenue fluctuations and restrictions.
3. Look for ways to reduce water loss and increase system efficiencies.
4. Limit the impact of unexpected expenditures.
5. Preserve the District's credit rating, enabling us to qualify for favorable borrowing terms in the future.
6. Stabilize rates and develop a plan to finance essential projects conservatively.

3.3 Enhance transparency in financial reporting by adopting best practices and ensuring timely and accurate financial disclosures.

Key Success Measures

1. Communicate financial performance and challenges effectively to internal and external stakeholders, fostering trust and confidence in the District's financial management.
2. Implement budget best practices to ensure ongoing GFOA certification.
3. Develop and provide financial reporting tools (dashboard) to internal and external stakeholders.
4. Keep customer bills fresh and straightforward while providing sufficient information about charges and water use.
5. Ensure ongoing dissemination of financial information, including performance to budget, water sales and purchases, and wastewater, as part of the District's overall financial health.
6. Provide information to customers about internal versus external cost of services and pass through appropriate Replenishment Assessment Charges and City of Desert Hot Springs Utility Users Tax increases.
7. Foster a culture of financial responsibility and accountability across the organization.

SMART Goal 4 – System Reliability

Ensure each component of the water and wastewater systems contributes to the long-term health and reliability of overall operations.

The District must maintain and improve our current water and wastewater infrastructure in a cost-effective manner to ensure the safe-sustainable delivery of water and wastewater services now and in the future. We will protect these valuable assets while preparing for emergencies. This strategic goal emphasizes a holistic and forward-thinking approach to water and wastewater system management and infrastructure, fostering innovation,

collaboration, and enduring strategies that align with the District's mission while ensuring the long-term reliability of its overall operation.

4.1 By September 2026, complete the construction of a Critical Service Center, which will foster increased collaboration, communication, and teamwork among employees working at one central location.

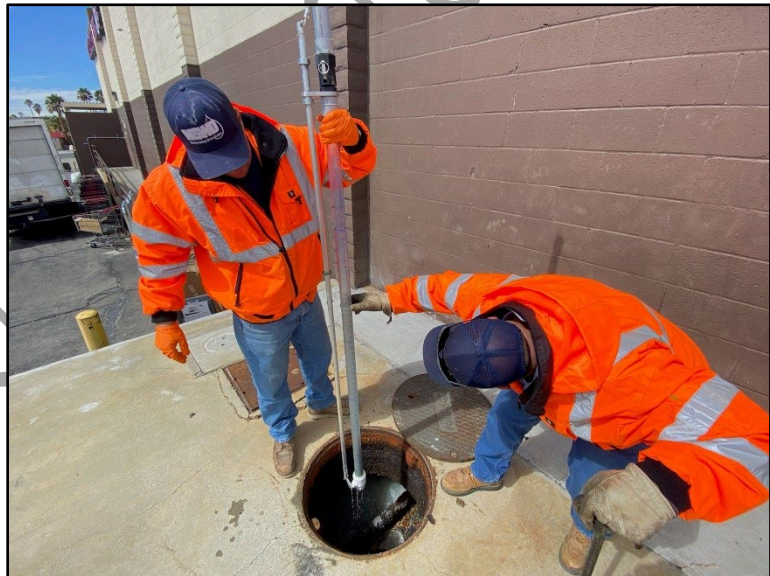
Key Success Measures

1. Construct a new administrative and operations building to allow the District to grow and continue to provide service to its customers.
2. With the Two Bunch location no longer feasible, ensure that the District's second choice, the Corporate Yard, is feasible and meets the District's future needs before engaging a contractor.

4.2 Update Existing Water and Wastewater Master Plans.

Key Success Measures

1. Review the District's five-year Capital Improvement Plan and ensure it aligns with the Long Range Financial Master Plan and all long-term financial strategies.
2. Conduct a financial and operational analysis of the impact of future residential and commercial development based on the Cities of Desert Hot Springs' and Palm Springs' General Plans.
3. Work with the City of Desert Hot Springs to develop an infrastructure feasibility study for unserved areas poised for growth.
4. Execute a mutual services agreement with Coachella Valley Water District (CVWD) to serve customers in the CVWD service territory without water/sewer access.
5. Collaborate with the City of Desert Hot Springs, Riverside County, and other stakeholders to repair old infrastructure and bring it up to current standards. Ensure that infrastructure improvements not only meet current demand but are designed to support future water and wastewater requirements, contributing to the overall reliability of the systems.



6. Evaluate options for relocating existing water infrastructure within inaccessible areas (including rear lot easements) of the District for ease of maintenance and risk reduction.
7. Identify and remove problematic tamarisk trees and other vegetation to prevent future root-related system issues.
8. Create a Predictive and Preventative Pipeline Replacement Project for aging piping within the water distribution system.
9. Continue to work with the Army Corp of Engineers to design and construct all defined assessment areas while leveraging grant funding to lower customer costs.
10. Identify additional capital projects and improvements that enhance system resiliency. Focus on increasing water yields from current projects through strategic enhancements and upgrades, aligning with the long-term reliability goals.
11. Conduct an analysis of available capacity within the current water system with future water demand projections to forecast the time of demand need. Incorporate results in Urban Water Management Plan updates and Master Plan updates.

4.3 Maintain and renew assets while facilitating strategic Capital Improvements.

Key Success Measures

1. Create a Predictive and Preventive Maintenance Program to meet established performance benchmarks.
2. Diligently manage and maintain current equipment to provide maximum value to the District.
3. Assess existing pipelines and associated equipment as part of the Predictive and Preventive Maintenance Program.
4. Research and implement a complete Computerized Maintenance Management System.
5. Build a connection to the MSWD IDE areas to the MSWD "main" system.
6. Evaluate system interconnects with neighboring agencies.
7. Evaluate emerging technologies and consider implementation.
8. Provide a comprehensive backup transmission system.

4.4 Invest and look at ways to fortify infrastructure security.

Key Success Measures

1. Optimize security preparedness at all sites.
2. Identify, monitor, and resolve risks of flood, earthquake, or natural disaster.
3. Invest in emergency backup generators and system redundancies for fail-safe operations.
4. Enhance security measures at critical remote sites and standardize systems and software to manage these operations.

4.5 Ensure the District is prepared to react to manmade and natural emergencies.

Key Success Measures

1. Continue to improve and refine the District's emergency response plan.
2. Effectively communicate with outside agencies and emergency preparedness partners, including mutual response like CalWARN or first response personnel at the City and County.
3. Continue to train District personnel in National Incident Management Systems (NIMS) to recommended levels and review the applicability of Web-EOC software programs.
4. Ensure earthquake retrofitting of critical infrastructure is included in long-term planning activities, protecting District assets and those of the customers we serve.
5. Participate in regional tabletop exercises to ensure staff are prepared for emergency situations.

SMART Goal 5 – Environmental Sustainability

Increase district-wide efficiency by adding new renewable energy resources, optimizing processes, implementing green building practices, and reducing overall water consumption.

Taking concrete steps toward being more environmentally sustainable, Mission Springs Water District will, in the next three years, increase District-wide energy efficiency by as much as 20% by adding new renewable energy resources, optimizing water treatment processes, implementing green building practices, and reducing overall water consumption through conservation programs and the encouragement of native and desert friendly landscaping by our customers. Being good stewards of our natural resources is part of MSWD's mission and vision for the future. It reflects our commitment and desire to uphold these values for the good of the community we serve.

5.1 Increase Use of Sustainable Energy Sources and Optimize Efficiencies – “There is no waste; just wasted resources”.

Key Success Measures

1. Add solar panels to District facilities and convert low electrical use sites to solar.
2. Evaluate hybrid/electric technology opportunities.
3. Explore biofuel opportunities.
4. Reduce overall energy consumption associated with District facilities by 20% in the next three years.
5. Evaluate opportunities to minimize greenhouse gas emissions in District operations.
6. Leverage the District's solar resources and look into expansion financing opportunities, including grants, leasing, and power purchase agreement opportunities.
7. Enhance sustainability by minimizing waste in resources needed to meet operation and maintenance objectives.

8. Consider the environmental impact on all business practices.
9. Explore additional sludge recycling options for future reuse.
10. Create an internal employee culture that proactively seeks ways to conserve water and energy and be more environmentally sustainable in everything we do.

1.2 Fleet Electrification.

Key Success Measures

1. Continue monitoring changes to fleet electrification mandates and work with regulators to ensure mandates are feasible.
2. Create a strategy that meets upcoming fleet electrification regulations and considers operational requirements. A financial analysis includes ongoing maintenance costs and the cost of electricity versus traditional fuel.
3. Pursue grant opportunities to fund the inclusion of Electric Vehicles in our fleet and provide funding for necessary charging infrastructure.

1.3 Embrace Green Building Standards.

Key Success Measures

1. Reduce overall energy consumption associated with District facilities by 20% and incorporate greater green building standards in all building projects, including the new Critical Services Center.
2. Ensure the new Critical Services Center design incorporates energy/water efficiency best practices, including but not limited to the building's positioning, solar control and shading, material selection, building envelope, efficient lighting (possible solar tubes), HVAC systems, and renewable energy systems.
3. Evaluate building designs and perform a cost-benefit analysis of the impact of incorporating LEED Green Building standards in construction projects.
4. Ensure all District construction projects adhere to California environmental laws and regulations.

SMART Goal 6 – Improved Technology & Processes

Ensure each component of the water and wastewater systems contributes to the long-term health, reliability, and addresses workflow inefficiencies by implementing technology solutions and process improvements.

The imperative for addressing workflow inefficiencies through technological advancements has become critical in response to the evolving demands and challenges facing MSWD. This need was elevated through the SWOT analysis and employee feedback; thus, the Board identified this goal as a priority. By addressing these aspects, the District aims to meet its immediate operational needs and future-proof its processes, ensuring sustainable and effective water management for the community. This comprehensive approach reflects a commitment to excellence, innovation, and delivering high-quality services.

6.1 Embracing technological solutions that align the District with industry best practices and modern standards.

Key Success Measures

1. Ensure information systems planning is aligned with the District's Strategic Plan.
2. Enhance cyber security to ensure the continued safety of our system.
3. Ensure secure data access, remote access, and valid customer data.
4. Finalize the solicitation for a new enterprise resource planning software platform, which will seamlessly integrate Finance, Customer Service, and Human Resources needs.
5. Streamline processes and improve customer service by reducing delays and errors to enhance customer satisfaction and trust in the District's services.
6. Automate employee payroll structure and eliminate manual entry of employee time and project numbers.
7. Develop a work order management system and analyze workload allocations for infrastructure and maintenance operations based on industry key performance indicators and standards.
8. Identify opportunities for the privatization of routine maintenance functions to augment staffing levels.
9. Adopt an asset management system to ensure cradle-to-grave tracking of resources that aligns with the asset management and replacement component of the Long Range Financial Master Plan.
10. Continue to enhance purchasing processes to streamline staff processing times while ensuring appropriate approvals are met.
11. Evaluate options for automating the inventory management system for purchasing, receiving, and warehouse operations. Expand and improve the use of mobile computing and communication technology.
12. Adopt a records retention policy, incorporate retention schedules into processes, and automate them into new computer systems.
13. Review lien processing and streamline and consolidate processing to one department.
14. Look for additional ways to leverage technology and increase staff efficiency and operational savings. Information systems should support effective decision-making, system integration, reliable data, and decreased redundancy.

6.2 Hire a designated GIS employee and integrate asset management within the MSWD work order management system.

Key Success Measures

1. Review the existing Nobel platform and ensure it meets the District's ongoing needs. Integrate data collection and analysis to allow for data-driven decision-making based on real-time data.
2. Boost real-time monitoring and incident response.
3. Enhance network analysis and optimization.

SMART Goal 7 – Workforce Excellence

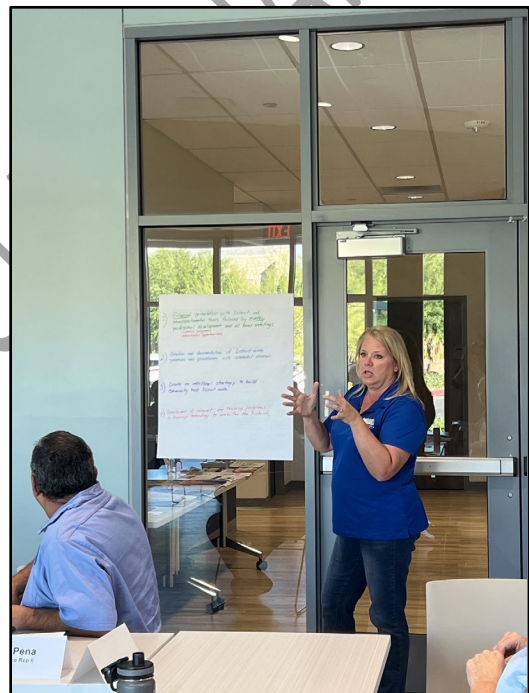
Investment in staff and management to cultivate a high-performing and knowledgeable workforce.

This SMART goal emphasizes the importance of ongoing investment in the District's most valuable assets—its staff and leadership. Through competitive compensation, expanded opportunities, and targeted development initiatives, the goal is to build a workforce that excels in performance, innovation, and leadership, increasing employee satisfaction and ensuring the sustained success of the District.

7.1 Create development opportunities and facilitate staff participation in professional development opportunities.

Key Success Measures

1. Continue to develop individual employee development plans to promote personal and professional growth.
2. Update the organization-wide succession plan, allowing employees the opportunity for professional growth, cross-training, and preparation for succession and temporary assignments to maintain continuity and operational effectiveness.
3. Modify the employee performance evaluation process to align with the District's new Strategic Plan and core values.
4. Hold managers accountable for performing timely performance evaluations that increases job knowledge, documents performance, and supports employees' overall success.



7.2 Expand leadership development programs to enhance the knowledge and skills of employees.

Key Success Measures

1. Leverage our member organizations, including ACWA, AWWA, CSDA, and CWEA to implement training initiatives to support leadership and succession planning to ensure a continuous pipeline of qualified individuals.
2. Create a Board of Directors onboarding program that provides new board members with resources and information to streamline their transition onto the Board.

3. Develop a comprehensive supervisor development and training program for existing managers, supervisors, and employees aspiring to supervisory positions.
4. On an ongoing basis, ensure 100% of employees have clearly defined job-related goals on their performance evaluations.
5. Publish and promote all employees' education/certification accomplishments internally.
6. Continue to hold regular GM/All-Hands meetings to create dialogue and promote organizational culture.

7.3 Recruit and retain employees.

Key Success Measures

1. Update and continue utilizing salary survey insights to inform salary decisions, ensuring that compensation remains competitive. Competitive compensation and expanded internship opportunities attract and retain top talent, contributing to a skilled and motivated workforce.
2. Create an internship program to increase opportunities for students and professionals, supporting industry employment growth and building a robust recruitment pool.
3. Foster collaborations with educational institutions to create pathways for talent to enter and thrive in the organization. Continue to investigate opportunities with local Colleges to create Career Technical Education pathways for some of our hard-to-fill positions.
4. Evaluate and look for ways to keep turnover rates at or below industry standards due to resignations or terminations (related to compensation or working conditions), not including retirements.

7.4 Ensure employee safety and wellness.

Key Success Measures

1. Continue to educate employees on safe working practices.
2. Require supervisors and lead workers to demonstrate their commitment to safe work practices.
3. Work towards a 100% non-litigation rate on Workers' Compensation claims.
4. Encourage Employee Wellness and implement a comprehensive, district-wide Employee Wellness Plan.



7.5 Cultivate a positive culture and teamwork among staff.

Key Success Measures

1. Ensure the lines of communication are open for all employees.
2. Employees experience camaraderie and teamwork through on-site employee events, and the company continues to recruit employees to the events committee to avoid committee burnout.
3. Focus on maintaining high employee morale and a positive organizational culture.
4. Ensure our workforce is ready to embrace Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion differences and continue routine training.

FINANCIAL STRUCTURE, PROCESS, & POLICY

Fund Structure

The District is comprised of the following major enterprise funds that are also listed in **Table 9** below.

General Fund – Used to account for activities associated with supporting the administration of the District.

Water Fund – Acquisition, treatment, and distribution of potable water, and the construction, repair, and replacement of related infrastructure. MSWD provides water service to 13,957 water accounts, of which 95% are residential customers.

Sewer Fund – Collection of domestic, commercial, and industrial wastewater, and the construction, repair, and replacement of conveyance facilities. MSWD provides sewage collection, treatment, and disposal services to 9,719 customer accounts, of which 94% are residential customers.

Each enterprise fund is considered a separate budgetary and accounting entity, reported on a full accrual accounting basis with the exceptions not in the Basis of Budgeting section of this document. Each fund is a separate fiscal entity with its own balancing set of accounts. Rates and budgets are adopted for each fund to support the associated operating and capital costs. Each enterprise fund records cash and financial resources, together with all related liabilities and residual equity balances.

Fund-Department Relationship

The cost of operating expenses, including employee wages and benefits, are allocated to each division and department based on actual expenses as tracked by the District's project accounting system, with allocation to the Water or Sewer Funds based on percentages determined by historical trends and service levels. District-wide expenses which are general in nature and not attributable to a particular project or department are allocated to the District's General Fund. **Table 10** shows the relationship between the District's departments and the enterprise funds that are charged for their activities.

Blended Component Unit

In April of 1985, the Mission Springs Water District Improvement Corporation (Corporation) was created by a joint exercise of powers agreement for the purpose of acquiring, constructing, rehabilitating, financing and refinancing, or providing for the sale of leasing of public capital improvements. The Corporation is governed by a board composed of the District's Board of Directors. The corporation has issued debt which is secured solely from installment payments payable under an installment purchase agreement entered into by the District and the Corporation. All accounts and funds created and established pursuant to any instrument or agreement to which the Corporation is a party, and any interest earned and accrued thereon, shall incur to the

benefit of the District. Separate financial statements are not prepared for the Corporation. It is reported as a blended component unit.

Property Taxes

The County of Riverside (County) bills and collects property taxes on behalf of the District and numerous assessment districts. The District's current year tax collection is received through periodic apportionments from the County. The County's tax calendar is from July 1 to June 30 each year. Property taxes attach as a lien on the property on January 1. Taxes are levied on July 1 and are payable in two installments on November 1 and February 1, and become delinquent after December 10 and April 10, respectively.

Basis of Budgeting

The District operates under the authority of the California Water Code. It maintains and prepares its financial statements and budgets using the accrual basis of accounting as prescribed by Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) and reporting standards applicable to California governmental agencies. MSWD makes an allocation of all general and administrative costs to the water district, sewer district, and to capital improvements based on a percentage of labor hours. The allocations are made monthly.

The Board of Directors approves an annual budget on or before June 30 for the ensuing fiscal year. From the effective date of the budget, the amounts stated therein as proposed expenditures become appropriations to the various departments. Budgets are prepared annually using the zero-base method. The Board of Directors may approve supplemental budget requests. The General Manager (GM) may transfer funds between general ledger accounts within the operating budgets if the total budget is not affected.

Budget Process

MSWD's streamlined 10-step budget process is summarized below as:

- 1. Initiate the Budget.** MSWD managerial staff inputs budgetary estimates for the following year with their departmental goals in mind at the beginning of the budgetary process.
- 2. Prepare a draft budget.** Based on these inputs, the Finance Department prepares the draft budget.
- 3. Finalize Employee Requests.**
- 4. Present Employee Requests to Human Relations Committee.**
- 5. Present the draft budget to the GM for review and comment.**
- 6. Present the draft budget to the Board of Directors at workshop.**
- 7. Present the GM recommended budget to the Board of Directors at Study Session.**

8. **Present the amended GM recommended budget to the Board of Directors at Board Meeting for approval.**
9. **Apply for Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Award for Excellence in Budget Reporting.**
10. **Propose any budget amendments.** Staff reviews the performance and budget in January, and if any amendments are necessary, a revised budget will be submitted to the Board of Directors in February. The approved budgets are posted on MSWD’s website.

Budget Control & Amendment

Throughout the budget period management staff are responsible for monitoring their department's budgets. Finance staff provide tools for managers to review their budgets at any time. In addition to the budget process, staff presents a monthly financial results report to the Board for review and approval. This report updates the Board on the progress of all operating revenues and expense for all funds, comparing budget to actual amounts. Finance staff also undertakes a comprehensive mid-year review of the District's operating and capital budgets, which are then submitted to the full Board for discussion and approval. If during the mid-year budget review or during the budget presentation to the Finance Committee it is determined that a significant adjustment is needed, then finance staff will work with managers to prepare the request for the Board of Directors to approve. Managers may transfer funds between their division accounts in accordance with the District's Reserve and Financial Benchmark Policy.

Financial Policies & Resolutions

Every June, the Board of Directors adopts the three budget resolutions that guide District operations for the following fiscal year. The Operating and Capital Budget establishes controls on changes in appropriations for the various funds. The District adopts its appropriations limit for the fiscal year in compliance with the requirements established by the Constitution of the State of California. Finally, the Board approves and adopts the employee classification and compensation plan indicating the number of positions approved for each classification and assigning titles for those positions. This is done for the efficient and effective operation of the District.

The Board of Directors also approves and implements the policies and resolutions that drive all financial decision making for the District.

Reserve Policies

Resolution No. 95-10

This resolution establishes a Wastewater Capital Reserve Fund.

Resolution No. 95-20

This resolution establishes a Water Capital Reserve Fund.

Resolution No. 95-21

This resolution establishes an Internal Services (General Fund) Capital Reserve Fund.

Bidding and Contract Procedures Policy

Resolution No. 2013-01

This resolution establishes a bidding and contract procedures policy. The purpose of this resolution is to establish guidelines for competitive bidding for any project. It goes on to identify the types of projects and approval amounts for each.

Minor Project

A project or service required by the District which is estimated by the General Manager to cost \$75,000 or less, and which may be awarded and negotiated by the General Manager, in contract or purchase order form.

Intermediate Project

A project or service required by the District which is estimated by the General Manager to cost more than \$75,000 but less than \$150,000 to complete.

Major Project

A project or service required by the District which is estimated by the General Manager to cost \$150,000 or more to complete.

Investment Policies

The District's investment policies outline the guidelines required to be used in effectively managing the District's available cash in accordance with the California Government Code. To address interest rate risk, the District's existing policy limits the maturity of investments to five years. To mitigate credit risks associated with its investments, the District's investment policy limits investments to large institutions and requires diversification to ensure that failure of one issuer will not significantly affect the District's cash flow.

Policy No. 2017-1 - Investment Policy

The purpose of this investment policy is to provide guidelines for the prudent investment of the District funds in conformance with California Government Code and other legal requirements governing the investment of public funds.

Resolution No. 2017-10

The purpose of this resolution is to authorize the District to join with other public agencies as a participant of the Investment Trust of California, carrying on business as CalTrust. The District is a voluntary participant in CalTrust, which is a Joint Powers Authority governed by a Board of Trustees made up of local treasurers and investment officers. As of May 31, 2024, the District's investment in CalTrust is \$31,742,931, of which \$2,725,391 was invested in the Liquidity funds pool, \$6,854,342 in the Short-term pool, and \$22,163,198 in the Medium-term pool.

Procurement and Disbursement Policies

Resolution No. 2018-05

The purpose of this resolution is to establish a policy for procurement and disbursement of district funds. It provides for a procurement system of quality and integrity; provides for the fair and equitable treatment of all persons or firms involved in purchasing by the District; ensures that supplies and services are procured efficiently, effectively, and at the most favorable prices available to the District; promotes competition in contracting; and ensures that MSWD purchasing actions are in full compliance with applicable Federal standards, State, and local laws. All other policies and resolutions involving procurement fall within this resolution.

Policy No. 2009-1

The purpose of this policy is to establish consultant/vendor invoice processing guidelines. Department supervisory staff are authorized to obligate the District for necessary costs and expenses required to fulfill the goals of the adopted budgets authorized by the Board of Directors.

Policy No. 2010-3

The purpose of this policy is to establish petty cash disbursement/replenishment guidelines. It is the purpose of this policy to outline provisions for the disbursement and replenishment of the petty cash fund established at \$200.

Policy No. 2011-1

The purpose of this policy is to establish the use of District credit card guidelines. This policy supersedes Policy 95-2. The issuance of credit cards assists the Finance Department in keeping an accurate record of charges incurred by each individual assigned a card. This system provides management with a check and balance method on budgeting items such as seminars, conferences, travel and training plus individual charges of necessary District materials and supplies.

Resolution No. 2018-02

The purpose of this resolution is to establish designated officers for disbursement of District funds and authorize to sign checks, drafts and transfers with all active bank accounts of the District. These officers may act in a fiduciary capacity for the District.

Debt Management Policy

Resolution No. 2017-11

The purpose of this resolution is to establish and adopt a debt management policy of the District. Senate Bill No. 1029 was passed by the California State Legislature in August 2016 and became law on September 12, 2013, requiring local agencies such as MSWD to adopt comprehensive written debt management policies reflecting local, state and federal laws and regulations.

FINANCIAL SUMMARIES

Budget Summary

The operating budget for fiscal year (FY) 2025 is approximately \$27.0 million as shown in **Table 12** below. There is an additional \$44.8 million in capital improvements proposed for a total budget of approximately \$71.9 million. This is a significant decrease in total budget expenses when compared to FY 2024. The decrease is primarily in the capital improvements budget due to the final construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Facility (RWRF) expected to be completed in early FY 2025. Also, MSWD staff continues to monitor the impacts of strict State regulations and drought mandates on District operations and will make any necessary changes to the budget as part of the mid-year budget evaluation.

Net Income Summary

The Net Income for FY 2025 is approximately \$20.3 million as shown in **Table 13**, which is significantly lower than FY 2024. The decrease can be directly attributed to the use of state and federal grants primarily in the capital improvements budget due to the final construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Facility (RWRF) expected to be completed in early FY 2025.

Summary of Revenue by Operating Fund

MSWD receives funding from a variety of sources: domestic water sales, wastewater service charges, connection fees, property taxes, grants, investment income, rental property, cellular tower leases, solar power generation, and charges for miscellaneous services.

For FY 2025, the Operating Revenue budget equals \$20,328,928, and the Non-Operating Revenue budget equals \$27,546,080, for a Total Revenue budget of \$47,875,008 as shown in **Table 14**. A significant source of funding is the use of grants for capital improvement projects, which have been obtained from both state and federal agencies and have allowed MSWD to adopt a budget that includes no fee or rate increases for any of its services.

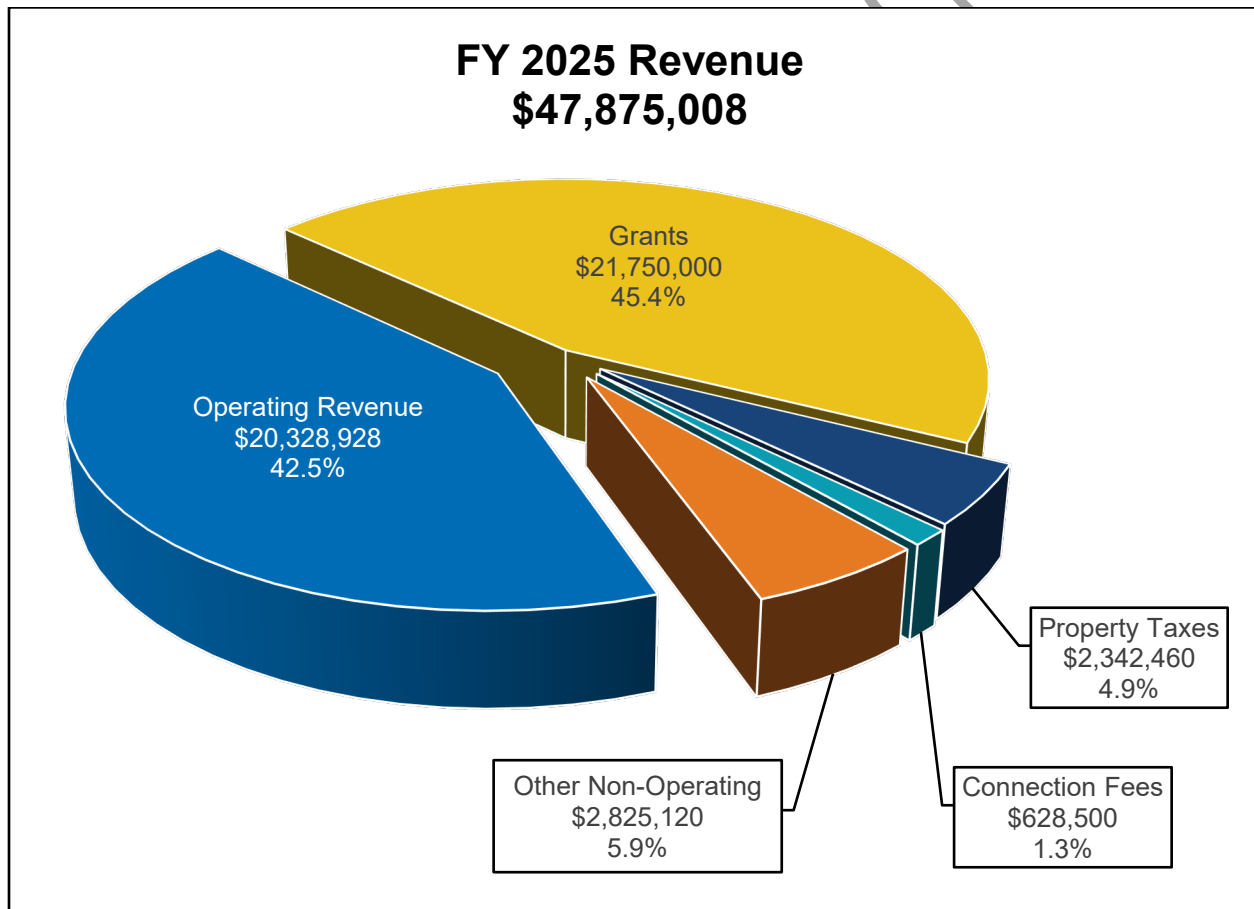

Total Revenue for Fiscal Year 2025

MSWD receives funding from a variety of sources: domestic water sales, wastewater service charges, water and sewer connection fees, property taxes, grants, investment income, rental property, cellular tower leases, solar power generation, and charges for miscellaneous services.

For FY 2025, the Operating Revenue and Non-Operating Revenue budgets amounted to \$20,328,928 and \$27,546,080, respectively, for a total revenue budget of \$47,875,008 as shown in **Figure 12** below. Significant sources of funding are grants expected for capital improvement projects. These state and federal grants have allowed MSWD to adopt a budget that includes capital improvements with no projected fee or rate increases for its services.

Summary of Revenue by Year

MSWD receives funding from a variety of sources: domestic water sales, wastewater service charges, connection fees, property taxes, grants, investment income, rental property, cellular tower leases, solar power generation, and charges for miscellaneous services.

For FY 2025, Operating Revenue and net Non-Operating Revenue amounted to \$20,328,928 and \$27,546,080, respectively, for a combined total revenue of \$47,875,008 as shown in **Table 15**. FY 2025 Operating Revenue decreased minimally compared to FY 2024. However, FY 2025 Non-Operating Revenue decreased significantly compared to FY 2024 mainly due to the decrease in the use of grants for capital improvement projects, in particular the final construction of the Regional Water Reclamation Facility expected to be completed in early FY 2025.

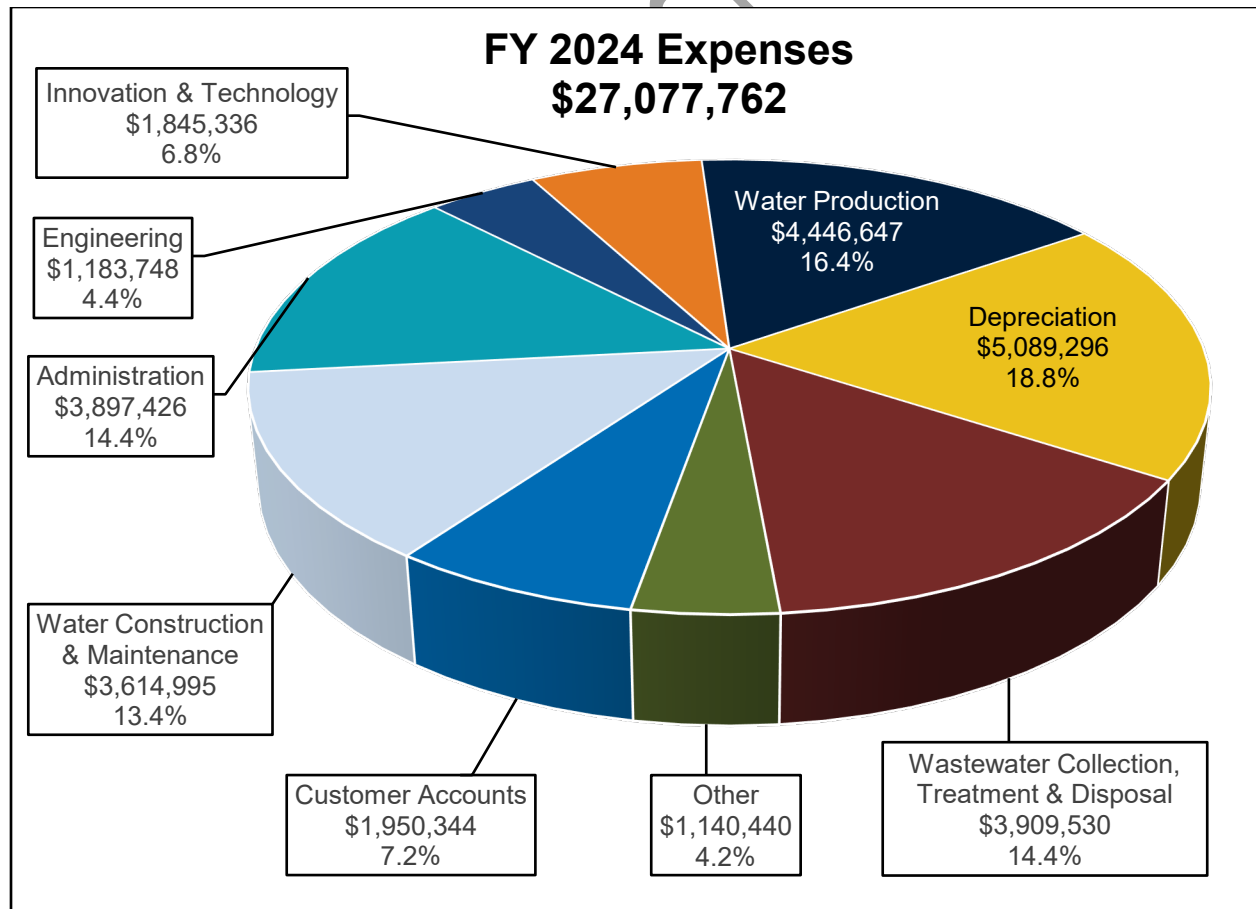

Total Expenses for Fiscal Year 2025

Operating expenses for FY 2025, amount to \$27,077,762 as shown in **Figure 13** below, representing an increase of \$2,166,336 from FY 2024. To keep up with an increase in contract work, the District added a new Contracts Analyst position. There is also an expected increase in Electric expense of at least 20% over FY 2024. The RWRf is coming online increasing operating costs. Finally, the increase in operating expenses also reflects an increase in deferred maintenance cost on District pipeline and equipment that is being addressed in FY 2025. For FY 2025, the Board approved a 4.78% Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) as recommended by the Human Relations Committee.

There is also \$44,810,257 in capital improvement expenses made up primarily by the final construction of the RWRf Conveyance and septic to sewer conversion projects. There are several developer driven projects for Wells 34 and 35, and the beginning of construction for the new administrative building, of approximately \$3.9 million and \$5 million, respectively. The District continues to prioritize capital improvements that can be covered by grant revenue.

Long-Range Financial Plans

To maintain its financial strength, in 2016 the District developed a Long-Range Financial Rate Study and Model. The model utilized the current fiscal year budget, incorporating multiple year revenue and expense assumptions used to address anticipated operating and capital expenditures, resulting in a dynamic financial report. The capital expenditures are based on the Capital Improvement Program and estimates program costs over a 5-year term. In addition, the model provided the basis for certain criteria to be incorporated into financial policy development, such as debt management, and designated fund levels.

The 2016 Long-Range Financial Rate Study and Model is now outdated and in need of an update. While the District continues to monitor its long-term finances, it is necessary to perform an updated Rate Study and Model. In June of 2023, the District hired Raftelis Financial Consultants, Inc. to perform an updated Rate Study and Model. It is expected to be completed in December of 2024.

CAPITAL & DEBT

Capital Improvements

For financial reporting purposes, a capital item is defined as an individual item with a cost of at least \$10,000 and an estimated useful life of more than one year. Each year as part of the budgetary process, the District’s staff contemplates capital needs for the coming fiscal year in conjunction with any capital plans that are in place. These annual analyses are based on facts known at the time of the preparation of the budget. The District’s capital items include water and sewer infrastructure, facilities, equipment, and fleet.



The District’s ongoing capital program represents improvements and/or replacements of critical infrastructure in both the water and sewer systems. District staff continually monitor system conditions and propose projects annually that will minimize system breakdown and increase system efficiencies. District vehicles and equipment are also part of the capital program. Because capital projects often span more than one fiscal year, appropriations of funds are carried over from one fiscal year to the next until the projects are completed. Funding for capital projects come from a variety of sources including rates, loans, grants, and assessment districts.

Summary of Reserve

Over the past several years, and because of the 2016 rate action, the District’s reserves have stabilized. The Board and staff continue to monitor these levels to ensure the financial stability of the District in the future. These reserves enable the District to properly maintain and replace its necessary infrastructure as well as create an emergency reserve against external circumstances.

MSWD continues to maintain financial stability and strong reserves through prudent and conservative money management practices, despite volatile financial markets.

The District converted its treasury holdings to CalTrust. CalTrust has provided significantly better total investment returns for the District since joining in 2017. While complying with California Government Code 53601 and 53605, CalTrust seeks to attain as high a level of current income as is consistent with preservation of principal and aligned with the public agency funds



guidepost of Safety, Liquidity, and Yield. The District holds cash reserves for various purposes, the largest of which is a Capital Reserve Fund of approximately \$45.7 million as of May 31, 2024 as shown in **Table 19** below.

Debt Service Fund Detail

At the beginning of FY 2024 the District had approximately \$22 million in outstanding long-term debt. \$7 million of this debt is related to the Groundwater Quality Protection Program which has been expanding the District’s sewer collection system and converting septic systems in the area for over 19 years. It is secured by assessment districts (not sanitary sewer rates) passed by local voters and the District uses collections from those assessments to service the debt payments. Included in the \$22 million is \$15 million in debt for cashflow support through the construction of the RWRF. **Table 24** is a summary of the long-term debt and the amounts expected to be paid in FY 2025.

Assessment District #7 Special Assessment Bonds

On February 28, 1985, the District issued special assessment bonds for \$222,200 to aid in financing a sewage collection system for Assessment District #7. The interest rate on the bonds is 7.25% per annum. Interest on the bonds is payable semi-annually on January 2 and July 2. Principal matures July 2 of each year through 2024.

Certificates of Participation – United States Department of Agriculture

On July 3, 2001, the District entered into a loan agreement with the U.S.D.A. and a Certificate of Participation (COP) was issued for \$348,000 to improve waterlines in Improvement District “E”. The interest rate on the COP is 4.50% per annum. Interest on the COP is payable semi-annually on February 1 and August 1. Principal matures February 1 of each year through 2041.

Assessment District #12, Phase I and Phase II – Refinance

On June 26, 2006, the District entered into an installment sale agreement with La Salle National Bank in the amount of \$2,200,000. The proceeds from this contract were used to purchase Assessment Districts #12 bonds totaling \$1,630,024. The bond proceeds were used for Assessment District #12, Phase I costs.

On September 21, 2007, the District entered into an installment sale agreement with La Salle National Bank in the amount of \$1,600,000. The proceeds from this contract were used to purchase Assessment Districts #12 bonds totaling \$1,329,530. The bond proceeds were used for Assessment District #12, Phase II costs.

On December 22, 2017, the District entered into a loan agreement with City National Bank in the amount of \$2,395,013. The proceeds from this contract were used to pay off the Phase I and II La Salle National Bank loans in the amount of \$1,309,488 and \$1,019,315, respectively. The interest rate on the loan agreement is 2.90% per annum. Principal and interest on the bonds is payable semi-annually on March 21 and September 21. Principal matures through September 21, 2027.

Mission Creek – 80 Acres

On June 21, 2013, the District entered into an installment sales agreement with Holman Capital Corporation in the amount of \$328,000. The proceeds were used to purchase 80 acres of land for future water system improvements. The interest rate on the installment sales agreement is 4.19% per annum. Interest on the bonds is payable semi-annually on June 7 and December 7. Principal matures on June 7 and December 7 of each year through June 7, 2033.

State Water Resources Control Board – State Revolving Fund Assessment District #12, Phase IV

In August 2012 (and later amended in January 2013), the District entered into a financing agreement with the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) for a total amount of \$9,957,921 for the purpose of financing Assessment District #12, Phase III costs. This program is a loan from the Clean State Revolving Fund (SRF) of which 50% of the principal amount was forgiven. This was made possible through Federal Environmental Protection Agency funds granted to SRF. The interest rate on the loan is 2.2% with

principal and interest payments due annually on January 31 beginning in 2015, final payment is due January 31, 2034.

Assessment District #12, Phase V

On December 19, 2013, the District entered into an installment sales agreement with City National Bank in the amount of \$1,215,000. The proceeds were used to purchase Assessment District #12 bonds totaling \$1,096,329 for Phase V costs. The interest rate on the installment sales agreement is 4.10% per annum. Interest on the bonds is payable semi-annually on March 2 and September 2. Principal matures on March 2 and September 2 of each year through 2029.

Assessment District #12, Phase VI

On November 1, 2014, the District entered into an installment sales agreement with BBVA Compass Bank in the amount of \$2,700,000. The proceeds were used to purchase Assessment District #12 bonds totaling \$2,582,000 for Phase VI costs. The interest rate on the installment sales agreement is 3.95% per annum. Interest on the bonds is payable semi-annually on March 2 and September 2. Principal matures on March 2 and September 2 of each year through 2029. On October 25, 2023 the District received a payoff demand from PNC Bank (formerly BBVA Compass) for the balance of the loan. The District paid the balance on this loan on November 30, 2023 via wire transfer.

Installment Sales Agreement – Nancy Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility

On January 26, 2023, the District entered into an installment sales agreement with Wells Fargo Bank in the amount of \$15,000,000. The proceeds were used for cashflow resources while the District waits to submit a grant reimbursement for the Nancy Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility. The final grant submittal approval was received on June 1, 2023, and the first grant disbursement is expected in August 2023. The interest rate on the installment sales agreement is 3.99% per annum. Interest only payments are due every month and the principal matures on January 25, 2025.

Description of Services Provided

Mission Springs Water District is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of five publicly elected members. The Board meets the third Monday of every month at the District's Administration Building located at 66575 Second Street in the City of Desert Hot Springs, California. The Board's activities relate to the governing of the District, establishing policy through approval of the budget, resolutions and ordinances, and participating in community affairs, intergovernmental relations, and participation at selected water organization activities. Salaries and benefits included in this division represent the staff needs to manage and support the Board of Directors.

The General Manager is the liaison to the Board of Directors and oversees the day-to-day operations of the District. The General Manager provides leadership and initiates strategic planning to implement the goals and vision of the Board of Directors. The Strategic Plan provides guidance in establishing long-term organizational goals and the General Manager utilizes the talent and skills of the entire staff to fulfill the organizational objectives.

Description of Services Provided

Public Affairs is responsible for government and legislative affairs, community outreach, conservation and water-use efficiency, and educational programs. In addition, the department is responsible for coordinating special events, and conducts outreach with customers, stakeholders, and legislative staff members. Public Affairs also develops a variety of multi-media materials and campaigns to provide information to our community through a variety of methods to help our customers learn about and understand our local water supply, infrastructure, and related issues.

