**Title:** Exclusive three (3) year purchase of Douglas Fir Power Poles through Stella- Jones FY 23, FY 24, and FY 25 term extension not to exceed \$56,000 annually

**Background:** The City went to bid for a three (3) year purchase of Douglas Fir Power Poles in July 2019. The poles are purchased in truck loads with a variety of pole sizes. The lowest bid received was from McFarland Cascade which merged into Stella-Jones in December of 2019.

Staff requested the exclusive purchase not to exceed \$27,126 which is for one load of 40-45' poles. In August 2019 an additional load of 30-35' poles were requested for \$27,620.00.

The yearly impact for FY20 was \$54,746, \$55,009.97 for FY21 and \$22,812.49 for FY22.

Staff continue to work on pole replacements and need to continue the exclusive contract with Stella- Jones to purchase loads of different sizes of poles when needed. Stella-Jones has provided good quality poles for the past three years, is reliable and delivers loads timely.

Fiscal Impact: The yearly impact is estimated at \$56,000.

Fifth Amendment to the Professional Services Agreement for Building Support Services with Willdan Increasing the Contract Compensation for Building Official and Inspector Services

**Background**: On April 28, 2022 the City's Building Official had resigned. On April 13, 2021 the Council awarded the RFP Proposal to Willdan for a building inspector. On September 14, 2021 the City amended the agreement to include certified Building Official/Project Manager Services at an hourly rate of \$165. On May 10, 2022 Willdan had reduced their rate for Building Official Services to an hourly rate of \$125.

The City is actively recruiting a Certified Building Official. In the meantime, Willdan has assisted the City's Building Department with both an inspector who has boots on the ground and interacts with the City's residents on a daily basis. In addition to a Building Official who has guided our residents through the regulations for construction required to provide the minimum standards to safeguard the life, limb, health, or property necessary from time to time to carry out the purpose of the California Building Code.

Willdan has been very successful in working with our residents to interpret the code and assist developers with the challenges that they might face prior to construction. The City of Needles continues to experience building activity and to maintain a streamlined permitting process the City will need to continue to retain Willdan for Building Official Services as we explore filling the Building Department vacancies.

## FIFTH AMENDMENT TO PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT CONSULTANT SERVICES

#### 1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This Amendment is made and entered into July 12, 2022, by and between the **CITY OF NEEDLES**, a **California Charter City**, (hereinafter referred to as the "City") and Willdan Engineering, a California corporation (hereinafter referred to as "Consultant"). City and Consultant are sometimes individually referred to as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

#### 2. RECITALS.

City and Willdan entered into a Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") dated April 19, 2021;

City and Willdan entered into a First Amendment to Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") dated July 13, 2021 for Comprehensive Plan Review and Structural Plan Review;

City and Willdan entered into a Second Amendment to Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") dated September 14, 2021 for Certified Building Official/Project Manager Services at an hourly rate of \$165.

City and Willdan entered into a Third Amendment to Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") dated April 26, 2022 for increasing the maximum contract amount.

City and Willdan entered into a Fourth Amendment to the Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") dated May 10, 2022 add a Certified Building Official Services hourly rate of \$125 and to increase the maximum contract amount.

City and Willdan wish to amend the Agreement to increase the maximum contract amount.

#### 3. AMENDMENT.

Section 2.1 is hereby amended to increase the maximum contract amount by \$72,000 from Two Hundred Forty Six Thousand Six Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$246,675) to Three Hundred Eighteen Six Hundred Seventy Five Dollars (\$318,675).

