All Council/Authority/Commission meetings of the City of Midwest City (MWC) elected officials will be held in the Council Chamber located at 100 N. Midwest Blvd., Midwest City, OK 73110, Oklahoma County, Oklahoma, unless notified otherwise.

Please note that the elected officials will informally gather at or after 5:00 PM in the City Manager's Conference room for dinner for evening meetings; however, no business will be discussed or acted upon. Meals will only be provided to the City Council and staff. Doors to the Council Chamber will be open to the public fifteen minutes prior to the start of a meeting.

For the purposes of all meetings of the MWC elected and/or appointed officials, the term "possible action" shall mean possible adoption, rejection, amendments, postponements, and/or recommendation to the City Council and/or Authorities.

Pursuant to Midwest City Resolution 2022-50, the following rules of conduct and engagement are in effect for all meetings of the MWC elected and/or appointed officials:

- 1. Only residents of the City, and/or identifiable business doing business in or with the City, or where it is required by statute during public hearings may speak during a public meeting, unless by majority vote of the City Council, non-residents may be permitted to comment on agenda items that impact them. To verify this new requirement, speakers must state their name and City residential/business address or provide/present proof of residential/business address to the City Clerk before addressing the elected officials.
- 2. There will be a 4 (four) minute time restriction on each speaker, which can be extended by a vote of the City Council, only if it benefits and/or clarifies the discussion at hand. The City Clerk, or designee, will be the timekeeper and will notify the chair when time has expired.
- 3. The Mayor/Chair reserves the right to remove individuals from the audience if they become disorderly. If the Mayor/Chair asks a disruptive individual to leave and the individual refuses to leave, the meeting will be recessed and appropriate law enforcement action will be taken.
- 4. Agenda items requesting action of the elected officials shall include:
 - 1. Presentation by City Staff and/or their invited guest speaker;
 - 2. If a public hearing is required, questions and discussion by and between the elected officials, City Staff, and the public;
 - 3. Questions and discussion by and between the elected officials and City Staff, invited guest speaker, and/or public during a public hearing; and
 - 4. Motion and second by the elected officials.
 - 5. If a motion is to be amended, the one who made the motion may agree and restate the motion with the amendment; however, if the maker of the motion does not agree to the amendment, the motion may be voted on as it stands.
 - 6. Final discussion and possible action/amended motion by the elected officials.

At 6:13PM Council recessed and moved to Economic Development Authority Meeting; Council reconvened at 6:30 PM.

31, 2028.

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) establishes the National Bridge Inspection Standards (NBIS) for all highway bridges on public roads throughout the United States. A structure is classified as a "bridge" if it is more than 20 feet between abutments, which includes reinforced box culverts commonly found in Oklahoma. Bridges are required to be inspected every two (2) years, but if certain criteria are met, the bridge must be inspected every year.

The City of Midwest City has 24 off-system bridges within city limits that must be routinely inspected. These bridges have an average age of 49 years, while the expected design life of a bridge is 75 years.

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) has a program through which they provide funds to inspect off-system bridges and has prequalified seven consulting firms to perform bridge safety inspections based on a qualifications-based selection process and the requirements of NBIS. The City can select one of these consultants, conduct inspections using City forces and an oversight engineer, use the same firm that Oklahoma County uses, or let ODOT select for the City. The selected consultant will operate under a contract with ODOT, which will be for a two (2) year term. The resolution informs ODOT of the option and consultant selected.

City staff reviewed the qualified consultants list and recommends renewing the contract with Consor Engineers, LLC, who was the selected consultant for the 2023-2025 term as well.

Action is at the discretion of the Council.

Midwest City's application was approved for DOJ Office of Justice Programs, 2025 BYRNE State Crisis Intervention Program (SCIP) funds to continue a Crisis Intervention and Response Team and program within the Midwest City Police Department. This is the second award received by the city and will provide for a (2) year operating grant. The MWCPD Crisis Intervention and Response Team assists and alleviates much of the stress on the patrol division when high risk mental health incidents occur. A trained team of officers and a licensed mental health professional work together to assess and evaluate situations, consider de-escalation techniques, and recognize key indicators of mental health crisis to assist in an appropriate intervention strategy and resolution. Those with known mental health conditions that result in reoccurring calls for service will be assisted through CIRT follow- up and case management services provided by the LMHP.

Funds will primarily be used to contract with a licensed mental health professional and provide officer overtime to augment the existing 2-man team. Other aspects of the program include interaction with local middle and high school youth through wellness education and events, community training opportunities, and the care of Miles, the therapy dog. Lt. Jeremy Zuniga will be providing program oversight.

Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), DOJ encourages recipients and subrecipients ("subgrantees") to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this award, and to establish workplace

safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

27. Restrictions and certifications regarding non-disclosure agreements and related matters

No recipient or subrecipient ("subgrantee") under this award, or entity that receives a procurement contract or subcontract with any funds under this award, may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended and shall not be understood by the agency making this award, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

- 1. In accepting this award, the recipient—a. represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and b. certifies that, if it learns or is notified that it is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of award funds, will provide prompt written notification to the federal agency making this award, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by that agency.
- 2. 46. Protection of human research subjects

The recipient (and any subrecipient at any tier) must comply with the requirements of 28 C.F.R. 47. The Bureau of Justice Assistance is a component of the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, which also includes the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the National Institute of Special Conditions of the Award

Points of view or opinions in this document are those of the author and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of the U.S. Department of Justice."

49. Regarding medication-assisted treatment (MAT)

The award recipient understands and agrees to the following: 1) all clients in a BJA-funded drug court have a right to access MAT under the care and prescription of a physician to the extent MAT is clinically indicated; 2) BJA-funded drug courts must not deny any eligible client enrollment to the drug court program because of their use of FDA-approved medications for the treatment of substance abuse; 3) MAT must be permitted to be continued for as long as the prescriber determines that the FDA-approved medication is clinically beneficial; 4) while under no circumstances can a BJA-funded drug court program deny access to MAT under the care and prescription of a physician when it is clinically indicated, a judge retains judicial discretion to mitigate/reduce the risk of abuse, misuse, or diversion of these medications; and 5) federal funds shall not be used to support activities that violate the Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. 801-904.

50. BJA-funded adult drug courts

52. Extreme Risk Protective Orders (ERPO) – Not Applicable to Oklahoma

with H&H Plumbing & Utilities, Inc., to include Change Order No. 1 to provide all necessary

services to complete the Northside Utilities Water Project in an increased amount of

\$270,035.00.

