First Amendment to Employment Agreement Between the City of Needles and Kathy Raasch (October 14, 2025)

DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT SERVICES/CAPITAL PROJECTS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This Director of Development Services/Capital Projects Employment Agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "AGREEMENT") is entered into and made effective the 13 day of August, 2024, by and between the CITY OF NEEDLES, (hereinafter referred to as the "CITY"), and Kathy Raasch, an individual (hereinafter referred to as "EMPLOYEE"). For purposes of this AGREEMENT, CITY and EMPLOYEE may be collectively referred to as the "Parties" or individually as a "Party."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, based on EMPLOYEE's qualifications and ability, the City Manager desires to appoint EMPLOYEE to serve as Director of Development Services/Capital Projects for CITY; and

WHEREAS, EMPLOYEE desires to perform and assume responsibility for the provision of services to CITY in the position of Director of Development Services/Capital Projects; and

WHEREAS, EMPLOYEE and CITY acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is not covered by and shall supersede any Memorandum of Understanding between City of Needles and the Teamsters Local 1932.; and

WHEREAS, the Parties wish to establish the terms and conditions of EMPLOYEE's provision of professional services to CITY through this AGREEMENT.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, CITY and EMPLOYEE hereby agree as follows:

1. POSITION, DUTIES AND TERM.

- 1.1 <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. The above recitals are incorporated herein and made a part of this Agreement.
- 1.2 <u>Position</u>. EMPLOYEE accepts employment with CITY as its Director of Development Services/Capital Projects and shall perform all functions, duties and services set forth in Section 1.5 (Duties) of this Agreement.
- 1.3 <u>Effective Date of Agreement/Term</u>. This Agreement is for an unspecified term and is subject to the "At-Will" provision in Section 1.4 and termination provision in Section 4.

1.4 Employment At-Will.

(a) EMPLOYEE's employment status with CITY shall be at-will and terminable with or without cause, at either Party's discretion, subject to the termination provisions provided herein. EMPLOYEE shall serve at the pleasure of the City Manager. EMPLOYEE

acknowledges, understands and agrees that EMPLOYEE may not avail himself/herself of any procedures, provisions or protections set forth under CITY's Employment Policies, as defined herein, in so far as such procedures, provisions or protections limit, restrict, modify, prohibit or regulate EMPLOYEE's status as an "at-will" employee of CITY or the ability of the City Manager to terminate EMPLOYEE's employment at any time for cause or for convenience and without cause. For purposes of this Agreement, the capitalized term "Employment Policies" means and refers to any ordinance, resolution, regulation, rule, memorandum of understanding, or other written policy of CITY as the same may be amended, modified or supplemented from time-to-time, and any written employment manual of the CITY which governs, regulates or otherwise relates to employment with CITY. CITY's Employment Policies shall not apply to EMPLOYEE in so far as such Employment Policies limit, restrict, modify or regulate (or may be interpreted to limit, restrict, modify or regulate) EMPLOYEE's status as an "at will" employee of the CITY.

- (b) EMPLOYEE shall not be entitled to any pre-termination hearing or other similar proceeding or appeal proceeding as a precondition to any decision or action by the City Manager to terminate EMPLOYEE's employment whether for cause or for convenience and without cause. EMPLOYEE shall also not be entitled to any post-termination hearing or appeal proceedings.
- (c) Nothing in this Agreement shall confer upon EMPLOYEE any right to any property interest in continued employment with CITY.
- Duties. EMPLOYEE shall serve as the Director of Development Services/Capital 1.5 Projects and shall have the duties and responsibilities of the Director of Development Services/Capital Projects, attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and as the same may be amended or modified from time-to-time by the City Manager, City Council, the California Codes, Needles City Code, Needles City Charter or CITY's policies and procedures approved by the City Council. EMPLOYEE's performance of EMPLOYEE's duties shall be subject to the direction of the City Manager. EMPLOYEE shall keep the City Manager fully informed of all significant operations or major undertakings by EMPLOYEE and the Development Services/Capital Projects Department ("Department"). EMPLOYEE shall also provide the City Manager with regular status reports on the operations and activities of EMPLOYEE'S Department. EMPLOYEE shall perform such duties as are customary and appropriate to the position Director of Development Services/Capital Projects as well as such special duties as may be assigned to EMPLOYEE from time to time by the City Manager. Notwithstanding EMPLOYEE's duties as Director of Development Services/Capital Projects, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to prohibit direct communications between the City Manager and employees within EMPLOYEE'S Department. EMPLOYEE shall attend all City Council, Board and Commission meetings, unless excused or directed otherwise by the City Manager.
- 1.6 <u>Work Hours</u>. The position of Director of Development Services/Capital Projects is an exempt position under all applicable wage and hour laws. EMPLOYEE's compensation (whether salary or benefits or other allowances) is not based on hours worked. EMPLOYEE shall not be entitled to any compensation for overtime, missed meal or rest periods, reporting time, or any other wage and hour benefits conferred upon non-exempt employees under state or federal wage and hour laws, including regulations propounded in applicable Industrial Welfare Orders.

EMPLOYEE is expected to engage in those hours of work that are necessary to fulfill the obligations of the Director of Development Services/Capital Projects position. EMPLOYEE does not have set hours of work as the Director of Development Services/Capital Projects is expected to be available at all reasonable and relevant times.

- 1.7 Regional and Professional Activities. CITY desires that EMPLOYEE be reasonably active in professional organizations that will promote the standing of CITY and advance CITY's goals, interests and policy objectives while also providing EMPLOYEE with opportunities for the type of professional development that will enhance EMPLOYEE'S ability to serve CITY and perform EMPLOYEE'S duties as Director of Development Services/Capital Projects. Toward this end, EMPLOYEE may, upon reasonable notice and approval by the City Manager, join professional organizations and participate in the activities of such organizations in so far as such participation promotes the interests of CITY and does not unduly interfere with the performance of EMPLOYEE's duties as Director of Development Services/Capital Projects. CITY agrees to budget and, consistent with that budget, pay for the dues, conference and travel fees, and subscriptions of the Director of Development Service necessary for EMPLOYEE'S participation in national, statewide, regional or professional organizations.
- 1.8 <u>Non-CITY Activities</u>. In accordance with Government Code Section 1126, during the period of EMPLOYEE'S employment, EMPLOYEE shall not accept, without the express prior written consent of the City Manager, any other employment or engage, directly or indirectly, in any other business, commercial, or professional activity (except as permitted under Section 1.7 (Regional and Professional Activity), whether or not for pecuniary advantage.

2. <u>COMPENSATION AND BENEFITS AND REIMBURSEMENTS</u>.

- Base Salary. Commencing on the date EMPLOYEE commences full time work with the CITY, EMPLOYEE shall receive a base annual salary of \$151,715 per year, (hereinafter, the "Base Salary"). The Parties understand and agree that the amount of the Base Salary, as preliminarily established for the year 2024, may be adjusted from time-to-time by the CITY MANAGER following a performance evaluation, as provided for in Section 2.2 (below). In no event shall EMPLOYEE's base salary adjust automatically pursuant to any mechanism, and in no event shall EMPLOYEE's base salary exceed the maximum amount approved by the City Council, including in the City's Council approved salary table or other document that may be adopted by the City Council in the future. The Base Salary shall be payable in bi-weekly installments at the same time and in the same manner as other management employees of CITY. EMPLOYEE's salary shall be subject to customary withholding for taxes and other required deductions.
- 2.2 <u>Performance Review</u>. On or before the anniversary date of execution of this Agreement, the City Manager will undertake a job performance review of EMPLOYEE. In connection with such performance review, the City Manager may consider any adjustments in EMPLOYEE's compensation consistent with CITY's Council approved salary table. The failure of CITY to undertake a performance evaluation shall not limit CITY's ability to terminate this Agreement pursuant to Section 4 (Termination).

- 2.3 <u>Benefits</u>. In addition to Base Salary, CITY shall also provide EMPLOYEE with the following benefits:
- (a) <u>Health Insurance, Life Insurance, and Reimbursements</u>. EMPLOYEE shall be provided with these benefits to the same extent as those benefits are provided to other City unrepresented management employees.
- (b) <u>Business Related Equipment</u>. City shall also provide EMPLOYEE a personal computer (at work) for use in connection with CITY business. CITY shall be responsible for maintenance of said item. EMPLOYEE acknowledges and agrees that EMPLOYEE has no right to privacy with regard to business related equipment, and CITY shall be apprised of any and all passwords at all times.
- (c) <u>Participation in Additional CITY Programs.</u> EMPLOYEE shall be eligible to participate in any other CITY program/employment benefits to the extent they are offered to non-represented CITY management employees.
- (d) <u>Cell Phone Stipend.</u> EMPLOYEE shall receive a cell phone stipend to reimburse EMPLOYEE for business-related costs incurred when using their personally owned cell phone. As of the Effective Date, the monthly cell phone stipend is Fifty Dollars (\$50.00). CITY may review and adjust the monthly cell phone stipend from time to time.
- (e) <u>Holidays and Leave.</u> EMPLOYEE shall accrue vacation leave, sick leave, and other leave as required by state or federal law as provided in the City of Needles Employee Handbook.
- (f) To offset the number of evening City Council, Board and Commission meetings EMPLOYEE is entitled to 40 hours of comp time per year which cannot be converted to cash.
- (g) <u>Public Employees' Retirement System (PERS) Eligibility</u>. The City has contracted with the California Public Employees Retirement System ("CalPERS") for its employees. As used in this Agreement, the terms "Classic Members" and "New Members" shall be the same as those terms are used in the Public Employees' Pension Plan Reform Act of 2013.

As of the Effective Date of this Agreement, EMPLOYEE is a:

_____ Classic Member ____x__ New Member subject to PEPRA, as may be amended from time to time.

EMPLOYEE shall receive the same CalPERS benefits as other unrepresented management employees of City, as may be amended from time to time by the City in its sole and absolute discretion. The CalPERS benefits are currently as follows:

As to New Members, the Benefits are the 2% at 62 Formula.

3. <u>ILLNESS OR INJURY; DISABILITY AND DEATH</u>.

3.1 <u>Cessation of Work Due to Injury or Disability</u>. In addition to any right of termination set forth under Section 1.4 and Section 4 (Employment With CITY "At-Will"), above, CITY also reserves the right to terminate EMPLOYEE's employment along with this Agreement if EMPLOYEE ceases to work as a result of injury or disability which results in Employee being unable to perform the essential duties of the Director of Development

Services/Capital Projects position, with or without accommodation, for a period of six (6) consecutive months or more, as documented by a healthcare provider. The foregoing notwithstanding, CITY may terminate EMPLOYEE if, in the CITY'S unilateral discretion if the disability poses a direct threat to the safety of CITY, EMPLOYEE or any other employees working for CITY, and any reasonable accommodation attempted by CITY would not mitigate or eliminate such a threat. CITY will not provide a severance payment if EMPLOYEE is terminated under this Section of this Agreement.

- 3.2 <u>Compensation for Work-Related Illness or Injury</u>. In the event EMPLOYEE suffers a physical or mental illness or disability arising out of the course of employment, EMPLOYEE's exclusive remedy or remedies against CITY for such illness, injury or disability shall be those legally allowed under the workers' compensation laws of the State of California. The Parties further agree that the California Workers Compensation Appeals Board shall be the exclusive venue for any claim of physical or mental illness or disability arising out of the course of EMPLOYEE'S employment with the CITY.
- 3.3 <u>Medical Examination.</u> EMPLOYEE agrees to submit to a medical and/or psychological examination by a qualified physician or psychiatrist selected by CITY, in the event the CITY determines a medical and/or psychological examination is needed to make a decision under Sections 3.1 through 3.2. CITY and EMPLOYEE shall receive a copy of all medical reports related to the examination.
- 3.4 <u>Death of Employee.</u> This Agreement along with EMPLOYEE's employment shall terminate automatically upon EMPLOYEE's death.
- 3.5 <u>Compensation Upon Termination</u>. Except as otherwise provided under this Agreement, if EMPLOYEE's employment is terminated pursuant to this Section 3 (Illness or Injury; Disability and Death), CITY shall pay EMPLOYEE all Base Salary, benefits, and compensation due and owing EMPLOYEE through the last day actually worked. If termination is caused by EMPLOYEE's death, CITY shall provide the compensation and benefits otherwise due EMPLOYEE to EMPLOYEE's executor, administrator, heirs, personal representatives, successors, and assigns. CITY will not provide for any "severance payment," as defined in Section 4, if EMPLOYEE is terminated under the provisions of Section 3.1 through 3.5.

4. <u>TERMINATION.</u>

4.1 <u>Termination by CITY for Convenience and Without Cause</u>. EMPLOYEE is appointed and serves at the pleasure of the CITY and is an at will employee. The CITY may terminate EMPLOYEE at any time for convenience and without cause. In the event EMPLOYEE is terminated without cause, at or during such time that EMPLOYEE is willing and able to performed his/her duties under this AGREEMENT, then in that event, CITY agrees to pay EMPLOYEE a severance equal to six (6) months' Base Salary, less any and all applicable or legally required deductions, provided EMPLOYEE has executed a CITY approved

full and final release of any and all actual or potential claims (including a Civil Code Section 1542 release) that EMPLOYEE has or could have against CITY, its officials, employee and/or agents. At the time of termination without cause, EMPLOYEE shall also receive all accrued but unused vacation. The foregoing notwithstanding, in no event shall the "severance payment" include the payment of any sums prohibited pursuant to Government Code Section 53260-53264, and any such sums shall be deducted from the "severance payment."

- 4.2 <u>Termination by Employee</u>. EMPLOYEE may terminate EMPLOYEE'S employment for any reason, and at any time, with or without cause. EMPLOYEE shall not receive a "severance payment" in the event EMPLOYEE terminates his/her employment with CITY pursuant to this Section.
- Termination for Cause by CITY. CITY may immediately terminate EMPLOYEE's 4.3 employment with CITY and this Agreement at any time by providing EMPLOYEE written notice of EMPLOYEE'S termination for cause and the reason(s) for the termination, and an opportunity for a discussion with the City Manager or the City Manager's designee. In the event the City Manager and EMPLOYEE are unable to resolve any disagreement regarding the cause for EMPLOYEE'S termination, the Parties agree to binding arbitration as provided in Section 6. No "severance payment" shall be paid in the event EMPLOYEE's employment is terminated for cause, except that CITY shall pay EMPLOYEE for all earned but unpaid wages and all accrued and unused vacation, as provided for in this Agreement. The term "cause" shall be defined to include any misconduct materially related to performance of official duties, including but not be limited to any of the following: 1) breach of this AGREEMENT, 2) willful or persistent breach of duties, 3) resume fraud or other acts of material dishonesty, 4) unauthorized absence or leave not otherwise supported by valid documentation from a healthcare provider, 5) conviction of a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude (i.e., offenses contrary to justice, honesty, or morality), conviction of a misdemeanor DUI, or conviction of a felony under California law (the CITY may, in its discretion, place EMPLOYEE on paid or unpaid administrative leave until resolution of charges brought against EMPLOYEE), 6) violation of the CITY's anti-harassment policies and/or a finding that EMPLOYEE engaged in legally prohibited personal acts of harassment, discrimination, and/or retaliation against a CITY official, CITY employee, or any individual protected by state or federal laws prohibiting harassment, discrimination, and/or retaliation, 7) violation of the Needles City Code, ordinances, rules or regulations, including but not limited to the CITY's Employee Handbook, 8) use or possession of illegal drugs, 9) engaging in conduct tending to bring embarrassment or disrepute to the CITY, 10) any illegal or unethical act involving personal gain, 11) failure to carry out materially significant and legally constituted directions or policy decisions of the City Council or City Manager, or 12) gross misfeasance or gross malfeasance.
- 4.4 <u>Termination Obligation</u>. EMPLOYEE agrees that all property, including without limitation, all equipment, tangible, Proprietary Information (as defined below), credit cards, keys, passwords, cell phones, tablets, pagers, documents, records, notes, contracts, and computergenerated materials furnished to or prepared by EMPLOYEE incident to EMPLOYEE'S employment are the property of CITY and shall be returned promptly to CITY upon termination of EMPLOYEE's employment. EMPLOYEE's obligations under this subsection shall survive the

termination of EMPLOYEE'S employment and the expiration or early termination of this Agreement.

4.5 <u>Benefits Upon Termination</u>. All benefits to which EMPLOYEE is entitled under this Agreement shall cease upon EMPLOYEE's termination, unless expressly continued under this Agreement, under any specific written policy or benefit plan applicable to EMPLOYEE, or unless otherwise required by law.

5. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

partner, joint venture, officer or shareholder, invest or participate in any business venture conducting business in the corporate limits of CITY, except for stock ownership in any company whose capital stock is publicly held and regularly traded, without prior approval of the City Manager and City Council. EMPLOYEE shall also be subject to the conflict of interest provisions of the Government Code of the State of California, the Needles City Code, and any other conflict of interest regulations applicable to EMPLOYEE's employment with CITY. For and during the Term of this Agreement and any extension term, EMPLOYEE further agrees that except for a personal residence or residential property acquired or held for future use as EMPLOYEE'S personal residence, EMPLOYEE will not invest in any other real estate or property improvements within the corporate limits of CITY without the prior consent of the City Manager and City Council.

