ORDINANCE 668-AC

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES AMENDING NEEDLES MUNICIPAL CODE (NMC) SECTION 96.00 "TABLE OF PERMISSIBLE USES" AND" SECTION 96.08 "DWELLING UNIT"

WHEREAS, the City of Needles, California ("City") is a municipal corporation, duly organized under the constitution and laws of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, state law authorizes cities to act by ordinance to provide for the creation and regulation of accessory dwelling units ("ADUs") and junior accessory dwelling units (JADUs); and

WHEREAS, in recent years, the California Legislature has approved, and the Governor has signed into law, a number bills that, among other things, amended Government Code sections 66310-66342 to impose new limits on local authority to regulate ADUs and JADUs; and

WHEREAS, On July 22, 2024, the City of Needles received a comment letter from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) regarding Ordinance No. 652-AC, which amended Needles Municipal Code (NMC) Section 96.00 "Table of Permissible Uses" and Section 96.08 "Dwelling Unit" and was adopted by the Needles City Council on August 6, 2022; and

WHEREAS, on September 19, 2024, Governor Newsom signed Senate Bill 1211 (SB 1211) into law, introducing further changes to State ADU regulations; and

As the advisory body to the City Council, the Planning Commission has independently reviewed and considered the project exempt under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines Sections 15060(c), 15061(B)(3) (the common-sense exemption), and 15378, that this Ordinance is nonetheless exempt from the requirements of CEQA in that the activity is covered by the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment. Where it can be with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA.

SECTION 3. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that facts do exist to approve an amendment to the Needles Municipal Code (NMC), attached as "Exhibit "A".

SECTION 4. The City Council HEREBY APPROVES Ordinance 668-AC for an amendment to the Needles Municipal Code (NMC) attached as Exhibit "A".

SECTION 5. This action shall become final and effective 30 days after this decision by the

City Council as provided by the Needles City Code.

Approving a Categorical Exemption for the Schools and Seniors' Sidewalk Project

Background: The City has identified the need for sidewalk improvements to provide a safer and more inviting bicycling and walking experience for students and seniors' commuting to nearby facilities using active forms of transportation. More specifically, the project scope includes design of curb, gutter, sidewalk, driveway, access ramps, and AC pavement improvements along various streets close to schools, senior center and senior housing.

The City was awarded \$1,565,000 in Active Transportation Plan (ATP) Cycle 6 Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) funds for its Schools and Seniors Sidewalk Project, with an estimated total project cost of \$1,658,000. The City retained an engineering consultant to complete preliminary engineering, planning and environmental clearance, right-of-way exhibits, plans & specifications, cost estimates, and project management services for the proposed project.

Project Description

The purpose of this project is to design curb, gutter, sidewalk, driveways, access ramps and AC pavement improvements along various local streets close to schools, senior center and senior housing all within the City of Needles' boundaries.

Introduction:

State law requires that every lead agency have defined rules or guidelines to implement the California Environmental Quality Act of 1970 (CEQA). The laws and rules governing the CEQA process are contained in the CEQA statute, Public Resources Code (PRC) §§21000 and following, the CEQA Guidelines (California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 15000 and following, referred to as "Guidelines" herein), and locally adopted CEQA procedures. This document represents the City of Needles (City) "Rules and Procedures for the Implementation of CEQA" hereinafter referred to as the CEQA Rules & Procedures, and is intended to update and replace, in its entirety, the previous City guidance document dated December 20, 1988 and as amended in 1992. These CEQA Rules & Procedures shall be applicable to all City Department(s) that have responsibilities under CEQA as either a "Lead Agency" or a "Responsible Agency." The Community Development Department is hereby designated as the principal "Lead Agency" Department for the City with respect to CEQA compliance.

Categorical Exemptions (Guidelines §§15300 to 15332)

Categorical exemptions are descriptions of types of projects which the Secretary of the Resources Agency have determined may not have a significant effect on the environment. Unlike statutory exemptions, categorical exemptions are not absolute. There are exceptions to the exemptions depending on the nature or location of the project. If an exception pursuant to the Guidelines §15300.2 applies, the project would not be exempt. Specifically, the following types of projects would not be exempt:

- located in sensitive environments:
- would result in cumulative impacts;
- have a significant effect on the environment;
- affect scenic highways;
- · affect historical resources; and
- are hazardous waste sites

Guidelines §15300.4 states that each public agency shall, in the course of establishing its own procedures, list those specific activities that fall within each of the exempt classes. There are 33 classes of Categorical Exemptions (referred to as Class 1, Class 2, etc.) provided in the Guidelines. Of the 33 classes listed in the guidelines (Guidelines Sections 15301 to 15333), the classes cited below, and accompanying examples represent the most commonly used categorical exemptions by the City. Please refer to the Guidelines for the complete list of exemptions and explanations:

- Class 1 Existing facilities, including existing highways and streets, sidewalks, gutters, bicycle
 and pedestrian trails and similar facilities, this includes road grading for the purpose of public
 safety (see discussion of City projects that would generally be expected to fall under 15301 (c)
 below), and other alterations such as the addition of bicycle facilities, including but not limited to
 bicycle parking, bicycle-share facilities and bicycle lanes, transit improvements such as bus lanes,
 pedestrian crossings, street trees, and other similar alternations that do not create additional
 automobile lanes:
- Class 2 Replacement or reconstruction of existing structures and facilities, where a new structure
 would be located on the same site and have approximately the same purpose and capacity as the
 structure being replaced;
- Class 3 New construction or conversion of small structures, where only minor modifications are made to the exterior. This class has limits in terms of the maximum that would be allowed depending on the type of use (e.g., multi-family residential unit totaling no more than four dwelling units);
- Class 4 Minor alterations to land, such as minor trenching or backfilling, fuel management, creation of bicycle lanes on existing rights-of-ways, and maintenance dredging;
- Class 5 Minor alterations in land use limitations, applies to areas with an average slope of less than 20% not resulting in changes in the land use or density;
- Class 11 Accessory structures, including the construction or placement of minor structures accessory
 to existing facilities such as signage, small parking lots, or seasonal/temporary use items;
- Class 15 Minor land divisions, applicable to property divisions in urban areas creating up to four parcels when in conformance with the General Plan and zoning; and
- Class 32 In-fill development projects, where the project size is five acres or less and substantially surrounded by urban uses and consistent with the general plan and zoning.