All other terms of the Agreement not specifically amended shall remain in full force and effect.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-53 A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, ESTABLISHING THE APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022 - 2023 FOR THE CITY OF NEEDLES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF DIVISION 9 OF TITLE I OF THE CALIFORNIA GOVERNMENT CODE

WHEREAS, Article XIII B of the Constitution of the State of California as proposed by the Initiative Measure approved by the people at the special statewide election held on November 6, 1979, and amended in June 1990 by the People of the State of California (Proposition III), provides that the total annual appropriations subject to limitations of each local government shall not exceed the appropriations limit of such entity for the prior year, adjusted for changes in the cost of living and population, except as otherwise specifically provided for in said Article; and

WHEREAS, the State Legislature added Division 9 (commencing with Section 7900) to Title I of the Government Code of the State of California to implement Article XIII B of the California Constitution; and

WHEREAS, Section 7910 of the Government Code provides that each year the governing body of each local jurisdiction shall, by resolution, establish its appropriations limit for the following fiscal year pursuant to Article XIII B at a regularly scheduled meeting or a noticed special meeting; and

WHEREAS, Proposition III was approved by the voters of the State of California, and requires a recorded vote of the City Council regarding the annual adjustment factors which have been selected each year; and

WHEREAS, at the time of adoption of this Resolution, data necessary to calculate the increase in nonresidential assessed valuation was not available from the County Assessor's office; and

WHEREAS, Section 7902 (a) of the Government Code sets forth the method for determining the appropriations limit for each local jurisdiction for the fiscal year 2022 - 2023; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Needles wishes to establish the appropriations limit for the fiscal year 2022 – 2023 for the City of Needles;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Needles, California, as follows:

Section 1: That it is hereby found and determined that the documentation used in the determination of the appropriations limit for the City of Needles for the fiscal year 2022 – 2023 was available to the public in the Finance Department of said City at least fifteen days prior to this date.

Section 2: That the growth in California Per Capita Income and City Population were selected for the 2022 – 2023 fiscal year.

Section 3: That there may be a need to amend the inflation factor selected and adjust the Appropriations Limit once the nonresidential assessed valuation data becomes available from the County Assessor's Office.

Section 4: That the appropriations limit for the City of Needles as established in accordance with section 7902 (a) of the California Government Code is: \$12,256,096.

**Title:** Adopt Resolution No. 2022-54 Authorizing the City Manager or Designee to Execute Agreements with the California Department of Transportation for the City of Needles to complete the Clean California Local Grant Program

**Background:** The City applied to Caltrans under the Clean California Grant Program for the First Beach project which includes a public restroom, trash bag stations, six trashcans, and six recycling bins on the site. The restroom and waste bins provide visitors of the park to dispose of waste correctly, and the transformed site will create a public space that the community is proud of.

The project site is a culturally important area where the community organically gathers. Despite First Beach being a significant space to the community, the project site currently has an empty basin used for dumping of trash and human waste. The type of waste disposed on the site includes bottles, diapers, food waste, food packaging, and canopies and beach chairs left by beach visitors. There is no signage to discourage dumping, and there is no public restroom and no trashcans on site. The site is unusable because of the dumping and lack of safe recreational space.

First Beach will be a safe community gathering space, which the community is invested in preserving. The project aims to empower the community as stewards of an area with cultural and historical significance to the City of Needles. The City was awarded the grant for the proposed project on March 3, 2022.

**Fiscal Impact:** \$2,179,702 in grant funding from the California Department of Transportation.

The purpose of the program is to provide up to \$20,000 of LMIHAF funding for the correction of any exterior physical deficiencies to structures, fences, landscaping, and other related appurtenances that are visible from a public right-of-way (as defined within the Program Policies), with priority given to code-related improvements.

On July 13, 2021, the City Council awarded the Request for Qualifications to **Trinity Construction Services Inc.** to complete the rehabilitation repairs for the Neighborhood Beautification Program. On March 21, 2022, the City was notified by Trinity Construction Services Inc. that they had withdrawn from the program. City staff immediately began readvertising for qualified licensed contractors.

