Purpose

A Cost-of-Service study is intended to allocate costs based on their functional purpose across different customer groups for the purpose of ensuring customers pay a fair and justifiable rate that is tied closely to their cost causation and is aligned with the utility's operational and financial needs.



working on a financial model for a new rate study for water, wastewater and

WTR & WW electric. The PowerPoint presentation today is water and wastewater and will

RATE STDY show the model for those two departments. She introduced the consultant, Brian

Bass, Manager, Raftelis.

Mr. Bass went over his PowerPoint including the rate study process, financial planning and rate projections, financial assumptions, water and wastewater status quo pro forma, financial plan results detail, proposed water and wastewater rates and bill impacts. He noted that a cost of service analysis is required under Prop 218.

Utility Manager Torrance spoke on the importance of a rate study to assure the utilities have enough revenue to cover all expenses noting that there cannot be borrowing between funds and each must stand independently. Water has been successful and only looking at a 3% increase but that's not the case with wastewater which has a lot of capital needs that are not able to be done. In order to avoid debt in wastewater, the rate increase will be spread over a five year plan. This is for information only today. The electric update will be on the next agenda and will be looking at different rate structures.

CHAIRMAN CAMPBELL explained that the Board approved the wastewater budget which included a list of capital projects so if any Board Member wants to see the millions of dollars, they're on that list. He also noted that the annual cost of living adjustment (COLA) will be coming in August or September to be implemented in October. COMMISSIONER BROWN asked that the list of capital projects be provided to the Board.

Entity Overview

The City of Needles operates as an Electric Power Entity (EPE) under AB-32 mandatory GHG reporting. The City of Needles reports unspecified and specified electricity imports, and retail sales. The source includes power imported into California, managed for the City of Needles by Western Area Power Administration – Desert Southwest Region.

Verification Overview

GHG Verification for The City of Needles entity consisted of a site visit, off-site data and record checks, and correspondence with the client. WZI recalculated GHG emissions values to check against reported values and tested for any materiality issues. In addition, original source data e-tags and CAISO market downloads were checked against entered data to verify accurate data collection. Calculation methods were also checked for conformance. GHG inventory planning and activities were checked and evaluated for conformance to the AB-32 reporting regulation.

Verification Activities

GHG Monitoring Plan:

-The entity's GHG inventory plan was obtained and checked for conformance. The plan thoroughly details required information and complies with the reporting regulation.

Unspecified Imports

-The entity reported unspecified imports from 20 generating facilities outside of California. The transactions are e-tagged. Transactions are managed on behalf of the City by Western Area Power Administration – Desert Southwest Region. The e-tags are compiled in an automated process by OATI. The entity requests a "Tags Sinking in Needles" report from OATI, which captures all e-tags delivered to the City. That data is then filtered to remove e-tags that are exempt from reporting. The removed tags include power originating in CA, and tags that are part of the DSWM Parker-Davis allocation sourced from Davis230. The DSWM tags are discussed under specified imports.

-Two sets of "metered" imports are also reported. These include the WALC Energy Imbalance Market transactions, and the Aggregated Energy Services group sharing transactions. These mechanisms are used to meet additional demand not covered by the tagged transactions. Meter reports from the City are used to calculate the transactions from these two sources, both of which originate outside of CA.

The verification team reviewed the complete OATI transaction data, and performed several additional data checks:

- 1. At the request of the verification team, a new query of the OATI data was re-run and sent to the verification team. The new data query matched the data used in the report exactly.
- A random sample of e-tags was requested, and the actual tags reviewed. Extra focus was
 put on tags that were excluded from the report, to ensure that they were correctly
 excluded. Tags matched reported data, and excluded tags were all sourced in CA. No
 issues were discovered.
- 3. Annual meter reports were requested and reviewed. The verification team was able to check the accuracy of the calculations used to determine the WALC energy imbalance and the AES group share transactions.
- 4. The verification team was made aware of 10 e-tags that were attested in 2024. This was determined to be due to errors made during tag creation. The attested tags corrected the errors and were determined to be accurate.
- 5. The verification team checked the e-tag data for transactions that were reported as unspecified imports. Tags were checked for appropriate source and sink codes, and were

filtered by source and total MWh recalculated. Total CO2e was also recalculated. No issues were discovered.

Specified Imports

-The entity reported specified imports from the DSWM Parker-Davis allocation sourced from Davis230. The City of Needles Parker-Davis Project allocation is delivered across the California border by WAPA-DSW using the DSWM01 PSE code and is reported on the City of Needles GHG Report as a specified import imported on behalf of the City of Needles. These transactions are hydroelectric power and have a zero CO2e value.

The verification team reviewed the e-tag data, and performed these data checks:

- 1. E-tags were checked for DSWM01 PSE codes. All tags were DSWM01.
- 2. Tags were totaled and checked against reported values. No issues were discovered.

Retail Sales

-The entity reported retail sales as a retail utility provider. These sales are reported based on monthly totals of the utility retail meter readings. These transactions do not contribute to the entity's CO2e total.

The verification team performed these data checks:

1. Monthly meter report was requested and reviewed. Total metered sales matched reported value exactly.

Material Misstatement Assessment

-To determine the error in reported data discrepancies, omissions, and misreporting events were quantified and used:

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Executive Summary

WZI was contracted to perform Greenhouse Gas verification services for the 2024 calendar year. Transactions Data are required to be fully verified by an accredited verification body.

Facility Overview

City of Needles is a power importer and retail provider in the state of California. Power transactions are managed on behalf of the City of Needles by the Western Area Power Authority.

The City of Needles reports transactions including specified and unspecified imports of hydroelectric and fossil-fuel generation, and retail sales.

General Plan

The WZI verification team will take steps to become familiar with the entity's trading operations in California. Transparency of data collection methods and how items are tracked will be scrutinized. Additionally, the team will scrutinize data collection methods, the personnel involved, and training methods in place that are meant to ensure precise data reporting. More details on information requested for verification to begin is detailed below in "Document Request."

Pre-Verification

WZI completed the required Conflict-of-Interest Form-A, which yielded a result of a "Low Conflict-of-Interest". Form-A was submitted and was approved to begin verification.

Verification Activities

A. Desk review of Report

The first tool is the Greenhouse Gas Monitoring Plan which will be reviewed by WZI to understand the facility operation and the methods used to properly report data from both emissions and product. Additionally, WZI has developed a checklist to use while reviewing the Monitoring Plan to ensure all necessary information is complete pursuant to Sections 95105(c)(1) through 95105(c)(10) of the Mandatory Reporting Rule. The 2024 summary report will be downloaded and reviewed for background and any broad issues.

B. Kick-Off Meeting

Kick-off meetings will be conducted through conference calls. This will consist of a discussion of what WZI is looking for in the data that is provided by Needles and WAPA agents and a general plan for how WZI will proceed in the verification process. The Greenhouse Gas Verification plan is the first source of information that serves as a basis for this discussion.

C. Document Request

A Document Request will be sent to the operator after the kick-off meeting. The operator will be asked to provide the requested documents in a timely manner. For the 2024 verification, the following information will be requested:

- 1. Greenhouse Gas Monitoring Plan:
- 2. Specified Import data;
- 3. Unspecified Export e-tags;
- 4. "GHG Quantities with Pivot" spreadsheet for 2024; and
- 5. 2024 EPE Workbook.

D. Off-Site Data Review

The off-site data review will be conducted at the WZI offices, and will consist of the following:

1. Create Sampling Plan

The Verification team will prepare a sampling plan based on data and documentation received from the operator. The sampling plan's primary focus will be the specified imports.

2. Data Completeness Check

The team will verify that all required data was collected. This data includes all power transactions into, out of, and through CA. Once the data is obtained, the data will be scrutinized for inconsistencies and how the data was collected and tracked. The team will inspect any data transfers from one format or source to another, either manual or automatic, and ensure that data quality is maintained throughout. After the data collection and tracking methods are checked, the team will ensure that data was manipulated properly. This would include procedures such as conversion factors unique to the operation, unit conversion accuracy, or general calculations used to prepare data for reporting purposes. Finally, the team will ensure that the data submitted in the report corresponds to the data records tracked for this year.

3. Data/Calculation Conformance Check

The team will verify that the calculation methods selected by the operator conform to the reporting regulation. The team will run sample calculations to verify the accuracy of the operator's calculation methods. Any error in reporting will be noted, regardless of significance, into the issues log and an explanation will be provided in the final report if the cause of the error is known (i.e. rounding error). If, however, the numbers for reporting do not match it will be noted in the issues log and is subject to revision by the reporter.

4. Issues Log Review

The team will compile the issues log and determine the impact of any errors found. Each issue will be identified with the date of discovery; a detailed description of the issue found; the specific reference in the MRR related to the issue; the impact on reported data (non-conformance, misstatement, etc.) and, finally, the resolution of the issue after corrective action is taken by the reporter to satisfy the mandatory reporting rule.