As guidance for City capital projects, the Class 1 Categorical Exemption under Section 15301 (c) include, but are not limited to:

- a. Minor widening of less than a lane width, and/or adding paved shoulders to existing streets;
- b. Pavement reconstruction, resurfacing, rehabilitation and placement of seal coats;
- c. Minor operational improvements to drainage facilities;
- d. Repair work on bridge structures;
- e. Reconstruction and/or repair of existing stream crossings;
- f. Maintenance of man-made water features;
- g. Installation of new traffic control systems, including signs, signals, interconnect, cameras, channelization of intersections, pavement striping, and other traffic control devices;
- h. Modification of traffic control systems and devices including addition of new elements such as signs, signals, and controllers;
- Repair and maintenance of a highway and all its appurtenant facilities including replacement of damaged or inadequate facilities, or upgrade of facilities to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act requirements;
- j. Minor operational improvements to drainage facilities;
- k. **Modification of existing features such as curbs**, headwalls, slopes and ditches within the right of way to improve roadway safety;
- I. Removal and/or replacement of distinctive roadway markings such as painted stripes, raised pavement markers, thermoplastic, tape or raised bars;

- m. Addition of auxiliary lanes when required for purposes such as weaving, turning, climbing, speed change, or for lane changing between adjacent interchanges or intersections;
- n. Landscaping within City owned property, rights of way, or within the California Aqueduct easement for the public's benefit;
- o. Addition of non-motorized trails including Class 1 bike path trails within right-of-way, or within easements:
- p. Addition or replacement of devices such as fencing, guardrails, safety barriers, guideposts and markers:
- q. Repair and maintenance of City owned facilities, parking lots, carports, and gates.

Conclusion: Pursuant to Article 19 of the State of California's CEQA Guidelines, the proposed City of Needles' ATP Cycle 6 Schools and Senior Sidewalk Improvement Project, ATPL-5220(011) & (PPNo: 1299)has been found to be **Categorically Exempt** from the requirements of CEQA under State Guidelines (Section §15300.4), Class (1) (Existing Facilities) because Class (1) "consists of existing streets, sidewalks and gutters" and, therefore, the City of Needles directs staff to file the notice of exemption.

WHEREAS, the Needles City Council has sufficiently considered all testimony and any documentary evidence presented to them in order to make the following determination.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the CITY COUNCIL of the City of Needles as follows:

- 1) Pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the Schools and Seniors' Sidewalk Project is exempt from CEQA, and
- 2) Staff is directed to file the Notice of Exemption (NOE) for the Schools and Seniors' Sidewalk Project with the State of California, Governor's Office of Planning and Research - State Clearinghouse, and the San Bernardino County Clerk.

Section 3 - CEQA Basis & Definitions

Introduction:

State law requires that every lead agency have defined rules or guidelines to implement the California Environmental Quality Act of 1970 (CEQA). The laws and rules governing the CEQA process are contained in the CEQA statute, Public Resources Code (PRC) §§21000 and following, the CEQA Guidelines (California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 15000 and following, referred to as "Guidelines" herein), and locally adopted CEQA procedures. This document represents the City of Needles (City) "Rules and Procedures for the Implementation of CEQA" hereinafter referred to as the CEQA Rules & Procedures, and is intended to update and replace, in its entirety, the previous City guidance document dated December 20, 1988 and as amended in 1992. These CEQA Rules & Procedures shall be applicable to all City Department(s) that have responsibilities under CEQA as either a "Lead Agency" or a "Responsible Agency." The Community Development Department is hereby designated as the principal "Lead Agency" Department for the City with respect to CEQA compliance.

Purpose:

These CEQA Rules and Procedures provide guidance to City Departments in the implementation of CEQA and the Guidelines. They are intended to provide objective and specific direction for the processing of projects pursuant to CEQA and to ensure the City produces consistent and adequate environmental documents.

These procedures are not meant to replace the State Guidelines but to implement and tailor the general provisions of the State Guidelines to the specific operations of the City. The City may administer its responsibilities under CEQA in any manner which meets the requirements of CEQA, notwithstanding the specific procedures and provisions set forth in these procedures. If any of these procedures are in conflict with or contrary to any provision of the State Guidelines as they exist or may be amended hereafter, the State Guidelines shall take precedence.



What is CEQA?

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is a State law that is intended to provide disclosure of the potential environmental impacts that may result from implementation of a project to both the public and decision maker. If a project subject to CEQA will not cause any significant adverse environmental impacts, a public agency may adopt a brief document known as a Negative Declaration (ND) or a Mitigated Negative Declaration (MND). If the project may cause adverse environmental impacts, the public agency must prepare a more detailed study called an Environmental Impact Report (EIR). An EIR contains in-depth studies of potential impacts, measures to reduce or avoid those impacts, and an analysis of alternatives to the project. A key feature of the CEQA process is the opportunity for the public to review and provide input on both NDs and EIRs. The CEQA process supports identifying feasible mitigation and/or project alternatives that can minimize or avoid environmental impacts. However, in some cases, significant and unavoidable impacts may result even when all feasible mitigation measures are implemented. CEQA does not require that projects be denied if significant impacts would result. A flow chart describing the CEQA process is provided in Appendix B.



A number of resources are available that provide useful guidance for implementation of CEQA. These include the Association of Environmental Professionals which provides topic papers on a number of CEQA issues, and the Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR), which maintains a website that provides CEQA technical advisories, published cases, and the latest updates to CEQA among other important resources. In addition, the CEQA Guidelines §§15350 to 15387 defines a number of important terms used throughout the Guidelines, some of which are summarized below.

What is a "Project" Under CEQA? (Guidelines §15378)

"Projects" covered by CEQA include any activity carried out, approved, or funded by a California public agency that may result in an adverse physical change in the environment, either directly or indirectly. If the activity is not a "project," then CEQA does not apply. CEQA typically applies to discretionary projects.