2023-2024 Accomplishments

- Developed and adopted a new Social Media governance policy in August 2023 to protect the District and guide staff in managing our pages.
- MSWD was featured in a City of Desert Hot Springs and Palm Springs Visitor's Bureau video series on KMIR/NBC in November 2023.
- Initiated a Strategic Plan kick-off in November 2023 and adopted a new Strategic Plan with revised Mission, Vision, and Values in March 2024.
- Held successful canned food and toy drives benefiting the residents of Desert Hot Springs throughout November 2023. Employees donated toys and non-perishable food items, which were distributed to community members in need.
- MSWD's Holiday Float brought joy to the hearts and minds of residents, winning the Best Decorations category with its Grinch-themed float.
- Throughout the year, MSWD provided comment letters and testimony to the State Water Resources Control Board, addressing impacts to the proposed Chromium-6 MCL and the Conservation as a Way of Life regulatory framework.
- Twelve students had their conservation and groundwater quality artwork featured in the District's 2024 community calendar. Participants were honored at the December 2023 Board of Director's meeting, and calendars were provided to community members throughout the year for free.
- Successfully hosted four quarterly LifeStream Community Blood Drives throughout the year.

- Successfully hosted a series of Fall Water 101 classes, educating customers and community members about the MSWD system. The classes, held monthly between August and December 2023 at the Desert Hot Springs Library, detailed how the District works to provide water and wastewater services both now and into the future.
- Started hosting monthly Water Talks featuring presenters from various organizations covering topics important to the water future of the valley, beginning in January 2024. These successful events have drawn as many as 35 participants and are some of our most-viewed social media posts.
- Took home three awards in January 2024, including Small Plant of the Year, Collection System Person of the Year, and Community Engagement & Outreach Project of the Year, during a special awards ceremony hosted by the California Water Environment Association and its Colorado River Basin Section. At the State level, the Public Affairs team placed second for Community Engagement & Outreach Project of the Year and the Horton WWTP took third in the Small Plant of the Year category.
- Amended Article VI of the wastewater discharge ordinance to better serve industrial users. The Public Affairs office solicited community support and input to guide the final changes.
- Public Affairs staff successfully participated in lobbying efforts that helped the District receive more than \$2.7 million in community project grants to support the Groundwater Quality Protection Project.
- Partnered with the Desert Hot Springs High School REAL Academy to sponsor a modeling project where students learned about the Mission Creek Subbasin and MSWD's water sources. The project was unveiled during a special ceremony on Earth Day at the Cabbot Yerxa Museum and remains on display in the MSWD Water Room.
- Hosted two Desert Hot Springs High School students in May 2024 as part of a new student internship program started with the REAL Academy. The spring interns spent time in the Engineering and Public Affairs departments learning about the District and its duties. A Summer internship is starting in June 2024, with MSWD hosting four students who will spend their time in Engineering, Wastewater, Production, and Public Affairs Departments.
- Continued to promote rebates and conservation throughout the District including toilet rebates, turf rebates, conservation kits, and bottled water tracking.

Engineering Division

Engineering & Water Resources Department

Description of Services Provided

Engineering & Water Resources is responsible for oversight of the Capital Improvement Program, water resources management, the District's Master Plans for Water and Sewer, and all engineering and planning work.

Engineering prioritizes and establishes schedules and methods for the design and construction of the District's Capital Improvement Projects. This department monitors and oversees engineering design activities, including those prepared by consultants; prepares and reviews engineering plans, cost estimates, labor proposals, agreements, public works contracts, and project specifications. This department implements construction management methods to manage contractors that are building the District's capital improvement projects in the field.

Water Resources uses planning and management tools to leverage the District's water supply portfolio to ensure access to reliable and resilient water supplies to meet future projected demands. This department ensures compliance with federal, state, and local regulations such as Integrated Regional Water Management, Urban Water Management Planning, Sustainable Groundwater Management Planning, and Salt and Nutrient Management Planning.

2023-2024 Accomplishments

- Well 42 Construction – The contractor has procured the well motor, pump assembly, and the MCC equipment from the manufacturer. The hydrogeologist completed a downhole video log and has recommended downhole rehabilitation to remove the biofilm and encrustation found along the well casing.
- AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Areas H & I – Staff has been unable to reach an agreement with the property at the south end of Hildago Street for an easement

needed to complete the proposed sewer alignment. Staff is evaluating other options.

- AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Area D3-1 – DWR approved repurposing the grant funding for this project and approved an amendment. Staff received a proposal from AECOM to complete the design and CEQA updates to the existing documents. Following Board approval, staff issued a notice to proceed.
- Well 22 Rehabilitation – Staff received the final project plans and specifications for the well site improvements. The project was bid and awarded to Canyon Springs Enterprises. Staff is working with contractor to schedule the work.
- Backup Generators for Well Sites 27-32 and 37 – Staff executed a contract extension with the consultant, and they submitted a revised plan. Once the solar panel layout is finalized for the sites, staff will solicit bids through Planet Bids.
- Supplemental Environmental Project – Completed the connection of the 21 properties to the existing sewer laterals and abatement of the 21 septic tanks.
- Well 34 Rehabilitation – The project was awarded to Legend Pump and Well Service. The contractor completed bailing, EMDS survey, brushing the well, focused intake pumping, chemical injection and pumping, and swabbing air lifting. The contractor completed final well development, aquifer pump tests, downhole video survey, and disinfection.
- Regional Water Reclamation Facility
- CVRWMG
- Water and Wastewater System Comprehensive Master Plan Updates
- Completed SGMA Annual Reports for the Mission Creek, San Gorgonio Pass, and Indio Subbasins.
- Continued to attend monthly Technical Advisory Committee meetings and monthly Steering Committee meetings for the Coachella Valley Salt and Nutrient Management Plan (SNMP) Updates.

 - Pipeline replacement project for aging pipes within the water distribution system. Incorporate the project in the Master Plan updates.

- Evaluate options for relocating existing water infrastructure within inaccessible areas (including rear lot easements) of the District for ease of maintenance and risk reduction.

- Identify and remove problematic tamarisk trees and other vegetation to prevent future root-related system issues.
- Create a Predictive and Preventative Replacement Project for aging piping within the water distribution system.
- Continue to work with the Army Corp of Engineers to design and construct all defined assessment areas while leveraging grant funding to lower customer costs.
- Identify additional capital projects and improvements that enhance system resiliency. Focus on increasing water yields from current projects through strategic enhancements and upgrades, aligning with the long-term reliability goals.
- Conduct an analysis of available capacity within the current water system with future water demand projections to forecast the time of demand need. Incorporate results in Urban Water Management Plan updates and Master Plan updates.

- Create a Predictive and Preventative Maintenance Program to meet established performance benchmarks.
- Diligently manage and maintain current equipment to provide maximum value to the District.

Finance & Accounting Department

Description of Services Provided

Finance coordinates the activities for the department. The Director of Finance oversees investment activities, debt administration, rate setting, as well as overall financial and budgetary oversight of the District. Other administrative duties include employee relations and performance, strategic planning, and goal setting.

Accounting performs all financial related services for the District, which includes general ledger functions, investment tracking, debt management, payroll and benefit processing, accounts payable, accounts receivable, customer billing, collection processing/referral, customer payment remittance processing, bank account reconciliation, monthly financial reporting, budget preparation, rate analysis/update, ACFR preparations, State Controller's report preparation, and Capital Improvement Program reporting.

Purchasing and Warehouse administers the decentralized purchasing system for the District, including the operation of a full-service warehouse. The department is responsible for oversight of the procurement and purchase order process for all departments. This department provides enhanced supply management, a high level of accountability and value-added services. The department also works to achieve cost savings and to stock adequate supplies in case of emergencies.

- As part of the Water Master Plan, include projects that connect the MSWD IDE areas to the MSWD “main” system.

Appendix B – Glossary

Accrual Basis of Accounting – The basis of accounting under which transactions are recognized when they occur, regardless of timing of cash receipts and disbursements.

Adopted Budget – The official budget as approved by the Board of Directors at the start of each fiscal year.

Amended Budget – The adopted budget as amended by the Board of Directors through the course of the fiscal year.

Assets – Resources owned or held by the District that have monetary value.

Balanced Budget – A budget in which planned expenditures do not exceed planned funds available.

Board – Comprised of the District's five elected Directors with a rotating president, collectively acting as the legislative and policy-making body of the District.

Bond – A security whereby an issuer borrows money from an investor and agrees and promises, by written contract, to pay a fixed principal sum on a specified date (maturity date) and at a specified rate of interest.

Budget – A financial plan, for a specified period, of operations that matches all planned revenues and expenditures with the services provided to the residents of the Mission Springs Water District service area.

Capital Budget – A budget which focuses on capital project to implement the Capital Improvement Program.

Capital Expense – An acquisition or an improvement (as distinguished from a repair) that will have a life of more than one year and costs more than \$10,000.

Capital Improvement Program – A plan for the capital improvements to be implemented each year over a number of years to meet capital needs arising from the assessment of long-term needs. It sets forth the estimated cost for each project and specifies the resources required to finance the projected expenditures.

Capital Improvement Project – The budget unit to group activities and costs necessary to implement specific capital improvement and/or acquisition. A project can include the construction, acquisition, expansion, replacement, or rehabilitation of a physical facility or improvement. Project often include planning and design, land acquisition, and project management costs related to such facilities and improvements.

Charges for Services – Revenue from charges for all activities of the District.

Contract Services – The costs related to services performed for the District by individuals, businesses, or utilities.

Debt Service Fund – A fund established to account for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, long-term debt principle and interest.

Department – A major organization group of the District with overall management responsibility for an operation or a group of related operations within a functional area.

Division – A major administrative organizational unit of the District with overall management responsibility for one or more activities.

Encumbrance – The commitment of appropriated funds to purchase an item or service.

Expenditures/Expenses – Decreases in net total assets. Expenses represent the total cost of operations during a period regardless of the timing of related expenditures.

Fiscal Year – A 12-month period to which the annual operating budget applies and at the end of which an entity determines its financial position, the results of its operations, and adopts a budget for the coming year. The District's fiscal year is from July 1 to June 30.

Fixed Assets – Equipment costing \$10,000 or more, including tax, with a useful life longer than one year, and not qualifying as a capital improvement project. Includes automotive equipment, office equipment, office furniture, acquisitions, landscaping improvement, etc.

Fund – An independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts, recording resources, related liabilities, obligations, reserves, and equities segregated for the purpose of carrying out specific activities or attaining certain objectives in accordance with special regulations, restrictions, or limitations.

Fund Balance – The equity (assets minus liabilities) of governmental fund and fiduciary fund types.

Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) – Uniform minimum standards of, and guidelines for, financial accounting and reporting. They govern the form and content of the basic financial statements of an entity. GAAP encompasses the conventions, rules, and procedures necessary to define accepted accounting practices at a particular time. They include not only broad guidelines of general application, but also detailed practices and procedures.

Goals – Broad, general statements of each division's desired community of organizational outcomes.

Government Accounting Standards Board – The independent organization that establishes and improves standards of accounting and financial reporting for U.S., state, and local governments.

Infrastructure – The accumulated pipelines and storage facilities of the District, including meters, valves, pumps, and other appurtenances.

Interest Earnings – The earnings from available funds invested during the year in U.S. Treasury Bonds, government agencies, and Certificates of Deposit.

Liabilities – Present obligations of the District arising from past events.

Materials and Supplies – Expendable materials and operating supplies necessary to conduct department activity.

Operating Transfer – A transfer of revenues from one fund to another fund.

Operating Budget – The annual budget and process that provides a financial plan for the operation of government and the provision of services for the year; excluded from the operating budget are capital projects, which are determined by a separate, but interrelated process.

Payroll Expenses – Compensation paid to, or on behalf of, District employees for salaries and wages, overtime, and benefits.

Program – An activity or set of activities that provides a particular service to the citizens.

Public Hearing – The portions of open meetings held to present evidence and provide information on both sides of an issue.

Reserve Fund – Prudent fiscal management tools with flexibility to continually adapt to change, ensure continued operational solvency, and preserve adequate levels of services.

Resolution – An order of a legislative body requiring less formality than an ordinance or statute.

Revenue – Moneys that the District receives as income such as payments for water consumption, shared revenues, and interest income.

- a. The General Manager is responsible for keeping expenditures within budget allocations for positions, salaries, operational expenses and capital acquisitions and may adopt budget policies as necessary to carry out that responsibility. No expenditure of funds shall be authorized unless sufficient funds have been appropriated by the Board or General Manager as described herein.
- b. The General Manager may exercise discretion in administration of the budget to respond to changed circumstances, provided that any single modification in excess of \$50,000 shall require approval by the Board.
- c. The Department Heads may exercise discretion in administration of the budget within a single department to respond to changed circumstances, provided that any single modification in excess of \$5,000 shall require approval by the General Manager.
- d. No transfers will be made between the operational and capital budgets.
- e. Except as provided by Section 3(b) herein, the Board must authorize any increase in the overall operating budget, capital budget, salary budget, and number of authorized permanent personnel positions above the level identified in the final operating and capital budget. The General Manager may authorize the hiring of temporary or part-time staff as necessary, within the limits imposed by the available funds in the operating and capital budget.

Section 4: That authorization is made for any carry over or continuing appropriations for the capital budget.

Section 5: That the Secretary is authorized and directed to forward a certified copy of this Resolution to the Riverside County Auditor.

In order to ensure that the District is in full compliance with laws implemented by state and federal agencies, the District’s Human Resources Manager and District Counsel regularly review and revise the Personnel Rules and Regulations. The revised Personnel Rules and Regulations include updates to existing policies to remain competitive, comply with new laws, or to clarify policy language.

Exhibit “A” outlines currently proposed amendments to the MSWD Personnel Rules and Regulations. With the Amendments proposed in Exhibit “A”, the MSWD Personnel Rules and Regulations will be in conformance with all required California and federal employment laws.

Exhibit A

Below represents the changes made to the Mission Springs Water District Personnel Rules and Regulations:

Rule 1.B. Non-Discrimination; Fair and Equal Employment – Revised

The District prohibits unlawful discrimination based on any characteristic protected by law. Protected characteristics are race (including hair texture, protective hairstyles, and other traits historically associated with race), color, religion and religious creed (including religious dress and religious grooming practices), sex (including pregnancy, perceived pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, and related medical conditions), reproductive health decision-making, gender, gender identity (including transgender identity), gender expression (including transgender expression or because an individual has transitioned or is (or is perceived to be) transitioning to live as the gender with which they identify, sex stereotyping, national origin, ancestry, citizenship, age (40 years and over), mental disability and physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), legally protected medical condition or information (including genetic information), protected medical leaves (requesting or approved for leave under the Family and Medical Leave Act or the California Family Rights Act, if applicable), the use of marijuana off the job and away from the workplace, military and/or veteran status, service, or obligation, reserve status, national guard status, marital status, domestic partner status, sexual orientation, status as a victim of domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking, enrollment in a public assistance program, engaging in protected communications regarding employee wages or otherwise exercising rights protected under the National Labor Relations Act or California Fair Pay Act, requesting a reasonable accommodation on a protected basis such as a disability or sincerely-held religious belief, practice, or observance, or any other characteristic protected by local, state, or federal laws. ~~The District maintains a policy of non-discrimination and equal employment opportunities with respect to all current employees as well as applicants for employment. The recruitment process, and the terms and conditions of employment will be governed on the basis of merit, competence and qualification, and will not be influenced in any manner by race (including traits historically associated with race, such as hair texture and protective hairstyles including, but not limited to braids, locks and twists), religion, sex, sexual orientation, age, national origin, ethnicity, disability, veteran status, marital status, political belief or opinion, political affiliation or any other legally protected status.~~

Rule 9. Dress and Grooming Standards – Revised

Employees ~~whose jobs require them to come in contact with customers, suppliers, or the public~~ are expected to wear apparel the District considers appropriate for **work** ~~dealing with the public.~~

Rule 15.F. Promotion – Revised

Any employee who is promoted to a position having a higher range than the position he/she occupies, shall commence work in the higher range at a step that at minimum is an increase of ten percent (10%) above the **base** rate the employee was receiving prior to promotion **or provisional appointment**. The new pay rate will be effective at the beginning of the pay period it takes effect. (“Base rate” is an **employee’s base hourly rate or salary that does not include other forms of pay, including, but not limited to, overtime, bonuses, or incentive pay**).

Rule 17.A.1. Enrollment in Health Insurance, Dental Insurance, Vision Care Coverage, Life Insurance, Employee Assistance Program and Deferred Compensation – Revised

All employees who are employed on a full-time basis, ~~except emergency, seasonal and temporary employees (30 hours or more less per week)~~, shall be enrolled in the health, vision, and employee assistance plans sponsored by the District. Regular and probationary employees may enroll eligible dependents in the health plan provided acceptable proof of eligibility is submitted along with enrollment forms. Regular and probationary employees and their dependents shall also be eligible for dental insurance, on the terms and conditions as authorized by the Board of Directors of the District. The District's deferred compensation program is voluntary. Fringe benefits may be altered on a year-by-year basis as the District may see fit. After a 30-day absence, that does not have job protection under any applicable local, state, or federal leave laws (“non-protected leave”), fringe benefits including but not limited to health insurance and life insurance will cease. Employees will be offered COBRA for medical benefits only. Life Insurance coverage will resume once the employee returns to work. **Temporary employees who work more than 30 hours per week shall be enrolled in health insurance. Emergency and seasonal employees are not entitled to health insurance.**

Rule 18.A. Training and Development – Revised

1. Employee must be a full-time regular employee of the District **for college or university degree reimbursement, and coursework must be completed during employees’ own time and not during District work hours**
2. **Employee must be a regular or probationary employee to receive reimbursement for professional development classes and certifications. At the District’s discretion, the District may approve completion of professional development classes and certifications during District work hours.**
3. All courses and related expenses for which the employee will request reimbursement must receive **prior written approval** from the employee’s Supervisor and the General Manager on the District’s Educational Assistance Request form. Other than those items listed above, no other reimbursements shall be made.
4. Satisfactory completion is considered a “pass” grade in the case of pass/fail courses. Satisfactory of courses graded on an A through F system or an equivalent method will be reimbursed 100% for a grade of “C” or higher. No reimbursement will be made for a “D” or “F” grade. The maximum benefit per **fiscal** year per employee shall be \$6,000.00. This amount must be submitted, approved, and adopted as part of the annual budget for the department in which the employee works before it is disbursed to satisfy the District’s reimbursement obligations in this section.

Rule 19.D.1.b. Automobile Mileage – Revised

Automobile Mileage. Automobile mileage is reimbursable at Internal Revenue Service rates presently in effect (see www.irs.gov). These rates are designed to compensate the driver for gasoline, insurance, maintenance, and other expenses associated with operating the vehicle. This amount does not include bridge and road tolls, which are also reimbursable. **The District will not reimburse for customary commuting miles.**

Rule 22.E. Standby Time – Revised

When on standby, the employee is entitled to receive the minimum standby pay in addition to overtime pay. The minimum standby compensation is 1.5 hours overtime calculated based on the employee's regular rate for each day of standby duty served Monday through Friday, ~~and~~ 3.0 hours calculated based on the employee's regular rate for each day standby duty is served on Saturday, Sunday, District holidays and on the employee's schedule day off under the 9/80 schedule, **and 6.0 hours will be calculated based on the employee's regular rate of pay for Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day only.** In addition to the minimum compensation set forth above, each employee on standby is entitled to overtime pay at the applicable rate for time worked.

Rule 27.F. Other Leaves of Absence – Revised

Jury and Witness Duty - The District will provide **full-time regular and probationary** employees paid time off to serve, as required by law, on a jury or grand jury if the employee provides reasonable advance notice. The District will also provide **full-time regular and probationary** employees with unpaid time off to appear in court or other judicial proceedings as a witness to comply with a valid subpoena or other court order.

Leave for Educational/Daycare Purposes - Employees will be granted time off without pay for up to 40 hours per calendar year, but no more than eight hours in any calendar month to... Address a child care provider or school emergency (i.e., the school or child care provider requested that the child be picked up, there is a behavioral or discipline problem with the child that needs to be addressed with the school or child-care provider, there is a closure or unexpected unavailability of the school or child-care provider, or that there is a natural disaster, such as an earthquake or fire, requiring that the child be kept home or picked up from the school or child-care provider). Leave for this purpose will ~~not~~ be limited to 8 hours per month.

Rule 33 Policy Against Harassment, Discrimination and Retaliation – Revised

A. Purpose of Policy ~~The District is committed to providing a workplace free of harassment, regardless of whether the workplace consists of the District's offices or some remote work location that is away from the District's premises. The District is committed to providing a work environment (whether the workplace consists of the District's offices or some remote work location that is away from the District's premises) free of harassment, discrimination, retaliation, and disrespectful or other unprofessional conduct based on race, religion (including religious dress and grooming practices), color, sex/gender (including pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding or related medical conditions), reproductive health decision-making, sex stereotype, gender identity/gender expression/transgender (including whether or not you are transitioning or have transitioned) and sexual orientation, national origin (including language use restrictions and possession of a driver's license to establish the right to work in the United States), ancestry, physical or mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, registered domestic partner status, age, sexual orientation, military and veteran status or any other basis protected by federal, state or local law or ordinance or regulation. It also prohibits discrimination, harassment, disrespectful or unprofessional conduct based on the perception that anyone has any of those characteristics or is associated with a person who has or is perceived as having those characteristics. This includes sexual harassment (which includes harassment based on pregnancy, perceived pregnancy, childbirth, breastfeeding, or related medical conditions) and harassment based on gender, gender identity, and gender expression, as well as harassment based on such factors as race (including traits historically associated with race, such as hair texture and protective hairstyles including, but not limited to braids, locks and twists), color, religion, religious creed (including religious dress and religious grooming), national origin, ancestry, citizenship, age, physical or mental disability, legally-protected medical condition or information (including genetic information), family care or medical leave status, military caregiver status, military status, veteran status, marital status, domestic partner status, sexual orientation, status as a victim of domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking, enrollment in a public assistance program, or any other basis protected by federal, state, or local laws.~~

Rule 35 Employee Drug and Alcohol Use Policy – Drug-Free Workplace – Revised

III. Recreational Marijuana

Be advised that the Adult Use of Marijuana Act, which legalizes the use of recreational marijuana for adults 21 years of age and older does not affect the rights of the District to maintain a drug-free workplace by prohibiting the use of marijuana by employees or prospective employees **while on duty or on District premises or impairment by use of marijuana while working**. Marijuana remains an illegal substance under the federal Controlled Substances Act. Therefore, the District reserves the right to terminate an employee who tests positive for marijuana **psychoactive cannabis metabolites** or to withdraw an offer of employment to a prospective employee who tests positive for marijuana **psychoactive cannabis metabolites**.

A. Reasonable Suspicion

When a supervisor or manager has a reasonable suspicion that any employee is working in an impaired condition or otherwise engaging in conduct that violates this Guideline, the employee will be relieved of duty and asked to submit to a blood, urine or other testing or examination designed to detect drugs or alcohol. **Unless the employee is subject to federal drug testing under DOT guidelines, the District will not test for non-psychoactive cannabis metabolites.** If the employee refuses to cooperate with the

administration of the drug/alcohol tests, the refusal will be handled in the same manner as a positive test result. While results are expected back, employee will be placed on paid administrative leave.

Rule 37 Inclement Weather – Revised

While this area generally enjoys excellent weather, there are occasions when there can be the potential for flooding, high winds, dust storms, and snow ~~in the higher elevations.~~

Employees who do not report to work when the District facilities are is open for business will not be paid for the day or for those hours not present during the day. With supervisor approval, the individual may take the time off as vacation or optional holiday time providing the employee has sufficient accrued hours.

Rule 39 Education and Certification Incentive Pay – Revised

Effective July 1, 2024

Each employee shall receive educational incentive pay, as indicated, if they achieve the following:

A. Higher Education Educational Incentive:

- 1. Employees whose job do not require a higher education degree (HED), but have earned one or employees who obtain a higher degree than required by their position will be eligible for the following incentive:
 - Bachelor’s degree or Master’s degree: two-and-one half percent (2 ½%) of base pay.

B. Certification Educational Incentive for Field Employees:

- 1. **One (1) Job-Related Certification Educational Incentive:**
 - Field employees can earn an additional two-and-one-half percent (2 ½%) of base pay for obtaining one job-related certification from the approved list of job eligible certifications for field employees.
- 2. **Two (2) Job-Related Certifications Educational Incentive:**
 - Field employees can earn an additional two-and-one-half percent (2 ½%) of base pay for obtaining two job-related certifications from the approved list of job eligible certifications for field employees.
 - Since it’s not possible to hold two certificate grades simultaneously (e.g., Water Distribution Grade 3 and Water Distribution Grade 2), field employees who possess a certification that is two (2) levels higher than what their job requires can earn incentive pay up to five percent (5%) of base pay. However, only the incentive pay associated with the actual certification held per the approved list of job eligible certifications for field employees is reportable to CalPERS.

3. Commercial Driver’s License (CDL) Bonus:

- Field employees who voluntarily maintain a CDL (not ordinarily required for their job) will be entitled to an additional two-and-one-half percent (2 ½%) of base pay. This compensation is not reportable to CalPERS.

C. Maximum Combined Incentive Pay:

1. Total maximum combined incentive pay not to exceed five percent (5%) of base pay.

D. Eligibility:

1. Higher Education Degrees:

- Degrees must be relevant to the duties regularly performed in the job classification, as determined by the General Manager.

2. Certifications:

- Certifications must directly relate to the employee’s job description. Refer to the approved list of job eligible certifications for field employees.

E. Effective Date.

- Employees must submit a Request for Educational Incentive pay along with necessary supporting documentation to the Human Resources Manager for approval.
- The employee will receive incentive pay beginning the next full pay period after submission of the documentation showing completion to the Human Resources Manager. It is the employee’s responsibility to submit the required documents in a timely manner.

F. Exceptions:

1. Ineligible Employees:

- Supervisors/superintendents, managers, and directors are not eligible for this incentive pay.
- Students, temporary, part-time, seasonal, or emergency employees are not eligible for this incentive pay.

2. Prerequisite or Acceptable Option:

- Employees are not eligible if their job classification states that a degree or certification is a prerequisite or an acceptable option for meeting required qualifications.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT WITH PREMIER PROPERTY PRESERVATION, LLC FOR ANNUAL JANITORIAL SERVICES FOR FY 2024-2025

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the General Manager to approve a one-year contract with Premier Property Preservation, LLC for Annual Janitorial Services for 2024-2025 in the amount of \$34,320.00, plus a 10% contingency for a total of \$37,752.00. The agreement can be extended for two additional one-year terms with the option to negotiate a revised price, if any. The not to exceed amounts are \$37,752.00 for fiscal years 2024-25, 2025-26 and 2026-27.

SUMMARY

The District contracts for annual disinfection and janitorial services for several facilities, including the Administration Building, Accounting Modular, Annex Building, Corporate Yard, and the Horton WWTP. This contract will also cover the new Nancy Wright RWRF, providing regularly scheduled professional janitorial services that include labor, cleaning supplies, equipment, and materials. Please refer to the attached contract for further details.

ANALYSIS

In May 2024, the District advertised a request for bids for annual janitorial and disinfection services via PlanetBids. Four bids were received, and Premier Property Preservation, LLC was the lowest responsive bidder. Below is a summary of the bids received.

Consultant agrees with the Mission Springs Water District that:

- a. When the law establishes a professional standard of care for Consultant's services, to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant will immediately defend, indemnify and hold harmless Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers against any and all liability from all claims and demands of all persons that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the Consultant's negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct in the performance (or actual or alleged non-performance) of the work under this agreement. Consultant shall defend itself against any and all liabilities, claims, losses, damages, and costs arising out of or alleged to arise out of Consultant's performance or non-performance of the work hereunder and shall not tender such claims to Mission Springs Water District nor to its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers, for defense or indemnity.
- b. Other than in the performance of professional services, to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant will immediately defend, indemnify and hold harmless Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees and authorized volunteers from all claims and demands of all persons arising out the performance of the work or furnishing of materials; including but not limited to, claims by the Consultant or Consultant's employees for damages to persons or property except for the sole negligence or willful misconduct or active negligence of Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- c. By his/her signature hereunder, Consultant certifies that he/she is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and that Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the professional services under this agreement. Consultant and sub-consultants will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement.
- d. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, a certificate of insurance satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing professional liability coverage of not less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate, that coverage shall not be cancelled except with notice to Mission Springs Water District. Coverage is to be placed with a carrier with an A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, or equivalent, or as otherwise approved by Mission Springs Water District. The retroactive date (if any) is to be no later than the effective date of this agreement. The Consultant shall maintain such coverage continuously for a period of at least five (5) years after the completion of the contract work. Consultant shall purchase a five-year extended reporting period i) if the retroactive date is advanced past the effective date of this Agreement; ii) if the policy is canceled or not renewed; or iii) if the policy is replaced by another claims-made policy with a retroactive date subsequent to the effective date of this Agreement. In the event that the Consultant employs other Consultants (sub-Consultants) as part of the work covered by this agreement, it shall be the Consultant's responsibility to require and confirm that each sub-Consultant meets the minimum insurance requirements specified above.
- e. **Verification of Coverage** – Consultant shall furnish the District with certificates and amendatory endorsements, or copies of the applicable policy language affecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the District before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The District reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including policy Declaration pages and Endorsement pages.
- f. Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the Consultant, his agents, representatives, employees, or sub-consultants. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, certificates of insurance (Acord Form 25 or equivalent) satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing:

Coverage – Coverage shall be at least as broad as the following:

- 1. **Commercial General Liability (CGL)** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) including products and completed operations, property

damage, bodily injury, personal and advertising injury with limit of at least coverage of not less than two million (\$2,000,000) per occurrence or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (coverage as broad as ISO CG 25 03, or ISO CG 25 04 endorsements provided to District), or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

2. **Automobile Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Business Auto Coverage (Form CA 00 01), covering Symbol 1 (any auto) or if the Consultant has no owned autos, Symbol 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned) with limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage each accident.
3. **Workers' Compensation Insurance** - as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. **Waiver of Subrogation:** The insurer(s) named above agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the Mission Springs Water District, its elected or appointed officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for the Agency; but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Mission Springs Water District has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer. Consultant is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the professional services under this agreement. Consultant and sub-consultants will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement. Sole proprietors with no employees, acknowledge that they are not subject to the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of California and agree to complete a signed workers compensation exemption form.

If Claims Made Policies:

1. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
2. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.

If the Consultant maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the District requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the District.

Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the Mission Springs Water District.

Self-Insured Retentions - Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Mission Springs Water District. The Mission Springs Water District may require the Consultant to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or Member Water Agency.

Required Provisions:

- **Additional Insured Status:** Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers or using the language that states "as required by written contract." are to be given insured status (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 01), with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the

Consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.

- **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this project, the consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects to the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers shall be in excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - Consultant shall require and verify that all sub-consultants maintain insurance meeting all requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are an additional insured on Commercial General Liability Coverage.
 - The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- g. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this agreement, the Consultant shall deliver the renewal certificate(s) to Mission Springs Water District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.
- h. Consultant shall not accept direction or orders from any person other than the General Manager or the person(s) whose name(s) is (are) inserted on Page 1 as "other Authorized Representative(s)."
- i. Payment, unless otherwise specified on Page 1, is to be within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District.
- j. Consultant hereby specifically represents and warrants to District that it possesses the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this agreement in a competent and professional manner, without the advice or direction of District and that the services to be rendered pursuant to this agreement shall be performed in accordance with the standards customarily applicable to an experienced and competent professional rendering the same or similar services in the state of California. Consultant further represents and warrants that it possesses all required licenses necessary or applicable to the performance of the services under this agreement. Professional permits required by governmental authorities will be obtained at Consultant's expense, and Consultant will comply with applicable local, state, and federal regulations and statutes including but not limited to Cal/OSHA requirements.
- k. Any change in the scope of the professional services to be done, method of performance, nature of materials or price thereof, or to any other matter materially affecting the performance or nature of the professional services will not be paid for or accepted unless such change, addition or deletion is approved in advance, in writing by a supplemental agreement executed by Mission Springs Water District. Consultant's "Authorized Representative(s)" has (have) the authority to execute such written change for Consultant.
- l. Unless otherwise agreed upon in writing, all reports, documents, or other written material, including any documents, images, photographs, video files, or other media created or developed by Consultant as part of the services required hereunder ("Written Products") shall be considered to be "works made for hire", and all Written Products and any and all intellectual property rights arising from their creation, including, but not limited to, all copyrights and all other proprietary rights, shall be and remain the property of Mission Springs Water District without restriction or limitation upon their use, duplication or dissemination by Mission Springs Water District, except as otherwise provided herein. The Consultant shall not obtain or attempt to obtain copyright protection as to any of the Written Products.
- m. District shall hold all intellectual property rights to any data, materials, digital information, and Written Products stored and/or developed pursuant to this agreement. Consultant hereby assigns to Mission Springs Water District all ownership and any and all intellectual property rights to the data, materials, digital information and Written Products that are not otherwise vested in Mission Springs Water District pursuant to section above.

Consultant shall not disclose, publish, or authorize others to disclose or publish, design data, drawings, specifications, reports, or other information pertaining to the projects assigned to the Consultant by the Mission Springs Water District or other information to which the Consultant has had access during the term of this Agreement without the prior written approval of an Authorized Representative during the term of this Agreement. Consultant's covenant under this section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- o. Consultant shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to sales, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by the Mission Springs Water District or the Authorized Representative. The Consultant shall maintain adequate records on services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of service. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. At all times during regular business hours, Consultant shall provide access to such books and records to the Authorized Representative or his or her designees and shall give the Authorized Representative or his or her designees the right to examine and audit such books and records and to make transcripts as necessary, and shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement.
- p. This Agreement is personal to the Consultant. Any attempt to assign or subcontract any right or obligation hereunder by the Consultant shall be void unless approved in writing in advance by the Authorized Representative. Consultant's services pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided by the representative or directly under the supervision of the representative and Consultant shall not assign another to supervise the Consultant's performance of this Agreement without the prior written approval of the Mission Springs Water District, by and through the Authorized Representative.
- q. Consultant shall not maintain, commit, or permit the maintenance or commission of any nuisance in connection with the performance of services under this Agreement.
- r. Consultant agrees to be familiar with and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local conflict of Interest laws, including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act (California Government Code Sections 81000, et seq.) and California Government Code Section 1090. During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall retain the right to perform similar services for other clients, but Consultant and its officers, employees, associates, and subconsultants shall not, without the prior written approval of the Authorized Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Consultant is not currently performing work that would require Consultant or one of its officers, employees, associates or subconsultants to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict-of-interest statute.
- s. A waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement whether of the same or different character.
- t. The Consultant shall commence, carry on, and complete all required tasks with all practicable dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner in accordance with all applicable laws and generally accepted industry standards.
- u. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. The Mission Springs Water District shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than the Consultant.
- v. In no event shall the making by the Mission Springs Water District of any payment to the Consultant constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of covenant, or any default which may then exist, on the part of the Consultant, and the making of any such payment by the Mission Springs Water District while any such breach or default shall exist shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Mission Springs Water District with regard to such breach or default.
- w. If any legal action is necessary to enforce any provision of this Agreement or for damages by reason of an alleged breach of any provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to receive

from the losing Party all costs and expenses in such amount as the courts may determine to be reasonable. In awarding the cost of litigation, the court shall not be bound by any court fee schedule, but shall, if it is in the interest of justice to do so, award the full amount of costs, expenses, and attorneys' and experts' fees paid or incurred in good faith.

- x. In the performance of the work required by this Agreement, Consultant shall abide by and conform with and to any and all applicable laws of the United States and the State of California, and with the local County and Municipal Code, ordinances, regulations and policies.
- y. If any part, term, or provision of this Agreement shall be held illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any law of a federal, state, or local government having jurisdiction over this Agreement, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions shall not be affected by such holding.
- z. The terms of this Agreement shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of California. Should litigation occur, venue shall be the Superior Court of Riverside County, California.
- aa. This Agreement represents the entire Agreement between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant with respect to the subject matter hereto and supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations, or agreements. No verbal agreement or implied covenant shall be held to vary the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and any subsequent successors and assigns. In the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and Consultant's proposal or Quote, and Exhibits hereto, the provisions of this Agreement shall control.
- bb. Precedence of Exhibits. All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated in this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- cc. Consultant will act hereunder as an independent consultant. This agreement shall not and is not intended to constitute Consultant as an agent, servant, or employee of the Mission Springs Water District and shall not and is not intended to create the relationship of partnership, joint venture or association between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant.
- dd. Each of the signatories herein hereby represents that he or she has the authority to execute the Agreement on behalf of his or her contracting party.
- ee. In the event the Consultant performs additional or different services than those described herein without the prior written approval of the Contract Manager, Consultant shall not be compensated for such services. Consultant expressly waives any right to be compensated for services and materials not covered by the scope of this Agreement or authorized by the District in writing.
- ff. Consultant shall promptly advise the Contract Manager as soon as reasonably practicable upon gaining knowledge of a condition, event or accumulation of events which may affect the scope and/or cost of Services. All proposed changes, modifications, deletions and/or requests for additional services shall be reduced to writing for review and approval by the District.
- gg. Consultant shall perform all services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement and the proposal. In the event that the terms of the proposal conflict with the terms of this agreement or contain additional terms that purport to bind the District, the terms of this agreement shall govern and said additional or conflicting terms shall be of no force or effect.

GENERAL CONDITIONS

Project Description:

Mission Springs Water District (MSWD or District) is seeking bids from qualified Consultants to provide janitorial and disinfection services at five (5) locations in the City of Desert Hot Springs, CA. The lowest responsive and responsible bidder will be issued a contract for the fiscal year 2024-2025 (July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025). MSWD will have the option, at its sole discretion, to extend the agreement and negotiate a revised price, if any, for one (1) year additional terms up to a total of three (3) years. No public bid opening will be held.

Personnel

The Consultant shall assign an on-site supervisor who will have overall responsibility for the performance of the services and who will be able to promptly resolve any questions or problems that arise. Consultant shall advise their supervisory staff and working personnel that because of the risk/liability issues, individuals not directly employed by the Consultant, children, family, friends, or pets are not permitted on District property during working hours.

Damage

If Consultant damages any property belonging to the District, the District may either retain from the money due to the Consultant an amount sufficient to repair the damage or require the Consultant to have the damage repaired to the satisfaction of the District, at the Consultant's expense.

Building Access

The successful Consultant must contact the Project Manager or Authorized Staff, prior to commencement of work. The Consultant will be issued keys, remotes, access cards and access codes to the work areas. Keys shall be assigned and used by only individuals employed by the Company. The Consultant shall report all lost or stolen keys, remotes, and access cards to the Project Manager or Authorized Staff within 24 hours of discovery of the loss. The Consultant shall reimburse the District for the cost as determined by the Project Manager or Authorized Staff for rekeying the facilities or duplicating additional keys, remotes, and/or access cards. Upon completion of this contract, and prior to payment of a final invoice, all keys, remotes, and access cards shall be returned and accounted for by the Project Manager or Authorized Staff.

Non-Performance for Services

Consultant will be considered non-compliant when in the judgment of the Project Manager or Authorized Staff, any one or more of the following conditions exist:

- a. The work requested was not performed in accordance with the performance standards set by this contract or the Project Manager or Authorized Staff.
- b. The work requested was not performed/or finished within the time specified.
- c. The specified equipment, tools or chemicals were not available, not used, not used correctly or were not in good operating condition, resulting in a substandard job.
- d. The "Daily Log" was not completed at the completion of the cleaning period.

Notification will be made to the Consultant directing that a correction of the deficiency be re-cleaned or as otherwise directed by the Project Manager or Authorized Staff at no increase or additional cost to the total contractual amount.

Security and Identification

We require a Live Scan to be performed for all contract staff working in any of the District Facilities.

Consultant shall attest in writing that a background check to the extent allowed by law has been conducted on each employee before initial employment and shall provide the District with a copy of all such background checks two weeks before employees' arrival to District premises.

Upon termination or transfer of any employee of the Consultant, the Consultant shall immediately notify the Project Manager or Authorized Staff by phone and email of such termination or transfer, and shall immediately obtain District owned property (keys, remotes, access cards) from the individual and returned to the Project Manager or Authorized Staff.

Business License

Prior to beginning any work, the Consultant shall obtain a Desert Hot Springs business license.

Insurance Requirements

A Certificate of Insurance will be furnished by the successful Consultant upon Notice of Award. The certificate(s) shall be completed by the Consultant's authorized agent and submitted to the District. The successful Consultant shall not commence any work in connection with the Agreement until it has obtained all the following types of insurance and shall maintain such insurance for the duration of the Agreement. The Consultant shall secure the minimum insurance coverage described below, and such insurance

shall be primary with respect to any insurance or self- insurance programs maintained by the District.

Comprehensive Commercial General Liability. Consultant shall obtain, and maintain throughout the life of the Agreement, Comprehensive Commercial General Liability Insurance in an amount of \$2,000,000 per occurrence and \$4,000,000 aggregate with an insurance carrier acceptable to the District and name the District as additional insured.

Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance. Consultant shall obtain, and maintain throughout the life of the Agreement, Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance with minimum limits of \$1,000,000, combined single limit for bodily injury liability and property damage liability and name the District as additional insured. This coverage shall include all owned vehicles, hired and non-owned vehicles, and employee non-ownership vehicles.

Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance. Consultant shall obtain, and maintain throughout the life of the Agreement, Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance in the amount that meets the statutory requirement and shall be in force with an insurance carrier acceptable to the District. The Consultant and any sub-consultants shall comply fully with the California Workers' Compensation Law.

Professional Liability Insurance. If applicable, the Consultant shall obtain and maintain throughout the life of the Agreement Professional Liability Insurance in an amount of \$1,000,000 per claims made and \$2,000,000 aggregate with an insurance carrier accepted to the District.

The Consultant shall instruct their insurance broker to furnish properly executed certificates of insurance to the District.

- The name of the insured Consultant, the specified job by name, the name of the insurer, the number of the policy, its effective date, and its termination date.
- Certificates of insurance shall clearly evidence coverage required above.
- Certificates of insurance shall be submitted by the broker directly to Mission Springs Water District via e-mail to the contract manager assigned. The insurer will notify the District at least thirty (30) days prior to any material changes in provisions or cancellation of the policy.

The District reserves the right to modify the insurance requirements set forth at any time during the process of solicitation or subsequent thereto.

PUBLIC WATER AND SEWER SYSTEMS CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENTS FOR TRACT NO. 32030-3 – SKYBORNE VILLAGE III

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Board approval of the Public Water and Sewer Systems Construction Agreements for the Skyborne Village III - Tract No. 30230-3 residential development project (Project) and authorize the General Manager to do all things necessary to complete the agreements.

SUMMARY

The acceptance of the Water and Sewer Systems Construction Agreements ensures that the systems will be constructed to the standards of the District and that the Developer is responsible for all costs associated with the design and construction of the systems. Additionally, the District has determined in conjunction with the City of Desert Hot Springs, that it is necessary to obtain separate Performance/Warranty and Payment bonds in favor of the District for the Project, which were previously accepted as part of the Water and Sewer Bonding Agreement, by the Board of Directors at the May 20, 2024 Board meeting. Subsequently, approved water and sewer facilities will be transferred to the District upon successful completion of all the work, and the one-year warranty period will begin.

ANALYSIS

The Water and Sewer Systems Construction Agreement, coupled with the previously approved Performance/Warranty Bonds for water and sewer improvements approved by the Board on May 20, 2024, assures the work will be completed pursuant to current District construction standards and will be paid for through the bonds if developer defaults, and will continue to cover the warranty period for the first year after final acceptance to correct any operational problems attributable to the original construction. The Payment Bond (labor & materials bond) also previously approved by the Board on May 20, 2024 covers claims by others against materials or labor supplied but not ever paid for in part or full for the project if it defaults. This bond is exonerated upon final acceptance.