On June 15, 2022, a Request for Qualifications was advertised in the Needles Desert Star for licensed contractors to bid for contracts to perform rehabilitation repairs to owner-occupied single-family homes that qualify for assistance under the Agency's Neighborhood Beautification Program, with a bid opening on July 6, 2022. We received a response from one qualified licensed contractor **BRACK CONSTRUCTION INC.** 

**Fiscal Impact:** The current balance (as of May 25, 2022) of available Low and Moderate Income Housing Asset Fund (LMIHAF) (approximately \$299,904.32) to the Program, wherein \$260,000 is to be reserved to fund projects and \$39,904.32 is to be reserved to fund Program Administration.

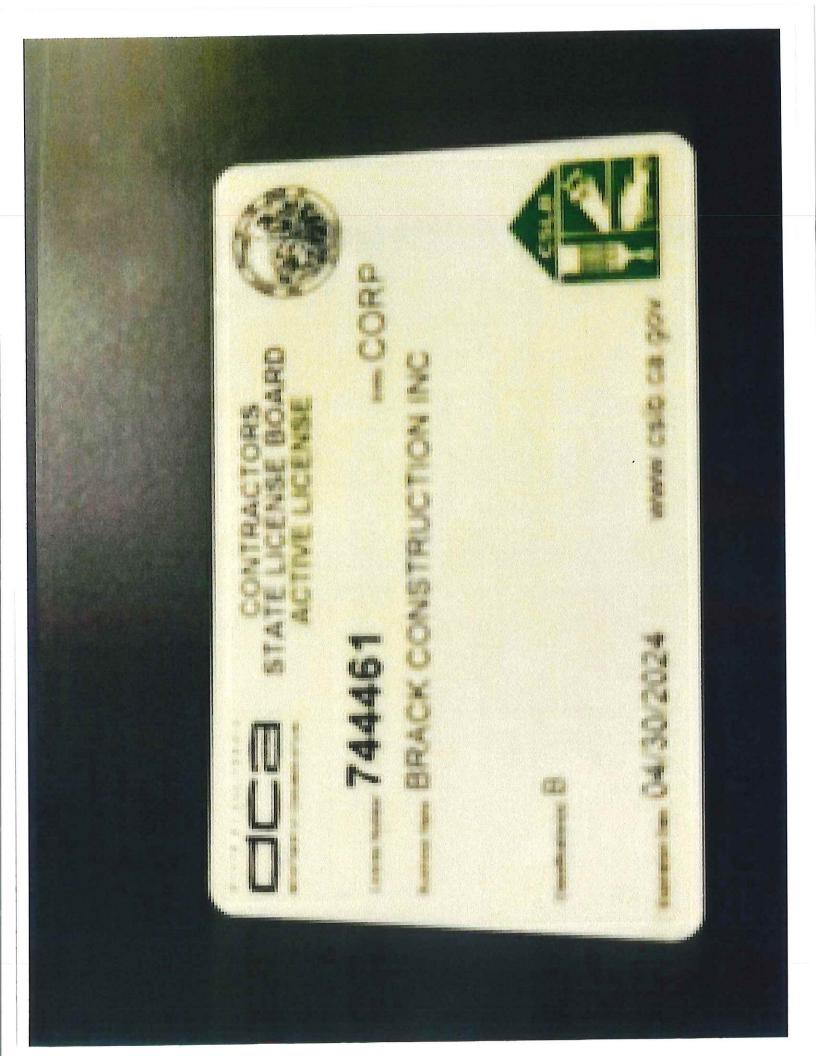

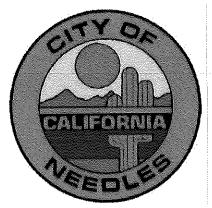

The City recent completion of the Housing Element presents the City of Needles' goals, quantified objectives, and policies relative to the development, improvement, and maintenance of housing within the incorporated areas of the City, during the period of 2021 to 2029.

The City is currently updating the Land Use Element and intends to process the Land Use Element and Circulation Element in tandem with each other.

The City of Needles has approximately 5,200 residents and is located on the "east coast" of California. The City of Needles is currently experiencing a significant economic development increase because of our affordable land prices and low power rates.