Specifically, Guidelines §15378 (a) defines a project as:

[T]he whole of an action, which has a potential for resulting in either a direct physical change in the environment, or a reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment, and that is any of the following:

- 1) An activity directly undertaken by any public agency including but not limited to public works construction and related activities clearing or grading of land, improvements to existing public structures, enactment and amendment of zoning ordinances, and the adoption and amendment of local General Plans or elements thereof pursuant to Government Code Sections 65100–65700.
- 2) An activity undertaken by a person which is supported in whole or in part through public agency contacts, grants, subsidies, loans, or other forms of assistance from one or more public agencies.
- 3) An activity involving the issuance to a person of a lease, permit, license, certificate, or other entitlement for use by one or more public agencies.

Discretionary Project (Guidelines §§15002(i), 15357)

A discretionary project is a project that requires the exercise of judgement or deliberation by a decision maker. Discretionary projects are subject to CEQA.

Ministerial Project (Guidelines §§15002(i), 15268, 15369)

A ministerial project requires little or no judgment by a public official. The City has no discretion, but is legally compelled to grant the approval if the required factual showing is made. Ministerial projects are exempt from the requirements of CEQA and do not require the preparation of a Notice of Exemption (NOE) or compliance with other exemption procedures. As stated in the guidelines, the determination of what is "ministerial" can most appropriately be made by the particular public agency involved based upon its analysis of its laws and each public agency should make such



determination either as a part of its implementing regulations or on a case-bycase basis. The following examples are City project types that generally qualify as ministerial under CEQA:

- a) Issuance of Building Permits
- b) Issuance of Certificates of Occupancy
- c) Issuance of licenses (business licenses, etc.)
- d) Issuance of a permit to do street work
- e) Issuance of an Encroachment Permit
- f) Approval of individual utility service connections and disconnections.
- g) Approval of a final map in compliance with the conditions of approval of the tentative map and consistent with all applicable laws.
- h) Approval of Lot Line Adjustments if consistent with all City requirements
- i) Sign permits (excluding sign programs), not requiring Conditional Use Permits or other hearings.
- j) Approval of Special Event Permits
- k) Accessory Dwelling Units consistent with the Municipal Code

Where a project involves an approval that contains elements of both ministerial and discretionary actions, the project will be deemed to be discretionary and will be subject to the requirements of CEQA. The decision whether the approval of a proposed project or activity is ministerial in nature may involve or require interpretation of the language of the legal mandate, and should be made on a case-by-case basis.

What is a Lead Agency? (Guidelines §15367)

The lead agency is the public agency that has primary responsibility for approving a project. For this ATP Cycle 6, the City of Needles, is considered the lead agency. Additional lead agency guidance is available in Guidelines §15051.

Environmental Review:

The first step in determining the appropriate processing steps is to determine if the activity is a project under CEQA. A detailed CEQA decision flow chart is provided in Attachment A. If the project is a ministerial action, no further action is required. If the project qualifies for an exemption which is the case for this project (refer to Exemption Procedures, in the following sections), an NOE is prepared and to be filed after project approval. If the project may have a potentially significant effect on the environment, an Initial Study may be prepared (not applicable for this project) to determine whether a ND/MND or an EIR is appropriate. If it is known whether an EIR will be prepared, preparation of an Initial Study is not required, but may be used to define the scope of the EIR concurrent with release of the Notice of Preparation.

Exemption Procedures:

Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines §15061, a project is exempt from CEQA if:



- The project is exempt by statute.
- The project is exempt pursuant to a categorical exemption, this ATP project.
- The activity is covered by the common sense exemption that CEQA applies only to
 projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment.
 Where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity in question
 may have a significant effect on the environment, the activity is not subject to CEQA.
- The project is exempt pursuant to the provisions of Article 12.5 which provides for exemptions for Agricultural Housing, Affordable Housing and Residential Infill Projects.

Types of Exemptions:

Statutory Exemptions (Guidelines §§15260 to 15285)

Statutory exemptions are projects specifically excluded from CEQA consideration as defined by the State Legislature. These exemptions are applied to any given project that falls under its definition, regardless of the project's potential impacts to the environment. Example statutory exemptions include feasibility and planning studies, emergency permits, family day care homes for up to fourteen children, and air quality permits. A project that will be rejected or disapproved by a public agency may be found statutorily exempt (Guidelines §15270(b)).

Categorical Exemptions (Guidelines §§15300 to 15332)

Categorical exemptions are descriptions of types of projects which the Secretary of the Resources Agency have determined may not have a significant effect on the environment. Unlike statutory exemptions, categorical exemptions are not absolute. There are exceptions to the exemptions depending on the nature or location of the project. If an exception pursuant to the Guidelines §15300.2 applies, the project would not be exempt. Specifically, the following types of projects would not be exempt:

- located in sensitive environments:
- would result in cumulative impacts;
- have a significant effect on the environment;
- affect scenic highways;
- affect historical resources; and
- are hazardous waste sites

The Director of the Community Development Department of the City of Needles or designated staff has also assessed that this ATP project qualifies for an exemption.

Guidelines §15300.4 states that each public agency shall, in the course of establishing its own procedures, list those specific activities that fall within each of the exempt classes. There are 33 classes of Categorical Exemptions (referred to as Class 1, Class 2, etc.) provided in the Guidelines. Of the 33 classes listed in the guidelines (Guidelines Sections 15301 to 15333), the classes cited below and accompanying examples represent the most commonly used categorical exemptions by the City. Please refer to the Guidelines for the complete list of exemptions and explanations:

Class 1 - Existing facilities, including existing highways and streets, sidewalks, gutters, bicycle and pedestrian trails and similar facilities, this includes road grading for the purpose of public safety (see discussion of City projects that would generally




be expected to fall under 15301 (c) below), and other alterations such as the addition of bicycle facilities, including but not limited to bicycle parking, bicycle-share facilities and bicycle lanes, transit improvements such as bus lanes, pedestrian crossings, street trees, and other similar alternations that do not create additional automobile lanes:

- Class 2 Replacement or reconstruction of existing structures and facilities, where a new structure would be located on the same site and have approximately the same purpose and capacity as the structure being replaced;
- Class 3 New construction or conversion of small structures, where only minor modifications are made to the exterior. This class has limits in terms of the maximum that would be allowed depending on the type of use (e.g., multi-family residential unit totaling no more than four dwelling units);
- Class 4 Minor alterations to land, such as minor trenching or backfilling, fuel management, creation of bicycle lanes on existing rights-of-ways, and maintenance dredging;
- 1. Class 5 Minor alterations in land use limitations, applies to areas with an average slope of less than 20% not resulting in changes in the land use or density;
- Class 11 Accessory structures, including the construction or placement of minor structures accessory to existing facilities such as signage, small parking lots, or seasonal/temporary use items;
- Class 15 Minor land divisions, applicable to property divisions in urban areas creating up to four parcels when in conformance with the General Plan and zoning; and
- Class 32 In-fill development projects, where the project size is five acres or less and substantially surrounded by urban uses and consistent with the general plan and zoning.