On August 28, 2024, the Council approved a contract in the amount of \$2,230,775.00 with H&H Plumbing & Utilities, Inc., to provide all necessary services associated with the construction of 9,380 linear feet of twelve (12) inch PVC waterline plus all the appurtenances to serve the Northside Utilities Water Project.

H&H Plumbing & Utilities, Inc., has completed work on this project. Change Order No. 1 adjusts certain pay item quantities needed to complete the North Side Utilities Water Project. The adjustments increased several pay item quantities as noted in the attached change order summary and added a 4" water meter and vault at the Water Resources Recovery Facility, resulting in an increase of \$270,035.00. The total amount of the contract increases from \$2,230,775.00 to \$2,500,810.00.

Title 61 of the Oklahoma Statutes, Section 121 requires that change orders or addenda to public construction contracts of over One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) shall not exceed the greater of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000.00) or a ten percent (10%) cumulative increase in the original contract amount. Change orders are not subject to this restriction if the contract contains unit pricing and the change order pertains to the unit price. The original contract amount was \$2,230,775.00 and the cumulative increase in the original contract amount as a result of this change order not related to unit pricing is \$38,290.00, which complies with these provisions of state law.

Staff recommends approval of this amendment.

Action is at the discretion of the Council.

sponsorship of a Transportation Alternatives Program application to construct approximately three quarters (3/4) of a mile of the Palmer Loop trail, and 2)

authorizing the City Manager to sign the application.

The proposed project would construct the next phase of the Palmer Loop trail, extending the trail to the east to the intersection of SE 15th Street and S. Douglas Blvd. It would also connect the Bomber Rail Trail to the Palmer Loop Trail and the Soldier Creek Trail.

The Palmer Loop trail is planned in the Midwest City Trails Master Plan, and will eventually be approximately 3.7 miles long. To date, approximately 2.1 miles of this trail have been constructed. This project would extend this trail eastward to the intersection of SE 15th Street and S. Douglas Boulevard, while also connecting it to the Bomber Rail Trail.

The accompanying programming resolution is required in order to have the referenced project considered for the Transportation Alternatives Program through ODOT. All projects that apply for this funding must be programmed in this manner. Programming a project does not guarantee the project will be funded since it competes with projects submitted by other entities across the state. A minimum of 20% in local match is required under this program.

Federal Funds: \$880,000.00
Local Match: \$220,000.00
Estimated Total Cost: \$1,100,000.00

No City funds are obligated at this time. However, if the project is funded, the City will be obligated to fund the local match and hire a design consultant. Project selection is scheduled for the spring of 2026. The Resolution designates the City Manager as the Chief Project Sponsor and delegates to the City Manager the authority to sign the application.

Staff recommends approval of the resolution.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE CITY OF MIDWEST CITY'S ELGIBILITY TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION FOR USE OF TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES PROGRAM FUNDS SET BY THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT (IIJA) TO EXTEND THE PALMER LOOP TRAIL TO S. DOUGLAS BOULEVARD AND CONNECT IT TO THE BOMBER RAIL TRAIL IN MIDWEST CITY AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO SIGN THIS APPLICATION

WHEREAS, the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, is submitting an application to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation for Transportation Alternatives Program funds in the amount of \$880,000.00, set forth by IIJA and as outlined in ODOT's Transportation Alternatives Program guidance & application packet for 2025; and

WHEREAS, the City of Midwest City recognizes the importance of safe, accessible, and connected transportation alternatives, including pedestrian and bicycle trails; and

WHEREAS, the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, is participating as an eligible project sponsor in the Oklahoma Department of Transportation's Transportation Alternatives Program set forth by IIJA; and

WHEREAS, federal monies are available under a Transportation Alternatives Program set forth by IIJA, administered by the state of Oklahoma, Department of Transportation, for transportation projects that prioritize safety, comfort, and connectivity to destinations for all people who use the street network in Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, acknowledges availability of the required local match of no less than 20%; and

WHEREAS, after appropriate public input and due consideration, the governing body of Midwest City, Oklahoma, has recommended that an application be submitted to the state of Oklahoma to extend the Palmer Loop Trail to S. Douglas Boulevard and connect it to the Bomber Rail Trail.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF MIDWEST CITY, OKLAHOMA

SECTION 1. That the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, does hereby authorize the City Manager to submit an application to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation for Transportation Alternatives Program funds set forth by IIJA on behalf of the citizens of Midwest City, Oklahoma.

SECTION 2. That the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, hereby assures the Oklahoma Department of Transportation that sufficient funding to extend the Palmer Loop Trail to S. Douglas Boulevard and connect it to the Bomber Rail Trail on Southeast 15th Street is available.

SECTION 3. That the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, hereby assures the Oklahoma Department of Transportation that sufficient funding for the operation and maintenance of for the Southeast 15th Street

Trail extension project will be available for the life of the project.

SECTION 4. That the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma, hereby assures the Oklahoma Department of Transportation that the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma will have title or permanent easement to the Southeast 15th Street Trail extension project by the time of project letting, if necessary.

SECTION 5. That the chief project sponsor of Midwest City, Oklahoma (who is hereby designated as the City Manager for the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma) is authorized to sign the application to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation for transportation alternatives program funds set forth by IIJA on behalf of the citizens of Midwest City, Oklahoma. The chief project sponsor is also authorized to submit additional information as may be required and act as the official representative of the City of Midwest City in this and subsequent related activities.

consider approval of the Final Plat of Cypress Village, for the property located at

1120 S. Post Road and 10100 SE 10th Street, Midwest City, Oklahoma.

The Final Plat for Cypress Village was approved by City Council at the August 26, 2025, meeting. The approval was conditioned upon the Applicant completing the required thoroughfare screening. The Applicant has requested the City Council consider allowing the plat to be recorded prior to the complete installation of the screening due to unique circumstances outside their control. The required thoroughfare screening includes both a masonry wall and landscaping along S. Post Road and SE 10th Street.

The Applicant has told staff they ordered the wall materials on July 23, 2025. The manufacturer's production facilities have caused delays for all of their customers. The Applicant has installed the posts for the wall, and has begun installing the panels they have received thus far. They should also be receiving the remaining panels within the next couple of weeks.

They feel a realistic timeline for completion of the screening would be by mid-December.