6. ARBITRATION OF DISPUTES.

Any claim, dispute, or controversy which would otherwise require or allow resort to any court or other governmental dispute resolution forum between EMPLOYEE and CITY arising from, related to, or having any relationship or connection whatsoever with EMPLOYEE'S employment or the terms of this Agreement, whether based on tort, contract, statutory, or equitable law, or otherwise, shall be submitted to and determined exclusively by binding arbitration under the Federal Arbitration Act, in conformity with the procedures of the California Arbitration Act (Cal. Code Civ. Proc. sec 1280 et seq.), including section 1283.05 and all of the Acts other mandatory and permissive rights to discovery); provided, however, that: in addition to requirements imposed by law, any arbitrator herein shall be a retired California Superior Court Judge and shall be subject to disqualification on the same grounds as would apply to a judge of such court. If for any reason the Parties cannot agree to an arbitrator, either Party may apply to a court of competent jurisdiction with authority over the location where the arbitration will be conducted for appointment of a neutral arbitrator. The court shall then appoint an arbitrator, who shall act under this Agreement with the same force and effect as if the Parties had selected the arbitrator by mutual agreement. The arbitrator shall then prescribe the rules and procedures for the arbitration process in accordance with laws that are applicable to the claim being raised. EMPLOYEE understands that by agreeing to this binding arbitration provision, both CITY and EMPLOYEE give up their right to a trial by jury.

7. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

7.1 <u>Notices.</u> All notices, requests, demands and other communications under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be effective upon delivery by hand or three (3) business days after deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid, certified or registered, and addressed to CITY at the address below or at the last known address maintained in EMPLOYEE personnel file. EMPLOYEE agrees to notify CITY in writing of any change in EMPLOYEE'S address during EMPLOYEE'S employment with CITY. Notice of change of address shall be effective only when accomplished in accordance with this Section.

- 7.2 <u>Indemnification</u>. Subject to, in accordance with, and to the extent provided by the California Government Claims Act (Government Code section 810 et seq.) CITY will indemnify, defend, and hold EMPLOYEE harmless from and against any action, demand, suit, monetary judgment or other legal or administrative proceeding, and any liability, injury, loss or other damages, arising out of any negligent act or omission occurring during the Term of this Agreement or any extension term. CITY shall have the discretion to compromise or settle any such claim, demand or action and pay the amount of any settlement or judgment rendered thereon. Notwithstanding the foregoing, CITY shall have no duty to indemnify, defend, or hold EMPLOYEE harmless from any criminal proceeding, or with regard to any civil, criminal or administrative proceeding initiated by EMPLOYEE.
- 7.3 Entire Agreement. This Agreement is intended to be the final, complete, and exclusive statement of the terms of EMPLOYEE's employment by CITY. This Agreement supersedes all other prior and contemporaneous agreements and statements, whether written or oral, express or implied, pertaining in any manner to the employment of EMPLOYEE, and it may not be contradicted by evidence of any prior or contemporaneous statements or agreements. To the extent that the practices, policies, or procedures of CITY, now or in the future, apply to EMPLOYEE and are inconsistent with the terms of this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall control. However, as noted in Section 2.7 above, EMPLOYEE shall be eligible to participate in any other CITY programs/employment benefits to the extent they are offered to CITY's unrepresented management employees.

- 7.4 <u>Amendments</u>. This Agreement may not be amended except in a written document signed by EMPLOYEE, approved by the City Manager, City Council and signed by the City Attorney.
- 7.5 <u>Waiver</u>. Failure to exercise any right under this Agreement shall not constitute a waiver of such right.
- 7.6 <u>Assignment</u>. EMPLOYEE shall not assign any rights or obligations under this Agreement. CITY may, upon prior written notice to EMPLOYEE, assign its rights and obligations hereunder.
- 7.7 <u>Severability</u>. If any court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of this Agreement to be invalid, unenforceable, or void, the remainder of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 7.8 <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement is entered into and is to be performed in San Bernardino County, California and shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the controlling laws of the State of California or federal law, whichever is applicable, and the Parties agree that venue in any court proceeding shall be in San Bernardino County, California.
- 7.9 Interpretation. This Agreement shall be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not in favor of or against any party. By way of example and not in limitation, this Agreement shall not be construed in favor of the party receiving a benefit or against the party responsible for any particular language in this Agreement. Captions are used for reference purposes only and should be ignored in the interpretation of the Agreement. This Agreement shall not be construed in favor of or against a party on the grounds that they drafted the Agreement or language in dispute.

7.10 Statutory Obligations

- a. Abuse of Office or Position. Pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53243, 53243.1 and 53243.2, which became effective on January 1, 2012, if EMPLOYEE is convicted of a crime involving an abuse of EMPLOYEE'S office or position, all of the following shall apply: (1) if EMPLOYEE is provided with an administrative leave pay pending an investigation, EMPLOYEE shall be required to fully reimburse such amounts paid by CITY; (2) if CITY pays for the criminal legal defense of EMPLOYEE (which would be in its sole discretion, as CITY is generally not obligated to pay for a criminal defense), EMPLOYEE shall be required to fully reimburse such amounts paid by CITY; and (3) if this Agreement is terminated, any cash settlement related to the termination of EMPLOYEE by CITY, said amount shall be fully reimbursed to CITY or shall be void if not yet paid to EMPLOYEE. For this Section, abuse of office or position means either: (1) an abuse of public authority, including waste, fraud, and violation of the law under the color of authority; or (2) a crime against public justice, including a crime described in Title 7 commencing with section 92 of the California Penal Code.
- b. <u>Maximum Cash Settlement Upon Termination of Agreement</u>. Pursuant to California Government Code Sections 53260 and 53261, regardless of the term of this Agreement,

if the Agreement is terminated and a dispute arises regarding the termination, the parties agree that the maximum cash settlement that EMPLOYEE may receive shall be equal to the monthly salary of EMPLOYEE multiplied by eighteen and shall not include any other noncash items except health benefits, which may be continued for the same duration of time (18 months) or until employee finds other employment, whichever occurs first.

- 7.11 <u>Incorporation of Recitals</u>. The Parties repeat and incorporate the recitals set forth above as if fully set forth herein.
- 7.12 Acknowledgment. EMPLOYEE acknowledges that EMPLOYEE has had the opportunity to consult legal counsel in regard to this Agreement, that EMPLOYEE has read and understands this Agreement, that EMPLOYEE is fully aware of its legal effect, and that EMPLOYEE has entered into it freely and voluntarily and based on EMPLOYEE'S own judgment and not on any representations or promises other than those contained in this Agreement.

Performs lead responsibility for all construction and project management for Capital Improvement Plans/Budgets.

REPORTS TO: City Manager

EXAMPLES OF RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Participate in the development and implementation of goals, objectives, policies, procedures, and priorities for the department.
- Manages Capital Improvement Plan projects, including construction activities which includes:
 - > proposing new projects
 - presenting projects to applicable advisory committees for review and approval
 - composing and assembling construction contracts, plans, and related documents
 - > advertising, bidding, evaluating, negotiating, and executing professional consultant contracts
 - > oversee site inspections

 - researching, analyzing, and resolving construction and project problems
 - oversee processing change orders and manage closeout of capital projects
- Prepare and administer departmental budget.

- Analyze and interpret social, economic, population and land, use data and trends; prepare written and graphic reports on various planning matters and elements of the general plan.
- Develops general plan and development code and assures timely updates and other measures to streamline regulations.
- Prepare initial studies and CEOA Compliance.
- Plans and manages all aspects of project design, development and implementation including preliminary technical research and feasibility analyses, funding and cost analyses, scheduling, public involvement, project budgeting and work plan development, project performance and results.
- Present materials at City Council, Planning Commission, other Boards and Commission and at professional and public meetings as required.
- Reviews operational procedures to ensure compliance with applicable policies recommends and initiates changes to department procedures policies and regulations including engineering design standards.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT SERVICES/CAPITAL PROJECTS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT

This FIRST AMENDMENT TO DIRECTOR OF DEVELOPMENT SERVICES/CAPITAL PROJECTS EMPLOYMENT AGREEMENT ("AMENDMENT") is made and entered into as of October 14, 2025 ("EFFECTIVE DATE"), by and between the City of Needles, a California charter city hereinafter referred to as "CITY" and Kathy Raasch, an individual hereinafter referred to as "EMPLOYEE." CITY and EMPLOYEE may be referred to individually as a "PARTY" and collectively as the "PARTIES."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the PARTIES entered into that certain Director of Development Services/Capital Projects Employment Agreement dated August 13th, 2024 ("AGREEMENT"); and

WHEREAS, EMPLOYEE accepted employment as Director of Development Services/Capital Projects for the CITY on an "at-will" employment status, terminable with or without cause at either PARTY's discretion, with compensation being an annual salary of One Hundred Fifty-One Thousand Seven Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$151,715); and

WHEREAS, the PARTIES now desire to amend the AGREEMENT to provide EMPLOYEE with (i) a five percent (5%) increase to EMPLOYEE's annual base salary thereby increasing her Amended Salary to One Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$159,300), and (ii) a one-time retention bonus in the amount of Three Thousand Thirty-Four Dollars (\$3,034); and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to provide for a second year retention bonus for EMPLOYEE; and

WHERAS, Section 7.4 of the AGREEMENT provides that no supplement, modification, or amendment shall be binding unless reduced to writing and executed by the EMPLOYEE and CITY, with approval of the City Council and signature of the City Attorney.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing Recitals and the mutual covenants contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, CITY and EMPLOYEE agree as follows:

1. **Incorporation of Recitals**. The PARTIES hereby agree that the recitals set forth in this AMENDMENT are deemed incorporated into this AMENDMENT and the AGREEMENT by this reference.

- 2. **Definitions.** All capitalized terms used but not defined in this AMENDMENT shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the AGREEMENT.
- 3. **Amendment to Section 2.1**. The PARTIES hereby agree that Section 2.1 of the AGREEMENT is hereby amended and replaced with the following:
- "2.1 <u>Base Salary.</u> Commencing on the EFFECTIVE DATE of this AMENDMENT, EMPLOYEE's annual base salary shall be increased by five percent (5%), resulting in a new annual base salary of One Hundred Fifty-Nine Thousand Three Hundred Dollars (\$159,300) (hereinafter, the "Amended Salary"). The Parties understand and agree that the amount of the Amended Salary, as established for the year 2025, may be adjusted from time to time by the City Manager following a performance evaluation, as provided for in Section 2.2 of the AGREEMENT. In no event shall EMPLOYEE's Amended Salary adjust automatically pursuant to any mechanism, and in no event shall EMPLOYEE's Amended Salary exceed the maximum amount approved by the City Council, including in the City's Council-approved position and salary resolution, the annual operating budget, or other document that may be adopted by the City Council in the future. The Amended Salary shall be payable in bi-weekly installments at the same time and in the same manner as other management employees of CITY. EMPLOYEE's salary shall be subject to customary withholding for taxes and other required deductions."
- 4. **Retention Bonus.** In addition to the Base Salary, EMPLOYEE shall receive a one-time retention bonus in the gross amount of Three Thousand Thirty-Four Dollars (\$3,034), payable within thirty (30) days of the Effective Date of this AMENDMENT. The retention bonus shall be subject to customary withholding for taxes and other required deductions.
- 5. **Second Year Retention Bonus**. EMPLOYEE shall receive an additional retention bonus equal to three percent (3%) of EMPLOYEE's Base Salary for the second year of employment, payable on the second anniversary of the Effective Date of the Agreement, provided that EMPLOYEE remains continuously employed by CITY through such date. The retention bonus shall be subject to customary withholding for taxes and other required deductions.
- 6. In the event EMPLOYEE's employment is terminated prior to the payment date of either retention bonus, whether by CITY for cause or convenience, or by EMPLOYEE for any reason, EMPLOYEE shall not be entitled to receive any unpaid retention bonus.
- 7. All other terms of the AGREEMENT not expressly amended by this AMENDMENT shall remain in full force and effect.

8. This AMENDMENT shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any legal action arising from or related to this AMENDMENT shall be brought in the state or federal courts of the State of California in and for the County of San Bernardino.

IT IS HEREBY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, the San Bernardino County Community Development and Housing Department serves as the County's administrative entity responsible for administering various housing and community development grant funds, including a pool of funds from residual rental receipts available to support the City's efforts to address homelessness as a small community; and,

WHEREAS, the County recognizes the urgent need to expand homeless services and resources to effectively address homelessness within its jurisdiction, and seeks to partner with the City of Needles ("City"), which will contract with qualified nonprofit and faith-based organizations to deliver outreach, sheltering, and other related services; and,

WHEREAS, such services are essential to bridge service gaps and connect individuals and families experiencing homelessness to stable housing and essential resources; and,

WHEREAS, the City participates in the County's Community Development Block Grant ("CDBG") and Community Planning and Development ("CPD") programming as a partnering city; and

WHEREAS, the City possesses the organizational capacity, administrative expertise, and financial management systems necessary to effectively oversee, manage, and administer the grant-funded homeless services program,

and further has the ability to enter into agreements with qualified nonprofit and faith-based organizations to deliver outreach and shelter services in order to maximize resources and strengthen the continuum of care; and

WHEREAS, both parties desire to enter into this contractual relationship whereby the City through nonprofit and faith based organizations will provide these vital services in accordance with all applicable federal, state, and local requirements;

NOW, THEREFORE, the County and the City mutually agree to the following terms and conditions:

A. DEFINITIONS

- **A.1** <u>City of Needles:</u> Refers to the incorporated municipality located in San Bernardino County, California, which is a participating jurisdiction in this Agreement. Unless otherwise specified, all references to "City" shall include its elected officials, officers, employees, agents, and designated representatives acting within the scope of their duties.
- A.2 Community Development and Housing Department (CDH): The County department responsible for administering federal, state, and local community development and housing programs, including this one-time grant allocation from residual rental receipts; promoting sustainable community development initiatives; overseeing affordable housing programs; supporting neighborhood revitalization projects; and ensuring the delivery of essential services to vulnerable populations throughout San Bernardino County.
- **A.3** Coordinated Entry System (CES): A centralized, community-wide process designed to identify, engage, and assist households experiencing, or at risk of experiencing, homelessness; coordinate the intake, assessment and referral for services that meet the level of assistance that is most appropriate to resolving their housing crisis; and prioritize the households with the most severe service needs for assistance in a timely manner.
- **A.4** County: Refers to San Bernardino County, a political subdivision of the State of California.
- **A.5** <u>Emergency Shelter:</u> Any facility, the primary purpose of which is to provide a temporary shelter for homeless persons, in general or for specific populations of homeless persons, and which does not require occupants to sign leases or occupancy agreements.
- **A.6** <u>Grant Funding:</u> A one-time grant allocation from a pool of funds from residual rental receipts available to support the City's efforts to address homelessness as a small community.
- **A.7** Homeless: As defined in Section 578.3 of Title 24 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- A.8 Homeless Management Information System (HMIS): A web-enabled database used by homeless service providers to capture information about the persons they serve. The database tracks services provided to homeless individuals and families by collaborative agencies. Services tracked include emergency, transitional, and permanent housing bed usage, employment, veteran's status, as well as referrals to health and human service providers, or other relevant supportive service agencies. Captured information is used to make informed decisions in planning, homeless advocacy, and policy development that result in targeted services. HMIS also includes the use of comparable database by victim services provider or legal services provider that is permitted under Part 576 of Title 24 of the Code of Federal Regulations.
- A.9 <u>Homeless Services Program:</u> The program will be designed to provide a focused response to homelessness by addressing immediate needs through outreach, emergency shelter, and other related services. The City will contract with qualified nonprofit and faith-based organizations to deliver these services, ensuring that individuals and families experiencing homelessness are connected to safe shelter, basic necessities, and referrals to supportive community resources.

A.10 <u>Street Outreach:</u> Essential Services related to reaching out to unsheltered homeless individuals and families, connecting them with emergency shelter, housing, or critical services, and providing them with urgent, non-facility-based care.

B. CONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITIES City shall:

- **B.1** Receive a lump-sum payment of grant funds from CDH at the outset of the contract term to administer the Homeless Services Program during the period of September 1, 2025, through August 31, 2026, as detailed in Attachment B Budget Summary. The City shall be responsible for managing these funds in compliance with all applicable federal, state, and local regulations.
- **B.2** Provide the necessary personnel and administrative support, including conducting a competitive procurement process to select qualified nonprofit and/or faith-based Homeless Service Provider(s) to render all services required to implement the Homeless Services Program, as described in Attachment A Project/Activity Description.
- **B.3** Monitor and oversee all work performed by the selected nonprofit and/or faith-based Homeless Service Provider(s) under the Homeless Services Program to ensure compliance with applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and program requirements.
- **B.4** Ensure that all contracted nonprofit and/or faith-based Homeless Service Provider(s) utilize both the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) to record client-level data, service activities, and program outcomes and the Coordinated Entry System (CES) to identify, assess, and prioritize homeless individuals and families for housing and services based on vulnerability and severity of need.
- **B.5** Require contracted nonprofit and/or faith-based Homeless Service Provider(s) to submit to the City, on a monthly basis, program progress status reports from HMIS and documentation of costs incurred, including receipts, invoices, and supporting financial records, as a condition of monitoring and auditing purposes.
- **B.6** Submit monthly status reports from HMIS, as required by CDH to ensure the program is providing outreach, shelter, and other related services to individuals and families experiencing homelessness and are connected to safe shelter, basic necessities, and referrals to supportive community resources.
- **B.7** Prepare, or cause to be prepared, required financial and programmatic audits upon completion of the Program, and return any unexpended or disallowed funds to CDH.