As guidance for City capital projects, the Class 1 Categorical Exemption under Section 15301

- (c) include, but are not limited to:
- a. Minor widening of less than a lane width, and/or adding paved shoulders to existing streets;
- b. Pavement reconstruction, resurfacing, rehabilitation and placement of seal coats;
- c. Minor operational improvements to drainage facilities;
- d. Repair work on bridge structures;
- e. Reconstruction and/or repair of existing stream crossings:
- f. Maintenance of man-made water features;
- Installation of new traffic control systems, including signs, signals, interconnect, cameras, channelization of intersections, pavement striping, and other traffic control devices;
- h. Modification of traffic control systems and devices including addition of new elements such as signs, signals, and controllers;
- Repair and maintenance of a highway and all its appurtenant facilities including replacement of damaged or inadequate facilities, or upgrade of facilities to meet current Americans with Disabilities Act requirements;
- j. Minor operational improvements to drainage facilities;
- k. **Modification of existing features such as curbs**, headwalls, slopes and ditches within the right of way to improve roadway safety;
- I. Removal and/or replacement of distinctive roadway markings such as painted stripes, raised pavement markers, thermoplastic, tape or raised bars;
- m. Addition of auxiliary lanes when required for purposes such as weaving, turning, climbing, speed change, or for lane changing between adjacent interchanges or intersections;

- n. Landscaping within City owned property, rights of way, or within the California Aqueduct easement for the public's benefit;
- o. Addition of non-motorized trails including Class 1 bike path trails within right-of-way, or within easements;
- p. Addition or replacement of devices such as fencing, guardrails, safety barriers, guideposts and markers;
- q. Repair and maintenance of City owned facilities, parking lots, carports, and gates.

Conclusion:

Pursuant to Article 19 of the State of California's CEQA Guidelines, the proposed City of Needles' ATP Cycle 6 Schools and Senior Sidewalk Improvement Project, ATPL-5220(011) & (PPNo: 1299)has been found to be **Categorically Exempt** from the requirements of CEQA under State Guidelines (Section §15300.4), Class (1) (Existing Facilities) because Class (1) "consists of existing streets, sidewalks and gutters" and, therefore, the City of Needles directs staff to file the notice of exemption.



ORDINANCE NO. 669-AC

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 15A, RECREATION AREA USE, OF THE NEEDLES MUNICIPAL CODE TO MODIFY SECTION 15A-3 TO UPDATE RECREATION AREA CLOSING HOURS AND ADD SECTION 15A-7.1, ENTITLED PUMP TRACK REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Needles, California reviewed the proposed section 15A-7.2 of the Needles Municipal Code, entitled Splash Pad Area Regulations; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that this activity is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to CEQA Section § 15060 (c)(2), the activity will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

SECTION 2. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that facts do exist to approve an amendment to the Needles Municipal Code ("Needles Code").

SECTION 3. The City Council HEREBY APPROVE Ordinance 669-AC amending the Needles Code as follows:

Chapter 15A of the Needles Municipal Code is hereby amended to modify section 15A-3 as follows:

Sec. 15A-3 Closing Hours of Certain Recreation Areas is hereby modified as follows:

In the following recreation areas, it shall be unlawful to enter or remain on the premises between the hours of 12:00 midnight 10:00 PM of one day and 5:00 A.M. of the following day:

- 1. Franz Flowers Field;
- 2. Ed Parry Park Field;
- 3. Grace Henderson Field;
- Duke Watkins Park (except by permit);
- 5. Santa Fe Park;
- Nikki Bunch Memorial Field;
- 7. Old Trails Monument Park;
- 8. Needles Municipal Aquatics Center;
- 9. Manny Morris Beachside Park (except by permit).

Sec. 15A-7.1 Pump Track Regulations is hereby added to Chapter 15A as follows:

- a. The following regulations shall apply within the Pump Track:
 - 1. Pump Track hours are 5:00 am 10:00 pm
 - 2. The Pump Track is for use by Children 5-12 years of age. Children under 7 years of age must be accompanied by an adult (18 or older).
 - Track is for bicycle use only. NO MOTORIZED BIKES, SKATEBOARDS, OR SCOOTERS ALLOWED. RIDE AT YOUR OWN RISK.
 - Please respect others space. Don't ride too close.
 - 5. Helmets are required by law, for riders, at all times. Protective gear such as elbow and knee pads, gloves and closed toe shoes are always recommended.
 - 6. No more than six (6) riders on the track at a time.
 - 7. Ride within your limits. Start small and work your way up.
 - RIDE THE SAME DIRECTION AS OTHERS.
 - 9. Riders must always ride with caution and yield the Right of Way to younger or less skilled riders.
 - 10. Visitors / Spectators not riding are required to remain outside the riding area.
 - 11. Do your part to help keep YOUR Park clean. Always pick up after yourself and encourage others to do the same.
- b. Any person who damages the pump track may be subject to civil or criminal citations and penalties.
- c. Any violation of any section herein shall be deemed to be an infraction and is punishable as such according to the provisions of the Needles Municipal Code and state or federal law.

SECTION 4. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase added by this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or effectiveness of the remaining potions of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivision, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases are declared unconstitutional, invalid or ineffective.

SECTION 5. This action shall become final and effective thirty (30) days after this decision by the City Council as provided by the Needles City Code.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 670-AC

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES, CALIFORNIA, AMENDING CHAPTER 15A OF THE NEEDLES MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADD SECTION 15A-7.2 ENTITLED SPLASH PAD AREA REGULATIONS

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Needles, California reviewed the proposed section 15A-7.2 of the Needles Municipal Code, entitled Splash Pad Area Regulations; and

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEEDLES DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that this activity is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") pursuant to CEQA Section § 15060 (c)(2), the activity will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment.