THIS WATER SYSTEM CONSTRUCTION AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) is made on this _____ day of _____, 20__ by and between MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT, a County Water District (“District”) with its headquarters at 66575 2nd Street, Desert Hot Springs, Riverside County, California,” and **Lennar Homes of California LLC** (“Developer”) located at 4140 Temescal Canyon Rd., Corona CA 92883, phone No. (951) 817-3503.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, Developer is planning the construction of a project (“Project”) of two hundred eighty six (286) residential lot(s) which is the subject to a **Tract Map No. 32030-3** further described and identified on the map attached to and made a part of this Agreement as Exhibit “A” (“Property”) and which is subject to the Landscape Plan attached hereto and made a part hereof by this reference as Exhibit “B”; and

WHEREAS, the Project will require a water distribution system to provide domestic water service to the to be designed and built by Developer (the “System”); and

WHEREAS, said Developer is desirous of having the District provide domestic water service to said Project and is willing to convey to the District the System after the construction thereof, contingent upon the District’s acceptance of such conveyance on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

AGREEMENT

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PARTIES AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

1. **Compliance with Law.** Developer will comply with all applicable state, federal and local laws, statutes and ordinances and the District’s ordinances, policies and regulations for planning and constructing the System (“Requirements”). The forgoing laws and regulations, as amended from time to time, are hereby incorporated herein by reference. Developer agrees to comply with the water conservation requirements set by MSWD and the Land Use Agency as well as the Landscape Plan.
2. **District Expenses Covered.** The Developer shall deposit, with the District, costs to cover necessary engineering and other services, permits, inspections and water system connection costs in an amount estimated by the District. Said deposit shall be increased and/or replenished if District determines that the amount deposited is not sufficient to cover the costs as estimated by the District from time to time.

- 3. Completion of Work.** The Developer shall contract for the design of the System by a licensed civil engineer experienced in the design of similar systems. The System to service the Project shall comply with the Requirements and construction plans for the same shall be presented to the District for approval by the District prior to the presentation thereof to Contractors for bidding purposes. Such System shall include all pipelines, valves, hydrants and appurtenances as required by District subject to the Requirements. The Developer shall at its sole cost and expense secure title to property, easements, and rights of way needed for the System prior to the commencement of construction and shall convey offers of dedication or grant deeds along with necessary roads for ingress and egress and for maintenance and operation of the water system. The Developer shall file a Notice of Completion upon completion of the water system.
- 4. Licensed Contractor.** The Developer will contract for the services of a licensed and qualified contractor ("Contractor") to construct the System. Said contract shall be signed by Developer and the licensed Contractor. Said Contractor shall be currently licensed by the State of California with a General engineering Contractor, "A" license and/or other appropriate license needed to construct the System. Said Contractor shall be experienced in the construction of domestic water systems and shall have been reviewed by the District and listed by the District as qualified contractor before a contract is signed and actual system construction begins. However, the District's approval of the Contractor shall in no way be deemed to impose on District any liability for the acts or omissions of said Contractor.
- 5. Payment and Performance.** The entire cost of the construction of the System shall be paid by the Developer as and when the amounts are due in such regards. Developer and Contractor shall assure that such construction is inspected by District personnel for conformance with the approved plans and specifications and the Requirements. Whenever the Contractor desires to work outside the regular or specified work periods or to vary the work period during any particular day, Contractor shall request permission from the District at least 24 hours in advance so that inspection services may be provided. If the District grants permission and if the work period includes hours outside the normal work hours of the District, the Developer shall pay for the inspection services provided outside of normal work hours in accordance with established District rates. Construction shall not begin until the "Notice to Proceed" is given by the District inspector nor until the Developer, or other authorized party, completes a "CERTIFICATION OF STREETS TO FINAL GRADE" for the streets in which the water pipelines are to be constructed. District inspection is for the purpose of conformance of construction with District requirements, and not for compliance by the Contractor with safety requirements. Inspection or final acceptance shall not constitute a waiver by the District of any claims against Developer and/or Contractor for any defects in the work performed hereunder and shall not result in the imposition on District of any liability with regards to the same. Developer shall guarantee the completion of construction of the Work by _____
_____. Developer agrees to pay all costs incurred by the District as it may incur and as may be necessary in connection with Contractor completing the Work, including administrative costs.
- 6. Insurance and Indemnity.** Developer's contractor shall provide required insurance certificates and endorsements as outlined below:

6.1 Indemnification: To the extent permitted by law, Developer (as well as Contractor and any other contractors or subcontractors hired to do any construction work), shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers from and against all claims, damages, losses and

expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs to defend arising out of the performance of the work described herein, and caused in whole or in part by any negligent act or omission of the Contractor, any subcontractor, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone whose acts any of them may be liable, except where caused by the active negligence, sole negligence, or willful misconduct of the Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers.

6.2 Minimum Insurance Requirements: The Developer shall require Contractor (including any contractors or subcontractors hired to do any construction work) to procure and maintain for the duration of the proposed construction, insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the proposed construction and the activities of the Contractor, guests, agents, representatives, employees or contractors and subcontractors. The Developer's contractor shall provide and maintain the following commercial general liability, automobile liability, workers' compensation coverages as permitted by law:

6.3 Coverage: Coverage shall be at least as broad as the following:

- a) **General Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits of at least two million dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. If Commercial General Liability Insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the project/location (with the ISO CG 25 03, or ISO CG 25 04, or insurer's equivalent endorsement provided to MSWD) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- b) **Automobile Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Business Auto Coverage (Form CA 00 01), covering Symbol 1 (any auto) or if Contractor has no owned autos, Symbol 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned) with limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage each accident.
- c) **Workers' Compensation Coverage** – By his/her signature hereunder, Developer certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and it shall cause Contractor to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this agreement. Contractors and sub-contractors will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this Agreement. The Contractor shall provide workers' compensation coverage as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. **Waiver of Subrogation** (also known as Transfer of Rights of Recovery Against Others to Us): The Contractor will be required to waive rights of subrogation to obtain endorsement necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation in favor of the Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers, for losses paid under the terms of this coverage which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for the Mission Springs Water District; this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Mission Springs Water District has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

- d) **Builder's Risk – (Course of Construction)** if necessary- insurance utilizing an “All Risk” (Special Perils) coverage form with limits equal to the completed value of the project and no coinsurance penalty provision.
- e) **Contractor's Pollution Liability – (optional: if project involves environmental hazards)** with limits no less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$10,000,000 policy aggregate.

If the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the District requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the District.

6.4 Required Provisions - The Commercial General Liability policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

- a) **Additional Insured Status:** MSWD, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are to be given insured status (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 12 05 09 or for projects including construction ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 10 01 and CG 20 37 10 01 including ongoing and completed operations), as respects: liability arising out of the work or activities performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations, and automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers.
- b) **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this project, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects to the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers; shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

6.5 Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the Mission Springs Water District.

6.6 Acceptability of Insurers: Insurance is to be placed with insurers having a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, or as otherwise approved by Mission Springs Water District.

The Contractor agrees and he/she will comply with such provisions before commencing project. All of the insurance shall be provided on policy forms and through companies satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District. Mission Springs Water District reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including policy Declaration and Endorsement pages. Failure to continually satisfy the Insurance requirements is a material breach of contract.

6.7 Verification of Coverage: Contractor shall furnish the District with certificates and amendatory endorsements affecting coverage required by the above provisions. All

certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the District least five days before the Contractor commences activities.

6.8 Contractors and Subcontractors: Contractor shall require and verify that all Contractors and subcontractors maintain the liability insurance requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are additional insureds on the commercial general liability insurance policy of all Contractors who hire subcontractors to perform work on the scheduled project with a form at least as broad as CG 20 38 04 13.

6.9 Continuation of Coverage: Contractor shall maintain for the duration of the contract, and for 5 years thereafter, insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors. Contractor shall be required to waive all rights of subrogation under this Agreement. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall be required to provide a renewal Certificate including the Additional Insured endorsement to the District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.

6.10 Other Considerations/Exceptions: When the Mission Springs Water District determines that any construction work may involve potential environmental pollution liability, the Commercial General Liability policy shall include Contractor's Pollution Liability –with limits no less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$10,000,000 policy aggregate.

7. Bonds. Developer shall provide the District with bonds or evidence of bonds as follows:

- a) Performance bond with corporate surety or sureties satisfactory to the District said performance bond being for not less than one hundred percent (100%) of the total contract price.
- b) A labor and materials payment bond being for not less than one hundred percent (100%) of the total contract price.

8. Notice of Completion. The District's Inspector shall complete a "Notice of Final Inspection" when all work has been completed in accordance with District requirements and prior to the Acceptance of said domestic water system by the District. An executed Notice of Completion shall be filed by the District. The Developer shall comply with the following requirements:

- a) A Bill of Sale executed by the Developer vesting title of said water system and appurtenances to the District;
- b) A copy of the contract between Developer and Developer's Contractor or other documents which verify the actual cost of the domestic water system as installed.
- c) Payment to the District by the Developer of any and all applicable fees including, but not limited to Connection Charge, Fire flow or front footage fee, and meter installation fees.

9. Warranty. The Developer shall guarantee the entire work shall be constructed in a good and workman like manner and all materials furnished shall be new and of high quality and both of

the forgoing will meet all the requirements specified herein. This warranty shall include both the quality of the workmanship and the materials used as well as that of subcontractors and suppliers.

- a) The Developer shall agree to make any repairs or replacements made necessary by defective materials or workmanship in the pipe materials supplied which have become evident within one year after date of recording Notice of Completion, and to restore to full compliance with the requirements of these specifications, including the test requirements, any part of the water system, which during said one-year period, is found to be deficient with respect to any provision of this specification.
- b) The Developer shall make all repairs and replacements promptly upon receipt of written orders from MSWD or if, in the event the repair work must be performed by MSWD, shall reimburse MSWD for actual labor, equipment and material expenses incurred to perform such corrective work. If the Developer fails to make the repair and replacements promptly, MSWD may do the work, and the Developer shall be liable to MSWD for the cost thereof as described above.

10. Water Services. The District will not furnish service to the water system until the completed system passes final inspection by the District, and Developer has fully complied with all provisions of this Agreement. Following fulfillment of the terms and conditions herein and acceptance by the District of said domestic water system, the District will provide service to said lands in accordance with the District's rules and regulations governing the provisions of such service. District requires that a permanent meter must be installed prior to landscaping.

11. Successors and Assigns. This agreement is binding on the assigns of the District and on the assigns, successors and representatives of the Developer. Assignment of this agreement by the Developer shall require the prior written consent of the District.

12. Contractor's License. The Contractor must possess at the time of commencing work and throughout the Project duration, a Contractor's License, issued by the State of California, which is current and in good standing. The Developer and Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor working on the Project possesses at the time of commencing work and throughout the Project duration, a Contractor's License, issued by the State of California, which is current and in good standing.

13. Corporation In Good Standing. If Contractor and/or Developer is a corporation or other entity, the undersigned hereby represents and warrants that the corporation or other entity is duly incorporated and in good standing in the State of California, and that the undersigned is authorized to act for and bind the corporation.

14. Provisions Required by Law. Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted herein and the Agreement shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not currently inserted, then upon application of either party the Agreement shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.

15. Attorneys' Fees. In the event that either party brings an action to enforce this Agreement, the prevailing party in such action shall be entitled to an award of the costs and expenses

incurred in connection with such action including but not limited to attorneys fees, expert witness fees, and filing fees.

16. Entire Agreement. This Agreement and the Exhibits and Recitals to this Agreement, which are incorporated herein by this reference, constitute the entire contract of the parties. No other agreements or contracts, whether oral or written, pertaining to the work to be performed, exists between the parties. This Agreement can be modified only by an amendment in writing, signed by both parties.

- a) **General Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury and personal & advertising injury with limits of at least two million dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. If Commercial General Liability Insurance or other form with a general aggregate limit, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the project/location (with the ISO CG 25 03, or ISO CG 25 04, or insurer's equivalent endorsement provided to MSWD) or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
- b) **Automobile Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Business Auto Coverage (Form CA 00 01), covering Symbol 1 (any auto) or if Contractor has no owned autos, Symbol 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned) with limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage each accident.
- c) **Workers' Compensation Coverage** – By his/her signature hereunder, Developer certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and it shall cause Contractor to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this agreement. Contractors and sub-contractors will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement. The Contractor shall provide workers' compensation coverage as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. **Waiver of Subrogation** (also known as Transfer of Rights of Recovery Against Others to Us): The Contractor will be required to waive rights of subrogation to obtain endorsement necessary to affect this waiver of subrogation in favor of the Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers, for losses paid under the terms of this coverage which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for the Mission Springs Water District; this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Mission Springs Water District has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer.

- d) **Builder's Risk – (Course of Construction)** if necessary- insurance utilizing an “All Risk” (Special Perils) coverage form with limits equal to the completed value of the project and no coinsurance penalty provision.
- e) **Contractor's Pollution Liability – (optional: if project involves environmental hazards)** with limits no less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$10,000,000 policy aggregate.

If the Contractor maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the District requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the District.

6.4 Required Provisions - The Commercial General Liability policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

- a) **Additional Insured Status:** MSWD, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are to be given insured status (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 12 05 09 or for projects including construction ISO Form CG 20 10 11 85 or both CG 20 10 10 01 and CG 20 37 10 01 including ongoing and completed operations), as respects: liability arising out of the work or activities performed by or on behalf of the Contractor including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations, and automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers.
- b) **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this project, the Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects to the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers; shall be excess of the Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

6.5 Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the Mission Springs Water District.

6.6 Acceptability of Insurers: Insurance is to be placed with insurers having a current A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, or as otherwise approved by Mission Springs Water District.

The Contractor agrees and he/she will comply with such provisions before commencing project. All of the insurance shall be provided on policy forms and through companies satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District. Mission Springs Water District reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including policy Declaration and Endorsement pages. Failure to continually satisfy the Insurance requirements is a material breach of contract.

6.7 Verification of Coverage: Contractor shall furnish the District with certificates and amendatory endorsements affecting coverage required by the above provisions. All

certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the District least five days before the Contractor commences activities.

6.8 Contractors and Subcontractors: Contractor shall require and verify that all Contractors and subcontractors maintain the liability insurance requirements stated herein, and Contractor shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are additional insureds on the commercial general liability insurance policy of all Contractors who hire subcontractors to perform work on the scheduled project with a form at least as broad as CG 20 38 04 13.

6.9 Continuation of Coverage: The Contractor shall, Contractor shall maintain for the duration of the contract, and for 5 years thereafter, insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees, or subcontractors. Contractor shall be required to waive all rights of subrogation under this Agreement. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor shall be required to provide a renewal Certificate including the Additional Insured endorsement to the District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.

6.10 Other Considerations/Exceptions: When the Mission Springs Water District determines that any construction work may involve potential environmental pollution liability, the Commercial General Liability policy shall include Contractor's Pollution Liability –with limits no less than \$5,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$10,000,000 policy aggregate.

7. Bonds. Developer shall provide the District with bonds or evidence of bonds as follows:

- a) Performance bond with corporate surety or sureties satisfactory to the District said performance bond being for not less than one hundred percent (100%) of the total contract price.
- b) A labor and materials payment bond being for not less than one hundred percent (100%) of the total contract price.

8. Notice of Completion. The District's Inspector shall complete a "Notice of Final Inspection" when all work has been completed in accordance with District requirements and prior to the Acceptance of said sewer system by the District. An executed Notice of Completion shall be filed by the District. The Developer shall comply with the following requirements:

- a) A Bill of Sale executed by the Developer vesting title of said sewer system and appurtenances to the District;
- b) A copy of the contract between Developer and Developer's Contractor or other documents which verify the actual cost of the sewer system as installed.
- c) Payment to the District by the Developer of any and all applicable fees including, but not limited to Connection Charge, Fire flow or front footage fee, and meter installation fees.

- 9. Warranty.** The Developer shall guarantee the entire work shall be constructed in a good and workman like manner and all materials furnished shall be new and of high quality and both of the forgoing will meet all the requirements specified herein. This warranty shall include both the quality of the workmanship and the materials used as well as that of subcontractors and suppliers.
- a) The Developer shall agree to make any repairs or replacements made necessary by defective materials or workmanship in the pipe materials supplied which have become evident within one year after date of recording Notice of Completion, and to restore to full compliance with the requirements of these specifications, including the test requirements, any part of the sewer system, which during said one-year period, is found to be deficient with respect to any provision of this specification.
 - b) The Developer shall make all repairs and replacements promptly upon receipt of written orders from MSWD or if, in the event the repair work must be performed by MSWD, shall reimburse MSWD for actual labor, equipment and material expenses incurred to perform such corrective work. If the Developer fails to make the repair and replacements promptly, MSWD may do the work, and the Developer shall be liable to MSWD for the cost thereof as described above.
- 10. Sewer Services.** The District will not furnish service to the sewer system until the completed system passes final inspection by the District, and Developer has fully complied with all provisions of this Agreement. Following fulfillment of the terms and conditions herein and acceptance by the District of said sewer system, the District will provide service to said lands in accordance with the District's rules and regulations governing the provisions of such service. District requires that a permanent meter must be installed prior to landscaping.
- 11. Successors and Assigns.** This agreement is binding on the assigns of the District and on the assigns, successors and representatives of the Developer. Assignment of this agreement by the Developer shall require the prior written consent of the District.
- 12. Contractor's License.** The Contractor must possess at the time of commencing work and throughout the Project duration, a Contractor's License, issued by the State of California, which is current and in good standing. The Developer and Contractor shall ensure that any subcontractor working on the Project possesses at the time of commencing work and throughout the Project duration, a Contractor's License, issued by the State of California, which is current and in good standing.
- 13. Corporation In Good Standing.** If Contractor and/or Developer is a corporation or other entity, the undersigned hereby represents and warrants that the corporation or other entity is duly incorporated and in good standing in the State of California, and that the undersigned is authorized to act for and bind the corporation.
- 14. Provisions Required by Law.** Each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to be inserted herein and the Agreement shall be read and enforced as though it were included herein, and if through mistake or otherwise any such provision is not inserted, or is not currently inserted, then upon application of either party the Agreement shall forthwith be physically amended to make such insertion or correction.

15. Attorneys' Fees. In the event that either party brings an action to enforce this Agreement, the prevailing party in such action shall be entitled to an award of the costs and expenses incurred in connection with such action including but not limited to attorneys fees, expert witness fees, and filing fees.

16. Entire Agreement. This Agreement and the Exhibits and Recitals to this Agreement, which are incorporated herein by this reference, constitute the entire contract of the parties. No other agreements or contracts, whether oral or written, pertaining to the work to be performed, exists between the parties. This Agreement can be modified only by an amendment in writing, signed by both parties.

AWARD OF CONTRACT TO MWH CONSTRUCTORS, INC. FOR CONSTRUCTION MANAGEMENT AND INSPECTION SERVICES FOR SKYBORNE VILLAGE III – LENNAR HOMES

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the General Manager to execute a contract agreement with MWH Constructors, Inc., for an amount not to exceed \$285,572 for construction management and inspection services for Skyborne Village III – Lennar Homes.

SUMMARY

MWH Constructors, Inc. was previously selected through a competitive review process to perform on-call Construction Management and Inspection services for the District for various types of projects for both development and capital improvement. MWH Constructors provided a scope and fee to provide inspection services for the Skyborne Village III – Lennar Homes Project. The scope of work involves inspection of over 11,800 linear feet of waterline, 286 water services, and the installation of 32 fire hydrants. Likewise, inspection and management services also include the inspection of 11,000 linear feet of sewer lines, 8,400 linear feet of sewer laterals, and 49 sewer manholes. Inspection will be performed by an experienced field inspector and will be per MSWD standards. These services include project construction and coordination with the developer’s contractor and MSWD staff.

ANALYSIS

MSWD is retaining MWH Constructors to provide Inspection services for the Skyborne Village III – Lennar homes project during pre-construction, construction, and post-construction phases of the development project. Staff will continually monitor the developer’s deposit account to ensure adequate funds are available for the inspection costs by MWH Constructors, Inc.

FISCAL IMPACT & STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

There is no fiscal impact to the District as this is a developer-driven project, and all costs associated will be paid for by the developer. This action is consistent with Strategic Plan Goal 4.3- Maintain and renew assets while facilitating strategic Capital Improvements.

Self-Insured Retentions - Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Mission Springs Water District. The Mission Springs Water District may require the Consultant to provide proof of ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers shall be in excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - Consultant shall require and verify that all sub-consultants maintain insurance meeting all requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are an additional insured on Commercial General Liability Coverage.
 - The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- g. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this agreement, the Consultant shall deliver the renewal certificate(s) to Mission Springs Water District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.
- h. Consultant shall not accept direction or orders from any person other than the General Manager or the person(s) whose name(s) is (are) inserted on Page 1 as "other Authorized Representative(s)."
- i. Payment, unless otherwise specified on Page 1, is to be within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District.
- j. Consultant hereby specifically represents and warrants to District that it possesses the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this agreement in a competent and professional manner, without the advice or direction of District and that the services to be rendered pursuant to this agreement shall be performed in accordance with the standards customarily applicable to an experienced and competent professional rendering the same or similar services in the state of California. Consultant further represents and warrants that it possesses all required licenses necessary or applicable to the performance of the services under this agreement. Professional permits required by governmental authorities will be obtained at Consultant's expense, and Consultant will comply with applicable local, state, and federal regulations and statutes including but not limited to Cal/OSHA requirements.
- k. Any change in the scope of the professional services to be done, method of performance, nature of materials or price thereof, or to any other matter materially affecting the performance or nature of the professional services will not be paid for or accepted unless such change, addition or deletion is approved in advance, in writing by a supplemental agreement executed by Mission Springs Water District. Consultant's covenant under this section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.

Consultant shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to sales, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by the Mission Springs Water District or the Authorized Representative. The Consultant shall maintain adequate records on services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of service. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. At all times during regular business hours, Consultant shall provide access to such books and records to the Authorized Representative or his or her designees and shall give the Authorized Representative or his or her designees the right to examine and audit such books and records and to make transcripts as necessary, and shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement.
- p. This Agreement is personal to the Consultant. Any attempt to assign or subcontract any right or obligation hereunder by the Consultant shall be void unless approved in writing in advance by the Authorized Representative. Consultant's services pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided by the representative or directly under the supervision of the representative and Consultant shall not assign another to supervise the Consultant's performance of this Agreement without the prior written approval of the Mission Springs Water District, by and through the Authorized Representative.
- q. Consultant shall not maintain, commit, or permit the maintenance or commission of any nuisance in connection with the performance of services under this Agreement.
- r. Consultant agrees to be familiar with and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local conflict of Interest laws, including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act (California Government Code Sections 81000, et seq.) and California Government Code Section 1090. During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall retain the right to perform similar services for other clients, but Consultant and its officers, employees, associates, and subconsultants shall not, without the prior written approval of the Authorized Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Consultant is not currently performing work that would require Consultant or one of its officers, employees, associates or subconsultants to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict-of-interest statute.
- s. A waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement whether of the same or different character.
- t. The Consultant shall commence, carry on, and complete all required tasks with all practicable dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner in accordance with all applicable laws and generally accepted industry standards.
- u. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. The Mission Springs Water District shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than the Consultant.
- v. In no event shall the making by the Mission Springs Water District of any payment to the Consultant constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of covenant, or any default which may then exist, on the part of the Consultant, and the making of any such payment by the Mission Springs Water District while any such breach or default shall exist shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Mission Springs Water District with regard to such breach or default.
- w. If any legal action is necessary to enforce any provision of this Agreement or for damages by reason of an alleged breach of any provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to receive

from the losing Party all costs and expenses in such amount as the courts may determine to be reasonable. In awarding the cost of litigation, the court shall not be bound by any court fee schedule, but shall, if it is in the interest of justice to do so, award the full amount of costs, expenses, and attorneys' and experts' fees paid or incurred in good faith.

- x. In the performance of the work required by this Agreement, Consultant shall abide by and conform with and to any and all applicable laws of the United States and the State of California, and with the local County and Municipal Code, ordinances, regulations and policies.
- y. If any part, term, or provision of this Agreement shall be held illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any law of a federal, state, or local government having jurisdiction over this Agreement, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions shall not be affected by such holding.
- z. The terms of this Agreement shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of California. Should litigation occur, venue shall be the Superior Court of Riverside County, California.
- aa. This Agreement represents the entire Agreement between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant with respect to the subject matter hereto and supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations, or agreements. No verbal agreement or implied covenant shall be held to vary the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and any subsequent successors and assigns. In the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and Consultant's proposal or Quote, and Exhibits hereto, the provisions of this Agreement shall control.
- bb. Precedence of Exhibits. All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated in this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- cc. Consultant will act hereunder as an independent consultant. This agreement shall not and is not intended to constitute Consultant as an agent, servant, or employee of the Mission Springs Water District and shall not and is not intended to create the relationship of partnership, joint venture or association between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant.
- dd. Each of the signatories herein hereby represents that he or she has the authority to execute the Agreement on behalf of his or her contracting party.
- ee. In the event the Consultant performs additional or different services than those described herein without the prior written approval of the Contract Manager, Consultant shall not be compensated for such services. Consultant expressly waives any right to be compensated for services and materials not covered by the scope of this Agreement or authorized by the District in writing.
- ff. Consultant shall promptly advise the Contract Manager as soon as reasonably practicable upon gaining knowledge of a condition, event or accumulation of events which may affect the scope and/or cost of Services. All proposed changes, modifications, deletions and/or requests for additional services shall be reduced to writing for review and approval by the District.
- gg. Consultant shall perform all services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement and the proposal. In the event that the terms of the proposal conflict with the terms of this agreement or contain additional terms that purport to bind the District, the terms of this agreement shall govern and said additional or conflicting terms shall be of no force or effect.

CONTRACT AGREEMENT RENEWAL WITH INTELESYS COMMUNICATIONS SERVICES FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended to authorize the General Manager to enter into a contract with Intelesys Communications Services for Information Technology (IT) Professional Services for the twelve-month period of July 1st, 2024 to June 30th, 2025, and do all things necessary to execute the agreement.

SUMMARY

The District requires complementary IT services to the day-to-day work that the IT Manager performs, including tracking individual workstation problems, software updates, server maintenance and anti-virus monitoring after hours. Intelesys Communications onboarded the District in January and became the District’s IT Professional Services provider on 2/1/2024. The initial contract period was 1/1/2024 - 6/30/2024 with the intent of being a 6-month trial period, also enabling the District to align the annual renewal with the start of the fiscal year.

ANALYSIS

Intelesys has proven themselves a capable service provider. They have proactively proposed and implemented innovative solutions and policies to improve the District’s cybersecurity posture.

The amount of this contract was included as part of the 2025 fiscal year budget. - a. When the law establishes a professional standard of care for Consultant's services, to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant will immediately defend, indemnify and hold harmless Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers against any and all liability from all claims and demands of all persons that arise out of, pertain to, or relate to the Consultant's negligence, recklessness, or willful misconduct in the performance (or actual or alleged non-performance) of the work under this agreement. Consultant shall defend itself against any and all liabilities, claims, losses, damages, and costs arising out of or alleged to arise out of Consultant's performance or non-performance of the work hereunder and shall not tender such claims to Mission Springs Water District nor to its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers, for defense or indemnity.
- b. Other than in the performance of professional services, to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant will immediately defend, indemnify and hold harmless Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees and authorized volunteers from all claims and demands of all persons arising out the performance of the work or furnishing of materials; including but not limited to, claims by the Consultant or Consultant's employees for damages to persons or property except for the sole negligence or willful misconduct or active negligence of Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- c. By his/her signature hereunder, Consultant certifies that he/she is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and that Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the professional services under this agreement. Consultant and sub-consultants will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement.
- d. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, a certificate of insurance satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing professional liability coverage of not less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate, that coverage shall not be cancelled except with notice to Mission Springs Water District. Coverage is to be placed with a carrier with an A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, or equivalent, or as otherwise approved by Mission Springs Water District. The retroactive date (if any) is to be no later than the effective date of this agreement. The Consultant shall maintain such coverage continuously for a period of at least five (5) years after the completion of the contract work. Consultant shall purchase a five-year extended reporting period i) if the retroactive date is advanced past the effective date of this Agreement; ii) if the policy is canceled or not renewed; or iii) if the policy is replaced by another claims-made policy with a retroactive date subsequent to the effective date of this Agreement. In the event that the Consultant employs other Consultants (sub-Consultants) as part of the work covered by this agreement, it shall be the Consultant's responsibility to require and confirm that each sub-Consultant meets the minimum insurance requirements specified above.
- e. **Verification of Coverage** – Consultant shall furnish the District with certificates and amendatory endorsements, or copies of the applicable policy language affecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the District before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The District reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including policy Declaration pages and Endorsement pages.
- f. Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the Consultant, his agents, representatives, employees, or sub-consultants. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, certificates of insurance (Acord Form 25 or equivalent) satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing:

Coverage – Coverage shall be at least as broad as the following:

- 1. **Commercial General Liability (CGL)** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) including products and completed operations, property

damage, bodily injury, personal and advertising injury with limit of at least coverage of not less than two million (\$2,000,000) per occurrence or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (coverage as broad as ISO CG 25 03, or ISO CG 25 04 endorsements provided to District), or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.

2. **Automobile Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Business Auto Coverage (Form CA 00 01), covering Symbol 1 (any auto) or if the Consultant has no owned autos, Symbol 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned) with limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage each accident.
3. **Workers' Compensation Insurance** - as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. **Waiver of Subrogation:** The insurer(s) named above agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the Mission Springs Water District, its elected or appointed officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for the Agency; but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Mission Springs Water District has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer. Consultant is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the professional services under this agreement. Consultant and sub-consultants will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement. Sole proprietors with no employees, acknowledge that they are not subject to the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of California and agree to complete a signed workers compensation exemption form.
4. **Cyber Liability Insurance** (Technology Professional Liability - Errors and Omissions), with limits of not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$2,000,000 aggregate or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. Coverage shall be sufficiently broad to respond to the duties and obligations as is undertaken by Consultant in this Agreement and shall include, but not be limited to, claims involving infringement of intellectual property, including but not limited to infringement of copyright, trademark, trade dress, invasion of privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, release of private information, alteration of electronic information, extortion and network security. The policy shall provide coverage for breach response costs as well as regulatory fines and penalties as well as credit monitoring expenses with limits sufficient to respond to these obligations.

If Claims Made Policies:

1. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
2. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.

If the Consultant maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the District requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the District.

Notice of Cancellation: Each insurance policy required above shall provide that coverage shall not be canceled, except with notice to the Mission Springs Water District.

Self-Insured Retentions - Self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Mission Springs Water District. The Mission Springs Water District may require the Consultant to provide proof of

ability to pay losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses within the retention. The policy language shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that the self-insured retention may be satisfied by either the named insured or Member Water Agency.

Required Provisions:

- **Additional Insured Status:** Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers or using the language that states "as required by written contract." are to be given insured status (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 10 01), with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.
 - **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this project, the consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects to the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers shall be in excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - Consultant shall require and verify that all sub-consultants maintain insurance meeting all requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are an additional insured on Commercial General Liability Coverage.
 - The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- g. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this agreement, the Consultant shall deliver the renewal certificate(s) to Mission Springs Water District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.
- h. Consultant shall not accept direction or orders from any person other than the General Manager or the person(s) whose name(s) is (are) inserted on Page 1 as "other Authorized Representative(s)."
- i. Payment, unless otherwise specified on Page 1, is to be within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District.
- j. Consultant hereby specifically represents and warrants to District that it possesses the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this agreement in a competent and professional manner, without the advice or direction of District and that the services to be rendered pursuant to this agreement shall be performed in accordance with the standards customarily applicable to an experienced and competent professional rendering the same or similar services in the state of California. Consultant further represents and warrants that it possesses all required licenses necessary or applicable to the performance of the services under this agreement. Professional permits required by governmental authorities will be obtained at Consultant's expense, and Consultant will comply with applicable local, state, and federal regulations and statutes including but not limited to Cal/OSHA requirements.
- k. Any change in the scope of the professional services to be done, method of performance, nature of materials or price thereof, or to any other matter materially affecting the performance or nature of the professional services will not be paid for or accepted unless such change, addition or deletion is approved in advance, in writing by a supplemental agreement executed by Mission Springs Water District. Consultant's "Authorized Representative(s)" has (have) the authority to execute such written change for Consultant.
- l. Unless otherwise agreed upon in writing, all reports, documents, or other written material, including any documents, images, photographs, video files, or other media created or developed by Consultant as part of the services required hereunder ("Written Products") shall be considered to be "works made for hire", and all Written Products and any and all intellectual property rights arising from their creation, including, but not limited to, all copyrights and all other proprietary rights, shall be and remain the property of

Mission Springs Water District without restriction or limitation upon their use, duplication or dissemination by Mission Springs Water District, except as otherwise provided herein. The Consultant shall not obtain or attempt to obtain copyright protection as to any of the Written Products.

During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall retain the right to perform similar services for other clients, but Consultant and its officers, employees, associates, and subconsultants shall not, without the prior written approval of the Authorized Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Consultant is not currently performing work that would require Consultant or one of its officers, employees, associates or subconsultants to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict-of-interest statute.
- s. A waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement whether of the same or different character.
- t. The Consultant shall commence, carry on, and complete all required tasks with all practicable dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner in accordance with all applicable laws and generally accepted industry standards.
- u. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. The Mission Springs Water District shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than the Consultant.
- v. In no event shall the making by the Mission Springs Water District of any payment to the Consultant constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of covenant, or any default which may then exist, on the part of the Consultant, and the making of any such payment by

the Mission Springs Water District while any such breach or default shall exist shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Mission Springs Water District with regard to such breach or default.

- w. If any legal action is necessary to enforce any provision of this Agreement or for damages by reason of an alleged breach of any provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to receive from the losing Party all costs and expenses in such amount as the courts may determine to be reasonable. In awarding the cost of litigation, the court shall not be bound by any court fee schedule, but shall, if it is in the interest of justice to do so, award the full amount of costs, expenses, and attorneys' and experts' fees paid or incurred in good faith.
- x. In the performance of the work required by this Agreement, Consultant shall abide by and conform with and to any and all applicable laws of the United States and the State of California, and with the local County and Municipal Code, ordinances, regulations and policies.
- y. If any part, term, or provision of this Agreement shall be held illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any law of a federal, state, or local government having jurisdiction over this Agreement, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions shall not be affected by such holding.
- z. The terms of this Agreement shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of California. Should litigation occur, venue shall be the Superior Court of Riverside County, California.
- aa. This Agreement represents the entire Agreement between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant with respect to the subject matter hereto and supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations, or agreements. No verbal agreement or implied covenant shall be held to vary the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and any subsequent successors and assigns. In the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and Consultant's proposal or Quote, and Exhibits hereto, the provisions of this Agreement shall control.
- bb. Precedence of Exhibits. All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated in this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- cc. Consultant will act hereunder as an independent consultant. This agreement shall not and is not intended to constitute Consultant as an agent, servant, or employee of the Mission Springs Water District and shall not and is not intended to create the relationship of partnership, joint venture or association between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant.
- dd. Each of the signatories herein hereby represents that he or she has the authority to execute the Agreement on behalf of his or her contracting party.
- ee. Consultant shall be paid at the rates set forth in the Proposal and shall not increase any rate without the prior written consent of the District. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, total fees and charges paid by the District to the Consultant under this Agreement shall not exceed the contract price specified on Page 1.
 - 1. Consultant shall not be compensated for any Services rendered nor reimbursed for any expenses incurred in excess of those authorized unless approved in advance by the District, in writing.
 - 2. Consultant shall submit to District, on or before the fifteenth (15th) of each month, itemized invoices for the Services rendered in the previous month. The District shall not be obligated to pay any invoice that is submitted more than sixty (60) days after the due date of such invoice. The District shall have the right to review and audit all invoices prior to or after payment to Consultant. This review and audit may include, but not be limited to District's:

- i. Determination that any hourly fee charged is consistent with this Agreement's approved hourly rate schedule;
 - ii. Determination that the multiplication of the hours billed times the approved rate schedule dollars is correct;
 - iii. Determination that each item charged is the usual, customary, and reasonable charge for the particular item. If the District determines an item charged is greater than usual, customary, or reasonable, or is duplicative, ambiguous, excessive, or inappropriate, District shall either return the bill to Consultant with a request for explanation or adjust the payment accordingly and give notice to Consultant of the adjustment.
3. If the work is satisfactorily completed, District shall pay such invoice within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District. Should the District dispute any portion of any invoice, District shall pay the undisputed portion within the time stated above, and at the same time advise Consultant in writing of the disputed portion.
- ff. In the event the Consultant performs additional or different services than those described herein without the prior written approval of the Project Manager, Consultant shall not be compensated for such services. Consultant expressly waives any right to be compensated for services and materials not covered by the scope of this Agreement or authorized by the District in writing.
- gg. Consultant shall promptly advise the Project Manager as soon as reasonably practicable upon gaining knowledge of a condition, event or accumulation of events which may affect the scope and/or cost of Services. All proposed changes, modifications, deletions and/or requests for additional services shall be reduced to writing for review and approval by the District.
- hh. Consultant shall perform all services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement and the proposal. In the event that the terms of the proposal conflict with the terms of this agreement or contain additional terms that purport to bind the District, the terms of this agreement shall govern and said additional or conflicting terms shall be of no force or effect.

4.2.2 Executive Summary

Thank you for allowing Intelesys the opportunity to present our proposal recommendations on the Mission Springs Water District's RFP for managed IT services. As a top provider of solutions and management for local government in Southern California for the last 20 years, Intelesys has thorough knowledge of the unique municipal needs in technology services.



Our firm has consistently engaged in municipal projects exceeding over \$1M in scope and multiple years in duration. With 20 employees, Intelesys has staff available for support 24x7x365 to assist in emergency situations with quick local dispatch when needed. All of our work is completed by company employees, we do not subcontract out any labor.

Intelesys has made a strategic decision to specialize exclusively in the municipal and government market space to build a level of expertise that can be shared across our client base. This approach allows us to share strategies, be aware of industry impacting issues, and to educate ourselves on the software commonly utilized within the industry. We are one of the very few select managed service providers that attend the annual Municipal Information Systems Association of California (MISAC) conference where information-technology directors gather to share ideas and learn about new challenges facing the municipal industry. As a platinum sponsor that has been involved in this organization for 15 years, Intelesys utilizes this peer group as a key component of continued education to support our clients.

Then in 2020, Laborers was hit with a network breach and engaged Intelesys to monitor, manage, and maintain their network on an ongoing basis. Charles Henigan has been instrumental in identifying network vulnerabilities, and locking down the network security to conform to the NIST standards. They have not had a network event since Intelesys took over. Their monthly contract is \$7,374.

Every support issue is tracked and documented in our ticketing system. All work performed and time invested in each ticket is detailed and audited for accuracy. Clients have access to managing and reviewing their tickets through our secure Client Portal.

Our service team maintains a close pulse on all active tickets, monitoring and acting in real-time to adjust allocated resources, manage to priorities, and maintain our SLA commitments. We utilize live dashboards throughout our facility to enable a constant awareness of open tickets. Whenever an SLA is within a 10% potential threshold of missing a committed target, the request turns red and is flagged at the management level to ensure proper resources are allocated to complete the tasks required.

If a more detailed scope of work is required on our part, it will be addressed on a project by project basis.

5.1 Transition

INTELESYS' WHITE GLOVE ONBOARDING

Intelesys' White Glove Onboarding process was designed to deliver an incredibly smooth transition from your existing IT support to our team. 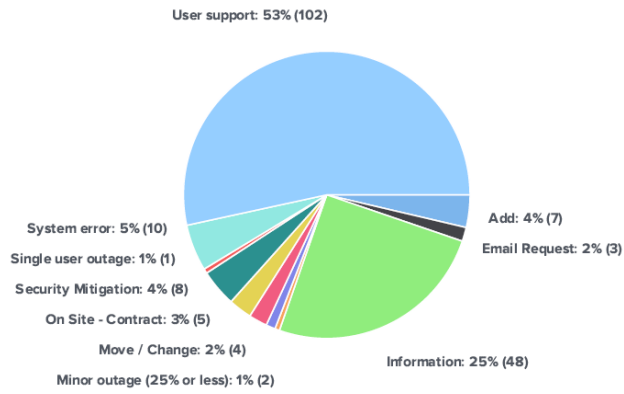
REPORTING

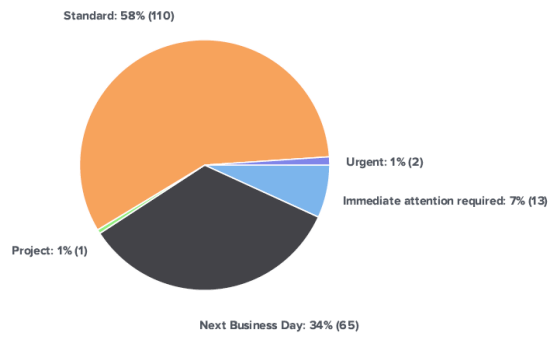
TICKET STATISTICS

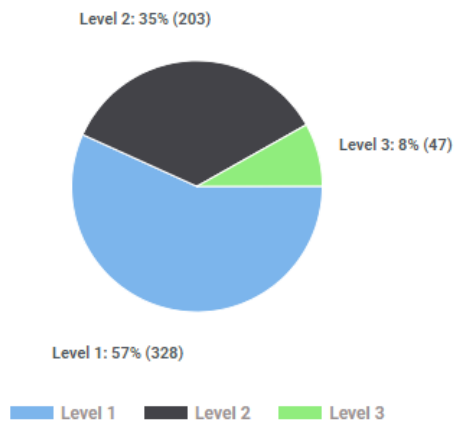
Tickets Received by Type

Term, Early Termination & Notice

Information Technology Management Services and Support

A. Term of Agreement

This professional services agreement shall be effective upon approval and execution by the parties hereof (the “effective date”) and shall continue until terminated as provided for herein. Notwithstanding anything in this agreement to the contrary, this agreement shall automatically terminate after six (6) months from the effective date, unless extended by the parties with the approval of the Mission Springs Water District (sometimes referred to herein as “District”).

B. Early Termination of Agreement

Notwithstanding any other provision of this agreement, Mission Springs Water District, at its sole option, may terminate this agreement with or without cause, or for no cause or for convenience at any time by giving thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant.

District has the right to terminate or abandon any portion or all the work under this Agreement by giving thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant. In such event, District shall immediately be given possession, title and access to all administrative accounts and data (including any passwords) required, necessary or desirable for complete access to and management of any data/asset/service created, stored, maintained or setup for the District, all original field notes, drawings and specifications, written reports, and other documents and data produced or developed for that portion of the work completed and/or being abandoned. The District will pay Consultant at the agreed upon rate set forth in the Schedule of Charges rendered for any portion of the work completed prior to termination where the District finds the work acceptable. If said termination occurs prior to completion of any task for the Project for which a payment request has not been received, the charge for services deemed acceptable by District will be pursuant to the rates set forth in the Schedule of Charges but not to exceed the reasonable value of such services. The District shall not be liable for any costs other than the charges or portions thereof which are specified herein. Consultant shall not be entitled to payment for unperformed services or work deemed unacceptable by District and shall not be entitled to damages or compensation for termination of work.

Consultant may terminate its obligation to provide further services under this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the District only in the event of substantial failure by the District to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement through no fault of Consultant.

AWARD OF CONTRACT AGREEMENT WITH TRIMBLE FOR WORK ORDER AND ASSET MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE SUBSCRIPTION AND SUPPORT SERVICES

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Authorize the General Manager to execute a three-year contract with Trimble Inc. for work order and asset management software subscription and support services in the amount of \$139,584.00, plus a 10% contingency for a total of \$153,542.40 and authorize the General Manager to do all things necessary to complete the project.