The Applicant states, they plan to fully comply with the screening requirements but are hoping for relief from the City regarding the timing due to the delays caused by their manufacturer. They are requesting City Council remove the condition of completing the thoroughfare screening so the plat can be filed, and building permits can be issued. They are willing to agree that Certificates of Occupancy for the residential units can be withheld until the thoroughfare screening is complete.

Action is at the discretion of the City Council.

The addition was at the request of the Police Department. Penalties for the ordinance are also included in additions to 1-15 penalty section.

Subject: Discussion, consideration, and possible action of accepting the 2025 Water Master Plan.

On October 17, 2023, the Oklahoma Water Resources Board approved the City of Midwest City's request for an American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant and committed funds in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 for the development of citywide master plans for the water, wastewater, and stormwater infrastructure and construction of water lines needed to connect the Water Resources Recovery Facility and Centrillium to Midwest City's water supply system.

On February 27, 2024, the City of Midwest City, the Midwest City Municipal Authority, and Garver entered into a Professional Services Agreement for an assessment of the water distribution system infrastructure, groundwater and surface water supply infrastructure, and water treatment facilities in order to develop a citywide Water Master Plan.

The Water Master Plan is now complete, and the Executive Summary and CIP Justification Sheets are attached for review by Council.

Executive Summary

This Water Master Plan includes a comprehensive assessment of the condition and performance of the City of Midwest City (MWC) water system. The plan shows MWC's commitment to its mission statement "to maximize the quality of life for its citizens through professional services, proper management of existing resources, and appropriate planning." The plan builds on a more limited hydraulic analysis completed in 2012, which included recommendations for the major distribution system improvements that MWC has built or set in motion since that time. Those improvements include the Felix Place Ground Storage Tanks (GSTs) and Booster Pump Station (BPS) and the Timber Ridge Elevated Storage Tank (EST) and High Service Pump Station (HSPS). This report provides an update to the previous analysis and a more comprehensive evaluation of the water system, including the condition of the water treatment plant (WTP) and other major facilities. The capital improvement plan (CIP) included in this report provides recommended improvements over the next 20 years to address existing deficiencies and support future growth.

Water System Overview

MWC has two water sources: surface water from Lake Thunderbird treated at the WTP and 26 active groundwater wells that are located throughout the city. Water from these two sources is supplied to customers via approximately 300 miles of finished water mains, one BPS, four GSTs, and three ESTs. A map of the water system is shown in Figure ES-1. Lake Thunderbird and the raw water transmission main from Lake Thunderbird are not included in the figure.




Figure ES-1: Water System Overview





Growth Projections

Garver evaluated historical population and water demand data to identify trends and develop projections for the next 20 years. These projections were developed in coordination with the recently completed Wastewater Collection System Master Plan. The projections were used to identify projects that would be needed to support future growth and to identify capacity requirements for water system improvements to meet future water demands. The projections for both average and max day demand can be seen as they relate to service population in Figure ES-2. As shown in the graph, demand is expected to steadily increase as population increases. MWC is within 25% of its anticipated buildout population (72,000) per the 2008 Comprehensive Plan, and recent population growth has been steady. MWC is in the process of completing a 2025 Comprehensive Plan, so future improvements were evaluated with a contingency factor to make sure there will be adequate water system capacity even if additional density and/or redevelopment is proposed in the updated comprehensive plan.




Figure ES-2: 20-Year Water Demand and Population Projections

Water Treatment Plant Comprehensive Evaluation

Garver reviewed the WTP's historical data for raw and treated water quality. The treated water has maintained compliance with the regulatory requirements for drinking water. A detailed assessment of the WTP was conducted by an interdisciplinary Garver team to evaluate the condition of the treatment facilities in the plant. Additionally, a capacity assessment was performed to develop a gap analysis and determine improvements needed to maintain treatment capacity and improve operations in the plant.

Based on this assessment, the WTP has sufficient capacity in most processes to supply projected demands for at least the next 20 years. Since most of the processes meet capacity requirements, the majority of the recommended improvements for the WTP are condition-based. However, there are two processes that do not meet current regulatory design requirements: the flash mixer and the residual ponds.





The flash mixer is the main process responsible for the removal of total organic carbon (TOC). Historically, TOC removal at the WTP has been lower than required. An evaluation of the flash mixer indicated that its current size and poor structural condition limit TOC removal. To address these deficiencies, Garver is recommending that a new, smaller flash mix structure be designed and constructed.

The residual ponds, which are used to store and dewater solids generated during the water treatment process, are another process that does not meet regulatory requirements. Currently, WTP staff dewater residuals monthly to bi-monthly, which does not meet ODEQ's six-month storage guidelines. Although this does not affect the treatment process, it does increase the time spent dewatering the residual ponds. Garver recommends that a study be done to review the current solids management processes.

The WTP has been in service for several decades and has provided reliable drinking water to the service area residents and industries. The WTP has been rehabilitated a few times to increase capacity, improve operations, and enhance quality of treated water, but much of its original construction remains in service. As a result, some of the facilities have condition needs and do not meet current standards for chemical storage, safety, containment, as well as electrical codes and structural design. Details of each facility condition assessment are described in this master plan. The major condition-driven CIP recommendations include construction of a new chemical building, rehabilitation of the solids contact unit, filters rehabilitation, and electrical improvements.

Distribution Facility and Well Condition Assessments

Most of the storage and pump facilities are in good condition. One of the GSTs and the pump station at Felix Place were replaced in 2023. The other GST at the Felix Place site, which was constructed in the 1950s, is anticipated to be replaced within the next 20 years. Additionally, the small EST at the WTP site, which serves the Windsong subdivision, is in poor condition. This tank will no longer be required and will be taken out of service after the proposed Timber Ridge EST and HSPS project is completed.

Groundwater Facilities Analysis

The supply assessment showed that there is sufficient water supply capacity to meet projected demands as long as the supplies are not impacted by a drought. Figure ES-3 summarizes supply capacity and projected demands through the 20-year horizon. As shown in the figure, the surface water rights are sufficient to meet projected demands for the next 20 years. However, the water available from Lake Thunderbird could be less than the water rights in a period of extreme drought. The groundwater capacity supplements the surface water capacity and is also more drought resilient. MWC plans to increase its groundwater capacity to make the system more resilient in case of a drought affecting water availability from Lake Thunderbird.