5. Materiality/Conformity Analysis

The team will determine if any errors found would create a material misstatement or a non-conformance. This information will be noted in the issues log. In the case of missing data, the proper steps will be taken according to Section 95129 of the MRR. The team will prepare a draft statement.

E. Site Visit

A site visit will be conducted at the WAPA building in Phoenix, AZ.

F. Revisions (If Needed)

If the report requires revision, the team will set the report status to "Revision Requested". After any revisions are complete, the verification will resume at step D.

G. Statement/Report Preparation

Materials from the off-site data review will be compiled into a draft verification report. The complete team will meet to determine the initial verification statement.

H. Internal Review

The report, issues log, and data will be submitted to the internal reviewer for final QA check. Depending on the internal reviewer's assessment, the verification team may need to return to the assessment for clarification. This may involve more information to be requested from the facility and/or a deeper review of portions the internal reviewer may flag as something that needs further scrutiny. Once the internal reviewer signs off on the report, the final statement can be prepared.

I. Final Statement/Report

Any errors found by the internal reviewer will be corrected. The final verification report will be prepared and submitted to the operator. After the operator has had sufficient time to review the report, the statement will be submitted to ARB via the reporting tool.

FIRST AMENDMENT

TO

NON-EXCLUSIVE LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR THE JOINT USE OF POLES

FIRST AMENDMENT TO NON-EXCLUSIVE LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR THE JOINT USE OF POLES ("Amendment") is made and entered into as of July 23, 2025 ("Effective Date"), by and between Citizens Utilities Rural Company, a California corporation, doing business as Fort Mojave Telecommunications, Inc. hereinafter referred to as "Licensee", and the City of Needles, a California charter city and the Needles Public Utility Authority, collectively hereinafter referred to as "City." Licensee and City may be referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the Parties entered into that certain Non-Exclusive License Agreement for Joint Use of Poles dated December 10, 2024 ("Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Agreement, Licensee was granted a non-exclusive license to utilize certain Joint Use Poles owned by City, as photos of and identifier described in Exhibit "A" to the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to amend the Agreement to add nine (9) additional Joint Use Poles to the scope of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Section 14.2 of the Agreement provides that any modification to the Agreement will be effective only if in writing and signed by both Parties.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing Recitals and the mutual covenants contained herein, and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, City and Licensee agree as follows:

- 1. **Incorporation of Recitals.** The Parties hereby agree that the recitals set forth in this Amendment are deemed incorporated into this Amendment and the Agreement by this reference.
- 2. **Definitions.** All capitalized terms used but not defined in this First Amendment shall have the meanings ascribed to them in the Agreement.
- 3. **Amendment to Recital A.** The Parties hereby agree that Recital A of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

- A. The Licensee has requested approval from Needles Public Utility Authority ("NPUA") to utilize certain power poles across eleven (11) specific locations to expand the Licensee's service area within California jurisdiction, as follows: (i) Location One: Eagle Pass Road, where the NPUA has two (2) power poles; (ii) Location Two: Needles Highway, crossing a San Bernardino County flood control area; (iii) Location Three: NPUA identification number 4883N Highland; (iv) Location Four: NPUA identification number 4878N Dead end on Highland; (v) Location Five: NPUA identification number 4864N Highland; (vi) Location Six: NPUA identification number 4608N Erin Drive; (vii) Location Seven: NPUA identification number 4595N Erin Drive; (viii) Location Eight: Situated on Fremont & Highland (no NPUA identification number); (ix) Location Nine: NPUA identification number 2713N L-Street at Fremont & Highland; (x) Location Ten: NPUA identification number 4689N Washington & Bailey; and (xi) Location Eleven: NPUA identification number 4584N Washington & Bailey. Photographic documentation of each Joint Use Pole is attached hereto as Exhibit "A" (hereinafter "Joint Use Pole" or "Joint Use Poles") and incorporated herein by this reference.
- 4. **Amendment to Recital B.** The Parties hereby agree that Recital B of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
- B. The Parties agree that this nonexclusive license Agreement only pertains to the Joint Use Poles depicted in Exhibit "A" as amended by the first Amendment to this Agreement executed on July 23, 2025; and
- 5. **Amendment to Section 7.1.** The Parties hereby agree that Section 7.1 of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:
- 7.1 Pole Attachment Fee. The annual fee for calendar year 2025 shall be \$7.78 per pole ("Annual Attachment Fee"). The Annual Attachment Fee shall be adjusted effective January 1 of each year. The amount of adjustment will be calculated by utilizing the National Consumer Price Index as follows: (i) the most recent published index number for the current year will be used as the fee adjuster to the next year's Annual Attachment Fee, (ii) the percentage of change in the average index numbers will be applied to the current year's Annual Attachment Fee, which will be effective January 1 of the next year, and (iii) the Annual Attachment Fee billing for the next year will be forwarded to Licensee by December 15 of each year.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Annual Attachment Fee will be adjusted in its entirety upon the successful completion of a rate study conducted by the City, in which case the findings of the study shall supersede the National Consumer Price Index. City has unilateral authority to determine the success of the rate study and the results will apply upon City's sole determination.

- 6. **Pole Attachment Fee.** The Parties acknowledge and agree that the Annual Attachment Fee set forth in the Amended Section 7.1 above shall apply to each of the additional Joint Use Poles listed in Section 3 of this Amendment.
- 7. The Parties hereby agree that Exhibit "A" of the Agreement is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with **Amended Exhibit "A"** attached hereto this Amendment as **Exhibit "A."**
- 8. All other terms of the Agreement not expressly amended by this Amendment shall remain in full force and effect.
- 9. This Amendment shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any legal action arising from or related to this Amendment shall be brought in the state or federal courts of the State of California in and for the County of San Bernardino.

NON-EXCLUSIVE LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR THE JOINT USE OF POLES

This License Agreement for the Joint Use of Poles ("Agreement") is made and effective as of the 10th day of December, 2024 ("Effective Date"), by and between Citizens Utilities Rural Company, a California corporation, doing business as Fort Mojave Telecommunications, Inc. hereinafter referred to as "Licensee", and the City of Needles, a California charter city and the Needles Public Utility Authority, collectively hereinafter referred to as "City." Licensee and City may be referred to individually as a "Party" and collectively as the "Parties."

RECITALS

This Agreement is entered into on the basis of the following facts, understandings and intentions of the Parties to this Agreement:

- A. The Licensee has requested approval to utilize Needles Public Utility Authority ("NPUA") power poles to cross two areas to increase the Licensee's service. The first location is Eagle Pass Road, where the NPUA has two power poles, and the second is on Needles Highway, which crosses a San Bernardino County flood control area, photos of which are attached hereto as **Exhibit "A"** (hereinafter "**Joint Use Pole**" or "**Joint Use Poles**"); and
- B. The Parties agree that this nonexclusive license Agreement only pertains to the Joint Use Poles depicted in Exhibit "A"; and
- C. The Parties agree that City reserves the right to deny the use of the Joint Use Poles if Licensee does not meet the conditions required by City, including but not limited to, safety standards, structure stability, power sustainability and energy demand.

AGREEMENT

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing Recitals and mutual covenants contained herein, City and Licensee agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Incorporation of Recitals.</u> The Parties accept the above recitals as true and correct and incorporate them herein as if they were fully restated in this Agreement.
- 2. <u>Purpose and Scope.</u> The purpose of this Agreement is to establish the terms and conditions under which the Licensee may utilize the Joint Use Poles. This Agreement shall apply

exclusively to the Joint Use Poles and shall be non-exclusive with the City retaining the right to allow other utilities and licensees to utilize its power poles.

- 3. <u>Authorized Use</u>. The Licensee is permitted to attach to the Joint Use Poles solely by means of an anchor. This Agreement does not authorize any drilling into the Joint Use Poles or any other action that may impact the integrity of the Joint Use Poles.
- 4. Reservation of City's Rights. City shall have sole and exclusive authority to approve, conditionally approve, or deny any request for Joint Use Pole attachments or to require any licensee to remove its equipment from City's poles. City reserves all rights and discretion related to future use of the poles, maintenance and/or replacement of the poles and any future uses or licensing of use of the poles.
- Power Pole at any time upon providing thirty (30) days written notice, unless exigent circumstances require shorter notice. Upon receipt of such notice, Licensee shall remove its attachments from the specified Joint Use Pole within thirty (30) days. City may terminate this Agreement immediately and without 30 days notice upon discovery of just cause. Just cause includes, but is not limited to, safety concerns, failure to comply with local, state, and federal laws, any and all regulatory requirements, or City's need to use the pole(s) for its own services.
- 5. <u>Licensee's Rights</u>. No use of any Joint Use Poles under this Agreement, regardless of duration, shall create or vest in Licensee any ownership or property rights therein. The Licensee's right shall be and will remain a license only and is revocable in City's discretion.