C. GENERAL CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS

C.1 Recitals

The recitals set forth above are true and correct and incorporated herein by this reference.

C.2 Contract Amendments

City agrees any alterations, variations, modifications, or waivers of the provisions of the Contract shall be valid only when reduced to writing, executed and attached to the original Contract and approved by the person(s) authorized to do so on behalf of City and County.

C.3 Contract Assignability

Without the prior written consent of the County, the Contract is not assignable by the City either in whole or in part.

C.4 Contract Exclusivity

This is not an exclusive Contract. The County reserves the right to enter into a contract with other Cities for the same or similar services. The County does not guarantee or represent that the City will be permitted to perform any minimum amount of work, or receive a minimum amount of compensation, under the terms of this Contract.

C.5 Attorney's Fees and Costs

If any legal action is instituted to enforce any party's rights hereunder, each party shall bear its own costs and attorney's fees, regardless of who is the prevailing party. This paragraph shall not apply to those costs and attorney's fees directly arising from a third-party legal action against a party hereto and payable under Indemnification and Insurance Requirements.

C.6 Background Checks for City Personnel

City shall ensure that its personnel (a) are authorized to work in the jurisdiction in which they are assigned to perform Services; (b) do not use legal or illegal substances in any manner which will impact their ability to provide Services to the County; and (c) are not otherwise disqualified from performing the Services under applicable law. If requested by the County and not in violation of applicable law, Contractor shall conduct a background check, at City's sole expense, on all its personnel providing Services. If requested by the County, City shall provide the results of the background check of each to the County. Such background check shall be in the form generally used by City in its initial hiring of employees or contracting for contractors or, as applicable, during the employment-screening process but must, at a minimum, have been performed within the preceding 12-month period. City personnel who do not meet the County's hiring criteria, in County's sole discretion, shall not be assigned to work on County property or Services, and County shall have the right, at its sole option, to refuse access to any Contract personnel to any County facility.

C.7 Change of Address

City shall notify the County in writing, of any change in mailing address within ten (10) business days of the change.

C.8 Choice of Law

This Contract shall be governed by and construed according to the laws of the State of California.

C. 9 Compliance with County Policy

In performing the Services and while at any County facilities, City personnel (including subcontractors) shall (a) conduct themselves in a businesslike manner; (b) comply with the policies, procedures, and rules of the County regarding health and safety, and personal, professional and ethical conduct; (c) comply with the finance, accounting, banking, Internet, security, and/or other applicable standards, policies, practices, processes, procedures, and controls of the County; and (d) abide by all laws applicable to the County facilities and the provision of the Services, and all amendments and modifications to each of the items addressed documents listed in subsections (b), (c), and (d) (collectively, "County Policies"). County Policies, and additions or modifications thereto, may be communicated orally or in writing to City or City personnel or may be made available to City or City personnel by conspicuous posting at a County facility, electronic posting, or other means generally used by County to disseminate such information to its employees or contractors. City shall be responsible for the promulgation and distribution of County Policies to City personnel to the extent necessary and appropriate.

County shall have the right to require City's employees, agents, representatives and subcontractors to exhibit identification credentials issued by County in order to exercise any right of access under this Contract.

C.10 Confidentiality

City shall protect from unauthorized use or disclosure the names and other identifying information concerning persons receiving Services pursuant to this Contract, except for statistical information

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not identifying any participant. City shall not use or disclose any identifying information for any purpose other than carrying out the City's obligations under this Contract, except as may otherwise be required by law. This provision will remain in force even after the termination of the Contract.

C.11 Primary Point of Contact

City will designate an individual to serve as the primary point of contact for the Contract. City or designee must respond to County inquiries within two (2) business days. City shall not change the primary contact without written acknowledgement to the County. City will also designate a back-up point of contact in the event the primary contact is not available.

C.12 County Representative

The Community Development and Housing Department Director or his/her designee shall represent the County in all matters pertaining to the services to be rendered under this Contract, including termination and assignment of this Contract, and shall be the final authority in all matters pertaining to the Services by City. If this contract was initially approved by the San Bernardino County Board of Supervisors, then the Board of Supervisors must approve all amendments to this Contract, unless otherwise delegated.

C.13 Reserved

C.14 Debarment and Suspension

City certifies that neither it nor its principals or subcontractors is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any federal department or agency. (See the following United States General Services Administration's System for Award Management website https://www.sam.gov). City further certifies that if it or any of its subcontractors are business entities that must be registered with the California Secretary of State, they are registered and in good standing with the Secretary of State.

C.15 Drug and Alcohol Free Workplace

In recognition of individual rights to work in a safe, healthful and productive work place, as a material condition of this Contract, the City agrees that the City and the City's employees, while performing service for the County, on County property, or while using County equipment:

- **C.15.1** Shall not be in any way impaired because of being under the influence of alcohol or an illegal or controlled substance.
- **C.15.2** Shall not possess an open container of alcohol or consume alcohol or possess or be under the influence of an illegal or controlled substance.
- **C.15.3** Shall not sell, offer, or provide alcohol or an illegal or controlled substance to another person, except where City or City's employee who, as part of the performance of normal job duties and responsibilities, prescribes or administers medically prescribed drugs.

The City shall inform all employees that are performing service for the County on County property, or using County equipment, of the County's objective of a safe, healthful and productive work place and the prohibition of drug or alcohol use or impairment from same while performing such service for the County.

The County may terminate for default or breach of this Contract and any other Contract the City has with the County, if the City or City's employees are determined by the County not to be in compliance with above.

C.16 Duration of Terms

This Contract, and all of its terms and conditions, shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of the respective parties, provided no such assignment is in violation of the provisions of this Contract.

C.17 Employment Discrimination

During the term of the Contract, City shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, sex, gender, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation, age, or military and veteran status. City shall comply with Executive Orders 11246, 11375, 11625, 12138, 12432, 12250, 13672, Title VI and Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the California Fair Employment and Housing Act and other applicable Federal, State and County laws and regulations and policies relating to equal employment and contracting opportunities, including laws and regulations hereafter enacted.

C.18 Environmental Requirements

In accordance with County Policy 11-08, the County prefers to acquire and use products with higher levels of post-consumer recycled content. Environmentally preferable goods and materials must perform satisfactorily and be available at a reasonable price. The County requires City to use recycled paper for any printed or photocopied material created as a result of this Contract. City is also required to use both sides of paper sheets for reports submitted to the County whenever practicable.

To assist the county in meeting the reporting requirements of the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939), City must be able to annually report the County's environmentally preferable purchases. City must also be able to report on environmentally preferable goods and materials used in the provision of their service to the County, utilizing a County approved form.

C.19 Improper Influence

City shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure that no County officer or employee, whose position in the County enables him/her to influence any award of the Contract or any competing offer, shall have any direct or indirect financial interest resulting from the award of the Contract or shall have any relationship to the City or officer or employee of the City.

C.20 Improper Consideration

City shall not offer (either directly or through an intermediary) any improper consideration such as, but not limited to cash, discounts, service, the provision of travel or entertainment, or any items of value to any officer, employee or agent of the County in an attempt to secure favorable treatment regarding this Contract.

The County, by written notice, may immediately terminate this Contract if it determines that any improper consideration as described in the preceding paragraph was offered to any officer, employee or agent of the County with respect to the proposal and award process. This prohibition shall apply to any amendment, extension or evaluation process once a contract has been awarded.

City shall immediately report any attempt by a County officer, employee or agent to solicit (either directly or through an intermediary) improper consideration from City. The report shall be made to the supervisor or manager charged with supervision of the employee or the County Administrative Office. In the event of a termination under this provision, the County is entitled to pursue any available legal remedies.

C.21 Informal Dispute Resolution

In the event the County determines that service is unsatisfactory, or in the event of any other dispute, claim, question or disagreement arising from or relating to this Contract or breach thereof, the parties hereto shall use their best efforts to settle the dispute, claim, question or disagreement. To this effect, they shall consult and negotiate with each other in good faith and, recognizing their mutual interests, attempt to reach a just and equitable solution satisfactory to both parties.

C.22 Legality and Severability

The parties' actions under the Contract shall comply with all applicable laws, rules, regulations, court orders and governmental agency orders. The provisions of this Contract are specifically made severable. If a provision of the Contract is terminated or held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable, the validity, legality and enforceability of the remaining provisions shall remain in full effect.

C.23 Licenses, Permits and/or Certifications

City shall ensure that it has all necessary licenses, permits and/or certifications required by the laws of Federal, State, County, and municipal laws, ordinances, rules and regulations. The City shall maintain these licenses, permits and/or certifications in effect for the duration of this Contract. City will notify County immediately of loss or suspension of any such licenses, permits and/or certifications. Failure to maintain a required license, permit and/or certification may result in immediate termination of this Contract.

C.24 Material Misstatement/Misrepresentation

If, during the course of the administration of this Contract, the County determines that City has made a material misstatement or misrepresentation or that materially inaccurate information has been provided to the County, this Contract may be immediately terminated. If this Contract is terminated according to this provision, the County is entitled to pursue any available legal remedies.

C.25 Mutual Covenants

The parties to this Contract mutually covenant to perform all of their obligations hereunder, to exercise all discretion and rights granted hereunder, and to give all consents in a reasonable manner consistent with the standards of "good faith" and "fair dealing".

C.26 Nondisclosure

City shall hold as confidential and use reasonable care to prevent unauthorized access by, storage, disclosure, publication, dissemination to and/or use by third parties of, confidential information that is either: (1) provided by the County to City or an agent of City or otherwise made available to City or City's agent in connection with this Contract; or, (2) acquired, obtained, or learned by City or an agent of City in the performance of this Contract. For purposes of this provision, confidential information means any data, files, software, information or materials in oral, electronic, tangible or intangible form and however stored, compiled or memorialize and includes, but is not limited to:, technology infrastructure, architecture, financial data, trade secrets, equipment specifications, user lists, passwords, research data, and technology data.

C.27 Notice of Delays

Except as otherwise provided herein, when either party has knowledge that any actual or potential situation is delaying or threatens to delay the timely performance of this contract, that party shall, within twenty-four (24) hours, give notice thereof, including all relevant information with respect thereto, to the other party.

C.28 Ownership of Documents

All documents, data, products, graphics, computer programs and reports prepared by City pursuant to the Contract shall be considered property of the County upon payment for services (and product, if applicable). All such items shall be delivered to County at the completion of work

under the Contract, subject to the requirements of Article D–Term of the Contract. . Unless otherwise directed by County, City may retain copies of such items.

C.29 Reserved Reserved.

C.30 Air, Water Pollution Control, Safety and Health

City shall comply with all air pollution control, water pollution, safety and health ordinances and statutes, which apply to the work performed pursuant to this Contract.

C.31 Records

City shall maintain all records and books pertaining to the delivery of services under this Contract and demonstrate accountability for contract performance. All records shall be complete and current and comply with all Contract requirements. Failure to maintain acceptable records shall be considered grounds for withholding of payments for invoices submitted and/or termination of the Contract.

All records relating to the City's personnel, City's consultants, subcontractors, Services/Scope of Work and expenses pertaining to this Contract shall be kept in a generally acceptable accounting format. Records should include primary source documents. Fiscal records shall be kept in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and must account for all funds, tangible assets, revenue and expenditures. Fiscal records must comply with the appropriate Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circulars, which state the administrative requirements, cost principles and other standards for accountancy.

C.32 Relationship of the Parties

Nothing contained in this Contract shall be construed as creating a joint venture, partnership, or employment arrangement between the Parties hereto, nor shall either Party have the right, power or authority to create an obligation or duty, expressed or implied, on behalf of the other Party hereto. In the performance of this Contract, City, its agents and employees, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the San Bernardino County. Any provision of this Contract that may appear to give the County any right to direct the City concerning the details of performing the services/Scope of Work, or to exercise any control over such performance, shall mean only that the City shall follow the direction of the County concerning the end results of the performance.

C.33 Release of Information

No news releases, advertisements, public announcements or photographs arising out of the Contract or City's relationship with County may be made or used without prior written approval of the County.

C.34 Representation of the County

In the performance of this Agreement, City, its agents and employees, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees, or agents of the San Bernardino County.

C.35 Strict Performance

Failure by a party to insist upon the strict performance of any of the provisions of this Contract by the other party, or the failure by a party to exercise its rights upon the default of the other party, shall not constitute a waiver of such party's right to insist and demand strict compliance by the other party with the terms of this Contract thereafter.

C.36 Subcontracting

City shall obtain County's written consent, which County may withhold in its sole discretion, before entering into Contracts with or otherwise engaging any subcontractors who may supply any part of the Services to County. At County's request, City shall provide information regarding the subcontractor's qualifications and a listing of a subcontractor's key personnel including, if requested by the County, resumes of proposed subcontractor personnel. City shall remain

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directly responsible to County for its subcontractors and shall indemnify County for the actions or omissions of its subcontractors under the terms and conditions specified in Section G. All approved subcontractors shall be subject to the provisions of this Contract applicable to City Personnel.

For any subcontractor, City shall:

- 36.1 Be responsible for subcontractor compliance with the Contract and the subcontract terms and conditions; and
- **36.2** Ensure that the subcontractor follows County's reporting formats and procedures as specified by County.
- **36.3** Include in the subcontractor's subcontract substantially similar terms as are provided in Sections B. Contractor Responsibilities, C. General Contract Requirements and G. Insurance and Indemnification.

Upon expiration or termination of this Contract for any reason, County will have the right to enter into direct Contracts with any of the Subcontractors. City agrees that its arrangements with Subcontractors will not prohibit or restrict such Subcontractors from entering into direct Contracts with County.

C. 37 Subpoena

In the event that a subpoena or other legal process commenced by a third party in any way concerning the Goods or Services provided under this Contract is served upon City or County, such party agrees to notify the other party in the most expeditious fashion possible following receipt of such subpoena or other legal process. City and County further agree to cooperate with the other party in any lawful effort by such other party to contest the legal validity of such subpoena or other legal process commenced by a third party as may be reasonably required and at the expense of the party to whom the legal process is directed, except as otherwise provided herein in connection with defense obligations by City for County.

C.38 Termination for Convenience

The County reserves the right to terminate the Contract, for its convenience, with or without cause, with a thirty (30) day written notice of termination. Such termination may include all or part of the services described herein. Upon such termination, payment will be made to the City for services rendered and expenses reasonably incurred prior to the effective date of termination. Upon receipt of termination notice City shall promptly discontinue services unless the notice directs otherwise. City shall deliver promptly to County and transfer title (if necessary) to all completed work, and work in progress, including drafts, documents, plans, forms, data, products, graphics, computer programs and reports.

C.39 Time of the Essence

Time is of the essence in performance of this Contract and of each of its provisions.

C.40 Venue

The parties acknowledge and agree that this Contract was entered into and intended to be performed in San Bernardino County, California. The parties agree that the venue of any action or claim brought by any party to this Contract will be the Superior Court of California, County of San Bernardino County, San Bernardino District. Each party hereby waives any law or rule of the court, which would allow them to request or demand a change of venue. If any action or claim concerning this Contract is brought by any third-party and filed in another venue, the parties hereto agree to use their best efforts to obtain a change of venue to the Superior Court of California, County of San Bernardino County, San Bernardino District.

C.41 Conflict of Interest

City shall make all reasonable efforts to ensure that no conflict of interest exists between its officers, employees, or subcontractors and the County. City shall make a reasonable effort to prevent officers, employees, subcontractors, or members of governing bodies from using their positions for purposes that are, or give the appearance of being motivated by a desire for private gain for themselves or others such as those with whom they have family business, or other ties. Officers, employees, and agents of cities, counties, districts, and other local agencies are subject to applicable conflict of interest codes and state law. In the event the County determines a conflict- of- interest situation exists, any increase in costs, associated with the conflict of interest situation, may be disallowed by the County and such conflict may constitute grounds for termination of the Contract. This provision shall not be construed to prohibit employment of persons with whom City's officers, employees, or agents have family, business, or other ties so long as the employment of such persons does not result in increased costs over those associated with the employment of any other equally qualified applicant.