SECTION 2. The City Council HEREBY FINDS AND DETERMINES that facts do exist to approve an amendment to the Needles Municipal Code ("Needles Code").

SECTION 3. The City Council HEREBY APPROVE Ordinance 670-AC amending the Needles Code as follows:

Chapter 15A of the Needles Municipal Code is hereby amended as follows:

Sec. 15A-7.2 Splash Pad Area Regulations

- a. A splash pad and associated water features are located at Duke Watkins Park. The City may install or place splash pads or water features at other City parks as authorized by the City Council. The splash pad days and hours of operation shall be posted on a sign at the park, along with applicable rules and regulations. The splash pad and water features shall generally be open and operational daily from 5:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. daily. Notwithstanding the foregoing or the posted days and hours of operation, the splash pad and water features may be closed or rendered nonoperational due to weather, maintenance or operation concerns, or as otherwise determined by the City Manager or his/her designee. The City reserves the right to modify the splash pad regulations by ordinance or resolution. The most current adopted regulations shall be posted by the City at the park. It shall be unlawful for any person to not abide by the adopted and posted splash pad area regulations, including the following:
 - 1. Splash Pad hours are 5:00 am 10:00 pm daily. Splash Pad is unsupervised. USE AT YOUR OWN RISK.
 - 2. Splash Pad is for ages 12 years and younger only. Children ages 7 and younger must be accompanied by an adult.
 - 3. Clean and proper swim attire must be worn while using the splash pad. Children who are not "toilet trained" must wear a swim diaper or plastic pants.
 - 4. Surfaces may be hot. Water shoes or proper footwear is strongly recommended.

- 5. No Climbing, hanging, swinging or sitting on the spray features.
- 6. The following is NOT ALLOWED: Alcohol, Inline Skates, Running, Rough Play, Bicycles, Scooters, Glass, Pets, Water Balloons & Soaps.
- 7. Splash Pad water is not suitable for drinking. DO NOT DRINK THE WATER.
- 8. Prohibited use of the Splash Pad, if you have any infection condition or open wounds.
- 9. Splash Pad may be closed at any time due to weather or maintenance.
- b. Any person who damages the splash pad or water features may be subject to civil or criminal citations and penalties.
- Any violation of any section herein shall be deemed to be an infraction and is punishable as such according to the provisions of the Needles Municipal Code and state or federal law.

SECTION 4. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase added by this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or invalid or ineffective by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity or effectiveness of the remaining potions of this Ordinance or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivision, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases are declared unconstitutional, invalid or ineffective.

SECTION 5. This action shall become final and effective thirty (30) days after this decision by the City Council as provided by the Needles City Code.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the City Council of the City of Needles, California, approve an amendment to the City Code.

WHEREAS, on March 28, 2023, City Council interviewed Patrick Martinez, Assistant City Manager/Development Services Director and directed the City Manager to negotiate a possible 3-year Employment Agreement with Mr. Martinez.

WHEREAS, on April 11, 2023, in Executive Session, City Council reviewed the draft Employment Agreement and set formal consideration of the Agreement for its Regular Meeting on April 25, 2023.

WHEREAS, the City Council and Mr. Martinez have agreed to the terms and conditions of employment which are outlined in the Employment Agreement attached hereto.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Needles, California, hereby approves the Employment Agreement between the City of Needles and Patrick Martinez and authorizes the Mayor to sign same for and on behalf of the City of Needles.

CITY MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (this "Agreement") is entered into as of the _____ day of __April 25 _____, 2023, between the City Council of and on behalf of the City of Needles (the "City" or the "City Council") and Patrick J Martinez, (the "City Manager" or the "Employee"). The above-named parties hereby mutually agree and promise as follows:

I. TERM.

The City hereby employs Employee as City Manager for a term of three (3) years commencing on October 2, 2023 (the "Commencement Date"), and continuing through October 1, 2026 (the "Term"), unless the Agreement is renewed in a writing executed by the parties. Either Employee or City may terminate this agreement without liability or further obligation prior to the Commencement Date.

II. SALARY.

City Manager's salary shall be \$197,000 per year, which sum shall be paid pursuant to the procedures regularly established, and as they may be amended by the City in its sole discretion. On each anniversary of this Agreement, the salary may be adjusted in an amount to be determined in the discretion of the City Council.

The position of City Manager is an exempt position under state and federal wage and hour laws. Employee's compensation (whether salary of benefits or other allowances) is not based on hours worked and Employee shall not be entitled to any compensation for overtime. Employee is expected to engage in those hours of work that are necessary to fulfill the obligations of the City Manager position. The City Manager does not have set hours of work as the City Manager is expected to dedicate himself on a full-time basis to serving as City Manager and to be available at all reasonable and relevant times.

III. DUTIES

Employee shall perform the duties of the City Manager as prescribed by the City Charter and the Needles Municipal Code. In addition to the powers and duties set forth in the Municipal Code, the City Manager shall have such powers and duties which are delegated to him by the

City Council. The City Manager shall execute all powers and duties in accordance with the policies adopted by the City Council and the State of California Government Code.

IV. CITY MANAGER AND COUNCIL RESPONSIBILITIES.

The City Manager shall be the chief executive officer of the City. As such, the City Manager shall have the responsibility for implementing City Council policy, whereas the City Council shall retain the responsibility for formulating and adopting said policy.

V. OTHER DUTIES.

The City Manager (or designee) shall: (1) review all policies proposed to the City Council and make appropriate recommendations to the Council; (2) periodically evaluate employees as provided for by California law and City policy; (3) advise the Council of possible sources of funds that might be available to implement present or contemplated City programs or services; (4) maintain and improve his professional competence by available means, including subscription to and reading of appropriate periodicals, and joining and participating in appropriate professional associations and their activities; (5) establish and maintain an appropriate community relations program; and (6) serve as liaison between the Council and as its designated representative with respect to all employer-employee matters, and make recommendations to the Council concerning those matters. Notwithstanding that a designee of the City Manager may perform said duties, the City Manager shall be the person ultimately responsible to the Council for the proper implementation of the duties and responsibilities described in this Agreement. At the discretion of the City Council, the City Manager shall also serve as the City's Director of Public Utilities and the executive director of the Needles Public Utilities Authority, Needles Public Finance Authority, Needles Housing Authority and the Successor Agency of the Needles Redevelopment Agency.