6. Maintenance.

- 6.1 <u>City's Maintenance</u>. City shall provide Licensee with thirty (30) day notice of any plans to replace, decommission or remove a Joint Use Pole.
- 6.2 <u>Licensee's Maintenance</u>. Licensee shall, at its own expense, make and maintain its attachments in a safe condition, in compliance with all applicable laws, regulations and industry standards. All attachment shall be made and maintained in a manner acceptable to City and in conformance with the standards listed below in Section 6.3 of this Agreement.
- 6.3 Agency and National Standards. Construction installation, maintenance and repair of Joint Use Poles and all electric and communication circuits located thereon shall be in accordance with the National Electric Safety Code, as adopted by California Public Utilities Commission, the National Electric Code as adopted by the City of Needles, the California Occupational Safety and Health Act (Cal OSHA), the southern California Joint Pole Committee

Joint Pole Practices and Routine, the rules and regulations of any governing authority having jurisdiction over the subject matter of this Agreement, and the requirements City prescribes in this Agreement. Where a difference in standards may exist, the more stringent shall apply.

6.4 No Conflict of Use. Licensee shall ensure that its attachments do not conflict with City or any other third-party use of the Joint Use Poles. In the event of any interference caused by Licensee's attachments, Licensee shall, at its own expense and within fifteen (15) days of written notice from the City or affected third-party, remedy the interference to City's satisfaction.

7. Cost.

- 7.1 Pole Attachment Fee. The annual fee for calendar year 2024 shall be \$7.78 per pole ("Annual Attachment Fee"). The Annual Attachment Fee shall be adjusted effective January 1 of each year. The amount of adjustment will be calculated by utilizing the National Consumer Price Index as follows: (i) the most recent published index number for the current year will be used as the fee adjuster to the next year's Annual Attachment Fee, (ii) the percentage of change in the average index numbers will be applied to the current year's Annual Attachment Fee, which will be effective January 1 of the next year, and (iii) the Annual Attachment Fee billing for the next year will be forwarded to Licensee by December 15 of each year.
- 7.2 <u>Failure to Pay</u>. If Licensee fails to pay Pole Attachment Fees when due, City may, upon ten (10) days written notice, terminate Licensee's rights under this Agreement and remove Licensee's attachments from the Joint Use Poles.
- 7.3 Removal of Attachments. Licensee is responsible for the removal of all wires, cables, lamp fixtures, guy wires, conduits, and all other apparatus, fixtures or appurtenances of Licensee attached to the Joint Use Poles ("Attachment"). Licensee shall bear all costs and expenses associated with the removal of any Attachment or other equipment or materials installed or placed by Licensee on the Joint Use Poles. Licensee shall complete all removal work in compliance with applicable laws, regulations, and industry standards.
- 8. <u>Assignment of Rights</u>. Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement, the City shall have the unrestricted right to assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of any part of this Agreement, including but not limited to any of its rights or interests hereunder, any Joint Use Pole, or any Attachment or right-of-way covered by this Agreement, to any firm, corporation, individual, or other entity without the prior written consent of Licensee.

The Licensee shall not assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of any part of this Agreement, including but not limited to any of its rights or interest hereunder, any Joint Use Pole, or any

Attachment or right-of-way covered by this Agreement, to any firm, corporation, individual, or other entity, without the prior written consent of the City.

- 9. <u>Taxes</u>. Licensee shall pay any taxes and/or assessments lawfully levied on its equipment/property attached to any Joint Use Pole.
- 10. <u>Notice</u>. When it is necessary to provide notice to the Parties as provided within this Agreement, delivery of such notice shall be to:

11. Indemnification.

11.1 <u>Licensee's Indemnification</u>. Fort Mojave Telecommunications, Inc. shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City of Needles, its officers, employees, agents, and representatives from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, suits, damages, liabilities, losses, settlements, judgments, costs, and expenses (including but not limited to reasonable attorney's fees and costs), whether or not involving a third party claim, which arises out of or relate to: (i) any use of or activities related to the Joint Use Poles or any pole in which Fort Mojave Telecommunications, Inc. has attachments installed, (ii) the installation, maintenance, repair, or removal of any attachments to the aforementioned power poles, (iii) any breach or violation of this Agreement by Licensee, (iv) any failure by Licensee to comply with applicable laws, regulations, or safety standards, or (v) any negligent acts, errors, or omissions of Licensee, its employees, agents, or contractors. Licensee's indemnification obligations shall apply regardless of whether the claim, demand, action, suit, damage, liability, loss, settlement, judgment, cost, or expense is caused in part by a party indemnified hereunder, except to the extent caused by the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City of Needles.

12. <u>Insurance</u>.

- 12.1 <u>Licensee Insurance</u>. Licensee shall, at its sole cost and expense, provide, procure and maintain, during the term of this Agreement the following insurance coverages:
- 12.1.1 Workers Compensation insurance to cover obligations imposed by federal and state statutes having jurisdiction of its employees engaged in the performance of the

work, and Employer's Liability insurance with a minimum limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000).

- 12.1.2 Commercial General Liability insurance to cover with a minimum combined single limit of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence. The policy shall include coverage for bodily injury, broad form property damage liability (including completed operations), personal injury liability (including coverage for contractual and employee acts), blanket contractual, and products. The policy shall include a severability of interest provision. The product and completed operation coverage shall extend for two years past the termination of the Agreement.
- 12.1.3 Comprehensive Automobile Liability insurance with a combined single limit for Bodily injury and property damage of not less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence with respect to Licensee's vehicles.
- 12.1.4 Licensee shall name the City as an additional insured on a primary and non-contributory basis.
- 13. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall remain in effect until terminated by either Party with or without cause, at any time upon one hundred eighty (180) days written notice to the other Party, or until otherwise terminated as provide in this Agreement.

14. Miscellaneous Provisions.

- 14.1 <u>Dispute Resolution</u>. Any controversy or claim, besides those related to bodily injury, death, or property damage, related to this Agreement shall be provided to the opposite Party through notice. Such controversy or claim shall be subject to a meeting between the appropriate officials of City and Licensee and both Parties shall attempt to settle disagreements amicably and efficiently before resorting to formal litigation. The initial meeting between the Parties officials shall take place within thirty (30) days after notice of the dispute has been received.
- 14.2 <u>Entire Agreement and Modifications</u>. This Agreement, which includes all attached exhibits, supersedes any and all pervious agreements, either oral or written, between the parties hereto with respect to the use of Joint Use Poles and contains all of the covenants and agreements between the parties with respect to the granting of the license to use the Joint Use Poles as described within this Agreement. Any modifications of this Agreement will be effective only if it is in writing, signed by both Parties.

- 14.3 <u>Choice of Law.</u> This Agreement is made, entered into and shall be performed in the County of San Bernardino, in the State of California and shall in all respects be interpreted, enforced and governed under the laws of the State of California.
- 14.4 <u>Venue</u>. The Parties agree that any action, proceeding, or claim arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be brought exclusively in the state or federal courts located in the County of San Bernardino, State of California. Each Party irrevocably submits to the exclusive jurisdiction of such courts for the purpose of any such action, proceeding, or claim.
- 14.5 <u>Severability</u>. If any portion, section, sentence, provision or paragraph of this Agreement is declared invalid, illegal or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the entire balance of this Agreement not so affected shall remain in full force and effect.






Fort Mojave Telecommunications, Inc. Proposed Joint Pole Locations

CITY OF NEEDLES PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

1. PARTIES AND DATE.

This Agreement is made and entered into this <u>13th</u> day of <u>October</u>, between the **CITY OF NEEDLES**, a **California Charter City**, (hereinafter referred to as the "City") and <u>Brooks</u> Consulting LLC (hereinafter referred to as "Consultant"). City and Consultant are sometimes individually referred to as "Party" and collectively as "Parties."

2. RECITALS.

2.1 Services.

The City solicited proposals to provide <u>Professional Services for Electrical Engineering</u> pursuant to that certain Request for Proposals, which is attached hereto as Exhibit "A."

2.2 Proposal

Consultant has made a proposal ("Proposal") to the City dated september 14, 2020 to provide such professional services, which Proposal is attached hereto as Exhibit "B."

2.3 Consultant.

City desires to retain Consultant to perform and assume responsibility for the provision of such services required by the City on the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement. Consultant represents and warrants to City that Consultant possesses the necessary skills, licenses, certifications, qualifications, personnel and equipment to provide such services.

3. TERMS.

3.1 Scope of Services and Term.

- 3.1.1 <u>Professional Services</u>. Consultant agrees to perform **the services described herein and in "Exhibit B"** ("Services"). All Services shall, as is consistent with the generally accepted professional standard of care, be performed in the manner and according to the timeframe set forth in the Proposal. Consultant designates <u>self or various persons</u> as Consultant's professional responsible for overseeing the Services provided by Consultant.
- 3.1.2 <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall become effective when executed and shall remain in effect until terminated as provided herein. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, this Agreement shall

- automatically terminate after <u>3 years</u> unless extended in writing by the Parties with the approval of the City Council of the City.
- 3.1.3 <u>Conflict</u>. In the event that the terms of the Proposal shall conflict with the terms of this Agreement, or contain additional terms other than the Services to be rendered and the price for the Services, the terms of this Agreement shall govern and said additional or conflicting terms shall be of no force or effect.