C.42 Former County Administrative Officials

City agrees to provide, or has already provided information on former San Bernardino County administrative officials (as defined below) who are employed by or represent City. The information provided includes a list of former County administrative officials who terminated County employment within the last five years and who are now officers, principals, partners, associates or members of the business. The information also includes the employment with or representation of City. For purposes of this provision, "County administrative official" is defined as a member of the Board of Supervisors or such officer's staff, County Executive Officer or member of such officer's staff, County department or group head, assistant department or group head, or any employee in the Exempt Group, Management Unit or Safety Management Unit.

C.43 Disclosure of Criminal and Civil Procedures

The County reserves the right to request the information described herein from The City. Failure to provide the information may result in a termination of the Contract. The County also reserves the right to obtain the requested information by way of a background check performed by an investigative firm. The City also may be requested to provide information to clarify initial responses. Negative information discovered may result in Contract termination.

City is required to disclose whether the firm, or any of its partners, principals, members, associates or key employees (as that term is defined herein), within the last ten years, has been indicted on or had charges brought against it or them (if still pending) or convicted of any crime or offense arising directly or indirectly from the conduct of the firm's business, or whether the firm, or any of its partners, principals, members, associates or key employees, has within the last ten years, been indicted on or had charges brought against it or them (if still pending) or convicted of any crime or offense involving financial misconduct or fraud. If the response is affirmative, the City will be asked to describe any such indictments or charges (and the status thereof), convictions and the surrounding circumstances in detail.

In addition, the City is required to disclose whether the firm, or any of its partners, principals, members, associates or key employees, within the last ten years, has been the subject of legal proceedings as defined herein arising directly from the provision of services by the firm or those individuals. "Legal proceedings" means any civil actions filed in a court of competent jurisdiction, or any matters filed by an administrative or regulatory body with jurisdiction over the firm or the individuals. If the response is affirmative, the City will be asked to describe any such legal proceedings (and the status and disposition thereof) and the surrounding circumstances in detail.

For purposes of this provision "key employees" includes any individuals providing direct service to the County. "Key employees" do not include clerical personnel providing service at the firm's offices or locations.

C.44 Copyright

County shall have a royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to publish, disclose, copy, translate, and otherwise use, copyright or patent, now and hereafter, all reports, studies, information, data, statistics, forms, designs, plans, procedures, systems, and any other materials or properties developed under this Contract including those covered by copyright, and reserves the right to authorize others to use or reproduce such material. All such materials developed under the terms of this Contract shall acknowledge the San Bernardino County as the funding agency and City as the creator of the publication. No such materials, or properties produced in whole or in part under this Contract shall be subject to private use, copyright or patent right by Contractor in the United States or in any other country without the express written consent of County. Copies of all educational and training materials, curricula, audio/visual aids, printer material, and periodicals, assembled pursuant to this Contract must be filed with the County prior to publication. To the extent this Contract is federally funded, City shall provide any information necessary to the County in order to comply with Federal Acquisition Regulation 52.227-15. To the extent applicable, the provisions of Federal Acquisition Regulation 52.227-14 Rights in Data - General shall apply.

C.48 California Consumer Privacy Act

To the extent applicable, if City is a business that collects the personal information of a consumer(s) in performing Services pursuant to this Contract, City must comply with the provisions of the California Consumer Privacy Act (CCPA). (Cal. Civil Code §§1798.100, et seq.). For purposes of this provision, "business," "consumer," and "personal information" shall have the same meanings as set forth at Civil Code section 1798.140. City must contact the County immediately upon receipt of any request by a consumer submitted pursuant to the CCPA that requires any action on the part of the County, including but not limited to, providing a list of disclosures or deleting personal information. City must not sell, market or otherwise disclose personal information of a consumer provided by the County unless specifically authorized pursuant to terms of this Contract. City must immediately provide to the County any notice provided by a consumer to Contractor pursuant to Civil Code section 1798.150(b) alleging a violation of the CCPA, that involves personal information received or maintained pursuant to this Contract. City must immediately notify the County if it receives a notice of violation from the California Attorney General pursuant to Civil Code section 1798.155(b).

C.53 Prohibition on Contracting with Entities that Require Certain Internal Confidentiality Agreements or Statements-Representation (FAR 52.203-18).

In compliance with Federal Acquisition Regulation 52.203-18, Contractor shall not require employees or subcontractors of Contractor seeking to report waste, fraud, or abuse, to sign internal confidentiality agreements or statement prohibiting or otherwise restricting such employees or subcontractors from lawfully reporting such waste, fraud or abuse to a designated investigative or law enforcement representative of a Federal department or agency authorized to receive such information. To the extent Contractor has required employees or subcontractors to sign internal confidentiality agreements or statements in the past, Contractor shall notify current

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employees and subcontractors that those prohibitions and restrictions are no longer in effect. Contractor shall include this clause in all subcontracts.

D. TERM OF CONTRACT

This Contract is effective as of September 1, 2025, and expires August 31, 2026, but may be terminated earlier in accordance with provisions of this Contract.

D.1 Early Termination

Either party may terminate this Contract without cause upon thirty (30) days' written notice. The CDH Director, or designee, is authorized to exercise CDH's rights concerning any termination of the Contract. The City's Manager, or designee, has the authority to terminate this Contract on behalf of City.

E. COUNTY RESPONSIBILITIES CDH shall:

- **E.1 Project Manager Assignment:** Appoint a qualified staff member to serve as the Project Manager for the Homeless Services Program. The Project Manager will serve as the primary liaison between CDH and City throughout the contract term.
- **E.2 Program Initiation:** Conduct a kick-off meeting with City within thirty (30) days of contract execution to review agreement terms, performance requirements, reporting procedures, and program expectations.
- **E.3** Technical Assistance and Guidance: Provide ongoing technical assistance, program guidance, and support to City, including timely communication of any concerns, recommendations for addressing operational challenges, or required procedural modifications.
- **E.4** Report Processing: Review City's monthly program progress reports from HMIS within thirty (30) calendar days of receipt, ensuring compliance with contract requirements.
- **E.5 Program Monitoring:** Conduct routine monitoring of City's program implementation, including periodic site visits, file reviews, and performance assessments to ensure compliance with contractual obligations.
- **E.6 Program Closeout:** Manage the program closeout process, including final report review, financial reconciliation, and completion of all required documentation to satisfy grant requirements.
- **E.7** Regulatory Compliance Oversight: Ensure compliance with all applicable federal regulations governing the Homeless Services Program. City acknowledges that CDH has sole responsibility and authority to represent the County in administering grant programs and maintaining full discretion over fund allocation decisions.

E.8 Collaborative Outreach: Partner with City to develop and implement outreach strategies to promote program awareness, maximize enrollment of eligible participants, and publicize program achievements and positive outcomes to stakeholders and the broader community.

F MUTUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- F.1 City and CDH shall, in good faith:
 - **F.1.1** Establish a satisfactory method for the exchange of information, as it may be necessary for each party to perform its duties and functions under this Contract and ensure all data and information is protected from improper disclosure in accordance with applicable laws.
 - **F.1.2** Establish a mutually satisfactory method for problem resolution at the lowest level possible, with a procedure to mobilize problem resolution up through City and CDH's mutual chain of command, as deemed necessary.

G. FISCAL PROVISIONS

- **G.1** The maximum amount payable under this Contract shall not exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000), as referenced in Attachment B Budget Summary, and is subject to the availability of grant funds. The consideration to be paid to the City, as provided herein, shall constitute full payment for all services and expenses incurred in the performance of this Contract, and is subject to proper documentation per Section I Right to Monitor and Audit.
- G.2 CDH shall provide the City with a lump-sum payment of grant funds at the outset of the contract term to administer the Homeless Services Program. The City shall be responsible for disbursing these funds to selected nonprofit and/or faith-based service providers and for ensuring all expenditures comply with applicable federal, state, and local regulations, as well as Attachment B Budget Summary.
 - **G.2.1** The City shall maintain monthly financial documentation demonstrating the use of funds, including invoices, receipts, and supporting records from the selected nonprofit/faith-based subrecipients and will be made available upon request from CDH.
 - **G.2.2** Monthly program progress reports from HMIS shall be submitted no later than fifteen (15) calendar days following the end of each month. Reports shall be transmitted to:

- **G.2.3** CDH may review the City's documentation at any time to verify expenditures. In the event of insufficient backup documentation, questioned costs, or noncompliance, CDH may require corrective action, recapture of funds, or adjustment of the City's future funding eligibility.
- **G.3** Any unexpended, unencumbered, or disallowed funds remaining at the conclusion of the contract term shall be returned to CDH within thirty (30) calendar days of contract close-out or final audit determination.
- G.4 City shall accept all payments from County via electronic funds transfer (EFT) directly deposited into the City's designated checking or other bank account. City shall promptly comply with directions and accurately complete forms provided by County required to process EFT payments.
- G.5 County is exempt from Federal excise taxes and no payment shall be made for any personal property taxes levied on City or on any taxes levied on employee wages. The County shall only pay for any State or local sales or use taxes on the services rendered or equipment and/or parts supplied to the County pursuant to the Contract.

- **G.6** Costs for services under the terms of this Contract shall be incurred during the contract period except as approved by County. City shall not use current year funds to pay prior or future year obligations.
- G.7 Funds made available under this Contract shall not supplant any federal, state, or local governmental funds intended for services of the same nature as this Contract. City shall not claim reimbursement or payment from CDH for, or apply for, the sums received from CDH with respect to that portion of its obligations, that have been paid by another source of revenue. City agrees that it will not use funds received pursuant to this Contract, either directly or indirectly, as a contribution or compensation for purposes of obtaining funds from another revenue source without prior written approval of CDH.
- G.8 City shall adhere to the County's Travel Management Policy (8-02 and 08-02SP1) when travel is pursuant to this Contract (see Attachment C County's Travel Management Policy for reference). In addition, City is encouraged to utilize local transportation services, including but not limited to, the Ontario International Airport.

H. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

H.1 Indemnification

The City agrees to and will also ensure that the contracted nonprofits/faith based organizations indemnify, defend (with counsel reasonably approved by County) and hold harmless the County and its authorized officers, employees, agents and volunteers from any and all claims, actions, losses, damages and/or liability arising out of this Contract from any cause whatsoever, including the acts, errors or omissions of any person and for any costs or expenses incurred by the County on account of any claim except where such indemnification is prohibited by law. This indemnification provision shall apply regardless of the existence or degree of fault of indemnities. The City indemnification obligation applies to the County's "active" as well as "passive" negligence but does not apply to the County's "sole negligence" or "willful misconduct" within the meaning of Civil Code section 2782.

H.2 Additional Insured

All policies, except for Worker's Compensation, Errors and Omissions and Professional Liability policies shall contain additional endorsements naming the County and its officers, employees, agents and volunteers as additional named insured with respect to liabilities arising out of the performance of services hereunder. The additional insured endorsements shall not limit the scope of coverage for the County to vicarious liability but shall allow coverage for the County to the full extent provided by the policy. Such additional insured coverage shall be at least as broad as Additional Insured (Form B) endorsement form ISO, CG 2010.11 85.

H.3 Waiver of Subrogation Rights

The City shall require the carriers of required coverages to waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its officers, employees, agents, volunteers, contractors and subcontractors. All general or auto liability insurance coverage provided shall not prohibit the City and City's employees or agents from waiving the right of subrogation prior to a loss or claim. The City hereby waives all rights of subrogation against the County.

H.4 Policies Primary and Non-Contributory

All policies required herein are to be primary and non-contributory with any insurance or self-insurance programs carried or administered by the County.

H.5 Severability of Interests

The City agrees to ensure that coverage provided to meet these requirements is applicable separately to each insured and there will be no cross-liability exclusions that preclude coverage for suits between the City and the County or between the County and any other insured or additional insured under the policy.

H.6 Proof of Coverage

The City shall furnish Certificates of Insurance to the County Department administering the Contract evidencing the insurance coverage at the time the Contract is executed, additional endorsements, as required shall be provided prior to the commencement of performance of services hereunder, which certificates shall provide that such insurance shall not be terminated or expire without thirty (30) days written notice to the Department, and City shall maintain such insurance from the time City commences performance of services hereunder until the completion of such services. Within fifteen (15) days of the commencement of this contract, the City shall furnish a copy of the Declaration page for all applicable policies and will provide complete certified copies of the policies and endorsements immediately upon request.

H.7 Acceptability of Insurance Carrier

Unless otherwise approved by Risk Management, insurance shall be written by insurers authorized to do business in the State of California and with a minimum "Best" Insurance Guide rating of "A- VII".

H.8 Deductibles and Self-Insured Retention

Any and all deductibles or self-insured retentions in excess of \$10,000 shall be declared to and approved by Risk Management.

H.9 Failure to Procure Coverage

In the event that any policy of insurance required under this contract does not comply with the requirements, is not procured, or is canceled and not replaced, the County has the right but not the obligation or duty to cancel the contract or obtain insurance if it deems necessary and any premiums paid by the County will be promptly reimbursed by The City or County payments to the City will be reduced to pay for County purchased insurance.

H.10 Insurance Review

Insurance requirements are subject to periodic review by the County. The Director of Risk Management or designee is authorized, but not required, to reduce, waive or suspend any insurance requirements whenever Risk Management determines that any of the required insurance is not available, is unreasonably priced, or is not needed to protect the interests of the County. In addition, if the Department of Risk Management determines that heretofore unreasonably priced or unavailable types of insurance coverage or coverage limits become reasonably priced or available, the Director of Risk Management or designee is authorized, but not required, to change the above insurance requirements to require additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits, provided that any such change is reasonable in light of past claims against the County, inflation, or any other item reasonably related to the County's risk. Any change requiring additional types of insurance coverage or higher coverage limits must be made by amendment to this contract. City agrees to execute any such amendment within thirty (30) days of receipt.

Any failure, actual or alleged, on the part of the County to monitor or enforce compliance with any of the insurance and indemnification requirements will not be deemed as a waiver of any rights on the part of the County.

H.11 The City agrees to provide insurance and will also ensure that the contracted nonprofits/faith-based organizations to provide insurance set forth in accordance with the requirements herein. If the City or the contracted nonprofits/faith-based organizations uses existing coverage to comply with these requirements and that coverage does not meet the specified requirements, the City agrees to amend, supplement or endorse the existing coverage to do so.

Without in anyway affecting the indemnity herein provided and in addition thereto, the City shall secure and maintain throughout the contract term the following types of insurance with limits as shown:

H.11.1 Workers' Compensation/Employer's Liability – A program of Workers' Compensation insurance or a state-approved, self-insurance program in an amount and form to meet all applicable requirements of the Labor Code of the State of California, including Employer's Liability with \$250,000 limits covering all persons including volunteers providing services on behalf of the City and all risks to such persons under this contract.

If City has no employees, it may certify or warrant to the County that it does not currently have any employees or individuals who are defined as "employees" under the Labor Code and the requirement for Workers' Compensation coverage will be waived by the County's Director of Risk Management.

With respect to Contractors that are non-profit corporations organized under California or Federal law, volunteers for such entities are required to be covered by Workers' Compensation insurance.

- H.11.2 Commercial/General Liability Insurance —City The Contractor shall carry General Liability Insurance covering all operations performed by or on behalf of The City providing coverage for bodily injury and property damage with a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000), per occurrence. The policy coverage shall include:
 - a. Premises operations and mobile equipment.
 - b. Products and completed operations.
 - c. Broad form property damage (including completed operations).
 - d. Explosion, collapse and underground hazards.
 - e. Personal injury.
 - f. Contractual liability. \$2,000,000 general aggregate limit.
- H.11.3 <u>Automobile Liability Insurance</u> Primary insurance coverage shall be written on ISO Business Auto coverage form for all owned, hired and non-owned automobiles or symbol 1 (any auto). The policy shall have a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage, per occurrence.

If the City is transporting one or more non-employee passengers in performance of contract services, the automobile liability policy shall have a combined single limit of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) for bodily injury and property damage per occurrence.

If the City owns no autos, a non-owned auto endorsement to the General Liability policy described above is acceptable.

- H.11.4 <u>Umbrella Liability Insurance</u> An umbrella (over primary) or excess policy may be used to comply with limits or other primary coverage requirements. When used, the umbrella policy shall apply to bodily injury/property damage, personal injury/advertising injury and shall include a "dropdown" provision providing primary coverage for any liability not covered by the primary policy. The coverage shall also apply to automobile liability.
- **H.11.5** Professional Liability Professional Liability Insurance with limits of not less than one million (\$1,000,000) per claim and two million (\$2,000,000) aggregate limits

<u>Errors and Omissions Liability Insurance</u> – Errors and Omissions Liability Insurance with limits of not less than one million (\$1,000,000) and two million (\$2,000,000) aggregate limits

or

<u>Directors and Officers Insurance</u> coverage with limits of not less than one million (\$1,000,000) shall be required for Contracts with charter labor committees or other not-for-profit organizations advising or acting on behalf of the County.

If insurance coverage is provided on a "claims made" policy, the "retroactive date" shall be shown and must be before the date of the start of the contract work. The claims made insurance shall be maintained or "tail" coverage provided for a minimum of five (5) years after contract completion.