SUMMARY

On February 20, 2024 the board approved the contract agreement for the Complete Deployment of the ARCGIS Enterprise, Utility Network, and CityWorks to Timmons Group. Included in the contract with Timmons was the proposal for the software needed for the Work Order and Asset Management Software that is managed by another company. Trimble is the licensing company that will allow the District to use the CityWorks Work Order and Asset Management Systems. In Trimble’s own words “from the office to the field, Trimble CityWorks helps you improve service to your community while increasing safety, efficiency and performance”.

ANALYSIS

On October 26, 2023, staff advertised a request for proposals for the complete deployment of the ARCGIS Enterprise, Utility Network, and CityWorks Program. Out of four proposals, Timmons Group was rated as the best company to provide these services. Within the Timmons Group’s proposal was Trimble’s proposed costs and timeline for the CityWorks project. Staff evaluated the proposals for each project component, including CityWorks and decided that the project scope provided by Trimble and Timmons was the best for the District. This is a separate contract that requires Board approval.

FISCAL IMPACT & STRATEGIC PLAN IMPLEMENTATION

The amount of this three year contract was included as part of the 2024 and 2025 fiscal year’s budget, respectively. This action is consistent with Strategic Plan Smart Goals # 4 – System Reliability and #6 – Technology & Processes.

Any conflict or inconsistency in the Agreement will be resolved in the following order of precedence: (1) the Order, (2) any applicable Supplemental Terms, (3) these General Terms, (4) the SOW, and (5) the Documentation.

1. **Definitions.** Capitalized terms have the meaning associated with them in this Section 1 (Definitions) or with the definition provided elsewhere in the Agreement.
- 1.1. "**Affiliate**" means an entity that, directly or indirectly, owns or controls, is owned or controlled by or is under common ownership or control with a party, where "ownership" means the direct or indirect ownership of more than fifty percent (50%) of an entity's outstanding voting rights or other equivalent voting interests.
 - 1.2. "**Customer**" is the entity or person identified in the Order or SOW.
 - 1.3. "**Dispute(s)**" means any dispute, claim, or controversy arising from or related to the Agreement.
 - 1.4. "**Documentation**" means Trimble's then-current usage guidelines, standard technical documentation, acceptable use policies, support policies, service level commitments, or other policies referenced in the Agreement.
 - 1.5. "**Hardware**" means hardware products specified in the Order.
 - 1.6. "**High Risk Activities**" means any mission critical, hazardous, strict liability, or other activity(ies) where use or failure of the Offerings could lead to death, personal injury, or physical or environmental damage. Examples of High Risk Activities include, but are not limited to: aircraft or other modes of human mass transportation, nuclear or chemical facilities, life support systems, implantable medical equipment, motor vehicles, autonomous vehicles, air traffic control, emergency services, or weaponry systems. High Risk Activities do not include utilization of Offerings for administrative purposes, to store configuration data, engineering and/or configuration tools, or other non-control applications, the failure of which would not result in death, personal injury, or physical or environmental damage.  - 1.7. "**Intellectual Property Rights**" means any and all right, title and interest in and to any and all trade secrets, patents, copyrights, service marks, trademarks, know-how, trade names, rights in trade dress and packaging, moral rights, rights of privacy, publicity, database rights and similar rights of any type, including any applications, continuations or other registrations with respect to any of the foregoing, under the laws or regulations of any foreign or domestic governmental, regulatory or judicial authority, and the right to sue for, settle and release past, present and future infringement of any of the foregoing.
 - 1.8. "**Law(s)**" means all applicable local, state/provincial, federal and international laws, rules, regulations, directives, ordinances and conventions, including, but not limited to, those related to data privacy and data transfer, international communications and export of technical or personal data.
 - 1.9. "**Licensed Software**" means the object code form of Trimble's proprietary installed software product for deployment on premises or on a device, as well as any Documentation, maintenance releases, and features and functionality enhancements, and application programming interfaces (APIs), in each case as as may be made available pursuant to the Order. For clarity, Licensed Software excludes firmware.
 - 1.10. "**Offerings**" means Trimble's Hardware, Software, Services, Support, and other Trimble goods or services specified on an Order or SOW.
 - 1.11. "**Order**" means the quotation, proposal, sales agreement or similar documents provided by Trimble and accepted by Customer.
 - 1.12. "**Services**" means any services described in the Order or a Statement of Work, including, without limitation, training, enablement, implementation, configuration, hosting, or content provision.
 - 1.13. "**Software**" means the Licensed Software and/or Software-as-a-Service specified on an Order.
 - 1.14. "**Software-as-a-Service**" or "**SaaS**" means a Trimble proprietary cloud service, as well as any Documentation, features and functionality enhancements, and application programming interfaces, in each case as may be made available pursuant to the Order.
 - 1.15. "**Statement of Work**" or "**SOW**" means a statement of work or similar agreement governing the provision of Services.
 - 1.16. "**Supplemental Terms**" are any additional Trimble terms and conditions referenced in the Order as "Supplemental Terms."
 - 1.17. "**Support**" means support and/or maintenance for Software, and as may be further described in the applicable Supplemental Terms, Documentation, or otherwise as specified by Trimble in writing.
 - 1.18. "**Trimble**" means Trimble Inc. or its Affiliate identified on the Order or SOW, or if none is specified, as set forth in [Exhibit A](#) (Trimble Entities; Governing Law; Exclusive Venue/Jurisdiction) based on the applicable Customer location.
 - 1.19. "**Trimble IP**" means the Offerings, Documentation, and any written and electronic materials, proprietary information, documentation, code, technology, systems, infrastructure, equipment, and trade secrets developed, provided or used by Trimble or its subcontractors to produce and provide the Offerings together with all Intellectual Property Rights therein, together with all modifications, improvements, changes thereto or derivative works thereof, including without limitation: (a) proprietary electronic architecture and other non-literal elements of the Offerings developed by Trimble, (b) functional and technical specifications and other technical, training, reference or service information, documentation and manuals and updates thereto, (c) APIs, customized applications and computer programs, (d) processes, methods, algorithms, ideas, and other "know how," (e) data and information provided or sourced by Trimble, (f) Offerings which Customer has the right to use via a subscription, and (g) network equipment and architecture.

2. **Orders; Validity.** An Order is valid for acceptance by Customer within the period indicated in the Order and if no such period is provided, for thirty (30) calendar days from the issue date. The Agreement is formed by Customer's execution of the Order. Changes to an Order or belated acceptance by Customer are not valid unless Trimble accepts them in writing, and Trimble's partial or complete delivery against an Order modified by Customer, or acceptance of payment, shall not be deemed to be an acceptance of the modification. Orders that Customer has accepted cannot be canceled for any reason without Trimble's prior written consent.
3. **Payment Terms; Invoicing**
- 3.1. Fees are as set forth in the Order or SOW. Fees do not include applicable sales taxes, value added taxes, goods and services taxes, export or import charges, transportation or insurance charges, customs and duty fees, personal property taxes, surcharges and fees, or similar charges, all of which are Customer's responsibility to pay. Unless Customer provides Trimble with direct payment authority or a valid exemption certificate for the appropriate jurisdiction, Customer will pay Trimble all such taxes, charges, and fees invoiced by Trimble in connection with the Offerings. Customer will pay any foreign exchange transaction fees and any foreign exchange profits or losses incurred on such transactions.
 - 3.2. Trimble will issue invoices in accordance with the billing frequency stated in the Order or SOW. Customer consents to the receipt of invoices electronically at the email address(es) it provided to Trimble for billing purposes, and accepts such invoices as if received by mail. Customer is responsible for maintaining current email address(es) with Trimble. Trimble's transmission of an invoice to the provided billing email address(es) (regardless of whether actually received by Customer) shall be considered delivery of that invoice by Trimble. Trimble's failure to issue an invoice in accordance with this Section 3 (Payment Terms; Invoicing) shall not be deemed to be a waiver by Trimble of its right to receive payment pursuant to the Agreement, but Customer shall not be obligated to make such payment until an invoice for such payment is issued by Trimble to Customer.
 - 3.3. Unless otherwise set forth in the Order or SOW, payments are due net 30 days from the date of invoice. Customer will make payment in the currency indicated on the Order or SOW. Trimble is entitled to offset payments against prior debt balances in Customer's account. Subject to any Laws to the contrary or as otherwise expressly stated in the Agreement, payments are not refundable. No credit, carryover, or refund will be given for any unused Offerings (e.g., services hours, data usage) allocated or available for use during an indicated period of time.
 - 3.4. Delinquent payments not subject to a bona fide dispute will bear interest at the lesser of 1.5% per month or the maximum rate permitted by applicable Law. If Customer does not object in writing to an invoiced amount by the invoice due date, Customer will be deemed to have acknowledged the correctness of that invoice and to have waived its right to dispute that invoice. A dispute as to a portion of any invoice or amount owed will give Customer the right to withhold or delay payment of the disputed portion only. Customer will be liable for all costs of collection of past due amounts (including attorneys' fees).
 - 3.5. Trimble may suspend Customer's access to or Trimble's provision of Offerings, as applicable, on five (5) business days prior notice if Customer fails to timely pay any invoice not subject to a bona fide payment dispute or fails to use diligent good faith efforts to resolve a bona fide payment dispute (unless cured during the notice period).
 - 3.6. For any breach of Customer's payment obligations under any Order(s), Trimble may, without limiting Trimble's other rights and remedies, declare Customer's unbilled future fees under any and all Orders immediately due and payable.
 - 3.7. Trimble has the continuing right to review Customer's credit and, if reasonably determined necessary by Trimble, change Customer's payment terms, and may at any time demand advance payment, satisfactory security (such as, but not limited to, a confirmed, irrevocable letter of credit acceptable to Trimble), or a guarantee of prompt payment prior to shipment or service activation.
 - 3.8. Offerings purchased or licensed under Trimble's United States General Services Administration ("GSA") Schedules are subject to all of the pricing and other terms and conditions described in the applicable GSA Schedule.
4. **Term and Termination**
- 4.1. **Term.** The term and any renewals thereof applicable for an Offering (collectively, the "Term(s)") shall be as set forth in the Order, SOW, or Supplemental Terms. Different Offerings may have different Terms.
 - 4.2. **Termination.** Either party may terminate the Agreement if the other party (a) fails to cure a material breach of the Agreement (including a failure to pay fees), or fails to provide a written plan of cure reasonably acceptable to the non-breaching party, within thirty (30) days after the non-breaching party's receipt of written notice specifying such breach or failure, (b) becomes designated by an applicable governmental entity as a business with which a party is prohibited from doing business with (e.g., via governmental sanctions program), or (c) seeks protection under insolvency or comparable proceeding, or if such proceedings are instituted against that party and not dismissed within sixty (60) days.

Except where an exclusive remedy is provided, exercising a remedy under the Agreement, including termination, does not limit other remedies a party may have.

EXCEPT FOR ANY LIMITED WARRANTY TERMS EXPRESSLY PROVIDED IN ANY APPLICABLE SUPPLEMENTAL TERMS, THE OFFERINGS ARE PROVIDED “AS-IS” AND WITHOUT EXPRESS OR IMPLIED WARRANTY OR CONDITION OF ANY KIND, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, THE IMPLIED WARRANTIES OR CONDITIONS OF MERCHANTABILITY AND FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE, SATISFACTORY QUALITY, TITLE, AND NONINFRINGEMENT. SUPPLEMENTAL TERMS MAY HAVE ADDITIONAL DISCLAIMERS. SOME JURISDICTIONS DO NOT ALLOW LIMITATIONS ON DURATION OR THE EXCLUSION OF AN IMPLIED WARRANTY, SO THE ABOVE LIMITATION(S) MAY NOT APPLY OR FULLY APPLY TO CUSTOMER.

7. Limitations of Liability.

7.1. Waiver; Liability Cap.

(a) EXCEPT FOR EXCLUDED CLAIMS, (i) NEITHER PARTY (OR ITS SUPPLIERS) SHALL BE LIABLE FOR DAMAGES FOR LOSS OF PROFIT OR REVENUE, DATA THAT IS LOST OR CORRUPTED, FAILURE OF SECURITY MECHANISMS, INTERRUPTION OF BUSINESS, LOSS OF GOODWILL, OR ANY SPECIAL, INCIDENTAL, RELIANCE, INDIRECT, PUNITIVE, OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES OF ANY KIND; AND (ii) EACH PARTY’S (AND EACH OF ITS SUPPLIER’S) ENTIRE LIABILITY FOR ANY AND ALL DAMAGES ARISING OUT OF OR RELATED TO THE AGREEMENT WILL NOT EXCEED IN AGGREGATE THE AMOUNTS PAID OR PAYABLE BY CUSTOMER TO TRIMBLE DURING THE PRIOR 12 MONTHS UNDER THE AGREEMENT FOR THE APPLICABLE OFFERING(S) GIVING RISE TO THE LIABILITY.

(d) SOME JURISDICTIONS DO NOT ALLOW A LIMITATION OF LIABILITY FOR DEATH, PERSONAL INJURY, FRAUDULENT MISREPRESENTATIONS, CERTAIN INTENTIONAL OR NEGLIGENT ACTS, VIOLATION OF SPECIFIC STATUTES, OR THE LIMITATION OF INCIDENTAL OR CONSEQUENTIAL DAMAGES. IN SUCH AN EVENT, THE FOREGOING LIMITATION(S) WILL NOT APPLY TO THE EXTENT PROHIBITED BY LAW.

7.2. Nature of Claims and Failure of Essential Purpose. The waivers and limitations in this Section 7 (Limitations of Liability) are agreed-upon allocations of risk constituting in part the consideration for Trimble’s performance under the Agreement, and will survive and apply even if any limited remedy in the Agreement fails of its essential purpose.

- 8. Indemnification.** Customer will defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Trimble from and against any and all third-party claims, costs, damages, losses, liabilities and expenses (including reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs) arising out of or in connection with (a) use or modification of any Offerings in breach of the Agreement, or in any manner not authorized by the Agreement or (b) Customer’s violation of Laws or the rights of a third party. Trimble will give Customer prompt written notice of any claim hereunder and will cooperate in relation to the claim at Customer’s expense. Customer will have the exclusive right to control and settle any claim, except that Customer may not settle a claim without Trimble’s prior written consent (not to be unreasonably withheld) if the settlement requires Trimble

admit any liability or take any action or refrain from taking any action (other than ceasing use of infringing materials). Trimble will not participate in the defense of any claim at its expense.

9. Confidentiality.

- 9.1. Definition. “Confidential Information”** means information disclosed to the receiving party under the Agreement that is designated by the disclosing party as proprietary or confidential or that should be reasonably understood to be proprietary or confidential due to its nature and the circumstances of its disclosure. Trimble’s Confidential Information includes, without limitation, the terms and conditions of the Agreement, and any technical or performance information about the Offerings, including the Documentation.
- 9.2. Obligations.** As a receiving party, each party (a) will protect the confidentiality of the disclosing party’s Confidential Information using the same degree of care it uses for its own information of like importance (but not less than reasonable care), (b) will not share the disclosing party’s Confidential Information with third parties except as permitted in the Agreement or with the disclosing party’s prior written or electronic consent, and (c) will only use Confidential Information to fulfill its obligations and exercise its rights in the Agreement. The receiving party may disclose Confidential Information to its employees, agents, Affiliates, contractors, and other representatives (collectively, “**Representatives**”) having a legitimate need to know (including, for Trimble, its subcontractors), provided (i) the Representatives are subject to confidentiality obligations no less protective than those in this Section 9 (Confidentiality), and (ii) the receiving party is responsible for any breach of this Section 9 (Confidentiality) by the acts or omissions of its Representatives.
- 9.3. Exclusions.** These confidentiality obligations do not apply to information that the receiving party can document (a) is or becomes public knowledge through no fault of the receiving party or its Representatives, (b) it rightfully knew or possessed on a non-confidential basis prior to receipt under the Agreement, (c) it rightfully received from a third party without obligation of confidentiality, or (d) it independently developed without using the disclosing party’s Confidential Information. Supplemental Terms may have additional exclusions.
- 9.4. Remedies.** Unauthorized use or disclosure of Confidential Information may cause substantial harm for which remedies at law (e.g., monetary damages) alone are an insufficient remedy. In the event of such actual or threatened breach by a party, the other party may seek injunctive relief, in addition to other available rights and remedies, for breach or threatened breach of this Section 9 (Confidentiality), without proof of actual damages or the requirement of posting a bond or other security.
- 9.5. Required Disclosures.** Nothing in the Agreement prohibits either party from making disclosures if required by Law or government or court order, provided (if permitted by Law) it notifies the other party in advance and reasonably cooperates in any effort by the other party to obtain confidential treatment.

10. Intellectual Property Rights.

- 10.1. Trimble IP.** As between the parties, except for any limited usage rights set forth in any Supplemental Terms, Trimble and its suppliers have and will retain all Intellectual Property Rights in and to Trimble IP and all copies, modifications, and derivative works thereof. No Intellectual Property Rights are granted by Trimble to Customer except as expressly provided under the Agreement.
- 10.2. Feedback.** Customer may from time to time provide suggestions, comments, or other feedback (collective, “**Feedback**”) to Trimble with respect to the Offerings. Both parties agree that all Feedback is and will be given entirely voluntarily, and shall not be considered Confidential Information of Customer. Customer shall not provide any Feedback that is subject to license terms that seek to require any of Customer’s products, technology, service, or documentation incorporating or derived from such Feedback, or any of Customer’s intellectual property to be licensed or otherwise shared with any third party. Customer hereby grants to Trimble and its Affiliates a nonexclusive, worldwide, perpetual, irrevocable, transferable, sublicensable, royalty-free, fully paid up license to use and otherwise exploit the Feedback.

11. Personal Information; Data Protection.

- 11.1.** This Section 11 (Personal Information; Data Protection) applies if Customer is a legal person (i.e., a business or legal entity). All Laws relating to the protection of privacy and data protection are referred to as “**Data Protection Legislation**”. “**Personal Information**” is defined as in the Applicable Data Protection Legislation, or if no definition is provided, any personally identifiable information which is either (a) provided by Customer or on its behalf, or (b) automatically collected through the Offering on Customer’s behalf. “**Applicable**”, in this context, means the Data Protection Legislation applicable to Customer at Customer’s principal place of business or to Trimble at Trimble’s principal place of business, and such Laws that the parties mutually agree apply.
- 11.2.** Each party will comply with all Applicable requirements of the Data Protection Legislation. This Section 11 (Personal Information; Data Protection) is in addition to, and does not relieve, remove or replace, a party’s obligations or rights under the applicable Data Protection Legislation.
- 11.3.** The parties acknowledge that: (a) when performing its obligations under the Agreement, Trimble processes Personal Information on Customer’s behalf, except for user registration and software licensing and usage data, for which Trimble acts as responsible party, and (b) the Personal Information may be transferred or stored, and/or accessed from outside of the country where Customer’s principal place of business is located in order to provide the Software and Trimble’s other obligations under the Agreement.
- 11.4.** Customer will ensure that it has all necessary appropriate consents and notices in place to enable (a) lawful transfer of the Personal Information to Trimble for the duration and purposes of the Agreement and (b) Trimble to lawfully use, process and transfer the Personal Information in accordance with the Agreement, including on Customer’s behalf.

- 11.5. If the processing of Personal Information by Trimble is subject to the General Data Protection Regulation ((EU) 2016/679) or the Data Protection Act 2018 of the United Kingdom, then, in addition, at the written request of Customer, the parties will execute an applicable data processing addendum, available at <https://www.trimble.com/privacy/DPA-TI-EuroSubs> (or any successor url). Transfers of Personal Information from Trimble entities located in Europe, acting as data exporter, to Trimble entities in the USA, acting as data importer, are governed, for the benefit of Customer, by the Standard Contractual Clauses available at the same url or upon written request to Trimble.
- 11.6. If the processing of Personal Information by Trimble is subject to US data protection laws, rules or regulations, then the US Data Processing Addendum for Customer Personal Information (available at https://dl.trimble.com/www/us_dpa_customer.pdf or any successor url) is herein incorporated by reference.

12. Miscellaneous.

- 12.1. **Assignment.** Trimble may assign the Agreement upon notice to Customer. Customer may not assign or transfer the Agreement (by operation of law or otherwise) without the prior written consent of Trimble. Any non-permitted assignment is void. The Agreement will bind and inure to the benefit of each party's permitted successors and assigns.
- 12.2. **Amendments.** Trimble may amend the Agreement from time to time with written notice to Customer. Such amendments shall take effect upon the next renewal, if any, of the Agreement, unless Trimble indicates an earlier effective date. If Trimble requires amendments with an earlier effective date and Customer objects in writing, then Trimble may permit such amendments to take effect upon the next renewal; provided, however, if Trimble declines to permit such later effective date, Customer's exclusive remedy is to terminate the Agreement with notice to Trimble, in which case Trimble will provide Customer a refund of any applicable pre-paid fees for the terminated portion of the current Term. To exercise this termination right, Customer must notify Trimble of its objections within thirty (30) days after Trimble's notice of the amended Agreement. Once the amended Agreement takes effect, Customer's continued use of the Offerings constitutes its acceptance of the modifications. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Trimble may modify Documentation upon written notice to Customer to reflect new features or changing practices, provided that the modifications will not materially decrease Trimble's overall obligations with respect to such Offering(s).
- 12.3. **Waiver and Severability.** No waiver of any provision or breach of the Agreement (a) will be effective unless made in writing, or (b) will operate as or be construed to be a continuing waiver of such provision or breach. In the event any portion of the Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, such portion will be construed as nearly as possible to reflect the original intent of the parties, or if such construction cannot be made, such provision or portion thereof will be severable from the Agreement, provided that the invalidity, illegality, or unenforceability in whole or in part of any provision does not affect the validity of other provisions.
- 12.4. **Force Majeure.** Neither party will be liable for any default, delay, or non-performance of its obligations under the Agreement (except for payment obligations) due to causes beyond its reasonable control, including, without limitation, strikes, blockades, war, terrorism, riot, internet or utility failures, governmental orders or actions, national or regional emergency, pandemics, or natural disasters, provided that such party promptly notifies the other in writing of such occurrence and uses commercially reasonable efforts to resume performance of its affected obligations as soon as feasible. Delays or failures that are excused as provided in this Section 12.4 (Force Majeure) will result in automatic extensions of dates for performance for a period of time equal to the duration of the events excusing such delay or failure.
- 12.5. **Notices.** Any notice or other communication given by either party to the other regarding the Agreement will be deemed given and served when personally delivered or delivered by reputable international courier requiring signature for receipt addressed to the party at its notice address. Notice will be deemed effective upon delivery or refused delivery attempt. Either party may change its notice address by written notice to the other. Customer's notice address will be the address appearing on the Order or SOW. Trimble's notice address will be the applicable address on Exhibit A (Trimble Entities; Governing Law; Exclusive Venue/Jurisdiction), or if the Trimble entity is not listed there, then on the Order. In addition, any valid notice to Trimble shall include a required copy to: Trimble Inc., Attn: General Counsel - Important Legal Notice, 510 De Guigne Drive, Sunnyvale, CA 94085, USA. Trimble may send operational notices to Customer by email or through the Offering, including, without limitation, modifications of the Agreement or Documentation, suspension, collection, and termination notices related to overdue fees.
- 12.6. **Export Control.** Customer acknowledges that the Offerings are subject to export restrictions by the United States government and import restrictions by certain foreign governments. Customer will not, and will not allow any third party to, remove or export from the United States or allow the export or re-export of any part of the Offerings or any direct product thereof: (a) into (or to a national or resident of) any embargoed or terrorist-supporting country; (b) to anyone on the U.S. Commerce Department's Table of Denial Orders or U.S. Treasury Department's list of Specially Designated Nationals; (c) to any country to which such export or re-export is restricted or prohibited, or as to which the United States government or any agency thereof requires an export license or other governmental approval at the time of export or re-export without first obtaining such license or approval; or (d) otherwise in violation of any export or import restrictions, Laws of any United States or foreign agency or authority. Customer warrants that it is not located in, under the control of, or a national or resident of any such prohibited country or on any such prohibited party list. The Offerings are further restricted from being used for the design or development of nuclear, chemical, or biological weapons or missile technology, or for terrorist activity, without the prior permission of the United States government. Customer will defend, indemnify, and hold Trimble harmless against any liability (including attorneys' fees) arising out of Customer's failure to comply with the terms of this Section. Customer's obligations under this Section 12.6 (Export Control) will survive the termination of the Agreement for any reason whatsoever.
- 12.7. **Anti-Corruption Compliance.** Each party, and any third party acting on its behalf, will comply with all applicable United States and international anti-corruption and anti-bribery laws and regulations, including, without limitation, the U.S. Foreign Corrupt Practices Act, the U.K. Bribery Act, and others (collectively, "**Anti-Corruption Laws**"). Each party, and any third party acting on its behalf, will not directly or indirectly offer, promise, or give any payment or anything of value to a government official, or

- other individual or entity, where the intent is to improperly influence any act or decision of the government official, individual or entity, to obtain or retain business or some other benefit or commercial advantage for either party. Each party, and any third party acting on its behalf, also will not solicit or accept any sort of payment or anything of value from anyone, where the intent is to improperly influence any acts of a party or any third party acting on its behalf.
- 12.8. GSA.** Offerings purchased or licensed under Trimble's United States General Services Administration ("**GSA**") Schedules are subject to all of the pricing and other terms and conditions described in the applicable GSA Schedule.
- 12.9. Governing Law and Venue.** The sole and exclusive governing Law, jurisdiction, and venue for the Agreement and all Disputes shall be: (1) as set forth in the Order, if any, or (2) otherwise, as set forth on Exhibit A (Trimble Entities; Governing Law; Exclusive Venue/Jurisdiction), in each case to the exclusion of all others; provided that Trimble may elect to bring action in courts with jurisdiction for Customer's location. The United Nations Convention on Contracts for the International Sale of Goods and any conflicts of laws provisions giving rise to a different result do not apply. No Dispute may be brought by either party more than one (1) year after such Dispute accrued, except that an action for nonpayment may be brought within two (2) years after the due date. Each party hereby waives, to the maximum extent permitted by law, any objection, including any objection based on *forum non conveniens*, to the bringing of any such proceeding in such jurisdiction.
- 12.10. WAIVER OF JURY TRIAL – UNITED STATES CLAIMS. FOR ANY CLAIM BROUGHT IN A STATE, FEDERAL, OR OTHER COURT IN ANY JURISDICTION WITHIN THE UNITED STATES, EACH PARTY IRREVOCABLY AND UNCONDITIONALLY WAIVES, TO THE FULLEST EXTENT PERMITTED BY LAW, ANY RIGHT IT MAY HAVE TO A TRIAL BY JURY IN ANY LEGAL ACTION, PROCEEDING, CAUSE OF ACTION, OR COUNTERCLAIM ARISING OUT OF OR RELATING TO THE AGREEMENT OR THE TRANSACTIONS CONTEMPLATED HEREBY; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, THAT THIS PROVISION SHALL NOT BE ENFORCED OR ENFORCEABLE TO THE EXTENT A WAIVER OF THE RIGHT TO A TRIAL BY JURY IS PROHIBITED BY, OR CONTRARY TO, THE PUBLIC POLICY OF THE STATE IN WHICH SUCH LEGAL ACTION, PROCEEDING, CAUSE OF ACTION, OR COUNTERCLAIM IS FILED.**
- 12.11. Region-Specific Terms.** Additional terms and conditions for specified regions are as set forth in Exhibit B (Region-Specific Terms).
- 12.12. Publicity.** Customer agrees that (a) Trimble may issue a press release in the form approved by the parties regarding the parties' entry into the Agreement, and (b) Trimble may identify Customer (including through use of its name and logo) as Trimble's customer, including on Trimble's website, and may include Customer in its customer list and marketing materials, but will cease this use upon Customer's written request.
- 12.13. Headings; Language.** The headings in the Agreement have been inserted for convenience only and shall have no substantive effect. The language of all parts of the Agreement shall in all cases be considered as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any of the parties. The parties hereby acknowledge and agree that the language of the Agreement shall be considered jointly drafted.
- 12.14. Subcontractors.** Trimble may use subcontractors in the performance of its obligations under the Agreement, and will be responsible for the acts and omissions of its subcontractors in their performance of Trimble's obligations in the Agreement.
- 12.15. No Third-Party Beneficiaries.** Except as may be expressly stated in any Supplemental Terms, there are no third-party beneficiaries under the Agreement.
- 12.16. Independent Contractors.** Each party is an independent contractor of, and is not an employee, agent, fiduciary, or authorized representative of, the other party.
- 12.17. Entire Agreement.** The Agreement sets forth the entire understanding between the parties in connection with its subject matter, and supersedes all prior or contemporaneous proposals, communications, agreements, negotiations, and representations, whether written or oral, regarding the subject matter thereof. Any additional, contrary, and/or pre-printed terms or conditions appearing on Customer's acceptance, orders, or associated purchase documentation are hereby rejected and will be of no effect.
- 12.18. Counterparts.** The Agreement, or portions thereof, may be executed in several counterparts and, if applicable, by each party on a separate counterpart, each of which, when so executed and delivered will be an original, but all of which together will constitute but one and the same instrument. A signature, digital signature, or electronic signature delivered through other means (e.g., email) shall have the same force and effect as an original ink signature.

Australia

For Customer who purchase Offerings in Australia, the following provisions apply:

- (a) For the purposes of this section, “**Australian Consumer Law**” means the Australian Consumer Law set out at Schedule 2 to the *Competition and Consumer Act 2010* (Cth), as amended from time to time, and “**Non-excludable Condition**” means the consumer guarantees, warranties, rights, or remedies under the Australian Consumer Law that cannot be limited, excluded, restricted, or modified, and to which Customer may be entitled.
- (b) To the extent permitted by Law, Trimble’s liability in relation to breach of any such Non-excludable Condition shall be limited, at its option, as follows: (i) in the case of the goods, to repairing or replacing the goods, supplying equivalent goods, or paying the costs of repairing or replacing the goods or acquiring equivalent goods; and (ii) in the case of the services, to re-supplying the services or paying the cost of re-supplying the services.
- (c) Nothing in the Agreement excludes, restricts or modifies any Non-excludable Condition.

Nothing in the Agreement is intended to derogate from Trimble’s obligations under the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) as amended from time to time.

- (e) Where Order(s) are a “Small Business Contract” within the meaning of the Australian Consumer Law:
 - (i) Trimble shall not accelerate Customer’s unbilled future fees under any Order(s);
 - (ii) Customer’s indemnification obligations under the Agreement are reduced to the extent Trimble’s acts or omissions contributed to or caused the claims, costs, damages, losses, liabilities, and expenses suffered by Customer;
 - (iii) Trimble’s liability in relation to breach of any Non-excludable Condition will be an Excluded Claim; and
 - (iv) No dispute or legal action arising under the Agreement may be brought by either party more than three years after such cause of action accrued.

France

Section 3.4 is hereby amended and restated to read as follows:

Section 3.4 Late payments will bear interest at the rate of 1.5% per month or the minimum rate allowed by Law (currently three (3) times the legal interest rate), whichever is higher, measured from the date on which the sums concerned became due until the date on which full payment is received. Collection fees of a minimum amount of 40 € will be added in accordance with Article L. 441-10.II of the Commercial Code. Customer will be liable for all other costs of collection of past due amounts (including court costs and attorney’s fees incurred by Trimble). If the Customer does not dispute an invoice amount in writing by the due date of the invoice, the Customer shall be deemed to have acknowledged the accuracy of such invoice and waived its right to dispute it. A dispute over part of an invoice or amount due shall entitle the Customer to withhold or delay payment of the disputed part only.

The following is hereby added as Section 7.1 (e):

(e) EACH PARTY HEREBY HAS AN OBLIGATION TO LIMIT THE DAMAGES IT MAY SUFFER IN THE EVENT OF A BREACH OF ITS OBLIGATIONS BY THE OTHER PARTY.

The Netherlands

The provisions of Section 4.2 (Termination) are the sole grounds for the termination of the Agreement, and to the extent permitted by Law, the right of Customer to rescind the Agreement and claim damages on the basis of statutory Law (including but not limited to sec. 6:265 Dutch Civil Code) is excluded.

THE LIMITATION OF LIABILITY IN SECTION 7 FOR A PERIOD OF 12 MONTHS EXPRESSLY INCLUDES ANY OBLIGATION TO PAY COMPENSATION UNDER A WARRANTY MENTIONED IN THESE TERMS OR RELATED CONTRACTS OR DOCUMENTS AND THE RESTITUTION OBLIGATIONS (*ONDEDAANMAKINGSVERPLICHTINGEN*) AND INDEMNIFY FOR DAMAGES. LIABILITY FOR DEATH OR PERSONAL INJURY SHALL NOT EXCEED EUR 1.250.000.

The applicability of section 6:227b subsection 1 and section 6:227c subsection 1 of the Dutch Civil Code are excluded in any Agreement between Trimble and any person who is not a consumer.

Addendum #3

Supplemental Terms for Software and Subscriptions

Version 1.1 (Last Updated: October 7, 2023)

1. Definitions. Capitalized terms not defined herein have the meanings given in the General Terms.

- 1.1. **“Active Project”** means any Project on which the Software may be used by Customer during any Annual Subscription Term.
- 1.2. **“Annual Subscription Term”** means each 12-month period of a Subscription Term.
- 1.3. **“Anonymized Data”** means any data collected in connection with the Offerings (including Customer Data) that has been aggregated and/or de-identified in such a manner that neither Customer nor any of its Authorized Users or any other individual can be identified from the data when it is shared outside of Trimble or its Affiliates.
- 1.4. **“Authorized User”** means any employee of Customer or third-party user authorized by Customer to access and use the Offerings on Customer’s behalf in accordance with the Agreement, including, without limitation, Section 6.6 (Third-Party Access).
- 1.5. **“Correction Services”** means subscription-based services that provide GNSS position correction data.
- 1.6. **“Concurrent User”** means any type of User authorized by Customer to access and use the Offerings on Customer’s behalf simultaneously at a given point in time.
- 1.7. **“Customer Data”** means any information, documents, materials, or other data of any type that is input by or on behalf of Customer into the Offerings or that is created or generated by Customer through Customer’s use of the Offerings, including without limitation information or data that is submitted manually by Authorized Users or through a Third-Party Platform. For clarity, Customer Data expressly excludes Usage Data.
- 1.8. **“Customer Group”** means Customer’s business units, Affiliates, or Joint Ventures, if any, listed in the Order that may authorize Authorized Users to use the Offerings on behalf of those business units, Affiliates, or Joint Ventures.
- 1.9. **“Gross Annual Revenue”** or **“GAR”** means Customer’s (and Customer Group’s, if applicable) income and revenue from all sources, before expenses or taxes, calculated on an annual basis according to generally accepted accounting principles and as reported in company financial statements. The various equivalent definitions may be used interchangeably.
- 1.10. **“Joint Venture”** means a business arrangement in which Customer and one or more other third parties agree to pool their resources to accomplish a Project or other commercial enterprise.
- 1.11. **“License Keys”** means electronic passwords, authorization codes, or other enabling mechanisms provided for use with the Offerings.
- 1.12. **“Named User”** means any type of Authorized User designated by Customer by name or other identifier to access and use the Offerings on Customer’s behalf.
- 1.13. **“Prohibited Data”** means any (a) patient, medical, or other protected health information regulated by the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (as amended and supplemented) (“HIPAA”); (b) credit, debit, or other payment card data subject to the Payment Card Industry Data Security Standards (PCI DSS); (c) information subject to regulation or protection under the Children’s Online Privacy Protection Act or Gramm-Leach Bliley Act, or (d) any other information which is regulated under Laws and is not required for use of the Software for its intended purpose.
- 1.14. **“Project”** means the initiation, delivery, operations, and maintenance of a construction project.
- 1.15. **“Provision Date”** means the date on which Trimble first provides access to the Offerings. For an Offering bundle comprised of multiple Software, the Provision Date will be the date on which the entire Offering bundle becomes fully provisioned.
- 1.16. **“Subscription”** means access to any Software, Support, Correction Services, content, data, or other information, in each case made available for the applicable Subscription Term(s).
- 1.17. **“Support Terms”** means the then-current Supplemental Terms for Support and Maintenance available at <https://www.trimble.com/en/legal/customer-terms> or any successor url.
- 1.18. **“Third-Party Materials”** means any third-party data, content, or proprietary software. Third-Party Materials is not part of Software.
- 1.19. **“Project Budget”** means the total projected cost allocated to carry out, manage, and complete one or more Active Project(s) over the entire Subscription Term. The various defined terms are equivalent and may be used interchangeably, including in other defined terms.
- 1.20. **“Total Project Value”** or **“Project Value”** means Project Budget divided by the number of Annual Subscription Terms in the Subscription Term (and not any renewal). The various defined terms are equivalent and may be used interchangeably, including in other defined terms.
- 1.21. **“Usage Limitations”** means Customer’s authorized scope of use for the Offerings as specified in the applicable Order, Supplemental Terms, or Documentation, which may include any user (e.g., Named User, Concurrent User, etc.), seat, copy, instance, data storage, CPU, computer, field of use, location, project, or other restrictions.
- 1.22. **“Usage Data”** means Trimble’s technical logs, data, and learnings about Customer’s use of the Offerings, excluding Customer Data.

2. Generally

2.1 Offerings.

(a) **Subscriptions (other than Licensed Software).** Customer may access and use the Subscriptions during the Subscription Term only for its internal business purposes in accordance with the Documentation, Usage Limitations, and the Agreement. Unless otherwise specified by Trimble, any Licensed Software provided with a Subscription is subject to the terms applicable to Licensed Software under the Agreement.

(b) **Licensed Software.** Trimble hereby grants Customer a non-transferable, non-sublicensable, non-exclusive license, during Term, to install, copy, and use the Licensed Software on systems or devices under Customer’s control only for its internal business purposes in accordance with the Documentation, Usage Limitations, and the Agreement. Licensed Software is licensed, not sold. Any Licensed Software deployed through hosting services delivered by Trimble are subject to the terms and conditions applicable to Licensed Software.

2.2 **Authorized Users.** Only Authorized Users may access or use the Offerings. User IDs are granted to individual, named persons, and each Authorized User will keep login credentials confidential and not share them with anyone else. Customer is responsible for its Authorized Users’ compliance with the Agreement and actions taken through their accounts. In the event an Authorized User is no longer authorized to use an Offering on Customer’s behalf, Customer will promptly de-activate such Authorized User’s access. Unless expressly permitted in the Order,

Supplemental Terms, or Documentation, Customer may not transfer Authorized User status from one individual to another. Customer will notify Trimble if it becomes aware that any of its Authorized User login credentials have been compromised.

2.3. **Restrictions.** Customer will not (and will not permit, encourage, or assist anyone else to) do any of the following: (a) provide access to, distribute, sell, or sublicense the Offerings to a third party; (b) use the Offerings on behalf of, or to provide any product or service to, third parties; (c) use the Offerings to develop a similar or competing product or service; (d) reverse engineer, decompile, disassemble, or seek to access the source code or non-public APIs to any element of the Offerings, except to the extent expressly permitted by Law (and then only after providing prior written notice to Trimble); (e) modify or create derivative works of the Offerings or copy any element of the Offerings (other than in connection with making copies of Licensed Software authorized under the Agreement); (f) remove or obscure any proprietary notices in the Offerings; (g) publish benchmarks or performance information about the Offerings, except to the extent expressly permitted by Law; (h) interfere with the Offerings' operation or its use by others, circumvent its access restrictions or, without the prior written permission of Trimble, conduct any security or vulnerability test of the Offerings; (i) transmit any viruses or other harmful materials to the Offerings; (j) submit to the Offerings any information that is inappropriate, defamatory, obscene, salacious, or unlawful, or use the Offerings to defame, harass, stalk, threaten, or otherwise violate the rights of others; (k) use the Offerings to advertise, offer to sell or buy goods, or otherwise for business promotional purposes; (l) for Licensed Software, unless expressly permitted in the Order, Supplemental Terms, or the Documentation, use or host any Licensed Software in a virtual server environment, or (m) for Corrections Services, re-broadcast the Corrections Services without the prior written consent of Trimble.

2.4 **Free Versions; Trials and Betas.** "Free Versions" means any Offerings made available to Customer for use without a fee. "Trials and Betas" means any Offerings or any features thereof made available on a evaluation or trial basis or as an alpha, beta, or early access offering, in any case free or otherwise. Unless otherwise set forth in the Documentation or the Agreement, Customer may only use Free Versions in a non-production environment and for non-commercial purposes, and Trials and Betas may only be used solely for Customer's internal evaluation to determine whether to purchase a license or subscription to the Offerings. The evaluation term for Trials and Betas shall be 30 days unless otherwise designated by Trimble in writing. Free Versions and Trials and Betas are optional, and Trimble may cease making available such Offerings at any time for any reason. Trials and Betas may be inoperable, incomplete, or include features that Trimble may never release, and their features and performance information are Trimble's Confidential Information. In the event Customer has purchased Services related to any Free Version or Trial and Beta, any unused Services upon any termination or expiration of the applicable term for the Free Version or Trial and Beta shall be forfeit. **Notwithstanding anything else in the Agreement: (a) Trimble has no obligation to retain Customer Data used with Free Versions and Trials and Betas; (b) Trimble provides the Free Versions and Trial and Betas "AS-IS" with no warranty, indemnity, service levels, or support; (c) Trimble's liability for Free Versions and Trials and Betas will not exceed US\$50, and (d) either party may terminate access to a Free Version or Trial and Beta, for any reason or no reason, immediately upon written notice to the other party.**

2.5 **Educational Versions.** For any version of the Offerings designated as "educational," or a similar term, Customer may use the Offerings solely for educational purposes - e.g., by an instructor or a student at an educational institution and while engaged in educational work. Such educational versions may not be used (a) by any other person; (b) by any educational institution for any non-educational purposes; or (c) for any for-profit purpose, including professional work or training offered for a fee, or by commercial entities.

2.6 **Delivery.** Offerings and License Keys, if any, will be delivered by electronic means unless otherwise specified on the applicable Order. Delivery is deemed to occur on the date on which the Offering and License Key, if any, are first made available to Customer.

2.7 **Software Activation and Metering; Audits.**

- (a) Offerings may gather and transmit to Trimble license usage, compliance, and activation data. Customer will not disable, modify, or interfere with the operation of any such functionality of the Offerings. Trimble may use the foregoing information to validate the authenticity of Authorized Users, to confirm Customer's compliance with the Agreement, to register the Offerings, to monitor and validate compliance with Usage Limitations, for license metering, and to protect Trimble against unlicensed or illegal use of the Offerings.
- (b) Upon Trimble's written request, Customer shall certify in writing that its use of the Offerings is in full compliance with the Agreement (including any Usage Limitations). In addition to the other license compliance monitoring rights in the Agreement, Trimble, or its authorized representative, may, upon prior reasonable notice of at least ten (10) days, inspect and audit Customer's records and use of the Offerings to confirm Customer's compliance with the Agreement. All such inspections and audits will be conducted during regular business hours and in a manner that does not unreasonably interfere with Customer's business activities. Customer is responsible for such audit costs only in the event the audit reveals that the use is not in accordance with the Usage Limitations or other licensed scope of use and for unpaid fees. Customer shall promptly pay all unpaid fees.

3. **Data Usage and Ownership.**

3.1 **Ownership.** Except for Trimble's limited rights set forth in the Agreement, as between the parties, Customer retains all Intellectual Property Rights in Customer Data. Trimble owns all Intellectual Property Rights in Anonymized Data and Usage Data.

3.2. **Limited Usage Rights.** Customer hereby grants to Trimble and its Affiliates the non-exclusive, worldwide, irrevocable, royalty-free right: (i) to use Customer Data during the Term to provide the Offerings, Support, and Services to Customer; (ii) to use and disclose Customer Data as otherwise permitted pursuant to the Agreement or any written consent or instructions of Customer; and, (iii) subject to Trimble's confidentiality obligations in Section 9 (Confidentiality) of the General Terms and all applicable Data Protection Legislation, to use Customer Data in perpetuity to develop, maintain, and improve the products, software, and services of Trimble or its Affiliates, including, without limitation, analytics, model training, and machine learning.

3.3 **Access.** Customer will not have access to Customer Data after termination or expiration of the Term, unless otherwise indicated in the Order, Supplemental Terms, or the Documentation, or the parties agree otherwise in writing.