The Project is in the City of Needles in San Bernardino County in the Mojave Desert and lies on the western banks of the Colorado River along the California/Arizona/Nevada borders. Needles has a local population of 5,200 and a regional population of 142,000. The City is roughly 110 miles (180 km) from the Las Vegas Strip and is the easternmost city of the San Bernardino-Riverside metropolitan area. Needles is geographically isolated from other cities in the county. Barstow, the nearest city within the county, is separated from Needles by over 140 miles of desert and 2 mountain ranges. In 2018, Meridian developed an application and process for the renewal of these permits and the City Council renewed some of the previously approved permits and approved permits for new businesses.

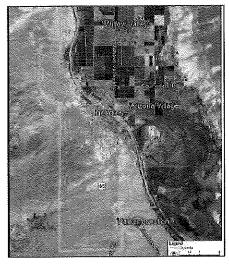
The City of Solvang updated its current Water System Master Plan to ensure adequate and reliable water supply and infrastructure to meet future demand as forecast in the City's General Plan at buildout. As part of the Water System Master Plan Update, the City will be improving reliability to meet future demands, including installation of new wells to replace lost pumping capacity, perfecting its existing water rights permit by extracting additional underflow from the Santa Ynez River, and implementing other improvements to the existing water system infrastructure. The project considered implications and impacts to other water rights holders on the lower Santa Ynez River, including the Santa Ynez River Water Conservation District, Improvement

#### District No.1 and Alisal Ranch.

Meridian Consultants prepared a program EIR that included project-level considerations to (1) evaluate present and future water supply and demand conditions; (2) analyze and identify water system supply and developing distribution deficiencies; and (3) prioripzing water sources, recommendations on developing new and expanded water production and treatment facilities, upgrading various distribution and storage facilities, and developing a capital improvement program to address deficiencies. Further, the program EIR evaluated the City's efforts to acquire a ome extension to perfect its water right and to secure a change in point of diversion for Water Right Permit 15878 from the SWRCB.

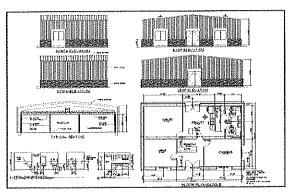
The Project would update its current 2005 Housing Element as part of the City's General Plan requirements and define policies and goals for future housing within the corporate boundary limits of the City. The Project would include policies and programs which would accommodate a variety of housing types for all income levels and needs of special population groups; analyze governmental constraints to housing maintenance, improvement, and development; address conservation and improvement of the condition of the existing affordable housing stock; and outline policies to promote housing opportunities for all persons within the City. This document would not include any changes to land use designations, zoning, building, or heights and intensities.

The Housing Element is one of seven mandatory elements to a local jurisdiction's General Plan. Jurisdictions in the six-county Southern

California Association of Governments (SCAG), including the City, must update their housing elements based on an eight year planning period that begins in 2015. The IS/ND provided compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines re-quired for the City to implement the Project and focus on whether the Project may cause significant effects on the environment.

#### Lead Agency: City of Needles

Meridian Consultants assisted in the review and completion of an Initial Study (IS)/ Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND) for the Fluid Holdings/Micro Lab Farms Project located in the City of Needles. The Project site is located in the City within San Bernadino County on a 3.75 acre parcel. With the legalization of marijuana in the state of California (most recently the Adult Use of Marijuana Act 2016) for medicine and recreation, there has been a need for the production of safe and legal marijuana.



Also known as Micro Lab Farms, the Project would create an indoor agriculture space in order to grow marijuana for legal

distribution and research. The proposed Project would construct a total of five structures: three buildings for production, one administrative building with restroom facilities, and one warehouse. The Project seeks to improve environmental conditions related to agriculture by growing indoors and minimizing the amount of water used through an evaporation process, which would maintain water reserves.