3.2 Responsibilities of Consultant.

- 3.2.1 Control and Payment of Subordinates; Independent Contractor. Services shall be performed by Consultant or by its employees under Consultant's supervision. Consultant will determine the means, methods and details of performing the Services subject to the requirements of this Agreement. The City retains Consultant on an independent contractor basis and not as an employee. Consultant retains the right to perform similar or different services for other clients during the term of this Agreement. Any additional personnel performing the Services under this Agreement on behalf of Consultant shall also not be employees of the City and shall at all times be under Consultant's exclusive direction and control. Consultant shall pay all wages, salaries, and other amounts due such personnel in connection with their performance of Services under this Agreement and as required by law. Consultant shall determine its own work hours and schedule; provide its own equipment; maintain its own offices; provide its own vehicles; insurance; cell phones and office phones; and Consultant shall be solely responsible for managing and supervising its personnel and employees. Consultant shall further be responsible for all reports and obligations, including, but not limited to: social security taxes, income tax withholding, payroll taxes, unemployment insurance, disability insurance, and workers' compensation insurance.
- 3.2.2 Standard of Care; Performance of Employees. Consultant shall perform all Services under this Agreement in a skillful and reasonably prudent manner, consistent with, and limited to, the standard of skill and care generally recognized as being employed by professionals performing similar services at the same time in the same discipline in the same locality in the State of California. The Consultant makes no other representations or warranties, whether expressed or implied, with respect to the services rendered hereunder. Consultant represents and maintains that it is skilled in the professional calling necessary to perform the Services. Consultant agrees that all employees and subcontractors shall have sufficient skill and experience to perform the Services assigned to them. Finally, Consultant represents that it, its employees and subcontractors have all licenses, permits, qualifications

and approvals of whatever nature that are legally required to perform the Services, and that such licenses and approvals shall be maintained throughout the term of this Agreement. As provided for in the indemnification provisions of this Agreement, Consultant shall perform, at its own cost and expense and without reimbursement from the City, any services necessary to correct errors or omissions which are caused by the Consultant's failure to comply with the applicable standard of care. Any employee of the Consultant or its sub-consultants who is determined by the City to be uncooperative, incompetent, a threat to the adequate or timely completion of a Project, a threat to the safety of persons or property, or any employee who fails or refuses to perform Services in a manner acceptable to the City, shall be promptly removed from the Project by the Consultant and shall not be re-assigned to perform any Services to City.

- 3.2.3 Laws and Regulations. Consultant shall exercise usual and customary professional care in its efforts to keep itself informed of and in compliance with applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations affecting the performance of Services, including applicable Cal/OSHA requirements, and shall give notices required by law. Consultant shall be liable for violations of such laws and regulations in connection with the Services, but only to the extent such violation constitutes a breach of the generally accepted professional standard of care Consultant shall indemnify and hold the City, its officials, directors, officers, and employees harmless, pursuant to the indemnification provisions of this Agreement, from liability to the extent caused by its negligent failure to comply with such applicable laws, rules or regulations.
- 3.2.4 <u>Employment Eligibility</u>. Consultant shall be solely responsible for obtaining Employment Eligibility Verification information from Consultant's employees, in compliance with the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, Pub. L. 99-603 (8 U.S.C. 1324a), and shall ensure that Consultant's employees are eligible to work in the United States.
- 3.2.5 <u>CalPers</u>. In the event that Consultant employs, contracts with, or otherwise utilizes any CalPers retirees in completing any of the Services performed hereunder, such instances shall be disclosed in advance to the City and shall be subject to the City's advance written approval.
- 3.2.6 <u>Drug-free Workplace Certification</u>. By signing this Agreement, the Consultant hereby certifies under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the Consultant will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code, Section 8350 et seq.) and will provide a drug-free workplace.

Safety. Consultant shall execute and maintain its work so as to avoid 3.2.7 injury or damage to any person or property. In carrying out its Services, the Consultant shall at all times be in compliance with applicable local, state and federal laws, rules and regulations, and shall exercise necessary precautions for the safety of its employees appropriate to the nature of the work and the conditions under which the work is to be performed. Safety precautions as applicable shall include, but shall not be limited to: (A) adequate life protection and life-saving equipment and procedures; (B) instructions in accident prevention for all employees and subcontractors, such as safe walkways, scaffolds, fall protection ladders, bridges, gang planks, confined space procedures, trenching and shoring, equipment and other safety devices, equipment and wearing apparel as are necessary or lawfully required to prevent accidents or injuries; and (C) adequate facilities for the proper inspection and maintenance of all safety measures. Nothing herein shall be construed as establishing any responsibility or obligation on the part of the Consultant for jobsite safety issues, programs, or precautions of anyone but its own employees and subconsultants for whom it is legally responsible.

4. Indemnification; Insurance.

- **4.1 Insurance.** Consultant shall maintain prior to the beginning of and for the duration of this Agreement insurance coverage as specified in Exhibit "C" attached to and made a part of this Agreement.
- 4.2 **Indemnity for Professional Liability.** When the law establishes a professional to the fullest extent permitted by law, Consultant shall indemnify and hold harmless the City and its officials, and employees ("Indemnified Parties") from and against losses, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses, including reasonable legal counsel's fees and costs, but only to the extent caused by any negligent performance of Consultant, its officers, agents, employees or subconsultants (or any agency or individual that Consultant shall bear the legal liability thereof) in the performance of professional services under this Agreement. In no event shall the indemnification obligation extend beyond the date when the institution of legal or equitable proceedings for professional negligence would be barred by any applicable statute of repose or statute of limitations. The parties expressly agree that this indemnity provision does not include, and in no event shall the Consultant be required to assume, any obligation or duty to defend any claims, causes of action, demands, or lawsuits in connection with or arising out of this Project or the services rendered by the Consultant.
- **4.3 Indemnity Other than Professional Liability**. Other than in the performance of professional services and to the full extent permitted by law, Consultant shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless City, and any and all of its employees, officials and agents from and against any liability (including liability for claims, suits, actions, arbitration

proceedings, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, losses, expenses or costs of any kind, whether actual, alleged or threatened, including legal counsel fees and costs, court costs, interest, defense costs, and expert witness fees), where the same directly arise out of, are a direct consequence of, or are in any way directly attributable to, in whole or in part, the performance of this Agreement by Consultant, including but not limited to officers, agents, employees or subcontractors of Consultant except where the same is caused by negligent or willful misconduct of the City.

5. Responsibilities of City.

- **5.1 Requests.** The City agrees to comply with all reasonable requests of Consultant and provide reasonable access to documents including objectives and constraints, space, capacity, and performance requirements, flexibility, and expandability, and any budgetary limitations, reasonably necessary to the performance of Consultant's duties under this Agreement. In order to facilitate Consultant's conformance with the performance schedule, the City shall respond to Consultant's submittals in a timely manner.
- **5.2 City Representative.** The City designates the City Manager or his designee as City representative ("City Representative") with respect to the work to be performed under this Agreement. The City Representative shall have complete authority to transmit instructions, receive information, and interpret and define the City's policy and decisions with respect to materials, equipment, elements, and systems pertinent to the Services covered by this Agreement.

6. Fees and Payments.

- **6.1 Compensation.** City agrees to pay per the bid specifications submitted. Consultant shall be paid at the rates set forth in the Proposal and shall not increase any rate without the prior written consent of the City. Notwithstanding anything in this Section 6, total fees and charges paid by City under this Agreement shall not exceed \$6,600 without approval by the City Council of City.
- **6.2 Invoices.** Consultant shall submit to the City a monthly itemized statement which indicates work completed and hours of Services rendered by Consultant. The statement shall describe the amount of Services and supplies provided since the initial commencement date, or since the start of the subsequent billing periods, as appropriate, through the date of the statement. City shall have the right to review and audit all invoices prior to or after payment to Consultant. This review and audit may include, but not be limited to City's:
 - a. Determination that any hourly fee charged is consistent with this Agreement's approved hourly rate schedule;
 - b. Determination that the multiplication of the hours billed times the approved rate schedule dollars is correct;
 - c. Determination that each item charged is the usual, customary, and reasonable charge for the particular item. If City determines an item charged is greater

than usual, customary, or reasonable, or is duplicative, ambiguous, excessive, or inappropriate, City shall either return the bill to Consultant with a request for explanation or adjust the payment accordingly, and give notice to Consultant of the adjustment.