H.11.6 Reserved

- H.11.7 Cyber Liability Insurance Cyber Liability Insurance with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 for each occurrence or event with an annual aggregate of \$2,000,000 covering privacy violations, information theft, damage to or destruction of electronic information, intentional and/or unintentional release of private information, alteration of electronic information, extortion and network security. The policy shall protect the involved County entities and cover breach response cost as well as regulatory fines and penalties.
- **H.11.8** Abuse/Molestation Insurance City shall have abuse or molestation insurance providing coverage for all employees for the actual or threatened abuse or molestation by anyone of any person in the care, custody, or control of any insured, including negligent employment, investigation and supervision. The policy shall provide coverage for both defense and indemnity with liability limits of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) with a two million dollars (\$2,000,000) aggregate limit.

I. RIGHT TO MONITOR AND AUDIT

- I.1 The County, State and Federal government shall have absolute right to review and audit all records, books, papers, documents, corporate minutes, and other pertinent items as requested, and shall have absolute right to monitor the performance of City in the delivery of services provided under this Contract. City shall give full cooperation in any auditing or monitoring conducted. City shall cooperate with the County in the implementation, monitoring, and evaluation of this Contract and comply with any and all reporting requirements established by the County.
- 1.2 All records pertaining to services delivered and all fiscal, statistical and management books and records shall be available for examination and audit by County representatives for a period of three years after final payment under this Contract or until all pending County, State and Federal audits are completed, whichever is later.
- City agrees to prepare and submit financial, program progress, evaluations, and other such reports as required by CDH. City shall maintain such property, personnel, financial and other records and accounts as are considered necessary by the County Auditor to ensure proper accounting for the HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM funds. All City records, with the exception of confidential client information, shall be made available to representatives of CDH and appropriate federal agencies during normal business hours.
- 1.4 City shall be responsible for maintaining complete and separate fiscal accounts for Grant Funds, which come under its control. City shall provide the fiscal reports on said grant funds as required by CDH to permit the tracing of all grant funds to its final expenditure. City will submit to CDH

complete and detailed activity descriptions, budgets, and expenses for each HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM, along with monthly reports of grant expenditures.

- 1.5 The CDH Director, or designee, will conduct periodic monitoring of City administration of the HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM. Monitoring will focus on the extent to which federal regulations have been met, the effectiveness of program management, and the organization and presence of all files, records, and other documents related to the performance of this Contract. City will permit on-site inspection by CDH representatives, and ensure that its employees furnish such information, as in the judgment of CDH representatives, may be relevant to a question of compliance with contractual conditions and grant directives, or the effectiveness, legality, and achievements of the program.
- **I.6** Records of City that do not pertain to the service under this Contract shall not be subject to review or audit unless otherwise necessary for understanding grant expenditures.

J. CORRECTION OF PERFORMANCE DEFICIENCIES

- **J.1** Failure by City to comply with any of the provisions, covenants, requirements or conditions of this Contract shall be a material breach of this Contract.
- J.2 In the event of a non-cured breach, County may, at its sole discretion and in addition to any other remedies available at law, in equity, or otherwise specified in this Contract:
 - a. Afford City thereafter a time period within which to cure the breach, which period shall be established at the sole discretion of County; and/or
 - b. Discontinue reimbursement to City for and during the period in which City is in breach, which reimbursement shall not be entitled to later recovery; and/or
 - c. Withhold funds pending duration of the breach; and/or
 - d. Offset against any monies billed by City but yet unpaid by County those monies disallowed pursuant to Item "b" of this paragraph; and/or
 - e. Terminate this Contract immediately and be relieved of the payment of any consideration to City. In the event of such termination, the County may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by the County. The cost to the County shall be deducted from any sum due to The City under this Contract and the balance, if any, shall be paid by The City upon demand.

K. NOTICES

All written notices provided for in this Contract or which either party desires to give to the other shall be deemed fully given, when made in writing and either served personally, or by facsimile, or deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, and addressed to the other party as follows:

L. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Contract, including all Exhibits and other attachments, which are attached hereto and incorporated by reference, and other documents incorporated herein, represents the final, complete and exclusive agreement between the parties hereto. Any prior agreement, promises, negotiations or representations relating to the subject matter of this Contract not expressly set forth herein are of no force or effect. This Contract is executed without reliance upon any promise, warranty or representation by any party or any representative of any party other than those expressly contained herein. Each party has carefully read this Contract and signs the same of its own free will.

M. ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES

PROJECT/ACTIVITY DESCRIPTION

HOMELESS SERVICES PROGRAM:

This program will provide Grant Funding to the City of Needles to create a program to expand homeless services and resources to effectively address homelessness within its jurisdiction, and seeks to contract with qualified nonprofit and faith-based organizations to deliver outreach and sheltering services to bridge service gaps and connect individuals and families experiencing homelessness to stable housing and essential resources. The City will ensure that all contracted nonprofit and/or faith-based Homeless Service Provider(s) utilize both HMIS to record client-level data, service activities, and program outcomes and CES to identify, assess, and prioritize homeless individuals and families for housing and services based on vulnerability and severity of need. The City will then provide monthly status reports from HMIS to CDH to ensure program compliance.

The program is expected to serve around eight (8) Participants, providing weekly outreach and shelter services. Each Participant will be seen weekly, resulting in approximately 52 client visits annually. The goal of the Program is to provide case management services to increase housing stability and provide support services and to connect the Participants with employment, medical and other related services needed.

PURPOSE

It is the policy of the Board of Supervisors to manage travel in the most efficient and cost-effective manner, through uniform procedures that provide internal controls and balance the travel requirements of the County and the County Traveler (County Policy 08-02, TRAVEL MANAGEMENT).

The purpose of this Standard Practice is to promote efficient use of County resources and strengthen internal controls by establishing uniform travel procedures.

DEPARTMENTS AFFECTED

Board of Supervisors, all County Agencies, Departments, Board-Governed Special Districts, Board-**Governed Entities**

DEFINITIONS

Appointing Authority – The executive or administrative head of a department, division or agency.

County Business - Any activity directly related to the necessary and required purposes and functions of the County.

County Traveler - Any County employee, applicant, board/commission/committee member, volunteer, or authorized contractor or consultant that may be required to comply with this policy pursuant to a contract for professional services, traveling on County Business. To the extent possible and feasible, this policy is to be applied to witnesses, in-custody persons, and patients traveling at the expense of the County.

PROCEDURES

Travel Expenses and General Conditions

- A. Travel on County Business must be arranged and authorized in accordance with provisions specified in applicable Memoranda of Understanding with employee bargaining units, County Code, other specific Board action, and/or procedures established by the Auditor-Controller/Treasurer/Tax Collector. The Appointing Authority should consider the nature of the trip, appropriateness of the individual to represent the organization, length of stay, mode of transportation, cost effectiveness of the request and any other relevant information regarding all travel requests including, but not limited
 - 1. Local travel;
 - 2. Out-of-state travel (County Code § 13.0613);
 - 3. Out-of-country travel (County Policy No. 08-04); or
 - 4. Travel reimbursed by a non-County source.
- B. Arrangements for transportation, lodging or registration fees may be made with a County-approved credit card.
- C. Travel expenses shall be carefully monitored by each department, division and agency, using designated accounting strings.
- D. Taking into consideration Paragraph H, County Travelers shall seek to use the lowest rate available for the type of service or accommodation being utilized that meets their needs and minimizes risks including negotiated airline, hotel and rental car contracts (for instance, the County utilizes a negotiated contract for rental car activities). An exception for airfare travel would apply if the flight time is longer than 8 hours, as travelers would be able to purchase premium economy class flights.

Business class and First Class would not be allowed. Additional exceptions may be made when an Appointing Authority determines that an overriding operational consideration, medical condition or disability, or a security consideration requires flexibility in order to serve the best interests of the County, or if a lower rate is not reasonably available.

- E. County Travelers eligible for reimbursement of actual and necessary expenses for transportation, meals, lodging and incidentals such as parking, telephone calls, tolls, and gratuities that are allowed by the department for authorized travel shall submit an Auditor-Controller/Treasurer/Tax Collector Travel Request Form (TRF) along with any supporting receipts to the Auditor-Controller/Treasurer/Tax Collector. All such reimbursements shall be subject to the conditions set forth in County Travel Policies, this Standard Practice, and the provisions of the applicable Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) with employee bargaining units and/or the Exempt Group Working Conditions Ordinance. Only expenses incurred as part of County Business and authorized by the Appointing Authority shall be included on this form and reimbursed. County Travelers who are not County Employees will be subject to the terms included in this Standard Practice when eligible for reimbursement for expenses incurred during the conduct of County business as authorized by the Appointing Authority.
- F. County Travelers shall complete the relevant expense section on the TRF for all overnight or out-of-state travel. The TRF is to be fully completed in addition to the Cal-Card Justification packet. The TRF is used to collect and report actual costs incurred for overnight or out-of state travel. Once completed, the TRF should be signed by the County Traveler, Appointing Authority (or designee) and submitted with the Cal-Card Justification packet, if applicable. The TRF is available on the Auditor-Controller/Treasurer/Tax Collector and the Purchasing Department websites.
- G. Any payment for or reimbursement of travel expenses from any non-County source must be approved by the Appointing Authority in advance of booking said travel. In certain situations, payment or reimbursement by a non-County source may create a conflict of interest, and for certain employees may be subject to reporting on financial disclosure forms. In such situations, the Appointing Authority should contact County Counsel for legal advice.
 - 1. County Travelers receiving reimbursement from a non-County source for travel on County time (such as statewide committees and vendor-paid training or product evaluation pursuant to a contract) shall forward documentation of the reimbursement to the Appointing Authority for handling and deposit if the traveler intends to submit a TRF to the County or use County resources to travel. The claim for actual and necessary expenses for transportation, meals, lodging and incidentals is subject to the conditions set forth in County Travel Policies and this Standard Practice.
 - 2. If an organization or vendor pays costs directly to an airline, hotel or other provider on a County Traveler's behalf, documentation must be provided to the Appointing Authority if a TRF is submitted to the County for reimbursement of other travel costs. Further, in situations where a County Traveler is reimbursed directly for expenses without remittance to the Appointing Authority, all County policies regarding conflict of interest, need for disclosure, ethics and vendor relations shall apply and the County Traveler will be responsible for providing appropriate documentation to support all of these requirements.
- H. Arrangements for transportation, lodging, registration fees, or other travel expenses shall be carefully monitored by the department. Reservations should be made as far in advance as possible to take advantage of discounts and special offers, and County Travelers shall request the government rate or lowest cost to the County when making travel arrangements. Non-refundable airline ticket options must be utilized whenever possible to minimize travel costs. Costs resulting from changes to non-refundable tickets in response to a County need or interest are valid County expenses.

I. Lodging costs may exceed the County's established rate(s) in the applicable MOU under special conditions:

- 1. A conference or convention sponsored by a California state or regional association for which the sponsor has arranged for the lodging, registration at a pre-arranged group rate may be permitted with advance written authorization of the Appointing Authority.
- 2. When a County Traveler is attending a conference or convention that is being sponsored by an organization of which the County department or employee is a member and where seminars or committee meetings are to be held at a particular hotel, or when events are scheduled for evening hours, the Appointing Authority may authorize lodging at the designated hotel.
- 3. If County Business requires lodging in an area of unusually high cost (as defined in the applicable MOU).
- J. If cancellation is necessary, County Travelers are responsible for canceling lodging or accommodations before the cancellation period ends and should record the cancellation number and justification in case disputes arise.
- K. Departments are responsible for tracking unused refundable tickets and available credit for unused non-refundable tickets, to be applied to future County travel. The County Traveler shall retain ownership of denied boarding compensation if a County Traveler is traveling on County Business and a carrier denies the County Traveler a confirmed reserved seat on an airplane. If voluntarily vacating a seat will not interfere with the performance of official duties, and if any additional travel expenses incurred as a result of vacating the seat are borne by the employee and not reimbursed, the employee may keep the compensation from an airline for vacating a seat when the airline asks for volunteers. In this situation, the County Employee must also utilize appropriate leave for the additional hours, if volunteering delays travel during work hours.
- L. Travel expenses may not be claimed for relatives or quests of a County Traveler.
- M. Special lodging such as accommodations in apartments, recreational vehicle parks or campgrounds, or other semi-permanent lodgings that require a contractual agreement shall be presented for review and advance written authorization of the Chief Executive Officer and processed through existing County Procedures.
- N. At the discretion of the Appointing Authority, County Travelers may be able to claim lodging on the evening prior to a function, or for the last evening of a function. Costs for a Saturday night stay may be reimbursable to a County Traveler if it reduces the ticket cost to the County more than any additional lodging/meals/parking costs, and is well-documented as a clear savings to the County.
- O. If the County Traveler chooses to extend his/her stay during the work week at personal expense, Appointing Authority approval is required in advance and is subject to the County Traveler's work schedule or approval of a request for leave time. Any increase in costs to the County for modified travel arrangements shall be reimbursed to the County (e.g. switching a return flight previously scheduled for Friday to Sunday).
- P. County Travelers may upgrade tickets or accommodations, such as early bird boarding and preferred seating, provided that the County Traveler personally pays for the difference in cost for such upgrade. The County Traveler must provide written documentation of payment, and demonstrate that the cost does not exceed that which would have been incurred had the upgrade not been made.
- Q. The County will not reimburse for any type of travel insurance (trip cancellation or interruption, accidental death or disability, loss of personal belongings, etc.) unless the Appointing Authority requests the County Traveler to purchase such coverage.

R. The County will not reimburse for certain personal charges, including, but not limited to, alcohol, inflight movie or internet charges, airport/hotel wireless internet charges (other than for a business purpose), or other miscellaneous charges at the discretion of the County Traveler's personal choice. Valet parking will not be reimbursed unless self-parking is not available or security is a concern. Exceptions may be authorized in certain circumstances with approval of the Appointing Authority.

- S. For Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) covered employees, County travel may impact certain aspects of employment such as compensation for overtime. It is not the intent of the County Travel Policy or this Standard Practice to address these types of issues. Any questions on such matters should be directed to the department's Human Resources Business Partner.
- T. Non-compliance with the provisions of this Standard Practice may result in withholding reimbursement, revoking of an County approved credit card and/or other disciplinary action up to and including terminating employment.

POLICY STATEMENT AND PURPOSE

It is the intent of this policy to implement best practices that demonstrate transparency and accountability by using the most cost effective rates and reasonable methods for the type of services needed, and by managing reimbursements according to provisions of the Memoranda of Understanding with employee bargaining units, County Code, or other specific Board action, and in compliance with Purchasing Department and Auditor-Controller requirements.

DEPARTMENTS AFFECTED

Board of Supervisors, all County Agencies, Departments, Board-Governed Special Districts, Board-Governed Entities

DEFINITIONS

Appointing Authority – The executive or administrative head of a department, division or agency.

County Business – Any activity directly related to the necessary and required purposes and functions of the County.

County Traveler – Any County employee, applicant, board/commission/committee member, volunteer, or authorized contractor or consultant that may be required to comply with this policy pursuant to a contract for professional services, traveling on County Business. To the extent possible and feasible, this policy is to be applied to witnesses, in-custody persons, and patients traveling at the expense of the County.

POLICY AMPLIFICATION

The County has a fiduciary and ethical responsibility to manage and protect public funds when utilizing taxpayer dollars for transportation and other travel expenditures. County Travelers should travel only on County Business when necessary and when the Appointing Authority determines it to be in the best interest of the County. It is the responsibility of the Appointing Authority to determine the need for and approve each request to travel on County Business.

Appointing Authorities are responsible for developing internal procedures that reference and meet the intent of this policy and the associated standard practice(s).

Background: In 2021, the City of Needles entered into a Professional Services Agreement with the Needles Chamber of Commerce, designating the Chamber as the preferred service provider to operate the City's Visitor Center. Under this five-year agreement (expiring

fixed annual payment of \$24,000 to support Visitor Center operations.

As part of the original partnership, the Chamber invested approximately \$176,000 in tenant improvements to the Visitor Center portion of the historic El Garces to create a welcoming and functional space for travelers. The Chamber currently:

- · Tracks and reports monthly visitor foot traffic,

Welcome Center Certification

At the previous City Council meeting Councilmember Tona Belt directed staff to agendize a discussion on elevating the existing Visitor Center by seeking certification as an official California Welcome Center (CWC). CWCs are part of a statewide network operated by Visit California, connecting travelers to local businesses, attractions, and experiences while encouraging longer stays and increased visitor spending. This step would rebrand and integrate the current center into the statewide program rather than building a new facility.

Key benefits of becoming a CWC include:

- Proven visitor impact: A 2025 Visitor Impact Study found 39% of visitors spent more time locally, 29% visited featured attractions, and 10% extended their stay by an average of 1.6 nights after visiting a CWC.
- Statewide marketing reach: CWCs receive premium placement in the California Visitor's Guide, California Road Trips, and on VisitCalifornia.com (1M+ monthly visitors) with ad values exceeding \$275,000.
- Highway signage: Caltrans provides official freeway and directional signage to draw travelers off major routes.
- Network credibility: CWC branding builds trust with travelers and strengthens tourism marketing efforts

Purpose of this agenda item: To obtain City Council direction on whether staff should submit the non-binding Notice of Intent to Propose and return on October 28, 2025, with a finalized operating plan and fiscal commitments before submitting the full application.