Approval of the Project would require a zoning change from Highway Commercial (C-3) and approvals from the California Department of Food and Agriculture (Cultivation License), California Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the California Regional Water Quality Control Board.

Meridian Consultants will prepare an Administrative Draft MND/IS for the proposed Project using the latest standard Initial Study checklist form appended to the 2022 CEQA Guidelines requirements. Analysis will be provided for each of the environmental topics in the Initial Study checklist form to study and provide justification for each "No Impact," "Less than Significant Impact," "Less Than Significant Impact with Mitigation Incorporated," and "Potential Significant Impact" determinations checked in response to each question.

The Initial Study will include a description of the proposed Project based on information provided by the Project team and prepared as part of Task 2. Meridian Consultants will also coordinate with the Project team to ensure that the technical information required to answer the Initial Study questions is at a level that will meet the necessary agency requirements, including the traffic analysis that will be completed by KOA Corporation. In addition, all discretionary actions requiring approval by the City and other agencies will be identified and described.

Meridian Consultants will conduct a review of relevant biological databases, including the California Natural Diversity Database (CNDDB) and eBird database, to determine the potential absence or presence of any sensitive wildlife or plant species within the Project vicinity. #### 5. Public Draft of CEQA Document Preparation

Task 5: Consultant will prepare CEQA Document for public review after receiving comments from City Staff and the public. Consultant will draft NOI to be sent off to appropriate State agencies as responsible agencies under CEQA for a public review period of 30 days. Consultant will draft all necessary documents for the lead agency to distribute to the newspaper for general circulation.

Upon receipt of comments from City staff on the Administrative Draft MND/IS, Meridian Consultants will meet (via conference call) with City staff to receive their comments, review these comments with the Project team, and revise the Administrative Draft MND/IS to incorporate the comments and requested information to prepare for release for public review.

This task also includes preparation of an unbound, camera-ready master copy of the Public Draft MND/IS for printing and distribution, as well as provision of electronic PDF files for posting to the City's website. Meridian Consultants will assist the City in the production of copies for public distribution as noted under the Deliverables section of this task.

The Lead Agency, the City, shall provide a Notice of intent (NOI) to adopt a MND/IS to the public, responsible agencies, trustee agencies, and the San Bernardino County Clerk where the proposed Project is located. Because the proposed Project will be subject to appropriate State agencies (CDFW, and others) as Responsible Agencies under CEQA, the public review period will require 30 days.

Pursuant to the CEQA Guidelines Section 15072(b), the City, as Lead Agency, shall mail a NOI to adopt a MND to the last known name and address of all organizations and individuals who have previously requested such notice in writing and shall also give NOI to adopt a MND by at least one of the following procedures to allow the public the review:

- 1) Publication of the NOI in at least one time by the City in a newspaper of general circulation in the area affected by the proposed project. If more than one area is affected, the notice shall be published in the newspaper of largest circulation from among the newspapers of general circulation in those areas.
- 2) Posting of NOI by the Lead Agency on and off site in the area where the proposed Project is to be located.
- 3) Direct mailing of the NOI to the owners and occupants of property contiguous to the proposed Project. Owners of such property shall be identified as shown on the latest equalized assessment roll.

To satisfy the above, we suggest that a copy of the NOI be posted at the City office. Our scope and cost <u>does not include</u> any legal publications in the local newspaper of the NOI, which is assumed to be done by the City if that method is selected.

In addition, Meridian Consultants will prepare the NOI for the San Bernardino County Clerk and submit the Public Draft MND/IS to local responsible agencies on behalf of the City, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15073(a) to the State Clearinghouse).

Deliverables:

- One (1) electronic copy of the Public Draft MND/IS for the City to post on its website
- Five (5) hard copies and one unbound and reproducible of the Public Draft MND/IS for distribution
- As required of the Draft MND/IS to be submitted to the State Clearinghouse for distribution to state agencies. Under the new requirements from the Office of Planning and research, the State Clearinghouse will no longer accept hard copies of documents.