- **6.3 Payment.** If the work is satisfactorily completed, City shall pay such invoice within fourty-five (45) days of its receipt. Should City dispute any portion of any invoice, City shall pay the undisputed portion within the time stated above, and at the same time advise Consultant in writing of the disputed portion.
- **6.4 Reimbursement for Expenses.** Consultant shall not be reimbursed for any expenses unless authorized in writing by the City Manager.
- **6.5** Additional Services. In the event Consultant performs additional or different services than those described herein without the prior written approval of the City Manager and/or City Council of City, Consultant shall not be compensated for such services. Consultant expressly waives any right to be compensated for services and materials not covered by the scope of this Agreement or authorized by the City in writing.
- 6.6 Prevailing Wages. Consultant is aware of the requirements of California Labor Code Sections 1720, et seq., and 1770, et seq., as well as California Code of Regulations, Title 8, Section 16000, et seq., ("Prevailing Wage Laws"), which require the payment of prevailing wage rates and the performance of other requirements on certain "public works" and "maintenance" projects. If the Services are being performed as part of an applicable "public works" or "maintenance" project, as defined by the Prevailing Wage Laws, and if the total compensation is \$1,000 or more, Consultant agrees to fully comply with such Prevailing Wage Laws. The City shall provide Consultant with a copy of the prevailing rates of per diem wages in effect at the commencement of this Agreement. Consultant shall make copies of the prevailing rates of per diem wages for each craft, classification or type of worker needed to execute the Services available to interested parties upon request, and shall post copies at the Consultant's principal place of business and at the project site. Consultant shall defend, indemnify and hold the City, its elected officials, officers, employees and agents free and harmless from any claims, liabilities, costs, penalties or interest arising out of any failure or alleged failure to comply with the Prevailing Wage Laws.

6.7 Accounting Records.

6.7.1 Maintenance and Inspection. Consultant shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to all costs and expenses incurred under this Agreement. All such records shall be clearly identifiable. Consultant shall allow a representative of the City during normal business hours to examine, audit, and make transcripts or copies of such records and any other documents created pursuant to this Agreement. Consultant shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to the Agreement for a period of three (3) years from the date of final payment under this Agreement.

7. General Provisions.

7.1 Termination of Agreement.

- 7.1.1 Grounds for Termination. The City or Consultant may, by written notice to the other party, terminate this Agreement at any time and without cause by giving written notice to the other party of such termination, and specifying the effective date thereof, at least seven (7) days before the effective date of such termination. Upon termination, Consultant shall be compensated only for those Services which have been actually and adequately rendered to the City, and Consultant shall be entitled to no further compensation.
- 7.1.2 Effect of Termination. If this Agreement is terminated as provided herein, Consultant shall, as long as Consultant has been fully paid for Services rendered, provide all finished or unfinished Documents and Data (as defined below), programming source code, plans reports and other information of any kind prepared by Consultant in connection with the performance of Services under this Agreement. Consultant shall be required to provide such documents and other information within fifteen (15) days of the request. If the City subsequently reproduces projectrelated documents or creates (or causes others to create) a derivative work based upon project-related documents created by the Consultant, the City shall completely remove the original professional seals, logos and other indications on the documents of the identity of the Consultant. The City agrees that any future use, reuse, or modification of the Consultant's work product without retaining and maintaining the retention of the Consultant shall be at the City's sole risk and without liability to the Consultant and the City agrees to waive any and all claims against the Consultant and release, defend, indemnify and hold the Consultant harmless from any and all claims or liabilities arising therefrom.
- 7.1.3 <u>Services</u>. In the event this Agreement is terminated in whole or in part as provided herein, the City may procure, upon such terms and in such manner as it may determine appropriate, services similar to those terminated.
- **7.2 Delivery of Notices.** All notices permitted or required under this Agreement shall be given to the respective Parties at the following address, or at such other address as the respective parties may provide in writing for this purpose:

Such notice shall be deemed made when personally delivered or when mailed, forty-eight (48) hours after deposit in the U.S. Mail, first class postage prepaid and addressed to the Party at its applicable address. Actual notice shall be deemed adequate notice on the date actual notice occurred, regardless of the method of service.

7.3 Ownership of Materials and Confidentiality.

- 7.3.1 City Ownership. Upon full payment to Consultant for Services rendered, all documents and data ("Documents & Data"), including data on electric, digital or magnetic media, prepared by Consultant under this Agreement shall be the property of the City for use solely in connection with the purpose for which they were created, except that Consultant shall have the right to retain copies of all Documents & Data for its records. The City recognizes that data, plans, specifications, reports, documents or other information recorded on or transmitted as electronic media are subject to undetectable alteration, either intentional or unintentional due to, among other causes, transmission, conversion, media degradation, software error, or human alteration. Accordingly, the electronic documents provided to the City are for informational purposes only and are not intended as an end-product. The Consultant makes no warranties, either expressed or implied, regarding the fitness or suitability of the electronic documents. If the City subsequently reproduces project-related documents or creates (or causes others to create) a derivative work based upon project-related documents created by the Consultant, the City shall completely remove the original professional seals, logos and other indications on the documents of the identity of the Consultant. The City agrees that any future use, reuse, or modification of the Consultant's work product without retaining and maintaining the retention of the Consultant shall be at the City's sole risk and without liability to the Consultant and the City agrees to waive any and all claims against the Consultant and release, defend, indemnify and hold the Consultant harmless from any and all claims or liabilities arising therefrom.
- 7.3.2 <u>Confidentiality</u>. All ideas, memoranda, specifications, plans, procedures, drawings, descriptions, computer program data, input record data, written information, and other Documents and Data either created by or provided to Consultant in connection with the performance of this Agreement shall be held confidential by Consultant. Such materials shall

not, without the prior written consent of the City, be used by Consultant for any purposes other than the performance of the Services. Nor shall such materials be disclosed to any person or entity not connected with the performance of the Services or the Project. Nothing furnished to Consultant which is otherwise known to Consultant or is generally known, or has become known, to the related industry shall be deemed confidential. Consultant shall not use the City's name or insignia, photographs of the Project, or any publicity pertaining to the Services or the Project in any magazine, trade paper, newspaper, television or radio production or other similar medium without the prior written consent of the City. Disclosure of any information in compliance with any legal orders shall not constitute a breach of this provision.

- **7.4 Cooperation; Further Acts.** The Parties shall reasonably cooperate with one another, and shall take any additional acts or sign any additional documents as may be necessary, appropriate or convenient to attain the purposes of this Agreement. Consultant shall not be required to take any additional acts or execute any documents that in any way might, in the sole judgment of the Consultant, increase the Consultant's contractual or legal obligations or risks, or the availability or costs of its professional or general liability insurance.
- **7.5 Entire Agreement.** This Agreement contains the entire Agreement of the Parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and supersedes all prior negotiations, understandings or agreements. This Agreement may only be modified by a writing signed by both Parties.
- **7.6 Governing Law.** This Agreement is entered into and shall be performed in Needles, California and shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. Any claims arising under this Agreement shall be brought in the state or federal courts located in San Bernardino County. The City and Consultant agree to submit all claims and disputes arising out of this Agreement to non-binding mediation prior to the initiation of legal proceedings. This provision shall survive completion or termination of this Agreement; however, neither party shall seek mediation of any claim or dispute arising out of this Agreement beyond the period of time that would bar the initiation of legal proceedings to litigate such claim or dispute under the applicable law.
- **7.7 Time of Performance.** Consultant shall perform as expeditiously as is consistent with the generally accepted professional standard of care.
- **7.8 City's Right to Employ Other Consultants.** The City reserves the right to employ other consultants at any time for any purpose.
- **7.9 Assignment; Sublease; Transfer.** Consultant shall not assign, sublease, hypothecate, or transfer, either directly or by operation of law, this Agreement or any interest herein without the prior signed written consent of the City Manager. Any attempt to do so shall be null and void, and any assignees, hypothecates or transferees shall acquire no right or interest by reason of such attempted assignment, hypothecation or transfer.

- **7.10 Construction; References; Captions.** Since the Parties or their agents have participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement, the language of this Agreement shall be construed simply, according to its fair meaning, and not strictly for or against any Party. Any term referencing time, days or period for performance shall be deemed calendar days and not work days. All references to Consultant include all personnel, employees, and subcontractors of Consultant, except as otherwise specified in this Agreement. All references to the City include its elected officials, officers, and employees except as otherwise specified in this Agreement. The captions of the various articles and paragraphs are for convenience and ease of reference only, and do not define, limit, augment, or describe the scope, content, or intent of this Agreement.
- **7.11** Amendment; Modification. No supplement, modification, or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding unless executed in writing and signed by both Parties.
- **7.12 Waiver.** No waiver of any default shall constitute a waiver of any other default or breach, whether of the same or other covenant or condition. No waiver, benefit, privilege, or service voluntarily given or performed by a Party shall give the other Party any contractual rights by custom, estoppel, or otherwise.
- **7.13 No Third Party Beneficiaries**. There are no intended third party beneficiaries of any right or obligation assumed by the Parties. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create a contractual relationship with, or a cause of action in favor of, a third party against either the City or the Consultant. Consultant's services hereunder are being performed solely for the benefit of the City, and no other entity shall have any claim against the Consultant because of this Agreement or the Consultant's performance or nonperformance of services hereunder.
- **7.14 Invalidity; Severability.** If any portion of this Agreement is declared invalid, illegal, or otherwise unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect.
- 7.15 Improper Payment. Consultant maintains and warrants that it has not employed nor retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement. Further, Consultant warrants that it has not paid nor has it agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for Consultant, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, the City shall have the right to rescind this Agreement without liability.
- **7.16 Conflict of Interest.** For the term of this Agreement, no member, officer, or employee of the City, during the term of his or her service with the City, shall have any direct interest in this Agreement, or obtain any present or anticipated material benefit arising therefrom. Consultant has read and is aware of the provisions of Section 1090 et seq. and Section 87100 et seq. of the Government Code relating to conflicts of interest of public officers and employees. Consultant agrees that they are unaware of any financial or economic interest

of any public officer or employee of the City relating to this Agreement. It is further understood and agreed that if such a financial interest does exist at the inception of this Agreement, the City may immediately terminate this Agreement by giving notice thereof. Consultant shall comply with the requirements of Government Code section 87100 et seq. and section 1090 in the performance of and during the term of this Agreement.