VI. OUTSIDE PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITIES.

City Manager, with prior approval of the City Council, may undertake outside professional activities for compensation, including consulting, teaching, training, speaking and writing provided they do not interfere with City Manager's normal duties and are done only during non-business hours, personal leave or holiday time of City Manager and are not done with

any existing vendors or contractors of the City. Under no circumstances shall such outside activities create a conflict of interest with the duties of the City Manager and the interests of the City.

VII. EVALUATION.

City Manager shall meet with the City Council in closed session annually, on or around each anniversary date of the Agreement, to review the City Manager's performance and to discuss the City Council's evaluation of said performance. Notwithstanding, the failure to conduct this annual evaluation shall not inhibit any party's ability to terminate this Agreement pursuant to Section VIII below. Additional closed sessions may be scheduled at the direction of the City Council to discuss the Employee's performance as deemed necessary by the City Council.

VIII. TERMINATION.

A. City Manager shall serve at the will and pleasure of the City Council and may be removed from office (terminated) at any time for any reason or no reason upon a majority vote of the City Council. The City Council may also terminate Employee for cause as set forth herein. Nothing in this Agreement shall prevent the City Council from terminating this Agreement and the services of City Manager at its sole discretion. Employee agrees that all property, including without limitation, all equipment, tangible property, proprietary information, documents, records, notes, contracts, and computer-generated materials furnished to or prepared by Employee incident to Employee's employment are the property of City and shall be returned immediately to City upon termination or resignation of Employee's employment. Employee's obligations under this subsection shall survive the termination of Employee's employment and the expiration or early termination of this Agreement.

B. <u>Termination Without Cause</u>

In the event City Manager is terminated by the City during the term of this Agreement, during which time Employee is willing and able to perform his duties under this Agreement, the City Council may, without notice or hearing, immediately release the employee from his/her employment with the City by providing City Manager with: (1) Nine (9) months' salary, less any and all applicable or legally required deductions; and (2) continuation of all existing health

benefits currently offered the Employee, for the lesser of nine (9) months or until City Manager finds other comparable employment. (The salary and benefits shall be referred to collectively as "Severance Pay"). Employee will not receive said Severance Pay until he executes a full and final release of any and all actual and potential claims (including a Civil Code Section 1542 release/waiver) that Employee has or could have against the City, its officials, employees and agents, in a form prepared by and acceptable to the City. Notwithstanding the above, should there be less than nine (9) months remaining on the unexpired term of this Agreement, the Severance Pay shall instead be equal to the number of months left on the unexpired term of the Agreement. In exchange for the Severance Pay, the City Manager hereby expressly waives any right or claims he may have related in any way to his employment and/or termination under any applicable law, City policy, or otherwise to contest, challenge, litigate, appeal or grieve his termination and/or the terms of this Agreement.

The above severance provisions are intended to comply with the provisions of Government Code section 53260, et seq.

C. Termination for Cause

In the event that it is determined that City Manager has been terminated for cause, the City Manager shall not be entitled to any Severance Pay. Termination shall be for "cause" if City Manager: (i) acts in bad faith and to the detriment of the City; (ii) refuses or fails to act in accordance with any specific direction or order of the City Council; (iii) continues in the poor performance of his duties despite Council efforts to correct any deficiencies; (iv) exhibits misconduct or dishonesty in regard to his employment; or (v) is convicted of a misdemeanor or felony crime. In case of his intended removal, the City Manager shall be furnished with a written notice stating the City Council's intention to remove him and the reasons therefore, at least thirty (30) calendar days before the effective date of removal. Within fifteen (15) calendar days after the furnishing of City Manager of such notice, he may, by writing, addressed to the City Council and delivered to the City Clerk, request a hearing before the City Council, where the sole issue shall be whether there is sufficient "cause" for the termination and the sole remedy whether City Manager is entitled to Severance Pay. Thereupon, the Mayor shall fix a time for such hearing. Such hearing shall be held before the expiration of the aforesaid thirty (30) calendar day period and the City Manager may attend and be heard. After furnishing the City Manager with written notice of his intended removal from office, the City Council may suspend 4 8185991.1

him from further duty, but his compensation shall continue until his removal by motion of the City Council.

D. Resignation

In the event that the City Manager resigns from his employment with the City, City Manager shall not be entitled to any Severance Pay.

E. Expiration of Agreement

Unless renewed in a writing signed by the Employee and the City, this Agreement shall expire upon expiration of the Term.

F. Statutory Obligations; Abuse of Office or Position.

Pursuant to Government Code section 53243, et seq. which became effective on January 1, 2012, if City Manager is convicted of a crime involving an abuse of his/her office or position, all of the following shall apply: (1) if City Manager is provided with administrative leave pay pending an investigation, City Manager shall be required to fully reimburse such amounts paid; (2) if the City pays for the criminal legal defense of City Manager (which would be in its sole discretion, as it is generally not obligated to pay for a criminal defense), City Manager shall be required to fully reimburse such amounts paid; and (3) if this Agreement is terminated, any cash settlement or Severance Pay related to the termination that City Manager may receive from the City shall be fully reimbursed to the City. For this Section, abuse of office or position means either: (1) an abuse of public authority, including waste, fraud, and violation of the law under color of authority; or (2) a crime against public justice, including a crime described in Title 7 commencing with section 92 of the Penal Code.