3.4 **Confidentiality.** In the event of any conflict between the terms of Section 9 (Confidentiality) of the General Terms and this Section 3 (Data Usage and Ownership), the terms of this Section 3 (Data Usage and Ownership) will control.

4. **Customer Obligations.**

4.1 **Dependencies and Compatibilities.** If Customer enables Dependencies or Compatibilities with an Offering, Trimble may access and exchange Customer Data with the Dependencies or Compatibilities on Customer's behalf. Trimble will have no liability or obligations under the Agreement with respect to how any Dependencies or Compatibilities uses or processes Customer Data. If Trimble hosts any Dependency or Compatibility

Customer's request, Customer represents and warrants to Trimble that Customer has all rights necessary. Trimble may charge additional such hosting services.

4.2 **No Prohibited Data.** Customer will not use the Offerings with Prohibited Data. Customer acknowledges that the Offerings are not intended to meet any legal obligations for these uses, including HIPAA requirements, and that Trimble is not a Business Associate as defined under HIPAA.

4.3 **Customer Data.** Customer is responsible for its Customer Data, including its content, accuracy, and compliance with Laws. Customer represents and warrants that it has made all disclosures and has all rights, consents, and permissions necessary to use its Customer Data with the Offerings and grant Trimble the rights in Section 3 (Data Use and Ownership), all without violating or infringing Laws, third-party rights (including intellectual property, publicity, or privacy rights), or any terms or privacy policies that apply to its Customer Data. If Customer utilizes data fields available in the Offerings to store data not required for the normal use and operation of the Offerings for their intended purpose, Customer agrees that Trimble is not responsible for, and will not be liable in any manner for such data, and Customer assumes all risks associated with, and agrees to hold Trimble harmless from and against any and all claims, losses, damages, liabilities, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) related to or arising from, Customer's use of data fields to store such data.

4.4 **Excluded Claims.** In addition to the Excluded Claims stated Section 7 (Limitation of Liability) in the General Terms, the following shall also be Excluded Claims for purposes of the Agreement: Section 10 (Indemnification) of these Software Terms and any breaches of Sections 2.3 (Restrictions) or Section 4 (Customer Obligations) of these Software Terms.

4.5 **License Compliance.** Customer shall promptly notify Trimble if Customer become aware of (i) any breach of confidentiality obligations regarding the Offerings, or (ii) any infringement (whether actual or alleged) of Trimble's intellectual property rights in the Offerings, or (iii) any unauthorized use of the Offerings by any person, and provide reasonable assistance to Trimble in connection with any suit or proceeding relating to such events.

4.6 **Usage Limitations.** Customer will comply with all Usage Limitations. If Customer exceeds the Usage Limitations during the Term, Trimble may invoice Customer for the use that exceeded the applicable Usage Limitations at Trimble's then-current list price, and Customer shall pay in accordance with the Agreement. The parties may also agree on a Usage Limitation adjustment, in which case Customer must sign a new Order and pay the applicable fees.

4.7 **Fee Criteria.** If the Order states Software is made available based on GAR, Project Budget, Total Project Value, population, specific-department usage, Affiliate-limitations, or similar criteria (any such criteria, the "**Fee Criteria**"), the fees for that Software are calculated based on that Fee Criteria as of the date of Order issuance by Trimble. Unless otherwise provided the Order, if the Fee Criteria increases by more than 10% during the Subscription Term, (i) Customer shall promptly notify Trimble in writing, (ii) Trimble has the right to adjust such fees based on changes in the Fee Criteria and its then-current list price for that Software (including on a prorated basis for the current term), and (iii) Customer shall pay any applicable additional fees upon receipt of the invoice in accordance with the Agreement. At the request of Trimble, Customer will promptly provide documentation satisfactory to Trimble evidencing Customer's then-applicable Fee Criteria.

5. Suspension of Access. Trimble may suspend Customer's access to an Offering, without liability, and in whole or in part, if (a) Customer breaches any Usage Limitations, Sections 2.2 (Authorized Users), 2.3 (Restrictions), 4 (Customer Obligations) or 6.2 (Offering Content); (b) Customer's account is five (5) business days or more overdue; or (c) immediately if Customer or any of its Authorized Users' acts or omissions threaten the integrity, availability, or security of the Offerings or Trimble's systems, products, or infrastructure (provided Trimble will use commercially reasonable efforts to provide Customer with advance notice of such suspension where Trimble determines exigent circumstances do not exist). Trimble will lift such suspension once the related issue or failure is cured to Trimble's reasonable satisfaction. Fees will continue to apply during the suspension period. Customer may be prohibited from entering new Customer Data or processing or accessing existing Customer Data and data reports during the suspension period. If Customer attempts to access or manipulate Customer Data utilizing third-party software during suspension, Trimble disclaims and Customer holds Trimble harmless from any responsibility or liability relating to lost or altered Customer Data or related damages.

6. Certain Features. The following provisions apply to the extent applicable to the Offerings.

6.1 **Third-Party Materials.** The Offerings may provide Customer with access to Third-Party Materials. Third-Party Materials are not part of the Offerings. To the extent specified by Trimble (including in any Supplemental Terms or Documentation), use of the Third-Party Materials may be subject to additional terms or restrictions ("**Third-Party Terms**"). Customer is solely responsible for its compliance with any Third-Party Terms, and failure to comply with such terms may result in termination of Customer's right to access any features of the Offerings that utilize such Third-Party Materials. If no Third-Party Terms are specified, Customer may use Third-Party Materials solely in support of Customer's authorized use of the Offerings in accordance with the Agreement.

6.2 **Offering Content.** "**Offering Content**" shall be any Trimble IP or Third-Party Materials made available as data or information through the Offering, whether included as part of the Offering or as a separate subscription. Any Offering Content that is Trimble IP will be deemed part of the Offering. Any Offering Content that is Third-Party Materials shall be subject to any applicable Third-Party Terms. If no Third-Party Terms apply, then unless otherwise authorized by Trimble in writing or the applicable Documentation, such Third-Party Materials, and any derivative thereof, may only be used or accessed by an Authorized User. Third-Party Materials will be used solely for Customer's internal purposes during the Term and must be accessed pursuant to a manual Authorized User request. Customer will not: (i) access, extract, or download any Third-Party Materials, or portions thereof, in batch or en masse by any means; (ii) use any device, software, or routine to bypass any hardware or software that prohibits volume requests for information; (iii) sell, offer to sell, rent, sublicense, or transfer any copies of the Third-Party Materials, or portions thereof, to a third party or allow a third party to use the Third-Party Materials; (iv) use the Third-Party Materials to develop services or products for sale or include any portion of the Third-Party Materials in any product or service; (v) use any portion of the Third-Party Materials to create a competitive service, product, or technology; (vi) recreate the Third-Party Materials or create otherwise a separate database or other repository of Third-Party Materials; (vii) use Third-Party Materials to train, augment, or correct another database or information repository; (viii) unless otherwise specified in the Documentation, permit any individual other than an Authorized User to access or use the Offering Content and any derivative thereof, or (ix) make any portion of the Third-Party Materials available to the public in any manner. Upon notice from Trimble and/or any termination or expiration of the Term, Customer will immediately cease using and delete/destroy all electronic and physical copies of Third-Party Materials.

6.3 Open Source. The Offerings may incorporate third-party open source software (“**Open Source**”), as listed in the Documentation or made available by Trimble. To the extent the terms of the Open Source license prohibit the terms of the Agreement from applying to the Open Source, the terms of the Open Source license will apply to the Open Source on a stand-alone basis instead of the Agreement.

6.4 Third-Party Application Stores.

(a) Purchase from Application Store. If Customer obtains the Offering (or portions thereof) through a third-party application store, marketplace, or other site or service (each, an “**Application Store**”), such Application Store is considered a reseller. All fees are non-refundable once paid. Customer’s download of the Offering may be subject to other terms as specified by the operator of the Application Store from which Customer downloaded the Offering.

(b) Apple-Specific Terms. If Customer downloaded the Offering from Apple Inc.’s (“**Apple**”) Application Store, the following terms are part of the Agreement. The Agreement is between Customer and Trimble, and not with Apple. However, as required by Apple, Apple and its subsidiaries will be third-party beneficiaries of the Agreement and will have the right (and will be deemed to have accepted the right) to enforce the Agreement against Customer as a third-party beneficiary. To the maximum extent permitted by Law, Apple will have no warranty obligation with respect to the Offering, and, as between Apple and Trimble, any other claims, losses, liabilities, damages, costs, or expenses attributable to a failure to conform to a warranty will be Trimble’s responsibility. Apple has no obligation whatsoever to furnish any maintenance or support services with respect to the Offering. As between Trimble and Apple, Trimble is solely responsible for the Offering and for addressing any claims Customer or any third parties have about the Offering or Customer’s possession or use of the Offering, including without limitation (i) product liability claims; (ii) any claim that the Offering fails to conform to any applicable legal or regulatory requirement; and (iii) claims arising under consumer protection or similar legislation. In the event of any third-party claim that the Offering or Customer’s possession or use of the Offering infringes that third party’s intellectual property rights, Apple will not be responsible for the investigation, defense, settlement, or discharge of such claim.

6.5 Security for SaaS or Hosting Services for Licensed Software. This Section 6.5 (Security for SaaS or Hosting Services for Licensed Software) applies to Offerings that are SaaS or hosting services for Licensed Software. During the Term, Trimble or its third party hosting provider(s) will use commercially reasonable efforts to establish and maintain reasonable administrative, physical, and technical safeguards designed to protect (a) the security, confidentiality, and integrity of Customer Data; (b) against anticipated threats or hazards to the security, confidentiality, and integrity of Customer Data; (c) against unauthorized access to or use of Customer Data; and (d) against unlawful processing, accidental destruction, or loss of Customer Data. In the event Trimble is not in breach of the foregoing obligations and an unauthorized third party nonetheless gains access to the Customer Data, such disclosure of Customer Data in such circumstances shall not be a breach of Section 9 (Confidentiality) of the General Terms. In the event of any conflict between the terms of Section 9 (Confidentiality) of the General Terms and this Section 6.5 (Security for SaaS or Hosting Services for Licensed Software), the terms of this Section 6.5 (Security for SaaS or Hosting Services for Licensed Software) will control.

6.6 Third-Party Access.

(a) Contractors and Affiliates. Unless prohibited by Trimble in the Order, Documentation, any Supplemental Terms, or otherwise by Trimble in writing, Authorized Users may include individuals who are contractors or consultants of Customer or employees, contractors, or consultants of its Affiliates; provided, however, any such access and usage may require additional fees as described in Section 4.7 (Fee Criteria), if applicable.

(b) Other Third-Parties. If expressly authorized by Trimble in the Order, Documentation, any Supplemental Terms, or otherwise by Trimble in writing, the Offerings may allow Customer to invite other third parties to become Authorized Users and/or access Customer Data.

(c) Generally. Customer authorizes Trimble to share Customer Data with any third-party Authorized Users or as otherwise instructed by Customer. Customer is solely responsible for such third-parties’ compliance with the Agreement and for any and all acts or omissions of any such third parties. Such third parties are not intended third-party beneficiaries under the Agreement. Trimble shall have no liability for any act or omission of any such third party, including by way of access or use of Customer Data. Such third-party access or use of the Offerings must be solely and exclusively for the benefit of Customer, and any other purpose is prohibited. For clarity, as between Customer and any such third parties, any data or other information uploaded by such third party to the Offerings on Customer’s behalf will be deemed Customer Data of Customer.

(d) Customer as a Third-Party. In the event that Customer is invited to access an Offering as a third party, any data or other information uploaded by Customer on behalf of such third party shall be deemed “Customer Data” of such third party.

7. Support. If Customer is eligible for Support and pays any applicable fees, Trimble will make such Support available in accordance with the Support Terms or as Trimble may otherwise expressly provide in writing. Unless otherwise set forth in writing by Trimble, Support is not available for Free Versions or Trials and Betas.

8. Term and Termination.

8.1 Perpetual License. If Customer purchases a perpetual license to Licensed Software, Customer’s license to the Licensed Software will continue in perpetuity subject to the terms and conditions of the Agreement. Support for Licensed Software is purchased separately unless otherwise indicated by Trimble in writing or on an Order.

8.2 Subscriptions.

(a) Subscription Term. If Customer purchases access to a SaaS or a license to Licensed Software for a limited period of time, the duration of the initial term and any renewals are as set forth in the Order (collectively, the “**Subscription Term(s)**”). Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in the Order, the start date for each Subscription Term for each Offering will begin on the Provision Date for that Offering. For clarity, each Offering may have a different Provision Date.

(b) Additional Subscriptions. If Customer previously purchased one or more Subscriptions for a particular Offering (“**Existing Subscription(s)**”) and subsequently purchases one or more additional Subscriptions (for any Offering) while the Existing Subscription(s) is in effect (the “**Additional Subscription(s)**”), the duration of the Subscription Term for the Additional Subscription will be as set forth in the Order. Unless otherwise set forth by Trimble in writing, all Customer’s Subscriptions shall have the same end date and Trimble may invoice all fees for all such Subscriptions on a single invoice.

8.3 Effect of Termination. Upon expiration or termination of the Agreement or the Order, Customer’s right to use the Offerings will cease and Customer will immediately cease any and all use of and access to the Offerings and will delete (or, upon request, return) all copies of any Offerings. At the disclosing party’s request upon expiration or termination of the Agreement, the receiving party will delete all of the disclosing party’s Confidential Information (excluding Customer Data, which is addressed in Section 3 (Data Usage and Ownership)). Customer Data and

Confidential Information may be retained in the receiving party's standard backups after deletion but will remain subject to the Agreement's confidentiality restrictions.

8.4 Survival. In reference to Section 4.3 of the General Terms (Survival), the following Sections of these Software Terms survive any expiration or termination of the Agreement: 1 (Definitions), 2.3 (Restrictions), 3.1 (Data Usage and Ownership), 4 (Customer Obligations), 8.3 (Effect of Termination), 8.4 (Survival), 9.3 (Additional Disclaimers), and 10 (Indemnification). Except where an exclusive remedy is provided, exercising a remedy under the Agreement, including termination, does not limit other remedies a party may have.

9. Warranties and Additional Disclaimers.

9.1 Limited Warranty. Subject to the Agreement and any mandatory Laws to the contrary, Trimble warrants to Customer that during the Warranty Period, the Offerings will perform materially as described in the Documentation. The "**Warranty Period**" is (a) 90 days for Licensed Software licensed on a perpetual basis, and (b) for the duration of the applicable Subscription Term, for any Subscriptions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Trimble makes no warranties with respect to Correction Services, which are provided as-is and as-available.

9.2 Warranty Remedy.

- (a) If the Offering fails to conform to Section 9.1 (Limited Warranty) during the Warranty Period, Customer may make a reasonably detailed warranty claim within 30 days of discovering the issue. For any such claims reported by Customer within such period that Trimble determines are valid, Trimble will correct such non-conformity by issuing corrected instructions, a restriction, or a bypass, or by replacing the Offerings, at Trimble's option. Subject to any mandatory Laws to the contrary, these procedures are Customer's exclusive remedy, and Trimble's entire liability, for the failure of the Offerings to conform to the warranty in Section 9.1 (Limited Warranty).
- (b) The foregoing limited warranty only applies if and to the extent that (i) any Offering associated with the warranty is properly and correctly installed, configured, interfaced, maintained, stored, and operated in accordance with the Documentation, and (ii) any Offerings associated with the warranty is not modified or misused. The foregoing limited warranty does not apply to (1) issues caused by unauthorized use or modifications; (2) unsupported or unauthorized versions of any Offerings; (3) operating the Offerings under any specification other than, or in addition to, the Documentation; (4) issues in or resulting from Dependencies, Compatibilities, or third-party systems, products, or services; or (5) Free Versions, Trials and Betas or other similar versions.

9.3 Additional Disclaimers. Trimble makes the following disclaimers in addition to Section 6 (Warranty Disclaimer) in the General Terms.

Customer will defend, indemnify, and hold harmless Trimble from and against any and all third-party claims, costs, damages, losses, liabilities, and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs) arising out of or in connection with (a) any Customer Data, Dependencies, or Compatibilities, or (b) Customer's breach of Sections 2.3 (Restrictions), 4 (Customer Obligations), 6.1 (Third-Party Materials), 6.2 (Offering Content), or 6.4 (Third-Party Application Stores) (each, a "**Claim**"). Trimble will give Customer prompt written notice of any Claim and will cooperate in relation to the Claim at Customer's expense. Customer will have the exclusive right to control and settle any Claim, except that Customer may not settle a Claim without Trimble's prior written consent (not to be unreasonably withheld) if the settlement requires Trimble to admit any liability, pay any amounts or take any action or refrain from taking any action (other than ceasing use of infringing materials). Version 1.0 (Last Updated: April 3, 2023)

Capitalized terms not defined herein have the meanings given in the General Terms and the Software Terms.

1. Scope. Provided that Customer has paid the applicable fees, Trimble shall provide the Support described in these Support Terms during the Maintenance Term (as defined below). The “**Maintenance Term**” shall be: (a) for Support for SaaS or Licensed Software licensed for a limited term, the applicable Subscription Term, and (b) for Support for Licensed Software licensed on a perpetual basis, the term specified in the Order, or if not specified, for a period of one (1) year.

2. Support.

2.1 During the applicable Maintenance Term, Trimble shall use reasonable efforts to correct or provide a workaround for any reproducible programming error in the Software attributable to Trimble with a level of effort commensurate with the severity of the error, as reasonably determined by Trimble. Upon identification of any programming error, Customer shall promptly notify Trimble of such error and shall provide Trimble with enough information to reproduce the error, including a listing of output and any other data that Trimble may reasonably request in order to reproduce the error and operating conditions under which the error occurred or was discovered. Trimble shall not be responsible for correcting any errors not attributable to Trimble.

2.2 For certain Software, Trimble may provide additional or different support services or procedures as set forth in the applicable Documentation, support handbook, or other written documentation provided by Trimble, if any (collectively, the “**Additional Support Documentation**”). If there is any conflict between these Support Terms and such Additional Support Documentation with respect to the description of support services, requirements or procedures, the provisions of such Additional Support Documentation will prevail. Customer agrees and acknowledges that Trimble may use third parties to provide Support on its behalf. Customer expressly consents to Trimble permitting such third parties to access Customer’s information and data to perform the Support for Customer.

3. Licensed Software Updates and Upgrades. During the applicable Maintenance Term, Customer shall be entitled to receive all upgrades and updates to the Software that are publicly released by Trimble. The contents and timing of all upgrades and updates will be decided by Trimble in its sole discretion. Any such updates and upgrades will be deemed to be “Software” and licensed under the terms and conditions of the Agreement, including any applicable software end user terms or license agreement. Updates and upgrades exclude (a) new versions of the Software (e.g., a change to the left of the decimal in the version number [e.g., 1.x to 2.x] or otherwise designated by Trimble), and (b) any separate modules and other functionality for which Trimble charges a separate fee.

4. Limitations and Exceptions. The following matters are not covered (and Trimble will not have any obligations with respect to such matters) pursuant to these Support Terms:

- 4.1. Any Software for which applicable fees have not been paid;
- 4.2. Any problem resulting from the misuse, improper use, alteration, or damage of the Software;
- 4.2. Any problem resulting from improper or inadequate installation, maintenance, or storage of the Software;
- 4.3. Any problem caused by modifications of the Software not made or authorized by Trimble;
- 4.4. Any problem resulting from any hardware or software in either case not developed or supported by Trimble, including, without limitation: any computers, tablets, disk drives, operating systems, network hardware or software, database, or any other hardware or third-party software;
- 4.5. Any problem resulting from the combination of the Software with other programming or equipment to the extent that such combination has not been approved by Trimble; and
- 4.6. Errors in any version of the Software other than the most recent release, provided that Trimble will continue to provide Support for superseded releases for a reasonable period (not to exceed ninety (90) days).

Support excludes on-site visits, installation and training, file conversion, optional products and services, directories, consulting services, shipping charges, or any recommended hardware.

5. Termination or Expiration. Support will automatically terminate with respect to any Software that is no longer licensed for use as a result of expiration or termination of the Agreement, or replacement of the applicable Software with new releases.

Upon identification of any error that cannot be resolved by Customer as first line of support (e.g., via the Support Portal, its internal staff, etc.), then Customer (through its Authorized Support Contact(s)) shall promptly notify Trimble of such error and shall provide Trimble with enough information, assistance, and cooperation to reproduce the error, including a listing of output and any other data that Trimble may reasonably request in order to reproduce the error and operating conditions under which the error occurred or was discovered. Trimble shall not be responsible for correcting any errors not attributable to Trimble.

Capitalized terms not defined herein have the meanings given in the General Terms.

1. **Generally.** Trimble or its authorized service providers will use commercially reasonable efforts to provide Services to Customer as described in an Order or SOW. Any changes in scope must be made in writing and approved by authorized representatives of Customer and Trimble.
2. **Training and E-Learning.** For any Services consisting of delivery of training or e-learning (e.g., videos, manuals, etc.), any content made available by Trimble shall not be deemed a Deliverable (as defined below), notwithstanding anything in an Order or SOW to the contrary, and no Intellectual Property Rights therein are assigned or transferred to the Customer. Unless an Order or Documentation states otherwise, prepaid training and e-learning content will expire if not completed within six months from the effective date of the Order or SOW. Trimble reserves the right to reschedule training if it determines in good faith that attendance is not sufficient or the originally scheduled time or location are no longer feasible. If the Order states a date that Services must be completed by, such date is presented for illustrative purposes. The actual completion date for such Services will be provided on the invoice.
3. **Customer Materials.** Customer shall provide Trimble with reasonable access to Customer's technical data, computer programs, files, documentation, and/or other materials (collectively, "**Customer Materials**") and to Customer's resources, personnel, equipment, and facilities to the extent necessary for the performance of Services. Client will be responsible for, and assumes the risk of any problems resulting from the content, accuracy, completeness, competence, or consistency of Customer Materials or its personnel. To the extent that Customer does not timely provide the foregoing access required for Trimble to perform the Services, Trimble shall be excused from performance until such items or access are provided. Customer hereby grants Trimble a limited and revocable right to use the Customer Materials for the purpose of performing the Services. Customer owns and will retain ownership (including all intellectual property rights) in the Customer Materials.
4. **Customer Premises.** Customer shall provide Trimble with safe access to Customer's premises as reasonably required for Trimble to perform the Services, if onsite performance of Services is needed and agreed to by Customer. Trimble personnel shall comply with the reasonable written rules and regulations of Customer related to use of its premises, provided that such written rules and regulations are provided to Trimble prior to commencement of the Services.
5. **Customer Dependencies.** Customer is responsible for taking all actions identified or described in the Agreement which are a condition for Trimble to provide Services. Should Customer's failure to take such actions result in a delay of Trimble against a delivery schedule, or result in additional provable costs incurred by Trimble, Trimble shall not be considered to be delayed in its obligations, and Trimble shall be entitled to payment of such additional costs.
6. **Deliverables.** "**Deliverable(s)**" shall mean any Trimble deliverables as expressly set forth on a SOW or Order. Trimble hereby grants Customer a worldwide, royalty-free, non-exclusive license to use the Deliverables for its internal business purposes in connection with the Offerings associated with such Deliverables and only for the period of time that Customer has ownership or authorized use of such Offerings. Unless expressly stated otherwise in the applicable Order or SOW, Trimble owns and will retain ownership (including all intellectual property rights) in and to the Deliverables (excluding any Customer Materials) and any modifications, improvements, and derivative works thereof (including to the extent incorporating any Feedback). If the parties have agreed that Trimble will assign ownership of Deliverables to Customer, the relevant SOW must set forth the terms and conditions regarding such assignment.
7. **Limited Warranty.** Trimble will perform Services in a professional and workmanlike manner. If notified of a non-conformity within ten (10) days of delivery of the applicable Services, and if Customer provides a sufficiently detailed justification to Trimble to allow Trimble to identify the non-conforming Services, Trimble will, as its sole liability and obligation for failure to provide Services meeting this warranty, either (a) re-perform the non-conforming Services at no additional cost to Customer, or (b) issue a credit for any Services which Trimble identifies as non-conforming.
8. **Travel Expenses.** Trimble will invoice Customer for reasonable and pre-approved out-of-pocket travel expenses incurred in connection with performing Services. Expenses may be invoiced separately from fees and may include, but are not limited to, airfare and other transportation, lodging, and incidentals. Expenses may also include meals reimbursable per a flat per diem rate, available upon request.

9. **Other Offerings.** These Services Terms only apply to Services, and not to any other Offerings, even if such other Offerings are referenced in an Order or SOW. For clarity, all such other Offerings shall not be considered a Deliverable hereunder, and the provision thereof shall be governed by one or more separate agreements between Trimble and Customer.
10. **Non-Solicitation.** During the Term and for a period of 12 months thereafter, Customer, shall not, directly or indirectly, solicit, hire, engage, or attempt to do any of the foregoing, any person who was an employee or independent contractor of Trimble who provided Services to Customer, without Trimble's express prior written consent.

Addendum #6

Supplemental Terms for Hardware

Version 1.0 (Last Updated: April 3, 2023)

Capitalized terms not defined herein have the meanings given in the General Terms.

1. **Delivery.** Delivery times for Hardware are established when an Order is received and accepted by Trimble. Trimble will use commercially reasonable efforts to meet Customer's requested delivery dates, unless Customer is in default under the Agreement or Trimble's performance is otherwise excused (e.g., force majeure, etc.). Late delivery is not a basis for Customer's cancellation of any Order.

Title and risk of loss or damage to the Hardware will pass to Customer upon delivery to Trimble's shipping carrier. Trimble will deliver any shipment FCA (Incoterms 2020) from its warehouse. Customer will pay or reimburse Trimble for all costs of carriage, freight, insurance (if applicable), taxes, duty and other related shipping charges. Trimble may fulfill its delivery obligations for Hardware through an Affiliate and/or authorized reseller. Trimble reserves the right to make partial deliveries.

2. **Acceptance, Inspection, Notice of Nonconformance.** All Hardware will be deemed accepted by Customer upon delivery to Trimble's shipping carrier, subject to Customer's right to inspect and reject damaged Hardware or Hardware that do not conform to the Order within 10 days of delivery. It is Customer's responsibility to give Trimble prompt written notice of identified damage or non-conformance to the Order. If Customer retains the Hardware without giving notice within the designated period, it will be deemed to waive its right of rejection. The foregoing will not, however, prejudice Customer's warranty remedies as described in the applicable Hardware Terms.
3. **Limited Warranty.** Unless the Hardware comes with a limited warranty that provides otherwise, Trimble warrants to Customer, and only to Customer, that the Hardware is designed and manufactured to conform in all material respects to Trimble's specifications and all parts are and will be free from defects in material and workmanship for a period of twelve (12) months from date of shipment. During the warranty period, Trimble's obligations in Section 7 (Sole Remedy; Warranty Procedure) are Customer's only and exclusive remedy for Hardware that Trimble reasonably determines does not meet the limited warranty, and is made subject to these Hardware Terms.
4. **Firmware.** Trimble hereby grants Customer a personal, non-exclusive, revocable, non-assignable right to access and use firmware solely as necessary to use the Hardware in accordance with the Documentation. During the limited warranty period, Customer will be entitled to receive such Fixes (as defined below) to the firmware that Trimble releases and makes commercially available and for which it does not charge separately, subject to the procedures for delivery to purchasers of Trimble products generally. Minor Updates (as defined below), Major Upgrades (as defined below), new products, or substantially new software releases, as identified by Trimble, are expressly excluded from this fix process and limited warranty. Receipt of software fixes will not serve to extend the limited warranty period. "**Fix(es)**" means an error correction or other update created to fix a previous software version that does not substantially conform to its Trimble specifications; "**Minor Update**" occurs when enhancements are made to current features in software; and "**Major Upgrade**" occurs when significant new features are added to software, or when a new product containing new features replaces the further development of a current product line. Trimble reserves the right to determine, in its sole discretion, what constitutes a Fix, Minor Update, Major Upgrade, new products, or substantially new software releases.
5. **Non-Trimble Manufactured Products.** Trimble will extend to Customer the manufacturer's warranty, if any, for all equipment and/or software products manufactured by another manufacturer and furnished by Trimble to Customer under such other manufacturer's brands. Customer acknowledges and agrees that Trimble shall not be responsible for separately warranting or supporting the equipment or software products of such other manufacturers.
6. **Warranty Exclusions.** The foregoing Hardware limited warranty will only apply in the event and to the extent that (a) the Hardware is properly and correctly installed, configured, interfaced, maintained, stored, and operated in accordance with the Documentation, and (b) the Hardware is not modified or misused. This limited warranty does not apply to, and Trimble shall not be responsible for defects or performance problems resulting from (i) the combination or use of the Hardware with hardware or software products, information, data, systems, interfaces or devices not made, supplied or specified by Trimble; (ii) the operation of the Hardware under any specification other than, or in addition to, the Documentation; (iii) the unauthorized installation, modification, repair or use of the Hardware; (iv) damage caused by accident, lightning or other electrical discharge, fresh or salt water immersion or spray (outside Hardware specifications), or exposure to

environmental conditions for which the Hardware is not intended; (v) normal wear and tear on consumable parts (e.g., batteries) or (vi) cosmetic damage. Trimble does not warrant or guarantee the results obtained through the use of the Hardware. **TRIMBLE MAKES NO WARRANTIES WHATSOEVER WITH RESPECT TO SERVICES, WHICH IF PROVIDED HEREUNDER ARE PROVIDED "AS-IS."**

7. **Sole Remedy; Warranty Procedure.** If the Hardware fails during the warranty period for reasons covered by this limited warranty and Customer notifies Trimble of such failure during the warranty period, Trimble will at its option repair or replace the nonconforming Hardware with new, equivalent to new, or reconditioned parts or Hardware or, if either of the foregoing is commercially impractical in Trimble's determination, refund the Hardware purchase price paid by Customer (excluding separate costs of installation, if any) upon Customer's return of the Hardware in accordance with Trimble's product return procedures then in effect. Any repaired or replaced Hardware will be warranted for a period of thirty (30) days or the remainder of the original warranty period, whichever is longer. Warranty service will be provided at a designated Trimble service center or by an authorized Trimble service provider. Except as otherwise agreed by the parties, Customer shall be responsible for all shipping charges to the designated Trimble service center or authorized Trimble service provider.
8. **Determination of Warranty Applicability:** Trimble reserves the right to refuse warranty services if the Hardware date of purchase cannot be proven, if a claim is made outside the warranty period or if a claim is excluded from the warranty pursuant to the Terms. Following Trimble's examination of Customer's claim, Trimble will notify Customer of warranty status and the repair cost of any out-of-warranty Hardware. At such time Customer must issue a valid purchase order to cover the cost of the non-warranted Hardware repair and return freight, or authorize return shipment of the Hardware at Customer's expense as-is.
9. **Non-responsibility for Lost Data.** Trimble shall not be responsible for any modification or damage to, or loss of any programs, data, or other information stored on any media or any part of any Hardware serviced by it or an authorized Trimble service provider, or for the consequence of such damage or loss, e.g., business loss in the event of system, program or data failure. It is Customer's responsibility, prior to servicing, to backup data and remove all features, parts, alterations, and attachments not covered by warranty prior to releasing the Hardware to Trimble. The Hardware will be returned to Customer configured as originally purchased.
10. **Return of Hardware:** All Hardware returns are subject to Trimble's prior written consent and must comply with its product return (RMA) procedures then in effect. Before returning or exchanging Hardware, Customer must contact Trimble directly to obtain an authorization number to include with the return. Customer must return Hardware to Trimble in their original or equivalent packaging, and Customer is responsible for risk of loss, as well as shipping fees back to Trimble. Hardware received but not eligible for return will be sent back to Customer freight collect. For approved returns, Customer will receive credit equal to the lesser of the Hardware invoice price or its current replacement value, less any applicable charges or fees.

Addendum #7**Supplemental Terms for U.S. Public Entities***Version 1.0 (Last Updated: October 7, 2023)*

Capitalized terms not defined herein have the meanings given in the General Terms and the Software Terms.

1. **Scope.** To the extent Customer is a public or governmental entity, these Supplemental Terms provisions apply to the extent Customer is a public or governmental entity in the United States.
2. **Intellectual Property Indemnification by Trimble.** Trimble shall defend Customer from and against any claim of infringement of a U.S. patent, U.S. copyright, or U.S. trademark asserted against Customer by a third party based upon Customer's use of the Offerings in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, and pay any resulting settlement or final judgment. If Customer's use of any of the Offerings are, or in Trimble's opinion are likely to be, enjoined due to the type of infringement specified above, or if required by settlement, Trimble may, in its sole discretion: (a) substitute for the Offerings substantially functionally similar programs and documentation; (b) procure for Customer the right to continue using the Offerings; or if (a) and (b) are commercially impracticable, (c) terminate the Agreement and refund to Customer the fee paid by Customer as reduced to reflect a five year straight-line depreciation from the applicable purchase date. The foregoing indemnification obligation of Trimble will not apply: (1) if the Offerings are modified by any party other than Trimble; (2) if the Offerings are combined with other non-Trimble products, but solely to the extent that the alleged infringement is caused by such combination; (3) to any unauthorized use of the Offerings; (4) to any unsupported release of the Offerings; or (5) to any third-party code, content, and/or data contained in and/or delivered with the Offerings.
3. **Tax Exemption.** If Customer is a tax-exempt entity and provides evidence of a tax-exempt certificate prior to executing this Agreement, then Section 3.1 of the General Terms regarding Customer's responsibility to pay taxes shall be inapplicable.
4. **No Indemnification by Customer.** Section 8 (Indemnification) and the second to last sentence of Section 12.6 (Export Control) of the General Terms shall be inapplicable.
5. **Public Records Law.** Customer's confidentiality obligations in Section 9 (Confidentiality) of the General Terms may be subject to applicable public records law.
6. **Limited Publicity.** Provision (b) in Section 12.11 (Publicity) of the General Terms shall be inapplicable.
7. **Termination for Convenience.** Customer may terminate this Agreement for convenience on not less than sixty (60) days' written notice to Trimble. If Customer terminates this Agreement under this paragraph, all fees for the Term shall immediately become due and payable. All previously paid fees (both used and unused) shall be non-refundable and forfeited. Furthermore, all earned, but unpaid, fees for professional services, if any, must be paid in full before the termination becomes effective.
8. **Non-Appropriation of Funds.** The Customer's funds for future and ongoing purchases are contingent on the availability of future appropriations of funds. If funds are not appropriated for any payments due under this Agreement, the Customer will promptly notify Trimble in writing and the applicable Order will terminate as of the date of the notice in accordance with Section 7 (Termination for Convenience) above and the Customer will have no further obligation to make any payments with respect to the affected Order, provided however that the Customer shall pay for any goods or services ordered prior to the date of the Customer's notice.
9. **Piggyback.** Trimble does business with many government entities whose applicable laws permit them to join an existing contract between another governmental agency and vendor to acquire goods and services thereunder. In such circumstances and if allowable by applicable law and contract, Customer expressly agrees to allow the other governmental agencies to acquire goods and services using this Agreement ("**Piggyback**"), subject to applicable pricing of the Trimble offerings at the time of the piggyback purchase.
10. **Governing Law.** Notwithstanding Section 12.9 (Governing Law and Venue) of the General Terms, the Laws of the jurisdiction required by applicable law shall exclusively govern this Agreement.

Addendum #8
Service Level Agreement; Data Security and Restoration
Version 1.0

1. Availability Service Level Agreement

For any Offering that is either (i) Software-as-a-Service or (ii) Licensed Software hosted by Trimble, the following will apply.

- 1.1. Target Availability. Trimble will use commercially reasonable efforts to make the Offering available with an uptime availability (time periods during which Customer has general connectivity to the Offering) (the “**Target Availability**”) as follows:

DPD	99.95%

**Target Availability is generally for a calendar month; provided that EAM target availability will be calculated on a quarterly basis.*

- 1.2. Exclusions. The calculation of uptime will not include unavailability to the extent due to: (a) Customer's use of the Offering in a manner not authorized in the Agreement or Documentation, (b) general Internet problems, force majeure events or other factors outside of Trimble's reasonable control, including without limitation interruption or failure of telecommunications or digital transmission links, hostile network attacks, network congestion, denial of service attack, (c) Customer's equipment, software, network connections or other infrastructure, (d) any acts or omissions of Customer or any third-party that is not a service provider of Trimble, (e) failure by Customer to pay any applicable fees under the Agreement, or (f) Scheduled Maintenance or emergency maintenance.
- 1.3. Scheduled Maintenance. "**Scheduled Maintenance**" means Trimble's scheduled, routine, or other maintenance which (1) occurs at such times as may be listed on Trimble's websites or Support Portal, or (2) Trimble notifies Customer with at least two (2) days advance notice, which can be via the Support Portal, e-mail, or in the Offering. Trimble reserves the right to schedule other maintenance periods on an as needed basis and will notify Customer in advance. Trimble will use commercially reasonable efforts to perform Scheduled Maintenance during low usage times.
- 1.4. Service Credits. If there is a verified failure of the Offering to meet Target Availability in a particular month and Customer makes a request for service credit within thirty (30) days after the end of such month, Customer will be entitled to a credit based on the monthly fees due for the affected Offering in such month ("**Service Credit**"). The Service Credit will be calculated as follows:

*Service Credit = Pro Rata Fee * percentage of time that the Offering did not meet the Target Availability*

The "**Pro Rata Fee**" means (1) for Target Availability measured monthly, one-twelfth of the total annual fee for the Offering (excluding taxes, etc.), and (2) for Target Availability measured quarterly, one-fourth of the total annual fee for the Offering (excluding taxes, etc). The Service Credit will be calculated to the nearest 30-minute interval. The total Service Credits in a month may not exceed 20% of the Monthly Fee.

Trimble will apply each Service Credit to Customer's next invoice, provided that Customer's account is fully paid up, without any outstanding payment issues or disputes. Customer will not receive any refunds for any unused Service Credits.

- 1.5. Sole Remedy. Service Credits constitute liquidated damages and are not a penalty. The Service Credits set forth in this Section are Customer's sole and exclusive remedy for any failure to meet the Target Availability.

2. Data Security and Restoration

- 2.1. Software-as-a-Service and Hosted License Software.
 - a) Trimble or its third-party hosting provider(s) shall use commercially reasonable efforts to establish and maintain reasonable administrative, physical, and technical safeguards designed to (a) protect the security, confidentiality, and integrity of Customer Data, (b) protect against anticipated threats or hazards to the security, confidentiality, and integrity of Customer Data; (c) protect against unauthorized access to or use of Customer Data; and (d) protect against unlawful processing, accidental destruction, or loss of Customer Data.
 - b) Trimble will use reasonable efforts to restore lost or damaged Customer Data for Offerings deployed through Trimble hosting services or as Software-as-a-Service, as described in this paragraph, if the loss or damage was caused by Trimble. Trimble will consult with Customer and provide information to Customer regarding the availability of backups and the potential limitations of data restoration. Customer understands that some data loss may result upon restoration based on the frequency and availability of backups. If Customer Data loss or damage is not caused by Trimble, Trimble will provide support and technical assistance for data restoration subject to Trimble's availability and payment of applicable fees at Trimble's then-current hourly rates.
- 2.2. On Premises Licensed Software. Trimble does not provide regular support or technical assistance for the repair or restoration of lost or damaged Customer Data as part of support for Licensed Software not hosted by Trimble, regardless of the cause. Assistance for restoration may be available subject to Trimble's availability and payment of applicable fees at Trimble's then-current hourly rates.

Consultant agrees with the Mission Springs Water District that:

- a. Consultant and District agree that District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers should, to the extent permitted by law, be fully protected from any loss, injury, damage, claim, lawsuit, cost, expense, attorneys' fees, litigation costs, defense costs, court costs or any other costs arising out of or in any way related to the performance of this Agreement by Consultant or any subconsultant or agent of either as set forth herein. Accordingly, the provisions of this indemnity are intended by the parties to be interpreted and construed to provide the fullest protection possible under the law to District. Consultant acknowledges that District would not enter into this Agreement in the absence of the commitment of Consultant to indemnify and protect District as set forth herein.
- b. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless District, its employees, agents and officials, from any liability, claims, suits, actions, arbitration proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses, damages or costs of any kind, whether actual, alleged or threatened, actual attorneys' fees incurred by District, court costs, interest, defense costs, including expert witness fees and any other costs or expenses of any kind whatsoever without restriction or limitation incurred in relation to, as a consequence of or arising out of, or in any way attributable actually, allegedly or impliedly, in whole or in part to the performance of this Agreement. Consultant's obligation to defend, indemnify and hold harmless shall include any and all claims, suits, and proceedings in which Consultant (and/or Consultant's agents and/or employees) is alleged to be an employee of District. All obligations under this provision are to be paid by the Consultant as they are incurred by District.
- c. Without affecting the rights of District under any provision of this Agreement or this Section, Consultant shall not be required to indemnify and hold harmless District as set forth above for liability attributable solely to the fault of District, provided such fault is determined by agreement between the parties or the findings of a court of competent jurisdiction.
- d. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, a certificate of insurance satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing professional liability coverage of not less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate, that coverage shall not be cancelled except with notice to Mission Springs Water District. Coverage is to be placed with a carrier with an A.M. Best rating of no less than A: VII, or equivalent, or as otherwise approved by Mission Springs Water District. The retroactive date (if any) is to be no later than the effective date of this agreement. The Consultant shall maintain such coverage continuously for a period of at least five (5) years after the completion of the contract work. Consultant shall purchase a five-year extended reporting period i) if the retroactive date is advanced past the effective date of this Agreement; ii) if the policy is canceled or not renewed; or iii) if the policy is replaced by another claims-made policy with a retroactive date subsequent to the effective date of this Agreement. In the event that the Consultant employs other Consultants (sub-Consultants) as part of the work covered by this agreement, it shall be the Consultant's responsibility to require and confirm that each sub-Consultant meets the minimum insurance requirements specified above.
- e. Verification of Coverage – Consultant shall furnish the District with certificates and amendatory endorsements, or copies of the applicable policy language affecting coverage required by this clause. All certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the District before work commences. However, failure to obtain the required documents prior to the work beginning shall not waive the Consultant's obligation to provide them. The District reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies, including policy Declaration pages and Endorsement pages.
- f. Consultant shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries or death to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder and the results of that work by the Consultant, his agents, representatives, employees, or sub-consultants. Consultant will file with Mission Springs Water District, before beginning professional services, certificates of insurance (Acord Form 25 or equivalent) satisfactory to Mission Springs Water District evidencing:

Coverage – Coverage shall be at least as broad as the following:

1. **Commercial General Liability (CGL)** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Commercial General Liability Coverage (Occurrence Form CG 00 01) including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury, personal and advertising injury with limit of at least coverage of not less than two million (\$2,000,000) per occurrence or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. If a general aggregate limit applies, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to this project/location (coverage as broad as ISO CG 25 03, or ISO CG 25 04 endorsements provided to District), or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
2. **Automobile Liability** - Insurance Services Office (ISO) Business Auto Coverage (Form CA 00 01), covering Symbol 1 (any auto) or if the Consultant has no owned autos, Symbol 8 (hired) and 9 (non-owned) with limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage each accident.
3. **Workers' Compensation Insurance** - as required by the State of California, with Statutory Limits, and Employer's Liability Insurance with limit of no less than \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease. **Waiver of Subrogation:** The insurer(s) named above agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the Mission Springs Water District, its elected or appointed officers, officials, agents, authorized volunteers and employees for losses paid under the terms of this policy which arise from work performed by the Named Insured for the Agency; but this provision applies regardless of whether or not the Mission Springs Water District has received a waiver of subrogation from the insurer. Consultant is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and Consultant will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the professional services under this agreement. Consultant and sub-consultants will keep workers' compensation insurance for their employees in effect during all work covered by this agreement. Sole proprietors with no employees, acknowledge that they are not subject to the Workers' Compensation Act of the State of California and agree to complete a signed workers compensation exemption form.
4. **Cyber Liability Insurance** (Technology Professional Liability - Errors and Omissions), with limits of not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence or claim, and \$2,000,000 aggregate or the full per occurrence limits of the policies available, whichever is greater. Coverage shall be sufficiently broad to respond to the duties and obligations as is undertaken by Consultant in this Agreement and shall include, but not be limited to, claims involving infringement of intellectual property, including but not limited to infringement of copyright, trademark, trade dress, invasion of privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, release of private information, alteration of electronic information, extortion and network security. The policy shall provide coverage for breach response costs as well as regulatory fines and penalties as well as credit monitoring expenses with limits sufficient to respond to these obligations.