Fiscal Impact: Since the City already operates a visitor center, the cost to pursue certification is primarily branding and marketing integration, not construction. The existing \$24,000 annual payment to the Chamber of Commerce may increase as the Chamber evaluates the staffing cost of opening the center seven days per week, as expected under the CWC model. The Chamber is currently preparing an updated cost proposal to reflect this change.

Estimated additional costs for certification include:

- Application Fee (one-time): \$1,000 (non-refundable)
- Welcome Package (required signage, branded furnishings, displays): \$9,000
- Annual Membership Dues: \$5,000 (access to statewide marketing & promotions)
- Caltrans Freeway Signage: ≈ \$7,000 (directional & wayfinding)

Operating Hours: Visit California does not mandate a minimum number of hours. For Needles, staff proposes maintaining reasonable hours that mirror the surrounding downtown businesses schedule. Expanding to seven days per week will increase labor needs; the Chamber will provide an updated cost estimate to support the final fiscal plan.

Performance Tracking: The Chamber already tracks monthly visitor counts and related engagement metrics. Chamber staff will expand this to include referral tracking and quarterly reporting to Council to demonstrate local impact.

The program also encourages local business sponsorships and partnerships to offset ongoing costs and help keep the center financially self-sustaining.

Recommended Action: Provide staff direction to:

- 1. Submit the non-binding Notice of Intent to Propose to Visit California for California Welcome Center certification; and
- 2. Return to City Council on October 28, 2025 with a finalized operating plan and fiscal commitments for consideration before submitting the full application due November 4, 2025.

A. INTRODUCTION

California Welcome Center Mission:

As a network of informational hubs, the CWCs – and their friendly, knowledgeable employees – provide visitors and local residents alike with informed suggestions on how to take advantage of a variety of experiences CWCs also serve as bands ambassadors for California tourism and benefit not only each individual visitor, but also – through influence over visitor spending – our local communities, the state and all associated stakeholders.

The California Office of Tourism (California Tourism) is required to establish conditions on which to base the designation of an entity as a CWC, and to ensure consistency of operating standards among the Centers. There are currently 22 CWCs throughout California. The purpose of this RFP is to designate an entity to provide services as a California Welcome Center in various counties throughout the state that are underserved by visitors. There is to be a designated Center in each of the following regions of the state: Shasta Cascade, Desert, North Coast, Inland Empire, Gold Country, High Sierra, Central Coast, Central Valley, Los Angeles County, Orange County, San Diego County and the Bay Area. Currently, California Tourism is accepting proposals requesting designation to serve **any California region**. If proposed location is too close to an existing center and could confuse visitors, the committee can elect to disqualify the proposal. In addition, proposers should review the California Code of Regulations for California Welcome Centers, which further outlines the criteria that govern the CWCs (Attachment B).

Those submitting a proposal are required to provide a \$1,000 non-refundable application fee. If approved for designation as a California Welcome Center, each Center pays an annual fee of \$5,000 to the California Welcome Center Fund, California Office of Tourism, as required by law for reimbursement of administrative costs incurred by the State in administering the program. In addition, the Centers pay for all fees associated with required signage.

B. NOTICE OF INTENT TO PROPOSE

Notice of Intent to Propose, Attachment C, must be received by the California Office of Tourism by October 14, 2025. The notice may be emailed to rfps@visitcalifornia.com or faxed to (916) 322-3402. The notice is non-binding; however, it ensures the receipt of all items related to this RFP. Proposals will be accepted only from applicants who submitted a timely Notice of Intent to Propose.



C. ELIGIBILITY

The applicant shall be a convention center, visitor bureau, chamber of commerce, local government, state government, federal government, private entity or combination of the above. Proposer must have a permanent structure with heating and air conditioning at the proposed property site and adequate public space, parking facilities, including space for buses and recreational vehicles. In addition, the proposer must provide significant documentation of financial support to sustain CWC for a minimum of 5 years and must serve the identified area. The property must be within two miles of a major freeway or highway. The applicant must have authority to permanently display the required signage on the exterior of the proposed property site, as well as the authority to display signage on local/city streets leading from the highway to the Center.

D. DESCRIPTION OF PROPOSER

A Proposer conference call will be held on **September 30, 2025 at 9:30 AM** Pacific Daylight Time (PDT). The purpose of the conference is to address any questions that the proposers may have regarding the RFP process. After the conference, all proposers needing additional clarification of this RFP must submit questions in writing to the California Office of Tourism, using the contact information in Section G, by 5 p.m. PDT on October 14, 2025. Questions submitted after this date will not be answered.

Proposals, due <u>November 4, 2025</u>, must be accompanied by a non-refundable application fee of \$1,000 made out to the Office of Tourism, with a notation "application fee, California Welcome Center," and sent to the address in Section G.

Proposals must address each item listed below and in the Proposal Plans, giving details of how requirements will be met. Proposals may be rejected if these requirements are not met.

- 1. Provide the proposer's name, address, county, telephone and fax numbers, and e-mail address.
- 2. Provide the name of the operating entity of the proposed center, i.e. Chamber of Commerce, City, County, etc.
- 3. Provide the name and title of the Director or Manager, with address, telephone and facsimile numbers and e-mail address.



E. PROPOSAL PLANS AND SCORING CRITERIA

Proposal shall contain the following information and shall be scored according to the criteria listed under each section.

1. Site Plan (0 to 20 points)

- (a) The physical address of the proposed Center.
- (b) Size and location of property. Provide the actual square footage of the proposed site or property and include a description of the proximity to tourist attractions, restaurants and lodging, and distance from major freeways or highways and its ability to fit anticipated guest traffic.
- (c) Central heating and air conditioning capacity.
- (d) Description of the architectural theme of the facility and how it is representative of local surroundings. In addition, review Attachment D for exterior and interior brand standard requirements within the California Welcome Centers Visual Identity Guidelines and detail the commitment to implementing the Basic Welcome Package, Tier 1 and Tier 2 brand elements based on location relevance. Estimated investment may fluctuate based on location, vendor availability, and guest traffic.
- (e) Restroom facilities and ADA compatibility.
- (f) Describe the interior display space, which must include the following: Layout for information racks, service desk and rest rooms. The layout must include plans that allow, at a minimum, eight 3' W' x 2'D display racks or 25' of linear wall space, or 51 square feet of open space dedicated to brochure display racks, and space for a 42 " plasma screen. Include details and plans for space that will be dedicated to dioramas, regional displays or exhibits (Refer to section E, paragraph 4(c) of this document and Attachment A, "Regional and Statewide Promotion" section).
- (g) Direct Internet access, High-speed Wi-Fi, minimum 35 mb unless otherwise noted based on location limitations.
- (h) Describe parking facilities, including RV and bus parking.
- (i) Provide a proposed timeline from conditional designation to grand opening including but not limited to:
 - a. Lease Negotiation
 - b. Tenant or Building Improvements
 - c. Other Improvements

Failure to meet timelines can result in loss of designation.



2. Marketing Plan (0 to 20 points)

(a) Public Relations.

Describe any public relations efforts that will promote the proposed center.

- (b) Direct Sales.
 - (1) Provide a list of any merchandise to be sold at the center, the benefit the merchandise has to the traveler and the competitive pricing of the merchandise with other local vendors. Note, all CWCs must include retail merchandise that are both indicative of California as well as of the local region where the site is located.
 - (2) Provide a list of any and all commercial establishments attached to the proposed property and the level of service it will provide to the traveler.
 - (3) Provide a list of travel services to be provided at the center, including travel arrangements, ticket booking service and Internet service. Provide a signed statement that the California Welcome Center shall not provide any direct real estate, time-share sales, or telemarketing.
 - i. Real Estate Agents can utilize advertising space as part of relocation services or resources offered by the center.
 - (4) Describe any other plans to promote the center through direct sales.
- (c) Print Advertising.

 Describe any plans to promote the Center through print advertising.

3. Financial Plan (0 to 20 points)

Identify funding sources including but not limited to; local DMO, City, Private Organizations, etc. and financial ability to sustain a CWC as well as associated expenses such as staffing, operational costs, payment of the annual \$5,000 fee, and costs for Caltrans freeway signage and directional city signage for the next 5 years. Financial plan should also include funds for occasional assessments for joint marketing purposes, such as printing of promotional CWC brochures, as well as attendance at the CWC management meetings, with three meetings per year located throughout California. California Welcome Centers should aim to operate at a breakeven or positive profit financial performance level through a core set of financial sponsors.

4. Operational Plan (0 to 30 points)

- (a) Description of proposed staffing, which shall include a manager with decision-making authority. Include number of full-time and part-time staff and indicate paid or volunteer. Each center is required to be staffed during operating hours.
- (b) Provide a signed statement including the commitment to operate seven days a week, except for major holidays.
- (c) Describe in detail the plan to gather, display and maintain visitor brochures and travel-related information from throughout the state. Information must promote the local region as well as the entire state.



- (d) Describe plans to incorporate dioramas, regional displays, or exhibits. Describe how the region, as well as the entire state, will be promoted visually and describe plans to depict to visitors the things to do and see in your region.
- (e) Provide plans for maintaining the building, restrooms and grounds surrounding the center.
- (f) Provide a certificate of insurance stating that there is comprehensive general liability insurance in effect for the property, with a combined single limit of not less than one million dollars per occurrence for bodily injury and property liability combined.
- (g) Provide proposed operating hours and describe how they meet the needs of travelers in the area.
- (h) Describe plans to train staff on current visitor information including new attractions, events, destinations and accommodations in the region and throughout the atate.
- (i) Provide authorization by the property owner that the applicant can display required signage on the exterior of the proposed property and evidence that signage will be in compliance with any relevant city or county ordinances.
- (j) Provide the method that will be used for tracking and recording the number of visitors to the Center on a monthly basis, a photoelectric infrared non-directional people counter, or similar, is preferred. Implementation of existing methods for statistical collection at California Welcome Centers may be required upon designation.
- (k) Provide a description of visitor traffic pattern (including an estimate of current visitor numbers as well as projected numbers), and why a center is warranted in the said area. If another California Welcome Center is located within 50 miles of the proposed location, provide a description of how the visitor traffic patterns will support both centers.

5. Local or Community Support (0 to 10 points)

Provide a letter from at least two of the following supporting the establishment of a California Welcome Center in the area.

- (a) The community's principal destination marketing organization
- (b) Tourism association
- (c) City or county
- (d) Other similar organization

Eligible proposals receiving between 85 and 100 points shall be considered for designation and a site visit shall be scheduled. The site visit, to verify the site and operational plan, and the proposer's understanding of the California Welcome Center responsibilities, will contain an additional point score of up to 20 points, beyond the original score. The designation, which is for a five-year period, will be awarded to the proposer(s) receiving the highest cumulative score.



The first year will be a probationary period. At the end of five years, the Center shall submit in writing a letter of intent to continue operation of the Center. The California Office of Tourism will then re-evaluate the effectiveness and appropriateness of continuing a Center designation at the same location. The California Office of Tourism reserves the right not to designate a California Welcome Center as a result of this RFP.

California Welcome Center Mission

California Welcome Centers (CWC) offer unique and authentic customized visitor services for explorers interested in all that California has to offer. As a network of informational hubs, the CWCs – and their friendly, knowledgeable employees – provide visitors and local residents alike with informed suggestions on how to take advantage of a variety of experiences CWCs also serve as bands ambassadors for California tourism and benefit not only each individual visitor, but also – through influence over visitor spending – our local communities, the state and all associated stakeholders.

Background

With the signing of Senate Bill 1983 in 1994, the California Office of Tourism (California Tourism) was authorized to establish conditions on which to base the designation of an entity as a California Welcome Center, and to ensure consistency of operating standards among the Welcome Centers. Assembly Bill 1356, approved by the Governor in August 2004, authorized continuation of the CWC program.



Regional & Statewide Promotion

The CWCs must prominently promote their immediate area and give travelers a reason to stay in the region a little longer, but they are also required to represent the entire state. Consequently, the CWCs are required to provide professionally designed displays that include information about traveling within California and the immediate region. The CWCs are encouraged to partner with their local community, convention and visitors bureaus, and other agencies to create exhibits.

All CWCs provide destination, attraction, performing arts, and accommodations brochures from throughout the state. Not more than ten percent of the literature offered at a CWC may represent non-California entities. Most of the CWCs also feature some or all of the following: advertiser display boards, reservation services, Internet access, regional and California merchandise, attraction ticket sales, and flat screen advertising.

Operating Standards

CWCs are independently operated and are subject to the standards developed by the California Office of Tourism, with established hours of operation convenient to visitors and easy access to travelers. CWCs, **which must be open seven days a week**, may be operated by convention and visitor bureaus, chambers of commerce, government, private entities, or a combination of these. California Tourism staff conducts both announced and unannounced inspections of the CWCs to ensure compliance with operating standards.

The Department of Transportation (Caltrans) is responsible for the installation and maintenance of highway signs identifying CWCs. The CWCs are responsible for the cost of signage. Costs of signs vary depending on size and number of characters used.

Traveling Bear Logo

The CWC logo sign continues to broaden the branding image. Its design includes a reflective blue background with a white border and white lettering reading "California Welcome Center." Adjacent to the lettering is a cutaway of a bear crossing into a reflective yellow map outline of the State of California. This traveling bear symbol is a copyrighted mark of the state and is authorized for use by California Tourism. When using the logo on printed material, CWCs must include the phrase "A joint marketing partnership with Visit California."



Revenue/Partnerships

Several of the CWCs have found a variety of companies, individuals and public agencies for sponsorships or partnerships. Whether the contributions are monetary or provide staff, displays, land, or building materials, many opportunities exist and are encouraged.

The following are examples of CWC partnerships:

- CWC, Anderson USDA Forest Service; Bureau of Land Management; National Park Service; Sierra Pacific Industries; Redding Rancheria; Shasta Outlets; Volcanic Legacy Scenic Byway, City of Anderson; Shasta Cascade Wonderland Association, among others.
- **CWC, Barstow** Bureau of Land Management; Public Lands Interpretive Association; San Bernardino County Parks Dept.; National Park Service; Mojave National Preserve; City of Big Bear; Disney, among others.

The CWCs are free to independently determine a method for obtaining, displaying, and maintaining visitor brochures and travel-related information from throughout the State. Currently, each of the CWCs has chosen to contract independently for brochure services through Certified Folder Display Service, Inc. Through this arrangement, each CWC receives statewide information to distribute, and receives revenue for brochures they display.

The individual CWCs have incorporated various additional methods for generating revenue. Examples of revenue generation include selling advertising space, forming public/private partnerships, selling California related merchandise, or adding café services.

Benefits of State/CWC Partnership

As valued travel industry partners, the CWCs are listed at no cost in the following State or California Travel and Tourism Commission funded marketing endeavors:

- The CWCs are promoted throughout the *California Official State Visitor's Guide and Travel Planner* (CVG), which has a circulation of 500,000 copies distributed worldwide, as well as 100,000 copies being downloaded. This exposure is valued at \$200,000 per year in advertising. In addition, the CWCs are highlighted on each regional map in the CVG. A digital version of the CVG is available online via visitcalifornia.com.
- The California *Official State Map* places information about the CWCs on the back panel of the map, which is premium placement. If this space were sold, it would be valued at \$49,000.
- The California Road Trips guide promotes the CWCs throughout the publication, and contains a listing that provides CWC contact information and directions and has an advertising value of \$26,000. One million copies of this publication are distributed annually.



- Each CWC has an individual page on the California Tourism Web site (visitcalifornia.com) under "California Welcome Centers," section of the website, each CWC is listed by region. Many are also featured in various trip itineraries. The site receives an average of 1.8 million unique visits per month
- As an official state-designated office, CWCs have an exclusive agreement with Caltrans
 to have freeway signage directing motorists to their location, in addition to smaller
 "trailblazer" signs on local city streets to further direct motorists off the freeway and to
 their site. Freeway signage increases the number of visitors to the CWCs.

Application Process

A committee of travel industry experts, including representatives from Visit California, the California Office of Tourism, and the California Welcome Center Program, meet periodically and consider inquiries from entities interested in being designated as a CWC. The area where an entity is located is reviewed to determine visitor traffic patterns, proximity to other CWCs, and overall need for a CWC. A Request for Proposal is issued in those areas that the committee feels would benefit from a CWC, and applications are accepted in accordance with California Code of Regulations Section 5372.

Those submitting a proposal are required to provide a \$1,000 non-refundable application fee. If approved for designation as a California Welcome Center, each CWC pays an annual fee of \$5,000 to the California Office of Tourism as required by law for reimbursement of administrative costs incurred by the State in administering the program.

Attachment B

California Welcome Center Program California Code of Regulations Title 10, Chapter 7.67, Sections 5370-5377

§ 5370. Definitions.