IX. FRINGE BENEFITS.

- A. <u>Time Off.</u> City Manager shall be provided with paid time off, including vacation, sick leave and paid holidays equivalent to that of a fifteen-year management employee. Additionally, city manager shall be provided 60 hours per calendar year administrative leave, pro-rated for portions of a calendar year, on a non-accrual and non-cumulative basis.
- B. <u>Health Benefits</u>: City manager shall receive same health benefits as other management employees.
- C. <u>CalPERS</u>. City manager shall receive the same CalPERS benefit as other management employees.
- **D.** <u>Professional Membership</u>. The City shall pay the City Manager's dues for his membership in the such organizations as are agreed upon with the City Council.
- E. <u>Automobile Allowance</u>. City manager shall be provided with a city vehicle for City-related business and/or functions during, before and after normal work hours or a mileage reimbursement for business miles traveled in accord with IRS rules.
- F. <u>Technology</u>. City will provide a laptop computer with remote access capability to city computer system and cell phone or \$50/month cell phone allowance
- G. Exclusive Consideration. All compensation, benefits and comparable payments to be provided to the City Manager under this Agreement shall be less withholdings required by law and shall be provided subject to any rules, regulations, agreements, or policies established by the City Council, as amended from time to time at its discretion. The City Manager shall be entitled to no benefits and compensation other than as set forth above.
- H. <u>Conflicts:</u> Employee shall not, during the term of this Agreement, individually, as a partner, joint venture, officer or shareholder, invest or participate in any business venture located within or conducting business in the corporate limits of City, except for stock ownership in any company whose capital stock is publicly held and regularly traded, without prior written approval of the City Council. Employee shall also be subject to the conflict of interest provisions of the Government Code of the State of California, City's Municipal Code, Charter and any other 8185991.1

conflict of interest regulations applicable to Employee's employment with City. For and during the Term of this Agreement and any extension term, Employee further agrees that except for a personal residence or residential property acquired or held for future use as Employee's personal residence, Employee shall not invest in any other real estate or property improvements within the corporate limits of City without the prior consent of the City Council.

- I. <u>Expenses:</u> City shall reimburse Employee for reasonable and necessary travel, subsistence and other business expenses incurred by Employee in the performance of Employee's official duties. All reimbursements shall be subject to and in accordance with any limitations or restrictions set forth under the laws of the State of California or any City adopted reimbursement policies.
- J. <u>Indemnification</u>: Subject to, in accordance with, and to the extent provided by the California Tort Claims Act (Government Code Section 810 et seq. including, but not limited to, Sections 825, 995 and 995.2) City will indemnify, defend, and hold Employee harmless from and against any action, demand, suit, monetary judgment or other legal or administrative proceeding, and any liability, injury, loss or other damages, arising out of any negligent act or omission occurring within the scope of Employee's employment during the Term of this Agreement or any extension term. City shall have the discretion to compromise or settle any such claim, demand or action and pay the amount of any settlement or judgment rendered thereon. Notwithstanding the foregoing, City shall have no duty to indemnify, defend, or hold Employee harmless from any criminal proceeding, or with regard to any civil, criminal or administrative proceeding initiated by Employee.

X. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

- A. This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the employment of the City Manager by the City and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the employment of City Manager by the City. This Agreement is intended to be the final, complete, and exclusive statement of the terms of Employee's employment by City and may only be modified.
- **B.** Each party agrees and acknowledges that no representations, inducements, promises or agreements, orally or otherwise, have been made by any party, or anyone acting on behalf of any party, which are not embodied herein and that any agreement, statement, or promise not contained in this Agreement shall not be valid or binding on either party.
- C. Any modifications of this Agreement will be effective only if made in writing and signed by both the City Manager and the City.
- **D.** If any provision, section or sentence of this Agreement is held by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- E. This Agreement shall be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not in favor of or against any party. By way of example and not in limitation, this Agreement shall not be construed in favor of the party receiving a benefit or against the party responsible for any particular language in this Agreement. Captions are used for reference purposes only and should be ignored in the interpretation of the Agreement. This Agreement may be altered, amended or modified only by an instrument in writing; executed by the parties to this Agreement and by no other means. Each party waives their future right to claim, contest, or assert that this Agreement was modified, cancelled superseded or changed by any oral Agreement, course of conduct, waiver or estoppel.
- F. The Parties repeat and incorporate the recitals set forth above as if fully set forth herein.

G. This Agreement is entered into and to be performed in the City of Needles, California within the County of San Bernardino and shall be interpreted and enforced pursuant to California law. The parties agree that in the event of any litigation, venue shall be in San Bernardino County California.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO CITY MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT TO CITY MANAGER EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT (this "Amendment") is entered into as of the 12 day of November, 2024 ("Effective Date") between the City Council of and on behalf of the City of Needles (the "City") and Patrick Martinez (the "City Manager" or the "Employee").

RECITALS

- A. City and Employee executed that certain City Manager Employment Agreement ("Agreement") entered into as of April 25, 2023;
- B. The parties now wish to amend the Agreement as set forth below.

AMENDMENT

A. Article II is hereby amended to read as follows:

II. SALARY

"City Manager's salary shall be Two Hundred and Seventeen Thousand Dollars (\$217,000.00) per year commencing on the Effective Date, which sum shall be paid pursuant to the procedures regularly established, and as they may be amended by the City in its sole discretion. On each Anniversary of the Agreement, the salary may be adjusted in an amount to be determined in the discretion of the City Council.

The position of City Manager is an exempt position under state and federal wage and hour laws. Employee's compensation (whether salary, benefits or other allowances) is not based on hours worked and Employee shall not be entitled to any compensation for overtime. Employee is expected to engage in those hours of work that are necessary to fulfill the obligations of the City Manager position. The City manager does not have set hours of work as the City Manager is expected to dedicate himself on a full-time basis to serving as the City Manager and to be available at all reasonable and relevant times."

B. General. Except as modified by this Amendment, all of the terms of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect. In the event of a conflict between the terms of this Amendment and the Agreement the terms of this Amendment shall control and supersede any such inconsistent or conflicting terms. Capitalized terms not otherwise defined in this Amendment shall have the meanings ascribed to such terms by the Agreement. The recitals in this Amendment are incorporated herein.