- **7.17 Equal Opportunity Employment.** Consultant represents that it is an equal opportunity employer and it shall not discriminate against any subcontractor, employee or applicant for employment because of race, religion, color, national origin, handicap, ancestry, sex or age. Such non-discrimination shall include, but not be limited to, all activities related to initial employment, upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination.
- **7.18 Labor Certification.** By its signature hereunder, Consultant certifies that it is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the California Labor Code which require every employer to be insured against liability for Workers' Compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that Code, and agrees to comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the Services.
- **7.19 Authority to Enter Agreement.** Consultant has all requisite power and authority to conduct its business and to execute, deliver, and perform the Agreement. Each Party warrants that the individuals who have signed this Agreement have the legal power, right, and authority to make this Agreement and bind each respective Party.
- **7.21 Counterparts.** This Agreement may be signed in counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original.
- **7.22 Contents of Request for Proposal and Proposal.** Consultant is bound by the contents of City's Request for Proposal and the Proposal. In the event of conflict, the requirements of this Agreement shall take precedence over those contained in the Proposal and the City's Request for Proposals. The incorporation of the Proposal shall be for the Services to be rendered and the price for such Services only, and any other terms and conditions included in the Proposal shall have no force and effect on this Agreement or the relationship between Consultant and/or City, unless expressly agreed to in writing.

EXHIBIT C Insurance Requirements

Time for Compliance.

Consultant shall not commence Services under this Agreement until it has provided evidence satisfactory to the City that it has secured all insurance required under this section. In addition, Consultant shall not allow any subcontractor to commence work on any subcontract until it has provided evidence satisfactory to the City that the subcontractor has secured all insurance required under this section.

Minimum Requirements.

Consultant shall, at its expense, procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Agreement by the Consultant, its agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors. Consultant shall also require all of its subcontractors to procure and maintain the same insurance for the duration of the Agreement. Such insurance shall meet at least the following minimum levels of coverage:

- i. General liability. Consultant shall maintain commercial general liability insurance with coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CG 00 01, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate, for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage. The policy must include contractual liability that has not been amended. Any endorsement restricting standard ISO "insured contract" language will not be accepted.
- **ii. Automobile liability.** Consultant shall maintain automobile insurance at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CA 00 01 covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of the Consultant arising out of or in connection with the Services to be performed under this Agreement, including coverage for any owned, hired, non-owned or rented vehicles, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each accident.
- iii. Professional liability (errors & omissions). Consultant shall maintain professional liability insurance that covers the Services to be performed in connection with this Agreement, in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per claim and in the aggregate. Any policy inception date, continuity date, or retroactive date must be before the effective date of this Agreement and Consultant agrees to maintain continuous coverage through a period no less than three (3) years after completion of the Services required by this Agreement.
- **iv. Worker's Compensation.** Consultant shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance (Statutory Limits) and Employer's Liability Insurance (with limits of at least \$1,000,000).

Other Provisions or Requirements

- **Separation of Insureds; No Special Limitations.** All insurance required by this Section shall contain standard separation of insured's provisions. In addition, such insurance shall not contain any special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the City, its directors, officials, officers, employees, agents and volunteers.
- **Deductibles and Self-Insurance Retentions.** Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. Consultant shall guarantee that, at the option of the City, either: (1) the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as respects the City, its directors, officials, officers, employees, agents and volunteers; or (2) the Consultant shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation costs, claims and administrative and defense expenses.
- Acceptability of Insurers. Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating no less than A:VII, licensed to do business in California, and satisfactory to the City.
- Proof of insurance. Consultant shall provide certificates of insurance to City as
 evidence of the insurance coverage required herein, along with a waiver of
 subrogation endorsement for workers' compensation. Insurance certificates and
 endorsements must be approved by the City prior to commencement of
 performance. Current certification of insurance shall be kept on file with City at all
 times during the term of this contract. City reserves the right to require complete,
 certified copies of all required insurance policies, at any time.
- City Approval. All coverage types and limits required are subject to approval, modification and additional requirements by City, as the need arises. Consultant shall not make any reductions in scope of coverage (e.g. elimination of contractual liability or reduction of discovery period) that may affect City's protection without City's prior written consent.
- Primary/noncontributing. Coverage provided by Consultant shall be primary and any insurance or self-insurance procured or maintained by City shall not be required to contribute with it. The limits of insurance required herein may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of City before the City's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.

City's rights of enforcement. In the event any policy of insurance required under this Agreement does not comply with these specifications or is canceled and not replaced, City has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance it deems necessary and any premium paid by City will be promptly reimbursed by Consultant

or City will withhold amounts sufficient to pay premium from Consultant payments. In the alternative, City may cancel this Agreement. Consultant acknowledges and agrees that any actual or alleged failure on the part of the City to inform Consultant of non-compliance with any requirement imposes no additional obligations on the City nor does it waive any rights hereunder.

- Waiver of subrogation. All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this agreement shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against City, its elected or appointed officers, agents, officials, employees and volunteers or shall specifically allow Consultant or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. Consultant hereby waives its own right of recovery against City, and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subconsultants.
- Requirements not limiting. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this Section are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for purposes of clarification only as it pertains to a given issue and is not intended by any party or insured to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type. If the Consultant maintains higher limits than the minimums shown above, the City requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the Consultant. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.
- **Notice of cancellation.** Consultant agrees to oblige its insurance agent or broker and insurers to provide to City with a thirty (30) day notice of cancellation (except for nonpayment for which a ten (10) day notice is required) or nonrenewal of coverage for each required coverage.
- Additional insured status. All policies required herein shall provide or be endorsed to
 provide that City and its officers, officials, employees, and agents, and volunteers
 shall be additional insureds under such policies.
- Pass through clause. Consultant agrees to ensure that its subconsultants, subcontractors, and any other party involved with the project who is brought onto or involved in the project by Consultant, provide the same minimum insurance coverage and endorsements required of Consultant. Consultant agrees to monitor and review all such coverage and assumes all responsibility for ensuring that such coverage is provided in conformity with the requirements of this section. Consultant agrees that upon request, all agreements with consultants, subcontractors, and others engaged in the project will be submitted to City for review.
- City's right to revise specifications. The City reserves the right at any time during the term of the contract to change the amounts and types of insurance required by giving the Consultant ninety (90) days advance written notice of such change. If such change

results in substantial additional cost to the Consultant, the City and Consultant may renegotiate Consultant's compensation.

- **Timely notice of claims.** Consultant shall give City prompt and timely notice of claims made or suits instituted that arise out of or result from Consultant's performance under this Agreement, and that involve or may involve coverage under any of the required liability policies.
- Additional insurance. Consultant shall also procure and maintain, at its own cost and expense, any additional kinds of insurance, which in its own judgment may be necessary for its proper protection and prosecution of the work.

AUDIT FINDINGS

I. Records Review

My staff reviewed the following records during the audit:

- Utility Statistics including miles of overhead line and underground cable, number of overhead and underground facilities, and number of customers served
- Pole Loading Calculation Records

II. Records Review – Violations List

My staff observed the following violations during the records review portion of the audit:

GO 95, Rule 18, Maintenance Programs and Resolution of Potential Violations of General Order 95 and Safety Hazards, Section (A)(1), states:

Each company (including electric utilities and communications companies) is responsible for taking appropriate corrective action to remedy potential violations of GO 95 and Safety Hazards posed by its facilities. Upon completion of the corrective action, the company's records shall show, with sufficient detail, the nature of the work, the date, and the identity of persons performing the work. These records shall be preserved by the company for at least ten (10) years.