If Claims Made Policies:

1. The Retroactive Date must be shown and must be before the date of the contract or the beginning of contract work.
2. Insurance must be maintained, and evidence of insurance must be provided for at least five (5) years after completion of the contract of work.
3. If coverage is canceled or non-renewed, and not replaced with another claims-made policy form with a Retroactive Date prior to the contract effective date, the Consultant must purchase "extended reporting" coverage for a minimum of five (5) years after completion of contract work.

If the Consultant maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, the District requires and shall be entitled to the broader coverage and/or higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the District.

Required Provisions –

- **Additional Insured Status:** Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers or using the language that states "as required by written contract." are to be given insured status (at least as broad as ISO Form CG 20 10 10 01), with respect to liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the Consultant including materials, parts, or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.
 - **Primary Coverage:** For any claims related to this project, the consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary at least as broad as ISO CG 20 01 04 13 as respects to the District, its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers shall be in excess of the Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
 - Consultant shall require and verify that all sub-consultants maintain insurance meeting all requirements stated herein, and Consultant shall ensure that Mission Springs Water District its directors, officers, employees, and authorized volunteers are an additional insured on Commercial General Liability Coverage.
 - The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to Mission Springs Water District, its directors, officers, employees, or authorized volunteers.
- g. If any of the required coverages expire during the term of this agreement, the Consultant shall deliver the renewal certificate(s) to Mission Springs Water District at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date.
- h. Consultant shall not accept direction or orders from any person other than the General Manager or the person(s) whose name(s) is (are) inserted on Page 1 as "other Authorized Representative(s)."
- i. Payment, unless otherwise specified on Page 1, is to be within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District.
- j. Consultant hereby specifically represents and warrants to District that it possesses the qualifications and skills necessary to perform the services under this agreement in a competent and professional manner, without the advice or direction of District and that the services to be rendered pursuant to this agreement shall be performed in accordance with the standards customarily applicable to an experienced and competent professional rendering the same or similar services in the state of California. Consultant further represents and warrants that it possesses all required licenses necessary or applicable to the performance of the services under this agreement. Professional permits required by governmental authorities will be obtained at Consultant's expense, and Consultant will comply with applicable local, state, and federal regulations and statutes including but not limited to Cal/OSHA requirements.
- k. Any change in the scope of the professional services to be done, method of performance, nature of materials or price thereof, or to any other matter materially affecting the performance or nature of the professional services will not be paid for or accepted unless such change, addition or deletion is approved in advance, in writing by a supplemental agreement executed by Mission Springs Water District. Consultant's "Authorized Representative(s)" has (have) the authority to execute such written change for Consultant.
- l. Unless otherwise agreed upon in writing, all reports, documents, or other written material, including any documents, images, photographs, video files, or other media created or developed by Consultant as part of the services required hereunder ("Written Products") shall be considered to be "works made for hire", and all Written Products and any and all intellectual property rights arising from their creation, including, but not limited to, all copyrights and all other proprietary rights, shall be and remain the property of Mission Springs Water District without restriction or limitation upon their use, duplication or dissemination by Mission Springs Water District, except as otherwise provided herein. The Consultant shall not obtain or attempt to obtain copyright protection as to any of the Written Products.

- m. District shall hold all intellectual property rights to any data, materials, digital information, and Written Products stored and/or developed pursuant to this agreement. Consultant hereby assigns to Mission Springs Water District all ownership and any and all intellectual property rights to the data, materials, digital information and Written Products that are not otherwise vested in Mission Springs Water District pursuant to section above.
- n. Consultant shall not disclose, publish, or authorize others to disclose or publish, design data, drawings, specifications, reports, or other information pertaining to the projects assigned to the Consultant by the Mission Springs Water District or other information to which the Consultant has had access during the term of this Agreement without the prior written approval of an Authorized Representative during the term of this Agreement. Consultant's covenant under this section shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- o. Consultant shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to sales, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by the Mission Springs Water District or the Authorized Representative. The Consultant shall maintain adequate records on services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of service. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. At all times during regular business hours, Consultant shall provide access to such books and records to the Authorized Representative or his or her designees and shall give the Authorized Representative or his or her designees the right to examine and audit such books and records and to make transcripts as necessary, and shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement.
- p. This Agreement is personal to the Consultant. Any attempt to assign or subcontract any right or obligation hereunder by the Consultant shall be void unless approved in writing in advance by the Authorized Representative. Consultant's services pursuant to this Agreement shall be provided by the representative or directly under the supervision of the representative and Consultant shall not assign another to supervise the Consultant's performance of this Agreement without the prior written approval of the Mission Springs Water District, by and through the Authorized Representative.
- q. Consultant shall not maintain, commit, or permit the maintenance or commission of any nuisance in connection with the performance of services under this Agreement.
- r. Consultant agrees to be familiar with and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local conflict of Interest laws, including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act (California Government Code Sections 81000, et seq.) and California Government Code Section 1090. During the term of this Agreement, Consultant shall retain the right to perform similar services for other clients, but Consultant and its officers, employees, associates, and subconsultants shall not, without the prior written approval of the Authorized Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Consultant is not currently performing work that would require Consultant or one of its officers, employees, associates or subconsultants to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict-of-interest statute.
- s. A waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement whether of the same or different character.
- t. The Consultant shall commence, carry on, and complete all required tasks with all practicable dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner in accordance with all applicable laws and generally accepted industry standards.
- u. No Third-Party Beneficiaries. The Mission Springs Water District shall not be obligated or liable under this Agreement to any party other than the Consultant.
- v. In no event shall the making by the Mission Springs Water District of any payment to the Consultant constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Mission Springs Water District of any breach of covenant, or any default which may then exist, on the part of the Consultant, and the making of any such payment by

the Mission Springs Water District while any such breach or default shall exist shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Mission Springs Water District with regard to such breach or default.

- w. If any legal action is necessary to enforce any provision of this Agreement or for damages by reason of an alleged breach of any provisions of this Agreement, the prevailing Party shall be entitled to receive from the losing Party all costs and expenses in such amount as the courts may determine to be reasonable. In awarding the cost of litigation, the court shall not be bound by any court fee schedule, but shall, if it is in the interest of justice to do so, award the full amount of costs, expenses, and attorneys' and experts' fees paid or incurred in good faith.
- x. In the performance of the work required by this Agreement, Consultant shall abide by and conform with and to any and all applicable laws of the United States and the State of California, and with the local County and Municipal Code, ordinances, regulations and policies.
- y. If any part, term, or provision of this Agreement shall be held illegal, unenforceable, or in conflict with any law of a federal, state, or local government having jurisdiction over this Agreement, the validity of the remaining portions or provisions shall not be affected by such holding.
- z. The terms of this Agreement shall be interpreted according to the laws of the State of California. Should litigation occur, venue shall be the Superior Court of Riverside County, California.
- aa. This Agreement represents the entire Agreement between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant with respect to the subject matter hereto and supersedes all prior oral or written negotiations, representations, or agreements. No verbal agreement or implied covenant shall be held to vary the provisions of this Agreement. This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the parties to this Agreement and any subsequent successors and assigns. In the event of any inconsistency between the provisions of this Agreement and Consultant's proposal or Quote, and Exhibits hereto, the provisions of this Agreement shall control.
- bb. Precedence of Exhibits. All documents referenced as exhibits in this Agreement are hereby incorporated in this Agreement. In the event of any material discrepancy between the express provisions of this Agreement and the provisions of any document incorporated herein by reference, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- cc. Consultant will act hereunder as an independent consultant. This agreement shall not and is not intended to constitute Consultant as an agent, servant, or employee of the Mission Springs Water District and shall not and is not intended to create the relationship of partnership, joint venture or association between the Mission Springs Water District and Consultant.
- dd. Each of the signatories herein hereby represents that he or she has the authority to execute the Agreement on behalf of his or her contracting party.
- ee. Consultant shall be paid at the rates set forth in the Proposal and shall not increase any rate without the prior written consent of the District. Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement to the contrary, total fees and charges paid by the District to the Consultant under this Agreement shall not exceed the contract price specified on Page 1.
 - 1. Consultant shall not be compensated for any Services rendered nor reimbursed for any expenses incurred in excess of those authorized unless approved in advance by the District, in writing.
 - 2. Consultant shall submit to District, on or before the fifteenth (15th) of each month, itemized invoices for the Services rendered in the previous month. The District shall not be obligated to pay any invoice that is submitted more than sixty (60) days after the due date of such invoice. The District shall have the right to review and audit all invoices prior to or after payment to Consultant. This review and audit may include, but not be limited to District's:

- i. Determination that any hourly fee charged is consistent with this Agreement's approved hourly rate schedule;
 - ii. Determination that the multiplication of the hours billed times the approved rate schedule dollars is correct;
 - iii. Determination that each item charged is the usual, customary, and reasonable charge for the particular item. If the District determines an item charged is greater than usual, customary, or reasonable, or is duplicative, ambiguous, excessive, or inappropriate, District shall either return the bill to Consultant with a request for explanation or adjust the payment accordingly and give notice to Consultant of the adjustment.
3. If the work is satisfactorily completed, District shall pay such invoice within thirty (30) days after acceptance by Mission Springs Water District. Should the District dispute any portion of any invoice, District shall pay the undisputed portion within the time stated above, and at the same time advise Consultant in writing of the disputed portion.
- ff. In the event the Consultant performs additional or different services than those described herein without the prior written approval of the Project Manager, Consultant shall not be compensated for such services. Consultant expressly waives any right to be compensated for services and materials not covered by the scope of this Agreement or authorized by the District in writing.
- gg. Consultant shall promptly advise the Project Manager as soon as reasonably practicable upon gaining knowledge of a condition, event or accumulation of events which may affect the scope and/or cost of Services. All proposed changes, modifications, deletions and/or requests for additional services shall be reduced to writing for review and approval by the District.
- hh. Consultant shall perform all services in accordance with the terms and conditions of this agreement and the proposal. In the event that the terms of the proposal conflict with the terms of this agreement or contain additional terms that purport to bind the District, the terms of this agreement shall govern and said additional or conflicting terms shall be of no force or effect.

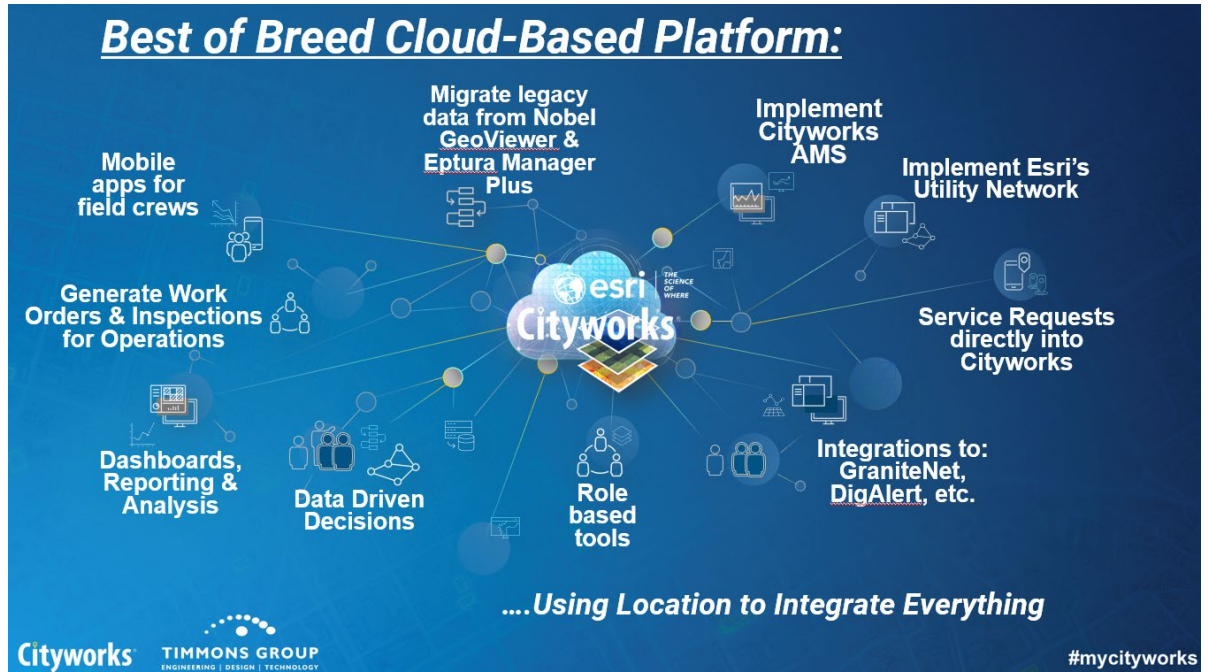

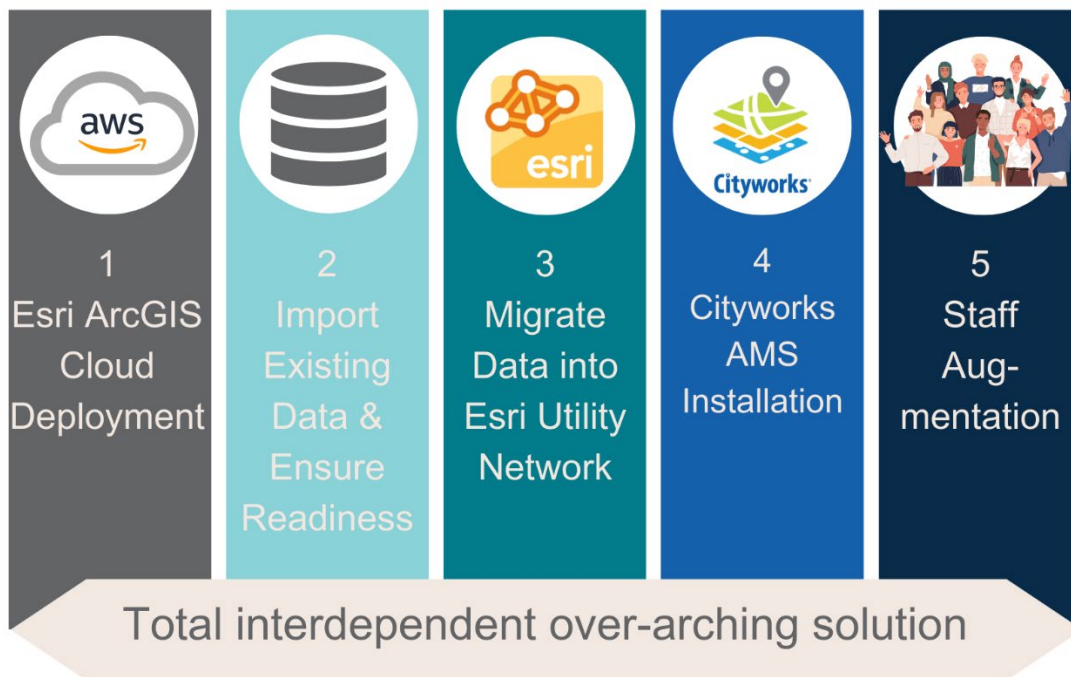

APPROACH

- Implementation
- Operations, Maintenance and Support

The project components and their associated tasks detailed below are designed to meet the full requirements of the RFP from the perspective of providing the required professional services to meet the full requirements as detailed within the RFP. Project Initiation sets the stage for downstream activities and tasks. This is the time to better define the overall goal of the project and what stakeholders hope to ultimately gain from the effort. During initiation, it is important to define who will be working on the project and their respective roles, as well as who will make business decisions and establish priorities for what ends up in the application. meeting agenda and project schedule. Timmons Group will draft a kick-off meeting agenda for MSWD to review and edit. Our Project Manager will also provide a detailed project management plan to include phases, tasks, task dependencies, and task durations prior to the kick-off meeting.

Our Approach to Project Management

Timmons Group specializes in delivering enterprise GIS & Asset Management solutions for our clients. We have accumulated years of experience and lessons-learned that have shaped our project management and implementation approach. Our project manager will be responsible for:

- Facilitating meetings between the Timmons Group team and MSWD project stakeholders

Our approach to project management is very “hands-on” and will support constant communication to minimize project risk, remove impediments to progress, and to ensure that we are delivering the best possible solution. Standard project management documents that will be posted to the project portal include: status reports (MS Word), current and past versions of the project work plan (Smartsheet), key project decision log, risk register and a task/action item log. Monthly we will provide MSWD with a project status report that documents the activities performed during the previous month. At a minimum the report shall address the following:

Project Component 1: ArcGIS Enterprise Cloud Deployment

ArcGIS Enterprise Discovery and Technical Design

Timmons Group has developed a proposed approach and schedule to optimize delivery to MSWD in a cost-efficient manner. Timmons Group is flexible in the approach and schedule for MSWD's ArcGIS Enterprise cloud deployment. Our approach summarized below is a systematic process we have refined over decades of experience with ArcGIS for hundreds of clients with a broad range of requirements. We start with a Discovery to build shared understanding of detailed requirements and desired outcomes and the steps that follow Discovery are flexible based on what we learn and what MSWD needs. From a schedule perspective we started with deploying a lower development environment for ArcGIS Enterprise to support components 2-4. Starting with a single environment provides MSWD cost savings by holding off on deploying and operating the production ArcGIS Enterprise environment until the necessary capabilities and data are ready to support MSWD's day to day activities. Based on MSWD's preferences and requirements the ArcGIS Enterprise production deployment can occur at any point in the overall project duration once the development environment is validated to meet the to be defined parameters for Go-Live.

Discovery

The purpose of Discovery is to document every relevant component of the current GIS so that all capabilities and functionality are accounted for in the cloud deployment. The GIS software, including extensions and add-ins, will be documented along with the licensing currently available to MSWD. Our team will document custom processes like database triggers, geoprocessing tools, stored procedures, views, or scheduled tasks running via Python or other tools as well.

ARCHITECTURE REVIEW AND VALIDATION

Timmons Group will work with MSWD to review the current system architecture. This will include the servers currently in place and the various software configurations in place for these servers. The goal is to ensure that Timmons Group, to the best extent possible, captures the current system configuration and dependencies of MSWD's GIS prior to finalizing the technical design and implementing a new GIS infrastructure.

CATALOG EXISTING DATA AND SERVICES

The current database(s)'s properties and data, users be documented for consideration during the migration. Users, roles, and schemas will be documented along with any versioning methods, if applicable.

CATALOG GDBs AND AGS SERVICES

Timmons Group will spend time working with MSWD to review the current GIS databases supporting the GIS architecture. This will include enterprise geodatabases (SDE), non-enterprise geodatabases, and other GIS data sources necessary to support the current GIS system. The goal here is to ensure that Timmons Group to the best extent possible captures the current system configuration and dependencies of MSWD's GIS prior to finalizing the technical design and implementing a new GIS infrastructure on AWS.

COLLECT AND DOCUMENT SECURITY REQUIREMENTS

Timmons Group will facilitate a workshop with MSWD IT staff to capture and record security requirements for the new GIS environment. These requirements will focus on security controls, identity access and management, network security and security logging.

COLLECT AND DOCUMENT SYSTEM INTEGRATION REQUIREMENTS

Integrations are a critical component of a successful enterprise implementation and before integrations can be implemented, networking must be designed and configured to facilitate communication between the various systems. Timmons Group will work with MSWD to review the current desired integrations with the enterprise GIS including Cityworks/ Cityworks Online. This will include the details and dependencies of integrations with third party systems including the networking ports and protocols required. The goal here is to ensure that Timmons Group to the best extent possible captures the current system configuration and dependencies of MSWD's GIS prior to finalizing the technical design and implementing a new GIS infrastructure on AWS.

Technical Design

DESIGN ARCHITECTURE

Timmons Group will create a system architecture design document with MSWD to ensure system specifications will meet the performance and security needs of MSWD. Timmons Group intends to review system architecture design documents for the new AWS Cloud environment with MSWD to ensure system specifications will adequately meet documented technical requirements.

DESIGN USER IDENTITY AND MANAGEMENT STRATEGY

Depending on the final technical design and other MSWD IT resources, we may leverage the following components to properly authenticate and authorize ArcGIS Portal users. If available from MSWD, Enterprise logins via HTTPS/SAML or OpenID Connect will use MSWD’s Federated Identity Management platform. A typical security pattern for Timmons Group is summarized below:

DEVELOP TEST PLAN

Our team will develop a test plan to validate the new GIS environments are functioning properly. The test plan will cover high level testing to ensure capabilities, data, services and security configuration are implemented as designed.

DESIGN AND DEVELOP BACKUP AND DISASTER RECOVERY PLAN

Timmons Group will work with MSWD to follow our proven disaster recovery (DR) framework composed of two phases, preparation and recovery. Leveraging our DR framework, we will work to understand MSWD’s needs and business risks to define recovery objectives. Two components of recovery objectives are recovery time objective (RTO), defined as the time it takes after a disruption to restore a business process to its service level, and recovery point objective (RPO), which is defined as the acceptable amount of data loss measured in time. With clearly defined recovery objectives in place, we evaluate and select the best strategy; e.g. traditional backup and restore, pilot light for quick recovery, warm standby, high availability multi-region deployment. We follow our framework for preparation to design and implement the strategy using automated processes including testing, monitoring, and alerting. Following the Preparation Phase of the DR framework, we exercise the Recovery Phase frequently to provide assurances these processes operate as designed and measuring RPO and RTO to ensure these objectives are successfully met.

DEVELOP OPERATIONS PLAN

Timmons Group will develop a cloud operations plan for the new GIS environment. The operations plan will document operational roles and responsibilities, service level objectives, monitoring and alerting, incident response plan, scaling and resource management policies, security measures implemented, cost optimization, and change management processes.

REVIEW SYSTEM ARCHITECTURE

Timmons Group intends to review system architecture design documents for the new AWS Cloud environment with MSWD to ensure system specifications will adequately meet documented technical requirements.

Build Cloud Infrastructure

Timmons Group will establish a new AWS Account under the Timmons Group main AWS account to provide separation for accurate billing each month. Within the dedicated AWS account Timmons Group will deploy AWS Virtual Private Cloud (VPC), networking and security services to support and protect the environments as well as isolate MSWD’s development environment from production. The remaining steps of this stage will first be performed to deploy the development environment and once validated infrastructure for production will be deployed. Our team will provision EC2 instances to support the ArcGIS Enterprise deployment model chosen and the requirements defined in Discovery. Next our team will build the data and storage tier. The final step for infrastructure will be to implement the backup and disaster recovery plan; testing disaster recovery will happen post software installation and configuration.

Configure Software

ArcGIS Enterprise workflows and functionality are enabled by four software components. This configuration is the base ArcGIS Enterprise deployment. Each component performs critical functions that support the requirements of the ArcGIS Enterprise deployment. Components are individually installed and configured to function together. This base deployment is the foundation for the ArcGIS Enterprise implementation. Where possible, our team will leverage automation to configure the ArcGIS Enterprise components.

CONFIGURE ARCGIS PORTAL

At the heart of the new environment, ArcGIS Portal will be deployed in a base and distributed configuration. Our team will build the necessary ArcGIS Portal instance(s) required for the new environment. We will target the GIS platform 11.1.1 (or higher “.1 release,” if desired by MSWD and recommend Esri LTS versions for production workloads) and follow the System Design Architecture artifact from the design phase that includes Esri’s best practices to be followed in the implementation and configuration. Our team will follow Esri’s best practices for secure ArcGIS Portal configuration as documented here: <https://enterprise.arcgis.com/en/portal/latest/administer/windows/security-best-practices.htm>

CONFIGURE ARCGIS SERVER

Our team will build the necessary ArcGIS Server Instances required for the AWS cloud environment. ArcGIS Server instances will be federated with Portal. With federated ArcGIS Servers, the portal's security store controls all access to the ArcGIS Server instance. This provides a convenient sign-on experience but also impacts how access and administration of the federated server(s) are controlled. Our team will follow Esri’s best practices for secure ArcGIS Server configuration as documented here: <https://enterprise.arcgis.com/en/server/latest/administer/windows/best-practices-for-configuring-a-secure-environment.htm>

CONFIGURE ARCGIS DATA STORE

Our team will configure ArcGIS Data Store to support the base Enterprise deployment. Data stores can include relational data store, tile cache data store, graph data store and or object data store for the hosted GIS environment.

CONFIGURE ARCGIS WEB ADAPTOR

Our team will configure ArcGIS Web Adapter in accordance with the technical design to support the appropriate deployment scenario to provide the appropriate access and restrictions at the web tier for the GIS implementation.

DEVELOP ARCGIS ENTERPRISE ADMINISTRATOR GUIDE

Our team will develop documentation for ArcGIS Enterprise administration including user and role management.

DEVELOP USER GUIDE FOR ARCGIS ENTERPRISE

Our team will develop a user guide for ArcGIS Enterprise for GIS staff to connect and use the new ArcGIS Enterprise environment leveraging ArcPro and ArcGIS Portal for daily tasks.

Testing and Launch ArcGIS Enterprise Environment on AWS

TEST ENVIRONMENTS PER TEST PLAN

Our team will follow the test plan to review and validate the new ArcGIS Enterprise deployment is configured as designed. Our team will resolve any issues uncovered and retest until all issues are resolved and provide MSWD with documented test results.

DEPLOY AWS ENVIRONMENT AS PRODUCTION ENVIRONMENT

In this stage, the new ArcGIS Enterprise environment will be deployed and released to users and GIS staff for production use. Since MSWD doesn’t currently have an existing ArcGIS Server or Enterprise environment the sequencing and timing of this event should be flexible though does need to be completed before the UN migration and Cityworks implementation can be finalized in the following project components.

Project Component 2: Import Existing Data and Ensure Readiness

System Migration Discovery & Planning

Early in the project, we will hold holistic discovery and planning sessions to ensure that all the component projects will be implemented in a way, and on a schedule, that makes sense and reduces both downtime and any need for duplicative editing. This will ensure that data gets migrated efficiently and at the time that makes the most sense so the new AGE, UN, and Cityworks are functional. This task might result in changes to the overall and component schedules to ensure we meet MSWD's business needs.

Migrate LandBase Data

Timmons Group will migrate MSWD's Landbase and other non-utility layers to the new enterprise geodatabases in Dev and Prod. Timmons Group does not recommend migrating the utility data to the enterprise geodatabases prior to the UN implementation. This will merely result in their replacement during the next Project Component.

UN Data Readiness Assessment

Timmons Group usually includes a "UN Data Readiness Assessment" as an early phase of our UN migration projects. However, due to the lack of resourcing and current GIS management practices (mdb and shapefile), we recommend forgoing this phase for MSWD. We will deploy the UN without prior data cleaning which will result in an inability to build subnetworks (and therefore run certain kinds of traces), but data cleaning can be automated as part of our migration processes with FME. In addition, data corrections can be more efficient in ArcGIS Pro/the UN because the errors will be exposed by the UN's validation workflow. Once the data has been cleaned, post-implementation, subnetworks and tracing will be fully functional.

Data Clean-up

After the UN is deployed to Production, Timmons Group will provide GIS editors to clean the data within the UN so that subnetworks can be successfully built. This will require access to source documents like As-builts to ensure edits can be completed correctly. This task will be completed using a time & materials rate.

Project Component 3: Migrate Data into Esri Utility Network

GIS Discovery

Timmons Group will work with MSWD to review the current GIS data. This will include the GIS databases, .mdb files, shapefiles, and other GIS data sources necessary to support the current and future GIS. The goal is to ensure that Timmons Group, to the best extent possible, captures the current system configuration and dependencies of MSWD's GIS prior to finalizing the technical design and implementing a new GIS.

UN Data Model Design & Editing Tools

DATA MODEL DESIGN

Per MSWD's request, the data models provided by Esri's solution will be used. However, there are customizations that Timmons Group have already done to these "base" data models to increase compatibility with Cityworks. These customizations will be used to ensure the success of the Cityworks component of this project. Per Cityworks discovery sessions, additional fields will be added to the data models, as required by MSWD's business requirements (for example, adding a WarrantyDate field).

EDITING TOOLS

Timmons Group will configure the UN databases and editing environment to ensure the highest possible data quality and to streamline editing workflows. Our team will configure Calculation and Validation Attribute Rules (AR) to ensure data quality; for example, Attribute Rules will generate the unique IDs that Cityworks requires. We will use a list of common rules and work with MSWD to ensure it meets business needs. Group editing templates will be configured per needs discussed during the workshops. This often involves items like hydrant and meter/service connection editing templates to streamline editing. These templates will be designed and documented at this stage but not built until the UN is deployed in the DEV environment. We recommend holding off on UN Diagrams until after the UN is in use and everyone at MSWD is comfortable with it.

UN Migration

DATA MIGRATION

Timmons Group will use Safe Software's FME product to migrate the data from the current data sources to the UN database from the previous phase. We will generate a Data Migration Matrix that show how each data source will be migrated to the UN data model, down to the field level (or domain values, as available).

The migration process can enhance and enrich the data mid-migration; for example, if a feature needs an attribute created based on a feature that it intersects, that can be created by the migration tool. We can also snap features together, within reasonable tolerances (e.g., hydrant to the end of a nearby lateral), and populate UN-specific data like subnetwork controllers. This is an iterative process; MSWD will have multiple chances to provide feedback both at the Migration Matrix stage and the actual data migration stage.

MIGRATION TO DEV ENTERPRISE ENVIRONMENT

Following migration approval, Timmons Group will move the draft migrations from file geodatabase into the DEV enterprise geodatabases in MSWD's environment and enable global IDs, editor tracking, branch versioning, and replica tracking. The mxd files will be migrated to ArcGIS Pro and re-built as necessary for the UN data model.

PROVIDE DOCUMENTATION AND THIRD-PARTY SOFTWARE

Timmons Group will share the created FME Workbenches to migrate the data and an updated Data Migration Matrix with MSWD.

Systems Integration

CITYWORKS

Following the identification of the Asset Types for Cityworks, Timmons Group will publish a feature service from Dev for Cityworks' Development environment to use. This will use definition queries to provide the relevant features for each Cityworks Asset Type.

CUES GRANITENET

If needed, a Map Package will be created for offline use by GraniteNet.

UN Testing, Training, and Go-Live

TIMMONS GROUP TESTING

Timmons Group will create a comprehensive testing plan that will:

- Identify team members and their roles and testing responsibilities
- Clearly delineate what is in-scope based on business needs

- Identify test criteria, environment, assumptions, and phases
- Create test scripts to ensure relevant functionality is addressed

Testing will be conducted on the DEV environment to ensure the UN data model and ArcGIS configurations are functional. We will also ensure the infrastructure is configured for good editing and viewing performance. Timmons Group will conduct system testing and functional testing prior to user acceptance testing (UAT) to ensure the system is ready for use. Changes to the data model, the data, the ArcGIS Pro configurations, or the test scripts are all possible. Once Timmons Group has passed the agreed-on test scripts, MSWD will receive training to prepare staff members to conduct their testing.

TRAINING

Once the migration is deployed to the DEV environment and tested by Timmons Group, we will provide four days of training: two days focused on office editing, one for field/mobile editors, and one day focused on administration. These focused training days align with the Workflow Guide documents that Timmons Group will provide. Following these trainings, the MSWD team will be empowered to use the Test Scripts to ensure full functionality of the implementation in the DEV environment so that the solution can be approved for Go-Live.

MSWD TESTING

MSWD will conduct testing following the test scripts that Timmons Group provided. It is possible that MSWD will have additional tests to perform, per IT requirements. Once MSWD passes the tests, Go-live approval should proceed.

UN Go-LIVE

Following successful UAT on DEV and with go-live nearing for Cityworks, an editing freeze will occur in the current production environment. The data will be extracted from the current production database and used in the final iteration of the migration tool. We will then load the UN data to the production environment, with configurations (e.g., attribute rules, editor tracking) applied. Feature services will be published and editing maps re-sourced to the production environment. Test scripts will be followed to ensure that functionality is still present and stable in this final environment. Integrations will be updated to ensure all functionality works as expected. This Go-Live process and regression testing is expected to take about a week. Timmons Group will work through the weekends to minimize downtime.

Project Component 4: Cityworks Implementation

Timmons Group has developed a phased and collaborative project approach that will provide the best overall solution to MSWD. (The methodology description is highly summarized to respect the required page limitations of our proposal). Our approach for each major Stage and Task is centered on four major program components:

- Project Management
- Core Software Configuration
- Department (Functional Group) Specific Implementations & replacement/integration of/to various existing/future systems
- Data analysis, reporting, and dashboards

Cityworks Asset Readiness

CITYWORKS ASSET HIERARCHY DESIGN & GAP ANALYSIS

In line with the work Timmons Group is completing as part of Project Component 3, Timmons Group will work with MSWD to establish an Asset Hierarchy for the new data model. Timmons Group will first host an overview of how assets are defined and used in Cityworks, then host one or more workshop(s) to review the defined assets and GIS with stakeholders. The outcome of these workshops are twofold: the Asset Hierarchy and the GIS Gap Analysis, which will serve as the backbone of the Cityworks implementation and should include all assets MSWD wishes to maintain in Cityworks, including vertical assets.

Task Group Deliverables

- Asset Hierarchy workshops, 4 hours total duration
- Asset Hierarchy spreadsheet (database design basics)
- GIS Gap Analysis & review meeting, 2 hours total duration

Cityworks Environment Preparation & Set-up

CITYWORKS KICK-OFF

Project team members and participating MSWD staff will participate in a Cityworks Phase Kick-off held to introduce project participants, establish roles and responsibilities of project participants, validate goals and objectives, establish the lines of communication for use throughout the project, and to answer any questions the staff may have. The kick-off meeting will include a Cityworks software demonstration.

CWOL OVERVIEW & INTEGRATING SYSTEMS DISCUSSION

We will meet with the Project core team to conduct a review of current and planned system architecture to address:

- Overview of Cityworks Online, including upgrades post Go-Live
- Review of Cityworks licensing
- Review mobile options for Field users, including devices and the current MDM solution in use
- A review of existing architecture and licensing per scoped system integrations.

LEGACY DATA/SYSTEM REVIEW

Timmons Group will host a walkthrough of a typical workflow completed by the agency in the current asset management system. The agency will share an existing workflow diagram (if existing), talk through the current business process and drivers, and demonstrate steps in the existing software system(s).

STAND UP CITYWORKS ONLINE

Timmons Group will liaise with Trimble Cityworks to stand up Cityworks Online (CWOL) and set up an administrative account to begin the configuration process.

CORE SYSTEM DATA MAPPING

The implementation team will define core configuration data in Cityworks and meet with MSWD to review the data mapping spreadsheets. The Cityworks core data mapping forms a portion of the Cityworks System Design Document. With our implementation team's assistance, MSWD will provide data to populate portions of the software prior to the Configuration Workshops. Any information MSWD can deliver prior to the workshops will be used by the implementation team to design, configure and implement the initial Cityworks configuration. The Cityworks Core System Data consists of the following:

- Employees – A list of all employees with titles, email addresses, contact information, labor rates, rate types
- Materials – A list of materials/parts that are used by your organization to complete work
- Equipment – A list of vehicles and heavy equipment used by your organization to complete work
- Contractors – Details about contractors used for work activities.

- Customer Accounts – Details about customers used as a lookup for service request creation.
- System Codes – Priority, status, categories and other fields on service requests, work orders and inspections

Task Group Deliverables

- Project Kick-off presentation & meeting minutes
- CWOL Overview & Integrating Systems meeting
- Cityworks Online environment stood up
- Legacy Data/System review meeting
- Cityworks AMS Core System Data meeting

Core System Implementation

CITYWORKS CONFIGURATION SPRINTS

The Timmons Group Project Manager will work with the MSWD Core Team to develop a scheduled cadence of the configuration to meet the requirements provided by the team.

- Configuration sprints will typically last three weeks
- Configuration sprints will include workshops to cover configuration workflows for each Functional Group that will cover discussion of asset categories, configuration of work order and inspection workflows, relevant interfaces, reports used, and data migration considerations.
- After configuration workshops, the MSWD Core Team completes any remaining areas in the worksheet not covered during workshops.
- Once returned, Timmons Group will use the worksheets to configure the system for the Functional Group.

Configuration sprints will culminate in a review meeting with the pertinent members of the Project team where MSWD will have the opportunity to provide feedback for any necessary remediation. Services for this task will include, but are not limited to:

- Work activity templates
- Work activity default roles and responsibilities where they exist
- Identification of data elements that are necessary to capture with any activity type
- Inventory (material) types and requirements as they exist in relation to work activity
- Equipment types and requirements as they exist in relation to work activity
- Existing datasets used or slated to be used in the proposed work activity processes
- Work activity printout forms or print templates where necessary
- Reporting or data tracking needs or requirements as they relate to work activity processes
- Identification of any touchpoint for integrated software(s) as they relate to Cityworks work activities

REPORT & DASHBOARD DEVELOPMENT

During discovery workshops and review meetings with each Functional Group, we will identify the reports and dashboards that are critical to MSWD's operations and leverage existing reports when it makes sense or create new reports and dashboards as necessary. This process of report and dashboard development will include the following:

- Catalog required reports/dashboards – The implementation team will first host a Prioritization Workshop, then work with Functional Groups to identify and catalog any existing reports that are required for continued use with Cityworks. The team will also work to identify any new reports/dashboards that Functional Groups determine helpful or necessary for their asset management needs.
- Create identified reports and dashboards – The implementation team will develop reports and dashboards and test them against the development Cityworks environment. Dashboards may be built in a variety of reporting tools, from data visualization software to dashboards in Cityworks.
- Review and remediation of reports being developed – The implementation team will meet with Functional Groups to review developed reports and make any adjustments or alterations to those files as necessary.

SYSTEM DESIGN DOCUMENT

Once all required information regarding the current work order management, service request, and inspection processes are collected and organized, our implementation team will work together to analyze and document the configuration in the System Design Document. This document serves as a reference of configuration decisions, reports, business processes and other information compiled during the implementation effort.

Cityworks System Integrations

ENTERPRISE INTEGRATIONS OVERVIEW

The concept of the enterprise system is to create interface points for solutions to share appropriate information with other software systems. Our team has extensive experience both configuring software and systems leveraging Cityworks APIs that include Service Request, Work Order, Inspections and metrics, the Cityworks Software Development Kit (SDK), and existing interfaces or modules for numerous customer billing, SCADA, Financial, Fleet Management, Billing, AVL, UDF, leak detection, fuel, playground equipment, and other systems. For the integrations requested, firstly, MSWD has identified Esri ArcGIS to be integrated with Cityworks. Understand that due to the architecture of Cityworks the integration to Esri ArcGIS requires no effort, it is built into the solution proposed (Note: Cityworks leverages Esri ArcGIS for Active Directory integration; MSWD likely has the requisite licensing but may require Esri system architecture changes).

The integration with Granite.NET is identified in the response to questions posed by Cyient and released on January 8, 2024 as being unnecessary for this phase of the project. This integration is therefore an option to pursue after Go-Live of the Cityworks AMS implementation.

The second integration identified by MSWD is with DigAlert, Timmons Group will use a modified Agile methodology to write an integration between the integrating system and Cityworks. We find this methodology strikes the appropriate balance between developing an integration that is well designed, considers the best technology for achieving the implementation, and is fair regarding the level of effort to both our clients and to ourselves. For each custom integration (DigAlert), the project team will work to:

- 1) Define the functional requirements of the integration
- 2) Build the proposed workflows, business rules and identify the system of action and ownership (record) for each task identified by the workflow design
- 3) Understand the level of effort required to build the integration
- 4) Understand the level of effort required to configure Cityworks PLL to successfully use/perform the integration

INTEGRATION WORKSHOPS

Our team will kick off the integration effort by hosting a discovery & design workshop. The goal is to meet with Functional Group(s) and verify critical information relevant to how the integration should work to best meet user business needs. Discussion during workshops will include:

- Integration workflows
- Frequency of updates from integrating system
- Functional requirements of integration in the form of User Stories
- API call limitations
- Location of integration console application

INTEGRATION REQUIREMENTS REFINEMENT AND GENERATION OF ACCEPTANCE CRITERIA

The Timmons Group Solutions Architect and development team will compile the final requirements of the integration. The Timmons Group Solutions Architect will work with MSWD to define acceptance criteria for each requirement. These requirements will include which data will pass between systems, how frequently data updates will occur, and the methodology by which data will be transmitted.

FINAL INTEGRATION DESIGN DOCUMENT

Timmons Group will develop a final document during this task, the Integration Design Document. This document includes:

- 1) Functional & technical requirements for the integration, including:
 - a. Integration direction (1-way or 2-way), frequency, and triggers
 - b. Final location of integration code or application
 - c. Methodology/APIs used
 - d. Error logging practices

- 2) Out-of-Scope items
- 3) Assumptions
- 4) Questions & Responses

INTEGRATION USER ACCEPTANCE TESTING & TEST SCRIPTS

The user acceptance testing phase of the implementation project will offer staff the opportunity to review the integration and complete end-to-end testing. Timmons Group will identify the necessary steps to complete end-to-end testing, and staff will complete and confirm testing results. Feedback will be incorporated into a revision process that will guide modifications to the scripts and processes that initially drove the integration. Feedback will be submitted using the same methodology as the overall project UAT, and the integration testing acceptance will be folded into User Acceptance Testing sign-off.

INTEGRATION DEPLOYMENT

On completion of the testing process and acceptance by MSWD, the project team will prepare for final cutover, which will coincide with the release of the new systems on the Go-Live date. Timmons Group will deploy the integration in the Production environment.

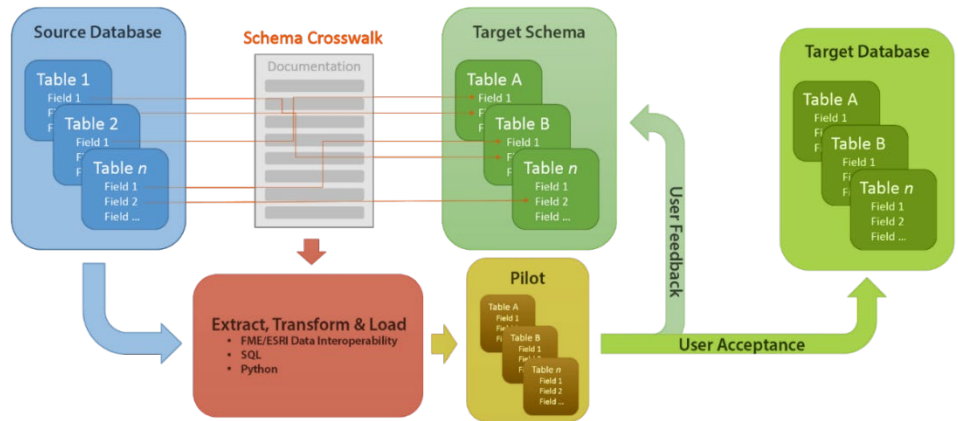
Cityworks Data Migrations

DATA MIGRATION/CONVERSION

One of the key objectives of MSWD is to migrate any desired legacy data to Cityworks from various systems. Inherent to that process is establishing a strategy to deal with the data that is being managed in what will become a legacy system. This task specifically addresses the datasets and systems that are slated for conversion into the proposed Cityworks solution. While the legacy datasets and systems targeted for conversion (ManagerPlus, Nobel Geoviewer) will span multiple database schemas, database versions and even database formats, the fundamental approach to successfully migrating data from one system to the other is, in fact, the same.