The following definitions shall apply to the regulations contained in this chapter:

- (a) "Agency" means the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency.
- (b) "California Welcome Center" means a visitor information center, designated by the State which is accessible to and recognizable by tourists and which encourages tourism in California.
- (c) "Center" means the property proposed as a California Welcome Center.
- (d) "Office" means the Office of Tourism, also known as the Division of Tourism, within the Business, Transportation and Housing Agency.
- (e) "Major Holiday" means New Year's Day, Easter Sunday, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

Note: Authority cited: sections 13995.151 Government Code. Reference: sections 13995.150 and 13995.151, Government Code.

§ 5371. Eligibility.

- (a) To be eligible for designation as a California Welcome Center, an applicant shall meet the following requirements:
 - (1) The applicant shall be a convention center, visitor bureau, chamber of commerce, local government, state government, federal government, private entity or combination of the above.
 - (2) The applicant shall have a permanent structure with heating and air conditioning at the proposed property site and adequate public parking facilities, including buses and recreational vehicles.
 - (3) The property shall be within two (2) miles of a major interstate freeway or highway.
 - (4) The applicant shall have authority to permanently display the required signage on the exterior of the proposed property site. Applicant shall also have authority to display signage on local/city streets leading from the highway to the Center.

§ 5372. Application Process.

- (a) The Office shall provide a Solicitation of an open application period for a California Welcome Center to all interested persons and shall post it on the Office website. The Solicitation shall be for a designated area(s), based on the necessity for a new or replacement Center. The Solicitation shall include a description of the Application process and the Application deadline. The Application deadline shall be no earlier than thirty (30) calendar days following the mailing of the Solicitation.
- (b) Not later than the deadline described in the subsection (a), each Applicant shall submit an original and four (4) copies of a completed Application to the Office.
- (c) Not later than sixty (60) calendar days following the deadline described in subsection (a), the Agency shall mail to each Applicant that submitted an Application either a notice disapproving the request or a letter of conditional designation. The letter of conditional designation shall indicate that the final designation is conditioned upon execution of an agreement between the Applicant and the Agency.

§ 5373. Application. General Information.

The General Information Section of the application shall contain the following information: (a) Applicant Information

- (1) The Applicant's name, address, county, telephone and facsimile numbers, e-mail address (if applicable).
- (2) Operating entity of the proposed center, i.e. Chamber of Commerce, City, County, etc.
- (3) The name and title of the Applicant's Director or Manager and address and telephone and facsimile number, if different than subsection (a) (1).
- (b) A non-refundable application fee of \$1,000.
- (c) Proposal plans as specified in Section 5374.

§ 5375. Continuing Responsibility of CWC.

- (a) Upon designation as a California Welcome Center, the Center shall be required to comply with the following:
 - (1) An annual maintenance fee of \$5,000 shall be paid to the Office on a fiscal year basis. This payment shall be due quarterly in payments of \$1,250, due July 1, October 1, January 1 and April 1.
 - (2) The Center shall pay for all fees associated with required signage, including permits, construction and placement of signs.
 - (3) The Center shall report to the Office the number of visitors for each month, by the sixth of the following month.
 - (4) The Center shall request approval from the Office in order to use the Traveling Bear logo, the "California Welcome Center" or the Dream Big logo on any merchandise, uniforms or signage. The Center shall submit the request to the Office.
 - (5) All merchandise sold in the Center shall be appropriate for all ages of travelers.
 - (6) The Center shall provide on-going training to their personnel including current visitor information on new attractions, events, destinations and accommodations in their region and throughout the State.
 - (7) The Center shall display all local (city and county in which the center is located), state and federal governmental tourism information at no cost to the governmental agency. The Center may charge other organizations for the costs of displaying and providing visitor information, including graphic displays and brochures.
 - (8) The operating entities of each center shall promote the California Tourism Website (www.visitcalifornia.com) in advertising, in promotional activities, in related collateral, on the physical premises, and on their website.
 - (9) The Center's manager or a designated representative with decision-making authority shall attend a minimum of two manager's meetings each year. The Office shall establish the meeting dates and places and will provide the managers the opportunity to share current visitor information including new attractions, events, destinations and accommodations in their region.
 - (10) The Center shall be required to pass periodic site inspections by Office staff. The site inspections shall not occur more frequently than once a year. The site inspection will verify that the Center is continually meeting the site specifications in the original proposal.

§ 5376. Revocation of Designation.

- (a) Failure to comply with the provisions in Section 5375, shall be cause for revocation of the California Welcome Center's designation.
 - (1) The Office shall provide written notice to a California Welcome Center that fails to comply with one or more the requirements in Section 5375. The notice shall describe the deficiencies and shall include a deadline for correction of the deficiencies.
 - (2) If the California Welcome Center fails to correct the deficiencies as required in subsection (a)(1), the designation shall be revoked. The revocation shall be effective 30 days after the deadline specified in subsection (a)(1).

§ 5377. Appeal Process.

- (a) Appeal of the revocation shall be in writing and shall include the following:
 - (1) Name and address of California Welcome Center making the appeal.
 - (2) Statement of the basis of the appeal.
 - (3) Documentation which supports the position of the California Welcome Center, submitted under the penalty of perjury.
- (b) An appeal by a California Welcome Center shall be served on the Office within 30 days of the effective date of the revocation.
- (c) The Office shall respond in writing to the appeal by the California Welcome Center within 30 days.
- (d) The California Welcome Center can appeal the Office's decision to the Agency Secretary by submitting a copy of the original complaint and the Office's written decision within 30 days of the date of the Office's decision.
- (e) The Secretary shall respond in writing within 30 days of receipt of the California Welcome Center's appeal and submission.

2. Point of Contact

DMG shall serve as the initial point of contact for developers and businesses that seek to locate in the City of Needles. DMG shall use office and mobile phone contact along with email for use by said businesses to communicate with DMG.

3. Ombudsperson

DMG shall serve as an economic ombudsman to the City of Needles and those parties interested in making economic investments. In the role of ombudsman, DMG shall assist in shepherding projects through the entitlement and permit process. DMG shall be furnished with office, mobile phone and email contact information for all department heads in the City of Needles and authorized alternate contacts. The City of Needles shall

endeavor to return all communication from DMG, Inc. regarding projects and clients (usually status-type or technical communication) four (4) business hours.

4. Sales & Marketing

DMG shall work in concert with City of Needles staff and any other consultants/professionls under contract relative to the sales & marketing of the City of Needles to target businesses, industries and professionals that could lead to economic investment in the City. This shall include, but not limited to industry groups (such as the International Council of Shopping Centers (and their members).

5. Regional Economic Development Summit

Working with City of Needles staff, Tribal leadership and neighboring cities and counties (including in Nevada and Arizona), plan a regional economic development summit that highlights economic opportunities in the Colorado River Tri-State Region for which to encourage investment in the community. Said summit would focus on retail, industrial, office and residential uses.

6. Technical Assistance

On an as-needed basis, DMG shall work with identified persons and companies seeking to make economic investments in the City of Needles and provide them with the names and contact information for persons and entities within the region that can assist them with their endeavors (such referrals could include architects, financial sources, accountants and other professional services). Referrals shall be made to those persons/entities in which there is no financial or business conflict between that entity and DMG. Additionally, where possible, DMG shall provide multiple referrals so that there is no preference shown.

7. Economic Impact Briefs

As projects move through the entitlement or permitting process, DMG shall produce an economic impact analysis (brief version) for said projects at the request of the City Manager and/or Community Development Director. From time to time as a project is being considered by a Planning Commission and/or City Council, the body will desire an Economic Impact Brief. This is usually a one-to-two-page memorandum with a page of general calculations (in Excel). Economic Impact Briefs are included in the retainer agreement.

8. <u>Demographics/Economic Updates</u>

DMG shall complete and a demographic analysis to the City Council, Chamber of Commerce and other business/community organizations in the City of Needles on an annual basis. Further, DMG shall produce an annual economic brief for the City, Chamber and community utilizing available and generally respected third-party data.

9. Calculation of Economic Activity

On an annual basis, DMG shall work with the City Manager and the staff to calculate the overall economic impact of the previous years' activity including economic investment and job creation in order to put a figure on the value of overall economic, entitlement and permitting efforts.

10. Reporting/Invoicing

DMG shall provide the City of Needles with project updates either verbally (in the case of certain projects that may need additional confidentiality) or in writing on not less than a monthly basis. Further, DMG shall meet with the City Manager of the City of Needles (by conference call or in person) at a minimum of once a month to discuss projects and updates.

11. Other Duties as Requested/Mutually Agreed

It is understood that Michael Bracken, as an individual and managing partner of Development Management Group, Inc. has extensive experience in both municipal management and economic development and as such he will avail himself to other duties that may be requested by the City Manager for the City of Needles in which are mutually agreeable.

12. Training

DMG, Inc. shall take on responsibilities to assist the City in long-term development of key staff members and departments by helping introduce designated persons to economic development, guide and mentor them by offering specific training and inclusion in the development process. Further, DMG, Inc. shall offer the City "full staff" economic development training via a 3-hour workshop that DMG, Inc. has produced and utilized in other communities.

13. Known Events/Opportunities

- A. ICSC Western (Palm Springs) September 2024
- B. ICSC Las Vegas May 2025
- C. Regional Economic Summit, TBA Winter/Spring 2025

14. Financial Arrangement:

DMG, Inc. is requesting consideration of a two (2) year contract whereby during year one (1) (Fiscal Year 2024-25) that the monthly retainer amount is \$5,000. During year two (2) (Fiscal Year 2025-26) that the monthly retainer amount is \$5,500. The second year of the contract would be a mutual option.

The Retainer Agreement shall include travel to Needles, CA on an as needed basis. Expenses related to travel on behalf of the City of Needles (outside the City) shall be subject to reimbursement at the Internal Revenue Service stated rate for the corresponding time period. SIXTH AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF NEEDLES AND DEVELOPMENT MANAGEMENT GROUP, INC. FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONSULTING SERVICES

1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This SIXTH AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT is made and entered into October 14, 2025 ("Effective Date"), by and between the CITY OF NEEDLES, a California Charter City, (hereinafter referred to as the "City") and Development Management Group, Inc., a California corporation (hereinafter referred to as "DMG"). City and DMG are sometimes individually referred to as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

2. RECITALS.

City and DMG entered into that certain CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF NEEDLES AND DEVELOPMENT MANAGEMENT GROUP, INC. FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONSULTING SERVICES ("Agreement") dated December 1, 2013 with a term commencing December 1, 2013 and and end date of June 30, 2015;

City and DMG entered into a FIRST AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated March 22, 2022 ("First Amendment") which among other things increased the authorized compensation to DMG in the amount of Thirty Thousand Dollars;

City and DMG entered into a SECOND AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated April 26, 2022 ("Second Amendment") which amended the Agreement to supersede the compensation terms in the First Amendment to authorize payments previously made by City and to be made against invoices through March 22, 2023.

City and DMG entered into a THIRD AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated March 28, 2023 ("Third Amendment") which increased the authorized compensation to DMG in the amount of fifteen thousand four hundred dollars extended until June 30, 2023.

City and DMG entered into a FOURTH AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated July 11, 2023 ("Fourth Amendment") which increased the authorized compensation to DMG in the amount of Seventy Thousand Dollars.

City and DMG entered into a FIFTH AMENDMENT TO CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT dated August 13, 2024 ("Fifth Amendment") which increased the authorized compensation to DMG in the amount of Seventy Thousand Dollars.

The parties wish to further amend the Agreement to increase the term and compensation to as follows:

3. AMENDMENT.

Section 2 is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 2. COMPENSATION. The term of the Agreement is extended through June 30, 2026. Compensation for this extended period commencing with the execution of this Sixth Amendment through June 30, 2026 shall be \$5,500 per month. CONSULTANT and CITY acknowledge and agree that compensation paid by CITY to CONSULTANTS under this Agreement, as amended, is based upon Consultant's written proposal dated October 9, 2025, for providing the services required hereunder, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and made a part hereof by this reference. CONSULTANT and CITY further agree that the total compensation due hereunder for this extended term shall not exceed Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) without written approval from CITY.

All other terms of the Agreement not specifically amended shall remain in full force and effect.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have made and executed this Agreement on the date and year set forth above.

1. 2025 State of the City — City of Needles Recap

On September 25, the City of Needles, in partnership with the Needles Chamber of Commerce and Visitor Center, hosted the 2025 State of the City. This year's theme, 'From Planning to Progress,' highlighted the City's momentum and the results of coordinated leadership among the City Council, staff, businesses, and residents. Mayor Janet Jernigan reflected on significant achievements, including a 91% increase in citywide property values since 2017, over \$10 million reinvested in streets, water infrastructure, and safe drinking water, and the transformation of parks such as Duke Watkins Park and Bob Belt Beach Park the latter recognized as the APWA Project of the Year. The program also celebrated new housing solutions, including the delivery of 29 affordable microunits converted from the former River Valley Inn Motel, expanded HUD-VASH veteran housing support, and a thriving local economy fueled by tourism and more than 600 new jobs in the emerging cannabis industry. With the upcoming Route 66 Centennial and several major infrastructure and development projects underway, Needles continues to build a stronger, more vibrant future. The Desert Town In California That's Perfect For Starting Over and Simple Living

Imagine a place where the morning sun paints the desert mountains gold and your bank account doesn't have a nervous breakdown every time rent comes due.

That place exists, and it's called Needles, California – a small desert community where second chances and simple living aren't just possible, they're practically the town motto.

When most Californians think about starting over, they picture themselves in trendy neighborhoods of Oakland or the bohemian enclaves of Joshua Tree – places where "affordable" still means "prepare to sell a kidney."

But tucked into California's eastern border, where the state meets Arizona and Nevada along the Colorado River, Needles offers something increasingly rare: a chance to live in the Golden State without requiring a gold mine.

This isn't just another dusty desert town you speed past on Interstate 40 – though admittedly, that's exactly what most people do.

Needles is a place with history, character, and the kind of wide-open possibilities that come when your cost of living plummets while your quality of life soars.





The town got its name from the pointed mountain peaks nearby, not from any abundance of sewing implements – though you might need to pinch yourself when you see the housing prices.

Driving into Needles feels like entering a different California altogether – one where time moves a bit slower and your dollar stretches a whole lot further.

The iconic wooden wagon sign welcoming you to "NEEDLES CALIFORNIA" stands as the first indication you've arrived somewhere special, a place where Route 66 nostalgia meets desert practicality.

The Colorado River forms the town's eastern boundary, a surprising ribbon of blue cutting through the arid landscape and providing both recreation and a psychological oasis.

Broadway Street, the main thoroughfare, offers a glimpse into both past and present – historic buildings from the railroad era standing alongside the practical businesses that serve today's residents.

The El Garces, a former Harvey House hotel and train station built in the early 1900s, anchors the town's historical district with its impressive white stucco presence.

This beautifully restored building serves as a reminder of when the Santa Fe Railway brought prosperity to this desert outpost.

For history enthusiasts, Needles offers a tangible connection to America's westward expansion, the golden age of rail travel, and the iconic Route 66 era that defined midcentury road culture.


But the real story here isn't just history – it's possibility.

In a state where coastal residents regularly sacrifice half their income to housing, Needles presents an alternative economic reality that feels almost too good to be true.

Housing costs in Needles sit at a fraction of what you'd pay in most California communities.

Modest homes can be found for rent at prices that would barely cover a parking space in San Francisco.

For those looking to buy, the market offers opportunities that seem plucked from a different decade – small homes sometimes available for under \$150,000, a number that might get you a storage unit in Los Angeles.

Mobile homes and RV living provide even more affordable options, with several parks offering full hookups and basic amenities at prices that leave room in your budget for, well, having a life.

This housing affordability creates a unique opportunity for people looking to start over – whether recovering from financial setbacks, career changes, divorce, or simply seeking a simpler existence.

The math is compelling: when housing consumes a smaller portion of your income, other possibilities open up.

The cost equation in Needles does have one significant variable: utilities.

Summer temperatures regularly soar well above 110 degrees, making air conditioning not a luxury but a necessity.

Summer electric bills can be substantial, though many residents have embraced solar power to offset these costs.

The flip side is winter, when the mild desert climate means minimal heating expenses and outdoor living at its finest.

Many residents find that the overall annual utility costs average out to reasonable figures, especially compared to the total cost of living in coastal areas.

Grocery shopping in Needles offers the basics without the boutique prices found in trendier California communities.

The local markets provide essential items, though selection may be more limited than what city dwellers expect.

Many residents make occasional shopping trips to larger towns across the border in Arizona, combining errands with the adventure of a day trip.

For those who enjoy dining out without the accompanying financial stress, Needles offers several unpretentious options that deliver satisfaction without the big-city markup.

The Wagon Wheel Restaurant embraces the town's Route 66 heritage while serving hearty American classics that leave no one hungry.

Their breakfast menu has developed something of a cult following among both locals and travelers passing through.

Juicy's River Cafe offers riverside dining with comfort food favorites – burgers, sandwiches, and other classics that remind you sometimes the simple things really are the best.

For Mexican cuisine cravings, Munchy's serves authentic dishes that deliver big flavors without the big check at the end of your meal.

Healthcare considerations are important for anyone contemplating a move to a smaller community, and this is an area where Needles presents some challenges.