Meridian Consultants will work with the City staff to file the Draft MND/IS electronically with the State Clearinghouse. This will include preparation of the Notice of Completion (NOC) and a summary of the CEQA document.

OPR and the State Clearinghouse have established a CEQA Submit Portal (internal portal for lead agencies and their consultants to register). Therefore, it will be important for Lead Agencies, such as the City, to register through the CEQA Submit Portal and lead agencies to approve consultants to register (so they can upload and manage document submissions on their behalf). Registry for consultants is not project specific but lead agency specific because the lead agency must verify you are their consultant.

State Clearinghouse website has information on how to file environmental documents and how to register.

• One (1) electronic and hard copy of the NOI to the City for the City to file with the County Clerk

#### 6. Draft of CEQA Document Preparation

Task 6: Upon receipt of comments after the 30-day public review period of the Public Draft CEQA Document, Consultant will review comments and draft responses to comments. Consultant will prepare Final CEQA document for presentation to the City Council for adoption.

Upon receipt of comments after the 30-day public review period of the Public Draft MND/IS, Meridian Consultants will review the comments (via conference call) with City staff. Following this review, we will prepare draft responses to the comments.

If a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) is required, Meridian Consultants will prepare an MMRP that identifies the mitigation measures included in the Draft MND/IS; the timing of the implementation of each measure; and the entity (applicant, agency, or both) responsible for implementing and monitoring each measure. We will coordinate with City staff to identify the responsible parties for each mitigation measure. Meridian Consultants will revise the MMRP in response to one round of comments for final submittal to the City.

An Administrative Final MND/IS containing responses to comments and other required CEQA sections will be provided to City staff for review. In addition, a Final MMRP will also be prepared.

Meridian Consultants will prepare the Final MND/IS and MMRP for presentation by City staff to the City Council for adoption.

This task also includes preparation of an unbound, camera-ready master copy of the Final MND/IS for printing and distribution, as well as provision of electronic PDF files for posting to the City's website.

Deliverables:

• One (1) electronic copy of the Administrative Final MND/IS, and MMRP, if required, for the City to review.

- One (1) electronic copy of the Final MND/IS, and MMRP if required, for the City and for posting on its website.
- Five (5) hard copies (one unbound and reproducible) of the Final MND/IS, and MMRP, if required, for the City for distribution.

#### 7. Notice of Determination

Task 7: Consultant will prepare the Notice of Determination for the proposed Project.

Meridian Consultants will prepare the Notice of Determination (NOD) for the proposed Project and provide the NOD to City staff for review.

Following the adoption of the Final MND/IS, Meridian Consultants will coordinate posting this notice with the San Bernardino County Clerk and State Clearinghouse. There is a \$50 processing fee by the County Clerk.

The County Clerk requires payment of the applicable California Department of Fish and Wildlife CEQA filing fees; these fees are currently \$2,548.00 for an MND; these fees typically increase annually on January 1. CDFW imposes and collects an environmental document filing fee to defray the costs of managing and protecting California's vast fish and wildlife resources, including, but not limited to, consulting with other public agencies, reviewing environmental documents, recommending mitigation measures, and developing monitoring programs.

The City will be responsible for payment of both the CDFW and County Clerk fees and they are not part of the proposed budget for this proposal.

- Meridian Consultants will file the NOD with the State Clearinghouse electronically

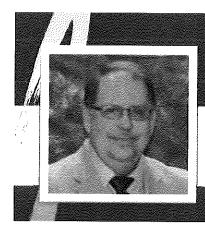

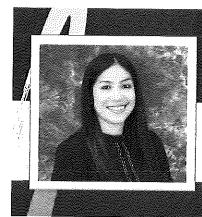

**Background:** On June 14, 2022, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 2022-47 proclaiming a local emergency, ratifying the proclamation of a State of Emergency by Executive Order N-09-21, and authorizing remote teleconference meetings of the legislative bodies of the City of Needles for the period of June 17, 2022 - July 17, 2022, pursuant to provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act.