GO 95, Rule 18, Section (B), Maintenance Programs, states:

Each company (including electric utilities and communications companies) shall establish and implement an auditable maintenance program for its facilities and lines for the purpose of ensuring that they are in good condition so as to conform to these rules. Each company must describe in its auditable maintenance program the required qualifications for the company representatives who perform inspections and/or who schedule corrective actions. Companies that are subject to GO 165 may maintain procedures for conducting inspections and maintenance activities in compliance with this rule and with GO 165.

The auditable maintenance program must include, at a minimum, records that show the date of the inspection, type of equipment/facility inspected, findings, and a timeline for corrective actions to be taken following the identification of a potential violation of GO 95 or a Safety Hazard on the company's facilities.

The City of Needles was unable to provide CPUC staff with a current maintenance program or procedure and was also unable to provide any work order records for calendar year 2024.

GO 165, Section III-B, Distribution Facilities, Standards for Inspection, states:

Each utility subject to this General Order shall conduct inspections of its distribution facilities, as necessary, to ensure reliable, high-quality, and safe operation, but in no case may the period between inspections (measured in years) exceed the time specified in Table 1.

GO 95, Rule 31.2, Inspection of Lines, states in part:

Lines shall be inspected frequently and thoroughly for the purpose of ensuring that they are in good condition so as to conform with these rules. Lines temporarily out of service shall be inspected and maintained in such condition as not to create a hazard.

GO 95, Rule 35, Vegetation Management, states in part:

Where overhead conductors traverse trees and vegetation, safety and reliability of service demand that certain vegetation management activities be performed in order to establish necessary and reasonable clearances the minimum clearances set forth in Table 1, Cases 13 and 14, measured between line conductors and vegetation under normal conditions, shall be maintained. (Also see Appendix E for tree trimming guidelines.) These requirements apply to all overhead electrical supply and communication facilities that are covered by this General Order, including facilities on lands owned and maintained by California state and local agencies.

GO 165, Rule III (C), Record Keeping, states in part:

The utility shall maintain records for (1) at least ten (10) years of patrol and detailed inspection activities, and (2) the life of the pole for intrusive inspection activities. Such records shall be made available to parties or pursuant to Commission rules upon 30 days notice. Commission staff shall be permitted to inspect such records consistent with Public Utilities Code Section 314 (a).

The City of Needles was unable to provide CPUC staff with a current inspection program or procedure for its overhead facilities and was unable to provide any patrol or detailed inspection records for calendar years 2023 or 2024. The city of Needles was also unable to provide any vegetation management records nor intrusive testing records for its poles in calendar year 2024.

GO 165, Section III-B, Distribution Facilities, Standards for Inspection, states:

Each utility subject to this General Order shall conduct inspections of its distribution facilities, as necessary, to ensure reliable, high-quality, and safe operation, but in no case may the period between inspections (measured in years) exceed the time specified in Table 1.

GO 128, Rule 17.2, Inspection, states:

[Underground supply] Systems shall be inspected by the operator frequently and thoroughly for the purpose of insuring that they are in good condition and in conformance with all applicable requirements these rules.

GO 165, Rule III (C), Record Keeping, states in part:

The utility shall maintain records for (1) at least ten (10) years of patrol and detailed inspection activities, and (2) the life of the pole for intrusive inspection activities. Such

records shall be made available to parties or pursuant to Commission rules upon 30 days notice. Commission staff shall be permitted to inspect such records consistent with Public Utilities Code Section 314 (a).

The City of Needles was unable to provide CPUC staff with a current inspection program or procedure for its underground facilities and was unable to provide any underground inspection records for calendar years 2023 or 2024.

IV. Field Inspection Violations List

GO 95, Rule 91.3 Stepping, B. Location of Steps, states in part:

The lowest step shall be not less than 8 feet from the ground line, or any easily climbable foreign structure from which one could reach or step. Above this point steps shall be placed, with spacing between steps on the same side of the pole not exceeding 36 inches, at least to that conductor level above which only circuits operated and maintained by one party remain. Steps or fixtures for temporary steps shall be installed as part of a pole restoration process. Steps shall be so placed that runs or risers do not interfere with the free use of the steps.

The lowest pole step on Pole No. 0603N was located at a height of less than eight feet above an easily-climbable short cinderblock wall.

GO 95, Rule 31.1, Design Construction and Maintenance, states in part:

Electrical supply and communication systems shall be designed, constructed, and maintained for their intended use, regard being given to the conditions under which they are to be operated, to enable the furnishing of safe, proper, and adequate service.

The following overhead facilities required of maintenance:

- A transformer on Pole No. 4453N had significant exterior corrosion.
- Multiple transformers on Pole No. 4602N had significant exterior corrosion.
- Pole No. 3545N was missing a section of its ground wire due to an apparent act of vandalism.
- A pole-to-pole secondary triplex between Pole No. 3566N and Pole No. 3559N was unraveling.
- The ground moulding on Pole No. 3564N was damaged.
- A down guy wire attached to Pole No. 4234N was excessively long. Approximately ten feet of the wire extended beyond the guy anchor and lay on the ground.

GO 95, Rule 51.6, Marking and Guarding, High Voltage Marking of Poles, states in part:

Poles which support line conductors of more than 750 volts shall be marked with high voltage signs. This marking shall consist of a single sign showing the words "HIGH VOLTAGE", or pair of signs showing the words "HIGH" and "VOLTAGE", not more than six (6) inches in height with letters not less than 3 inches in height. A pair of signs may be stacked to a height of no more than 12 inches. Such signs shall be of weather and corrosion—resisting material, solid or with letters cut out therefrom and clearly legible.

The "High Voltage" signs on each of the following poles were missing or damaged:

GO 128, Rule 17.1, Design, Construction and Maintenance, states in part:

For all particulars not specified in these rules, design, construction, and maintenance should be done in accordance with accepted good practice for the given local conditions known at the time by those responsible for the design, construction, or maintenance of [the] communication or supply lines and equipment.

The following underground or surface-level equipment was in need of maintenance:

- Padmounted Transformer No. 4644 was leaking oil.
- Padmounted Transformer No. 3284 had corrosion around its base and was leaking oil.
- Padmounted Transformer No. 4681 had a damaged locking mechanism. The transformer could not be opened by Needles staff during the audit, and CPUC staff was unable to inspect its interior.

- New wire was placed on Pole No. 3545N. Ground wire was removed by theft.
- Unraveling wire was repaired
- Ground Molding was replaced on Pole No. 3564N
- Down guy wire was repaired on Pole No. 4234N

GO 95, Rule 51.63, Marking and Guarding, High Voltage Marking of Poles

 All poles mentioned below have work orders prepared for crews to replace or install highvoltage signs as requested

GO 128, Rule 17.1, Design, Construction and Maintenance

- The padmounted transformer no. 4644 & 3284 will be replaced in the fall. Current peak summer temperatures limit the crews ability to schedule an outage for the extended period needed to replace the transformers.
- The padmounted transformer no. 4681 damage lock has been repaired and is in working condition.

Wastewater Treatment Facility and Collection System June 2025

Please find below a summary of our services provided associated with the operational support services for the wastewater treatment facilities for the month of June 2025.

- The daily average flow for the month of June 2025 was 0.461 MGD.
- Completed the May 2025 monthly monitoring report for the state.
- Conducted in-house process control testing for the SBRs.
- Sent out the weekly and monthly samples as required by the monitoring permit.
- Tested the plant lift station and plant alarm callouts.
- Administrative coordination with finance and the administrative staff at 3rd street is ongoing.
- Inspected facility perimeter fences and percolation ponds.
- Operations staff decanted the digester to limit the amount of sludge that needed to be sent to the drying beds for further
 processing and ultimate removal to the off-site landfill.
- Completed routine monthly inspection of the Kubota tractor, the 4" trash pump, and the jetter.
- Cleared drying beds 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11 and placed in bed 24 for future removal.
- Preventive Maintenance Program is ongoing per operating hours of the various plant components.
- Completed the bar screen service and inspections throughout the month.
- Completed weekly inspection of the emergency generator prior to and during its weekly test runs.
- Ongoing communication with City staff regarding items associated with the overall wastewater system.
- Staff completed the CJIPA PPE and electrical safety training modules.
- Replaced the fridge in the lab. This is used for storing reagents, batteries, and samples.
- Wastewater team completed the annual inventory for both the plant and collections.

Supplemental repair services, exceptional event(s) during the month of December.

- June 10, 2025 operational staff troubleshot the hand off auto switch for the pumps at Jack Smith park. Some control wires were inadvertently transposed when the new motor starter was installed. We also replaced the lag float and reconnected the thermal control wires. (5.0 man hours No charge for this activity).
- June 13, 2025 wastewater team replaced manhole cover on Peru St. (No charge for this activity)
- June 16, 2025 operations staff repaired leaks on the compression release head for the shop compressor. (1.0 hour No charge for this activity)
- June 24, 2025 operations staff was called out at ~0038 hours for a control panel alarm for a failed motive pump in SBR #1.
 The main breaker was tripped. The pump was left in the off position for further investigation during normal business hours.
 (1.0 hour No charge for this activity)
- June 25, 2025 wastewater team removed and replaced the motive pump on SBR #1. The pump was sent up to the authorized repair facility on June 26, 2025 for further inspection. We are expecting a quote for the repairs sometime in July. (8.0 man hours, No charge for this activity.)