Figure ES-3: Average Day Supply Capacity and Projections

While current water supply for MWC includes a combination of surface water and groundwater, in times of drought, surface water may become more limited than groundwater. MWC's groundwater supply was evaluated to determine the types of improvements needed to supplement supply should such a scenario occur. Many of MWC's current groundwater wells were constructed in the 1950s and are in need of major rehabilitation or replacement. Several wells are inoperable due to mechanical or water quality issues.

To identify the actions needed to meet supply redundancy goals and identify any operational deficiencies, each existing well was evaluated. Based on this evaluation, Garver recommended rehabilitation, abandonment, or replacement for each well in MWC's inventory. The CIP includes improvements to bring the groundwater wells up to current standards, to restore lost groundwater capacity, and to create additional groundwater capacity through the construction of new wells. The CIP projects have been prioritized to maximize the impact of funding available for supply redundancy improvements. In summary, nine existing operational wells are recommended for replacement (due to old age), six new wells are recommended for construction to increase groundwater system capacity, and 17 wells are recommended for abandonment. When all groundwater CIP projects are constructed, the groundwater supply will have increased redundancy to supplement average day demands in the event of a surface water shortage, as shown in Figure ES-4. The recommended groundwater improvements will provide sufficient supply to support a WTP service interruption of a few days under average demand conditions and longer periods when demands are below average. The increased groundwater supply would also supplement the surface water supply during extended drought conditions.








Figure ES-4: Proposed Water Supply Redundancy

Water System Assessments

Garver assessed the overall performance of the water distribution system using a hydraulic model and comparing the system capacity to Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality (ODEQ) regulations and other level of service targets. The distribution system water mains have enough capacity to maintain system pressures above the minimum ODEQ requirement of 25 psi, but pressures are lower than the target level of service in the southeast corner of the city due to the relatively high ground elevations in that area. MWC was already planning on creating a High Pressure Zone (PZ) to increase these pressures through the completion of the Timber Ridge EST and HSPS project. Additional water main improvements are recommended to loop areas with dead-ends and to replace undersized older pipes along major arterial roads.

Figure ES-5 summarizes the water system's elevated storage capacity targets and the proposed capacity based on projected demands through the 20-year horizon. The proposed elevated storage capacity is not a regulatory requirement but is intended to provide redundancy and maintain a more stable pressure in the water system during emergencies and periods of peak demands. The existing elevated storage capacity is currently below the target. The addition of two new ESTs is recommended over the next ten years to increase capacity toward the target, as shown in the figure by the increase in proposed elevated storage capacity.








Figure ES-5: Proposed Storage Capacity and Projections

Capital Improvement Plan

Based on the WTP assessment, distribution system assessment, groundwater facilities analysis, and hydraulic modeling evaluation, a series of CIP projects were developed through the 20-year horizon. All projects are summarized in Table ES-1, distribution projects are shown in Figure ES-7, and WTP projects are shown in Figure ES-8. Figure ES-6 summarizes total spending for the CIP by year, and Appendix H contains details about potential funding opportunities for the CIP, including eligibility requirements and terms.




Figure ES-6: Proposed Capital Outlay Schedule








Figure ES-7: 20-Year Distribution System CIP Summary








Figure ES-8: 10-Year Water Treatment Plant CIP Summary






Project Description

Rehabilitation of existing wells identified in the 2025 Sanitary Survey is recommended to meet ODEQ regulatory requirements and create groundwater supply redundancy. Specifics on the updates required at each site will be presented in the updated GWMP which is actively being prepared by Garver.

Project Drivers & Triggers

ODEQ completed a "2025 Sanitary Sewer Deficiencies" report which listed wells 27, 28, 49, 52, 53, and 55 as deficient facilities. The six deficient wells exhibit degradation to the foundations and building enclosures that may allow for contamination, physical damage, excessive freezing, and tampering. Rehabilitation of these wells has been prioritized as a result of ODEQ's 2025 report.



Project GW-2: Rehabilitation of Existing Well Houses - Phase 2




Project Description

Operational wells that were 70 years or older (Well #6, #16, #17, #18 and #22) were not considered for rehabilitation and are instead recommended for replacement in Project GW-3. Wells that were less than 70 years old are recommended for rehabilitation in Project GW-2 (Wells #48, #50, and #54).

Project Drivers & Triggers

This project is proposed to maintain the existing groundwater supply capacity. To maintain the supply of the existing wells, the existing well sites need to be rehabilitated to meet regulatory requirements.



Project GW-3: Construction of Six New Vertical Wells



Project Description

Six new wells are recommended to increase groundwater supply redundancy. Installation of SCADA and site security are included in the costs for each well. Costs for construction of new well transmission mains are included (assuming all new wells will be booster wells routed to the Felix Place BPS). The quantity of transmission main included in the cost estimate is a high-level assumption and should be re-estimated when well sites are selected.

Project Drivers & Triggers

This project is proposed to increase groundwater supply redundancy so the MWC system has available supply alternatives in the event of a WTP shutdown.

Other Considerations

The potential well sites shown in this figure are all on city owned property. Test wells should be drilled at each site prior to finalization of the site selection. More than six potential well sites are included in this map to provide options for MWC in the event that a site test well does not produce desirable results and alternative sites are needed. Well transmission main costs are based on diameters varying from 6-inch through 14-inch.





Four HPZ alternatives are presented in the 2025 GWMP. MWC requested that HPZ Alt #2 be chosen as the representative HPZ project, shown here as GW-4. This project will allow groundwater from the Main Pressure Zone (MPZ) to fill the clearwells at the WTP, thus providing groundwater supply to the HPZ in the event of a WTP shutdown.

Project Drivers & Triggers

This project is proposed to create a connection between the MPZ and the HPZ so the HPZ can be supplied by groundwater in the event of a WTP shutdown.

Other Considerations

Any of the HPZ Alternatives described in the 2025 GWMP may replace HPZ Alt #2 as GW-4. HPZ Alt #1 would require pre-filling the WTP clearwells with surface water prior to the shutdown, HPZ Alt #3 would require opening the boundary valves between the MPZ and the HPZ, and HPZ Alt #4 would require wells in the HPZ.



This project is proposed to restore groundwater supply capacity that will be lost with the abandonment of existing, aged wells, and will create groundwater supply redundancy so the MWC system can eventually be supplied by groundwater in the event of a WTP shutdown.

Other Considerations

The potential well sites shown in this figure are all on city owned property. Test wells should be drilled at each site prior to finalization of the site selection. More than five potential well sites are included in the figure to provide options for MWC in the event that a site test well does not produce desirable results and alternative sites are needed. Well transmission main costs are based on diameters varying from 6-inch through 14-inch.