The town has a small hospital – Colorado River Medical Center – providing basic emergency and medical services.

For specialized care, residents typically travel to larger facilities in nearby cities like Lake Havasu City, Bullhead City, or even Las Vegas.

This reality requires thoughtful planning, especially for those with ongoing medical needs, but many residents find the trade-off worthwhile for the overall lifestyle benefits.

Transportation in Needles is refreshingly uncomplicated compared to California's metropolitan areas.

Traffic jams are virtually nonexistent, parking is plentiful and free, and the wear and tear on vehicles (and nerves) is significantly reduced.

The town's remote location does mean having a reliable vehicle is important for most residents.

Public transportation options are limited, though there are services available for those who no longer drive.

The central area of town offers reasonable walkability, though the summer heat makes early morning or evening the only practical times for pedestrian activities during the hottest months.

Recreation and entertainment in Needles center around natural beauty and simple pleasures rather than commercial attractions.

The Colorado River provides a playground for fishing, boating, swimming, and water sports, with several access points near town.

The surrounding desert, including the nearby Mojave National Preserve, offers spectacular landscapes for hiking, photography, and some of the most breathtaking stargazing you'll ever experience.

The night sky above Needles, unpolluted by big-city lights, reveals a universe of stars that city dwellers forget exists – a nightly show that costs nothing but delivers wonder in abundance.

For indoor entertainment, the Needles Regional Museum chronicles the area's rich history, from Native American heritage through the railroad boom and Route 66 era.

Community events often celebrate the town's unique heritage, with car shows and festivals that draw visitors from surrounding areas.

The Needles Recreation Center offers activities for residents of all ages, providing affordable options for fitness and social interaction.

Local churches and community organizations host regular gatherings that foster connection – something increasingly valuable in our digitally isolated world.

This sense of community represents one of Needles' greatest assets for those seeking to start over.

In a town of approximately 5,000 residents, anonymity isn't really an option – and most locals consider that a feature, not a bug.

Newcomers often remark on how quickly they're welcomed into the community fabric, with neighbors who actually introduce themselves and look out for one another.

This social environment creates a support network that's particularly valuable for those rebuilding their lives or seeking a fresh start.

The pace of life in Needles moves deliberately, allowing for genuine human connection that often gets sacrificed in the rush of urban existence.

Safety considerations factor into any relocation decision, and Needles generally offers a secure environment with lower crime rates than many larger communities.

The small-town dynamic means unusual activities rarely go unnoticed, creating an informal community awareness that supplements official law enforcement.

Weather in Needles defines much of the rhythm of daily life.

Summer brings intense heat that reshapes activities around early mornings and evenings, with midday retreats to air-conditioned interiors.

Winter, spring and fall offer gloriously mild temperatures that make outdoor living a joy when much of the country is shoveling snow or battling humidity.

This seasonal pattern creates a distinctive lifestyle that many residents come to appreciate – a natural cycle that connects them to the environment in ways urban living rarely allows.

The clear, dry desert air can be beneficial for those with certain respiratory conditions, though the extreme heat requires respect and adaptation.

Cultural amenities in Needles may be more modest than in metropolitan areas, but the town's rich historical heritage provides its own form of cultural wealth.

The influence of Route 66, the railroad era, and Native American traditions creates a unique cultural identity reflected in local architecture, events, and community practices.

For those who occasionally crave more diverse cultural experiences, Las Vegas lies about two hours away – close enough for day trips or weekend excursions without the daily stress of big-city living.

Technology connectivity, once a significant challenge in remote areas, has improved substantially in Needles.

Most areas now have access to reliable internet service, allowing residents to stay connected with distant family and friends through video calls and social media.

This digital access also facilitates remote work opportunities, online education, and entertainment options that supplement the town's physical amenities.

The financial advantages of living in Needles extend beyond housing and daily expenses.

California's tax structure, while generally considered high, includes some benefits that residents can leverage.

Property taxes in San Bernardino County are relatively reasonable compared to coastal counties, and Needles' lower property values translate to lower tax bills.

For those relocating from higher-cost areas, selling property elsewhere and purchasing in Needles can potentially free up significant equity to fund new beginnings or business ventures.

This financial reset has allowed many newcomers to eliminate mortgage payments entirely, dramatically reducing monthly obligations and opening up new possibilities.

The entrepreneurial opportunities in Needles present another avenue for those seeking fresh starts.

The lower cost of entry for starting small businesses means dreams of ownership become more accessible.

From small retail shops to service businesses to creative endeavors, the financial barriers are significantly lower than in California's more competitive markets.

The town's location along Interstate 40 and historic Route 66 creates potential for tourism-related businesses that cater to travelers passing through.

The proximity to the Colorado River opens possibilities for recreation-focused enterprises that serve both locals and visitors.

Of course, life in Needles isn't for everyone.

The remote location, extreme summer heat, and limited amenities present real challenges that potential residents should carefully consider.

Those who thrive on urban energy, require specialized services, or can't tolerate high temperatures might find the trade-offs too significant.

But for people seeking an affordable fresh start in California, Needles offers something increasingly rare: possibility without prohibitive cost.

The financial breathing room that comes with dramatically lower living expenses allows many residents to pursue dreams that would remain forever out of reach in the state's high-cost areas.


In many ways, Needles represents an alternative vision of California living – one based not on status and acquisition, but on simplicity, affordability, and connection to both nature and community.







1. Assemblymember Gonzalez Needles Visit

The City of Needles was pleased to welcome Assemblymember Jeff Gonzalez for the second time in as many weeks, as he returned to host community meetings at the historic El Garces. Assemblymember Gonzalez — who serves as Vice Chair of the Assembly Committees on Military and Veterans Affairs and on Water, Parks, and Wildlife — commended Needles for its positive progress and emphasized the importance of working together to build a stronger community for residents. City officials, staff, and community members gathered to discuss local priorities and hear updates on legislative initiatives impacting Needles. This visit directly supported the City Council's goal of fostering civic engagement and strengthening partnerships with state leaders. The City sincerely thanks Assemblymember Gonzalez for spending the day in Needles, engaging with local leaders, and meaningfully connecting with our community. A special thank you is also extended to the City staff — including Parks & Recreation, Public Works, and supporting departments — whose efforts ensured the success of these meetings.

2. Supporting Housing & Healthcare: Assemblymember Gonzalez Site Visits
Today, Assemblymember Jeff Gonzalez toured key sites in Needles, including
the Colorado River Medical Center, highlighting the vital role rural hospitals play
in supporting community health and economic stability. He also visited the River
Valley Inn, once a blighted motor inn and now transformed into 29 affordable
micro-apartments through a partnership between the City, the State of
California, and developer Armen Ghadimian, supported by \$410,000 in
Prohousing Incentive Program state housing funds. This work advances the City
Council's goals to expand quality housing, strengthen essential services, and
build a resilient, healthy community for residents. During the visit,
Assemblymember Gonzalez presented Mr. Ghadimian with a proclamation
recognizing this milestone. A ribbon cutting is scheduled for next month, with
more information to follow — see the attached photo for a glimpse of the event.

3. ICSC Western Conference – Palm Springs

This week, Vice Mayor Ellen Campbell, Councilmember Jamie McCorkle, and the City Manager represented Needles at the 2025 ICSC Western Conference in Palm Springs. With a regional population of 146,500, more than 23,000 vehicles traveling Interstate 40 daily, and a growing tourism and industrial base, Needles is well positioned for new investment. The delegation met with developers, retailers, and investors to market key properties, highlight riverfront recreation and hospitality opportunities, and attract growth that will help fill vacancies, bring new amenities, and strengthen Needles' standing as a progrowth destination in the Southwest. While in the desert, City officials also met with Congressman Raul Ruiz and his staff to discuss ways to collaborate on improving the quality of life for Needles residents, including advancing behavioral health resources and veterans' services. These conversations and connections will help position the City for new partnerships and support future community needs.

4. Monster Truck Insanity - Next Level Tour

The Monster Truck Insanity Next Level Tour is coming to the Needles Rodeo Grounds on **November 7–8**, **2025**, bringing high-energy motorsports and family-friendly entertainment to our community. Fans will experience monster truck freestyle competitions, the free pre-show Insanity Fest meet-and-greet, and rides in a real monster truck, with showtime at 7:00 PM. This event supports the City Council's goals to position Needles as a regional recreation and tourism destination and to drive local economic activity by attracting visitors who support area businesses. 5. Urban Land Institute (ULI) Technical Assistance Program Presentation
The City of Needles was honored to be selected as one of only six cities in
California and Nevada to participate in the Urban Land Institute (ULI) California—
Nevada Technical Assistance Program (TAP), a fully grant-funded initiative led
by ULI Orange County/Inland Empire (ULI OCIE). Over the past several days, a
volunteer panel of real estate and land use experts has met with local
stakeholders to craft actionable strategies for housing and economic growth,
infrastructure improvements, climate resilience (extreme heat, drought, seismic
risks), and community safety — all of which directly support the City Council's
long-term goals for sustainable growth and resilience. The Mayor, City Council,
and members of the public are invited to attend the panel's presentation of
recommendations on Tuesday, October 7, 2025, at 4:00 p.m. at the El Garces
Hotel.

6. Needles Pride Program & Infrastructure Improvements

The Needles Pride Program continues to unite residents, property owners, and businesses in a shared effort to beautify neighborhoods, promote civic pride, and support property maintenance. Alongside these community-driven efforts, the City remains committed to investing in critical infrastructure, public safety,

and enhanced public spaces. This week, Public Works completed ADA sidewalk repairs and replacements near the southwest corner of Broadway and I Street, performed pothole maintenance along D Street, Larchwood, and in Chesney's, and removed weeds and cleaned Bob Belt Beach Park to maintain safe, welcoming riverfront access. City Parks staff also overseeded Manny Morris Park and Nikki Bunch Park in preparation for the cooler season; the new seed is expected to sprout in 7–10 days. Meanwhile, the Electric Department repaired streetlights at the Wagon Wheel near the Shell station and installed additional LED lighting at Jack Smith Park as part of its ongoing lighting improvement program, which will continue as supplies allow. Residents can report concerns by calling 760-326-2115 (press #9) or using the Needles Connect app on Google Play Store (Android) and Apple Store (iOS). Together, we're building a safer, stronger Needles!

7. Upcoming Event: Fall 2025 Vaccination & Licensing Clinic

This is a reminder that the City of Needles Animal Shelter will host its Fall 2025 Vaccination & Licensing Clinic on Saturday, November 15, 2025, from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at 1662 Flip Mendez Parkway. PetSmart Veterinary Services (Dr. Joseph Velasco) will provide rabies, DA2PP (dogs), FVRCP (cats), Bordetella, rattlesnake vaccinations, and microchipping. City pet licenses will be available at special event rates: \$15 (altered) / \$25 (unaltered). Please remind residents to keep cats in carriers and dogs on leashes. For questions, call (760) 326-4952. This clinic supports the City Council's priorities on public health, animal welfare, and responsible pet ownership. See the attached flyer for details.

8. Needles Housing Authority – Security Fencing Project Update

This week, the Needles Housing Authority (HACN) began construction on its Security Fencing Project, awarded to Golden West Fence for a total project cost of \$233,000 funded through HACN Capital Funds. The project will install approximately 1,500 linear feet of new wrought iron fencing along J Street, Balboa Street, and Bailey Avenue to enhance the security of Housing Authority property. During initial demolition, staff identified existing wall and sidewalk conditions that were not fully apparent until removal began. To remain within budget while maintaining the planned level of security, the project design was adjusted to incorporate the structurally sound existing wall, with areas in need of grout or repair to be addressed as part of the work. Construction is now actively underway and will continue over the coming weeks. Refer to the attached photos for current project progress

9. City Staff End-of-Summer Safety Celebration

City staff gathered this week for an End-of-Summer Safety BBQ to celebrate a successful summer season marked by limited workplace incidents and a strong commitment to safety. Maintaining a safe and prepared workforce is critical to the City Council's goals of providing reliable services, protecting public resources, and fostering a positive, high-performing work environment. This event recognized the dedication of employees across all departments who kept operations running smoothly and safely during one of the City's busiest times of

the year, ensuring essential services continued without disruption to the community. Refer to the attached image for a glimpse of the event.

10. Rivers Edge Golf Course — Season Reopening

The Rivers Edge Golf Course officially reopened for the season today, Friday, October 3. The celebration will conclude with the beloved Lighted Parade at 5:00 p.m. This year's theme is "It's a Snoopy Christmas on Rt. 66, Charlie Brown!" Assemblyman Jeff Gonzalez' 2025 Bill Update

AB 513: California Global Warming Solutions Act of 2006: scoping plan

SUMMARY: Would require the California Air Resources Board to include greenhouse gas emissions from wildland and forest fires in the state scoping plan. This would ensure that California is considering all major sources of emissions when developing solutions to our climate crisis.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Assembly Natural Resources

AB 634: Controlled substances: tianeptine.

SUMMARY: Would add Tianeptine (also known as "gas station heroin"), a dangerous and addictive substance currently available for retail sale, to the list of Schedule 1 Drugs.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Public Safety

AB 641: Drug-Induced Movement Disorder Awareness Program.

SUMMARY: Drug-induced movement disorders are neurological conditions caused by antipsychotic medications that can be pervasive, debilitating, and irreversible. This Bill would require the State to establish a public awareness program.

STATUS: Held in Assembly Appropriations

AB 658: Vehicles: registration fees.

SUMMARY: Would require the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) to complete an affordability impact analysis within six months of any vehicle registration fee increase. This analysis would enable California

to better track the impacts of registration fees throughout the state, which contribute to the overall affordability crisis plaguing California.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Assembly Transportation

AB 676: Medi-Cal: unrecovered payments: interest rate.

SUMMARY: Authorizes the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) to waive the interest that would otherwise accrue when DHCS

seeks to recover an overpayment made to a Medi-Cal service provider.

STATUS: Held in Assembly Appropriations

AB 709: Sustainable Groundwater Management Act: groundwater sustainability plans.

SUMMARY: Provides local groundwater agencies with the flexibility, between official state assessments, to govern themselves and manage groundwater for long-term sustainability, without materially changing an approved Groundwater Sustainability Plan.

STATUS: Awaiting Governor's Signature

AB 764: Birds and mammals: nongame birds: mute swans.

SUMMARY: Adds mute swans, a highly invasive species, to the list of exotic nongame birds that can be legally taken, in order to reduce and better control their populations in California

STATUS: Awaiting Governor's Signature

AB 795: California Commission on the United States Semiquincentennial.

SUMMARY: Establishes the California Commission on the United States Semiquincentennial to plan and coordinate commemorations of the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence and the American Revolution.

STATUS: Held in Assembly Appropriations

AB 826: Veterans' benefits: protections.

SUMMARY: Prohibits individuals or businesses that are not accredited by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (USVA) from charging a veteran a fee to assist them with filing a veterans' benefit claim with the USVA. Enacts a civil penalty per violation of \$2,000, half to be distributed to the Veterans Service Office Fund, and half to be distributed to the filing district attorney.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Assembly Judiciary

AB 1016: Power facility and site certifications: thermal powerplants: geothermal resources.

SUMMARY: Removes regulatory and permitting obstacles to get geothermal powerplants online faster, while retaining high environmental and labor standards.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Senate Energy

AB 1031: Hazardous waste control laws: exemption: geothermal resources.

SUMMARY: Caps the generation and handling fee rate for geothermal hazardous waste control laws to no more than \$10 per ton.

STATUS: Held in Assembly Appropriations

AB 1058: Motor Vehicle Fuel Tax Law: suspension of tax.

SUMMARY: Would suspend the Gas Tax for one year, and require all savings as a result to be passed on to the consumer.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Assembly

Transportation

AB 1145: State highways: safety: State Highway Route 74: report.

SUMMARY: Would require CalTrans to conduct a highway safety study on State Highway Route 74.

STATUS: 2-Year Bill in Senate Transportation

AB 1169: Wildlife grants: Shared Habitat Alliance for Recreational Enhancement program.

SUMMARY: Would help to expand the number of outdoor recreation opportunities offered to the public through the Department of Fish and Wildlife's (DFW) Shared Habitat Alliance for Recreational Enhancement (SHARE) Program.

STATUS: Held in Senate Appropriations

AB 1282: Personal Income Tax Law: credits: medical expenses.

SUMMARY: Would a create an income tax deduction for out-of-pocket medical costs from January 1, 2025 to January 1, 2030,

STATUS: Held in Assembly Revenue & Taxation

AB 1335: Habilitation services.

SUMMARY: Removes the requirement that employment programs administered under the Department of Developmental Services obtain unnecesary accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities to be eligible as a Regional Center vendor.

STATUS: Held in Assembly Human Services

AB 1412: Special education: pupil transfers: residency requirements: records.

SUMMARY: Requires a local education agency receiving a transfer of a military child with special needs to promptly work with parents to obtain official records, and to implement the pupil's individual education plan (IEP) adopted in the previous school, or to craft a new IEP within 30 days.

STATUS: Awaiting Governor's Signature