MIGRATION WORKSHOPS

The implementation team will work together to understand the data migration requirements. A series of discovery workshop meetings will be held to review current systems and their data schemas, as well as the review of requirements for the data migration effort. It will need to be understood by all team members what data needs to be moved from the legacy system to the Cityworks environment. MSWD should be prepared to determine what the state of the legacy system will be moving forward: understanding the accessibility of legacy systems may have an impact on what data is required to be migrated to the new Cityworks system. The team will also need to discuss and determine what defines ‘success criteria’ for the data migration. After reviewing and understanding the nature of the data in the existing system as well as the requirements for data to be moved to the Cityworks system, an agreed on percentage of records migrated is necessary. Timmons Group will document the outcomes of these discovery workshop meetings.



SCRIPT DEVELOPMENT

The project team will develop a series of processes to facilitate the actual migration of the source system data into Cityworks. Depending on the complexity and volume of the source data, the process may be a mix of manual and a scripted solution but will be established in a manner to ensure repeatability. The scripted solutions will be tailored to each specific data conversion effort and may range from native SQL Server scripts to third party migration tools but will ultimately follow a pattern referred to as extract, transform and load (ETL). The ETL process will be designed as a one-time process that will result in data migrated into a development Cityworks database.

DATA MIGRATION SPRINTS

Once the scripts are developed, the project team will test the converted data. This process is designed so that after the first data migration sprint (Draft) a review meeting will be held to note any issues or errors, make necessary adjustments to the scripts, and then repeat the process. A summary of the migration sprints will be provided to the client as well. This will be an opportunity to review the results versus the previously defined success criteria threshold.

DATA MIGRATION USER ACCEPTANCE TESTING

The user acceptance testing phase of the implementation project will offer staff the opportunity to review the migration data within the context of the proposed Cityworks system in contrast with the information contained in the source systems. The acceptance testing places more emphasis on the front-end testing, wherein users will interact with, interrogate and visualize data through the Cityworks interface. Feedback will be incorporated into a revision process that will guide modifications to the scripts and processes that initially drove the conversion. On completion of the testing process and acceptance by MSWD, the project team will prepare for the production conversion, which will coincide with the release of the proposed system and the retirement of the legacy solutions.

Cityworks User Acceptance Testing

DEVELOP TESTING AND ACCEPTANCE PLAN AND TEST CASES

The implementation team will work with MSWD to develop and administer a Testing and Acceptance Plan that addresses User Acceptance Testing (UAT). The Testing and Acceptance Plan will address how MSWD will test Cityworks software functionality and database configuration, including testing across the Cityworks platform (Respond and Mobile app) and tracking configuration defects for remediation. Data conversion and integration efforts will include their own discrete testing period. Timmons Group implementation team will also develop a series of testing scripts to guide testing users through the testing workflows. These scripts provide structure for testing users to follow during the execution of User Acceptance Testing. On completion of development of the Testing and Acceptance Plan, the Team shall submit said plan to MSWD for review and approval.

ACCEPTANCE TESTING

Prior to Go-Live there will be an acceptance testing period. During this period MSWD will test the Cityworks implementation to identify and resolve issues. The Testing and Acceptance Plan will frame and guide staff through the testing process, and users will follow the Test Cases to determine testing outcomes. User Acceptance Testing is kicked off by Tester Training, wherein Timmons Group implementation staff will host remote web meetings to train testers on the key components of the software. These training sessions are focused on the functions specific to testing. Timmons Group instructors will also provide support during the UAT period for users as needed. Users will follow the process outlined in the Testing and Acceptance Plan to submit defects to Timmons Group for remediation. At the end of the acceptance testing period, the client Project Manager will sign off on User Acceptance Testing to formally move the project into the Training phase.

Training

TRAINING OVERVIEW

During each onsite meeting (e.g., kick-off, workshops, configuration review) our implementation team will consistently expose MSWD staff to Cityworks and basic workflows within the software. By the time the implementation project has reached Training, the focus of the task is system-wide adoption of the product and many staff will already be familiar with the Cityworks software.

TRAINING PLAN & PREPARATION

Our implementation team, in conjunction with the MSWD Project Manager and key stakeholders, will devise a training plan specific to your environment. Training is across the Cityworks platform as necessary per workflows/roles. The approach to developing this plan is detailed below. The training plan will include:

- Product training curriculum descriptions and instructors
- Training Materials
- Client responsibilities
- Schedule

This training plan will be used as a guide but may be modified when necessary to support the goals and techniques of staff resources. Additionally, Timmons Group technical staff will develop documentation and prepare the Cityworks environment for training.

CITYWORKS ONSITE TRAINING

Cityworks training is modular. Students attend those sections that are relevant to the type of work that they are performing. All courses include relevant materials and sample data. MSWD will identify who will be trained based on the criteria and needs that will have been identified during configuration workshops.

Cityworks Go-Live

CUTOVER, GO-LIVE, AND FINAL ACCEPTANCE OVERVIEW

The period between the end of Training and Go-Live Day is called Cutover. This period, typically over a weekend, follows a strict timeline to take MSWD live in Cityworks as quickly as possible after users have completed training. Preparation for Cutover begins prior to User Acceptance Testing to allow ample time to prepare the environment.

GO-LIVE CHECKLIST

Timmons Group will prepare a Go-Live Checklist to guide all key members of the project implementation team through the Cutover process. The Go-Live Checklist is a detailed task plan, including resource assignments, to support moving the Cityworks software from test to production environments over the course of the scheduled Cutover period.

GO-LIVE

Per the Go-Live Checklist, the implementation team will execute the tasks during the cutover period to take the production environment to “Live” status. Timmons Group will provide on-call or onsite Go-Live Support during the first days of Go-Live.

SYSTEM DEPLOYMENT SUPPORT & FINAL ACCEPTANCE

Timmons Group will provide support for the period between Go-Live and Final Acceptance while users begin adopting and the system stabilizes. Timmons Group will tie up loose ends, correct any new issues found, assist users in troubleshooting, host ad-hoc web meetings to aid users who need additional help after training, and guide Cityworks Administrators through the first steps administering the system.

FINAL ACCEPTANCE

Targeted around thirty days Post Go-Live, the system should be stable enough for Final Acceptance. Timmons Group will begin the transition to our Customer Success Manager, step through project closeout tasks, and host the final project meetings. MSWD will sign off on Final Acceptance.

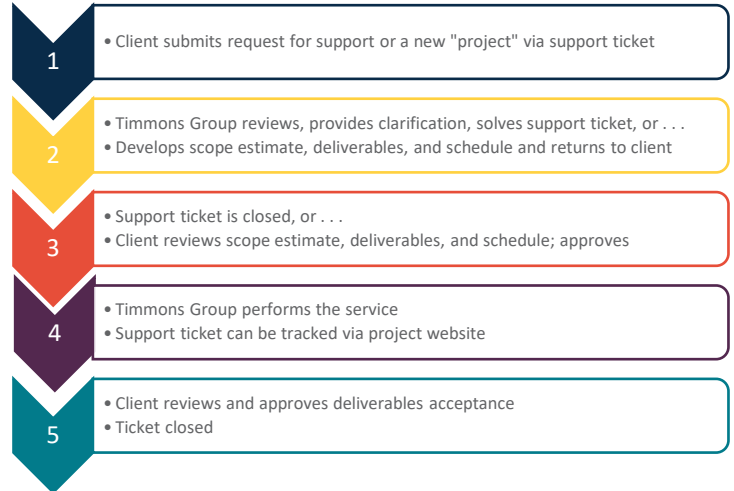

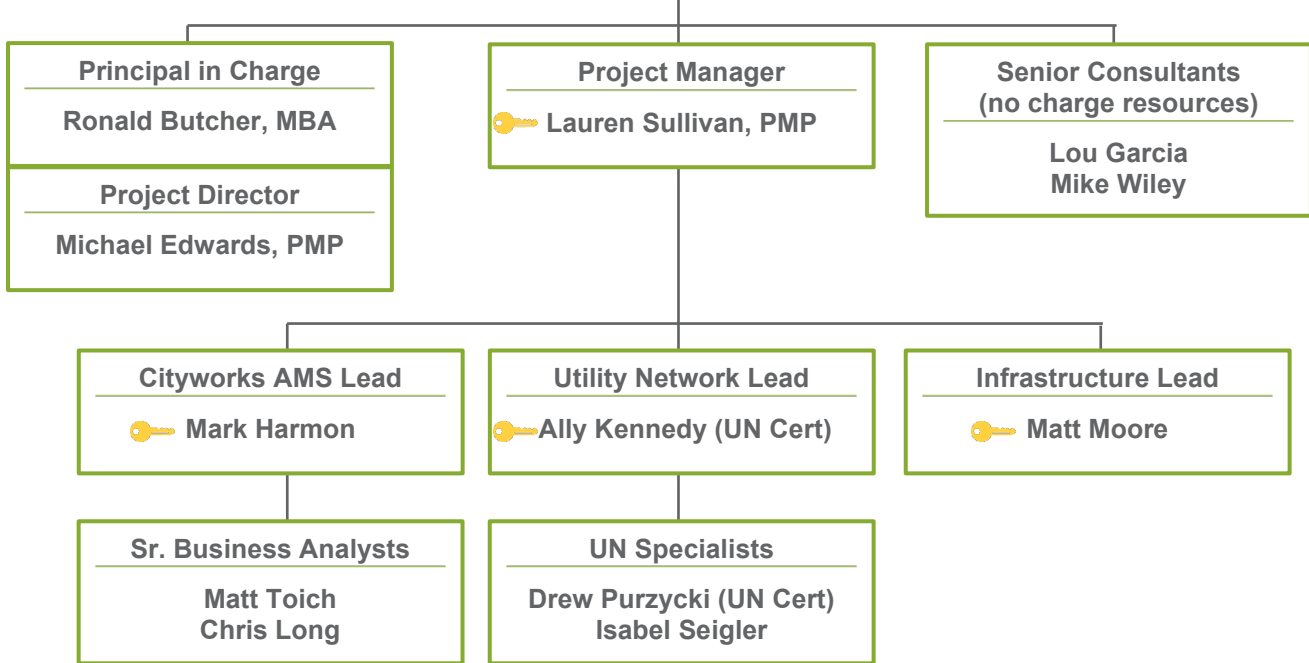
Component 4 Assumptions

- MSWD will provide data as identified in the Gap Analysis Document and Asset Hierarchy spreadsheets.
- MSWD will provide Timmons Group with a copy of the Cityworks AMS & CWOL Software license agreement
- MSWD will be present and participate in all meetings
- MSWD will provide any necessary documentation for current (As-is) business processes, including standard operating procedures, work forms, and/or reports where they exist
- MSWD will have necessary report/dashboard software licensing acquired for report file development and will give Timmons Group sufficient access to that software

- MSWD is responsible for all testing of core system configuration according to the Testing Plan
- MSWD is responsible for identifying User Acceptance Testers and assigning associated testing scripts
- Class sizes will be limited to 15 students.
- MSWD will sign off on Final Acceptance on completion of services rendered

Project Component 5: Staff Augmentation

MSWD is also seeking staff augmentation services to maximize its investment in GIS technology and expand its usefulness. The vision from the RFP was that these services, since they were to be ad-hoc, would be based on hourly rates. Timmons Group has provided hourly rates for staff that could be leveraged through this type of engagement. We also wanted to make MSWD aware that we provide these types of services on a fixed-fee basis. 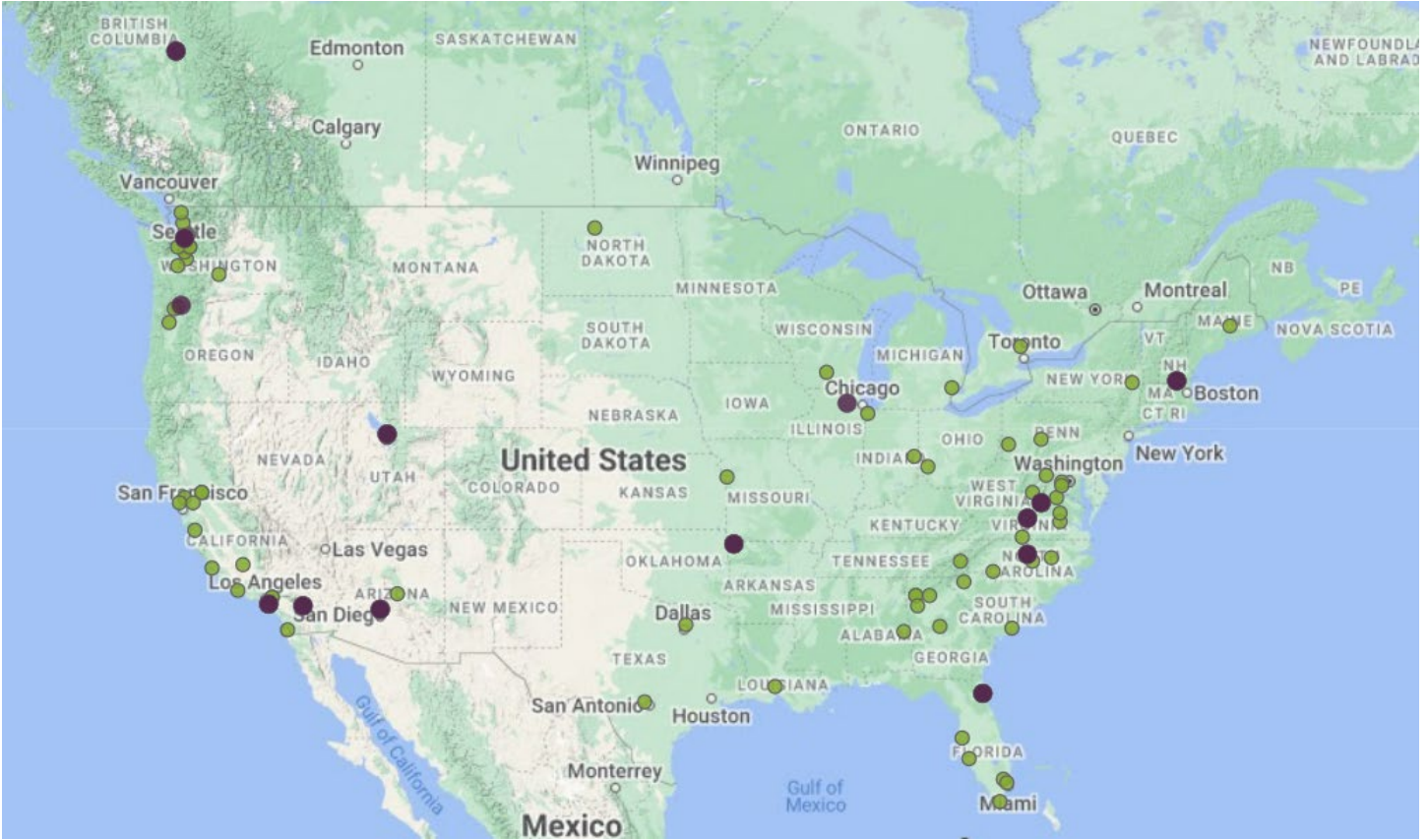


Figure 1: Timmons Group has worked with numerous Municipal Utility Clients (green) and performed multiple Utility Network Projects (purple) across North America.

They may not be resold, transferred, or otherwise disposed of, to any other country or to any person other than the authorized ultimate consignee or end-user(s), either in their original form or after being incorporated into other items, without first obtaining approval from the U.S. government or as otherwise authorized by U.S. law and regulations.

EXHIBIT C

Term, Early Termination & Notice

Complete Deployment of ArcGIS Enterprise, Utility Networks, Cityworks

A. Term of Agreement

This professional services agreement shall be effective upon approval and execution by the parties hereof (the "effective date") and shall continue until terminated as provided for herein. Notwithstanding anything in this agreement to the contrary, this agreement shall automatically terminate after two (2) years and four (4) months from the effective date, unless extended by the parties with the approval of the Mission Springs Water District (sometimes referred to herein as "District").

B. Early Termination of Agreement

Notwithstanding any other provision of this agreement, Mission Springs Water District, at its sole option, may terminate this agreement with or without cause, or for no cause or for convenience at any time by giving thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant.

District has the right to terminate or abandon any portion or all the work under this Agreement by giving thirty (30) days written notice to Consultant. In such event, District shall immediately be given possession, title and access to all administrative accounts and data (including any passwords) required, necessary or desirable for complete access to and management of any data/asset/service created, stored, maintained or setup for the District, all original field notes, drawings and specifications, written reports, and other documents and data produced or developed for that portion of the work completed and/or being abandoned. The District will pay Consultant at the agreed upon rate set forth in the Schedule of Charges rendered for any portion of the work completed prior to termination where the District finds the work acceptable. If said termination occurs prior to completion of any task for the Project for which a payment request has not been received, the charge for services deemed acceptable by District will be pursuant to the rates set forth in the Schedule of Charges but not to exceed the reasonable value of such services. The District shall not be liable for any costs other than the charges or portions thereof which are specified herein. Consultant shall not be entitled to payment for unperformed services or work deemed unacceptable by District and shall not be entitled to damages or compensation for termination of work.

Consultant may terminate its obligation to provide further services under this Agreement upon thirty (30) days written notice to the District only in the event of substantial failure by the District to perform in accordance with the terms of this Agreement through no fault of Consultant.

AWARD OF CONTRACT TO TRI-STAR CONTRACTING II INC., FOR THE 13TH AVENUE, MISSION LAKES BOULEVARD AND THOMAS AVENUE TROPICAL STORM HILARY WATERLINE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

This item was presented at the May 16th Study Session. General Manager Macy summarized the item, and Will Whitten presented a slight modification. He noted that over the weekend, an adjustment was made to the amount being requested from the Bureau of Reclamation to include MSWD personnel time, bringing the total amount up to \$358,010. Given that the grant can fund up to \$400,000 and we are requesting a 0% cost share due to the project area's disadvantaged community status, the grant could still fund the entire amount we request.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution 2024-17, and authorize the Executive Assistant to notify the County Registrar of Voters that the offices of three board members are to be filled and that candidates will be responsible for the costs associated with the Candidate's Statement.

SUMMARY

The District is required to notify the Riverside County Registrar of Voters of the holding of the 2024 election for three directors’ seats currently held by Robert Griffith, Russ Martin, and Ivan Sewell. Pursuant to provisions of the California Elections Code, the Board of Directors must adopt certain resolutions related to the General District Election. As such, it is necessary to submit the appropriate resolutions to the County of Riverside for consolidation and for the Board to approve necessary costs associated with the election. The election costs include the polling place cost, direct costs such as printing, mailing, publications, translations, transporting, security, processing ballots, election supplies, staffing, temporary staff, and election payroll. Election costs are distributed among all jurisdictions that are on the ballot. Each estimate is based on the current number of registered voters in each county.

ANALYSIS

In prior MSWD general district elections, candidates have been responsible for any and all costs associated with the printing and handling of the Candidate’s Statement. The Riverside County Registrar estimates the cost of the 2024 Candidate’s Statement will be \$550. The filing of the candidate’s statement for inclusion in the voter’s pamphlet is optional, and there is no cost to any candidate for filing nomination papers, so the recommended deposit should not be construed as serving as a deterrent for anyone with limited financial resources from running for local elected office.

RESOLUTION 2024-19 ~ OPPOSING BALLOT INITIATIVE 1935

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Board adoption of Resolution No. 2024-19 takes an opposing position on Ballot Initiative 1935.

SUMMARY

Ballot Initiative 1935 limits the ability of voters and State and Local Governments to raise revenues for government services. An entity representing California’s wealthiest corporations is behind a proposition eligible for the November 2024 statewide ballot. The measure – Initiative 1935 (previously Initiative 21-0042A1) – would revise the state constitution to significantly undermine local control and disrupt the ability of local governments to provide essential services and infrastructure. CSDA has formed a coalition of member agencies against the initiative and asked them to pass individual resolutions opposing it.

ANALYSIS

Ballot Initiative 1935 will result in the loss of billions of dollars annually in critical State and local funding, disrupting the ability of voters, local agencies, and the State to fund services and infrastructure by:

- Adopting new and stricter rules for raising taxes, fees, assessments, and other charges.
- Revising the State Constitution, as amended by Propositions 13, 218, and 26, among other provisions, creates new grounds to challenge funding sources and disrupt fiscal certainty.
- Restricting the ability to issue fines and penalties to corporations and property owners that violate local environmental, water quality, public health, public safety, fair housing, nuisance, and other laws and ordinances.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MISSION SPRINGS WATER DISTRICT OPPOSING INITIATIVE 1935 (FORMERLY 21-0042A1)

WHEREAS, an association representing California’s wealthiest corporations is spending millions of dollars to promote a deceptive proposition currently eligible for the November 2024 statewide ballot; and

WHEREAS, the measure restricts the discretion and flexibility of locally elected boards to respond to the needs of their communities and injects uncertainty into the financing and sustainability of critical infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the measure constrains state and local officials’ ability to protect our environment, public health and safety, and our neighborhoods against those who violate the law; and

WHEREAS, the measure is opposed by hundreds of local governments, firefighters and other first responders, healthcare providers, teachers, working families, and local elected officials;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Mission Springs Water District opposes Initiative 1935 (formerly 21-0042A1);

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Mission Springs Water District will join the No on Initiative 1935 (formerly 21-0042A1) coalition, a growing coalition of local

government, public safety, labor, infrastructure advocates, and other organizations throughout the state.

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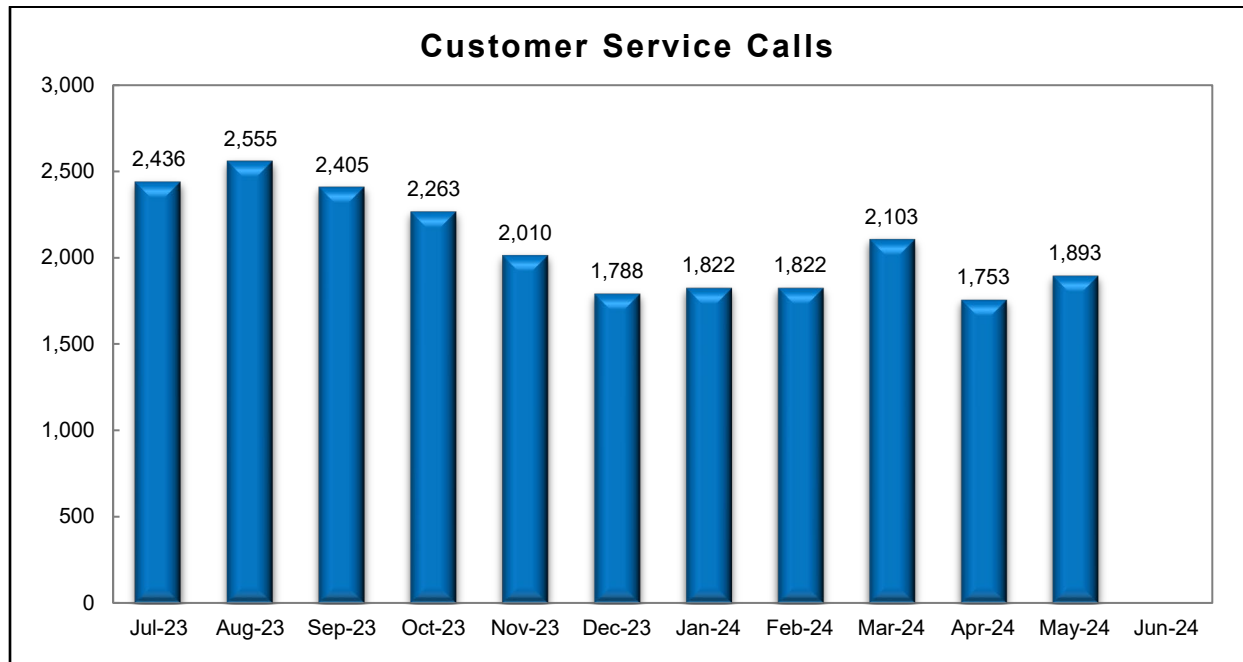

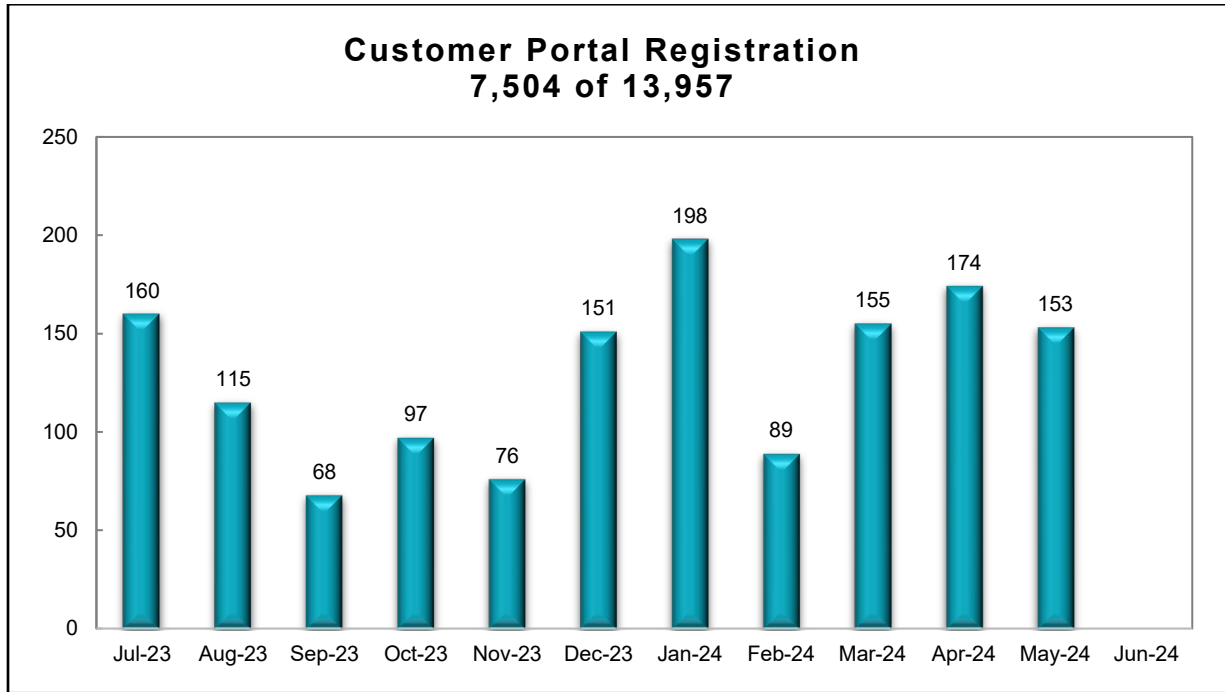

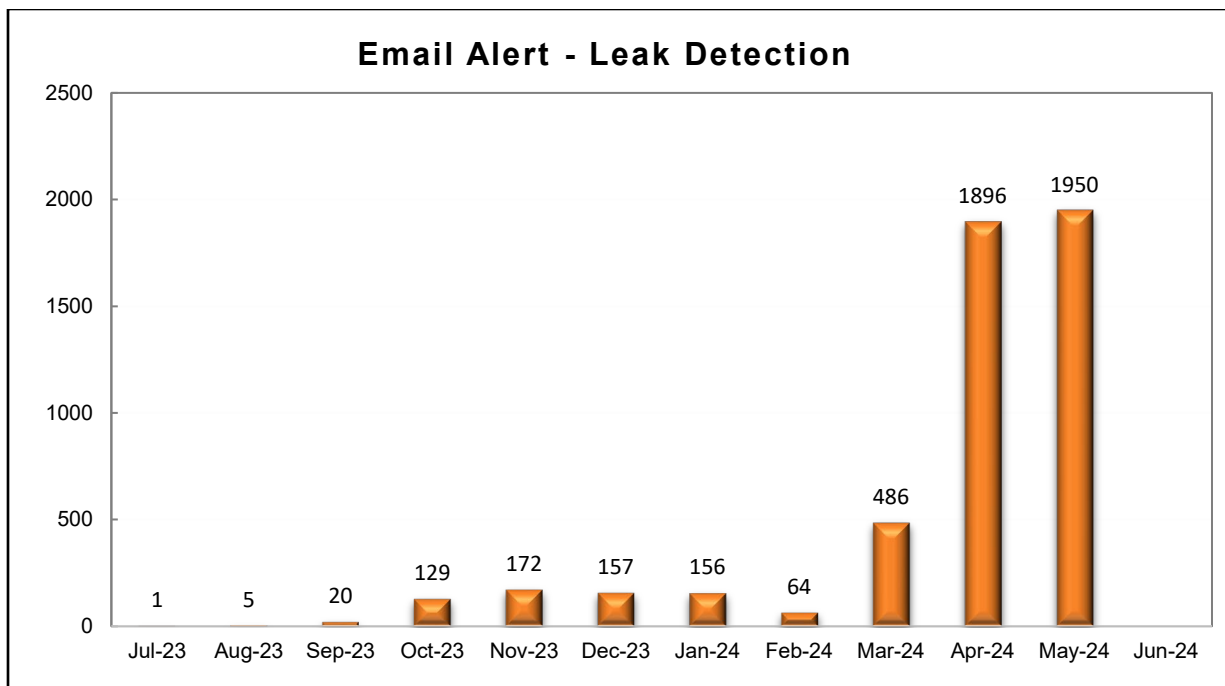
Customer Portal

The District has implemented an AMI infrastructure and Neptune 360 portal. All customers are encouraged to sign up for the Customer Portal to access bills and leak alerts. Since launching the portal, customer adoption has reached 54%, or 7,504 customers registered so far.



Monitoring of Customer Accounts

WaterSmart Analytics data provides a comprehensive overview of leaks detected and automated alerts sent to MSWD customers. All customers are encouraged to sign up in the Customer Portal to access bills and leak alerts.



Customer Experience Enhancement Program

The Customer Service Department continues the Customer Experience Enhancement Program. This program provides an Online Booking Calendar for in-person one-on-one account assistance and review, in addition to phone screening and on-the-spot feedback/coaching with a Customer Service representative.



The Customer Service team continues to host “Coffee Talk Wednesdays” providing mini-training and discussions. Weekly training topics include:

Customer Bill Assistance Programs

The District continues to facilitate bill assistance programs for the benefit of its customers.

- The United Way Customer Bill Assistance Program continues to be utilized by those customers who need assistance for one billing period annually, paying \$100 per approved customer.
- Riverside County's Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) Care Program provides customers with a one-time payment towards their water and/or sewer bill of up to \$5,000. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services permitted the extension of the LIHWAP program through March 31, 2024. Please note that the program is now closed as of March 31, 2024. There is no further funding as of now, and the remaining payments from the March 2024 applications will be received in April 2024.

Finance & Accounting Department

The Finance and Accounting Department continues to work with its vendors to complete the yearly and necessary tasks to meet State and Federal reporting requirements and the strategic goals established by the MSWD Board of Directors. Below are project highlights and summaries for May 2024.

Payroll

Staff continues to work with Lincoln Financial to gather employee information and make modifications to payroll reports, required by the implementation of the new investment platform called "Alliance" that will be rolling out in June 2024 for the deferred compensation plans administered by Lincoln.

Additionally, the following quarterly procedures were completed in the month of April 2024:

- Worker's Compensation Insurance Payments were calculated for the 1st quarter of 2024 and processed with ACWA for a total of \$37,437.81.
- Form 941 Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return was filed.
- Form DE 9 CA Quarterly Contribution Return and Report of Wages was filed.

Current Work Priorities

The Accounting team worked on the preliminary audit work requested by RAMS who was in the office the week of May 27, 2024, performing audit procedures through March 2024.

The Accounting team continues the process of updating the Accounts Payable invoice approval using Laserfiche workflow.

Staff also began to draft policy and Laserfiche workflow for the Unclaimed Funds process.

Accounting continues to support other departments as needed:

- Engineering
 - A reimbursable job was created to track all the expenses related to New Development projects, for:

- Industrial Pretreatment Comp Plan Review 13310 Little Morongo.
- Operations
 - Accounting continues to support Operations on reimbursable jobs that need to be billed. These include primarily damage to District property where a police report was filed.
- Human Resources
 - Accounting continues to work with Human Resources to update employee forms and workflow using Laserfiche Forms; including the Boot Reimbursement form, Direct Deposit Change form, Timesheet submittal form, and the Off Work Request form.
- Customer Service
 - Accounting worked with Customer Service on the Sewer Charges Pre-payment letter to go out to all customers with sewer fees, to prepay before they go on the property taxes.
 - Accounting helped with the arrearage funds that were sent back to the state for current accounts of approximately \$1,500.

The Director of Finance continues:

- Work with Raffelis on the Long-Range Financial Master Plan, providing additional backup on District cost of services.
- Attended the 2024 ACWA Spring Conference in Sacramento, bringing back several ideas for improving District Procedures.
- Continues to work with the General Manager from Monte Vista Water District through the CSDA mentorship program.
- Continues to work with the General Manager and Timmons to streamline the GIS project into a shorter timeframe.
- Coordination with staff to work with Lincoln Financial group to update and plan documents related to the 457b deferred compensation plan and to implement a 401a plan.
- Continues to work with the outside business analyst on the grants and preparation of the Regional Grant reimbursement submittals.
- Continues to work with accounting on new GASB pronouncements that affect the District in the current year.
- Attended several CSDA trainings on things like PFAS and Payroll updates as well as contract agreements to stay on top of current trends affecting special districts.

The District received a plaque from the GFOA for the 2024 Distinguished Budget Presentation Award.

Cash

Total cash receipts for the month of May 2024 amounted to \$14,466,263, primarily from water and sewer customer account payments, including the County deposit for the sewer charges on the property taxes of approximately \$4 million. Also, the receipt of one of two checks from the State Water Board for the Regional Water Reclamation Facility grant totaling \$9,069,477.

Innovation & Technology Department

The Innovation and Technology (IT) Department continues to work with staff and vendors to achieve technological enhancement and meet innovation goals established by the MSWD Board of Directors. Below are project highlights and summaries for May 2024.

Department Updates

- Intelesys is finalizing the migration to the new email security platform with an estimated go-live in early June 2024.
- Issues were encountered with a District firewall and the manufacturer issued a replacement. The replacement unit has been functioning properly.
- Assisted Public Affairs with technology needs for the internship program.
- Provided eDiscovery assistance for a public records request.

Technology Improvements

- A new wireless access point was installed at the Corporate Yard in the shop area to allow connectivity of the device used for automotive repair.
- Two new security cameras were installed at the Corporate Yard.
- A new wireless access point was installed at the Wright Regional Water Reclamation Facility.
- Cybersecurity improvements continue to be made to improve District security.
- Desktop computers and laptop upgrades continue as needed.

On-Going Cyber Security Training

IT continues the monthly anti-phishing training scenarios with staff and Board members. Staff have been diligent in reporting suspicious emails or contacting the IT Manager for review of suspicious emails before acting.

Purchasing Department

Staff continues to source sanitization supplies to ensure wipes, hand sanitizer, and disinfectants are available to all District buildings and vehicles for the safety of the staff.

Price increases and supply chain issues continue to surface within our industry. Specifically, PVC pipe and fittings, ductile iron pipe and service brass fittings, restraints, hydrants, and valves, as well as many other products, are experiencing significant shortages that could lead to extended lead times. Along with these supply chain problems, pricing continues to escalate. These problems exist with both domestic and import materials. Staff will continue to monitor the situation and perform due diligence in getting all the material that is needed to maintain the water systems.

Total inventory purchases were \$35,624.67, and the total issued for use by field crews totaled \$36,474.74, for May 2024.



ENGINEERING & OPERATIONS

Engineering Department

Below is a list of Capital Projects and status updates for May 2024.

Well 42 Project

MSWD has tentatively approved the proposed downhole rehabilitation plan provided by the hydrogeologist. As a result, the contractor provided a change order to complete the out-of-scope work. Given the out-of-scope nature of the well rehabilitation work, and total amount required to complete said work, staff will bring a contract amendment to the Board for approval in June 2024. Following approval of the contract amendment, staff will direct the contractor to complete the necessary work to complete the project.

AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Areas “H” & “I”

MSWD staff is evaluating the next steps with respect to crossing private property to make the sewer connection at the south end of Hildago Street.

Well 22 Rehabilitation

Staff is currently working with the contractor, Canyon Springs Enterprises, on scheduling the project and executing the agreement.

Water and Wastewater System Comprehensive Master Plan Updates

Staff and consultants continued progress on evaluating the future demands and system needs, as well as finalizing the master plans and capital improvement programs. Staff anticipates completing the plans and presenting them to the Board in the coming weeks.

AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Area “D3”

Following Board approval in April 2024, staff has reached out to AECOM to execute a contract to complete design work for Area D3. Staff will be issuing the notice to proceed in the coming weeks.

AD-18 – GQPP Sewer Project Areas “A” & “G”

The Army Corps of Engineers design consultant, Genterra, is in the process of preparing the 100% design.

Backup Generators for Well Sites 27-32 and 37 Projects

Once the proposed future solar panel layout is finalized for the sites, staff will solicit bids through the Planet Bids website within the next few months and will evaluate the bids once they are received and will present the bid results to the Board of Directors in a future Board meeting.

Well 34 Rehabilitation

Construction resumed and is on track for completion in July 2024.

Tropical Storm Hilary Waterline Replacement Project at 13th Avenue, Mission Lakes Boulevard, and Thomas Avenue

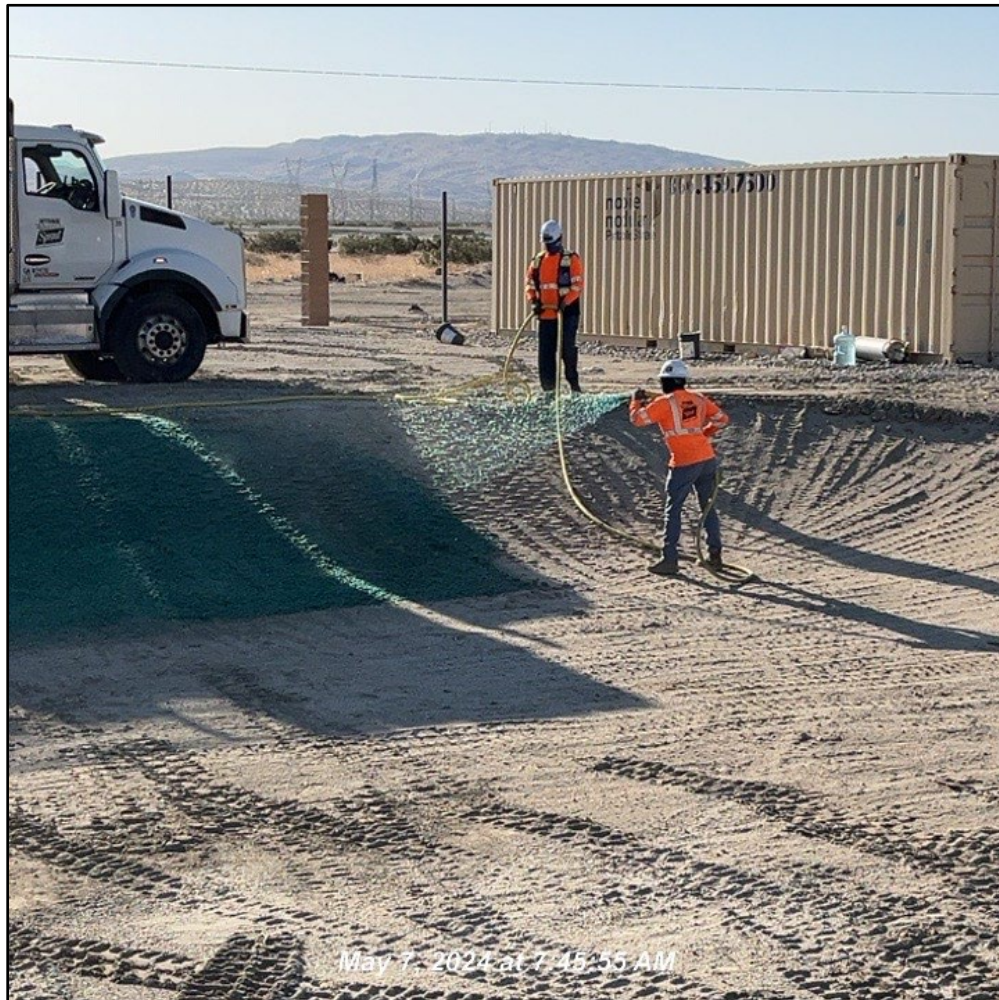
Staff completed bidding the project and the Board approved the award for construction. Staff is currently working with the contractor, Tri-Star, on executing the agreement and scheduling the project with construction scheduled to start quickly in the coming weeks.

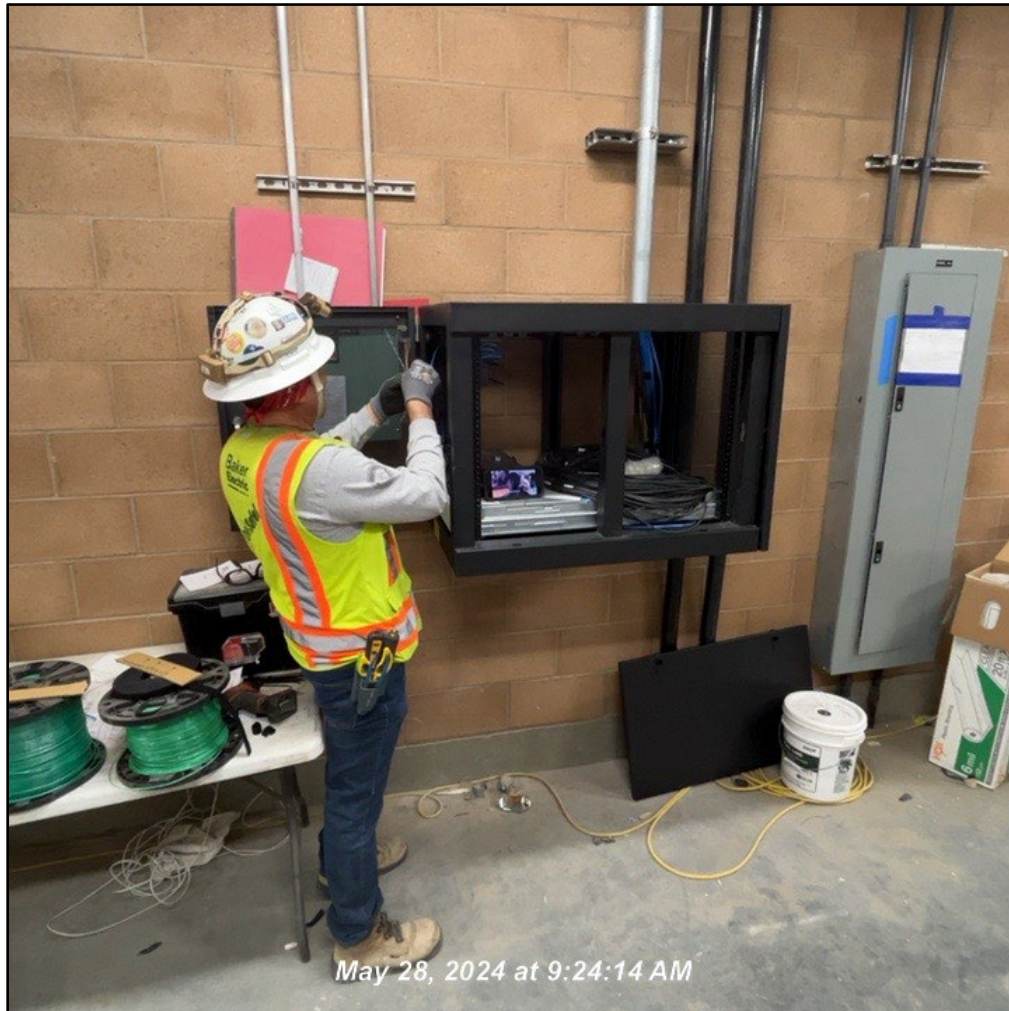
Regional Water Reclamation Facility

The Project Team continued responding to RFIs and processing change orders and payment requests submitted by the contractor, JF Shea Construction.

The contractor continued construction on the Regional Water Reclamation Facility (RWRF) and has achieved the substantial completion milestone. Through the month of May 2024, JF Shea Construction:

- Completed the punch list for the mechanical, structural, architectural, and civil portion of the project.
- Completed finish grade of the site, drainage improvements, and long-term dust suppression.
- Continued completion of the site security system, with a target completion of the first week of June 2024.
- Demobilized the construction yard, trailers, and equipment.