Over the past ten years, there have been at least six groups who have approached the City about the possibility of constructing an indoor sports complex. Some were focused on basketball, some on volleyball and a few were only concerned with pickleball. The size of operations being proposed varied as did the preferred location. One of the groups interested in Midwest City was headed by Mr. Toriano Lands, a graduate of Carl Albert High School who started the Stingray Volleyball Academy in 2011.

Coach Lands examined a handful of sites before finally deciding on Lot 4 of the Soldier Creek Industrial Park. He also considered a variety of different architectural designs in advance before finally selecting a designed by ROAM Studios, the same architectural firm in charge of creating the neighboring American Glass, Inc. project.

Approval of the attached documents is the first formal step involved in moving towards the creation of a 4.13-acre sports complex that will feature a multi-purpose indoor facility of over 25,000 square feet of floor space along with three outdoor pickleball courts and six outdoor volleyball courts in addition to three multi-sport natural grass fields. Approval of these documents will allow the Midwest City Council and Economic Development authority to consider an economic development agreement next month.

A RESOLUTION OF THE MIDWEST CITY UTILITIES AUTHORITY DECLARING THE NORTHERNMOST 180,000 SQUARE FEET (APPROXIMATELY 4.13-ACRE) OF LOT 4 IN THE SOLDIER CREEK INDUSTRIAL PARK, AN ADDITION TO THE CITY OF MIDWEST CITY, OKLAHOMA COUNTY, OKLAHOMA, AS SURPLUS; APPROVING THAT CERTAIN "AGREEMENT FOR THE PURCHASE AND SALE OF REAL ESTATE", BY AND BETWEEN THE MIDWEST CITY UTILITIES AUTHORITY AND STINGRAY VOLLEYBALL ACADEMY LLC (THE "REAL ESTATE AGREEMENT"); AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING EXECUTION AND DELIVERY OF THE REAL ESTATE AGREEMENT; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING THERETO.

WHEREAS, the Midwest City Utilities Authority, an Oklahoma public trust (hereinafter, the "Utilities Authority"), in its effort to create jobs and to expand local economic development opportunities previously acquired certain personal property for the purpose of developing the Soldier Creek Industrial Park (hereinafter "SCIP"),

WHEREAS, Stingray Volleyball Academy, an Oklahoma limited liability company (hereinafter, the "Company"), intends to develop, construct, equip and operate a 4.13-acre multisport facility within SCIP in Midwest City, Oklahoma (hereinafter, the "Sports Facility"), and to create over \$400,000 in annual wages and benefits for new jobs in the maintenance and operation of the Sports Facility, which will bring new visitors to Midwest City and create an annual economic impact of over \$1 million; and

WHEREAS, in exchange for the Company's agreement to undertake the Project, the Midwest City Utilities Authority, an Oklahoma public trust (hereinafter, the "Utilities Authority"), has agreed to sell land owned by the Utility Authority in the Soldier Creek Industrial Park to the Company, pursuant to the terms and conditions of that certain "Agreement for the Purchase and Sale of Real Estate", by and between the Utilities Authority and the Company (hereinafter, the "Real Estate Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Trustees of the Utilities Authority have determined that it is in the best interests of the residents of Midwest City, Oklahoma that the Real Estate Agreement be approved.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CHAIRMAN AND TRUSTEES OF THE MIDWEST CITY UTILITIES AUTHORITY, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Declaring the Property as Surplus. The Trustees of the Midwest City Utilities Authority hereby declare the northernmost 180,000 square feet (4.13-acres) of Lot 4 of the SOLDIER CREEK INDUSTRIAL PARK, an Addition to the City of Midwest City, Oklahoma County, Oklahoma as surplus, and authorizing the General Manager/Administrator to dispose of the property as provided for in the Real Estate Agreement.

SECTION 2. Approving the Terms and Conditions of the Real Estate Agreement. The Trustees of the Midwest City Utilities Authority hereby approve that certain "Agreement for the Purchase and Sale of Real Estate", dated as of its date of execution, by and between the Utilities

Authority and the Company (the "Real Estate Agreement"), in substantially the form submitted atthis meeting, with such changes as made be hereafter approved by the Chairman of the Utilities Authority.

AGREEMENT FOR PURCHASE AND SALE OF REAL ESTATE

THIS AGREEMENT for Purchas	e and Sale of Real Estate ("Agreement") made and
entered into this day of	, 2025 ("Effective Date"), by and between
the Midwest City Utilities Authority	, an Oklahoma public trust (the "Seller"), and
Stingray Volleyball Academy LLC,	an Oklahoma Limited Liability Company, or
permitted assigns (the "Buyer"), is mad	le with reference to the following facts:

- (i) Seller owns a certain tract of real property containing 373,085.99 square feet, located in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma, more particularly described on Exhibit "A," attached hereto and made a part hereof ("Overall Property").
- (ii) Seller desires to sell and Buyer desires to purchase a portion of the Overall Property, containing approximately 180,000 square feet (± 4.13 gross acres), as approximately described on Exhibit "B" attached hereto and made a part hereof, all improvements thereon and appurtenances thereunto belonging ("Property"), in accordance with the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement. The final legal description and square footage of the Property shall be determined by the Survey, as set forth below.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants herein contained, and other fair and valuable considerations, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

- **1. Purchase and Sale.** Seller agrees to sell, and Buyer agrees to purchase, the Property for the consideration and on the terms hereinafter provided, free and clear of all mortgages, security interests, liens, encumbrances and charges whatsoever.
- **2. Purchase Price.** The purchase price for the Property shall be calculated on the basis of Four Dollars (\$4.00) per square foot of land contained in the Property, payable as follows:
 - **2.1. Earnest Money.** The sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) (the "Earnest Money") shall be delivered to Chicago Title Oklahoma, Attn: Kevin T. O'Shields, 210 Park Avenue, Suite 210, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73102; (405) 810-2400; Kevin.Oshields@ctt.com (the "Escrow Agent"), within two (2) business days of the execution of this Agreement by both parties, and shall be held by said Escrow Agent under the terms and conditions of this Agreement, to be applied to the Purchase Price payable at Closing. The Escrow Agent may place said Earnest Money in an interest-bearing account, and the party to whom said Earnest Money is ultimately delivered shall receive any such interest earned.
 - **2.2. Cash.** The balance of the Purchase Price shall be paid by Buyer to Seller by bank cashier's or certified check or wire transfer, at Closing.