1. Route 66 Broadband - Channel 2 Community Broadcasts

City staff recently met with representatives from Route 66 Broadband to coordinate the City's use of Channel 2 on their cable TV platform for community programming. The City will utilize this channel to broadcast public bulletins, emergency alerts, community flyers, a calendar of community events, and recordings of City Council meetings on a continuous loop. This initiative supports the Council's goal of enhancing public engagement and promoting transparency by expanding access to timely and relevant information. By leveraging Route 66 Broadband's local cable platform, the City can more effectively inform residents about upcoming events, programs, and important local decisions. Channel 2 programming is expected to be operational within the next few weeks. Thank you to Route 66 Broadband for your collaboration and support in helping the City share its story with the community.

2. Needles Beautification in Action

The City of Needles remains committed to infrastructure, safety, and community pride through coordinated, citywide efforts. This week, Public Works and Utility crews addressed priority maintenance across several areas. Temporary asphalt repairs were completed near Chestnut Market and nearby neighborhoods to improve road safety until permanent resurfacing is scheduled. In the downtown area, overgrown vegetation was cleared to enhance visibility and appearance. At Bob Belt Beach Park, crews placed boulders to block access to the peninsula and prevent erosion. On Front Street near El Garces, the Water Department responded to a recurring leak, initiated an emergency Blue Stake, and fully replaced the service line. These improvements reflect the City Council's priorities—investing in infrastructure, enhancing neighborhoods, and promoting beautification. We thank our crews for their continued dedication. Photos from this week's work are attached. Residents can report concerns by calling 760-326-2115 (press #9) or using the Needles Connect app on Google Play Store (Android) and Apple Store (iOS). Together, we're building a safer, stronger Needles!

- 3. Route 66 Pharmacy Now Open and Accepting Registrations
 Route 66 Pharmacy is now open at 821 W. Broadway with a fresh new
 storefront and is actively registering patients. While approval to serve Medi-Cal
 patients is still pending, they are currently able to serve those with Medicare
 Part D insurance. Residents are encouraged to stop by and create a patient
 profile now, ensuring they're ready for full service as soon as Medi-Cal
 authorization is in place. This new pharmacy helps address the gap in local
 prescription access created by the closure of Rite Aid earlier this year. This
 effort aligns with the City Council's commitment to expanding essential services,
 supporting public health, and fostering economic growth. Take a look at their
 updated storefront—another positive step for healthcare access in Needles.
- 4. Elevating Needles Through Regional Tourism Partnerships
 The City of Needles was recently featured in *Traicy Japan*, highlighting the city
 as the Gateway to California's Oasis on the Colorado River and a key stop
 along historic Route 66. In April, the Mayor welcomed an international
 delegation from Japan during a Familiarization (FAM) tour organized by
 Discover Inland Empire and tourism leader Freddy Bi. The visit showcased
 local attractions including the Recreation Center, Needles Regional Museum,
 and the Welcome to California sign—promoting Needles' Route 66 legacy,
 riverfront amenities, and historic character. The coverage provided valuable
 international exposure and strengthened the city's appeal to global travelers.
 This effort supports the City Council's goals to attract tourism, foster
 engagement, promote Needles as a vibrant destination, and drive economic
 opportunity. Read the article: *Traicy Japan Discovering Needles*.
- 5. Chamber Business Directional Sign Program Now Open for Participation The Needles Chamber of Commerce is actively managing the Business Directional Sign Program, offering local businesses a low-cost way to increase visibility and attract travelers. Supported by an \$8,700 grant from Supervisor Dawn Rowe, the first of 11 signs is now being renovated, with full installation expected by year's end. Sign slots are available at high-traffic locations throughout the city, including Needles Highway, Broadway, River Road, and K Street. Details on sizing, pricing, and availability are outlined in the attached brochure. This program supports Council's goals of enhancing tourism, supporting small business, and promoting public-private partnerships. - 6. Electric Yard Building Construction Progress Update
 As a follow-up to the initial delivery of the Electric Yard Building, construction is now visibly progressing. The structural steel framing has been erected, and the concrete pad and driveway have been completed. Equipment is on-site, and crews are actively advancing work on the next phase of the build. This project continues to reflect the Council's investment in infrastructure stability, asset protection, and operational readiness. By replacing temporary storage with a permanent facility, the City is taking meaningful steps to extend the lifespan of

essential utility equipment and reduce long-term replacement costs. Updated site photos are attached for your reference.

7. Advancing Regional Collaboration

As part of the City Council's ongoing commitment to strategic regional collaboration, City Manager Patrick Martinez recently participated in a leadership roundtable hosted by the ROMEO Breakfast Club, a respected 46-year-old civic group in Boulder City focused on regional dialogue and public service. The meeting brought together local government leaders to address shared challenges, exchange best practices, and explore opportunities to align resources for smart, sustainable growth. It also provided a platform to showcase Needles' rich history, recent economic development efforts, and growing momentum, reinforcing the city's progress and potential. These efforts reflect the City of Needles' dedication to building strong intergovernmental partnerships that advance Council priorities and enhance quality of life throughout the region.

8. Backpack and School Supply Drive - Colorado River Station

The Colorado River Sheriff's Station / Needles Police Department is hosting a Backpack and School Supply Drive to support students in the Needles Unified School District. The drive aims to collect new backpacks and school supplies to assist local families and ensure children are prepared for a successful school year. Because backpacks are often a costly burden for low-income families, this effort helps relieve that pressure while strengthening community support for Needles youth. Monetary donations are also accepted and will be used to purchase backpacks and supplies. All contributions will be acknowledged publicly, including on social media platforms. 9. Financial Literacy- "On The Money" by Arrowhead Credit Union

Participants engaged with interactive stations, learning about housing costs, transportation, savings, and employment, while working alongside peers and mentors. The atmosphere was energetic, educational, and highly engaging. Lunch was generously provided by Smashed Burgers on 66—thank you for fueling the day. We also extend our sincere thanks to Arrowhead Credit Union for their continued investment in Needles youth and community development. 1. Peanuts Foundation Highlights Needles' Role in National Celebration Attached is the official press release from Peanuts Worldwide and the Foundation for Hospital Art announcing a community celebration in Needles on August 12, 2025, commemorating the 75th anniversary of the Peanuts comic strip and the 50th anniversary of Spike's debut. The event honors Needles' unique connection to Charles Schulz—who spent part of his childhood in the city and later used it as inspiration for the character Spike. As part of the celebration, the Colorado River Medical Center will receive two large-scale, paint-by-number murals donated by the Foundation for Hospital Art, featuring classic Peanuts characters and a special desert-themed design showcasing Spike. Community members will be invited to participate in the painting during the event. The press release also outlines the broader "Take Care With Peanuts" initiative and includes remarks from Schulz's granddaughter Stephanie Revelli, Peanuts leadership, and local officials. This national recognition shines a spotlight on Needles as a meaningful part of the Peanuts legacy and reflects how community, art, and storytelling can come together to support healing and civic pride.

2. Citywide Maintenance and Beautification Efforts Continue

The City of Needles continues to prioritize infrastructure, safety, and community pride through ongoing, visible improvements across the city. Staff is aligning local stories and visuals with Visit California's 2025 editorial calendar to maximize exposure. With July already underway, upcoming themes offer several strong opportunities: August (accommodations, camping, glamping), September (wine/beer/surf), October (fall events and Halloween), and December (holidays and Route 66 Centennial previews). To submit content for editorial consideration, click here. These themes provide timely ways to showcase our OHV access, outdoor recreation, events, lodging, and our lead role in the 2026 Centennial celebration. Through this partnership, Needles has the opportunity to be featured across Visit California's digital and print platforms, reinforcing our presence as a key stop along the Mother Road. Staff will continue to submit targeted content and collaborate with local partners to elevate Needles' visibility in the months leading up to the Centennial.

 On Saturday, August 2, Tri-State Community Healthcare will sponsor a free Night Pool Party at the Needles Aquatic Center, located at 1661 J Street, from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. The event will feature complimentary hot dogs, chips, and drinks, along with water bounce house slides, a water balloon toss competition, and open pool activities for all ages. This fun, family-friendly event is designed to offer Needles residents a safe and festive environment to beat the summer heat, enjoy outdoor recreation, and connect with one another. 

On Tuesday, August 12, 2025, Needles will celebrate two important anniversaries: the 75th anniversary year of the Peanuts comic strip (which launched in October 1950) and the 50th anniversary of Spike's debut.

Starting at 10:00 a.m., Peanuts and local organizations are planning a variety of activities at the Colorado River Medical Center, located at 1401 Bailey Avenue, Needles, CA 92363. The event is open to the public.

Stephanie Revelli, a granddaughter of Peanuts creator Charles M. 