The primary purpose of California Assembly Bill 361 (Rivas) is to allow for California public agencies to continue holding public meetings remotely, using abbreviated teleconferencing procedures, during the COVID-19 state of emergency.

Pursuant to AB 361, if the state of emergency remains active, or state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, in order to continue to teleconference using the abbreviated teleconferencing procedures, the local legislative bodies shall, not later than 30 days after teleconferencing for the first time under AB 361, and every 30 days thereafter, make the following findings by majority vote:

- (A) The legislative body has reconsidered the circumstances of the state of emergency.
- (B) Any of the following circumstances exist:
  - (i) The state of emergency continues to directly impact the ability of the members to meet safely in person.
  - (ii) State or local officials continue to impose or recommend measures to promote social distancing.

#### **RESOLUTION 2022-55**

#### A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY PERSISTS, RE-RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY EXECUTIVE ORDER N-09-21, AND RE-AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES FOR THE PERIOD JULY 18, 2022 – AUGUST 17, 2022, PURSUANT TO PROVISIONS OF THE RALPH M. BROWN ACT

WHEREAS, the City of Needles (the "City") is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the City Council; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of the City's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code §§ 54950 – 54963) (the "Brown Act"), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the City's legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

**WHEREAS,** a proclamation is made when there is an actual incident, threat of disaster, or extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the jurisdictions that are within the City's boundaries, caused by natural, technological, or human-caused disasters; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, the City Council previously adopted Resolution 2022-47 on June 14, 2022, finding that the requisite conditions exist for the legislative bodies of the City to conduct remote teleconference meetings without compliance with Government Code section 54953(b)(3); and

WHEREAS, as a condition of extending the use of the provisions found in Government Code section 54953(e), the City Council must reconsider the circumstances of the state of emergency that exists in the City, and the City Council has done so; and

WHEREAS, emergency conditions persist in the City, specifically, on March 4, 2020, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a State of Emergency to exist in California as a result of the threat of COVID-19; despite sustained efforts the virus continues to spread and is impacting nearly all sectors of California; and

WHEREAS, on June 9, 2021, the California Department of Public Health issued updated public health directives related to physical distancing and face coverings effective June 15, 2021, based on guidelines issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; and

WHEREAS, the San Bernardino County Department of Health has recommended measures to promote social distancing. The current state and federal masking guidance recommend that vaccinated individuals wear face masks in public indoor settings. The state still requires unvaccinated individuals to wear masks indoors; and

WHEREAS, the City Council does hereby find that the ongoing risk posed by the highly transmissible COVID-19 virus will continue to cause conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the City which are likely to be beyond the control of services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of the City, and the City Council desires to proclaim a local emergency and ratify the proclamation of state of emergency by the Governor of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, as a consequence of the local emergency persisting, the City Council does hereby find that the legislative bodies of the City shall continue to conduct their meetings without compliance with Government Code section 54953(b)(3), as authorized by Government Code section 54953(e), and that such legislative bodies shall continue to comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings as prescribed in Government Code section 54953(e)(2); and

WHEREAS, all meeting agendas stating meeting dates, times and the manner in which the public may attend and offer public comment by call-in option or internet-based service option shall be posted, at a minimum, on the City's website and at the City's main office.

# NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

#### Section 1. Recitals.

The recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into this Resolution by this reference.

#### Section 2. Affirmation that Local Emergency Persists.

The City Council hereby considers the conditions of the state of emergency in the City and proclaims that a local emergency persists throughout the City, and the ongoing risk posed by the highly transmissible COVID-19 virus has caused, and will continue to cause, conditions of peril to the safety of persons within the City; furthermore, the guidance of San Bernardino County Department of Health recommends physical distancing.

#### Section 3. Re-ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency.

The City Council hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of March 4, 2020.