3. Closing. The consummation of the transaction and the delivery of the documents referred to herein shall occur at the "Closing". The Closing shall take place within thirty (30) days following the later to occur of: (a) approval and completion of the Subdivision and PUD Amendment as set forth in Sections 8.7 and 8.8 below, and (b) the expiration of the Access and Feasibility Study Period (defined below). The Closing shall take place at the office of the Escrow Agent or by mail-away closing.

4. Title and Survey Material.

- **4.1. Title Commitment.** Following the Effective Date, Buyer shall obtain a commitment for title insurance from Chicago Title Insurance Company on said Property ("Title Commitment") showing a merchantable title in the Seller, according to the standards adopted by the Oklahoma Bar Association, free and clear of all liens and encumbrances except those shown herein.
- **4.2. Survey.** Following receipt of Subdivision approval (set forth in Section 8.7 below), Seller shall obtain and deliver to Buyer an ALTA survey of the Property in a form acceptable to induce survey protection under the Title Commitment called for herein ("Survey"). The cost of the Survey shall be paid by Seller.
- **4.3. Title and Survey Review.** The Buyer shall have twenty (20) days, following receipt of the Title Commitment and Survey ("Title Review Period"), to have the Title Commitment and Survey examined and furnish any objections in writing to the Seller, or its agents herein, as to exceptions, defects or conditions shown on the Title Commitment or Survey ("Buyer's Objections"). Seller have no obligation to attempt to remove, satisfy or otherwise cure any of Buyer's Objections, however Seller shall have not to exceed five (5) business days from the receipt of Buyer's Objections to notify Buyer in writing that: (i) Seller will cure all or certain of Buyer's Objections as of or prior to Closing, or (ii) Seller will not cure all or certain of Buyer's Objections ("Seller's Cure Period"). If Seller fails to deliver the foregoing notice with respect to all or any of Buyer's Objections on or prior to the expiration of the Seller's Cure Period, then Seller shall be deemed to have elected option (ii) above with respect to any such Buyer's Objections. If Seller elects not to cure (or has deemed to have elected not to cure) any or all of Buyer's Objections, Buyer may, as Buyer's sole and exclusive remedies (a) waive said Buyer's Objections and proceed to Closing without any reduction of the Purchase Price, or (b) only by notice to Seller given on or prior to the expiration of five (5) business days after the expiration of Seller's Cure Period, terminate this Agreement, in which event the Earnest Money shall be released to Seller, and Seller and Buyer shall have no further obligations hereunder (except as otherwise expressly provided herein).
- **4.4. Updated Title Documents.** If the Title Commitment or a Survey is revised or any new exception document(s) is delivered, Buyer may object to any new matter revealed in the revised Title Commitment or Survey or new exception document(s)

within the same time stated in paragraph 4.3 to make objections beginning when the revised Title Commitment, Survey, or exception document(s) is delivered to Buyer.

5. Representations and Warranties.

- **5.1. Seller's Representations and Warranties.** Seller represents and warrants to Buyer as follows:
 - (a) Condemnation. Seller has no knowledge and has not received any written notice that the Property, or any part thereof, is or will be the subject of or affected by any condemnation, eminent domain, or similar proceeding.
 - **(b) Litigation.** To Seller's knowledge, there is no existing or threatened action, suit or proceeding affecting the Property, or any part thereof, or relating to or arising out of the ownership and use of the Property or any part thereof, in any Court or before or by any Federal, State, County or Municipal department, commission, board, bureau, agency or governmental instrumentality.
 - **(c) Legal Compliance.** To Seller's knowledge, Seller has complied with all Federal, State and local laws and administrative regulations relating to the ownership of the Property.
 - **(d) Options.** Seller has not granted to any person, firm or other entity a right or option to acquire the Property, or any part thereof, which has not been heretofore terminated in full.
 - **(e) Taxes.** All general taxes and special assessments relating to the Property due and payable with respect to calendar years prior to the year of Closing shall have been paid in full and discharged prior to Closing.
- **5.2.** Buyer's Representations and Warranties. The Buyer represents and warrants to Seller that Buyer has the authority and power to enter into and carry out the provisions of this Agreement; and that the execution and performance of this Agreement will not conflict with or result in any breach of the terms and provisions of any instrument or agreement to which Buyer is a party.
- **5.3. Survival.** The foregoing representations and warranties of Seller and Buyer shall survive the Closing for a period of one (1) year.
- **6.** Access and Feasibility Study. Seller shall provide Buyer, Buyer's agents and employees, access to the Property for the purpose of conducting, at Buyer's sole cost, liability and expense, (from which Buyer shall indemnify and hold Seller harmless), feasibility, adequacy of drainage, environmental, engineering and topographic studies,

including inspections, surveys, test borings, soil analyses and all other studies, tests, inspections, analyses and surveys reasonably necessary in the opinion of Buyer to establish to Buyer's satisfaction that the Property is suitable for Buyer's intended use. All of Buyer's obligations hereunder shall be subject to such studies, tests, inspections, analyses and surveys. If, within two hundred ten (210) days after the Effective Date ("Access and Feasibility Study Period"), Buyer should determine that the Property is unsuitable, Buyer may, at Buyer's option, (i) accept the condition of the Property and proceed to Closing; or, (ii) terminate this Agreement by notice in writing to Seller, in which event after the return of the Earnest Money and any interest to Buyer, neither party shall have any further obligations to the other hereunder. Upon the expiration of the Access and Feasibility Study Period, if Buyer has not elected to terminate the Agreement, the Earnest Money shall become non-refundable, except in those circumstances as specifically provided for herein.

- **7. Condition of Property.** Pending Closing, Seller shall maintain the Property in the condition existing as of the date hereof, ordinary wear and tear excepted.
- **8. Conditions Precedent.** The obligation of Buyer hereunder at Closing shall be subject, at Buyer's option, to the following conditions:
 - **8.1. Performance by Seller.** The Seller shall perform all its obligations to be performed hereunder at or prior to Closing.
 - **8.2. Representations and Warranties.** All representations and warranties of the Seller hereunder shall be true and correct as of Closing.
 - **8.3. Title.** Marketable title to the Property shall be vested in Seller in fee simple absolute, subject to no mortgage, pledge, lien, encumbrance, security interest or charge, except such matters as shall have been approved by Buyer in writing. "Marketable title" shall be determined according to current title standards adopted by the Oklahoma Bar Association.
 - **8.4. Condemnation.** Neither the Property, nor any part thereof, shall have been condemned by any authority having that right and power, nor shall the Property or any part thereof be the subject of any pending or threatened eminent domain proceeding.
 - **8.5. Alteration.** Neither the Property, nor any part thereof, shall have been materially altered prior to Closing.
 - **8.6. Environmental Audit.** As of the Effective Date, Seller has provided Buyer with an existing Phase I and limited Phase II of the Property. Buyer shall have the absolute right to obtain, at Buyer's expense, an updated Phase I and/or Phase II Environmental Audit to determine that the Property is suitable for the needs of Buyer. Buyer shall have until the expiration of the Access and Feasibility

Study Period to notify Seller of the acceptability of such Audit. If no notice is given to Seller by Buyer within such time, the Audit shall be deemed acceptable.