- 1. This past week, City staff was deeply saddened to learn of the unexpected passing of Dale Jones, City Clerk of Needles. Appointed on September 13, 2005, Dale served with unwavering dedication as the official custodian of city records, ensuring the integrity and accessibility of City Council actions. Her meticulous work in codifying ordinances into the Municipal, Zoning, and Subdivision Codes made them readily accessible to the public and city staff, significantly impacting our community. Over her 19 years as City Clerk, Dale was a diligent civil servant, a beacon of commitment, and a tremendous asset to the City Council. Her dedication and invaluable contributions to our City will be remembered with deep gratitude and respect. Details of Dale's services will be shared with the community at a later date, as her family has requested privacy while making arrangements. We invite you to join us in honoring Dale at a future council meeting, where we will commemorate her significant contributions to the City. Your presence will be a testament to the impact she had on our community.
- 2. The City of Needles is excited to host its inaugural Community Fall Festival tomorrow, November 2, from 9:00 am to 2:00 pm at Santa Fe Park (950 Front Street). Our Public Works team has prepared the grounds and refreshed the Santa Fe Park sign for the event (see attached photo). Enjoy a day filled with food, friends, and entertainment at minimal city expense, thanks to vendor support. With over 38 vendors selling items from candles to artwork, kids' activities, an obstacle course, and a dog parade and costume contest at noon (leashes and costumes required), there's something for everyone! A prize will be awarded for the best fall-themed vendor booth. This festival reflects the Council's commitment to community engagement, a pro-business environment, and sustainable growth. - 3. On Saturday, October 26, 2024, a power outage impacted the Gates and Lillyhill areas around 7 PM. The Needles electric crew quickly traced the issue to a faulty underground conduit near Larchwood and Casa Linda. They implemented a temporary fix to restore power over the weekend, and by Wednesday, October 30, a new conduit was installed, with final touches completed that day. This project was a genuine team effort, with Utilities and Public Works working together in an all-hands-on-deck approach to resolve the issue as quickly as possible. Thanks to everyone involved, including Philips Construction, for their assistance. Refer to the attached images for a look at the repair efforts.
- 4. Thank you to the San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department for hosting the 5th Annual Trunk or Treat on October 30, 2024, and to Misty Hunt for her outstanding organization. Congratulations to all the winners—the judges had "a monster of a time" choosing among many fantastic trunks (refer to the attached images of the winners)! We were truly amazed by the creativity and effort put into each trunk. Special congratulations to the Needles Recreation Center for bringing home the prize for the most interactive trunk. We also extend our heartfelt thanks to the event sponsors Tri-State Community Healthcare, ArrowHeart Foundation, and Republic Services. Your support was instrumental in making this year's event howlingly extraordinary!
- 5. The Needles City Manager recently joined city managers from Bullhead, Lake Havasu, and Kingman to discuss collaborative opportunities for the region. These communities face similar challenges, so they focused on building a cooperative approach to shared concerns. During the meeting, Needles shared updates on grant resources and highlighted current developments, including the new Bob Belt Beach Park and the ongoing splash pad construction at Duke Watkins Park, showcasing the city's growth and regional strength (see attached images). The city managers aim to leverage shared resources and best practices to promote sustainable growth, improve infrastructure, and address regional issues like economic development and environmental sustainability. This united effort strives to enhance the quality of life for residents across the region.
- 6. The City Council's vision celebrates Needles' unique charm and prime location along the beautiful Colorado River, aiming to enhance quality of life and attract visitors and new families to the area. Aligned with this vision, the dedicated Public Works staff are focused on improving and maintaining public spaces and amenities, ensuring that Needles is a welcoming, enjoyable place for everyone. This week, the Public Works Department demonstrated this commitment through important efforts to improve infrastructure and beautify community spaces. Together, they cleaned, painted, and restored the historic World War I Cannon Monument and its surrounding white fence, bringing new life to this cherished landmark. A special thank you to Mayor Jernigan for generously donating the paint for this project. This event was a true display of community spirit and teamwork—thank you to everyone involved! - 8. On October 26, 2024, the Needles community came together for its annual "Trunk-or-Treat on Front Street," filling Santa Fe Park with families enjoying a safe, festive trick-or-treating experience. 

- 1. On October 24, 2024, the City of Needles welcomed State Senator Steven Padilla on his first visit to Needles, highlighting our city's recent accomplishments and shared vision for sustainable growth. Senator Padilla, who represents San Diego, Imperial, Riverside, and San Bernardino Counties, has a strong record in public service, economic development, and public safety. He also serves on standing committees for Housing, Budget and Fiscal Review, Agriculture, and Natural Resources and Water, adding tremendous value to our community. During his visit, we showcased vital advancements, including the \$6.1 million Well 11 Treatment Plant, \$2.1 million Lilly Hill Booster Station, \$7 million in park revitalizations, and over \$10 million in road and water line improvements over the past four years. With support from our City Council, city staff, and grants, Needles is building a vibrant, resilient future alongside Senator Padilla. Refer to the attached photos for a glimpse into the event.
- 2. City officials recently held a productive meeting with the Bureau of Reclamation to review Needles' projected water usage in the Lower Colorado Basin Region. Impressively, the City diverted 233 acre-feet less than initially planned, receiving commendation for adhering to its water order limits and demonstrating strong water management practices. The Bureau of Reclamation anticipates a continued Level 1 Shortage, with Lake Mead's elevation projected to stay between 1,050 and 1,075 feet. While drought conditions have neither worsened nor improved compared to last year, this year's snowpack reached 114%—exceeding the 1991-2020 median. California is not expected to face further shortage reductions, although Arizona and Nevada are not as fortunate. These efforts reflect the City of Needles' commitment to responsible water management and preparedness for changing environmental conditions as the 2019 Drought Contingency Plans conclude this December. Refer to the attached document for detailed projections.

- 3. We're excited to share that the Fort Mojave Telecommunications hosted a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony at Santa Fe Park on Tuesday, October 22, 2024. The event featured speeches from distinguished guests, including officials from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Fort Mojave Chairman Timothy Williams, and Needles representative Mayor Jernigan, along with a performance by the Fort Mojave Tribal Bird Singers. This celebration marks an important milestone for our community, highlighting the partnership and growth we are achieving together. See the attached images for a glimpse of the event.










State of the System (Water Years 1999-2025)^{1,2}





- Under the Inadvertent Overrun and Payback Policy, no overruns may be incurred during Shortage.




Status of SEIS ROD Lower Basin Conservation¹



WaterSMART Program Basics



Most WaterSMART activities are grant programs with varying program objectives



Generally, a 50% non-Federal cost share is required for grants under WaterSMART. However, depending on the program, funding may be as low as 0% depending on entity



States, tribes, cities, water districts, irrigation districts, watershed groups, non-profits (including watershed groups), and flood control districts located within the 17 Western United States, territories, AK, HI, and American Territories



Funding is allocated through annual competitive processes