#### Section 4. Remote Teleconference Meetings.

The Mayor, the City Manager, and legislative bodies of the City are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

#### Section 5. Effective Date.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until the earlier of (i) August 17, 2022, or such time the City Council adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of the City may continue to teleconference without compliance with Government Code section 54953(b)(3).

#### Section 6. Certification.

The Clerk of the City Council shall certify as to the adoption of this Resolution and shall cause the same to be processed in the manner required by law.

Title: City Planner Job Description and Salary

**Background:** In January 2022 the Associate Planner retired. Prior to their retirement the City awarded on-call development review consulting to Michael Baker International who is currently assisting with getting projects through the development process in the absence of an Associate Planner.

The City has been unsuccessful in filling the Associate Planner position after a lengthy recruitment process. City staff recommends the City begin recruitment for a City Planner as opposed to hiring a low level introductory Associate Planner because it would provide a more experienced, thus higher level, of service to the public.

The position would bring in-house the expertise to properly process the continued increase in development projects in accord with the policy direction of the City Council, and lessen or eliminate the use of outside consultants. This should result in more timely and effective development reviews, yet compliance with City Codes and applicable state law.

**Fiscal Impact:** The City Planner position is currently an authorized position by the City Council. The addition of a City Planner would reduce the General Fund dollars towards outside Planning Consultants Services.

Existing: Step 96 \$24.29 -\$31.00/hr (Associate Planner)

Proposed: Step 129 \$33.73-\$43.04/hr (City Planner)

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, SETTING PRIORITIES FOR FILING WRITTEN ARGUMENT(S) REGARDING A CITY MEASURE AND DIRECTING THE CITY ATTORNEY TO PREPARE AN IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

WHEREAS, a General Municipal Election is to be held in the City of Needles, California, on November 8, 2022, at which there will be submitted to the voters the following measure:

To maintain and protect the level of essential services such as public safety, and other vital services including infrastructure, street repair and park improvements, shall a measure be adopted to amend the Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) which is paid only by guests who stay in local hotels, motels and other lodgings, to also include and apply to "short term residential rental units" in the City of Needles?

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the City Council authorizes the following member(s) of it's body

to file (a) written argument(s) not exceeding 300 words regarding the City measure as specified above), accompanied by the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting it, in accordance with Article 4, Chapter 3, Division 9 of the Elections Code of the State of California. The arguments may be changed or withdrawn until and including the date fixed by the City Clerk after which no arguments for or against the City measure may be submitted to the City Clerk.

The arguments shall be filed with the City Clerk, signed, with the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the author(s) submitting it, or if submitted on behalf of an organization, the name of the organization, and the printed name and signature of at least one of its principal officers who is the author of the argument. The arguments shall be accompanied by the Form of Statement To Be Filed By Author(s) of Argument (see Form F-A-1).

SECTION 2. That the city council directs the City Clerk to transmit a copy of the measure to the city attorney, unless the organization or salaries of the office of the city attorney are affected. a. The city attorney shall prepare an impartial analysis of the measure not exceeding 500 words showing the effect of the measure on the existing law and the operation of the measure. If the measure affects the organization or salaries of the office of the city attorney, the city clerk shall prepare the impartial analysis. b. The analysis shall include a statement indicating whether the measure was placed on the ballot by a petition signed by the requisite number of voters or by the governing body of the city.

c. In the event the entire text of the measure is not printed on the ballot, nor in the voter information portion of the voter information guide, there shall be printed immediately below the impartial analysis, in no less than 10-point type, the following: "The above statement is an impartial analysis of Ordinance or Measure (TBD). If you desire a copy of the ordinance or measure, please call the election official's office at 760-326-2113 and a copy will be mailed at no cost to you."

d. The impartial analysis shall be filed by the date set by the City Clerk for the filing of primary arguments.

SECTION 3. That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this resolution and enter it into the book of original resolutions.