- **8.7. Subdivision.** Upon Escrow Agent's receipt of the Earnest Money, Seller shall submit a minor plat application to the City of Midwest City to subdivide the Overall Property into two (2) separate lots, one of which shall be the Property ("Subdivision"). The Subdivision process may take up to ninety (90) days to complete. If Seller is unable to obtain the necessary approvals to obtain the Subdivision, Buyer may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Seller and Buyer's Earnest Money shall be returned to Buyer and the parties shall have no further obligations to the other hereunder.
- **8.8. Rezoning/PUD Amendment.** The Buyer intends to use the Property to construct a 25,760 square feet indoor sports facility in addition to three (3) illuminated, covered regulation-size sand volleyball courts, three (3) illuminated open regulation-size sand volleyball courts, and three (3) non-illuminated grass athletic fields capable of hosting flag football, soccer and other outdoor sports. ("Intended Use"). The Property is currently zoned as PUD PC-1766, which must be amended to allow the Property to be used for Buyer's Intended Use ("PUD Amendment"). Additionally, Buyer understands that Seller has an inherent interest in the use of the Property and agrees that the PUD Amendment shall also include certain prohibited uses of the Property, which shall be incorporated into the PUD Amendment application. Upon receipt of approval of the Subdivision, Seller shall make application with the City of Midwest City to commence the PUD Amendment process, which may take up to ninety (90) days to complete. If Seller is unable to obtain the necessary approvals to obtain the PUD Amendment, Buyer may terminate this Agreement upon written notice to Seller and Buyer's Earnest Money shall be returned to Buyer and the parties shall have no further obligations to the other hereunder.
- **9.** Conditions Precedent to Seller's Obligations. The Seller's obligations hereunder shall be subject, at its option, to the conditions that Buyer perform all Buyer's obligations to be performed hereunder at or prior to Closing and that all representations and warranties of the Buyer hereunder are true and correct as of Closing.

10. Termination of Agreement.

- **10.1. Termination.** Either party may terminate this Agreement, at or prior to Closing, by written notice to the other party if any of the conditions precedent to that party's obligations hereunder shall have not been satisfied within the times prescribed herein.
- **10.2. Return of Earnest Money and Interest to Buyer.** If this Agreement is terminated by Buyer on account of Seller's failure or inability to satisfy any

condition precedent to Closing, and Buyer is unwilling to waive such condition, neither party shall have any further obligations hereunder except that Escrow Agent shall promptly refund to Buyer the Earnest Money delivered in escrow pursuant to paragraph 2.1 hereof.

- **10.3. Delivery of Earnest Money and Interest to Seller.** In the event Buyer refuses or is unable to close the transaction described herein despite the satisfaction of all conditions precedent to Buyer's obligations hereunder, Escrow Agent shall deliver the Earnest Money delivered in escrow, pursuant to paragraph 2.1 hereof, to Seller as full and complete liquidated damages, and without further liability of either party to the other and, in such event, neither party shall have any further obligations hereunder.
- **10.4. Specific Enforcement.** In the event that Seller refuses or is unable to close this transaction despite the satisfaction of all conditions precedent to Seller's obligations hereunder, Buyer shall be entitled, at Buyer's option, to specifically enforce the terms of this Agreement. The prevailing party shall be awarded reasonable attorney fees and costs.
- **11. Transactions at Closing.** The following transactions shall take place at Closing:
 - **11.1. Warranty Deed.** A General Warranty Deed, in Oklahoma statutory form and describing the Property, shall be executed and delivered by Seller to Buyer.
 - **11.2. Documentary Stamp Taxes.** Seller shall pay all sums necessary for the purchase of Documentary Stamps required to be affixed to the Warranty Deed under Oklahoma law.
 - **11.3. Proration of Taxes.** All Ad Valorem Taxes accruing or assessed with respect to the Property during the calendar year of Closing shall be prorated on the basis of the calendar year of Closing between Buyer and Seller as of the date of Closing. If the amount of such general taxes cannot be ascertained at Closing, such proration shall be on the basis of taxes assessed with respect to the previous calendar year, but shall be subsequently adjusted when such determination can be made.
 - **11.4. Payment.** Buyer shall pay to Seller, by certified or bank cashier's check or wire transfer, all sums owed under subparagraph 2.2 hereof, and the amount held by Escrow Agent in accordance with paragraph 2.1 hereof shall be delivered to Seller.
- **12.** Cooperation of Seller. Seller shall deliver to Buyer, within ten (10) days after the Effective Date, any surveys, prior title policies, environmental reports, or soil reports, pertaining to the Property that the Seller has in its possession.

- **13. Expenses.** Except as otherwise provided herein, expenses shall be paid as follows: a) Abstracting, title commitment and title policy: Buyer; b) Survey: Seller; c) Closing or escrow fee: ½ Seller, ½ Buyer; d) Documentary Stamps: Seller; e) Mortgage Tax: Buyer; f) Loan costs: Buyer. Each party will bear and pay its own expenses and professional fees of negotiation and consummating the transactions contemplated hereby.
- **14. Brokers.** The parties agree that there has been no broker, finder or other intermediary involved in this transaction and each party shall indemnify the other against all loss, cost, damage or expense, including attorney fees, should any such broker, finder or intermediary make any claim against the nondefaulting party.
- **15. Notices.** All notices, requests, demands, instructions, other communications called for hereunder or contemplated hereby shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been given if sent by overnight delivery, email transmission, personally delivered in return for a receipt, or if mailed by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, three days after the date of such mailing, to the parties at the addresses set forth below. Any party may change the address to which notices are to be given hereunder by giving notice in the manner herein provided.
 - **15.1. Seller.** Notices to Seller shall be addressed as follows:

- **16. Time of the Essence.** Time shall be of the essence with respect to the performance by the parties of their respective obligations hereunder.
- **17. Whole Agreement No Oral Modifications.** This Agreement embodies all the representations, warranties and agreements of the parties hereto and may not be altered or modified except by an instrument in writing signed by the parties.
- **18. Benefit of Agreement.** This Agreement shall be binding and inure to the benefits of the parties and their respective heirs, successors and assigns.
- **19. Governing Law.** This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Oklahoma applicable to contracts.
- **20.** Counterparts and Signatures. This Agreement may be executed in any number of counterparts which, taken together, shall constitute one and the same instrument. Confirmed facsimile and electronic signatures are binding.
- **21. Offer Available.** The foregoing offer is made subject to acceptance in writing hereon by the Seller on or before 5:00 p.m. Central Time, the _____ day of ______, 2025, and the return of an executed copy to the undersigned of this document. If not so accepted, this offer shall be deemed withdrawn and of no force and effect.
- **22. Miscellaneous Provisions**. The parties agree as follows:
 - (a) Formal Approval of Agreement. Buyer acknowledges that this Agreement and the Closing contemplated hereunder are wholly contingent upon the Seller obtaining the formal approval of the Midwest City Utilities Authority in an open meeting.
 - **(b) Warranty Deed Restriction.** Buyer acknowledges that the Warranty Deed shall contain language that the Property shall remain on the tax rolls of Oklahoma County and the City of Midwest City in perpetuity so that the Property shall never be exempt from taxes, regardless of the status of the owner of the Property.

- **(c)** Economic Development Assistance Agreement. Seller has agreed to provide Buyer with certain incentives in exchange for the timely development of the Property pursuant to the terms set forth in the Economic Development Assistance Agreement ("Development Agreement"), a draft of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "C". The Development Agreement shall be executed by Buyer and Seller at or prior to Closing.
- (d) Repurchase Right. As a condition of this sale, Seller retains the right to repurchase the Property at the same purchase price of \$4.00 per square foot, should Buyer or any subsequent owner fail to commence construction on the Property for Buyer's Intended Use within one hundred eighty (180) days after the date of Closing. For purposes of this repurchase right, "commence construction" shall mean any work undertaken on the Property following the issuance of a Soil Disturbance Permit. This right of repurchase may be exercised by written notice to Buyer by Seller. The language contained in this provision shall be included in the Warranty Deed delivered to Buyer at Closing. If Buyer does not commence construction (as defined above) within such 180-day period, Seller shall have a period of two hundred forty (240) days following the date of Closing to notify Buyer in writing of its election to exercise this repurchase right and a period of two hundred seventy (270) days following the date of Closing to close on the repurchase of the Property from Buyer. In the event Seller does not exercise its repurchase right within two-hundred forty (240) days of the date of Closing, then this repurchase right shall automatically terminate and no further document shall need to be recorded to terminate such repurchase right.
- **(e) 1031 Exchange.** Seller and/or Buyer agree to execute any and all documents necessary to effectuate a 1031 tax deferred exchange on the behalf of Seller and/or Buyer so long as such execution does not result in any expense to the non-participating party.
- **(f) Assignment.** Buyer may not assign this Agreement without Seller's written consent, which shall be in Seller's sole discretion.
- **(g) Disclaimer of Warranties.** At time of Closing, except for the warranty of title set forth in the deed of conveyance, and as otherwise set forth herein, Seller hereby specifically disclaims any warranty, guaranty or representation, oral or written, past, present or future, of, as to, or concerning (i) the nature and condition of the Property including, without limitation, the water, soil and geology, and the suitability thereof and of the

Property for any and all activities and uses which Buyer may elect to conduct thereon, and the existence of any environmental hazards or condition thereon (including the presence of asbestos) or compliance with all applicable laws, rules or regulations; (ii) the nature and extent of any right of way, lease, possession, lien, encumbrance, license, reservation, condition or otherwise; and (iii) the compliance of the Property or its operation with any laws, ordinance or regulations of any governmental or other body. Buyer acknowledges that it will have an opportunity to occupy and inspect the Property and that it will be relying solely on its own investigation of the Property and not any determinations made by or information provided or to be provided by Seller or Seller's representatives. Buyer further acknowledges that its information with respect to the Property will be obtained from a variety of sources, and Seller a) has not made, and will not make, any independent investigation or verification of such information; and b) does not make any representations as to the accuracy or completeness of any such information, and the sale of the Property as provided for herein is made on an "As Is", "Where Is" basis and "With all Faults", and Buyer expressly acknowledges that, in consideration of the agreements of Seller herein, except as otherwise specified herein, Seller makes no warranty or representation, express or implied, or arising by operation of law, including, but not limited to, any warranty of condition, habitability, merchantability, tenantability or fitness for a particular purpose, in respect of the Property. The terms and provision of this paragraph shall survive the Closing of the sale and shall not be deemed to merge into the deed and other documents delivered at such Closing.

(h) Unlawful and Illegal Acts. Buyer nor Seller shall engage, nor be involved in any manner, in any unethical, discriminatory, or illegal business practices or transactions with any person or entity. Nor shall Buyer engage in business with any country, entity or person that supports terrorism or with which the United States government does not approve conducting business. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, Buyer and Seller represent and warrant that neither Buyer nor Seller, nor any person or entity who owns a direct interest in Buyer or is an a officer, director, sits on advisory board, and/or serves in any official capacity of Seller, nor any of its subsidiaries, affiliates, directors, officers, agents, or employees is a terrorist, international narcotics trafficker, person engaged in the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, or person with whom Buyer or Seller may be prohibited from doing business under laws, regulations, or executive orders administered by the Office of Foreign Assets Control ("OFAC") of the U.S. Treasury Department. If any of the

foregoing representations is no longer true at any time prior to the date of Closing, the party hereto shall immediately notify the other.

(i) Escrow Agent. The parties agree that the duties of the Escrow Agent are purely administrative in nature and that the Escrow Agent shall not be liable for any error of judgment, fact, or law, or any act done or omitted to be done, except for its own gross negligence or willful misconduct. In the event a dispute arises with respect to the release of the Earnest Money, the Escrow Agent shall retain the Earnest Money until one of the following occur: (i) A written release is executed by Buyer and Seller agreeing to its disbursement; or (ii) Interpleader of legal action is filed, at which time the Earnest Money shall be deposited with the Court Clerk.