In June 2024, JF Shea Construction will complete all remaining punch list items. Thereafter, they will primarily be idle until the raw water testing begins, following the completion of the Conveyance Line.

The Project Team completed a pre-construction meeting with the contractor, Yellow Jacket Drilling, at the Monitoring Well #2 site to confirm site access and staging requirements. The contractor is expected to mobilize and complete construction of the third required monitoring well in late June through early July 2024. Thereafter, the closeout report regarding Waste Discharge Requirement Special Provision F.3. for RWRF Groundwater Monitoring will be submitted to the Regional Water Quality Control Board (RWQCB).

Staff completed review of the access agreement with the owner of a private well near Palm Drive and Interstate 10 required for annual sampling and reporting to the RWQCB. The agreement is routing for signature. Thereafter, the closeout report regarding Waste Discharge Requirement Special Provision F.4. for TDS Impact Evaluation will be submitted to the RWQCB.

The Project Team continues to coordinate with the State Water Board on the SRF/Grant funding agreement and reimbursement requests.

- Staff received an update that the Reimbursement Request No. 2 and No. 3 have been processed and payment issued to MSWD.
- Staff responded to additional RFIs from the State regarding the Conveyance Line FBA.

RWRF Conveyance Line

The Project Team continued responding to RFIs and processing change orders and payment requests submitted by the contractor, Downing Construction, Inc.

The contractor completed all construction of the force main and gravity sewer, including final paving, signage, and striping. The gravity sewer portion across the SCE transmission crossing still remains.

Staff continues to coordinate with SCE to resolve the easement issue along Little Morongo Road south of 18th Avenue. In May 2024, the Project Team responded to SCE's RFIs and addressed their comments on the easement acquisition documents.

Area M2 Sewer Collection System (AD-15)

Staff has received the final bid package and is preparing it for bidding. Staff has submitted the final bid package to the State for approval. Staff plans to bid the project following the State's approval.

RWRF Roadway Design (19th Avenue, Little Morongo Road, and 20th Avenue)

The consultant initiated the 90% design.



Operations & Maintenance

Construction & Maintenance

Water Line Locations

Staff completed approximately 467 water line location requests using iPads and the GeoViewer Mobile app to streamline and manage line locations.



Water System Repairs/Replacement

Staff continued to repair and replace components of the water distribution system keeping it in optimum working order and properly functioning without any interruption. Below is a summary of the repairs and replacements completed in May 2024.

- 10 water service lines were replaced with copper.
- 14 service line leaks were repaired.
- Eight mainline leaks were repaired.
- One fire hydrant was replaced.



Water System Maintenance

Staff continued to implement preventative maintenance and inspection program keeping the water distribution system in optimum working order and properly functioning without any interruption. Below is a summary of the maintenance completed in May 2024.

- 251 ground valves were exercised.
- 125 fire hydrants were flushed, maintained, and painted.
- One air-release valve was inspected and/or rebuilt. Annual air-release valve maintenance has been completed.
- No Cla-Val valves were maintained this month.
- 15 blow-offs were flushed.



CMMS Workorder Program

A total of 32 work orders were processed in May 2024 using the CMMS program.

New Water Meter Service Installation

Staff installed 17 new water service lines in May 2024.

Fire Flow Testing

Staff continued performing field fire flow tests for the Engineering Department. Five fire flow tests were conducted in May 2024.



Fleet & Facility Maintenance

Janitorial Services

The janitorial contractor, Executive Facilities Services Inc., continues to clean and disinfect all District buildings. Routine disinfection is performed four times per week Tuesday through Friday. Additionally, routine janitorial services are provided twice per week on Wednesdays and Fridays. Staff is preparing an RFP to request revised bids reducing the cleaning and disinfection to two days a week each and add the new Wright RWRF to the list of facilities.

Building Maintenance

Staff completed the following building maintenance during the month of May 2024:

- Installed a new gate sign at the Corporate Yard.
- Repaired 9 leaks at the Well 27/31 west fence line irrigation.
- Readjusted the float on the meter shop swamp cooler.
- Replaced a damaged power cord on the Corporate Yard shop welder.
- Repaired 3 leaks on the irrigation line at the Two Bunch Reservoir.
- Moved extra generator cables to the shelf in the Corporate Yard shop and reorganized shelves.
- Installed antennas at the Corporate Yard and Horton WWTP Plant and adjusted with Kurt.
- Installed two Ring camera/floodlights at the Corporate Yard, one above the north break room entrance and one above the southeast main door to the shop.
- Re-secured door trim on the west door to the Corporate Yard break room.
- Flushed drain on upstairs men's restroom at the Administration Building.
- Repaired two leaks on the irrigation at the Terrace Reservoir.
- Replaced ADT alarm batteries in the shop at the Corporate Yard.
- Replaced air chuck at the gas pumps at the Corporate Yard.
- Removed film from the west stairs exterior camera at the Administration Building and inspected other perimeter cameras.
- Installed Visqueen and fir strip board to the upstairs north hall at the Administration Building.
- Installed different shelves in Amanda's office at the Administration Building.
- Installed a Wi-Fi antenna and ran cable in the shop at the Corporate Yard for Kurt.
- Replaced toilet in women's restroom in the Engineering/Annex Building.
- Performed blowout of old stores twice this month.

Standby Generator Monthly Maintenance Program

Our team conducts monthly testing to ensure that all generators are in good working order and ready for use when needed. There were no issues with the generators this month.

Fleet Maintenance/Repairs

- Units 428, 429, and 430 had 2-way radios and antennas installed.
- Unit 428 had the PM service and tire rotation performed.
- Unit 410 had the PM service, tire rotation, and filter change performed.
- Unit 412 had the PM service, tire rotation, and two internal plugs installed, as well as cosmetic repairs performed.
- Unit 439 had a valve key mount fabricated and installed.
- Unit 437 had the PM service and tire rotation performed.

- Unit 408 had the PM service performed and cabin filter replaced.
- Unit 360 had the PM service performed, battery replaced, fuel filter replaced, and a faulty fuel pump and shutoff solenoid replaced.
- Unit 442 was picked up from crane Install at Morgan Crane, had the roof light replaced with a directional bar, had Line-X applied, and was outfitted for service.
- Unit 117 had the suction tube repaired.
- Units 429 and 430 had back racks installed.
- Unit 416 had the air filter blown out due to excessive dirt buildup and will be scheduled for service.
- Unit 437 had license plates installed.
- Unit 444 had the rear Gannon picked up from GBD and mounted, the roof was lowered, and had MSWD decals and unit numbers applied.
- Unit 432 had the seat patches replaced.
- Unit 345 had 3 tires replaced at Desert Tire.
- Unit 421 had the battery replaced.
- Unit 391 was decommissioned and had the GPS transferred to Unit 442.
- Unit 367 had repairs performed at RDO for the left front axle assembly.
- Unit 335 had the PM service performed, and replaced the fuel filter, upper radiator hose, and belt. A loom was added to the harness and brackets made for main power wire restraint.



Wastewater Collections

Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSOs)

There were no Sanitary Sewer Overflows (SSOs) in the collection system during May 2024.

Dos Palmas Lift Station

Operators conducted daily site visits to ensure proper pump operation, SCADA (Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition) system functionality, and site security.

Sewer Line Locations

Staff completed 374 sewer line location requests using iPads and the GeoViewer mobile application to streamline and manage line locations.

Sewer Line/Collections Maintenance

- Staff completed 49 CCTV inspections, totaling 15,312 feet in May 2024.
- Zero miles of sewer mainline were cleaned in May 2024.

Wastewater Treatment

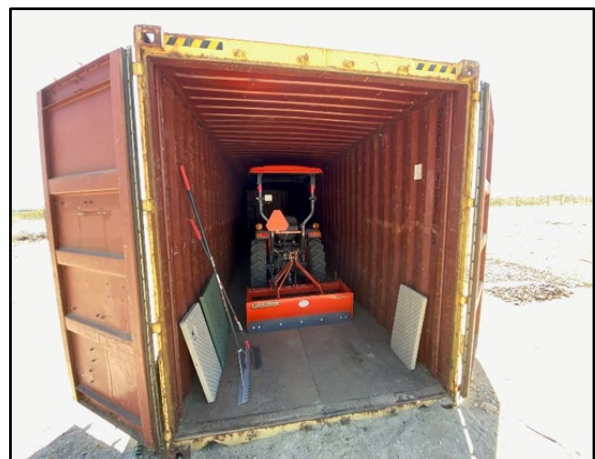
Plant Maintenance

Staff spent 534-man hours performing routine plant maintenance, equipment maintenance, and plant operations at the Horton and Desert Crest Wastewater Treatment Plants (WWTPs). Also, during this timeframe staff spent 136.2-man hours operating the sludge belt filter press, including filling and removing 19 trailers of sludge from the Horton and Desert Crest WWTPs.

Staff continued routine maintenance removing rags from the headworks auger, aeration tanks, RAS pumps, grit pumps, etc.

Staff pulled new wiring for the South photo electric beam due to a faulty signal coming from ADT.

The new Kubota tractor for the Desert Crest WWTP has arrived. Staff will now be able to maintain the WWTP more efficiently. The Kubota will be stored within a locked shipping container on site.



Sampling and Laboratory

Staff collected 49 samples and spent 98-man hours performing laboratory duties and analysis for process control and regulatory reporting purposes. Both plants are producing an effluent that meets the District's permit discharge requirements.

Pond Maintenance

Ponds 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 were cleaned and rehabilitated during May 2024. Pond 1 was cleaned and rehabilitated twice this month. With the warm temperatures and high winds, staff are seeing algae blooms in the ponds causing issues for percolation. Staff will be keeping the ponds online for no more than 2 weeks at a time to try and prevent algae from coating the bottom of the ponds.



Weekly Wastewater Training

The training courses aim to provide all operators with consistent knowledge and a better understanding of processes, including operating equipment more proficiently. This training helps keep operators safe while completing maintenance. A summary of this month's training includes:

- Loader Fluid Inspections
- Skip Loader Fluid Inspections
- Kubota Fluid Inspections

Nancy Wright RWRP Startup Training

Staff have continued training on various equipment throughout the Nancy Wright RWRP.

Water Production

Water Pumped/Produced

During the month of May 2024, the District's three public water systems produced the following quantity of water:

- MSWD (CA3310008) – 679.59 Acre Feet (221.45 MG)
- West Palm Springs Village (CA3310078) – 11.37 Acre Feet (3.70 MG)
- Palm Springs Crest (CA3310081) – 5.27 Acre Feet (1.72 MG)

Water Sampling/Testing

- Bacteriological Sampling – Staff collected 50 routine samples in the MSWD system, four routine samples in the ID-E area which includes the West Palm Springs Village (WPSV) and Palm Springs Crest (PSC) systems, and four well samples in ID-E.
- Staff collected 16 general physical samples in the MSWD system and two general physical samples in ID-E.
- During May 2024, staff collected weekly Bac-T samples at Well 22. All these samples passed.
- Well 26A Uranium Treatment (IXP) Sampling – The monthly uranium sampling was completed on May 6, 2024.
- Monthly Reporting – The District's Monthly Coliform Monitoring Report for May 2024 for all three water systems was sent to the SWRCB on June 4, 2024.

Chlorination System Updates

- Chlorination Pumps – Staff conducted routine maintenance and inspections on all chlorine pumps and related equipment at well sites. Staff made necessary adjustments, repairing and/or rebuilding to ensure proper operation. Most chlorinator pumps continue to function properly, with only typical preventative maintenance required (i.e., repair of cracked chlorination suction/feed tubing).
- Chlorinator Pump Cleaning – Staff began cleaning all chlorinators two times per month with a vinegar-based solution to reduce chlorinator issues. All the chlorine pumps were cleaned twice during the month of May 2024.
- Sodium Hypochlorite (Chlorine) Usage – During the month of May 2024, a total of 1,667 gallons of chlorine (12.5% solution strength) was used to disinfect the distribution system and our production facilities. (Reflects usage in the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)
- Chlorine Residuals at Production Well Sites – In May 2024, the Production staff checked and documented the chlorine residuals at all wells in use 218 times. The average chlorine residual of these readings was 0.88 ppm. (This data reflects the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)
- Distribution System Chlorine Residuals – During the month of May 2024, the Production staff checked and documented the chlorine residuals throughout the distribution system a total of 97 times. The average chlorine residual of these readings is 0.73 ppm. (This data reflects the MSWD and ID-E water systems.)

Well Soundings

Staff continued to sound the groundwater levels for 13 production wells and nine monitoring wells. Staff strives to complete these by the 15th of each month.

Production Facility Updates

Staff oversees all water production sites, making necessary adjustments. They conduct monthly overflow maintenance as needed by climbing reservoirs. Staff also inspects reservoir roofs using a drone.

- Well 22 Rehabilitation – As previously mentioned, this well experienced intermittent failing bacteriological tests. However, this issue has been rectified as indicated in repeated passing Bac-T results.
- Gateway Fire Pump Monthly Testing – Staff performed the monthly fire pump testing on May 8, 2024. All systems functioned properly. Water loss data was captured and entered onto our water loss tracking worksheet.
- Well 24 Update – The well is still offline, and the pump is currently out of the well. MSWD staff has determined that it is best to run this well to failure. We are working with contractors to bring this well back into operation as soon as possible. The extracted equipment was picked up by Southwest Pump on May 21, 2024, to be inspected by their service department. We are waiting for their final equipment inspection report.
- Well 31 Pump Noise – The pump has been removed from this well and is currently being inspected for necessary repairs. Additionally, since the pump is out of the well, we are having a video survey and EMDS (well casing study) performed on the well. It has been determined that all the downhole equipment needs to be replaced. This work is expected to be completed before the end of June 2024.
- Well 33 Chlorination System Upgrade Project – This project is complete and functional. This site now automatically monitors and adjusts chlorine dosing to ensure proper and continuous chlorination.
- Reservoir Inspections – The following reservoirs were climbed and inspected by MSWD Production staff during May 2024: Worsley, Gateway, Well 34 Suction, Overhill, Valley View, and Little Morongo. No significant concerns were found. All MSWD reservoirs were viewed via drone during May 2024.
- Motor Oil and Greasing – All well and booster motors were serviced by staff in May 2024. The servicing included cleaning, oil change, and bearing greasing.
- Pump Packing Maintenance – The packing for the following pumps were serviced/adjusted by MSWD staff in May 2024: Little Morongo and Well 22.
- Generator Usage – Due to upgrades being made to SCE equipment, MSWD experienced multiple power outages at the Overhill and Gateway booster stations. Staff deployed generators to these sites to ensure continued water service to the Painted Hills communities.

Well 33 Solar Site

Staff continue to monitor the performance of the solar system. However, MSWD is still working with Kenwood Energy to review past maintenance reports and the current condition of the facility. They are also helping prepare an RFP for an O&M service contract.

Water Report

Through continued development in the Desert Hot Springs area and at the request of new customers, water services are always being added. Below is a summary of new water services added each month.

Integrated Regional Water Management Planning

The Coachella Valley Regional Water Management Group (CVRWWMG) met to discuss on-going grant funded projects and upcoming grant opportunities. The CVRWWMG implements the Integrated Regional Water Management (IRWM) Plan for the Coachella Valley IRWM Region.

The CVRWWMG continued to discuss the Urban Water Use Efficiency and Conservation Regulations and Chromium-6 Regulations.

Mission Creek Subbasin Sustainable Groundwater Management Act Compliance

The 2022 Alternative Plan Update for the Mission Creek Subbasin is still with the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) for review, however, DWR doesn't anticipate completing reviews of alternative plans until sometime later in 2024.

San Gorgonio Pass Subbasin Sustainable Groundwater Management Act Compliance

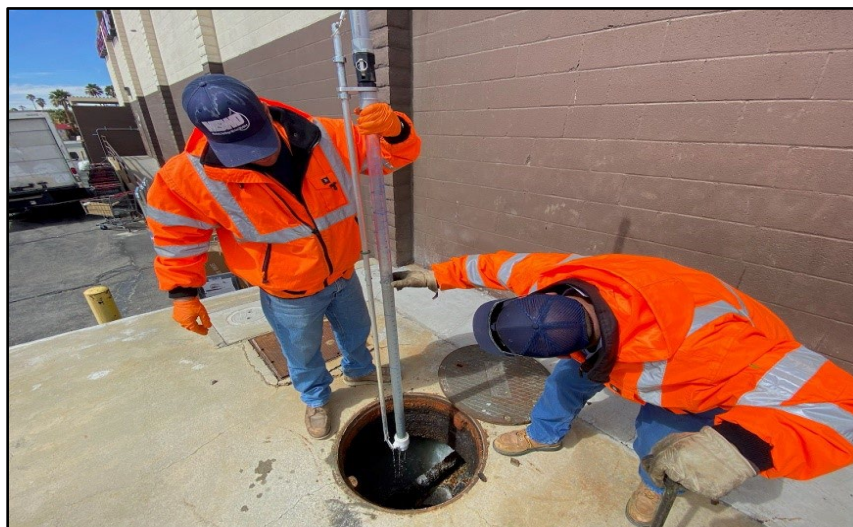
The consultant, Provost & Pritchard, completed and submitted the final SGMA Annual Report for Water Year 2022-23 to DWR.

Indio Subbasin Sustainable Groundwater Management Act Compliance

The 2022 Alternative Plan Update for the Indio Subbasin is still with the DWR for review, however, DWR doesn't anticipate completing reviews of alternative plans until sometime later in 2024.

Salt and Nutrient Management Planning

Staff attended the monthly steering committee meeting to review the Task 2 Technical Memorandum (TM) – Characterize Groundwater Quality and Task 3 TM – Delineate Draft Management Zones and Metrics to Characterize Beneficial Use Protection that is in progress. Staff anticipates receiving the draft TM-2 in May 2024 from the consultant for review by both the steering committee and technical advisory committee.

Desert Hot Springs Recreation Center Summer Camp

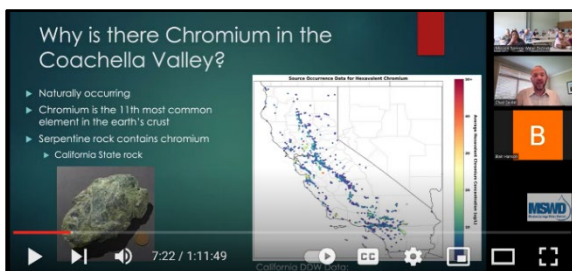

Customer Survey

MSWD launched the customer survey to redesign the monthly water bill experience, which concluded on May 24, 2024. This initiative underscored our commitment to delivering exceptional service and engaging our valued community in shaping the future of our utility statements.

The District greatly appreciates the participating customers' feedback and opinions on how we should present the monthly water bill statement.

Annual Sewer Pre-Payment Option for 2024-2025



MSWD Customers can pre-pay their annual sewer service bill instead of allowing it to be placed on their property tax bill. Customers can pre-pay their sewer bills by Monday, July 1, 2024, to avoid having their sewer payment rolled onto the property taxes. To promote the pre-payment option, MSWD sent letters with a tear-off payment coupon to all wastewater customers and promoted it on social media and our website promotions.

Legislative Update

Federal: California Special Election Results

In the special election to replace former Speaker of the House Kevin McCarthy's seat, State Representative and former District Director for McCarthy, Vince Fong, defeated Mike Boudreaux to serve the remainder of the 118th Congress. Representative-elect Fong will be sworn into Congress in the coming days and is running for a full term in November 2024. California's 20th Congressional District has been vacant since McCarthy resigned at the end of 2023.

Federal: National Security Memorandum for Critical Infrastructure

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released a new National Security Memorandum (NSM) to replace the decade-old presidential policy document on critical infrastructure protection. The NSM clarifies the roles and responsibilities of the lead federal agencies identified to improve the resilience of our critical infrastructure sectors against all hazards. The EPA is the lead federal agency for the water sector. The NSM also implements a coordinated nationwide approach to assess and manage sector-specific risks.

State: Revised Conservation as a Way of Life Regulation

In May 2024, the State Water Resources Control Board released the third version of the revised draft regulation for Making Conservation a California Way of Life with a 15-day written comment period that ended June 4, 2024. The revised draft regulation outlines unique water use efficiency goals for each urban retail water supplier, including urban water use efficiency standards, variances, an urban water use objective, and commercial, industrial, and institutional (CII) performance measures.

Given the arid nature of our region and the disadvantaged community we serve, achieving a 0.55 LEF standard by 2040 poses significant challenges. Achieving this standard will be a tremendous lift and create significant affordability challenges, particularly absent dedicated funding or technical assistance. The 0.55 LEF is based on design standards, and many factors in the real world make striving for this level of efficiency impractical, especially for communities in the highest evapotranspiration zones in the state. We appreciate the concerns the State Board members expressed about water affordability, equity, and the potential infeasibility of achieving the 2040 outdoor standard, and we encourage continued collaboration to devise a sensible solution. Retail and wholesale water suppliers will still need to generate revenues to cover their operating and capital costs, including the increased costs driven by these regulations, and rates will rise accordingly.

State: Initiative 1935 – Taxpayer Protection Act Update

Ballot Initiative 1935 would result in the loss of billions of dollars annually in critical state and local funding, disrupting the ability of voters, local agencies, and the State of California to fund services and infrastructure by:

- Adopting new and severely stricter rules for raising taxes, fees, assessments, and other charges.
- Revising the State Constitution, as amended by Propositions 13, 218, and 26, among other provisions, to the advantage of the initiative's proponents and plaintiffs, creating new grounds to challenge these funding sources and disrupting fiscal certainty.
- Restricting the ability of local governments to issue fines and penalties to corporations and property owners that violate local environmental, water quality, public health, public safety, fair housing, nuisance, and other laws and ordinances.

The initiative includes provisions that would retroactively void all state and local taxes or fees adopted after January 1, 2022, if they did not align with the provisions of this initiative. This may also affect indexed fees that adjust over time for inflation or other factors. Effectively, it would allow well-funded interests that are not residents of your community to invalidate the prior actions of local voters, undermining local control and voter-approved decisions about investments needed in their essential services and infrastructure.

Last fall, Governor Gavin Newsom, joined by the State Legislature and former State Senate President Pro Tem John Burton, filed an emergency petition to the California

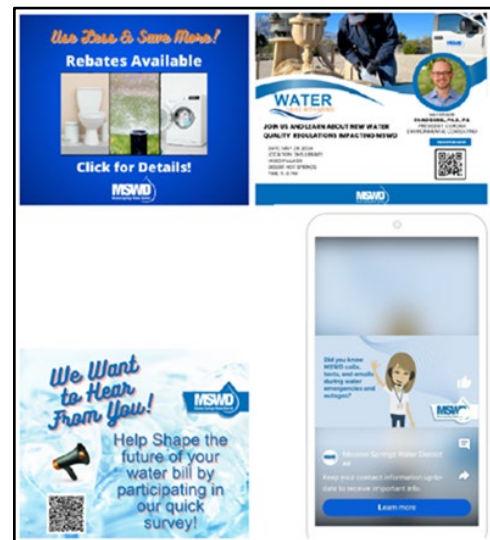
Supreme Court for a pre-election challenge to Initiative 1935, arguing that the measure is unlawful because it improperly revises the state constitution via initiative, and would impair essential government services. CSDA promptly joined a coalition to file a letter to the Supreme Court in favor of granting pre-election review.

On November 29, 2023, the California Supreme Court issued an order to show cause why the measure should not be removed from the ballot and established a schedule for briefing the court. An amicus brief filed by CSDA, and 10 other local government partners argues the measure is an unlawful revision of the state constitution because of the ways the measure would redistribute authority between state and local governments, the measure would undermine essential functions of local governments, and because the ballot measure is so poorly drafted that it raises many interpretive issues that will not be simply resolved without requiring extensive litigation after passage. The brief urges the Court to act before the measure is placed on the ballot for the November 2024 election because planning impacts are being felt now and could impair essential government services.

The California Supreme Court is likely to rule on the pre-election challenge before the end of June 2024, when the Secretary of State is anticipated to qualify the measure for the November 2024 ballot formally.

MSWD Digital Advertising

The District featured four Google and Facebook/Instagram ads promoting various MSWD programs. The Google campaign garnered almost 295,000 impressions and 1,139 link clicks. Our Facebook ads garnered more than 258,000 impressions and 391 link clicks.

FY25 Appropriations Update

House Appropriations Committee Chair Tom Cole (R-OK) announced several important fiscal year (FY) 2025 appropriations updates, including subcommittee allocations and a markup schedule for all twelve annual appropriations bills. Funding levels include defense and non-defense spending as developed by the *Fiscal Responsibility Act of 2023*.

California Special Election Results

In the special election to replace former Speaker of the House Kevin McCarthy's seat, State Representative and former District Director for McCarthy Vince Fong defeated Mike Boudreaux to serve the remainder of the 118th Congress. Representative-elect Fong will be sworn into Congress in the coming days and is running for a full term in November. California's 20th Congressional District has been vacant since McCarthy resigned at the end of 2023.

EPA Releases National Security Memorandum for Critical Infrastructure

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released a new [National Security Memorandum](#) (NSM) to replace the decade-old presidential policy document on critical infrastructure protection. The NSM clarifies the roles and responsibilities of the lead federal agencies identified to improve the resilience of our critical infrastructure sectors against all hazards. EPA is the lead federal agency for the water sector. The NSM also implements a coordinated nationwide approach to assess and manage sector-specific risks.

Legislative Activity

House Passes Special District Grant Accessibility Act. On May 7th, the House passed the *Special District Grant Accessibility Act* ([H.R. 7525](#)) by a vote of 352-27. The legislation would require that special districts be recognized as units of local government for the purposes of federal grant eligibility. The bill was transmitted to the Senate and referred to the Homeland Security and Government Affairs Committee for consideration.

Federal Funding Opportunities & Announcements

EPA Announces \$3 Billion for Lead Pipe Replacement. EPA [announced](#) \$3 billion in funding to help all states and territories identify and replace lead service lines through the Lead Service Line formula grant program. The awarded funding will be proportional to the number of lead service lines identified in each state or territory. In addition, EPA released a [memo](#) and [outreach documents](#) that clarify how states and territories can use this funding and other funding opportunities to reduce lead exposure in drinking water.

Reclamation Announces WaterSMART Drought Resiliency Awards. Reclamation [announced](#) \$147.6 million for the FY24 WaterSMART Drought Resiliency grant program. The grants will support building new or upgrading existing infrastructure, recharging aquifers, advancing water recycling and treatment, and supporting innovative technology development.

Reclamation Announces WaterSMART Small-Scale Water Efficiency Grants. Reclamation [announced](#) \$3.7 million for 41 projects in 14 Western states through the

WaterSMART Small-Scale Water Efficiency Grant program. Reclamation provides funding to irrigation and water districts, tribes, states and other entities with water or power delivery authority for small water efficiency improvements that have been identified through previous planning efforts.

Reclamation Releases WaterSMART Small Scale-Scale Water Efficiency Round 2 NOFO. Reclamation released a [NOFO](#) for \$12 million through the WaterSMART Small-Scale Water Efficiency Grant program. The grant program supports states, tribes, and local governments as they plan for and implement actions to increase water supply sustainability through investments in existing infrastructure and attention to local water conflicts. Applications are due by July 9th.

Reclamation Announces WaterSMART Large-Scale Water Recycling Awards. Reclamation [announced](#) \$179 million for four projects in California and Utah through the WaterSMART Large-Scale Water Recycling Program. Funding will support water infrastructure projects, including rural water, water storage, conservation and conveyance, nature-based solutions, dam safety, water purification and reuse, and desalination.

Reclamation Announces Funding for San Joaquin Valley Drought Resilience. Reclamation announced \$81 million through a [Memorandum of Understanding](#) (MOU) signed with the Central Valley Project South-of-Delta contractors – including the San Luis & Delta-Mendota Water Authority, San Joaquin River Exchange Contractors Water Authority and Friant Water Authority. The MOU identifies a framework, long-term drought plan, and a 2024 Pilot Program, including a “drought pool,” to build drought resiliency in the San Joaquin Valley.

Reclamation Announces FY24 Aging Infrastructure Grants. Reclamation [announced](#) \$520 million through the FY24 Aging Infrastructure program. The grants will support projects that improve water conveyance and storage, increase safety, improve hydropower generation, and provide water treatment.

Federal Agency Personnel & Regulatory Announcements

President Biden Announces Expansion of White House EJ Advisory Council. President Biden [announced](#) the appointment of 12 additional members to the White House Environmental Justice (EJ) Advisory Council. The EJ Advisory Council advises the administration on EJ issues across all federal agencies. The Council is holding a [public hearing](#) on June 5th and 6th which will include the newly appointed members.

EPA Transmits Clean Watersheds Survey to Congress. EPA [transmitted](#) its 2022 Clean Watershed Needs Survey to Congress. The survey is a comprehensive report on wastewater, stormwater, and other clean water infrastructure needs nationwide. EPA estimates \$630 billion is needed over the next 20 years for clean water infrastructure.

EPA Publishes Final PFOA and PFOS CERCLA Rule. EPA published its [final rule](#) to designate two per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) — perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and perfluorooctanesulfonic acid (PFOS), including their salts and structural isomers — as hazardous substances under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA), also known as Superfund. The rule will enable investigation and cleanup of these chemicals and ensure that leaks, spills, and other releases are reported. The rule is effective July 8th.

IRS Publishes Final Rule on EV Tax Credits. The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) published a [final rule](#) regarding the critical mineral and battery components requirements for the new clean vehicle credit. The guidance finalizes rules for taxpayers intending to transfer the new and previously owned clean vehicle credits to dealers who are eligible to receive advance payments as well as provides rules regarding the process for dealers to become eligible entities to receive advance payments of the transferred credits. The final rule also provides guidance regarding the IRS compliance process in the case of the taxpayer's omission of a correct vehicle identification number. Finally, it finalizes the rules for qualified manufacturers of new clean vehicles to determine if the battery components and applicable critical minerals contained in a vehicle battery are foreign entity of concern (FEOC) compliant. For purposes of the FEOC-compliance requirements, the final regulations:

- Provide relevant definitions;
- Impose a due diligence requirement for battery components and applicable critical minerals;
- Describe the methods by which FEOC-compliance is determined; and
- Outline a reporting and review process for determinations of FEOC-compliance.

The rule is effective on July 5th.

IRS Announces Direct File as Permanent Tax Filing Option. The IRS [announced](#) that Direct File will be a permanent option for filing federal tax returns beginning with the 2025 filing season. Direct File allows individuals with simple federal tax returns to file directly with the IRS at no cost.

USDA Renews Interagency Food Loss and Waste Collaboration. USDA [announced](#) a partnership with EPA, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) to renew the Federal Interagency Collaboration to Reduce Food Loss and Waste. Participating agencies will strengthen coordination to continue to produce educational and guidance materials, conduct outreach, community investments, voluntary programs, technical assistance, policy discussion, and public-private partnerships related to food loss and waste prevention.

Subject: Comment Letter—Proposed Making Conservation a California Way of Life Regulation

Dear Honorable State Water Resources Control Board,

The Coachella Valley Regional Water Management Group (CVRWMG) includes Coachella Water Authority (CWA), Coachella Valley Water District (CVWD), Desert Water Agency (DWA), Indio Water Authority (IWA), Mission Springs Water District (MSWD), and Valley Sanitary District (VSD). The group represents a collaborative effort to implement the Coachella Valley Integrated Regional Water Management (CVIRWM) Plan to address the water resources planning needs of the Coachella Valley. The CVRWMG's Region is located in central Riverside County, within the Colorado River Funding Area.

The CVRWMG would like to express our appreciation for the opportunity to comment on the third draft of the Making Conservation a California Way of Life Regulation (Regulation). After reviewing the third draft of the proposed Regulation, we continue to have concerns (which we outlined in our previous letters) that have not been addressed. We believe our comments and recommendations make valuable contributions that increase the feasibility of compliance with the proposed Regulation. Specific comments and recommendations are provided below.

Feasibility

In our previous letter, we requested a change to the LEF standard of 0.55 due to feasibility concerns. The CVRWMG is disappointed this was not addressed in the updated proposed Regulation. The CVRWMG is made up of agencies in an arid region with many disadvantaged communities (DACs) and water agencies in the region have expressed concerns about the feasibility of a residential outdoor 0.55 LEF standard. Achieving 0.55 LEF for 2040 will be a tremendous lift for many suppliers, and could still impose significant affordability challenges, particularly absent dedicated funding or technical assistance. The 0.55 LEF is based on design standards and many factors in the real world make striving for this level of efficiency impractical, especially for communities in the highest evapotranspiration zones in the state.

Similarly, we originally requested the inclusion of 20% irrigable non irrigated (INI) as irrigated and not as a buffer. Including the 20% INI as a buffer does not meet the intent of the legislation or conform with real-world conditions. This 20% should not be viewed as additional, but as an area that is being irrigated. The Department of Water Resources conducted a statistical analysis of outdoor water use, Landscape Area Measurement (LAM) and INI data. The data concluded that the INI area is being irrigated at one-fifth or 20% of the irrigable area.

We also continue to request that Effective Precipitation be removed from the final Regulation and outdoor standard. Landscapes are generally not designed to consider effective precipitation since it is highly variable in our region. Precipitation can percolate below the root zone of the plant negating its beneficial effect to that plant's watering needs. Additionally, precipitation is often not distributed evenly throughout suppliers' service areas. Some areas may receive precipitation and other areas none, making it difficult to apply one effective precipitation rate at the water supplier level.

We continue to request changes that recognize inherent data limitations and gaps. If the 20% INI buffer is not a permanent facet of all suppliers' budgets, the State should consider a Data Error Adjustment.

In Section 974, which addresses commercial, industrial, and institutional best management practices, the draft Regulation should replace "implement" with "offer" to recognize suppliers' appropriate authorities. Water agencies cannot feasibly implement programs against the will of, or without express consent from, their customers.

Tree Provisions

The third draft incorporates a new variance for tree canopies, however, as written we have concerns regarding implementation. We support ACWAs recommended changes to the Tree Variance so that it is feasible for water suppliers to utilize.

Alternative Compliance

We appreciate that the second draft Regulation modified alternative compliance pathways to be more accessible for suppliers facing large reductions. This path to compliance is an essential improvement for agencies facing the challenge of operating at the limits of their resources, while striving to meet the required objectives. The modified alternative compliance pathways will be based on the median household income (MHI) of the population served by suppliers, which will greatly benefit the many DACs in the Coachella Valley and in California.

Collaboration

We value the State Water Resources Control Board's commitment to working with all suppliers, non-governmental organizations, and other entities in drafting the Regulation. Collaboration plays a vital role in drafting the Regulation as it ensures diverse perspectives are considered, leading to more comprehensive and effective policies. We request the State Water Resources Control Board continue to work with all suppliers, non-governmental organizations, and other entities on addressing unclear or inconsistent language before the Regulation goes to Board.

Thank you again for providing an opportunity to comment. We look forward to continuing to work with you on this topic.

Dear Honorable State Water Resources Control Board,

On behalf of Mission Springs Water District, I would like to extend our gratitude for the opportunity to provide feedback on the third draft of the Making Conservation a California Way of Life Regulation (Regulation). We appreciate the State Water Resources Control Board's responsiveness to our comments on the initial drafts and the subsequent revisions that have been made. While we generally concur with the proposed modifications in the newest draft of the Regulation, we have some lingering concerns that merit attention and further collaboration.

Feasibility: Given the arid nature of our region and the disadvantaged community we serve, achieving a 0.55 LEF standard by 2040 poses significant challenges. Achieving this standard will be a tremendous lift and create significant affordability challenges, particularly absent dedicated funding or technical assistance. The 0.55 LEF is based on design standards, and many factors in the real world make striving for this level of efficiency impractical, especially for communities in the highest evapotranspiration zones in the state.

Cost: We appreciate the concerns expressed by Board members about water affordability, equity, and the potential infeasibility of achieving the 2040 outdoor standard. Retail and wholesale water suppliers will still need to generate revenues to cover their operating and capital costs, including the increased costs driven by these regulations, and rates will rise accordingly.

Alternative Compliance: We appreciate that the latest draft of the Regulation modified alternative compliance pathways to be more accessible for suppliers like MSWD, which face significant reductions. This path to compliance is an essential improvement for agencies facing the challenge of operating at the limits of their resources while striving to meet the required objectives.

Collaboration: We value the State Water Resources Control Board's commitment to collaboration and inclusive stakeholder engagement in the regulatory process. We believe that continued collaboration is essential for addressing unclear or inconsistent language before the Regulation is finalized.

In conclusion, we appreciate the opportunity to provide feedback on the Regulation and express our willingness to work collaboratively toward practical and feasible water conservation policies. We look forward to further dialogue and collaboration on this critical issue.

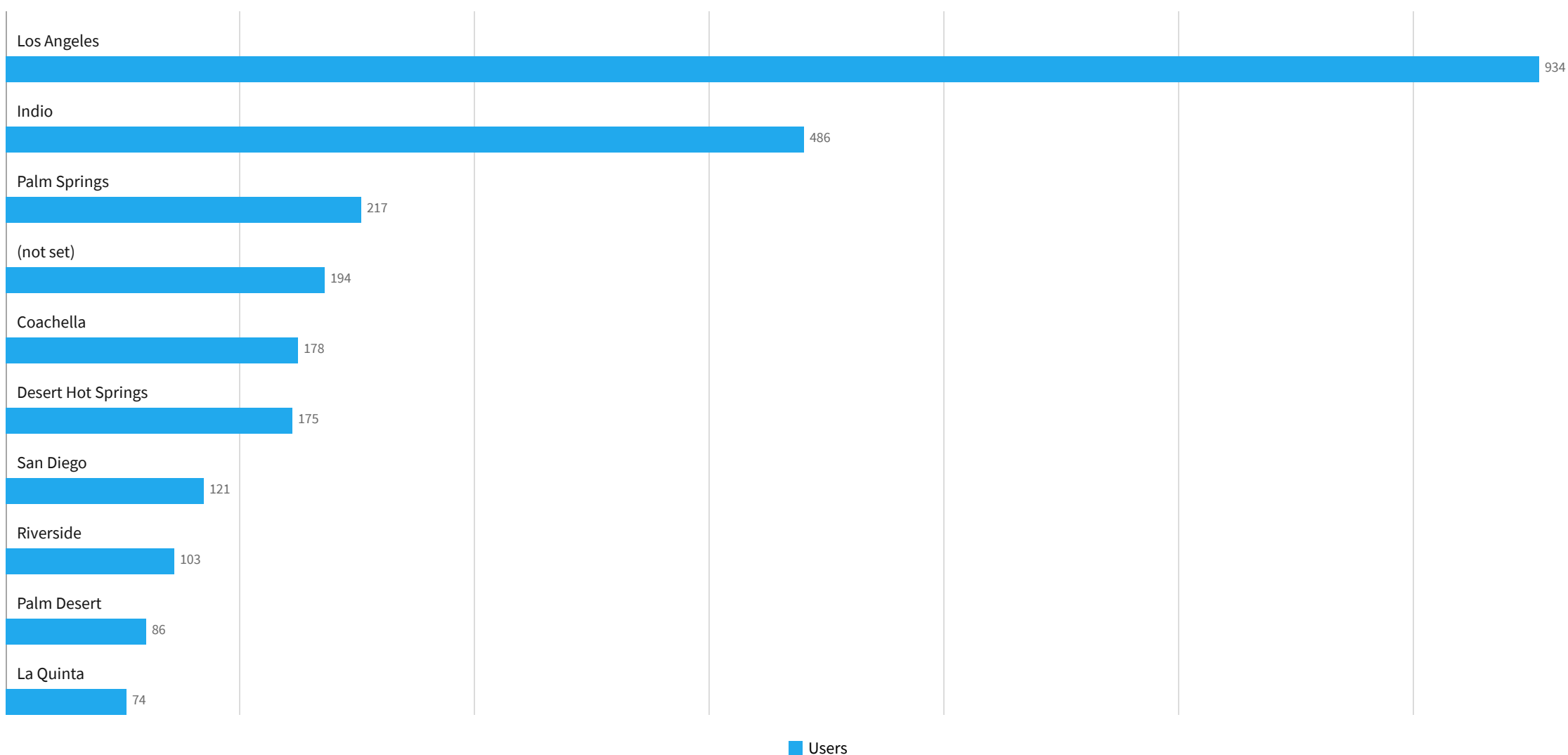

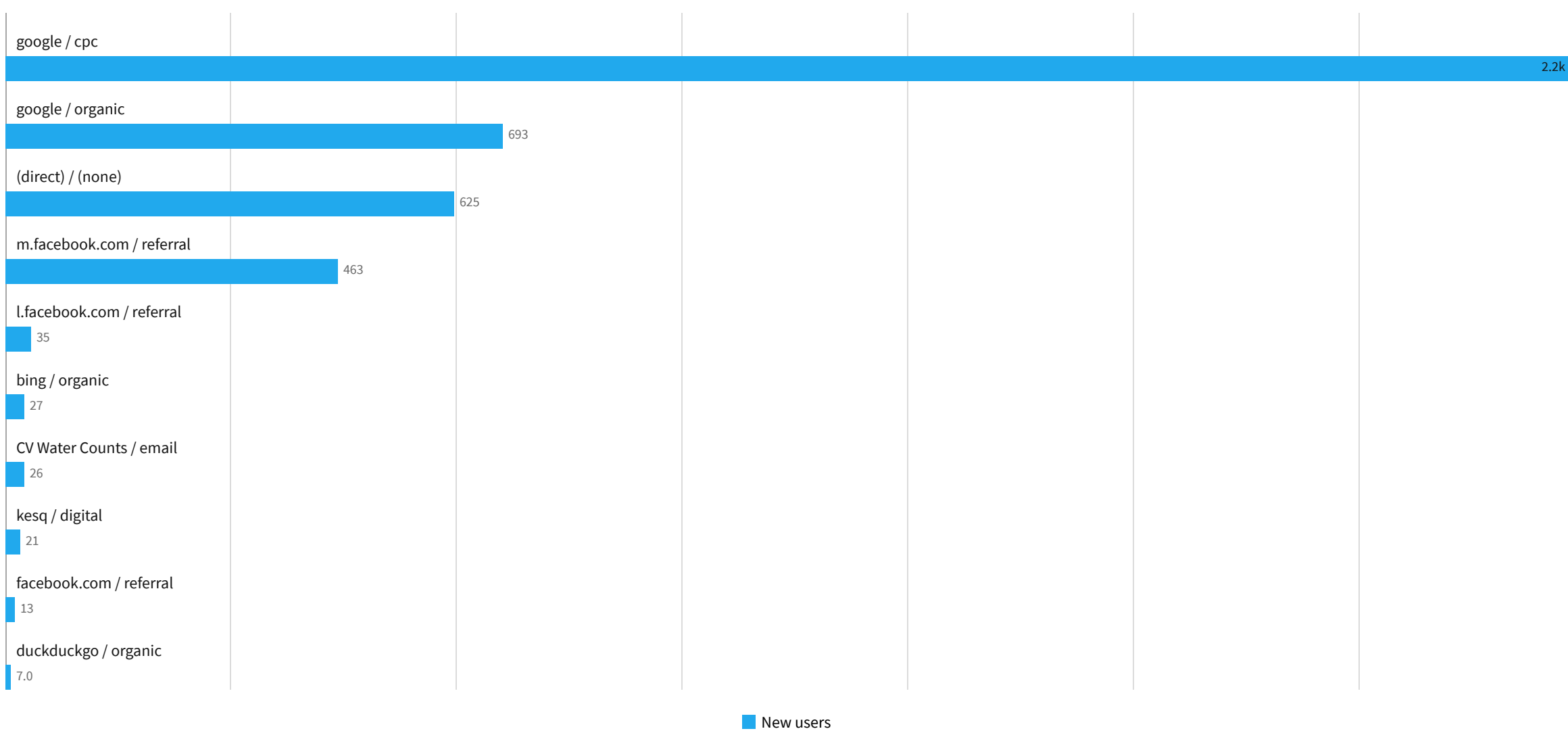
